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



Objects

The objects of this Society as stated in Article II of the Constitution are:

1. .

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Insignia

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, page 57.

CHAPTER MEETING OPENING

Gavel.

Regent: To perpetuate the memory and the spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; to promote the development of an enlightened public opinion; and to foster patriotic citizenship; — these are the objects of our Society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

Chaplain: Guard that which is committed unto thee.

Response: Yea, I have a goodly heritage.

Chaplain: Thou shalt remember all the way which Jehovah thy God hath led thee.

Response: Blessed is the nation whose God is Jehovah.—I Timothy 6:20; Psalm 16:6; Deut. 8:2; Psalm 33:12.

Chaplain (or Collect): Our Father in Heaven, we thank Thee for Thy guidance and for Thy abiding presence in the life of our country. We thank Thee for all those yesterdays of our human race whose lessons and fulfillments have become a heritage to us. Continue, we pray, Thy blessings upon this nation, that all who are a part of it may learn true nobility of manhood and womanhood.

Grant us growth in understanding and increasing devotion to righteousness, Amen.

Pledge of Allegiance.

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INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

Chaplain: You have been duly elected to office in _____ Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Do you accept its responsibilities and duties?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to uphold the Constitution of the United States of America and to seek its observance by others?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to perform the duties of your office to the best of your ability and understanding, and that at all times you will conduct yourself uprightly, God being your helper?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: That which is gone out of thy lips thou shalt observe and do; according as thou hast vowed unto Jehovah thy God. —Deut. 23:23.

Collect: Lord God, we pray that we may be joined together in loyalty;—these who now are placed in leadership, and we who have chosen them to guide us. Bless their faithfulness and ours, in a united service to our Society and to Thy kingdom. May we have an awareness of Thy companionship in all our plans and projects; and the assurance of Thy benediction upon our work. Amen.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Report immediately to the State Corresponding Secretary any change in chapter officer or chapter chairman.

Report AT ONCE all resignations, deaths, marriages, and members RECEIVED by transfer to the Treasurer General. Do not report a resignation, or transfer a member in arrears in dues. Only members in good standing may resign or be transferred.

Do not vote to grant a resignation. Report all resignations IM-MEDIATELY. To delay may cause injustice, and the member to have to be dropped or the chapter to have to pay an additional year's dues.

Vote to receive a member by transfer, and notify the Treasurer General IMMEDIATELY of the acceptance of the member by the chapter.

Do not report names of members as transferred to other chapters until you receive notice from the Treasurer General that such transfers have been recorded.

Grant transfer card as soon as requested. Do not vote to grant transfer OUT of the chapter. Do not send transfer card to the Treasurer General. The member transferring gives it with a copy of her application paper to the chapter to which she transfers. Chapter from which member transferred does not remove name from rolls when transfer card is issued, but does remove it from the rolls when notice is received from Treasurer General that transfer has been completed. Likewise, chapter to which member transfers does not add name to rolls when transfer card and application paper is received, but adds the name to the rolls as of the date on which the Treasurer General notifies the chapter Treasurer of BOTH chapters of date upon which transfer is completed.

Collect dues in time to reach Washington by January 1. DO NOT wait until December to begin to collect dues.

Send in late December all dues on hand. DO NOT wait for delinquents. Send all dues received after Jaunary 1 AS SOON AS RE-CEIVED. DO NOT HOLD dues received after January 1 waiting for other members to pay. To do so may rob your chapter of rightful representation and a member of the right to serve as a delegate or alternate.

Send special funds for schools, scholarships, etc., for which State credit is desired to the STATE TREASURER, who in turn will forward to the Treasurer General.

Every Chapter Regent, Treasurer, and Registrar, should have a copy of the D. A. R. Handbook. The price of the Handbook is twenty cents, or six for one dollar, in one package to one address. Orders with remittances should be sent to the Treasurer General, Memorial Continental Hall, Washington, D. C.

Forty third Annual State Conference

Annual Pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission

The eighth annual pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission was made September 18, 1940, by ninety-seven persons. At 10:30 A. M., the Board Meeting was called to order by the State Vice-Regent, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder. The State Chaplain, Mrs. William H. McCamish, led in prayer; and in the absence of the State Chairman of Correct Use of the Flag Committee, the Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mrs. J. N. Ryan.

Welcome and greetings were extended by Mrs. Shrewder, who also gave an account of the automobile accident in which the State Regent, Mrs. A. J. Berger, and the State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. H. M. Stricklen, were badly injured early Sunday morning, September 15th. Mrs. Shrewder also expressed to the members of the Board Mrs. Berger's best wishes and regret that she could not be present.

Reports were given by the State Officers. Letters from honored guests at the State Conference, announcement of the New York Daughters, of Mrs. William H. Pouch for President General, and other communications were read.

Appreciation of the fact of James Ross Chapter serving as hostess for the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage this year was expressed by Mrs. Shrewder; the Secretary was instructed to send a note of thanks, and Mrs. L. B. Naylor was requested to give oral thanks.

Mrs. Shrewder streesed the following:

First: Mrs. Berger's desire that Kansas rank 100 per cent in contributing to the National Endowment Fund before March 1st; every chapter to be represented by some amount.

Second: The Archives Room, \$25.00 having been pledged by the Kansas Society. Chapters were urged to contribute toward this project in September or October.

Third: Membership. National Board will meet October 10th to accept new members. All applications should be sent in as soon as possible. Chapters are organizing at Eureka and Ulysses and will be confirmed before the end of 1940.

Members were requested to place orders for the Golden Jubilee issue of the National Historical Magazine, which will be the October number, without delay. Single copy to be fifty cents; money must accompany order. Mrs. Shrewder stated our subscriptions to the magazine are increasing. She also made an announcement relating to the C. A. R. Divisional Meeting to be held in Innes Tea Room, October :21st. A telegram containing greetings from Mrs. Kathryn Campbell was read.

The Board approved the gift of one of its members of a 12x18 inch Kansas flag which had been requested by the North Carolina Orthopedic Hospital, which is to be given as an expression from the Board of its appreciation and affection for Mrs. A. J. Berger.

Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick, Ex-Vice President General and Honorary State Regent, brought greetings, told of a recent telephone conversation had with Mrs. Berger concerning the accident, and suggested messages be sent to Mrs. Berger and Mrs. Stricklen. A motion was made by Mrs. O. P. Dellinger, and seconded by Mrs. Marcel Duphorne, that telegrams be sent to Mrs. Berger and Mrs. Stricklen, expressing our disappointment that they could not be with us, and best wishes for their recovery. The motion was carried, and the Secretary was instructed to send the messages.

Reports of State Chairmen followed. Mrs. L. B. Naylor, State Chairman of Approved Schools, moved that the money coming in for Tamasee School be applied to a scholarship. This motion was seconded by Mrs. W. H. McCamish, and carried.

Mrs. Shrewder expressed the Board's appreciation of the fact that Mrs. Joe R. Beeler, State Chairman of the Correct Use of the Flag, is giving the First Prize of \$5.00 for the Flag Essay Contest for 8th grade pupils, for the best essay on the American Flag, and instructed the Secretary to send a note to her, stating the Board's acceptance of her plan, and its grateful acceptance of her donation of First Prize. A motion, made by Mrs. O. P. May, and seconded by Mrs. J. W. Dixon, that the Board authorize the State Society to pay \$3.00; \$2.00 for the Second Prize, and \$1.00 for the Third Prize for the Flag Essay Contest, as suggested by the State Chairman of Correct Use of the Flag, was carried.

Mrs. J. W. Dixon moved that the State Society give a \$5.00 prize to the girl who has first place in the Girl Home Makers Cotton Dress Contest in Kansas; whether there is one girl or many girls competing. Mrs. C. F. Drake seconded this motion, which was carried.

Inquiry was made regarding the new By-Laws by Mrs. C. F. Drake. Mrs. Shrewder announced that the Chapters would have them very soon.

Mention was made by Mrs. Shrewder of the Forty-third Annual State Conference which will be held in El Dorado, March 25, 26 and 27, 1941.

Mrs. Glenn T. Zimmerman moved that as an expression of sympathy, in the death of Mr. J. W. King, a note be sent to Mrs. King from the Board. This motion was seconded by Mrs. O. P. Dellinger, and carried. The Secretary was instructed to send note.

Mrs. L. B. Naylor stated that Mrs. John Logan Marshall, of South Carolina, Vice President General, would be in Kansas between October 19th and November 2nd, and will visit chapters without expense to them. She also announced luncheon would be served on the lawn at 12:30, followed by an address on the Constitution by Mr. Arthur J. Stanley, of Kansas City, Kansas, and music by pupils from the Wyandotte High School and Junior College. The Secretary was instructed by Mrs. Shrewder to send notes of thanks to Mr. Stanley and Mr. J. Lewis Doll, of the Wyandotte High School. Meeting adjourned.

Executive Board Meeting

The Executive Board met in the Innes Tea Room, in Wichita, January 10, 1941, at 2:30 P. M. The State Regent, Mrs. A. J. Berger, presided, and all members were present. Mrs Berger, in the name of the State organization, thanked Mrs. Shrewder for furnishing the Kansas flag which was presented to the Museum at North Carolina Orthopedic Hospital, where white, Indian and Negro children are patients.

As Tamassee, one of our two D. A. R. Approved Schools, is endeavoring to raise funds to erect a new High School Building in order to provide the class room space required by regulations governing accredited schools, the Executive Board agreed to go on record as recommending that the D. A. R. Chapters in Kansas cooperate by contributing a fund sufficient to finance either the High School Entrance Hall at a cost of \$500, or Hall No. 3, cost \$500. Mrs. Shrewder moved that the Executive Board recommend that this project be undertaken in the name and honor of our present State Regent, Mrs. A. J. Berger. Seconded by Mrs. Duphorne. Carried. Mrs. Berger expressed appreciation and thanks. P. Dellinger, as State Historian, sponsor the replacing of this marker on Pawnee Rock at an approximate cost of \$31., using figures submitted by Metalcrafts Inc., of Cincinnati. Seconded by Mrs. Duphorne. Carried.

A motion, made by Mrs. McArthur, that the Executive Board recommend that the El Quartelejo Pilgrimage be made an Annual Spring Pilgrimage, and a sum not to exceed \$15.00 be allowed the hostess chapter for expenses of same, was seconded by Mrs. Shrewder, and carried. Mrs. Shrewder moved that the Executive Board recommend that the El Quartelejo Pilgrimage this year be a Coronado celebration in cooperation with the local Scott County Coronado Committee. W. Lane and carried.

An invitation was extended by Mr. Allison McClure of the El Dorado Theatre to the Susannah French Putney Chapter and members of the Conference to be his guests at the premier showing of "The Land of Liberty," starting at 4:15 P. M. Meeting adjourned.

4. That a reprint of the Rules of the Student Loan Fund be made and a copy sent to each chapter.

The recommendations made by the Board of Management were read and voted on by sections as follows:

1. That the chapters of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution raise a fund of \$500.00 to cover cost of a hall in the new High School building at Tamassee, and that this project shall be undertaken in the name and honor of our present State Regent, Mrs. A. J. Berger. Carried.

 That a definite rule be passed establishing a two weeks loan period with the privilege of two weeks renewal on all books borrowed from the Kansas State D. A. R. Genealogical Lending Library; all books to be insured and all postage and insurance to be paid by the borrower. Carried.
 That the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution purchase two volumes of "Historical Restorations by the

That the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution purchase two volumes of "Historical Restorations by the Daughters of the American Revolution", by Lewis Barrington; one to be placed in the Kansas State D. A. R. Genealogical Lending Library and one in the file of the State Historian; and that chapters be asked to consider purchasing copies of this publication for their local and chapter libraries. Carried.

5. That the 1942 per capita tax of 32 cents be allowed. Carried.

6. That a charge of 25 cents be made for papers on file in the State Filing and Lending Bureau for use by the chapters; fee to be retained by the Filing and Lending Bureau to be used toward the expense of this office. Carried.

Those attending the 43rd Conference will long remember the spectacular pledging and giving scene when the following amounts were contributed for the Tamassee High School: Total pledges— \$202.00; total cash and checks—\$157.00; Grand total-—\$359.00. The gifts and pledges were tabulated and turned over to the State Treasurer and will appear in her report. Mrs. A. B. Seelye reminded us that what was being done for the new High School should not be confused with nor interfere with the support of Tamassee School.

Miss Catherine Campbell's motion that the State Corresponding Secretary be instructed to write to the National Society, calling attention to the fact that the Kansas D. A. R., contributed the \$1,000.00 given to International Institute in honor of Mrs. George Thacher Guernsey, was seconded by Mrs. G. L. Coughron, and carried.

Mrs. Frank S. Hodge, as Regent of Uvedale Chapter, extended a very kind invitation to the Kansas Daughters to hold their fortyfourth Conference in Hutchinson next March; and a telegram from

the Hutchinson Chamber of Commerce, extending cordial and urgent invitation, and pledging full cooperation, was read. Mrs. Berger, in the name of the State Society, assured Mrs. Hodge the invitation was unanimously accepted. Miss Marion Seelye moved that the Executive Board be empowered to approve the minutes of the Thursday morning meeting of the Conference; seconded by Mrs. G. D. Weilepp, and carried. At Mrs. Berger's request, Mrs. C. G. Wilke, Chairman, introduced and thanked the Pages, and Mrs. Ralph B. Earp, the Chairmen, who served during Conference. Mrs. Berger expressed thanks to them in behalf of Kansas State Society for making the Conference such a happy occasion, and a rising vote of thanks was given by the assembly. Mrs. Earp, in turn, thanked Mrs. Berger and Conference members. In closing, all joined heartily in singing "Blest Be The Tie That Binds"; the Benediction was pronounced by Mrs. Berger; the colors were retired, and the 43rd Annual State Conference was adjourned.

The minutes for Thursday morning have been approved by the members of the Executive Board.

Report of State Officers

STATE REGENT

(Mrs. Alexander J.) RUTH NORRIS BERGER

The sands of the hour glass of my administration for the past eleven months have rapidly slipped away, and I come before you today to give an account of my stewardship as State Regent of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. Just as the world is filled with sunlight and shadow, so is a State Regent's life filled with delightful experiences and arduous tasks; but when viewed in retrospect, the difficulties fade into insignificance and only the happy spots remain.

As I review the work of the past year I am deeply impressed with the part which Faith has played in the accomplishment of our established program. Once, in an interview, Marconi, the wizard of wireless, remarked: "Only Faith can bridge the gulf between man and infinity". It was Faith which led our forefathers to bridge the ocean between the old world and the new, so that freedom might be established on American soil. It was Faith in the hearts of four patriotic women which led to the building of our splendid National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. It was Faith which led to the appointment in 1894 of Mrs. Martha Hand as the first State Regent of Kansas, and Faith which led to the organizing two years later of the Topeka Chapter, the first in our State. My State Regency began under the most auspicious and happy circumstances. In an impressive ceremony at the 49th Continental Congress in Washington, I was installed State Regent of Kansas, and the retiring State Regent, and now Vice President General, Miss Seelye, took from her shoulder the blue ribbon and placed it over mine—transferring to me also the guardianship of the State work in Kansas. From that day forth it has been my earnest desire to keep the State Society functioning on the same high plane attained by my predecessors in office.

I deeply appreciate the many lovely courtesies extended me this year. It was with regret that many delightful invitations could not be accepted. I should like to make special mention of each delightful occasion, but as I have requested the Officers, Chairmen and Regents to stress the work of the Society rather than social activities, I, too, shall confine my report to the work of the Society, though each occasion will always remain a most pleasant memory in my book of Golden Memories.

As State Regent I have been invited to represent the State Society at many patriotic gatherings and have carnestly endeavored at all times to cooperate to the fullest extent in promoting all worth while movements which are in sympathy with our objects and aims. I attended the Southeastern District meeting in Pittsburg and the 2nd Annual El Quartelejo Pilgrimage which was arranged for by our efficient State Vice Regent, Mrs. Shrewder. The James Ross Chapter of Kansas City was hostess for the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage, and I deeply regret that the car accident a few days before made it impossible for me to be present.

Wherever I have gone this year I have found keen interest in the work of our Society and a real desire on the part of our members and others to obtain information on the actual work we do. The members of a chapter naturally look to the Regent for the diffusion of D. A. R. information. Since she is of necessity the actual pivot around which the real chapter work turns, I would earnestly urge each Regent to inform herself fully so that she may be the leader of a wide awake, active, well informed chapter. I know of no better way for one to become such a leader than through the use of the D. A. R. Handbook.

During this year it has been my privilege to attend four of the five meetings of the National Board of Management held in Washington, and I plan to attend the meetings there next month. Kansas will have three members on the House Committee, and four will serve as Pages at the Continental Congress. It is indeed a pleasure to learn that so many members are planning to attend the Congress this year, and I urge each one who can to attend.

It is my desire to bring to the attention of the chapters many vital phases of our work in order to promote the growth and virility of our State and National Society. Of prime importance is increased membership if we would strengthen our organization, and this should be the goal of every chapter in the state.

We have lost many through death and resignation during the depression; so we must bend every effort to increase our numbers and keep our ranks intact. At this particular time I desire to call to the attention of every Chapter Regent, incoming Chapter Regent, and Chapter Treasurer present, the importance of making the effort now to collect all 1941 dues that have not been paid. Do not wait to start until in May or June, nor depend on the little slip from National Society to collect the dues of your members. Late last spring I

learned that Kansas had 138 members whose dues had not been paid. This, of course, meant these members would be dropped on July 1st if dues were not paid. In an effort to prevent this loss of members on July 1st, and with faith in the Chapter Regents and Treasurers cooperating with me, I wrote a personal letter to each Regent, and, also, to every delinquent member explaining what this loss would mean to the member, the Chapter, the State and National Society if her name were dropped for nonpayment of dues. A dream came true, for soon after July 1st I received word that all but 15 of the 138 members had paid their dues.

It is indeed encouraging to learn from the report of your State Registrar that we are gaining new members and that former ones are being reinstated. Membership was one of our Golden Jubilee projects, and a net increase in membership this year the desire of your State Regent. This was such a strong desire that she worked day after day, and by this I mean often far into the early morning hours after the regular day's D. A. R. work was done, trying to establish eligibility for prospective members. In going over the list of 145 members admitted this year, your Regent finds the names of 31 new members for whom she has not only worked out their ancestral line, but also made out and typed the required two application papers and data necessary to establish their eligibility, besides having worked for six others whose papers could not be verified until additional data was furnished.

Let us all make the effort to win every new member possible. To achieve this objective the Junior Membership groups afford a golden opportunity. We must give special heed to our youth development program; we must ally ourselves with youth, for they are the citizens of tomorrow and will carry on when we are no longer able to serve.

Last March Miss Seelye announced the arrival of twins by the names of Kanza and Ninnescah Chapters. Although I am not able to announce the arrival of twins this year it gives me great pleasure to announce the arrival of two new chapters. The Lucretia Griswold Latimer Chapter of Eureka, with Mrs. Hugh Dennis as Organizing Regent, was confirmed on October 10, 1940, with 12 organizing members. Today, five months after having been confirmed, the chapter has a membership of 23, and the possibility of one more member for whom I made out the papers last week. My one regret in connection with this chapter is that I could not be present as planned for their organizing meeting because of the accident four days before. Two very good and efficient friends, Mrs. John W. Kirkpatrick, Honorary State Regent, and Miss Edith Chesney, had charge of the meeting.

The arrival of the 55th D. A. R. Chapter in Kansas came on December 4, 1940, when the Byrd Prewitt Chapter of Ulysses, with Mrs. David Shelton Forshee as Organizing Regent, was confirmed by the National Society with 20 organizing members. In September, accompanied by your State Vice Regent. Mrs. Shrewder, and State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Stricklen, we drove to Ulysses for the pre-organization meeting of the Byrd Prewitt Chapter, which was held at the home of Mrs. Forshee. It was a delightful occasion, and being my first as State Regent it will always remain a very happy memory. The final organizing meeting was held a short time later, with our capable State Vice Regent, Mrs. Shrewder, in charge.

with our capable State Vice Regent, Mrs. Shrewder, in charge. I am very proud of these two new chapters and their Organizing Regents, Mrs. Dennis and Mrs. Forshee. Since you have heard the reports of the State Officers and will hear the reports of the State Chairmen and Chapter Regents before the Conference closes, I shall not encroach upon their rights by reporting at any length on their special departments and shall mention but a few of the highlights where the work was in connection with our Golden Jubilee projects.

This year in connection with our work for Approved Schools the Kansas Society for the first time decided to try and follow the plan of most of the State Societies and establish a scholarship at Tamassee. To tell you the result would be to take from the rights of our Approved School Chairman, and a certain Chapter Regent, so all that I am going to say is for you to listen closely tomorrow morning to the reports of the Chapter Regents, and on Thursday morning to the report of your State Chairman of Approved Schools, with this thought, that "in working together there is success, and that together we can build for permanence."

Our Good Citizenship Pilgrimage was an outstanding event of this year. More schools entered than ever before, and as State Regent it was a real pleasure to sign the 158 Good Citizenship Certificates. Miss Frances Hawkinson of Savonburg, was chosen the 1941 State Pilgrim, and we are most happy to have her with us today.

Other achievements of which the State may well be proud are the 8th Grade Flag Essay Contest which was conducted under the supervision of Mrs. Beeler, State Chairman of Correct Use of the Flag; and another to be reported by Mrs. Deeble, State Chairman of the National Historical Magazine Committee.

The State's pledge to the Document Room has been paid in full. Many chapters contributed to the fund for the American Red Cross Ambulance honoring Clara Barton, Founder of American Red Cross and a charter member of the National Society.

Last year as Vice Regent it was my privilege to prepare the report on the condition and location of the 96 Santa Fe Trail Markers placed in 1906 by the Kansas Society, D. A. R., and the State of Kansas along the route of the old Santa Fe Trail. When this report was completed it was learned that 12 of the markers were in need of repair, and one, the bronze marker on Pawnee Rock, had been removed. By vote of the Board of Management at the State Conference last year, the replacing of the bronze marker on Pawnee Rock was left to the Executive Board. Today, in the hotel lobby, you will see a sketch of the bronze marker that is being considered. The size selected is the same size as the original marker. The wording selected for the marker carries at the top the same wording that appears on the granite markers along the trail. The information regarding Pawnee Rock has been taken from the book, "Marking the Santa Fe Trail" by Mrs. Cordry, former State Historian. The Pawnee Rock Park Board has offered to place the marker without cost as soon as we furnish the marker.

marker without cost as soon as we furnish the marker. Your State Regent realized that the 12 markers in need of repair should be taken care of this year, but that we had no funds to use for this purpose. The old saying, "Where there's a will there's a way" surely held true, for today it is my pleasure to report that all of the 12 markers have been repaired this year. Some were reset on their old base so they are now solid and permanent, and others have been placed on a new concrete base. I wish to express my gratitude to the Kansas State Highway Commission and to the County Engineers who by their cooperation have made this report possible.

In this year of Golden Jubilee it was the desire of your State Regent to report that the Kansas Society through the chapters and members had cooperated 100 per cent in contributing to the National Endowment Fund a Golden Jubilee project. Today, with a song in my heart, I can say you have made my wish come true. You are 100 per cent, and I do thank you!

As I reach the conclusion of my report and look backward over the yesterdays that have been filled with many tasks attendant upon the State Regency and have demanded not only most of my time, but all of my time to the exclusion of other activities, I find that by actual count I have written 2,109 postal cards and 2,022 letters in addition to the 364 mimeographed letters that went out during the year. I have traveled over 5,000 miles within the state and visited or contacted 29 chapters.

I feel deeply indebted to the entire membership for granting me the privilege of serving as State Regent of Kansas, and I feel that I have grown immeasurably in real understanding and appreciation of the work of our beloved Society. Whatever of merit has been accomplished is due to the concentrated effort and whole hearted cooperation on the part of the National and State Officers, State Chairmen, Chapter Regents, and you as individual members. I shall ever treasure in my heart the many kindnesses that have been bestowed upon me and will prize as one of my life's richest investments, the true and enduring friendships which have been formed as we have worked and served together.

What we love we work for—and in true service lies happiness, for "Service is not labor; it is just love set free—Just to put in motion the good in you and me".

STATE VICE REGENT

It has been a great privilege to serve as your Vice Regent, with Mrs. A. J. Berger, Regent, and the other members of the State Board of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. My first official pleasure of the year was to attend the Tri-Chapter, Flag Day luncheon meeting, held at the Arkansas City Country Club on June 14th. It was a great satisfaction to bring this Pilgrimage to a close, realizing that in so completing the SECOND Annual El Quartelejo Pilgrimage we had kept the faith, which in 1939 Miss Marion Seelye as State Regent of Kansas had had—to initiate a western Pilgrimage at El Quartelejo, in the Spring, which would some day, be to us what our eastern Pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission, in the Fall, has become. Inasmuch as El Quartelejo is the only Indian Pueblo in Kansas; is the site of the first white settlement in the state; and is owned by the D. A. R.'s of Kansas, it is indeed fitting that it should be the object of an annual pilgrimage. Scott County may seem a long way from civilization if you are not used to our widely separated towns of western Kansas, but with our modern roads and comfortable, high speed motor cars, the trip can be made safely and pleasantly, from any chapter in the state; and a treat of rare beauty awaits you in the Spring at El Quartelejo with a warm, warm welcome. Coronado found it worth the effort of a 4,000 mile journey, four hundred years ago this very Spring, when roads and modes of travel were scarcely what they are today.

Preservation of Historic Spots:

Phebe Dustin Chapter placed a marker at the site of Prairie Dog Creek Battle, near Long Island, Kansas. This battle was fought between the Indians and the 18th Kansas Cavalry of Ft. Hays, August 22, 1867.

A marker has been purchased by the Molly Foster Berry Chapter to be placed in the spring on the Judge Musgrave House, Ft. Scott. The house is now being restored. Judge William Musgrave was commissioned Justice of Peace by Governor Reeder in 1854.

Eunice Sterling Chapter dedicated a marker in Topeka Cemetery at the State Conference in March, 1940, to Nellie Rogers Mc-Gregor, a granddaughter of a Revolutionary Soldier.

Abilene repaired their markers at a cost of \$5.00.

A marker was placed three miles east of Baldwin, on Highway No. 50, to commemorate the Battle of Black Jack. Mrs. Lena Miller Owen, Chapter Historian of Betty Washington Chapter, was a member of the committee. Sixteen members of the chapter attended the dedication.

Isabella Weldin Chapter aided in the restoration of the oldest house in Augusta, Kansas.

The restoration of the D. A. R. Santa Fe Trail markers has now been completed.

In closing, I wish to thank the Chapter Historians for their fine cooperation.

The interest manifested in the State D. A. R. Library by chap-ters over the state has indeed been gratifying during the past year. It is the hope of your State Librarian that in the year to come every chapter will choose a librarian whose privilege it will be to keep in touch with the opportunities offered each chapter through the work of the State Library, and to make available these benefits to the chapter, and to its prospective members.

In the effort to be mutually helpful, chapters can be of great assistance in the building of the collection of books and the balancing of the budget, if they can conveniently plan to include library service in their outline of next year's work. Contributions of money to the State or National Library Fund, through the office of the State Teasurer, are always helpful. STATE REPORTER

(Mrs. Glenn T.) LUCILE ZIMMERMAN

Out of the 55 chapters in the state, 49 have press relations chairmen. All chapters were contacted and the response was generous. 98 photographs were used in the state papers and 5 in the National magazine.

During the Jubilee year many projects were promoted by chapters and all that were sent to me were reviewed in the papers. The news of the 1940 Continental Congress and the Golden Jubilee meeting have been filed in the scrap book. The 1940 State Conference was written for the state papers as was the program for 1941.

Kansas has received fine publicity thru the National Historical magazine the past year—the 1940 State Conference appeared in the June issue; an account of the marker placed at the grave of Mrs. George Thacher Guernsey in the May issue; article about Mrs. Guernsey in the Jubilee number; a sketch of the first children born in Kansas in the January issue; an article written by Mrs. Kruske, Wichita, under the Junior membership column in the March magazine, as was Mary Delehay's description of Lincoln's visit to Kansas. Two articles were in the Kansas Historical Quarterly.

All activities of the National and State organization and all chapter news have been compiled in an indexed scrap book which will be taken to Washington to be on display for Continental Congress. Reports have been sent to the District Chairman, Mrs. Francis Kurtz, Minneapolis, Minn; many letters and reports to the National Chairman, Mrs. Jacob Zimmerman, of Harvey, Ill; yearly reports to the State Regent and State Secretary.

Wellington leads again with 814 inches. Eunice Sterling leads with photos having published 22; they are second with 660 inches. 7154 inches of publicity have been printed in the newspapers of Kansas and has a monetary value of \$250,390., if it were sold as advertising. The Good Citizenship Pilgrimage had wonderful publicity all over the state, Abilene having over 90 inches on this subject alone. D. A. R. broadcasts, articles on the Flag and historical events, all were splendidly publicized. I should like to commend Ft. Supply Trail Chapter, Ashland, for always using a cut of the Flag or the D. A. R. emblem at the head of their newspaper articles.

It has been a joy to serve you during the past year and I wish to express my appreciation to all who have cooperated with me to bring news of D. A. R. activities before the public. The newspapers have been splendid and for their help and kindness during my first year as your reporter, I give my sincerest thanks and appreciation.

AMERICANISM

(Miss) ADELAIDE JANE MORSE

Americanism is an unfailing love of America and loyalty to its institutions and ideals. In other lands, once free peoples are now subjected to the oppression of dictators. America is on trial today. We are deluged with isms of all kinds. America must remain strong, think clearly and act positively. The function of the Americanism Committee D. A. R. is citizenship training for all persons residing upon American soil and never, in the history of our country has this work been more necessary. In August, 1940, I sent letters of instruction and suggestions for work in Americanism to the 53 Chapters in Kansas. February 1, 1941, a questionnaire was sent to each Chapter Chairman on Americanism for a report on the work done in her Chapter. Forty Chapters responded and from these reports, I submit the following report to you.

A large number of Chapters have had a whole or part program in their meetings on Americanism. At some of these Chapter meetings, newly naturalized citizens and the young voters have been guests. Since there are but few foreign communities in Kansas, many Chapters have confined their work to the underprivileged in training them for citizenship. However, Eunice Sterling Chapter continues her excellent work sponsoring the American-Syrian Club in Wichita. Effective work in several Mexican communities has been reported. Chapters have assisted at Naturalization Courts—instructing new citizens in the fundamentals of American Government and laws and stressing patriotism. Flags and the Manual for Emigrants have been presented to each new citizen. We believe that a knowledge of fourth grade English should be required as well as a thorough knowledge of the laws effecting citizens of the United States.

The newest movement on the part of this committee is the recognition of the young voters who have just reached their majority and will cast their first votes. Classes of instruction have been held for them, urging them to register, study the issues, know about the candidates, and vote at all elections. A citizenship Day honoring these young Americans has been set aside in many towns and the D. A. R. Chapters have cooperated in the celebration. Some Chapters have assisted in night schools in the education of the underprivileged, donating time as teachers and helpers. We have in some cases encouraged latent talent in music and art among these peoples also. The scope of the Americanism Committee is wide and adaptable to all parts of the United States. We have a great work to do as Patriotic Americans in teaching and guiding our youth to combat the subversive movements in our America and the menace of foreign propaganda. Propaganda attacks us on every side and we should provide ourselves with answers if the American ideal and America is to be victorious.

We must boldly and wisely uphold the American ideal which is the Democratic way of life.

Today Americanism is not simply opportunity, democracy, individualism or freedom. It is also an effort to keep alive our patriotism—protect our Flag—and keep a balanced system of power private rights, economic elements and social and religious groups.

AMERICAN RED CROSS

CONSERVATION

(Mrs. Claude E.) ETHEL G. ST. JOHN

Abilene: Chapter has encouraged and assisted such character building organizations as the Junior American Citizens Clubs (37 clubs---802 members) the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Girl Home Makers, Girl Reserve, Red Cross and Junior Red Cross. Awarded medals to outstanding students in Junior and Senior High School. Assisted in providing Chrstmas baskets for the needy, also contributed to milk fund. Members have planted 131 trees, 193 shrubs and 388 bulbs. Arthur Barrett: Fifteen of the seventeen members belong to the Red Cross. Several have donated to Salvation Army and Orphans Home. 700 trees and shrubs have been planted. Chapter purchased clothing for a Junior High School girl.

Atchison: Donations sent to hospital and library. Cards and flowers sent to shut-ins. 600 hours reported in Red Cross work. Members canned 1670 quarts of fruit, vegetables and meat, 250 glasses of jelly. 550 blubs planted, 260 roses and other shrubs, 230 trees.

Betty Bonney: Chapter contributed \$5.00 to Red Cross, \$5.00 to Endowment Fund, \$4.00 to Salvation Army, \$1.00 to iron lung, \$1.00 to Clara Barton Ambulance, \$1.50 for Christmas baskets to which 42 members contributed food. Many bouquets of flowers have been sent to shut-ins. One member has worked with Junior College Y.W.C.A. and helped with dramatic class at Church. One member is on Red Cross board and helps with Girl Scout work. Many have contributed to charity funds. Six members worked on Red Cross drive. Members have planted 100 Arbor-Vitae, 100 red cedar trees, 23 shade trees, 70 shrubs, 8 dozen bulbs, 36 rose bushes. C. A. R. planted 24 hedge plants at Soldiers monument, also 6 trees on vacant lot.

Betty Washington: 65 members contributed to War Relief fund. 70 helped in charity organizations. 50 helped hospitals and shutins. 30 took part in civic work. Members planted 150 trees, shrubs, roses, and 5,000 bulbs. 50 members had a part in protection of wild life and birds. 10 in beautification of highways. 10 in fire prevention.

Captain Jesse Leavenworth: Contributions to the War Relief fund, \$28 to American Red Cross and \$1.00 to the Ambulance fund in memory of Clara Barton. Fruits and jellies amounting to \$19.50 donated to local hospitals and Small Memorial Home. \$5.00 in cash to Cushing Memorial hospital. Cards and gifts sent to shut-ins, also hospital calls made. Members have planted 26 trees, 68 bulbs and 12 shrubs.

Concordia: Members planted 711 trees including 675 Shelter Belt trees, 41 shrubs and 72 tulip bulbs. One member worked on Red Cross drive.

Dana: Chapter contributed to Red Cross, purchased Christmas seals. \$2.50 to Finnish relief, \$1.50 to Girl Scouts, \$2.00 to Salvation Army. Decorated a car for Armistice Day parade. Members planted 20 dozen bulbs, and 12 trees.

Dodge City: Members planted 184 trees, 205 shrubs and hardy perennials, and 172 bulbs. 12 "No Hunting" signs were posted on farms. 6 partridges, 6 quail and 12 pheasants were turned loose. One dam was built and the resulting lake stocked with cat fish (secured from drying pools by permission of the district game warden).

Emporia: The Chapter contributed \$2.00 to the Clara Barton Ambulance fund. The Chapter has a representative on the Spanish Missions Board and contributed \$3.00 toward this work. This is a local Mission supported by Emporia organizations. 19 trees, 541 bulbs and 19 shrubs were planted by members.

Eunice Sterling: The Chapter sent \$12.50 to support of Boy's State, and \$12.50 to Girl's State. Members planted 215 dozen bulbs and tubers, 163 trees and 280 shrubs and bushes. \$5.00 basket of food was given at Christmas time.

Fort Larned: Chapter contributed \$2.00 to Kate Duncan Smith, \$2.00 to Tamassee, \$2.00 to National Endowment. Members assisted in Red Cross work and for Wichita orphan home. Helped fill Christmas baskets. Worked with highway men to beautify highways. Have planted 64 trees, 53 shrubs, about 900 bulbs. One member is planting shelter belt or 3 or 4 hundred trees. A new marker placed at "Old Fort Larned" by highway commission. Chapter gave their approval.

Fort Supply Trail: The resident members report 100 per cent in the planting of trees and shrubs. One member has donated a year's subscription of Life Magazine to the Clark County Hospital (given in name of D. A. R.). The Chapter gave a good contribution to the Clark County Council of Woman's Clubs for the erection of the Monte Casine marker which commemorates the historical spot where an early day monastery was established in Clark County. The Chapter has voted to place a marker where the oldest Indian trail crosses the highway of our county. Mrs. Shrewder, member of our Chapter, had done much research on the map of trails of Clark County and has turned the map over to the Kansas Woman's Club to be given to the Kansas Historical Society.

General Edward Hand: Chapter contributed \$5.00 to Ranson Memorial Hospital. 90 per cent paid membership in the Red Cross. 10 surgical garments made for Red Cross (number allotted the Chapter by Red Cross). 70 per cent of membership contributed to Scout drive. 100 per cent contributed to Welfare drive. 175 Welfare baskets packed for Christmas distributed by Chapter member. 10 children clothed. 25 trees and 100 bulbs planted by members. Flower seed sown along public highway.

Hannah Jameson: Chapter contributed \$5.00 to local relief and \$5.00 to Red Cross. Two meeting days the members sewed for the Red Cross in November making 80 yards of material into diapers, and in February 10 girl's wool dress skirts. One member is instructor for knitting for Red Cross.

Henry Dawson: Chapter members have planted 1,113 bulbs, 116 shrubs, and 46 trees.

Isabella Weldin: Members planted 617 bulbs, 60 shrubs, and 404 trees. Chapter paid for three red bud trees to be placed in city park. 10 scrap books sent to crippled children's ward at Wesley hospital, Wichita. 50 magazine novels to Veterans Hospital, Wichita. \$5.00 to our Augusta Historical Society to help restore our first house.

Jane Dean Coffey: Members have made contributions to War Relief fund, helped in Red Cross drive and helped in community charity campaign which includes all civic relief work.

Kanza: Chapter is interested and has fostered planting of trees. Two members planted trees along highway to conceal an old dumping ground. The Chapter is asking that old cemeteries be preserved and a committee is compiling data pertaining to pioneer families.

Lucretia Griswold Latimer: Members have planted 1,300 iris, 12 jonquils, 23 lillies, 450 tulip bulbs, 60 gladioli, 34 roses, 28 flowering shrubs, 30 fruit bearing shrubs. 7 shade trees, 33 fruit trees, 18 evergreens, 1 weeping willow, 1,050 strawberry plants, 31 rhubarb, 12 asparagus roots, 200 hedge, 20 trees banded. Hollyhock, criental poppy and petunia seeds planted. One member transplanted moss bed. Martha Loving Ferrell: For British Relief, 30 knit sweaters and 4 knit shawls. 21 dozen diapers hemmed for Red Cross. Mexican relief local, carload of food and clothing, 24 U. S. Flags. Chapter gave \$5.00 to each the Kate Duncan Smith school, Tamassee, City Public Museum, Community Chest, National Endowment Fund. Chapter is sponsoring a young man from Goddard for "State Boy". Members have planted 4 oak trees, 4 Austrian Pines, 6 Chinese elms, 2 cedars, 2 crab trees, 1 Rose acacia tree, 1 locust tree, 6 shade trees, 3 shrub trees, 12 rose bushes, several hundred bulbs, and many dozen shrubs.

Martha Vail: Chapter contributed to State Cancer Control Fund. All members contributed to Red Cross, Salvation Army, Tuberculosis Fund and local community chest. Two members contributed to English War Helief fund. Two worked in Red Cross drive. One member knitted 2 Red Cross sweaters. Four members are Church school teachers. 15 trees and 25 shrubs were planted by members.

Mary Wade Strother: 14 members are employed in various phases of human conservation and 19 members reported planting trees, shrubs, and bulbs. One member is in charge of green house, so no estimate could be made of her industry.

Molly Foster Berry: Chapter had one program "Conservation of Human Life." Chapter maintains a bed in Goodlanders Childrens Home. Refurnished bedding to last five years, \$25. Contributed \$2.00 to Clara Barton ambulance. Eight members helped with Red Cross drive. Talks were made by members to character building organizations, one to Junior College Y.W.C.A., 5 to Girl Reserves, and 3 to young peoples Church leagues. Members planted 1,800 bulbs, 150 iris, 25 shrubs and 2 holly trees.

Nathan Edson: Members have contributed to War Relief fund charity organizations, hospitals, shut-ins, and 6 helped with Red Cross drive. One member on library board. Chapter sponsors organization of County Historical Society. One member leads cub Scout group, one works in vacation Bible School, one is vice-president of P. T. A. Chapter sent box of clothing and other articles to aid Becker boy or girl. Members planted 100 trees, 48 fruit trees, 38 rose bushes and 100 tulip bulbs.

Ninnescah: One member received certificate for Red Cross first aid course. One member broadcast over radio in regard to 4-H Extension work and the article will appear in National Magazine. One member is Supt. of nursery school. Two members cared for 2 needy families. One roadside beautification in front of their farm. One helped with Red Cross drive. One member is soloist in choir, another is Y.W.C.A. music chairman.

Oceanus Hopkins: Members planted 30 fruit trees, 5 shade trees, 36 shrubs, 200 raspberries, 230 bulbs. Three members report spraying trees and shrubs, 300 fruit trees sprayed. 15 acres of ground fertilized and limed. Chapter donated to Student Loan \$10.00, Christmas basket \$5.00, coal and help to needy family \$10.00. One member is organizer and director of Rainbow Girls.

Olathe: Chapter contributed \$14.00 to charity organizations. Flowers, cards and fruits sent to shut-ins. \$5.00 to young peoples choir. One member gives a home to two homeless girls and sends them to school. Several members assist in Boy and Girl Scout work. One teaches in vacation Bible school, also active in Girl Home Makers work. Members planted 102 trees, \$3 bulbs, 303 shrubs. Two miles of weed cutting and hedge trimming on highway during summer, Chapter planted 24 hard maple trees and 13 shrubs in Olathe cemetery at a cost of \$49.78.

Peleg Gorton: Chapter has had one program on soil conservation by County Agricultural agent. One program on health by city doctors. Cards sent to shut-ins. One member worked on Red Cross drive, also works in Thrift shop which is sponsored by Community Council. In this shop people receiving county and state assistance can buy used articles for a few pennies. Several members are assisting financially with highway and park beautificaton. Chapter contributed \$3.00 to Red Cross and \$2.00 to Iron Lung.

Phebe Dustin: Chapter reports deep interest in both human and natural resources conservation; brought same into programs; planted hundreds of trees and flowers; protected birds and wild life; interested themselves in young people and their needs; took part in soil conservation program on their farms.

Polly Ogden: Chapter gave \$5.00 toward mural painting in Children's Room in public library and \$3.50 to W. P. A. nursery school. A committee is working on plans for developing roadside resting places along highway 40 with tables, and where possible, shade and water. Chapter sponsored Good Citizenship Pilgrimage and presented representative with pin. Several members helping with Red Cross drive, War Relief work and charity organizations.

Randolph Loving: Chapter has had two programs devoted to Human Conservation, Cancer Control and Speech Laboratory at Wichita University. Members have planted trees, shrubs and flowers. Red Cross work by individual members, also observed fire prevention week. One member gave radio skits for fire prevention.

Rhoda Carver Barton: Members have liberally supported Red Cross drive, Tuberculosis Fund, Salvation Army, March of Dimes and charity work. Christmas cards and stationery with postage included were given by a member to a hospital patient for period of 3 months. Chapter gave Flag to student in local school ranking highest in U. S. History. Chapter contributed to most all the Kansas Society projects for the Golden Jubilee year. Members planted 6 trees.

Samuel Linscott: All members have planted trees, shrubs, and bulbs. One member planted 15 cherry trees, 100 grape vines and 50 iris bulbs.

Smoky Hill: Members planted 43 fruit trees, 3 shade trees, 4 cedars, 35 rose bushes, 33 spireas, 6 flowering trees, 7 honeysuckle vines, 56 bulbs. The matron of the Bickerdyke Home of Ellsworth has secured and planted 10,000 trees and shrubs as a shelter belt at the east side of the grounds. Kansas State has paid for these but the D. A. R. Chapter gets credit for them. This is the second shelter belt in Ellsworth County.

Sterling: Members have planted 30 shrubs and trees. One member helped with Red Cross drive. Six have knitted sweaters,

Susannah French Putney: Chapter contributed \$6.50 for history medals, \$3.00 magazine for school, \$3.00 citizenship medals, Clara Barton Ambulance, \$3.00, Milk Fund \$2.00, Endowment Fund \$2.00, and Film \$3.50. Baby Layettes to City Nurse, valued at \$20. Members have planted 15 trees, 100 bulbs. Several members are serving on local Red Cross board, assisted in Red Cross membership drive. One member is chairman of Braille and another assists with transcribing books. One member is chairman of layettes for War Relief and one directs knitting for war refugees. Topeka: Chapter contributed \$6.50 to Ellis Island, \$5.00 to local Red Cross, \$2.00 to Clara Barton Ambulance; sent 90 stockings filled with nuts and candy to Tamassee school at Christmas time. Members gave much time to Red Cross work; 80 hours sewing and 48 hours cutting in Red Cross rooms, 16 hours making surgical dressings, 18 sweaters knitted, also 2 pairs socks. One member is chairman of production for the Shawnee County Chapter of Red Cross.

Uvedale: Members are interested in both Human Conservation and conservation of natural resources. 108 trees and many bulbs were planted.

Wichita: Chapter contributed \$1.00 to Girls Vacation Fund, \$2.00 to Kenmore, \$5.00 School of Ozarks, \$24.00 Tamassee. 30 members have Red Cross membership. Chapter had program on citizenship and patriotism in February. Members planted 60 trees, 1,000 bulbs and 100 shrubs.

The essays were judged on the basis of: Neatness, spelling and composition, 20 per cent; Originality and style 20 per cent; Historical and Symbolic Data, 20 per cent; Flag Etiquette twenty per cent; Patriotism and Responsibility of the Individual to His Flag and Country twenty per cent; and the Essay was not to have more than 500 words. Prizes were \$5.00, \$2.00 and \$1.00. In this case there were two \$1.00 prizes. Flve Chapters sponsored the contest; there were 100 entries from Ninnescah Chapter; 21 from Byrd Prewitt; 9 from Betty Bonney; 5 from Desire Tobey Sears, and 300 from James Ross; a total of 435 Essays written.

Flag Day material was sent to each chapter. A letter of instruction and a questionnaire was sent to each chapter in September. A card to each chapter in January. All correspondence was answered promptly.

35 chapter reports were received before March 1st, 2 after March 1st. Questionnaires show: three chapters did not have a chairman. 65 Flag Manuals were placed in chapters, 16 elsewhere, 487 Flag Codes were distributed, one Flag Code framed. 199 Flag Leaflets, 275 small Flags and 7 large Flags for public buildings or organi-

zations have been furnished. Five chapters report Flag Manuals placed in schools and public libraries. Captain Jesse Leavenworth loaned 5 Manuals to District Court; 53 talks, 5 formal addresses, 2 talks by request to civic organizations. 2 radio talks, 13 special papers or drills on the Flag were given. 73 talks printed in local papers, 5 chapters say talks were given but do not give the number; 31 chapters observed Flag Day in one of the following ways: parades, picnics, luncheons, breakfasts, teas; displayed Flags and special meetings; 17 local papers printed articles on Flag etiquette, 7 chapters kept a scrap book. 2 chapters sponsored plays or pageants.

Some chapters gave Flags and Manuals to the newly naturalized citizens, some gave Flag instruction to the foreign children, others attended naturalization Court. 25 chapters sing the National Anthem; 97 per cent give the Pledge of Allegiance, 85 per cent of the chapter members own Flags. 5 chapters report troublesome questions of Flag etiquette, 15 chapters corrected breaches of Flag etiquette. 19 chapters mentioned a particular need of Flag Education; these deal mostly with general Flag use. One chairman suggested a revision of the questionnaire. Another stressed a definite understanding of the term "using Flags as decoration".

Abilene—Flag Day was observed with a Flag program, all members gave short talks on the Flag and Rev. Dr. David Townley, a patriotic talk.

Arthur Barrett-gave 141 Flag Codes to the county schools.

Atchison—made a pilgrimage to the Museum at Lawrence June 14th. A Flag story contest was conducted in the 6th Grade of Central School, Atchison.

Baxter Springs—sent the two traveling Flags to Susannah French Putney Chapter, El Dorado.

Betty Bonney—had a tri-City Luncheon June 14th at the Country Club. Winfield and Wellington were guests. The D. A. R. Flag was used for the State C. A. R Conference at Arkansas City, the school Armistice Program and Spring Musical Festival. Sponsored the Essay Contest, had 9 entries.

Byrd Prewitt-sponsored the Essay Contest, had 21 entries.

Captain Jesse Leavenworth—used the chapter's banner and silk Flag of the United States at a special program February 16, 1941, Americanization Week, and gave a Flag and manual to each person naturalized at the County Court House.

Christiana Musser---reported all children who are in hearing distance of the bugle call when the Flag is raised at the Chanute High School and Junior College stop and stand at attention.

Dana—ask the question should the Flag be flown at night at the football games, the field is enclosed?

Desire Tobey Sears—sponsored Essay Contest, had 5 entries.

Gave a Flag drill at a Washington Birthday Tea. Miss Jennie I. Campbell was one of the District Judges of the Essay Contest.

Eunice Sterling-gave a large Flag to the Boy Scouts.

Fort Supply Trail—had the Pledge of Allegiance run in the local paper each week and other Flag material at various times.

Henry Dawson—placed Flags on the graves of its members Decoration Day.

James Ross—gave Flag instruction and lead the Pledge of Allegiance at Americanization classes. Sponsored the Essay Contest and had 300 entries.

Jane Dean Coffey—gave a brief explanation of various phases of Flag etiquette at each meeting. Presented a Flag to each new member. Had a fine Flag Day service with a luncheon at the Hotel.

Martha Loving Ferrell—was represented at Massing of the Colors May 26th by The Military Order of the World War at St. James' Episcopal Church; also represented November 11, 1941, at the Veteran's Hospital in an Armistice Service.

Mary Wade Strother—presented a Flag for out door use to the Mission House, St. Faith, Salina. There was a special ceremony in which the Boy and Girl Scouts and several cadets from St. John's Military school participated. A fitting way to observe Washington's Birthday. 16 small Kansas Flags with a footed holder were given to the Junior American Citizens Clubs.

Molly Foster Berry-gave 50 Flag Codes, 57 Flag Leaflets and 40 small Flags.

Ninnescah-sponsored the Essay Contest and had 100 entries.

Oceanus Hopkins—gave the Flag Pageant written by Mrs. Dickinson at the Pittsburg and Girard High Schools to 600 pupils. A radio program was given Flag Day.

Peleg Gorton—joined the American Legion in a parade on Flag Day, also, Tri-County meet at Arkansas City.

Phebe Dustin—had a Flag Day Breakfast, attended naturalization Court and gave Flags and manuals to naturalized citizens. Mrs. L. J. Robertson acted as a District Judge in the Essay Contest.

Polly Ogden-presented a large Flag to the Girl Scouts. Gave 60 small Flags.

Susannah French Putney-had a Flag Day Assembly at the High School and band concert.

Topeka—celebrated Flag Day with a talk by a past Veteran of the World War and a paper on the Flag.

Wellington—joined Winfield and Arkansas City in a Tri-County dinner.

Wichita—instructed foreign children from the manual. Gave an annual Flag Day Tea, and American Music Golden Jubilee Patriotic Program. Flags are in all school rooms in the Junior High schools and also displayed in the auditoriums. One Junior High School gave the patriotic pageant "Our America" for Clubs. Chapter was represented at Massing of the Colors May 26, 1940.

Postage, express and mimeographing this year were \$2.61.

Thank you for the year books, for the splendid cooperation of the Regents and chairmen. I appreciate the fine work you have done. I am indebted to our State Regent, Mrs. Berger, our Treasurer, Mrs. Duphorne, and the Judges of the Contest: Miss Jennie I. Campbell, Mrs. L. J. Robertson, Mr. W. R. Boyd, Jr., Miss Elmina Graham, Mrs. J. U. Massey and Mr. R. W. Hart for the time and energy they spent to help make the 8th Grade Essay Contest a success. I do thank each of you.

D. A. R. GOOD CITIZENSHIP PILGRIMAGE

(Mrs. Harry M.) ELIZABETH S. IVES

The Good Citizenship Pilgrimage Committee in its sixth year is most happy to announce an increase of 40 schools participating in the Pilgrimage over last year or an increase of 32 per cent. We had 158 Pilgrims elected this year and only two names received too late to be entered.

By October 1, the seven congressional districts had been organized with:

1st District. Mrs. John Fulton of Atchison, as District Chairman. 27 schools entered with an increase of 17 schools.

2nd District. Mrs. G. P. Cole of Ottawa, as District Chairman. 16 schools participated.

3rd District. Miss Lillian Cloud of Winfield, as District Chairman. 10 schools entered.

4th District. Mrs. A. M. Ellis and Mrs. E. C. Miller of Manhattan, Chairmen. 12 schools participated. 5th District. Mrs. Carl Mathews of Potwin, as District Chair-

16 schools participated with an increase of 9 schools.
6th District. Mrs. John Siglinger of Phillipsburg, as Chairman.
42 schools entered with an increase of 17 schools.
7th District. Mrs. J. C. Denious of Dodge City, as Chairman.
35 schools taking part with an increase of 12 schools.

The first and sixth districts tied this year with the greatest increase of 17 schools each. Last year the seventh district had the greatest increase but for the fourth consecutive year the sixth district has had the largest number of schools participating.

The State Chairman sent to the District Chairmen the names of every high school in their respective districts with the name of the principal and the D. A. R. Chapters. Thru the cooperation of the Chapter Chairmen these schools were contacted. Schools were also notified thru the bulletin sent out to all schools by the State We are indeed most grateful to them Department of Education. for this cooperation. The State Department of Education feels that this is a very worth while project and has offered all help possible.

Not all Chapters participated but it is hoped since the National Society is stressing this committee that each chapter regent will appoint a Good Citizenship Pilgrimage Chairman who is interested in this activity and willing to work.

The same plan that Kansas has used for the last five years in the selection of the State Pilgrim was used this year. During December and January the senior students selected three senior girls for their outstanding qualities-dependability, leadership, service and patriotism. The faculty selected the Pilgrim from those to represent her school and sent her name to the district chairmen who held the district drawings the first week in February and sent the name of the district winner and alternates to the State Chairman.

These seven district winners were guests of the State Society in a Pilgrimage to Topeka, March 1. The girls were escorted thru the State House visiting the various offices and climbing to the dome. Then they visited the Cappers Publication. At 12.30 they returned to the Hotel Jayhawk where they were guests of honor at a luncheon. Mrs. Berger gave each of the girls a corsage, the first any of the girls had ever received. There were 90 D. A. R.'s present and three State Officers, Mrs. McCamish, who gave the invocation; Mrs. Dillinger, our State Historian; and our State Regent, Mrs. Berger. Miss Irene Pederson who was the Kansas Pilgrim to Washington in 1939 was present.

These seven girls who were awarded the trip to Topeka were typical Good Citizens of our high schools, outstanding among their classmates in those qualities for which they were chosen. Several of the girls attended Girls State last year. As each girl was introduced at the luncheon she told of the Pilgrimage contest held in her school.

Following the luncheon the girls called at the Executive Mansion and Mrs. Ratner presented each with a souvenir.

The State Drawing was held at 3:00 o'clock in the Governor's office with Governor Ratner officiating. Miss Frances Hawkinson of Savonburg was the first name drawn and she will represent Kansas in the Pilgrimage to Washington D. C. in April. Miss Betty Marie Goll of Derby and Miss Lois Field of Formoso were first and second alternates.

As State Chairman of the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage and at the urgent suggestion of the National Society, I wish to make the following recommendations:

1. That a merit system be installed in Kansas instead of the method we are now using. Kansas is among the last 18 states to adopt a merit system.

2. Have the Pilgrim selected before the Christmas holidays.

D. A. R. MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

(Mrs. Dan) RUTH HOPSON

Kansas reports sending to the National Treasurer General two hundred and thirty-one dollars and ten cents, to pay for D. A. R. Manuals. Kansas chapters distributed fifteen hundred and thirtytwo manuals, of which eighty were Spanish, twenty Italian, and the rest English. These were used for naturalization work and with the adult foreign language groups. Postmasters used the manuals during alien registration. The state chairman sent one thousand one hundred and ten manuals to the clerks of the district courts in Kansas, who use them for naturalization. Two thousand two hundred manuals were sent by the state chairman to the commanders of the C. C. C. camps. Every camp in Kansas received manuals. The total number of manuals distributed was four thousand eight hundred and forty-two.

More important than the number of manuals distributed, was the interest shown in the manuals. Two years ago, manuals were also sent to the clerks of the courts, and many reorders are being received. Fourteen chapters ordered manuals. Those who have used the books, say that they are one of the best aids to Americanization now available.

D. A. R. MUSEUM

As your state chairman of D. A. R. Museum, it was my happy privilege to participate in the presentation ceremony in Memorial Continental Hall, last April, when the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the Amercan Revolution presented to the Museum a display case to nonor the memory of the late Mrs. W. E. Stanley, Kansas first National Officer. While this case was the major project of this committee last year, it was not officially presented until April 16th, 1940. She also attended the annual meeting of the Museum Committee which was in charge of Mrs. Willard Steele, Curator General.

At this time the state chairman wishes to thank the 34 chapters, the State Officers Club and the individuals who made this gift possible. In a recent letter from the secretary of the Museum she writes, "Your state's case is serving a noble purpose displaying special exhibits." Also she wishes to thank those chapters that have contributed this year to the Museum Fund. In her letter to all the chapters she asked for small contributions, and a total of \$9.00 has been subscribed.

Your state chairman also wishes to express her appreciation of the courtesies extended to her. On Flag Day it was her pleasure to be the guest of the Betty Bonney Chapter at Arkansas City, the hostess chapter to the Tri-City Annual Flag Day meeting. In November she was the guest of the Rhoda Carver Barton Chapter at Fredonia at a guest day tea in the home of Mrs. Pliny Simpson. Here a brief talk was made in behalf of the Museum, and at this State Conference she was the guest of the Susannah French Putney Chapter at a dinner for the State Chairmen on Tuesday night.

Fifteen articles have been offered to the Museum the past year, but not all have met the necessary requirements. Another article was offered as a loan. The Museum does not accept loans or reproductions, each article must be an outright gift, and must be the criginal and authentic article.

In addition to the monetary gifts three other articles have gone to the Museum;

1. The Vice-President General pin of the late Mrs. W. E. Stanley, Kansas' first National Officer, presented by her daughter, Miss Harriet Stanley of Eunice Sterling Chapter. This pin will be placed with the historic insignia of the National Society.

2. A silver marrow spoon, presented by Louise H. and Charlotte McLellan of Topeka.

3. A matching dressing spoon $12\frac{1}{2}$ inches long, presented by Louise H. and Charlotte McLellan of Topeka.

Another gift has been willed to the Museum. A rare article which had belonged to a Captain in the Revolutionary War. The Museum Committee is glad to have members and friends remember its needs in their wills, either by gifts of relics or money.

In our beautiful Museum are the tangible results of the work of this committee which carries out one of the Objects for which this Society was founded fifty years ago, namely: "To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence - - - by the preservation of documents and relics."

The past lives in our Museum and you may help to make it more real by placing there the relics which played such an important part in the lives of these men and women whom we honor in this Society.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE STUDENT LOAN COMMITTEE

1. That Student Loan Fund Day shall be observed in January.

2. That a business man, preferably a banker, shall sign the note in addition to the parent or guardian.

3. That the State Treasurer shall report all receipts and expenditures of the Student Loan Fund to the Chairman and to the Financial Secretary of the Student Loan Committee on the first of each month.

4. That a reprint of the Rules of the Student Loan Fund be made and a copy sent to each Chapter.

The success of the Student Loan Fund depends upon the judgment of Chapters recommending applicants for the loans. Too much care cannot be taken in the selection of students in order to assure prompt payments of loans. High moral and scholastic standards are to be considered first, and next the placing of students in institutions that uphold true American ideals. The amount of the average loan is \$200. No Chapter is too small to have a part in this work. Some may wish to establish their own Student Loan Funds as an honor or a Memorial to a member.

In addition to gifts to the Fund, your Committee has endeavored to make the nine loans we have made SAFE. Then we have spent much time in collecting interest on notes due. We are endeavoring to make the students securing loans realize the value of money loaned to them and that prompt payment will help another girl to secure education in her Senior year; also that each loan is a part of a revolving fund which cannot exist without repayment. Our plan

is to loan to girls who are in a position to repay the loans. Let our slogan for this next year be "Larger loans to aid more students."

ELLIS ISLAND

In the march of progress, the Daughters of the American Revolution have always insisted that the prestige and integrity of our government must be held high; that its form, which our forefathers so arduously evolved, must be preserved through service and sacrifices of the American people.

The helpful and most practical service which is being rendered by you and your chapter, through the N. S., D. A. R., to the Aliens, who are detained at Ellis and Angel Island, is a great source of inspiration to them for right living and creates in them a desire to respect the laws of our country under whose banner they are seeking protection.

A letter was sent to each Chapter in November, urging their co-operation in complying with our National Chairman's program for the year. In February a card was mailed to each Chapter who had not already sent in their report.

April, 1940, report shows that the sum of \$19,142.42, which includes the 5 cent per capita quota, excess money and value of materials sent, was given by N. S., D. A. R., to Ellis and Angel Island. Kansas contributed her part to this cause. I sincerely thank each chairman and each chapter for their splendid cooperation, in helping me to have a better report than last year. My thanks to chapters for the Year Books.

Fifty-four chapters of the fifty-five in the State appointed a chairman for this committee. Your state chairman sent a typed letter in June or July, 1940; a printed form letter in September, 1940, and a postal card in January, 1941, to each chapter chairman; and by request, explanatory literature was sent to thirty chapters. A total of 109 typed, and 55 form letters, and 128 postal cards were

This year the group furnishes Chapter Secretary, Flag Chairman, G. C. P. Chairman, a delegate to Natl. Congress and C. A. R. Congress, State G. C. P. Chairman. MOTION PICTURES

(Mrs. Clarence) PEARL WILKE

As State Chairman of Motion Pictures I submit the following report:

In October I sent letters to all the Chapter Chairmen in which attention was called to the Program outlined by the National Chairman.

February 15 a double card with questionnaire was mailed to all Chapters. Of this number 33 were returned. My report is from this information.

11 Chapters have no Chairman.

4 Chapters subscribe to the monthly list of reviews of pictures compiled by our own D. A. R. National Review Comm. in N. Y.

3 Chapters post them on Bulletin Boards in Schools Libraries. 12 Chapters use the motion picture department of the D. A. R.

Magazine in their monthly meetings.

15 Chapters reported their Theatres had matinees occasionally for children.

4 Chapters report that their Theatres have Saturday matinees.

1 Chapter said that a Patriotic short was shown on Saturdays.

27 Chapters report that they have both Double and Single Feature Shows. Towns that have several Theatres usually have one with Single Features. Other Theatres have Double Features. Towns with one Theatre have Single Features the first of the week and Double Features over the week-end.

Fredonia Chapter showed the picture "Ellis Island" to their High School.

Emporia Chapter and Susannah French Putney Chapter reported that an Educational Picture is shown in each school once a week. This is a School Program.

Susannah French Putney Chapter has purchased a short film "A Pledge of Allegiance" which shows the United States Flag waving and the Pledge is said. This is to be loaned to the schools and other organizations.

NATIONAL DEFENSE THROUGH PATRIOTIC EDUCATION

(Miss) ESTHER CHRISTMORE

All but two of the fifty-five chapters have Chapter Chairman of National Defense; these two chapters are just newly organized.

Of the fifty-three chapters who have Chapter Chairman of National Defense, all but one Chairman sent in reports to the State Chairman.

Five Chairmen report active Committees of National Defense.

The National quota of ten cents per member for Kansas has been paid.

Chapter Chairmen report one hundred subscriptions to National Defense News. The Abilene Chapter (Abilene) and the Peleg Gorton (Winfield) report thirteen subscriptions; the Polly Ogden (Manhattan) and the Molly Foster Berry (Fort Scott) twelve; and the Susannah French Putney Chapter (El Dorado) ten.

Twenty-four chapters devoted one entire program to National Defense. The Topeka Chapter (Topeka) devoted seven meetings to National Defense and the Abilene Chapter (Abilene) five. The Courtney-Spalding Chapter (Russell) worked out a Patriotio Program for the year. The Jonathan Gilbert Chapter (La Crosse) used "The Tree of Liberty" as a study and reported a section at each meeting.

Twenty-nine chairmen report the use of the National Defense Handbook for programs, addresses, reports, references, study, radio, and the press.

Thirty-three chairmen report the National Defense News used in many ways: reference, quotations, talks, radio, reports, press, programs, current events, study, debate classes, elementary and secondary schools, universities, school and public libraries and colored schools.

Eleven chairmen report that they have talked on National Defense at each chapter meeting and ten chairmen report that they have made reports at all but one or two meetings.

Sixteen chairmen report using the Resolutions of the Continental Congress as a guide.

Twenty-one chairmen report that their chapters observed National Defense Week in a number of ways: by special programs on National Defense, radio addresses, cooperating with other organizations in giving programs, and through the press.

Twenty-one chairmen report helping to counteract subversive activities by radio, newspaper items, speeches, endorsing resolutions, and by being individually alert. The Oceanus Hopkins Chapter (Pittsburg) reports five talks on National Defense. The Polly Ogden Chapter (Manhattan) has given aid to the F. B. I. concerning stranded German sailors now residing in our country. The chapter chairman of the Polly Ogden Chapter received two letters: one from Mr. J. Edgar Hoover and one from the Kansas City Office thanking her for the work done.

Seven chapters sponsored the Good Citizenship Contest in Junior High Schools; fourteen sponsored the Good Citizenship Contest in the Senior High Schools; and twenty-seven sponsored the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage Contest in the Senior High Schools. The number of medals or pins awarded to winners of these and other contests is not complete, but sixty-one have been reported.

Twenty-two chapters have distributed educational material to teachers in the Elementary and Secondary Schools, to Parochial Schools, Mexican Missions and homes, Mexican Boy Scouts, C. C. Camps, Naturalization Courts, Bus and railroad stations, Salvation Army Reading Rooms, the Y. W. C. A. and the Y. M. C. A., County Superintendents of Schools, City and College Libraries, and local clubs.

Thirty-two chapters have observed Flag Day, Lincoln's and Washington's Birthdays, Constitution Day, Memorial Day, Armistice Day, and Kansas Day with programs, plays, speakers, picnics, floats, luncheons, teas, breakfasts, and parades. The Abilene Chapter Chairman directed a play entitled "Crinoline and Candlelight" for George Washington's Birthday and presented it for the Senior High School. She also directed a play for the Senior High School entitled "The American Passport". The Abilene Chapter Chairman was responsible for "The American's Creed" to be given to the Grade, Junior and Senior High School Children on Constitution Day.

Seven Chapters report newspaper articles and letters placed in county papers, local papers, scrap books and files. Nine chapters have had speakers to appear before them as a group or before institutes, school assemblies, patriotic organizations and other educational groups. These speakers include senators, attorneys, doctors, and educators. The State Chairman gave an address on the subject "Complete Defense—America's Needs" before the Abilene Chapter for National Defense Week. She gave this same address to the Women's Republican Club of Dickinson County in February. During the year she wrote an article for the Topeka Daily Capital on National Defense. entitled "America's Task". Other subjects given by speakers include "Good Citizenship" at County Institute, "The World As I See It", "World Conditions", "Workings of the Draft", "Community Service", "Know Your America", and "Patriotic Education". Dr. Josephine Trabue, Chapter Chairman of the Oceanus Hopkins Chapter (Pittsburg) sponsored a patriotic lecture "Total Defense for America" by Mr. Benjamin W. Young, Presbyterian minister of Ft. Scott, Kansas. This lecture was presented to the college chapel at Pittsburg and was well received by the students, faculty, and the public. Dr. Trabue also helped to organize a Crawford County Historical Society which is an Auxiliary of the Kansas State Historical Society.

Eighteen chapters report cooperating with other patriotic organizations and educational groups in sponsoring community projects such as the Red Cross, Boys' State, Programs for Patriotic holidays, Americanization, British Relief, G. A. R., Art Museums, Historical Societies, Girl Reserves, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Y. W. C. A. The Uvedale Chapter (Hutchinson) gave five dollars to Pinehurst College. The Susannah French Putney Chapter (El Dorado) has through the cooperation of the County Superintendent of Schools distributed patriotic literature. Her chapter chairman has helped to plan programs on "Good Citizenship" and the "Constitution" for Farm Bureau Women. The Wichita Chapter (Wichita) made an investigation of the Rugg Books and presented findings to the school superintendent. The Nathan Edson Chapter (Clay Center) gave certificates to fifteen Four H Girls in recognition of their special club These fifteen girls came to a meeting, gave the program work. and received their awards. The Martha Loving Ferrell Chapter (Wichita) contributed a Flag to each Mexican family through the Mexican Mission. The Betty Washington Chapter (Lawrence) distributed literature of a patriolic nature among the Mexicans of Lawrence, Kansas. The General Edward Hand Chapter (Ottawa) gave 225 Flag Codes and 600 Leaflets: one to every Rural teacher in the county; one to every Mexican home in the county; others were placed in Sunday School rooms for juniors. This chapter also gave 65 Manuals for Citizenship to Mexicans; and 12 Manuals to others. The J. Edgar Hoover Addresses and other material were given to Citizenship Classes of Farm Bureau Women.

Sixteen chapters have been the means of Patriotic films in theatres, schools and churches. The Desire Tobey Sears Chapter (Mankato) sponsored four Patriotic pictures. The Molly Foster Berry Chapter (Fort Scott) sponsored two Patriotic films that netted their chapter sixty-one dollars and eight cents for chapter work. The Lois Warner Chapter (Junction City) sponsored the Ellis Island film in their local high school. The Martha Loving Ferrell Chapter (Wichita) had their October meeting "The Restoration of Williamsburg". The Peleg Gorton Chapter (Winfield) and the Olathe Chapter (Olathe) sponsored the "Howards of Virginia". The Nathan Edson Chapter (Clay Center) reports the showing of Patriotic groups by Mr. and Mrs. George Kreeck. The Henry Dawson Chapter (Mc-Pherson) and the Jane Dean Coffey Chapter (Coffeyville) sponsored "The Land of Liberty" at their local theatres.

Twenty-seven chapters report cooperating with the National Society on legislation in Congress, on responding to calls on vital issues and on acting voluntarily on matters about which they have been previously informed. The State Chairman sent to all Chapter Chairmen the Resolution as endorsed by the National Board in regard to the Lease-Lend Bill H. R. 1776, urging them to act immediately, to write their Congressmen, asking them to reserve to themselves the powers given them by the Constitution. The Chapter Chairmen and Chapter Members were also notified by their State Chairman to write the Speaker of the House and their Congressmen urging the continuance of the work of the Dies Committee.

It has been a great privilege to serve you the past year as State Chairman of National Defense Through Patriotic Education. I am deeply grateful to the chapter chairmen for their efforts and cooperation in making this report possible. Ours is an educational program. May we become more National Defense minded.

NATIONAL HISTORICAL MAGAZINE

(Mrs. J. H.) LOUISE DEEBLE

It is a pleasure to bring you the report of the National Historical Magazine. Forty-three (43) of the fifty-five (55) Chapters in the State appointed Chairmen for the Magazine.

Cards and letters were mailed early in the fall to every Chapter regarding the Golden Jubilee number and also the yearly subscriptions.

Forty-seven (47) Chapters report using the Magazine in some way at their Chapter meetings, and thirty-three (33) Libraries receive the Magazine as a courtesy from the D. A. R. Chapters of Kansas.

Seventy-two (72) single copies of the Golden Jubilee number were purchased through the efforts of our Chapter Chairmen.

From the records at National and reports of the Chapter Chairmen we have a total on March first of 220 yearly subscriptions. This is an increase of twelve (12) over last year.

REPORT OF SENIOR STATE PRESIDENT, KANSAS SOCIETY C. A. R.

(Miss) MARIE SELLARS

In most national organizations a great part of the interest and activity is devoted to the children's order, or youth group; for it is realized that these young people will compose the older group of the future. All are preparing sons and daughters of their members—and their members' friends—to carry on the work of the organization when the present members are no longer able, or willing. Likewise, the D. A. R. should encourage and promote the C. A. R., for even though organized as a separate Society with its own elections and officers and with boys and girls both as members, it was started by a D. A. R. member with the approval and endorsement of the National D. A. R Society. There is a close tie between the two Societies and it should be a very much closer one, since all C. A. R. officers and leaders must be members in good standing of the D. A. R.—or the S. A. R.

Though our State Society C. A. R. is now functioning; there is much experimenting, planning, and organizing yet to do. At the present time, however, there is little dictation from the National Society as to organization and requirements, so we in Kansas are able to formulate our own policies and plan the C. A. R. work in the manner best adapted to conditions in this locality, while still being a part of the national organization and participating in the national aims and work. Kansas can, and should, build a strong and influential State C. A. R. Society.

There are two divisions of the C. A. R. organization in our state:—the children's division, and the adult divison. Chldren are not capable, nor do they have the time, to assume the entire responsibility for the plans and work of such an organization as C. A. R., and adult supervision is essential; but C. A. R. is a children's society and their division should be planned with the children in charge and as little adult participation as possible. Their annual meeting is the "C. A. R. State Conference" held in the fall, and they are encouraged to help plan and to conduct this meeting themselves. And, since children always get along better without too many adults looking on, only those leaders are present who are necessary to help with plans and supervision. We hope that the other adults will understand and not feel hurt or slighted that they are not encouraged to attend.

The "adult division" is one of the most important factors in the efficient operation of the State Society, for the children's group would be unable to function without adult support and leadership. The adult division has at least one annual meeting that is entirely separate from any meetings of the children; and this— through the kindness and permission of the State Regent of D. A. R.—is in the form of a "Breakfast" held usually on the morning of the second day of the D. A. R. State Conference in March. It is primarily for the "Adult Associate Members of C. A. R.," but guests are welcome, for it is always "dutch treat." and anyone interested may secure a ticket.

Also a part of the adult division is the "State C. A. R. Council of D. A. R. Representatives" which is now being formed. Its purpose is to have a member in each D. A. R. chapter who will work with the State C. A. R. Society and further its activities. The "Council" is not intended as a means to urge chapters to organize local C. A. R. Societies. We need very much the interest and help of every D. A. R. chapter in Kansas; but it is not our intention to encourage every chapter to organize a C. A. R. Society in their town. But every town does have one or two or more children who are eligible for membership in the C. A. R., though they may not necessarily be children of mothers who belong to D. A. R. This is not a requirement for C. A. R. membership. Sometimes it is not the mothers who belong to D. A. R. who are not eligible, or men who have the Revolutionary ancestor for eligibility.

As a means of increasing interest in membership among the children and parents in localities and towns where there is no local C. A. R. Society near, an "all-state" group was organized this year, and is called the "Coronado (all-state) Society". The membership of this Society, which is just like any other C. A. R. group, is composed of children from all over the state regardless of where they may live. The advantage of belonging to this Society, instead of as a member-at-large, is that the children will be in closer touch with other C. A. R. members of the state; will have more interest in what the Kansas C. A. R. is planning and accomplishing; will be able to have a definite part in that work; and will feel they are more a part of the organization. Most important, we need to teach our children patriotism and loyalty to their country in these critical times. If, and when, local C. A. R. Societies desire to organize, any Coronado Society members who wish may transfer to these; or members of other C. A. R. groups may transfer to the Coronado Society, as, for instance, should the local group find it necessary to disband.

Children could learn much authentic history from books and stories with accurate and good historical backgrounds, but often they, need to be encouraged to read these. If they could have a traveling chest of such books, and a "plan for reading", such a project might prove entertaining and interesting, and much information might come to them that would be helpful in their studies as well. Even though such books are usually available in the local libraries, many children are not interested in reading historical stories unless encouraged, in some way, to do so. The "Magazine and Library Committee" of the Kansas C. A. R. is now considering this project, and it is hoped it may be possible to have one or more of these chests. This year two D. A. R. chapters—"Emporia" and "Wellington"—each contributed one dellar toward some phase of the C. A. R. work, and these donations probably will be used for books if the library project is established.

We hope that the Regents of the D. A. R. Chapters have enjoyed the issues of the "C. A. R. Magazine" which they have received the past year. These were the gift of our National Chaplain, Mrs. W. H. Belk, who was our guest at Topeka during D. A. R. Conference last March.

Kansas now has nine local C. A. R. Societies including the allstate group. The three new ones are the "Coronado (all-state) Society", "Susannah Oldham Society" at Topeka, and "Quivera Society" at Sterling. The present membership of the children's division is around 125, and the Adult Associate Members in the adult division number around 75. There are 17 D. A. R. chapters that have a "representative" on the "State C. A. R. Council". All this represents a gain over last year; but we hope, of course, that next year all these figures will be increased.

The Kansas C. A. R. needs your interest and support very much, --support both for the adult and for the children's divisions.

EL QUARTELEJO PILGRIMAGE

June 17, 1940

It has become the custom after a two year's trial, for the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution to hold an annual Pilgrimage at the site of El Quartelejo in Scott County State Park, Kansas.

Inasmuch as El Quartelejo is the only Indian Pueblo in Kansas; is the site of the first white settlement in the state; and is owned by the D. A. R.'s of Kansas, it is indeed fitting that it be the object of an annual pilgrimage.

In 1922 the site was formally acquired by the State Society and in 1925 the ruins were marked with a granite shaft, at a cost of \$1,270.00. The monument is inscribed with a brief history of the former Picurie Indian settlement and later a French trading post. The pueblo, of which little remains, was destroyed by fire prior to the general settlement of Scott County, and was discovered quite by accident. Excavation of the foundation was made late in the last century, and many relics taken from the ruins are now in the museum at Lawrence.

During the regency of Miss Catharine Campbell, details were worked out for acquiring title to the site by the State Society. One of the stipulations of the agreement drawn up at this time was that a marker be erected within a given time. This was done while Mrs. Robert Bruce Campbell, of Wichita, was serving as State Regent in 1925. The marker is a granite shaft of great beauty and dignity and bears in addition to a description of the situation, a bronze insignia of the N. S. D. A. R.

The Second Annual El Quartelejo Plgrimage was held June 17th, 1940. Members and their friends from nine Kansas chapters attended the meeting. Representatives from as far east as Ottawa and Winfield, and one D. A. R. from the state of Illinois enjoyed a program which started at 10:00 o'clock with a tour of the Park, conducted by the Boy Scouts of Troop 149, Scott City. A picnic lunch at the Camp Christy Dining Hall was followed by the formal program. Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, Vice-Regent of the State Society, presiding.

Mrs. A. J. Berger, Regent of Kansas, and two Honorary State Regents and National Vice Presidents General, Miss Catharine Campbell and Mrs. Robert Bruce Campbell, attended and discussed the history of the El Quartelejo Indian Pueblo and reviewed the manner in which the D. A. R. came into possession of the site and the erection of the beautiful granite shaft marking the exact location of the pueblo.

The Honorable J. C. Denious of Dodge City, member of the Kansas Coronado Cuarto Centennial Commission, spoke of plans in Kansas for the 1941 Coronado observance and expressed the hope that all such patriotic organizations as the D. A. R. should become interested in cooperating with the Commission. Although no formal action was taken, it was agreed that the State Society would enjoy a visit to Scott City at a time next year when a special Coronado celebration might be held.

The second pilgrimage was more distinctly our own than the first one held in 1939. We depended less upon the locality in which we were visiting, for our arrangements and our entertainment. We were especially happy to have our speakers from our own organization for our 2nd Pilgrimage. We were, as before, offered every dourtesy by the Scott City C. of C; we were offered the use of the Camp Christy Dining Hall of the Baptist Boys' Camp, which is located within the Park, and again enjoyed the able guide service of the specially trained Boy Scouts.

The chapters forming the hostess group were again, Fort Supply Trail, Dodge City and Jonathan Gilbert, being the chapters located nearest the Park. Jonathan Gilbert is located 100 miles from the pueblo ruins; this is the nearest Kansas chapter to the site. You can understand that our work is one of planning at long range. This year Jonathan Gilbert handled the correspondence and publicity; Dodge City was resposible for food plans and Fort Supply Trail for general arrangements. For the splendid and whole hearted cooperation of these chapters your chairman is most grateful.
