



MRS. ROBERT BRUCE CAMPBELL

Regent, Eunice Sterling Chapter, D. A. R., 1920-1923 State Regent, Kansas Society, D. A. R., 1923-1929 Vice President General, National Society, D. A. R., 1929-1931.

On Tuesday afternoon, April 7, 1942, members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, relatives and friends of Mrs. Campbell gathered in Maple Grove Cemetery, Wichita, to place the official D. A. R. bronze memorial marker upon the grave of their beloved Honorary State Regent and past Vice President General, Mrs. Robert Bruce Campbell.

An impressive ceremony was conducted by Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, State Regent, Mrs. Clarence F. Drake, Regent, and Mrs. Samuel I. Hellar, Chaplain of Eunice Sterling Chapter, of which Mrs. Campbell was a member and past Regent. Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, State Vice Regent, gave a beautiful personal tribute to Mrs. Campbell. MRS. SHREWDER'S TRIBUTE TO MRS. CAMPBELL

Olive Decatur Campbell (Mrs. Robert Bruce) became a member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in Junc, 1910. As we review her activities concerning this Society from that time until June, 1941, we are conscious that in placing to her memory any kind of a memorial, we are attempting a vain thing, for truly, she has builded her own monument, through service. In placing this marker we do, however, in the only way that we have, designate this member as having been faithful and true to the ideals of our society.

I cannot here relate the many activities and accomplishments that have been hers. I would, however, remind you of her years of prominence in her own chapter, in the State and in the National Society. As Regent of Eunice Sterling Chapter from 1920 to 1923, she was known as a good executive, administering the duties of her office in a kindly, efficient way- ever thoughtful of the betterment of her chapter, whose members will always cherish her memory. The same can be said of all of her work throughout the following years.

As the responsibilities of the offices to which she was elected increased, so increased her dexterity and her strength. She served her State as Vice Regent and in 1923 was elected to the office of Regent of the Kansas Society. This office she held until 1929. During her administration, the State gained steadily and amazingly in membership; the American Indian Instituté was generously assisted financially; the handsome El Quartelejo Marker was erected; the third State Directory was published; the State Student Loan was created; over \$10,000 was paid into the building fund for Constitution Hall and the Kansas Roomo in the Administration Building were refinished and refurnished. Think of the expenditure of effort demanded by these stated projects, alone. Their success was not attained without courage nor without sacrifice, because at the time of her Regency, her family was young, and it, as well as State concerns, demanded her attention. It was a real achievement to have neglected neither.

In 1020 she was elected to the office of Vice President Ceneral and in this capacity served on many important National Committees. Afterward, she did not become inactive in the affairs of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Her keen interest, fine perception and splendid sense of balance were invaluable and ever available for the asking.

We are apt to measure her greatness by our loss, as we miss the inspiration of her actual presence and the advantage of her wise counsel. But we must remember that Olive Decatur Campbell developed and left for us a pattern; a design of loyalty of purpose, steadfastness in endeavor, the courage of accomplishment—tompered with a graciousness of spirit.—If we can, and if we will, follow this plan—then we, the Kansas Daughters, will have kept the faith.

Objects

The objects of this Society as stated in Article II of the Constitution are:

1.

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Insignia

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, page 57.

Gavel.

Chaplain (or Collect): Our Father in Heaven, we thank Thee for Thy guidance and for Thy abiding presence in the life of our country. We thank Thee for all those yesterdays of our human race whose lessons and fulfillments have become a heritage to us. Continue, we pray, Thy blessings upon this nation, that all who are a part of it may learn true nobility of manhood and womanhood.

Grant us growth in understanding and increasing devotion to righteousness. Amen.

INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

Chaplain: You have been duly cleeted to office in . Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Do you accept its responsibilities and duties?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to uphold the Constitution of the United States of America and to seek its observance by others?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to perform the duties of your office to the best of your ability and understanding, and that at all times you will conduct yourself uprightly, God being your helper?

Response: I do.

- Chaplain: That which is gone out of thy lips thou shalt observe and do; according as thou hast vowed unto Jehovah thy Cod. Deut. 23:23.
- Collect: Lord God, we pray that we may be joined together in loyalty; —these who now are placed in leadership, and we who have chosen them to guide us. Bless their faithfulness and ours, in a united service to our Society and to Thy kingdom. May we have an awareness of Thy companionship in all our plans and projects; and the assurance of Thy benediction upon our work. Amen.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Report immediately to the State Corresponding Secretary any change in chapter officer or chapter chairman.

Report AT ONCE all resignations, deaths, marriages, and members RECEIVED by transfer to the Treasurer General. Do not report a resignation, or transfer a member in arrears in dues. Only members in good standing may resign or be transferred.

Do not vote to grant a resignation. Report all resignations IMMEDIATELY. To delay may cause injustice, and the member to have to be dropped or the chapter to have to pay an additional year's dues.

Vote to receive a member by transfer, and notify the Treasurer General IMMEDIATELY of the acceptance of the member by the chapter.

Do not report names of members as transferred to other chapters until you receive notice from the Treasurer General that such transfers have been recorded.

Grant transfer card as soon as requested. Do not vote to grant transfer OUT of the chapter. Do not send transfer card to the Treasurer General. The member transferring gives it with a copy of her application paper to the chapter to which she transfers. Chapter from which member transferred does not remove name from rolls when transfer card is issued, but does remove it from the rolls when notice is received from Treasurer General that transfer has been completed. Likewise, chapter to which member transfers does not add name to rolls when transfer card and application paper is received, but adds the name to the rolls as of the date on which the Treasurer General notifies the chapter that the transfer is completed. Treasurer General notifies Chapter Treasurer of BOTH chapters of date upon which transfer is completed.

Collect dues in time to reach Washington by January 1. DO NOT wait until December to begin to collect dues.

Send in late December all dues on hand. DO NOT wait for delinquents. Send all dues received after January 1 AS SOON AS RECEIVED. DO NOT HOLD dues received after January 1 waiting for other members to pay. To do so may rob your chapter of rightful representation and a member of the right to serve as a delegate or alternate.

Send special funds for schools, scholarships, etc., for which State credit is desired to the STATE TREASURER, who in turn will forward to the Treasurer General.

Every Chapter Regent, Treasurer and Registrar, should have a copy of the D. A. R. Handbook. The price of the Handbook is twenty-five cents. Orders with remittances should be sent to the Treasurer General, Memorial Continental Hall, Washington, D. C.

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Annual Pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission

The Ninth Annual Pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission was made September 20, 1941, by one hundred and twenty-five members. The Board Meeting was called to order by the State Regent, Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, at ten-thirty o'clock, A. M. The State Chaplain, Mrs. William H. McCamish, led in prayer. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Miss Gladys Beck, Regent of James Ross Chapter.

Welcome and greetings were extended by Mrs. Berger who expressed regret at the absence of the State Recording Secretary, Mrs. John N. Ryan, due to the serious illness of Mr. Ryan. Mrs. H. M. Stricklen was appointed to serve as Recording Secretary, pro tem.

Lettters of appreciation from honored guests at the State Conference and other communications were read. The Vice President General from Kansas, Miss Marion Seelye, and Miss Catherine Campbell, Honorary State Regent, graciously responded to introductions. Reports were given by State Officers. Thanks and appreciation to the James Ross Chapter as hostess to the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage, were expressed by Mrs. Berger, and instructions given to the Secretary to send a note of thanks. Mrs. Berger announced that in compliance with a request made to all states honored in the service of a President General, that Kansas was the first state to raise the \$100.00 necessary to purchase a figure to display the gown of Mrs. George Thacher Guernsey.

Mrs. Berger spoke of the Three Point Program of the Kansas Society:

First, in expressing the hope that every chapter would contribute to the \$500.00 pledge made at the State Conference for the Kansas Hall in the new Tamassee High School.

Second, Chapters were urged to make contributions before December 1, 1941, to the bronze Santa Fe Trail Marker to be placed on Pawnee Rock so that the order may be given before the advance in price.

Third, Emphasis was placed on the importance of assisting in , the work of the American Red Cross, and a request was made, when possible, that service be given to the Red Cross in the name of your Chapter.

The State Vice Regent, Mrs. Shrewder, reported on the Kansas pledge of \$500.00 for the Kansas Hall in the new Tamassee High School. \$288.60 has been received, and an additional \$141.00 pledged, leaving a balance of \$70.40 to be pledged and \$211.40 to be collected.

Mrs. Berger stressed contributions to the Kansas Tamassee Scholarship of \$115.00 which will make it possible for some child to attend Tamassee next year on a Kansas D. A. R. scholarship.

A letter from Ralph H. Cain, Superintendent of the Tamassee D. A. R. School was read, in which he suggested that two Kansas Flags 12x18 inches be furnished, to mark the two Kansas Memorial Acres upon the occasion of Founder's Day, October 26th, Mrs. Robert L. Jones proffered the gift of one of these flags in the name of the Emporia Chapter, and it was approved. Miss Stella B. Haines, who was a member of the Kansas Legislature at the time of the adoption of the Kansas Flag, offered a gift of the second flag. Approval was given and Mrs. Berger expressed the grateful appreciation of the Kansas Society for these gifts. The Secretary was instructed to send notes of thanks.

Mrs. Berger expressed the Board's appreciation of the gift of \$5.00 made by Mrs. Joe R. Beeler, State Chairman of the Correct Use of the Flag, to be used as a First Prize in the Flag Essay Contest, and insructed the Secretary to give further grateful expression in a note to Mrs. Beeler. Mrs. Shrewder moved, and it was seconded, that the Kansas Society vote \$5.00 to be used as prizes \$3.00 as a Second prize, and \$2.00 as Third prize for the Flag Essay Contest. The motion carried.

Mrs. Berger stated that net increase in membership should be a major project of every chapter, and announced that she would award two membership prizes of \$5.00 each at the 1942 State Conference. Mrs. Berger reminded the members of the importance of holding chapter elections in January. Chapter Chairmen reported.

A motion was made by Miss Marion Seelye, and seconded, that \$5.00 be voted to be used as a first award in the Girl Home Makers Cotton Dress Contest in Kansas. The motion carried.

Mrs. Harry M. Ives, State Chairman of Good Citizenship Pilgrimage, explained the merit system and questionnaire to be used in the selection of the Kansas Good Citizenship Pilgrim. Following discussion on the present custom of bringing the Good Citizenship Pilgrims into Topeka, Mrs. H. L. Kennedy made a motion, and it was seconded, that the pilgrimage to Topeka be discontinued and instead have the Good Citizenship Pilgrim presented at State Conference, plans for which to be left to the Executive Board. The motion carried.

Mrs. G. D. Weillep, State Chairman of Shawnee Mission, announced that the three pictures precented through Betty Washington Chapter, had been hung in the D. A. R. rooms at Shawnee Mission; also that the picture of Jerome C. Berryman, great-grandfather of the State Vice Regent, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, and who was an early day figure in the Mission, had been hung over the mantle in the north building of the Mission. Mrs. Berger voiced appreciation for these gifts.

Mrs. Berger announced the dates for the State Conference to be held in Hutchinson as March 12, 13 and 14, 1942, at which time the President General, Mrs. William H. Pouch, will be present.

Miss Gladys Beck announced luncheon would be served at 12:30 on the lawn followed by an address by Mr. F. L. Schlagle, Superintendent of the Kansas City, Kansas, schools. The Secretary was instructed to send a note of thanks to Mr. Schlagle.

Miss Catherine Campbell, Chairman, read the report of the Memorial Resolutions Committee; also a tribute to Mrs. Robert Bruce Campbell sent by Mrs. Loren E. Rex. Miss Campbell moved that this tribute be included in the Memorial Resolution and adopted as such. Seconded by Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder and carried. The report of the General Resolutions Committee was read by the Chairman, Mrs. Jud P. Hall, and by motion by her, adopted as a whole. The reports of the National Vice Chairmen, Mrs. Ralph B. Earp, American Red Cross, and Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell, D. A. R. Museum, woro given and enjoyed, as was also the report of the Senior State President, C. A. R., Miss Marie Sellars.

Mrs. John Warren Kirkpatrick moved that Miss Grace Meeker be made an Honorary State Regent. Seconded by Mrs. Glenn T. Zimmerman, and carried. Miss Meeker graciously responded that it was one of the happiest privileges she had ever had. Mrs. Berger explained regarding the change in place for the meeting of Continental Congress from Washington, D. C., to Chicago, and that Credential Reports would stand. Headquarters will be the Stevens Hotel, the date about the 4th of May. The usual luncheon and banquet will be given. Mrs. Berger expressed the hope that many would attend. An etching "Sign of Spring," by Crumbo, and an Announcement of the Opening of the Living Indians Room, sent by Mrs. Loren E. Rex, National Chairman of the American Indians Committee, were passed around. They will be filed with the State Historian.

Mrs. Glenn T. Zimmerman moved, and it was seconded by Mrs. William H. McCamish, that as there was only one candidate for each office, the vote be taken viva voce. The election was then held and candidates as nominated the previous day, elected. The recommendations made by the Board of Management were read and voted on by sections as follows:

- 1. That our contributions to Kate Duncan Smith D. A. R. School for this year be given for purchasing a drinking fountain. Carried.
- 2. That the surplus in the Tamassee Hall Fund be held until such time as the cost of the marker can be determined; any remainder to be retained for Tamassee D. A. R. School work. Carried.
- 3. That the State Library Fund and the National Library Fund be combined, to be hereafter known as the Library Fund. Carried.
- 4. That the per capita tax of 32c for 1943 be allowed. Carried.
- 5. That Kansas Society D. A. R., replace the drapes, slip and pillow covers in the Kansas Room in Memorial Continental Hall, at an approximate cost of \$30.00. Carried.
- 6. That in accordance with our policy to so honor deceased State Regents, a bronze Lay Member Marker be purchased and placed on the grave of Olive Decatur Campbell, past State Regent, at a cost of \$7.25 f.o.b. Cincinnati. Carried.
 Mrs. Berger expressed her appreciation of the work done the three processing of the state of t

Mrs. Berger expressed her appreciation of the work done the past two ycars and asked for continued cooperation and help. Mrs. Drake made the following announcement: "This has been a most pleasant and unusual business session in that we have but three out-going officers. They have been efficient and most courteous in executing the duties of their offices. To show our appreciation of the work of these out-going officers, Mrs. John N. Ryan, Mrs. John E. Morgan and Mrs. Glenn T. Zimmerman, as well as of thosy remaining, Madam Regent, I move we give a rising vote of thanks." The response was unanimous. Mrs. Berger thanked Mrs. Drake in behalf of the State Society. A rising vote of thanks was also given, at Mrs. Berger's suggestion, to the Uvedale Chapter and its Regent, Mrs. Wallace S. Wick, for all they have done toward making this a very pleasant occasion, and their cooperation in planning for the Conference. Mrs. John W arren Kirkpatrick conducted a brief installation service for the newly elected officers. Mrs. Marcel Duphorne, State Treasurer, thanked the Chapter Treasurers for their whole-hearted support and offered any help she could give. One verse of "Blest Be the Tie that Binds" was sung, led by Mrs. Earl Foy, with Mrs. T. E. Foster, accompanist; the Benediction was pronounced by the State Conference was adjourned.

Minutes of Saturday morning were approved by the Executive Board.

Report of State Officers

STATE REGENT

(Mrs. Alexander J.) RUTH NORRIS BERGER

The days, the weeks, and the months have slipped away and we find ourselves at the end of another administration. As your State Regent it has been my desire not only to prove worthy of the trust you placed in me two years ago, but to carry on the work of our Society in a constructive manner, with a strengthening of our foundation which will permit greater achievements in the years to come.

I deeply appreciate the many courtesies and the kind consideration shown me at all times. I should like to make special mention of each delightful occasion, but as others have been requested to stress the work of the Society rather than social activities, I, too, shall confine this report to the work of the organization.

"Together" is one of the greatest words in the English language, and together the Kansas Daughters have gone forward in every phase of the work of the National Society. As each state chairman will bring to up the report of her committee it would deprive her of a rightful privilege for me to mention any details of the splendid work accomplished by the state chairmen.

This year you were asked to cooperate in a three point program which included educational, historical, and patriotic projects—and to include as a major project each year an increase in membership.

Your gifts to our approved schools, and especially to the two D. A. R. schools, Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith, have been deeply appreciated. I am happy to report that our first Tamassee scholarship student is doing nice work at Tamassee and appreciates your making it possible for her to attend school this year. I trust that as long as we have a Tamassee that Kansas D. A. R. will never fail to provide the necessary amount for at least one child to attend school each year. A scholarship is \$100, and fifteen dollars additional if clothing is provided. With 56 chapters this will not require a great deal from any one chapter but it will mean more than a great deal to some child.

You have heard Mrs. Shrcwdcr's wonderful report on the Kansas Corridor in the Tamassee High School and know that in less than one year you contributed the entire amount—\$500. Would that I could convey to you that which I feel in my heart. My appreciation of this expression of your friendship and interest in our D. A. R. school is far beyond my being able to express in words. I do thank you.

Within three months you contributed the amount necessary to purchase the beautiful bronze Santa Fe Trail marker for Pawnee Rock—one of the most historic sites on the route of the old Santa Fe Trail. In appreciation of this historical marker the Pawnee Rock State Park Board is placing the marker without cost to the State Society. When weather conditions and tire restrictions will permit, plans for dedicating the marker will be completed.

Kansas is the only state west of the Mississippi River, and, in membership it is next to the smallest state that has had the honor of having a President General,—but it was the first state to send to the Treasurer General the money for the figure to display the gown of her President General, Mrs. George Thacher Guernsey. Present and Past State Officers, State Chairmen, members of Betty Washington and Susannah French Putney Chapters, Atchison Junior Group, and friends in several chapters who knew of the request and that it could not be presented to the chapters before fall, in less than three weeks contributed the \$100.

At the request of Mr. Hardy, caretaker at Shawnee Mission, Kansas D. A. R. furnished several strings of electric lights and new bulbs to be used for lighting the Living Christmas Tree at Shawnee Mission during Christmas week.

In December you were asked to contribute to the Nursery Air Raid Shelter for British Children. When this was presented to the National Board of Management by Mr. Henry J. Allen of Kansas, pledges were made by several of the State Regents, and in the name of the Kansas Society I pledged \$75 and any additional that we might be able to give. You have contributed over the amount pledged and I do thank you. In connection with this I want to mention that \$25 was the gift of the Kansas Society, Daughters of Colonial Wars whose membership, as the gift indicates, includes many of our members.

The reports of Chapter Regents show that Kansas Daughters have been active in all patriotic work. It has been most gratifying to read in the reports of the First Aid Classes organized, of the many hours given and articles made for the Red Cross,—and that nearly every chapter contributed; that a large number of our members served on patriotic committees; that many American Flags have been given this year; that books, and magazines, and cookies have been sent to recreation centers and that others were keeping the cookie jars filled on certain days; that members served as hostesses and as chaperones at recreation centers and used their cars to take the "dates" to the parties and dances; that the Aluminum Drive, the saving of waste paper, and the saving of cancelled stamps for Queen's Hospital were included in many of the reports. Defense Stamps and Bonds have been purchased. Nine chapters reported the amount invested in bonds and it totals \$1,931.00.

As local chapters to show growth must add new members, the State Society to show progress must add new chapters. Last year it was my privilege to report two chapters organized and this year I am happy to report the organization of the William Creekmore Chapter at Pleasanton on January 12, 1942, with eighteen organizing members. I deeply regret the Organizing Regent, Mrs. William A. Spohn, cannot be with us today.

Three Organizing Regents have been appointed and chapters are organizing at Great Bend, Garden City and Coldwater. The chapter at Great Bend will probably be completed within the next two months. We are pleased to have with us today Mrs. William Peschka the Organizing Regent at Great Bend.

You have heard the splendid report of your State Registrar. The net gain of 94 members this year is our largest net gain in 12 years. Forty-seven of our fifty-five chapters added at least one new member to their roll during the year. The number of Kansas members dropped this year for non payment of dues was less than at any time in the past 22 years, and perhaps longer, but records are not available prior to the year 1920. For several years we have had a few chapters with a membership of 12, which is the number required by the National By-Laws in order to function as a chapter. It gives me a great deal of pleasure to report that today we do not have a single chapter in the state whose membership is not more than twelve. It has been my pleasure to assist in establishing the eligibility of 46 of the 180 members admitted this year, and to make out the required two application papers for forty-one of the forty-six.

In going over the daily record sheet for the year, I find that in addition to attending three meetings of the National Board I have traveled 6,729 miles within the state, and, by actual count, have personally written 2,925 letters and 3,399 postal cards; a total of 6,324 pieces of mail in addition to the 410 mimeographed letters that were sent out during the year. It has been a busy year with very few, if any idle moments, but the confidence and the friendship of the Kansas Daughters is rich reward for any service it has been my privilege to render.

As the two years of our work together draw to a close I wish to thank the State Officers, the State Chairmen, the Chapter Regents, and each and every one of you for your loyalty, your cooperation, your abiding interest and your splendid achievements in every branch of the work. I thank you also for your friendship, for your confidence, and for your every courtesy and consideration shown me, and I pledge anew my loyalty to you.

STATE VICE REGENT

In compliance with the request from the State Regent, the officers' reports will be concerned only with the actual business and accomplishments of our several offices. In this we are not unmindful of the many social occasions and courtesies which have been extended to us, of which we would like to SAY MUCH. We are aware of the urgency of business and of the volume of business to come before this Conference, and for this we must conserve our time. We are also privileged to have with us our President General and others of the National Society from whom we are most anxious to hear at length.

The work of the Vice Regent is not arduous in Kansas. Especially has this been so, serving under an energetic and efficient Regent. It has been a lare privilege and a very great pleasure to serve with our Regent, Mrs. A. J. Berger, and with the other members of a most congenial Board.

As Vice Regent I attended the two State Pilgrimages. El Quartelejo Pilgrimage, held in the Spring (June 17th) in the west and Shawnee Mission, held in the Fall (September 20th) in the east. At the latter a State Board meeting was attended.

It was my privilege to represent the Regent at Greensburg, October 26th, at the 7th District Kansas Federation of Women's Clubs 46th Annual Convention and to report there, along with members of the American Legion Auxiliary, the American Association of University Women and the American Woman's Voluntary Services, upon Registration for Defense. The enrollments plans of the several organizations bear a definite similarity, differing mainly in the inclusiveness and varieties of services to be rendered. Our enrollment card appcared to be the most simple, but entiroly adoquate, and at that time we were very far ahead in the progress made toward actually getting our plan ready for use.

At the regional meeting in Newton, November 15th, I was pleased to speak on Tamassee: to present the plan for the Kansas Hall project and the Tamassee Scholarship plan. The outcome of the Kansas Hall project and the report on the Tamassee Scholarship which will be given by Mrs. L. B. Naylor, Chairman of Approved Schools, prove that our daughters are fully aware of the significant place of our schools in the present scheme of things and of their vital importance to us in this battle for democracy. I attended with all other members of the Executive Board the planning meeting held in Wichita, February 10th.

My great privilege and accomplishment this year has been the completion of the work as Chairman of the Kansas Hall Project for Tamassee High School. Due to the excellent presentation of Tamassee School by Mrs. John Logan Marshall and the interest and assistance given me by the State Treasurer, Mrs. Marcel Duphorne, the work of this committee has been greatly lightened.

Undertaken in the name and honor of Ruth Norris Berger, Regent of Kansas, the funds (\$500.00), for a room in the new high school building at Tamassee, to be known as Kansas Hall, were to have been collected over a period of two years. Due to unsettled economic and national conditions, members were asked to make the effort to complete the project within this year, (just $\frac{1}{2}$ the time.) The response with which the proposal was met speaks for itself. The fund, made up entirely of voluntary contributions from members and chapters, was raised by the 1st of January, and enough has since been added to assure us of a marker when the building is finished and the various halls and rooms are dedicated. I might add that this marker is obligatory, and that the Board is placing before you later at this Conference, a recommendation that the amount in excess of \$500.00 be definitely set aside for its purchase and installation.

Kansas Hall at Tamassee will be, when completed, a fine tribute richly deserved by one who has given so generously of her talent, her time and her strength, to the work of the Society. The mechanics of this committee work would make a long and dull report. Over 250 communications were sent out in the interest of Kansas Hall. A complete list of contributions and conributors is on file with the Treasurer and will not be duplicated here. It is a long list of generous devotion to the principles and interests of our Society. As chairman of this committee, and as Vice Regent, I feel that I can but inadequately express my gratefulness to you for your understanding and for your loyal cooperation. It is exactly what I expected from you and I shall be grateful to you always for thi confirmation of my faith in Kansas and in Kansas Daughters. I shall likewise be grateful to you always for this opportunity to have served my State well, because of YOU.

June 24th, fifty-five letters were sent to Chapter Regents enclosing lists of National and State Officers and State Chairmen, with a request for lists of local Chapter Chairmen.

July 16th, a card was sent to each Chapter Regent announcing the appointment of Mrs. Loren E. Rex as National Chairman, and Mrs. Otis L. Thisler as State Chairman of the newly created Committee of American Indians.

During August, sixteen cards were mailed to Chapter Regents requesting return of Chapter Chairmen lists, and letters were sent to all State Chairmen enclosing lists of their respective Chapter Chairmen.

September 22nd, thirty-four cards were sent to State Officers and State Chairmen notifying them of the change in Regents of Sterling Chapter.

December 29th, a letter concerning State Conference, together with three Information and two Credential blanks was mailed to all Chapter Regents.

Notices of changes in Chapter Officers were sent to the Organizing Secretary General. State Chairmen were notified of all changes in local Chapter Chairmanship. It was my pleasure to accompany the State Regent on several of her official visits, and I regret that it was not possible to have accepted other kind invitations. I attended the Shawnee Mission Picnic and Board Meeting; and on January 12, 1942, it was my privilege to attend the organization meeting of the William Creekmore Chapter at Pleasanton, Kansas.

During the year I have mailed two hundred and thirty-one letters and two hundred and twenty-seven cards, and have received two hundred and forty-one communications, including seventeen year books.

To have served as your Corresponding Secretary has been a pleasant experience and I wish to express my grateful appreciation for the many courtesies shown me.

STATE REPORTER

It has been a great privilege to serve you during the past year as your State Reporter and I deeply appreciate all the chairmen and regents have done to bring the right kind of publicity to the public of the D. A. R.

All activities of the National and State organization and all chapter news have been compiled in the D. A. R. scrap book, also the 1941 Continental Congress and the 1941 State Conference.

Reports have been sent to the National Chairman, Mrs. Joseph E. Pryor, the State Regent and the State Secretary.

Kansas has received fine publicity in newspapers all over the state-48 chapters have chairmen responding nicely. The Good Citizenship Pilgrimage, Flag Essay, D. A. R. Broadcasts, Historical events, Red Cross activities of members and National Defense were well publicized by chapters.

Fort Supply Trail and Susannah French Putney Chapters both use the D. A. R. emblem at the top of most of their items. 17 different chairmen of the Susannah French Putney Chapter, El Dorado had long articles about their committee work in the local papers.

9,385 inches of publicity appeared in the newspapers of Kansas last year and had a monetary value of \$329,070, if it were sold for advertising.

Abilene is to be commended for the publicity given to the Junior American Citizens Club work.

Eunice Sterling, Wichita, leads this year with 1,122 inches-Susannah French Putney, El Dorado, is second with 935 inches and Wellington is third with 704. Ft. Supply Trail, Ashland, is first in the weekly edition class.

170 pictures were used in Kansas papers during the past year— 57 in the state news—Eunice Sterling also leads in pictures having 37 pictures in their local papers.

The State Conference held at El Dorado last year was sent to the National Historical Magazine.

CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG

(Mrs. Joe R.) VERNEDA D. BEELER

Today, "The Flag of The United States of America," our Flag needs love and protection more than ever before in its history. The work of our committee is to foster Flag Education and to engender in all Americans a love for The Flag of The United States of America that will never fail, no matter how drastic the circumstances. We must keep always our Flag a symbol of freedom." These words were written in a letter last September to chapter chairmen. Six months later, the drastic circumstances are facing us. Our people are more Flag Conscious for we must preserve our liberty, freedom and democracy.

Forty-five of the 55 Kansas Chapters distributed 227 Flag Manuals; 145 Flag Leaflets; 257 Small Flags and 30 Large Flags for public buildings. 103 Flag Talks were given at various meetings; 14 Radio Talks; 24 special papers or drills on The Flag at D. A. R. meetings. 32 local newspapers printed Flag material. 37 chapters observed Flag Day with Patriotic Programs at Picnics, Breakfasts, Luncheons or City Celebrations. Atchison chapter sponsored a "Flag Story Contest." Fort Larned chapter a Flag Play. Flag Education has been given by chapters to foreigners in their communities. 94% of the D. A. R. members own Flags. 96% of chapters give the Pledge of Allegiance. These should be 100%. 8 chapters report questions on Flag etiquette, 20 chapters have corrected breaches of etiquette.

Our chief project this year was the Eighth Grade Essay Contest. "The Flag of The United States of America.". 466 Essays were written (two schools reported only the high rating essays). First place, Lovan Davenport, Leavenworth, \$5.00; Second place, Norma Mathew, Arkansas City, \$3.00; Third place, Yvonne Thompson, Derby, \$2.00. Through the splendid cooperation of Mr. George L. McClenny, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, rural schools not close to D. A. R. Chapters learned of the Contest and had 48 entries in the Contest. Of these Dorothy Leihen, Ness City, rated Fifth place. Only three prizes were given, but the first ten are given honorable mention. Mrs. Lloyd Robertson, Miss Jennie I. Campbell and Mr. F. W. Boyd, Jr., state judges, said of the essays: "They are better than last year. The amount of originality the 'original ones' put into the standard story was interesting." An English Teacher wrote, "I certainly think this is a worthwhile contest—it has created such an interest among our students." Another said, "I feel that now all of us could write such essays because some of our students (and teachers) are sending brothers into the Service and we really know the meaning of the Glorious Red, White and Blue." Several fine articles on the Essay Contest were in the newspapers of the State. All chapters have done splendid work: some of the accomplish-

At the State Conference last March in El Dorado, the Conference voted to establish the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage Contest on a merit basis using a questionnaire as stressed by the National Society. Because of a revision of the Manual, made necessary by a change in naturalization laws, no Manuals were available for six months of the past year. However, in the remaining time, Kansas distributed 2,696 Manuals, 13 chapters reporting. These were used principally for naturalization work; but also for education, for the A. W. V. S., the Y. W. C. A., and for Job's Daughters. Kansas' contribution to the Manual Fund was \$219.20.

D. A. R. MUSEUM

C. club works with the Red Cross and has a Victory Garden. The Scandia Rural School gave Defense albums and stamps as Valentines.

Our J. A. C. work is excellent. Wherever it has been understood and efforts made to organize clubs, there has been success. We hope more of our Chapters the coming year will be convinced of its worth.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

Kansas has had a slight increase in the number of Junior Members in the past year, but we still do not have enough of the junior age interested in the worthwhile projects of the D. A. R.

Phebe Dustin and Wellington have the Junior Members meeting and counting their hours of war relief with the Chapter.

Eunice Sterling Junior Group takes a personal interest in the Chapter's scholarship girl at Tamassee.

Topeka Chapter has a Junior Service Group, meeting twice a month in the afternoon, with three projects—Red Cross sewing, sewing instruction and entertainment for the girls at the Florence Crittendon Home, and a Christmas box including an afghan and candy for Tamassee D. A. R. School. Topeka is also organizing a group to meet in the evenings for war work.

Atchison Chapter Junior Group meets in the evening, doing Red Cross sewing and knitting. They organized a Red Cross First Aid Class that was open to the public. They delegate two or more members of their group to attend the Chapter meetings. Their social activities were a party for older C. A. R.'s and other prospective members, a luncheon for the Topeka Junior Group, and a Christmas party shower for Tamassee. A rummage sale financed their projects—20 Girl Scout memberships at the State Orphans Home, gifts to the U. S. O. and the Red Cross, sheets for Tamassee, and a donation for the Fund to display the gown of the President General from Kansas. They are working with other civic clubs to sponsor a nursery school for underprivileged children.

The percent of members in our chapters under the ages of 20 or even 35 is too small. There is much work to be done. Can we interest more of this age group to do it this next year?

NATIONAL DEFENSE THROUGH PATRIOTIC EDUCATION

(Miss) ESTHER CHRISTMORE

All but one of the fifty-five chapters have Chapter Chairman of National Defense. Fifty-one Chairmen sent reports to the State Chairman.

The National Quota of ten cents a member has been paid.

Forty Chairmen report using the National Defense News in chapter work. Sixteen have reported on National Defense News at each meeting.

Chapter Chairmen report eighty-nine paid subscriptions to Na-tional Defense News; the Eunice Sterling Chapter (Wichita) twenty; the Susannah French Putney (El Dorado) sixteen; the Molly Foster Berry (Fort Scott); Dodge City and Abilene Chapters ten each.

Twenty-nine Chairmen report that the National Society's Resolutions on National Defense were presented to their chapters.

Twenty-five chapters have had one or more programs on Na-tional Defense, making a total of fifty programs. Eight chapters provided from one to three speakers on National Defense to other organizations for public school assemblies, civic clubs, and radio broadcasts. Ten chapters have cooperated in Citizenship Day Probroadcasts. Ten chapters have cooperated in Citizenship Day Pro-grams and observed from one to four patriotic holidays such as Armistice Day, George Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Flag Day, with speakers, playlets, music. Six chapters have had an exhibit of National Defense literature at chapter meetings, public schools, public libraries, and stores. Fifteen chapters distributed National Defense literature in the public schools, public libraries, school libraries, chapter meetings, study clubs, and Recreation Camps. Nine chapters have sponsored Patriotic Films. Those mentioned were "The Land of Liberty," "Howards of Virginia," and "Pledge of Allegiance." Four Chairmen report from one to four radio talks on National Defense. National Defense.

Three chapters conducted the Good Citizenship Contest in Junior High School; sixteen, in Senior High School; and twenty-three conducted the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage Contest. Fifty-one medals were presented for these and other contests.

Six chapters report work in Recreation Camps. Wichita Chapter (Wichita) gave \$12.50 for one boy's expenses at Boys' State. Others have sent magazines and books to Forts and Camps, have acted as hostesses and chaperones, have kept cookie jars filled, have had Sunday dinners, teas and entertainment for the soldiers.

Twenty-five chapters report a large per cent of their membership attending First Aid, Nutrition, and Home Nursing Classes. Others are sponsoring Home Defense Programs, serving on Defense Savings Committees, helping with Civilian Defense Registration, buying and selling Defense Bonds and Stamps.

Many of the chapters have bought Defense Bonds. The Eunice Sterling Chapter (Wichita)purchased a \$500.00 bond; Mrs. Frank Kruske, the chairman of this same chapter, sold over \$2,000.00 in bonds to interested friends and chapter members, and has sold Defense Stamps at all chapter meetings. Lois Warner (Junction City) purchased six \$100.00 bonds. Abilene Chapter (Abilene) purchased two bonds. Betty Washington (Lawrence) and Henry Dawson (Mc-Pherson) purchased one bond each.

Twenty-eight chapters report that 25% to 100% of their membership signed the Home Defense Cards. Nine chapters report 100%.

Almost every chapter is actively engaged in some phase of Red Cross work, has helped with the U. S. O. Drive, the Victory Book Drive, and the Aluminum Drive. The Abilene Chapter sent away 650 pounds of aluminum after it was cleaned and ready. Many members are saving tin foil, silk stockings, and cancelled stamps. The Chapter Chairman, Miss Kate Miles of the Mary Wade Strother Chapter, Salina, participated in the Ambulance Drive netting \$100.00. She also helped raise for the British Relief Fund \$150.70. The Abilene Chapter has been active in Bed Cross. Six members hold offices or head committees. Numbers of hours spent in sewing and limiting, 3,458; amount given to Red Cross in Roll Call, \$149.00. This same Chapter sponsored three assembly programs for the Junior High School. The Dodge City Chapter (Dodge City) distributed 496 pieces of literature to her public schools.

The State Chairman has been celling Defense Stamps in school each week, is on the Defense Savings Committee for Abilene, Kansas, has encouraged the buying of Defense Stamps and Bonds at each chapter meeting, has directed two patriotic plays which were repeated for school and civic clubs.

It has been a great privilege to serve you the past year as State Chairman of National Defense Through Patriotic Education. I am deeply grateful to the Chapter Chairmen for their efforts and cooperation in making this report possible. Ours is an educational program. May we become more National Defense minded.

NATIONAL HISTORICAL MAGAZINE

Your State Chairman of the National Historical Magazine is pleased to bring you the following report:

Early last fall, the Chairman sent to each Chapter Chairman, or to the Chapter Regent where none had been appointed, a letter outlining objectives for the year and requesting that the subscription list, with dates of expiration, be sent to her, and that all new subscriptions and renewals go to her for forwarding to the Magazine office. This letter was followed later by a card listing the subscrip tions in that Chapter, as found in the State Chairman's file and asking that the Chapter Chairman check back for correctness. Reports were received from only 41 Chairmen and Regents.

Forty-three Chairmen had been appointed for the year in the 55 Kansas Chapters.

Your Chairman is happy to report 249 subscriptions in the State, a gain of 19 since the report of last year and the largest number on record from available files. Peleg Gorton again wins first honors for having the largest number of subscriptions, 15, but Fort Supply Trail deserves special honorable mention, with 9 subscriptions for a membership of only 32.

Interest in the Magazine is evidenced through its greatly increased use the past year. Susannah French Putney Chapter stands at the head of this list, with articles having been re-written and combined for six local newspaper storics, and programs based upon the Magazine, reviews and 2-minute sales talks also being given. Many Chapters used the Magazine as a basis for programs, outstanding among these having been a paper on "Old China and Glassware" presented at a meeting of Gen. Edward Hand Chapter. Group subscriptions have been popular and the issues passed around at the meetings, in many cases being then given to City and High School Libraries. High School and College students find the material valuable in preparing their studies.

As Chairman of Radio, I beg to submit the following report for the year:

Your Chairman wrote to fourteen Kansas Stations asking for time for talks on D. A. R. work this year. Ten responded, graciously offering to cooperate and give us fifteen minute broadcasts. As you know, much of the success in this work depends upon the generosity of the broadcasting stations. We have had fifteen excellent programs and over nine Kansas Stations. An Oklahoma station, KVOO, on November 7, included the D. A. R. in a patriotic program for the Federated Clubs and the Kansas D. A. R. part in the program was sponsored by the Jane Dean Coffey Chapter of Coffeyville.

I report the following broadcasts:

June 14, 1941—A program over KGGF, Coffeyville, announced by Mrs. T. J. Gilstrap; a vocal solo by Mr. Caldwell Johnson, a talk by Mrs. R. W. Diver, Regent, on the topic, "We do our bit," which included excerpts from the President General and the reading of the Resolutions adopted by Continental Congress.

Report of National Chairman and Vice Chairmen

AMERICAN INDIANS

(Mrs. Loren E.) LEDA F. REX, Chairman

As National Chairman of the American Indians Committee, the State Recording Scorctary has asked that this report reach her on or before March 6th: since this date comes before the time limit has closed for the reports of Vice and State Chairmen to reach me, of necessity this report is only a partial one.

First, may I extend greetings to the State Regent, hostess chapter and members of the 44th State Conference. I regret that because of the war situation I shall not be present in person but I assure you that my best wishes are with you. So far as I know the Oregon State Society last Fall made the

So far as I know the Oregon State Society last Fall made the first contribution to the Indians Committee; \$50.00 was given for adult education to be used for Indian women living in Oregon. Chapters in Wichita gave money for Indian boys attending Wichita University. New York State has a four year scholarship for the use of a girl at Cornell University. There is some interest money from the former American Indian Institute, Minor Scholarship for d.

West Virginia gave the first \$100.00 to the Living Indians Room, which room is located in the basement of Memorial Hall; and the State Chairman of the same State was the first State Chairman to contribute to this fund. Many articles of Indian crafts have been sold, perhaps \$300.00 to \$500.00 worth, no definite figures are avail able at this time. Here the need is for a greater market, better instruction and more materials. Beads are in demand. If members have beads to donate, kindly send to (Vice Chairman) Mrs. Hester Wishaar, c/o Indian Agency, Leupp, Arizona. When making gifts and when using place cards and favors if our members would buy from the Indians Committee, the assistance would be appreciated. D. A. R. Magazine, Nov., 1941, pages 40-41, tells the addresses of chairmen and designates their specific line of work.

The Indians in marked degree have gone to the defense of our country and the large way in which they are buying bonds and the manner in which they have placed their funds at the disposal of the President of the United States is a challenge to ANY American. The Indian girls are going into the service as nurses and to provide training for these girls is one of our greatest opportunities. The Society wanted to send New Testaments to the Indian men in service but to deliver them was next to impossible and we were informed that the Government presents such books to all men in service if the gifts are desired. Members are urged whenever possible to make personal contacts and to give cheer to these men.

The Living Indians Room at National Headquarters is being provided as a place to present and display the work and art of the American Indians of today, and it should receive funds from the members to make it worthy of its position. At present it has been cleaned and whitewashed and is to be humbly presented and started on its mission of good will. Suggestions are welcomed; plans are to be made which, it is hoped, may work out into something very useful for our living and future Indians. In token of the opening of this room, enclosed is an original etching by Woodrow Crumbo who is a former American Indian Institute youth. The ceremony of dedication of the Indian room is to be held in the National Officers Club room at eleven o'clock, April 20th, 1942.

So often the question is asked, what are GOOD investments? The reply to this question from the Chairman of the American Indians Committee, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, is: to cooperate with and to educate our FIRST AMERICANS first, and "Other things will be added unto you." Washington, D. C., March 1st, 1942.

AMERICAN RED CROSS

(Mrs. Ralph B.) FRANCES D. EARP, Vice Chairman,

Colorado, Mrs. George Bradfield, Chairman:

Colorado Daughters have done an outstanding piece of work for the Red Cross. One chapter spent 3,100 hours knitting for the Belgians. Another chapter sent these articles to British people: 2,000 garments; 1,900 pounds of soap; 159 pounds of rope; one Transfusion Apparatus. Another chapter sent to British people, 265 pairs of hose and 20 dozen buttons. One member who is greatly handicapped with Arthritis completed 25 baby bonnets, 12 blankets, 12 diapers, 2 night dresses, 12 jackets, 2 dresses, and knitted 100 mittens. One worker is over 90 years old. One chapter took scraps of wool and made into attractive mittens of many designs and color. This work received recognition from the St. Louis office. State is 100% in supporting Red Cross and Defense program. Members are doing a fine piece of work with Junior Red Cross through the schools. 36 chapters reported 55,717 hours spent in the work; made 3,377 garments; knitting 597; cutting 1,809; 3 afghans; 1 shawl. Money contributed, \$663.50, and purchased some Bonds.

Kansas, Mrs. Ralph B. Earp, Chairman:

We have 55 chapters and 48 reported. Members are serving in many ways: Red Cross Nurse, First Aid Instructor, two Executive Secretaries. One is Regional Director of the American Women's Volunteer Service of the Seventh Army Corps Area. Many are giving full time to cutting, sewing and other projects. One member has given 1,000 hours to sewing, making 348 articles. One member gives much time to transcribing Braille. She gave a broadcast, subject "Braille's Contribution to Americanism." This article was sent to Lending Department, also to National Magazine. She has spent 500 hours in the sewing room. One chapter acts as hostess to the boys in Camp Funston. One member is Secretary of Kansas Hospital Association and has charge of Hospital Defense work. Another has knitted 43 sweaters. Another (new chapter) has interested 14 clubs in doing Rcd Cross work; she sent a paper to the Lending Depart ment. Two chapters have Gray Lady's Corps. Each chapter cooperates with the program of Red Cross classes. We have contributed 34,415 hours and made 23,961 garments. Gave \$1,116.00 to Red Cross; Emergency Fund \$17.50; British Relief \$41.00; Clara Barton Ambulance \$3.00. Two chapters bought Defense Bonds. 75% of membership are members of Red Cross.

Nebraska, Mrs. S. C. Johnson, Chairman: Nebraska Daughters have been busy with the many activitios of our Red Cross program, serving in many ways a total of 47,929 hours; sewing and knitting a total of 1,598 garments. They gave 433 Books to the book drive and many magazine subscrip tions. Candy, eigarettes and playing cards were given to the boys on the troop trains. One chapter is acting as hostess to the boys in an Army Post. First Aid and Home Nursing classes are being attended. One Gray Lady Corps in the State. They are cooperating in every project of the Red Cross and Defense program; 90% of the membership are members of Rod Cross. 36 chapters reported gifts of money as follows: U. S. O.-\$82.50; Red Cross \$1,315.25; British Relief-\$10.00; War Drive-\$250.00, a total of \$1,658.25.

North Dakota—We regret we do not have a report from North Dakota.

South Dakota, Mrs. T. S. Norton, Chairman: Six chapters reported 228 articles made and 6,515 hours spent; of this two members of the Mary Chilton Chapter spent 2,400 hours in the workroom. Members are enrolled in Braille, Nutrition, First Aid and Home Nursing classes. Cookies were sent to the boys in camp. \$115.00 was given to War Relief Drives. All members are anxious to do their part in the Red Cross program.

Late report-2,000 hours, 65 garments, \$3.00 to surgical dressings.

REPORT OF SENIOR STATE PRESIDENT,

KANSAS SOCIETY C. A. R.

It is a pleasure and a privilege to bring to you this brief, though very incomplete, report of the children's work and activities. Our membership has increased this year, and we have transferred three girls to the D. A. R. chapters of the state, and one boy to the S. A. R. Honorable mention goes to "Kickapoo Corral Society" of Winfield for the greatest increase in membership. At least three of our C. A. R. members have won distinction for themselves and for the Kansas C. A. R: Jean Peck of Arkansas City, Past Junior State President, was elected Junior National Historian at the National Convention last spring; Marilyn Greenbank of El Dorado was appointed Junior National Chairman of the C. A. R. Magazine Unit 2; and Leeta Nelle Marks, member of the "Eleanor White Dare Society" of Atchison, was one of fifty-four—and the only Kansan receiving cash awards in the American Youth Forum contest sponsored annually by the "American Magazine."

In addition to the annual donations to the C. A. R. Scholarships maintained by the National Society at Tamassee, three of the Kansas Societies and several of the C. A. R. Grandmothers' Committee conributed to the Kansas Corridor at Tamassee in honor of Mrs. Berger who is a State Promoter of C. A. R., as well as State Regent of D. A. R. Most of the societies have contributed to the Red Cross, and members of the C. A. R. are participating in the national defense and war effort, even though the children have neither the time nor opportunity to be as active as adults. At the 1942 State Conference a prize will be presented to the Society purchasing the largest amount of bonds and stamps, and another to the Society with the greatest number of members participating. A preliminary report at our Conference in October showed eight \$25.00 bonds and over \$30.00 in stamps already purchased. Other war activity, adaptable to the children's abilities, is being planned, so that through their membership in the patriotic society of C. A. R., the children may have the opportunity to help in this crisis just as their ancestors and the children of 1776 helped in the time of the Revolution.

I appreciate the many courtesies which have been extended to me during my term as State President of the children's society, and I wish to thank all of you for your cooperation and interest in C. A. R.

Mrs. Berger, presented the matter of having the 1860, 1870 and 1880 Kansas Census Records microfilmed, explaining the benefits of a 10% discount made possible through the Carrie Meeker Wood legacy, for this work; this discount to come through the National Society for a limited time or until the fund should be exhausted. Mrs. McArthur made the microfilming of the 1860 Census immediately possible through a personal gift of the necessary amount. Mrs. McArthur moved that the State Society have the microfilming of the 1870 Census done at once, and that the microfilming of the 1880 Census be undertaken as a State project, to be completed as soon as possible, in order to gain the benefit of the above mentioned discount.
