MOBILE BLOOD PLASMA UNIT

On July 24, 1943, the Mobile Blood Plasma Unit assigned to the Columbus Blood Donor Center by the National Red Cross and purchased from funds contributed by the Kansas Society through the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, was presented to the Blood Donor Center at Columbus, Ohio.

Miss Rosalie R. Haddox, Regent of the Columbus D. A. R. Chapter, represented your state regent at the presentation. In presenting the Mobile Unit Miss Haddox conveyed the following message from your state regent. "In the gift of the mobile blood plasma unit presented by the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, National War Fund, through the Kansas State Society, the Kansas Society of the D. A. R. experience a very great patriotic pride that we consider it a peculiarly fitting gift to those brave men and women who are called to defend the glorious land for which our forefathers, sacrificed their lives and fortunes to establish. Move forefathers sacrificed their lives and fortunes to establish. this blood plasma unit serve to its fullest in the saving of precious lives, and to the purpose that all men shall be free.'

The following news item appeared in the Columbus (Ohio) Citizen: "Kansas joined hands yesterday with Ohio in promoting the Red Cross blood donor service as funds originating with the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution were made available for the purchase of basic equipment for the Columbus center, 180 North High Street.

"The presentation was made at the local center yesterday by Miss Rosalie Haddox, regent of the Columbus Chapter D. A. R., who represented Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, regent of the Kansas Society. Edwin M. Tharp, Chairman of the board of directors of the Franklin County Red Cross, accepted the gift. . . .

"Along with the funds is a plaque bearing the legend: "This blood donor center has been equipped by the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, National War Fund." It has been placed in the local center's reception room where more than 63,000 donors have entered to contribute blood for vital plasma.

"The gift, it was explained, is intended to cover the original cost of the basic equipment in the center here as well as an ambulance which forms one of the two mobile units operating out of the Columbus center to many communities in Central Ohio.

Excerpt from a letter received from Miss Haddox:

"Columbus, Ohio. July 26, 1943.

"Dear Mrs. Berger:

The Columbus Chapter of the American Red Cross wishes me to convey to you and the Kansas Society, D. A. R., their heartfelt gratitude for your fine gift of the mobile plasma unit. With a fitting ceremony, the unit was presented Saturday afternoon at 4:00 p. m., and at the same time the plaque, marking the gift of the equipment for the blood donor center from the National Society was unveiled. The Red Cross committee wished to take care of both gifts at the same time . . . It was a pleasure to represent you in this ceremony, Mrs. Berger, and if I can be of any assistance to you please write me." please write me."

Objects

The objects of this Society as stated in Article II of the Constitution are:

1.

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Insignia

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D. A. R. Handbook, page 56.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Report immediately to the State Corresponding Secretary any change in chapter officer or chapter chairman.

Report AT ONCE all resignations, deaths, marriages, and members RECEIVED by transfer to the Treasurer General. Do not report a resignation, or transfer a member in arrears in ducs. Only members in good standing may resign or be transferred.

Do not vote to grant a resignation. Report all resignations IMMEDIATELY. To delay may cause injustice, and the member to have to be dropped or the chapter to have to pay an additional year's dues.

Vote to receive a member by transfer, and notify the Treasurer General IMMEDIATELY of the acceptance of the member by the chapter.

Do not report names of members as transferred to other chapters until you receive notice from the Treasurer General that such transfers have been received.

Grant transfer card as soon as requested. Do not vote to grant transfer OUT of the chapter. Do not send transfer card to the Treasurer General. The member transferring gives it with a copy of her application paper to the chapter to which she transfers. Chapter from which member transferred does not remove name from rolls when transfer card is issued, but does remove it from the rolls when notice is received from Treasurer General that transfer has been completed. Likewise, chapter to which member transfers does not add name to rolls when transfer card and application paper is received, but adds the name to the rolls as of the date on which the Treasurer General notifies the chapter that the transfer is completed. Treasurer Ceneral notifies Chapter Treasurer of BOTH chapters of date upon which transfer is completed.

Collect dues in time to reach Washington by January 1. DO NOT wait until December to begin to collect dues.

Send in late December all dues on hand. DO NOT wait for delinquents. Send all dues received after January 1 AS SOON AS RECEIVED. DO NOT HOLD dues received after January 1 waiting for other members to pay. To do so may rob your chapter of rightful representation and a member of the right to serve as a delegate or alternate.

Send special funds for schools, scholarships, etc., for which State credit is desired to the STATE TREASURER, who in turn will forward to the Treasurer General.

Every Chapter Regent, Treasurer and Registrar, should have a copy of the D. A. R. Handbook. The price of the Handbook is twenty-five cents. Orders with remittances should be sent to the Treasurer General, Administration Building N. S. D. A. R.

NATIONAL AWARD TO EUNICE STERLING CHAPTER

At the fifty-second Continental Congress of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, held in Cincinnati, Ohio, in April 1943, a signal honor was bestowed upon Kansas and Eunice Sterling Chapter in the cash prize award of \$20 offered by the National Historical Magazine to the chapter having the greatest number of subscriptions to the magazine. With 65 subscriptions Eunice Sterling Chapter won first place. Mrs. Robert C. Foulston, regent of Eunice Sterling Chapter, accepted the award in the name of the Chapter. Credit for this outstanding honor is due Mrs. Christian F. Nies, chapter chairman for the National Historical Magazine. At a meeting of Eunice Sterling Chapter on April 23, Mrs. Foulston presented the check to Mrs. Nies, who moved that it be given to the Blood Plasma Fund. The chapter voted its approval.

HISTORY OF THE GAVEL

Used by Mrs. George Thacher Guernsey

At the forty-fifth annual State Conference held in Coffeyville, in March 1943, Mrs. W. C. Summers, regent of the Betty Washington Chapter, presented to the State Society a gavel of historical interest. It is made from a piece of a walnut tree which grew out of the chimney of the John Brown cabin. The silver band is inscribed on one side, "To Mrs. George T. Guernsey from D. A. R., Lawrence, Kansas, 1916" and on the other side it reads, "Wood from John Brown's Cabin."

Mrs. Berger expressed deep appreciation for the gift which she accepted in the name of the State Society. Mrs. Summers has also provided the interesting history of the gavel which follows:

"This gavel is made from wood from John Brown's cabin near La-Cynge. Before World War 1, Chris Armstrong gave me the walnut wood. A gavel and table were made of it by Billy Moise, and Armstrong later made affidavit of this fact—which I gave to the State Historian of D. A. R.

I used the gavel as President of the Lawrence Civic League, Regent of Betty Washington Chapter D. A. R. and as President of the Lawrence Women's Club.

At a luncheon at my home, 1605 Tennessee Street, given by Betty Washington Chapter, the gavel was presented to the State Regent, Mrs. Guornsoy, and she used it in Washington when President General. The silver mounting upon the gavel was paid for by the Betty Washington Chapter. As she promised to return it to me when done with it, Mrs. Guernsey's nephew, Prof. Joseph Kellogue, gave it to me after Mrs. Guernsey's death, and I sold it to Mrs. Walter Keeler who presented it to Mrs. W. C. Summers, her mother—then Regent of Betty Washington Chayter.

Annual Pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission

September 19, 1942

Members of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution made their tenth annual pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission on Saturday, September 19, 1942. The Board Management convened in the main building and the meeting was called to order at 10:55 a. m. by the State Regent, Mrs. A. J. Berger. The State Chaplain, Mrs. W. H. McCamish led in the devotionals and Mrs. L. B. Naylor, regent of the hostess Chapter, James Ross, led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

State Officers present were: Mrs. A. J. Berger, Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, Mrs. W. H. McCamish, Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell, Mrs. Marcel Duphorne, Mrs. W. E. McArthur, Mrs. O. P. Dellinger, Mrs. Jonathan B. Carter. Chapter Regents: Mrs. W. C. Summers, Miss Lena Smith, Mrs. H. L. Kennedy, Mrs. L. B. Naylor, Mrs. G. L. Caughron, Mrs. H. P. Thomas, Miss Mary Clark. Vice Regents: Miss Nellie Trueblood, Mrs. L. S. Holroyd.

In her welcome the state regent spoke of the seriousness of the times and said that we may expect to be called upon again and again to do our part in the present crisis. Letters were read by the secretary from our President General, Mrs. W. H. Pouch, from Vice President General Mrs. Reuben E. Knight and from Mrs. Carl Friend expressing their pleasure in attending the Kansas State Conference held in Hutchinson, last March. Also a note of regret from Mrs. Payne Ratner, wife of the Governor of Kansas. For our support of D. A. R. Approved Schools notes of appreciation were read from Crossnore, Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee. The family of Mr. Robert Bruce Campbell and Mrs. Clarence F. Drake, regent of Eunice Sterling Chapter thanked the state society for having placed an official D. A. R. bronze marker on the grave of the late Olive Decatur Campbell, honorary state regent and past vice president general. The state officers were asked for reports. Mrs. Marcel Duphorne, state treasurer reported that on September 1, 1942 the balance in the treasury was \$3,832.78. The State Registrar, Mrs. V. E. McArthur said that it is our patriotic duty to secure the membership of women who are eligible. The Recording Secretary, Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell, reported that she has served as secretary pro tem at the meeting of the Kansas delegation at Continental Congress in Chicago and had assisted the state regent in the printing of the stationery for the use of the state officers and state chairmen. The State Historian, Mrs. O. P. Dellinger, presented to the D. A. R. rooms, in Shawnee Mission, three cups and saucers of Old Leeds Spray, Royal Doulton. Mrs. Ralph LaShelle, state chairman of Shawnee Mission accepted the gift with thanks.

Thanks and appreciation to the hostess chapter, James Ross and to the Regent, Mrs. L. B. Naylor were expressed by the state regent and the secretary was instructed to send a note of thanks. She also spoke of the completion of microfilming the U. S. Census records of Kansas for the years 1860, 1870 and 1880, and that Kansas was among one of the first states to complete this project. This was made possible through the generosity of Mrs. V. E. McArthur and Mr. and Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell. She also reported that the drapes and slip covers for the Kansas room in Memorial Continental Hall had been completed.

Mrs. Berger spoke of the definite war projects: the raising of a fund by voluntary subscription by individuals and by chapters for the blood plasma units and equipment so necessary on the fields of battle; the state project is to furnish a recreation room at Camp Funston of which the essential cost will be a little over \$200; to

report the purchase of war bonds and stamps by members and chapters to the chairman of National Defense. For the state to receive credit, checks must be sent to the state treasurer.

The state chairmen reported. Miss Stella B. Haines, chairman of D. A. R. Student Loan Fund, introduced Miss Maude Haver, secretary of this committee. Miss Haines reported that the national chairman requested that the rate of interest on future loans be 2% instead of 4%. New notes have been printed for the use of this committee which must bear the signature of the applicant, the parents or guardian and a business man. The notes of two girls issued in 1936, 1937 and 1938 are now outlawed and uncollectable. Miss Haines moved that the notes of Viola M. Dow and of Mary Alford be stricken from the records. Seconded by Mrs. Shrewder and carried. Miss Haines moved that \$500 of the Student Loan Fund be invested in war bonds. An order to be given by the state treasurer. Seconded by Mrs. Caughron and carried. Mrs. Kennedy moved and it was seconded by Mrs. Dellinger that the bond be filed with the state treasurer. Carried. Miss Haines moved and Mrs. Naylor seconded the motion that the rate of interest on future loans be reduced to 2% in compliance with the request of the national chairman. Motion carried.

Mrs. Berger referred to a letter from Mrs. Dan Hopson, state chairman of Correct Use of the Flag concerning the usual award for the eighth grade essay contest. Mrs. Shrewder moved that the state society allow \$5.00 to be used in awards in this contest. Seconded by Mrs. McCamish and carried. Mrs. Berger also mentioned that on June 22, 1942, President Roosevelt signed the Flag Law (H. S. Res. 303) and as October will be the 50th anniversary of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, the National Chairman of Correct Use of the Flag will ask if chapters observed the anniversary. Mrs. Berger showed leaflets which had been issued by Mrs. Alonzo N. Benn of Chicago, general vice chairman, and she will secure copies for each chapter regent and any others especially interested.

Mrs. McArthur moved that Kansas D. A. R. give \$5.00 to the C. A. R. ambulance fund. Seconded by Mrs. Shrewder and carried.

Mrs. Dellinger moved that a prize of \$5.00 be given in the cotton dress contest of the Girl Home Makers Committee. Seconded by Mrs. Shrewder and carried.

The regent stressed that we shall again give a \$115 scholarship to Tamassee and that \$75 be given to Kate Duncan Smith for a walk to connect Becker Hall with the library. Increase in membership will be a major project. She announced that the 45th Annual State Conference would be held in Coffeyville on March 8, 9, 1943. The Dale Hotel will be headquarters and that the President General, Mrs. William H. Pouch will be present. Mrs. Berger advocated a two day conference and the majority voted in favor of it. She quoted a letter from Mrs. Ralph B. Earp, National vice chairman of Red Cross in which she told of the pressing need for nurses' aides and asked members to keep an account of all garments made and hours spent in Red Cross work.

Mrs. Berger spoke of three small sums in the state treasury which have been left over from previous projects now completed. Mrs. McArthur moved that these overflow funds be placed at the disposal of the state regent where most needed. Seconded by Mrs. Naylor and carried.

Mrs. C. E. Niven, state chairman of the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage announced that the contest would extend from October 15th to December 15th and that the contest questionnaires would be in the hands of the contestants by December 1.

Mrs. Shrewder moved that the Board of Management of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, recommend to the State Conference in March 1943, that Mrs. Berger be endorsed for the office of vice president general. Mrs. Berger asked the recording secretary to take the chair. Mrs. Carter seconded the motion and it carried unanimously. Mrs. Berger resumed the chair and thanked the Board for this thoughtful courtesy. Mrs. Shrewder spoke of the pride which the Kansas Daughters have in the appointment by the President General of Mrs. Berger as Special Vice Chairman of Genealogical Records.

Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell, state chairman of D. A. R. Museum spoke of the nation-wide survey being made by her committee of museums or portions of museums in which the D. A. R. have a part.

Mrs. H. L. Kennedy, regent of the General Edward Hand Chapter of Ottawa, told that Miss Grace Meeker, honorary state regent, would soon change her residence to another state. Mrs. Ferrell moved that the Kansas Society D. A. R. present Miss Meeker with a past state regent's ribbon. Seconded by Mrs. Duphorne and carried.

Meeting adjourned at 12:55 for lunch, but because of the cold and recent rain it could not be held on the grounds of the Mission but was held in the cafeteria of the Roseland school. Following the lunch, the regent of the James Ross Chapter, Mrs. L. B. Naylor presided at the program and introduced the state officers, state chairmen, the chairman of the day, Mrs. Lena Scurlock, and Mrs. Richard Helman regent of the Elizabeth Benton Chapter of Kansas City, Missouri.

Mrs. Berger brought greetings and Albert Spriester, trumpeter, gave a group of patriotic airs. Mrs. Naylor then introduced Capt. Alpha H. Kenna of Fort Leavenworth, who brought a stirring message to the 75 members assembled.

That \$10.00 be sent from the Tamassee Hall Fund for the marker on the Kansas Hall at Tamassee High School as allowed at the State Conference in March 1942, and that the following equipment for the High School be purchased: drinking fountain, \$30.00; three ceiling lights for the Kansas Hall at \$3.00 each, \$9.00; four ceiling lights in three class rooms, four light per room at \$3.00 each, \$36.00; making a total of \$75.00, and that the remainder of the fund be transferred to the 1944 Tamassee Scholarship Fund. Moved by Mrs. Duphorne and seconded by Mrs. Shrewder.
- 3. That the 32 cents per capita tax for 1944 be allowed. Motion made by Mrs. McArthur and seconded by Mrs. Shrewder.

- 4. That the Tamassee Scholarship be continued as a state project. Moved by Mrs. Ferrell and seconded by Mrs. McArthur.
- 5. That the sum of \$66.00 be raised as a state project to purchase a sterilizer (wholesale price) for Kate Duncan Smith School. Motion by Mrs. McArthur seconded by Mrs. Shrewder.
- 6. That \$1,036 from the State Student Loan Fund be invested in war bonds to be redeemed if necessary, for the Student Loan Fund, and the accrued interest be credited to the State Student Loan Fund, and that bonds be filed with the state treasurer. Motion by Mrs. Shrewder and seconded by Mrs. McArthur.
- 7. That the date of the 1944 State Conference be left to the discretion of the hostess regent and the state regent. Motion made by Mrs. Duphorne and seconded by Mrs. Ferrell.
- 8. That the 1943 Annual Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage be left to the discretion of the Executive Board and the James Ross Chapter. Moved by Mrs. Shrewder and seconded by Mrs. McArthur.

Meeting adjourned at 9:30 a.m.

Mrs. J. W. Hornbaker moved that the annual Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage be left to the discretion of the Executive Board and the James Ross Chapter. Seconded by Mrs. L. B. Naylor and carried.

Mrs. Berger announced the gift of a greenback corsage from Mrs. William H. Pouch. In graciously accepting the gift Mrs. Berger said that it would be given to the Blood Plasma Fund.

Twelve state chairmen responded to the roll call. Mrs. C. E. Nevin, State Chairman of the Good Citizenship Committee; Mrs. Clarence F. Drake, State Chairman of D. A. R. Manuals for Citizenship; Miss Stella B. Haines, State Chairman of State Student Loan; Mrs. J. W. Dixon, State Chairman of Girl Home Makers and Mrs. G. L. Caughron, State Chairman of Motion Pictures. Mrs. O. P. Dellinger explained that the War Service records of some O. P. Dellinger explained that the War Service records of sons and daughters in the armed corvice should be kept by the members. Mrs. V. E. McArthur, State Chairman of Membership apole of the importance of increasing our membership. Mrs. Jud Pierson Hall, State Chairman of Press Relations, asked all chapters to have now notices of their chapter meetings in their local papers. Miss Catherine Campbell, Honorary State Regent and past Vice President General arrived and was introduced by the state regent. She expressed her pleasure in being present. Seconded by Mrs. J. W. Hornbaker and carried.

J. Gregory, at the organ, played for the Processional of color bearers and pages escorting the State Officers, past National Officers, Guests of Honor, The President General and the State Regent.

The State Regent, Mrs. A. J. Berger, declared that by virtue of the power vested in her as state regent, the Forty-fifth Annual Conference of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, open and in session. The State Chaplain, Mrs. William H. McCamish, gave the invocation which was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. Mrs. T. J. Gilstrap accompanied by Mrs. O. J. Gregory led in the singing of one verse of the National Anthem. Mrs. Robert W. Diver lead in the recitation of The American's Creed.

Mr. J. D. Byers, Mayor of Coffeyville, and Mrs. Robert W. Diver, Regent of the hostess chapter, Jane Dean Coffey, welcomed the Kansas Daughters of the American Revolution and guests to Coffeyville. Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, State Vice Regent, responded to the greetings.

MONDAY EVENING

The candle light banquet at 7 o'clock in the recreation hall of the First Presbyterian Church was an outstanding event of the Conference. White candles and greenery were used in profusion and large bowls of jonquils and a large insignia of our Society centered the speakers table. The Invocation was given by the State Chaplain, Mrs. William H. McCamish. An attractive trio from the Coffeyville Junior College; Caroline Morrison, Helen Highbaugh and Lois Rea DeHon, delighted the audience with their selections. A most interesting address, "So Proudly We Hail," was given by Mr. W. M. Ostenberg, Superintendent of the Coffeyville Schools.

Mrs. Berger presented Mrs. Robert W. Diver, Regent of the hostess chapter, who introduced the Conference Committees of her chapter.

Later a reception was held in the Ladies Parlor of the First Presbyterian Church with music by a string trio; Barbara Stanley, Barbara Wilkinson, Joan Diver with Mary Kathryn Clark, accompanist.

TUESDAY MORNING

The closing session of the Conference was called to order by the State Regent, Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, at 8:55 a.m. Tuesday, March 9, 1943, in the First Baptist Church. The State Chaplain, Mrs. William H. McCamish read from the Scripture and offered prayer. Following the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, Mrs. T. J. Gilstrap, accompanied by Miss Bee McClellan led in the singing of the first and last verses of, "America."

The minutes of the opening session on Monday afternoon were read by the Recording Secretary and approved. The Regent invited Miss Edith Chesney to be seated on the platform. Miss Chesney kindly acted as Chairman of Credentials in the absence of the State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Harve M. Stricklen.

The reports of the chapter regents showed much work accomplished during the year. Mrs. W. C. Summers, Regent of the Betty Washington Chapter, presented the State Regent with a gavel which had once belonged to the late Mrs. George Thacher Guernsey and which had been made from a piece of log from the John Brown cabin. Mrs. Berger graciously accepted the gavel in the name of the State Society. Mrs. Berger then announced the cash awards for the increase in membership in chapters. To the chapter of 25 or more members, having made the greatest net increase in membership, the award of \$5 was given to the Fort Supply Trail Chapter, Ashland. The Regent, Miss Lena Smith, in accepting this award in the name of her chapter, announced that the check would be turned over to the state blood plasma fund. The prize of \$5.00 to chapters having a membership of 24 or less, having made the greatest net increase in membership was awarded to the Neodesha Chapter, Neodesha. Mrs. G. L. Caughron, regent, in accepting for the chapter said that the award would be used for some worthy cause.

A telegram to Mrs. William H. Pouch from Mrs. Russell William Magna, National Chairman of War Bonds and Stamps Committee, reported that to March 8, 1943, the Daughters of the American Revolution had purchased \$10,200,00 War Bonds.

Mr. Caldwell Johnson, Supervisor of Music in the Coffeyville Junior College, sang two delightful numbers, "Song of Spring" by James Rogers and "The Flower Song" from Carmen. He was accompanied by Mrs. Caldwell Johnson. A letter was read from the National Chairman of the Correct Use of the Flag, Miss Elizabeth M. Barnes, a native Kansan. She complimented the State Society on the splendid work done in promoting the school essay contests. In the absence of the State Chairman of the Correct Use of the Flag, Mrs. Dan Hopson, the winners in the Eighth Grade Flag Essay Contest were announced by Mrs. Berger.

1st award, \$3.00 to Dorothy Helvey, Mankato. 2nd award, \$2.00 to Donna Benson, Leavenworth. 3rd award, \$1.00 to Joan Rose, Hamilton.

Mrs. John W. Dixon, State Chairman of the Girl Home Makers Committee presented 8 girls from the Coffeyville High School who modeled the dresses submitted in the Girl Home Makers Cotton Dress Contest. The prize of \$5.00 was given to Marie Unruh of McPherson, sponsored by the Henry Dawson Chapter. Second place was awarded to Lavern McGahan of El Dorado, sponsored by the Susannah French Putney Chapter, and honorable mention to Wilma Kern of Pittsburg, sponsored by the Oceanus Hopkins Chapter.

The Travelling Flags were awarded to the Fort Supply Trail Chapter for the greatest percentage of increase in membership, having made a gain of 27%. Miss Lena Smith, regent, expressed the pleasure which the members of the chapter would have in possessing the flags for a year.

Mrs. Berger explained that as the state treasurer cannot close her books until the last day in February; and, as the State Conference met so early this year in March; and, as all certified accountants are busy with unprecedented income tax reports, it was impossible to get an auditor's report in time for Conference. Miss Catherine Campbell moved that the Executive Board be empowered to accept the report of the auditor. Seconded by Mrs. J. W. Hornbaker and carried.

Mrs. John N. Ryan read the report of the Resolutions Committee and moved its adoption as a whole as the report contained only courtesy resolutions. Mrs. Ryan asked the privilege of adding names. Privilege granted.

Mrs. William H. Pouch and Mrs. John Logan Marshall in leaving to attend the Oklahoma State D. A. R. Conference expressed their gratitude for all the courtesies and pleasures extended to them and spoke of their pleasure in having attended the Kansas State Conference.

The Recording Secretary read the following recommendations made by the Board of Management and moved their adoption:

1. That the State Conference in March 1943 endorse Mrs. Alexander J. Berger for the office of Vice President General, to be presented for election at the Continental Congress in 1944. Seconded by Mrs. J. N. Ryan.

Mrs. Berger called the State Vice Regent, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder to the chair, and Miss Edith Chesney checked the voting strength of the Conference which she declared to be 52. Mrs. Shrewder appointed as tellers Mrs. Leon Campbell, Mrs. Robert C. Foulston and Mrs. Howard M. Richardson. After the ballots were cast the tellers retired and the business of the Conference proceeded.

- 2. That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, through the chapters, continue the expansion of the blood plasma program as long as it is a major war project of the National Society, and, as \$1,902.85 has already been contributed to the Blood Plasma Fund, that an immediate effort be made to complete the necessary additional funds to cover the cost, \$2,350, of a complete mobile blood plasma unit. Seconded by Mrs. Chaney and carried.
- 3. That \$10.00 be sent from the Tamassee Hall fund for the marker on the Kansas Hall at Tamassee High School, as allowed at the State Conference in 1942, and that the following equipment for the High School be purchased: a drinking fountain at \$30.00; ceiling lights in the Kansas Hall costing \$9.00 and ceiling lights in three class rooms costing \$36.00, a total of \$75.00, and that the remainder of the fund be transferred to the 1944 Tamassee scholarship fund. Mrs. Naylor seconded the motion. Carried.
- 4. That the 32 cents per capita tax for 1944 be allowed. Mrs. E. W. Jones seconded. Carried.
- 5. That the Tamassee scholarship be continued as a state project. Seconded by Mrs. L. B. Naylor. Carried.
- 6. That the sum of \$66 (wholesale price) be raised as a state project, through the chapters, to purchase a sterilizer for Kate Duncan Smith School. Mrs. Fred J. McEwen seconded the motion. Carried.
- 7. That \$1,036 from the State Student Loan fund be invested in War Savings Bonds, to be redeemed, if necessary, for the State

Student Loan Fund and the accrued interest be credited to the State Student Loan Fund and the bonds be filed with the State Treasurer. Seconded by Miss Stella B. Haines. Carried.

- 8. That the date of the 1944 State Conference be left to the discretion of the hostess regent and the state regent. Mrs. G. L. Caughron seconded the motion. Carried.
- 9. That the Annual Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage in 1943 be left to the discretion of the Executive Board and the James Ross Chapter. Mrs. Chaney seconded the motion. Carried.

The tellers reported and Mrs. Shrewder announced that Mrs. Berger had been duly endorsed by the State Conference as a candidate for the office of Vice President General at the Continental Congress in 1944. Mrs. Berger resumed the chair and thanked the Conference for the confidence expressed in this endorsement.

Miss Lena Smith moved that a note be sent to Mrs. Harve M. Stricklen, by the secretary, expressing regret at her absence and best wishes for her speedy recovery. Carried.

Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell moved that the Executive Board be empowered to approve the minutes of this session. Seconded by Mrs. J. N. Ryan and carried.

Mrs. Robert C. Foulston, Regent of Eunice Sterling Chapter, brought greetings from her chapter and extended an invitation for the 1944 Conference to meet in Wichita. Mrs. Berger, in behalf of the State Society thanked Mrs. Foulston and assured her that the invitation was unanimously accepted.

Following announcements regarding Continental Congress, Mrs. Berger thanked all for their part in making this a most enjoyable and successful State Conference.

The Assemblage sang one verse of "Blest be the Tie That Binds," led by Mrs. T. J. Gilstrap accompanied by Miss Bee McClellan. At 12 o'clock Mrs. Berger asked all to stand for a few moments in silent prayer, in compliance with the request of the President General. Mrs. Berger pronounced the Benediction and with the retiring of the colors the Conference was declared adjourned at 12:02 p. m.

The minutes of Tuesday morning session have been approved by the Executive Board.

TUESDAY

At 1:00 o'clock, on Tuesday, a luncheon was served in the undercroft of St. Paul's Episcopal Church. Mrs. Berger presided and Mrs. William H. McCamish gave the Invocation. Mrs. R. W. Diver gave a special welcome and greeting from Rev. Father Joseph, rector of the church. Following lunch an address was given on, "The Qualities for the Crisis," by Lieut. James N. Kelly Jr., Chaplain in the United States Army.

MEMORIAL SERVICE

On Tuesday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock, the Memorial Service was held in St. Paul's Episcopal Church. Following the organ prelude by Mrs. J. H. Benefiel, the Assemblage stood as the Processional entered and all joined in singing, "Holy, Holy, Holy." The State Chaplain, Mrs. William H. McCamish, presided and the State Regent, Mrs. A. J. Berger and the State Historian, Mrs. O. P. Dellinger participated in the service. The tribute to the thirtyeight departed members was given by Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick. Pages dressed in white stood on either side of a tall hamper of

greenery and as each name was read a red rose was placed in her honor. A violin solo, "Meditation" from "Thais" was played by Mrs. Paul Kirkpatrick. Following Taps by Jimmie Bliss, the Assemblage stood and joined the Recessional in singing, "He Leadeth Me."

The flowers from the Memorial Service were sent to the hospital at the Air Base near Coffeyville.

Report of State Officers

STATE REGENT

(Mrs. Alexander J.) RUTH NORRIS BERGER

Today our organization stands not only for a cause won long ago—the freedom of America,—but as a vital, active and dynamic force in a greater cause—the freedom of the world.

In the next few years we may be called upon to sacrifice nearly everything for which we have worked and saved, to serve just one purpose—that our nation may exist.

The importance of the objects and work of our society have never been more apparent than at this time when America is calling for the help of every man, woman and child in some special line of duty. Our war efforts will provide opportunity for everyone to serve. Today some of our chairmen, regents, and most loyal members are absent from this state conference because of war work.

In reviewing the work of the Kansas Daughters it is most gratifying that so much war work has the loyal personal service of our members yet our chapters have not neglected the regular work of our society because of these added responsibilities.

While very proud of the achievements of the state officers, state chairmen, chapter regents and members it is not my intention to report their efforts and progress for that is their well earned privilege. I might add however, that it is difficult to pass over this as there are several things I should like very much to tell you about. Especially, of your generous response to our major war project—the expansion of the blood plasma program.

On April 7, 1942 the D. A. R. bronze marker, as voted by the 44th State Conference, was placed at the grave in Maple Grove Cemetery, Wichita, of our Honorary State Regent and Past Vice President General, Mrs. Robert Bruce Campbell. The State Society desires to express to Mrs. Drake and to the members of Eunice Sterling Chapter its appreciation for taking care of the details connected with the placing of the marker and for the courtesies shown the state officers and members present on that day.

During this year, and as voted by the conference last March, the furniture in the Kansas room in Memorial Continental Hall has been refinished and reupholstered and new drapes placed at the windows. The room, as most of you know, is the rest room provided by our State Society for the clerical staff of the National Society.

Through the generous gifts of Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur and Mr. and Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell the Kansas United States census records of 1860, 1870 and 1880, on file with the United States Bureau of the Census, have been microfilmed and placed with the National Society. Their gifts, made soon after the request of the National Society for the microfilming of these census records, placed Kansas among the first states to provide the films for all of the years requested.

Your contributions to our Approved Schools, and especially to the two D. A. R. schools, Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith, are deeply appreciated. Your state chairman has a very fine report for you on the work you have done for our schools. In working for and, with the youth of our country we are building for the future and carrying out one of the most constructive programs for national defense that any organization can have.

The furniture for the D. A. R. Recreation Room for the men in the service is being purchased at this time under the supervision of the Field Director of the American Red Cross Camp and Hospital Service Council, Fort Riley. The room will be made especially attractive by the gifts of a new Philco radio with player attachment and several records and three floor lamps from the Smoky Hill Chapter and their Organizing Regent, Mrs. Harry A. Kunkle. The State Society deeply appreciates these gifts.

After it became known that the D. A. R. Recreation Room would have a radio we learned that the WACS at Fort Riley wanted a radio for their recreation room. Through the kindness of Fort Supply Trail Chapter and Mrs. Roy B. Shrewder the WACS did not need to look elsewhere for their radio. We are most grateful for this gift.

By vote of the State Board of Management the State Society presented to the Kansas Society, Children of the American Revolution a cash contribution for the C. A. R. American Red Cross Ambulance. Cash prizes have been given for the Flag Essay Contest sponsored by the State Chairman, Correct Use of the Flag, and for the State Girl Home Makers Cotton Dress Contest.

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to report the organization of the Jeremiah Howard Chapter at Great Bend on May 25, 1942, with twenty-one organizing members; Mrs. W. A. Peschka, Organizing Regent. This is the fifty-seventh D. A. R. Chapter in Kansas and the fourth to organize during the three years it has been my privilege to serve as State Regent.

You have heard the splendid report of your State Registrar and know that this year Kansas is again able to report a fine net gain—seventy-six—in membership. Forty-seven of our fifty-seven chapters added at least one member to their roll. The number of members dropped for nonpayment of dues,—four—is less than in any one of the past twenty-three years. Now is the time to make every effort possible to collect all unpaid 1943 dues. To wait until later may mean a loss in your chapter membership.

In going over the daily record for the year I find that in addition to attending four meetings of the National Board I have traveled 4,284 miles within the state and, by actual count, have personally written 3,361 letters and 2,923 postal cards; a total of 6,284 pieces of mail in addition to the 420 mimeographed letters that were sent out during the year.

I feel deeply indebted to the entire membership for granting me the privilege of serving as State Regent of Kansas. What ever of merit has been accomplished is due to the concentrated effort and whole hearted cooperation on the part of the State Officers, State Chairmen, Chapter Regents, and you as individual members. I wish that time permitted me to tell you of the many lovely courtesies

extended at each chapter meeting,-which are so deeply appreciated. It has been a wonderful privilege to know and to work with the Kansas Daughters. I do thank you more than words will frame.

As true daughters of the men who were not afraid to give the "last full measure of their devotion" that freedom might live let us pledge ourselves "to give the last full measure of devotion" that freedom shall not perish from this earth.

The Daughters of the American Revolution are proud descendants of brave men who defended their country and their flag many years ago. Today the Daughters are following their example and although denied the sword, take whatever weapon lies at hand and wield it valiantly at home. This is exemplified in their sale of War Saving Stamps and Bonds. Of equal importance is the Blood Plasma Program; the members of the National Society have not only given

generously of their money but of their blood, a notable example is our own President General, Mrs. Pouch.

Thousands of Daughters are sewing, knitting, making surgical dressings, serving in hospitals as Gray Ladies and Nurse's Aides and performing many other services to our men in uniform.

Your State Reporter has written articles publicizing this work of the D. A. R. for several newspapers over the state; the same was done each time a press release came from our National Chairman of Press Relations, Mrs. John Bailey O'Brien. Other articles have been sent in from time to time but as publicity is restricted they have not always been published.

Two articles were published in the National Historical Magazine. The activities of the National and State Societies and clippings from chapter chairmen have been compiled in a large scrap book.

Fort Supply Trail and Susannah French Putney Chapters are to be commended for their use of the insignia of the National Society.

There were 3980 inches of publicity over the state this year and as paid advertising it would have a monetary value of \$20,000.00. Sixty-five pictures were used.

This year Eunice Sterling of Wichita again takes first place, with 812 inches and Susannah French Putney of El Dorado again takes second place with 551 inches. Fort Supply Trail is third with 386 inches.

They have been found to subserve "Accuracy in business, economy of time, order, uniformity and impartiality." Parliamentary rules embody the following principals. Justice to all, Courtesy to all, Rules of the majority and the rights of the minority.

our work among our foreign born—our work to bring cheer to our boys in service through books, cookies, letters, dances, parties and meals in our own homes, and our work among our youth — in Boys' and Girls' State — and the awarding of medals, certificates and prizes.

And I find a goodly number of our members have donned uniforms, many, many more including your State Chairman are doing their bit at various Defense Plants in our state.

Being thus employed I can not attend the State Convention this year. This is a genuine sacrifice on my part for I have always loved it so and have never missed since I came to Kansas eight years ago.

I thank Mrs. Berger for the privilege of working with her and you. I send my love and greetings to you all and WILL meet with you "When the lights go on again all over the world."

AMERICAN RED CROSS

(Mrs. Ralph B.) FRANCES D. EARP

Your state chairman is pleased to bring to you this very fine report. I regret I cannot print your reports in full. Due to space, they must be condensed.

I mailed 114 mimeographed letters and 57 cards and many other letters pertaining to our committee. Our members have made 4,750 articles and hundreds of buttonholes. They have spent 84,964 hours in all types of Red Cross work. Thirty-four members have taught classes in Home Nursing, First Aid, Nutrition, Canteen, and Nurses' Aides. One hundred and sixteen members took Nutrition, 82 took Home Nursing, 256 took First Aid. We have 13 members who are Nurses' Aides, 4 members who are Gray Ladies, 1 member who is a nurse in Honolulu, and 1 member who is a Director of Red Cross work in London. In addition to these, many members are serving as local and county chairmen of the many Red Cross committees. A sum of \$860.50 was given to Red Cross work, and \$32.50 was given to Nurses' Barracks at Fort Riley.

Number of chapters reporting 51.

I am always thinking of you as one who is holding high the Red Cross banner above the many Storm Clouds of this war.

Report planting of 119 trees, 80 Shrubs, 893 Bulbs.

Atchison: Cooperated in every way with Red Cross; planted 30 rose bushes, 6 trees and 512 bulbs. Canned 1304 quarts fruit and vegetables.

Betty Washington: Large per cent of members planted trees, shrubs and bulbs. With help of school children collected and sent 20 lbs. cancelled stamps. Many chapters awarded the local winner. There were 40 essays submitted. The papers were graded by the Flag chairmen of our sister patriotic societies: Mrs. Nettie Morss, Howard, American Legion Auxiliary; Mrs. Feral A. Bem, Wichita, Spanish War Veterans Auxiliary; and Mrs. Gertrude Sommers, Kansas City, Women's Relief Corps. Nice publicity was given in both state and local newspapers. Winners were: Dorothy Helvey, Mankato, First, \$3.00; Donna Benson, Leavenworth, Second, \$2.00; Joan Rose, Hamilton, Third, \$1.00 and Helen Howell, Ashland, Honorable Mention.

The reports from the chapters show that the Kansas D. A. R. is alive to the importance of Flag Etiquette. Chapters have distributed Flags and Flag codes. The state chairman has supplied each chapter with the new Flag law, (Public law 829), of December 22, 1942. As a patriotic society, the D. A. R. feel that the committee work on Correct Use of the Flag is of especial importance in this war year.

D. A. R. GOOD CITIZENSHIP PILGRIMAGE

Last year's approved Questionnaire was used again this year for the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage Contest.

The Contest was very favorably received in all parts of the State, much credit is due all Chapter Chairmen.

D. A. R. MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

(Mrs. Clarence F.) ONA SNYDER DRAKE

Forty, of the fifty-five Chapters appointed chairmen for the D. A. R. Manual for Citizenship. Twenty-two ordered Manuals. Thirty six replied to the questionnaire sent them in January. These showed 1,554 Manuals ordered in English and Spanish. The Manuals were used in various ways; Naturalization classes of adult education groups—Scout and Girl Reserve work—club programs—Salvation Army—Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A.—Americanism centers at libraries—lawyers—District Courts—Churches of foreigners—and speech classes in public schools. One Chapter assisted in a Citizenship Contest in a local high school. Twenty-two Chapters report using the Manual this year in various ways. Ten report using it as a part of a Chapter program. Thirteen report having Manuals on hand for distribution.

Kansas reports sending \$228.30 to the Treasurer General in payment for Manuals since April 2, 1942. 26 Chapters paid the full quota of 10c per capita. Several Chapters made contributions, though not the required amount.

Your Chairman sent a letter in October to every Chapter Chairman or Regent suggesting uses for the Manual and a copy of the Manual was sent to each in November.

This being an unusual year with our Country at war and conservation in all things being our first effort, your Chairman feels that our Chapter Chairmen are to be complimented upon the careful consideration given in ordering Manuals and in placing them where the greatest benefit would be derived. Correctly informed citizens are the best citizens and all chapters should help the alien or future citizen and law maker to get the best possible instruction for citizenship through our D. A. R. Manual.

(Mrs. Garland P.) HELEN B. FERRELL

In making this, the seventh consecutive annual report as state chairman of the D. A. R. Museum, some outstanding facts are worthy of mention: the very youngest chapter in the state has a chairman of this committee; several chapters have written for suggestions for programs on our Museum, one of these was the second youngest chapter; another chapter held a silver tea with an exhibit of heirloom silver, glass and china. The proceeds from this tea were given to the Blood Plasma Fund. These facts and the list of gifts from Kansas this year shows that there is an interest in the state in our D. A. R. Museum.

There is interest, too, in busy war-time Washington as shown in a recent letter from the Curator General. To quote, "The fuel shortage has hit your Museum hard. Since before the new year Memorial Continental Hall has had no heat, and the Curator General's office has been moved to the Administration Building. But more groups with appointments have come to see the Colonial kitchen and the Childhood in America exhibit than ever before. Our visitors enter by the back door and are escorted to the South Gallery where the current exhibit is being held. War and cold do not stop our work."

These clubs are open to all boys and girls of elementary school age with programs and activities which are adaptable to any school group. Through these clubs instruction in patriotism and citizenship can be given.

The clubs throughout the state have helped in collecting thousands of pounds of scrap iron; some are knitting squares for afghans for Junior Red Cross. Many are buying defense stamps and bonds. The Abilene and Salina Clubs sent books, magazines, puzzles and Scrapbooks to nearby army camps. The Clubs of Abilene bought \$2,389.65 worth of stamps and bonds for one semester. Olathe clubs bought \$7,250.00 and collected several tons of scrap iron. The Tescott clubs gathered over 8 tons of scrap iron; and one club of the James Ross chapter presented a tableau "The Stars and Stripes." One primary group of Abilene presented a patriotic play "The Light of Liberty" in Salina on November 6, 1942 for the State Teachers Association. The Gen. McArthur Club of Pittsburg has helped with Junior Red Cross and T. B. Christmas Seal Sales. The Lincoln club of the General Edward Hand Chapter purchased \$200 in stamps, presented patriotic programs and collected 6 tons of scrap iron.

The Junior Members of Kansas have been devoting their time to the war services recommended by the National Society and by their communities. They are doing such things as sewing, knitting, preparing surgical dressings and collecting wool clips for the Red Cross; taking first aid, home nursing, nurses' aide training and nutrition courses under the direction of the Red Cross; taking part in the War Bond drives, in the Civilian Defense Organizations and in the work of the rationing boards; aiding financially and by entertainment at nursery schools, underprivileged homes and orphans' homes; and making contributions to the United Service Organizations; Girl Scouts at the State Orphans' Home; Red Cross Kit Fund; Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee Schools; Helen Pouch Scholar-Scholarships and Foreign Body Detector Fund.

Chapters reporting members of the Junior age active with D. A. R. projects have the ideal situation. If a chapter does not have members between the ages of eighteen and thirty-five active in their D. A. R., an effort should be made to organize a junior committee with a special job of their own.

Increased Junior Membership is essential for the survival of the Society for as a Junior said at the Continental Congress "The Life Insurance Policy of the National Society is in its Junior Members."

NATIONAL DEFENSE THROUGH PATRIOTIC EDUCATION

(Miss) ESTHER CHRISTMORE

All of the fifty-seven Chapters have Chapter Chairman of National Defense. Reports were received from fifty Chapters. All Chapters paid their 10c per capita quota. Thirty-one Chapters had from one to eight programs on National Defense, totaling sixty programs. Ninety-five paid subscriptions to National Defense News were reported. Twenty-five Chapters distributed National Defense News to school and public libraries and members of Chapters. Thirty-two Chapters know the National Society's program as expressed through the resolutions passed by Continental Congress. Twenty-three Chapters follow legislation and let their Congressmen know their views on vital questions. Thirty-one Chapters participate in local good government by exercising the ballot, cooperating with Civic Organizations, schools, P. T. A., serving on election boards, City Councils, and Central Committees. Eleven Chapters distributed literature from National Defense Office among members and placed it in school and public libraries. Thirty-seven Chapters observed National Holidays. Seventeen Chapters gave a total of thirty-nine awards. Nineteen Chapters sponsored the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage but twenty-nine medals will not be awarded for the duration.

The Dodge City Chapter established a War Relief Work Room in April, 1942, and members took turns staying there from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day. The women gave magazines and other reading material to soldiers, sent soldiers from their community birthday cards, and gave each soldier leaving a package of postal cards. Since then the Dodge City Chapter has given up this room and is cooperating with the local U.S. O. The Dodge City Chapter has established an Information Booth at the Santa Fe Station and aids all Service men who come through on trains wishing information.

Report of National Chairmen and Vice Chairman

AMERICAN INDIANS

(Mrs. Loren Edgar) LEDA FERRELL REX, Chairman

To comply with the request of brief data to reach the state recording secretary on or before March Third it is necessary to arrange comething especially for use in the 1943 printed Proceedings in addition to the regular National report.

During the congress in 1942, \$550.00 worth, in even figures, of Indian handicraft was sold—only the official photographer exceeded this figure in sales made in Chicago. In Cincinnati this year there is be an Indian booth where articles are to be offered for sale, other things are to be exhibited, and also from this place information is to be obtained regarding this committee.

The National Society has proclaimed a policy of all out for Victory and in the list of greatest needs we find blood plasma, ambulances, and nurses; to provide training for many Indian girls as war nurses is our big objective. Every state chould assume the responsibility of sending into this war service at least one nurse. If every chapter donated as little as \$1.00 this committee could accomplish a magnificent work which would show real patriotism. From profits on Indian articles sold by the National chairman alone, one nurse has been provided for; small grouped donations will provide for another nurse. Illinois, Ohio, District of Columbia, and Pennsylvania have taken nurses in training, all of whom will graduate in less than two years. There are Indian girls in training in Kansas hospitals who would make wonderful war nurses. In response to the request for used beads, great quantities have been donated for use by the Indians in making articles to sell.

The Living Indians Room in Memorial Continental Hall has received many gifts since its dedication a year ago—among them is the entire collection of the late Miss Helen Scout. (Stout)

AMERICAN RED CROSS

(Mrs. Ralph B.) Frances D. Earp, Vice Chairman Western Division

At the request of the National Chairman of American Red Cross, the reports of the states were sent directly to her. Therefore there is no report for the Chairman of the Western Division.

D. A. R. MUSEUM

(Mrs. Garland P.) HELEN B. FERRELL, Vice Chairman Western Division

The special assignment, for this year, from the Curator General to the Divisional Vice Chairmen, was to make a survey of the museums in each of the states in her division in which D. A. R. members might have any part in sponsoring or maintaining a museum; also, the location of the museum, the size, the title of the head and the nature of the museum. The detailed report has been sent to the office of the Curator General, but for our files the report has been abridged. Of the states in the Western Division, Colorado and South Dakota have not reported.

Kansas. Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell, Chairman.

- At Old Shawnee Mission in Kansas City, Kansas, the State Society, D. A. R. maintains two large rooms, the object being to preserve articles of historic interest indigenous to the state and the State D. A. R. Society. It is required that articles must be at least 75 years old and many relics of pioneer Kansans are preserved there. The Colonial Dames, The United States Daughters of 1812 and the Daughters of the American Colonists each also maintain two rooms in this building.
- 2. At Independence, the Esther Lowery Chapter owns a quaint and interesting Chapter House. Many articles of historic interest are found here. Of special interest are the two silver communion cups used in the church in New Jersey where Esther Lowrey attended. She was the wife of Col. Thomas Lowery, a Revolutionary soldier.
- 3. The Augusta Historical Museum at Augusta, of which Miss Stella B. Haines is the president. Articles of pioneer days have been placed in the oldest house in Augusta, a log cabin built in 1868. In early days this cabin housed the store of C. N. James, the Post Office, Masonic Lodge, Baptist and Methodist services and Public School taught by L. N. Blood.
- 4. Wellington Museum, Wellington. Sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. The Wellington Chapter D.A. R. maintains a locked case. The exhibit is changed from time to time using whatever of interest the chapter members care to loan for that purpose.
- 5. Wichita Public Historical Museum Association, located in the Forum in Wichita. The collection represents pioneer displays, dioramas, the collection of the Sedgwick County Pioneer Society and a loan collection of about 50 articles from Eunice Sterling Chapter. Notable in this loan collection is a copper warming

pan that had belonged to the Gen. Israel Putnam family, a hand woven bed spread from the Kingsbury family of Worcester, Mass., made in 1815 and a crochet rug made by a Real Daughter. Many members of this chapter are interested members of this association, two are trustees and another is the 1st. Vice President. At a recent Sunday open house more than 600 visitors registered.

Nebraska. Mrs. Ralph Graham, Chairman.

- Niobrara Chapter, Hastings, has a small collection and are adding to it. It is located in the building called the House of Yesterday.
- 2. Lewis and Clark Chapter at Fremont gave their relics to the State Museum at Nebraska City, and they also have a glass case in the Court House at Fremont.
- 3. 37th Star Chapter at McCook has a small interesting museum and are adding to it each year.
- 4. Broken Bow Chapter collects everything relating to the early history of their country. Indian relics, early cooking utensils, etc. The exhibit is changed from time to time because of lack of display space.
- 5. Sioux Lookout Chapter at North Platte, in Memorial Park, is a small museum called D. A. R. Museum. It is open to visitors every Sunday afternoon—except in extreme cold weather. Visitors from all over the United States and from many foreign countries have registered there. It has a valuable collection of old guns, organs, music boxes, spinning wheels and old glass and china. It is the oldest small museum in the state.

North Dakota. Mrs. Harley E. French, Chairman.

- Minishoshe Chapter, Bismark, has charge of the Roosevelt Cabin in the Capital grounds. The cabin was moved from a ranch in the western part of the state. It is furnished with Roosevelt relics, many sent directly by the family.
- 2. Sakakawee Chapter, Valley City, started the Barnes County Historical Museum in 1930. Other organizations have exhibits there but the custodian is always a D. A. R.
- 3. Sully Hill Chapter, Devil's Lake, furnished the hostess house at Sully Hill Park, 16 years ago. Many pieces of old furniture, pictures, rugs. Members of D. A. R. are hostesses each Sunday afternoon during the summer months. Nearby, the D. A. R. contributed to the rebuilding of the last two log cabins of the old original Fort Totten. In the large cabin are housed 500 antiques contributed by the Pioneers of the Lake Region. Many of these were brought in by covered wagon. Buffalo rugs are on the floor.
