



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

#### Objects

The objects of this Society as stated in Article II of the Constitution are:

#### 1.

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

#### 2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

#### 3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom ,to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### Insignia

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above.—D. A. R. Handbook, page 56.

Continue, we pray, Thy blessings upon this nation, that all who are a part of it may learn true nobility of manhood and womanhood.

Grant us growth in understanding and increasing devotion to righteousness. Amen.

#### INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

Chaplain: You have been duly elected to office in ———— Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Do you accept its responsibilities and duties?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to uphold the Constitution of the United States of America and to seek its observances by others?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to perform the duties of your office to the best of your ability and understanding, and that at all times you will conduct yourself uprightly, God being your helper?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: That which is gone out of thy lips thou shalt observe and do; according as thou hast vowed unto Jehovah thy God.—Deut. 23:23.

Collect: Lord God, we pray that we may be joined together in loyalty; —these who now are placed in leadership, and we who have chosen them to guide us. Bless their faithfulness and ours, in a united service to our Society and to Thy kingdom. May we have an awareness of Thy companionship in all our plans and projects; and the assurance of Thy benediction upon our work. Amen.

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# GENERAL INFORMATION

Report immediately to the State Corresponding Secretary any change in chapter officer or chapter chairman.

Report AT ONCE all resignations, deaths, marriages, and members RECEIVED by transfer to the Treasurer General. Do not report a resignation, or transfer a member in arrears in dues. Only members in good standing may resign or be transferred.

Do not vote to grant a resignation. Report all resignations IMMEDIATELY. To delay may cause injustice, and the member to have to be dropped or the chapter to have to pay an additional year's dues.

Vote to receive a member by transfer, and notify the Treasurer General IMMEDIATELY of the acceptance of the member by the chapter.

Do not report names of members as transferred to other chapters until you receive notice from the Treasurer General that such transfers have been received.

Grant transfer card as soon as requested. Do not vote to grant transfer OUT of the chapter. Do not send transfer card to the Treasurer General. The member transferring gives it with a copy of her application paper to the chapter to which she transfers. Chapter from which member transferred does not remove name from rolls when transfer card is issued, but does remove it from the rolls when notice is received from Treasurer General that transfer has been completed. Likewise, chapter to which member transfers does not add name to rolls when transfer card and application paper is received, but adds the name to the rolls as of the date on which the Treasurer General notifies the chapter that the transfer is completed. Treasurer General notifies Chapter Treasurer of BOTH chapters of date upon which transfer is completed.

Collect dues in time to reach Washington by January 1. DO NOT wait until December to begin to collect dues.

Send in late December all dues on hand. DO NOT wait for delinquents. Send all dues received after January 1 AS SOON AS RECEIVED. DO NOT HOLD dues received after January 1 waiting for other members to pay. To do so may rob your chapter of rightful representation and a member of the right to serve as a delegate or alternate.

Send special funds for schools, scholarships, etc., for which State credit is desired to the STATE TREASURER, who in turn will forward to the Treasurer General.

Every Chapter Regent, Treasurer and Registrar, should have a copy of the D. A. R. Handbook. The price of the Handbook is twenty-five cents. Orders with remittances should be sent to the Treasurer General, Administration Building N. S. D. A. R.

# PRESENTATION AND DEDICATION OF THE KANSAS STAR, NATIONAL BIRTHDAY BELL, VALLEY FORGE

#### (Mrs. Roy V.) DOROTHY B. SHREWDER, Chairman

One of the truly inspirational occasions in connection with the fifty-third Continental Congress was the presentation and dedication service at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, April 13, 1944. At Valley Forge you sense reverently and assuredly that "Things that have stood the test of time are becoming increasingly precious to us in a world of revolution and chaos."

In the Washington Memorial Chapel which was literally packed with D. A. R. members from every state, three State Bells, fourteen State Stars and one State Flag were presented and dedicated. (Following this ceremony the corner stone of the Robert Morris Thanksgiving Tower, was laid,) while over all the lovely valley there rang out the music of the Carillon—Faith of Our Fathers, America, The Star Spangled Banner.

An outstanding presentation speech was that given by the Kansas Regent, Mrs. Alexander J. Berger. Kansans were justly proud to be so ably represented and a sense of gratitude filled the minds of all who were there; gratitude that we could share in such a heritage.

Kansas members present at this ceremony, in addition to Mrs. Berger were: Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder; Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur; Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell; Mrs. Marcel Duphorne; Mrs. Robert C. Foulston; Mrs. H. B. Gabbert; Mrs. John W. Lane and Miss Elizabeth Kilgore. In presenting the Kansas Star, Mrs. Berger said:

"To the citizens of every state this is a hallowed spot for had it not been for the indomitable courage of the soldiers who suffered and fought here the glorious story of the States might have been a very different one. The late Stephen Vincent Benet in his last book, "Western Star," paid such heroes as these a beautiful tribute when he wrote:

"Now by the Eastern Shore,

Between the seamarks and the roads going west,

I call two oceans to remember them-

I fill the hollow darkness with their names."

Because a star has ever been a symbol of guidance how fitting it is that upon this great National Birthday Bell the States should pay tribute in stars to the guiding spirit of our forefathers—a spirit which kept each generation pushing wonderful new frontiers unto this day when we are called upon to defend that which they died to found. This is our testing time—our Valley Forge—in which to prove ourselves worthy of our heritage.

The early history of every state parallels in a lesser measure the beginning of our country, for it was through great courage and endurance—physical, mental and spiritual they took form. Brave men and women with vision and the fortitude to follow that vision founded our states. This truth is expressed in the motto of Kansas— "Ad Astra per Aspera"—to the stars through difficulties.

I deem it a very great privilege and honor to dedicate this thirty-fourth star of my beloved State of Kansas to the memory of the Revolutionary ancestors of the Kansas Daughters and to the heroes of Valley Forge."

Greetings were brought by Miss Grace Meeker, senior honorary state regent; Miss Catherine Campbell, honorary state regent and past vice president general; and Mrs. Loren E. Rex, honorary state regent, past chaplain general and National Chairman of the American Indians Committee.

Thanks and appreciation to the James Ross Chapter as hostess to the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage were expressed by Mrs. Berger who instructed the secretary to send a note of thanks to the chapter for their hospitality. Mrs. Berger spoke of the solendid work done by Mrs. Jud Pierson Hall, state reporter, who had resigned as she will be out of the state for some months to be with her son who is in the Navy. The resignation was accepted with regret. Miss Catherine Campbell nominated Mrs. G. D. Weilepp of the General Edward Hand chapter for the office of state reporter to complete the unexpired term of office. Mrs. Naylor seconded the nomination. As there were no other nominations Mrs. McCamish moved that they be closed. Carried. Mrs. McCamish moved that the vote be taken by acclamation. Seconded by Mrs. Lehman and carried. Mrs. Weilepp was unanimously elected and was invited to attend the Board meeting. Mrs. Weilepp expressed her thanks to the Board for the confidence expressed in electing her to this office.

Mrs. Berger named the three major projects of the Kansas Society for this year:

1. MEMBERSHIP. Two prizes of \$10.00 each are offered by the state regent and the state registrar to the chapter having a membership under 25 and to the chapter having more than 25 members, making the greatest net increase in membership. March 1, 1943 to March 1, 1944.

2. BLOOD PLASMA FUND. To purchase either another complete mobile blood plasma unit at \$2350 or a blood center at \$2000. Fund to be completed by January 1, 1944. Now on hand \$1526.25.

3. APPROVED SCHOOLS. The scholarship at Tamassee to be maintained. \$115 pays for board, room, clothing and schooling for one year at Tamassee. A sterilizer will be given to Kate Duncan Smith School to cost at wholesale, \$66.00. This sterilizer will care for the needs of the people on Gunter Mountain over an area of 100 square miles. Mrs. Naylor moved that all money received over the amount for a one year scholarship at Tamassee and not sufficient for a second scholarship be used toward medical scholarships, and all amounts received over \$66.00 for the sterilizer at Kate Duncan Smith, be used toward medical scholarships. Seconded by Mrs. Shrewder and carried.

Mrs. Berger read a letter from Donna Benson of Wadsworth, Kansas, winner of the second prize in the 1943 Flag Essay Contest. Mrs. McCamish moved that the State Society sponsor the eighth grade Flag Essay Contest and award three prizes: \$3.00 for first; \$2.00 for second and \$1.00 for third prize. Seconded by Mrs. Weilepp and carried. Mrs. Berger referred to a letter from Miss Elizabeth Barnes, national chairman of Correct Use of the Flag Committee in which she complimented Kansas for being the first state to report a chairman of this committee in each chapter in the state. Miss Barnes also announced that, when the National Anthem is sung immediately following the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag that the hand remains over the heart during the singing of the anthem.

Miss Catherine Campbell moved that the state society sponsor the Girl Home Makers Cotton Dress Contest and award a prize of \$5.00. Seconded by Mrs. Holroyd and carried.

Miss Ida Lyons moved to accept the recommendation of the Executive Board, that a supplement to the 1938 State D. A. R. Directory be compiled and ready for distribution at the State Conference in March, 1944. Seconded by Mrs. Weilepp and carried. The State Registrar, Mrs. V. E. McArthur was instructed to prepare this supplement.

Miss Catherine Campbell moved that an historical report of the state society since 1938 and up to March 1, 1944, be compiled and included in the printed Proceedings in 1944, and that a few extra copies be made. Seconded by Mrs. Dellinger and carried.

Mrs. Berger announced that the state society has 10 members in the enlisted service of our country and that the Proceedings of 1943 will be dedicated to them and their names will appear on the Roll of Honor. Mrs. McArthur moved that a service flag, to honor these members, be placed in the Kansas room, in Memorial Continental Hall, at the time of the October National Board meeting. Seconded by Mrs. Lehman and carried. Permission to place this flag in the Kansas room has been granted by Mrs. C. C. Haig, chairman of Buildings and Grounds Committee. Mrs. Haig said that Kansas is the first state to ask for this privilege.

# Reports of State Officers

# STATE REGENT

# (Mrs. Alexander J.) RUTH NORRIS BERGER

As most of you know we have entered the 50th anniversary year of the appointment of the first State Regent of Kansas, the circumstances of which are a far cry from those of 1894 when the National Society appointed Mrs. Hiram Hand, State Regent of Kansas.

It required two years for this first state regent and her small group of members to secure enough eligible ladies in any one community to form a chapter. In 1896 three chapters were organized and this changed the Kansas Society from a small group of members residing in several towns to a society composed of three chapters.

The years since then have been filled with progressively greater growth and accomplshment until now the Kansas Society is composed of 57 chapters and has a membership of 2589. Four of the 57 chapters were organized and 733 members were admitted by verification and reinstatement during the present administration. The 58th chapter in Kansas may be organized by June—as it appears quite likely that a chapter in Lyons may organize with about 26 members.

Through the years our aims and ideals remain the same, but always we interpret them in the terms of the ever changing trend and demands of the time.

A little over a year after your state regent went into office our country entered the world war. The days since then have been busy days for all of us, with responsibilities, anxieties and work constantly increasing, but with a challenge for service never before given to American women. The members of the Kansas Society have accepted the challenge, and in reading the reports of the work accomplished by the chapters and individual members I marvel at the amount of work so well done. The true spirit of the Kansas Daughters is evidenced in the way you have responded to each and every call, and in so doing you have not forgotten the usual avenues of endeavor. This fact is proved in your support of our approved schools. Up to four years ago you had never given a scholarship to our approved schools. Since then you have given one or two scholarships each year, two drinking fountains, a sidewalk and the Kansas Corridor and class room equipment in the Tamassee High School. You crowned your efforts this year by giving five scholarships to Tamassee and four medical scholarships to Kate Duncan Smith. This is in addition to the surgical sterilizer which is the only one in the one hundred square mile area served by the Kate Duncan Smith School.

Your contributing in less than thirty days more than enough to make it possible for your state regent to make her last official act the dedication of the Kansas State Star at Valley Forge is most deeply appreciated — as are the several notes that have come to me expressing regret that their contribution was too late to be included in the gift. The large number of books presented to our National Library; the several gifts made to the National Museum; the purchase of the first house in Wichita, all show that your splendid record of war work has been in addition to the Society's usual avenues of endeavor.

For me to tell of the war work that has been done would be to deprive others of their rightful privilege to make the report. I cannot refrain though from mentioning your work for the war project fund. This year you have contributed \$6968.93 for the expansion of the blood plasma program, and the Junior Group of the Atchison Chapter has contributed \$442.90 for a Berman Metal Locator to be used in helping to save the lives of those wounded in battle. It is hoped that a part of the money contributed this year will be used for a blood donor center at Lynn, Massachusetts, and for a combination mobile unit for the Fort Worth Center. We are justly proud of the mobile unit presented in July of this year through the Kansas Society to the blood donor center at Columbus, Ohio. We are also proud of the twelve members of the Kansas Society now serving with the armed forces; of the generous gifts made to the several camps located within our state, and of the Sun Room at the Winter General Hospital in Topeka.

Your liberal gifts and the large number of hours given to war service work prove that the days have been busy ones for the members of the Kansas Society. As your state regent I, too, have been busy. I have attended all regular meetings of the National Board and have spent many hours at my near "war casualty" typewriter. An actual count shows I have personally written 3898 letters and 2468 postal cards. A total of 6366 pieces of mail in addition to cutting the stencils and addressing the envelopes for the 521 mimeographed letters that have gone out. I have endeavored to answer all requests promptly and to assist in establishing eligibility and in making out the application papers for new members.

The contacts made through the D. A. R. work have been most enjoyable and I appreciate immensely all the acts of courtesy and hospitality the Kansas Daughters have extended me.

It has been a stimulating experience to serve the Kansas Society during this critical period and I thank you for the privilege and for the wonderful cooperation of every one of you. I could ask no more for my successor than that she receive the same wonderful cooperation you have given me.

This year is a critical one in the life of our nation, but let us never lose sight of the fact that the same Divine Providence that watched over the founders of our republic and guided them in the framing of our constitution is still with us to guide and strengthen us.

You must know that it is with a feeling of regret that I have made this — my last report to you as State Regent. One cannot work through four years with such fine cooperation and splendid effort and come to the close without a feeling of sadness. I want to say to you how deeply grateful I am for all your help and kindness, and for the comfort you have given me in my hours of sorrow. It has meant more than you know — and will remain in my memory always.

# STATE VICE REGENT

# (Mrs. Roy V.) DOROTHY BERRYMAN SHREWDER

The duties of this office are not numerous and always very pleasant. Under the capable eye of the state regent, even emergencies have been few. It has been a privilege and a pleasure to serve as vice regent the past four years. The inspiration of Mrs. Berger's leadership and the associations of an entirely harmonious Board will be carried over into the years. I thank you for having given me the opportunity to serve in this capacity during this time and thank you for the many thoughtful courtesies extended to me by the members and chapters of the State Society.

Since my last report, I have attended the National D. A. R. Congress held in Cincinatti, serving on the Registration committee. I attended the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Board meeting, the Conference Board of Management meeting and all called meetings of the Executive Board. I represented the regent at one chapter meeting and was the guest at two chapter meetings celebrating Washington's Birthday.

As Chairman of the National Birthday Bell (at Valley Forge) project, I arranged for the collection of funds necessary to place ' the Kansas Star in the border of 48 stars, on the Birthday Bell. This project was begun January 15th. The letter sent out on this date explained the project and outlined the plans for financing it. This was done through contributions commemorating American Patriots whose descendants now live within the state of Kansas. The amount necessary was \$240.00. On the basis of \$5.00 contribu-tions, 48 ancestors were thus to be honored. The 48 names along with the names of the donors are to be inscribed in the Birthday Bell Book, at Valley Forge.

The first contribution was a generous one and by February 8th. the entire amount necessary to provide our star was raised and the chapters informed that no further contributions could be accepted for this project. The names of the donors and the Patriots will be filed with the state historian. The state treasurer has the list of contributions in her files. (Both are listed below). On April 13th, at Valley Forge, the Star will be dedicated by our State Regent. This dedication will be a fitting observance of the 50th anniversary of the National Society Doughters of the

the 50th anniversary of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in Kansas. It is a real tribute to the loyal and tireless endeavors of our state regent, that this project was so quickly completed.

The splendid record of her achievement, climaxing 50 years of faithful and excellent records of Kansas State Regents, will prove a real inspiration as the State Society, now come of age, takes up its work, in what may prove to be the most trying years of its his-tory. As a patriotic society, we MUST meet the challenge of the years ahead. As your State Reporter and Chairman of Press Relations, I submit to the 46th Annual State Conference the following report:

Last September I was elected to this office to finish the term of Mrs. Hazle M. Hall, resigned, so most of my report will cover the period from October 1st, 1943 to March 1st, 1944, although the publicity reported covers the entire year from March 1st, 1943 to March 1st, 1944. Mrs. Hall had two articles published in the National Historical Magazine—one in May giving a report of the 45th State Conference held at Coffeyville and the other in September on KANSAS BLOOD DONORS.

In October I wrote all Chapters of the change in State Reporters and all Press Relations Chairmen were asked to send in Chapter Publicity. I am happy to report that most of them have done so and publicity has been received from 51 chapters.

All press releases from Mrs. John Bailey O'Brien, National Chairman of Press Relations have been sent to our State papers; historic events, death of D. A. R. members and activities of the State Committees have found space in these papers. All of these and publicity for the 51 chapters have been carefully compiled in an indexed scrap-book and will be sent to National Congress.

Chapter year books were most welcome and interesting.

The annual publicity reports for Kansas have been sent to Mrs. O'Brien, Bronxville, N. Y., National Chairman.

Approximately 4,400 inches of D. A. R. publicity were printed in Kansas last year and 52 pictures were used. The standing of the chapters this year is the same as last. EUNICE STERLING CHAP-TER again takes first place with 542 inches and 31 pictures; SUS-ANNAH FRENCH PUTNEY CHAPTER is second with 427 inches and FORT SUPPLY TRAIL CHAPTER is third with 367 inches and 4 pictures. Fort Supply Trail and Susannah French Putney Chapters are to be commended for their use of the D. A. R. insignia.

It has been a pleasure to serve as your state reporter the last half of the year and your cooperation and promptness have been very gratifying. I wish to express my appreciation to the Wichita Eagle, Wichita Beacon and Topeka Capital and their club editors for space given us. They have been most kind.

We are still at war and our war work and projects must go on. May this coming year find Kansas D. A. R. members ready and willing for any demand that may be made of their time, their money and their Blood, and it is to be hoped that ALL chapters will report promptly ALL projects and activities so that state and national may know what Kansas is doing.

Wellington Chapter presented at a guest meeting the "Old Portage Trail" by Francesco DeLeone, with description and historical background by Raymond Burnette Pease; illustrated by the seven pieces of the Suite and the addition of three Indian songs by Lieurance, Cadman and Logan.

Susannah French Putney chapter has had three good programs featuring American Music; namely, "Beginning of American Music" concerning Indian and Negro music; "Kansas in American Music," and "Civil War and Its Influence on Music."

Randolph Loving Chapter devoted one entire program to American Music at which time two groups of solos were given by Inez Jamieson, soprano. Mrs. Jamieson's selections were all by American composers and included two numbers by Kansas composers, one in manuscript. At the same meeting a flute trio composed of three students from the Fine Arts Division of the University of Wichita presented three numbers, two by American composers and one arranged by a member of the trio.

In the Betty Washington Chapter the Chairman of Advancement of American Music at every program gave a short historical sketch for some patriotic American song, if a piano was available, the chapter sang the selection otherwise it was read by a member.

Henry Dawson Chapter illustrated with appropriate music a program describing the use of the American Flag in Army posts and ceremonies down the years from the Revolution to the present time.

Dana Chapter, Fort Larned Chapter, Polly Ogden Chapter and Ninnescah Chapter are especially commended for having included American Music on a majority of their programs.

Arthur Barrett Chapter had one program of Early American Music.

Phebe Dustin Chapter devoted one entire meeting to American Music.

Jeremiah Howard Chapter presented Mrs. M. F. Russell, pianist, organist and composer in a program of Hymns of all Ages which included some American composed hymns. Another program presented compositions of Mrs. Russell in manuscript and a third program given by guest speakers reviewed American musical history of the first period with recordings of Stephen Collins Foster.

Topeka Chapter, Martha Loving Ferrell, General Edward Hand Chapter and Peleg Gorton Chapter mentioned musical programs but not as to whether they were American or not. The committee does not advocate American music to the exclusion of all other, works of foreign composers may be used with that of American composers.

Work suggested for the committee for next year: A comparison and use of the most popular war songs of the American Wars; Songs of United Nations, and a suggestion that the reports suggesting topics for study be sent out earlier to be incorporated in the current year books.

The state chairman appreciates the cooperation and interest shown by chapter chairmen and finds that progress has been made in a few respects, but realizes a great deal more can be done and encourages the use of recordings for study of American Music.

The state chairman sent letters to all chapter chairmen concerning the national chairman's suggestions for Advancement in American Music, and later sending cards to remind chairmen of annual reports, and also answered all direct queries.

# AMERICAN INDIANS

The annual letters to the State Chapters were sent out in September, emphasizing the need of our concerted effort in making it possible for Indian girls to become trained nurses.

We close the book on another year of Red Cross work. This year we spent 178,681 hours sewing, knitting, teaching, supervising, attending classes, Canteen work, Gray Ladies, Nurses' Aides, in U.S. O. rooms, and Surgical Dressings. Due to shortage of materials we made 1938 articles. We gave through our treasurer \$153.00 and much more in local work; 71 attended classes; we have 5 Gray Ladies; 17 Nurses' Aides; 1 Red Cross nurse; 1 WAVE; 22 taught classes; 33 donated blood; and dozens are working as chairmen in different committee work.

I have written 116 chapter letters, visited one chapter, gave two Red Cross lessons, and taught two Home Nursing classes.

I have enjoyed our contacts and it has been a source of inspiration to serve as your state chairman.

My sincere 'Thanks' to Mrs. Berger and to you. May this little poem be an inspiration to you to do more Red Cross work next year. Let us always do for others not them for us.

### CONSERVATION

#### (Mrs. Robert L.) EMMA DENT JONES

Of the fifty-seven Chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Kansas, 73% responded to questionnaires sent out by state chairman, of which the following is a summary.

30 Chapters assisted in the activities of various youth organizations, including Scouts, 4-H, Campfire and Girl Reserves.

23 Chapters reported aid to several charitable groups, of which help to hospitals was predominant.

Civic and welfare societies have been helped generously, both by cash donations and by work of individual members.

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The Highway Traffic program has been aided by the placing of signs along the Highway and in talks before groups on "the rules of the road" by D. A. R. women. Members of four chapters took work in Health Clinics; 5 chapters report work among the foreign born; 6 chapters have helped with the delinquent youth movement and 2 chapters reported special donations to the Cancer fund.

Of the work of Natural Resources we are very proud. In this state of variable climatic conditions, where trees require the most careful handling (even seeming to need special prayers in some localities), we can report the planting of 2000 trees besides 20 acres of seedlings reported by one chapter. Shrubs to the number of 1154 have been planted and 1929 bulbs found their way into the yards of D. A. R. members. 100% of the chapters reporting have saved waste fats, making a total of 1649 lbs. salvaged. Silk hose to the amount of 204 pairs and silk scraps totaling 2815 lbs. were given. One chapter reports 25 bushels of tin saved and there were also 845 lbs. of tin sent in, with another 4000 of scrap metal salvaged.

One chapter conducted a quiz program on Conservation; while a member of another chapter conserved coal by closing all of the rooms in her house, but one.

Perhaps best of all is the 100% of Victory gardens reported, which go all of the way from 4 to 5 in a chapter to 40 or 50 gardens in larger chapters. 44,096 quarts of food have been canned with plans to increase the amount next year.

Cash donations from reporting chapters amount to \$4947.75, exclusive of money sent to the two accredited schools.

# CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG

## (Mrs. Dan) RUTH HOPSON

Questionnaires were received from forty-two chapter chairmen of Correct Use of the Flag Committees. These reported that every chapter gives the Pledge of Allegiance, and gives it correctly, at each meeting. Twenty-three chapters report singing the Star Spangled Banner, and several others mention having patriotic music. Thirtythree chapters observed Flag Day with a program. There were 142 flags, large and small, presented. These were given to aliens, Girl and Boy Scouts, schools, and used on graves of deceased members. A Mexican Boy Scout troup was given flags; some chapters give new members a flag. 349 Flag codes were presented, 298 copies of the new Flag law; and 179 Flag leaflets. Ten chapter chairmen made Flag scrapbooks. Sixty-two corrections were made on the incorrect display of the Flag. Chapter chairmen gave 51 talks to chapters, 15 to schools, 38 elsewhere, and one talk was given on the radio. 9 guest speakers were presented. Three original papers about the Flag were written. Twenty chapters report special Flag publicity in their local press.

Especially emphasized in Kansas was the Flag Essay contest. Two hundred sixty one children wrote essays, of which 24 were submitted in the state contest. First place was given to Phyllis Hane, Leavenworth; second to Joy Bomau, Leavenworth; and third, to Marilyn Cowell, Manhattan; Barbara Jones, Leavenworth; Barbara Ann Little, Virgil; Kathleen Bearden, Bonner Springs; Ruth Anne Mellott, Edwardsville; Patricia Lawrence, Winfield; and Donna Jean Lawson, Arkansas City, received honorable mention. The judges were Mrs. Willard Morss, Howard, Mrs. Lloyd Robertson, Phillipsburg, and Mrs. Clyde King, Phillipsburg.

Kansas was the first state to report to the national chairman that there was a chapter chairman for each chapter. Kansas has stressed particularly giving information on the form of the Flag salute and the necessity for patriotic instruction on the importance of the Flag.

This year Kansas Society presents its ninth Pilgrim in the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage contest. For the past three years this contest has been conducted on a merit basis, using the following procedure: Each 4 year public Senior High School, that requested same, was given a questionnaire to be filled out by the senior girl chosen by the senior class and faculty as the best citizen of her school. These questionnaires were sent to the District chairmen of our committee, who had been appointed by your state chairman. Competent and impartial judges chosen by these chairmen selected the three best questionnaires and same were forwarded to the state chairman, where all 18 (3 from each of the 6 districts) were again judged by judges chosen by your state chairman, and the winner and two alternates determined as follows:

Winner: Miss Ruth Ann Wolf, Manhattan.

First alternate: Miss Cavita Thuma, El Dorado.

Second alternate: Miss Maella Marie Brown, Washburn High, Topeka.

One hundred four high schools participated in the contest this year. Sixteen from Districts One, Two and Three; nineteen from Districts Four and Six and Eighteen from District Five. Good Citizen Certificates, provided by our National Society, were mailed to each contestant. Since the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage Contest has been sponsored by Kansas Society, District One has had 3 winners; District Five can claim 2 and other Districts one each.

This summer I contacted all our former Pilgrims by letter, and will make a report on their present activities later today.

# D. A. R. MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

### (Mrs. Clarence F.) ONA SNYDER DRAKE

Forty of the fifty seven chapters appointed chairmen for the D. A. R. Manual for Citizenship. Twenty ordered manuals and eight reordered two or more times. Twenty four replied to the questionnaire sent to them in January. These showed: 1419 Manuals ordered in English, 71 in Spanish, 36 in Italian, 9 in Greek, 2 in French, 12 in German, 1 in Norwegian. Two chapters ordered 17 Manuals, one in each language for Public Library use, and one ordered 12 in foreign languages for Public Library use, a total of 1595 manuals.

Thirty four chapters paid full per capita for Manuals. Twenty three contributed, but not full amount. Kansas reports sending full payment of State quota to the Treasurer General in payment from March 1, 1943 to March 1, 1944.

Chapters reported the Manuals were used in the following ways: for programs, the James Ross Chapter using it for six — In educational centers — Scout and Girl Reserve work — Club programs — Naturalization classes — District courts — History classes in public schools — Salvation Army, — Mexican Missions — City and college libraries. One Chapter sent a copy to a member of the Coast Guard in his Christmas box. Several reported having Chairman and Regent attend Court when foreigners received their citizenship. Concordia chapter reported the Manual refused for library at Federal Internment Camp, for reason that it contained a U. S. map.

Your chairman sent a letter in October to every chapter chairman suggesting uses for the Manual and at this time she wishes to thank them for their interest and untiring efforts in placing Manuals where they would be used most. There has never been a time in the history of our country when it has been so necessary for those living upon its shores to become citizens and to know the necessity for Citizenship. Naturalization of every foreigner within a community should be the goal of each chapter. Your state and national chairman will gladly cooperate with the chapters in every way. The D. A. R. Manual for Citizenship is the best medium for obtaining all necessary information that the alien will need to assist him in becoming a good citizen and future voter in our Nation.

#### ELLIS ISLAND

## (Mrs. D. B.) BERNICE COLLINS LUDWICK

Our work at Ellis Island and Angel Island for the duration of the war is wholly with the sick and disabled men of the Merchant Marine and Coast Guard, helping these men to regain their health and sanity. In the United States Marine Hospital at Ellis Island 90% of the men treated there are American citizens. Occasionally allied seamen injured near our waters are brought to this hospital for treatment.

The Marine Hospital is the only Public Health Service Hospital that has an occupational therapy unit, and that is due to the generosity of the Daughters of the American Revolution. More and more mental cases are being sent to this hospital.

Every chapter that has contributed to this fund should feel a thrill of pride in knowing they have helped bring relief to these men who have been through such frightful experiences. All contributions were appreciated to the fullest extent.

Baxter Springs chapter secured yarn and knit 2 mufflers, 9 pair socks and ten beanies for Ellis Island Coast Guard Boys. Thanks for this fine work. Abilene and Leavenworth Chapters sent worthwhile boxes, beside making a nice cash donation. Olathe Chapter sent a nine pound box of fancy scrap leather.

I note from your reports some very interesting programs have been given during the year. Forty-two chapters sent in reports. I thank the chapter chairmen for their interest and results which is gratifying when there are so many war funds to contribute to.

## JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS

## (Mrs. Earl K.) JEAN C. ZIMMERMAN RAY

Kansas has 76 clubs and 1,711 members reported.

The Kansas City, Kansas, clubs sponsored by James Ross chapter have 2 clubs, 37 members.

The Salina clubs sponsored by Mary Wade Strother chapter have 28 clubs, 781 members and range from kindergarten to the sixth grade. They have collected paper, tin cans, scrap iron, sent magazines to soldiers in camps, cleaned up school yards, helped younger children carry on room activities, bought war stamps, emphasized health, given programs for parents. One club broadcast over the local radio station. One club makes model submarines.

The El Dorado clubs sponsored by Susannah French Putney chapter have 3 clubs, 122 members. They have bought war stamps and bonds, gathered tin cans and paper, sent Christmas box overseas to refugee children and gave cards to soldiers in hospital at Fort Riley.

The McPhercon clubs sponsored by Henry Dawson chapter have 33 clubs, 771 members. They have collected scrap iron, tin cans, papers and magazines. They went Christmas Caroling, shoveled snow for shut inc, bought bonds and stamps and have given patriotic programs.

Through the Office of Civilian Defense, manuals were sent to each chapter chairman telling them how J. A. C. could get Federal recognition for their work.

The Abilene chapter sponsors 22 clubs --one is named for Ceneral Eisenhower, they have 560 members.

## JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

#### (Mrs. O. P.) ANNA MARIA SLADE MAY

Kansas has at least twenty-one new Junior Members this year. Some of these are in a junior group, some are in a junior committee and some are in chapters without special classification. The total increase in membership is not so great not because of a lack of interest on the part of the Juniors but Junior Members of former years are taking important part in the regular chapter work. War conditions have caused many of our prospective members to move out of the state.

The Junior Members are active in war services as bond drives, rationing board assistants, fat salvage raising and conservation of fruit and vegetables, block workers for O. C. D.—in community activities as Girl Scouts for State Orphans Home—in Red Cross sewing, knitting, service with blood bank and blood donors—in D. A. R. projects as good citizenship pilgrimage, Correct Use of the Flag and C. A. R. Donations were given to Red Cross, Helen Pouch Scholarship, Tamassee, Kate Duncan Smith and Metal Locator. Atchison Chapter Junior Group alone raised enough to more than buy one locator. Other chapters sent contributions to the fund.

"Sow well and ye shall reap" has been used by our National Chairman to express the relationship between a Chapter and its Junior Members.

## MOTION PICTURES

### (Mrs. Guy D.) GERTRUDE C. JOSSERAND

Of the 57 chapters of D. A. R. in Kansas, 40 have appointed Motion Picture chairmen. Twenty chairmen sent in reports to this office.

8 chapters reported no Motion Picture work this year other than using the publication, "Unbiased Opinions" as a guide to choosing their pictures.

3 chapters made contributions for motion picture equipment for D. A. R. Approved Schools:

Oceanus Hopkins chapter cooperated with other civic bodies in furthering better films and kept display boards in college and library.

Four chapters presented talks to their chapters on better films. 2 chapters sponsored motion picture shows.

Your chairman of Motion Pictures sent names of all Motion Picture chairmen to Fox Theatres—Public Relations department for the publication, "Unbiased Opinion."

She sent a letter to each chairman outlining the work of this department and later a card requesting reports of work accomplished.

## NATIONAL DEFENSE THROUGH PATRIOTIC EDUCATION

### (Mrs. C. W.) ESTHER C. WHEELER

Of the 57 chapters in Kansas, all but two have a Chairman of National Defense. Questionnaires were sent to all chairmen, but 13 failed to report. Therefore, my report is incomplete.

Chapter chairmen report 56 programs on National Defense.

Fifty-seven paid subscriptions to the National Defense. Fifty-seven paid subscriptions to the National Defense News have been reported. The largest number of subscriptions came from the Eunice Sterling Chapter (Wichita), 17 in number. The Susannah French Putney (El Dorado) and Martha Vail (Anthony) each had 10 subscribers. The National Defense News has been distributed in School and Public Libraries.

The following National Holidays have been observed by Chapters: Memorial Day, Armistice Day, Flag Day, Washington's Birthday, Constitution Day, Lincoln's Birthday, Columbus Day.

Twenty-six Citizenship Awards have been given. Twenty-five chapters sponsored the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage and 20 awards have been given.

The per capita tax on dues paid was \$263.80. Since our total membership in Kansas is 2,587, and with \$263.80 paid in per capita

for National Defense, Kansas is more than 100% in her National Defense per capita tax.

Number of Stars on State Service Flag is 12 OF THEIR VERY OWN D. A. R. MEMBERS.

Money sent to Treasurer General for the past year: Blood Plasma, \$7,151.03 and \$263.80 per capita tax for National Defense, making a total of \$7,414.83.

Contributions to the Blood Plasma program during the past year totaled on May 15th the amount necessary to pay for a Mobile Blood Plasma Unit. The National Red Cross assigned this unit to the Blood Donor Center established at Columbus, Ohio.

Amount contributed from Chapters for Blood Plasma from March 1, 1943 to March 1, 1944 was \$7,151.03. The largest contribution (\$1,222.15) came from the Jonathan Gilbert Chapter (La Crosse). Fort Supply Trail (Ashland) was second with a contribution of \$781.00. Uvedale Chapter (Hutchinson) contributed \$560.00. Emporia Chapter, \$556.20; Eunice Sterling (Wichita) \$530.54; and Betty Bonney (Arkansas City) \$489.50. Special methods of raising funds were: Chapter Funds, Book Reviews, Teas, Voluntary Contributions, Rummage Sales, American Legion Contributions, and Assessments. Number of members giving their blood was 29.

Total amount in bonds purchased by Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution for the past year was \$1,629.00. Total amount purchased by chapter funds was \$1,377.65. The largest contribution of \$1,332.00 came from the Eunice Sterling chapter (Wichita). Total amount in bonds and stamps purchased by members and their families was \$612,804.65. Two chapters alone, Newton and Eunice Sterling (Wichita) reported \$125,000.00 and \$212,025.00 respectively.

Total number of Buddy Bags made was 702. Number of Bags filled was 730. These bags were sent to Winter General Hospital, the Red Cross, and St. Louis Area Office.

Total numbers of members in chapters reporting War Records was 475. Total number of hours recorded was 81,831. Total number of members reporting 750 hours War Service was 54. Of those chapters reporting: Mary Wade Strother (Salina) reported 6; Wellington, 6; Abilene, 6; and James Ross (Kansas City) 5. Distribution of hours: American Red Cross 29,887 hours; U. S. O. 5,732 hours; Book Drives, 100 hours; Hospitality Centers, 737 hours; War Relief Campaigns, 254 hours; Special Work for Men in the Armed Forces, 776; Bond and Stamp Booths, 3,959 hours; War Bond Campaigns, 900 hours; American Women's Voluntary Service, 4,942 hours.

Number of men from homes of D. A. R. members in Armed Forces 192; Number of members enrolled in WAC 4; Number of members enrolled in WAVES 4; Number of members enrolled in Coast Guard Reserves 1; Number of Commissioned Nurses from chapters in Armed Forces 4. Miss Lillian Case member of Betty Bonney (Arkansas City) is Assistant American Red Cross Director serving over-seas in London. Number of members working in war industries 18.

Topeka chapter reports three Gray Ladies and Mary Wade Strother (Salina) reports two. Topeka chapter also reports the furnishing of the sun room at Winter General Hospital, giving in cash \$250.00 and furnishing floor lamps and a radio in addition. Members of the Susannah French Putney chapter (El Dorado) sold \$36,176.95 stamps and bonds at War Booth during Bond Drive. Members of James Ross chapter (Kansas City) helped with Russian Relief. The Seelye family of the Abilene chapter entertained over week ends during the year 358 soldiers. Up to date they have entertained 509 soldiers over week ends. It has been a pleasure to serve you as State Chairman of National Defense. I wish to thank ,

the State Officers and Chapter Chairmen for making this report possible.

## NATIONAL HISTORICAL MAGAZINE

As your state chairman of National Historical Magazine I bring you the following report:

Contact has been made with all 57 chapters by letters and cards urging the chairmen to secure new subscription and renewals. A small percentage of the chairmen have sent in reports by March 1 as requested. Those who did said members were not interested in the magazine this year because they were devoting their efforts to the many calls pertaining to the war and giving to blood plasma.

Last year the total of subscriptions was 281; this year 260. As your State Chairman of Radio I submit the following report:

As you know much of the success of this work depends upon the generosity of the broadcasting stations and perhaps never before in our nation's history have these stations been called upon so much and so often for time. Radio time has been harder to secure this year and for that reason I feel that we have been very fortunate to have the time given us by the following stations for the following broadcasts:

September 17, 1943—Jane Dean Coffey chapter sponsored a Constitution Day program over Station KGGF, Coffeyville, arranged by Mrs. W. M. Ostenberg, chapter radio chairman. Mrs. Vaughn Partridge played a violin solo and Mrs. H. L. Campbell, regent, spoke on "What the Constitution Means to a Citizen."

- November 26, 1943—Mary Wade Strother chapter sponsored a Thanksgiving Day program over Station KSAL, Salina, arranged by Mrs. Alice Coleman Larsen, chapter radio chairman. There were flute solos played by Mary Lois Monahan and a dialogue "Early Thanksgiving Days" by Miss Florence Bond, regent, and Mrs. Leila Rearwin, past regent of Mary Wade Strother chapter.
- February 12, 1944—Dodge City chapter sponsored a broadcast over KGNO, Dodge City, arranged by Mrs. W. A. Layton, vice regent and Mrs. A. R. Buckingham, radio chairman. Mrs. J. C. Denious gave a report of the work and record of Dodge City D. A. R. chapter.
- February 12, 1944—Emporia chapter sponsored a program over Station KTSW, Emporia, arranged by Miss Violet Haynes, radio chairman. The broadcast was presented by Prof. George Pflaum's broadcasting class at Kansas State Teachers' College, and the subject was George Washington Carver, the noted Negro educator and scientist—his service to mankind.

- February 19, 1944-Mrs. F. J. Kambach, regent, was sponsored by the Topeka chapter in her broadcast over WIBW, Topeka. Mrs. Kambach gave a patriotic talk commemorating the birthdays of Lincoln and Washington.

I wish to thank the regents and radio chairmen who have cooperated with me. I do appreciate it. To make the necessary arrangements for each broadcast with the chapter and the radio station and then to notify the chapters later, has required much correspondence. It has been a pleasure to serve as your Radio chairman the past two years and for the Kansas D. A. R. and myself I wish to thank the radio stations and all who have given time and talent to make possible these broadcasts this year.

Since the organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution on October 11, 1890, seven hundred and fifty-seven actual daughters of men who participated in the American Revolution have been members of the Society. A gold spoon was voted for each of the daughters in 1895, and since 1898 all their dues have been remitted. A hundred and thirty-two Real Daughters have received pensions beginning with eight dollars and being gradually increased to twenty-five. Until last December we had one of these Real Daughters with us, Mrs. Annie Knight Gregory of Williamsport, Pennsylvania. Mrs. Gregory passed away on December 17, 1943. Had she lived until tomorrow she would have been 101 years of age. Mrs. Knight's father served as a drummer boy in the Revolutionary War, and, as a Captain in the War of 1812.

Prior to her death Kansas Chapters brought happiness and cheer to our Real Daughters by remembering her with numerous cards, letters and gifts.

In making this report we all realize that it is the last report of the Real Daughters Committee. It has been a privilege and a pleasure to serve as State Chairman of this committee during the four years of Mrs. Berger's administration. 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## Reports of National Chairman and Vice Chairmen

## AMERICAN INDIANS

#### (Mrs. Loren E.) LEDA FERRELL REX, National Chairman

Greetings to the Kansas State Officers and to all of the Kansas Daughters.

The recording secretary has requested that I submit my report as national chairman although I have not as yet received reports from any of the state chairmen.

It may seem that much has been accomplished, but I feel that Commencement is the proper name for the three years just ending. The opportunity for service in the future is limitless.

The funds given to train Indian girls as war nurses were gratifying. Since the government has offered to furnish this training, our committee has sponsored no new trainees. No student nurse has been deserted however, and all were allowed to make their own choice. Cecilia Cuts the Rope, the girl supported by Ohio, is a magni-ficent example of the kind of gratitude which comes from a worthy person, yet she was one, so greatly handicapped. The spirit and good will created by Ohio in raising and in giving these funds is a real asset.

Important among the plans which the war disrupted are:

- To more completely furnish the Living Indian Room.
   To compile a hand book, giving information about the Indians.
- To collect color photographs of Indian life.
   The Traveling Library of Indian Books.

One of the most beneficial projects being carried on by this committee is the listing of all accredited Indian Schools with brief, definite information telling of their work and needs.

Some of these Indian Schools are to be designated as Approved Schools by the Indians Committee. The plan is to give scholarships in rotation and any assistance possible to these schools.

## AMERICAN RED CROSS

## (Mrs. Ralph B.) FRANCES D. EARP, Vice Chairman Western Division

#### Colorado,

Colorado Daughters have had a wonderful year in Red Cross work. Thirty-six chapters contribute this report: articles (sewing and knitting) 3,093; hours contributed to all kinds of work 59,515; amount of money, \$873.30; blood donors, 284; amount of blood donated, 451 pints; number attending classes, 24; number doing executive work, 71; number in motor corps, 14-contributed 3,962 hours; number in Canteen work, 41—contributed 16,224 hours; number in gauze room, 173—contributed 23,707 hours; number doing work for the blind, 7— contributed 1,801 hours; number who administered First Aid, 12; number working in armed forces, 247—contributed 22,723 hours; number of Gray Ladies, 16—contributed 4,241 hours; number of nurses' aides, 16—contributed 5,096 hours; other Red Cross work, 3,339 hours making a total of 140,608 hours in all types of work. Braille is being taught and gifts of cookies, kit bags, afghans, furniture, books and magazines are given generously to the boys. Kansas,

Kansas Daughters have served in the spirit, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." Forty-six chapters contributed to this report: number of articles (sewing and knitting) 1,938; number of hours in all types of work, 178,681; amount of money \$153.00; blood donors, 33; number attending classes, 71; number teaching classes, 22; number of nurses' aides, 17; number of Gray Ladies, 5; number doing work for the blind, 1. One member who lives in Virginia taught Nutrition; another served on the Civil Air Patrol of Texas; another served on the Junior Army and Navy Guild Organizations at the Great Lakes Station; another served 400 hours as a Nurses' Aide in a Des Moines hospital and gives one evening a week to the U.S.O. center. One chapter was instrumental in securing 80 sacks of flour and \$185.00 worth of supplies for Canteen work. Other chapters have furnished recreation and sun rooms in Camps and Hospitals, and supplied entertainment and refreshments for the soldiers. One chapter served 602,327 men and women in the service with 78,176 dozen cookies, 13,405 sandwiches and 245,058 cups of coffee, tea and kool aid.

Your chairman wrote 116 letters and visited one chapter. "May we always be the one to do for others, not others for us." Nebraska,

Number of articles (sewing and knitting) 2,114; number of hours contributed in all types of work, 137,228; amount of money given to the Red Cross, \$706.56; blood donors, 13; number of members attending classes, 108; number of members teaching classes, 21; number of nurses' aides, 16; number doing work for the blind, 2 chapters; number of members in all Red Cross activities, 409; two chapters contributed to Seeing Eye Fund and other chapters are doing service in various activities for the boys in the camps. Thirtyfour members are eligible for the service pins having over 750 hours since Pearl Harbor.

North Dakota,

Number of articles (sewing and knitting) 461; number of hours in all types of work, 9,224; amount of money to the Red Cross, \$267.00; blood donors, 2; number attending classes, 29; number teaching classes, 10; number of nurses' aides, 3; members working in other activities, 82; one is doing work for the blind. The state responded most generously toward the blood plasma fund. South Dakota,

Seven chapters contribute this report: number of articles (sewing and knitting) 6,524; number of hours contributed in all types of work, 8,263; number attending classes, 36; blood donors, 2; amount of money given, \$37.50; number of Gray Ladies, 10.

The members in each state are doing fine work in all Red Cross activities. Each state gave generously to the blood plasma fund. My 'Thanks' to Mrs. Pouch, Mrs. Geagley and Mrs. Berger for this honor of being your national vice chairman of the Western Division the past three years.

#### D. A. R. MUSEUM

## (Mrs. Garland P.) HELEN B. FERRELL, Vice Chairman Western Division

The Curator General, Mrs. C. Edward Murray, requested that the survey of the Museums, in which the D. A. R. have a part, be continued by the state chairmen and that supplemental reports be filed. No reports from Nebraska and South Dakota. Colorado, Mrs. Carley W. Halsey, Chairman.

The Colorado Society maintains a room in the State Museum at Denver. All articles must be approved by Dr. Hafen, curator of the State Museum, and must date not later than 1830. The display is composed of spinning and weaving equipment, historical china, a spoon mold, candle mold, candle sticks, sewing table, silver spoons, land grants, old deeds and papers. A most interesting piece is a chair used at the inauguration of Washington and is owned by Mrs. E. T. Boyd.

Kansas, Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell, Chairman: At Phillipsburg, Phillips County, the Phebe Dustin chapter re-ports, "We have in Phillips County a museum, housed in the Community Building. For the duration everything has been packed away and the two rooms are loaned to the Red Cross. Mr. L. L. Holben and the two rooms are nonned to the Red Cross. Mr. L. L. Holben is in charge. Mrs. Lloyd Robertson (one time state D. A. R. treasurer and national chairman of Student Loan) is on the Board. We had a meeting in the museum three years ago and Mr. Cecil Kingery lectured on the collection. Mrs. Leanore Morrison, one of the de-ceased D. A. R. members, left the museum her collection of pioneer relics."

At Fort Scott, Bourbon County, Molly Foster Berry chapter. In May 1942, at the Centennial celebration of Fort Scott, the regent of the Molly Foster Berry chapter officially dedicated the Fort Scott Historical Building, recently restored on historic Carroll Plaza, a military post in 1838. In this building are the relics of the Bourbon County Historical Society, recently turned over to the city by the Daughters of the American Revolution. To quote from the regent's report, "Furnished and opened to the public the local D. A. R. Museum to Fort Scott and community."

# STATE CONFERENCES 1938-1944

Forty-first Conference, Newton, Hotel Ripley, March 29-31, 1939, Miss Marion Seelye, State Regent, presiding. Mrs. Imogen B. Emery, National Chairman of the National Defense through Patriotic Education Committee, was guest of honor, delivering an inspiring address, "Let Freedom Ring," at the banquet. The Conference voted, ac an Anniversary project, to present a case to the National Museum in honor of Mrs. Stanley, and to place grave markers for Mrs. Guernsey and Mrs. Stanley upon approval of their families. It was decided that a committee should investigate the present location and condition of the Santa Fe Trail markers, placed by the Society years before. The Valley Forge Bell project was reported completed, the dedication to take place following the close of Continental Congress. New curtains and a chaise lounge cover had been provided in the Kansas Rest Room in Washington. The Conference voted to grant permission to the State Fish and Game Commission for moving the marker at El Quartelejo for the reconstruction of the original pueblo, providing several conditions were met. Mrs. J. N. Ryan graciously and efficiently served as Secretary pro tem in the absence of the Recording Secretary because of illness.

Forty-second Conference, Topeka, Hotel Jayhawk, March 18-20, 1940. This Conference was highly honored by the presence of the President General, Mrs. Henry M. Robert, Jr., who gave a stirring address at the evening meeting held in Memorial Hall. Other honor guests were Mrs. William H. Belk, Vice President General of North Carolina, Mrs. Loren E. Rex, Chaplain General, Mrs. Joseph G. Forncy, State Regent of Pennsylvania and Mrs. William H. Schlosser, State Regent of Indiana. Two new Chapters, Kanza at St. John and Ninnescah at Pratt, were reported as having been organized. The Conference voted to pay from the General Fund balances due on the following three projects in order to complete them: The wall bases for the Archives Room in Memorial Continental Hall, three given in honor of Mrs. Rex and three in honor of Mics Scelye; The Guernsey Memorial Organ, placed in Memorial Continental Hall, and the Museum Case, honoring Mrs. Stanley. Eunice Sterling Chapter presented D. A. R. Banner which is to accompany the Traveling Flag awarded each year to the Chapter showing the greatest increase in membership. The State Society requested National to be relieved of the uplecep of the dining room and kitchen in Memorial Continental Hall, retaining only the employees' lounge as its responsibility.

Forty-third Conference, El Dorado, Hotel El Dorado, March 25-27, 1941. Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, State Regent. Susannah French Putney Chapter, Mrs, Ralph B. Earp, Regent, hostess chapter. Mrs. William H. Pouch, past Organizing Secretary General and a candidate for the office of President General, Mrs. John Logan Marshall, Vice President General of South Carolina, Miss Marion Seelye, Vice President General, and Mrs. Loren Edgar Rex, Chaplain General, were honor guests at the conference. The splendid addresses of Mrs. Pouch and Mrs. Marshall added a great deal to the conference. Other honor guests wero Miss Catherine Campbell and Mrs. John W. Kirkpatrick, Honorary State Regents and past Vice Presidents Gen eral, Mrs. Payne H. Ratner, wife of Governor Ratner, Mrs. Carl E. Friend, wife of the Lieutenant Governor, Miss Marian Bienfang, Junior State President, C. A. R., and Miss Frances Hawkinson, Good Citizenship Pilgrim for 1941.

The conference voted to give in honor of the State Regent, Mrs. Berger, \$500 for one of the main corridors in the Sarah Corbin Robert High School under construction at Tamassee. During the conference members contributed and pledged \$359.00 for this project. Two new chapters, Lucretia Griswold Latimer at Eureka and Byrd Prewitt at Ulysses were reported as having been confirmed by the National Society. The State Registrar reported 165 members admitted by verification and reinstatement. Two scholarships for Tamassee and a generous cash gift for the heating plant fund at Kate Duncan Smith were reported by the State Chairman of Approved Schools. Liberal contributions to the National Endowment Fund, the Archives Room and the American Red Cross Ambulanco fund were reported.

The conference voted to place a bronze Santa Fe Trail marker on Pawnee Rock; adopt the merit system for selecting the Kansas Good Citizenship Pilgrim, and to make the El Quartelejo Pilgrimage and annual event.

In honor of their past National President, Mrs. William H. Pouch, members of the William Rittenhouse Society, C. A. R. of El Dorado presented a flag ceremony entitled "Kansas and Her Early Banners." Guest speakers at the conference included David L. MacFarlane, Dean of Men, Kansas State Teachers College.

Forty-fourth Conference, Hutchinson, Bisonte Hotel, March 12-14, 1942. Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, State Regent. Uvedale Chapter, Mrs. Wallace S. Wick, Regent, hostess chapter. Mrs. William H. Pouch, President Ceneral, and Mrs. Reubon E. Knight, Vice President General and National Vice Chairman of National Defense, greatly honored the conference with their presence and splendid informative addresses. Other honor guests were Miss Catherine Campbell and Mrs. John W. Kirkpatrick, Honorary State Regents and past Vice Presidents General, Miss Grace Meeker, Honorary State Regent, Mrs. Carl E. Friend, wife of the Lieutenant Governor, Miss Jean Peck, Junior National Historian, and Miss Marian Bienfang, Junior State President, C. A. R., and Miss Emily Bernstorf, Good Citizenship Pilgrim for 1942.

Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, State Vice Regent and chairman of the Kansas Corridor for Tamassee Fund, reported the required amount, \$500, had been contributed for the Kansas Corridor in the Sarah Corbin Robert High School at Tamassee. Other gifts reported for Approved Schools included a scholarship and Memorial Acre to Tamasscc and a frost proof drinking fountain to Kate Duncan Smith School. The Pawnee Rock Santa Fe Trail marker project was reported as completed; one new chapter, William Creekmore at Pleasanton, confirmed by the National Society, and \$76.50 contributed for the Sacombe Park Nursery Air Raid Shelter for British Children. (Note: Contributions made at a later date brought the total to \$98.00). It was reported that Kansas, and in honor of their President General, Mrs. George T. Guernsey, was the first state to contribute \$100 for the Preservation of Gowns of the Presidents General.

Nine chapters reported \$1,931 invested in war bonds and stamps. The State Registrar reported 220 members admitted by verification and reinstatement and a net gain of 94 members—the largest net gain in membership in 12 years. The conference voted to place a bronze D. A. R. insignia marker at the grave of Mrs. Robert B. Campbell, Honorary State Regent and past Vice President General. (Note: The marker with plate attached was placed on April 7, 1942). Speakers at the conference included Major Clyde D. Keith of Fort Riley, Mr. Howard T. Hill, head of the Department of Public Speaking, Kansas State College, and Mr. Frank S. Hodge of Hutchinson. The conference closed with the election of state officers to serve 1942-1944.

Forty-fifth Conference, Coffeyville, March 8-9, 1943. Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, State Regent. Jane Dean Coffey Chapter, Coffeyville, Mrs. Robert W. Diver, Regent, hostess chapter. Mrs. William H. Pouch, President General, and Mrs. John Logan Marshall, past Vice Precident Ceneral and member of the Tamassee Board, were honor guests at the conference. Their inspiring addresses added a great deal to the occasion. Other guests of honor were Miss Catherine Campbell and Mrs. John W. Kirkpatrick, Honorary State Regents and past Vice Presidents General, Miss Marian Bienfang, Junior State President, C. A. R., and Miss Roma Gatewood, Good Citizenship Pilgrim for 1943.

That Kansas Daughters had devoted many hours to all branches of war work was clearly indicated in the reports made at this conference. The State Society reported \$1,902.85 contributed for the expansion of the blood plasma program; a recreation room furnished at Fort Riley; a cash contribution sent for the nurses needs at the Nurses' Barracks and a radio for the WACS Recreation Room, both at Fort Riley. The Dodge City Chapter reported a War Work Room established in the Lora Lock Hotel. The State Chairman reported 4,750 articles made and 84,964 hours devoted to Red Cross work. The National Defense Chairman reported \$588,302.00 invested in war bonds and stamps by Kansas members and their families. A \$100 ' war bond, the gift of the National Society, was presented to the Kansas Good Citizenship Pilgrim.

Through the generous gifts of Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur and Mr. and Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell, the Kansas United States census records of 1860, 1870 and 1880 were microfilmed and presented to the National Society. One new chapter, Jeremiah Howard at Great Bend, was reported as confirmed by the National Society. The State Registrar reported 183 members admitted by verification and rein statement and a net gain of 76 members. The number of members dropped for non-payment of dues, four, was less than in any one of the preceding 23 years. Two scholarships to Tamassee and a sidewalk to connect Beeker Hall with the Library at Kate Duncan Smith were reported by the Approved School Chairman. New curtains were purchased and the furniture refinished and reupholstered in the Kansas Lounge in Memorial Continental Hall. Mrs. W. C. Summers, Regent of Betty Washington Chapter, presented to the State Society a gavel made from one of the logs from John Brown's cabin. The spavel was used at a Continental Congress by Mrs. Guernsey, President General. Guest speakers at the conference included Mr. W. M. Ostenburg, Superintendent of Schools, Coffeyville, and Lieutenant James N. Kelly, Jr., Chaplain, United States Army.

Forty-sixth Conference, Wichita, Lassen Hotel, March 20-22, 1944. Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, State Regent. Eunice Sterling Chapter, Mrs. Robert C. Foulston, Regent, hostess chapter. This conference, held in the Golden Anniversary year of the Kansac So ciety, (1894-1944), was greatly honored by the presence of Mrs. Joseph G. Forney, First Vice President General, Mrs. Samuel James Campbell, Treasurer General, Mrs. E. Thomas Boyd, Chairman of National Defense, and Mrs. John Trigg Moss, Parliamentarian of the National Society. The splendid informative addresses of our honor guests long will be remembered by the Kansas Daughters. Other honor guests were Mrs. Henry W. Townsend, State Regent of Missouri, Miss Catherine Campbell and Mrs. John K. Kirkpatrick, Honorary State Regents and past Vice Presidents General, and Miss Ruth Ann Wolf, Good Citizenship Pilgrim for 1944.

That Kansas Daughters had continued to give of their time, energy and money to help in the winning of the war was proved by the reports given at the conference. The State Society reported that during the year \$7,023.03 was received for the expansion of the blood plasma program bringing the total amount contributed through the chapters to \$9,108.88. From this fund, and in the name of the National Society, D. A. R., through the Kansas Society, the American Red Cross purchased and presented a mobile unit to the blood donor center at Columbus, Ohio. (Note: Soon after the close of the conference the Treasurer General advised the State Regent that the American Red Cross had assigned a station wagon and a panel truck to the San Antonio center in the name of the Kansas Society). The Junior Group of the Atchison Chapter contributed \$442.92 for a Metal Locator and locator fund. The State Chairman reported 178,681 hours given to Red Cross work and many members serving as Nurses' Aides, Gray Ladies and as chairmen of Red Cross committees. The National Defense Chairman reported 51,949 hours, not including Red Cross hours, devoted to war work, and \$612,804.65 invested in war bonds and stamps by Kansas members and their families. A \$100 war bond, the gift of the National Society, was presented at the conference to the Good Citizenship Pilgrim of 1944. From the Student Loan Fund the sum of \$1,554.00 was invested in war bonds to be held by the State Treasurer until the money is needed for student loans, or, if not needed, until the bonds mature. A sun room at Winter General Hospital was furnished by the Topeka Chapter.

Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, State Vice Regent and Chairman for the Kansas Star at Valley Forge, reported the project completed and the dedication set for April 13, 1944. Other outstanding historical work reported included the purchase of the oldest house in Wichita by the Eunice Sterling Chapter at a cost of \$3,000.00. In addition to equipment given for the high school building it was reported that five scholarships were given to Tamassee and four medical scholarships and a surgical sterilizer to Kate Duncan Smith School. The State Registrar reported 169 members admitted by verification and reinstatement and a net gain of 69 members.

Guest speakers at the conference included Dr. Thomas A. Williams,, Pastor, First Methodist Church of Wichita. The conference closed with the election of officers to serve 1944-1946 and Mrs. Berger, Honorary State Regent.

A recreation room was furnished at Fort Riley at a cost of over \$230.00; a sun room at Winter Ceneral Hospital costing over \$250.00, and numerous gifts of radios, furniture and drapes for recreation rooms at camps within the state. Ninetyeight dollars was contributed for the Sacombe Park Nursery for British children. In 1943 fourteen Kansas Daughters were serving in an enlisted branch of the service. Beautiful silk service flags were hung in the Kansas Lounge in Memorial Continental Hall and in the Kansas Room at Shawnee Mission.

Approved Schools, Chairmen: Mrs. L. J. Brenneman, 1938-39; Mrs. Lou B. Naylor, 1939-44. In addition to liberal contributions and numerous boxes of clothing sent direct to D. A. R. Approved Schools the following gifts were made between 1940-44: To Tamassee-\$500 for the Kansas Corridor in the Sarah Corbin Robert High School in honor of Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, State Regent; seven, \$115 and three \$100 scholarships; Memorial Acre and the following equipment for the new high school building: drinking fountain; marker and ceiling lights for the Kansas Corridor and the ceiling lights for three class rooms. To Kate Duncan Smith School:-\$97.60 for the heating plant fund; frost proof drinking fountain; sidewalk to con nect Becker Hall with the Library; four \$50 medical scholarships and a surgical sterilizer. The reports of the Treasurer General, 1941-44, show that Kansas Daughters contributed through her office \$2,436.79 to Approved Schools.

The District and Pilgrimage to Topeka plan of the preceding three years was continued in 1939, 1940 and 1941, with increasing interest being shown. In 1941, by vote of the State Conference, the merit system for selecting the State Pilgrim was adopted. Each year the State Pilgrim was the guest, with all expenses paid, of the State Society at the State Conference. By vote of the National Board of Management the State Pilgrims of 1943 and 1944 were presented a \$100 war bond in lieu of the trip to the Continental Congress. The following young ladies represented the Kansas Society as State Pilgrim: 1939, Ruth Irene Pederson, Everest; 1940, Mary Ellen Crawford, Sterling; 1941, Frances Hawkinson, Savonburg; 1942, Emily Bernstorf, Winfield; 1943, Roma Gatewood, Ellis; 1944, Ruth Ann Wolf, Manhattan.

D. A. R. Museum, Chairman: Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell, 1938-1944. In 1940, a display case, costing more than \$100, was placed in the Museum in memory of Mrs. W. E. Stanley, first National Officer from Kansas. In 1943 a bulletin board with marker was presented to the Museum by Eunice Sterling Chapter to honor the memory of Mrs. Robert B. Campbell, past Chapter Regent, Honorary State Regent and past Vice President General. In addition to monetary gifts twenty seven articles were presented to the museum, 1940 1944.

Genealogical Records, Chairmen, Mrs. Joe R. Beeler, 1938-40; Mrs. Harry A. Kunkle, 1940-42; Miss Edith Chesney, 1942-44. Splendid work was done by this committee and approximately 59 volumes of typed, indexed and bound genealogical material sent to the National Chairman to be placed in the D. A. R. Library. Duplicate copies of most of the material were sent to the Kansas D. A. R. Traveling Genealogical Library and to the Kansas State Historical Society.

Girl Home Makers, Chairmen: Mrs. John S. Lunceford, 1938-41; Mrs. John W. Dixon, 1941-44. The dresses entered in the Cotton Dress Contests were displayed at the State Conferences and a prize of \$5 awarded for the dress winning first place.

On April 23, 1939, Miss Marion Seelye, State Regent, dedicated the Kansas Bell in the National Carillon at Valley Forge. The Kansas Star on the National Birthday Bell in the Carillon at Valley Forge was dedicated on April 13, 1944, by Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, State Regent. In honor of their revolutionary ancestors members of the Kansas Society in 1943-44 paid for eleven "footprints" on the "steps to fame" in the Robert Morris Thanksgiving Tower at Valley Forge. In 1944 the State Historian compiled and sent to the Historian Ceneral the war service records of 456 relatives of Kansas Daughters. The Eunice Sterling Chapter, Mrs. Robert C. Foulston, Regent, purchased in 1944, at a cost of \$3,000.00, Wichita's oldest home which was built by D. S. Munger in 1868.

Incomplete chapter reports for 1942-1944 show that over \$1,307,072.00 had been invested in war bonds and stampe by chapters and members and their families; 2,186 Buddy Bags made and over 130,214 hours devoted to various branches of war work. #### STATE COMMITTEES

#### State Committees and their chairmen, 1938-1944

El Quartelejo Pilgrimage, Chairman, 1939, Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, As the result of a request from the State Fish and Game Commission to move the D. A. R. marker at El Quartelejo, located in the Scott County State Park, great interest was aroused in this historie site and at the Conference held in Nowton, it was suggested that a yearly pilgrimage to the Park be planned. It was thought, too, that such a Pilgrimage might be the means of linking more closely together the widely separated Chapters in the western part of the state. Arrangements for this first Pilgrimage, held June 20, were in charge of the three nearest Chapters, Ft. Supply Trail, Dodge City and Jonathan Gilbert, with Mrs. Shrewder, Mrs. Denious and Mrs. Robinson comprising the committee. A most enjoyable day, including a tour of the Park, a picnic lunch at Camp Christy and a program of historic interest, was arranged. Local citizens, with the assistance of Boy Scouts, extended every courtesy. A number of distinguished guests was present, in addition to members from six D. A. R. Chapters.

Second Annual El Quartelejo Pilgrimage, June 17, 1940, Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, Chairman. Members and their friends from nine chapters attended the meeting. The program started at 10 a. m. with a tour of the Park. A picnic luncheon at the Camp Christy Dining Hall was followed by the formal program. Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, Vice Regent and Chairman for the Pilgrimage, presided. Mrs. A. J. Berger, State Regent, and two Honorary State Regents, Miss Catherine Campbell and Mrs. Robert B. Campbell attended and discussed the history of the El Quartelejo Indian Pueblo and reviewed the manner in which the D. A. R. came into possession of the sitc and the crection of the beautiful granite shaft marking the exact location of the Pueblo. The Honorable J. C. Denious of Dodge City spoke of plans in Kansas for the 1941 Coronado observance. The chapters forming the hostess group were again, Ft. Supply Trail, Dodge City and Jonathan Gilbert with Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, Chairman, Miss Mary Aten, Mrs. L. L. Robinson and Mrs. W. H. Shattuck comprising the committee.

Third Annual El Quartelejo Pilgrimage, June 17, 1941, Mrs. J. C. Denious, Dodge City Chapter, Chairman. We were honored on this occasion in having with us our Honorary State Regent and Vicc President Ceneral, Miso Marion Seclyc, who brought greetings to the members assembled. The program included greetings from the State Vice Regent, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder; welcome and greetings from Mr. Floyd Cook, President, and Mr. John Norman, Secretary and Treasurer Scott City Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, State Regent, responded to the cordial welcome extended by Mr. Cook and Mr. Norman. Mrs. Clarence F. Drake, Regent of Eunice Sterling Chapter, gave a beautiful tribute to Mrs. Robert B. Campbell whose death occurred on June 2, 1941. It was during the State Regency of Mrs. Campbell the El Quartelojo marker was erected.

Jonathan Gilbert Chapter, LaCrosse, located 100 miles from El Quartelejo, is the nearest Kansas Chapter to the pueblo ruins. On account of the gasoline and tire rationing it was decided to discontinue the El Quartelejo Pilgrimages until a later date.

Santa Fe Trail Markers, Chairman, 1939-40, Mrs. A. J. Berger. The State Conference in 1939 authorized an investigation of the present location and condition of the 96 granite boulders placed by the Society in 1906-07 along the route of the old Santa Fe Trail. Mrs. Bcrgcr, with the cooperation of the State Highway Commission, accomplished this difficult and painstaking task in a thoroughly brilliant manner and later the State Department and County Engineers made repairs to markers where needed. A bronze Santa Fe Trail marker was placed on Pawncc Rock in 1942 by the State Society.

Shawnee Mission, Chairman: 1938-40, Mrs. Wayne F. Shaw. A complete list of the contents of the D. A. R. Rooms, both gifts and loans, was compiled by the Chairman. The Society cooperated in the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the Mission. The annual Pilgrimage each September, Olathe Chapter in charge, was an inspiration to those who attended. Mrs. G. D. Weilepp served as Chairman of this committee 1940-42, and Mrs. Ralph LaShelle, 1942-1944. With James Ross Chapter as hostess the annual Pilgrimage to the Mission was made in Soptember of each year. Several gifts, including a silk service flag to honor Kansas members in the service, were presented for the D. A. R. rooms. The State Society presented to Shawnee Mission the electric lights for the Living Christmas Tree on the Mission grounds.

Valley Forge Bell, Chairman: 1938-39, Mrs. A. J. Berger. The project of raising funds for the Kansas Boll in the Carillon at Valley Forge was completed in 1939 through the untiring efforts of Mrs. Berger. School children and other patriotic organizations were asked to contribute. On April 23, Kansas Daughters and others gathered in the Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge for an impressive ceremony during which the Boll was dedicated. Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick made the presentation speech and Miss Seelyo, • 3

State Regent, dedicated it. Rev. John Robbins Hart, D. D., rector of the Chapel accepted the Bell. Mrs. Leland S. Duxbury, Historian General, delivered the address. The inscription engraved on the Bell includes the names of all organizations which contributed to it. The Bell cost \$650, weighs 72 pounds and sounds the tone of E.

Kansas Corridor, Tamassee, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, Chairman, 1941-42. At the State Conference in 1941 the Kansas Society voted to contribute \$500 during the next two years, and in honor of the State Regent, Mrs. Berger, for a corridor in the Sarah Corbin Robert High School under construction at Tamassee. Under the splendid leadership of Mrs. Shrewdor this project was completed in less than one year.

Kansas Star, Valley Forge, Chairman, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, 1944. In less than thirty days the Kansas Chapters under the efficient leadership of Mrs. Shrewder contributed \$240 for the Kansas Star on the National Birthday Bell in the Carillon at Valley Forge. Several members of the Kansas Socity attended the impressive cere mony in the Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge on April 13, 1944, when the Kansas State Star was dedicated by Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, State Regent. Following an address by Mrs. Frederick Alfred Wallis, Historian General, the Rev. John Robbins Hart, Ph. D., rector of the Chapel, accepted the several gifts presented to Valley Forge on this occasion. The program closed with an address by Mrs. William H. Pouch, President General.

D. A. R. Directory Supplement: Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur, State Registrar, compiled in 1944 an excellent supplement to the 1938 Kansas D. A. R. Directory. The Supplement was published by the State Society and placed on sale at the 46th State Conference.

#### SPECIAL PROJECTS

Sacombe Park Nursery. In October 1941 the National Board of Management voted to sponsor a D. A. R. Nursery Air Raid Shelter for British Children. Kansas contributed \$98.00 and the nursery sponsored by the N. S. D. A. R. in England is the Sacombe Park Nursery.

Preservation of Gowns of the Presidents General. Through personal contributions made in 1941 by friends of the late Mrs. George T. Guernsey, President General from Kansas, \$100 was contributed for the Preservation of Gowns of the Presidents General in Memorial Continental Hall. Kansas was the first state to complete this project.

United States Census Records. In 1942 the State Societies were asked to have microfilms made of their United States Census returns of 1850, 1860, 1870 and 1880. Through the generous gifts of Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur and Mr. and Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell the microfilms of the Kansas returns were made and presented to the National Society. Kansas was the fifth state to complete this project.

#### CHAPTER HISTORY

#### D. A. R. Chapters Organized in Kansas, 1938-1944

Kanza Chapter, St. John, was organized January 24, 1940, with 13 members. Mrs. J. D. Stewart was elected the first Regent. It has more than doubled its membership, receiving a prize for this increase in 1942 and 1044 and has been interested in many lines of D. A. R. activity.

Ninnescah Chapter, Pratt, was organized January 24, 1940, with 13 members. Mrs. Leland Scrogin was elected the first Regent. It also has more than doubled its membership and won the Traveling Flags Award in 1941. Members have enthusiastically undertaken various D. A. R. projects.

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Lucretia Griswold Latimer Chapter, Eureka, Mrs. Hugh Dennis, Organizing Regent, was confirmed by the National Society on October 10, 1940. The chapter, named for the ancestress of Mrs. Dennis, organized with 13 members and doubled its membership within the first year. It has been represented at the state conferences and has been interested in many D. A. R. activities.

Byrd Prewitt Chapter, Ulysses, Mrs. David Shelton Forshee, Organizing Regent, was confirmed with 20 organizing members by the National Society on December 4, 1940. Eleven members have been added to the Chapter Roll. The chapter has been represented at the state conferences and four of the members have served as Pages and one as a delegate to Continental Congress. Byrd Prewitt Chapter, named for the Revolutionary ancestor of Mrs. Forshee, has taken an active part in all D. A. R. work.

William Creekmore Chapter, Pleasanton, was confirmed by the National Society on February 2, 1942 with 18 organizing members. The chapter, named for the Revolutionary ancestor of Mrs. William Spohn, Organizing Regent, has increased its membership and has been interested in many lines of D. A. R. activity. In 1943-1944 over \$100 was contributed for the expansion of the blood plasma program.

Jeremiah Howard Chapter, Great Bend, Mrs. W. A. Peschka, Organizing Regent, was confirmed with 21 organizing members by the National Society on June 12, 1942. The chapter, named for the Revolutionary ancestor of Mrs. Peschka, has increased in member ship and has been active in all D. A. R. work. It has been represented at the State Conferences and during its first year contributed over \$800 for the expansion of the blood plasma program.

#### STATE REGENTS

Miss Marion Seelye, elected State Regent in 1938 at the Conference in Pittsburg, had previously served the State Society as Vice Regent for two years and as Treasurer for seven years. She also served as State Chairman of the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage and of the National Historical Magazine. Becoming a member of the National Society and Abilene Chapter in 1920, she was elected to several Chapter offices, including Regent and Vice Regent.

Increase in membership was the foremost aim of her administra tion and, while a small loss occurred the first year, the net gain the second year was 49. Two Chapters were organized, Kanza and Ninnescah, and two others were nearly completed when her term ended. Much effort was expended in attempting to make the Penny Pines, a National Anniversary project, applicable in Kansas and, through the U. S. Forest Service, it was thought for a time that something might be found possible. However, no workable plan could be formulated.

Other Anniversary projects carried out were the gifts of six Wall Bases, at a cost of \$150.00 for the Documents Rooms, three honoring Mrs. Rex and three, Miss Seelye, and the Display Case, presented to the National Museum in memory of Mro. Stanley. Miss Seelye had the honor of dedicating three projects of the State Society; the Display Case mentioned above, the Kansas Bell at Valley Forge and the marker placed on the crypt where Mrs. Guernsey rests.

Investigation of the present location and condition of the Santa Fe Trail markers was made and interest revived in El Quartelejo, the early Indian Pueblo, to the extent that an annual pilgrimage to this historic site was inaugurated. In 1940, the State Regent personally gave a prize of \$10 to the Chapter showing the largest increase in membership and prizes of \$5, \$3, and 2 to the three Chapters organizing the most new Junior American Citizens Clubs.

The pages appointed to serve at Continental Congress in 1939 were: Mary Chaney, Elizabeth Chancy, Betty Chesney, Eleanor Harris and Frances Hawes. In 1940, they were: Mrs. Frank S. Hodge, Mrs. Ralph Winstead, Patti Payne and Phyllis Forshee.

At the close of the Topeka Conference, Miss Seelye was made Honorary State Regent and unanimously endorsed for the office of Vice President General. She was elected to this National office at the Continental Congress which followed, for the term 1940-43.

Mrs. (Alexander Joseph) Ruth Norris Berger of Arkansas City was elected State Regent in 1940 and re-elected in 1942. She served as State Vice Regent, 1938-40, and as State Registrar, 1933-38. In her chapter, Betty Bonney, she has served as Registrar, Vice Regent and Regent. During her term as State Registrar she established the card file system that is used by the State Society and compiled the Kansas D. A. R. Dircctory published in 1938. She assisted in the organizing of new chapters and in establishing eligibility for a large number of members admitted into the Kansas Society. In 1938-39 Mrs. Berger served as State Chairman of Radio and as chairman for raising \$650 for the Kansas Bell at Valley Forge which was dedicated on April 23, 1939. During 1939-40 she prepared a report on the condition and location, showing the location by maps of each county, of the 96 Santa Fe Trail markers placed in 1906 by the Kansas Society and State of Kansas. Copies of this report were filed with the State Regent, the D. A. R. National and State Libraries and the Kansas Historical Society.

During her four years as State Regent Mrs. Berger attended one special and all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She cooperated to the fullest extent in all lines of D. A. R. activity and placed special emphasic on war work, Approved Schools and membership. In less than two years \$9,108.88 was contributed through Kansas Chapters for the expansion of the blood plasma program. From this fund the American Red Cross purchased and presented in the name of the Kansas Society a mobile unit to the Columbus, Ohio, blood donor center and a station wagon and panel truck to the center at San Antonio, Texas. Kansas Daughters devoted over 315,574 hours to Red Cross work and made more than 35,182 garments and 2-186 Buddy Bags. Chapter reports for 1942-44 show over \$1,207,072.00 invested in war bonds and stamps by Kansas members and their families. A recreation room was furnished at Fort Riley by the State Society and \$98.00 was given for the Sacombe Park Nursery for British children. The Topeka Chapter furnished a sun room at Winter General Hospital and Kansas chapters made numerous gifts of radios, furniture and drapes for recreation rooms at camps within the state. The Junior Group of the Atchison Chapter contributed \$442.92 to the Metal Locator fund.

In honor of the State Regent the Kansas Society provided the Kansas Corridor in the Sarah Corbin Robert High School at Tamassee. From 1940-44 ten scholarships and a Memorial Acre were given to Tamassee and the following equipment for the new high school building: marker and ceiling lights for the Kansas Corridor; a drinking fountain, and the lights for three class rooms. Four medical scholarships; a surgical sterilizer; a frost proof drinking fountain; a sidewalk to connect two of the buildings, and \$97.60 for the heating plant fund were given to Kate Duncan Smith School. The Treasurer General's reports for 1941-44 show \$2,436.79 contributed through her office for Approved Schools.

Four chapters were organized, and including the April 15, 1944 Board Meeting, 769 members were admitted by verification and reinstatement into Kansas Society. There was a substantial net gain in membership each year.

In 1942 a large bronze Santa Fe Trail marker was placed on Pawnee Rock. The oldest house in Wichita was purchased in 1944 by Eunice Sterling Chapter at a cost of \$3,000.00.

In addition to monetary gifts twenty-seven articles were presented to the National Museum. This included a bulletin board given to honor the memory of Mrs. Robert B. Campbell. Each year several books were purchased and presented to the National Library. In 1944 all the books on the "Wanted List" sent out by the National Library were contributed.

Microfilms of the Kansas United States Census records of 1860, 1870 and 1880 were presented to the National Society. This gift was made possible by the generous gifts of Mrs. Vernon E. Mc-Arthur and Mrs. and Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell. Kansas was the fifth state to complete the project. Through personal contributions made in 1941 by friends of the late Mrs. George T. Guernsey, President General from Kansas, Kansas was the first state to contribute \$100 for the Preservation of Gowns of the Presidents General. The furniture was refinished and new drapcs and slip covers were purchased for the Kansas Lounge in Memorial Continental Hall.

In 1944 a splendid supplement to the 1938 D. A. R. Directory was compiled by Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur, State Registrar, and published by the State Society.

During her four years as State Regent Mrs. Berger wrote 12,206 personal letters and 10,899 postal cards relating to D. A. R. work and traveled many miles within the state to visit the Kansas Chapters.

The last official act as State Regent was the dedication on April 13, 1944, of the Kansas Star on the National Birthday Bell at Valley Forge.

Mrs. Berger is deeply grateful of the privilege of serving as State Regent of the Kansas Society. She can only hope to prove her gratitude by continuing to be of whatever service she can, and can wish no more for her successors than that they receive the same loyal and kindly support which she has received from the Kansas Daughters.

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On April 18, 1944, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, State Regent elect, placed in nomination the name of Mrs. Alexander J. Berger for the office of Vice President General. On April 19th Mrs. Berger was elected on the first ballot Vice President General of the National Society, D. A. R.

Mrs. Julius Young Talmadge, President General, has appointed Mrs. Berger chairman of the Spring, 1946 State Conferences; a member of the National Resolutions Committee and National Chairman of Genealogical Records Committee, 1944-1947.

#### DISTRICT MEETINGS

#### 1938-1944

Jane Dean Coffey Chapter, Coffeyville, was hostess to the Southeast District Meeting in May, 1938. Molly Foster Berry Chapter, Ft. Scott, entertained the District in May 1939; Oceanus Hopkins Chapter, Pittsburg, in May 1940; Dana Chapter, Columbus, in May 1941; Neodesha, in June 1942; Esther Lowrey Chapter, Independence, in June 1943, and Baxter Springs Chapter, Baxter Springs, in June 1944.

#### THE TRAVELING AWARD FLAG

This Flag was awarded to Courtney-Spalding Chapter in 1938; to Ft. Supply Trail Chapter in 1939 and to Baxter Springs Chapter in 1940. In 1940, Eunice Sterling Chapter, Wichita, presented to the State Society a beautiful silk D. A. R. Flag to be awarded with the United States Flag to the chapter making the largest percentage of increase in membership. The Traveling Award Flags were awarded to the following chapters: Ninnescah Chapter, Pratt, in 1941; Neodesha Chapter, Neodesha, in 1942; Ft. Supply Trail Chapter, Ashland, in 1943, and Kanza Chapter, St. John, in 1944.

#### MEMBERSHIP AWARDS

In 1942 and 1943 the State Regent, Mrs. Berger, offered a prize of \$5 to the chapter with less than twenty-five members and \$5 to the chapter with more than twenty-five members that made the larges net gain in membership. In 1942 Kanza Chapter, St. John, and Jane Dean Coffey Chapter, Coffeyville, were awarded the prizes. In 1943 the prizes were awarded to Neodesha Chapter, Neodesha, and Ft. Supply Trail Chapter, Ashland. In 1944, Mrs. V. E. McArthur, State Registrar, offered awards in the same amount and the prizes of \$10 each were awarded to Kanza Chapter, St. John, and Betty Bonney Chapter, Arkansas City.

Grave marker placed by the State Society on crypt in Mount Hope Abbey, Independence where Mrs. George Thacher Guernsey, President General from Kansas, rests. A bronze insignia of the National Society, with a plate beneath bearing the words, President General 1917-1920. The dedicatory ceremony was held on the morning of March 8, 1940, with more than fifty Daughters, relatives and friends present.

No data on the Town Flag-pole marker placed in 1940-41, as reported by the State Historian.

Santa Fe Trail marker placed on Pawnee Rock by the State Society, 1942.

Abilene Chapter cooperated with the County Historical Society in marking Sand Springs, 1941-42.

Bronze D. A. R. grave marker with plate placed by the State Society at the grave of Mrs. Robert Bruce Campbell in Maple Grove Cemetery, Wichita; April 7, 1941.

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Chisholm Trail marker placed by Wellington Chapter, 1942.

Site of the home of Judge William Margrave at the Old Officers' Post, 1942, by Molly Foster Berry Chapter, Ft. Scott.

#### CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Under the very enthusiastic and efficient leadership of Miss Marie Sellars, State President, the Kansas Society, C. A. R., grew and broadened its scope of work amazingly, following the organization meeting of the five Societies, held in Pittsburg, March 29, 1938. The first State Conference took place in the fall of 1939. Miss Sellars had appointed Senior State Officers to assist the Junior Officers, and had outlined in detail the duties of each. State Chairmen of several committees were appointed. Interest was aroused in patriotic and historic projects and funds contributed to various activities of the National Society. Each year a C. A. R. Breakfast was a regular feature of the D. A. R. State Conference and Greetings were brought either by the Senior or Junior State President. Several Societies were organized in the state until they numbered nine.

In 1942 the National Society, C. A. R., appointed Mrs. Jack Lane of Winfield, Senior State President of Kansas C. A. R. Under the capable leadership of Mrs. Lane, liberal contributions were made to various projects, foremost of these being the "Jeep Fund," the major war project of the National Society, C. A. R., and to Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith D. A. R. Approved Schools. At the meeting of the N. S. C. A. R., held in New York City on April 22, 1944, Mrs. Lane presented in the name of the Kansas Society, C. A. R., the Service Flag of the National Society, Children of the American Revolution.

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
