





#### OBJECTS

The objects of this Society as stated in Article 11 of the Constitution are:

# 1.

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

#### 3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, page 56.

#### INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

Chaplain: You have been duly elected to the office in --Chapter. Daughters of the American Revolution. Do you accept its responsibilities and duties?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to uphold the Constitution of the United States of America and to seek its observance by others?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, Daughters of the American **Revolution?** 

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to perform the duties of your office to the best of your ability and understanding, and that at all times you will conduct yourself uprightly, God being your helper?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: That which is gone out of thy lips thou shalt observe and do; according as thou hast vowed unto Jehovah thy God.-Deut. 23:23.

Collect: Lord, God, we pray that we may be joined together in loyalty;--these who now are placed in leadership, and we who have chosen them to guide us. Bless their faithfulness and ours, in a united service to our Society and to Thy kingdom. May we have an awareness of Thy companionship in all our plans and projects; and the assurance of Thy benediction upon our work. Amen.

#### GENERAL INFORMATION

Report immediately to the State Corresponding Secretary any change in chapter officer or chapter chairman.

Report AT ONCE all resignations, deaths, marriages, and members RECEIVED by transfer to the Treasurer General. Do not report a resignation, or transfer a member in arrears in dues. Only members in good standing may resign or be transferred.

Do not vote to grant a resignation. Report all resignations IMMEDIATELY. To delay may cause injustice, and the member to have to be dropped or the chapter to have to pay an additional year's dues.

Vote to receive a member by transfer, and notify the Treasurer General IMMEDIATELY of the acceptance of the member by the chapter.

Do not report names of members as transferred TO OTHER CHAPTERS UNTIL you receive notice from the Treasurer General that such transfers have been received.

Grant transfer card as soon as requested. Do not vote to grant transfer OUT of the chapter. Do not send transfer card to the Treasurer General. The member transferring gives it with a copy of her application paper to the chapter to which she transfers. Chapter from which member transferred DOES NOT REMOVE NAME FROM ROLLS WHEN TRANSFER CARD IS ISSUED, but does remove it from the rolls when notice is received from Treasurer General that transfer has been completed. Likewise, chapter to which member transfers does not add name to rolls when transfer card and application paper is received, but adds the name to the rolls as of the date on which the Treasurer General notifies the chapter Treasurer of BOTH chapters of date upon which transfer is completed.

Collect dues in time to reach Washington by January 1. DO NOT wait until December to begin to collect dues.

Send in late December all dues on hand. DO NOT wait for delinquents. Send all dues received after January 1 AS SOON AS RECEIVED. DO'NOT HOLD dues received after January 1 waiting for other members to pay. To do so may rob your chapter of rightful representation and a member of the right to serve as a delegate or alternate.

Send special funds for schools, scholarships, etc., for which State credit is desired to the STATE TREASURER, who in turn will forward to the Treasurer General.

Every Chapter Regent, Treasurer and Registrar, should have a copy of the D. A. R Handbook. The price of the Handbook is twenty-five cents. Orders with remittances should be sent to the Treasurer General, Administration Building N. S. D. A. R. 1720 D. Street, N.W., Washington 6, D.C.

#### ANNUAL SHAWNEE PILGRIMAGE September 17, 1946

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#### BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING

#### (Mrs. Dan) Ruth Hopson, Secretary

The State Board of Management, Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, met at Shawnee Mission, Kansas City, Kansas, September 17, 1946, at 10:00 a.m., with Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, state regent of Kansas, presiding. Devotions were led by the Chaplain, Miss Stella B. Haines. Miss Grace Meeker, honorary state regent, led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. Mrs. Shrewder gave a report of the summer's work; the publication of the Proceedings by Mrs. Ferrell and Mrs. McArthur; the revision of the by-laws by Mrs. Hornbaker and her committee; the compilation of the directory of officers and chairmen by Mrs. Harper; two circular letters to the chapter regents and one to the state chairmen by the state regent; the preparation of the stationery by Mrs. Hopson; the renovation for Shawnee Mission D.A.R. rooms by Mrs. Ashlock and her committee. Mrs. Shrewder announced her itinerary; the National Board Meeting, October 17, followed by the meeting of the national press relations committee of which she is a member; then to Tamassee October 20, and to Kate Duncan Smith, October 22, for the dedication of the drinking fountain and the sidewalk completed in Mrs. Berger's administration. This will be followed by district meetings, October 26 at Pittsburg, October 28 at Wichita, and October 30 at Hays, to hear the report of the National Board meeting.

Roll call showed the following present: State Offices, Mrs. Shrewder, Mrs. Feirell, Miss Haines, Mrs. Hopson, Mrs. Kambach. Mrs. Naylor, and Mrs. Weilepp. Chapter Regents, Mrs. T. F. Rudisill of Capt. Jesse Leavenworth; Mrs. Wm. L. Ainsworth of Eunice Sterling; Mrs. J. A. Boyd, of Fort Larned; Miss Grace Ruth Meeker of Gen. Edward Hand, and Mrs. E. E. Gladish of James Ross, Mrs. Tillie Karns Newman of Jane Dean Coffey; Mrs. C. E. Mullin of Susannah French Putney and Mrs. Harry Logan of Topeka. The Honorary State Regents were presented: Miss Grace Meeker, Miss Catherine Campbell, Mrs. John Warren Kirkpatrick Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, Mrs. Loren E. Rex.

State officers reports were heard: Mrs. Kambach, treasurer, reminded the Board that state dues of new members received at the May Board meeting must be paid. Mrs. Ferrell. vice regent had no report. Miss Haines, chaplain. reported that juvenile delinquency was the subject she was asking to have studied. Mrs. Naylor, registrar, reported a net gain of 15 since conference, making an approximate total of 2840 members at this time. She announced the membership prizes as follows: Mrs. Naylor to give \$5 to chapter for net gain in the three classes of chapters (those under 25; those between 25 and 50; those over 50.) Mrs. McArthur and Mrs. Shrewder to give \$15 first prize and \$10 second prize and \$5 third prize for net gain. Mrs. Ferrell to give \$5 to the D.A.R. chapter responsible for the most new C.A.R. members and \$5 to the chapter gaining the most Junior members (those under 30,) The serious illness of Mrs. John

Dixon, state historian, was announced. Mrs. Weilepp, reporter, stated that the new Public Relations Handbook would be received early in October. The Recording Secretary, Mrs. Dan Hopson, read the following recommendations from the executive committee meeting of September 16, and moved their adoption.

1. That the Regent's Bulletin be published four times a year, on a subscription basis. at 30%; subscriptions to be secured by the chapter press committee chairmen; publication contingent on 500 subscriptions being received by November 15, 1946. Seconded. Carried.

2. That a Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage be held in October following the National Board Meeting; and that meetings of the southeast, southwest and northwest districts be he'd immediately following in convenient order. That a report of the National Board Meeting be given by the state regent and chapter plans be heard at all meetings Seconded. Carried.

3. That \$5 be allowed for the prize for the cotton dress contest in the Girl Home Makers Committee. Seconded. Carried.

4. That \$5 and the silver History Medal be allowed for the prize for the history essay contest. Seconded. Carried.

No further business appearing, the state chairmen were invitea into the Board meeting.

Mrs. Berger, member of the National Committee for Erection of Memorial Bell Tower at Valley Forge spoke on this subject and urged that the contributions be made at once. It was announced that Harold A. Spatz of Lebo, Kansas, a Japanese victim of the Doolittle raid, had been honored by Mrs. D. F. Collinwood of Plains, at Valley Forge.

Mrs. Rex. national chairman of American Indians committee was introduced. Mrs. Ernest Klooz, state chairman of this committee reported that she had a letter ready for the chapter regents. Mrs. W. M. Ostenberg, chairman of Approved Schools urged a 20<sup>c</sup> per capita contribution to the Becker Hall Fund. Mrs. W. E. Baker announced that the Pilgrims from each state would again be taken to Washingfon, and introduced Mrs. Jack Lane, one of the district chairmen. Mrs. Howard Doyle asked all chapters to participate in the museum work. Miss Haines read Miss Maude Haver's report on Student Loan, asking each chapter to read the student loan report in the Proceedings at the January meeting. Mrs. Berger, as national chairman, reported on Genealogical Records for Mrs. Hal Black, commending Mrs. Black's work, and urging the importance of copying all records before 1900. Mrs. Harry Logan read Mrs. Harold Cone's Radio report. Mention was made of broadcasts on Constitution Day at Topeka and Wichita, and plans for special days at Hutchinson.

Mrs. Ferrell, state chairman of Resolutions, reported she had no resolutions to present, but read one from the Continental Congress, esking Congress to make Constitution Day a national holiday. She moved that the chapters be requested to observe Constitution Day in their own chapter programs. Seconded. Carried. Mrs. J. W. Hornbaker, state chairman of By-Laws Revision, reported that the Revisions committee had drafted new By-Laws, and planned to have a copy before the district meetings. Her committe had worked with the advice of the late Mrs. Moss and of Mrs. Fleming, national parliamentarians.

Mrs. Harry Ashlock, introduced as a wizard for her handling of Shawnee Misssion problems, gave an interesting report on the renovation and repair of the D.A.R. rooms. She commended Mrs. E. E. Gladish and Mrs. P. M. Krall of James Ross chapter for their cooperation. She reported the work was done with love, interest and \$241.37 cash. It was moved by Miss Haines that Mrs. Ashlock be authorized to order 144 decks of playing cards, with a picture of Shawnee Mission, to be sold for 75% a deck. Seconded. Carried.

Mrs. Ferrell moved that the secretary be instructed to send a vote of thanks to Mrs. Ashlock and her committee for their fine work, and also to thank the James Ross chapter for its cooperation, and to Mr. Harry A. Hardy, state custodian of the Mission, for his work. Seconded. Carried. Shawnee postal cards were announced for sale to supplement Shawnee Mission Fund.

Mrs. Ferrell moved that the stcretary be instructed to send **a** note to Honorary State Regent, Miss Marion Seelye, expressing regret at her absence. Seconded. Carried.

Mrs. Shrewder asked all regents to read to their chapters the President General's comments in the preface to the N.S.D.A.R. Directory of Committees. She announced the receipt of two tickets for the forthcoming national election, and mentioned that Mrs. Berger's name appeared on Mrs. John Logan Marshall's ticket by the unanimous endorsement of Mrs. Berger by the Kansas State Conference. Mrs. Berger responded and remarked that she appreciated the loyalty of her state.

After various announcements of plans, the meeting of the Board of Management adjourned.

At 12:30 under the stately old trees on the Mission grounds, the members and visitors gathered for a picnic lunch and program. Luncheon plans were in the hands of James Ross chapter. A delicious picnic luncheon. brought by members attending, was arranged on tables, by the Committee; Mrs. E. E. Gladish, regent; Mrs. P. M. Krall, Mrs. Don McCombs, Mrs. R. C. Harry, Mrs. H. A. Richeson, Mrs. Floyd Fugate, Mrs. Lena Scurlock, Miss Florence E. Gephart and Miss Alice Dods.

As the guests assembled for luncheon from the window of the D.A.R. rooms came the strains of Long Long Ago sung by Mrs. Mattingly. Words by Mrs. Harry Ashlock were as follows:

Mrs. Shrewder appointed as tellers Mrs. C. P. Traxel, Mrs. C. L. Bruner, Mrs. Jack Lane, Mrs. G. G. Anderson, and Mrs. A. H. Epperman.

While the vote was being counted Mrs. Marshall and Mrs. Edwin Stanton Lammers addressed the Conference informally. Mrs. Shrewder thanked the resolutions committee for its work. The report of the tellers was received. Mrs. Shrewder announced the 49th State Conference had endorsed Mrs. Loren E. Rex for the office of vice president general for election at the Congress in May 1947, by a vote 72 to 22. Mrs. Harper, corresponding secretary, was instructed to inform Mrs. Rex. The ballot was ordered destroyed.

Martha Loving Ferrell, Minisa, Randolph Loving, and Wichita chapters extended an invitation to the State Conference to meet in Wichita, March 1948. Mrs. Harris Landrum, who brought the invitation was instructed to carry back to the chapters the thanks and acceptance of the Conference.

### REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

### STATE REGENT

### (Mrs. Roy Valentine) Dorothy Berryman Shrewder

(Containing the report of her activities as national vice chairman of Membership and as a member of the special Committee to Formulate Policy of Press Relations and Certain Standing Committees.)

One year ago the plans were laid which have been fulfilled during these months that have passed. We have gathered here at Dodge City in Annual Conference to give an accounting of that work, accomplished through the various channels of our Society. As each officer and chairman and every chapter regent has had her part in the accomplishment of the work, it is for them to report. As state regent I have had tasks of my own to perform and it is of these that I would speak especially. It will be difficult not to touch, at times, upon the work of the others as it is the cooperation of us all that has made possible the reporting of a splendid record achieved by the Kansas Society during the year of 1946-47.

With many Kansas Daughters I attended the 55th Continental Congress held in Atlantic City where it was my privilege to work on the Resolutions Committee throughout the Congress. This appointment continues through until the close of the present administration. Working on this committee is an interesting but a confining job, for the committee meets early and works late as suggested resolutions come to it constantly through every day of the Congress and these in turn must be considered and prepared for presentation to the delegate body for adoption.

The Railroad strike made the Congress an uncertain and exciting time and hurried and harried were most departures from Atlantic City.

During the Summer I attended many meetings of the faithful By-Laws committee, at work on the revision of the State By-Laws. I commend their work to you as the product of thorough study and very sincere effort. Their faithfulness to their task during the Kansas Summer is an example of real devotion. Several visits in the interest of Membership and organization of new chapters were made during the Summer also by the regent.

In September the Annual Shawnee Mission Meeting was held in celebration of Constitution Day. A lovely day was spent at the old Mission with Mrs. Loren E. Rex as speaker. Her topic was appropriately American Indians. It was at this time that a resolution was passed changing the Shawnee Mission meeting from September to October, in order that a report of the October National Board Meeting might be brought to those attending. It was also voted that the Northeact District should act as hostess to this meeting annually, holding at this time its Fall District Meeting and it is hoped that the other districts of the state will hold their meeting following, in rotation This would prove of real assistance in reaching all parts of the state and representatives of many chapters in preparation for the Fall work, and should increase the general interest and accomplishments of the society's program.

In October I attended the National Board of Management Meeting and at this time experienced a hotel strike in Washington, D.C. which made the meeting difficult as members of the board were scattered throughout the city and arrangements for meetings of various kinds had to be changed and many were the adjustments and the scurrying here and there trying to locate meetings or keep appointments. The Board was followed by a most delightful trip south for a visit at the D.A.R. schools Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith, At Tamassee we were the guests of the school for a week-end. We stayed in the dormatories, ate in the dining hall, attended the Sunday Services and the dedications of the sites of the Auditorium-Gym-nasium and the Chapel, were privileged to sit on a Tamassee board meeting and derived such pleasure from our associations with the boys and girls of Tamassee. It was a heartwarming experience and we left Tamassee with real regret. Our day at Kate Duncan Smith was especially interesting and here we again enjoyed the hospitality of the school. We attended a dedication service in Becker Hall and had a most delicious luncheon in the school dining hall. A highlight of my visit there was a visit with the public health nurse, Miss Fredericka Beal, a Kansan, who has spent several years at Kate Duncan Smith, where she has done much for the children who attend the school and the people of the surrounding mountain country. Her "vitamin program" was of special interest and it was gratifying to know that the Kansas Daughters through the medical scholarships scnt to the school were contributing to a program which means so much in health building and in the general happiness of the children who attend the school and indeed, for the general welfare of the entire region. \$3.40 provides the necessary vitamines for a child for 168 days or a school term. We left with the promise from Miss Beal that she would visit the Kansas chapters on her first vacation home this Summer. A treat is in store for those chapters fortunate encugh to have her.

Mrs. A. J. Berger accompanied me on this trip. We went by train as far as Birmingham and returned from there by plane—another strike overtaking us on the way which necessitated a change in reservations from T.W.A. to other air lines. We arrived home just in time to attend the Fall District meetings.

Three district meetings were attended in late October—at Pittsburg, at Wichita and at Hays. The Vice Regent, Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell accompanied me on these visits. We drove, starting from Wichita and returning there from the last visit at Hays.

A hurried trip East was made in February to attend the National Board Meeting and a meeting of the Special Press Committee. At this, as at all board meetings of the past year, the number of applications presented through the Kansas chapters was most gratifying. It has been the custom of your regent to procure the data from the applications passed which would assist the state registrar in keeping her records up to date and avoiding much delay occasioned by waiting for the information from individuals or from chapters, who in turn must wait for the information to reach them from the National Society. Notes of welcome were sent to the new members whose names were procured also. At one of these meetings it was a thrill to hear of the confirmation of a new chapter, Minisa, at Wichita. Minisa is a chapter of 31 members, every applicant a new member and every application presented, accepted. The state is indebted to Mrs. V. E. McArthur, membership chairman for her patient and painstaking work which made such a record possible. We look forward to completing the work on at least two new chapters during the coming year, the ground work of which has been substantially laid during this past year.

A series of late Fall chapter visits was climaxed by a visit to Saint Francis Boys' Home at Ellsworth. One is impressed not only by the fine work that is being done there under the direction of the Reverend Robert M. Mize—Father Bob, to the boys—but of the general need for all manner of things to make a house confortable and attractive. Many Kansas chapters and individual members have done much for Saint Francis Boy's Home. As we review our first year's service and realize that we have been generous, may we rededicate ourselves to greater service and more definite effort and generosity for these boys who are resuming a normal life and fitting themselves to take up the burdens and privileges of citizenship. May we continue to have the satisfaction, as the years go by, of assisting in so worthy and so vital an endeavor.

Two invitations for service outside the Society, and representing the D.A.R. had to be regretted as the meetings conflicted with former plans. In both cases representatives attended on behalf of the Society. The Governor's Council on Teacher's Salaries in Topeka was attended by the State Treasurer, Mrs. Frank J. Kambach and the Institute of Citizenship at State College in Manhattan was attended by Mrs. Hugh Burham, member of Polly Ogden chapter. I am most grateful for the kindness of these members in attending these meetings as representatives of the Kansas Society and for the splendid information gained on each occasion. Apropos to both occasions it may well be mentioned that "Education is a better safeguard to liberty than a standing army. If we retrench the wages of the schoolmaster we must raise those of the recruiting sergeant." (Edward Everett 1794-1865.)

Three main projects were stressed and goals set for the year's accomplishments; One was membership, our goal was 3000 members for Kansas on this date. Our gains were splendid, but our losses through death and unfortunately through resignation were too great and so we have fallen short—by a very small margin, to be sure, but alas, short. We will continue to stress membership during the coming year and we shall hope to increase the membership—and so the interest—of every chapter in Kansas. We must build up some of our chapters, we must keep up the steady growth of others and we must organize more chapters—and always with emphasis upon young members, to guard against the years.

Two administration projects, Valley Forge and the Auditorium-Gymnasium at Tamassee have been stressed and great accomplishments made in both fields. The detailed reports to be given by those in charge of the direction of these two projects in the state will fill our hearts with pride. I would still stress these two projects, however, in the final days between now and Continental Congress. Splendid as has been our work and that of the other states, the great increase in building costs has outdistanced us and funds are still needed to complete the buildings as planned. Each is of the utmost importance in its own way. Each is a project of the National Society, which we must not fail.

In the many interests and fields of work sponsored by our society, Kansas Daughters have done their share and I am proud to know that it is a goodly share. It speaks of the fine spirit of cooperation and interest within the state and of the vigor of the State Society. For this interest and cooperation I would express my thanks and congratulate you the Kansas Daughters upon work well done.

There are many things for which I wish to say thank you—for 'the many lovely invitations to visit chapters and for the courtesies given me as state regent by all chapters and members. I regret that it has not been possible to accept all invitations—nor even to keep all appointments made to visit or to speak. My failures have always been unavoidable and deeply regretted. The splendid chapter yearbooks that have come to my desk with those helpful lists of members and inspirational programs, have been so enjoyed. I want especially to thank my own chapter for its continual understanding and help, for its splendid cooperation in always meeting the enthusiasm of an oft times over enthusiastic regent. I must thank the members of my family, who have done so much to make possible my work and travel for the Daughters of the American Revolution. They have truly made it possible many times in many ways, by assuming tasks that were mine and in helping me to accomplish tasks too large for one. My C.A.R. daughters have folded and mailed the Regent's Bulletin and posted innumerable letters.

Two numbers of the Regent's Bulletin have been put out under the new subscription plan with Mrs. C. P. Traxel as business manager and Mrs. John C. Reese as assistant editor. The new enterprise needs additional subscriptions if the Bullentin is to keep out of the "red".

Never a year's work is ended but that we look forward to the beginning of another. Wc do look forward definitely to two projects for the year of 1947-48. One, membership, I have already mentioned: the other is the much needed redecorating and refurnishing of the Kansas Room for the D.A.R. clerical staff in Washington. It is hoped that this Conference will see its way clear to endorse a plan for the accomplishment of this work in the immediate future. This is our contribution to the upkeep of the D.A.R. buildings in Washington. Almost a complete renovation has been made and we look very dingy and shabby in comparison. With your permission the redecoration will be authorized and a committee on the procuring of funds for new furnishings will be set up.

As I review the miles of travel that have been necessary to accomplish my chapter visits—actually thousands of miles traveled back and forth across the state, I am reminded once again of the very great need of a systematic travel schedule for the state regent; a schedule that would permit visits to more chapters with less expenditure of effort; a schedule that would mean more to regent and to chapters in the way of inspiration and information exchanged. Some chapters are repeatedly missed because it is impossible to go back to them, when a visit might have been made in conjunction with another. Wont you think this over and let me try out some such plan beginning early next Fall? Our work would get under way much more quickly and we would all work much more easily and more efficiently. We do need efficiency in our organization. We are not keeping step in this direction with other women's organizations, and it is very trying to our younger members—if comfortable to some of the rest of us.

As I close this my third year as your state regent, I can think back over all of those glorious years of pleasure, of service and of fine friendships with the greatest satisfaction. They have been years of working together in the state and with the national administration. A new administration is to take office in May and while your old regent will thrill to the pleasure of setting up the new projects in accordance with new plans she is convinced that it would be much better if a new state regent could take up the torch for you and for the society—and be able to carry that torch throughout the next administration. It has been such a satisfaction to set up, to develop and to finish the nationally stressed projects these three years. I do commend it to your thinking and ask your sincere consideration of such a plan—to make the term of office of the state regent and officers coincide with that of the national cabinet.

We need other things in our state. We need very badly sufficient interest and effort on the part of our members to make possible the reorganization of the C.A.R in our state. The regent can give complete cooperation to the state president of the C.A.R. She has done this and has been responsible for new C.A.R members. She has attended, representing the state president and on her own behalf as national chairman of Red Cross in the C.A.R. Society, 3 national C.A.R. Board Meetings in Washington this past year; but C.A.R. needs YOUR cooperation. It needs more Promoters, more Societies organized and leaders; more effort on your part on behalf of YOUR children. I beg of you heed the call to service which will be given by the C.A.R. President, Mrs. David S. Jackman as she reports to you. If you will but look to the C.A.R. you will be building for the future of D.A.R. and for America.

As National Vice Chairman of Membership, Western Division the state of Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota, come under my supervision. It is my duty to compile at the close of each year a comparative table of the loss and gain, the special efforts and prizes awarded by these states. At a meeting of the committee during the Continental Congress it is my duty to report and to answer for my states. This has been accomplished and I look forward to the round table at Congress with much pleasure as I have an overall gain to report for the Western Division.

As a member of the Committee to Formulate Policy of Press Relations and Certain Standing Committees my work has been most interesting. I have attended three meetings of this committee. The projects of the society which have received special mention in the press, both favorable and unfavorable have been the study of this committee and ways in which we might better our relations with the public. As stated by the Society's Press Relations Advisor—"Public Relations is intangible. Publicity does not mean putting a piece in the papers. Publicity is only one of the tools of Public Relations." As Public Relations is the business of making friends, it then stands that every member of the society is a good or a bad public relations officer according to the things she does or says affecting the work of the society. Press releases have received considerable attention and a new, enlarged press policy has been adopted. The Press Release Digest is an outgrowth of the work of this committee, the final report of which will be given by its capable chairman, Mrs. Roscoe C. O'Bryne at the 56th Continental Congress.

During the last days of this year, it has been my pleasure to attend two State Conferences of neighboring states. As the guest of the Colorado Society I enjoyed a lovely day at the foot of the Rockies in the beautiful Broadmoor Hotel, where the Colorado Daughters reported wonderful accomplishments for their year just closed. My visit was brief but packed with pleasure and inspiration. I made the trip by train, returning home to work on final plans for my own Conference before starting on the 570 mile drive which was to take me to Scottsbluff, Nebraska to the Nebraska State Conference. There I spent the entire time of their Conference and gained so much in the three days of activities there. It is surprising how similar are our efforts in the different state societies, yet how different our approach to the same ends. Next year in Kansas should definitely be a better year because of the information gained through these visits and the inspiration gained through the lovely contacts and friendships formed. I have still another State Conference in Oklahoma to attend the week following this our own.

The presence of National Officers and National Chairmen at a State Conference add much in so many ways and it has been such a pleasure to anticipate the visits from members of the National Board for our 49th Annual Conference. As we have planned definitely for the visits from our First Vice President General, Mrs. John Logan Marshall and Mrs. VanCourt Carwithen, national chairman of Approved Schools and Mrs. Edwin Stanton Lammers, national chairman of Junior American Citizens and our two neighboring State Regents, Mrs. James C. Suttie of Nebraska and Mrs. Lewis L. Stone of Oklahoma, we realize how fortunate will be the Kansas Daughters for the inspiration that is to be ours because of their presence among us. It is their devotion to the high principles and activities of our society, and your devotion, that makes possible the splendid work or the Daughters of the American Revolution.

## STATE VICE REGENT

From the close of the State Conference, March 1946, to the installation ceremony at Continental Congress in May, your vice regent yet served her state as recording secretary. Immediately following the State Conference work was begun on editing and compiling the reports of the Conference for printing in the annual Preceedings. The council and assistance of the State Regent, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, and the retiring State Vice Regent, Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur, are greatly appreciated. The copies of the Proceedings came off the press the last week in June and were immediately placed in the mail, and, so far as can be ascertained, Kansas was the first of the state societies to mail out Proceedings, the past year.

In addition to attending Congress in Atlantic City last May, your vice regent attended the annual meeting at Shawnee Mission in September, the District Meetings in October and has been present at all meetings of the Executive Committee and the Board of Management of the State Society. The visits to a number of chapters were greatly enjoyed.

The duties of the vice regent have been light but she has stood ready at all times to assist, in any way possible, the state regent.

Following the decision, last October, of the National Board of Management that names of state and national officers—past and present might be placed in a special section in the Memorial Bell Tower at Valley Forge, and at the suggestion of the national historian that a chairman for this special project be appointed by the state regent, your vice regent was so appointed early in December.

I attended the September 17th meeting at Shawnee Mission and took the minutes of the Board of Management meeting. I attended the organization meeting of the Northeast Kansas District, and the meeting of the Northwest district meeting at Hays. I have signed the vouchers for the expenditure of state funds and answered all correspondence. I sent out the blanks for the reports of officers, chairmen, and chapter regents, for the fortyninth annual state conference. It was a pleasure to be the guest of the Jeremiah Howard chapter, and to met the Jonathan Gilbert, Kanza and Fort Larned chapters, at Great Bend, on Armistice Day.

### STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

### (Mrs. Jesse C.) Melville Campbell Harper

Following State Conference letters of appreciation were sent to the Topeka chapter, Topeka Chamber of Commerce and all those who took part in plans and programs to make the conference a success.

March 31st. Cards were sent to three regents asking for return of Officer Information Blanks.

April 10th. Cards were sent to twenty-six incoming regents reminding them the chapter committee chairmen lists must be in on April 15th.

May 15th. To each State Officer was sent a typewritten list of her respective chapter officers' names and addresses, with a list of all chapter regents names and addresses.

To fifty-seven chapter regents and fourteen state officers and honorary state regents was sent a one page mineographed compilation of names of all national officers, names and addresses of state officers, state parliamentarian and state chairmen.

May 25th Immediately following Continental Congress lists of all officers of each chapter in Kansas were sent to the organizing secretary general.

To each state chairman was sent a list of names and addresses of her respective chapter chairmen, and list of names and addresses of all chapter regents.

January 1st. To fifty-eight chapter regents were mailed letters concerning State Conference and Continental Congress, and enclosing three Officer Information Blanks and two Credential Blanks, the return of which was asked for before February 10th.

To fourteen state officers and honorary state regents were mailed letters concerning State Conference and Continental Congress.

January 29th. A letter was sent to each of the fifty-eight incoming chapter regents requesting her to place the names and addresses of her committee appointees on blank provided for that purpose to be returned before April 15th.

February 25th. Twenty-five regents were notified by card that either or both, Officers Information Blank or Credential Blank, had not been returned.

It will be noted that all mimeographed letters prepared for chapter regents have also been sent to all state officers and honorary state regents so that they may all be aware of the progress of the business of the state.

The organizing secretary general was notified of all changes in chapter officers and the state chairmen were notified of all changes of chapter chairmen that were received by this office.

During the year four hundred twenty-five pieces of mail have been sent out and four hundred forty two pieces, including twenty-two year books, have been received.

In the proposed By-Laws under the Duties of the Corresponding Secretary, Article V Section 5, the Corresponding Secretary is directed to "Compile these lists into a directory for the ensuing administration." These lists referred to are the chapter officers directory and the chapter chairman directory, both of which directories are to be placed together in one binder for the coming administration and must be prepared in advance of the time when they will be needed.

Anticipating the passage of this By-Law and preparing for the needs of the incoming administration, the Annual Chapter Officer Directory of the Fifty-eight chapters for 1947-48 is finally completed. A copy of this Directory will be sent to the organizing secretary general at the close of Continental Congress, to the state regent at the close of State Conference.

The compiling of a Directory is a time consuming task. Two thousand forty-three names were used and one hundred twelve hours consumed last year in preparing these lists for the retiring administration. Every card that must be written asking for more complete address or zone number or fuller name, and every card sent asking that blanks be returned, is a time consumer and holds up the progress of the work of this officer. If chapter regents. and all members for that matter, would just read carefully the directions sent out to them from the state officers and state chairmen, and then try to meet adequately the dead lines set for their replies, there would be no end of time and energy saved. All the machinery of the state's business

would run along on a more even keel. To all chapter regents may I say, please keep all copies of the State Regent's Letters and her Bulletin, also communications from the Corresponding Secretary, keep them in a file for ready reference; thus many a letter of inquiry may be avoided. Keep the Handbook and the D.A.R. Magazine at hand for your use.

Much time and thought on the part of your officers have been spent trying to streamline the state work, so as to reach a higher point of efficiency with a smaller expenditure of time and energy. This ideal state can only be reached when every communication is read carefully and complied with as soon as possible.

It has been a distinct honor and a pleasure to serve the Kansas Society a third year as corresponding secretary. With sincere appreciation I wish to thank all chapter regents for their fine cooperation and for the many courtesies that have been accorded me.

It is my privilege and pleasure to bring to this 49th Kansas D.A.R. Conference the report of state reporter, whose duties also include those of State Press Relations chairman. Due to the fact that we had a State Conference and a National Congress in 1946 D.A.R. publicity shows a marked increase. Kansas has 58 chapters and this year there have been 52 chapter press chairmen. The regents of the other six chapters served as press chairmen. To these press chairmen and regents go the credit for this most gratifying report. Their response and promptness have been excellent. Newspapers all over Kansas, both daily and weekly, have given us liberal space andKansas Society D.A.R. has had fine dignified publicity. Contact has been made five times this year with the chapters and in January a questionnaire was sent asking for a report from each chapter. For the first time since I have been making reports to you as Press Relations chairman, I can report 100% chapter publicity. This alone makes for a good National Press report.

All national, state and chapter news reports have been compiled in an indexed scrapbook and state reports have been sent to Mrs. James O'Brien, national press chairman, and to our state regent and to the state recording secretary.

I am happy to report 7000 inches of national, state and chapter publicity this year and the use of 144 pictures. Susannah French Putney chapter, Eldorado, through the splendid efforts of Mrs. M. J. Long, chapter press chairman, reports the largest number of inches of publicity this year, 1080, and 35 pictures used. James Ross chapter Kansas City, Mrs. L. B. Naylor, press chairman, is second with 311 inches and Martha Vail chapter. Anthony, Mrs. Donald Muir, chairman with only 35 members and only weekly papers available, is third with 271 inches reported. Very outstanding publicity has been done this year by four (4) small chapters, Arthur Barrett, Dana, Samuel Linscott and Kanza, all reporting well over 100 inches each of publicity in weekly papers. Randolph Loving chapter, Wichita, had two one half page spread pictures.

The thanks of Kansas Society is again extended to our official state papers, Topeka Capital, Wichita Eagle and Wichita Beacon for their cooperation and generosity in giving so much fine space.

I deeply appreciate the chapter yearbooks and personal messages sent me throughout the year.

In the year ahead under the efficient leadership of our state regent, may we all work for a greatly increased interest in all D.A.R. publicity.

#### C.A.R. PROMOTERS AND JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

## (Mrs. Earl C.) Mae F. Moses

Your state chairman attended the Annual Junior D.A.R. Assembly Dutch Treat Dinner and Breakfast which preceded the Contintental Congress in Atlantic City. It was the tenth anniversary of the Junior Daughters of the American Revolution Assembly. It was indeed an inspiration, to hear what the young women all over the United States were accomplishing. Statistics show that the membership of the young women has increased, and that they are becoming more interested in the work that the Daughters of the American Revolution are doing. Before the Assembly meeting, letters were sent to all the Junior chairmen, informing them of the time and place of the various events of the Junior Assembly in Atlantic City:

In September letters were again sent to all 57 chapters informing them of the projects adopted and the work planned for the year by the Junior Assembly. A letter followed in November, urging interest and participation in the Valley Forge project, also in the other projects of the Juniors. A letter was enclosed concerning the organizing of C.A.R. societies, and information of general interest to all members. 33 chapters have appointed Junior Membership chairmen. In January a questionnaire was sent to all the chapters concerning their Junior Membership and C.A.R. societies and our "Scholarship Family" news was included. 35 chapters have replied. The contribution to the Junior projects was generous. The work done by the Atchison chapter committee is the most outstanding. There are 21 members in their group. 4 new members this year. Their chapter regent attends all their meetings and they occasionally attend the chapter meetings. They paid Girl Scout dues, \$14.00, also Christmas gifts to them totaling \$11.00; \$5.00 to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund; \$5.00 each to Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee Schools; \$5.00 to Red Cross; \$5.00 to Cancer Control; \$5.00 to St. Francis Boy's Home. They also sponsor a C.A.R. society.

Many chapters have presented the Junior Membership plans to their chapters. I am grateful to all for their fine cooperation, letters and cards.

# CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

# (Mrs. R. E.) Lena Welch Odell

For the second consecutive year Kansas has had 100% chapter chairman of Conservation. The work of the 44 chapter chairmen reporting, reveal much work accomplished and a real understanding of the human and natural Conservation work. With our Country at peace, the D.A.R. of Kansas have turned to the conservation of human lives and to the saving and helping of the youth of our state. A total of \$1370.29 was reported spent on Becker Boys and Girls; Scouts; 4-H; Camp Fire Girls; Reserves and Boys' State. This does not show the hours of leadership nor the number of advisors and councilors from among our chapter members.

Clothing, old and new, was donated. Awards, cash prizes, were given, all to encourage our boys and girls to be better citizens.: Twenty-four chapters reported work done for and with the Salvation Army, hospitals, foreign born, aged and crippled, at a cost totaling \$845.00.

Ten chapters reported especially fine work with polio patients in homes and hospitals. One chapter donoted to an Iron Lung.

Three chapters donated canned goods to hospitals. The sum of \$326.00 donated for civic and charitable work, shows work done in Y.M.C.A. and delinquent youth. Nine chapters held health clinics. The Highway Traffic Program has been carried out through six chapters, teaching safety in homes and on streets, \$60.00 spent.

Cancer Control has been stressed in 30 chapters with \$252.00 donated. Three county commanders and cne state chairman for this work are members of our D.A.R. One chapter is making cancer dressings. Other health programs, Red Cross drives, T. B. Association and March of Dimes have received \$750.00 from our members and all chapters responded with personal help. Kansas chapters planted 2309 trees, 3220 shrubs, and 1850 bulbs, 4 Historic Trees were marked.

Fire prevention was stressed in five chapters with one program. 847 lbs. of fat was reported sold or given to the Camp Fire Girls to. be sold, by 25 chapters.

22,550 lbs of paper, 11 chapters fought waste, 110 gardens with 14,993 quarts canned. Three nutrition classes. Ten chapters reported fight on rodents and 13 chapters have sent in seeds for our War Service Gardens and \$4.00 in cash. Seven programs have been presented on the different phases of Conservation.

One old American flag of the 1860's was preserved and presented to the State Museum. Conservation work in Kansas for 1946 has been of vital interest.

## CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG COMMITTEE

#### (Mrs. D. L.) Vering S. Moberly

There were 47 of our 58 chapters that sent in reports. Among the activities of the various chapters are the following: 3 large flags, 164 small flags, 340 Flag Codes and 500 leaflets were distributed to new members, schools and clubs; 25 corrections on the use of the flag and 28 talks were given to chapters and schools. There were 7 guest speakers and 5 presented specially planned programs; 14 had publicity in their local papers. Nine original papers were written and one pageant presented; 26 had programs of the flag; 15 gave flag quizzes; 7 sponsored essays on the flag in which over 300 school children took part and 5 gave prizes; 27 planned special programs for Flag Day.... 13 flags were presented to an Americanization class.

The best report of all is that of the 47 chapters give the pledge at every meeting and the correct salute and all but a very few who lack a piano, sing our National Anthem. This is the twelfth annual Good Citizenship Pilgrimage contest to be sponsored on a nationwide scale by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The year just completed finds all chapters with National Defense chairmen. 28 have submitted reports. Our state chairman has sent three communications dealing with the work of the committee and written letters to several Congressmen commending them for their stand on certain Legislative matters.

We have 50 paid subscriptions to the News, these have been placed in schools, libraries, colleges, Y.W.C.A. and St. Francis Boys' Home.

The amount in War Bonds and Stamps is \$28,560.

Twenty-eight programs have been given, including "Constitution of the United State," "United Nations," Juvenile Delinquency," "International Peace Program."

Eunice Sterling used National Defense material at Y-teen program, Radio programs have been featured over Columbia, N.B.C., and Mutual Broadcasting networks by Jeremiah Howard chapter.

All chapters observe some holiday, Washington's Birthday and Flag Day being the most popular.

Forty-two Manuals for Citizenship were distributed, literature given to Scouts, Schools and 4-H groups. The Constitution and America History is taught in most of our schools. 6 Good Citizenship Medals were awarded. Chapters cooperate with patriotic groups in their localities.

Abilene assists with 20 Junior American Citizens clubs while Oceanus Hopkins had a Washington's Birthday tea with ten patriotic groups as guests.

Many round table discussions have been held. Members serve on election boards and urge citizens to vote. Children are taught to respect the law by observing city ordinances.

World Geography was emphasized by programs on "World Progress," "Tension Areas," and other titles of interest.

The 3 R's were remembered by, Reconversion. Henry Dawson cooperated by helping Veterans find employment, Rehabilitation, A number of Kanza chapter was a R.N. on a hospital ship for three years, now home doing nursing. Martha Vail, promoting Roadside Park as Veterans Memorial. Newton has Gray Lady and assists Veterans through community groups. Henry Dawson have camp and hospital committee, gave gifts at Christmas and provided entertainment for patients at air base hospital. Eunice Sterling sponsors American Syrian Club, assisted with gifts and plans for Christmas party at Veterans hospital, support Gray Lady's Corps. Betty Bonney assisted Mobile Unit in making X-Ray and blood tests, 3000 children and grown-ups took these tests.

Freedoms have been emphasized by special programs on "Bill of Rights," "Education through Posters." To promote understanding of our Freedoms the Olathe chairman attended an Inter-racial meeting.

Our Youth movement has been taken care of through talks on juvenile delinquency, Schools of Religious Education and Baxter Springs cooperated with local movic house in bringing juvenile pictures for Saturdays. Members work with Scouts, Y.M.C.A., 4-H Clubs, schools, Sunday Schools recreation centers and many contribute to St. Francis Home for Boys. Edward Hand maintains a youth center which is used one night a week by negro children.

Our Legis'ative study has not been neglected as many letters have been written to Congressmen on Immigration, Naturalization, Federal Education and Socialized Medicine. Many round table discussions have been held on this exceedingly important subject. Opinions vary as to Universal Military Training.

My sincere thanks to all chapters for making this report possible.

- WHEREAS, The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in Congress assembled on May 23, 1946, adopted as part of the Conservation Program, the accuisition of a parcel of acreage of Redwood forest known as the "National Tribute Grove", as a living memorial to service men and women of World War II; and
- WHEREAS, the California State Society Daughters of the American Revolution has already contributed over three thousand dollars toward the purchase price of twenty-six thousand two hundred dollars for one of these "parcels", now, therefore be it
- RESOLVED, that the Kansas State Society Daughters of the American Revolution in State Conference assembled adopt the "D.A.R. Parcel in the National Tribute Grove" project, as a part of its Conservation work. and assist in completing the purchase price through chapter and individual members donations of Five Dollars each for each service man or women's name to be listed in the Golden Book of Memorials in "The National Tribute Grove."

#### CANCER CONTROL

- WHEREAS, The members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, have a sincere interest in Human Conservation and do recognize the outstanding work of the American Cancer Society in the fields of RESEARCH, EDUCATION and Service, be it,

## CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG COMMITTEE

With 163 chapters in five states, 111 reported. 20 large and 698 small Flags were presented to schools, clubs, Americanization classes and new members; 2773 Flag Codes and 648 Flag Leaflets were distributed; 44 corrections and 80 talks were made; 14 guest speakers; 26 chapters had publicity in local newspapers; 25 papers were written and 11 pageants given: 49 chapters had Flag programs; 54 had Flag quizzes; 12 chapters sponsored and 321 wrote Essays; 15 chapters gave prizes; 5 made 'scrapbooks. 66 chapters sing the National Anthem at every meeting; 118 give the Pledge of Allegance correctly at every meeting.

Special features were: one chapter presented Flag Codes to a club of foreign born war bridos; one Radio program mentioned the display of the Flag at the World Series, Rose Bowl and Orange Bowl games; History of the Flag, in a pageant on Flag Day, on the Colorado Capitol grounds; one chapter gave Flags to new citizens on "I am an American Day"; one chapter presented the United States Flag and a city flng, for the entrance to the Denver Mountain Park; one chapter joined with the American Legion and the Kansas State School for the Deaf in sponsoring a Flag Contest, with 259 students participating.

You have heard the very fine report of Mrs. Howard Doyle, Kansas state chairman, six gifts to the Muscum and contributions amounting to \$49.00. This amount appears to be the largest ever to have been contributed in any one year, except on a special project.

Kansas members who will be attending Continental Congress should avail themselves of the opportunity to become acquainted with your Museum, the only strictly historical museum in the city of Washington. The state rooms have been restored and you will find much of interest in each room. 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# BY-LAWS

# of the

# KANSAS STATE SOCETY

## of the

# NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

# Revised and Adopted at the State Conference March 27, 1947

# ARTICLE I.

Name

The name of this society shall be the Kansas State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

# ARTICLE II.

#### Object

Section I. This Society pledges fidelity and loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the objects of which are:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary and enlightening public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Section 2. Its purpose shall be to further the above plans of the National Society and to maintain harmonious co-operation among the chapters in Kansas and to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

#### ARTICLE III.

#### Membership

Section 1. The membership of this State Society shall include all Daughters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who are members in good standing of some Chapter in Kansas. Good standing shall be interpeted to mean that all National and State dues have been paid.

Section 2. Chapters failing to pay State dues shall not be entitled to representation at State Conference, to receive State Communications or participate in any State affairs until dues are paid to the State Society.

# ARTICLE IV.

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be State Regent, . State Vice Regent, State Chaplain, State Recording Secretary, State Treasurer, State Registrar, State Historian, State Librarian, State Reporter, and State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 2. No member shall be eligible for election to any state office or appointment to any state chairmanship who has not been a member in good standing of the Kansas State Society for one year. No member shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms, and no member who has served one term in any state office, shall be eligible to election to any other state office, except that of State Regent and State Vice Regent, until the expiration of one year.

A member having served more than one half term in any state office shall be deemed to have served a term. A candidate for State Regent must have served as an elected Chapter Regent. A candidate for any state office, except that of Corresponding Sccretary, must have served as an elected chapter officer.

Section 3. Election of officers shall take place on the last day of the annual State Conference occuring in the year of the election of National Officers.

Election shall be by ballot, for a term of three years.

A majority of votes cast shall elect.

The terms of office of the State Regent and State Vice Regent begin at the close of the Continental Congress which confirms their election.

The officers of the Kansas Scciety shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected and confirmed, beginning with the year of 1950.

Provided that. at the next regular election, to be held in 1948, the officers shall be elected for a two year term.

Section 4. The nominating committee shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the October State Board of Management meeting.

This elected member shall serve as chairman of the nominating committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to submit names of candidates for the state offices on the second day of the annual State Conference of election year. Nominations other than those made by the nominating committee may also be made from the floor. All candidates must have given their consent before nomination.

The nominating committee shall, immediately after November first, notify all Chapters of impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted.

Candidates shall be selected from all districts of the state.

No person shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a, vote at State Conference.

Section 5. When the several candidates for State Regent are nominated, each in turn shall nominate her State Corresponding Secretary. The ballot cast for a State Regent shall serve, automatically, as a ballot for her State Corresponding Secretary. Thus each is an elected officer. In no other instance may two officers be elected from the same chapter.

Section 6. In recognition of valuable service to the State Society the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by acclamation at a State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent.

#### ARTICLE V.

#### Duties of Officers

Section 1. STATE REGENT: The State Regent, in addition to performing the duties which pertain to her office, according to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, shall preside at all meetings of this Society, of the Executive Committee, cf the State Board of Management and to the Kansas Delegation to the Continental Congress. She shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for, sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer for moneys appropriated by the Society, and may call meetings of the Executive Committee or Board of Management whenever she may consider it important and necessary. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter General Chairman, prepare the program for the Annual State Con ference. She shall present at the Annual State Conference all amend ments proposed to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society and such other matters as she may deem worthy of consideration. She shall be a member of the printing committee. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees, excepting a nominating committee. •

She shall record all changes in membership sending to the State Treasurer, to have recorded in the State Treasurer's books, all membership reports received from the National Society, following each meeting of the National Board. The State Treasurer will duly record the same.

Upon her confirmation, the incoming State Regent may appoint a State Parliamentarian, and Consulting Genealogist.

Section 2. STATE VICE REGENT: The State Vice Regent, in the absence or disability of the Regent, shall perform the duties pertaining to the office of Regent. She shall be a member of the printing and stationery committee and a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. STATE CHAPLAIN: The State Chaplain shall officiate in the offering prayer and other religious services when requested by the Regent. She shall be a member of the Memorial Committee.

Section 4. STATE RECORDING SECRETARY: The State Recording Secretary shall keep a correct record of all meetings of the State Conference, the State Executive Committee and the Board of Management. She shall be chairman of the Printing and Stationery Committee; countersign all orders drawn on the Treasurer and signed by the Regent. She shall prepare the proceedings for the Annual State Conference for publication, subject to the approval of the State Regent, and perform such other duties as pertain to her office.

Section 5. STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: The State Corresponding Secretary, under the direction and supervision of the Regent, shall notify all state Officers and the Regent of each . chapter in good standing of the time of the Annual Conference not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall give notice of meetings of the Executive Committee, and Board of Management as directed by the State Regent. She shall be the chairman of the committee on credentials. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, immediately after the close of Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the various chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each state chairman two typewritten copies of the list of names and addresses of her respective chapter chairmen (one of which is to be sent to her National Chairman and the second one for She shall compile these lists into a directory for the her own use.) ensuing administration.

Section 6. STATE TREASURER: The State Treasurer shall collect all moneys and disburse the same only upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. All moneys received by the Treasurer shall be deposited in some reliable bank in her name as State Treasurr, and all payments made by her shall be by check. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit the same to a Certified Public Accountant before the Annual State Conference. She shall be custodian of all bonds and policies belonging to the society. She shall be bonded by the State Society for the sum of \$2,500.00 for the faithful discharge of the duties above defined. She shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan Notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall be a member of the Executive and Credentials Committees.

Section 7. STATE REGISTRAR: The State Registrar shall keep the card file as established; assist in proving cligibility claims; prepare the Kansas Directory Daughters of the American Revolution, when ordered by the Society; check her membership file against the records of the State Treasurer immediately after July first. She shall keep a file of all reports received from the National Society and these are to be delivered with the State Card file, and all other material dealing with the work of the office, to her successor. She shall be a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 8. STATE HISTORIAN: The State Historian shall take charge of all the historical papers received by the Society and shall catalogue and arrange the same, placing in a locker at the State Historical Society at Topeka, such historical documents, and all materials for preservation. She shall be chairman of the Memorial Committee. She shall prepare the Smithsonian Report.

Section 9. STATE LIBRARIAN: The State Librarian shall have supervision of the State D.A.R. library. She shall prepare a report listing all material sent to the National Library and all books records, and other material received for the State Library, during the year, for publication in the State Conference Proceedings. On retiring from the office, the State Librarian shall send to the newly elected Librarian and to the State Regent a complete list of all material on file in the State D.A.R Library, and given over to the newly elected State Librarian.

Section 10. STATE REPORTER: The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the State Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be State Chairman of the Publicity Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files (or Scrap Book) and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D.C.

Section 11. All officers and Committee Chairmen upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, all moneys, accounts, record books, papers or other property belonging to the Society.

#### ARTICLE VI.

#### Meetings

Section 1. The supreme governing body of this society shall be a Conference. An annual meeting of the Kansas State Conference shall be held in March unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or by the State Board of Management. The purpose of this conference shall be to receive reports of the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen; for the election of officers and for any other business that may arise. Section 2. Each State Chairman shall compile a typed report of not more than three hundred words covering the work accomplished by her committee for the year ending February twenty-eighth. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary by March first, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Each Chapter Regent shall send a report of the work and plans of her chapter, for the year ending February twenty-eighth, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary immediately after March first. This report shall be typed, and limited to two hundred fifty words, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Section 3. The Kansas State Society shall be divided into four districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively.

A Director, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected at an annual district meeting to be held in the fall. The District Director shall not be eligible for reflection, until the expiration of one year. Each district shall entertain the State Conference in rotation; the time and place to be determined by the hostess district and the State Regent. The Southwest District shall entertain the State Conference in 1948.

Section 4. The voting members of the Annual State Conference shall be the State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, and Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the first Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates, regularly elected by Chapters as hereinafter specified, provided they have been members of their Chapter for one year and are in good standing.

Section 5. Twenty-five voting members shall constitute a quorum at the meeting of the Annual State Conference.

Section 6. Chapters of less than fifty members shall be entitled to representation at the Annual State Conference by the regent and two delegates. Chapters having membership of fifty to one hundred shall be represented by their Regent and five delegates. After the first hundred, representation shall be in the ratio of three delegates for every subsequent one hundred. Alternates shall be elected for each Chapter Regent and delegate.

Section 7. Delegates and alternates shall be elected at the January meeting of their Chapter in each year, and certificates of their election signed by the Regent and Treasurer of their Chapter, shall be sent to the State Corresponding Secretary for the Committee on Credentials by February first. Vacancies that occur in the delegation may be filled by the Regent from alternates duly elected for that purpose at the January meeting.

# ARTICLE VII.

#### Board of Management.

Section 1. The State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, and Chapter Regents, shall constitute a State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over affairs of the State Society to do and transact business during the interim between the meetings of the State Society. The State Board shall meet at the call of the State Regent at least twice a year. A meeting of the State Board shall be held immediately preceding the opening session of the State Conference.

A Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held in October, following the National Board of Management meeting, and this meeting shall be termed the official Fall State Board Meeting; the Northeast District shall act as hostess annually, at Shawnee Mission. Meetings of the Southeast, Southwest, and Northwest Districts shall be held immediately following in convenient order and a report of the National Board meeting be given by the State Regent and chapter plans be heard at.all meetings.

Other meetings may be held upon the call of the State Regent or upon written request of seven members of the Board of Management. It shall recommend to the Annual State Conference such patriotic and historic work as seems desirable to be undertaken by the Society. Eleven members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have power to fill vacancies in office until the next election; the election to fill such vacancies shall be by ballot, notice of the vacancy having been given in the call for the meeting of the State Board.

Section 4. All officers, the Board of Management and Committees shall make reports of their work for the year, at the Annual State Conference.

## ARTICLE VIII.

#### Executive Committee

Section 1. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Recording Secretary, State Registrar and State Treasurer, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three members.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall make a report at each meeting of the Board of Management.

### ARTICLE IX.

## Committees.

Section 1. The Regent shall appoint a Student Loan Committee consisting of three members who shall supervise the Kansas D.A.R. Student Loan Fund.

The Regent shall appoint a Conference Committee which shall consist of the Reporter and two other members.

There shall be a Printing and Stationery Committee which shall consist of the Recording Secretary, Vice Regent and Regent.

A Memorial Committee shall consist of the Historian, Chaplain and one other member.

The Committee on Credentials shall consist of the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and one other member.

# ARTICLE X

# State Funds

Section 1. Each Chapter, belonging to the State Society shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before January first of each year the sum of \$1.35 for each member, in good standing on the Chapter rolls on that date.

Chapter Treasurers shall furnish, with each remittance of dues, a list of members for whom she is paying.

Chapters failing to pay above per capita dues shall be delinquent February first and not entitled to representation at State Conference.

Representation of Chapters at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon number of dues in the hands of the State Treasurer by February first.

The Treasurer shall notify chapters of their standing on February first.

Section 2. Life Members shall be counted in the basis for representation. Chapters shall count all Life Members in their Representation and State dues should be paid for full representation.

Section 3. Stationery and postage, and in cases of emergency, telephone and telegraph charges, which charges shall be validated by the Executive Committee, shall be furnished to the State Officers and State Committees.

Section 4. A sum not to exceed \$500.00 per year shall be allowed the State Regent for her expenses in carrying on her work.

Section 5. To partially defray her expenses to the State Conference, each State Officer shall be allowed the sum of \$12.00, provided however, that no expenses will be allowed an Officer when the Conference is held in her own home city. Section 6. No provision is made for expenses of Honorary State Officers.

Section 7. In addition to the obligations specified in these By-Laws, no debts or liabilities shall be incurred except by vote of the Conference.

# ARTICLE XI.

#### Chapters.

Section 1. It is recommended that election of chapter officers, for a term of three years, take place in January, occurring in the same year as the election of state officers. Chapter officers shall be installed and take office in May, following the confirmation of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent at Continental Congress.

On or before February first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks to be furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter Officers for the ensuing year.

The Regent-elect of each chapter shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on or before April first, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of all newly appointed chapter chairmen.

# ARTICLE XII.

# Parliamentary Authority

Section 1. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order revised, shall govern this Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

#### Amendments.

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendments has been sent to the State Regent and each Chapter at least sixty days before the Annual State Conference.

Section 2. Amendments to these By-Laws shall take effect at the close of the Annual State Conference at which they are adopted.

#### STANDING RULES.

# ARTICLE 1.

Section 1. The Recording Secretary with the Regent shall see that arrangements are made for the publishing of Proceedings of the State Conference which are contained in the files of the Recording Secretary, the expense of such report to be born by the State Society.

The Recording Secretary shall send a copy of the printed Proceedings to all State Officers and Chapter Regents, State Chairmen, and to such other persons and libraries as shall be designated by the State Regent.

When an election has occurred, it shall be the duty of the retiring Recording Secretary and retiring Regent to compile these proceedings and arrange for their publication.

Section 2. Board of Management meetings may be attended by State Chairmen, District Directors, Chapter Regents' representatives and other interested members, on invitation of the State Regent, except when the Board is in Executive session.

# ARTICLE II.

Section 1. \$25.00 shall be allotted the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

Section 2. \$50.00 shall be allotted the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Congress.

Section 3. Daughters attending State Conference and accepting the courtesies thereof, shall pay a registration fee of \$2.00 such fee to be allowed the hostess chapter.

#### ARTICLE III

Section 1. These rules may be amended, suspended or repealed at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of voting members present.
