The objects of this Society as stated in Article 11 of the Constitution are:

1.

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, page 56.

We thank Thee for all those yesterdays of our human race whose lessons and fulfillments have become a heritage to us. Continue, we pray, Thy blessings upon this nation, that all who are a part of it may learn true nobility of manhood and womanhood.

Grant us growth in understanding and increasing devotion to righteousness. Amen.

INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

Chaptain: You have been duly elected to the office in ——Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Do you accept its responsibilities and duties?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to uphold the Constitution of the United States of America and to seek its observance by others?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to perform the duties of your office to the best of your ability and understanding, and that at all times you will conduct yourself uprightly, God being your helper?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: That which is gone out of thy lips thou shalt observe and do; according as thou hast vowed unto Jehovah thy God.—Deut. 23:23.

Collect: Lord, God, we pray that we may be joined together in loyalty;—these who now are placed in leadership, and we who have chosen them to guide us. Bless their faithfulness and ours, in a united service to our Society and to Thy kingdom. May we have an awareness of Thy companionship in all our plans and projects; and the assurance of Thy benediction upon our work. Amen.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Report immediately to the State Corresponding Secretary any change in chapter officer or chapter chairman.

Report AT ONCE all resignations, deaths, marriages, and members RECEIVED by transfer to the Treasurer General. Do not report a resignation, or transfer a member in arrears in dues. Only members in good standing may resign or be transferred.

Do not vote to grant a resignation. Report all resignations IMMEDIATELY. To delay may cause injustice, and the member to have to be dropped or the chapter to have to pay an additional year's dues.

Vote to receive a member by transfer, and notify the Treasurer General IMMEDIATELY of the acceptance of the member by the chapter.

Do not report names of members as transferred TO OTHER CHAPTERS UNTIL you receive notice from the Treasurer General that such transfers have been received.

Grant transfer card as soon as requested. Do not vote to grant transfer OUT of the chapter. Do not send transfer card to the Treasurer General. The member transferring gives it with a copy of her application paper to the chapter to which she transfers. Chapter from which member transferred DOES NOT REMOVE NAME FROM ROLLS WHEN TRANSFER CARD IS ISSUED, but does remove it from the rolls when notice is received from Treasurer General that transfer has been completed. Likewise, chapter to which member transfers does not add name to rolls when transfer card and application paper is received, but adds the name to the rolls as of the date on which Treasurer General notifies the chapter that the transfer is completed. Treasurer General notifies Chapter Treasurer of BOTH chapters of date upon which transfer is completed.

Dues should be in the hands of the Treasurer General and the State Treasurer by January Ist. Do not wait for delinquents.

Send special funds for schools, scholarships, ets., for which credit is desired to the State Treasurer, who in turn will forward to the Treasurer General. All contributions must be in the hands of the State Treasurer by January 31 to be included in the report of the current year.

Every Chapter Regent, Treasurer and Registrar, should have a copy of the D. A. R. Handbook. The price of the Handbook is twenty-five cents. Orders with remittances should be sent to the Treasurer General, Administration Building, N. S. D. A. R. 1720 D Street, N. W., Washington 6, D. C.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

CONTINENTAL CONGRESS—The Fifty-ninth Continental Congress will be held in Washington, D.C., April 17-21, 1950. Certain rules will have to be followed in making hotel reservations, again with the Washington Housing Bureau. Directions will reach you at a later date.

NATIONAL BOARD OF MANAGEMENT—The next meeting of the National Board of Management will be held October 10, 1949. Applications for membership and reinstatements should be sent to the Treasurer General not later than September 15.

STATE CONFERENCE—The Fifty-second Annual State Conference will be held in Topeka, March 9, 10, 11, 1950. Hotel Jayhawk headquarters. All room reservations must be made direct with the hotel. The Northeast District is hostess. Registration fee is \$1.00.

SHAWNEE MISSION AND DISTRICT MEETINGS—The annual Fall State Board of Management meeting will be held at Shawnee Mission, Thursday, October 20, 1949. Northeast District meeting will be held at Shawnee Mission, Friday, October 21; Northwest District meeting will be held at Junction City, Monday, October 24; Southeast District meeting will be held at Independence, Wednesday, October 26; Southwest District meeting will be held at St. John, Friday, October 28.

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EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS

The Executive Committee, Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, met at the Hotel Muehlebach, Kansas City, Mo., October 28, 1948, with Mrs. William L. Ainsworth, State Regent, presiding, and all officers and State Parliamentarian present.

The treasurer's report was given. Mrs. G. B. Harrop moved that an undesignated balance of \$25.00 be transferred to the General Fund. Motion carried.

Mrs. Harrop, State Registrar, reported on special prizes for membership gains.

Mrs. Ainsworth gave Mrs. Kambach an order to inspect the material in the files of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, located in the Kansas State Memorial Library.

The following recommendations were moved and carried:

- 1. That steel filing cases be purchased for the records of the State Registrar, at a cost not to exceed \$60.00.
- Conforming to a resolution of the 1948 State Conference, pledging support to the National Building Project, that the 35¢ apportioned to the per capita tax be diverted to the National Building Fund for the two years (1948-1950).
- 3. That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, give \$25.00 to the National Tribute Grove Fund.

Pursuant to the call of the State Regent, Mrs. William L. Ainsworth, the Executive Board of Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, met at the Broadview Hotel, Emporia, Kansas, January 4, 1949, at 11:00 a.m., with Mrs. Ainsworth presiding. Present were Mrs. Ainsworth, Regent; Mrs. Frank J. Kambach, Vice Regent; Mrs. C. E. Mullin, Treasurer; Mrs. G. B. Harrop, Registrar; at the invitation of the Regent, Mrs. Roscoe W. Graves, Parliamentarian, also attended.

OFFICIAL OPENING

RESOLUTIONS

Fifty-first Annual State Conference Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution

T

Resolved—that the resolutions as adopted by the Fifty-seventh Continental Congress be incorporated as a part of the Kansas Society Resolutions.

II

Whereas, All countries which have sacrificed civic freedoms because of false propaganda promising peace and prosperity in exchange for their sovereignty;

Whereas, Our Nation is threatened by the presence of an idealogy in the form of communism and socialism completely contrary to our principles, which seek to destroy our form of government, and our American way of living by subtle infiltratian into many American groups; into schools and colleges in the name of youth movement; into women's groups in the name of peace; into labor groups in the name of higher wages and control; and even into churches and patriotic organizations.

Therefore be it resolved, that the preservation of our institutions, our free economy and our homes are still our first line of defense.

And be it further resolved, that the Daughters of the American Revolution oppose all National or International plans, proposals or legislation presented as an emergency or defense measures, which would convert the United States Government into a form of State Socialism.

That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, adopt a policy of informing itself intelligently on the theory and manner of this threatening intrusion, to dedicate itself earnestly to the business of recognizing and exposing Un-American activity whereever it is seeking to entrench itself or has already done so.

III

Whereas, The loose interpretation and even deliberate misrepresentation of true historical facts concerning the integrity of great Americans and of the principles of the Government of the United States is dangerously and subtly implanting Un-American ideas in the minds of our children through the use of textbooks, bioggraphies, reference books and by word of mouth. Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution urge the Governor of the State to appoint commissions to investigate textbooks and reference books in use in the public schools and schools of higher learning in the state.

IV

Whereas, The Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, is interested in the preservation and the marking of historic spots in Kansas;

Resolved, The Kansas Daughters approve the act of the legislature, which makes an appropriation for the purpose of aiding in the preservation and rehabilitation of the frontier Post of Ft. Scott.

REPORT OF STATE REGENT

to the

FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL STATE CONFERENCE

This marks the end of the first year in our second half century of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. Your State Regent wishes to express her appreciation for the privilege of serving this society. She has endeavored to carry out the obligations and duties of her office to the best of her ability. Many letters of encouragement and advice have been included along with those necessary communications of instruction and direction to Chapter Regents, District Officers and Chapter Chairmen. Her correspondence has been extremely heavy and she asks your indulgence, if at times, the answers to your questions have not seemed as prompt as you anticipated.

Your State Regent is most grateful for the splendid cooperation of the State Officers who have given so generously of their time and efforts. It has been a satisfaction to work with women who have taken their responsibilities as seriously as the honors that came with their offices. Especially does she acknowledge the never failing support of the State Vice-Regent who has rendered her services with such sympathetic understanding to the planning of the District meetings. The very close communication with the State Treasurer and the State Corresponding Secretary has been of inestimable value in serving the Society.

She

regrets that it was impossible to accept all invitations and she hopes that she will be given the opportunity to visit all those other chapters before the time of our next State Conference. The willingness of so many chapters to cooperate, sometimes at great inconvenience, is evidence of the loyalty of the Kansas Daughters.

It is her belief that chapters need visits from the State Regent, that she may bring first hand information of the latest developments of all our National projects and suggestions from the National Board for the advancement of our Society. It is her opinion that visits of the other State Officers and District Officers and Honorary State Regents act as inspirations and guides in performing a better service to our Society. Also your State and District Officers need the knowledge and inspiration received from visits to your chapter. It is a means of comparisons and an opportunity to pass along the best suggestions gleaned from each chapter to the next. Invitations extended to neighboring chapters are an aid to closer cooperation and understanding, and it is the hope of your State Regent that more of these exchange chapter visits may come into being.

A C.A.R. Loyalty meeting was attended in December. At that meeting, your State Regent was elected a member of the State C.A.R. Advisory Board, along with all past State Presidents of C.A.R. This Society is one of the responsibilities of our D.A.R. for from its midst come many members of the future. We call upon them to serve as Pages when we lack numbers of our own Junior members. Please wont the mothers of our beloved Society recruit into the ranks of our membership those blood daughters who have reached the age of 18, and into the ranks of C.A.R. their children, whose heritage entitles them to belong? This, mothers, is your opportunity to serve our Society.

March 1st, we were credited with 3113 Kansas Daughters. Your State Regent would like to propose a slogan of "One New Member for Every Chapter." Of course many chapters can and will do much better than that, but please exert an effort to gain that first new member.

Two new chapters are in the process of organization, June 8, 1948, a new chapter in Topeka was approved by the National Board with Mrs. Raymond Plyley as Organizing Chairman for a chapter by authorization. October 20, 1948, Mrs. J. Edgar Mitchem was appointed Organizing Regent for a chapter at Oakley. It is to be hoped that these chapters will complete their organization in the near future and that others may be added to our Chapter roll.

Much has been done this past year to promote the historical, educational and patriotic objects of our Society, as you will learn from the Conference reports. There has been a greater interest in all D.A.R. activities in the determination to do D.A.R. work in D.A.R. There is a marked increase in Approved Schools contributions, in the number of J.A.C. clubs, in alertness to National Defense and Americanism, in gifts to St. Francis Boys' Home, in the work of the American Indian Committee and in the Ellis Island Committee and in increased numbers of D.A.R. Magazine subscriptions.

As a National Vice Chairman of D.A.R. Magazine Committee, your State Regent considers it her privilege and obligation to remind you that the publication of our National Society is the source of much valuable and necessary information for chapter activity. You could not carry on a hobby of any sort to a successful fulfillment without the guidance and information and suggestions contained within the pages of some book or magazine devoted to the subject matter of your particular hobby. Can you expect to get the most out of D.A.R. or contribute the most to its success without that publication that deals exclusively with the interests of our Society?

Looking back through the past year, there appear many things that have been left undone and many others that should have been done differently, but it has been the aim of this administration to do what seemed most necessary, at the time, in a fair and impartial manner for the good of our National and State Societies and for the harmonious settlement of any problem or question that has arisen. The guidance and counsel of the State Parliamentarian has meant comfort and strength on more than one occasion. It has been the endeavor of your State Regent to present for your consideration all information disseminated at the National Board meetings, to keep you informed concerning all projects that are being undertaken by our National Society, and well aware of the stand of our organization on the questions of public interest.

The time is at hand to begin to plan for the year ahead. Do not wait until Fall to begin thinking about the work you have to do. Our State D.A.R. year has already begun. It started March 1st. Those newly elected Regents should begin now to plan with their Boards the program for the fall of 1949 and the Spring of 1950. Your committees should be appointed and ready to work. The new officers and Chairmen should be consulting with, and learning from, their predecessors in the chapter, even though they do not even take over until after the Continental Congress. Chapter Regents, you are largely responsible for the success or failure of your chapter. Ad-

monish your Officers and Chairmen to work toward a better record than ever before accomplished by your Chapter. Cooperate with and encourage those with whom you must work. Do not overlook those new members. They are a valuable asset in every chapter. Give them the opportunity to serve.

At the same time, notices were sent to those who comprise the Board of Management meeting, and to the State Chairmen, informing them of a meeting to be held the morning of October 29th, before the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage.

December 20th, nearly 850 of the 2,000 Regent's Bulletins were addressed and mailed out to members of Kansas chapters.

December 28th, a mimeographed letter concerning State Conference and National Congress information, was mailed to our official mailing list, with three information blanks for officers serving 1949-1950; and two credential blanks included with this letter to the chapter regents.

January 10th, a letter concerning State Conference reservations, registration and sessions information, was mimeographed and sent to all on our official list; with mimeographed blanks enclosed to the chapter regents for information to be returned giving the names and addresses of each chapter chairmen of State Committees.

March 1st, notices were sent to those on the Executive Board informing them of the Board Meeting Wednesday, March 9th. Notices were also sent to those comprising the Board of Management Meeting reminding them of the Board of Management meeting Thursday March 10th.

The Organizing Secretary General has been notified of all changes of chapter officers when same has been reported to me.

State Chairmen have been notified of change in local chairmen when same has been reported to me.

When reports have been dilatory, and there have been too many of these, the regents of these chapters have been notifed of this, to the number of three times, if necessary. Please allow me to Urge each chapter regent, or other officer in the chapter, to return blanks promptly, at least by the date specified; and to have all reports properly filled out and correctly signed. Also, to give to her successor, all helpful suggestions, so that she will accomplish her chapter work more successfully.

Registrations and reservations for meals have been accepted and acknowledged to the number of 122 registrations and the amount of \$775.45 before Conference opening date.

The correspondence has been very, very heavy; but, I have endeavored to reply to the many letters and eards asking for information or making requests. I have made an attempt to acknowledge everything sent to me by correspondence.

The year has been a very interesting and instructive one; and for the privilege of serving you, I deem it a year of much pleasure. I wish to thank every person who has helped to make it so.

REPORT OF PARLIAMENTARIAN

(Mrs. R. W.) Myrtle Graves

The By-Laws of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, give definite duties for all of the elective officers. The Parliamentarian has no duties routine or otherwise. Article V, Section I reads: "Upon her confirmation, the incoming State Regent may appoint a State Parliamentarian and Consulting Genealogist." In April 1948 I accepted the appointment as Parliamentarian at the request of the State Regent.

I attended the Executive Committee meeting in Kansas City, October 28, 1948; the Board of Management meeting in Kansas City, October 29; the Executive Committee meeting in Emporia, January 4, 1949; the Executive Committee meeting in Emporia, March 9, 1949; and the Board of Management meeting in Emporia, March 10, 1949. I regret, that because of illness, I was unable to attend any of the District Meetings and a meeting of Lucretia Latimer Chapter in Eureka.

I have received a few letters from Chapter Regents asking questions about parliamentary procedure, By-laws and their interpretation. Only two State Officers have had questions about our By-Laws. I have tried to advise on all questions to the best of my ability.

The experience of this year has convinced me that more time in Chapter meetings could be spent quite profitably, learning more about the Constitution and By-Laws of our National Society; the By-Laws of the State Society and parliamentary procedure. I believe that there are some weak places in our State By-Laws that need to be adjusted.

Mimeographed letters were sent in August, to each chapter regent and each chapter chairman of Membership. Personal letters were written, at the same time, to all state officers, district directors and chapter chairmen of Membership, urging all to be ever alert for new members. It is the duty of every Kansas Daughter to work for new members. We lost last year and this year, too many who had recently been admitted. If any one desires a Redwood Burl, which makes a beautful table fern, the same may be procured for a dollar. And you are asked to place the names of our loved ones with War Service in the Golden Book.

All States have done splendid work for the Red Cross, Health Agencies, Youth Agencies, and Famine Relief. South Dakota Chapters have given food and clothing, and moncy to St. Marys and other Indian Schools and reservations, spending \$500 in all, and Colorado Chapters sent 190 boxes of clean usable clothing to the Navajo Assistance Inc. They also sent 75 boxes to Low Countries of Europe, 5 bundles to Britain, 10 CARE Packages, 2 Thank you bundles, 1 bundle to Italy and 1 bundle to isolated Islands. The Conservation of National Resources Pledge was sent to every chapter to be read at some meeting.

Zebulon Pike Chapter, Colorado Springs, secured a Granite Marker and had a bronze Marker imbedded in it, and placed it beside their Washington Elm. Colorado contributed \$512.60 to Tribute Grove.

South Dakota with a small number of chapters, thirteen to be exact, sent in money for two names for the Golden Book, and contributed \$17.00 for the Tribute Grove.

North Dakota with only 10 Chapters in the State reports \$108.00 spent by two Chapters on Projects. \$15.00 to Tribute Grove. The Film "Kenmore" was secured by one chapter and was taken to four other chapters and shown five times in schools.

Nebraska with its Snow Bound Area this winter worked with the Red Cross to alleviate suffering. Maintains a House for the Aged at Wayne, Nebraska. Omaha members contributed 9 times to the Blood Bank, contributed to the Blind Association and to the Home for Teenage girls, and assisted at the Children's Hospital. Also contributed five large boxes of clothing from Norfolk, Nebraska and contributed to Famine relief. Total all contribution \$178.85.

All States report large quantities of seeds and bulbs sent. Our National Chairman, Mrs. Christin, is giving ten Burls as prizes at the Conservation Breakfast in Washington, five to the States that have given the largest amount on a per capita basis, and five to the States that have given the largest amount in dollars. All members attending Congress are urged to be present at the Breakfast.

Owing to illness of our Kansas State Chairman, the report of Kansas is rather meager.

Kansas with 59 chapters, reports 56 of them with Conservation Chairmen.

All departments of Human Conservation were sponsored, Red Cross Blood Donors, Youth Clubs, and one gift to Cancer Control Project of \$107.50. Outstanding contributions and interest shown in the St. Francis Boys' Home at Ellsworth, Kansas. \$861.50 sent, which provided care, food, blankets, 2 mixmasters, new clothing, linens and a water Heating Plant. A set of Dickens and a set of Book of Knowledge were sent.

Although Kansas met her quota last year for the National Tribute Grove we are proud to report \$213.48 has come in since the first of the year for this project. \$35 was given at time of State Conference.

All the States have done splendid work for the National Conservation Program and it has been a pleasure to serve as National Vice-Chairman of our Division under the able leadership of our National Chairman, Mrs. Christin.

Tribute Grove contributions for all States in our division total \$809.38.

REPORT CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG COMMITTEE 1948-1949

My sincere thanks to these Chairmen for their splendid work.

The space allotted for this report is insufficient to allow covering all the accomplishments of this Committee.

There are 159 Chapters in the Western Division, of which 103 filed reports with their State Chairmen.

There were 164 large and 1,466 small flags presented to various organizations, etc. 50 Chapters had Flag Code rules explained; 70 Chapters keep Flag Code on file for reference; 2,409 Flag Codes were distributed; 575 other pieces of literature on the Flag were distributed; 46 Corrections were made.

Talks on the flag were given to 47 Chapters, 33 to schools and 23 elsewhere. Eleven speakers addressed Chapters on Flag topics. Thirty-one Chapters devoted one entire program to the Flag; 30 publicity items appeared in local papers; 10 were broadcasts by radio; 2 original papers, 33 stories, 2 pageants and 13 quizzes were written. Thirty-five Chapters sponsored essay contests in schools in which 122 children participated and 12 prizes were awarded.

Thirty-three Chapters observed Flag Day with special programs; 45 Chapters report members giving correct salute when the Flag is passing; 90 give Pledge of Allegiance at each meeting; 47 sing the National Anthem at each meeting with the correct salute.

Seventy-four Chapters report displaying the Flag as directed in the Flag Code and 73 Chapters report members as displaying Flags on National holidays. 36 Chapters supported bills pending in the U. S. Congress for prevention of desecration of our flag, by means of letters to Congressmen, talks in Chapter, radio, etc.

Thirty-one Chapters had copies of and supported all Flag resolutions by the last D.A.R. Continental Congress. 16 Chapters report special activities in their communities. 3 State Chairmen report that their State Regents mentioned Flag work in their reports. 50 Chapters report having a file of Flag Material.

One Chapter in Nebraska explained how the Flag was made and gave correst use to the schools in its town. The C.A.R.s of Omaha gave "The Story of the Flag" over KOWH Radio Station.

D.A.R. MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP COMMITTEE

(Mrs. Vernon E.) Virginia Bostick McArthur Vice Chairman National Western Division

The Western division, 160 chapters, is composed of Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, North and South Dakota. All states reported. Letters were sent in mid-summer to all state chairmen urging work for the Manual and questionnaires were sent in January.

Not all chapters have chapter chairmen. Several state chairmen visited chapters and a round table was held at the Colorado State Conference. 7631 Manuals were distributed to schools, libraries, Naturalization Courts, G. I. War brides, Boy and Girl Scouts, newspaper offices, citizenship classes and the Denver Opportunity school.

D.A.R. members attended Naturalization Courts, welcomed new citizenships, presented them with American Flags, manuals and pamphlets on "100 things you should know about Communism." Zebulon Pike chapter, Colorado Springs, had classes in citizenship for 32 foreign born wives of service men at Camp Carson. Club rooms were loaned for classes, a nursery room for babies and D.A.R. members served as baby sitters. High ranking officers served as teachers. Camp Carson took a picture of the group and a feature story was published in a paper which went to many parts of Europe and was printed in several languages.

Many chapters studied legislation and immigration laws and sponsored Naturalization classes. Some publicity in newspapers. Only one radio broadcast.

North Dakota is working with displaced persons by asking chapter chairmen to give them Manuals.

D.A.R. MUSEUM COMMITTEE

(Mrs. Garland P.) Helen B. Ferrell, National Vice Chairman Western Division

The reports of the state chairmen of the D.A.R. Mueseum Committee of the Western Division received to date have been gratifying. More chapter chairmen have been appointed, more chapters have had Museum programs and more money has been contributed than in previous years.

A letter and a questionnaire was sent to each state chairman. A favorable response was made to the question, "Would your state or

some chapter in your state be interested, next year, in making a pledge or in presenting a gift to honor an outstanding member of your state"?

Colorado reported two chapters had Museum programs and \$10.00 was contributed; Nebraska reported one Museum program and \$16.00 contributed; Kansas chapters had eight programs and contributed \$35.00. Kansas also reported the gift of a valuable reference book, "Stiegel Glass," by Frederick Hunter—the gift of the National Vice Chairman of Western Division.

There are 47 chapter chairmen of D.A.R. Museum in the 59 chapters in Kansas. Chapter regents, can't we make this 100% next year?

Whenever you are in Washington do visit the D.A.R. Museum located in our own buildings. Become acquainted with it. You will find much of interest there and your time will be well spent.

RADIO COMMITTEE

(Mrs. Harold) Lois Johnson Cone, National Vice-Chairman Western Division

As National Vice-Chairman of the Radio Committee, I am pleased to report that all of the states in the Western Division, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, North Dakota and South Dakota, were prompt in their annual reports and that one of the states, Colorado, showed an increase in radio activity.

In these more sparsely populated states the comparatively few radio stations serve a wide territory and in consequence they have great demands for radio time. There is, morever, a decided trend against granting free time to organizations. There are about 160 chapters in the Western division, but there are only about 75 available radio stations. Of that number only about half have the policy of granting free time. Kansas, with 59 D.A.R. chapters, can have access to only about 15 radio stations. The conditions, combined with the extremely severe winter has lessened radio activity in this division.

In spite of these handicaps we were able in this division to give 126 broadcasts using a total of 17 hours with a commercial value of about \$1800.00. Our Kansas radio chairman, Mrs. H. C. Markham of Parsons, prepared and sent out three excellent letters to the

chapter chairman stating the objectives for the year's work and giving helpful information and advice.

Our National chairman, Miss Dorothy Frances Wright, feels that radio has assumed more importance in present day life than the press and she stresses improved cooperation from the chapter regents and radio chairmen. All five of the state chairmen reported an increasing difficulty of securing free radio time. Recommendations were made to urge the National Society to grant adequate funds to this committee to insure proper radio coverage. Great emphasis was placed on urging more strenuous efforts for the advancement of radio work.

NORTHEAST DISTRICRT

(Mrs. Gaylord D.) Helen L. Weilepp, Director

The Northeast District has nine chapters with a membership of 668.

Most of the chapters show a gain in membership and all report much interest in D.A.R. projects. There has been a wide range of activities and good publicity has been reported.

The Northeast District was hostess district for the State Board Meeting and Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage on October 29th. At that time Mrs. Wayne Ashlock, James Ross Chapter, State Chairman of Shawnee Mission, dedicated the walnut tree planted October 17, 1945 and marked it with a bronze plaque.

All chapters use the Ritual for opening and give the Pledge of Allegiance. All chapters are contributing to the Building Fund.

ARTHUR BARRETT—On the State Regent's Honor Roll. Sent 14 boxes to St. Francis Boys' Home at Christmas. Had 173 inches of publicity.

ATCHISON—Marked historical sights. Had 132 hours volunteer work at Wadsworth Hospital.

BETTY WASHINGTON—Furnished a musical program for Shawnee Mission Luncheon, October 29. Presented a scarf once owned by Charles Robinson, first Governor of Kansas, and a beaded shoe once owned by Mrs. Charles Robinson to the D.A.R. room at Shawnee Mission. Has a large student loan fund.

GENERAL EDWARD HAND—Entertained Betty Washington Chapter on November 13th. Sent a gift of money at Christmas to President General for the building fund. On February 22nd presented a bronze plaque to the Ottawa City Library in memory of Miss Grace Meeker, past State Regent.

JAMES ROSS—Helped form the Naturalization Council of Kansas City, Kansas. The first president was a member of D.A.R. Gave the public library a subscription to Motion Picture Guide.

OLATHE—Celebrated Founders Day in October. Has eight Good Citizenship Clubs with 245 members in the Grade Schools and Kansas School for the Deaf.

SAMUEL LINSCOTT—Made a cash donation to Navajo Indians. Gave a Good Citizenship prize of \$10.00 to a high school student. Had an outstanding program on Musical Therapy by Father Heeney of the Topeka Episcopal Church.

TOPEKA—The State Regent, State Chairman of C.A.R. and State Junior Membership Chairman are members of Topeka Chapter. Has a \$1250 scholarship at Washburn University which is being used by a Topeka girl. Gave a D. A. R. magazine subscription to the City Library. Contributed microfilm of Topeka Cemetery records (1859-1913) containing 23,500 names.

CAPTAIN JESSE LEAVENWORTH—Gave prizes to County Grade School children for essays on "What My Flag Means to Me." Took part in Armistice Day and Old Settlers Day celebrations. Gave many hours of work and service to Wadsworth Veterans Hospital.

Northeast District won second prize for largest net gain in membership during the year and James Ross Chapter won first prize for largest net gain in membership in chapters having over 50 members. Olathe Chapter won prizes in Girl Home Makers and Scholarship contests.

NORTHWEST DISTRICT

(Mrs. Walter A.) Modena Crary, Director

The Northwest District of Kansas Daughters of the American Revolution met in McPherson, November 1st, at the Congregational Church with members of Henry Dawson Chapter as hostesses. 85 members and guests were registered including State Officers, Chairmen, and Past Officers. It is my pleasure to report the fine work done by the 16 Chapters in the Northwest District which has a membership of 660. 12 chapters of the 16 are on the Honor Roll of Kansas Chapters for having all dues paid in full by January 1st, 1949.

I cannot give you exact totals—some chapters did not specify amounts—but I can give you an idea of the work accomplished.

Programs have been interesting and varied, including subjects that are akin to D.A.R. interests and many projects have been well supported. Chapters included the National Anthem and Patriotic music for the advancement of American Music.

Americanism and citizenship are stressed in all Chapters by giving the Pledge of Allegiance, D.A.R. Ritual, and American's Creed. One Chapter had a program given by a teacher from England, and another gave \$5.00 to an Americanization Center. Manuals were placed in College, High School, and Public Libraries and 12 were given to new Naturalized citizens.

A box of linen, \$12.00, and an Electric Iron was sent to St. Mary's. One Chapter sent seeds and bulbs to Ft. Riley, Ft. Leavenworth, and Smoky Hill Air Base. \$5.00 was sent to Kenmore and another Chapter assisted in caring for a Memorial Park.

Many Patriotic Days were observed with special social affairs and the correct Use of the Flag was demonstrated in all Chapters, and also in several schools.

D.A.R. Magazine was reviewed by 5 Chapters and there were over 40 paid subscriptions in the District.

Many Chapters are working on Genealogical Records and Histories, and \$2.00 was sent to the State Chairman for the Binding Fund.

Press Relations hae been excellent with reports of meetings in local papers. Clippings were sent to the State Chairman and several Scrapbooks were kept.

C.A.R. groups are growing and some members attend regular D.A.R. meetings and conduct a story telling hour in one town. J.A.C. membership reported 25 clubs.

Two cash donations were made to Ellis Island, 4 members made the pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission and \$1.00 was donated.

National Defense News was reviewed and subscriptions were

placed in City Libraries. Chairmen stressed National Defense and one member attended all meetings of a State U.N.E.S.C.O.

Seven Chapters have sponsored the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage with 18 girls given cash awards and pins. A number of Chapters have entertained girls and their mothers at special social meetings.

Girl Home Makers have given programs and displayed their cotton dresses. Two will be shown at State Conference. Certificates and cash have been awarded to 20 girls and \$40.00 was given to the Scholarship Fund by one Chapter.

St. Francis Boys' Home, a Kansas project, was liberally remembered. Eight boxes of clothing and food, and a substantial amount in cash was donated by 100% of the Chapters. Birthday and Christmas cards and Christmas gifts were also sent the boys.

Our Approved Schools have been most generously remembered. A \$50.00 Medical Scholarship and \$8.75 as a Christmas gift were sent to Tamassee. 16 boxes of used clothing were sent to Tamassee. Kate Duncan Smith and Crossnore and cash donations were made by 75% of the Chapters.

Many other activities were participated in by all 16 Chapters, but time and space will not permit me to mention them. May I express my sincere and deep appreciation to the Regents and members of the Northwest District for their splendid cooperation. May next year's achievements be even better.

The goal for the rest of the year will be to further the programs of the American Indian and the Approved Schools. The Director has written over 70 letters contacting each chapter in the district at least twice by correspondence and numerous telephone calls.

Due to a serious car accident on Christmas Day, the Director is slowly recuperating and regrets her inability to attend the State Conference but sends her best wishes for an inspirational and successful meeting. She wishes to thank Mrs. Cooper who has so unselfishly officiated in her stead.

SOUTHWEST DISTRICT

(Mrs. Hugh D.) Grace Ransom, Director

The Southwest District has 17 Chapters. I have received reports from 13 of the chapters so my report will not be complete, however it does show exceptional work done in all D.A.R. projects.

The District meeting was held in Larned, on November 5, with the Fort Larned Chapter as hostess. About 70 members were present. Fifteen chapters were represented and many splendid reports were given

Officers elected were: Director, Mrs. Hugh Ransom, Freeport; Secretary, Mrs. Bertha McMillen, Macksville; and Treasurer, Mrs. Robert Williams, of Larned. Kanza chapter extended the invitation to the Southwest District to meet with them in St. John, next fall. The invitation was accepted.

The State Regent visited 15 of the chapters in the district and her visits were an inspiration to all, which was reflected in the many outstanding reports given at the State Conference.

Thirteen of the chapters made the State Honor Roll by having all dues paid by January 1, 1949.

AMERICANISM—Stressed in all chapters. Eunice Sterling chapter sponsors an American Syrian Club. They celebrated their

In February their American music program featured music in Washington's, in Lincoln's, and in modern times, using numbers by Francis Hopkinson, Embers, McDowell, Stitt, and Gershwin.

Betty Bonney featured Kaneas music and composers at their January meeting. They have had songs and instrumental numbers at most meetings, and papers on history of American music. As have Jeremiah Howard, Minisa, Eunice Sterling, Baxter Springs, Topeka, Sterling, Fort Larned, Molly Foster Berry, Smoky Hill, Esther Lowrey, and Abilene. The Abilene chapter reviewed the book, "Adventures of a Ballad Hunter."

Baxter Springs chapter placed a Vietrola in their public school.

Sterling D.A.R. members presented a musical play "Thirty Minutes With Washington," at a Music Club program. Songs featured in the play were "Chester" and "Enraptured I Gaze" by Francis Hopkinson. At one meeting folk songs were discussed and illustrated by recordings. Kansas composers and their works were discussed at the January meeting.

Wellington chapter enjoyed choral readings by May Williams Ward assisted by a group of school children.

Fort Supply Trail C.A.R. pre-school children danced the Minuet at their February meeting.

Wichita, Newton, Martha Vail, Topeka, Eunice Sterling, and Betty Bonney featured American music at chapter teas.

Fort Larned presented recordings of American composers at their February meeting and furnished American jigs for the Virginia Reel.

Esther Lowrey usually has music at every meeting, using outside talent from the schools and Music Club.

May I thank these music chairmen for their interesting reports, their cooperation, and for evincing such enthusiasm for our advancing American Music.

AMERICAN INDIANS (Mrs. Glenn) Rella Scott Rhea

The annual letters to State Chapters were sent out, in November, giving information on, and setting forth needs, of St. Mary's school for Indian Girls, at Springfield, South Dakota, and Bacone College for Indian boys and girls at Bacone, Oklahoma.

The need of the Navajos was also stressed.

Cards were sent to State Chapters, in February, asking that their reports be sent on time.

Seventeen Chapters reported programs on the American Indians. Six Chapters requested material, and information. Thirteen Chapters sent clothing, beads and books. One Chapter had a tea towel, shower for St. Mary's.

Silver offering of \$16.05 taken at N. W. District meeting purchased an Electric iron for St. Mary's, and an Electric iron was also given by Mrs. C. E. Brock, of Mary Wade Strother Chapter, for this school.

\$206.90 was received to January 31, 1949. Fifteen Chapters did not report.

AMERICANISM COMMITTEE D. A. R. MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP COMMITTEE (Mrs. John L.) Winifred M. Berry

In October letters were sent to all Chapter Chairmen and to the regents where no appointments had been made, outlining the year's work ahead. The N.E. District October meeting at Shawnee Mission was attended by the State Chairman. In January, letters again went out to all chapters, requesting reports and contributions for the Kansas D. A. R. Manual for Citizenship Committee pledge for the new Building. All reports and requests for Manuals were acknowledged by cards.

Of the 59 chapters, 51 have chairmen of these committees. All reports stated observing with fitting programs most patriotic days, especially Flag Day and Constitution Day. Also lessons and programs on Communism, Resolutions adopted by the 57th Continental Congress, legislation of Immigration Laws, Juvenile Code for Kansas and the Manual were given.

An interesting item from Mrs. Charles R. Curtis, National Chairman of Americanism stated that all but four states in the Union require elementary and High School instruction concerning the United States Constitution to qualify for a High School diploma. I am happy to state that Kansas is not among them. They are Kentucky, Maryland, Texas, and Vermont. Kansas requires 1 credit in U. S. History and ½ credit in Constitution to graduate from a Kansas High School.

About 400 Manuals were placed in District Courts, High Schools, Libraries, Junior Colleges, Hospitals, Foreign Student Clubs, and Foreign Missions, and given to G. I. Brides, Boy and Girl Scouts, County Superintendents, prospective and new citizens, and to St. Francis Boys' Home.

Guest speakers gave inspirational talks on Legislative recommendations of the Juvenile Laws of Kansas, textbooks used in our schools, Communism, and especially helpful and interesting were the visits and talks by the State Regent, Mrs. Ainsworth.

At Naturalization Courts, there were Welcoming Committees and the new citizens were presented with American flags and manuals. Several chapters gave receptions for the new citizens. One Chapter Chairman assisted in establishing a Naturalization Council which also gave a reception for the new citizens of the past year—another taught a Naturalization Class three nights weekly

for four weeks, and also gave instruction in the correct use of the flag.—New Citizens, 44.

Outstanding in their activities were Dodge City, Dana, Mary Wade Strother, James Ross, Eunice Sterling, Capt. Jesse Leavenworth, Emporia, Henry Dawson, Jeremiah Howard, and Nathan Edson. Newspaper publicity, 76 inches.

For the Kansas D.A.R. Manual for Citizenship Committee pledge for the New Building \$18.00.

All Chapters reporting, did excellent work and I wish that time and space permitted me to relate each one's special field in detail. I thank each Chairman for her promptness and cooperation, also Mrs. McArthur, National Vice Chairman of the Manuals, and Mrs. Ainsworth, State Regent.

APPROVED SCHOOLS COMMITTEE

Co-Chairmen: Mrs. Robert H. Chesney and Mrs. Fred J. McEwen

The 1948 report of gifts given to the D.A.R. Approved Schools by the Daughters of Kansas is a very fine one, and a pleasure to give. It reflects your real interest and concern for the young people in these southern states, and strengthens our conviction that the world does move forward on the feet of little children, and that we have a part in it.

Nothing can be finer than the thoughtful scholarships so generously given, the excellent chapter participation with cash gifts, and the personal touch of sending remarkably good used clothing.

Kansas as a state contributed \$7,670.75 to D.A.R. Approved Schools this year; of this \$3,628.75 was cash, and \$4,042.00 in clothing, sent in by 53 chapters. The chapters really outdid themselves in sending boxes: 117 were sent, and some of them amazing in size. To mention a few of the huge ones: Fort Larned 357 pounds, a real record; General Edward Hand 222 pounds, Minisa 125 pounds, Jeremiah Howard about 175 pounds, Isabel Weldin 194 pounds, and Polly Ogden with an estimated \$235, Susannah French Putney \$125, Fort Supply Trail \$170, Hannah Jameson \$195, Wichita \$200, Byrd Prewitt estimated \$225, and Randolph Loving \$150—there were quite a number in the \$100 group. We attempted an average of one dollar per pound when no valuation was given. There is appreciation due to the women who packed these boxes; no small chore, I can assure you.

Since last summer we sent two letters to each chapter chairman, along with our "scratch and pin" postal cards to stimulate clothing collection, and a card recently requesting chapter records. Some of the courteous replies we received were very encouraging and delightful, and we do thank you; in the same breath may we ask that next year some of you please try to send in your reports a bit more promptly! It was keenly disappointing to receive no response from five chapters.

Don't undervalue the importance of your work with D. A. R. Approved Schools. We can give to these children of the three things necessary and requisite to each one to make life worthwhile; SOMETHING TO DO, SOMEONE TO LOVE and SOMETHING TO HOPE FOR! Something to DO in Working Scholarships, school industries and clothing to remodel. Someone to LOVE- a scholarship lady is a real fairy-godmother in the eyes of these youngsters. And something to HOPE for: education and opportunity, and suitable clothing.

BY-LAWS COMMITTEE (Mrs. C. F.) Julia B. Eckelman

The work of this committee during the year has consisted altogether in supplying Kansas Daughters with the State By-Laws as amended at the 1948 State Conference.

On April 1, last year—immediately following the State Conference, cards were mailed to all State Officers, District Directors, State Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents who served during the term 1946-48. These cards stated the amendments adopted at the Conference and requested that all copies in their hands be corrected.

In June, when the list of newly elected Chapter Regents was complete, copies of the By Laws were amended and sent as follows: National Parliamentarian; Honorary State Regents; New State Officers; State Committee Chairmen; Chapter Regents.

Following the election of the officers in the districts last fall, copies were mailed to the new District Secretaries.

Amended copies have also been given to 33 individual members requesting them. In all, 110 cards and 139 copies of amended By-Laws have been issued by this Committee.

C.A.R. PROMOTERS AND JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN (Mrs. Raymond C.) Louise H. Plyley

This year has been a most interesting and informative one for me. The correspondence with C.A.R. Promoters and Junior Membership Chairmen over the state and with our National Chairman, Miss Mary Helen North, has been very worthwhile and contacts at the various district conferences where I met many with whom I have corresponded have been very enjoyable.

A letter was received at the beginning of our year with an outline of the work which our National Chairman wished us to accomplish this year. In my first letter to the local chairmen I sent this information on to them. In December a letter was sent to all chapters regarding the Building Fund. Also, in December, samples of the Memorial Continental Hall stationery were sent to all chapters. Finally, a questionnaire was sent to each chapter asking for a report on the work of the year, and in some cases, one or two postcards reminders to report were also sent. Thirty-three of the fifty-nine chapters have sent in reports, so we do not have a very clear picture of the Junior Membership in Kansas.

There were thirty five Junior Membership chairmen appointed this year and a total of forty-nine junior members were reported. Jane Dean Coffey Chapter reports organizing a Junior Committee of four members. Jeremiah Howard Chapter reports the organization of the C.A.R. Society.

The Holon Pouch Scholarship Fund has been our National project again. I am happy to report that Topeka Chapter has credit for the largest order in the state and a check for \$13.55 was sent to the State Treasurer from this chapter. Stationery sold by chapters and at the various conferences have made a total of \$44.52 to be credited to the Helen Pouch Scholarship Fund.

CONSERVATION (Miss) Maude Haver

There are 59 chapters in Kansas—56 chapters have conservation chairmen. 33 chapters reported to me, therefore my report is incomplete.

Kansas gave its full quota to the National Tribute Grove Fund last year, however, because of the insistence of the National Chairman of Conservation, I wrote cards to all chapters, stating that more money was needed for this Fund.

Tribute Grove \$178.48; Tribute Grove voted at Conference \$25.00; personal contributions \$10.00. Total \$213.48.

HUMAN CONSERVATION—12 chapters reported 100% membership in Red Cross, others about 90%. A number reported blood donors. Many assisted in Red Cross and American Cancer Control Drives and the sale of T.B. stamps. 724 hours of work in these various organizations was reported. A gift of \$107.50 was made to the Cancer Control by Wichita Chapter as a memorial to one of its members.

Much work for the conservation of Youth was reported—St. Francis Boys' Home, Girl Scouts, Boys State, Save the Youth Inc., 4-H Clubs and such like.

Several noted that since state agencies and schools were taking care of Automotive Safety Foundation Program there was no need for the D.A.R. Chapter to organize the work.

Conservation of Natural Resources—Six letters were written to state legislators concerning this subject. Several voiced the opinion of this chairman, "Under the leadership of the U. S. Soil Conserva-

tion Service the Farm Bureau and kindred organizations, this agricultural county is very much alive to the need for the conservation of natural resources. So we make no effort to recommend conservation to people who are far better versed in the subject than we are. This is true of every county in Kansas.

HISTORIC TREES—Eunice Sterling Chapter has planned to mark a Shittim Wood Tree, which is believed to be the only one in the state of Kansas.

The amount reported for War Service Gardens was \$7.50.

Probably the most outstanding work accomplished for conservation this year in Kansas was in the field of Human Conservation. Aside from the interest in the various annual drives was the interest in the St. Francis Boys' Home. Rev. Robert Mize spoke to several chapters.

Entire programs devoted to the Flag 10. Special features are Quizzes and Roll Call. Original papers written 2. Flag quizzes given 2. Essay contests 32. Prizes given 12. Number of children in contests 100. Chapters observing Flag Day 14.

Chapters reporting use of Pledge of Allegiance to Flag at meetings 30. The National Anthem is sung at twenty-one chapters. Flag displayed according to Public Law No. 829—20. Flags displayed on holidays by Chapter members 20 chapters. Chapters supporting bills pending in U. S. Congress for prevention of desecration of Flag 10.

Chapters having copies and studying resolutions on Flag adopted by 57th Continental Congress 4. On file, flags, leaflets and codes, in chapters 18.

REPORT OF STATE CHAIRMAN OF GOOD CITIZENSHIP PILGRIMAGE COMMITTEE

As State Chairman of the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage Committee I close my year's work with grateful appreciation for the assistance and understanding of the State Regent, Mrs. William Louis Ainsworth, and for the splendid cooperation of all my District Chairmen to whom I give all credit for carrying out the details of the contest.

Your State Chairman attended the Northeast District meeting at Shawnee Mission, and the Northwest District meeting at McPherson, Kansas.

Reports and four communications have been sent to the National Chairman. 125 cards and letters were written during the year.

The fourteenth annual Good Citizenship Pilgrimage contest was conducted from October 15th to December 15th.

At the suggestion of the State Regent a new questionnaire was composed and this year, for the first time, the committee work was divided into the four D.A.R. districts instead of the six congressional districts. A chairman was appointed for each district.

Fifty of the fifty-eight chapters appointed chairmen.

Letters announcing the contest and giving the details were mailed to 620 superintendents of public high schools. 120 schools entered the contest, which was an increase of 13 over last year.

Forty Good Citizenship pins were presented to contestants. One district, the Southeast, gave a pin to each of the three winners of that district, as they represented schools where no chapter existed.

Certificates of award were mailed by each District Chairman to her Good Citizens, accompanied by a letter of congratulations.

Entrants in the contest were senior girls in accredited public high schools. Each was chosen by classmates and faculty as best exemplifying the qualifications of a good citizen, which are dependability, service leadership and patriotism. A questionnaire was sent by the District Chairmen to each contestant for answering. The three highest from each district were considered by the state judges to determine the girl who was to be the State Winner.

Miss Polly Anne Peckham of Wichita High School East, Wichita, Kansas in the Southwest District was selected State Pilgrim.

D.A.R. STUDENT LOAN FUND COMMITTEE

(Mrs. J. W.) Agnes Murray

The Loan Fund report is not materially changed from last year. One long outstanding note remains unpaid. One application for a loan was received. The applicant wished to borrow \$400.00 but withdrew her request when she found that the rules established a limit of \$200 to each borrower. Ninety young women have received loans since the fund was established.

This condition, no demand for loans, is true of most loan funds, inquiries have shown. Local funds are not being used. Many gift scholarships are available to help needy students, and work is plentiful at the present time for others. Polly Ogden Chapter, Manhattan, decided to close its local fund and used the money, \$763.77, to purchase silver services for certain women's residence halls at Kansas State College.

However, young women undoubtedly will need help again, and the state fund should be conserved for that time.

Return postal cards were mailed to all chapters for reports. Answers were received from twenty-eight chapters.

ELLIS ISLAND

Sixty chapters of Daughters of American Revolution received two letters and one reminder post card each during the year. These letters explaned the work being done and asked for chapter donations and individual donations.

The activities of State Chairman have been as follows:

- 1. Set up a plan for the year's work.
- 2. Sent three letters, including the plan, to chapter chairmen of Girl Home Makers or Regents.

- 3. Contributed for Girl Home Makers \$30 and directed two "orchids" (\$10) to this project; also turned expense money for postage, etc. to complete the needed \$93.00 for the project.
- 4. Talked briefly to Board of Management, three chapters, and Northwest District Conferences regarding Girl Home Makers.
- 5. Arranged for the McPherson chapter of Future Home Makers of America to present at the Northwest District Conference the emblem service and creed.
- 6. Was in charge of the Advancing Colors Ceremony at the National Convention of the Future Home Makers of America at Kansas City, Missouri, July 1949.

Chapters that have participated in some way in Girl Home Maker activities number 19. They have worked mainly with F. H. A. chapters, 4-H Clubs, and Home Economics classes. JUVENILE CODE COMMISSION

(Mrs. Joe) Verneda D. Beeler

The duty of this committee is to work with the Kansas Juvenile Code Commission which is composed of five members appointed by the Governor.

We wrote to each chapter asking them to study, analyze and report to us their reaction and opinions of the Juvenile Code Commission's findings and recommendations. In July "The Preliminary Report" of the Commission was submitted to the Governor. Copies of this were sent by Mrs. Laura McClure, secretary to the Commission to each chapter. In January "The Report and Recommendations" of the Commission was submitted to the Governor and the 1949 Legislature. Your committee chairman mailed a copy to each chapter. She also gave a report on the D.A.R. Committee work at the North west District Meeting in McPherson. Mrs. Roy Shrewder gave the committee report at the Southwest District Meeting at Larned.

We do thank the D.A.R. Chapters for their splendid response to our request. All seem to agree with the Commission's findings as a whole and favor the necessary improvements. There were some details that were questioned. These same questions very likely will come up during legislative debate. This was evident at the Juvenile Code Commission Joint Hearing of the House and Senate Judiciary Committees which your chairman was privileged to attend. The function, scope and value of these recommendations should not be taken lightly. They are far-reaching and very important. It is difficult to comprehend the magnitude of the Juvenile Code Commission's work; the great field it covers in the lives of human beings until you hear discussed in detail its findings from investigations and its recommendations for correction and improvement in our state social problems.

The misfit, misguided and maladjusted child is a product of society. Society means parents, homes, schools, churches, communities, states and nations. True Legislation and Laws are essential for the care of delinquent children, for mentally and physically ill children, for abondoned children; proper housing, food, clothing and medical care are necessities, as are qualified teachers and trained sympathic supervisors. However, Daughters this is not enough! It is our duty to care for the cases which now exist and are a result of "faulty thinking and acting". Our greater need is a "Program of Educating and Training" children so there will be no such problems.

This program would go well with the work of this commission. Let us teach prevention of delinquency that we may need no correction. This to start with marriage, parents, home, schools, church and community. Let us develop proper leadership in our children; stress and praise strong character, strict morals, honesty, courage, truth, loyalty, and patriotism. Let us feed the minds and hearts of children with the fuel of love, understanding, the facts of life, the importance of emotional control and how to assume responsibilities in life. That kind of an educational program will pay big dividends in human happiness and greatly reduce the Juvenile problems as well as ease the expense of caring for such cases. How great is the need for thought and action on these matters.

MOTION PICTURES

The leading question in our work the past year has been, "How can the standards of audience demand of motion pictures be lifted and maintained, and how can they be reflected to the makers of pictures so that better films will be produced?"

It is felt that the surest way to get better motion pictures—a desire shared by all—is for everyone to patronize only the best films. To this end, motion picture chairmen have been requested to encourage the members of their chapters to select and attend only such films as are approved by reliable reviewers. The D.A.R. Motion Picture Guide was recommended as one of the best reviews available. Members were urged to subscribe; also to supply schools and libraries with Guides to be placed on bulletin boards.

The response to a questionnaire sent to each chapter indicates that a half or more of the chapters are subscribers and a number are placing copies in schools and libraries. Reports are encouraging, but conditions could be improved.

The responses indicate also that in some schools the better pictures are brought up for discussion in classes in English or dramatics; that many Parent Teacher Associations are interested in the kind of pictures the school children are to see; and that there has been a tendency toward better pictures the past year.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

Dear State Regent and Members of the State Board, D.A.R. Your State Chairman of National Defense submits the following

report:

NUMBER OF NATIONAL DEFENSE CHAIRMEN: Of the 59 Chapters in Kansas, 56 Chapters have National Defense Chairmen. This is an increase of five new Chairmen during this administration from July 1, 1948 to January 31, 1949.

NUMBER OF CHAPTERS SENDING IN REPORTS, 37 Chapters have submitted reports for the past year—or 62.7% of the total number of Chapters.

OF NATIONAL DEFENSE PROGRAMS, 10 NUMBER Chapters reported one entire program each: 4 Chapters, two entire programs each; 1 Chapter, three entire programs-A total of 21 individual programs.

PROGRAM TOPICS MENTIONED. "The Freedom Train and Our American Heritage"; "Branches of the United Nations;" "Russia and Our Relations;" "Communism;" "The Bill of Rights;:, "Government Responsibility;" "Womens Part in War;" "D.A.R. Duties Towards Aiding National Security."

OTHER PROGRAM PHASES. 10 Chapters reported Roll Call by the Chapter Chairman from National Defense News at each meeting; 1 Chapter reported a "True and False Quiz" on National Documents and Laws: 1 Chairman gave 5 "five minute talks" on National Defense projects; 1 Chairman read excerpts from the Secretary of the Navy's address as published in November-December National Defense News; 1 Chapter had the subject, "Federal World Government" debated by the local H. S. Debate team.

One Chairman reported, "Our Chapter works with this slogan: 'The greatest glory of a free-born people is to transmit that freedom to our children and community.'" (Jeremiah Howard Chapter.)

HOLIDAY OBSERVANCE. Holidays were observed by 14 Chapters.

FREEDOM TRAIN. 4 Chapters reported members visited Freedom Train. One Chapter cooperated with local groups while Train was in the city. One Chapter gave literature on Freedom Train and folders to schools and pupils.

DISTRIBUTION OF LITERATURE. National Defense literature was distributed by 15 Chapters to Youth Groups, Schools, Community Activities, Libraries, Ladies Lounge, Hotels, Public Offices, Public Speakers, and Chapters for program material. Some specific examples of literature were: Book of Freedom Train placed in City Library; Bulletin Board in Public Library with literature

on National Defense; Manual of Citizenship given to Senior High School, Jr. High School, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts by one Chapter; pamphlets, "Give Thought to the Constitution," "Power of the Great Seal," 5 sets of pamphlets on Communism, and 30 pieces on "George Washington and the Revolution" were distributed by one Chairman.

AUTHENTIC TEACHING OF THE CONSTITUTION AND AMERICAN HISTORY. Four Chapters—this was done in their schools, using State Texts, according to checking.

REMOVAL OF UNDESIRABLE TEXTS. One Chapter reported history text to be abolished—but not due to D.A.R. checking alone. One Chapter reported a text was referred to local Board and State Board of Education and to State Text Book Commission.

GOOD CITIZENSHIP MEDAL. Eight Chapters gave Good Citizenship Medals. Two of these Chapters were outstanding, Viz; Susannah French Putney Chapter, gave six medals in the Jr. High School. Samuel Linscott Chapter each year awards a cash prize of \$2.50 for good citizenship in each of the following schools—Senior H. S. Holton; Jr. H. S. Holton; Rural H. S., Jackson Co; County H. S., Jackson County.

II. COOPERATION WITH COMMUNITY: EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

PATRIOTIC AND CIVIC GROUPS. 14 Chapters reported cooperation with such organizations as: American Legion Auxiliary, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Forum Clubs, Farm Bureaus, Churches, Civic Clubs, P.T.A., UNESCO.

YOUTH MOVEMENTS. 10 Chapters reported a special study and work with Youth Groups such as Scouts (Boy and Girl), YWCA, 4-H Clubs, Rural Youth, "Hi-Teen", Youth Church Conventions, Recreation for Youth, Saturday morning pictures for children. In addition, 2 Chapters reported cash contributions to community youth programs; One Chapter (Great Bend) reported that "Chapter members are leaders and advisors to Youth Groups."

COUNTERACTING SUBVERSIVE ACTIVITIES. One Chapter chairman, a member of a City Library Board, reported the removing of "one subversive publication from reading table and several books from shelves." One Chapter reported "trying to organize Jr. Amer-

ican Citizen Clubs." One Chairman urged that "need for watching subversive teaching is constant—comic books are dangerous to youth, also many movies and certain types of literature."

III. INTERNAL DEFENSE. HOME AND CHURCH

COOPERATION WITH CHARACTER-BUILDING GROUPS. Cooperation with the following Character-building Groups with special emphasis on the guidance and conservation of youth were reported by 18 Chapters; the home, local Sunday Schools and Churches, Schools, Jr. American Citizens through the schools, Boy and Girl Scouts, worthwhile Youth Movements, union religious services, Teen Town projects, Library projects, Girl Reserves, St. Francis Home for Boys in gifts and birthday cards, World Day of Prayer. Health examination in schools was reported by one Chapter.

UNIQUE PROJECTS. One Chapter (Martha Vail) reported "naming Farms and Ranches, and promoting Roadside Beautification."

IV. LEGISLATION

STUDY AND ACTION. Six Chapters reported that letters were written to Congressmen on the following subjects of legislation: Immigration, Naturalization, UMT, Socialized medicine, Education, Un-American Activities Committee. In addition, 2 Chapters discussed and approved the State Juvenile Code.

V. MILITARY PREPAREDNESS—OUR NATION'S SECURITY

Two Chapters reported in favor of—in accord with National D.A.R. policy. One Chapter reported 95% approval.

VI. NATIONS DOMESTIC POLICY

Eight Chapters reported attention was given to the Nation's Domestic Policy. Bill of Rights studied and followed by panel discussion. Study of State and National Laws, obeying all laws, voting 100%. Approval of teaching our Constitution and U. S. History in High Schools. Entertaining Foreign War Brides. Distribution of D.A.R. Manuals in foreign language and encouraging non-citizens to establish citizenship. Great interest in political radio commentators. Study of economic and social changes in world which will continue to be great.

VII. NATION'S FOREIGN POLICY

Five Chapters commented upon WORLD ORGANIZATION vs. WORLD GOVERNMENT. Special emphasis was placed upon study of this subject and the D.A.R. Resolutions—also study of National Defense News on subject.

UNITED NATIONS. One Chapter reported a program on "Branches of the United Nations." One Chapter thought some changes were advisable. One Chapter thought it was a dead issue.

UNESCO. One Chapter sent delegates to UNESCO and had reports on the meeting. Another Chapter will have a D.A.R. representative in a city unit of UNESCO that is being organized.

ACTIVITIES OF THE STATE CHAIRMAN

CORRESPONDENCE. Since July 1, 1948, 25 letters and 80 postals have been written in carrying on the work of this Committee. These have included correspondence with the National Office, the State Regent, National Defense Chairmen, Congressmen, FBI, etc. Also, a general letter was written in September 1948 and copies mailed to all the Chapter Regents and National Defense Chairmen outlining the work of the National Defense Committee for the year. Postal cards were written during February, 1949 to Chapter Chairmen requesting reports and calling attention to the State Convention at Emporia. (Copy of general letter is attached.)

MATERIAL, PAMPHLETS, REFERENCE LIBRARY. A considerable amount of very fine material has been received from the National Office. This has been studied and filed in a National Defense Reference Library. Numerous requests from Chapter Chairmen for program material have been received and answered.

HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE. A special effort has been made to urge support for the continuation of the Un-American Activities Committee. Letters were written to Representative Meyer, President Truman, Senator Reed, Senator Schoeppel, and the present Chairman of the Committee, Honorable John S. Wood. Encouraging replies were received with assurance of support. Excerpts from the letters are as follows.

"You may be assured of my continued ardent support of the House Committee on Un-Amercan Activities and of the additional legislation which is required to combat this menace." (Sgned) Herbert A. Meyer.

"The President has received your letter of January 12th with the accompanying correspondence. You may be sure that your interest in writing is appreciated." (Signed) M. J. Connelly, Secy to the President.

"... I am of the opinion that popular demand for such an investigative body will be the deciding factor toward its continuance. I am glad to have the views of the Kansas Society of the D.A.R. in this important matter. I am sure that such an organization will continue its fine efforts to preserve the rights and freedoms which have made this country what it is today." (Signed) Clyde M. Reed.

"There are a large number of members of both houses of Congress which are very much concerned about this same issue. I am sure they will not give up the battle at this stage of the game. I shall certainly scrutinize each issue that comes under the heading of un-American activities. ." (Signed) Andrew Schoeppel.

"I feel certain that the Committee will continue to put forth its best efforts in the exposure of the subversive elements operating within our midst. When the 57th Continental Congress of your organization adopted the resolution supporting the Committee, it was a source of great satisfaction to me . . . It is my earnest hope that the Committee will continue to receive the support of your organization during these trying times." (Signed) John S. Wood.

LIBRARY BULLETIN BOARD PROJECT. Your State Chair-

man has co-sponsored with the local D.A.R. Chapter Oceanus Hopkins, a National Defense Bulletin Board in the Pittsburg Public Library. The local Chairman of the Oceanus Hopkins Chapter reported: "This is a most effective and interesting means of publicizing National Defense and also the Daughters of the American Revolution Society." Since August, 1948, 55 booklets and pamphlets from the National Office have been posted on the Bulletin Board. These have included materials on Communism, reports by the Un-American Activities Committee, Constitution Day, United Nations Day, Domestic Policy, Foreign Policy, World Organization vs. World Government, Youth Movements, National Education Week, Resolutions adopted by the National Society, and George Washington. Information from the

State Department and various phases of the 7-Point Program on National Defense as outlined by the National D.A.R. have also been included.

MAKE YOUR COMMUNITY NATIONAL DEFENSE CONSCIOUS. This slogan for action has been submitted to the D.A.R. Chapters in Kansas. National Defense Chairmen and their Chapters have been urged to be alert to infiltration of Communism and alien ideologies into Kansas communities in government, publications, education, the arts, youth groups, labor, etc. Much can be achieved in the field of public relations by interpeting to the Community the program of D.A.R. "For protection and security, not for aggression" is the D.A.R. interpretation of National Defense.

SPECIAL MEETINGS attended included the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage, District Meeting at El Dorado, and Molly Foster Berry Chapter, Ft. Scott.

In submitting this report, your State Chairman wishes to acknowledge with appreciation the fine help and cooperation of the National Chairman and the National Office, the State Regent, the Kansas Chapters, and the Chapter Chairman of National Defense.

NEW BUILDING FUND

(Mrs. J. W.) Sylvia Hornbaker

Chapters and members are cooperating in a very wholesome manner by contributing to the New Building Fund. Chapters have signified their intention of contributing the minimum and possibly more.

Wichita Chapter of which Mrs. Thor Jager is the regent, is the first chapter in the state to make the honor roll by contributing over \$6.00 per member.

Two letters were written to the chapter regents containing information in regard to the New Building and the Fund. One letter contained an attractive apron with a verse in the pocket, and the suggestion that the chapter regent make an apron for each member of the chapter, who would place a penny a day in the pocket for the New Building fund. Mrs. Robert Chesney was responsible for the apron idea, and contributed the many aprons that were mailed to the chapter regents.

Contributions as of February 1st amounted to \$2,091.05

The spontaneous contributions to the New Building Fund at State Conference proved that our members, when properly informed, are willing to cooperate with our National projects.

SANTA FE TRAIL MARKERS

Requests for information, as to condition, location and suggestions for improvement of Santa Fe Trail Markers, together with complete descriptions of location of each marker were sent out June 30, 1948.

In ten counties through which the Trail is marked, there are no chapters of D. A. R. so Regents of chapters nearby have been asked to make the check. Have received reports concerning markers from eighteen of the twenty-one counties.

The Highway Department advised that a new ruling is now in effect...."No more markers to be placed on Highway Right of Way." However they do not indicate that the markers now so placed will be moved.

A letter to Roy Cox State Highway Director asking for the help and cooperation of his department in restoring and maintaining of the Santa Fe Trail Markers for the benefit of all. Markers needing attention and markers unreported are listed, and location descriptions given by counties. Will report to you on receiving his reply.

For your information have listed counties in which markers are located setting forth the information I have on each marker to date.

The foregoing is respectfully offered for your opinion.

P.S.—A letter from Roy W. Cox, Director of Highways, advises, quote, "I am handing your letter, with attached information, to our maintenance Engineer, L. J. Siler, who handles these matters. He will check the markers and we will advise you later what we can do.

It does look like we are going to be very short of funds for 1949 and I cannot give you any assurance now that we can get these markers in shape during this year. However, we will check the matter carefully and advise you later what we can do."

As State President of the Kansas Society, Children of the American Revolution, I submit the following report:

I wish to express my appreciation of the honor conferred upon me by the C.A.R. Society, in this, my first report. It is a pleasure to serve under so fine a President as Mrs. Donald Bennett Adams.

It is a pleasure to report the organization of the Rebecca Moore Odell Society at Great Bend, Kansas. Mrs. Earl C. Moses was appointed Organizing President at the Board Meeting in February 1949 – and she has nineteen members. The Society was named after an ancestor of Mrs. Moses.

Applications for appointments of the following organizing presidents have been made: Mrs. Charles E. Jones of Wichita, Kansas, and Mrs. McCray of Garden City, Kansas.

We have five National Promoters and eleven State Promoters, five are new this year. We have increased our state officers to three, President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer.

We had a meeting of the Adult Committee of the Kansas Society of C.A.R. in Kansas. Much profitable discussion of C.A.R. activities past and present came before the committee. The Committee passed on the formation of an Advisory Committee made up of the State Regent of D.A.R. and the past presidents of the Kansas Society C.A.R. BY-LAWS

of the

KANSAS STATE SOCETY

of the

NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised and Adopted at the State Conference March 27, 1947

ARTICLE I.

Name

The name of this society shall be the Kansas State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II.

Object

Section I. This Society pledges fidelity and loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the objects of which are:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary and enlightening public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Section 2. Its purpose shall be to further the above plans of the National Society and to maintain harmonious co-operation among the chapters in Kansas and to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

ARTICLE III.

Membership

Section 1. The membership of this State Society shall include all Daughters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who are members in good standing of some Chapter in Kansas.

Good standing shall be interpeted to mean that all National and State dues have been paid.

Section 2. Chapters failing to pay State dues shall not be entitled to representation at State Conference, to receive State Communications or participate in any State affairs until dues are paid to the State Society.

ARTICLE IV.

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Chaplain, State Recording Secretary, State Treasurer, State Registrar, State Historian, State Librarian, State Reporter, and State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 2. No member shall be eligible for election to any state office or appointment to any state chairmanship who has not been a member in good standing of the Kansas State Society for one year. No member shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms, and no member who has served one term in any state office, shall be eligible to election to any other state office, except that of State Regent and State Vice Regent, until the expiration of one year.

A member having served more than one half term in any state office shall be deemed to have served a term. A candidate for State Regent must have served as an elected Chapter Regent. A candidate for any state office, except that of Corresponding Secretary, must have served as an elected chapter officer.

Section 3. Election of officers shall take place on the last day of the annual State Conference occurring in the year of the election of National Officers.

Election shall be by ballot, for a term of three years.

A majority of votes cast shall elect.

The terms of office of the State Regent and State Vice Regent begin at the close of the Continental Congress which confirms their

The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected and confirmed, beginning with the year of 1950. election.

Provided that, at the next regular election, to be held in 1948, the officers shall be elected for a two year term.

Section 4. The nominating committee shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the October State Board of Management meeting.

This elected member shall serve as chairman of the nominating

It shall be the duty of this committee to submit names of cancommittee. didates for the state offices on the second day of the annual State Conference of election year. Nominations other than those made by the nominating committee may also be made from the floor. All candidates must have given their consent before nomination.

The nominating committee shall, immediately after November first, notify all Chapters of impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted.

Candidates shall be selected from all districts of the state.

No person shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at State (Conference.

Section 5. When the several candidates for State Regent are nominated, each in turn shall nominate her State Corresponding Secretary. The ballot cast for a State Regent shall serve, automatically, as a ballot for her State Corresponding Secretary. Thus each is an elected officer. In no other instance may two officers be elected from the same chapter.

Section 6. In recognition of valuable service to the State Society the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by acclamation at a State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent.

ARTICLE V.

Duties of Officers

Section 1. STATE REGENT: The State Regent, in addition to performing the duties which pertain to her office, according to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, shall preside at all meetings of this Society, of the Executive Committee, of the State Board of Management and to the Kansas Delegation to the Continental Congress. She shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for, sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer for moneys appropriated by the Society, and may call meetings of the Executive Committee or Board of Management whenever she may consider it important and necessary. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter General Chairman, prepare the program for the Annual State Conference. She shall present at the Annual State Conference all amend ments proposed to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society and such other matters as she may deem worthy of consider-

ation. She shall be a member of the printing committee. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees, excepting a nominating committee.

She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer, to have recorded in the State Treasurer's books, all membership reports received from the National Society, following each meeting of the National Board. The State Treasurer will duly record the same.

Upon her confirmation, the incoming State Regent may appoint a State Parliamentarian, and Consulting Genealogist.

- Section 2. STATE VICE REGENT: The State Vice Regent, in the absence or disability of the Regent, shall perform the duties pertaining to the office of Regent. She shall be a member of the printing and stationery committee and a member of the Executive Committee.
- Section 3. STATE CHAPLAIN: The State Chaplain shall officiate in the offering prayer and other religious services when requested by the Regent. She shall be a member of the Memorial Committee.
- Section 4. STATE RECORDING SECRETARY: The State Recording Secretary shall keep a correct record of all meetings of the State Conference, the State Executive Committee and the Board of Management. She shall be chairman of the Printing and Stationery Committee; countersign all orders drawn on the Treasurer and signed by the Regent. She shall prepare the proceedings for the Annual State Conference for publication, subject to the approval of the State Regent, and perform such other duties as pertain to her office.
- Section 5. STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: The State Corresponding Secretary, under the direction and supervision of the Regent, shall notify all state Officers and the Regent of each chapter in good standing of the time of the Annual Conference not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall give notice of meetings of the Executive Committee, and Board of Management as directed by the State Regent. She shall be the chairman of the committee on credentials. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, immediately after the close of Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the various chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each state chairman two typewritten copies of the list of names and addresses of her respective chapter chairmen, (one of which is to be sent to her National Chairman and the second one for her own use.) She shall compile these lists into a directory for the ensuing administration.
- Section 6. STATE TREASURER: The State Treasurer shall collect all moneys and disburse the same only upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. All moneys received by the Treasurer shall be deposited in some

reliable bank in her name as State Treasurer, and all payments made by her shall be by check. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit the same to a Certified Public Accountant before the Annual State Conference. She shall be custodian of all bonds and policies belonging to the society. She shall be bonded by the State Society for the sum of \$2,500.00 for the faithful discharge of the duties above defined. She shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan Notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall be a member of the Executive and Credentials Committees.

- Section 7. STATE REGISTRAR: The State Registrar shall keep the card file as established; assist in proving eligibility claims; prepare the Kansas Directory Daughters of the American Revolution, when ordered by the Society; check her membership file against the records of the State Treasurer immediately after July first. She shall keep a file of all reports received from the National Society and these are to be delivered with the State Card file, and all other material dealing with the work of the office, to her successor. She shall be a member of the Executive Committee.
- Section 8. STATE HISTORIAN: The State Historian shall take charge of all the historical papers received by the Society and shall catalogue and arrange the same, placing in a locker at the State Historical Society at Topeka, such historical documents, and all materials for preservation. She shall be chairman of the Memorial Committee. She shall prepare the Smithsonian Report.
- Section 9. STATE LIBRARIAN: The State Librarian shall have supervision of the State D.A.R. library. She shall prepare a report listing all material sent to the National Library and all books records, and other material received for the State Library, during the year, for publication in the State Conference Proceedings. On retiring from the office, the State Librarian shall send to the newly elected Librarian and to the State Regent a complete list of all material on file in the State D.A.R Library, and given over to the newly elected State Librarian.
- Section 10. STATE REPORTER: The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the State Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be State Chairman of the Publicity Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files (or Scrap Book) and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D.C.
- Section 11. All officers and Committee Chairmen upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, all moneys, accounts, record books, papers or other property belonging to the Society.

ARTICLE VI.

Meetings

Section 1. The supreme governing body of this society shall be a Conference. An annual meeting of the Kansas State Conference shall be held in March unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or by the State Board of Management. The purpose of this conference shall be to receive reports of the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen; for the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. Each State Chairman shall compile a typed report of not more than three hundred words covering the work accomplished by her committee for the year ending February twenty-eighth. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary by March first, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Each Chapter Regent shall send a report of the work and plans of her chapter, for the year ending February twenty-eighth, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary immediately after March first. This report shall be typed, and limited to two hundred fifty words, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Section 3. The Kansas State Society shall be divided into four districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively.

A Director, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected at an annual district meeting to be held in the fall. The District Director shall not be eligible for reelection, until the expiration of one year. Each district shall entertain the State Conference in rotation; the time and place to be determined by the hostess district and the State Regent. The Southwest District shall entertain the State Conference in 1948.

Section 4. The voting members of the Annual State Conference shall be the State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, and Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the first Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates, regularly elected by Chapters as hereinafter specified, provided they have been members of their Chapter for one year and are in good standing.

Section 5. Twenty-five voting members shall constitute a quorum at the meeting of the Annual State Conference.

Section 6. Chapters of less than fifty members shall be entitled to representation at the Annual State Conference by the regent and two delegates. Chapters having membership of fifty to one hundred shall be represented by their Regent and five delegates. After the first hundred, representation shall be in the ratio of three delegates for every subsequent one hundred. Alternates shall be elected for each Chapter Regent and delegate.

Number of representatives allowed according to State Treasurer's record of paid membership on February first. Paid Chapter Membership Representation Total Vote 12 to 49 Regent and two delegates 3 50 to 100. Regent and five delegates 100 and over Regent and five delegates plus 6 plus three delthree delegates fo revery additegates for every ional full hundred paid members. additional full hundred paid members.

Section 7. Delegates and alternates snan be elected at the January meeting of their Chapter in each year, and certificates of their election signed by the Regent and Treasurer of their Chapter, shall be sent to the State Corresponding Secretary for the Committee on Credentials by February first. Vacancies that occur in the delegation may be filled by the Regent from alternates duly elected for that purpose at the January meeting.

Section 8. Daughters attending State Conference shall pay a registration fee of One Dollar.

ARTICLE VII.

Board of Management.

Section 1. The State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, and Chapter Regents, shall constitute a State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over affairs of the State Society to do and transact business during the interim between the meetings of the State Society. The State Board shall meet at the call of the State Regent at least twice a year. A meeting of the State Board shall be held immediately preceding the opening session of the State Conference.

A Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held in October, following the National Board of Management meeting, and this meeting shall be termed the official Fall State Board Meeting; the Northeast District shall act as hostess annually, at Shawnee Mission. Meetings of the Southeast, Southwest, and Northwest Districts shall be held immediately following in convenient order and a report of the National Board meeting be given by the State Regent and chapter plans be heard at all meetings.

Other meetings may be held upon the call of the State Regent or upon written request of seven members of the Board of Management. It shall recommend to the Annual State Conference such patriotic and historic work as seems desirable to be undertaken by the Society. Eleven members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have power to fill vacancies in office until the next election; the election to fill such vacancies shall be by ballot, notice of the vacancy having been given in the call for the meeting of the State Board.

Section 4. All officers, the Board of Management and Committees shall make reports of their work for the year, at the Annual State Conference.

ARTICLE VIII.

Executive Committee

- Section 1. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Recording Secretary, State Registrar and State Treasurer, shall constitute the Executive Committee.
- Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three members.
- Section 3. The Executive Committee shall make a report at each meeting of the Board of Management.

ARTICLE IX.

Committees.

Section 1. The Regent shall appoint a Student Loan Committee consisting of three members who shall supervise the Kansas D.A.R. Student Loan Fund.

The Regent shall appoint a Conference Committee which shall consist of the Reporter and two other members.

'There shall be a Printing and Stationery Committee which shall consist of the Recording Secretary, Vice Regent and Regent.

A Memorial Committee shall consist of the Historian, Chaplain and one other member.

The Committee on Credentials shall consist of the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and one other member.

ARTICLE X

State Funds

Section 1. Each Chapter, belonging to the State Society shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before January first of each year the sum of \$1.35 for each member, in good standing on the Chapter rolls on that date.

Chapter Treasurers chall furnish, with each remittance of dues, a list of members for whom she is paying.

Chapters failing to pay above per capita dues shall be delinquent February first and not entitled to representation at State Conference.

Representation of Chapters at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon number of dues in the hands of the State Treasurer by February first. The Treasurer shall notify chapters of their standing on February first.

- Section 2. Life Members shall be counted in the basis for representation. Chapters shall count all Life Members in their Representation and State dues should be paid for full representation.
- Section 3. Stationery and postage, and in cases of emergency, telephone and telegraph charges, which charges shall be validated by the Executive Committee, shall be furnished to the State Officers and State Committees.
- Section 4. A sum not to exceed \$500.00 per year shall be allowed the State Rogent for her expenses in carrying on her work.
- Section 5. To partially defray her expenses to the State Conference, each State Officer shall be allowed the sum of \$12.00, provided however, that no expenses will be allowed an Officer when the Conference is held in her own home city.
- Section 6. No provision is made for expenses of Honorary State Officers.
- Section 7. In addition to the obligations specified in these By-Laws, no debts or liabilities shall be incurred except by vote of the Conference.
- Section 8. A sum equal to ten cents per member shall be taken from the State Fund and placed in an Annual State Conference Expense Account.

ARTICLE XI.

Chapters.

Section 1. It is recommended that election of chapter officers, for a term of three years, take place in January, occurring in the same year as the election of state officers. Chapter officers shall be installed and take office in May, following the confirmation of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent at Continental Congress.

On or before February first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks to be furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter Officers for the ensuing year.

The Regent-elect of each chapter shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on or before April first, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of all newly appointed chapter chairmen.

ARTICLE XII.

Parliamentary Authority

Section 1. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order revised, shall govern this Society in all cases to which they are applic-

able and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XIII.

Amendments.

- Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendments has been sent to the State Regent and each Chapter at least sixty days before the Annual State Conference.
- Secion 2. Amendments to these By-Laws shall take effect at the close of the Annual State Conference at which they are adopted.

STANDING RULES.

ARTICLE 1.

Section 1. The Recording Secretary with the Regent shall see that arrangements are made for the publishing of Proceedings of the State Conference which are contained in the files of the Recording Secretary, the expense of such report to be born by the State Society.

The Recording Secretary shall send a copy of the printed Proceedings to all State Officers and Chapter Regents, State Chairmen, and to such other persons and libraries as shall be designated by the State Regent.

When an election has occurred, it shall be the duty of the retiring Recording Secretary and retiring Regent to compile these proceedings and arrange for their publication.

Section 2. Board of Management meetings may be attended by State Chairmen, District Directors, Chapter Regents' representatives and other interested members, on invitation of the State Regent, except when the Board is in Executive session.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. \$25.00 shall be allotted the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

Section 2. \$50.00 shall be allotted the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Congress.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. These rules may be amended, suspended or repealed at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of voting members present.

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
