

The objects of this Society as stated in Article 11 of the Constitution are:

1.

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, page 56.

INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

GENERAL INFORMATION

Report immediately to the State Corresponding Secretary any change in chapter officer or chapter chairman.

Report at once to the Treasurer General, State Regent, State Registrar and State Treasurer, all resignations, deaths, marriages, and members received or lost by transfer. Do not report a resignation nor transfer a member in arrears for dues. Only members in good standing may resign or be transferred. The Handbook gives specific directions regarding transfers and resignations. Please follow rules carefully.

Report immediately to the State Regent and State Registrar all changes of address of members.

CHAPTER REGISTRARS ATTENTION. Please copy from application papers before sending to Washington, the full name of applicant including her maiden name, and if married, the name or initials of her husband, the complete address, name of ancestor with his rank, the State in which he served and the State in which he died. If the applicant is a Junior Member (under 35 years of age) please make a notation of that with her birth date. As soon as notice is received from National that the applicant has been accepted, report this information to the State Regent and the State Registrar. Report data concerning Junior Members, also to the State Chairman of Junior Membership.

Dues should be in the hands of the Treasurer General and the State Treasurer by January 1st. Do not wait on delinquents. Members, whose dues are unpaid January 1st are "in arrears."

All contributions to be counted in the current year's report must be in the hands of the State Treasurer by January 31st. The State fiscal year extends from January 31, 1950 to January 31, 1951.

Every Chapter Regent, Treasurer and Registrar should have a copy of the D.A.R. Handbook. All members, who wish to be informed should have copies. The price is twenty cents (6 copies for \$1.00). The status of our nations is in the hands of the thinker and the voter. We do not want world government. That will be the end of American independence. If American independence goes, the last hope will be gone, the last bit of freedom left on earth will go.

Our country is not only a beautiful land lying between two oceans, it is all this, but it is our America. It is the boy whistling on his way home from school, it is the open barn door, the miner with his drill, it is a Mother's love. This is our America for which we should thank God every day of our lives. "Be quiet, my child, do the right, look for the right as God gives you brains to see the right, and our blessed America will be sufficient."

Mrs. Amott, Fort Scott, made mention of the fact Mrs. Rex Fortenberry, attorney-at-law in Dallas, Texas, who is the daughter of Dr. J. R. Newman in Fort Scott, made a very fine talk about Socialized Medicine some time ago in Fort Scott. Mrs. Fortenberry is decidedly against it.

Mrs. Shrewder, National and State Chairman of Resolutions said "We are interested in resolutions pertaining to National Defense. This committee does not seek to impose its will upon you, the National Society, it presents for your consideration some things which without your vote cannot be accepted, but with your vote are accepted as the policy of the National Society, so please be informed on all matters, especially as matters of National Defense are of such great interest to us."

Nominating committee was named as follows: Mrs. J. B. Gould, Fort Scott as chairman; Mrs. Mullin, ElDorado; and Mrs. C. R. Calvert, Winfield.

A candidate for State Regent or State Vice Regent must have served as an elected Chapter Regent. A candidate for any state office must have served as an elected chapter officer."

THAT—Art. V, Section 3, second sentence, be amended to read: "She shall be the Chairman of the Memorial Committee."

THAT—Art. V, Section 8, second sentence be amended to read: "She shall be a member of the Memorial Committee."

THAT—Art. VI, Section 3 second paragraph, second sentence be deleted and the following inserted in it's place: "The term of office shall be one year and no District Officer shall serve more than three consecutive terms."

THAT—Art. VII, Section 1, be amended to read: "The State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose memberships are within the State. District Directors and Chapter Regents shall constitute a State Board of Management."

THAT—Art. IX, fourth paragraph be amended to read: "A Memorial Committee shall consist of the State Chaplain, chairman, the State Historian, and one other member."

THAT—Art. I Section 1, second paragraph—STANDING RULES be amended to read: "The Recording Secretary shall send a copy of the printed Proceedings to all State Officers, Chapter Regents, State Chairmen, District Directors, and to other persons and libraries as shall be designated by the State Regent."

RESOLUTONS

I-MAINTAINING THE AMERICAN WAY OF LIFE

Whereas, The dominant motive of the founders of the American Constitutional Republic was to secure forever the establishment of a society where recognition of Divine Truth and a free civilization go hand in hand; and

Whereas, Increasingly have these ideals been challenged by a doctrine of collectivism extolled and advanced as a higher form of human welfare;

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution adopt a policy of informing itself intelligently toward the end that this alert and patriotic group take action indivirually against threatening forms of Socialism, of Communism and the destruction of our American Way of Life.

OPPOSING WORLD GOVERNMENT

Whereas, There are now active organizations and individuals in our Country which endeavor to establish a World Government, a World Federation or any other International organization which would result in the destruction of our American Way of Life;

Whereas, World Government Law would be enforced directly, upon individuals in our country and a World Government taxing power would directly tax our citizens independently and in addition to our own National Taxation, and the World Government would take over the gold reserves of the United States and all member nations, thus rendering our own currency worthless;

Whereas, The power to tax is the power to destroy, and if the United States of America should join such a World Government, it would cease to be a free nation, its people would lose their precious liberties and become slaves of a World Superstate founded on the philosophy that the individual is NOT the master of his government but its servant;

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution declares itself uncompromisingly opposed to World Government or any other International organization with supreme authority over all National Governments,

Resolved. That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution entreat its individual members to urge their legislators to oppose this dangerous scheme to destroy the United States of America.

III-OPPOSING SOCIALIZED MEDICINE

Whereas, Great pressure is being exerted on Congress to pass legislation which would place under Government control the health and medical care of the people of the United States;

Whereas, Such action would mean further heavy taxation through the creation of another huge bureaucracy;

Whereas, Such legislation would violate the freedom and individual liberty of the people of the United States of America;

Whereas, Such Government invasion in the field of medical care would open an avenue of advance into other professions with a Welfare State or Socialism the inevitable result;

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Resolution vigorously opposes legislation designed to create State medical care and expresses emphatic opposition to the establishment of Socialized Medicine with its vast extension of a parasitic bureaucracy which would result in a socialistic state in violation of the principles set forth in the Constitution of the United States of America.

IV-OPPOSING FEDERAL AID TO EDUCATION

Whereas, The Public schools of the United States of America are one of the Nation's first lines of National Defense;

Whereas, Our laws provide for tax supported public schools to insure the privileges and benefits of an education to all citizens irrespective of race, color, or creed;

Whereas, Public education may be used to further ideologies of any government in power; Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution voice opposition to any legislation placing control of public education under federal regulation and to the use of public tax funds for private schools.

V—IMMIGRATION

Whereas, The economic, social and spiritual mind of the United States is under increasing pressures and conflicts, and there is growing evidence of a determined effort to break down our immigration laws;

Resolved, That for the purpose of protecting the interest of all our citizens, and particularly our veterans, and for the purpose of excluding foreign elements imbued with political ideologies wholly at variance with our Constitutional system of Government, the Kansas Society, Daughters of the Revolution urge upon Congress that no immigration over and above the present quota system be permitted into the United States, either by special legislation, unused quotas, or, executive order.

VI-NATIONAL SECURITY

Whereas, The experience of two World Wars has demonstrated the dangers of unpreparedness, and the vital need of maintaining a trained and well-equipped army, navy, and air-force at all times;

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Resolution urge Congress to provide for the maintenance of an armed force sufficient in strength and equipment to meet any attack on land, sea or air or any aggressor until the reserved forces are made ready to meet the emergency;

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution further supports continued research and technical development in all branches of the armed services.

VII—TEACHING YOUTH

Whereas, The minds of children and youth are influenced by teachers and teaching-methods;

Whereas, Misguided teachers and leaders, consciously or otherwise, implant unamerican ideas in the minds of our youth;

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution dedicate itself to work with those in authority to keep our teaching methods free from this subtle misrepresentation of the American Way of Life.

VIII-LOYALTY OATH

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm its endorsement of the Loyalty Oath.

IX-FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm its unqualified faith in the Federal Bureau of Investigation and its present Director, J. Edgar Hoover.

X-UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES

Whereas, Thinking Americans know there is a need for constant vigilance against subversive forces in our midst;

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution urge the continued support of a committee in our National Congress on Un-American activities.

XI-MEMORIAL BELL TOWER

Whereas, The committee for the erection of the Memorial Bell Tower at Valley Forge is proceeding with the erection of the Tower;

Whereas, Necessary funds are needed to cover increased cost over the original estimates;

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution urge its chapters and members to cooperate with this committee in raising the necessary funds to complete the Tower.

XII-BUILDING PROMOTION PROJECT

Whereas, The Fifty-seventh Continental Congress authorized a \$900,000 Building Project for a new Administration Building;

Whereas, The amount of \$18,546 which was assumed by the Kansas Society is now brought near completion;

Resolved, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution continues its support of this National Building Project so that this debt may be speedily liquidated.

XIII—CHAPTER PROGRAMS FOR EDUCATION

Whereas, We of today are living in a small and very fast moving world where each of us is directly affected by dailing happenings; Recommended, That the Kansas Society in Chapter Programs place more emphasis on topics of the day and keep members informed so that as individual, patriotic, American women they may play a part in the forming of sound public opinion in their communities toward saving the American form of Government from destruction.

XIV

Resolved, That copies of these resolutions be sent immediately to all Kansas Chapters.

XV—COURTESIES

Resolved, That the Fifty-second State Conference of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution express appreciation to Mrs. James B. Patton, First Vice-President General; Mrs. Edwin Stanton Lammers, Recording Secretary General; Mrs. Loren E. Rex, Vice-President General; Mrs. LaFayette LeVan Porter, National Chairman D.A.R. Magazine; Miss Mary Helen North, National Chairman Junior Membership; Mrs. Roy Valentine Shrewder, National Chairman Resolutions Committee for their gracious presence and challenging messages which contributed so much to the value of this State Conference.

The Chapter owns an original painting by the German American Artist, Lentze, showing the crossing of the Delaware, with General Hand in the picture. Mrs. Davis owned this valuable painting and at her death, her sons presented it to the Chapter. There are only three paintings of the historical crossing; One is in the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C. and the third now hangs in the Carnegie Library in Ottawa, Kansas.

NEW CHAPTERS

JOHN ATHEY CHAPTER

Organized August 4, 1949, was named for the ancestor of Mrs. (J. Edgar) Adah Allen Mitchem.

John Athey, Soldier of The American Revolution

The Athey Family is one of great antiquity in county Galway, Ireland. A detailed history of the ancient family is given in Dr Charles E. Athey's book "Genealogy of the Athey Family in America, 1642-1932."

The first of the family to come to America of whom we have records, was Capt. George Athey who was born in Ireland in 1642 and came to Maryland in 1668. He patented land in Charles County in 1675 and we find a number of records of land patented to him during the period from 1675 to 1688. The first patent was called "Wakefield" and was in Charles County although he had earlier appeared in St. Mary's County.

The Maryland Archives show that George Athey was returned a Captain of Foot Militia for Prince Georges County, Maryland 1694-1696. He seems to have moved further up the river with the years and to have lived in St. Mary's, Charles and Prince Georges County at different times. He owned land on both sides of the Potomac approximately where the city of Alexandria now stands according to the old records. As the years passed, some of the family lived both in Virginia and in Maryland.

Captain George Athey married Sarah, the daughter of Thomas Marsh who was one of the first Commissioners of Maryland appointed by Lord Baltimore. Both the Athey and Marsh Families are among the old Manorial and Heraldic Families in Maryland.

Among the children of Capt. George and Sarah (Marsh) Athey, was John Athey who was known as "the merchant of the Severn." This John Athey, according to the records, was among the few people of those times who possessed books. The Maryland Historical Magazine for December 1940, under, "Books owned by Marylanders in 1700-1776" quoting from an old record says: "John Athey of Prince Georges County was worth nineteen pounds and owned one Bible, one Prayer book, Two old books and a Primer." (Inventories 1740-Liber 15, Folio 611.) The Atheys of much later generations have lived by the Bible, the Prayer Book and even the Primer.

Daughters of the American Revolution

John Athey the merchant, married Margaret Lewis in 1711. They had a son whom they named George. This George Athey married Mary... whose last name we do not know. They moved into Fairfax County, Virginia where this George died in 1733 leaving two infant sons, Robert and John. The mother died and the two little sons were reared in the home of an uncle.

John was the younger of the two. He was born about 1730. He enlisted February 6. 1776 and served in Capt. Phillip Richard Francis Lee's Company commanded by Col. William Heth, in the 8th Company 3rd Virginia Regiment, Continental Line. His name is mentioned in the Saffel Revolutionary Records as having served at Valley Forge, Germantown and Trenton. He was discharged in 1778, with the rank of Corporal.

John Athey was not a young man when he enlisted. He was forty-seven years old and had a family. He had married Sarah the daughter of "Col. Foster" (who also was a soldier of the Revolution). During the War, Sarah, his wife, lived in Fairfax County Virginia and is listed in the census of 1783 as having several children. After the War, John and Sarah Athey bought 160 acres of land in the Horseshoe Bend of the Great Cacapon River, in Morgan County, now in West Virginia. There they reared their family and there John died in 1830 and Sarah died in 1831, both aged one hundred years. They are buried on their old farm.

John Athey was just a plain soldier. Just like thousands of yours and mine who have never been sung in song or story. But worthy, as were they.

Basil Athey, son of John Athey, the Revolutionary Soldier, was born 1765/68 in Fairfax County, Virginia. He married Mary Margaret Bruce and lived in Jefferson County, now West Virginia.

They were the parents of Judson William Athey who as a young man, taught school at Wheeling, West Virginia. Later he went down the Ohio River on a flatboat with the family of Aquila Justice, Sr. to the Wabash. They went up the Wabash to Parke County, Indiana about 1826. There it was that Judson married Susannah Justice daughter of old Aquila Justice Sr., in 1827.

Judson William Athey and Susannah Justice were the parents of Martha Athey Cox, our grandmother. Martha's full name was Martha Jane Athey and she was born in Park County, Indiana, on January 20th, 1831. She was married first to James T. Rockwell of an old New England family. He died, leaving her with a small daughter, Mary Jane Rockwell. On January 26, 1854, Martha Jane (Athey)

Rockwell was married to our grandfather, William Cox and they went from Parke County, Indiana to live at Marengo, Iowa County, Iowa.

Martha Athey Cox died at Marengo; Iowa, on September 8, 1861 and she was buried in the Athey Cemetery on the old farm of Jurdan William Athey, her father. She was the mother of two children who survived her, by the name of Cox.

Matilda Elizabeth Cox, our Mother, was born. February 18, 1856 at Marengo, Iowa. When sixteen years of age she came to Wilson County, Kansas with the family of her half sister, Mary Rockwell Brockway. They settled at Neodesha and there she attended school, and after teaching two terms of school there, she was married on March 30, 1876, to our father, William Albert Allen.

From 1872 to 1944 Matilda Elizabeth (Cox) Allen lived at Neodesha, Kansas. During all those years she was a member of the Methodist Church as was our father. They were the parents of eight children who grew to maturity, one dying in childhood. Mother died on May 5th, 1944 and Father died March 18, 1941. If Father had lived until March 30th they would have celebrated their sixty-fifth Wedding anniversary.

Adah Elizabeth (Allen) Mitchem, daughter of William and Matilda E. (Cox) Allen is the mother of four children, all residents of Oakley and vicinity. And she is a grandmother several times.

Which fact shows that on our line, the Atheys have been residents and citizens of these United States for eleven generations. (Capt. Geo., John, George, John, Basil, Judson, Martha,, Matilda Adah, John Paul, Randy). From 1642 to 1949 is a period of three hundred and seven years which is the time in which the Athey family have been true, patriotic men and women. They have served in every war, and during the War between the States as many served with the Union as served with the Confederacy. They have been conscientious, loyal Christian people who have asked little but have given much. Surely they have been long in the land and deserve great honor:

Matilda Elizabeth (Cox) Allen was a pioneer of Kansas. She spent seventy-two of her eighty-eight years in the State. She was truly a Kansan most of her life. She had the good of her State, her Community and her family at heart, always. She came to Kansas when the State was young. And she was always proud to be called a Kansan. Her children have all felt the same way about their native State. She saw her only brother give his life for his country. She herself, sent three sons to World War I and four grandsons to World War II.

JOHN HAUPT CHAPTER

Organized November 17, 1949, was named for the ancestor of Mrs. (Raymond) Louise Haupt Plyley.

John Haupt was a Sergeant in Captain Adam's Co., Col. Peter Grubb's Battalion of Associaters in Lancaster Co., destined for the Jersey's, August 15 1776. He arrived in America with his father Johannes Haupt in 1750 and was naturalized in Doylestown, Northampton, Co., Penn. in 1772. He married Catherine whose name was probably Schick. He died in Northampton County, Pa. and his will was proved on December 14, 1812.

SHAWNEE CHAPTER

Organized December 1, 1949 in Mission Short History of the Shawnee Indians who lived for four decades in Eastern Kansas

The Shawnees were the first of the Emigrant Tribes of Indians to settle in what is now called Wyandotte Co., Kansas. At one time the Shawnees were an influent al tribe but the victory of General Wayne in 1794 broke their power and they never regained their prestige. Some years later Tecumseh, the greatest of all their leaders, aided and abetted by his brother Ten-Squa-Ta-Wa, "the Prophet" attempted to form a confederacy of all the Indian tribes and resist the encroachment of the whites, but the victory of General Harrison at the battle of Tippecanoe, November 1811 broke up the confederacy.

After the victory of General Wayne, a considerable part of the Shawnees left the United States and moved across the Mississippi into Spanish Territory, settling near Cape Girardeau, Missouri. General Clark of Lewis and Clark fame in November 1825 made a treaty with the Missouri Shawnees whereby they gave up their lands in Missouri which had been given them by the Spanish Government for a new reservation in the lands west of the Mississippi. The Shawnees selected a strip directly west of the Missouri border on the South side of the Kansas River. There was a provision in the treaty that the Ohio Shawnees might also share in its terms.

The Missouri Shawnees began to move in the fall and winter of 1825. About one-third of the Ohio Shawnees moved in 1926. In 1831 the remainder came. The territory was afterwards known as Kansas.

COFACHIQUE CHAPTER

Organized December 19, 1949 in Iola

Cofachique (pronounced Coffey-chee)

As early as 1536, explorations were made of this mid-western country. The Spanish came hunting gold, the French seeking Indian trading posts and the English to venture into settlements. Many hardships were encountered—"in this land where no man permanently abides."

. The Western prairies had for untold ages been occupied by Indians. Indians, puzzled and awed by the advent of the white man, and because of mistrcatment by certain of these men became hostile toward all newcomers.

Massacres, sackings and hostilities were common. Frontier life is always hard, but it was made many times harder in Kansas by the years of strife and Indian warfare.

The Osage Indians lived in eastern Kansas, south of the Kansas River, and because of the kind treatment of early itinerant Roman Catholic priests had become a friendly tribe by 1810. One Osage Chief known to the white men as Cofachique, was particularly kind in his dealings with early settlers. He was responsible for bringing aid to the distressed and homeless. Years later the first town in the present County of Allen was named for this courageous Redman, Cofachique, Chief of the Osages.

The town of Cofachique, Allen County, was founded in 1855 on the east bank of the Neosho River about one and one-half miles. by a group of Pro-slavery men from Fort Scott. It was laid out southeast of the present Iola and the town association was authorized to hold any quantity of land, not exceeding 900 acres, where the town was located. Cofachique was the only town in Allen County for nearly two years and was the county seat until 1858. The town lasted but a short time after the removal of the County Seat to Humboldt. The natural disadvantages of the townsite—it was not easily accessible and there was no water supply—together with the smy-

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pathies of the founders, contributed to the ultimate death of the Community.

Research done by Mrs. John Barley at a nearby monastery, left no question that the name Cofachique was for the early day Indian Chief, who had befriended the white people in this locality. It was presumed that since Cofachique was an Indian Chief, he must have been at least 30 years old when the town was founded in 1855, thus making sure that he was born before 1825.

STATE OFFICERS CLUB

The thirteenth annual meeting of the Kansas State Officers Club, Daughters of the American Revolution, met at 7:30 for a Breakfast in the Green Room, Jayhawk Hotel, Topeka, Saturday March 11, 1950.

Invocation was given by the Chaplain Mrs. Walter T. Chaney.

After breakfast the meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. V. E. McArthur.

Mrs. Loren E. Rex, organizer of the State Officers Club, and Mrs. Walter T. Chaney, as General Chairman of the State D.A.R. Conference were introduced. The President also presented Miss Mary Helen North, National Chaiman Junior Membership Committee as a guest.

Minutes of March 12, 1949 read and approved with correction, Mrs. Jonathan B. Carter gave an orchid of \$10.00 to the Building Fund in name of her mother Mrs. W. T. Courtney, and not in name of the Club.

In absence of the Treasurer, the President requested the Secretary to read the report.

Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell presented the proposed revision of the By-Laws.

Moved by Mrs. David Jackman that each article be read and voted upon. Seconded and carried. The By-Laws were adopted as revised and amended.

The President thanked Miss Stella B. Haines for the breakfast arrangement.

Moved by Mrs. Ferrell that \$10.00 be contributed to the Building Fund in honor of Mrs. Wm. L. Ainsworth. Seconded and carried. Moved by Mrs. Ferrell that \$2.50 be contributed to the Bell Tower Fund. Seconded and carried. The following officers were elected:

STATE OFFICERS' CLUB BY-LAWS Ruth G. Traxel ,Secretary

Article 1-Name

This organization shall be known as the Kansas State Officer's Club of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II-Object

The object of this club shall be to foster sociability among its members, to advance the work of Patriotic Education, to promote historical interest in the state, to aid in marking historical spots, and to promote the interests of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article III-Membership

Section 1. Those eligible to membership shall be officers and ex-officers of the Kansas State Society of the D. A. R., providing however that the member is in good standing in the State and National Society and is acceptable to the other members of the club.

Section 2. The application for membership must be endorsed by three members of the club. Initiation fee and dues for one year Names so endorsed may be submitted at the annual meeting.

Article IV-Meetings

Section 1. The annual breakfast meeting shall be held the morning of the last day of the annual conference of the Kansas Society, D.A.R. The hour and price to be determined by the chairman of arrangements.

Section 2. Special meetings of the Executive Committee and the club may be called by the president at such times as she deems best; and special meetings may be called by the president upon the written request of five members.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the club.

Article V-Officers

Section 1. The officers of the club shall be president, three vice-presidents, chaplain, secretary, treasurer, historian and reporter. These officers, together with the ex-state regents not holding office in the club, shall constitute the Executive committee.

Section 2. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Vacancies in office shall be filled by the executive committee.

Section 4. The term of office shall be for one year only and no officer may succeed herself.

Article VI-Duties of Officers

Section 1. President. The president shall preside at all meetings and shall appoint all committees. She shall sign with the treasurer, all bills for disbursement of the funds of the club.

The vice-president shall perform the duties of the president in her absence.

Section 2. First vice president. The first vice-president shall perform the duties of the president in her absence, and be chairman of By-Laws committee.

Section 3. Second vice-president. The second vice-president shall be chairman of arrangements for the annual meetings.

Section 4. Third vice-president. The third vice-president shall be chairman of the membership committee in which there shall be three members. One member shall be chosen at the annual meeting each year and then she and the chairman shall choose the third member.

Section 5. Chaplain. The duties of the chaplain shall be the offering of prayer as directed by the president.

Section 6. Secretary. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep the minutes of the annual meeting and of the executive committee meetings of the club. She shall conduct all routine correspondence and give due notice of the annual meeting.

Section 7. Treasurer. The treasurer shall collect and receive all fees and dues. All orders for disbursements of funds must be signed by the president and the treasurer.

Section 8. Historian. It shall be the duty of the historian to keep an indexed reference record of all work of the club. (A scrapbook if so desired.)

Section 9. Each officer shall make a report at the annual meeting.

Article VII.—Dues

Section 1. The annual dues shall be fifty cents per member payable on or before January first of each year. The initiation fee shall be one dollar.

Section 2. Only members in good standing are eligible to attend the annual meeting of the club.

Section 3. Any member desiring to resign from the club shall present her resignation in writing to the Treasurer who shall immediately notify the President of the resignation. The resignation of a member in arrears for dues shall not be accepted.

Section 4. A resigned member may be reinstated in the same manner as a new member is accepted by the club and upon payment of dues for the current year.

Section 5. Any member whose dues are in arrears for one year and after two notices from the treasurer, shall have her name removed from the membership roll by the treasurer on January first next after her dues become delinquent. The treasurer shall notify the president of the removal. Section 6. A member dropped for non-payment of dues may be reinstated in the same manner as a new member and upon payment of her indebtedness to the club at the time that she was dropped and a reinstatement fee of one dollar and the payment of dues for the current year.

Article VIII-Guests

Section 1. Only guests of the D.A.R. State Conference and General Chairman of the State Conference hostess chapter may be guests at the annual meeting of the club and their breakfasts shall be paid for out of the club treasury.

Article IX-Amendments

Section 1. These By-Laws shall become effective upon their acceptance by the club.

Section 2. These By-Laws may be amended at any annual meeting by a majority vote of those voting, a quorum being present, provided copies of such amendment has been sent to the officers and past presidents of the club not less than 30 days prior to the Annual meeting.

Section 3. Robert's Rules of Order, revised, shall be authority in all matters herein specified.

REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

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STATE REGENT'S REPORT

The second year of this administration has proved to be a busier one than the first, for following closely, the reports at the State Conference at Emporia, came the realization that with increased efforts, we could achieve greater success. It takes enthusiasm and determination to accomplish goals beyond past records, and it has been an exciting experience to work with the State Officers and State Chairmen, endeavoring to inspire our Kansas Chapters to fulfill the dreams we had for them.

The major project of this administration has been our Building Fund. We are not blessed in Kansas, with members who give small fortunes to help us make our quota the easy way. Your State Regent has visited all but four of our Kansas Chapters, Betty Bonney, Council Oak, Rhoda Carver Barton and Samuel Linscott. She hopes it will be possible to visit these four chapters before summer, so htat she can retire from office, knowing that her mission was accomplished. She regrets very much that her absence from the State made it impossible for her to accept the gracious invitation of Samuel Linscott Chapter. Since our last State Conference, these chapters have been visited: Arthur Barrett, Atchison, Baxter Springs, Betty Washington, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, Christiana Musser, Cofachique, Concordia, Courtney Spalding, Dana, Desire Tobey Sears, Esther Lowrey, General Edward Hand, Hannah Jameson, Henry Dawson, Isabella Weldin, James Ross, Jane Dean Coffey. John Athey, John Haupt, Jonathan Gilbert, Lois Warner, Lucretia Griswold Latimer, Martha Loving Ferrell, Nathan Edson, Neodesha, Oceanus Hopkins, Olathe, Peleg Gorton, Phebe Dustin, Sarah Steward, Shawnee, Smoky Hill, Susannah French Putney, Topeka, Uvedale and William Creekmore.

It is with pride that I announce the organization of four new chapters this year—John Athey Chapter of Oakley, organized August 4; John Haupt Chapter at Topeka, organized November 17.... Shawnee Chapter at Mission, organized December 1 and Cofachique Chapter at Iola, organized December 19. This makes a nice addition to our Kansas membership. I regret the loss of one chapter, Frederick Funston, disbanded February 1, 1950.

Following our State Conference, a year ago, your State Regent was graciously entertained at the State Conference of the Colorado Society in Pueblo and of the Missouri Society in St. Joseph. Following the October Board Meeting, last Fail, she was the guest of the West Virginia State Society at their Conference in Parkersburg. This year, she has regretted several out-of-State meetings because of busy planning for our own Conference, but she plans to attend the Conference of the Missouri Society in Kansas City, next week. Last year, she gave a slip from our Kansas "Dollar Tree" to the Colorado Regent, hoping it would grow for their building fund. This year, she sent the Colorado Regent, some rare green roses, a gift in her honor for the Building Fund. There has been fun along the way of duties to lighten the hard work.

At the close of the February National Board Meeting, your State Regent was one of a group of over 400 Daughters of the American Revolution in attendance at the dedication of the Betty Washington bedroom at Kenmore in Fredericksburg, Virginia.

Your State Regent has attended every regular meeting of the National Board and plans to attend our Continental Congress in April.

The new directory has been a tremendous task and has required many hours of intense effort on the part of Chapter Registrars, who have so carefully copied and corrected their records and sent them to the State Registrar and the State Regent, that the state records might also be checked. It is to be hoped that this directory will serve the Chapter Registrars in assisting with lineages for future members. It is earnestly desired that any discrepancies in the records be reported immediately to the State Registrar and the State Regent:

ANNUAL REPORT STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY (Mrs Hugh P.) Mary B. Hartley

Soon after the 1949 State Conference of Kansas Society, D.A.R. in Emporia, notes of thanks and apreciation were sent to those who were responsible for entertaining those attending Conference.

In April I attended Continental Congress where I had charge of the reservations at the Kansas Luncheon and the Kansas reservations at the Congress banquet.

In May a directory of names and addresses of each chapter officer, along with a set of reports of officers of each chapter, was sent to the Organizing Secretary General.

A few days later, a directory of National and State Officers and State Committee Chairmen was mimeographed and sent to those on our official mailing list which is: our President General, Kansas Vice President General, our Honorary State Regents, our State Regent, National Chairman, National Vice Chairmen, State President C.A.R., State Officers, State Chairmen, Chapter Regents and District Directors.

A complete list of her respective chapter officers' names and addresses was sent to each state officer.

A complete list of names and addresses of regents of all chapters was sent to all on our mailing list.

In May, I assisted the State Regent in mailing out her bulletin.

In May two copies of a list of names and addresses of her respective chapter chairmen, were sent to each state chairman.

In September I assisted the State Regent in mailing out her bulletin.

In mid October, notices were mailed to Executive Board Members advising a Board Meeting would be held previous to the Shawnee Mission Meeting. It was a pleasure to entertain this Board Meeting in my home on October 20th.

At the same time notices were sent to those who comprise the Board of Management Meeting, and to the State Chairmen, informing them of a meeting to be held the evening of October 20th in the Old Mission Methodist Church.

December 1st, it was a pleasure to have Shawnee Chapter of Kansas D.A.R. organized in my home.

In early December, I assisted the State Regent by typing 1100 names and address labels of the 3,000 Bulletins that she mailed cut.

February 3, a mimeographed letter and mimeographed blank for information giving the names and addresses of each chapter chairman of the State Committees was sent to each chapter regent who will be serving in 1950-51.

February 22, notices were sent to those on the Executive Board, informing them of the Board meeting in Topeka on March 8th before State Conference convenes.

February 24th, notices were sent to the members of the Board of Management informing them of a meeting in Topeka on the morning of March 9th.

The Organizing Secretary General has been informed of all changes in chapter officers when same has been reported to me.

When reports have not been received when due, notices have been sent out to the number of three times, if necessary, to the chapter regent. It has ben a pleasure to attend a few meetings of several D.A.R. Chapters but is is a great regret that I could not accept all invitations extended.

As I leave this office and this work, I express my thanks and great appreciation to all who have helped to make the term a very pleasant one.

My term of office as State Registrar has been completed. The two years have been very busy years.

STATE HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Mrs. Tillie Karns Newman

It is with pleasure that I submit to this 52nd Annual State Conference, Daughters of the American Revolution, the following report:

47 Chapters reported.

- 18 Members wrote their Congressmen and Senators urging support to the restoration and preservation of Cowpens Battlefield National Park of South Carolina and the Alamanance Battlefield.
 - 1 Historic spot was marked, but is not yet dedicated; it is the grave of Sarah Keyes, daughter of a Revolutionary War soldier and

member of the ill fated Donner Party, who is buried near Alcove Springs. This is in the province of the Arthur Barrett Chapter

- and will be dedicated May 28, 1950. The D.A.R. plaque is placed on a native limestone boulder and the inscription reads: "God in His Love and Charity has called in this beautiful Valley a Pioneer Mother." The William Wilson Chapter preserved a Santa Fe Trail marker at Hartland, Kansas, by placing it upon a cement base.
- 20 Graves of D.A.R. members were marked, one of these was a past Chapter Regent, and a marker was placed by the State Society for Miss Grace R. Meeker, of Ottawa, a State Regent.
 - 9 Medals were awarded for History work. In the contest sponsored by your State Historian for the best article of 750 words on a Revolutionary War Character—First prize, \$5.00 goes to Vanessa Coffman of Topeka for, "Fearless Molly Pitcher,"

Second prize, \$3.00 to Donna Cunningham of Marysville for "Sibyl Ludington,"

Third prize \$2.00 to Suzanne E. Ross of R.R. No. 3, Wycoff School, Ottawa "Thomas Jefferson, Champion of Democracy."

- 19 D.A.R. Members visited History classes in schools.
- 27 Members read school histories.
- 1 Map of North America on parchment, bearing the date of 1623, has been placed at the State Historical Society by Martha Vail Chapter D.A.R. for safe keeping and interest to the public.
- 3 Original papers of historical information are filed with the archives of the State Historian; they are from John Athey Chapter, Oceanus Hopkins Chapter and Captain Jesse Leavenworth Chapter.
- 87 Pilgrimages to historic spots were recorded.
- 110 Historical Anniversaries observed.
- 18 Historical Broadcasts and 5 Chapter Scrap books mentioned. The Historian for Isabella Weldin Chapter, Miss Stella B. Haines, reports that she represented the D. A. R. in the Pony Express Celebration at Augusta last fall.

VALLEY FORGE MEMORIAL

During the first half of 1949—240 letters and 120 cards were mailed in the interest of the Bell Tower by your Historian. Fifty cook books were sold and as many boxes of cards. The State Historical Scrap Book has been revamped with an index and its pages numbered. A new cover has been made by Mrs. Chas. W. Aikins, Jr. which greatly improves its appearance.

STATE LIBRARIAN (Mrs. Fayette E.) Lillian I. Rowe

I wish to thank you for the privilege and honor of serving you these past two years as your State Librarian, and to present to the Fifty-second Annual State Conference my yearly report.

Thirty-seven chapters reported some activity for the librarian, and all but thirteen chapters have chapter librarians. In addition to the fall letters to chapter librarians, eighty-three letters have been written. Twenty volumes have been added to our State D.A.R. Library this year, and in addition, eleven genealogical manuscripts and one supplement and a set of photostatic Bible records. Also reported this year are three volumes of genealogical records prepared last year, but received too late for last year's report. Smoky Hill Chapter sent in 951 pages of genealogical records in four nicely bound volumes. Outstanding in their library work was Eunice Sterling Chapter (1788 pages of genealogical records copied) with a fine genealogical collection donated to the Wichita City Library, with a new book given in honor of each member who dies, and a gift of a microcard reader to the Wichita City Library by Mrs. Harrie S. Mueller, regent of Eunice Sterling Chapter, and her three daughters.

This year the D.A.R. scrapbook contains 9177 inches of publicity and 156 pictures.

REPORT CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG COMMITTEE Mrs. David S. Jackman National Vice Chairman

For over one hundred and fifty years, the Star Spangled Banner has waved "O'er the Land of the Free and the Home of the Brave." This generation shall determine its future and carry it on to greater heights or to oblivion.

If the work of the Flag Committee of the N.S.D.A.R. means as much to the membership at large as it has to the few Daughters whose privilege it has been to serve on this Committee, then we need not fear for the future, but if the attitude of most Daughters of the American Revolution is one of apathy toward and ignorance of, the work of thousands who would destroy this Emblem of Freedom, then we have failed as a Committee. I pray that we have not failed.

The Mid-western states—North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado, have alert Chairmen. The reports sent in to your National Vice-Chairman show a deep interest in acquainting the people of these States with the meaning of our Flag and its correst use.

COLORADO has an especially fine record with ALL 35 Chapters reporting. When you realize the vastness of the State, with the necessity of crossing mountains every way you turn, then you realize how busy this Chairman, Mrs. Clark A. Pratz, has been. She has written over one hundred personal letters. Many flags were given to J.A.C. Clubs, Boy and Girl Scout Troops; the National Days were observed in radio talks and by other means of publicity. Thank you, Mrs. Pratz.

NORTH DAKOTA, Miss Helen Stowell reporting from 6 chapters out of 10, reports 3 Memorial Day Services and the continued Preservation of the Theo. Roosevelt Cabin at Bismark, N. Dakota.

SOUTH DAKOTA—Miss Edith Churton, reports from 10 chapters out of 14 in the state. Six chapters reported the adoption of the Flag Resolution of the Continental Congress of D.A.R. Four chapters sent letters to U. C. Congressmen asking their support of the legislation for Protective Flag Laws. Some members sent personal letters to Representatives for passage of Federal Flag Laws.

NEBRASKA—Mrs. J. H. Parsons, Chaiman, did not have the cooperation of many chapters, only seven out of 44 reporting. This is the apathy we fear. The seven chapters reporting gave the usual proceedings—Salute to the Flag at meetings, the singing of the National Anthem, the displaying of our Flag on National Holidays, etc. One large flag was presented to the Omaha Girl Scouts and one hundred fifty codes were distributed. There were several talks and one original paper.

KANSAS-Mrs. T. F. Rudisill, Chairman. 25 Chapters out of 59 reported. I know Mrs. Rudisill has been most active and should have had more reports. (This is my state and I know her work). Mrs. Rudisill has written many personal letters, as well as a form letter to all chapter chairmen. The Flag Quiz was sent to all Chapters. On Achievement Day, Col. H. J. Steen spoke to 500 High School young people on "Our Flag-What it means to me." The same speech was given over a radio station. Letters were written to Congressmen from seven chapters. The National Holidays were observed in several chapters. Small flags were presented to new citizens and to Hospitals for use on trays. Fifty-one news items appeared in local papers. One original paper was presented.

These reports show that the State Chairmen have tried to make our Chapters flag conscious but all too few of our members apparently are interested.

If we, of the N.S.D.A.R., are not willing to give to Chairmen of this Committee all our enthusiasm and cooperation, how can we expect the citizenry of the United States to care, as they should, about our Emblem of Freedom?

My sincere appreciation to my State Chairmen, and to Mrs. Turner, the National Chairman. I have been pleased to serve as National Vice Chairman of the Mid-western area.

D.A.R. MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP COMMITTEE

(Mrs. Vernon E.) Virginia Bostick McArthur, National Vice Chairman

Western Division

The Western Division is composed of about 160 chapters in Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, North and South Dakota. All states have done various phases of Manual work. Over 6000 Manuals, in 10 languages were distributed to schools, libraries, Y. W. C. A., Naturalization Ccurts, G.I. Brides, Boy and Girl Scouts, Clerks of the Court and Displaced Persons.

Omaha Nebraska chapter leased a film, "Our Nation's Capital" which was shown 18 times to a combined audience of 4521 students. They ordered 3476 Manuals throughout the year. Zebulon Pike chapter, Colorado conducted a class of 53 GI brides, 22 of whom could not speak English.

Many chapters have had programs on the Manual. Several observed "I am an American Day" and studied Immigration laws. One Chapter in Kansas gave a Christmas party for GI brides and the State Chairman gave prizes for the best essays on the Manual.

D.A.R. members in all states welcomed new citizens at the Naturalization Courts and presented them with American Flags and the Manual.

D. A. R. MUSEUM COMMITTEE

(Mrs. Garland P.) Helen B. Ferrell, National Vice Chairman Western Division

The Colorado State Society maintains a D.A.R. Museum room in the State Historical building on the Capitol grounds in Denver. All articles displayed here meet the same requirements as our Museum in Washington. One of the outstanding articles is a fine Chippendale chair used at Washington's inauguration. This is owned by Mrs. E. Thomas Boyd. Many of you will recall, with pleasure, Mrs. Boyd's visit to our district meetings last October. During the Colorado State Conference the Museum committee has arranged for a tea in their Museum room to honor our President General, Mrs. O'Byrne, who will be in attendance.

Recently the Colorado state chairman visited the new Museum in our new building in Washington. So impressed was she by its beauty that I quote from her letter, "I saw that beautiful room and many others, the beauty of it all, the coloring and arrangement makes one very proud to belong to an organization which does such worthwhile things and still has a touch with our glorious past."

Nebraska reports one gift, a small pen sketch made in 1775 of the headquarters of Gen. Gage; Chapters contributed \$4.00 and 16 chapters had programs on and displays of Early American Glass, silver, linen, old lace, and samplers.

North and South Dakota have nothing to report.

You have heard the very fine report of the Kansas State Chairman. I am sure that it will compare favorably with the reports of other states having larger memberships. Since 1937 Kansas has not missed a year when some gift or gifts have not found their way to the Museum. The increase in contributions from chapters and the increase in the number of chapter programs on the Museum are evidences of a growing interest.

A portion of the money contributed this year was designated to be used to refinish three of the Museum chairs and to reline the case given 10 years ago by the State Society in honor of the late Mrs. W. E. Stanley, the First National officer from Kansas. A beautiful coral velvet replaces the original Monks cloth lining.

Those of you who go to Wishington, do budget your time so that you may not be hurried when you visit the new Museum. Also see the state rooms in Memorial Continental Hall. The Colonial Kitchen, the Children's Attic, and Texas Music room are outstanding.

At this time I wish to express my gratitude to the State Society for the Museum case given in my honor, the very nicest thing that has ever been done for me. I am repaid many fold for my years of service and devotion to the Society that I love so much.

Madam regent and members, I do thank you most sincererly.

RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMITTEE

(Mrs. Harold) Lois Johnson Cone, National Vice Chairman

Western Division

As National Vice Chairman of the Radio and Television Committee, I am pleased to report that all of the States in the Western Division: North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Colorado and Kansas, were prompt in their annual reports. There are about 175 D.A.R. chapters in the division with approximately 85 available radio stations.

Television in these states has not yet been available for program making. While its possibilities will be limitless, more professional talent will become necessary.

There is increasing difficulty in obtaining free time from local radio stations. Their public relations periods have been cut to the minimum while the demands from worthy organizations have greatly increased. This is especially true of the stations in the larger cities. In spite of these handicaps the Western Division was able to give approximately 76 broadcasts using a total of 18 hours with a commercial value of about \$1860.00. While the number of broadcasts decreased this year, the length of each broadcast was longer and there was an increase in commercial value.

Kansas Society showed an increase in radio activity, sponsoring 18 broadcasts on 10 radio stations. This represented something over 4 hours. There will also be a period at the time of the state conference and several spots concerning its activities. One of the most interesting Kansas Projects was a series of 5 programs on various phases of National Defense, arranged by our efficient state chairman and Oceanus Hopkins chapter of Pittsburg in connection with the State Teachers' College at Pittsburg. Miss Maude B. Skinner, state chairman of National Defense, prepared the programs. Tape recordings have been made available to other chapters in the state gratis.

The State Society of South Dakota also has a splendid project which is sponsored jointly with the state university radio school and station, a radio drama contest for which \$100 in prizes has been donated. The subject is to be some historically verified event which took place within the present limits of South Dakota. Prizes will be announced on March 18th, 1950. "The Song of the Republic," written by a D.A.R. member and put on by University students, is in tape recordings and available for use.

The State Society of Nebraska has produced the greatest number of radio hours, 6. Regular broadcasts have been made every month since September, 1948 on two local stations in Omaha. Many of the scripts were written by state chairman. Several programs for their state conference, featuring National Officers, are to be given during the state conference in March.

The State Society of Colorado and the State Society of North Dakota have contributed significant programs in which state and National Officers and committee chairmen were featured. These states are handicapped by fewer available radio stations than the other states in the district. Both state chairmen have served faithfully.

Miss Dorothy Frances Wright, our National chairman of Radio and Television feels that radio and television have made rapid advances in the past year as an influence in our present day thinking. These mediums should be used by all Daughters for the preservation. of our American Way of Life.

Recommendations were again made that the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, grant adequate funds to this committee to insure adequate radio and television coverage.

ADVANCEMENT OF AMERICAN MUSIC (Mrs. Nelson) Roberta Kilbourn

Chapters answering questionnaire 31.

Your chairman for Advancement of American Music submits the following report: Mary Wade Strother studied the history of Indian music at one meeting, concluding with a flute solo by a Kansas Wesleyan student. On Flag Day a K. U. student played two piano solos.

General Edward Hand use high school and college students and faculty for their special numbers.

Dodge City have music on every regular program. A paper was read on American folk music with songs to illustrate. They use chapter talent in special numbers. At their Christmas program a Girl Scout troop sang carols.

Molly Foster Berry use chapter talent featuring group singing. At one meeting American composers were listed and something was told of their lives.

On Kansas Day Susannah French Putney devoted the program to American composers.

Randolph Loving does much to help further good music by contributing to the Wichita Symphony fund, and more than half of their members are in the Kansas Association of the Symphony Society. They are featuring an American Folk music program in a chapter meeting this month.

Newton chapter stresses music.

At their Washington Tea Oceanus Hopkins presented music by the Junior treble Clef Club.

The music chairman of the Desire Tobey Sears chapter had a silver tea in her home with the program of music by American composers. The funds given at this tea went into the building fund.

The Topeka chapter featured ballads of early day sung by a trio and square dances with early music.

Mrs. Keller, music chairman, reports a Stephen Foster program in costumes by Music Club Madrigal singers.

Baxter Springs used chapter talent in piano and vocal solos. "Music of Washington's Time" was given by a girls sextet. At an interesting program at Eunice Sterling Dr. Earle Davis presented a program in song and verse on origin of American ballad and American folk lore.

At their annual guest day Courtney-Spalding devoted the entire program to American music given by a boy's octet and soprano, bass, and tenor soloists from Hays High School.

Jeremiah Howard used children of C.A.R. chapter for the musical part of their program.

Martha Vail year book committee called for music at each meeting, appointing a different member to be responsible.

Wellington featured a program by "pilgrimage girls" of piano and vocals.

Fort Larned have music at each meeting, always using chapter talent. At their Washington party the children of the D.A.R. gave a piano recital, and danced the Minuet in costume. At one meeting their music chairman used recordings to bring early American dances to the group.

Wichita chapter was presented an American musical program by Mrs. Merle Bennett.

Arthur Barrett had as their goal this year the memorizing of the fourth verse of our National Anthem. A paper on "American Music" was given by the chairman. At their May meeting the program will be devoted to Indian music.

James Ross have music at every meeting. Mrs. Pearson wrote a sketch titled "Through the Years with Song and Dance" featuring American music. She acted as narrator and the D.A.R. chorus sang assisted by a male quartet. Camp Fire girls and Boy Scouts took part in this program.

At a Kanza chapter meeting the music chairman sang the new song composed by a Florida D. A. R. member.

In closing my term as music chairman may I thank all music chairmen for their endeavor to keep American music before our D.A.R.

AMERICAN INDIANS

The annual letters to the chapters were sent out in September. The need for institution-type tables and chairs for St. Mary's school for Indian girls at Springfield, South Dakota was stressed and the needs met with a splendid response.

The Southwest District gave money for a table and twelve chairs were given by individuals and chapters. \$35.50 cash was also given.

\$69.20 was given to Bacone College for Indian boys and girls at Bacone Oklahoma.

364 pounds of clothing and \$19.50 cash snet to the Navajos. Eight pounds of pictures from greeting cards were sent to White Horse Lake School, Crownpoint, New Mexico.

Seventeen requests for visits to chapters for a talk on this committee were received.

Nine requests for program materials were complied with.

Reminder post cards were sent to the chapters in January. A splendid response in chapters sending in reports and an increasing interest in our American Indians is most encouraging.

AMERICANISM COMMITTEE D.A.R.. MANUALS FOR CITIZENSHIP COMMITTEE Mrs. John L. Berry, State Chairman

Americanism programs reported consisted of two book reviews, two radio broadcasts, the observance of all Patriotic Days, study of the Constitution and Bill of Rights, the stand taken by National against Federal Aid to Education, against State Medical Care, against World Government, and the study of the Immigration Laws.

Six chapters gave prizes for historical essays. They were Arthur Barrett, Dana, Jeremiah Howard, Molly Foster Berry, Wellington, and Samuel Linscott.

Amount of money spent on Americanism, \$140.

48 Chapters have chairmen of these Committees.

33 Chapters sent reports.

690 Manuals were distributed to G.I. Brides, D.P.'s, teacher of Civics for classes in the Elementary School, in State Teacher's College, Naturalization Courts, Naturalization Classes and Councils, Welfare Offices, Boy and Girl Scouts, City and Hing School Libraries, Office of District Clerks, and to New Citizens. New Citizens, 118.

Chapters kept in touch by personal calls, attended both Nturalization Councils and Proceedings. Chapter chairmen, regents, and members have attended several Naturalization Proceedings, the chairmen presenting the new citizens with Manuals and American flags. They also welcomed them by holding receptions in their honor. One chapter Chairman is a member of a Naturalization Council, and another is its president.

Several Chapters had programs on the Manual, quizzes were conducted, and the letters from the National, National Vice, and State Chairmen were read.

The State Chairman called on three G.I. Brides and two D. P's, leaving the Manual in their language where no English was spoken, two German and one French.

APPROVED SCHOOLS COMMITTEE

Co-Chairmen: Mrs. Robert H. Chesney and Mrs. Fred J. McEwen

In spite of the presure and drain of the National Building Fund the 1949 Kansas Approved Schools report is excellent; not quite up to last year, of course, but a fine average.

Almost all Kansas Chapters included Approved Schools in their budgets; some necessarily small amounts, but it is a little here and a little there that adds up so beautifully in our united efforts. Several chapters gave most generously making this education and care of OUR underprivileged children in OUR own D.A.R. schools of first importance. And then there are those with the vision for scholarships; those are real thrills.

From Kansas. Tamassee received \$1,075.00 in scholarships alone, and \$616.15 in cash went to Kate Duncan Smith, and \$184.00 to Crossnore, in addition to small sums to six other schools.

Do please keep in mind that \$25.00 for Approved Schools will equip two students with needed eye glasses, buy school clothing for a child for a year, provide a job for a big boy for a semester, or add a good deal to the fund for the Tamassee Gymnasium-Auditorium we want so much to complete.

Again this year the same loyal and conscientious women all over the State worked hard packing and shipping the huge boxes of used clothing that mean Financial aid to our schools, and help to the many low-income mountain families with very difficult clothing problems. This year we, too, sent a couple of boxes of used dentures to Crossnore. Our complete Approved Schools report shows we gave \$2,593.15 in cash, and on the basis of \$1.00 per pound, the 116 boxes of clothing amounted to \$3,775.00, making a combined total from this state of \$6,368.15.

One of the highlights of the year was an Approved School Tea in November sponsored by the five Wichita Chapters for all Kansas D.A.R. members. This joint effort made it possible to have displays of lovely handicraft from seven of our schools, and many fine pieces of copper ware, exquisitely woven baby things, beautiful hooked rugs, gay looper carpet bags, ties, scarfs, etc., were purchased by the several hundred who attended. It was a pleasure to have so many honor guests, to get acquainted with other chapter members, and best of all to enrich the schools participating by over \$650, of which \$125 was raised on a scholarship raffle, with a gorgeous cake given by our State Regent, Mrs. Ainsworth, as a personal prize. It is hoped to make this affair a yearly one with outstanding speakers from our D.A.R. schools.

Our Fall letter to all Chapter chairmen gave a current survey of the fourteen schools approved by our National Society, and also included complete directions on how and where to send packages to the various schools.

REPORT OF THE KANSAS STATE BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

1949-1950

(Mrs. C. F.) Julia B. Eckelman, Chairman

The members of your By-Laws Committee are : Mrs. Stuart Simpson, Henry Dawson Chapter; Mrs. Robert Good, Phebe Dustin Chapter and Mrs. C. F. Eckelman, Martha Loving Ferrell Chapter.

Following the State Board of Management meeting in October, 1949, the Committee received from the State Recording Secretary, the amendments recommended by the Board at this meeting. Other suggested amendments from Kansas Daughters were also proposed and considered. With the counsel of the State Parliamentarian, seven new amendments were approved. Notice of intention to present these amendments at the State Conference March, 1950, were sent each chapter, State Officer, and District Director on January 1, 1950.

The Committee hopes that each member is familiar with these proposed amendments and the wishes of her chapter regarding the changes to be voted on. We will be very glad to clarify any point which may not be understood, and trust you will call upon us. Additional copies of the amendments will be available at the Registration Desk.

Wichita, Kansas, December 28, 1949

To All Kansas Daughters:

The following amendments to the Kansas State D.A.R. By-Laws, recommended by the State Board of Management and approved by the State Parliamentarian, will be presented for consideration at the Kansas State Conference-Topeka, Kansas. March 9, 10, and 11, 1950.

THAT—Art. IV Section 2, second paragraph be amended to read: "A member having served more than one half term in any office shall be deemed to have served a term. A candidate for State Regent or State Vice Regent must have served as an elected Chapter Regent. A candidate for any state office must have served as an elected chapter officer."

THAT—Art. V, Section 3, second sentence, be amended to read: "She shall be the Chairman of the Memorial Committee."

THAT—Art. V, Section 8, second sentence be amended to read; "She shall be a member of the Memorial Committee."

THAT—Art. VI, Section 3, second paragraph, second sentence

be deleted and the following inserted in it's place: "The term of office shall be one year and no District Officer shall serve more than three consecutive terms."

THAT—Art. VII, Section 1, be amended to read: "The State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose memberships are within the State. District Directors and Chapter Regents shall constitute a State Board of Management."

THAT—Art. IX, Fourth paragraph be amended to read: "A Memorial Committee shall consist of the State Chaplain, chairman, the State Historian, and one other member."

THAT Art. I, Section 1, second paragraph, STANDING RULES, be amended to read:

"The Recording Secretary shall send a copy of the printed Proceedings to all State Officers, Chapter Regents, State Chairmen, District Directors, and to other persons and libraries as shall be designated by the State Regent."

STATE CHAIRMAN, C. A. R. PROMOTERS

(Mrs. Earl C.) Mae Foster Moses

After Congress last year your State Chairman of Promoters was appointed and had the field to herself, so to speak. Formerly her work was combined with that of Junior Membership.

The Promoter's responsibility is to see that her chapter is fully informed about C.A.R. and their activities.

Beginning last July, each of the 59 chapters were fairly bombarded with cards and letters in an effort to find out if there were any children or grandchildren in the homes of D.A.R. members. If so, I asked for their names, addresses and ages. I had visions of a directory for eligible children. A total of 231 letters and 97 cards were sent out; also a questionnaire.

If a chapter does not know all about C.A.R., what the requirements are for membership and that it is the patriotic duty of a chapter to sponsor a Society, also that C.A.R. is a children's organization,

run by the children, (as much as possible) your Chairman did not write enough letters or they were not read to the chapter members.

A Promoter's duty is what the name implies. But we have nothing to sell but an idea, namely: That the children deserve a patriotic organization all their own.

We have 47 chapter Promoters. 10 replied with complete lists of eligible children. 29 replied to the questionnaire. Only one chapter reported no children to work with. The number that replied is not quite half, but in that group 10 receive the C.A.R. Magazine; nine had made an effort to organize a Society.

Your Chairman reported C.A.R. activities at Shawnee Mission Board meeting and Southwest District Meeting last October. Attended the last Continental Congress and C.A.R. Convention.

Peleg Gorton and Fort Supply Trail Chapter invitations were regretted because of conflicting engagements. C.A.R. Societies presented the program on both occasions.

As Senior President of Rebecca Moore Odell Society, have attended seven of their eight meetings since organization, April 30, 1949.

Because of the great interest in C.A.R. of Mrs. Ainsworth and Mrs. Shrewder, and their generosity, the State Society put out the much talked about news sheet "The Sunflower Special". In the state it went out with the Regent's Bulletin to all chapter regents and many others. Also to all State Presidents and Junior State Presidents by your chairman.

Many replied with flattering comments, accompanied by their "News Sheets" and State Year Books, which heve been an inspiration and have given us many new ideas and much information.

An Organizing President has been appointed in Coffeyville and St. John. In the latter, Mrs. Manter Bock, will organize a Society in the near future.

A Society organization in Coffeyville was scheduled for February 24, but due to a technicality, had to be postponed until after the next Board Meeting in Washington. When organizing a society be sure to send a name to Washington for approval of the Board before organization.

REPORT OF CONSERVATION CHAIRMAN Mrs. L. L. Klein, State Chairman

Fifty-five chapters have Conservation Chairmen. I have had reports from very few chairmen so my report is incomplete.

Eight chapters reported having had a program on Conservation. About 90% of members belong to Red Cross, many members have worked on Cancer control drives and sale of T.B. stamps. Two chapters have members as county chairmen of Polio Fund drive, 836 hours of work in various health agencies was reported, most chapters reported work with youth agencies; Boy and Girl Scouts, 4-H Clubs etc.

Since soil conservation is being stressed so strongly by the Farm Bureau in the counties there has been less need for this work in our D.A.R.

Particularily fine reports were sent in by the Lucretia Griswold Latimer, Eunice Sterling, Oceanus Hopkins, Atchison, Susannah French Putney and William Wilson Chapters.

Since the work done by the chapters for St. Francis Boys Homes is given in detail in the report of that committee I will not repeat it here. Before I close my report I want to express my deep appreciation of the cooperation of the State Officers, Chapter Chairmen and the individual members, particularly those of the Dodge City Chapter in my work the past two years.

REPORT OF STATE CHAIRMAN OF GOOD CITIZENSHIP PILGRIMAGE COMMITTEE (Mrs. G. W.) Irene Houser

As your State Chairman of the Good Citizenship Pilgimage Committee, it gives me great pleasure to submit the following report.

The fifteenth annual Good Citizeship Pilgrimage contest was conducted from October 15 to December 15.

Again this year, the committee work was divided into the four D.A.R. districts and a chairman was appointed for each district.

Fifty of the fifty-nine chapters appointed chairmen.

Letters were mailed in September to each char er chairman and chapter Regent announcing the contest and giving all details of the Good Citizenship Program. A copy of the history of the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage program was also sent to each chapter chairman to be used constructively in a chapter program.

Also, letters announcing the contest and giving the details were mailed to 623 superintendents of public high schools. 124 schools entered the contest, which was an increase of four over last year.

Thirty-five Good Citizenship pins were presented by chapters to their contestants. The Molly Foster Berry Chapter of Fort Scott gave a pin to each of the three winners of the Southeast District and the Atchison Chapter of Atchison also presented a pin to each of the three winners of the Northeast District.

Certificates of award were mailed by each District chairman to all of her Good Citizens, accompanied by a letter of congratulations. In addition, a letter of appreciation was mailed to each school entering a contestant.

Entrants in the contest were senior girls in accredited public high schools. Each was chosen by classmates and faculty as best exemplifying the qualifications of a good citizen, which are dependability, service, leadership, and patriotism. A questionnaire was sent by the District chairmen to each contestant for answering. The three highest from each district were considered by the state judges to determine the girl who was to be the State Winner.

Miss Josephine Van Scoyk of Burlington High School, Burlington, Kansas in the Southeast District was selected as State Pilgrim.

Miss Van Scoyk desires to continue her education and to prove worthy of the citizenship award she has won.

Three Chapters each entered a candidate for the scholarship: Abilene Oceanus Hopkins, Polly Ogden.

Ten chapters gave or have plans to give special recognition in some way to girls doing outstanding work in home economics and home making: Abilene, Arthur Barrett, Desire Tobey Sears, Martha Vail, Mollie Foster Berry, Nathan Edson, Oceanus Hopkins, Peleg Gorton, Polly Ogden, Uvedale.

Seven chapters reported time given by members to further home making activities by girls, through such organizations as FHA, 4-H Clubs, Girl Scouts, etc: Abilene 22 hours; Mary Wade Strother 155 hours; Nathan Edson 24 hours; Newton members did work of this type, but no hours stated; Oceanus Hopkins 12 hours; Peleg Gorton 135 hours; Poly Ogden 10 hours.

A number of chapters expressed interest in active work for this committee next year. Though the Girl Home Maker activities were carried on by only one-third of the chapters, what was done was most outstanding and of high quality. All reflect in a fine way upon the program of the Kansas Society Daughters of American Revolution.

GIRL HOME MAKERS SCHOLARSHIP

The Girl Home Makers State Scholarship is one aspect of the Girl Home Makers Committee work, through which the Kansas Society gives recognition to outstanding work in home economics and home making and encouragement to higher education in this field. The fund is obtained through voluntary contributions by interested D.A.R. members. The Girl Home Makers Scholarship idea was initiated by Mrs. Frank Williams in 1945 as a State Board of Management project and in 1948 became entirely a responsibility of the Girl Home Makers State Committee.

The first award, \$50.00, was made at the state annual conference, March 1946, to Barbara Kauffman, sponsored by Jane Dean Coffey Chapter. Barbara majored in home economics at the Coffeyville Junior College and was graduated with honors. She is now married to Mr. Sam Cheeseman, who is preparing at the University of Kansas to be a teacher of chemistry. In addition to her home making responsibilities, Barbara is working at the telephone office to help with the family finances.

In March 1947, the fifty dollar scholarship was awarded Joanne Wolgast, who was sponsored by Arthur Barrett Chapter. Joanne enrolled in home economics at Kansas State College the following September. She is now in her junior year and has made an excellent record in every way.

Patricia Lawrence, sponsored by Peleg Gorton Chapter, received the fifty dollar scholarship award in 1948. She is now a sophomore in home economics at Kansas State College and is preparing to be a teacher. She has done highly satisfactory work in spite of the fact that she has very limited financial means and must earn much of her way. The scholarship was definitely a contributing factor in making possible her first year of college.

The scholarship fund in 1949 reached the sum of \$75.00 and two were awarded, one \$50.00 and one \$25.00, Delores Zimmerman, sponsored by Olathe Chapter, received the \$50.00 scholarship; and Carolyn Kittell, sponsored by Oceanus Hopkins Chapter, the \$25 one. Delores is a freshman in home economics at Kansas State College and Carolyn at K.S.T.C., Pittsburg, Kansas. Both girls are doing fine work in their courses and extra class activities.

This year, 1950, three \$25 scholarships are being awarded. The recipients are: Mary Elizabeth Sich, sponsored by Polly Ogden Chapter, and will attend Kansas State College, Manhattan; Dawn Tedlock, sponsored by Oceanus Hopkins Chapter, and will attend Kansas State Teachers College, Pittsburg; Joan Verliene Engle, sponsored by Abilene Chapter, and will attend Kansas State College, Manhattan. All three are outstanding high school students with fine records in regard to scholarship, personality, leadership, and interest and achievement in home economics and home making.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS (Miss) Novma J. Mering

The interest in Junior American Citizens Clubs continues to grow with each year and, therefore, each year I have a better report to give you.

Two years ago when I took this work, the report to Continental Congress was 130 clubs and 3,286 memebers; last year Kansas reported 202 clubs with a membership of 4,686. This year we will report 270 clubs with 6,577 members.

JUNOR MEMBERSHIP

Kansas Juniors made a very fine record last year. We won \$10.00 at Congress for the greatest increase in membership of Juniors for states with a membership under 5,000, but our percentage was highest of any state. This prize money is being used for prizes in our state for the chapter with the greatest increase in Junior membership and the chapter which has sold the largest amount of stationery for the Helen Pouch scholorship fund.

John Haupt chapter of Topeka has the largest increase in Junior membership with nineteen new Juniors. Eunice Sterling chapter has sold the largest amount of stationery, with a contribution to the scholarship fund of \$13.15.

Fifty-one of our chapters have Junior Membership Chairmen, though only twenty-seven chapters report Junior members. Fort Supply Trail with twenty-three, John Haupt with twenty-four, Jane Dean Coffey with seventeen, Eunice Sterling with sixteen and Jeremiah Howard with eleven Juniors all should have special mention.

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Three of the Junior Committees sponsor C.A.R. groups. Jane Dean Coffey, Fr. Supply Trail and Jeremiah Howard. John Haupt chapter has a C.A.R. chairman and plans a C.A.R. chapter.

It has been a very great privilege to serve as your Junior Chairman for the past two years. Anyone who has had the opportunity to serve under Mrs. Ainsworth has been very fortunate. I hope I have been able to spread the gospel of the need for Juniors in each of our chapters. The enthusiasm these young women have is the very thing we need in D.A.R. to carry on the work our National Society has set out to do.

JUVENILE CODE COMMISSION COMMITTEE

As you know the Juvenile Code Commission Committee was appointed to work with the Kansas Juvenile Code Commission and communicate to, and urge the study of the findings of this commission. This work was admirably done by your chairman Mrs. Joe R. Beeler before her resignation a year ago.

The Commission presented a new Juvenile Court law to the legislature but very little of the law was enacted. The commission was not continued so there has been nothing from the commission to report to the chapters.

There seems to be little reason to continue the committee as it is, but the Juvenile Code Commission has made such a thorough study of Juvenile problems and needs that we feel many of their recommendations will come up for enactment later on as people are better educated to the needs.

The Kansas D.A.R. should keep in touch with proposed legeslation in this field.

This might be done by a special legislative committee to consider legislation in all fields, or by a committee member on some of our Youth committees, or even the conversation Committee, who would direct their attention particularly to laws and efforts for the care and conservation of Youth, the nations greatest resource.

The Kansas D.A.R. must continue their program of education and training children in normal living so that the delinquent child does not develop.

Daughters of the American Revolution

STATE CHAIRMAN OF MEMBERSHIP (Mrs. Vernon E.) Virginia Bostick McArthur

This report completes ten years as your State Chairman of Membership. 1n 1940 the Kansas Society had 53 chapters with a membership of 2338. We now have 63 chapters with a membership of 3202.

Mimeographed letters were sent in August to each chapter chairman and personal letters were written to State officers and district directors urging them to be ever alert for new members.

With four new chapters organized this year, our membership has increased but there have been too many rsignations. Won't you urge all your resigned members to be re-instated. The Daughters of the American Revolution have a battle to fight to keep this country free and secure. It can be done only by the united effort of all Daughters to work for a greatly increased membership.

It has been a distinct honor and privilege to work with Mrs. Berger, Mrs. Shrewder and Mrs. Ainsworth, all the State officers, Chapter regents and Chapter Chairmen, these ten years. Thank you all for your many courtesies extended to me.

REPORT OF MOTION PICTURE DEPARTMENT

(Mrs. Roy) Laura L. Rankin

Work in the Motion Pictures Department has followed somewhat the plans set up for last year.

An important feature of the work is the use of the D.A.R. Motion Picture Guide which is compiled monthly by D.A.R. women who give the very best evaluation on all pictures. All D.A.R.'s should use this dependable information before attending the showing of a film.

Members are urged to select and attend musical, historical and wholesome comedy films; to avoid as much as possible sex, crime, gangster and drinking pictures. Thus, through interest and support of better films, objectionable ones will be eliminated.

Some chapters have a period when worth while films are recommended and discussed informally.

We can promote better conditions by urging theatre managers to show children's programs once a month, preferably on a Saturday morning; also family films on Friday nights so that the family may enjoy good clean shows together.

Progress is slow but reassuring.

REPORT STATE CHAIRMAN OF NATIONAL DEFENSES (Miss) Maude B Skinner

Madame Regent and Members of the State Board of Management: Chapter Chairman representation. 58 Chapters in the State have a National Defense Chairman. This is 100% with one exception.

2. Literature Distributed—

Literature was distributed by 6 chapters. Dana Chapter (Columbus) recommended John T. Flynn's book, "The Road Ahead," to the Public Library Books Committee. James Ross Chapter (Kansas City) distributed 75 Manuals to prospective new citizens.

- 3. Cooperation with Schools
 - a. As to teaching history; 3 Chapters reported a check.

b. As to text book checking; 4 Chapters reported checking of text books. The Chairman in Jane Dean Coffey Chapter (Coffeyville) is at present checking an American Government text. Reports show satisfactory appraisal.

Letters written to U.S. Senators and Representatives as follows: Nine letters on Socialized Medicine and D. P. Bill (1 chapter); letters protesting Federalized Education (1 chapter); on Hoover Commission (1 chapter.)

V-Elections

17 Chapters reported that their members voted at the last elections and intended to vote during 1950 general election—however, the actual number of members were estimated or given as approximate figures.

VI-Chapter Reports

8 Chapters report monthly on National Defense, the time alloted varying from 2 minutes to 15 minutes. One Chapter (Emporia) had all programs during year based on National Defense.

15 Chapters reported one National Defense meeting each year. 2 Chapters include Defense news through giving reports from the National Magazine and current events at each meeting.

VII—Special Activities Reported

- Mary Wade Strother Chapter, Salina, Kansas: Program on Navy, Speaker from Navy Recruiting Office.
- General Edward Hand, Ottawa, Kansas: An essay contest among the rural schools on "What the Flag Means to Me." awarded three prizes. Winners read their essays at the May meeting.
- Oceanus Hopkins Chapter, Pittsburg, Kansas: National Defense Bulletin Board, Pittsburg Public Library, and National Defense Radio Broadcasts.
- Eunice Sterling Chapter, Wichita, Kansas: Literature on National Defense was distributed at Boys State during June, 1949 and a display was put in Public Library Bulletin Board near time of Flag Day.
- Neodesha Chapter, Neodesha, Kansas: A Junior American Citizens Club was organized at one of our grade schools with 15 members. Plan to increase membership. Study patriotism, the Flag, immigration, civic problems.
- Arthur Barrett Chapter, Marysville, Kansas: The Chapter will cooperate with other Patriotic organizations in the dedication of the Marker for the grave on Sarah Keyes, a daughter of a Revolutionary soldier, a member of the ill-fated Donner party who is buried in the historic Alcove Spring area in this county. William Wilson, Garden City, Kansas: A special check on the text
- books have been made in the schools and found satisfactory. Chapter is working toward placing our D. A. R. Literature where it will be accessable to the public school children.

Isabella Weldin Chapter, Augusta, Kansas: A decorated D.A.R. car in the community Flag Day Parade.

Samuel Linscott, Holton, Kansas: The chapter each year gives a sum of money to the Holton High School and to rural schools in Jackson County to be used as prizes to promote Good Citizen-

ship.

Atchison Chapter, Atchison, Kansas: A series of three programs in which we have endeavored to show conditions in the U.S., in Europe, and other suggestions of government before the public. By comparison and discussion we have brought to the attention of our members the strength and weakness of our country and the needs for National Defense.

VIII—Suggestions for Improvement

Several Chairmen reported lack of time for National Defense reports and discussions, and thought this was a mistake. One Chairman wrote: "We have such a broad program that even with Executive Board Meetings to lighten business somewhat, there is never time enough. D.A.R. is not a Study Club, and it is hard to make the members realize we have a patriotic duty in keeping informed about current issues as well as guarding tradition of the past."

CONTRIBUTION OF MRS. E. THOMAS BOYD National Vice Chairman

Reports on the fine addresses made by Mrs. Boyd during the District Meetings were frequently mentioned by the Chairmen. These messages were appreciated by all who heard her. One Regent wrote: "I heard Mrs. Boyd three times at the Fall District Meetings and have quoted her in the Chapter and to individuals. She was splendid."

ACTIVITIES OF THE STATE CHAIRMAN

1.---Correspondence:

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A general letter was sene to all Chapter Regents and Chapter Chairmen. (a copy is attached). Numerous requests for information and material from Chapter Chairmen have been answered. Letters have been written to the U.S. Senators and Third District Representatives protesting Federal Aid to Education, Socialized Medicine, and the D. P. Bill. Correspondence has been maintained with the National Defense Office and with the State Regent relative to Committee work.

Total correspondence: 25 individual letters, 174 general letters to Chapter Regents and Chapter Chairmen, 73 postals.

2. National Defense Bulletin Board:

In line with our emphasis on publicity of National Defense, a Bulletin Board has been maintained in the Public Library. The local Chapter has cooperated in this project. Your State Chairman has placed approximately fifty phamphlets received from the National Defense Office on this bulletin board, including information on these subjects: World Government, Federal Aid to Education, Socialized Medicine, the United Nations, Communism, reprints from the D.A.R. magazine, Congressional Records, etc. The local newspapers have given the project good publicity. (see enclosed clipping.)

3. National Defense Radio Broadcasts

As an additional emphasis on publicity of National Defense, your State Chairman has supervised and helped to outline six National Defense Radio Broadcasts over station KSEK, Pittsburg, Kansas, as follows: (one over KOAM)

Kansas Day Program, KSEK, January 29, 1950 World Government, KSEK, February 5, 1950 Book, "The Road Ahead," KSEK, February 12, 1950 Socialized Medicine, KSEK, February 19, 1950 Washington's Birthday Program, KOAM, February 22, 1950 Federal Aid to Education, KSEK, February 26, 1950

These broadcasts represented a creative project and our scripts were original. The speakers appearing on these Discussion Programs included representatives from community groups such as The Veterans of Foreign Wars, The Medical Society, The City Federation of Women's Clubs, The Kansas State Teachers' College, Pittsburg High School, the Bar Association, members of Oceanus Hopkins Chapter and the State Chairman of National Defense. The State Chairman of Radio, Mrs. E. O. Blake and the Chapter Chairman of Radio (Oceanus Hopkins Chapter) cooperated by sending notices to Chapters of these broadcasts. Special thanks are due to the Radio Studio of Kansas State Teachers College for making the tape recordings of these broadcasts and their assistance in making transcriptions of these programs. Due t othis service the tape recordings may be loaned to any Chapter or radio station for future broadcasting.

A limited supply of these transcribed programs are available for distribution at the State Convention.

With this amount the following things were purchased: 26 bedspreads; 15 rugs; 30 pairs draperies; 10 study lamps; 20 wire baskets for clothing 8 gollons paint; new flooring (rubber tile) laid in halls.

With money sent by chapters and not marked for furnishing, a new automatic washer and ironer was bought for the Ellsworth Unit.

Through the fine cooperation and helpfulness of these people, has this report been made possible:

FIRST: To the State Highway Department, Mr. L. G. Siler, Maintenance Engineer, and to the Division Engineers, my thanks for checking, repairing and maintaining the markers on the State Highways; obviously the State Highway Department cannot go out of its jurisdiction to maintain the markers for us, so the off the highway markers are our problem.

SECOND: To the Chapters, through their Santa Fe Trail Marker Chairman, Regents and members who checked markers on county roads, and out of the way places, my thanks; and

THIRD: To the Civic Clubs, County Engineers and patient husbands, my thanks.

The survey for 1948-1950 shows Ninety-eight markers. We gained one marker, which is situated in Haskell County, on the South side of Highway US-160 on the Grant County line; but have been unable to ascertain if it were omitted from the last survey, or if it has been moved into Haskell County recently.

Out of the ninety-eight markers in the state, six are now reported to need attention.

In Johnson County—Marker No. 4 located approximately three miles southwest of Olathe is reported in bad condition. The Olathe Chapter is considering what they can do about this.

In Wabaunsee County—The Highway Department reports the marker needs attention; the County Engineer states the marker is standing and can be seen from the road.

In Rice County—Marker No. 7, The State Highway Department reports that the base is beyond repair. The Sterling Chapter is undecided what they can do.

In Pawnee County—The State Highway Department reports that Marker No. 2 has been moved and the base is badly cracked.

In Ford County—The State Highway Department reports that Marker No. 1, on Mule Hill, is in fair condition. Marker No. 2 South of Spearville has a poor base.

DISTRICT DIRECTOR REPORTS

NORTHEAST DISTRICT

(Mrs. Irwin S.) Helen H. Vincent, Director

In the Northeast district we have the distinction of having the oldest and the youngest chapters in the state—both in Topeka. On April 2nd of 1950 Topeka chapter will be 54 years old, and John Haupt also of Topeka, will be slightly less than four months old. Betty Washington, October 17th will be 54; General Edward Hand, on November 24th will be 51 years old; and 44 years ago, October 23rd, Captain Jessie Leavenworth was installed. Atchison, 42 years ago last January 29 was a new chapter; Samuel Linscott, January 28th was 41 years old; also July 26th James Ross will become 41 years old. Twenty-nine years ago next November 11th, Olathe Chapter was founded, and Arthur Barrett 22 years ago, January 26th, was founded at Marysville. Then with Shawnee and John Haupt just four months old in April, we have eleven chapters in our Northeast district.

Including these new chapters we have a net gain of 55 members in D.A.R., or a total membership of 738 daughters.

Our state regent has visited all but one of these chapters during her term of office, attending their regular meetings, or especially called meetings and parties in her honor. Due to your director's short term of office, illness, and absence from the state, she has been unable to visit but one chapter, but she hopes to accept invitations to several chapter meetings before the year is over. A great many letters have been written, and prompt replies have been received from every chapter Regent (including their reports.)

Food and rummage sales have been the main projects for money making within the chapters. "Patches," a many quilt-block stuffed dog, has been made in quantities and sold by Topeka chapter. Lawrence chapter. Betty Washington, has helped some Haskell Institute students through "Good Citizenship Pilgrimage" work, and General Edward Hand helped with the P.T.A. milk fund project. Captain Jesse Leavenworth gave gifts of money to a local hospital, and much canned goods to "Small Memorial Home." Atchison paid Girl Scout dues for girls at "The State Home." Samuel Linscott was especially active in Red Cross and Cancer drives. James Ross did outstanding work in distributing manuals for citizenship. Olathe re-set a Santa Fe marker. Arthur Barrett has collected dues on time for the fifth consecutive year. The two youngest chapters, Shawnee and John Haupt, have been busy organizing and getting acquainted with themselves and the duties in D.A.R. Shawnee helped with a new citizens' party, and presented a rose to each new citizen. John Haupt has 24

Junior members included in her 46 membership, making the largest Junior membership committee in the state. Our district tied with Southeast claiming 31 Junior members each.

Seven chapters reported work done with the American Indians, and a total of \$73.00 donated. All chapters reported donations to Approved Schools with approximately \$300.00 given in cash and clothing. A few chapters have shown interest in D.A.R. Library, Motion Picture, Radio, Junior American Citizenship, Music, and Museum, with occasional programs on these subjects. Interest has been shown in Manuals for Citizenship through attendance at the naturalization hearings, and in the distribution of manuals and flags.

Donations of home canned goods, milk, and home-made soap to local institutions; honoring good citizenship girls; attending Shawnee Mission Meetings (including a few money donations) sending supplies, cash and cards to St. Francis Boys 'School, approximately \$75.00; selling cards and cook books for Valley Forge; contributing to the press; helping Girl Home Makers; keeping up on Historical Research and Genealogical Records; and contributing in small amounts to Ellis Island, have been undertaken by a large percentage of the chapters.

Nine chapters have contributed to the Building Fund, and three have done work on a Student Loan Fund.

There are no active C.A.R. chapters in the district, but it is hoped Topeka will re-organize one soon, since more interest is being shown.

Nine chapters have taken several subscriptions to the D.A.R. Magazine; and National Defense, and the Correct Use of the Flag are being used as programs by many chapters.

With Northeast District as host to the state conference in March, and the interest shown through prompt replies to letters accepting their duties for the conference, this year, of 1950, promises to be an outstanding one.

NORTHWEST DISTRICT

The Northwest District met October 24th, in Junction City, with Lois Warner Chapter as hostess, Mrs. Walter Crary, District Director presided. Nearly a hundred were present, program was interesting. Mrs. Thomas Boyd, Honorary Vice President General of Colorado was guest speaker, State Officers and State Chairman were present.

The Northwest District has one new Chapter, John Athey, at Oakley was organized in August with 21 members and nine more papers pending. We now have 17 chapters and our membership is a little over 700. Chapters are all striving to raise sufficient funds to complete their quota on the new Building Fund, dues have been paid in one on time, in most cases and new members are being added to our membership.

D.A.R. projects have been stressed in all programs, meetings are opened using ritual, National Anthem, and Pledge of Allegiance at each meeting.

Many chapters have sent funds to the St. Mary's High School for Indian girls at Springfield, South Dakota, and all Chapters have contributed to the Approved Schools—cash and boxes of clothing, have been sent.

St. Francis Boys' Home, our own Kansas Project was part of each Chapter's Budget, all giving generously, one chapter giving a 78 piece set of dishes and a pair of pillows, besides gifts and cards to the boys, two other chapters each gave \$25.00, another \$40.00.

The majority of the Chapters sponsor The Good Citizenship Pilgrim Girl, presenting them with pins and having them as guests at D.A.R. meetings, and the Girl Home Makers Clubs, entertaining the girls and their instructors and presenting Certificates of Award to the girls. Some chapters have given cash prizes to the outstanding girl.

Chapters are recognizing the need for C.A.R. and J.A.C. one chapter has 18 J.A.C. clubs with 475 members, another 23 clubs with 673 members and another conducts story-telling and play hour each summer with an attendance last summer of 116 children.

The Genealogical Records chairmen have been busy, records of marriages, cemeteries and family histories are being typed and copies placed where they will be available when needed.

National Defense has had a place on the program of our Chapters, one chapter has a discussion of the current editorial in "Life" Magazine at each meeting, others use articles from our own D.A.R. Magazine.

Chapters have contributed to the Valley Forge Memorial and Eisenhower Memorial Stone, buying Cook books and cards

Chapters have expressed their appreciation of the visits of the State Regent, Mrs. Mary Ainsworth, to their Chapters, believing much benefit will come from the visits.

May I express my appreciation and thanks to the Regents and members of the Northwest District for their cooperation. We will strive for greater accomplishments in the years ahead.

It is with much pride in the accomplishments of the seventeen chapters in the Southwest District that I present these facts and figures compiled from the regent's reports.

American Indians: Six chapters gave a total of \$107.00 to the general fund; 7 gave \$92.50 to St. Mary's Indian School; 5 gave \$46.10 to Bacone; 1 gave \$10.00 to the Navajo project; 1 gave \$10.00 to Indian Child Care, Ft. Defiance, Ariz; and 5 chapters sent clothing for Indian Welfare.

Americanism and D.A.R. Manual: Five chapters gave six pro-

grams, four chapters report members wrote to Congressmen on pending legislation.

Approved Schools: Twelve chapters sent clothing to Kate Duncan Smith, Tamassee, Crossnore, Pine Mt. and others; cash sent to Kate Duncan Smith by 10 chapters \$287,50; \$571.50 by 11 to Tamassee; \$118.50 by 7 to Crossnore; \$65.00 by 2 to Blue Ridge; Eunice Sterling sent \$40.00 to each of these, Berea, Pine Mt., and Berry; Fort Supply Trail sent \$25.00 to the Auditorium fund at Tamassee; 1 medical and 3 full scholarships; Ninnescah sent 1 scholarship to Tamassee; Total amount \$1436.50. The five Wichita chapters gave an Approved School Tea, under the direction of Mrs. Beulah Chesney. Minisa Chapter won the Scholarship at the tea. Details may be obtained grom Mrs. Chesney if any chapter wants them.

C.A.R. Promoters: Two chapters reported organizations, Fort Supply Trail and Jeremiah Howard; two chapters reported organization pending; \$10.00 cash to the committee from 2 chapters.

Conservation: Two chapters gave programs; 3 gave to the March of Dimes, Cancer Fund, and Tuberculosis Fund a total of \$16.00. William Wilson chapter is a member of the National Wildlife Federation; Wichita reports a study of soil erosion by members; every member of Randolph Loving gave time to civic organizations; Kanza sent seeds to veterans in hospitals.

Correct Use of the Flag: Wellington Chapter gave flag codes to all teachers and Scout Leaders; all 17 display the flag at meetings

D.A.R. Good Citizenship Pilgrim: Five chapters participated, with and give the Pledge of Allegiance.

the program having been presented to 6. Five chapters gave awards.
D. A. R. Magazine: A complete total was not given by all chapters, partial total 129; some chapters reported on increase in the subscriptions; 3 chapters placed subscriptions in public libraries, and 1 in a school library. Jeremiah Howard has reported 50% of members subscribing.

D. A. R. Museum: Eunice Sterling gave \$25.00 in cash, \$15.00 to reline a case in the museum with coral velvet, \$11.00 to refurnish a chair, 2 silver candle sticks, snuffers and tray, a handmade, embroidered, silk veil made in 1811 Fort Supply Trail gave a rye straw bread basket 50 years old and \$5.00; Jonathan Gilbert gave \$5.00 as did Randolph Loving. Wichita chapter gave a gift of a Steuben Glass carafe to the Wichita Museum, and a sandwich bowl to the National Museum, no report on the acceptance as yet.

D. A. R. Student Loan Fund: \$2.00 from Wellington chapter. William Wilson plans to establish a fund to aid students in Garden City School. Ellis Island: \$69.00 reported sent to committee; 4 chapters report programs, or the use of Ellis Island Film.

Filing and Lending: Two chapters made use of material from this bureau; Uvedale maintains a shelf in public library.

Genealogical Records: \$21.00 in funds from 3 chapters; Eunice Sterling sent two pages of supplement to State Library, 1191 pages of copied records to the National Library, plus "Biographical Records of Sedgwick County"; 397 pages copied records, 23 volumes, historical clippings from newspapers, and a micro-card reader to the Wichita Library.

Girl Home Maker: \$7.00 to committee from 2 chapters; 4 shapters presented program; Martha Vail chapter gave 20 awords.

Junior American Citizens: Three chapters report programs given; three chapters report 166 clubs; Martha Vail reported 1202 children participating, and Jeremiah Howard, 2273.

Junior Membership: Six chapters reported junior members separate from other members. Fort Supply Trail leads with 23. Helen Pouch Scholarship fund, \$29.00 from 3 chapters.

Membership: 977, with 11 chapters that reported new members by confirmation; others reported papers pending. Three chapters placed markers at grave of those lost by death.

Motion Pictures: Three chapters gave programs. William Wilson had films of the National Parks and Wildlife; four showed the Ellis Island Film.

National Defense: Ten chapters gave a total of 14 programs; Eunice Sterling had a report at each meeting; Minisa had current events each time; others had pertinent reports from the D.A.R. magazine. Mrs. E. Thomas Boyd, National Chairman of Defense, spoke at the District Conference in St. John, October 28, 1950.

New Building Fund: Eleven chapters are on the Honor Roll, of these 8 are also on the Star Honor Roll; Fort Supply Trail reported an additional \$185.15 since being on the Star Honor Roll in 1949. All chapters have contributed to the fund.

Valley Forge: \$35.00 cash to committee; 3 chapters gave \$127.50 to Eisenhower Memorial Stone Fund; purchases included 93 boxes of Christmas cards, 4 boxes note cards, 47 D.A.R. cookbooks; 2 chapters gave \$15.00 to State Seal; William Wilson gave \$25.00 to Bell Tower; Jonathan Gilbert purchased a memorial plate; Eunice Sterling gave \$25.00 for State Regent's name, and placed 6 patriot's names.

Mrs. Laura Goodspeed Horton of Kanza chapter, has been helping 8 underprivileged children become better Ameican citizens.

William Wilson sent 6 Care Packages, 224 lbs. of clothing to Finland, and 60 lbs. of books to the Philippines.

BY-LAWS

of the

KANSAS STATE SOCETY

of the

NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE

AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised and Adopted at the State Conference March 11, 1950

ARTICLE I.

Name

The name of this society shall be the Kansas State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II.

Object

Section I. This Society pledges fidelity and loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the objects of which are:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of cclebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary and enlightening public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Section 2. Its purpose shall be to further the above plans of the National Society and to maintain harmonious co-operation among the chapters in Kansas and to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

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ARTICLE III.

Membership

Section 1. The membership of this State Society shall include all Daughters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who are members in good standing of some Chapter in Kansas.

Good standing shall be interpreted to mean that all National and State dues have been paid.

Section 2. Chapters failing to pay State dues shall not be entitled to representation at State Conference, to receive State Communications or participate in any State affairs until dues are paid to the State Society.

ARTICLE IV.

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Chaplain, State Recording Secretary, State Treasurer, State Registrar, State Historian, State Librarian, State Reporter, and State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 2. No member shall be eligible for election to any state office or appointment to any state chairmanship who has not been a member in good standing of the Kansas State Society for one year. No member shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms, and no member who has served one term in any state office, shall be eligible to election to any other state office, except that of State Regent and State Vice Regent, until the expiration of one year.

A member having served more than one-half term in any office shall be deemed to have served a term. A candidate for State Regent or State Vice-Regent must have served as an elected Chapter Regent. A candidate for any State office must have served as an elected chapter officer.

Section 3. Election of officers shall take place on the last day of the annual State Conference occuring in the year of the election of National Officers.

Election shall be by ballot, for a term of three years.

A majority of votes cast shall elect.

The terms of office of the State Regent and State Vice Regent begin at the close of the Continental Congress which confirms their election.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected and confirmed, beginning with the year of 1950. Provided that. at the next regular election, to be held in 1948, the officers shall be elected for a two year term.

Section 4. The nominating committee shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the October State Board of Management meeting.

This elected member shall serve as chairman of the nominating committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to submit names of candidates for the state offices on the second day of the annual State Conference of election year. Nominations other than those made by the nominating committee may also be made from the floor. All candidates must have given their consent before nomination.

The nominating committee shall, immediately after November first, notify all Chapters of impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted.

Candidates shall be selected from all districts of the state.

No person shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at State Conference.

Section 5. When the several candidates for State Regent are nominated, each in turn shall nominate her State Corresponding Secretary. The ballot cast for a State Regent shall serve, automatically, as a ballot for her State Corresponding Secretary. Thus each is an elected officer. In no other instance may two officers be elected from the same chapter.

Section 6. In recognition of valuable service to the State Society the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by acclamation at a State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent.

ARTICLE V.

Duties of Officers

Section 1. STATE REGENT: The State Regent, in addition to performing the duties which pertain to her office, according to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, shall preside at all meetings of this Society, of the Executive Committee, of the State Board of Management and to the Kansas Delegation to the Continental Congress. She shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for, sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer for moneys appropriated by the Society, and may call meetings of the Executive Committee or Board of Management whenever she may consider it important and necessary. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter General Chairman, prepare the program for the Annual State Con ference. She shall present at the Annual State Conference all amend ments proposed to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society and such other matters as she may deem worthy of consideration. She shall be a member of the printing committee. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees, excepting a nominating committee.

She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer, to have recorded in the State Treasurer's books, all membership reports received from the National Society, following each meeting of the National Board. The State Treasurer will duly record the same.

Upon her confirmation, the incoming State Regent may appoint a State Parliamentarian, and Consulting Genealogist.

Section 2. STATE VICE REGENT: The State Vice Regent, in the absence or disability of the Regent, shall perform the duties pertaining to the office of Regent. She shall be a member of the printing and stationery committee and a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. STATE CHAPLAIN: The State Chaplain shall officiate in the offering prayer and other religious services when requested by the Regent. She shall be the Chairman of the Memorial Committee.

Section 4. STATE RECORDING SECRETARY: The State Recording Secretary shall keep a correct record of all meetings of the State Conference, the State Executive Committee and the Board of Management. She shall be chairman of the Printing and Stationery Committee; countersign all orders drawn on the Treasurer and signed by the Regent. She shall prepare the proceedings for the Annual State Conference for publication, subject to the approval of the State Regent, and perform such other duties as pertain to her office.

Section 5. STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: The State Corresponding Secretary, under the direction and supervision of the Regent, shall notify all state Officers and the Regent of each chapter in good standing of the time of the Annual Conference not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall give notice of meetings of the Executive Committee, and Board of Management as directed by the State Regent. She shall be the chairman of the committee on credentials. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, immediately after the close of Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the various chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each state chairman two typewritten copies of the list of names and addresses of her respective chapter chairmen. (one of which is to be sent to her National Chairman and the second one for her own use.) She shall compile these lists into a directory for the ensuing administration.

Section 6. STATE TREASURER: The State Treasurer shall collect all moneys and disburse the same only upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. All moneys received by the Treasurer shall be deposited in some reliable bank in her name as State Treasurer, and all payments made by her shall be by check. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit the same to a Certified Public Accountant before the Annual State Conference. She shall be custodian of all bonds and policies belonging to the Society. She shall be bonded by the State Society for the sum of \$2,500.00 for the faithful discharge of the duties above defined. She shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan Notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall be a member of the Executive and Credentials Committees.

Section 7. STATE REGISTRAR: The State Registrar shall keep the card file as established; assist in proving eligibility claims; prepare the Kansas Directory Daughters of the American Revolution, when ordered by the Society; check her membership file against the records of the State Treasurer immediately after July first. She shall keep a file of all reports received from the National Society and these are to be delivered with the State Card file, and all other material dealing with the work of the office, to her successor. She shall be a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 8. STATE HISTORIAN: The State Historian shall take charge of all the historical papers received by the Society and shall catalogue and arrange the same, placing in a locker at the State Historical Society at Topeka, such historical documents, and all materials for preservation. She shall be a member of the Memorial Committee. She shall prepare the Smithsonian Report.

Section 9. STATE LIBRARIAN: The State Librarian shall have supervision of the State D.A.R. library. She shall prepare a report listing all material sent to the National Library and all books records, and other material received for the State Library, during the year, for publication in the State Conference Proceedings. On retiring from the office, the State Librarian shall send to the newly elected Librarian and to the State Regent a complete list of all material on file in the State D.A.R Library, and given over to the newly elected State Librarian.

Section 10. STATE REPORTER: The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the State Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be State Chairman of the Publicity Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files (or Scrap Book) and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D.C.

Section 11. All officers and Committee Chairmen upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, all moneys, accounts, record books, papers or other property belonging to the Society.

ARTICLE VI.

Meetings

Section 1. The supreme governing body of this society shall be a Conference. An annual meeting of the Kansas State Conference shall be held in March unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or by the State Board of Management. The purpose of this conference shall be to receive reports of the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen; for the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. Each State Chairman shall compile a typed report of not more than three hundred words covering the work accomplished by her committee for the year ending February twenty-eighth. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary by March first, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Each Chapter Regent shall send a report of the work and plans of her chapter, for the year ending February twenty-eighth, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary immediately after March first. This report shall be typed, and limited to two hundred fifty words, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Section 3. The Kansas State Society shall be divided into four districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively.

A Director, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected at an annual district meeting to be held in the fall. The term of office shall be one year and no District Officer shall serve more than three consecutive terms. Each district shall entertain the State Conference in rotation; the time and place to be determined by the hostess district and the State Regent. The Southwest District shall entertain the State .

Section 4. The voting members of the Annual State Conference shall be the State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, and Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the first Vice Regent or alternate and the delegates or their alternates, regularly elected by Chapters as hereinafter specified, provided they have been members of their Chapter for one year and are in good standing.

Section 5. Twenty-five voting members shall constitute a quorum at the meeting of the Annual State Conference.

Section 6. Chapters of less than fifty members shall be entitled to representation at the Annual State Conference by the regent and two delegates. Chapters having membership of fifty to one hundred shall be represented by their Regent and five delegates. After the first hundred, representation shall be in the ratio of three delegates for every subsequent one hundred. Alternates shall be elected for each Chapter Regent and delegate. Section 7. Delegates and alternates snall be elected at the January meeting of their Chapter in each year, and certificates of their election signed by the Regent and Treasurer of their Chapter, shall be sent to the State Corresponding Secretary for the Committee on Credentials by February first. Vacancies that occur in the delegation may be filled by the Regent from alternates duly elected for that purpose at the January meeting.

Section 8. Daughters attending State Conference shall pay ... registration fee of One Dollar.

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ARTICLE VII.

Board of Management.

Section 1. The State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose memberships are within the State. District Directors and Chapter Regents shall constitute a State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over affairs of the State Society to do and transact business during the interim between the meetings of the State Society. The State Board shall meet at the call of the State Regent at least twice a year. A meeting of the State Board shall be held immediately preceding the opening session of the State Conference.

A Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held in October, following the National Board of Management meeting, and this meeting shall be termed the official Fall State Board Meeting; the Northeast District shall act as hostess annually, at Shawnee Mission. Meetings of the Southeast, Southwest, and Northwest Districts shall be held immediately following in convenient order and a report of the National Board meeting be given by the State Regent and chapter plans be heard at all meetings.

Other meetings may be held upon the call of the State Regent or upon written request of seven members of the Board of Management. It shall recommend to the Annual State Conference such patriotic and historic work as seems desirable to be undertaken by the Society. Eleven members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have power to fill vacancies in office until the next election; the election to fill such vacancies shall be by ballot, notice of the vacancy having been given in the call for the meeting of the State Board.

Section 4. All officers, the Board of Management and Committees shall make reports of their work for the year, at the Annual State Conference.

Executive Committee Section 1. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Record-ing Secretary, State Registrar and State Treasurer, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three members. Section 3. The Executive Committee shall make a report at each

meeting of the Board of Management.

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Committees.

Section 1. The Regent shall appoint a Student Loan Committee consisting of three members who shall supervise the Kansas D.A.R. Student Loan Fund.

The Regent shall appoint a Conference Committee which shall consist of the Reporter and two other members.

There shall be a Printing and Stationery Committee which shall consist of the Recording Secretary, Vice Regent and Regent.

A Memorial Committee shall consist of the State Chaplain, chairman: State Historian, and one other member.

The Committee on Credentials'shall consist of the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and one other member. 21 **x** •. •

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ARTICLE X

State Funds

Section 1. Each Chapter, belonging to the State Society shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before January first of each year the sum of \$1.35 for each member, in good standing on the Chapter rolls on that date.

Chapter Treasurers shall furnish, with each remittance of dues, a list of members for whom she is paying.

Chapters failing to pay above per capita dues shall be delinguent February first and not entitled to representation at State Conference.

Representation of Chapters at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon number of dues in the hands of the State Treasurer by February first.

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The Treasurer shall notify chapters of their standing on February first.

Section 2. Life Members shall be counted in the basis for representation. Chapters shall count all Life Members in their Representation and State dues should be paid for full representation.

Section 3. Stationery and postage, and in cases of emergency, telephone and telegraph charges, which charges shall be validated by the Executive Committee, shall be furnished to the State Officers and State Committees.

Section 4. A sum not to exceed \$500.00 per year shall be allowed the State Regent for her expenses in carrying on her work.

Section 5. To partially defray her expenses to the State Conference, each State Officer shall be allowed the sum of \$12.00, provided however, that no expenses will be allowed an Officer when the Conference is held in her own home city.

Section 6. No provision is made for expenses of Honorary State Officers.

Section 7. In addition to the obligations specified in these By-Laws, no debts or liabilities shall be incurred except by vote of the Conference.

Section 8. A sum equal to ten cents per member shall be taken from the State Fund and placed in an Annual State Conference Expense Account.

ARTICLE XI.

Chapters.

Section 1. It is recommended that election of chapter officers, for a term of three years, take place in January, occurring in the same year as the election of state officers. Chapter officers shall be installed and take office in May, following the confirmation of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent at Continental Congress.

On or before February first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks to be furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter Officers for the ensuing year.

The Regent-elect of each chapter shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on or before April first, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of all newly appointed chapter chairmen.

ARTICLE XII.

Parliamentary Authority

Section 1. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order revised, shall govern this Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XIII.

Amendments.

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendments has been sent to the State Regent and each Chapter at least sixty days before the Annual State Conference.

Section 2. Amendments to these By-Laws shall take effect at the close of the Annual State Conference at which they are adopted.

STANDING RULES.

ARTICLE 1.

Section 1. The Recording Secretary with the Regent shall see that arrangements are made for the publishing of Proceedings of the State Conference which are contained in the files of the Recording Secretary, the expense of such report to be born by the State Society.

The Recording Secretary shall send a copy of the printed Proceedings to all State Officers, Chapter Regents State Chairmen District Directors, and to such other persons and libraries as shall be designated by the State Regent.

When an election has occurred, it shall be the duty of the retiring Recording Secretary and retiring Regent to compile these proceedings and arrange for their publication.

Section 2. Board of Management meetings may be attended by State Chairmen, District Directors, Chapter Regents' representatives and other interested members, on invitation of the State Regent, except when the Board is in Executive session.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. \$25.00 shall be allotted the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

Section 2. \$50.00 shall be allotted the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Congress.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. These rules may be amended, suspended or repealed at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of voting members present-

STATE CONFERENCES 1944-1950

FORTY-SEVENTH CONFERENCE CANCELLED-In cooperation with the Office of Defense Transportation Forty-seventh Annual State Conference, scheduled to convene in Emporia, March 22, 1945 was cancelled. Cancelled, in order that all rail and hotel facilities might be made more readily available for moving the military. On February 1, 1945 the National Board of Mangement of the N.S.D.A.R. had met and fortified by the advice of the Society's Parliamentarian and its Attorney voted to cancel the 54th Continental Congress (This is the first time in the history of the Society that no Annual Congress The National Board further voted unanimously to had been held.) cancel all State Conferences, to conform with the request of the O.D.T. In the interim, the Executive Committee of the Kansas Society Two Executive Board Meetings conducted all necessary business. transacted the following business: arranged that the date of the 1946 State Conference be set for the convenience of the President General; allowed for the per capita tax; arranged to follow the Approved School program of former years and decided to contribute \$500 (more if contributed) to the Tamassee Auditorium-Gymnasium; arranged to have a history of the Student Loan Committee written and published in the 1946 Proceedings. Despite travel restrictions the work of the State Society was progressive and fruitful. \$4000 was sent in to the WAR FUND. Two LCI (L) ships were adopted. A committee appointed for the revision of the State By-Laws was ready to report.

All regular committee work had gone forward. Membership made a gain of 98. The Regent Kansas Society was awarded a prize of \$25 for largest increase in Magazine subscriptions. The State Regent's Bulletin had been reestablished and published monthly. The State Regent attended all regular meetings of the National Board of Management.

FORTY-EIGHTH CONFERENCE—Topeka, Hptel Jayhawk, March 26, 27, 28, 1946. Topeka Chapter hostess chapter, Miss Mabel S. Fry, General Chairman. Honor Guests: Mrs. A. J. Berger, Honorary State Regent and Vice President General; Honorary State Regents Miss Catherine Campbell and Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick; Mrs. Frederick A. Sapp, State Regent elect of Illinois; Mrs. Van Court Carwithen, National Chairman Approved Schools; Mrs. Reuben Edward Knight, National President C.A.R.; Mrs. David S. Jackman, State President C.A.R.; and Miss Nova Anne Brown, Kansas Good Citizenship Pilgrim. Mrs Carwithen, speaker at the opening meeting held in the Topeka Wonen's Club spoke informatively on the Approved Schools of the D.A.R. Mrs. Knight was the speaker of the second afternoon. Her topic was C.A.R. and the Reverend Robert Mize, Director of St. Francis Boys' Home was the speaker at a noon meeting. An unusual feature of the Memorial Hour was the inclusion of a Memorial honoring the 19 reported Gold Stars among families of D.A.R. A large candle was lit memorializing these war dead and the smoked stained Battle Flag of the LCI (L) 588 was dipped in salute during the ceremony. This was added to the regular memorial for D.A.R. members. Work of the years 1945 when the Conference was cancelled and 1946 was reported and the following transacted-names of the two commanders of the Kansas LCI (L) ships placed in Valley Forge; a \$250 floor block, honoring the State Regent placed in Valley Forge; transfer of War Fund to St. Francis Boys' Home with sufficient additional to furnish a bedroom and the annual gift of a \$100 scholarship authorized; Membership prizes awarded (see committees); \$500 gift to Becker Hall at Kate Duncan Smith School; completing of the \$500 pledge to the Tamassee Auditorium; \$7.50 authorized for History contest prizes; direction that the By-Laws committee present revision to the 49th Conference, 1947; endorsement of Mrs. Alexander J. Berger as a candidate for National office on the ticket of Mrs. John Logan Marshall (election in 1947); report of 15 issues of the Regent's Bulletin at regents expense for printing, postage assumed by the Society and 4500 additional pieces of mail sent from Regent's desk; Announcement of the Memorial Bell Tower at Valley Forge as the No. 1 historical responsibility of Kansas D.A.R.; Total membership 2816; net gain 129. Establishment of a \$50 Girl Home Maker Scholarship, the gift of the state officers.

Kirkpatrick, Honorary State Regents of Kansas; Mrs. James Suttie, state regent of Nebraska; Mrs. Lewis Snow, state regent of Oklahoma; Mrs. Van Court Carwithen, National Chairman Approved Schools; Mrs. Edwin Stanton Lammers, National Chairman Junior American Citizens; Mrs. David S. Jackman, State President C.A.R.; Jerome C. Berryman, representative of the State President Kansas S.A.R.; Mrs. Lucius W. Mémorial Service was impressive in the lovely Presbyterian Church and a City tour was arranged by Dodge City; The Fort Supply Trail Chapter arranged the banquet at which the Valley Forge Memorial Bell Tower was emphasized. Completion of the project in Kansas was announced. Mrs. Marshall was the lovely and inspirational speaker. During the Conference the Reverend Mize and Mrs. Jackman spoke on the Radio in behalf of the St. Francis Boys' Home and the C.A.R. Business conducted included the following: \$233 allowed for redecoration of the State Rest Room in Washington; endorsement of Mrs. Loren E. Rex, as requested by letter from Wichita Chapter for the office of Vice President General (because of serious illness, Mrs. A. J. Berger, candidate on Mrs. Marshall's ticket for election in 1947 was compelled to withdraw, leaving no candidate for office from Kansas); complete revision of the Kansas By-Laws was adopted; completion of the Kansas pledge to Valley Forge Memorial Bell Tower.

FIFTIETH CONFERENCE-Wichita, Allis Hotel, March 18, 19, 20, 1948. The five Wichita Chapters, Eunice Sterling, Martha Loving Ferrell, Minisa, Randolph Loving and Wichita with Mrs. B. B. Anawalt General Chairman served as a committee in a new State Conference plan whereby one of the four districts each year assumes charge of Conference plans. Honor Guests: Mrs. Roscoe C. O'Byrne, President General; Mrs. Loren E. Rex, Vice President General from Kansas; Mrs. Edwin Stanton Lammers, Recording Secretary General; Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick and Mrs. A. J. Berger, honorary State Regents of Kansas; Mrs. Charles Crockett, State Regent of Colorado; Mrs. Herbert R. Hill, National Chairman Press Relations; Mrs. David S. Jackman, State President C.A.R.; Reverend Robert Mize, Jr., Director St. Francis Boys' Home. The Conference opened with the Memorial Service followed by the official opening at the Allis Hotel. _Mrs. Edwin Stanton Lammers, Recording Secretary General, speaker on "Youth and National Defense". The Regent's Dinner was highlighted by an address by the President General (Regents reports were given in condensed form during the business meeting by the District Directors).

Honorary State Regents spoke at a luncheon meeting and Ralph Carney, Wichita businessman and speaker of note was the banquet speaker. Through his generosity a scholarship to one of the D.A.R. schools was made possible. Mr. Carney returned \$50 of his speaker's fee for this purpose. A delightful tea was held at the home of Mrs.

Herman D. Ewers. The entire Conference was made more interesting and delightful by the presence of the President General throughout. Both the President General and the Recording Secretary General presented the proposed Building Program and during the Conference a resolution was passed supporting the plan. Other business transacted included: Presentation of a check for \$366.50 to Reverend Mize for the St. Francis Boys' Home; the project having grown from one to two units the past year; Girl Home Maker and Membership awards; endorsement of the retiring State Regent, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder for the office of Vice President General or any National office of her choice; election of Mrs. Shrewder to the office of honorary State Regent; endorsement of Mrs. John W. Kirkpatrick, honorary state regent and past Vice President General for the office of Honorary Vice President General upon a vacancy for that honor; announcement of candidates for state office by the nominating committee, first time the nominations have been so conducted; election of the new state officers for a period of two years without the privilege of reelection, the term beginning in 1950 to coincide with the National Society term of office and to be limited to three years in National; announcement by Mrs. Lucile Rust of a continuation of the Girl Home Maker's Scholarship; motion adopted that the Regent's Bulletin be continued at state expense, ways and means to be devised by the new board. Following the Conference a C.A.R. luncheon was held.

Miss Lucina Jones served as General Chairman with a central planning committee composed of Emporia, Council Oak, and Newton Chapters. Honor Guests were Mrs. Loren Edgar Rex, Vice President General, Miss Edla Stannard Gibson, National Chairman Approved Schools Committee, Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe, National Chairman Building Promotion Committee, Miss Mary Helen North, National Chairman Junior Membership, Mrs. William J. Boyd, State Regent of Missouri, Mrs. Donald Bennett Adams, National President C. A. R. and Mrs. Jackson Parker Adams, State President C. A. R. Over two thousand dollars was contributed to the Building Fund during the Conference and 35 cents percapita was voted from the general Fund for the two years of thisadministration. An additional gift of \$25.00 was made to the National! Tribute Grove, thus placing the State on an honorable mention role.

The State Regent announced that 21 chapters had been visited. The State Conference voted to place a marker at the grave of Miss Grace Meeker, Honorary State Regent. It was voted to order 200 Valley Forge Cook Books. Miss Polly Anne Peckham, Good Citizenship Pilgrim was presented with a \$100 bond, the gift of the National Society.

FIFTY-SECOND CONFERENCE, Topeka, Hotel Jayhawk, March 9, 10, and 11, 1950. Mrs. William Louis Ainsworth, State Regent. The Chapters of the Northeast District, Arthur Barrett, Atchison, Betty Washington, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, General Edward Hand, James Ross, John Haupt, Olathe, Samuel Linscott, Shawnee and Topeka were hostesses with Mrs. Walter T. Chaney, General Chairman . Honor Guests were Mrs. James B. Patton, First Vice President General, Mrs. Edwin Stanton Lammers, Recording Secretary General, Mrs. Loren Edgar Rex, Vice President General, Mrs. LaFayette LeVan Porter, National Chairman D.A.R. Magazine Committee, Miss Mary Helen North, National Chairman Junior Membership Committee and Mrs. Earl C. Moses, State President Honorary State Regents present were Mrs. Loren Edgar Rex, C.A.R. Mrs. Alexander J. Berger and Mrs. Roy Valentine Shrewder. It was announced through Molly Foster Berry Chapter, the State Student Loan Fund was named as beneficiery of an estate, the amount to be known upon settlement of the estate. The Conference voted to cancel off the unpaid notes owing the Student Loan Fund and because of so little call for loans, to divert \$500.00 from this fund to the Tamassee Auditorium-Gymnasium for one-half the right wing bleachers. An additional 30 cents per capita was voted to the Building Fund, making the contribution from State funds, \$1 per member over the two year period. Thirty-three chapters completed their quota for the building. fund honor roll, all but seven making the star honor roll of six dollars per member. The State quota of \$5.50 per member or \$17,000.50 was attained at Continental Congress and the retiring State Regent, Mrs. Ainsworth and the incoming State Regent, Mrs. von der Heiden pledged the balance of the six dollar quota for the State. The Conforence voted to relinquish the basement Rest Room in the basement at our National headquarters in order to concentrate on the newly acquired room on the third floor of the new building. It was voted to mark this room in honor of Mrs. William Louis Ainsworth, State Regent 1948-1950. It was voted to replace the organ given in honor of Mrs. Guernsey, President General 1917-1920, which was sold because it had been dismantled and stored for lack of a place to use it, with a suitable memorial. It was announced that the marker at the grave of Miss Grace Meeker, Honorary State Regent was placed March 8, 1950.

It was reported that the ninety-eight Santa Fe Trail Markers have been checked and all but six are in good repair. The State Regent announced that thirty-seven chapters had been visited. One more has been visited since Conference, making a total of 59 of the 62 chapters visited by the State Regent. The organization of four new chapters was announced, John Athey at Oakley, John Haupt at Topeka, Shawnee at Mission and Cofachique at Iola. Miss Josephine Van Scoyk, Good Citizenship Pilgrim was awarded a \$100 bond, the gift of the National Society.

The State Seal was placed at Valley Forge by voluntary contribuions. State Officers were elected for a three year term 1950-1953. Mrs. Ainsworth, retiring State Regent was unanimously endorsed for the Office of Vice President General for election in 1951 and was elected Honorary State Regent.

Bacone University and Memorial Scholarship there were stressed with a total of \$1229.48 sent 1944-1948. A dining table and twelve chairs for the dining room at St. Mary's School for Indian Girls was a special project accomplished 1949.

AMERICAN RED CROSS—Chairmen: Mrs. Harold Bottomley 1944-1947.... Mrs. Ross E. Odell 1947-1948. During the War, Red Cross became a separate committee. In 1947 it was again returned to the status of a sub-committee of Conservation. During 1944-1947 period this was a very active committee reporting 147,055 hours of work; 14,446 articles made; \$6,470.11 sent (exclusive of the Blood plasma Program); 622 Blood doners.

AMERICANISM— Chairmen: Mrs. August E. Heitman, 1944, Mrs. R. M. Russell 1945; Mrs. John Nye 1946-1948; Mrs. John L. Berry 1948-1950. This committee was combined with D.A.R. Manuals for Citizenship (in Kansas). APPROVED SCHOOLS: Chairmen. Mrs. Sherman G. Ihde 1944-1946; Mrs. W. M. Ostenberg 1946-1948; Mrs. Robert Chesney with Mrs. Fred J. McEwen, Co-Chairman 1948-1950. Total amount in cash sent to Approved Schools during this period was \$15,789.79. 233 boxes of clothing valued at \$7,812.00 was sent during 1948-1950. \$500 was sent to Tamassee for one-half the right wing bleachers of the new Auditorium-Gymnasium, following the 1950 State Conference. A Tour of Approved Schools arranged by the National Society in October 1948 was attended by the State Regent, Mrs. Ainsworth; the state Chairman of Approved Schools, Mrs. Robert Chesney, Mrs. Loren Edgar Rex, Vice President General and Mrs. Roy Valentine Shrewder, National Chairman Resolutions Committee.

CONSERVATION—Chairmen: Mrs. Ross E. Odell 1944-1948; Miss Maude Haver 1948-1949; Mrs. R. G. Klein 1949-1950. For the years 1946-1948 this committee included as sub-committee the American Indians and American Red Cross Committees. Work covered human and natural conservation with emphasis on the National Tribute Grove. At the 1948 State Conference it was pledged to make up the total contribution to the Tribute Grove to make possible a gift amounting to 25 cents per capita honoring the National Vice Chairman, Mrs. John W. Kirkpatrick. This pledge was later paid and Kansas received honorable mention for her participation in this project.

CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG—Chairmen: Mrs. D. L. Moberly 1944-1948; Mrs. T. F. Rudisill 1948-1950. Outstanding work done 1944-1948 with students in the School for the Deaf at Olathe. Flag posters and quizzes prepared by the Chairman were circulated over the entire State. Battle Flag of the LCI-(L)=588 was used in state wide talks and used in the Memorial Service 1946 during the State Conference in Topeka. This Flag, now the property of the Kansas Society has been placed in the Museum Rooms at Shawnee Mission. Flags are given new citizens at Naturalization Courts by several chapters.

D. A. R. GOOD CITIZENSHIP PILGRIMAGE—Chairmen; Mrs. Claire G. Lindahl 1945; Mrs. John Siglinger 1946; Mrs. Willis E. Baker 1947; Miss Hazel Kirk 1948; Mrs. G. W. Houser 1948-1950. State Pilgrims, Miss Marie Melson Burns 1945; Miss Nova Anne Brown, Lakin 1946; (entertained at State Conference); Miss Donna Mae Hull, Clay Center 1947; (trip to Washington); Miss Leann Jean Thomas, Valley Falls, 1948. By vote of the Continental Congress the 1945 and 1946 Pilgrims reseived a \$100 bond each, due to war and

D. A. R. MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP—Chairmen: Mrs. E. L. Braddock 1944-1946; Mrs. John Nye 1946-1948; Mrs. John L. Berry 1948-1950. During 1948-1950 the Manuals in 18 languages were displayed at all District Meetings and at State Conference.

D. A. R. MAGAZINE—Chairmen: Mrs. David S. Forshee 1944-1946; Mrs. W. O. Buswell 1946-1948; Mrs. Earl Robertson 1948-1950. The name of the Society's Magazine was changed from NATIONAL HISTORICAL MAGAZINE in 1946 to the D.A.R. Magazine. All State Regents were made National Vice Chairmen of the Magazine Committee 1947. In 1945 the Kansas Society received a \$25 prize for the greatest increase in subscriptions in States of it's membership class. The number of subscriptions in Kansas increases each year, but there are still far too few subscriptions for our membership.

The large table display case given 10 years ago by the Kansas Society in honor of Mrs. W. E. Stanley, Past Vice President General was relined. It now houses the gown worn by Caroline Harrison, the first President General, N.S.D.A.R.

D. A. R. STUDENT LOAN FUND—Chairmen: Miss Maude Haver 1944-1948; Mrs. J. W. Murray 1948-1950. At the 1950 State Conference, one loan past due since 1937 was cancelled off. A Splendid history was prepared and laws governing the use of the funds were revised by Miss Haver and are found in full in the 1946 State Proceedings. One loan of \$200 was made in the Fall of 1949, the only loan made during the years 1944-1950. The report of February 1, 1950 showed \$1,205.06 in cash and \$3,800 in bonds in the Student Loan Fund. This fund was made a beneficiery through Molly Foster Berry Chapter and it is anticipated that the final settlement of the estate will reveal the amount to be more than \$20,000.00.

ELLIS ISLAND—Chairmen: Mrs. Charles C. Theis 1944-1947; Mrs. Harold Bottomley 1947-1948; Mrs. Mary Wickwire Ingham 1948-1950. Post War service was stressed. Work with Neuro-Psychiatric and Tubercular patients was the main work.

FILING AND LENDING BUREAU—Chairmen: Mrs. W. P. Stoker, 1944-1946; Mrs. Mary Naylor Brown 1946-1948. This committee was made a part of the Program Committee 1948.

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GENEALOGICAL RECORDS—Chairmen: Mrs. Hal M. Black 1944-1948; Mrs. George Vandaveer 1948-1949; Miss Minnehaha Finney 1949-1950. During Mrs. Black's Chairmanship, some 18,537 pages of records were received and over 70 typed and bound volumes of records were sent to the National Society. Additional duplicate volumes were sent to the State Historical Library, the State D.A.R. Library and the Eunice Sterling Collection housed in the Wichita Public Library (In 1949 the Eunice Sterling Collection was presented to the Wichita Library, so that it might be indexed and made available to research workers in the Wichita Library). The State Chairman's prize, the professional binding of a copy of their work for the National D.A.R. Library was awarded to Emporia Chapter in 1949. A special award was granted to Courtney Spalding Chapter by the State Chairman in 1950.

GIRL HOME MAKERS—Chairmen: Mrs. Frank Williams 1944-1948; Mrs. Lucile Rust 1948-1950. Cancellation of the 1945 State Conference also cancelled contests for that year. The remaining years, prizes were given for cotton dress and meal planning and preparation and service. A scholarship of \$50 was given each year, with an additional \$25 Scholarship in 1949. Scholarships were awarded to Barbara Kauffman, Coffeyville 1946; Jo Anne Wolgast, Marysville 1947; Patricia Lawrence, Winfield 1948; Delores Zimmerman, Olathe and Carolyn Kittle, Pittsburg 1949. Three \$25 scholarships were awarded in 1950. The scholarships were awarded to Mary Sich, Manhattan; Dawn Tedlock, Pittsburg; Joan Engle, Abilene.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS—Chairmen: Miss Marie Sellars 1944-1946; Mrs. Charles Bruner 1946-1948; Miss Novma Mering 1948-1950. Total number of J.A.C. Clubs reported at 1944 State Conference 76 with a total membership of 1711. In 1948 there were 130 clubs with a membership of 3271. In 1950 the State Chairman reported 270 active clubs with a total membership of 6,577. The continual growth of clubs and members indicates the need for this work in Americanism as a real step in National Defense.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP and C.A.R. PROMOTERS—Chairmen; Mrs. Earl C. Moses 1944-1948; Mrs. Raymond Plyley 1948-1949. In 1949 these two committees were separated, due to the confusion of Junior Members and Members of C.A.R. Mrs. Earl C. Moses, State President of C.A.R. took over the Chairmanship of C.A.R. Promoters. Few Junior Groups existed in 1944, but substantial gains in Junior Membership are shown each year of this period. Kansas Junior Members won prizes awarded by the National Chairman for the most Junior members accepted in States with a membership under 5,000 for 1949 and 1950. Topeka Chapter was awarded the prize offered by the State Chairman for selling the most stationery for the Helen Pouch Scholarship in 1949 This prize was awarded to Eunice Sterling Chapter in 1950.

MEMBERSHIP—Chairmen; Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur 1944-1950. The State Registrars and the District Directors have been of valuable assistance with membership. Numerous prizes were awarded each year. Membership March 1, 1944 was 2587 and March 1, 1950 was 3,202. The Eunice Sterling Travelling Award Flags went to William Creekmore 1945, Fort Larned 1946, Dana 1947, Nathan Edson 1948, Lucretia Griswold Latimer 1949 and John Haupt 1950. This is for the greatest percentage gain in membership.

MOTION PICTURES—Chairmen: Mrs. Paul G. Hutchison 1944; Miss Lucina Jones 1945-1946; Mrs. Mary Naylor Brown 1948; Mrs. Roy Rankin 1948-1950. This committee was combined in Kansas with Filing and Lending in 1946-1948.

NATIONAL DEFENSE—Chairmen: Mrs. Harry Kendall 1944-1948; Miss Maude B. Skinner 1948-1950. Text Book reviews have become important due to un-American influence in school texts. Following in line with the Resolutions passed by the National Society at Continental Congress, all Socialistic programs have come under scrutiny. Mrs. E. Thomas Boyd of Denver, Colorado, National Vice Chairman of National Defense Committee was a guest at the four District Meetings in 1949 and spoke against Socialized Medicine, Federal Aid to Education, World Government. She emphasized the necessity for keeping informed on present legislation and in furthering the patriotic ideals of our National Society. A series of radio broadcasts on National Defense was arranged thru cooperation with the State Chairman of Radio and the State Teachers College, Pittsburg.

PRESS RELATIONS—Chairmen: Mrs. G. D. Weilepp 1944-1948; Mrs. Asa L. Johnson 1948-1950. This committee work has been handled by the State Reporter and has shown excellent Newspaper cooperation throughout the State.

RADIO—Chairmen: Miss Emma Bond 1944-1945; Mrs. Harold Cone 1945-1948; Mrs. H. C. Markham 1948-1949. This Committee was changed to RADIO AND TELEVISION in 1949. Mrs. E. O. Blake was chairman 1949-1950. Excellent response has come from some radio stations. Spot announcements have been a prominent feature of this program. The State Chairman in cooperation with the State Chairman of National Defense arranged a National Defense broadcast following the 1950 State Conference.

TRANSPORTATION—Chairmen: Mrs. Robert C. Owen 1948-1950. Transportation to and from Chapter Meetings has been the most important function of this committee. It has not seemed satisfactory to arrange transportation for District Meetings nor State Conferences, nor Continental Congress.

STATE AND SPECIAL COMMITTEES

NATIONAL BUILDING PROJECT-Chairman: Mrs. J. W. Hornbaker 1948-1950. October 1947 and February 1948 National Board Meetings were concerned with working out a plan to repair and enlarge the Administration Building of the group of our National Society buildings in Washington. The plan finally approved was the erection of a three-story building to fill the entire space between Memorial Continental Hall and Constitution Hall. The plans included necessary repairs, enlarging the Administration section, the inclusion of a modern Museum in the center section and offices for the C.A.R. and remodeling Memorial Continental Hall to house the D.A.R. Library. The cost estimated at \$900,000.00 was approved by the February 1948 National Board of Management. Mrs. Roscoe C. O'Byrne, President General and Mrs. Edwin Stanton Lammers, Recording Secretary General attended our 50th State Conference in Wichita, 1948, and spoke in behalf of this proposed plan, whereupon it was voted to support the building plan if adopted. The 57th Continental Congress held the following month in April 1948 voted overwhelmingly in favor of this project. Eventually a quota of \$5.50 per member was set to attain an Honor Roll for each chapter with \$6.00 per member for a Star Honor Roll. Wichita Chapter was the first chapter to attain the Star Honor Roll. By the 1950 Continental Congress the State attained the Honor Roll with 26 chapters on the Star Honor Roll and seven others on the Honor Roll. The retiring State Regent, Mrs. Ainsworth and the incoming State Regent, Mrs. von der Heiden pledged at the 59th Continental Congress to raise the balance of the \$6.00 quota for the State.

REVISION OF STATE BY-LAWS: Mrs. J. B. Heffelfinger 1944-1946; Mrs. J. W. Hornbaker 1946-1947; Mrs. C. F. Eckelman 1948-1950.

Due to cancellation of the 47th Annual State Conference which was to have been held in Emporia, March 1945 and further because of

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the death of the National Parliamentarian the following year during the committee's work the revision of the State By-Laws was not taken up until March 1947, during the 49th State Conference held in Dodge City. In 1944 during a visit from the National Parliamentarian, Mrs. John Trigg Moss, she advised the State Regent that the State By-Laws needed revision and the work was undertaken, with the result that such a revision was adopted in 1947 and amendments made to this revision in 1948. Some of the main changes are as follows-The creation of a Nominating Committee; the division of the State into four Districts, Southeast, Southwest, Northeast, and Northwest with definite functions and holding Fall meetings: In 1948 a State Conference Fund was created of 10 cents per capita to be taken from the General Treasury and the state conference registration fee was changed from \$2 to \$1 and no longer included the banquet ticket. The By-Laws were printed in full in the State Proceedings of 1947 and 1948. Changes made at the 50th State Conference in Wichita included; The term of the State Officers was changed to three years with no reelection to office; the state dues were increased to \$1.35.

JUVENILE CODE COMMISSION

This State Committee was formed 1948 to study Juvenile laws under consideration by the State Juvenile Code Commission. Mrs. Joe Beeler was appointed Chairman with Mrs. John B. Gould and Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder on the committee. Mrs. Beeler resigned and in 1949 Miss Helen Stafford was appointed Chairman.

KANSAS ROOM AT N.S.D.A.R. HEADQUARTERS

Mrs. Louise Crawford Wright served as Chairman 1948-1950. Mrs. Wright, a charter member and still an active member of Lois Warner Chapter has been a resident of Washington for many years. It was deemed wise to have a Chairman living in Washington, to keep in touch with the needs and progress of our Kansas Room. At the request of the National Chairman of Buildings and Grounds, Mrs. David D. Caldwell, the basement Rest Room was relinquished at the Fifty-second State Conference, thus allowing the State to give it's entire attention to the new Committee Room on the third floor.

SAINT FRANCIS BOYS' HOMES-Mrs. C. P. Traxel 1945-1947; Mrs. G. G. Anderson 1947-1948; Mrs. R. G. Klein 1948-1950.

St. Francis Boys' Homes, an effort of the Episcopalian Church of Kansas to establish better homes for boys from broken homes and homes for delinquent boys needing other than corrective institutional influence, was endorsed by the Kansas Society at its 50th State Conference held in Wichita. This was done in the interest of building a better youth citizenry and in cooperation with the National

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Society to work with the problem of Juvenile Delinquency as suggested by J. Edgar Hoover of the F.B.I. St. Francis Boys' Homes seemed just the answer to provide suitable Homes for boys that needed to be kept out of institutions. The project has proven an appealing one. It has grown in interest among the Kansas membership as it has grown in usefulness and increased in physical size from one to two units at Ellsworth and at Salina, Kansas. Our first pledge was \$100 to provide a scholarship for one boy at Ellsworth; interest and work increased from the time the project was undertaken, to include other scholarships, gifts to the boys, equipment for the Homes and acreage for the farm at Salina.

Christmas and Birthday cards sent by members to the boys have proven to be morale builders. Many chapters send Christmas gifts, as well as boxes of new and used clothing, and several chapters have visited the homes taking gifts with them. During 1948-1950 much valuable equipment including furnishings and linens, furnaces, station wagons, books and canned food were secured for the home.

SHAWNEE MISSION; Mrs. Harry E. Ashlock 1944-1950. A careful supervision of the two D.A.R. Rooms at Shawnee Mission has been maintained. In October 1945 a lovely program was arranged by the chairman, assisted by James Ross Chapter when the President General, Mrs. Julius Young Talmadge was guest or honor. In 1946 the rooms were carefully and completely renovated and redocorated, under the able supervision of the chairman and they now constitute a perfect example of the historic period of the active Mission years. The State Historical Society cooperated in the renovating and provided \$100 for structural repair. At the Fall meeting 1947, the beautiful Stanley case was dedicated. This Museum case was the gift of Miss Harriet Stanley of Eunice Sterling Chapter in memory of her mother Mrs. W. E. Stanley, Honorary State Regent of Kansas. It contains gifts from the Stanley family and other museum treasures. The chairman completed the collection of past state regents' pictures with the exception of one which has been promised. She supervised the placing of the bronze tablet marking the tree planted commemorating the 100th anniversary of the North Building, erected under the supervision of the Reverend Jerome C. Berryman, Superintendent of the Mission at that time. Many valuable gifts have been added to the D.A.R. museum rooms.

WAR SERVICE UNITS: Mrs. Roy Valentine Schrewder: Mrs. C. P. Traxel 1944-1947. The War Work Committe established to take care of spocial war work continued to function under the name of War Service Units. Under the committee continued work was done in completing the blood plasma program and the so called war fund. \$3,088.26 went into the National Blood Plasma Fund from the Kansas Society in 1944-1945 and \$991.14 into the War Fund. The collection of this amount was due largely to the regent, Mrs. A. J. Berger, under whom the project was set up. This year's work was a carry over until the project could resolve itself. Work of the War Service Units was to function under the supervision of the state Kansas "Adopted" the LCI (L) 588 during regents and chaplains. the 53rd Continental Congress held in New York. This consisted of keeping in contact with the men on board ship and with their families on shore. Later the LCI (L) 646 was adopted by the Kansas Society and the names of the two commanders were placed on the Honor Roll of the Valley Forge Bell Tower. The Battle Flag of the LCI(L) 588 which saw service in the Mediterranean was sent to the State Regent. It was used in Flag programs over the state and after its use in the Memorial Service at State Conference in Topeka, 1946 was sent to the D.A.R. Museum rooms at Shawnee Mission. The usefulness of this committee having terminated the committee was discontinued in 1947.

VALLEY FORGE MEMORIAL BELL TOWER: Member National Committee Mrs. A. J. Berger, 1946; Mrs. J. W. Dixon 1946-1948; Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell 1946-1947; Miss Maude Haver 1949-1950. The work of this committee was handled by the State Historian 1947-The erection of a stone Bell Tower dedicated to Revolutionary 1949. patriots and the men and women who served in World Wars I and II was consigned to the N.S.D.A.R. with the stipulation that a fund of approximately \$100,000 should be raised by May 1947. The fund was raised but due to building confusion and shortages caused by the war, erection of the tower could not be started. Rising costs made the former estimates insufficient by the time building priorities could be obtained and the project was reopened. The fund has been procured through a series of memorials, names to be inscribed at a cost of \$10 for the honor roll, additional memorials were opened, chapter names could be included for \$25, floor blocks for \$250, men of note for \$300 and so on. The names of 26 chapters have been placed at Valley Several other chapters have reserved space for their names. Forge. A floor block in honor of Mrs. Shrewder was placed there. The five Wichita Chapters placed there the name of the Wichita Cruiser. A patriot stone was taken in honor of General Dwight Eisenhower. 200 Valley Forge Cook Books were sold by the Kansas daughters. and many boxes of Valley Forge Christmas cards. The State Seal has been placed there.

AWARDS FROM THE NATIONAL SOCIETY TO KANSAS

GIRL HOME MAKERS: The cotton dress submitted by Miss Lorraine Chapman sponsored by Peleg Gorton Chapter, was awarded first place in the State and later in the National Society contest 1946. Honorable mention was given to Miss Doris Lembright sponsored by the Dodge City Chapter at Continental Congress 1947.

MAGAZINE PRIZE: A prize of \$25 was given to Kansas by the National Magazine Committee for the largest number of subscriptions in a State having less than 4000 members and more than 2000 in 1945.

MEMBERSHIP: Kansas won the \$10 offered by the National Membership Chairman for the highest gain on a percentage basis in the Western Division in 1947.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP: Kansas won first prize for the greatest gain in Junior Membership of all States for 1949 and 1950. These prizes were \$10 each and were offered by the National Chairman.

CHAPTER HISTORY

D.A.R. CHAPTERS ORGANIZED IN KANSAS 1944-1950

Minisa Chapter, Wichita was organized October 17, 1946 with 31 members. Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur, State Consulting Genealogist took the responsibility for the organization of this chapter, which was by authorization. Mrs. Frank E. Blaser was elected the first Regent. The Chapter now has 33 members. Star Honor Roll for the new Building.

William Wilson Chapter, Garden City, was organized January 31, 1948 by authorization. Mrs. Mamie Prather was elected first Regent. It has doubled its membership and now numbers 31 members. Star Honor Roll for New Building.

John Athey Chapter, Oakley, was organized August 4, 1949 with Mrs. J. Edgar Mitchem as Organizing Regent and elected first Regent. The Chapter was named for an ancestor of Mrs. Mitchem. With a beginning of 16 members, it has already increased to 22. The Chapter name has been placed at Valley Forge and they made the Building Honor Roll.

John Haupt Chapter, Topeka, was organized November 17, 1949 with 34 members. Mrs. Raymond Plyley, for whose ancestor the chapter was named, was elected the first Regent. The Chapter name was placed at Valley Forge. With a membership of 49, the chapter won the Eunice Sterling Award Flag at their first State Conference, in which they took a very active part, furnishing most of the Pages. This Chapter has a large Junior Membership.

Shawnee Chapter, Mission, was organized December 1, 1949 with 20 members. Mrs. E. F. Sanders was elected the first Regent. The Chapter now has 25 members. The Chapter name has been placed at Valley Forge.

Cofachique Chapter, Iola, was organized December 19, 1949 by authorization. Mrs. C. F. Eckelman served as Genealogist for this Chapter. With 16 Charter Members, they have increased to 20 members. Mrs. Earl Sifers was elected the first Regent

STATE REGENTS

Mrs. (Roy Valentine) Dorothy Berryman Shrewder of Ashland was elected State Regent in 1944 and reelected in 1946. She served as State Vice Regent 1940-1944 and as State Librarian 1938-1940. As State Librarian she organized the Traveling Library. It now contains only genealogical materials and is transported and housed in cases that were provided at this time. As Vice Regent she was Chairman of the Kansas Star for the large bell at Valley Forge, honoring State Regent, Mrs. Alexander J. Berger. She was a member of the committee to prepare the Supplement to the 1944 Kansas State Directory and assisted in the organization of Byrd Prewitt Chapter representing the State Regent at the formal organization. She served as Chairman of the El Quartelejo Pilgrimage until the war conditions necessitated abandoning the pilgrimage. She attended all required meetings of the National Board. She represented the State Regent at the Annual State Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Board Meeting in 1940.

As State Regent, Mrs. Shrewder inherited the war projects when the pressure of maintaining the regular work of the Society and keeping up the added war work was great. The conversion period which followed was no less of a strain and a period of great adjustment was achieved through the understanding and cooperation of the Kansas Daughters. Over \$4,000.00 was added to the War Funds during the one and one-half years of war activity. The proposed project of libraries at certain permanent army hospitals, was organized in the State, but was abandoned before funds were collected as government funds were made available for this purpose. The adoption of the plan to provide moving picture and radio equipment for hospitals, and funds for the Approved Schools, was finally decided upon as a legitimate use for the sum collected for war effort. In making gifts to the Schools from this fund, the fact that G I's and children of service men were receiving educational advantages in our schools was a factor in the decision. The final disposition of the remaining fund was made through the Resolutions Committee of which Mrs. Shrewder was a member. Organization of the Valley Forge Memorial Bell Tower and raising of the fund needed was completed, but before priorities could be obtained for the erection of the tower, building conditions demanded additional sums. The project was reopened at the last October Board meeting attended by Mrs. Shrewder, with regret, as the former sum had been definite and her State had completed its quota on this estimate. However post war conditions made the action necessary, as it made necessary many other seeming irregularities and inconsistencies. In the years to come, it is hoped that members in reviewing this period will understand the severe

strain and the conscientious efforts of the Presidents General and the Boards in meeting their problems.

Never before was the National Society called upon to cancel its Continental Congress and all meetings over a certain numerical size. This was made necessary because of travel restrictions because of the war. The 47th State Conference was cancelled likewise, and ways had to be devised to meet with chapters, when gasoline was rationed and cars and tires not available. The State Regent's travel schedule was difficult because of limited public transportation, especially north and south. The cooperation of the chapters with the State Society permitted a high standard of regular work, while completing a magnificent program.

During the last year of her Regency, Mrs. Shrewder served as National Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, the first of a three year appointment. She had served as a member of the same committee the two previous years. She also served as a member of a special committee to formulate the policy of press relations and certain standing committees in 1946-1947 and attended all meetings of that committee. She was National Vice Chairman of Membership 1943-1947, National Vice Chairman of D.A.R. Magazine Committee 1947-1948.

To meet the need of communicating with chapters and members during the restricted period the Regent's Bulletin was revived. As there were no funds available for this, the Regent assumed the printing costs. She edited, prepared and mailed all copies of the Bulletin with the exception of two numbers during a trial subscription period. This subscription method failing, the Regent again assumed personal responsibility for the Bulletin. At the close of her term of office the State Conference voted the continuance of the Bulletin to be arranged at State cost and sent to the entire membership, where it had hitherto been sent to certain key members over the state. In every issue of the Regent's Bulletin a section was devoted to the Children of the American Revolution.

Mrs. Shrewder's great interest was youth committees and under her leadership the Approved Schools program was greatly broadened. Scholarships to the two D.A.R. Schools form the great work of the Kansas Society. The Girl Home Maker Committee was emphasized and a \$50 scholarship established through her interest. The Junior American Citizens Committee was strengthened. The adoption of the St. Francis Boys' Home as a Kansas project was the high light of her efforts for youth citizenship. The work of the Children of the American Revolution was stressed and full state cooperation given. The regular committees of the National Society were all given attention and the Memorial Bell Tower at Valley Forge, the National Tribute Grove in California, the Tamassee Auditorium-Gymnasium, all special administration projects were all completed on a quota basis.

The Staff Restroom at headquarters was renovated and redecorated and the D.A.R. rooms at Shawnee Mission were completely reconditioned and redecorated, while valuable additions were made to the Museum articles in these rooms, and the valuable addition of the handsome Stanley Memorial Case and pictures of past State Regents added. To the National D.A.R. Museum many valuable contributions were made and accepted.

Reorganization of the Business and Physical structure of the Kansas Society was particularly emphasized during Mrs. Shrewder's four years as Regent. Through a revision of the By-Laws (undertaken at the suggestion of the National Parliamentarian) several changes in the State structure were made—the division of the State conference, in rotation at state expense; the establishment of a nominating committee for selection of officers; change of meeting date of Fall Board Meetings to come after the October National Board, so that directions from that Board might be incorporated in the year's work more easily; the establishment of definite and regular Regent's visits to the chapters: and duties of officers specifically outlined; the term of State Office was set as three years to coincide with the National Administration with no re-election. A permanent fire proof file to hold Society materials was installed in the State Historical Society in Topeka.

Two Chapters were organized—Minisa at Wichita and William Wilson at Garden City.

Mrs. Shrewder served as State and National Promoter of C.A.R. during her regency, as a National Chairman of Red Cross in 1946-1947, and as National Vice President of C.A.R. 1947-1949.

During the 50th Annual State Conference in Wichita 1948, Mrs. Shrewder was elected Honorary State Regent. She was endorsed at this same Conference for the office of Vice President General or any other office of her choice in 1950. (Mrs. Shrewder was chosen as candidate for Librarian General on the ticket of Mrs. Edwin Stanton Lammers of Texas. She accepted and was defeated in the election held April 19, 1950). Mrs. (William Louis) Mary Govier Ainsworth of Wichita and Derby, was elected State Regent for the last of the two year terms. A member of Eunice Sterling Chapter, she served her chapter as Second Vice Regent and Regent. During her chapter Regency, she started a Chapter News Letter and a voluntary contribution for chapter projects, in place of Ways and Means projects.

She issued the State Regent's Bulletin as arranged for at the 1948 State Conference. Emphasis was placed upon Membership, especially Junior Membership and the proof of her efforts to assist the State Chairman of Junior Membership came when both years of her adminstration, Kansas won the prize for the greatest gain in Junior Membership of all States. The close cooperation of the State Treasurer and of the District Directors made possible the large increase in chapters upon the State Honor Roll for the payment of dues ON TIME. Four Chapters were organized, John Athey, John Haupt, Shawnee and Cofachique. In spite of much effort to prevent its loss, one chapter, Frederick Funston was disbanded.

Chapter visits were one of the projects of her administration and all but three of the 62 chapters were visited, some more than once. She encouraged exchange visits between chapters and urged chapters to invite State Officers, State Chairmen and District Officers to present programs and speak on the work and projects of our National and State Societies. She emphasized D.A.R. work for D.A.R. Chapters.

The New Building Program was the major project of her adminstration and during her two years in office, the State met its quota of \$5.50 per member, making the Building Honor Roll. At the 59th Continental Congress, Mrs. Ainsworth as retiring State Regent and Mrs. von der Heiden as incoming State Regent, pledged the remainder of the \$6.00 per member quota for the State. 26 chapters completed their Star Honor Roll quota and seven others made the Honor Roll. Many gifts in the new building were made in honor of Kansas Daughters, including the new Kansas Room in honor of Mrs. Ainsworth, a large mahogany filing cabinet in honor of Mrs. Loren Edgar Rex, Vice President General, an Addressograph in honor of Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, National Chairman of Resolutions Committee, a Museum Case in honor of Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell, National Vice Chairman D.A.R. Museum Committee and six Book Stacks in honor of Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, Past Vice President General.

To promote the program of National Defense, Mrs. Ainsworth arranged for the visit of Mrs. E. Thomas Boyd, Honorary Vice President General and National Vice Chairman, National Defense Committee to each of the four District Meetings at Mission, Junction City, Independence, and St. John in the Fall of 1949. Mrs. Ainsworth will serve as Chairman of the National Defense Meeting to be sponsored by the five Wichita Chapters November 10, 1950.

As an inspiration for the Approved Schools program, Mrs. Ainsworth accompanied by Mrs. Robert Chesney, State Chairman of Approved Schools attended the Tour of Approved Schools arranged by the National Society in the Fall of 1948. She served on the Committee for the Approved Schools Tea given by the five Wichita Chapters, November 4, 1949. At this Tea hand crafts from seven of the Approved Schools were displayed, benefitting the participating schools by more than 650.00.

A supplement to the 1944 Directory was compiled by the State Registrar, Mrs. G. B. Harrop with the assistance of the Chapter Registrars, and published by the State Society.

Mrs. Ainsworth attended all regular meetings of the National Board, the dedication of the new library and the new Museum and the Betty Washington bed room at Kenmore and the New Building.

At the close of the Topeka Conference, March 11, 1950, Mrs. Ainsworth was elected Honorary State Regent and was unanimously endorsed for the office of Vice President General for election in 1951.

DISTRICT MEETINGS AND SPECIAL MEETINGS

SOUTHEAST DISTRICT: The fourteenth Annual Southeast District Conference was held June 9, 1944 in Baxter Springs, Mrs. Robert W. Diver, District Regent. The State Regent, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder reported on the Continental Congress. It was voted to hold future District Meetings in the Fall.

ANNUAL SHAWNEE MISSION PILGRIMAGE: The State Board of Management met October 17, 1945, James Ross Chapter Hostess. The meeting, usually held near Constitution Day was postponed in order that the President General, Mrs. Julius Young Talmadge might be present. Guests of Honor were: Mrs. Talmadge, Mrs. Frank Edgar Lee, Historian General, Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, Vice President General and Mrs. Henry Townsend, State Regent of Missouri. Mrs. Lee presented the Valley Forge Memorial Bell Tower project.

Recommendations were: \$500 gift to Tamassee Auditorium-Gymnasium, a Compilation of the History of the Student Loan Fund by the Chairman, endorsement of Mrs. Alexander J. Berger for a cabinet office on the ticket of Mrs. John Logan Marshall, allowance of prizes \$5 and \$3 for Girl Home Makers and \$5 and \$2.50 for Historical Research, securance of storage space and a locker for the Society Files in the Historical Society at Topeka, authorization of \$150 repair on the Mission Rooms, authorization of a \$250 Floor section at Valley Forge, honoring the State Regent, Mrs. Shrewder. The luncheon meeting was high-lighted by the address of the President General Mrs. Talmadge. The afternoon meeting conducted in front of the North Building of Shawnee Mission was in charge of Mrs. Ashlock, State Chairman of the Mission. The Battle Flag of the LCI (L) 588 was used for the Pledge of Allegiance. The pledge was "signed" by Dorothy Weber, student from the Olathe School for the Deaf. A walnut tree was planted and dedicated, in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the creetion of the North Building, under the superintendency of Reverend Jerome C. Berryman, great grandfather of the State Regent, Mrs. Shrewder. This was followed by a lovely Indian interlude by Mrs. Ashlock and assisting musicians. Members of James Ross Chapter in costumes of the Mission days, conducted visitors through the Mission Buildings. ;

That evening a joint Kansas-Missouri Meeting was held in Kansas City, Mo. honoring the President General.

SOUTHEAST DISTRICT: The fifteenth Meeting was held in Fort Scott October 18, 1945, Molly Foster Berry Chapter, hostess. The State Regent reported on the October National Board Meeting and placed the name of Samuel Berry, Revolutionary soldier and husband of Molly Foster Berry on the Valley Forge Honor Roll in honor of the Chapter's 34th Anniversary. The Battle Flag of the LCI (L) 588 was used in a special Flag program.

SOUTHWEST DISTRICT: This was the organization meeting of this District and was held October 22, 1945 in Hutchinson. Fifteen Chapters were in the district.

NORTHWEST DISTRICT: This District was organized Oct. 23, 1945 in Salina with 15 chapters. Mr. Elmer Ahlstedt, father of the Commander of our LCI (L) 646 spoke. The State Officers placed Lieutenant Alstedt's name on the Honor Roll at Valley Forge. The State Regent gave a 15 minute Radio broadcast. Mary Wade Strother Chapter was Hostess.

ANNUAL SHAWNEE MISSION PILGRIMAGE AND STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING: Was held September 17, 1946. James Ross Chapter, Hostess. The State Regent reported on her visit to Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith D.A.R. Schools, following the October National Board Meeting. Membership prizes were announced and recommendations made to the Board: The Regent's Bulletin be publiched on a subscription basis; the Shawnce Mission Pilgrimage be held in October instead of September, to enable the State Regent to report on the October National Board meeting; \$5 be allowed for Girl Home Makers prize; \$5 be allowed for History Contest. Special reports were given by National Chairmen. present: Mrs. Berger on Valley Forge and Mrs. Rex on the American Indians. It was reported that the repair on the Mission Rooms was completed at a cost of \$241.37 (\$100 being paid by the State Historical Society.) Two National tickets were announced by the Regent and the Board was reminded that Mrs. Berger was an associate candidate on the ticket of Mrs. John Logan Marshall, by unanimous endorsement of the State Conference.

NORTHEAST DISTRICT: The organization meeting was held September 17, 1946. It was voted that the Annual Meeting of the Northeast District be held at Shawnee Mission and the District to act as Hostess to the State Board of Management.

SOUTHEAST DISTRICT: October 26, 1946 Oceanus Hopkins Chapter was Hostess. The State Regent reported on the National Board Meeting and her visit to Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee D.A.R. Schools. The proposed By-Laws revisions were presented.

SOUTHWEST DISTRICT: October 28, 1946 Eunice Sterling Chapter commemorating it's 50th Anniversary was hostess at the Allis Hotel in Wichita to the District. The State Regent reported. Minisa Chapter recently organized was admitted to the District.

NORTHWEST DISTRICT: October 30, 1946 Courtney Spalding Chapter was hostess. Besides the routine business and reports, there was a Tour to historical points of interest.

SHAWNEE MISSION AND DISTRICT MEETINGS 1947: By revision of the State By-Laws, March 27, 1947, the four Districts became a definite part of the State structure, the State Conference to rotate among the Districts and a member of the State Nominating Committee to be elected from each District (the Chairman being elected by the State Board of Management).

ANNUAL SHAWNEE MISSION PILGRIMAGE AND BOARD MEETING: October 27, 1947. Recommendations: Registration fee for State Conference be changed to \$1; the sum equal to 10¢ per capita be taken from the State treasury for State Conference expense; authorization to purchase a steel filing cabinet for storage of Kansas Society materials, to be placed in the State Historical Society. Election of Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick as Chairman of State Nominating Committee. Election of Mrs. C. P. Traxel to State Corresponding Secretary to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Mrs. J. C. Harper. A dedication ceremony was held in the D.A.R. Rooms, at which Miss Harriet Stanley, doner of an elegant Museum Case, in memory of her mother, Mrs. William E. Stanley, Honorary State Regent and twice Vice President General (the first National Officer from Kansas), accepted the thanks of the Kansas Society extended by Mrs. Harry Ashlock, State Chairman of Shawnee Mission. Colonel Conrad G. Follansbee was the luncheon speaker. A resolution protesting the sale of Old Huron Cemetery in down town Kansas City, Kansas, was adopted.

NORTHEAST DISTRICT: Mrs. E. B. Col'ard, Secretary, presided at the meeting, and was elected the member of the Nominating Committee from this District.

NORTHWEST DISTRICT: October 28, 1947, Polly Ogden Chapter was hostess. Jo Anne Wolgast, Girl Home Maker Scholarship Girl was presented with a D.A.R. Coffee spoon by the State Regent. Polly Ogden Chapter made a gift of \$25 to the Grace Marshall Scholarship Fund in place of flowers for officers and visitors. Mrs. J. W. Hornbaker was elected a member of the Nominating Committee.

SOUTHEAST DISTRICT: Hannah Jameson Chapter was hostess October 29, 1947 to the 17th Annual Meeting. Mr. W. H. Martin, S.A.R. was a guest speaker. Mrs. O. P. Dellinger was elected a member of the Nominating Committee.

SOUTHWEST DISTRICT: Jeremiah Howard Chapter was hostess, October 31, 1947. Mrs. C. F. Eckelman was elected a member of the Nominating Committee. A gift of \$25 was made the District Treasury to the Grace Marshall Memorial Scholarship Fund. Report of C.A.R.

SHAWNEE MISSION AND BOARD OF MANAGEMENT: October 29, 1948. Recommendations: Allowance for purchase of steel filing case for records of State Registar, cost not to exceed \$60; that 35¢ per capita be given each year from the General Fund, to the National Building project for the two years 1948-1949; contribution of \$25 to the National Tribute Grove; purchase of \$10 worth of Building Fund postals. Dedication of a bronze marker placed at tree planted in 1945 commemorating the 100th Anniversary of erection of the North Building at Shawnee Mission.

NORTHEAST DISTRICT: October 29 1948. Music by Madrigal Singers of Lawrence Music Club. Report by State Regent on October National Board Meeting and the Tour visiting six of our D.A.R. Approved Schools. Orchids of \$5 each to the Building Fund were given to the State Regent and the District Director. \$15 was contributed to the Building Fund by the Northeast District. The Regent of Betty Washington Chapter presented a muffler, owned by Governor Robinson, first Governor of Kansas, to Shawnee Mission.

NORTHWEST DISTRICT: Henry Dawson Chapter was hostess November 1, 1948 at McPherson. The Emblem Service of the Future Home Makers of America was presented by McPherson High School girls. An electric iron and \$16 was contributed to St. Mary's School for Indian Girls. An interesting panel discussion "We went to Continental Congress" was presented. Mr. Stanford Lehmberg gave a short organ recital. The State Regent spoke on "Opportunities for Kansas" reporting on the National Board Meeting and the Tour of Approved Schools. An invitation was extended by Emporia for the next State Conference in March 1949.

SOUTHWEST DISTRICT: Fort Larned Chapter was hostess November 5, 1948 in Larned. A musical program was presented. A lei of dimes and good luck wish bones from the William Berryman Society C.A.R., was presented to the State Regent. (This later was given to the National President C.A.R., Mrs. Donald Bennett Adams, at the State Conference in Emporia). \$25 was contributed to the Building Fund. The State Regents report was given.

SOUTHEAST DISTRICT: Susannah French Putney Chapter was hostess in El Dorado, November 4, 1948. Reports were given by the State Regent, all State Officers present, and those State Chairmen present. \$17 was contributed to the National Building Fund. Susannah French Putney gave \$5 to the Building Fund.

SHAWNEE MISSION PILGRIMAGE & BOARD MEETING; The Executive Committee met for luncheon in the home of the State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Hugh P. Hartley, October 20, 1949. At four o'clock that afternoon the State Board of Management met at Old Mission Methodist Church, a dinner was served at six p.m. at which all Kansas Daughters were welcome. Following dinner the State Chairman gave their reports.

NORTHEAST DISTRICT: A new plan was adopted this year, hoping to benefit the District Meeting, allowing a full day for business as is done in other Districts. Coffee was served by the members of James Ross Chapter preceding the Meeting. An orchid of \$5.00 for the Building Fund was presented by General Edward Hand Chapter. Two new Chapters in this District were announced ready for organization, John Haupt Chapter in Topeka and Shawnee Chapter in Mission. Mrs. G. D. Weilepp was elected to the Nominating Committee. The State Regent reported on the National Board Meeting. Mrs. E. Thomas Boyd of Denver, Honorary Vice President General and National Vice Chairman, National Defense Committee, gave an address "Pioneering in the New Era."

NORTHWEST DISTRICT: October 24, 1949 Lois Warner Chapter was hostess in Junction City. A reception was given in the home of the Regent, Mrs. LaShelle the evening preceding the meeting. A Coffee was given by the hostess chapter during registration. Reports were given by all State Officers and State Chairmen in attendance. Announcement was made of the organization of John Athey Chapter, August 4, 1949, and the prizes given for the first new Chapter by the State Regent, awarded to the N. W. District and to John Athey Chapter. Mrs. E. Thomas Boyd, Honorary Vice President General and National Vice Chairman of National Defense gave a stirring talk against Socialized Medicine, Federal Aid to Education and other Socialistic Movements. Mrs. F. L. Veach was elected to the Nominating Committee. The State Regent reported on the National Board Meeting.

SOUTHEAST DISTRICT: Esther Lowrey Chapter was hostess in Independence, October 26, 1949. Reports were given by State Officers and State Chairmen. Cofachique Chapter of Iola was announced as nearly ready for organization. Mrs. E. Thomas Boyd, addressed the meeting on National Defense. Mrs. Shrewder National Chairman Resolutions Committee talked on Resolutions Mrs. Ainsworth, State Regent, reported on the National Board Meeting. Mrs. John B. Gould was elected to the State Nominating Committee.

SOUTHWEST DISTRICT: Kanza Chapter was hostess October 28 in St. John. A lovely musical program was presented by a sextette. from the Harmony Music and Study Club. State Officers and State Chairmen reported. There was a report on C.A.R. by the State Chairman of C.A.R. Promoters, Mrs. Earl Moses. Mrs. E. Thomas Boyd, of Denver was the featured speaker and presented some interesting facts on National Defense and the rising socialistic trends of today. A resolution endorsing Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder for Librarian. General on the ticket of Mrs. Edwin Stanton Lammers was adopted. Following the report of the Treasurer, it was voted to contribute \$6 per Chapter (not already on the Building Honor Roll) to the Building Fund. \$66 was contributed. The District voted to purchase one of the dining chairs at \$7.50 for St. Mary's School for Indian Girls. Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur was elected to the State Nominating Committee. It was announced that 13 of the 17 Chapters in this District made the State Honor Roll by having all dues paid by January 1st. Mrs. Ainsworth State Regent gave her report.

Transfers to D.A.R. Chapter, awarded to Wellington Chapter 1947; \$5 for the greatest increase in Junior Membership awarded to Jeremiah Howard Chapter in 1948; and \$10 for the first D.A.R. Chapter to organize, awarded to William Wilson Chapter 1948. The Eunice Sterling Traveling Flag Award for the greatest percentage gain in membership went to William Creekmore, 1945; Fort Larned, 1946; Dana, 1947; Nathan Edson, 1948 Lucretia Griswold Latimer, 1949; John Haupt, 1950.

MARKERS IN KANSAS PLACED BY D.A.R. 1944-1950

October 29, 1948, a bronze marker cemented to native stone was dedicated at Shawnee Mission by Mrs. Wayne Ashlock, State Chairman Shawnee Mission Committee. This marked the walnut tree planted October 17, 1945 in memory of Reverend Jerome C. Berryman, Superintendent of the Mission, 100 years before, when the North Building was erected. Due to war shortages, it was impossible to place the marker at an earlier date.

March 8, 1950, a bronze marker was placed on the tomb of Miss Grace Meeker, Honorary State Regent, who passed away December 4, 1947. This was in accordance with a motion passed at the Fifty-first State Conference. The State Regent, Mrs. Ainsworth; State Chaplain, Mrs. Jackman; State Treasurer, Mrs. Mullin; Honorary State Regents, Mrs. Shrewder and Miss Campbell with Mrs. Whitaker, Regent of General Edward Hand Chapter and many members of that chapter and others attended this ceremony.

Kansas Society .

A native limestone marker was placed by Arthur Barrett Chapter at Alcove Spring in memory of Sarah Handley Keys. At the top of the marker are the dates 1776 and 1846 and on a bronze placque this inscription: "Sarah Handley Keyes, a daughter of a Revolutionary soldier." Erected by the Arthur Barrett Chapter D.A.R. Enscribed in the rock are these words: "God in His Love and Charity Has Called in This Beautiful Valley, a Pioneer Mother.: May 26, 1846." Mrs. Keys was a member of the Reed-Donner party that camped at Alcove Spring, preparatory to ferrying across the flooded Blue River at Independence Crossing on the Oregon Trail. The marker was made possible through a bequest of \$100 made by Miss Martha Harvey, daughter of Ex-Governor Harvey of Kansas. The marker was dedicated May 30, 1950.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

The State President C.A.R., Mrs. David S. Jackman of Wichita, experienced the same difficulties as the State Regent D.A.R. in 1944, due to the continued war effort and inability to hold meetings. Six Societies and a membership of 98 were reported for the year 1945. Under the continuing and splendid leadership of Mrs. Jackman, the C.A.R. was held together and made some gains. 1946 report included 125. 1947 reported a gain of 9 new members. The total membership reported in 1948 was 126, but during these four years 24 members transferred to D.A.R. and S.A.R.

William Berryman Society was organized in Ashland in 1948 with 19 members. Rebecca Moore Odell Society was organized at Great Bend April 30, 1949 with 20 members. Quivera Society was organized at Coffeyville, May 19, 1950 with 10 members.

Members of C.A.R. served as Pages at the Southwest District Meeting in Wichita 1946. At the State Conference in Dodge City, 1947, members of Coronado Society acted as Pages and presented a Flag Pageant. At the State Conference in Wichita 1948, eight members of C.A.R. served as Pages under the leadership of Miss Sarah Ann Haines, Senior President of Coronado Society.

At all D.A.R. State Conferences, C.A.R. meetings have been held. At the State Conference in Topeka 1946, Mrs. Reuben E. Knight, National President C.A.R. was the featured speaker at a luncheon meeting. At the State Conference in Dodge City 1947, the Pages from Coronado Society presented a Pageant and the State President, Mrs. Jackman presented a 15 minute broadcast on C.A.R. Following the State Conference in Wichita 1948 the first State meeting was held, since before the war, Mrs. Roscoe C. O'Byrne, President General

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was honor guest. Mrs. Donald Bennett Adams, National President, was an Honor Guest at the State Conference in Emporia 1949. A C.A.R. luncheon was held with Mrs. Earl C. Moses, State President, presiding, following the State Conference in Topeka, Saturday March 11, 1950.

A C.A.R. Promoters Chairman was made a State Committee of D. A.R. and a column in the Regent's Bulletin devoted to C.A.R. activities 1944-1948. Enclosed in the December 1949 State Regent's Bulletin, appeared the first issue of the "Sunflower Special" devoted exclusively to C.A.R. news. This news sheet was awarded the second prize, a parchment scroll for the best all-printed news sheet, at the National Convention of C.A.R. 1950. Attending this National Convention were the State President, Mrs. Earl C. Moses, the State Vice President, Mrs. William Ainsworth; the State Secretary, Mrs. Manter H. Bock, Mrs. Roy Valentine Shrewder, Past National Vice President, Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell, National Promoter, and Miss Sarah Shrewder. Senior President Coronado Society. When Mrs. Moses was confirmed during the installation ceremony, her ribbon was placed by Mrs. Ainsworth.

A C.A.R. State Conference was held in Great Bend, June 12, 1950 with Mrs. Earl C. Moses, State President, presiding. Other Senior State Officers attending were: Mrs. William Ainsworth, Vice President, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, Registrar and Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur, Historian; Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden, State Regent was an honor guest. Junior Officers elected were: Miss Margery Null, President; Jerome Woods Berryman, Vice President; Mary Ann Stinson, Chaplain; Marjory Baker, Recording Secretary; Mona Rae White, Registrar; Jo Lou Bogue, Treasurer; Edward Jarvis Snyder, Color Bearer; Martha Milan, Historian and Sally Morrison, Publicity Chairman.

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
