OBJECTS

The objects of this Society as stated in Article 11 of the Constitution are:

1.

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, page 56.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Report immediately to the State Corresponding Secretary any change in chapter officer or chapter chairman.

Report at once to the Treasurer General, State Regent, State Registrar and State Treasurer, all resignations, deaths, marriages, and members received or lost by transfer. Do not report a resignation nor transfer a member in arrears for dues. Only members in good standing may resign or be transferred. The Handbook gives specific directions regarding transfers and resignations. Please follow rules carefully.

Report immediately to the State Regent and State Registrar all changes of address of members.

CHAPTER REGISTRARS ATTENTION. Please copy from application papers before sending to Washington, the full name of applicant including her maiden name, and if married, the name or initials of her husband, the complete address, name of ancestor with his rank, the State in which he served and the State in which he died. If the applicant is a Junior Member (under 35 years of age) please make a notation of that with her birth date. As soon as notice is received from National that the applicant has been accepted, report this information to the State Regent and the State Registrar. Report data concerning Junior Members, also to the State Chairman of Junior Membership.

Dues should be in the hands of the Treasurer General and the State Treasurer by December 1st. Do not wait on delinquents. Members, whose dues are unpaid January 1st are "in arrears."

All contributions to be counted in the current year's report must be in the hands of the State Treasurer by January 31st. The State fiscal year extends from January 31, 1950 to January 31, 1951.

Every Chapter Regent, Treasurer and Registrar should have a copy of the D.A.R. Handbook. All members, who wish to be informed should have copies. The price is twenty cents (6 copies for \$1.00). Orders with remittances should be sent to the Treasurer General, Administration Building, N. S. D. A. R., 1776 D Street, N. W., Washington 6, D. C.

Continental Congress—The Sixty-ffirst Continental Congress will be held in Washington, D. C., April 13-19, 1952

National Board of Management—The next meeting of the Natonal Board of Management will be held October 23-24, 1951. Applications for Membership and reinstatements should be sent to the Treasurer General three weeks in advance of this date.

State Conference—The fifty-fourth State Conference will be held in Hutchinson, March 12—14, 1952.

All room reservations must be made direct with the hotel. The Southwest District will be hostess. Registration Fee, \$1.00.

Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Picnic; will be held September 17, 1951. Plan to attend the meeting.

Annual Fall State Board of Management meeting will be held at Dodge City, October 30, 1951.

District Meetings—The Southwest District meeting will be held at Dodge City, October 31, 1951. The Northwest District meeting will be held at Abilene, November 2, 1951. The Northeast District meeting will be held at Topeka, November 5, 1951. The Southeast District will be held at Coffeyville, November 8, 1951.

State Regents Chapter Visits—The State Regent is asking the District Directors to make a schedule of chapter visits in their district for her and chapters are asked to cooperate in the matter on any special arrangements necessary to fit into the travel schedule that may be made.

IMPORTANT AMENDMENTS TO NATIONAL BY-LAWS

Adopted Continental Congress 1951

"Chapter Treasurers shall report to the Treasurer General on the first day of June and November all members in arrears, changes in membership, marriages and deaths since the last report. The fees and dues sent to the Treasurer General by the Chapter treasurer must be accompanied by an alphabetical list of the members to whom dues shall be accredited."

"The Annual National dues of two dollars from each Chapter member shall be sent by the chapter treasurer to the Treasurer General on or befire the first day of each year. This amount shall include the quota funds or per capita tax."

Beginning July 1, 1951 two dollars annual National dues must be sent with the initiation fee of five dollars for applicants joining the National Society through a chapter.

"A fee of \$5.00 shall accompany each supplemental claim, to establish the right for additional ancestral bars." The Chapter Treasurer shall send the \$5.00 supplemental fee with supplemental papers to the Treasurer General.

KANSAS STATE CHAIRMAN OF APPROVED SCHOOLS Kansas City, Kansas—October 18, 1950

In August, I received my first letter from the National Chairman, Mrs. Lowell E. Burnelle, Glosster, Ohio and upon advice of our State. Regent I hurriedly typed letters to all Chapter Chairman of Approved Schools of the State, hoping they would receive them before their first meeting. These letters contained the highlights of the National Chairman's letter and the following resolutions made by the National Board and considered necessary after the needs in the Peabody Survey were noted, February 2, 1950.

Whereas, Since we have chosen to assume the entire responsibility for the education and citizenship training of underprivileged children placed in our own two schools, Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith, and since we wish these students to represent the highest principles and ideals of our Society,

Resolved, That our first consideration be given these two schools in the distribution of gifts and funds.

Resolved, That the Student Loan Fund Committee of the various States consider the allocation of some of the funds from the Committee for scholarship aid for Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith. (This resolution has inspired several states to release the Student Loan Fund immediately in order that children now on the waiting list may enter our school.) I bring these resolutions by the National Board so you may empress on your Chapters the wish of the National Society, to concentrate all of your efforts on our own two schools.

Kate Duncan Smith has 23 needs ranging from \$125.00 to \$20,000.00. Tamassee needs \$14,000.00 to complete the Auditorium-Gymnasium Building, \$10,000.00 for stage, chairs, 2 powder rooms, 3 sections of bleachers. \$10,000.00 for a revolving fund, \$5,130.00 salaries for special workers, and miscellaneous, 3 typewriters, 100 arm chair-desks at \$10.00 each, 2 pianos, wool blankets, 30 mattresses at \$16.00 each.

It has been suggested that Kansas again divert \$500.00 from our State Student Loan Fund for another one-half wing of the Stadium at Tamassee, as we have over \$1,000.00 in the Student Loan Fund. This is for your consideration and subject to the vote of the Conference in March.

I sent to National for material for programs and received very little and nothing on Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith.

I have had requests from Chapter Chairman for program literature and have sent them all I had on our two schools and referred others to National and the Schools and hope they were able to obtain the necessary material.

Your Chairman is new and inexperienced but I hope very soon to become better acquainted with the work of the Committee. I shall endeavor to pass on to the Chapter chairman all information received from the National Chairman.

October 13 I attended a Benefit for Approved Schools at Topeka, Kansas, sponsored by the D.A.R. Topeka Chapters which consisted of a Table Setting contest and Exhibition of Silver. This was a very delightful affair, and I hope very profitable for the Approved Schools. I wish to thank them for their invitation and hospitality.

Mrs. Klein moved the board recommend \$500.00 be sent to Tamassee. Mrs. Pinegar seconded. Motion carried.

Mrs. Earl Moses, state president of C.A.R. gave her report. Mrs. Wm. Ainsworth gave the following report:

Kansas, with the States of Colorado, Nebraska, North and South Dakota is in the Western Division of our National Society. I would like to have you check the report of the Correct Use of the Flag Chairman in the 59th Continental Congress Proceedings and the report of the National Vice Chairman, Correct Use of the Flag, Mrs. Jackman, my Predecessor, in our State Proceedings for 1950.

Colorado—35 chapters reported 100% on this Committee Nebraska—7 of the 44 Chapters reported North Dakota—6 of the 10 Chapters reported South Dakota—10 of the 14 Chapters reported KANSAS—25 of our 62 Chapters reported.

Your National Vice Chairman pleads for better cooperation this year. At the present moment our National Society is emphasizing our study of the Flag Code—Public Law 829 and urging every member to write her Congressman to make an effort to secure legislation for honoring and protecting "Old Glory". A plan is being

promoted now through Government agencies to "fly over every public building by Nnited Nations Day, October 24,, the United Nations Flag. Quoting our President General, Mrs. Patton, "I call on all the members to resist the un-American effort which is being made to fly the flag of the United Nations above or in equal prominence with the Stars and Stripes.

"We believe that the United States Flag Code as enacted by the 77th Congress should be observed and that the position of honor for our Flag should be maintained as designated in that law. There is no need ever to display the United Nations Flag except at a United Nations meeting."

PLEASE TAKE THIS MESSAGE BACK TO YOUR CHAPTER And please see that your Chapter makes a report for this committee, to the State Chairman, Mrs. Gray, so that she may turn over to me the best report on the Flag Kansas has ever made. Let's lead the Western Division this year!

RESOLUTIONS

Your committee on Resolutions is ready to report to the Fifty-Third Annual Session of the Kansas Society of Daughters of the American Revolution the following:

We desire to reaffirm the Resolutions passed by the 59th Congress National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution and specifically to reemphasize certain of those Resolutions.

RETAINING AMERICAN IDEALS IN EDUCATION

Whereas, Left-wing educators are urging a "Reconstruction" of our Educational System to indoctrinate children and adults with the new social order of "Worldmindedness" conditioning our people for subjugation to "World Government" alleging that "excess patriotism" and loyalty to our Country are unwarranted, and

Whereas, The indoctrination of all our people is being conducted in many ways and places, including our schools,

Resolved, That the 53rd Annual Conference of the Kansas Society of Daughters of the American Revolution declare its opposition to the introduction of subversive ideas in American education and earnestly urge the teaching, in both primary and secondary schools, of United States History, Geography, and Civics according to the ideals of American free enterprise, economy, and the Constitution of the United States.

OBSERVANCE OF PATRIOTIC OCCASIONS

Whereas, There is an increasing indifference in the observance of the anniversaries of American historical events and of great American characters, and,

Whereas, With the influx of aliens through the established quotas and the displaced persons quotas there is greater necessity than ever before to arouse in the minds of the American people an awakened understanding of the obligation they owe to those men and women who, with faith and sacrifice formed our government and left to us the priceless heritage of a free people,

Resolved, That this Society through its members earnestly foster the observance of all patriotic and national holidays and urge the display of the United States Flag on such occasions in all public places and at private homes.

THE FLAG

And be it the sense of this Conference of Kansas Society Daughters of American Revolution, that,

Whereas, A nation-wide effort is now being made to weaken the force and meaning of the Stars and Stripes as a symbol of the United States of America as a free, independent, and sovereign nation,

It be Resolved that, The Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution do strongly oppose the flying of any other emblem, national or international, above, to the right of, in equal prominence with, or in the place of the United States Flag on United States Soil.

SUPPORTING CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORITY

Resolved, That the Kansas Society of the American Revolution pledge to the Congress of the United States support in the exercise of its Constitutional Authority to determine when and where American troops shall be garrisoned in foreign lands.

Resolved, That the President and Congress of the United States be urged to avoid commitments abroad of our military and economic resources which may weaken the defense of our hemisphere or jeopardize the independent action of our own government, and

Be it further Resolved, That the President and the Congress be urged in the exercise of their separate Constitutional functions, to exact from our allies adequate military guarantee to avoid another foreign military engagement in which American troops are called upon to do most of the fighting and dying.

GENOCIDE CONVENTION

Whereas, The Supreme Court of the United States has ruled that under Section 2, Art. VI of the Constitution of the United States, all treaties entered into by this country become the law of the land, and

Whereas, At present a sub-committee of the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate has under consideration a treaty called the GENOCIDE CONVENTION, which, if approved by the Senate, will become the law and which will deprive United States citizens of their legal rights under circumstances which are hidden in the phraseology of fine words,

Resolved, That the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Resolution express its opposition to ratification of this treaty and to approvel by any department or division of our Federal Government.

WORLD GOVERNMENT

Resolved, That the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution express its unalterable opposition to the idea of WORLD GOVERNMENT, whatever named, and call upon representatives in Congress to fight and vote against it.

THE F. B. I.

Resolved, That the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution express again, as in the past, its unqualified faith in the Federal Bureau of Investigation and in its present director, J. Edgar Hoover.

UNAMERICAN ACTIVITIES

Resolved, That the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge the continued support of a Committee in our National Congress on un-American activities.

Resolved, That the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution again declare its opposition,

To Socialized Medicine;

To Federal Aid to Education and to the use of public funds for private schools;

To alteration of present immigration laws and quotas, as set forth in resolutions passed by the State and National Societies;

And be it Resolved, That copies of these Resolutions be sent to the Kansas Senators and to all Kansas Representatives in Congress.

We recommend the following as a plan for individual effort by members of the Society:

WRITE a personal letter, brief and to the point, expressing your own views on these subjects to

Key Members of Committees in Congress

Your United States Senators

Your Representatives in Congress

These letters must include the writer's complete address.

The Hon. James P. Richards is Chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee

The Hon. Richard B. Russell is Chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

All addressed at Washington, D. C.

BY-LAWS

CHAPTER REGENT'S CLUB

The National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution Organized at State Conference, March 12, 1950

ARTICLE I-Name

The name of this club shall be the Kansas Chapter Regent's Club.

ARTICLE II—Object

The object of this regents club shall be to further the plans of the National and State Societies of the Daughters of the American Revolution; to maintain harmonious co-operation among the chapters in Kansas; to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state; and to particularly foster closer relationship among chapters, friendship among officers, and to encourage the exchange of ideas.

ARTICLE III-Membership

The membership of the chapter regent's club shall include past, present and incoming chapter regents in Kansas.

ARTICLE IV-Officers

- Section 1. The officers of the club shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Breakfast Chairman. These officers shall constitute an Executive Committee.
- Sec. 2. Three members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum.

- Sec. 3. Vacancies in office shall be filled by the Executive Committee.
- Sec. 4. The term of office shall be one year only, and no officer may succeed one's self. Election shall be by acclamation.
- Sec. 5. Officers upon retiring from office shall deliver to all successors any monies, accounts, record books, papers, and other properties belonging to the club.

ARTICLE V-Duties of Officers

- Section I. PRESIDENT—The president shall preside at all meetings and appoint all committees.
- Sec. 2. VICE-PRESIDENT—The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the president in her absence.
- Sec. 3. SECRETARY—It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep and report the minutes of the annual meeting and of the Executive Committee to the State Recording Secretary for publication in the Annual Proceedings.
- Sec. 4. TREASURER—The treasurer shall collect all dues, and make such disbursements as are approved by the club or the Executive Committee.
- Sec. 5. BREAKFAST CHAIRMAN—The breakfast chairman shall have charge of reservations, tickets, and simple table decorations for the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VI-Meetings

The annual breakfast meeting shall be held the morning of the last day of the Kansas State Conference of the D.A.R. The hour and price to be determined and announced by the chairman of arrangements.

ARTICLE VII-Dues

The annual dues shall be fifty cents (\$.50) per member and are payable at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VIII-Order of Business

- 1. Prayer.
- 2. Roll Call
- 4. Collection of dues.
- 3. Treasurer's Report.
- 5. Election of new officers.
- 6. Discussion.

These By-Laws shall become effective upon their acceptance by

STATE OFFICERS REPORTS

STATE REGENT'S REPORT

Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden

It hardly seems possible that one third of the present administration is now history. To say it has been a busy, happy year does not describe it adequately, suffice it is to say the association with the splendid Daughters of Kansas and the member of National Society has been most satisfying. At all times the good of the Society has been considered in furthering the program of the National Society in Kansas and to keep our own members informed and a little ahead of other states has been our aim. Being new on the state board has required study and diligent application to become familiar with duties and business of the order.

As the reports of the officers, chairmen, and chapter regents are given, the scope of the work will be revealed and we trust the achievements will far exceed your expectations.

Confirmation at Continental Congress was a thrilling experience, the high point being when the retiring regent presented the official ribbon and wished the regent as much happiness as she had enjoyed during her term of service.

Making the appointments and organizing the official family was the first duty and it required much time, caused chiefly by delays in hearing from prospective appointees. Your regent heartily recommends promptness in answering letters at all times. If it is found one cannot comply with a request never hesitate to let the fact be known promptly so that another may have a chance. It would have been easier to have appointed qualified members without regard to districts or chapters but we tried to spread the appointments through out the state.

Kansas received National appointments as Vice chairmen on eight important committees all of which was appreciated.

Resignations have been received from two state officers—Treasurer and Reporter, and two state chairmen have resigned. These places will be filled as soon as possible.

Chapter Visits: On return from the state conference last spring the home chapter honored both the state corresponding secretary and state regent with special entertainment.

Council Oak Chapter took the leading part in a county-wide Old Settlers Celebration to make money for tree surgery on the famous old Oak Tree at Council Grove, and the two state officers, Regent and Corresponding Secretary were invited to ride in a special car at the head of the parade. Both enjoyed it immensely.

Several Chapter "Closing Teas" were attended last spring including Henry Dawson, Jane Dean Coffey, Betty Washington, and Uvedale. In the fall visits were made to Nathan Edson, Lucretia Griswold Latimer, Sterling, Topeka, Isabella Weldin, Jeremiah Howard, John Athey, Smoky Hill, Courtney Spalding, and Esther Lawrey. It was gratifying to find John Athey, just a year old, doing so well and having a new member added to the Roll.

Of unusual interest was the "Table Setting" show put on by the Topeka Chapter as a benefit for the Approved Schools; and the "Defense Tea" with an exhibit of historic quilts and a Poster Contest given by the five chapters in Wichita. Both were well attended.

A number of chapters will be visited this spring before the chapters close for the summer vacation, and next week a visit to the Oklahoma State Conference in company with the Vice President General is on the agenda. Of course to Continental Congress in April when we hope many Kansas Daughters can attend.

Visits were made in company with the State Parliamentarian to the two units of the St. Francis Boys' Home at Ellsworth and Salina.

The Pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission was held in October and although the weather was ideal not many attended. Much discussion was heard about having the Pilgrimage in September on Constitution Day and such discussion resulted in a change being made in the By-Laws.

The four District Meetings were held following the Pilgrimage and members are commended for their efforts in making the programs so entertaining, but not neglecting the business of D.A.R. Projects. The District Directors can be of much help to the State Regent and care should be taken in selecting a Director for qualities of Leadership. This care should be extended to all offices both state and chapter. Much detail work could be lifted from the shoulders of the state regent if Directors would function as it was intended when the state was divided. As the Society grows there is need to lighten the burdens of the state regent else it will become increasingly difficult to find a woman willing to assume the office. Last fall the regents and Directors that planned an itenary for the state regent were especially appreciated and it is hoped all will do so next fall. It might even be expedient to ask for a called meeting for a visit when it would conveniently fit in with a planned trip. It is not likely that the state regent can visit any chapter more than once during the term of service.

No attempt will be made to compare one district with another as being superior. It was found that some were excelling in one branch and another in some other line, but all were trying to promote D.A.R. program as best they could, which is desired.

No new chapters have been added but one chapter that was considering disbanding has been given encouragement and 4 or more new members added. One chapter has fallen below the legal number of members required and unless something is done quickly it will be disbanded, with regret.

Since the Continental Congress the state regent has attended the October and February 1951 board meetings in Washington, D.C. Not many state regents were present at the February meeting but it was an important meeting. Your state regent feels that were it possible for each Daughter to go to these meetings and hear the discussions, pro and con, on the many questions of policy and projects, there would never be a lack of support. All matters are thoroughly investigated and the best solutions adopted. The President General and her officers can be relied upon and are worthy of the support of every loyal Daughter.

The Regent's Bulletin and the Sunflower Special were published in October and December and over 5000 copies distributed. The next issue will be put out in April or May, we trust before Continental Congress. The Bulletin requires much work by both state regent and corresponding secretary and it is also quite an expense to the state, but if it keeps the members informed, promotes the D.A.R. program and takes the place of extra correspondence between the state and chapter officers it is filling its mission and justifying its continuance. It would be wise to keep the Bulletin handy for reference.

Beginning the duties of the office, the latter part of April, many letters were sent requesting lists of chapter chairmen, due April 1st. Some replies came as late as September. Changes in State Officers may account for this delay, for we are one fourth of the way, toward a successful April 1st closing, this year and congratulate the regents upon wonderful cooperation that will make for improved work in the society.

The file of chapter officers and required directories were sent to the Organizing Secretary General, in May and the directories of chapter regents and lists of National and State Officers were sent to the official mailing list, shortly afterward.

Each State Chairman and State officer received her respective lists of chapter representatives, in July.

In October I assisted the state regent, in issuing her bulletin, and typed all 3000 addresses for the December bulletin.

34 year books have been received and acknowledged.

REPORT OF STATE HISTORIAN

As State Historian I submit to the 53rd Annual State Conference the following report:

Forty-two Chapters reported. 11 Historic spots have been marked, 8 restorations.

Esther Lowrey Chapter is having a bronze marker made for an old church building erected in 1872 which was formerly used as the Chapter House but is now used by the Girl Scouts for meetings. The building is preserved as an historic landmark as one of the first church buildings in Independence.

Neodesha Chapter has worked for a memorial for the City Park with the 25 names of boys from the county who lost their lives in World War II. This marker has been placed and is finished.

Newton Chapter is completing on Honor Roll of World War II Veterans also a Memorial Record Book for deceased D.A.R. members.

Kansas had an outstanding report, one chapter presented a program, thirty Minutes of Washington portraying, the music and poetry of the Washington period.

Many of the chapters are singing "The Star Spangled Banner" some report they are learning the first two verses.

Another chapter reports they have one program a year on American Music. The Minisa chapter had a program on Christmas music and its history.

A member of Henry Dustin chapter wrote a poem which was set to "Home on the Range".

Nebraska reports a program on the composer of the National Anthem, Francis Scott Key, also the life and work of Stephen Foster and American Indian Music. They are urged to observe National Music Week in May.

North Dakota says out of the nine chapters, six had music chairman and once they had songs of the Revolutionary period.

Colorado says they are using our American Music by John T. Howard, they think it is the best text book for reference. Mrs. Louther reports she has attended all state board meetings for Colorado.

South Dakota says some chapters have outstanding music records played by composers and some use Christmas carols.

Ten chapters devoted at least one meeting to a music program and two have sponsored radio programs, and eleven chapters open their meetings with "The Star Spangled Banner."

CONSERVATION

Mrs. Roy Valentine Shrewder National Vice Chairman, Conservation

Conservation, we are accustomed to think of in terms of trees and plants, how many we have saved, or planted during the year, or to what extent we may have helped with some civic effort dealing with the matter of human conservation. In the few minutes alloted me you will probably expect to hear a tabulation of just what efforts the states in my district have put forth. I started to make such a tabulation but my thoughts kept reaching out to a wider meaning of our committee work on conservation. CONSERVATION, in a world in which waste on every side has become almost the rule on, every side, do we really dare to think in terms of real conservation? Our natural resources, our humanity has never been so expendable as now, never been so lavishly disseminated with such extravagant disregard for results.

It is important and dangerous that our forests, our minerals, our oil, our food stuffs are being poured out so lavishly, never to be retrieved.

It is even more important and much more dangerous that three wars, within the lives of those of us here, have deprived our Nation of scientists,, doctors, ministers, fathers and sons, and statesmen, so gravely needed to meet the challenge and complexities of this age. The eighteen year olds that lie in Flanders Field, where the poppies grow between the crosses row on row, would today be in their prime. Who knows but there our Washington or our Lincoln may be.

And doubtless the resultant political unrest that comes from such a situation, the frustrations, the discouragements, the apathy, may be behind the conditions which brought forth the rebuke hurled at America and its people a few days ago in a radio broadcast, when one of our well known commentators, Cecil Brown, spoke at some length about the shredding of the moral fiber of the Nation. Has our moral fiber, as a people, become actually weakened? Well, if it has, it is certainly time to take stock and to do something about it; What ever the cause of a lessening of a general attitude toward moral values, we must stop where we are and we must either conserve what we have left and build upon it or we will find ourselves in the unhappy situation of having to crusade. I believe it is more sensible to conserve!

There is a definite and successfully working effort today to supplant our own ideas and ideals of the American Way of Life with foreign ideologies. Shall we continue to stand idly by and permit our youth to be so degenerated, so trained, that here before our very eyes the moral fiber and fabric of our Nation and its people is being changed?

Well, charity begins at home. So let us examine our own homesteads. What about our children, your and my children and grand-children? Do you know what they are being taught or what they are picking up from teachers and companions? What kind of a foundation do we permit them to leave our firesides with? Do they have instilled in their hearts and minds so definitely and deeply that nothing can shake it, a faith in their God; their own Country, the last stronghold of freedom; their homes? Good homes make good communities; good communities make better states and stronger nations; and strong nations, morally strong, ecomomically sound, make a better world or nations. You simply cant work it from the top down!

How can you help in conserving the integrity, the moral fiber, of your Nation? You the Daughters of the American Revolution, whose heritage is one of freedom, freedom dearly purchased and dearly held, whose watchword all of these years has been "Eternal Vigilance, is the price of Liberty?" Oh, have we been caught off guard? And are we willing to put forth the effort now, to hold the line?

Get into politics, not in the sense of party politics, but know candidates, what they stand for, and put the ones that meet your demands in office; YOU CAN, you know!

Get on the School Boards, watch the text books, even if you arent on the school board, watch the teachings in the public schools. Get J.A.C. Clubs into the schools, if you can with the NEA pledged to curb excessive patriotism. Put your patriotism and your knowledge to work! Work with the Scouts, the Camp Fire Girls, in the Sunday School and with your groups everywhere, and do you forget that you have the finest vehicle, right at your hand, for patriotic education and better citizenship, your own C.A.R. which cannot function without D.A.R. leadership? We guard our children's physical health most jealously. What about their mental health?

It has been said that a Nation's greatest single asset is its children; Our children, tomorrow's men and women of this great Nation, upon whom, the security of the Republic depends more acutely than ever before in its history.

Children are greatly in need of patriotic training, and especially at the present time. D.A.R. members, or should be, especially well fitted to organize and give this training, and to instill the ideals of our American Way of Life. We cannot begin to teach loyalty, loyalty that is instinctively a part of every child, at too young an age. In

this day and age when there are so many radical forces in the world, we should teach our children and young people the fundamental principles of democracy, and Loyalty to those principles; in order that they may have a sound background to formulate their ideas and to judge those concepts of communism and other radical forces and influences with which they come in contact. Rest assured that sooner or later in their lives they will come in contact with these influences and the only way we can protest them is to instill our principles of freedom and democracy, as young as possible! The radical groups teach their youth and train them from the age of six and younger. Let us not leave the work of training our children in the fundamentals of good citizenship entirely to the schools! Le us, as members of the great patriotic society, "Daughters of the American Revolution," make it our individual responsibility to see that the youth of this Nation is trained in citizenship from the cradle. Let us help the schools and the teachers, by laying a foundation so firm in the faith of our fathers. so sure in the trust in God, so staunch in the belief in the principles of the United States of America that no earthquake of communism can shake that foundation! We are not building for the present but for the future when we conserve the moral fiber of the Nation.

CORRECT USE OR THE FLAG

(Mrs. Wm. L.) Mary Ainsworth National Vice Chairman

In August, 1950, letters with enclosures of Flag Codes and other leaflets were sent to each of the five State Chairmen, Correct Use of the Flag, in the Western Division. This letter requested a report to me for this committee, not later than March 1, 1951.

Upon receipt of a letter from the National Chairman, early in October, concerning the movement to fly the United Nations Flag from every public building and school, letters relaying that information were sent to each State Chairman, urging her to become acquainted with this UnAmerican effort and alert her Chapters to guard against such a movement.

The National Vice Chairman attended the Kansas State Board of Management and each of the four District Meetings, speaking on the Flag at each meeting. She read the President General's Press Release in regard to the United Nations Flag, in each meeting. Copies of this Press Release with a report on the Flag from one of our Kansas District Meetings were sent to each of the five State Chairman, Copies of all reports were sent to the Kansas State Chairman and the State Regent.

A New Years Flag Letter was sent to each of the five State Chairmen and to each of our Kansas Chapter Chairmen.

March 6, only three State Chairmen had reported to me and you may be interested to know that of the 35 Chapters in Colorado, reports came from 31. Only 37 Kansas Chapter Chairmen reported to our State Chairman. Twenty-one out of 44 Nebraska Chapters reported. Because I drove to the home of our State Regent to study the reports of the Chapter Regents, I know that 53 Kansas Chapters, whose reports were then in her possession, observed Correct Use of the Flag in some manner, all giving the Pledge of Allegiance at each Chapter meeting. Duplicate reports went to the National Chairmen and to the National Vice Chairman, so because almost half of our Chapter Chairmen failed to make a report to the State Chairmen, we do not get the credit we rate. Le me urge you to begin now to prepare for a better record next year. Keep track of all efforts to secure MORE GLORY FOR OLD GLORY and please report in detail to your State Chairman, next year.

Colorado is having a Flag Luncheon at their State Conference. They will adopt a Flag Resolution at their Conference. You (will hear) from our Kansas State Chairman. No details came to me of special Flag projects in Nebraska.

As you know, the slogan of this committee is MORE GLORY FOR OLD GLORY. Our State Chairman urged every Daughter to own a Flag. I want to urge every Daughter to follow the Flag Code. One of the projects of the D.A.R. through this committee is the distribution of Flag Codes. Then surely, if we distribute them to those who are not members of our Society, we should be expected to follow the rules and regulations set down in that Code. How long since you studied the Flag Code? Do you always take the time to display your Flag or see that someone else in your household displays OLD GLORY on every National holiday? I was amazed at the very few Flags displayed on George Washington's Birthday in Wichita, Bring OLD GLORY to the fore.

I was pleased to read in an Alabama paper, a short time ago, an article copied from Springfield, Illinois in which Governor Stevenson urged persons to discard the idea that the flag is something to be flown only on Flag Day or on the Fourth of July, He said, "It should be displayed every day on private as well as public buildings as a constant reminder of the loyalties we all owe to our country and the obligations that rest upon every American, especially during this period of national emergency."

Of course, you know that the Daughters of the American Revolution salute with the ungloved right hand. But do you know, that the Flag Code says, "When the National Anthem is played and the flag is not displayed, all present should face the music and stand at attention; and when the National Anthem is played and the flag is displayed, all present should face the flag and salute? There is no question about this in the Flag Code, yet, I have noticed lack of uniformity in this, at State Conference and even at our Continental Congress.

I want to pass on to you, a remark made by Mrs. Alonzo Newton Benn, a former National Chairman of this committee. She said, "When you pledge Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, place your purse and your packages in a chair and trust the Lord to look after them, while you pledge your Allegiance."

Then for the Chapter Chairmen of this committee, I wish to tell this story:

Dr. William H. Burton of Harvard's Graduate School of Education, made a study of what school children think they are saying when they salute the Flag. One boy, who clicked his heels, stiffened his spine, put his hand on his heart and got that starry-eyed look, usually associated with emotional reactions, was asked to write out what he had just said in saluting the flag. The boy wrote, "I perjur legens to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republicans for which it stands, one nation invisible with liberty and jesters for all." Instead of emphasing the ritual, how much better if someone sat down with that boy for 15 minutes and talked about what the Pledge of Allegiance really means.

Unless children see the sparkle, the real sublimity of the oath they are taking, there is little point in speaking the words.

Next June 14 is the 174th birthday of Old Glory. Let's colobrate that birthday in each Chapter and don't fail to report to your State Chairman.

STATE CHAIRMEN REPORTS AMERICAN INDIANS COMMITTEE

Mrs. Glenn Rhea

The annual letters were sent, to the chapters in October. The need for dressings, for St. Mary's school for Indian girls, at Spring field, South Dakota, and for clothing for the Navajos was stressed.

In November cards were sent, asking for a special thank offering at the November meeting of the chapters for the dresses fund.

In December a mimeographed letter from a teacher of the Navajos at Crownpoint, N. M., was mailed to the chapters with a request for their Christmas card pictures, quilt scraps, beads, etc.

In Jauary report reminder cards were mailed.

In compliance with these \$285.85 was given for Indian work. \$59.00 for Bacone.

There were 291 pounds of clothing sent—20 going to St. Mary's, 37 to Thrift Shop at Bacone, the rest to the Navajos.

59 pounds of picture books, cards, beads, and scraps were sent.

15 programs were held, and 11 requests for material.

16 requests for visits to chapters for a talk were received and 14 accepted.

The list of chapters who made outstanding contributions, both cash and otherwise. is too long to mention by name in this report, but my deepest gratitude to you all for your fine response, your steadily increasing interest, in this work, and your patience with my various requests.

AMERICANISM AND D.A.R. MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. H. A. Mitchell

It has been my experience that the work of these two committees is so closely allied in both Chapter and State that I shall follow that pattern in making my report.

In cities where naturalization courts and classes function it has been the privilege of some D.A.R. Chapters to be invited in many ways to aid in such procedure.

Presenting the Citizenship Manuals to new citizens and to those preparing for that happy occasion, seems to the court officials to be very important. A large number of new citizens have been aided

by the use of these manuals. On occasion some 15 foreign brides of our American soldiers have received the D.A.R. citizenship manuals.

Other uses for manuals are as follows:

Libraries in Junior and Senior High School Libraries where civics and allied subjects are taught Libraries in Catholic High Schools Public Libraries Boy and Girl Scout groups.

In many cases the books are studied and passed on to others.

Most judges require that an applicant for citizenship must read and understand English, also speak English. We have few requests for manuals in other languages for that reason. Some courts request copies of all the languages so that they might better help an applicant for citizenship by coaching them in their own language. Some chapters make a special effort to keep in touch with applicants that they might be ready with such help as they are privileged to give.

In some instances High School choruses furnish music at the ceremony when the new citizens are honored. Welcome cards are given and any other material from defense and other committees that make for a real welcome into our country. In come instances a guest speaker is provided. Boy Scouts present and retire the flag. Invocations are said by Catholic Priests, Rabbis, Protestant Ministers. All this is usually planned by a D.A.R. Chapter.

Publicity in newspapers seems to be limited, at least according to the reports I have received.

Americanism, being a way of life, is had to set down in figures, but the results of the work done by such committees is very gratifying. Well informed speakers are asked to speak to chapters on such subjects and timely articles as read and discussed in chapter meetings.

Communism is not tolerated in this area.

The chapters in Kansas making the greatest requests for the D.A.R. Manuals are: Junction City, Emporia, Topeka, Leavenworth. Smaller cities have less demand but are none the less vigilant.

Through the channel of the state chairman, 371 manuals in English and 2 in German have been requested. All chapters but 12 out of 62 have chairmen of Americanism and D.A.R. Manual for Citizenship committees.

APPROVED SCHOOLS COMMITTEE Chairman, Mrs. Harry A. Richeson

The report of the Kansas Approved Schools is very good. It is hoped in the coming year the Chapters will be able to concentrate greater efforts in our schools, since the National Building Fund is so nearly completed and they will have recovered from that project.

The majority of Kansas Chapters include Approved Schools in their budgets. One meeting a year was given to an Approved Schools Program by most Chapters.

My first letter sent to the Chapter Chairmen in September included the highlights of the National Chairman's letter and the two Resolutions adopted by the National Board relative to giving our first consideration of gifts and funds to our two D.A.R. owned schools, Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith and the diverting of Student Loan Funds not being used, to these two schools.

The 1950 Conference voted to divert \$500.00 from the Kansas Student Loan Fund to buy one-half the right wing bleacher in the Talmadge Auditorium Gymnasium at Tamassee. It is recommended that Kansas again divert \$500.00 this year from the Student Loan Fund for a second half of the right wing bleacher. Kansas Daughters will be very proud of this completed project.

There are many children on the waiting list at our D.A.R. schools and every donation, be it ever so small, added together makes it possible to enroll more of these children who otherwise would be denied the privilege of an education.

From Kansas, Tamassee received \$1280.00 in Scholarships. Cash donations to all schools amounted to \$2416.10. Clothing to all schools consisted of 80 boxes of 2720 pounds or an equivalent of \$2720.00. Total cash and clothing donations to all schools \$5136.00.

Two chapters report the sale of handcrafts and display of exhibits from several schools.

General Edward Hand reported they are working on a scholarship fund by giving "Coffees" in members homes and expect to soon reach their goal.

Molly Foster Berry Chapter of Ft. Scott is considering a Scholarship for Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith.

Several chapters were unable to make donations at this time and some have plans they hope to accomplish in the Spring.

Wichita Chapter reported the purchase of a Memorial Acre at Tamassee. Topeka reported they are buying one also, as a Memorial to their deceased members in lieu of flowers for funerals.

Several Chapters sent boxes of Christmas cards and gifts to the schools.

One of the highlights this year was a table setting contest and Silver Exhibit sponsored by the Topeka Chapter for Approved Schools benefit. Invitations were sent to many Kansas Chapters, their local High Schools and the public in general Your Chairman of Approved Schools was privileged to attend and it was a very delightful affair. Schools were generously remembered by this Chapter.

The first of December a Questionnaire was sent to all Chapter Chairman, also a Pamphlet from Tamassee telling of their great need for windows in the Auditorium-Gymnasium Building so that it could be used in cold stormy weather.

All Chapters but one report a Chapter Chairman of Approved Schools.

Several Chapters wrote for literature for Programs and all available matter on hand at that time was mailed immediately.

Four Chapters failed to send reports although post-card reminders were mailed early in February and second reminders were mailed later. Please try to send your reports by the first of February so that my full report may reach the State and National Chairman by March first.

Let us continue to send our good used clothing to our Schools, let us work a little harder, be a little more generous in the future toward the less fortunate whom we have pledged to aid, the little children who are the hope of the Nation, our beloved America. It has been said "The world moves forward on the feet of little children."

The following were appointed members of the Kansas State By-Laws Committee for 1950-53: Mrs. Harry Ashlock, James Ross Chapter, Kansas City; Mrs. F. H. Freeto, Oceanus Hopkins Chapter, Pittsburg; and Stella B. Haines, Isabella Weldin Chapter, Augusta.

At the Fall meetings of the four Districts and of the State Board of Management, recommendations were made for changes in the State By-Laws; notice of the same was printed in the Regent's Bulletin in December. All the Chapters were notified by the Committee, that action would be taken at the State Conference in March 1951 on the following Amendments:

- That Article VI, Section 3, be amended to read: At each District Meeting, the State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board Meeting.
- That Article VI be amended to read: Section 9, The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Picnic shall be held on Constitution Day, September 17, with the Northeast District as hostess.
- 3. That Article VII, Section 2 be amended by striking out the second paragraph reading: A Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held in October, following the National Board of Management meeting; the Northeast District shall act as Hostess annually at Shawnee Mission. Meetings of the Southeast and Northwest Districts shall be held immediately following in convenient order and a report of the National Board meeting to be given by the State Regent and Chapter plans be heard at all meetings.

In compliance with the request of our National chairman to help "Keep America Green", 37 of the 42 chapters reporting have planted trees, shrubs, and bulbs, either as home planting or as a public project.

Among the special projects have been the building of dams and ponds, establishing a bird sanctuary, the seeding of 60 acres of badly eroded land to mixed grass, raising money for tree surgery for the famous Council Oak, 15,000 feet of terracing, care of the Madonna of the Trail monument, and cooperating with a city manager in a city wide tree planting and replacement program.

Esther Lowrey chapter, General Edward Hand, Council Oak, Neodesha, Wellington, Molly Foster Berry, Oceanus Hopkins, Smoky Hill, Randolph Loving, Eunice Sterling, and Lucretia Griswold Latimer.

Seven chapters reported food canned or stored in lockers.

At the conclusion of the sixteenth annual Good Citizenship Pilgrimage contest, conducted by the Danghters of the American Revolution for senior girls in accredited public high schools, the state judges declared Miss Marilyn Kazmierski to be the Kansas State Good Citizen, Miss Kazmierski, who was sponsored by Oceanus Hopkins Chapter of D.A.R. of Pittsburg is 18 years of age. She was born in



Pittsburg where she has been an outstanding student during her high school years. Outside interests included Girl Scout work and her Church, St. Mary's Catholic Church.

During her high school course Marilyn was an A student, yet found time to be a leader in all school activities—which included orchestra, a year as president of Y-Teens, member of Student Council, Junior Academy of Science, secretary of senior class, editor of the school paper, "The Booster" and athletics.

She plans to attend Kansas State Teachers College at Pittsburg, majoring in Language and Literature, preparing herself for teaching or enter the journalistic field.

As State Chairman of Good Citizenship Pilgrimage Committee, we are pleased to submit the following report.

The sixteenth annual contest opened October 15 and closed December 15.

In August a letter was sent to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction informing him of the contest, notice of which he included in his first bulletin to high school principals.

Your state chairman was ably assisted by four district chairmen. They are:

Northwest District—Mrs. George Kreeck, Clay Center Northeast District—Mrs. R. W. Pearson, Kansas City Southwest District—Mrs. E. J. Taggart, Wellington Southeast District—Mrs. Ralph Young, Neodesha

There are 62 chapters in the State, 54 of which had chairmen of Good Citizenship Pilgrimage. In September letters of information and rules for the contest were mailed to each chapter chairman who contacted her local high school principal.

Letters announcing the contest and giving rules and information were also mailed to the principals of the 623 qualified high schools by the district chairmen. Of this number 106 senior girls submitted questionnaires.

Each of these girls received a D.A.R. certificate of award and 45 Good Citizenship pins were presented by chapters to contestants from their local schools. Also a number of chapters gave cash awards.

The Certificate of award, pins, and cash prizes were presented by Chapter chairmen of Good Citizenship Pilgrimage in chapter meetings honoring the contestant or at Senior Chapel in May.

Entrants in the contest were senior girls in accredited public high schools. Three were chosen by classmates as best exemplifying the qualities of a good citizen, which are dependability, service, leadership, and patriotism. From these three the school faculty chose the one to represent her school.

A questionnaire was sent by the District Chairman to each contestant.

The three best questionnaires from each district were submitted to three state judges who selected the State Good Citizen from these questionnaires.

Miss Marilyn Kazmierski of Pittsburg High School and sponsored by Oceanus Hopkins chapter N.S.D.A.R. was the winner of the contest.

She is from the Southeast district of which Mrs. Ralph Young is chairman. She was present at Kansas State Conference at Pittsburg where she received her awards.

It has been a privilege to serve as your chairman of Good Citizenship Pilgrimage under the fine leadership of Mrs. von der Heiden. Her officers also have cooperated with this department in every way.

The four District Chairman have given me invaluable assistance. For all of which, in addition to the help and loyal cooperation of chapter regents, and chairmen, we are deeply grateful.

The objective of this department is always to foster the ideals of good citizenship. The year's work is completed when the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage contest is closed and the State Good Citizen for the year is announced.

The real work begins in August when your chairman sends to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction a notice of the contest which he includes in his first bulletin to High School Principals.

Your state chairman is assisted by four efficient district chairmen, They are: Northwest District, Mrs. George Kreeck of Clay Center; Northeast District, Mrs. R. W. Pearson of Kansas City; Southwest District, Mrs. E. J. Taggart of Wellington; and Southeast District, Mrs. Ralph Young of Neodesha.

It was from Mrs. Young's district that the State Good Citizen was selected. She is Miss Marilyn Kazmierski, a senior in the Pittsburg High School. She will receive her award at this State Conference. Mrs. Frank Freeto of Pittsburg, National Vice-Chairman of Good Citizenship Pilgrimage, will make the presentation. The National

award is a one hundred dollar series "G" Bond. She will also receive a Good Citizen pin and a certificate from Oceanus Hopkins Chapter.

Miss Connie Gangwer of Coffeyville and Miss Sylvia Stutes of Pleasanton were the other two high girls in the S. E. District. The three high from the Southwest District were: 1st, Miss Ann Arden Garnen of St. John; 2nd, Miss Joan Haun of Larned; 3rd, George Ann Harney of Hutchinson. In the Northeast District: 1st, Miss Marva Baxter of Topeka; 2nd, Miss Margaret Edith Logan of Maple Hill: 3rd, Miss Avalon York of Spring Hill. . CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG COMMITTEE

Thirty seven Chapters sent a report to me this year. Last year twenty-five reported their work, so we have a gain there. From these reports I find we in Kansas have been more Flag conscious this year. 'I feel that we all need more study and more publicity in these trying times our Nation is going through. Thirty-seven Chapters report that they use the correct Flag Salute, twenty-nine sing the National Anthem at their meetings. Eight corrections were made where the Flag was incorrectly displayed. This the duty of each Daughter and every Citizen of our Country.

Each Chapter celebrates Flag Day in some manner, the family picnic with a short program, seems to be the favorite. Seven Chapters have given Flags to Schools, Scout Troups, and to mark a grave, (20 large and 64 small Flags). One Chapter gave a small Flag to each new citizen at the Naturalization service. We have distributed nearly 2500 copies of the Flag code. Eunice Sterling Chapter leads the list by giving each member a Code, and to the schools too. Other Chapters have given Codes to their schools, Libraries, and Boy and Girl Scout Troups. Five Chapters have written the U. S. Congressmen asking for protective Flag laws. Eunice Sterling Chapter sponsored an essay contest in their schools.

Some of the special activities were working with the community in a pageant, having a float in a parade, attending Naturalization ceremonies, sponsoring two boys for the Boys State, sending a boy Scout to Valley Forge, showing a movie of the Flag's history in four grade schools and the Junior High. Four members from McPherson gave a patriotic program for another club. At Great Bend the children gave a Flag program in costume, entitled "World Friendship."

I thank all of you who have helped with this program this year. I hope that next year we will be able to make a much better report.

For your state chairman this year of 1951 is starting out to be a very informative year.

Our State Regent, Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden has been very helpful in solving the problems that have come to your recently appointed chairman.

With a total of 62 chapters, all too few chairmen have sent in reports. In part this was due to the change of state chairman about the close of 1950.

Since my appointment as chairman of genealogical records, I have contacted every chapter chairman by letter or postal card.

A few chapter chairmen have shown much interest in compiling

these records. Other chapter chairmen are working on projects that will not be completed for this year's report.

Reports Annual Meetings 1869-1931. Rhoads Chart, compiled by Charles W. Roop, 3560 E. Douglas, Wichita, was filed with Mrs. O. J. Woods' papers. National D.A.R. No. 397421. A complete chart.

Emporia Chapter. 536 pages of genealogical records. Vo. 9 tombstones inscriptions, Lyon county cemeteries. 134 pages in volumes made and bound. The work of the Girl Home Makers Committee has been a continuation of the work started last year and has had three main objectives:

- 1. Girl Home Maker State Scholorship.
- 2. Local recognition of girls doing outstanding work in Home Economics or Home Living Classes.
- 3. Working with girls individually or through other organizations that emphasize better home-making activities.

The state chairman made three contacts with each chapter and sent a Hand-book to each local chairman. Thirty nine chapters

returned their report blanks with twenty-six chapters taking part in the committee activities.

Twelve chapters reported a total of 2,125 hours given by chapter members to further home making activities through other organizations such as F. H. A., 4-H Clubs, Girl Scouts and others. These chapters are: Atchison, Emporia, Hannah Jameson, Jeremiah Howard, Mary Wade Strothers, Minisa, Molly Foster Berry, Nathan Edson, Oceanus Hopkins, Randolph Loving, Shawnee, William Wilson.

Honorable mention is given to Concordia, Polly Ogden, Oceanus Hopkins, for the largest contribution to the scholarship fund; to Nathan Edson with 800 hours; William Wilson with 400 hours; and Martha Vail with 215 hours work on home making activities with girls in various activities; to Molly Foster Berry for the most Girl Home Maker pins Awarded.

State scholarships were awarded to Diane Mueller of Emporia and Phyllis Lawson of Oceanus Hopkins. Both girls are high school seniors and are honor students. They have participated in high school and community activities and have received honors in home economics.

A check for the amount of the scholarship will be sent to the head of the Home Economics Department of the school in which the girl enrolls next fall and will be given to her when she has completed her enrollment as a Home Economic Major.

The chairman wishes to thank all chapter chairman, the State Regent, Mrs. von der Heiden and all individuals who have helped with the work of this committee.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS COMMITTEE

In September of 1950 sent letters to Regents of eighteen chapters who did not have chairmen of $J.A.C_2$ requesting them to appoint same.

Same date, sent 44 letters to chapter chairmen, and packages to each including one Study Guide, one Hand-book and one President's pin. Requested each to report number of clubs and members, so necessary material could be forwarded.

Five regents reported no chairman. Nine chairmen requested material be sent them, but no further report.

Number of clubs reported as follows: Abilene, 22 clubs with 560 members.

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Smoky Hill, Ellsworth, one club with 140 members. 4 to 12 years of age meeting three times each week for 10 weeks.

Martha Vail, Anthony, 57 clubs with 1036 members. These included all grades and Junior High in Barber County.

Jeremiah Howard, Great Bend, 65 clubs in Barton County Rural Schools with 887 members; 8 clubs St. Rose Porochial School with 265 members; 10 clubs Washington School, Great Bend 390 members; 10 clubs Riley School, Great Bend, 346 members. Total 1888 members.

Total number of clubs, 173. Total membership 3624.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

It is a pleasure to be able to report an increase in the number of Junior members admitted to the Society this year. John Haupt Chapter of Topeka admitted the most. However, Fort Supply Trail has the largest working Junior committee reported at this time.

Many Junior members are taking an active part in the work and projects of the D.A.R. In the Southwest District three are serving as regents of their chapters. Others are serving as District Directors, State chairmen, National chairman, C.A.R. officials and chairmen, and chapter chairmen. Junior members have done their share over in contributing to the building fund.

Thirty chapters over the state have contributed to the Helen Pouch Scholarship Fund through the sales of stationery effered by your Junior Committee. Byrd Prewitt contributed the greatest amount this year, with Kanza chapter a close second.

KANSAS ROOM, N. S. D. A. R.

The Kansas Room is a very delightful room located on the top floor of the Administration Building at the far end of the corridor. The west wall is solid, the south and the north walls each have two windows and the east wall has two doors. One door connects the Georgia Room and the other door leads into the corridor. The wail is tinted a very pale green. I judge the room to be approximately 18 ft. by 24 ft.

At first it was understood that our room would serve the best purpose of all of the Daughters as a conference room and estimates were obtained from dealers in the District of Columbia for furnishing the room in the style of a Bank Director's conference room. The estimates ran considerably higher than anticipated. For example, good substantial mahogany chairs, similar to the ones used in the Pan American Union across the street from our building, were quoted at \$150.00 each instead of the anticipated \$50.00 each. After obtainthe estimates the management of the building informed us that it may be necessary for the Kansas Room to be used for office space in a very few years. Your Chairman was fortunate to have the advice of our State Regent, Mrs. von der Heiden, who was in Washington in October. It was deemed advisable to delay furnishing the room until such time as a definite decision is made by the management of the building as to the use that will be made of the Kansas Room.

Temporily the Kansas Room is being used by the Chaplain General as a Worship Room. She feels the location of the room is secluded and quiet for worship. She has a desk on the west wall fixed as an altar with a big D.A.R. Bible and other items. There are no chairs in the room but there is a grandfather clock on the north wall between the windows.

MEMBERSHIP

A general letter of instruction, including a list of prizes offered, was sent to each Chapter Chairman of Membership, in August 1950. In those chapters without a Membership Chairman, the letters were sent to Chapter Registrars. In this letter, a request for a report to me, not later than February 15, 1951, was made. Copies of this letter were sent to all Chapter Regents.

Following each National Board Meeting, as soon as notified by the State Regent, of new members accepted, a card of congratulation was sent to each Chapter, with a reminder that the data necessary for the State Files be sent to the State Registrar and to the State Regent. A note of regret was sent to each Chapter, not accepting new members, including a wish that the next National Board would find application papers for approval for that Chapter.

As soon as data for new members and reinstated members and transfers from out-of-State is received, cards are placed in the State Membership File. As soon as notified of transfers within the State, deaths, resignations, marriages, and other changes, corrections are made in the File.

A close cooperation with the State Consulting Genealogist has been maintained, resulting in an increase of membership. Constant communication with the State Registrar has been necessary to check on membership changes.

The planned Membership Panel to be given at State Conference is scheduled to simplify membership reports and to serve as an inspiration for securing additional new members.

Your State Chairman regrets that she has been unable to organize any new Chapters this past year and she solicits your cooperation in the organization of new Chapters wherever there is a desire among eligible persons, who are interested.

MOTION PITCURE COMMITTEE

Sixty-two questionnaires were sent out to the chapters with the following results: (refer to questionnaire)

To question number 9 the majority reported that western pictures were the most popular, comedies, and musical films ranked second, and family and historical next.

Two chapters have shown the film "America the Beautiful" one each of "The Power Behind the Nation", "Make Mine Freedom", "Familiar Patriotic Songs", "Declaration of Independence", "Stephen Foster Songs", "The Howards of Virginia", The film "Ellis Island" has been shown in several chapters. Also those of our sponsored schools.

It is surprising how much closer we feel to our projects after having seen films concerning them.

We hope that this coming year will find each motion picture chairman collaborating more closely with the theater manager in bringing better pictures to our children. We oldsters are too far gone!

NATIONAL DEFENSE COMMITTEE

Miss Maude B. Skinner

61 Chapters have a Chairman of National Defense-98% representation.

Reports have been received from 30 Chapters—48% of Chapters in the State. This representative cross-section shows the following activities:

- 1. Number of Programs Presented:—Socialism, 3; World Government, 15; Communism, 13; The Constitution, 9; Federal Aid to Education, 2; United Nations, 8; Immigration, 7; Socialized Medicine 6; The Flag, 6; American Indians 1; Declaration of Independence, 1; Atomic Energy, 1.
- 2. Number of Times Holidays Were Observed:—Washington's Birthday, 13; Flag Day, 12; Constitution Day, 6; Lincoln's Birthday 3; Christmas, 3; Memorial Day, 2; Thanksgiving, 2; Kansas Day, 1; Columbus Day, 1; Armistice Day, 1.
- 3. Literature Distributed:—Literature on National Defense, naturalization booklets, and Correct Use of the Flag phamplets were distributed to Chapter members, to public Libraries, and to High Schools by a number of Chapters.
- 4. Cooperation With Schools:—26 Chapters showed cooperation in the following: Sponsoring Junior American Citizens Clubs, 2;

Good Citizenship Medals presented, 16; Manuals for Citizenship, 4; World Government, 1; United Nations,1; inquiry into use of subversive text-books, especially MaGruder's American Government text, 2.

- 5. Community Cooperation:—Number of Chapters cooperating with following groups: Patriotic, 8; Civic, 6; Study, 2; Forums, 2; Youth, 11; Church, 5; Red Cross, 1; Cancer Control, 1; State Meeting of Library Association, 1; individual cooperation of members with all groups, 2.
- 6. Legislative:—National Defense Chairman personally read and explained the Resolutions of the 1950 N.S.D.A.R. Congress in 12 Chapters.

Members of 4 Chapters contacted State Legislators. Subject: School Legislation.

Members of 10 Chapters contacted National Legislators concerning bills covered by our National Resolutions. Subjects included: World Government, Genocide Treaty, Immigration Bill, School Legislation, Communism, Socialism, Socialized Medicine.

Five members of Hannah Jameson Chapter, Parsons, wrote letters protesting placing the United States Flag about the Stars and Stripes.

- 7. Elections:—19 Chapters indicated their members were registered to vote. Members voting in 1950 general election—100%, 12 Chapters; a majority to 95%, 5 chapters.
- 8. Chapter Reports:—14 Chapters indicated they have one Defense meeting each year. A National Defense report is made at each meeting in 11 Chapters. 3 Chapters said "generally", and 1 Chapter said "parts of several meetings." Defense News from D.A.R. Magazine and Press Digest given.
- 9. Special Activities:—Sound "movies" "The Signing of the Declaration of Independence," and "America the Beautiful" were shown at the Washington Birthday meeting of Dana Chapter, Columbus, by one of the Chapter members.

Wichita Chapter, Wichita, had an "open" meeting on National Defense with two qualified speakers.

Eunice Sterling Chapter, Wichita, gave considerable amounts of National Defense literature to Schools and Boy Scouts.

Five Wichita Chapters: Eunice Sterling, Martha Loving Ferrell, Minisa, Randolph Loving, Wichita, sponsored a National Defense Tea, November 10, 1950. Mrs. William Louis Ainsworth was General Chairman. Mrs. Charles L. Robinson, Rapid City, South Dakota, Vice Chairman of the National Defense Committee, was the guest speaker. This Tea was also attended by the Kansas State Regent, Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden, a number of out-of-state Regents, and members from various D.A.R. Chapters outside of Wichita. A special feature of the Tea was a National Defense Poster display showing the prize winners of the contest which was open to 7th grade pupils in the Wichita Schools. This program is recommended to other Chapters.

Arthur Barrett Chapter, Marysville, adopted a Resolution opposing World Government and sent copies to their representatives and senators, both National and State. This action is recommended to all D.A.R. Chapters in Kansas. (A copy of this Resolution is attached to this report.)

William Creekmore Chapter, Pleasanton, has made a Special study regarding the use of sub-versive text-books and checked the schools of Linn County through the County Superintendent and school officials. This Chapter has also given special study to the Genocide Convention.

Jane Dean Coffey Chapter, Coffeyville, has had a special Reading and Study program on National Defense during the year. Ten books have been reviewed and reports from the National Defense articles in our D.A.R. Magazine and Press Digest have been "faithfully reported" at each meeting.

Oceanus Hopkins Chapter, Pittsburg, sponsors a National Defense Bulletin Board in the Pittsburg Public Library on which National Defense bulletins from the National Office are displayed. Much interest in this has been shown by the public.

ACTIVITIES OF STATE CHAIRMAN

1. Correspondence.

Correspondence has been maintained with the National Defense Office, N.S.D.A.R.; with State Regent; and with the Regents and National Defense Chairmen of all Kansas Chapters. Numerous requests for information and material have been answered. At request of the National Defense Office, D.A.R., a list of all members of the State Legislature was obtained and reported to the National Office. A questionnaire was prepared and sent to all candidates for Congress in Kansas to ascertain their viewpoints on subjects relating to National Defense. At the suggestion of the National Defense Office, letters have been written in line with Resolutions passed by the N.S.D.A.R. to various Congressmen and officials of Government. Copies of these letters have been filed from time to time with our State Regent and the Executive Secretary of the National Defense Committee, D.A.R.

Total correspondence: 88 letters, 145 postals, and several packages of material mailed.

2. National Defense Bulletin Board.

In line with our emphasis on publicity of National Defense, a Bulletin Board has been mantained in the Pittsburg Public Library and is co-sponsored by the Oceanus Hopkins Chapter, Pittsburg. During the past year, your State Chairman has placed approximately 75 phamplets, which have been received from our National Defence Office, on this Board. This Bulletin Board was displayed at the State Conference in Pittsburg, and the project is recommended to other Chapters in the State.

3. Radio Programs.

On the National Defense Radio Program, Station KOAM, Pittsburg, February 22, 1951, your State Chairman spoke on the subject: "Americans on Guard." Copies of this speech were mimeographed through the courtesy of the Pittsburg Senior High School and made available to the delegates attending the State Conference. Oceanus Hopkins Chapter co-sponsored this program.

During the State Conference, your State Chairman had the honor of presenting our State Regent, Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden, Mrs. Loren E. Rex, first Vice President General, N.S.D.A.R., and Mrs. Donald Bennett Adams, National President, C.A.R., who spoke over station KSEK, Pittsburg, March 10, 1951.

4. Special Meetings Attended.

Oceanus Hopkins Chapter, National Defense speaker, subject: "Breaches in National Defense." Wichita Chapters, National Defense Tea. Kansas State Conference, Pittsburg, March 8-9-10.

During the State Board of Management Meeting at the State Conference, your State Chairman was happily surprised to learn that the Wichita Chapters sponsoring the National Defense Tea have made contributions to a fund for use of the State National Defense Committee. The graciousness of these Chapters is gratefully acknowledged. It is hoped that other Chapters will follow the lead of the Wichita Chapters and help create a fund to advance the work of the National Defense Committee in the State.

Special thanks are expressed to Mr. Earl K. Grotheer, County Attorney of Crawford County, for his fine address, "Let Us Build, Not Destroy," at the State Conference, National Defense Dinner Program.

Appreciation to all those who have assisted in the work.

A guest Day in February, a program consisting of American music was presented by the Hays college faculty, was an outstanding program scheduled by the Courtney-Spalding chapter.

Some very interesting programs have been given and some still to be presented by the Dana chapter. A sound film of 'Patriotic American Songs' was their January meeting. February 22nd, their guest day, a sound film of Steven Foster songs will be presented. Mrs. Glad Robinson Youse of Baxter Springs, will give a program of her own compositions at the meeting in April.

Phebe Dustin chapter reports a program on Indian Music and special musical numbers.

The music chairman of Esther Lowrey has programs of instrumental and vocal music featuring American composers planned for some of their meetings. Some interesting programs at Fort Larned chapter wer reported. They had home town artists as guests soloists for a Flag Day luncheon, the entire program was of American Music. Thanksgiving hymns were sung by the group at the November meeting. Minuets and early dances will be featured at their Washington tea, and a paper on American Music will be given in the spring.

In November two examples of early American music was presented to Kanza chapter by their newly organized C.A.R. Another program on early American music will be given in February, and in May Mrs. Kilbourn of Sterling will present "Thirty Minutes of Washington", portraying the music and poetry of the Washington period, when the chapter will be hostess to Fort Larned, Ninnescah, and Jeremiah Howard chapters.

The Neodesha chapter had a special meeting with vocalists who sang typical southern and mountain music of America. At their Christmas meeting a group of music club members sang special Christmas numbers.

Having heard a lovely program given by some of the Indian boys and girls from Haskell Institute, I know that James Ross had a treat in store for them when in September they observed an American Indian Day. Two students for the Institute dressed in native costume presented quaint songs and dances. "Symphony of the Seasons", a film in technicolor was shown in October, music by the "Old Masters" accompanied it. In December the chapter sang Christmas carols and Kansas Day was observed by having Mrs. Dora Claflin give some Kansas poems.

The Martha Loving Ferrell chapter reports that they have one full program given on American Music each year. This year the music department of the Wichita University will present an American Opera program, for the chapter.

The music chairman of the Eunice Sterling chapter reports that American Music is featured to a greater extent than foreign. At a program on conservation "America the Beautiful" was sung. Their last guest day was a program some of which was American, was given by a harpist. The Washington birthday and Mothers Day programs will feature American Music.

Reporting for the Olathe chapter their music chairman says that appropriate carols were sung for the observance of Christmas, and as all other chapters, they use "The Star Spangled Banner" whenever possible.

A program on American Music "Tracing American Music Through the Wars" illustrated with records, was given by the Wichita

thapter. A finnish girl in native costume presenting Finnish music was given. Other programs featuring the harp, a quartette and other instruments presenting American Music and patriotic music appeared on their programs.

Lois Warner chapter had appropriate music on guest days, and they try to follow ideas suggested by the state music department.

A Washington tea is planned for the month of February by the Ninnescah chapter. I like to have responses from the chapters even though they may be short.

The music chairman of the Arthur Barrett chapter reports the singing of Christmas carols to observe the Christmas season, and a program on American Music, and one on Music in George Washington's time.

The Samuel Linscott chapter had a program devoted to Christmas music, having a guest pianist, they also sang Christmas carols, and sing "America" at their meetings.

From Desire Toby Sears chapter is the following report in part: There has been special music, vocal and instrumental by American composers at each meeting. Using a lower key has made the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" more pleasant for the average member. As a special feature we have given a few interesting facts in the life of Kansas composers, and used some of their beautiful compositions. In October, songs of Bernice-White Scott were sung by our member Mrs. Winifred Noller-Kuiken. Teresa Waugh, a talented high school girl, played compositions of Mr. Bohning her teacher. In April when our Girl Home Makers and Good Citizenship Pilgrimage girls are guests, we shall have music composed by Rebecca Welty-Dunn and a talk by Mrs. Claire Youse. Kansas folk have done well and we should praise our own talent.

The Nathan Edson chapter sometimes use a record of the National Anthem. They often have music by the high school students. They had a program of Christmas music and their guest day features special music. In February they will have a "Parade of Shawls", divided into historical periods and with appropriate music for each period. Interesting?

Molly Foster Berry's chairman of music reports that each year they have a program on "American Music" featuring American composers. They have group singing at each meeting such as carols at Christmas time, patriotic songs, etc.

The Oceanus Hopkins Chapter had a program of American music directed by their music chairman. Their chapter music committee

was responsible for all of the beautiful music furnished for our state conference in Pittsburg.

A program on "Early American Music" was one of the outstanding programs of the Minisa chapter. They also had a program on Christmas music and its history.

Peleg Gorton chapter uses "America" as well as the National Anthem at their meetings. They have special numbers when possible and have one program each year on American music.

Other days observed with special music were: Flag Day, Thanksgiving Hymns, Colonial Christmas with appropriate music, Kansas Day, our Colonial Tea with the minuett, and our final program will feature appropriate music for the Conservation and American Indian.

At the December meeting, guest day, of the Jeremiah Howard chapter, three outstanding musicians, a vocalist, pianist, and violinist presented their program. The June meeting is to be a Flag Day program presented by musicians within their own chapter and it will be on American Music.

At two special guest meetings given in church parlors by the Topeka chapter, American Indian chants were used, also a group of songs by American composers.

Captain Jesse Leavenworth has no chairman at the present time,, for the Advancement of American Music, but do stress American Music at their teas.

A musical program of all American composers was given in December by Hannah Jameson chapter. In February "Music during George Washington's Time" was given at their annual George Washington's tea.

Henry Dawson has guest singers on special occasions. On Kansas Day one of their members wrote poems appropriate for the occasion. One group was set to the tune of "Home on the Range," sung by native Kansans, another group was set to the tune of "There's a Long, Long Trail." All members joined in this group. Patriotic songs are also used.

I wish to thank the various chapters most sincerely for their co-operation in sending in their reports. Send one if one line in

length. Please continue to keep the Advancement of American music and the singing of our National Anthem in mind when planning your programs. Let us make every effort to gain an harmonious world in which to live, through music in our own country, that it overflows into others, as harmony is the quality the whole world is seeking.

Sponsored a very successful Table Setting Contest and Silver Exhibit in cooperation with Wolf's, Jewelers for the benefit of Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee schools. Entertained the State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, State Parliamentarian, and State Reporter at October Guest Luncheon.

Last April the National Board meeting of C.A.R. and National Convention were attended by your state president. Her report was filed, as only C.A.R. members are permitted to report at the convention. She attended the National Officer's Club luncheon and the and was officially installed as Kansas state president under the C.A.R. dinner, preceding the dance, as a patroness; on Sunday, went on the Annual Pilgrimage and visited the National Historical Shrines Elm Tree. The ribbon sash was placed by Mrs. W. L. Ainsworth honorary state regent.

May 19, assisted with the organization of the Quivira Society, Coffeyville, which was organized with 10 members. Mrs. Forest Jamison was the Organizing President. June 12, the State C.A.R.

Conference was held in Great Bend with sixty registered members and guests. Rebecca Moore Odell Society, Great Bend, was hostess. assisted by Jeremiah Howard chapter, D.A.R. Senior officers were installed and junior officers elected and installed with the candlelight service. Societies represented in addition to the hostess society, were Francis Scott Key, Wichita, and Coronado, Ashland. During the morning business session, the state president presided, assisted by Sally Morrison, junior president of Rebecca Moore Odell Society; at that time the state did not have a junior president. In the afternoon the hostess society presented a pageant in costume, "World Friendship". Greetings were extended by the honor guests; Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden, state regent; Mrs. W. L. It is an all printed sheet and was issued in March, October, and December, 1950, and was awarded second prize in National contest.

When I first learned the children of the American Revolution were also to have a Museum I wondered if it might not be superflous as the Daughters of the American Revolution have such a wonderful historical Museum. Upon more mature thought I can see that it is a very fine thing in several ways.

- 1. Because of limited space the D.A.R. Museum cannot accept duplicates. Perhaps some plan might be evolved so that duplicates offered to the -D.A.R. Museum might be transferred to the C.A.R. Museum—of course with the consent of the donor. In this way many articles of historical museum value would be preserved instead of perhaps later falling into the hands of collectors or antique shops.
- 2. What better way can we teach patriotism and love of Country than by interesting our children in the preservation of relics which were so much a part of the lives of our Revolutionary ancestors.

The C.A.R. Museum maintains the same high standards of the D.A.R. Museum. To be acceptable all articles must be originals and

BY-LAWS

of the

KANSAS STATE SOCETY

of the

NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised and Adopted at the State Conference March 11, 1950

ARTICLE I.

Name

The name of this society shall be the Kansas State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II.

Object

Section I. This Society pledges fidelity and loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the objects of which are:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relies, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary and enlightening public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Section 2. Its purpose shall be to further the above plans of the National Society and to maintain harmonious co-operation among the chapters in Kansas and to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

ARTICLE III.

Membership

Section 1. The membership of this State Society shall include all Daughters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who are members in good standing of some Chapter in Kansas.

Good standing shall be interpreted to mean that all National and State dues have been paid.

Section 2. Chapters failing to pay State dues shall not be entitled to representation at State Conference, to receive State Communications or participate in any State affairs until dues are paid to the State Society.

ARTICLE IV.

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Chaplain, State Recording Secretary, State Treasurer, State Registrar, State Historian, State Librarian, State Reporter, and State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 2. No member shall be eligible for election to any state office or appointment to any state chairmanship who has not been a member in good standing of the Kansas State Society for one year. No member shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms, and no member who has served one term in any state office, shall be eligible to election to any other state office, except that of State Regent and State Vice Regent, until the expiration of one year.

A member having served more than one-half term in any office shall be deemed to have served a term. A candidate for State Regent or State Vice-Regent must have served as an elected Chapter Regent. A candidate for any State office must have served as an elected chapter officer.

Section 3. Election of officers shall take place on the last day of the annual State Conference occurring in the year of the election of National Officers.

Election shall be by ballot, for a term of three years.

A majority of votes cast shall elect.

The terms of office of the State Regent and State Vice Regent begin at the close of the Continental Congress which confirms their election.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected and confirmed, beginning with the year of 1950.

Provided that, at the next regular election, to be held in 1948, the officers shall be elected for a two year term.

Section 4. The nominating committee shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the October State Board of Management meeting.

This elected member shall serve as chairman of the nominating committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to submit names of candidates for the state offices on the second day of the annual State Conference of election year. Nominations other than those made by the nominating committee may also be made from the floor. All candidates must have given their consent before nomination.

The nominating committee shall, immediately after November first, notify all Chapters of impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted.

Candidates shall be selected from all districts of the state.

No person shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at State Conference.

Section 5. When the several candidates for State Regent are nominated, each in turn shall nominate her State Corresponding Secretary. The ballot cast for a State Regent shall serve, automatically, as a ballot for her State Corresponding Secretary. Thus each is an elected officer. In no other instance may two officers be elected from the same chapter.

Section 6. In recognition of valuable service to the State Society the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by acclamation at a State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent.

ARTICLE V.

Duties of Officers

Section 1. STATE REGENT: The State Regent, in addition to performing the duties which pertain to her office, according to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, shall preside at all meetings of this Society, of the Executive Committee, of the State Board of Management and to the Kansas Delegation to the Continental Congress. She shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for, sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer for moneys appropriated by the Society, and may call meetings of the Executive Committee or Board of Management whenever she may consider it important and necessary. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter General Chairman, prepare the program for the Annual State Conference. She shall present at the Annual State Conference all amend ments proposed to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society and such other matters as she may deem worthy of consider-

ation. She shall be a member of the printing committee. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees, excepting a nominating committee.

She shall record all changes in membership sending to the State Treasurer, to have recorded in the State Treasurer's books, all membership reports received from the National Society, following each meeting of the National Board. The State Treasurer will duly record the same.

Upon her confirmation, the incoming State Regent may appoint a State Parliamentarian, and Consulting Genealogist.

- Section 2. STATE VICE REGENT: The State Vice Regent, in the absence or disability of the Regent, shall perform the duties pertaining to the office of Regent. She shall be a member of the printing and stationery committee and a member of the Executive Committee.
- Section 3. STATE CHAPLAIN: The State Chaplain shall officiate in the offering prayer and other religious services when requested by the Regent. She shall be the Chairman of the Memorial Committee.
- Section 4. STATE RECORDING SECRETARY: The State Recording Secretary shall keep a correct record of all meetings of the State Conference, the State Executive Committee and the Board of Management. She shall be chairman of the Printing and Stationery Committee; countersign all orders drawn on the Treasurer and signed by the Regent. She shall prepare the proceedings for the Annual State Conference for publication, subject to the approval of the State Regent, and perform such other duties as pertain to her office.
- Section 5. STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: The State Corresponding Secretary, under the direction and supervision of the Regent, shall notify all state Officers and the Regent of each chapter in good standing of the time of the Annual Conference not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall give notice of meetings of the Executive Committee, and Board of Management as directed by the State Regent. She shall be the chairman of the committee on credentials. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, immediately after the close of Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the various chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each state chairman two typewritten copies of the list of names and addresses of her respective chapter chairmen (one of which is to be sent to her National Chairman and the second one for her own use.) She shall compile these lists into a directory for the ensuing administration.
- Section 6. STATE TREASURER: The State Treasurer shall collect all moneys and disburse the same only upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. All moneys received by the Treasurer shall be deposited in some

reliable bank in her name as State Treasurer, and all payments made by her shall be by check. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit the same to a Certified Public Accountant before the Annual State Conference. She shall be custodian of all bonds and policies belonging to the Society. She shall be bonded by the State Society for the sum of \$2,500.00 for the faithful discharge of the duties above defined. She shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan Notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall be a member of the Executive and Credentials Committees.

- Section 7. STATE REGISTRAR: The State Registrar shall keep the card file as established; assist in proving eligibility claims: prepare the Kansas Directory Daughters of the American Revolution, when ordered by the Society; check her membership file against the records of the State Treasurer immediately after July first. She shall keep a file of all reports received from the National Society and these are to be delivered with the State Card file, and all other material dealing with the work of the office, to her successor. She shall be a member of the Executive Committee.
- Section 8. STATE HISTORIAN: The State Historian shall take charge of all the historical papers received by the Society and shall catalogue and arrange the same, placing in a locker at the State Historical Society at Topeka, such historical documents, and all materials for preservation. She shall be a member of the Memorial Committee. She shall prepare the Smithsonian Report.
- Section 9. STATE LIBRARIAN: The State Librarian shall have supervision of the State D.A.R. library. She shall prepare a report listing all material sent to the National Library and all books records, and other material received for the State Library, during the year, for publication in the State Conference Proceedings. On retiring afformather office the State Librarian shall send to the Total meeting and to the State Regent a complete list of all material on file in the State D.A.R Library, and given over to the newly elected State Librarian.
- Section 10. STATE REPORTER: The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the State Society to leading-newspapers-in-this-territory. She shall be State Chairman of the Publicity Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files (or Scrap Book) and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D.C.
- Section 11. All officers and Committee Chairmen upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, all moneys, accounts, record books, papers or other property belonging to the Society.

ARTICLE VI.

Meetings

- Section 1. The supreme governing body of this society shall be a Conference. An annual meeting of the Kansas State Conference shall be held in March unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or by the State Board of Management. The purpose of this conference shall be to receive reports of the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen; for the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.
- Section 2. Each State Chairman shall compile a typed report of not more than three hundred words covering the work accomplished by her committee for the year ending February twenty-eighth. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary by March first, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Each Chapter Regent shall send a report of the work and plans of her chapter, for the year ending February twenty-eighth, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary immediately after March first. This report shall be typed, and limited to two hundred fifty words, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Section 3. The Kansas State Society shall be divided into four districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively.

At each District meeting the State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board of Management meeting.

A Director, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected at an annual district meeting to be held in the fall. The term of office shall be one year and no District Officer shall serve more than three consecutive terms. Each district shall entertain the State Conference in rotation; the time and place to be determined by the hostess district and the State Regent. The Southwest District shall entertain the State Conference in 1948.

- Section 4. The voting members of the Annual State Conference shall be the State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, and Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the first Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates, regularly elected by Chapters as hereinafter specified, provided they have been members of their Chapter for one year and are in good standing.
- Section 5. Twenty-five voting members shall constitute a quorum at the meeting of the Annual State Conference.
- Section 6. Chapters of less than fifty members shall be entitled to representation at the Annual State Conference by the regent and two delegates. Chapters having membership of fifty to one hundred shall be represented by their Regent and five delegates. After the first hundred, representation shall be in the ratio of three delegates for every subsequent one hundred. Alternates shall be elected for each Chapter Regent and delegate.

Section 7. Delegates and alternates snau be elected at the January meeting of their Chapter in each year, and certificates of their election signed by the Regent and Treasurer of their Chapter, shall be sent to the State Corresponding Secretary for the Committee on Credentials by February first. Vacancies that occur in the delegation may be filled by the Regent from alternates duly elected for that purpose at the January meeting.

Section 8. Daughters attending State Conference shall pay ..

registration fee of One Dollar.

Section 9. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Picnic shall be held on Constitution Day, September 17, with the Northeast District as hostess.

ARTICLE VII.

Board of Management.

Section 1. The State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose memberships are within the State. District Directors and Chapter Regents shall constitute a State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over affairs of the State Society to do and transact business during the interim between the meetings of the State Society. The State Board shall meet at the call of the State Regent at least twice a year. One meeting to me held immediately preceding the first fall District meeting and one to be held immediately preceding the opening session of the State Conference.

A Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held in October, following the National Board of Management meeting, and this meeting shall be termed the official Fall State Board Meeting; the Northeast District shall act as hostess annually, at Shawnee Mission. Meetings of the Southeast, Southwest, and Northwest Districts shall be held immediately following in convenient order and a report of the National Board meeting be given by the State Regent and chapter plans be heard at all meetings.

Other meetings may be held upon the call of the State Regent or upon written request of seven members of the Board of Management. It shall recommend to the Annual State Conference such patriotic and historic work as seems desirable to be undertaken by

the Society. Eleven members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have power to fill vacancies in office until the next election; the election to fill such vacancies shall be by ballot, notice of the vacancy having been given in the call for the meeting of the State Board.

Section 4. All officers, the Board of Management and Committees shall make reports of their work for the year, at the Annual State Conference.

ARTICLE VIII.

Executive Committee

- Section 1. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Recording Secretary, State Registrar and State Treasurer, shall constitute the Executive Committee.
- Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three members.
- Section 3. The Executive Committee shall make a report at each meeting of the Board of Management.

ARTICLE IX.

Committees.

Section 1. The Regent shall appoint a Student Loan Committee consisting of three members who shall supervise the Kansas D.A.R. Student Loan Fund.

The Regent shall appoint a Conference Committee which shall consist of the Reporter and two other members.

There shall be a Printing and Stationery Committee which shall consist of the Recording Secretary, Vice Regent and Regent.

A Memorial Committee shall consist of the State Chaplain, chairman: State Historian and one other member.

The Committee on Credentials shall consist of the Corresponding Secretary. Treasurer and one other member.

ARTICLE X

State Funds

Section 1. Each Chapter, belonging to the State Society shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before January first of each year the sum of \$1.35 for each member, in good standing on the Chapter rolls on that date.

Chapter Treasurers shall furnish, with each remittance of dues, a list of members for whom she is paying.

Chapters failing to pay above per capita dues shall be delinquent February first and not entitled to representation at State Conference.

Representation of Chapters at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon number of dues in the hands of the State Treasurer by February first. The Treasurer shall notify chapters of their standing on February first.

- Section 2. Life Members shall be counted in the basis for representation. Chapters shall count all Life Members in their Representation and State dues should be paid for full representation.
- Section 3. Stationery and postage, and in cases of emergency, telephone and telegraph charges, which charges shall be validated by the Executive Committee, shall be furnished to the State Officers and State Committees.
- Section 4. A sum not to exceed \$500.00 per year shall be allowed the State Regent for her expenses in carrying on her work.
- Section 5. To partially defray her expenses to the State Conference, each State Officer shall be allowed the sum of \$12.00, provided however, that no expenses will be allowed an Officer when the Conference is held in her own home city.
- Section 6. No provision is made for expenses of Honorary State Officers.
- Section 7. In addition to the obligations specified in these By-Laws, no debts or liabilities shall be incurred except by vote of the Conference.
- Section 8. A sum equal to ten cents per member shall be taken from the State Fund and placed in an Annual State Conference Expense Account.
- Section 9. A sum equal to two cents a member shall be taken from State Fund Annually and placed in the treasury of the Kansas C.A.R. The amount accumulated to be used for C.A.R. projects.

ARTICLE XI.

Chapters.

Section 1. It is recommended that election of chapter officers, for a term of three years, take place in January, occurring in the same year as the election of state officers. Chapter officers shall be installed and take office in May, following the confirmation of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent at Continental Congress.

On or before February first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks to be furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter Officers for the ensuing year.

The Regent-elect of each chapter shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on or before April first, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of all newly appointed chapter chairmen.

ARTICLE XII.

Parliamentary Authority

Section 1. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order revised, shall govern this Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XIII.

Amendments.

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendments has been sent to the State Regent and each Chapter at least sixty days before the Annual State Conference.

Section 2. Amendments to these By-Laws shall take effect at the close of the Annual State Conference at which they are adopted.

STANDING RULES.

ARTICLE 1.

Section 1. The Recording Secretary with the Regent shall see that arrangements are made for the publishing of Proceedings of the State Conference which are contained in the files of the Recording Secretary, the expense of such report to be born by the State Society.

The Recording Secretary shall send a copy of the printed Proceedings to all State Officers, Chapter Regents State Chairmen District Directors, and to such other persons and libraries as shall be designated by the State Regent.

When an election has occurred, it sha'l be the duty of the retiring Recording Secretary and retiring Regent to compile these proceedings and arrange for their publication.

Section 2. Board of Management meetings may be attended by State Chairmen, District Directors, Chapter Regents' representatives and other interested members, on invitation of the State Regent, except when the Board is in Executive session.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. \$25.00 shall be allotted the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

Section 2. \$50.00 shall be allotted the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Congress.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. These rules may be amended, suspended or replaced at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of voting members present-

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
