LEDA FERRELL REX (Mrs. Loren Edgar)

Mrs. Loren Rex joined the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the spring 1924, as a member of the Wichita Chapter, and down thru the years her work in State and National societies has been outstanding. She has thirteen proven lines of D.A.R. ancestors.

Mrs. Rex served as vice regent and regent of her chapter; and as vice regent and State regent of the Kansas society from November 1934 until April 1938. Five Kansas chapters were organized during her regency, and the Kansas State D.A.R. Bulletin was one of her creations. Through her efforts, the "History of Kansas D.A.R." was compiled and published. She was state chairman of the Constitution Hall Finance Committee for eight years, 1926 to 1934, and was national vice chairman of the Approved Schools Committee during 1932 until 1934. Mrs. Rex brought distinction to Kansas during her term of office as Chaplain General in 1938; she also served as vice president, Western Division, National Officers Club.


In the National Society, Mrs. Rex was appointed the Society's first chairman of the Indian Committee by Mrs. William H. Pouch, president General. Mrs. Julius Talmadge, who succeeded Mrs. Pouch, re-appointed Mrs. Rex to her second term as National chairman of this group.

In the 1947-1950 election of seven vice president general, Mrs. Rex was accorded first position with the highest vote.

She has served as national president of Daughters of the American Colonists, and is a member of United States Daughters of 1812, the Daughters of Colonial Wars, National Society of Colonial Dames of America, National society of the Daughters of the Barons of Runnemede, the National League of American Pen Women, the P.E.O. Sisterhood, and former Promoter of the Children of the American Revoution.

The high honor of First Vice President General was bestowed upon Mrs. Rex in 1950, the first year to dispense with second and third V.P.G.'s. She is serving in the cabinet of Mrs. James B. Patton, which consists of twelve members, who compose the Executive Committee of the National Society.

OBJECTS

The objects of this Society as stated in Article 11 of the Constitution are:

1.

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, page 56.

INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

Chaplain: You have been duly elected to the office in ------Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Do you accept its responsibilities and duties?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to uphold the Constitution of the United States of America and to seek its observance by others?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution?

Response: I do.

Chaplain: Do you faithfully promise to perform the duties of your office to the best of your ability and understanding, and that at all times you will conduct yourself uprightly, God being your helper?

Response: I do.

- Chaplain: That which is gone out of thy lips thou shalt-observe and do; according as thou hast vowed unto Jehovah thy God.—Deut. 23:23.
- Collect: Lord, God, we pray that we may be joined together in loyalty;-these who now are placed in leadership, and we who have chosen them to guide us. Bless their faithfulness and ours, in a united service to our Society and to Thy kingdom. May we have an awareness of Thy companionship in all our plans and projects; and the assurance of Thy benediction upon our work. Amen.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Report immediately to the State Corresponding Secretary any change in Chapter Officers or Chapter Chairmen, also report changes of Chapter Chairmen to State Chairmen. For example a change in Chapter National Defense Chairman should be reported to the State National Defense Chairman.

Report at once to the Treasurer General, State Regent, State Registrar and State Treasurer, all resignations, deaths, marriages, and members received or lost by transfer. Do not report a resignation nor transfer a member in arrears for dues. Only members in good standing may resign or be transferred. The Handbook gives specific directions regarding transfers and resignations. Please follow rules carefully.

Report immediately to the State Regent and State Registrar all changes of address of members.

CHAPTER REGISTRARS ATTENTION. Please copy from application papers before sending to Washington, the full name of applicant including her maiden name, and if married, the name or initials of her husband, the complete address, name of ancestor with his rank, the State in which he served and the State in which he died. If the applicant is a Junior Member (under 35 years of age) please make a notation of that with her birth date. As soon as notice is received from National that the applicant has been accepted, report this information to the State Regent and the State Registrar. Report data concerning Junior Members, also to the State Chairman of Junior Membership.

Dues should be in the hands of the Treasurer General and State Treasurer by December 1st. Your chapters representation at State Conference depends on conforming to this rule. Do not wait on delinquents. Members whose dues are unpaid January first are "in arrears."

All contributions to be counted in the current year's report must be in the hands of the State Treasurer by January 31st. The State fiscal year extends from January 31, 1952 to January 31, 1953.

Every Chapter Regent, Treasurer, and Registrar should have a copy of the Handbook, Price twenty-five cents. There is a new booklet of "Prayers" for the chapter Chaplain at thirty-five cents and the Chapter chairman of Americanization will of course want the D.A.R. Manuals, twenty-five cents each.

IMPORTANT AMENDMENTS TO NATIONAL BY-LAWS Adopted Continental Congress 1951-1952

"Chapter Treasurers shall report to the Treasurer General on the first day of June and November all members in arrears, changes in membership, marriages and deaths since the last report. The fees and dues sent to the Treasurer General by the Chapter treasurer must be accompanied by an alphabetical list of the members to whom dues shall be accredited."

"The Annual National dues of two dollars from each Chapter member shall be sent by the chapter treasurer to the Treasurer General on or before the first day of each year. This amount shall include the quota funds or per capita tax."

"The initiation fee of all applicants for membership in the Society, except as provided in Article 1, Section 2, of the National By-Laws, shall be six dollars."

"National Officers, State Regents, Chapter Regents, delegates and alternates shall pay a Registration Fee of two dollars when registering for Continental Congress or any special meeting of the National Society."

"In a locality where there is a Chapter, other Chapters may be organized provided each secondary Chapter shall contain at least twenty-five members of whom twelve have never belonged to any chapter.

"When transferring to a chapter ,transfer cards must be accompanied by a copy of the members application paper. Two dollars will be charged for each copy made by the National Society."

CHAPTERS REGISTRARS—Please check on all applicants whose papers have been sent to National. Please urge applicants to REPLY to letters from office of Registrar General and to send in requested information as promptly as possible.

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STATE OFFICERS' CLUB BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I-Name

This organization shall be known as the Kansas State Officers' Club of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II—Object

The object of this club shall be to foster sociability among its members, to advance the work of Patriotic Education, to promote historical interest in the state, and to aid in marking historical spots, and to promote the interests of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE III-Membership

Section 1. Those eligible to membership shall be officers and ex-officers of the Kansas State Society of the D.A.R., providing however, that the member is in good standing in the State and National Society.

Section 2. The membership chairman must notify newly elected officers that they are eligible for membership in the State Officers' Club.

ARTICLE IV-Meetings

Section 1. The annual breakfast meeting shall be held the morning of the last day of the annual conference of the Kansas Society, D.A.R., the hour and price to be determined by the Second Vice President of the State Officers' Club and the general chairman of the State Conference hostess chapter.

Section 2. Special meetings of the Executive Committee and the club may be called by the president at such times as she deems best; and special meetings may be called by the president upon the written request of five members.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the club.

ARTICLE V-Officers

Section 1. The officers of the club shall be president, three vicepresidents, chaplain, secretary, treasurer, historian, and reporter. These officers, together with the ex-state regents not holding office in the club, shall constitute the executive committee.

Section 2. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the executive committee.

Secton 3. Vacancies in office shall be filled by the executive committee.

Section 4. The term of office shall be for one year only and no officer may succeed herself.

ARTICLE VI-Duties of Officers

Section 1. President. The president shall preside at all meetings and shall appoint all committees. She shall sign with the treasurer all bills for disbursement of the funds of the club.

Section 2. First Vice-President. The first vice-president shall perform the duties of the president in her absence, and be chairman of By-Laws Committee.

Section 3. Second Vice-President. The second vice-president shall be State Officers Club chairman of arrangements for the annual meetings.

Section 4. Third Vice-President. The third vice-president shall be chairman of membership.

Section 5. Chaplain. The duties of the chaplain shall be the offering of prayer as directed by the president.

Section 6. Secretary. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep the minutes of the annual meeting and of the executive committee meetings of the club.

Section 7. Treasurer. The treasurer shall send out notice of the annual meeting, collect and receive all dues and fees. All orders for disbursements of funds must be signed by the president and treasurer.

Section 8. Historian. It shall be the duty of the historian to keep an indexed reference record of all work of the club. (A scrapbook if so desired.)

Section 9. Each officer shall make a report at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII—Dues

Section 1. The annual dues shall be fifty cents per member, payable to the treasurer before the annual meeting each year. The initiation fee shall be one dollar.

Section 2. Only members in good standing are eligible to attend the annual meeting of the Club.

ARTICLE VIII—Guests

Section 1. Only guests of the D.A.R. State Conference and general chairman of the State Conference hostess chapter may be guests at the annual meeting of the club and their breakfasts shall be paid for out of the club treasury. Х

ARTICLE IX—Amendments

Section 1. These By-Laws shall become effective upon their acceptance by the club.

Section 2. These By-Laws may be amended at any annual meeting by a majority of those voting, a quorum being present, provided copy of such amendment has been sent to the officers and members of the club not less than ten days prior to the annual meeting.

Section 3. Roberts Rules of Order, revised, shall be authority in all matters not herein specified.

STATE OFFICER'S REPORTS

STATE REGENT'S REPORT

Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden, State Regent

At the close of the second year of this administration it is a pleasure to report that Kansas ranks high among the States in D.A.R. achievements. We have generously supported State and National projects, and although all goals have not been reached, our efforts show outstanding results and our society has grown and prospered.

MEMBERSHIP. (The membership on February 1, 1952, was 3281 in 61 chapters, plus 31 members at large. Chrisitana Musser Chapter fell below the legal number of 12 members, and was disbanded. We are happy to report an organizing regent is at work on papers at Stockton, Kansas, and a new chapter is being formed.

VISITS. Immediately following the State conference at Pittsburg, the State Regent visited the Oklahoma State conference, accompanied by the First Vice-President General, Mrs. Loren E. Rex. A number of chapters have been visited during the year, but there are still 20 chapters remaining. We have found that many chapters hold their regular meetings on Saturday, and nearly all chapters are reluctant to change their scheduled dates. Thus, the State Regent has made a number of long trips of over 325 miles just to visit one chapter, when several chapters could have been visited at a saving of time and expense. We are wondering about this situation and what can be done to improve it.

The State regent appreciates the contact with the chapters and no part of the several duties are more delightful, however, we must face the facts. Visits are not entirely social affairs; they are made to give information and inspiration for the promotion of the D.A.R. program. If the State regent is not given the opportunity to impart such information to your chapter, it has been the loser. The State corresponding secretary has accompanied the regent on many trips, and appreciative thanks are extended to her and to the chapters for many courtesies, gifts, flowers and contributions to special funds. All money corsages have been placed in the Valley Forge Fund, credited to the donors. We plan to complete the visits to chapters this coming year.

BOARD MEETINGS. The National Board of Management meetings have been attended on October 23-24, and also January 31 and February 1. At the last named meeting, the Kansas regent was from the most distant western State, but she felt it was imperative to attend. It would be most enlightening if all members could sit in on these meetings and hear the discussions. They would better understand how carefully the National board is handling the business of the Society. There will be two board meetings during the Continental Congress in April. The State Board of Management meeting was held at Dodge City last fall prior to the district meeting. The plan to rotate the fall meeting was well liked.

DISTRICT MEETINGS. The four district meetings were held in the fall with election of officers and the selection of meeting places for next fall as follows: Southwest District at Wichita; Northwest District at Emporia; Northeast District at Lawrence and Southeast District at Neodesha. As soon as the date for the October National Board meeting has been set, district dates will be decided.

The SHAWNEE MISSION PILGRIMAGE AND PICNIC was a success with over 100 members attending. The dinner was spread on the Historic grounds of the Old Mission school and a program followed in the afternoon. At a short ceremony the Junior Honorary State Regent Mrs. William L. Ainsworth, was invited to hang her picture along with the other Honorary State Regents in the D.A.R. rooms at the Historical building. The next Pilgrimage and Picnic will be held on September 17, 1952, and it would be nice if chapters would plan to attend, especially those who have never visited the Historical place, one of our State projects.

CONTINENTAL CONGRESS. The 60th Continental Congress last April was attended by a large delegation, and 43 attended the Kansas Luncheon. The delegation had a splendid location on the floor of the auditorium and the Regent's box, which seats six, was occupied at all times by delegates or guests. Senator and Mrs. Frank Carlson were with us at the opening session. One of the most thrilling experiences was at the time General Douglas McArthur and family paid a visit and he delivered a brief address. Kansas had one page, one member of the house committee, one acted as a teller, one as a timekeekper and one on the Building Fund Committee and Valley Forge Committee. The 61st Continental Congress will be held April 14-19, 1952. A very special event will be the pre-conference dedication pilgrimage to Valley Forge on Easter Sunday, April 13.

OFFICERS REPORTS. You will be proud of the State officers reports which show that they have been doing, to the fullest, their respective duties. The State Regent acknowledges their kindly assistance throughout the year. Their reports and all other reports will be published in the State Proceedings, where you may read and refer to them during the coming year.

STATE CHAIRMAN REPORTS. The State Regent commends the chairmen for their devotion to their departments, and thanks them and the chapter regents and chapter chairmen for their efforts in behalf of our vast program. It has been a record year in the Approved Schools with the bequest of \$28,602.98 given through the Molly Foster Berry Chapter for a Memorial Scholarship at Tamassee, named the Sarah, Rose and Anna Allen Memorial.

STATE PROJECTS. All members should be on the alert for Historical material for Shawnee Mission, and State and County Historical Societies should be given every assistance possible. Every Revolutionary Ancestor's grave shoud be marked, and all Historical Spots preserved.

THE NATIONAL MUSEUM should receive our encouragement, and occasionally \$4.00 should be sent for rebinding our Application papers.

PUBLICITY. Each chapter should give publicity to the worthwhile activities of their chapter, so that other chapters may know and emulate them; and the public in general may understand the nature of our society, its objects and aims.

KODACHROME SLIDES. Both sets of slids were purchased for use on chapter visits, and may be obtained for use in the chapters at any time by writing to the State Regent.

PROGRAMS. Music by American composers, the use of the National Anthem and Pledge of Allegiance should open all programs, and, National Defense should be a must for chapter study. We need to be informed on world affairs and be ready to protect America. according to our Theme, "America In Our Hearts," first, last, and all the time.

THE REGENT'S BULLETIN has been issued three times the past year and sent to our entire membership in an attempt to keep everyone informed. Learn to use the Bulletin as you would a letter of instruction, it is published for that purpose. Keep it on file for ready reference. The Sunflower has been enclosed with each Bulletin.

CONTESTS. Every contest is made to create and stimulate interest. If your chapter has taken part, it has gained in some way, and the organizaton has profited. Awards will be made at this meeting. Congratulations, if your chapter has won, and please try again if it has not. CHAPTER REPORTS. The Chapter Reports are marvelous, but let's wait and let the Chapter Regents tell their own challenging stories. You will be astounded at the amount of splendid work among the American Indians, the St. Francis Boys' Home, Americanization courts, and countless other things.

CLOSING. We thank the National Chairman of Junior Membership, Mrs. Sherman Watson, for her gracious presence and fine address, which added interest and impressiveness to the occasion. We regret that more National officers could not be with us, and hope for better attendance next year.

It has been a real pleasure to work with the Daughters of the Southwest District in making plans for this conference, and grateful thanks are extended to the General Chairman, Mrs. Ralph W. Fulton, for her untiring efforts. She and her workers have been kind and cooperative, and deserve much praise.

We acknowledge the visits of many Daughters the past year; you have added charm to our home and enriched our life. Do come again and bring others with you, and if you have problems, let us help solve them. It has also been enjoyable to have visited the chapters and homes of many of the Daughters. When staying over night, you have welcomed us most graciously to your family group, and served us your finest food. Such hospitality could not be found outside a Daughters' home.

For any success achieved the past year, we give the credit to the Daughters of Kansas, and assure them that no State Regent has been given better support or shown stauncher loyalty. REPORT OF STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

We have examined the financial books and records of the treasurer of the Kansas Daughters of The American Revolution for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1952, and submit herewith a summary statement of fund balances and a statement of cash receipts and disburscments for the year then ended.

The cash on deposit had been allocated to funds as detailed in Schedule No. 1. The bonds were the property of the Student Fund.

Confirmation of the cash on deposit was obtained by correspondonce with the depository bank and the bonds were examined by us.

The bank statement of the Exchange State Bank of Douglass, Kansas disclosed a balance remaining therein of \$10.95 against which was recorded an outstanding check No. 16, dated November 10, 1950, in the amount of \$10.95, which check was written in the prior adult period.

We did not have for inspection, the checks paid by the Exchange State Bank during the period from February 1, to February 24, 1951, and for the period from April 30 to June 25, 1951. Items shown on the bank statements as having been paid during such periods conformed, in amounts with the treasure's record disbursements, but without examining the individual checks we had no means of knowing whether the payee on the check was the same as recorded in the disbursement record.

In our opinion, the accompanying statements of fund balances and cash receipts and disbursements together with the foregoing comments present fairly the position of the organization as at January 31, 1952, and its financial activity for the year then ended.

CONSERVATION

Mrs. Roy Valentine Shrewder, National Vice Chairman

We are reminded by our National Chairman of Conservation that "Conservation is a bulwark of Democracy" and that in our prolonged struggle to maintain our Democratic way of life, timber, water and soil are all vital in that maintenance.

In the conservation and the rebuilding of our natural resources every locality has its own problems. These problems are reflections of the local resources and local needs. Whether these needs are to conserve or to rebuild, the problem is of equal importance. Some of our natural resources can never be replaced, and these must be judiciously used. Others, as in the case of timber and of soil, can be rebuilt and our programs toward reforestration, soil building and prevention of loss of soil through water and wind erosion must be carried on unceasingly. The economy of our nation demands strict attention to all matters of conservation. If we are to continue to help in the feeding of hungry peoples, in furnishing materials for the building or rebuilding of homes and even entire cities, if we are to share in a world wide arms program we must look to our natural resources and make the most of them. All of us can help if we will learn of and deal with this problem from our individual and local levels.

In a world seemingly indifferent to human life we are faced with increasing demands for human conservation. Our program in this committee deals specifically with work done for the physically handicapped and mentally ill; the welfare department; the juvenile courts; and work with veterans both in hospitals and out. All other work formerly reported under Human Conservation should be under other committees.

In the coming year, the last of this administration, this same program will be in force. As the chapter programs are made up for the year do not neglect to include a program on Conservation. Remember the dead lines for reports—State chairmen report to National Vice Chairmen by March 1, 1953 so that your National Vice Chairman can report to the National Chairman by March 15th.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

It has been my privilege this year to note that progress has been made by the Junior membership committees in the states of Nebraska, Colorado, and Kansas. I still have one year left to serve in which I hope to find at least one junior member in South Dakota and one in North Dakota.

Peace Pipe Chapter of Denver is still the largest junior committee in the Division. John Haupt, of Topeka, Kansas is second. The committees of Kansas and Colorado, and Nebraska and South Dakota report favorable on the sale of stationery offered by the junior committee. Deborah Avery Chapter of Lincoln had a benefit bridge which increased nicely its contribution to the Helen Pouch Fund. Kanza Chapter of St. John, Kansas, sent a huge box of articles for the Junior Bazaar. Other Kansas chapters also contributed. Colorado sent the most ideas to me which they used in raising moncy for the fund.

Kansas has one junior serving as chapter regent. Colorado, Nebraska, and Kansas all have juniors serving in other elective offices, chapter chairmen, and promoters of C.A.R.

From the information coming to me, it seems that the members of the D.A.R. are becoming better informed about junior members, their ideals, and interest in the work of the D.A.R.

I am looking forward for a better year next year.

It has been most encouraging to have had forty-six chapter chairmen or regents who have taken time to answer my letters. Thank you.

Your state chairman sent three communications to each chapter this year. She attended the state Conference in Pittsburg and the Southwest District Conference in Dodge City. Weather prevented attendance at the other district meeting.

Forty-two chapters have appointed chairman for junior membership. Shawnee chapter sponsred a contest in the local grade schools. Jeremiah Howard is to sponsor a radio program depicting the work of the C.A.R. and the D.A.R.. Many juniors in other chapters are working as chapter chairmen, chapter officers, and promoters of the C. A. R.

To my knowledge twenty-six chapters contributed to the Helen Pouch Memorial scholarship fund. Kanza chapter purchased the most stationery this past year. Kanza chapter also had roll call in February to which cach member responded with a gift for the Junior Bazaar held each spring at Continental Congress Other chapters that contributed to the bazaar also included Shawnee John Haupt, Lucretia Griswold Latimer, Dodge City, and Minisa.

The treasurer's report will show the amount each chapter contributed this year to the Helen Pouch Fund.

Thank you for your support and interest. I am looking forward to the next year.

STATE CHAIRMEN REPORTS

AMERICAN INDIANS AND CONSERVATION Mrs. Glenn Rhea, State Chairman

The annual letters were sent to the chapters in October directing attention to the request of our National chairman that the Bacone Memorial Fund be completed this year, the need for a scholarchip fund for a girl from St. Mary's to study nursing be established and the ever present poverty of the Navajo nation to be kept in mind.

In December cards were sent asking for towels and wash cloths for St. Mary's to augment their diminished supply. In response 43 chapters state that 3000 was given to Bacone, \$101.00 to the general Indian fund, with \$10.00 designated for the Navajos. \$74.00 to St. Mary's toward a scholarship for nursing. 115 lbs. of clothing, 51 lbs. costume jewelry was sent to St. Mary's along with towels from 30 chapters. Minisa leading with \$15.00 allotted for the latter. 332 lbs. of clothing was sent to the Navajos with 12 ozs. of beads and yarn additional. This was mostly sent to White Horse Lake, Cornfield Day school and Window Rock. 1109 Christmas cards were sent also. Some contributions to Haskell were made. Betty Washington presented pins to students from Haskell who entered the Citizenship Pilgrimage contest.

Twenty-two programs on Indian welfare were held in local chapters. A number of members did outstanding work and gave individual gifts.

Eleven requests for visits to chapters received, 8 accepted.

In February report reminder cards were sent to 38 chapters who had not reported to that date. For these the state chairman feels at fault, for not getting the reminder cards to you earlier.

It has been a pleasure to learn together the ways and needs of our Indian brothers. Sincere thanks to you all.

CONSERVATION

Our conservation report is considerably shortened this year in compliance with the request of our National Chairman that all work formerly under Human Conservation be reported under other committees.

We were asked to continue our interest in all of these worthy organizations, but to do so as individuals and not as chairman of the conservation committees.

Remembering the aim of this committee to make all citizens conservation conscious thus aiding constructively in our country's economic future. Attention of the chapters was called to sources of material for program information.

Timber, water, and soil being vital in the struggle in maintaining our way of life your chairman is happy to report 1288 trees planted with miles of terracing.

Peleg Gorton had an especially fine report.

AMERICANISM AND D.A.R. MANUALS

(Mrs. H. A.) Helene Palmer Mitchell, State Chairman

The work of these committees in Kansas during the past year has been gratifying and it is with pleasure that I submit this report to the 4th Annual State Conference of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

52 Chapters have chapter chairmen of these committees.

40 Chapters reported their accomplishments during the past year.

Last November I sent quite a long list of suggestions for work that the Chapers might do during the year. Then in February 1952 I sent a set of questions to each chapter so they might easily make a report of their year's work. The highlights of these reports are as follows:

Work pertaining to Naturalization seemed to be considered the most important. Ten chapters reported having worked with Naturalization Courts and assisted in preparing the classes for the eventful day when they should become Citizens of the United States. The Courts held impressive ceremonies for the admittance of these classes or groups who were ready to be admitted. It was a privilege for me to participate in three such ceremonies. The classes were attentive and seemed to be appreciative. They received the D.A.R. Manuals, flags, cards, codes, and other matter of information in an interested manner. Two ceremonies were especially impressive as they were held on Constitution Day. The Judges who spoke to them and the entire program emphasized the privilege that was theirs in becoming citizens of the United States. Another Court was held in a high school auditorium so that the students could know the precedure for becoming a naturalized citizen.

The Courts observe the standard that those who are to be admitted should have a fair knowledge of English and understand the laws under which they are to live.

The Courts are cordial in their attitude to the Daughters of the American Revolution. They do not encourage much fanfare at the time of naturalization ceremonies, but they do tell the new citizens that the ladies who will give them the manuals and other materials are their friends and will help them in any way they can. If the day is not a special day, such as Constitution Day and there has been a long program already arranged by the Court, they are permitted to give a welcome or say a few words. It is preferred that the welcome be done at a separate time.

A few D.A.R. chapters reported members having taught in these classes. Others had visited such classes. Some had assisted with Naturalization papers.

Some chapters had sponsored receptions for the new citizens and on special or patriotic holidays had held parties for them.

Several chapters had given flags and "welcome" cards, but in some cities that service was taken over by other organizations. The same was true of assisting at the voting places. (The Daughters had helped when needed.

Some chapters had sponsored clubs both for adults and children. I think sponsoring sewing, cooking, hand craft, hobbies and music could be urged more than it seems to have been.

Some had helped the new citizens to celebrate patriotic holidays. This too could be urged more than now being done. Our natural born citizens are lax in this respect and should show more respect on patriotic and religious days as they deserve.

New citizens living in or near military bases and especially old Forts are fortunate in seeing and hearing the history of many early American landmarks, government buildings and other places of interest.

In Kansas, underprivileged children are very well cared for. Of course there is always a need in the way of money and help for any institution, but the nucleus is there. Some are supported by the government. Some work has been done at Houses of Correction, Childrens Homes, and play grounds. In some instances the supervision has been questioned and supervisors have been replaced.

Kansas laws do not countenance any great degree of illiteracy. All children attend school. Their parents are recognized and rewarded. Schools for crippled but brilliant children have been instituted. They are given tests and placed where they can best be developed. There are schools for blind, deaf, spastics, and other special schools. The Daughters are interested in the conduct of these schools and some include donations to such schools in their chapter budgets.

Some chapters do work for hospitals. This is an American gesture, especially since help is hard to get and there is such a great demand for doctors and nurses. Two chapters reported members trying for title of "Gray Lady". New hospitals had been built in these localities and such help is very acceptable. Some D.A.R. members are omployed in schools of logopedics and foundation homes. Frequent donations are made to these institutions.

Some Americanism committees sponsor study in chapters of such subjects as immigration laws, constitution, and early history so that they may be well informed and ready to help those wishing to become naturalized.

American History is taught in public schools and teachers are required to have an AB or BS degree. An effort is made to employ only teachers who are true Americans and most chapters report their attitude is satisfactory. A few younger teachers are reported to have a slight idealistic-socialistic leaning but on the whole, they adhere to the principles layed down by our forefathers.

Discussions in chapter meetings and patriotic addresses seem to be the favorite way of promoting a patriotic awakening. Your chairman would like to suggest some old patriotic songs can help to promote a feeling of Americanism.

Two chapters reported members having displaced persons or D.P.s on their farms. It is interesting to know that the owners are well pleased with their work and that their attitude is all that could be desired so far as being good citizens is concerned.

The amount of money spent in promoting "Americanism" according to reports at hand, is \$133.80. Since all chapters have not reported, I know that much more has been spent. I do not have reports from three of the largest chapters and very active ones. The large chapters have many requests for time and money. The small ones seem slow to recognize their opportunities for patrictic work. So much could be done to further Americanism even in rural communities.

I hope that next year there will be an awakening to more and greater responsibilities in all chapters, large and small. I hope to be able to report chapters 100% in having chairman of Americanism and D.A.R. Manuals for Citizenship.

D.A.R. MANUALS FOR CITIZENSHIP

To-National Chairman:

A questionnaire was sent to each chapter, in November, asking that it be completed and returned, not later than February 20, 1952. They have been slow coming in and even on March 1st they are still arriving.

There are 62 Chapters in the State; 52 have chairmen of D.A.R. Manuals for Citizenship; 40 have at this time, reported.

The returned questionnaires reveal the following interesting facts; About 323 manuals have been distributed during the past year and reporting at this time. Most of them were English. There were 7 in German; 6 in French; 1 Italian. The recipiants were groups, institutions, and individuals, some of which I will mention.

High school students, some of whom are foreign wives; war brides, leaders of Boy Scout troops, teachers, libraries, Courts, D.P.s, Army, Wacks, Y.W.C.A., and some centers near large cities, such as Bethel neighborhood, Skyline mission, Mexican-American council. These centers are located around Kansas City.

Seventy-four manuals were given to war brides, with suggestions for studying them. None were reported as being sold for 15ϕ .

There was 671 inches of publicity reported but only three pictures. They group pictures of Naturalization classes.

One chapter reported a 15 minute broadcast each week, two chapters reported 2 short broadcasts each. Ten chapters reported programs on the D.A.R. Manuals.

Some chapters entertained displaced persons and presented manuals to them; others entertained war brides and gave them manuals with an outline for study arranged by the extension depart ment of the University of Kansas.

Twelve chapters reported special programs on Constitution Day.

One chapter chairman said their war brides had mostly married into good familico and didn't want any one bothering in their affairs Another chairman stated that their war brides were all very well settled by this time and did not need further help.

The leader of a young mens church group asked me for one of the D.A.R. Manuals. I gladly gave it to him as I could readily see that would be very good ground for the sewing of seed for Americanism.

I have interviewed a few foreign people to learn if they had found the manual useful. They assured me they had and referred to it often. The Courts recommend it's use and admonish the new citizens to read them carefully.

I would urge every chapter to have a chairman for Manuals and Americanism. They combine nicely. Make a formal report of your work next year, but add any items of interest. Ideas that work for one chapter may be a good suggestion for another.

APPROVED SCHOOLS

Mrs. Harry A. Richeson, Chairman

Early in September the fall letter containing instructions from the National Chairman Mrs. Lowell E. Burnelle, Glouster, Ohio and a list of the needs of the schools was mailed to all chapter chairman, also a chart of all Approved Schools furnished by the National Society. This chart lists all schools and necessary information which will answer many of your questions relative to your work as chapter chairman. Some very interesting and instructive literature and report blanks was included.

In December, reminder cards were mailed to all chapter chairman calling attention to the sending of reports by February first and second notices were sent to 13 chapters, 3 failing to make a report.

All chapters but one have a chapter chairman, 38 chapters include the schools in their budgets and 35 chapters have had Approved Schools programs. Extra literature was sent several chapters for programs and a quantity was brought to the Conference and it is hoped that you will take this back to your chapter.

The 1951 Conference voted to divert \$500.00 from the Student Loan Fund to purchase the second half of the right-wing bleacher in the Talmadge Auditorium Building at Tamassee. These bleachers are inside the Auditorium and make permanent seating for the students at all their functions. It was my privilege to visit Tamassee last August and see the finished project of the Kansas Society and my heart swelled with pride when I saw and realized what these seats would mean to those children, their parents and friends when they gathered in this wonderful building.

Molly Foster Berry chapter of Ft. Scott reported the Sarah, Rose and Ann Allen estate of \$28,602.98 in cash and securities had been transferred to Tamassee as a Memorial Fund for the education of under-privileged children. This chapter also reported the purchase of a Memorial Acre of \$40.00 at Tamassee.

Cash donations to all Approved Schools amounted to \$30,685.28. Gifts of clothing to all schools of 95 boxes, value \$2,048.55 Scholarships amounted to \$927.50.

Total gifts, donations and scholarships amounted to \$33633.83. One chapter reported the sale of handcraft from schools, \$138.08.

Some chapters reported sponsoring projects which prohibited them from making contributions this year.

Christmas gift packages and dormitory gifts were sent by several chapters.

The National Chairman states there will be no new projects this year in which the chapters will be asked to participate and she thought the donations would reach an all time high of \$200,000.00.

The schools show great improvement and progress from these increased contributions.

Kate Duncan Smith School is badly in need of Campus lighting which will cost a total of \$1500.00 and they are hopeful.

The schools appreciate your clothing and depend on it, so if possible continue this project in your chapter.

Chapter Chairman in your reports please do not include the Indian Schools and St. Francis Boys 'Home as those reports should be sent to the State Chairman of American Indians and Conservation and St. Francis Boys' Home. Consult your chart of the 13 National Approved Schools sent you from the National Society.

Thanks for your cooperation and generous gifts. Let us continue the work and plans of our Society, together we will build for the future, and keep "America in Our Hearts."

BUILDING COMPLETION FUND Mrs. A. L. Comstock, State Chairman

BUILDING FUND. There has been a good many contributions made to the Building Completion Fund since the report given at the State Meeting in Hutchinson. You will find the Treasurer's report in this book which shows the gifts from each chapter to the time of the annual audit. A number of gifts were sent in between the audit and the National Continental Congress. During that meeting gifts and pledges were made but the exact amount is not known.

Just before Continental Congress after carefully going over the accounts and balances in the various funds and estimating the budget needs for the coming year it was decided that 25ϕ per capita could be spared from the General Fund for the Building Fund. The State Treasurer made the distribution and each chapter was credited with the amount according to its membership. The total was \$794.75. This money was used to cover a marker in the Kansas Room at National Headquarters for the three Honorary State Regents who had not been honored heretofore. With this marker honoring Miss Catherine Campbell, Miss Marion Seelye and Mrs. Alexander J. Berger, of \$200.00 each, all Honorary State Regents of Kansas and the present Regent have been honored by the state. The last marker was placed on the door connecting the Kansas Room with the room on the east.

Kansas has now given over \$7.00 per capita to the Building Fund. It has earned a Blue Star which has been placed on the Gold Badge and there is a small balance toward the second Blue Star. Kansas Daughters have every right to be proud of this achievement.

STATE BY-LAWS COMMITTEE Miss Stella B. Haines, Chairman

Notices were sent to all chapters that recommendations for changes in the By-Laws must be sent to the State By-Laws Committee, who shall submit them to the State Conference. Such suggested changes shall be sent to all chapters sixty days before the annual State Conference.

CONSULTING GENEALOGIST

This has been a busy year for your State Consulting Genealogist. Early in September, cards were sent each chapter, outlining the help offered in proving eligibility for prospective members. Many queries were received and a total of sixty-two letters and forty-six cards have been written giving date or suggestions for research, to twentyeight chapters.

It is impossible to state how many claims were accepted on this data, but we do know that six lineages, previously rejected by the Registrar, have been cleared and the ancestors service approved. It was a real pleasure to have a part in establishing service for three Revolutionary Patriots, never before submitted as eligibity for membership in the National Society.

I believe that chapter interest in Genealogy is increasing for this year members other than chapter registrars have written expressing a desire to learn more about methods of research, that they might help prospective members for their chapters.

The Kansas D.A.R. State Library contains excellent material for research and I wish to thank the State Librarian, Mrs. Pinegar for her courtesy and promptness in extending the facilities of the Library to me, each time I requested the loan of books.

Although the purchase and placing of books does not come under this office, I wish to mention the splendid additions, the Wichita Chapters and members have made to the Wichita Public Library, during the last two years. I commend this as a project for all Kansas Chapters, and urge you to collect family records, Genealogies, County Histories and all books with Genealogical value and place them in your local libraries. This is most practical way to help im adding to Kansas Membership, for it puts within reach the data needed and often saves much time and effort.

During the past year, I have given programs on Genealogy for five chapters, and spoke briefly and answered queries at the Southwest District meeting at Dodge City.

I trust that you will call on me whenever I can serve you.

CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG

A letter was sent to each chapter in September giving an outline of the work of our committee for the coming year, urging the chapters to promote knowledge of the history of the Flag and Flag Code, and to know the occasion on which to display it. We also want each member to own a Flag and to cooperate with the Merchants in the town in having patriotic displays in their windows.

Cards were sent out urging that members display their Flags on Flag Day and July 4th, and to contact ten friends to do the same.

I have had reports from only twenty chapters this year, but each reported the use of the correct Flag salute, and singing the National Anthem at each meeting. All chapters report that Flag Day is celebrated by having picnics for the families and friends, luncheons with programs about the Flag or some special meeting.

The John Haupt chapter balked twenty cup cakes, decorated with small flags for the Winter Veterans Hospital in Topeka, besides having a luncheon meeting with a Flag program.

Many chapters have given Flag Codes to schools, libraries, Scout troops, etc. Other chapters have attended Naturalization ceremonics presenting each new citizen with a small flag. One chapter entertained for the War Brides in their town. Several flags have been given to schools; and Essay Contests about our Flag have been sponsored by several chapters.

Questionnaires were not sent out this year but a report was requested from each chapter. We know that more work is done by chapters than is ever reported so please make an effort to have a full report in the hands of your chairman next year.

GOOD CTIZENSHIP PILGRIMAGE COMMITTEE (Mrs. W. A.) Maude B. Gore Chairman

As State Chairman of the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage Committee it gives me great pleasure to submit the following report:

. The seventeenth annual contest closed December 15. 1951. This activity comprises the major part of the work of this department,

Early in Soptember lettors of imformation and the rules of the contest were sent by district chairmen to the principals of the 623 qualified high schools in Kansas. The State superintendent of Public Instruction had at an early date complied with our request that he include this information in his first Bulletin to School principals.

Your chairman sent letters of instruction and rules to each D.A.R. chapter so all were fully informed and urged to participate in the contest. 13 questionnaires were submitted to the judges, a gain of 17 over last year.

Entrants in the contest are senior girls from accredited four year high schools. The rules state that three girls are to be chosen from the senior class, by their classmates. From these three, one is chosen by the faculty who best exemplifies the qualities of a good citizen which are Dependibility, Service, Leadership, and Patriotism.

When the girl has been chosen the school principal requests a questionnaire from the district chairman. This the girls fill out in a school room without previous knowledge of its contents.

The questionnaires without names are judged in each district. The three highest are sent to the State chairman and from these 12 questionnaires the State judges select the State Good Citizen.

Miss Sara Diebert of Irving High School Irving, Kansas, has been chosen the State Good Citizen for 1952. She is from the Northeast District of which Mrs. R. W. Pearson, regent elect of James Ross chapter, Kansas City is the District chairman.

Miss Diebert will receive a 100 dollar bond, a good Citizenship pin, and a Certificate of award from the National Society D.A.R.

The second righest place is awarded to Miss Carol Wells of Winfield which is in the Southeast district. Mrs. Earl Guy of ElDorado is chairman of this district.

Third place honors go to Miss Norma Jean Braaf of Harper, Kansas, in the Southwest district of which Mrs. E. J. Taggart is chairman.

Mrs George Kreeck of Clay Center is chairman of the Northwest district which has the distinction of sending in the most questionnaires 44 in all. It would be fine if each district sent that many.

Your chairman is very grateful to these four very fine and efficient chairmen.

Mrs. R. W. Pearson, James Ross chapter, Kansas City, Northeast district, Mrs. E. J. Taggart, Wellington chapter, Southwest district, Mrs. George Kreeck, Nathan Edson chapter, Clay Center, Northwest district, Mrs. Earl Guy, Susannah French Putney chapter, ElDorado, Southeast district.

Each girl who enters the contest receives a certificate of award from the National Society.

Thirty-three D.A.R. chapters are giving Good Citizenship pins to the girls sponsored by their chapters. In addition some chapters give cash awards. A number of chapters have a special place on their program at which time they honor their Good Citizen. Other chapters make their awards at Senior chapel, usually in May, when other patriotic organization award prizes and honors to senior students.

The interest and assistance of our State Regent Mrs. von der Heiden, my four district chairmen, the regent elect of Henry Dawson chapter Mrs. T. T. Bukey, who has so willingly assisted in this work during the crisis and the interest and cooperation of all chapter Regents, and chapter chairmen of G.C.P. has made this year a good year. My sincere thanks to all of you.

Your Chairman of Insignia is happy to submit the following report:

Many letters have come to this department requesting information on D.A.R. Insignia and its use. After consulting the National chairman, these have been answered as follows:

"The Insignia of the N.S.D.A.R. consists of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff, surrounded by 13 stars representing the original 13 colonies. There is the official insignia and two recognization pins, minature of the official insignia. These may be worn with or without the official blue and white ribbon. Ancestral bars, chapter bars, chapter regent bars and ex-chapter regent bars may be added on the ribbon. The insignia is to be worn on the left breast above any other badge worn.'

The insignia should be accorded a place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs yearbooks and conference reports. It should be placed at the top center, or upper left hand corner without any wording whatsoever. There are markers with insignia available for deceased members. The Junior membership is allowed to use the D.A.R. insignia for printing purposes on stationery to be sold to D.A.R. members.

Postal cards were sent to each Chapter in the state to learn how many pins had been purchased during the past year; in 17 chapters . reporting 15 members had purchased recognition pins.

Every D.A.R. member is urged to wear the recognition pin, not only to Chapter meetings, but elsewhere. Often it is of great service to strangers in a new home or in the city. Wear it proudly, conforming with the dignity and importance of the National Society which it represents.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS COMMITTEE

Early in October, 1951, letters were sent to sixteen chapter regents who did not have chairman J.A.C., urging them to appoint came, and enclosed was a copy of the general letter to chapter chairmen.

Phebe Dustin, Mrs. C. L. Moody, teacher at Agra, 60 members in 7th and 8th grades.

Smoky Hill, Miss Lola Gebhardt, chairman, 116 members, 4 to 12 years of age, meeting three times each week for ten weeks.

Olathe, Mrs. Harry Buchholtz, chairman, 131 members, including 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th grades, some meeting each week, others once or twice each month, with thirty minute sessions. These clubs present a program for the D.A.R. chapter each year, and at the close of this program, the children are shown an historical film.

Mary Wade Strother, Mrs. Roy Garrigues, chairman, 9 clubs with 289 members, 4th to 8th grades, meeting each week for thirty minutes. The principal and 6th grade teacher of one school in Salina, requested six pins for the club presidents. The clubs re-elect officers each six weeks, for Parliamentary Procedure, and the out-going president always wants to keep his pin.

Martha Vail, Mrs. Riley MacGregor, chairman, 43 clubs, with 1219 members, meeting each month for thirty minutes. All elementary, city and rural school children in Barber County are members.

MOTION PICTURES

Sixty-two letters, questionnaires, list of available historical films for programs and list of the films recommended as best suited for children were sent out last fall. Also included was the request that each chapter vote for the film they deemed the finest for children and a list of the requirements by which the firm was to be judged. The result was overwhelming. Two chapters voted it was a tie.

A few chapters give moving picture reports at regular meetings and use the D.A.R. guide; or articles from the D.A.R. Magazine.

A number of chapters have used the Special Patriotic Pictures our society recommends and have urged the teachers to use them. They are excellent. Why not use them often?

The theatre magazines in several cities provide special programs for children and some are using films from the "Children's Film Library."

The Motion Picture Guide is being subscribed for by many chapters.

One chapter reported that motion picture appreciation courses have been established in the schools. Hats off to that town.

Daughters of the American Revolution

No chapter has reported the detection of communist propaganda in pictures which is strange when the list of actors, actresses, producers, writers, and directors who are active in the cause of communism, who belong to many of the organizations, is as long as your arm.

The better communists they are the better the parts they procure and the more pictures they make. They have already poured, thousands of dollars into the coffers of the party. They defy our courts and everytime we go to one of their pictures we are helping their cause.

Some of the movie stars who are fighting communism in Hollywood are either being left out of pictures entirely or have been warned to stop their anti-communistic activities.

A boycotting of any picture that has a communist connected with it in any way might prove an effective way of coping with the situation. It is a serious problem and we need to be informed and thinking of ways to combat their pernicious influence.

NATIONAL DEFENSE COMMITTEE Miss Maude Skinner, Chairman

Kansas is 100% in Chapter representation of Chapter Chairmen in National Defense. 34 chapters, or 54.8%, have submitted reports, a representative cross-section of the D.A.R. Chapters in Kansas. Their activities are as follows:

PATRIOTIC EDUCATION

Holidays Observed (number of time)—Flag Day, 19; Washington's birthday 19; Constitution Day 10; Christmas 4; Columbus Day 3; Fourth of July 2; Decoration Day 2 all National Holidays 2; Lincoln's Birthday 2; Armistice Day 2; Thanksgiving 1; Kansas Day 1; New Year's 1.

Cooperation with Schools—5 chapters stressed education on Good Citizenship Medal qualifications; 4 chapters reported a review of text-books; 16 chapters presented Good Citizenship Medals. Eunice Sterling (Wichita) distributed 100 Good Citizenship Medal posters in one district and literature on Good Citizenship was displayed in teacher's lounge at one school.

Number of Chapter Programs presentel:——Constitution 18; Dangers of Socialism 17; Dangers, Federal Aid to Education 16; Dangers, Socialized Medicine 10; Dangers, relaxing Immigration Laws 12; Dangers, Communism 19; Dangers, World Government 25; Dangers, International Treaties 12; Dangers Genocide Treaty 15; Dangers, Declaration of Human Rights 11.

Abilene Chapter (Abilene)—The Chapter Chairman of National Defense presented "a full program on the war situation today, with emphacic on the European situation and the cold war with Russia all over the world, especially Asia." Talk will be repeated in Enterprise, Kansas in March.

Oceanus Hopkins Chapter (Pittsburg) The City Manager, Pittsburg, gave an address to the chapter on "Civil Defense."

COMMUNITY COOPERATION

Number of chapters which cooperated with the following groups to inform Americans of the dangers imminent to our Constitutional Republic:——Patriotic 13; Civic 12; Study 11; Youth 5; Church 6; Forums 2; (*) Other Contacts, Red Cross 1; Blood Bank 1.

(*) Isabella Weldin Chapter (Augusta) gave a framed copy of the "Bill of Rights" to the Augusta Historical Society.

Eunice Sterling (Wichita) Chapter Chairman distributed literature to Naturalization groups, especially for class receiving citizenship papers on Constitution Day; to Boy Scouts; and to school children.

Chapters contacting local Civil Defense Councils concerning local Civil Defense needs: 8 chapters.

NATIONAL RESOLUTIONS, D.A.R.

Twenty-five chapters reported the Resolutions of the 1951 Continental Congress were personally read and explained by either the Regent or Chairman of National Defense. Several chapters indicated "not all but several of them" were read.

Topics discussed by 4 chapters recommending resolutions for consideration by the 1952 Continental Congress:

1. Changing our Constitution so Treaties would not take precedent over the former.

2. To stop use of subversive text-books in our schools.

- 3. Dangers, Federal Aid Education.
- 4. Dangers, Socialized Medicine.

LEGISLATION

State——Six chapters reported contact with state legislature on pending bills.

National-Nine chapters through their members, reported contact with National Legislators concerning pending bills related to subjects covered by our National Resolutions. Subject of contacts-Socialism 1; World Government 3; Socialized Medicine 1; U.M.T. 3; Subsidies 1; Communism 2; Atlantic Union 1; Immigration 1; Genocide Treaty 2; Vatican Representative 1.

Letters and Telegrams—Seventy-five letters and several telegrams were sent to National Legislators. Most active chapters were: Baxter Springs, Susannah French Putney, Eunice Sterling, Wellington.

Registered to Vote—Twenty-nine chapter chairman indicated they are registered to vote in primary and all elections.

Percent of chapter members voting in last election—100% 19; 95% 2; 90% 3; 60% 1; 50% 1. (numbers indicate chapters with per cent).

MOST IMPORTANT NATIONAL DEFENSE PROJECT OF YEAR Abilene (Abilene)—"I think the month by month information given by the chairman is worth far more than just one big talk. It teaches the members what to watch for, how to evaluate what's happening in our government, how to keep our eyes open".

Susannah French Putney (El Dorado)—"Regent's active interest and contact with Kansas National and State leaders."

Atchison (Atchison) First to vote in all elections. To make known our approval or disapproval of pending bills of legislation, locally, at least. To uphold our American Way of Life. To have many programs of a patriotic nature."

Baxter Springs (Baxter Springs)——"Circulating data received to public speakers."

Betty Washington (Lawrence)—"Working against Socialized Medicine and disloyalty in our schools creeping in from different sources to our children."

Dodge City (Dodge City)—"Several talks on Crusade for Freedom."

Eunice Sterling (Wichita)—"The National Defense Council formed by five D.A.R. chapters is proving very helpful to National Defense chairmen. Have had discussion on Genocide Treaty, North Atlantic Pact Treaty, Atlantic Union, Immigration and next subject will be Education. Donations from a members Chapter funds voted, and some personal contributions. probably \$35.00 to \$40.00, has been spent on material relative to National Defense."

Fort Larned (Larned)—"We invited all the displaced persons in our county to a meeting and a High School teacher gave a talk on the Manual for Citizenship and answered questions."

Good suggestion by chairman, Abilene chapter—"I give five minute talk each time and distribute the material sent by the National Chairman and Executive Secretary which I do not have time to cover. The members keep it rotating.

SUGGESTIONS BY CHAPTER CHAIRMEN

Dana (Columbus) "Think this Committe could be divided under two heads."

Abilene (Abilene)—"A list of recent magazine articles on the material sent out each month would be helpful to a conscientious local chairman. She could suggest them to the members for further information. I have accidently stumbled onto some which have been wonderful. A review of some make wonderful talks at chapter meetings."

IS NATIONAL DEFENSE MAILING IMPORTANT TO CHAPTER CHAIRMEN

Twenty-five chapter chairmen answered "yes." Comments—"most helpful" "Very useful."

ACTIVITIES OF STATE CHAIRMAN

Correspondence—76 postals, 39 letters, 15 packages of material mailed to chapters. Correspondence has included all Chapter Regents and Chapter Chairmen of National Defense; the State Regent; National Defense Office, N.S. D.A.R.; Congressmen on issues of National Defense; and other individuals relative to furthering the work of our Committee.

SPECIAL NATIONAL DEFENSE PROJECTS IN KANSAS

1. A National Defense Council was organized in July, 1951 by the five chapters in Wichita: Eunice Sterling; Martha Loving Ferrell; Minisa; Randolph Loving; Wichita. Mrs. William Louis Ainsworth, Vice President General, was the organizing Chairman. The officers are: Mrs. Henry Sumpter, Chairman; Mrs. Thor Jager, Vice Chairman; Mrs. Dwight Oxley, Secretary. The Council is composed of the Regents, the National Defense Chairmen, and the Flag Chairmen from the five Wichita Chapters. A regular meeting is held each month and any Chapter member interested may attend. The Council Chairman reports that the study and discussions are "interesting and

stimulating" and proving worthwhile to all the Wichita Chapters. Your State Chairman made the original suggestion for this organization, is cooperating with the Council in their work, and recommends that other Chapters organize National Defense Councils.

2. Research Library. From the special National Defense Fund created last year by donations from Peleg Gorton (Winfield); Minisa (Wichita); and Martha Loving Ferrell (Wichita) your State Chairman is building a Research Library for reference and study to advance the work of National Defense in Kansas. Chapters are arged to use this service and write for information.

3. National Defense Bulletin Board. Approximately 50 pamphlets and bulletins from the National Defense Office, N.S.D.A.R. have been posted on the Bulletin Board in the Pittsburg Public Library during the past year by your State Chairman. This project is recommended to other Chapters in the State.

Material for State Conference. Considerable National Defense material was obtained for distribution to the delegates at the State Conference, Hutchinson.

With appreciation to all those who have assisted in the work of the National Defense Committee during the past year, this report is respectfully submitted by your State Chairman, National Defense.

Your Chapter meetings, District Conferences prove your knowledge of Parliamentary procedure.

Every leader must be well informed on Parliamentary law, know your National and State Constitution and By-Laws and our Chapter By-Laws, for successful meetings.

Parliamentary procedure is a means of expressing cooperation. All Parliamentary rules will be found to embody the following principals, Justice to all; Courtesy to all; One thing at a time, The rule of every organized Chapter.

Recorded laws are vital and important, they are the foundation of every organized chapter. Chapter Officers and members should know the extent of their authority and power and that individual Chapters have in adopting rules for their own government is indespensible.

Chapters should realize the scope and character of the National Society as well as the program instituted by the State Regent during her administration.

Your Parliamentarian has assisted the State Regent when requested. It has been a pleasure to confer with State Chapters and members and she desires all chapters to study Parliamentary Law (Roberts Rules Revised) and observe the ethics of Parliamentary procedure in Chapter meetings.

She calls your attention to page 122 to 128 inclusive of the eighth Edition of the Hand Book July 1951 for study.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE

(Mrs. G. D.) Helen L. Weilepp, State Chairman

The theme of the Program Outline for 1951-1952 was "America in Our Hearts." As soon as the outline was received from our National Program Chairman, Mrs. Leroy Hussey, it was mailed to the program chairman or regent of each Kansas D.A.R. chapter. Some chapters received it too late to use as their programs had already been printed but those chapters using the National theme report very interesting programs. In January a request was sent to all chapters for a report of the year's programs; from those reports and yearbooks received a good Kansas report was sent to National.

ADVANCEMENT OF AMERICAN MUSIC

The State Chairman wishes to say that, in her opinion, Kansas is not doing the fine job in this field that Kansas is capable of doing.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Your committee on Resolutions desire to submit its report to the 54th State Conference at this time:

We recommend that the Fifty-fourth State Conference D.A.R. do at this session ratify the splendid resolutions adopted by the Sixtieth Continental Congress D.A.R. in April 1951, at Washington, D.C.; and your committee is desirous to repeat and emphasize a number of those resolutions by incorporating them wholly or in part into like resolutions for the Kansas Society.

Therefore the Prologue to our resolutions is adapted directly from our National Society:

1. REDEDICATION—Whereas, the socialist threat and communistic dangers to our Republic become, day by day, and, month by month, more ominous, and

Whereas, our Society's fundamental principles are more sorely needed today than ever before for Home and Country,

Resolved, that we, the D.A.R. at this critical time in World History rededicate ourselves in emulation of the spirit and service of our forefathers and of the Founding Fathers of our Republic, reconsecrating our utmost effort to the perpetuation of their courage,

sacrifice, devotion to duty, love of country and religious faith "So that this nation under God, shall have a new birth of Freedom and that Government of the People, by the People, for the People shall not perish from the earth."

KANSAS SOCIETY'S RESOLUTIONS

I. FOURTH OF JULY—Whereas, the year 1952 becomes the 175th anniversary of our national independence.

Resolved, that our society's rededication be expressed by a renewed effort in every community for appropriate patriotic observance of the day and that the Stars and Stripes shall fly at the home of every member of our society as well as usual in all public places and on the streets of our towns, and we urge that all homes either rural or urban display the Flag of The United States of America.

II. THE FLAG—(a) No other Flag to Supercede the Stars and Stripes.

Whereas, The flag of the United States of America is a symbol of our National Sovereignty and the unity of our nation, and

Whereas, there continues public misunderstanding and circumstance and place where the United Nations flag may properly be flown, and

Whereas, such circumstances and place for the use of the U.N. Flag is only over United Nations properties and soil, and only over enterprises of the United Nations on equal prominence with the flags of all or many nations in some public pagent or celebration, and

Whereas, misguided effort has been, and continues being, made to exhibit the flag of U. N. in positions of honor on United States soil;

Resolved, that Kansas Society D.A.R. calls to the attention of our Kansas Representatives and Senators in The Congress that our National Society D.A.R. has petitioned The Congress of the United States of America to pass legislation, and to provide for enforcement of a flat law which prohibits any other national or international flag being displayed over or in place of the Flag of the United States of America on U. S. Soil.

(b) LAW FOR PROTECTION OF THE FLAG—Whereas, the Flag of the United States of America has no protection by federal law against desecration and mutilation, and

Whereas, there have been introduced into Congress House Bill 1333 and Senate Bill 555 for the protection of the United States Flag from mutilation, desecrations, mercenary exploitation with penalities for violation of such laws,

Resolved, that Kansas Society D.A.R. call attention of our Kansas Congressmen to these bills still in Committee and urge them to help bring these bills to a speedy enactment, and

Resolved, That a Copy of this Resolution be sent to our Kansas members of Congress and to the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee in the Congress.

(c) FLAG ON GRAVES—Resolved that Kansas Society D.A.R. urge our state congressmen that through proper channels of the Government, they urge that the Flag of the United States of America be flown over the last resting place of the United States Military personnel buried in Korea, as a sacred symbol of those ideals for which these men died.

(a) POSITION OF THE FLAG AT MEETINGS—From National Society Daughters of the American Revolution comes a proposed emphasis in Flag Code Etiquette for the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Whereas, much confusion has arisen over the interpretation of the flag code as to the correct placing of the United States Flag.

Resolved, that at all meetings of the D.A.R. either social or business, the United States Flag always be placed to the right of the presiding officer. (Effective immediately)

III. WORLD GOVERNMENT Whereas there have arisen in the country a great many proponents of World Government or Partial World Government, including many prominent and influential persons (some of whom hold high positions in our U. S. Government) all this with the result that there are well organized movements under varied titles to further a World Government, and

Whereas, there are now some thirty and more groups in addition to student bodies in school and college all of whom through speakers written and printed material, discussion groups, and forums for young and old, are successfully propagandizing uniformed and well meaning American citizens who will follow an eloquent leader to the alluring bait of benevolence, humanitarianism, and peace, and

Whereas, by such universal federation the United States of America, would relinquish its sovereign rights and further on the basis of proportional representation, it would minority voting power,

 Resolved, That the Fifty-fourth State Conference of Kansas Society D.A.R. reassert its stand as opposed to World Government or Partial World Government, and

Resolved, that the Kansas Society D.A.R. reaffirm its unaltered nations banded together for international negotiation and arbitration to conciliate misunderstandings between neighbor nations and for mutual exchange of friendly offices in every area of human relations —but

Resolved, that the Kansas Society D.A.R. reaffirm its unaltered stand, That our U.S.A. retain its complete independence and sovreignty and express its unchanged opposition to any super-government which our U. S. achievements can be dissolved and lost to both ourselves and to other aspiring nations who might better be lifted up by our example of a successful, nation of free people in a Republic of Free States.

IV. TREATIES-Whereas Article VI paragraph 2 of our U. S. Constitution says "All treaties made or which shall be made under the authority of the United States shall be the supreme law of the land and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the Constitution or laws of any state to the contrary not with standing, and

Whereas, the United Nations Treaty on Human Rights—and the Genocide Convention in several ways and by a number of statements would abrogate various rights of American Citizens including several privileges safe guarded by our Constitutional Bill of Rights, including trial rights, and freedom of the press, and

Whereas, the legislature of 23 states in our Republic, lured by the Humbar resolution, declared themselves in favor of a World Government under the U. N., and

Whereas, the states, one by one, have found U. N. Treaties to be in direct conflict with provisions of their own State Constitutions, to the end that 17 of the 23 legislaturers have rescinded their previous acclaim, and

Whereas, there is now pending in Congress S. J. Resolution No. 102 which would prohibit treaties becoming "law of the land" except by ammendment of the United State Constitution,

Resolved, that the Kansas Society D.A.R. unreservedly supports S. J. Res. 102, and

Resolved, that Kansas Society D.A.R. lose no time in action, but wire our Kansas Senators today as the expression of our Society's stand that we urge them to support S. J. Resolution 177—opposing the adoption of the Covenant of Human Rights, and the Genocide Convention.

Daughters of the American Revolution

V.——DUTIES OF CONGRESS AND RIGHT TO DECLARE WAR—Whereas, the United States Constitution delegates to each of the three branches of our Government its distinct privileges and duties, and

Whereas, the right to declare war belongs solely to the Congress,

Resolved, that Kansas Society D.A.R. through letters to our representation in the Congress urge that Congress reclaim and exercise its several and sole rights and duties and to defend those rights against every encroachment by any other branches of Government whether elected, appointed or by created "Bureaus", "Divisions" or "Authorities."

VI. OUR AMERICAN YOUTH—(a) Education—Opposing Teaching "World Citizenship"

Whereas, the teaching of "World Citizenship" in our public schools is being promoted by various groups, and

Whereas, "World Citizenship" presupposes a "World Government" which would destroy our national sovereignty and constitutional liberties and

Whereas, the teaching of "World Citizenship" in our schools can subvert the loyalties of our young people from the government of the United States of America and condition them to accept citizenship in a "World Government" therefore,

Resolved, that the Kansas Society D.A.R. go on record as opposing the teaching of this Un-American doctrine of "World Citizenship" in our public schools; and

Resolved that the Kansas Society, D.A.R. recommend that our text-books be carefully examined and that all text-books in American History, Civic, and /or the Social Studies, spreading this form of teaching, be banned by the State Board of Education of Kansas; and

Resolved, that History which is offered in the curriculum of our Kansas schools be emphasized as a subject actually to be taught to our children rather than left "to discretion of the teacher"—and that administrators and supervisors of schools see to it that the subject be given force of Truth about our nations birth, and accomplishments, and ideals, so that our children may come through with a patriotic understandng and love of the free land in which they are privileged to be citizens.

(b) UNESCO—Whereas, under the approval of UNESCO there has been prepared and published a series of Books entitled "Toward. World Understanding" which arc intended to provide teachers with 1

guidance in the art of instructing our young Americans in the practice of World Citizenship; and

Whereas, we are all aware that the proved method of dictator nations has been to reeducate and subvert the youth from family loyalties and teachings toward a designed usefulness to the Supreme State; and

Whereas, UNESCO already is an accepted division of our United States State Department, explained and propagandized by pamphlets published by the United States Department of State and paid for by government funds,

Resolved, that Kansas Society D.A.R. do protest these un-American activities and protest the use of tax money for the furtherance of such subversive activities.

(c) LANGUAGE EDUCATION—hereas, Large number of young people coming from our schools today exhibit a dearth of knowledge of fundamentals in the employment of the English Language and many have had no education in any language other than their own and, therefore have limited understanding of the sources of our English language, which lack of fundamental knowledge, is exhibited in daily individuals convorce as well as in the columns of many papers.

Resolved, that Kansas Society D.A.R. go on record in this 54th Annual State Conference as in favor of more and better opportunities for written self-expression in all our primary and secondary schools, and

Whereas, a wider knowledge of other languages tends not only to enrich our own but makes for better understanding with our neighbor countries,

Resolved, that our Society recommend to our State Committee on school curriculum that the Spanish language be offered in all our High Schools and Colleges in order to further understanding between our Latin American neighbors and ourselves: and further

Resolved that is is the belief of our Society that fluency in at least two foreign languages should be required in the curriculum of all college students preparing for diplomatic careers; and that fluency in the language of the country to which an envoy is accredited be one of the measures of his ability for the past, and

Resolved that copies of these resolutions be sent to The Governor of Kansas, the State Superintendent of public instruction, the State Text Book Commission and The State Board of Regents. (d) NARCOTICS—Whereas, In view of information given out by the press concerning the growing use of narcotics everywhere and in view of the alarming reports concerning the distribution of narcotics to school youth

Resolved, that our society strongly recommend to our state and national law making bodies more stringent laws, and heavier punishments for all who illegally traffic in narcotic drugs.

(c) Whereas, We are all co deeply concerned that our youth shall be educated in the inspiring story of our beloved land, in the lives of its patriots, and the founding of its its government; and that they shall be embued with natural patriotism that arises in the soul of a citizen for his home country and for his own flag, and

Whereas, there is no other place nor organization in which our children may be so safely trained and inspired as in our own sponsorody organization of Children of The American Revolution.

Resolved, that we urge D.A.R. chapters or chapter members to sponsor C.A.R. organization wherever possible.

VII. IMMIGRATION—Whereas, there exists by virtue of benevolent impulses on the part of some—and more questionable reasons on the part of others—an increasing pressure on our Congress to let down more of the bars to immigration.

Resolved, that the immigration laws be strictly enforced and that the quotas remain, as status quo, and

Resolved, that resident aliens and displaced persons who do not take steps to become naturalized citizens within the legal or a reasonable period of time be deported and denied the privilege of return.

VIII. RECAPITULATION—The Kansas Society of D.A.R. in their Fifty-fourth State Conference does again as they have through a number of years past, declare its position as:

(A)—Opposed:

1. To the continued and increasing eneroachment of Government into business and the many controls over private enterprise, and

The Society declares its opposition

2. To Federal aid and control of Education,

3. To the use of public funds for private schools;

4. To socialized or State Administered Medical Services;

5. To sending American troops into undeclared wars or to sending troops to any war except by act of Congress.

The Kansas Society D.A.R. does at this Conference again declare

(B) its approval and commendation for

1. The safeguards afforded our country and its citizens by the capable labors of Mr. J. Edgar Hoover and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and

2. For those men of integrity in congressional committees who have exposed subsersive group and individuals in our midst and for the exposure of crime and graft across our land in government and private enterprise, and we urge Congress that such committees be continued and supported in their investigations.

IX. CIVIL DEFENSE—This Resolution from Oceanus Hopkins Chapter might be used as a criterion for other chapters when and where useful.

Copy of Resolution passed by Oceanus Hopkins Chapter, D.A.R. Pittsburg, Kansas, May 21, 1951.

Whereas, Co-operation with the Civil Defense Program has been placed under the National Defense Committee, D.A.R., by our Nationaal Society, and

Whereas, Our President General and National Defense Chairman, N.S.D.A.R. has urged Chapter cooperation with local Civil Defense Programs in these critical times.

Resolved that the Oceanus Hopkins Chapter D.A.R., Pittsburg, Kansas extend to the City Manager of Pittsburg, Mr. William Hanson, and the City Civil Defense Committee its cooperation and patriotic support.

X. THE FRANCHISE—Whereas, the truth is that citizens of other free nations seem to exercise their right of franchise in far greater proportion than do the citizens of our own U.S.A. and

Whereas, It is a well known fact that our state and national legislators and officers step into their high offices by the votes of only a minority of the people who have a Constitutional right to vote and thus to govern, and

Whereas, Women in these U.S. have attained to the highest social, educational, and political privileges accorded women anywhere in the world, and

Whereas, We as Daughters of patriots who risked and sacrificed fortunes and lives that we might live under the greatest, free Constitutional government yet devised by man, . Resolved, by Kansas Society D.A.R. that we shall concern ourselves with using the suffrage accorded us, at every level of government in our state, and

Resolving, that from precinct meetings, through county and district conferences, at primary elections and at general elections, in whatever party we may choose to belong our vote shall be cast in an effort to see to it that those who represent us shall be informed persons of high integrity and inalienable loyalty to God and Home and Nativeland.

"There is a weapon that comes down as still As snowflakes fall upon the sod, But executes a free man's will As lightning does the will of God, And from its force no doors nor locks Can shield you—'Tis the ballot box."

There was a gift of \$25.00 from Mrs. Ainsworth sent to state conference and a number of contributions were given at Continental Congress also a number of pledges. The State Regent pledged \$500.00 from Kansas for 1953. The balance needed for Construction on April 19, 1952 was \$53,840.85. Total Pledges and cash contributed during Continental Congress amounted to \$14,876.17. The Natches Garden Party (Mississippi) netted \$1,250.00 and the C.A.R. gave 2000.00 for the Frieze in the Bell Tower.

The State Regent believes Kansas will help to retire the Valley Forge Bell Tower debt during the coming year and will not find it too big a task to accomplish.

Dodge City, Kansas, October 31, 1951

The Southwest District Conference of the Daughters of The American Revolution was held in Dodge City, Kansas, Wednesday, October 31, at the American Legion Club, following the State meeting held Tuesday.

The State Meeting Climaxed Tuesday night with a lovely banquet served to a large delegation and guests who enjoyed several vocal numbers by Mrs. Kathryn Isley McGuire, and a lecture by Franc and Jean Shor, relating some of their experiences in the near East and Asia, where they spent the last three years gathering material for magazine articles. Unaware of the fact when she accomplished the feat, Mrs. Shor holds the women's high altitude record.

Wednesday morning, before the most of the dolegation arrived at the Legion Hall, the snow was falling. It was a cold, snappy morning, and as the guests entered the hall, they were greeted by the welcome aroma of coffee, which was served by the Dodge City ladies with breakfast rolls.

Mrs. Roy Buckingham and Mrs. Henry Grose of Dodge City registered the guests as they arrived. Several picture were taken of officers of the D.A.R. and Chairmen of State and District Committees before the meeting was called to order by the district director, Mrs. Victor Durr of Jetmore, Mrs. Durr presided, assisted by Mrs. Wm. H. von der Heiden, State Regent. A ritualistic ceremony opened the session with Mrs. Mantor Bock of St. John, Chairman of Junior Membership, in charge, followed by the singing of the Star Spangled Banner.

The guests were welcomed by Mrs. Guy D. Josserand of the Dodge City Chapter and a very gracious response was given by Mrs. J. E. McMullen of the Jeremiah Chapter, Great Bend.

Interesting reports were given by District Chapters. However, due to the inclement weather several chapters were not represented.

The District Treasurer Mrs. William C. Adamek, Minisa chapter, Wichita reported that all chapters but one had paid their dues of one dollar. She also delivered a message of regret from Mrs. R. H. Chesney, Regent of Wichita Chapter, Wichita, who was unable to attend due to an injury. Mrs. H. A. Mitchell, Wellington Chapter, State Chairman of Americanism and D.A.R. Manual urged each chapter to have at least one program on Americanism during the year. She requested that clippings concerning these programs be sent to her. She said we should interest ourselves not only in erecting historical monuments, but ondcavor to take new people to see these things and explain why they were erected. She stressed the display of flags. She told of visiting the Naturalization Court and seeing a class receive their papers as citizens of our United States. Mrs. Mitchell encourages us to spongor essays on Americanism among our young people, as they learn much in finding this material.

Mrs. A. L. Comstock, Topeka, formerly of Wichita, State Committee Chairman of the Building Fund stated that the outstanding debt at this time is three hundred thousand dollars, and suggested several means of raising money to help pay this indebtedness.

Mrs. Earl C. Moses Sr., Jeremiah Chapter, Great Bend, State President of C.A.R. expressed her appreciation of the whole hearted cooperation of Mrs. von der Heiden, a National Promoter, and others who have given their time and efforts to build up the C.A.R. The September issue of the C.A.R. magazine, containing a complete report of the State conference held June 14th in Wichita, and also a picture of our State Junior President, Sally Wayne Morrison was sent to all Chapter Regents with her compliments. Four pages of the Sunflower Special were sent out in April and September. Mrs. Moses had just returned from a well attended National Board Meeting in Wichita. Ten States were represented by their Presidents. Kansas activities compared favorably with those of other states.

There are now seventeen National Promoters, all of whom are State Promoters, as well, and in addition to these there are ten State Promoters. We have eleven Societies and nine organizing Societies.

A new Society, Wyandot, Kansas City was organized September 15th, with 13 members. Twelve sets of papers were approved for the society organizing in Dodge City. We now have 242 C.A.R. members and she suggested that when they are twenty-one an invitation should be extended to them to join D.A.R. by transfer; or S. A. R.

The Kansas State Society of S.A.R. sent \$5 to apply on printing costs of the Sunflower Special.

The National C.A.R. project this year is that C.A.R. pay for a Frieze near the top of the Memorial Room of Bell Memorial Tower at Valley Forge. It is composed of exquisite carvings of native birds and small animals on 24 stones, dedicated to 'C.A.R." members who served in World War II and the Korean conflict." The Sunflower Special is the only State project of C.A.R. Mrs. C. E. Gray, Emporia, State Committee Chairman on The Correct Use of the Flag states that we are all Americans, but dock strikes and the like are not American. She also insists that the United Nations Flag must not fly above the United States Flag.

Mrs. J. B. McKay, El Dorado, State Committee Chairman on Advancement of American Music, gave a short report.

Mrs. Guy Josserand, State Committee Chairman on Insignia, encourages the wearing of our recognition pin, not only at our D.A.R. meetings, but to wear it at all times. One who has dropped out of the D.A.R. is not eligible to wear the pin. Pins of deceased may be sold.

Mrs. Mantor Bock tells us that any girl of eighteen is eligible for D.A.R. Mrs. Bock stressed two projects: getting new members and money making schemes. She said she would be happy to advise on money making projects.

Mrs Jonathan B. Carter of Wilson, State Parliamentarian, thanked the ones in charge for a very good meeting.

Mrs. J. B. Heffelfinger of Newton, State Corresponding Secretary expressed her pleasure at receiving letters. It is both stimulating and encouraging and it shows interest. However, she stresses the importance of signing your full name and address, as well as indicating the chapter to which you belong. This eliminates the necessity of going through the files, directories and year books to identify the writer. Also state if you are Miss or Mrs.

Mrs. C. F. Eckelman, Minisa Chapter, Wichita, Consulting Genealogist of Kansas, tells us that the fee for supplementals has been raised to \$5 and is likely to be \$6 soon. She expressed deep regret that the recent floods have destroyed many records. It is well to have these things officially recorded in State record books, so that there will be duplicates of said records. She stressed that one wishing to join the D.A.R. should approach her through the Chapter inviting the prospective member. Even if one wishes to be a Member at Large this contact must be made through the local chapter. However, a Member at Large must come to the State for Signatures.

Mrs. J. E. McMullen called attention to the article on the Daughters of the American Revolution that appeared in the November issue of the National Geographic magazine.

At the close of the morning session guests enjoyed viewing the books, pictures, and the stationery on the display table. One picture taken at the Sixtieth Continental Congress in Washington, D.C., April 16th through 20th included the General McArthur family. While visiting briefly at the meeting General McArthur expressed his admiration of our society and closed by saying the world looks to our society for Patriotic Leadership.

A lovely luncheon was served at 12:30. The invocation was given by Mrs. Martin Mayrath. Mr. Gordon Day gave three vocal numbers, "The Homing Heart", "My Friend" by Malotte, and "Home On the Range" in which all joined in the chorus. Mrs. Carol Hughes accompanied on the piano. Mrs. Durr of Dodge City Chapter introduced" Mrs. R. G. Klein State Vice Regent, who introduced Mrs. von der Heiden. In turn Mrs. von der Heiden introduced Mrs. C. R. Harner, hostess regent, and the following State Officers:

The following officers were elected for the coming year: Mrs. Earl Robertson, Atchison, Director; Mrs. E. F. Sanders, Topeka, Secretary; Mrs. E. F. Huddleson, Betty Washington chapter, Lawrence, Treasurer.

Eight chapters out of eleven reported the following data: All observed Constitution Day, Flag Day, Washington's Birthday with outstanding programs and some Lincoln's Birthday, Armistice and Columbus Day. The themes for the programs are based on National Defense and Americanism. Six chapters participated in the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage and three Girl Home Makers awards. As the story of the American Flag unfolded, Mrs. Leedy asked questions and received prompt answers from the C.A.R. members. She first told the story of the Colonial Flag with its thirteen stars with her crayon then the change that occured through the many years to the present time. While Mrs. Leedy was busy with her crayon the group sang patriotic songs. The singing of the Star Spangled Banner was the thrilling close of her interesting talk as we viewed the beautiful picture of OLD GLORY in its colors of red, white and blue.

The following junior state officers were installed by Mrs. Moses who used the candle lighting service. The light of the retiring officers was extinguished as the candle of the new officer was lighted. The oath of office was administered by the state chaplain, Mrs. D. S. Jackman, Wichita. STATE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Mrs. Earl Cecil Moses, Sr. 2818 Broadway, Great Bend, Kansas April 1, 1951 to April 1, 1952

The first activity of the state president in April 1951 was attending a state executive board meeting to plan the state conference program. The State Conference was held in Wichita June 13 and 14, 1951. There was a Buffet Supper followed by a stunt program June 13 in the Walnut Room of the Lassen Hotel. The state conference was a morning and afternoon session June 14 in the 20th Century Club House. The senior president presided jointly with the Junior President, Margery Null.

In April, 1951, she attended the National C.A.R. Convention in Washington, D. C.; also, the Board Meeting, National Officers' Club Luncheon and Dinner-Dance, accompanied by the Page, Martha Milam from Great Bend.

She was the guest of Francis Scott Key Society and their mothers in Wichita June 2. Later in June, accompanied by the new junior president, Sally Wayne Morrison, and junior state program chairman, Rollin Peschka, she was the guest of Coronado and William Berryman Societies, Ashland, at a joint meeting with their sponsoring chapter, Fort Supply Trail.

They also, were guests of Rebecca Moore Odell Society, Great Bend, and reported for the National Convention.

The state president reappointed the complete roster of Senior State Chairmen. The Junior State President appointed the junior state chairmen and wrote an informative letter to each junior chairman, state officer and society president.

In October, 1951, she attended the National Board Meeting and Officers Luncheon in Washington, D.C. Eight new National Promoters have been added and thirteen new state Promoters, making a total of 17 National and 22 State Promoters.

It was a pleasure to assist with the organization of the Wyandot Society, Kansas City, September 15, 1951 with 13 members. The organization was preceded by a luncheon honoring the state president, given by Mrs. J. W. Radotinsky of James Ross chapter. Wyandot Society sent a story and picture of their organization to the C.A.R. Magazine. The Leavenworth Society, with 16 members and the Sunflower Society with 8 members have more than enough applicants to organize in the early summer. The Marias De Cygne Society, Pleasanton, and the Society being organized in Harper are nearer their goal. Most of the Societies report historical and patriotic programs at their meetings. Rebecca Moore Odell Society has sent 316 inches of publicity and pictures to the state D.A.R. reporter for her scrapbook to be entered in the National contest. Other senior presidents have also sent their publicity to her. All were asked to.

The September C.A.R. Magazine was sent to each of the 62 chapter D.A.R. Regents; they were requested to give it to the chapter promoter after reading it. The state president attended the D.A.R. Board of Management meeting in Dodge City and also, the District meeting and gave a report. She attended the state D.A.R. Conference and reported C.A.R. activities. She presided at the C.A.R. Breakfast at the Conference, March 7, 1952. Places were laid for 32. The tables were colorful with patriotic decorations. Each guest received a copy of the revised state By-Laws with the blue cover adding color to the tables. Mrs. V. E. McArthur was in charge of reservations. Mrs. Marcel Duphorne gave the devotions. Mrs. Jack Lane led the Pledge of Allegiance. Greetings were extended by the state regent, Mrs. von der Heiden. Mrs. Sherman Watson, National Chairman of Junior Membership Committee spoke briefly. She stated that "C.A.R. is the artery through which the life blood of D.A.R. membership flows." Mrs. Earl Robertson, treasurer, reported a balance of \$169.25, as of March 1, 1952. Mrs. Bertha Gabbert, Magazine chairman, reported 30 subscriptions in Kansas. Mrs. G. P. Ferrell, Museum chairman. reported cash sent in \$26.00 and also, five pieces for the Museum cases. The state president gave a summery of the work accomplished during the 28 months that she had served as state president. Mrs. Earl Robertson read a letter from the National President, Mrs. Charles Carroll Haig, reappointing Mrs. Moses state president for a term of two years. Mrs. Moses asked her state officers and state chairmen to continue to serve with her. The president's Page was Mrs. Myron C. Burr, Dodge City. The state society honored their state president by giving a \$50.00 Medical Scholarship to Tamassee an honor deeply appreciated. The quota of 15¢ per member for the Valley Forge Frieze, was paid in full and added to this a gift of \$50.00 by Rebecca Moore Odel Society, honoring the junior state president, Sally Wayne Morrison, brought the total amount given to this project, to \$95.15. Our quota was over subscribed.

Through the efforts of Mrs. G. P. Ferrell, in addition to the \$26.00, the Museum received a small Sutherland luster mug; a D.A.R. spoon of April 18, 1905, commerating the occasion of the first Congress held in Constitution Hall. A music book "The Christmas Harp" a copper luster pitcher; A Sandwich glass dish Bull's-eye pattern. Mrs. Ferrell has honored the state president of C.A.R; a grand daughter; a past National vice-president; three other grand children and two great grandchildren. Also Mrs. W. L. Ainsworth, vice-president of C.A.R. Two and one half pages of advertising were sent to the National Magazine for the January issue, 1952; one page by Coronado and William Berryman Society, Ashland, and one and one half by Rebecca Moore Odell Society, Great Bend. Four lucky girls of the John Bicknell Society Phillipsburg, had their dues paid in advance to their 18th birthdays by the sponsoring chapter. Kickapoo Corral Society, Winfield, invited the state presidents to a joint meeting with the sponsoring chapter. The invitation was greatly appreciated but a previous engagement prevented the acceptance. Two members from their society took part in the Memorial Day Services in Winfield and two members accompanied by the senior president and a D.A.R. member attended the state conference in Wichita. Kickapoo Corral now has 15 members.

The senior president of Kanza Society and others were guests of the Rebecca Moore Odell Society in September. Kanza contributed to American Indians Valley Forge Frieze and their meetings were They have 21 members. historical and patriotic. The Rebecca Moore Odell Society has had nine meetings and at each a business session followed by a social meeting. The historical and patriotic theme has been carried out in all their meetings. They received \$5.00, They were a National prize, for a radio and program skit in 1951. represented at the state conference by five delegates their senior president, and two sponsors. Contributions were made to the Valley Forge Frieze American Indian Fund, Binding of application papers, Maintenance Fund, Gadby's Tavern Fund, Kate Duncan Smith Milk Fund, Kenmore Fund, Museum Fund, Tamassee, and the Hand Book Fund. Total \$81.70, and dues for 55 members, National and state. Two members took part in Memorial Day Services.

The Senior President of Susannah Oldham sent \$5.00 to the state from S.A.R. to be applied on the Sunflower Special expense. The society with six members is sponsored by S.A.R. The latter organization paid C.A.R. Magazine subscriptions many years in advance for the Kansas Historical Society in Topeka. Their generosity is much appreciated.

Quivira society now has 19 members. Patriotic Days were observed at their meetings. Four members and the senior president served as pages at the District D.A.R. meeting. The society put out a very attractive year book. William Rittenhouse Society has been growing and now has 17 members. The Society, also, had representatives at the state conference in Wichita.

The state president's first project, "The Sunflower Special," was first issued in December 1948 with two pages. It was increased to four pages in April 1951. The September and December issues in 1951 have four pages. 3300 copies were printed of all three issues and sent to all D.A.R. members in the state and all C.A.R. personnel; also, to all state presidents and national officers.

The state president assisted with the organization of the Buffalo Society, Dodge City, March 22, 1952 with 24 members. Mrs. Carroll Hughes was organizing president. The society was confirmed April 17, 1952. Kansas now has twelve societies. Four societies in the process of organizing and seven organizing presidents.

The state society is grateful to D.A.R. for the \$60.00 received, representing 2ϕ per member. The following resolution was passed March 8 1952 at the state D.A.R. Conference: "Resolved, That we urge D.A.R. chapters or chapter members to sponsor C.A.R. organizations wherever possible and to support them in every possible way."

BY-LAWS

of the

KANSAS STATE SOCETY

of the

NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised and Adopted at the State Conference March 11, 1950

ARTICLE I.

Name .

The name of this society shall be the Kansas State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II.

Object

Section I. This Society pledges fidelity and loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the objects of which are:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary and enlightening public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Section 2. Its purpose shall be to further the above plans of the National Society and to maintain harmonious co-operation among the chapters in Kansas and to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

ARTICLE III.

Membership

Section 1. The membership of this State Society shall include all Daughters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who are members in good standing of some Chapter in Kansas.

Good standing shall be interpreted to mean that all National and State dues have been paid.

Section 2. Chapters failing to pay State dues shall not be entitled to representation at State Conference, to receive State Communications or participate in any State affairs until dues are paid to the State Society.

ARTICLE IV.

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Chaplain, State Recording Secretary, State Treasurer, State Registrar, State Historian, State Librarian, State Reporter, and State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 2. No member shall be eligible for election to any state office or appointment to any state chairmanship who has not been a member in good standing of the Kansas State Society for one year. No member shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms, and no member who has served one term in any state office, shall be eligible to election to any other state office, except that of State Regent and State Vice Regent, until the expiration of one year.

A member having served more than one-half term in any office shall be deemed to have served a term. A candidate for State Regent or State Vice-Regent must have served as an elected Chapter Regent. A candidate for any State office must have served as an elected chapter officer.

Section 3. Election of officers shall take place on the last day of the annual State Conference occuring in the year of the election of National Officers.

Election shall be by ballot, for a term of three years.

A majority of votes cast shall elect.

The terms of office of the State Regent and State Vice Regent begin at the close of the Continental Congress which confirms their

election.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected and confirmed, beginning with the year of 1950.

Provided that at the next regular election, to be held in 1948, the officers shall be elected for a two year term.

Section 4. The nominating committee shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the October State Board of Management meeting.

This elected member shall serve as chairman of the nominating committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to submit names of candidates for the state offices on the second day of the annual State Conference of election year. Nominations other than those made by the nominating committee may also be made from the floor. All candidates must have given their consent before nomination.

The nominating committee shall, immediately after November first, notify all Chapters of impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted.

Candidates shall be selected from all districts of the state.

No person shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at State Conference.

Section 5. When the several candidates for State Regent are nominated, each in turn shall nominate her State Corresponding Secretary. The ballot cast for a State Regent shall serve, automatically, as a ballot for her State Corresponding Secretary. Thus each is an elected officer. In no other instance may two officers be elected from the same chapter.

Section 6. In recognition of valuable service to the State Society the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by acclamation at a State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent.

ARTICLE V.

Duties of Officers

Section 1. STATE REGENT: The State Regent, in addition to performing the duties which pertain to her office, according to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, shall preside at all meetings of this Society, of the Executive Committee, of the State Board of Management and to the Kansas Delegation to the Continental Congress. She shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for, sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer for moneys appropriated by the Society, and may call meetings of the Executive Committee or Board of Management whenever she may consider it important and necessary. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter General Chairman, prepare the program for the Annual State Con ference. She shall present at the Annual State Conference all amend ments proposed to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society and such other matters as she may deem worthy of consideration. She shall be a member of the printing committee. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees, excepting a nominating committee.

She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer, to have recorded in the State Treasurer's books, all membership reports received from the National Society, following each meeting of the National Board. The State Treasurer will duly record the same.

Upon her confirmation, the incoming State Regent may appoint a State Parliamentarian, and Consulting Genealogist.

Section 2. STATE VICE REGENT: The State Vice Regent, in the absence or disability of the Regent, shall perform the duties pertaining to the office of Regent. She shall be a member of the printing and stationery committee and a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. STATE CHAPLAIN: The State Chaplain shall officiate in the offering prayer and other religious services when requested by the Regent. She shall be the Chairman of the Memorial Committee.

Section 4. STATE RECORDING SECRETARY: The State Recording Secretary shall keep a correct record of all meetings of the State Conference, the State Executive 'Committee and the Board of Management. She shall be chairman of the Printing and Stationery Committee; countersign all orders drawn on the Treasurer and signed by the Regent. She shall prepare the proceedings for the Annual State Conference for publication, subject to the approval of the State Regent, and perform such other duties as pertain to her office.

Section 5. STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: The State Corresponding Secretary, under the direction and supervision of the Regent, shall notify all state Officers and the Regent of each chapter in good standing of the time of the Annual Conference not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall give notice of meetings of the Executive Committee, and Board of Management as directed by the State Regent. She shall be the chairman of the committee on credentials. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, immediately after the close of Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the various chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each state chairman two typewritten copies of the list of names and addresses of her respective chapter chairmen (one of which is to be sent to her National Chairman and the second one for She shall compile these lists into a directory for the her own use.) ensuing administration.

Section 6. STATE TREASURER: The State Treasurer shall collect all moneys and disburse the same only upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. All moneys received by the Treasurer shall be deposited in some reliable bank in her name as State Treasurer, and all payments made by her shall be by check. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit the same to a Certified Public Accountant before the Annual State Conference. She shall be custodian of all bonds and policies belonging to the Society. She shall be bonded by the State Society for the sum of \$2,500.00 for the faithful discharge of the duties above defined. She shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan Notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall be a member of the Executive and Credentials Committees.

Section 7. STATE REGISTRAR: The State Registrar shall keep the card file as established; assist in proving eligibility claims; prepare the Kansas Directory Daughters of the American Revolution, when ordered by the Society; check her membership file against the records of the State Treasurer immediately after July first. She shall keep a file of all reports received from the National Society and these arc to be delivered with the State Card file, and all other material dealing with the work of the office, to her successor. She shall be a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 8. STATE HISTORIAN: The State Historian shall take charge of all the historical papers received by the Society and shall catalogue and arrange the same, placing in a locker at the State Historical Society at Topeka, such historical documents, and all materials for preservation. She shall be a member of the Memorial Committee. She shall prepare the Smithsonian Report.

Section 9. STATE LIBRARIAN: The State Librarian shall have supervision of the State D.A.R. library. She shall prepare a report listing all material sent to the National Library and all books records, and other material received for the State Library, during the year, for publication in the State Conference Proceedings. On retiring from the office, the State Librarian shall send to the newly elected Librarian and to the State Regent a complete list of all material on file in the State D.A.R Library, and given over to the newly elected State Librarian.

Section 10. STATE REPORTER: The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the State Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be State Chairman of the Publicity Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files (or Scrap Book) and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D.C.

Section 11. All officers and Committee Chairmen upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, all moneys, accounts, record books, papers or other property belonging to the Society.

ARTICLE VI.

Meetings

Section 1. The supreme governing body of this society shall be a Conference. An annual meeting of the Kansas State Conference shall be held in March unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or by the State Board of Management. The purpose of this conference shall be to receive reports of the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen; for the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. Each State Chairman shall compile a typed report of not more than three hundred words covering the work accomplished by her committee for the year ending February twenty-eighth. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary by March first, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Each Chapter Regent shall send a report of the work and plans of her chapter, for the year ending February twenty-eighth, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary immediately after March first. This report shall be typed, and limited to two hundred fifty words, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Section 3. The Kansas State Society shall be divided into four districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively.

At each District meeting the State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board of Management meeting.

A Director, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected at an annual district meeting to be held in the fall. The term of office shall be one year and no District Officer shall serve more than three consecutive terms. Each district shall entertain the State Conference in rotation; the time and place to be determined by the hostess district and the State Regent. The Southwest District shall entertain the State Conference in 1948.

Section 4. The voting members of the Annual State Conference shall be the State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, and Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the first Vice Regent or alternate and the delegates or their alternates, regularly elected by Chapters as hereinafter specified, provided they have been members of their Chapter for one year and are in good standing.

Section 5. Twenty-five voting members shall constitute a quorum at the meeting of the Annual State Conference.

Section 6. Chapters of less than fifty members shall be entitled to representation at the Annual State Conference by the regent and two delegates. Chapters having membership of fifty to one hundred shall be represented by their Regent and five delegates. After the first hundred, representation shall be in the ratio of three delegates for every subsequent one hundred. Alternates shall be elected for each Chapter Regent and delegate.

Section 7. Delegates and alternates snall be elected at the January meeting of their Chapter in each year; and certificates of their election signed by the Regent and Treasurer of their Chapter, shall be sent to the State Corresponding Secretary for the Committee on Credentials by February first. Vacancies that occur in the delegation may be filled by the Regent from alternates duly elected for that purpose at the January meeting.

Section 8. Daughters attending State Conference shall pay .. registration fee of One Dollar.

Section 9. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Picnic shall be held on Constitution Day, September 17, with the Northeast District as hostess.

ARTICLE VII.

Board of Management.

Section 1. The State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose memberships are within the State. District Directors and Chapter Regents shall constitute a State Board of Management. Section 2. The State Board of Management shall have all power

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over affairs of the State Society to do and transact business during the interim between the meetings of the State Society. The State Board shall meet at the call of the State Regent at least twice a year. One meeting to me held immediately preceding the first fall District meeting and one to be held immediately preceding the opening session of the State Conference.

A Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held in October, following the National Board of Management meeting, and this meeting shall be termed the official Fall State Board Meeting; the Northeast District shall act as hostess annually, at Shawnee Mission. Meetings of the Southeast, Southwest, and Northwest Districts shall be held immediately following in convenient order and a report of the National Board meeting be given by the State Regent and chapter plans be heard at all meetings.

Other meetings may be held upon the call of the State Regent or upon written request of seven members of the Board of Management. It shall recommend to the Annual State Conference such patriotic and historic work as seems desirable to be undertaken by the Society. Eleven members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have power to fill vacancies in office until the next election; the election to fill such vacancies shall be by ballot, notice of the vacancy having been given in the call for the meeting of the State Board.

Section 4. All officers, the Board of Management and Committees shall make reports of their work for the year, at the Annual State Conference.

ARTICLE VIII.

Executive Committee

Section 1. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Recording Secretary, State Registrar and State Treasurer, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three members.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall make a report at each meeting of the Board of Management.

ARTICLE IX.

Committees.

Section 1. The Regent shall appoint a Student Loan Committee consisting of three members who shall supervise the Kansas D.A.R. Student Loan Fund.

The Regent shall appoint a Conference Committee which shall consist of the Reporter and two other members.

There shall be a Printing and Stationery Committee which shall consist of the Recording Secretary, Vice Regent and Regent.

A Memorial Committee shall consist of the State Chaplain, chairman; State Historian, and one other member.

The Committee on Credentials shall consist of the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and one other member.

ARTICLE X

State Funds

Section 1. Each Chapter, belonging to the State Society shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before January first of each year the sum of \$1.35 for each member, in good standing on the Chapter rolls on that date.

Chapter Treasurers shall furnish, with each remittance of dues, a list of members for whom she is paying.

Chapters failing to pay above per capita dues shall be delinquent. February first and not entitled to representation at State Conference.

Representation of Chapters at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon number of dues in the hands of the State Treasurer by February first.

The Treasurer shall notify chapters of their standing on February first.

Section 2. Life Members shall be counted in the basis for representation. Chapters shall count all Life Members in their Representation and State dues should be paid for full representation.

Section 3. Stationery and postage, and in cases of emergency, telephone and telegraph charges, which charges shall be validated by the Executive Committee, shall be furnished to the State Officers and State Committees.

Section 4. A sum not to exceed \$500.00 per year shall be allowed the State Regent for her expenses in carrying on her work.

Section 5. To partially defray her expenses to the State Conference, each State Officer shall be allowed the sum of \$12.00, provided however. that no expenses will be allowed an Officer when the Conference is held in her own home city.

Section 6. No provision is made for expenses of Honorary State Officers.

Section 7. In addition to the obligations specified in these By-Laws, no debts or liabilities shall be incurred except by vote of the Conference.

Section 8. A sum equal to ten cents per member shall be taken from the State Fund and placed in an Annual State Conference Expense Account.

Section 9. A sum equal to two cents a member shall be taken from State Fund Annually and placed in the treasury of the Kansas C.A.R. The amount accumulated to be used for C.A.R. projects.

ARTICLE XI.

Chapters.

Section 1. It is recommended that election of chapter officers, for a term of three years, take place in January, occurring in the same year as the election of state officers. Chapter officers shall be installed and take office in May, following the confirmation of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent at Continental Congress.

On or before February first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks to be furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter Officers for the ensuing year.

The Regent-elect of each chapter shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on or before April first, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of all newly appointed chapter chairmen.

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ARTICLE XII.

Parliamentary Authority

Section 1. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order revised, shall govern this Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XIII.

Amendments.

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendments has been sent to the State Regent and each Chapter at least sixty days before the Annual State Conference.

Section 2. Amendments to these By-Laws shall take effect at the close of the Annual State Conference at which they are adopted.

STANDING RULES.

ARTICLE 1.

Section 1. The Recording Secretary with the Regent shall see that arrangements are made for the publishing of Proceedings of the State Conference which are contained in the files of the Recording Secretary, the expense of such report to be born by the State Society.

The Recording Secretary shall send a copy of the printed Proceedings to all State Officers, Chapter Regents State Chairmen District Directors, and to such other persons and libraries as shall be designated by the State Regent.

When an election has occurred, it shall be the duty of the retiring Recording Secretary and retiring Regent to compile these proceedings and arrange for their publication.

Section 2. Board of Management meetings may be attended by State Chairmen, District Directors, Chapter Regents' representatives and other interested members, on invitation of the State Regent, except when the Board is in Executive session.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. \$25.00 shall be allotted the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

Section 2. \$50.00 shall be allotted the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Congress.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. These rules may be amended, suspended or replaced at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of voting members present
