



#### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

I, therefore, believe it is my duty to my country to love it; to support its Constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its flag; and to defend it against all enemies."

#### NATIONAL SOCIETY

#### of the

#### DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

#### OBJECTS

The objects of this Society as stated in Article 11 of the Constitution are:

1.

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

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3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend to institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center of the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, Page 62.

#### D. A. R. RITUAL

Chaplain (or Collect): Our Father in Heaven, we thank Thee for Thy guidance and for Thy abiding presence in the life of our thank Thee for the state of the country. We thank Thee for all those yesterdays of our human race whose lessons and fulfillments have become a heritage to us. Continue, we pray, Thy blessings upon this nation, that all who are a part of it may learn true nobility of manhood and womanhood.

Grant us growth in understanding and increasing devotion to righteousness. Amen. Pledge of Allegiance.

#### INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

CHAPLAIN: You have been duly elected to office in ..... Chapter (or State, or National Society), Daughters of the American Revolution. You have been chosen to represent the members and to lead them. They have faith in you. That faith goes deeper than standing here before us and taking this oath. It represents "Faith in the Future." I hope you realize the seriousness of the obligation you are now assuming. Do you accept its responsibilities and duties?

CHAPLAIN: Do you promise faithfully to uphold the Constitution of the United States of America and to seek its observance by others?

RESPONSE: I do.

CHAPLAIN: Do you promise faithful loyalty to the Constitution and By-laws of the National Society, Daughters of the American. Revolution?

CHAPLAIN: Do you promise faithfully to perform the duties of your office to the best of your ability and understanding, and that at all times you will conduct yourself uprightly, God being your helper?

RESPONSE: I do.

CHAPLAIN: Do you further promise to cooperate with all your officers to the best of your ability, and at all times conduct yourself uprightly and according to law as becomes a member of the National Society, God being your helper?

#### GENERAL INFORMATION

CHAPTER REGISTRARS ATTENTION: Please copy from application papers before sending to Washington, the full name of applicant including her maiden name, and if married, the name or initials of her husband, the complete address, name of ancestor with his rank, the State in which he served and the State in which he died. If the applicant is a Junior Member (under 35 years of age) please make a notation of that with her birth date. As soon as notice is received from National that the applicant has been accepted, report this information to the State Regent and the State Registrar. Report data concerning Junior Members, also to the State Chairman of Junior Membership.

Dues should be in the hands of the Treasurer General and State-Treasurer by December 1st. Your chapters representation at State Conference depends on conforming to this rule. Do not wait on delinquents. Members whose dues are unpaid January first are "in arrears."

All contributions to be counted in the current year's report mustbe in the hands of the State Treasurer by January 31st. The State fiscal year extends from January 31, 1954 to January 31, 1955.

National Chairmen will continue to mail copies of their letters to their respective State Chairmen and National Vice Chairmen. The State Chairmen, in turn, should relay the information to Chapter Chairmen in their respective State.

INVESTMENT TRUST FUND: The new Investment Trust Fund established by Continental Congress now has about \$40,000 on interest. Since a large fund of this kind is essential for the welfare and progress of our National Society, it is urged that each Chapter contribute something toward it this year.

CHAPTER PROGRAMS: The theme of this year's programs will be "Foster True Patriotism," as taken verbatim from one of our major objectives. It is a splendid topic and should be remembered in numerous ways during the coming months.

NEW PARLIAMENTARIAN: The Society is indeed fortunate to have for its new National Parliamentarian, beginning July 1, Mrs. Sarah Corbin Robert, 53 Southgate Avenue, Annapolis, Md., well known to our members as Mrs. Henry M. Robert, Jr., former Treasurer General and President General and now one of our Honorary Presidents General, who is widely known as an authority on Parliamenary Law. She is the Trustee of Robert's Rules of Order, Revised. Her articles of information and education for our members will begin in the September issue of our D.A.R. Magazine. As plans are now being worked out for reorganization of the National Parliamentarian's work, it is asked that, until further announcement is made, no Chapter By-Laws be sent for the Parliamentarian.

GENERAL REVISION OF NATIONAL BY-LAWS: Since there has been no general revision of the By-Laws of our National Society since 1927, Continental Congress voted for a general revision at the next Congress. Mrs. G. W. S. Musgrave, 315 Washington Blvd., Laurel, Md., will be Chairman of the augmented committee to study and present proposed revisions. If any of you have suggestions, send them to Mrs. Musgrave. Since changes in our National By-Laws next April might make it necessary for similar changes to be made in State and Chapter By-Laws, it is recommended that State Societies and Chapters defer temporarily any changes in their By-Laws.

CLEARING HOUSE COMMITTEE: Mrs. Walter C. Pomeroy, 1016 Oakland Ave., Ann Arbor, Mich., will continue as Chairman of the Clearing House Committee. If any member has suggestions as to changes in our Committees, she should contact Mrs. Pomeroy.

CONSTITUTION HALL RENOVATIONS: As authorized by the Continental Congress, the Executive Committee on June 2 signed contracts for the renovation of Constitution Hall, which has had very little improvement since its completion in 1929. Although the modernization of the electrical systems and the repainting of the large auditorium will involve much work, Executive members felt that the contracts were reasonable for the projects and the cost should be well within the estimated amounts, money for all of which is already available and on hand.

HONOR ROLL: A total of 807 Chapters made the Gold or Silver Honor Roll or Honorable Mention last year. This was a notable record. It is sincerely hoped that many more will attain these goals next year.

PROGRAM MATERIAL: Program material may be obtained from our Program Committee Office at Headquarters. Among the items available there is, through arrangement of the Radio & Television Committee Chairman, a tape recording of the address of Fulton Lewis, Jr., at Continental Congress. The rental fee is \$1.50.

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1954 PROCEEDINGS: Copies of the 1954 Proceedings may be ordered now from the Business Office at \$3.50 each. Board members, Honorary Officers and National Chairmen will receive free copies.

DOLLARS FOR DEFENSE: To expand the work of the National Defense Committee beyond its budget allotments, Mrs. James B. Patton, National Chairman, has announced that voluntary contributions will be acceptable. Checks should be made payable to the Treasurer General, ear-marked for National Defense. Lists of such donors will be printed in the D.A.R. Magazine, unless anonymity is requested.

CONGRESS BANQUET: Mrs. E. E. Woollen will not make reservations for the Congress Banquet until after November 1. She warns that after Banquet tickets have been purchased, no refunds should be requested.

GRANDMA MOSES' PAINTING NOTE CARDS: By courtesy of Hallmark, famous company noted for greeting cards, 10,000 note card folders have been received by the National Society. The front cover is a color reproduction of the picture of the Battle of Bennington, painted by "Grandma" Moses in her 93rd year and presented by her last year to our Museum. She is a member of our Society. The folders may be purchased at ten cents each, including envelopes, from the National Business Office. They will also be sold by State and Chapter Chairman of the D.A.R. Museum Committee. Proceeds will be used for the art fund of the Museum for restoration of other paintings owned by our Nationl Society.

D. A. R. MARKERS: For your information, D.A.R. markers bearing our Insignia should be purchased from companies which have been duly approved by our National Board of Management to make D.A.R. markers. A list of the authorized companies may be found in the Handbook.

OFFICIAL PUBLICATIONS: Each Officer and every Chapter should use our official publications, as these contain a wealth of information about our Society and its work. These include the following: Handbook, 35c; Highlights of Program Activity, 10c; What the Daughters Do. 5c; and the D.A.R. Magazine, \$2 per year. The Press Digest will resume publication, as usual, with the September issue. It will be sent free to all Board Members and Honorary Officers, each Chapter Regent, Chapter Chairman of National Defense and Chapter Chairman of Press Relations. Other subscriptions, 50c per year.

#### COMMITTEE CHANGES

C.A.R. COMMITTEE: A new National Committee was authorized by Continental Congress for cooperation with the Children of the American Revolution. The National Chairman of this committee will be Mrs. Charles Carroll Haig, who is National President of the National Society, Children of the American Revolution. State Chairman for Kansas is Mrs. Ben W. Friedel of Kansas City, Kansas.

AMERICAN MUSIC: Formerly a sub-committee under the Program Committee, the Advancement of American Music, was made a full national committee, under the name "American Music."

STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE: By vote of the National Board of Management, the D.A.R. Student Loan Committee will be known as the Student Loan and Scholarship Committee. This change in name was requested by State Regents who wished to be able to report scholarships to colleges and universities, other than our Approved Schools and Indian Schools. All scholarships for any of our Approved Schools should continue to be reported through the Approved Schools Committee; all scholarships for Indians should continue to be reported through the American Indians Committee.

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HONOR ROLL: The Honor Roll Requirements for the ensuing year will remain practically the same as last year. Each requirement was informally discussed at the Board Meeting on April 24th, with Mrs. Chester F. Miller, National Chairman of the Honor Roll Committee, present.

Because a number of chapters sent representatives to the 1954 Continental Congress, in order to make the Honor Roll, Requirement No. 3 will be kept the same for this year as it was last year. (But, by general agreement, it was decided that for the Honor Roll for 1955-56, there will be a substitute question added, to this effect: "If chapter was not represented at Continental Congress in 1955, was it represented at your 1955 State Conference and did it have a program on the 1955 Continental Congress?")

#### D. A. R. HONOR ROLL REQUIREMENTS—1954-55

- Did your Chapter have a NET INCREASE in membership from February 1, 1954 to February 1, 1955? (Figures must be based on official figures from National)
- Did your Chapter admit at least ONE new Junior member (age 18 to 35 years) between February 1, 1954 and February 1, 1955?
- 3. Was your Chapter represented at Continental Congress, 1954?
- 4. Were the National Society dues for all Chapter members received in Washington prior to January 1, 1955? (This does not include Life Members or members exempt because of admission or reinstatement after July 1, 1954.)
- 5. Did your Chapter devote at least FIVE MINUTES to National Defense topics at each meeting from September 1954 through February, 1955?
- 6. Did your Chapter send aid of any kind to at least one of our D.A.R. Schools or Approved Schools?

- 7. Do at least TWENTY PER CENT of your members subscribe to our D.A.R. Magazine? (Subscriptions to schools and libraries may be counted.)
- 8. Did your Chapter send at least one advertisement to the D.A.R. Magazine between May, 1954 and February, 1955?
- 9. Did your Chapter work for at least EIGHT National Committees, other than those listed above? Namely, American Indians, American Red Cross, Americanism, Conservation, Correct Use of the Flag, Good Citizens, D.A.R. Museum, D.A.R. Student Loan Fund, Genealogical Records, Junior American Citizens, Motion Picture, Press Relations, Program including American Music, Radio and Television, Transportation. (Underscore those aided.)
- 10. Did your Chapter have a special D.A.R. project this year for your community? (This does not mean a Chapter contribution to Community Chest or other civic organizations, for members should donate individually and use Chapter funds for D.A.R. purposes; but it does mean a special D.A.R. project, such as a D.A.R. room in a hospital, restoration of historic structures, etc., of value to the community.)
- 11. Did your Chapter cooperate with the Project of the Historian General?
- 12. Did your Chapter contribute anything to the planned new endowment (or investment fund of the National Society?)

  Those Chapters answering "Yes" to each of the above 12 questions will be placed on the National Society's Gold Honor Roll, 1954-55. If the answer is "Yes" to 11 of the above questions, the Chapter will be placed on the National Society's Silver Honor Roll, 1954-55. If the answer is "Yes" to 10 of the questions, the Chapter will receive Honorable Mention. Questionnaires must be signed by the Chapter Regent, the Chapter Treasurer and the Chapter Recording Secretary and sent by MARCH 1, 1955 to Mrs. Chester F. Miller, National Chairman of the Honor Roll Committee, 1237 Owen Street, Saginaw, Michigan.

#### CHANGES IN BY-LAWS

By vote of the Continental Congress, two changes were made in our National By-Laws: (1) If a membership application paper is rejected, half of the initiation fee is to be retained by the National Society; (2) the fee for supplemental lines was increased from \$5.00 to \$10.00.

No supplemental papers are now being accepted.

If papers have not been verified after two years' consideration, they are to be returned to the chapter or applicant, provided no data or correspondence of value to the paper has been received during the last six months.

The initiation fee will remain at \$6.00, since the motion was lost to revise the By-Laws to increase it to \$10.00.

GENERAL REVISION: The Continental Congress voted to have a general revision of the By-Laws in 1955. Although there have been many amendments to the By-Laws, there has not been a general revision since 1927.

INVESTMENT TRUST FUND: The Investment Trust Fund was officially set up by Continental Congress. In this fund, there is almost \$40,000, including a gift of \$5,400 in bonds from an anonymous donor during Congress week. It is hoped that every chapter will contribute something toward this fund this year.

NATIONAL DEFENSE CONTRIBUTIONS: As suggested by the National Defense Chairman in her report to Congress, any chapter or individual wishing to help expand the National Defense Committee work may send a donation for this purpose through the State Treasurer to the Treasurer General, earmarked for National Defense. A list of all donors, with amounts contributed will be printed in the D.A.R. Magazine, unless anonymity is requested.

CONSTITUTION HALL RENOVATION: Work will soon begin on the re-painting and re-wiring of Constitution Hall, as voted by Continental Congress,—the Reserve Fund for Maintenance of Properties to be augmented for this purpose by sums not to exceed \$60,000 from the D.A.R. Magazine Funds.

NATIONAL CHAIRMEN'S LETTERS: Letters of instruction from the National Officers and National Chairmen will be printed during the early summer and mailed as soon as possible.

NATIONAL PARLIAMENTARIAN: It is a great pleasure to announce that beginning July 1, Mrs. Sarah Corbin Robert, 53 Southgate Avenue, Annapolis, Md., will become our new National Parliamentarian.

SPEAKERS' BUREAU: One of the resolutions adopted at Continental Congress called for the organization of a committee of qualified speakers in each State to appear before civic groups, if and when requested, as well as D.A.R. chapters, to discuss the different points of our National Defense program, information, factual and documented, to be obtained from our National Defense office. These Speakers' Bureaus should be set up under the direction of the State Regent or the State Board of Management, D.A.R.

CONGRESS BANQUET: No reservations for the 1955 Congress banquet will be made until November 1st. State Regents and others are particularly requested to note that no refunds should be requested. The Kansas table is No. 14.

The 64th Continental Congress will be held April 18-22, 1955.

National Defense is the vital issue of the hour and it will be stressed with great emphasis throughout our administration.

- 3. The National Society will sponsor a bus tour to the approved schools, next year immediately following the October board meeting, which will be Oct. 11, 12 and 13, 1954.
- 4. The literature of Captain McPherson is to be returned to the donor. Heirs desired its return.
- The number of free copies of the Press Digest is to be increased to include the N. D. Chairmen as well as the State Regents and Press Chairmen.
- A special committee will be appointed to confer with J. E. Caldwell Jewelers concerning designs and prices for a membership pin for those who have been members for 25 and 50 years.
- Registrar General was authorized to make minor revisions in the application papers. All papers are to be carefully examined by the Chapter Registrars and Treasurers. We must know the endorsers.
- 8. The last report was re: applications accepted by the board, and authorization for new chapters.

# RESOLUTIONS PASSED MARCH 12, 1954

Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution

RESOLVED: That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution continue to support and promote undivided allegiance to the unique Prinicples of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States of America; to stress the importance of understanding and determining of the difference between propaganda and fact; to expose and combat the political and economic fallacies of Socialism and Communism; to uphold the dignity, rights and sacredness of the individual, upon which this Nation was founded and to defend this Nation against all foreign and domestic enemies.

Amendment to the Flaw Law (P L 8290)

WHEREAS Section 3 (k) of Public Law 829 (approved by the 77th Congress, 2nd Session, December 22, 1942) requires clarification to lessen present confusion on proper interpretation.

RESOLVED, That the Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States be requested to make the following desired change as provided for in Section 8, Public Law 829, 77th Congress, Chapter 806, 2nd Session, H. J. Res. 359. In Section 3 (k), strike out the entire subsection (k) and insert in lieu thereof, "When used on a speaker's platform, the Flag, if displayed flat should be displayed above and behind the speaker. When displayed from a staff, whether on platform, in chancel, or on the floor on the same level with the audience, or in the open on platform or ground level, the Flag should occupy the position of honor at the speaker's right as he faces the congregation or audience. Any other flag so displayed should be placed at the speaker's left as he faces the congregation or audience."

#### Kansas State Flag

WHEREAS, Many of our Kansas youth are not familiar with the Kansas State Flag, it is fitting in this Territorial Centennial year of our beloved state of Kansas that we impress upon the citizenry the historical importance of the Great Seal of Kansas and the citizen's responsibility as expressed in its motto "To the Stars Through Difficulty."

RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution urge that special emphasis be placed upon the teaching of the meaning of our State Flag; that we go on record as favoring the display of the Kansas Flag on all public school buildings, on the same staff but below the flag of the United States.

# Treaty Making Powers

WHEREAS, Unlike other nations the United States Constitution makes foreign treaties become the supreme law of this land thus superseding the Constitution and all Federal and State laws;

WHEREAS, Frank E. Holman, Ex-President of the American Bar Association in his address to the Veterans of Foreign Wars at Yakima, Washington, July 10, 1952, explained why our Constitutional liberties are endangered;

RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution urges passage of a Constitutional Amendment to do at least three things,

- It should provide that no treaty is valid which conflicts with the Constitution of the United States.
- 2. No treaty is to be effective until implemented by legislation.
- 3. No such legislation shall be valid if contrary to or in excess of the powers delogated to the Congress by the Constitution.

# V World Government

WHEREAS, Our Country's acceptance of a World Government and the consequent relinquishment of our National Sovereignty would mean World Citizenship—and thus an end to all our Immigration Laws; World Money—with the dollar on a par with all other monies in the world and controlled by the World Government and not by the United States Treasury; World Law—with Americans tried by World Courts anywhere in the world instead of in our American Courts; a World Army—with its troops quartered anywhere in the world under the command of World Government Generals, and troops from any other country, probably in Washington or any city or town in the land;

RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm its opposition to any form of World Government, World Federation or to any intermediate federation, and to all impairment of the National Sovereignty of our Representative Republic, the United States of America, by Convention, Covenant or Treaty.

# VI Revision of the U N Charter

WHEREAS, The question of a Charter Review Conference will be on the agenda of the U N General Assembly in 1955, and the United States and other nations have already signified their intention of favor this Review Conference; and

WHEREAS, Undter Senate Resolutions 126 (as amended by S R 193) the Foreign Relations Subcommittee on the United Nations Charter is conducting a study of the problems of Charter Review; and

WHEREAS, Proposals are now being advanced for Charter revision by individuals and organizations whereby World Government supporters are promoting proposals for converting the U N into a

World Government such as the "One World Congress" proposals adopted in Copenhagen by delegates from twenty-seven countries, August 1953 in a joint conference of the World Association of Parliamentarians for World Government and the World Movement for World Federal Government with its affiliate "The United World Federalists, Inc." in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Under the Copenhagen Declaration, "The Conference recommends to the Governments concerned: (a) That the United Nations proceed to a general revision of the Charter; (b) That this revision should transform the United Nations into a world federal government..."

RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, declare its opposition to revising the U N Charter into a World Government or further abridging in any manner the national sovereignty and independence of the United States of America.

RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society urge its members to communicate their position to their Senators and Representatives in Congress and the Foreign Relations Subcommittee on the United Nations Charter.

# VI Immigration

RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution protest any revision or changes of the McCarran-Walter Immigration and Nationality Act (P L 414) that would alter or weaken its present meaning for strength.

# VII Right to Work

RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution commend Wint Smith of the 6th Kansas Congressional District for his work and efforts on legislation protecting a man't right to work, and that we would favor just and proper Right to Work legislation in Kansas.

RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the Amer-

ican Revolution commend the Kansas Restaurant Association for distributing in eating places throughout the state the prayers—Roman Catholic, Jewish and Protestant—for those who want to offer table grace; the small folder, placed on tables suggests this reverent custom.

#### STATE REGISTRAR REPORT

As State Registrar for the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, I submit the following report to the 56th Conference. It has been a pleasure to work with our State Regent and State Officers, also the Chapter Registrars.

A form letter was sent out in Sept. 1953 to all Chapter Registrars, giving instructions as the information which should be sent to this office. The yearly report form was included at this time. To date I have received 46 out of the 62 Chapters.

There were 123 letters and 25 cards sent out this past year from this office. Five State Directories were sold at \$2.00 each, and I have more on hand to sell at this price.

The State Society has printed form cards which I hope to get to all Chapter Registrars to be used in sending in the correct information.

I attended Shawnee Mission, the Fall Board of Management meeting and the Northeast, Southeast and Southwest District meetings. I also visited the Bryd Prewitt Chapter meeting in Ulysses in Feb.

The Necrology list was prepared for the Memorial Service at State Conference.

The following Chapters have contributed to the Registrar General's Book Binding Fund this year.

#### REPORT OF STATE HISTORIAN

#### 1953-1954

The creation of the office of State Historian, which came about through efforts of the Kansas Daughters to mark the Santa Fe Trail, occurred at the 1910 State Conference at Lawrence. Mrs. T. A. Cordry, who complied the book, "Marking the Santa Fe Trail," was the first State Historian and served from 1910 until her death in 1921.

Upon receipt of the files from Mrs. W. A. Peschka, former historian, your present historian took inventory to acquaint herself with the contents. A careful search of the records revealed that no Revolutionary soldiers' grave in Kansas had ever been reported; the graves of six Real Daughters are listed.

In July, the program of the new Historian General, Mrs. Wayne M. Cory, was received. Mrs. Cory's program stressed the teaching of American History in elementary schools. She listed six activities for Chapters. A Chapter reporting that it had carried out at least one of the six activities would be given credit on the National Honor Roll.

A form letter containing the information from Mrs. Cory was mailed in September to Chapter Historians with a request that the letter be read at a Chapter meeting.

#### CORRECT USE OF FLAG

Mrs. Victor L. Durr, Chairman

In making this, my first report as your State Chairman of Correct Use of the Flag, I am both pleased and grateful for the fine cooperation and enthusiasm shown by the Chapter Chairmen and through them the chapters as a whole.

Through this past year Mrs. Ralph Fulton, vice-chairman, and I have strived to "Keep the Flags Flying" on our national holidays by sending letters or cards to all chairmen at the first of each month to remind them of the special days so they, in turn, could remind their members to put out their Flags. We also have stressed the wish that every member of D.A.R. own a Flag. From my reports received I now think we are well on the way to having a Flag in every Daughters home.

I was very pleased to receive reports from forty-eight of our sixty-two chapters. I think this is a fine percentage for our first year.

I have received many fine letters and also very fine suggestions from many of the chapter chairmen. Their enthusiasm has meant much to me. Twenty chapters had an entire program devoted to OUR FLAG and as many shared their program with another committee. I have received many good ideas from programs and there is a fine supply of Flag material available at little or no cost as well as many fine-films which can be obtained for as little as the Express charges.

178 Flags were presented by our Kansas Daughters this year. Four of these were large Flags presented to a new Boys Club, two tonew schools, and one presented in honor of Mrs. William L. Ainsworth, Vice-President General, for the platform of Constitution Hall in Washington. Twenty-three chapters studied the Flag Code and many mentioned that this had been done in the last few years. This is a very good idea and makes a fine program for a chapter meeting. 821 Flag Codes were distributed by our chapters, many along with small Flags at Naturalization ceremonies to our new Citizens, to Scout Troops, grade school children, new D.A.R. members and others.

I found that all chapters reporting give the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America at their meetings, but only about half sing the National Anthem. Several chapters have made and presented scrapbooks on Flag material to their C.A.R. chapters and some are still being compiled. I think this an excellent project and I hope more chapter chairmen will undertake it this coming year.

Two chapters have reported special projects of placing miniature American Flags on cupcakes or gum drop vases on hospital trays in their communities on Flag Day, Lincoln and Washington birthdays. Perhaps this is just the kind of project many chapters need to make their member more Flag conscious.

This report cannot be concluded without my thanks being given to all State Officers and Chapter chairmen for their help and enthusiasm and particularly their suggestions. Also to Mrs. William Ainsworth, National Chairman of Correct Use of the Flag, who has spent hours in writing letters of information and help to me.

Let us, as an organization, and, as individuals renew our efforts. to "Protect Our Flag, that it may continue to protect us."

Your D.A.R. Magazine chairman is pleased to report a definite increase over last year. A year ago we had 536 subscriptions and now we have 650; an increase of 114 subscribers. Every chapter has a Magazine chairman—62 in all. August 1st we had 509 subscribers; since then a gain of 141. Please take care of renewals two months before the subscription expires.

A two page mimeographed letter was sent in August to all chapter chairmen and one to the chapter regent at the same time. In October, your chairman gave a report at the state board meeting and also at two district meetings. Cards were mailed to all chairmen in December offering a special gift card to be sent if the subscription was to be a gift. Early in January a questionnaire was mailed to all chairmen and in February, reminder cards were sent to those who had not replied; later in the month cards were mailed to the regents of chapters not heard from. All chapters have sent in reports. Congratulations! First time that has happened.

### SANTA FE TRAIL MARKERS REPORT

#### Mrs. J. O. Carter, Chairman

My aim this Kansas Centennial year is "To Make Everyone Santa Fe Trail Conscious." I was delighted, as all of you probably were, when I heard of the proposed Caravan over Hiway 50-N following the old Santa Fe Trail. It starts at Mission, May 11 and ends at Garden City, May 17. There will be parades and other activities along the way especially at points that were important to the pioneers and traders in the old days.

Fifty-two years ago at the State Conference held at Ottawa, Mrs. Fannie Geiger Thompson, the St. Regent, wondered what the Daughters could do to show their patriotism. They had no monuments to restore as their Eastern sisters had, but being Kansas pioneers and equal to any emergency they decided to place some on the fast disappearing Santa Fe Trail. Now, 50 years later, some of these monuments placed by the Daughters of the American Revolution and the State of Kansas need restoring. Won't you show your patriotism by hunting up some of these blocks of red granite that have been pushed from their bases, some laying on their faces and restore them to their former dignity and historical significance? We will always revere and honor the shrines of our Revolutionary ancestors but let us give more thought and care to our immediate monuments. The settling of Kansas was the result of the travel along the Santa Fe Trail.

Some of you have asked for material on the Trail. Dr. Margaret. Long of Denver has written a comprehensive volume on the Smoky Hill Trail and will bring out one on the Santa Fe Trail this fall. I commend both of them to you for your study. Our own State Library has several copies of Mrs. Cordry's Marking the Santa Fe Trail.

I am continuing Mrs. Denions' project of obtaining pictures of all the 96 markers. I assigned those markers nearest the 13 chapters located directly on the Trail and asked them to be responsible for them. If some are closer to other chapters please tell me and I will reassign them. It does not seem fair to ask these chapters to bear all the expense of restoration. I wish some State funds could be made available for this purpose.

I hope to have some program material available next year forthe use of chapters and schools, and perhaps a play or pageant forschools on Kansas Day.

Five chapters out of the 13 assigned this special report, responded. My thanks to them and especially to Mrs. Rex Curtis of Henry Dawson, McPherson. She and her regent spent a day and a half driving around the country taking these pictures and incidentally ruined a tire on the graveled roads.

Eight reported they had had programs on the Trail. Mrs. Fowler of General Edward Hand Chapter supplied the city and county schools with material. And have planned to take the 6th graders on a tour of historical places.

Mrs. W. H. White, Council Oak Chapter, reports that the 4-H Boys restored one marker and may do another. Does that give you an idea?

As far as I have reports on them, seven need repairing or placing one bases. Four of these are in Garden City's 100 mile long district. Chapters are few and far between out there but we are not lacking in history. That part of the Trail from Pawnee Rock to old Fort Bent across the line in Colorado was the bloodiest, most dangerous part of the whole Trail. I hope that in the next two years we can have all 96 pictures and many more of points of historical interest in your locality, and that all our markers can be put in good condition and that the people of Kansas will be made Historical Marker conscious.

The scrapbook of pictures is on display near the registration table and I invite you to stop and look at it.

#### HONOR ROLL — 1953-1954

# REPORT OF CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG COMMITTEE Mrs. William Louis Ainsworth, National Chairman

It has been the aim of this committee to promote a "Flag-conscious public," beginning with our own members. It is our desire that each member own her own Flag and display it on every National Holiday, particularly those days for special display of the Flag as specified in Article 2 (d) of the Flag Code—Public Law 829.

Taking as our motto, PROTECT OUR FLAG, THAT IT MAY CONTINE TO PROTECT US, we have urged the study of Flag Laws in each State, along with study of the Flag Code, and Flag literature.

We extend our grateful appreciation to our State Regent and to our very interested State Chairman and her Vice Chairman and to all Chapter Chairmen who have helped PROTECT OUR FLAG. We are deeply appreciative of Public Law 107 designating the position of the Flag of the United States of American when displayed with the Flag of the United Nations. We give thanks for the March 1st Proclamation of President Eisenhower as Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, prescribing the regulations for displaying the Flag at half-staff.

Practically all chapters give the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag at every meeting. Many chapters sing and some recite the National Anthem. A number of chapters are learning several verses of the National Anthem. Many Flag talks were made both to D.A.R. and to outside organizations. Many chapters have entire programs on the Flag. Numerous corrections on display of the Flag were noted. Excellent publicity was given in newspapers, on radio and TV programs.

Reports show that chapters in 48 States and Alaska have presented LARGE FLAGS to Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cubs, Brownies, Public Schools, Churches, Red Cross, Fire Houses, Air Base, Court Houses, Hospitals, Tamassee D.A.R. School, Hillside School, Berry School, Blue Ridge School, American Legion, Town Memorial Park, Salvation Army Citadel, Y.W.C.A., Local Polio Headquarters.

SMALL FLAGS have been presented to New Citizens, Citizenship Classes, Evening Adult Education Class Rooms, Good Citizens present for State Conferences, Hospitals—for trays on Flag Day, Cemeteries for graves of members and Revolutionary Soldiers.

FLAG CODES were distributed to Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Schools, Churches, J.A.C. Clubs, Post Offices, Police Force, Libraries, P.T.A., New D.A.R. members, Womens Clubs, C.A.R. Societies, Camp Fire Girls, Naturalization Courts, City Officials, War Brides, Youth Centers.

FLAG LITERATURE was given to Libraries, Schools, Girls Clubs, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, C.A.R., City Councils, Circuit Judges.

FLAG TALKS were made to Schools, Citizenship Classes, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Elks Club, U.D.C., League of Women Voters, Grange Meetings, American Legion and University Club.

SCRAPBOOKS OF FLAG PROGRAM MATERIAL were given to D.A.R. Chapters, C.A.R. Societies, Libraries, Schools.

PARTICIPATION IN COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES: At request of D.A.R. several city mayors authorized the ringing of all Church bells for five minutes at 11 A.M. on July 4th; Floats in Fourth of July and Centennial Celebration parades; Participation in Naturalization Courts; Flag Essay Contests in Schools; Constitution Day Programs; Window Displays of Flag material and literature; Reminders to Editors of local newspapers and to Managers of local Radio Stations and TV Stations to mention display of Flags on proper days.

# D.A.R. MAGAZINE COMMITTEE WESTERN DIVISION, NATIONAL VICE-CHAIRMAN

It has been a pleasure to serve as national vice-chairman of the D.A.R. Magazine. Information which is received from time to time from the national chairman—usually each month—is forwarded to the state chairman in the Western Division. The states are North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Colorado and Kansas.

The chairmen have done their work well in all the states. Two of the states are twenty percenters: North Dakota and South Kakota. Colorado and Nebraska have more than doubled their subscriptions since August 1st. The former gained 149 and the latter 136. South Dakota only lacked two of doubling her list. Kansas needed 16 more subscriptions to be a 20 percenter. A large number were sent in, in February, too late to be counted but will be a good start for next year.

Colorado is short 92 subscriptions to make the goal and Nebraska is short 75. The above estimate was made, using the list of members published in the February issue of the Magazine.

The information received telling of the progress made in each of the states in the Western Division has been appreciated and has in every instance been an inspiration, and one has been regularly received from the national chairman. Many thanks to her.

#### PROGRAM COMMITTEE

As your State Program Chairman, it is with pleasure that I bring you this report of our 62 chapters. 58 reporting.

A questionnaire was sent out to all the chapter chairmen and their answers indicated that the program outline sent out last summer was used by most of the chapters.

The theme for programs this year was "Perpetuate the Spirit of America." Nearly all the chapters reporting adhered for the most part to D.A.R. programs. The majority of chapters have members to present these programs.

Our D.A.R. magazine is used by almost all chapters and our President General's message is read at many of the meetings.

I have forwarded to our National Headquarters six papers written by our members: two from Topeka chapter, one from Martha Vail chapter, Anthony; two from Esther Lowrey chapter, Independence; and one from Lois Warner chapter, Junction City. These papers are filed and incorporated in a lending library for the use of all D.A.R. chapters.

All chapters reported program committees and all but one reported planning their programs on a yearly basis.

The yearbooks I received were very interesting. The insignia on the cover was quite generally used as was the flag allegiance and the American croed included in the pages of most of the books. National holidays or days to display the flag, members' Revolutionary ancester, and their respective national D.A.R. number were found in some books. I noticed several chapters are printing a yearbook to carry over for a two or three year period with a mimeograph section to be added each year which will contain the meeting schedules. This might be a helpful suggestion if you are struggling with the problem of the rising cost of printing.

May I suggest again that there are lists available for program material which include plays, radio scripts, films, and papers which can be borrowed from the National Headquarters. These include the paper written by our members and filed for this purpose. These catalogo or lists can be obtained by writing our National Program Chairman, Mrs. A. Keith McClung, (Administration Building, 1776 D. St., N. W., Washington 6, D. C.)

Many chapters reported excellent speakers among their own members and these along with outside speakers have presented some outstanding book reviews, papers, and talks along the lines of D.A.R. endeavor. A quiz program over several issues of our national magazine an educational program with lots of participation. Round table discussions on various topics such as "Civil Defense, It's Importance To Us Here in the Mid-West" and one on the Pamphlet, "What the Daughters Do" were interesting. Slides of the Eisenhower Memorial Foundation in Abilene were shown by one chapter reporting. Many chapters have used the youth in their community when they had report of the Boy Scout Jamboree held last summer in California. This being a Centennial year for the Kansas Territory and several cities, chapters are working on these observances in their communities and the emphasis is on the history of our great State. A tour of the Forbes Air Base near Topeka was an outstanding meeting for the Topeka chapter. A Christmas program with the regent playing the part of a visiting regent from the Artic sounded clever and profitable as it netted contributions for our D.A.R. schools, this was reported from the Eunice Sterling Chapter, Wichita.

Many chapters reported visits from our State Regent or perhaps other state officers and those of course were high points in their year of activities.

I cannot mention all the outstanding programs reported, but I do think the exchange of ideas is valuable and I certainly have appreciated the cooperation and interest of all the program chairmen in their prompt reports to me.

State Regent, Mrs. Abels, I can assure you we have 62 chapters in this state that are very much alive and their programs indicate that they are striving to achieve the goal of our thome, "Porpetuate the Spirit of America."

#### NATIONAL DEFENSE COMMITTEE

"One of the principal goals of this committee is to have an informed membership. To be informed one must know the various sides of any question; consequently much of the information coming to chapters from our office of National Defense, tells of situations and people who are seeking to undermine our Government. Some of it is not interesting nor pleasant reading but it is information, and necessary to our understanding. As you know, one of the prime objectives of our National Society is the preservation of our Republican form of government."

As chapters it is your privilege to have a part in this great educational effort. Through the chapters and their chapter chairmen must information be channeled. Your national office can provide material, making it available to you through the state chairman and vice-chairman but to the chapters goes the real responsibility of informing the membership.

To this end-your state chairman, assisted by four vice-chairmen heading our four districts have endeavored to pass on and to supplement information for this great D.A.R. National Defense program. The Vice-chairmen have all made unique contributions to our work. Miss Ida Lyons of N.E. District was my very faithful companion, critic, assistant at the District meetings last Fall. At the S.W. District she spoke on National Defense representing the chairman, in order that a talk on this subject might be presented to all districts. In the N.W. District your chairman appreciated the assistance of Mrs. W. L. Ainsworth, Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden and Mrs. J. B. Heffelfinger in presenting a panel discussion. Mrs. Lester Connett's work in the N.W. District is reflected in the splendid work of the chapters in that district. Mrs. Bruce Josserand of S.W. District has contributed much to the resolutions and is responsible for many of those presented at this state conference. Miss Maude Skinner of S.E. District has done much valuable research, especially in the field of education and textbook reviews. During the Fall District meetings a resolution, affirming our stand for the Bricker Amendment was passed and sent to our Senators.

Three special communications were sent from this office to all chapters; two in September dealing with The National Anthem and Constitution Day Mrs. James B. Patton's address "Western Civilization is in a World Crisis" went out in January with a request to all chapter chairmen and regents to cooperate in getting this timely information before their members. The response on such short notice was most gratifying. To duplicate and send material to the sixty-two Kansas chapters is a tiresome and expensive effort. There is no authorized allowance for this work. Chapter response is the reward. No effort is too great when satisfying results are accomplished.

Articles have been prepared for all members of the Kansas D.A.R. News. Our deep appreciation to our State Regent for including in the State Conference number of the News Mrs. Patton's address "Western Civilization is in a World Crisis," thus making this pertinent information available in one way or another to every Kansas Daughter and we hope to many outside our membership.

There is one other agency with the state which promotes and accelerates our work. This is the Wichita National Defense Council to which all five Wichita chapters contribute representation. The very excellent work of this Council is evident in the work of all of these represented chapters. Its influence is definitely felt in this large population area.

Report blanks, carrying 19 questions were sent to every Kansas Society chapter for the National Defense office. Each blank specified the date when due and the proper disposition of the blank. Would you like to know how you "produced" as Districts and as a state? Here are the figures percentage wise.

N.E. District responded 66.6%; S.E. District responded 56.2%; N.W. District repsonded 64.7%; S.W. District responded 76.5%. The Kansas Society responded 66.2%. For this good response I again thank you. To receive a 100% report is not as important as the fact that you are doing a good job in promoting our National Defense program. This reporting plan is new this year. Next year your familiarity with it will increase your reporting of activities and give a better overall record of state activity.

#### Following is a tabulating report of the 19 questions asked:

- 1. Thirty-three chapters reported devoting five minutes to National Defense at every meeting.
- 2. Thirty chapters had at least one complete program on National Defense. Seventeen on Mrs. Patton's address.
  - 2. Eighteen chapters presented 42 Good Citizenship Medals.
- 4. Four chapters gave nine Awards of Merit. (I am not sure that chapters understand this Award of Merit. Please read your October 1953 D.A.R. Magazine for a description of the project and a picture of this award. It is a special award, not offered before this year,)
  - 5. Thirty-five chapters reviewed the national resolutions.
- 6. Twenty-six chapters answered "Does your State outlaw the Communist Party?" Evidently many could not find the answer.
- 7. Thirty two chapters answered on the Loyalty Oath question. One chairman sent a copy of the oath. (Mrs. Harry Kendall, past National Defense chairman.)
- 8. Twenty one chapters answered regarding State investigation of UnAmerican activities in state.
- 9. Twenty chapters brought to members information on pend ing legislation on the following: Bricker Amendment 33, Flag 3, Im migration 7, UNESCO 5, U N Charter revision 4, Genocide Convention 2, Covenant on Human Rights 6.
- 10. Ten chapters wrote to legislators on Bricker Amendment (9), other legislation (4).
  - 11. Thirty-one chapters reported 100% voting by members.
  - 12. Sixteen chapters sent literature.
- 13. Eight chapters spent \$88.97 in furtherance of this National Defense work.
- 14. Five chapters evaluate textbooks (history, social science), 9 members working, 7 sent reviews or remarks.
  - 15. Seventeen chapters reported knowing teachers and principles.

- 16. Patriotic holidays observed: Flag Day 24, Washington's Birthday 21, Constitution Day 17, Lincoln's Birthday 3, Susan B. Anthony's Birthday 1, Columbus Day 1, Kansas Day 5, Memorial Day 5, Thanksgiving 3, Independence Day 2, Louisiana Purchase 1, Armistice Day 2.
  - 17. Sixteen chapters cooperated with other community agencies.
- 18. Community projects reported: Good Citizenship Medals, OSO, Americanism Center, Eisenhower Foundation, Old Santa Fe-Trail Museum, Blood Bank, Flags and Manuals given to D Ps in community.
- 19. The most important project reported by the most chapters the 5 minute presentation of National Defense information to chapters.

May I suggest to National Defense Chairmen for another year—Digest and correlate your material thoroughly. Hold your time strictly to 5 minutes. Request time for one full chapter National Defense program before your Yearbook committee arranges its program. Becure that you know the difference between propaganda and facts and fearlessly present your facts.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF SHAWNEE MISSION CHAIRMAN

Mrs. Chauncey Cox, Shawnee Mission Chairman

Your Shawnce Mission Chairman has certainly enjoyed her role this year to the fullest extent.

Our annual State D.A.R. Constitution Day Pilgrimage to old Shawnec Mission on September 17th was well attended by approximately 200 people. The State Historical Society cooperated beautifully with our group in having the East Building in readiness for us by that date! and also, having installed the directional SHAWNEE MISSION signs on Highway 50.

It was in preparation for the centennial anniversary of the organization of Kansas territory this year, 1954, that prompted the Kansas Historical Society to redecorate the East Building; and an interior decorator was engaged. In conformity to other museums of its kind and in having our rooms represent the correct period, the Kansas Historical Society has removed the portraits of our past State regents from the walls of our rooms, as well as other rooms; and suggested that they be placed in an album.

May it be said, at this time, that there were 110 inches of Pilgrimage publicity in six local newspapers, including pictures.

Our State D.A.R. Society sent \$34.32 to the Kansas Historical Society in October, 1953 for the decorating expense in their rooms at the Mission. That included replacing the wall paper on the east wall and washing of the woodwork; and touching up a few places with paint.

In June your chairman sent some informational data on SHAW-NEE MISSION to all the Kansas Chapters, to be used for a program, if so desired. Then on January 5th, she sent out questionnaires to all the chapters, the information being used in this report.

She was delighted with the percentage of responses from the chapter chairmen, having received answers from 49 Chapters. Out of our 62 State Chapters, we have 51 SHAWNEE MISSION Chairmen. Twenty-eight Chapters had SHAWNEE MISSION as part of their year's program and those that didn't are planning to do so this year.

There were twenty-three chapters who used the material which was sent to them in June. It was indeed a thrill to your chairman when she opened the questionnaires and found "yes" answers to the specifield questions.

The "General Edward Hand" Chapter of Ottawa has contributed six lovely antique soup plates left them by the will of Mrs. Brembacker to be placed in SHAWNEE MISSION. "Shawnee" Chapter donated a leather bound guest registration book for our rooms in September. There are several other chapters who hope to make contributions to our rooms in the near future.

There were twenty-four Chapters represented at our Pilgrimage with the following number from these Chapters: Abilene 1, Arthur Barrett 1, Betty Washington 16, Jesse Leavenworth 6, Courtney-Spalding 1, Desire Tobey Sears 1, Eunice Sterling 2, Gen. Edward Hand 10, Henry Dawson 1, Isabella Weldin 2, James Ross 26, John Haupt 2, Lois Warner 1, Martha Loving-Ferrell 5, Mary Wade Strother 1, Molly Foster Berry 8, Newton 3, Oceanus Hopkins 8, Polly Odgen 4, Shawnee 11, Topeka 12, Atchison 5, Jeremiah Howard 1 and Olathe 3.

Among the suggestions for your SHAWNEE MISSION Chairman, which were solicited in the questionnnaire, was one which several members felt that the responsibility of the hostess role for the SHAWNEE MISSION Pilgrimage should be shared with other chapters of the Northeast District.

Your SHAWNEE MISSION Chairman would like to express her appreciation and thanks to our State Regent, Mrs. Abels, to all chapter Shawnee Mission Chairman and all those who helped with the work of this committee.

#### AMERICANISM AND D.A.R. MANUAL

Dear Chapter Chairman of Americanism and D.A.R. Manual for Citizenship:

That is quite a title and apparently you and I have much to do before the March reports are due.

The National Chairman of Americanism and D.A.R. Manual for Citizenship committee is Mrs. Ashmead White, 157 Broadway, Bangor, Maine.

She writes that the aims and purposes of this Committee is citizenship training under two main divisions: (1) Work with the Foreign Born and (2) Work with our Youth.

Under work with the Foreign Born we should contact aliens through social workers, School Superintendents, the courts, immigration offices, etc. We should attend naturalization ceremonies and then follow up these new citizens. They may need our help especially to register and vote. We should interest ourselves in schools for the foreign born as well as help reduce illiteracy among native whites and negroes.

(2) Under work with our Youth comes the training of Youth to become Good Citizens. Work with local authorities on the teen age drug addiction problems, support automobile safety programs. Help underprivileged children by working at dental and medical clinics, playgrounds, nurseries, etc.

Human Conservation has been added to our program. This includes our interest in youth, under Welfare Depts., Juvenile Court. work, and the helping of the physically handicapped, and mentally sick.

The Girl Homemakers Committee has been discontinued but anywork such as contest cooking, menu planning, sewing and Homeeconomics Scholarships may be reported.

Volunteer Youth Service cooperation with any groups such as-Girl Scouts, P.T.A., 4-H Clubs, Church Youth groups are also incorporated.

Every chapter is urged to have at least one program to study the Constitution, Bill of Rights and the Immigration and Naturalization Laws.

The D.A.R. Manuals for Citizenship are study books and should be given to foreigners at the time they take out their first papers forcitizenship. The manuals are distributed free for naturalization purposes.

Please send me the names of persons needing manuals such as-School Superintendents, Naturalization Leaders, Immigration Officers, Class Leaders, Social Workers who will be working with thetoreign born.

The National Board voted to charge 25c per copy for Manuals. to schools and organizations, and to charge postage when lots of 25 or more are ordered.

A program on Manuals perhaps with a Judge, Immigration authority or teacher as guest speaker might be worked out.

Let us hear from you goon. Please send any newspaper clippings pertaining to your work.

#### D.A.R. MUSEUM

Following is a report of Kansas work accomplished this year for the D.A.R. Museum in Washington.

Kansas daughters have shown great interest and pride in our National D.A.R. Museum. Our theme for the year has been, "Out of the Past We Learn for the Present and the Future." Through the Museum we are doing patriotic, historic, and educational work. Our Museum will benefit from our interest and support and continue to be one of the finest in the country. It attracts visitors from all parts of the world. It is a part of our heritage as Daughters.

Our work for the Museum has been three-fold.

First—Our goal has been every chapter in Kansas devoting one meeting to a study of the Museum.

Second—Contributions to the Museum Fund and to the Art Fund within the Museum Fund.

Third—The donation of gifts, previous to 1830.

The majority of chapters have had interesting programs concerning the Museum. Many have included a showing of antiques with the museum program. This is an effective means of creating interest in and a study of antiques. Several chapters reported that at each chapter meeting the hostess displayed antiques. Programs such as these create interest in the giving of gifts to our Museum.

An interesting paper telling of the history of the Museum and describing the priceless treasures now on display has been sent to me.

Kansas has given to the Museum Fund as follows: Twenty-four dollars to the Museum Fund and eighteen dollars to the Art Fund within the Museum Fund. This makes a total of forty-two dollars.

Money is needed for the restoration of priceless oil paintings. I am hoping that all chapters that have not contributed to this fund will do so as soon as possible.

As State Chairman of the Museum, I attended two of the District meetings and reported on the Museum and its needs. Publicity has been given our National Museum.

Mrs. Richard C. Southgate, our Curator General, writes us of the rare and beautiful objects now on display in the Museum. I am hoping that Kansas daughters traveling to Washington will visit our Museum. It is a beautiful and fascinating place. They should then bring back information concerning it to the members of Kansas chapters. I should like to hear of gifts which Kansas daughters wish to give to our Museum. I am sure we can increase our interest and our giving of gifts.

May I urge all chapter Regents to appoint Museum chairmen. Chapter chairmen can do much toward creating interest in, and gifts for, our Museum.

It is a pleasure and privilege to serve Kansas daughters and I am grateful to the State Regent for this opportunity. My thanks to our Kansas chapters for their interest and cooperation. We will continue to work with increased interest for our Museum.

#### CONSERVATION

#### Josephine Davis, Chairman

I have received replies to a short questionnaire sent early in February, from 51 of the 61 Chapters in the State. Letters were sent to the 32 conservation chairmen in those Chapters having such a chairman. All the Chapters that did not report the name of a chairman for conservation were contacted through the Regent.

Sixteen Chapters reported Conservation programs. These included panel discussions, papers, colored slides, short movies and speakers. Five Chapters have had Conservation projects. Council Oak Chapter helped pay for tree surgery on the famous Council Oak at Council Grove, Kansas. Sterling Chapter, at Sterling, Kansas, planted two Golden Spruce trees at the Santa Fe Trail marker on Highway 96 and 14 near Lyons, Kansas. They were watered and cared for during the drouth, and are reported doing just fine. Some necessary repairs were made at the marker, also.

The big or little dam situation in Northeast Kansas is a major controversy, although it is the largest public conservation in the state; one that our D.A.R. State Resolutions Committee has discussed at the past two state conferences and has felt better to keep hands off. Arthur Barrett Chapter, Marysville, at a program of pictures and soil Conservation speaker, presented an awards of merit to Hon. Howard S. Miller, First District Congressman, for his outstanding leadership in National Soil Conservation, which included opposition to Tuttle Creek dam near Manhattan.

Six Chapters have asked for and been furnished material on different aspects of Conservation. I hope to co-operate with the state program chairmen this summer, so that we may have more program numbers that will create interest and understanding of this important topic.

#### APPROVED SCHOOLS

(Mrs. A. L.) Blanche Comstock

In January my first letter as your State Chairman of Approved Schools was sent to all Chapter Regents and Chapter Chairmen, announcing my recent appointment.

A questionnaire was enclosed for all Chapter Chairmen's yearly report—56 chapters reported. All chapters reported a Chapter Chairman of Approved Schools.

- 32 chapters listed Approved Schools in their budgets.
- 24 chapters gave a program on the schools.
- 3 chapters showed slides of our schools.
- 35 chapters reported sending clothing to the schools—a total of 49 boxes, valuation \$1,770.00, weights 2,419 lbs.
  - 8 full scholarships were sent, totaling \$1,055.00.
  - 10 partial scholarships, totaling \$68.50.
    - \$50.00 was sent for medical supplies.
    - Cash donations to all schools amounted to \$858.00.

Total of all donations, \$1,981.50—Included in this is, Scholarships \$1,124.00, \$102.50 total to five other schools.

Broken down for the individual schools.

Kate Duncan Smith—Scholarships \$267.50—Cash donations \$334.-50. Clothing valuations \$858.50, weighing 1,218 lbs.

Tamassee—Scholarships \$856.50—Cash donations \$271.50. Clothing valuations \$728.50, weighing 859 lbs.

Crossnore—Cash donations \$76.00—Clothing valuations \$183.00, weighing 342 lbs.

Berea-Cash donations \$33.00.

Berry-Cash donations \$20.00.

Blue Ridge—Cash donations \$20.00.

Lincoln Memorial—Cash donations \$12.50.

Pine Mountain Settlement—Cash donations \$20.00.

Several chapters reported sending Christmas boxes of gifts, candy and cookies. Six chapters failed to report, and several chapters included their donations to St. Mary's School, St. Francis Boys' Home, and Bacone. Their total amount being \$653.00. These contributions cannot be credited in my report, it consists only of the 13 national approved schools listed and sent out by the National Society.

In the late fall it was suggested by National that some states take over a towel project for our own Kate Duncan School. Kansas took over that project. As my letters went out announcing the project it was most gratifying the way the chapters responded to the call. Beautiful\_towels of all colors and designs made a most attractive display at the conference.

A total of 472 towels were donated. 426 were displayed at the conference. 46 were mailed direct to the school. \$2.00 was donated for shipping charges. Your splendid cooperation in this project is greatly appreciated. My sincerest thanks for your assistance.

Your Chapter chairman plans to take a tour of the approved schools this fall. By doing so she feels she will be able to serve her State Society as a better informed chairman.

The following resolution has been approved by the members of the Southwest District of D.A.R.

Whereas the National Society of the Daughters of The American Revolution in April 1953 declared itself in favor of Senate Joint Resolution No. 1 known as the Bricker Amendment.

Whereas: during the last hours of the 83rd Congress a diversionary measure, known as the Knowland substitute, was introduced which stopped passage of the Resolution of No. 1 and

Whereas: this Knowland substitute fails to safeguard the Constitution against treaty and executive agreement, which is the purpose of the Bricker Amendment, be it resolved that the Southwest District of the Kansas Daughters of The American Revolution stand on the action of the N.S.D.A.R. and Senate Resolution No. 1, known as the Bricker Amendment and that members call upon their Senators to defeat the Knowland substitute as a worthless instrument and toenact the Bricker Amendment with an additional clause, making it retroactive to January 1, 1945, thus causing it to affect the United. Charter and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, so nullifying any acts which the treaties creating them may permit, but which would otherwise be unconstitutional.

The above resolution was passed by the Southwest District of the Kansas Daughters of the American Revolution in Session Oct. 31, 1953, Great Bend, Kans.

Report of the Acting Secretary, Morning Session:

In spite of the unexpected snow storm and consequent bad road conditions, 32 Daughters were present at the morning session at the Northwest District Conference at the Ripley Hotel in Newton on Nov. 7, 1953. More arrived in time for the luncheon and the afternoon session.

Coffee and cookies were served to the early arrivals by the gracious hostess chapter of Newton. On display in the hotel dining room (which also served as the meeting room) were chapter yearbooks, aprons, and lineage books. The aprons were brought by Mrs. Robert Chesney, State Chairman of the Eisenhower Foundation, D.A.R., and were for sale as were the lineage booklets which were brought by Emporia chapter. The aprons were made of nylon net and trimmed with nosegays and were very colorful and festive in appear ance. Money from the sale of the aprons goes to the Eisenhower Foundation.

The meeting was called to order at 10 a.m. by Miss Pauline Cowger, Regent of Mary Wade Strother Chapter, Salina, and Northwest District Director. Mrs. John C. Reese, Newton, offered prayer. Mrs. J. J. Heffelfinger, Newton, led the recital of the pledge of allegiance to the flag and the American creed. Mrs. L. J. Nelson, Newton, led the singing of the national anthem. Mrs. E. R. Sanner, Newton, who was the efficient general chairman of the Conference, was the pianist. Mrs. John H. Griffith, Regent, Newton chapter, welcomed the Conference. The response was to have been given by Mrs. J. H. Jenson, State Recording Sceretary, but since she was unable to be prosent, there was no response except the vigorous applause given Mrs. Griffith.

Minutes of the Oct. 22, 1953 Conference held in Emporia were read by Mrs. Mabelle Ehlers, Polly Ogden chapter, acting secretary for the morning session. Berger, Sarah Steward chapter and were read by the acting secretary. The report on the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage was made by Mrs. Wm. Louis Ainsworth, Vice President General, for Mrs. W. A. Crary, State Reporter. Mrs. Ainsworth who, besides being Vice President General, is National Chairman, Correct Use of the Flag Committee, and also State Organizer, distributed The Flag Code, a leaflet with a solf explanatory title. She spoke briefly on some of the problems involved especially those in relation to the position of a church flag when the national flag is also displayed. Among other helpful statements made by Mrs. Ainsworth was this: we often hear the flag spoken of as the Stars and Stripes. If the flag as displayed reads Stripes and Stars, then it is wrong. A brief history of the Northwest District was read by the acting secretary compiled by Miss Cowger from the minutes of the former meeting. The report of the State Reporter, Mrs. W. A. Crary was also read.

It is my pleasure to bring greetings from the National Society,. Children of the American Revolution. I attended the National Board meeting, October 12, 1953, in Washington, D. C.

Reports covering the period, April 1, to September 30, showed that 126 have transferred to D.A.R.; 38 to S.A.R.; 108 over age and dropped; 478 new applicants were approved at this Board meeting.

The C.A.R. National Project for the current year is American Indians. A fully equipped tractor will be presented to Bacone College, Bacone, Oklahoma, by the N.S.C.A.R. Cost about \$2200.00 at 15c per member.

An important consideration of the national board of C.A.R. was the acceptance of a gift of a collection of 600 dolls. The collection was made over a period of 30 years and each country, each protectorate and each distinct section of certain countries is represented by authentic costumed dolls, generally a boy and girl doll. The collection will be placed in specialy designed cases, with tinted gass, to prevent discoloration of colors, in the C.A.R. Museum in Constitution Hall, Washington, D.C. It will be known as the Kathleen Douglas collec-

tion, presented by her parents in her memory. Among many offers they have had for this collection was \$10,000.00. A tentative estimate of the cost of the cases has been given as \$2300.00. Doll banks, for penny collections, will be sent out to finance the purchase of the cases.

A recommendation was sent out to the N.S.D.A.R. board to place C.A.R. on the list of national committees. C.A.R. status will not be changed, only in relation to committee assignments. The respective C.A.R. officers will head the respective C.A.R. committees in the national, state and local societies.

This will be presented for a vote at the 1954 Continental Congress. This recommendation meets with the approval of Miss Gertrude Caraway, President General. C.A.R. was on the list of D.A.R. national committees until 1919.

#### **BY-LAWS**

#### of the

#### KANSAS STATE SOCIETY

#### of the

#### NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE

#### AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised and Adopted at the State Conference March 11, 1950

#### ARTICE I.

#### Name

The name of this society shall be the Kansas State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### ARTICLE II.

#### Object

- Section 1. This Society pledges fidelity and loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the objects of which are:
- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relies, and for the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary and enlightening public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Section 2. Its purpose shall be to further the above plans of the National Society and to maintain harmonious co operation among the chapters in Kansas and to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

#### ARTICLE III.

#### Membership

Section 1. The membership of this State Society shall include all Daughters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who are members in good standing of some Chapter in Kansas.

Good standing shall be interpreted to mean that all National and State dues have been paid.

Section 2. Chapters failing to pay State dues shall not be ontitled to representation at State Conference, to receive State Communications or participate in any State affairs until dues are paid to the State Society.

#### ARTIVLE IV.

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Chaplain, State Recording Secretary, State Treasurer, State Registrar, State Historian, State Librarian, State Reporter, and State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 2. No member shall be eligible for election to any state office or appointment to any state chairmanship who has not been a member in good standing of the Kansas State Society for one year. No member shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms, and no member who has served one term in any state office, shall be eligible to election to any other state office, except that of State Regent and State Vice Regent, until the expiration of one year.

A member having served more than one half term in any office shall be deemed to have served a term. A candidate for State Regent or State Vice Regent must have served as an elected Chapter Regent. A candidate for any State office must have served as an elected chapter officer.

Section 3. Election of officers shall take place on the last day of the annual State Conference occurring in the year of the election of National Officers.

Election shall be by ballot, for a term of three years.

A majority of votes cast shall elect.

The terms of office of the State Regent and State Vice Regent begin at the close of the Continental Congress which confirms their election.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected and confirmed, beginning with the year of 1950.

Provided that, at the next regular election, to be held in 1948, the officers shall be elected for a two year term.

Section 4. The nominating committee shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the October State Board of Management meeting.

This elected member shall serve as chairman of the nominating committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to submit names of candidates for the state offices on the second day of the annual State Conference of election year. Nominations other than those made by the nominating committee may also be made from the floor. All candidates must have given their consent before nomination.

The nominating committee shall, immediately after November first, notify all Chapters of impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted.

Candidates shall be selected from all districts of the state. No person shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at State Conference.

Section 5. When the several candidates for State Regent are nominated, each in turn shall nominate her State Corresponding Secretary. The ballot cast for a State Regent shall serve, automatically, as a ballot for her State Corresponding Secretary. Thus each is an elected officer. In no other instance may two officers be elected from the same chapter.

Section 6. In recognition of valuable service to the State Society the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by acclamation at a State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent.

#### ARTICLE V.

#### Duties of Officers

Section 1. STATE REGENT: The State Regent, in addition to performing the duties which pertain to her office, according to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, shall preside at all meetings of this Society, of the Executive Committee, of the State Board of Management and to the Kansas Delegation to the Continental Congress. She shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for, sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer for moneys appropriated by the Society, and may call meetings of the Executive Committee or Eoard of Management whenever she may consider it important and necessary. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter General Chairman, prepare the program for the Annual State Conference. She shall present at the Annual State Conference all amend-

ments proposed to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society and such other matters as she may deem worthy of consideration. She shall be a member of the printing committee. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees, excepting a nominating committee.

She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer, to have recorded in the State Treasurer's books, all membership reports received from the National Society, following each meeting of the National Board. The State Treasurer will duly record the same.

Upon hor confirmation, the incoming State Regent may appoint a State Parliamentarian, and Consulting Genealogist.

Section 2. STATE VICE REGENT: The State Vice Regent, in the absence or disability of the Regent, shall perform the duties pertaining to the office of Regent. She shall be a member of the printing and stationery committee and a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. STATE CHAPLAIN: The State Chaplain shall officiate in the offering prayer and other religious services when requested by the Regent. She shall prepare the proceeding for the Annual State

Section 4. STATE RECORDING SECRETARY: The State Recording Socretary chall keep a correct record of all meetings of the State Conference, the State Executive Committee and the Board of Management. She shall be chairman of the Printing and Stationery Committee; countersign all orders drawn on the Treasurer and signed by the Regent. She shall prepare the proceeding for th Annual State Conference for publication, subject to the approval of the State Regent, and perform such other duties as pertain to her office.

Section 5. STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: The State Corresponding Secretary, under the direction and supervision of the Regent, shall notify all state Officers and the Regent of each chapter in good standing of the time of the Annaul Conference not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall give notice of meetings of the Executive Committee, and Board of Management as directed by the State egent. She shall be the chairman of the committee on credentials. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, immediately after the close of Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the various chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each state chairman two typewritten copies of the list of names and addresses of her respective chapter chairmen, (one of which is to be sont to her National Chairman and the second one for her own use.) She shall compile these lists into a directory for the ensuing administration.

Section 6. STATE TREASURER: The State Treasurer shall. collect all moneys and disburse the same only upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. All moneys received by the Treasurer shall be deposited in some reliable bank in her name as State Treasurer, and all payments made by her shall be by check. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit the same to a Certified Public Accountant before the Annual State Conference. She shall be custodian of all bonds and policies belonging to the Society. She shall be bonded by the State Society for the sum of \$2,500.00 for the faithful discharge of the duties above defined. She shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan Notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall be a member of the Executive and Credentials Committees.

Section 7. STATE REGISTRAR: The State Registrar shall keep the card file as established; assist in proving eligibility claims; pre pare the Kansas Directory Daughters of the American Revolution, when ordered by the Society; check her membership file against the records of the State Treasurer immediately after July first. She shall keep a file of all reports received from the National Society and these are to be delivered with the State Card file, and all other material dealing with the work of the office, to her successor. She shall be a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 8. STATE HISTORIAN: The State Historian shall take charge of all the historical papers received by the Society and shall catalogue and arrange the same, placing in a locker at the State Historical Society at Topeka, such historical documents; and all materials for preservation. She shall be a member of the Memorial Committee. She shall prepare the Smithsonian Report.

Section 9. STATE LIBRARIAN: The State Librarian shall have supervision of the State D.A.R. library. She shall prepare a report listing all material sent to the National Library and all books records, and other material received for the State Library, during the year, for publication in the State Conforence Proceedings. On retiring from the office, the State Librarian shall send to the newly elected Librarian and to the State Regent a complete list of all matrial on file in the State D.A.R. Library, and given over to the newly elected State Librarian.

Section 10. STATE REPORTER: The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the State Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be State Chairman of the Publicity.

Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files (or Scrap Book) and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D. C.

Section 11. All officers and Committee Chairmen upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, all moneys, accounts, record books, papers or other property belonging to the Society.

#### ARTICLE VI.

#### Meetings

Section 1. The supreme governing body of this society shall be a Conference. An annual meeting of the Kansas State Conference shall be held in March unless otherwise ordered by the State Conforence or by the State Board of Management. The purpose of this conference shall be to receive reports of the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen; for the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. Each State Chairman shall compile a typed report of not more than three hundred words covering the work accomplished by her committee for the year ending February twenty-eighth. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary by March first, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Each Chapter Regent shall send a roport of the work and plans of her chapter, for the year ending February twenty-eight, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary immediately after March first. This report shall be typed, and limited to two hundred fifty words, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Section 3. The Kansas State Society shall be divided into four districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, South east and Southwest Districts, respectively.

At each District meeting the State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board of Management meeting.

A Director, Scerctary and Treasurer shall be elected at an annual district meeting to be held in the fall. The term of office shall be one year and no District Officer shall serve more than three consecutive terms. Each district shall entertain the State Conference in rotation; the time and place to be determined by the hostess district and the State Regent.

Section 4. The voting members of the Annual State Conference shall be the State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, and Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the first Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates, regularly elected by Chapters as heroinafter specified, provided they have been members of their Chapter for one year and are in good standing.

Section 5. Twenty-five voting members shall constitute a quorum at the meeting of the Annual State Conference.

Section 6. Chapters of less than fifty members shall be entitled to representation at the Annual State Conference by the regent and two delegates. Chapters having membership of fifty to one hundred shall be represented by their Regent and five delegates. After the first hundred, representation shall be in the ratio of three delegates for every subsequent one hundred. Alternates shall be elected for each Chapter Regent and delegate.

Section 7. Delegates and alternates shall be elected at the January meeting of their Chapter in each year, and certificates of their election signed by the Regent and Treasurer of their Chapter, shall be sent to the State Coresponding Secretary for the Committee on Credentials by February first. Vacancies that occur in the delegation may be filled by the Regent from alternates duly elected for that

purpose at the January meeting.

Section 8. Daughters attending State Conference shall pay a registration fee of One Dollar.

Section 9. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Picnic shall be held on Constitution Day, September 17, with the Northeast District as hostess.

#### ARTICLE VII.

#### Board of Management

Section 1. The State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose memberships are within the State. District Directors and Chapter Regents shall constitute a State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over affairs of the State Society to do and transact business during the interim between the meetings of the State Society. The State Board shall meet at the call of the State Regent at least twice a year. One meeting to be held immediately preceding the first fall District meeting and one to be held immediately preceding the opening session of the State Conference.

Other meetings may be held upon the call of the State Regent of upon written request of seven members of the Board of Management. It shall recommend to the Annual State Conference such patriotic and historic work as seems desirable to be undertaken by the

Society. Eleven members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have power to-

fill vacancies in office until the next election; the election to fill such vacancies shall be by ballot, notice of the vancancy having been given in the call for the meeting of the State Board.

Section 4. All officers, the Board of Management and Committees shall make reports of their work for the year, at the Annual State Conference.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

#### Executive Committee

Section 1. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Recording Secretary, State Registrar and State Treasurer, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three members.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall make a report at each meeting of the Board of Management.

#### ARTICLE IX.

#### Committees

Section 1. The Regent shall appoint a Student Loan Committee consisting of three members who shall supervise the Kansas D.A.R. Student Loan Fund.

The Regent shall appoint a Conference Committee which shall

consist of the Reporter and two other members.

There shall be a Printing and Stationery Committee which shall consist of the Recording Secretary, Vice Regent and Regent.

A Memorial Committee shall consist of the State Chaplain, chair-

man; State Historian, and one other member.

The Committee on Credentials shall consist of the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and one other member.

## ARTICLE X. State Funds

Section 1. Each Chapter, belonging to the State Society shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before January first of each year the sum of \$1.35 for each member, in good standing on the Chapter rolls on that date.

Chapter Treasurers shall furnish, with each remittance of dues.

a list of members for whom she is paying.

Chapters failing to pay above per capita dues shall be delinquent

- Section 3. Stationery and postage, and in cases of emergency, telephone and telegraph charges, which charges shall be validated by the Executive Comittee, shall be furnished to the State Officers and State Committees.
- Section 4. A sum not to exceed \$500.00 per year shall be allowed the State Regent for her expenses in carrying on her work.
- Section 5. To partially defray her expenses to the State Conference, each State Officer shall be allowed the sum of \$12.00, provided however, that no expenses will be allowed an Officer when the Conference is held in her own home city.
- Section 6. No provision is made for expenses of Honorary State Officers.
- Section 7. In addition to the obligations specified in these By-Laws, no debts or liabilities shall be incurred except by vote of the Conference.
- Section 8. A sum equal to ten cents per member shall be taken from the State Fund and placed in an Annual State Conference Expense Account.
- Section 9. A sum equal to two cents a member shall be taken from State Fund Annually and placed in the treasury of the Kansas C.A.R. The amount accumulated to be used for C.A.R. projects.

#### ARTICLE XI.

#### Chapters

Section 1. It is recommended that election of chapter officers, for a term of three years, take place in January, occurring in the same year as the election of state officers. Chapter officers shall be installed and take office in May, following the confirmation of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent at Continental Congress.

On or before February first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks to be furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three type-written lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter Officers for the ensuing year.

The Regent-clect of each chapter shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on or before April first, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of all newly appointed chapter chairmen.
