PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

OBJECTS

The objects of this Society as stated in Article II of the Constitution are:

1.

To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic auniversaries.

2.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3.

To cherish, maintain, and extend to institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center of the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, Page 62.

GENERAL INFORMATION

CHAPTER REGISTRARS ATTENTION: Please copy from application papers before sending to Washington, the full name of applicant including her maiden name, and if married, the name or initials of her husband, the complete address, name of ancestor with his rank, the State in which he served and the State in which he died. If the applicant is a Junior Member (under 35 years of age) please make a notation of that with her birth date. As soon as notice is received from National that the applicant has been accepted, report this information to the State Regent and the State Registrar. Report data concerning Junior Members, also to the State Chairman of Junior Membership.

Dues should be in the hands of the Treasurer General and State Treasurer by December 1st. Your chapters representation at State Conference depends on conforming to this rule. Do not wait on delinquents. Members whose dues are unpaid January first are "in arrears."

All contributions to be counted in the current year's report must be in the hands of the State Treasurer by January 31st. The State fiscal year extends from January 31, 1956 to January 31, 1957.

National Chairmen will continue to mail copies of their letters to their respective State Chairmen and National Vice Chairmen. The State Chairmen, in turn, should relay the information to Chapter Chairmen in their respective State.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

WHEREAS a true appreviation of American history is important to good citizenship and a bulwark against the infiltration of alien ideologies, and

WHEREAS a renewed and increased appreciation of great lessons drawn from studying the history of our Country creates increased

WHEREAS certain youth groups have become special targets of internationalism, one such well known youth organization having designated February as "internationanl month," therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution urge its chapters to designate February as "American History Month" and urge the Governor of the State of Kansas and city mayors to officially declare February as "American History Month" to help build a durable heritage of faith, fortitude, and righteousness for future generations.

PATRIOTISM IN EDUCATION

WHEREAS national security depends upon the character of our citizens and a knowledge of the fundamental principles upon which the United States government was established, and also an understanding of the forces working toward its destruction and

WHEREAS the "training of our youth today determines the security of our nation Tomorrow." presupposes the necessity of specialized instruction regarding the advantages of our system of

government above others in order to build good future citizens and provide for the security of coming generations, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution continue and strengthen its interest in the patriotic education of our youth by the support of laws requiring the teaching of American history, civics and the science of the American form of government in our schools; increased supervision in the selection of instructors and materials used; encouragement of more public meetings for the purpose of increasing interest in patriotic education, and other means for accomplishing the objectives stated in this resolution.

UNESCO

WHEREAS the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, known as UNESCO, a specialized agency of the United Nations, has declared among other objectionable things that "nationalism is the major obstacle to the development of world mindedness' and

WHEREAS said UNESCO is carrying on powerful propaganda through the American school system and otherwise working toward destruction of the form of government established by the founding fathers with the thought of promoting a one world pattern and

WHEREAS UNESCO is a deliberate plan to create public opinion for world citizenship—especially directed to the school children of the Nation and is patterned exactly after the Communist teaching in Soviet Russia, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution go on record as supporting the action taken by the recent national convention of the American Legion at Miami,, Florida, urging Congress to take appropriate action to completely disassociate the United State government from the UNESCO program.

FEDERAL AID TO EDUCATION

RESOLVED: That the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, resifirm their adamant stand for control of education by the people through their States and local communities only and oppose federal aid to education.

INVESTIGATING COMMITTEES

WHEREAS we have on previous occasions stated our approval of investigating committees devoted to protecting our country against the invasion of alien ideologies and the operation of subversive forces, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm its previous stand in this regard and commend the efforts of those who are exposing subversive activities and request the Congress to appropriate adequate funds for the continuance of the courageous campaign by our duly elected legislators and their staffs.

APPENDIX NINE

WHEREAS a special report prepared some years ago by the House Committee On Un-American Activities when Representative Martin Dies was chairman, known as "Appendix Nine" consisting of several volumes, has been for some reason taken out of circulation and

WHEREAS said report is known to contain vital information designed to alert the American people to dangers of subversive activities, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution urge the Congress of the United States to authorize the reprinting and circulation of this document and appropriate the necessary funds required to complete the project.

THE F.B.I.

WHEREAS the Federal Bureau of Investigation has by its integrity, courage, intelligent leadership and loyalty to the principles upon which the Republic was founded, helped insulate the American people against focs of many types and descriptions, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution reiterate confidence in the Federal Bureau of Investigation and its able leadership symbolized by the person of Mr. J. Edgar Hoover.

KANSAS COMMITTEE ON UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES

WHEREAS certain States, notably California, have found it advantageous to set up committées on un-American activities to co-

operate with various law enforcement agencies and departments of the federal government such as the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the House Committee On Un-American Activities, and

WHEREAS the people of Kansas need to be kept informed regarding the mechanics and machinations of the communist apparatus, and also alerted to the dangers of communist infiltration among non-communist groups including schools, civic clubs, churches, labor unions and other bodies, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution suggest that the Kansas State Legislature explore the possibility and advisability of organizing such a committee in Kansas to function along lines comparable to similar committees now existing in other states.

FEDERAL JURY SYSTEM

WHEREAS the jury system is a fundamental of the American judicial structure and basic to a free society under law and must therefore be protected and

WHEREAS recent attempts have been made to undermine and bring this branch of the judicial system into question and disrepute by secretly planting dictaphones in rooms where jurors were deliberating, thereby eavesdropping on their conversations dealing with the innocence or guilt of persons on trial in open court and

WHEREAS Attorney General Herbert Brownell proposed on January 10, 1956 that Congress enact a law prohibiting such activities as being inconsistent with the purposes of the Seventh Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansus Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution go on record as condemning said innovations and urge Congress to do everything possible to expedite enactment of the law proposed by Attorney General Brownell.

RIGHT TO WORK

WHEREAS the Constitution of the United States and the Bill of Rights guarantees to its citizens certain freedoms including the choice of occupation, a fundamental right of the American heritage and

WHEREAS totalitarian systems deny their citizens the rights

of such choice thereby making those who labor and all others servants of the state, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution recognize and approve the basic right of all Americans to choose their own vocations and at the same time commend those who are trying by legislative processes to preserve and uphold this sacred right.

IMMIGRATION '

WHEREAS the Immigration and Nationality Act, known as the Walter-McCarran Act (Public Law 414) became effective on December 24, 1952, and

WHEREAS the Act has been especially effective in the denaturalization and deportation of criminals and subversives and is operating in the best interests of the American people, and

WHEREAS pressure is being placed upon government officials and Congress by certain groups to change this law, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eight annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm its approval of the Walter-McCarran Act and urge all patriotic Americans to resist any change, weakening amendments or private bills which would destroy its effectuality.

REVIEW OF UN CHARTER

WHEREAS the tenth General Assembly of the United Nations passed a resolution on November 21, 1955 which calls for a Review Conference, and the Security Council voted its concurrence on December 15, 1955 and

WHEREAS a committee of the Whole has been created to work with the Secretary-General of the United Nations in fixing a time and place for the Conference, its organization and procedure, and said Committee is to report its recommendation to the Twelfth Assembly in 1957, and

WHEREAS proponents of World Government are seeking to propagandize the American people into support of converting the United Nations into a World Government wherein the sovereignty of our Republic under Constitutional government would be destroyed, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm its opposition to World Government in any form and urge our Congress to carefully investigate Charter Review and resist any attempt to convert the United Nations Charter into a World Government.

SUPPORTING THE BRICKER AMENDMENT.

WHEREAS treaties "shall be the supreme law of the land and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby" when two-thirds of "the Senators concur," and

WHEREAS executive agreements may have the same prerogatives, and

WHEREAS the United States is one of the few Nations in which a treaty becomes "self-executing" automatically, and

WHEREAS specialized agencies of the United Nations and other entangling alliances can pose special threats through these treaty making powers, and

WHEREAS the supremacy of the United Nations Charter over the United States Constitution has already become an issue in some court cases, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm its support and endorsement of the Bricker Amendment which provides that no treaty or other international agreement can become internal except through laws enacted by elected representatives of the American people.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm its request that the United States Senate consider the advisability of further amending the Constitution, so as to require either a majority or two-thirds vote of the entire membership before any treaty can be adopted.

PEACEFUL COEXISTENCE

WHEREAS the twentieth Congress of the Soviet Communist Party recently declared it a part of their global program to work inside the capitalist world under the slogan "peace," with Kruschev declaring there are only two roads, "peaceful co-existence or war," and at the same time stating that violent revolution is not necessary now to bring about a socialist state, and

WHEREAS the Select Committee on Communist Aggression of the House of Representatives concluded that the history of Czechoslovakia is the history of every government that tried to coexist or cooperate with the Communists and

WHEREAS the Committee further concluded "that peaceful coexistence is a Communist myth which can be attained only through the complete surrender of our free way of life for one of slavery under Moscow controlled Communism," therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eight annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution support a re-examination of the Country's foreign policy by the Congress of the United States that America may not succomb to this poisonous formula of "peaceful co-existence" distilled by Communism, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Fifty-eight annual conference call upon our government and its citizens to heed the warning: "When they shall say Peace and safety, then sudden destruction cometh upon them."

WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

WHEREAS the World Council of Churches has on its official roster leaders from the iron curtain countries, as for example Professor Josef L. Hromadka, Prague, Czechoslovakia, a Member of the Executive Committee; Dr. Jan Chadaba of Czechoslovakia, Member of the Central Committee; Dr. Victor Hajek of Czechoslovakia, Synodical Senior of the Church of the Czech Brethren, Member of the Central Committee of the World Council; Bishop Janos Peter of Hungary, Delegate to the World Council, and

WHEREAS such men are exercising a baneful influence on the Christian program through the world and communists are known to use the church as a cloak to cover their teachings and

WHEREAS Paul the Apostle said "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers; for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness and what communion hath light with darkness?" therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution call upon its members to be alert and protest any contamination of the holy Christian faith which comes to their attention.

REDEDICATION TO RELIGIOUS PRINCIPLES

WHEREAS by the dispensation of divine grace we are favored to live in a nation founded on a fundamental belief in God and

WHEREAS the thought of mankind is today being invaded and

poisoned by atheistic philosophies and doctrines designed to destroy faith in the supernatural content of historical and evangelical Christianity, in the name of so-called "liberal theology," the "brotherhood of man" and related teachings, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Fifty-eighth annual conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution rededicate itself to continued faith, sincere prayer, steadfast belief in the Bible and greater participation in the field of Christian activities.

CORRECT USE OF FLAG

Mary Ainsworth (Mrs. William L.), National Chairman

For the third year of this administration, it has been our pleasure to promote our motto: "PROTECT OUR FLAG THAT IT MAY CONTINUE TO PROTECT US." The splendid cooperation of the National Vice Chairmen of this committee to forge ahead in one supreme effort to surpass the record of the past two years, is reflected in the reports of the State Chairmen. Thirty-six States had more and better chapter reports this year than last. These States whose chapters reported 100% are given special commendation: Connecticut, Delaware, District of Columbia, Indiana, Ohio, Arizona, New Mexico, North Dakota and Utah.

The many States, striving toward a goal to have a Flag in the home of each member and that Flag displayed on all patriotic anniversaries is encouraging. As one Chairman wrote: "Wouldn't you like to know, when you put out your Flag, that all over America, members of our National Society are also displaying their Flags?"

All States reported enthusiastic participation in the observance of Constitution Week with a greater display of our Flag. Many States reported a special endeavor to promote American History Month with emphasis on display of the Flag.

593 chapters had entire programs on the Flag. 681 chapters made a serious study of the Flag Code. 234 chapters studied their own State Flag legislation with the idea of bringing about better Flag laws. We, in Kansas, are fortunate to have such good legislation for the protection of our Flag. We should make sure those laws are carefully observed.

Wichita reported a 5th Grade teacher in a school near an air base carrying on an out-standing program of Americanism using the D.A.R. Manual for Citizenship and the Flag Code for a course of study. More of these publications should be made available for teachers.

This past year Flag Codes have been distributed to Broadcasting Stations, Chambers of Commerce, City Councils, Civic Clubs, Court Rooms, J.A.C. Clubs, Jobs Daughters, Libraries, Ministers, Naturalization Courts, Newspapers, Publishers, Polling Places, Members of D.A.R., S.A.R. and C.A.R., Boy and Girl Scouts, Schools and Y.W.C.A.

2,558 large Flags, 34,271 small Flags and 16,035 Pledge of Allegiance cards were presented as gifts.

1,832 Flag talks were made to chapters, District and Regional Meetings, Community Gatherings, 4-H Clubs, Kiwanis Clubs, Republican Womens Clubs, Hospitals, Churches, Adult Education

Classes, Schools, Orphanages, Federated Clubs, International Institute and P.E.O.

Appreciation is extended to those Kansas chapters that have cooperated in observing patriotic anniversaries and following the Flag Code.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE

From the reports of the Program Chairmen of the five States in the Western Division, consisting of 166 Chapters, it is noted that marked enthusiasm and increased interest in good programing has been the result of our program outline sent to each Chapter. Also, the availability of material suggested in this outline.

With the exception of a few Chapters that began their metings in October, Constitution Day was unanimously celebrated.

The D.A.R. Magazine is read and used extensively.

Many prominent outside speakers have helped stimulate our theme: "Protect America's Future Through Education." Conservation and National Defense have been th paramount subjects.

Each State in the Western Division shows conscientious effort and marked progress.

D.A.R. MAGAZINE

The chapters in the Western Division have done very well under the leadership of their state and chapter chairmen.

Colorado has 447 subscribers which is seventeen per cent of the membership being subscribers.

Nebraska has 454 subscribers which is eighteen per cent. Nebraska has 44 chapters with 28 chapters in the 20 per cent class.

South Dakota has ninety-seven subscribers which is twenty-two per cent taking the Magazine.

North Dakota has eighty subscribers. Twenty-six per cent of their membership being subscribers.

Kansas has 567 subscribers which is sixteen plus per cent being subscribers. Twenty-two chapters have twenty per cent of their membership taking the Magazine.

It hase been a pleasure to receive the report of progress from our National Chairman, Mrs. Earl M. Hale, each month, for the past

three years, as released by the National Society, D.A.R. Also, to hear from the state chairmen from time to time.

During Constitution observance week, placards sent out by the National Society D.A.R. were placed on display in High School, Church, Bank and two prominent store windows by your National Vice Chairman of the D.A.R. Magazine.

My grateful appreciation to all with whom I have been associated in the interest of the D.A.R. Magazine during the past three years. It has been a pleasure to work with all of you.

AMERICAN MUSIC

Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn, National Vice Chairman Western Division

I would like to submit the following report of our musical activities in the Western Division this year, 1955-56.

Coloreda—14 chapters reported this year. Mrs. Yarnell, State Chairman, feels that though fewer chapters have sent in reports, that it is not from lack of interest. She says that Colorado chapter members have become "far more musically minded, and are particularly interested in American music." Six chapters reported using compositions of state composers. All chapters open each meeting with the National Anthem.

Kansas—Several chapters have stressed the history and development of American music in their programs, roll calls, and stories. Mrs. Henning, State Chairman, lists other interesting ways of furthering American music in chapter meetings. "Religious Influence in the Home," old hymns were used, drawing the group in attendance into the singing. Early American Music used as a setting for Washington Tea. Help interest other organizations with patriotic music. Music by Kansas composers have been used for all or part of chapter programs.

Nebraska—Some chapters report observing National Music Week. Others reported using American Music at each meeting. The state chairman, Mrs. Squires, stressed hymns whose words and music were written by Americans. Other programs featured were music of Nebraska Indians, and music of the presidents from Washington through Truman.

North Dakota—In all D.A.R. projects, American music is a vital part of the program, says Mrs. Thorkelson, State Chairman. Three chapters had programs on American music. One chapter presented music of state composers. In Bismarck, through the influence of chapter members, the local Music Club adopted American Music as the entire year's program.

South Dakota—Only five of fourteen chapters reporting. Mrs. Elster, State Chairman, feels that chapters in her state have not ac-

cepted American music as they should. Some of the chapters observe National Music Week, others reported using American music at each meeting.

STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY Marcia S. Baty

At the 57th Annual State Conference held in Parsons in February 1955, I served as chairman of the Credential Committee reporting the registration figures to sessions of the Conference.

Immediately following the State Conference the State Officers were supplied with lists of their respective chapter officers. A new roster of chapter regents was compiled and mailed to the official

mailing list. On March 1st the file of chapter officers for Kansas was mailed to the Organizing Secretary General in Washington.

In April I accompanied the State Regent to the Continental Congress in Washington. On June 15th the lists of chapter committee chairmen were mailed to each of the state committee chairmen. During May and June I accompanied Mrs. Abels on her visits to Arthur Barrett Chapter, Marysville. Samuel Linscott Chapter, Holton; James Ross Chapter, Kansas City and General Edward Hand Chapter Ottawa. At each of these meetings I gave a report of the Continental Congress.

In August, the official announcement of the Board of Management meeting and of the four district meetings, was mailed to the official mailing list. Illness prevented my attendance at the other two district meetings.

On December 1st the credential forms, for reporting delegates and alternates to the State Conference, were mailed to the chapter regents. On January 1st, blanks for reporting chapter officers were mailed to the chapter regents. On January 15th the official announcement of the Board of Management meeting, and the Annual State Conference to be held in Wichita in March, was mailed to the official mailing list. On January 28th the blanks for reporting chapter committee chairmen were mailed to the chapter regents with a letter of instruction to send these blanks to the newly elected Corresponding Secretary. On February 15th registration cards for chapter delegates and alternates were mailed to chapter regents. On March 1st names and addresses of delegates and alternates to the Continental Congress were compiled into list form.

Forty-eight chapter yearbooks have been received and acknow-ledged. In all 862 pieces of mail were sent out from this office after the State Conference in Parsons. The work of the Credential Committee for the 58th Annual State Conference in Wichita has been planned, and is being put into operation.

In October 1955 I mailed a form letter to all Chapter Registrars with instructions as to the information needed for the State files. In January 1956 the yearly report forms were mailed to all Chapters to date 62 have been returned to me, only 1 chapter not reporting.

The big project this past year has been the printing of the new State Directory, it is now finished and for sale. The information for this Directory was sent from the Chapter Registrars and the files corrected accordingly. If there are mistakes check with your Chapter Registrar first and then notify your State Registrar.

There were 175 letters and 35 post cards sent out from this office this past year.

I attended all executive meetings, Shawnee Mission in September and the fall Board of Management meeting in Ottawa in October and all four of the District meetings.

The Necrology list was prepared for the Memorial Service at State Conference and I assisted with the Service.

I submit the following report to the 58th Annual State Conference: Have attended most of the District Meetings and all State Conferences during my three years as State Librarian. I have enjoyed thoroughly my work. The cooperation among all the members as well as our officers has been most inspiring, also am pleased with the increased use of the Library and the interest shown.

We have (60) Librarians listed out of our 63 chapters. My October letter, with questionaire attached, went out to all chapters. In this I tried to stress the importance of giving more generously to

our libraries—as it is these libraries that are instrumental in bringing in our new members. By thus enlarging our membership we, in turn, are able to take on our various D.A.R. projects all the more easily.

More than 50 percent of chapters gave subscription of D.A.R. magazine to City, University, and High School libraries in their home towns.

Shawnee gave 100 historical calendars to be placed in schools and suitable public places. Jane Dean Coffey assisted in the organization of a Junior Historical Society. Nathan Edson presented a historic flag to Girl Scout Troop and erected a flag pole at Girl Scout Cabin. James Ross presented a Flag Skit and 16 members inspected history text books in local schools. Conducting History Essay Contests were Arthur Barrett, Baxter Springs, Byrd Prewett, Dodge City, Neodesha, Shawnee, Smoky Hill, Sterling and Wellington; Wichita gave a grand total of \$1,400 to the Eisenhower Foundation; Dodge City, \$100 to the Cowboy Capital; Eunice Sterling \$10 to establishment of "Cow Town"; Leavenworth checked cemetery records of Ft. Leavenworth for possible Rev. Soldiers' graves. Fine publicity in TV, Press, and Radio for Flag Day, Constitution Week, and History projects obtained by Shawnee, Arthur Barrett and others. Wichita Chapter gave an acre at Tamassee as a memorial honoring the late Mis. Loren Rex. Wellington gave historical books to city library as memorials honoring deceased members. Council Oak members assisted with Old Kaw Mission Museum at Council Grove. Results of the work accomplished by Kansas Chapters cannot be measured by mere figures. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve the Kansas Society as State Historian for the past three years. My thanks for the splendid cooperation, the many courtesies extended

to me, the invitations that I have been unable to accept.

Of 63 Chapter Historians, 40 returned the questionaire report.

22 Chapters participated in the Historian General's Project, some in two and three activities.

59 DAR members inspected local history text books.

Nine Chapters sponsored history essay contests; eight Chapters gave prizes for best grades in history; 18 historical scrap books were compiled by school children; eight Chapter took school children on historical tours; four Chapter sponsored 27 Historical Programs in schools; two Chapters sponsored Patriotic Anniversaries in schools. 27 Certificates of Awards, 27 medals, 50 gifts of money and books were awarded by the 22 Chapters. A grand total of 638 school children visited historical spots or were taken on historical tours.

Three Revolutionary Soldiers' graves were located by Wichita Chapter.

15 graves of DAR members marked with DAR markers, complete data received by State historian for 10; 81 Patriotic Anniversaries observed; 88 Historical programs in Chapter meetings; One original document reported sent to Historian General; one Chapter, William Wilson contributed \$2 to William Tyler Page Fund; Five glossy photos of DAR Restorations sent to Historian Genearal.

Some outstanding accomplishments: Lucretia Griswold Latimer marked site of Old Fort Montgomery, Eureka, with plaque, and fitting reremonies; Topeka replaced bronze plaque on large stone monument which marks site of Old Baptist Indian Mission near Topeka. Eunice Sterling, Leavenworth, Sarah Stewart, and Shawnec replaced, restored and repaired, markers, buildings and portrait.

AMERICAN INDIANS

(Mrs. H. B.) Bertha M. Gabbert, State Chairman

During the past year informative letters were sent to each chapter urging their support and special interest in our two Indian Schools and in Indian affairs.

Your State Chairman attended an Indian Breakfast at Continental Congress and gained much information and inspiration from contact with the chairman for other states, from the representatives of the two schools and from those who addressed us.

The schools and their problems were presented to the Daughters at the fourth district metings and at several chapter meetings by your chairman; material was sent to each chapter which requested it.

Questionnaires were sent to the 63 chapters and 47 were filled and returned and from these and from the State Treasurer's books the following report was compiled:

All chapters except two have Indian Chairmen.

Sixteen chapters had Indian programs including: an informative panel on general tribal conditions, a book review, films, talks on St. Mary's School for Girl and on Bacone College; two had addresses by Blanche Miller, an archealogist who lives part of each year with the Indians; a paper on Chief Little Bear of the Osage tribe; a discussion of Indian conditions in colonial days and now, and the story the "Indian Opera."

22 boxes of clothing totaling 431 lbs. were sent to St. Mary's also included was yarn, beads, and costume jewelry.

Several chapters sent wrapped Christmas gifts, also many new and used Christmas cards; a box of leather belts and purses and one subscription to The Reader's Digest.

Two boxes of clothing were sent to Bacone College.

The treasurer's books show \$329.00 contributed, allocated as follows:

\$70.00 to St. Mary's, a scholarship fund to be known as the Leda Ferrel Rex Scholarship.

\$66.50 to St. Mary's general fund.

\$106.00 to American Indians.

\$86.50 to Bacone College.

Many Kanses Daughters contributed generously to their own church Indian missions.

A book was placed on a library shelf honoring Leda Ferrell Rex, the first National DAR Chairman for American Indians.

Our gifts to Indians were \$86.00 more than last year and I hope this indicated a more personal interest in our schools.

I feel there is more concern about the moral and physical condition of our Indians and about the governmental situation involving them; also a realization that our Indian race segregation must be solved as well as that of the Negroes.

Thanks to our State Regent for this departmental service.

AMERICAN RED CROSS

(Mrs. C. S.) Nina Newman

Kansas Committee for National Red Cross is now three years old. It originated at the beginning of the present administration. The interest in Red Cross work has grown during this time. It has been shown through the fine response each year in returning to me the questionaires which I have sent to each chapter. At the present time the big project of this committee is still the Blood Program. Members have given many hours to the work of this program. More than forty members have been blood donors and one member has given two gallons of blood. One Chapter baked about forty-five pies in the past year to serve at the Blood Bank. We have been represented in every phase of the Blood Program. We have had workers as receptionists, recruiting donors, keeping records, staff aides and motor service. Our members are nurses aides and registered nurses.

Many Daughters donated their services to the Udall-Blackwell disaster area. Clothing was sent, also food bandages and dressings for the injured in hospitals. One Daughter drives her car transporting programs, sponsored by the local Red Cross, to Winter Veterans Hospital and the State Hospital in Topeka. We have others who give their time to Veterans Hospital, acting as Gray Ladies and helping where ever needed. Some chapters have done knitting, all kinds of sewing and have rolled bandages during their chapter meetings. Christmas boxes have been packed and sent to our soldiers all over the world. Among us, we also have members on Red Cross Boards, Volunteer Service, Directors Home Service Chairman, Instructors in Red Cross Work and many U.S.O. Workers.

Since this is the closing of our final year with this administration, I wish to express my appreciation for your fine reports and splendid cooperation. It has been a pleasure and a privilege to have served the past three years as State Chairman of our American Red Cross Committee.

AMERICANISM AND D.A.R. MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP COMMITTEE

Mrs. Thos. B. Steunenberg, State Chairman

Questionnaires were sent to all chapters in the state along with a pamphlet entitled "Shopping for Safety" and an announcement of a D.A.R. Traffic Safety Contest. Thirty chapters reported.

WORK WITH THE FOREIGN BORN

Eight chapters worked with the Naturalization Courts and seven chapters supported the Naturalization classes. One chapter presents awards to the students and one member helps with the classes. At the Naturalization ceremonies five chapters presented flags, three gave Welcome Cards and three gave other gifts such as Flag Codes and copies of the Declaration of Independence.

Teas, receptions, or some form of entertainment for the foreign born or their children, were given by six chapters. Five chapters assisted the new citizens in voting and four visited them in their homes.

One thousand two hundred Manuals for Citizenship were distributed throughout the state. These went to the U. S. District Courts, County Courts, U.S.O., Libraries, school holding naturalization classes, and directly to candidates. Nine chapters worked with G. I. brides and disabled persons.

Those chapters having the greatest opportunity to work with the foreign born report these activities:

The Lois Warner chapter, which kindly invited the state chairman to attend a lunchcon meting, entertained a representative group of G. I. wives. Because of "Operation Gyroscope" (the 10th Division, at Fort Riley, was exchanged with the 1st Division in Germany) many foreign born wives wished to become citizens before leaving the States and the classes were crowded. The County Clerk naturalized six hundred nine soldiers and foreign born wives. Lois Warner chapter also gave a dessert team for the foreign born wives. Six hundred thirty-six manuals were distributed by the chapter.

The Topcka chapter participated in the ceremonies at the U.S. District Court in October, presenting small flags to twenty-six new citizens, and again in February to thirty-two. They distributed two hundred Manuals in English and seventeen in Spanish.

The Eunice Sterling chapter reported thirty-eight persons from fifteen nations taking the citizenship oath at the Wichita District Court. Small silk flags, flag codes and Welcome Cards were presented by the Daughters. The chapter distributed two hundred Manuals to candidates.

The Shawnee chapter in Kansas City visited naturalization classes, and a representative always attends every hearing in the Federal Court. One hundred fifty copies of the Declaration of Independence have been given throughout the year. The chapter assists the Naturalization Council every February in sponsoring a tea for new citizens. A Christmas party for the children of new citizens is sponsored in the same way. One hundreds Manuals were distributed to citizenship classes.

The Wyandot chapter in Kansas City is well represented on the Naturalization Council, supporting both the Christmas party for the children, and a tea. The children who act as American chairman for the Council, also provides an Americanism program in February.

The James Ross chapter in Kansas City supported the naturalization classes, worked with the U.S. District Court and sponsored a tea.

The Fort Larned chapter entertained aliens at their February meeting.

WORK WITH OUR YOUTH

Six chapters worked with underprivileged children; two worked with juvenile delinquency; four with the removal of subversive and obscene literature from school libraries; six offered prizes for Americanism essays and six sponsored Girl Homemaker clubs.

The Nathan Edson chapter entertained the Girl Homemakers at a program; they have also kept in touch with past war brides who have by now become a part of their community.

The Sarah Steward chapter worked with the Girl Homemaker contests, and also entertained the girls.

The Samuel Linscott chapter gave copies of the Star Spangled Banner, the Flag Code, and the American's Creed to all students in the Junior and Senior High School.

HUMANITARIAN WORK

An outstanding project for the handicapped was contributed by a member of the Susannah French Putney chapter. She prepared the following in Braille: four price catalogues, the Emporia phone directory, and several odd pieces. She is now working on a Bible Dictionary.

AMERICANISM

Three chapters gave programs on Highway safety; four used films stressing Americanism; ten chapters studied Immigration and Naturalization Laws; seventeen chapters, that had little opportunity to work directly with Naturalization procedues, gave programs based on the Manual.

One hundred seventy-eight inches of publicity on Americanism was reported. Three chapters spent a total of \$25.50 on Americanism, of which Lois Warner chapter contributed \$20.00.

The Polly Ogden chapter devoted one complete program to the D.A.R. Manual for Citizenship. The Daughters learned that foreign born wives were happy to receive the Manual. It is especially appreciated because it is clearly written, compact, and free.

APPROVED SCHOOLS

KANSAS CONSERVATION REPORT 1956

There are forty-eight Conservation chapter chairmen in Kansas, and from their reports I forward the following.

Sixteen chapters report a Conservation program at a chapter meeting this year. Of this number six had guest speakers. Emporia Chapter had the District Conservation head as guest speaker. Arthur Barrett Chapter presented a D.A.R. Award of Merit to Mr. Glenn Stockwell for his outstanding work in the Blue Valley when he gave a worthwhile talk at their Conservation meeting. Three other chapters report films on Conservation at their Conservation programs, besides Susannah French Putney Chapter, which had an informative talk by the County Agricultural agent, who showed pictures of Conservation work being accomplished in the county.

Fort Larned Chapter reports that one of her members who is Chairman of the Pawnce Historical Society, assisted by the Chapter Conservation Chairman, spent much time in preparing an authentic notebook of the history of old Ford Larned. This notebook was given to the delegation who toured the acreage and buildings of the Fort for the purpose of considering it for a National Park or National Shrine. The entire membership of the Chapter gave its wholehearted support to this project.

Nearly all Chapters report attendance at Conservation meetings which are so generally held over the State. More than half the chapters report planting trees, shrubbery and windbreaks; building terraces and ponds on individual property, and several mentioned "keeping trees alive through the drouth." The farm of one member has been designated a State Game Refuge, and quail and pheasants from the State Hatchery have been released on this land.

CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG

In making this, my last report as Chairman of the Correct Use of the Flag Committee, there is much to be said and many to thank. I have been privileged to serve under a most gracious and capable National Chairman from our state, Mrs. William L. Ainsworth. I have also had a most cooperative and enthusiastic group of chapter chairmen, without whom this committee could not have functioned. I am most grateful for the privilege of service to our Society and the interest shown.

During the past three years 2404 Flags were presented. Of those,

twenty large Flags and 1318 small Flags were presented this year. Nearly 2500 Flag Codes have been distributed by our chapters to our new citizens, Scout troops, schools, D.A.R. members, and others. A special effort has been made by our chapter chairmen to have a Flag in the home of every D.A.R. member. One chapter has started a project of selling Flag sets to its members with excellent results.

Through the past three years I have received many fine letters and suggestions from many of the chapter chairmen. Their enthusiasm and help has meant much to me. Fifty-eight programs were given by our chapters this year over the radio, to young people's organizations, and at chapter meetings.

Our motto has been "Protect Our Flag, That It May continue To Protect Us" and we have been striving for a more "Flag-Conscious Public." Let us all try to show our love and loyalty to our country by displaying and giving proper respect to "Old Glory." By example, we, the Daughters of the American Revolution, can move mountains. For every ripple in the breeze of "Old Glory" is like a shaking fist chanllenging any and every effort to take from us our rights and privileges to live as free men and free women. Look upon it with devotion, display it proudly—not only on specific holidays, but in front of your homes every bright day in the year. For every day is Freedom's Day.

D.A.R. MUSEUM

Mildred G. Kent (Mrs. Paul N.) Chairman

It is with pleasure and gratitude in the interest shown and the work accomplished by our Kansas chapters, that I submit the following report.

The Daughters of the American Revolution Museum is truly one

of the most interesting and important projects of D.A.R. and a challenge to our heritage as Daughters. Kansas Daughters have shown great interest and pride in our National D.A.R. Museum. Our theme for the year has been, "From the Past We Learn for the Present and the Future." Through our study and accomplishments for the Museum we are doing patriotic, historic, and educational work. Our Museum will benefit from our interest and support and continue to be one of the finest in the country. It attracts visitors from all parts of the world.

Our work for the Museum has been three-fold.

First —Our goal has been every chapter in Kansas devoting one meeting to a study of the Museum.

Second—Contributions to the Museum Fund and to the Art Fund within the Museum Fund. Special project—sale of the Grandma Moses cards. The proceeds from these sales have been given to the Art Fund.

Third —The donation of gifts, previous to 1830.

The majority of chapters have had interesting programs concerning the Museum. Many have included a showing of antiques with the Museum program. This is an effective means of creating interest in and a study of antiques. Several chapters reported that at each chapter meeting the hostess displayed antiques. Programs such as these create interest in the giving of gifts to our Museum.

An interesting paper telling of the history of the Museum and describing the priceless treasures now on display has been sent to me. I have also received a number of newspaper articles giving interesting accounts concerning collections on display in our Museum.

During the past year Kansas chapters have given to the Museum Fund as follows: Forty dollars to the Museum Fund and seventy-five dollars to the Art Fund within the Museum Fund. This makes a total of one hundred fifteen dollars—Kansas gift to the Museum Fund.

The chapters have responded enthusiastically in the purchase of the "Grandma Moses" cards. As State Chairman, I ordered and distributed these cards. The proceeds from the sale of these cards will, as in the past, be an additional gift to the Art Fund. The proceeds from the note-folders in addition to funds contributed to the Art Fund will be used to restore Museum paintings which are badly in need of core.

It is with pleasure that I report that our State Regent, Mrs. Edwin F. Abels, offered a gift of The First American edition, Encyclopaedia. It consists of eighteen volumes and four supplementals published in October 1793 at Philadelphia, Pa. It was presented in honor of Mrs. Abels' mother, Mrs. Lizzie Kunkel Robinson. The volumes have been approved for acceptance by the Museum. Kansas chapters are very interested in our Museum.

As State Chairman of the Museum, I attended District meetings and reported on the Museum and its needs. I have given talks concerning the Museum at several chapter meetings. Publicity has been given our National Museum.

The past years have been eventful ones for the Museum. Several beautiful and outstanding collections have been presented to our Museum. These collections include rare silver, china, crystal, beautiful jewelry, textiles, furniture, and some rare manuscripts.

I am hoping that Kansas Daughters traveling to Washington will visit our Museum. It is a beautiful and fascinating place: They should then bring back information concerning it to the members of our Kansas chapters. I should like to urge Kansas Daughters to continue the presentation of gifts to our Museum.

All chapter Regents should appoint Museum chairmen. Chapter chairmen can do much toward creating interest in, and gifts for, our Museum.

It has been a pleasure and a privilege to serve Kansas Daughters as Chairman of our Museum and I am grateful to the State Regent for this opportunity. These three years have been ones of joy and inspiration. My sincere thanks to the members of our Kansas chapters and Chapter Chairmen of the D.A.R | Museum for their interest and cooperation. It is my hope that we will continue to work with increased interest for our Mureum and the accomplishments of our goals.

Of the thirty-six Chapters reporting—Ten had a program of Kansas composers and their compositions—Twenty-three in a program or some other way stressed the history and development of American Music—Thirty sang the first and fourth stanzas of the National Anthem at the opening of each meeting whenever possible. Some recited it and one Chapter advocated using it in the key of Aflat, which we are doing at this Conference and have done before.—Thirteen observed Music Week and many spoke of having members who helped observe Music Week with other groups.

In future times it will be the desire of your State Chairman to have a report from each Chapter, I am sure. Although only a few over half of the Chapters reported this year the part of the report of which we can all be justly proud is in the answers to the last question of the questionnaire—"What other ways of furthering American Music has your Chapter used?" There were so many original and different ways as well as the not too unusual programs that my only regret is I cannot take the time to tell you of each one.

Several used the roll call to get each person present interested in Kansas or American composers and compositions. It was nice to have several send in for programs such as "Over an American Mantel" and "I Hear America Singing" and give them. Having an exchange of programs is something I wish we might do on a state level as well as nationally. One Chapter Chairman (at each meeting) gave the story of a composer and his song and then had the group sing it. Another Chapter was able to have appropriate patriotic music in the churches during Constitution Week.

Another program was on Conservation and used the story of "Johnny Appleseed" and appropriate numbers were sung by a soloist. For a Christmas program one Chapter had a trip to the Holy Land with slides and narrative by one who had just returned. Several musical numbers were used such as "I Walked To-day Where Jesus Walked", "O Little Town of Bethlehem", "In the Garden", for the pause at the Garden of Gethsemane and ending with "Holy, Holy, Holy".

These are just a few of the programs which especially impressed me.

I sincerely hope that the ideas given and the enthusiasm shown by so many of our Chapter Music Chairmen will help those who have had difficulty with music programs. There is so much joy and fun in music. None of you should miss it even if you have to use records (as one Chapter does) at times rather than having members or guests perform.

As my three years as State Chairman of Music draws to a close may I thank Mrs. Abels, our wonderful leader, for giving me the opportunity to work with you for the Advancement of American Music. Also may I thank you—the Chapter Chairmen—for your enthusiastic co-operation.

It hase been my pleasure and privilege to serve as State Chairman of a new National Committee for three years, under the leadership of our gracious State Regent, Mrs. Abels.

The Honor Roll National Project has finished three years of checking achievements of the chapters by states and district.

Kansas has shown a slight increase over last year in the number of chapters making HONORS. As of the first of March, your state chairman has heard from 52 chapters. 17 chapters should receive HONORS; including six GOLD, five SILVER, and six HONORABLE MENTION.

"Our state chapters are included in the Western Division, made up

of Coloredo, Nebraska, North and South Dakota and Kansas. We have the most number of chapters in any of the above mentioned states; bu the percentage having Honors does not rank as high as any one of the four other states in the district.

Points 1, 2, 7, and 12 seem to have been the m ost difficult to achieve. National's hope was to inspire the chapters to accomplish all the things which D.A.R. is supposed to work for each year; and to have a record of achievements throughout the states, by districts.

Your chairman has wrtten over 140 letters to our state chapters, and to the national and district chairmen; and March first made her report to National and District.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS

(Mrs. Hugh D.) Grace Ransom, State Chairman

Your State Chairman sent letters in August to all chapters which reported chapter chairman or the Junior American Citizens Committee. Of the 63 chapters in Kansas, 44 reported chairmen.

Well over 1,000 pins were distributed and around 50 Handboooks. Only three D.A.R. chapters have reported the organization of J.A.C. clubs. Abilene Chapter reports 24 clubs with a total of 656 members. Mary Wade Strother chapter reported 15 clubs with 200 members. Smoky Hill chapter has one J.A.C. club which they named The Story Hour for Young Citizens. This club lasted two months, during the summer vacation. It had 70 members and was the largest

single club in Kansas. Miss Lola Gebhardt, chapter chairman, sponsors the club and works with the young people. She sent a report of her club to the Nationnal D.A.R. Magazine which carried the story of it.

Martha Vail chapter placed material in the hands of all city and rural schools in Barber County and we believe the material is being used as this county has always been outstanding and very co-operative but as of this date no reports have been returned to the chapter chairman or the State Chairman.

Two others chapters have reported an effort made in trying to organize J.A.C. clubs but not definite reports were made.

So—altho the several chapters have tried to organize J.A.C. clubs and we feel our material is being used to a good advantage, yet it leaves your State Chairman with a report that is much less than in past years.

Only 25 clubs were actually reported on the official membership cards and which could be reported to the National chairman and with a membership of 726.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

(Mrs. Signor) Dorothy Fink, State Chairman

The Junior Membership Committee has been endeavoring to increase the number o junior members and their interest for the past thre years, and I feel sure than we have made some progress in this direction. We sincerely hope that this progress will continue and junior members will take a more active part in the D.A.R. chapters of Kansas.

From the 27 replies to the 63 questionnaires that were sent to the Junior Membership Chairman, the 27 chapters reporting have 131 junior members. Of these, 31 are new junior members. Included among these 131 junior members are 16 chapter officers, 24 chairmen and committees, one state officer, two chanrmen of state committees, one member of a state committee, and one member of a national committee. Many of our Junior Members have been active in committee work of their chapters; such as Junior American Citizens clubs, Children of the American Revolution, American Red Cross, Girl Scouts, National Defense, Civil Defense, Approved Schools and Programs.

The fund raising projects of the Junior Membership committees for the past year were the selling of note paper and bazaar articles at the State Conference in Parsons and the Fashion show presented by Tomahawk chapter. Thorugh their efforts, the committee has contributed to the Helen Pouch Scholarship fund \$58.78.

In closing, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the State Officers, Chapter Officers, Chapter Regents, and Chapter Chairmen for their help, cooperation, and many suggestions these past three years and especially to John Haupt chapter for the hard work they have done to make the bazaar a success each year.

MOTION PICTURES

(Mrs. William M.) Laurilla Fowler

Letters concerning the motion picture committee, and questionnaires were sent out to each chapter chairman with the request to return them to me by February 1, 1956. Of the number sent out I received 22 replies. This is more than have replied in the past.

This year we wanted to stress the value of D.A.R. Motion Picture Reviews. Several chapters are placing copies of the Reviews in the city and school libraries. While some say the Reviews arrive too late to do good, others praise the value of it in aiding in movie selections.

The Disney films still are popular, especially for the children. Also popular with D.A.R. members are religious and historical movies with musicals scoring high.

The majority of chapters have at least one motion picture program each year. In most cases films procured through the D.A.R. are used. They have a number of very good films that are free. I want to thank all the chapter chairmen who cooperated with me on this committee the past three years. I do hope we can do much more to improve movies.

The State Chairman made a special trip to the National Defense office in Washington in January to check with the secretary the list of Kansas chairmen. She has the list. It is a correct list, if you state chairman's list is correct for it is an exact copy. The courteous, painstaking attempt to answer all questions was greatly appreciated. It really demonstrates that all agencies, all along the line are trying to help our chapters, our memberships and our communities.

The report on Constitution Day and Week was satisfying throughout. The many reports made from the National Society shows this project to have been well reported and well cooperated in.

American History Month needs more enthusiasm and less questioning. Several chapter chairmen report inability to get anything else across after their big attempt on the Constitution—especially have they found schools reluctant in some cases, to have schedules and routines "interrupted" again. In the opinion of this state chairman, if we could get this project established as part of our National Defense work, so that local chairmen could be working on it before school programs are set up as shutouts, we might see more cooperation.

Ready Made programs—the hue and cry for these can surely not be heard when the material coming from the National Defense office is really tailor-made and ready for use. Not more material but more interest and willingness to use is, seems to be the crux of the matter.

Questions 7 and 8, repeats, were amazingly enough answered incorrectly or not at all, showing lack of knowledge—still on this subject. On the other hand some very excellent explanations were given to No. 8, which is a little complex in Kansas.

Tabulated report—the following tabulated report shows continued confusion in the matter of awards and medals and continued reluct-

ance on the part of chairmen or chapters to press the matter with the public schools. The adult Award of Merit program in one met with objection in one community showing a definite misunderstanding of its worth and purpose.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE

(Mrs. Leroy) Doris H. Hood, State Chairman

This report of the chapters' program work can be quite complete and inclusive for there was a response to the questionnaire by 57 chapters. Although some replies came back a little too late for the National Report for Kansas, we did have the picture from 50 chapters, which I think was a fairly good representation.

I feel that there has been a general forward trend toward planning our programs with D.A.R. materials and the D.A.R. objectives in mind—this of course with the originality and initiative of alert program chairmen. Thirty-eight chapters reported using material from the national program office against only seventeen last year.

"Protect America's Future Through Patriotic Education" was our theme of the year and the program suggestions were outstanding. Fifty-two chapters reported having programs on patriotic education and fifty chapters observed Constitution Week with patriotic or educational programs.

I was glad to learn that so many chapters now have the program materials available for use in their chapters. The catalogues, handbook, "Highlights of Program Activity," and "Press Digest" should be made available to every program chairman. The program outline which is sent out early in the summer should go to the program chairman, but these names must be sent to the corresponding secretary early in order that the state program chairman will have a mailing list. Otherwise the program outline is sent to the regents early in June.

I received forty-nine yearbooks. They were beautiful and showed a great deal of work and planning. I noticed that many chapters did

use the supplement idea, but probably will be printing a completely new book this year due to the change in all state and national officers.

Forty chapters reported having had state officers as speakers. As a rule this meant our State Regent, Mrs. Abels. They all praised her talks on National Defense, the Constitution, Patriotic Education, and also her subject "Heraldic Art" was a new and interesting idea to many. Eighteen chapters reported having state chairmen and seven entertained national chairmen during the program year.

I was especially interested in the outstanding programs about which the chairmen have so generously written. I am going to pass on to you some of their suggestions.

Several chapters celebrated anniversaries and of course this was an outstanding program for them. Chapter histories were relived through song and event. Members of long standing reminisced of "yester years" which was a pleasure to them and an inspiration to the new members. One chapter recalled all the varied and large national porjects that they had helped with through the years. Old yearbooks and photographs were displayed. Chapter members were honored.

Washington Day Teas are always an outstanding program for our Society. Antiques, old quilts, furniture, glassware, or family heirlooms were displayed and discussed. One chapter honored Benjamin Franklin this year for they said, "he was a patriot too." Several chapters used the program suggestions, "Over an American Mantel" and "In Martha's Room" with costumed players (both excellent). "All About Us" is another play from the national program office that I highly recommend.

Pilgrimages to the Eisenhower Memorial and Shawnee Mission were enthusiastically reported. A program on Thanksgiving in biblical, classical, and colonial times sounded good. Another chapter reported having a Thanksgiving family dinner for the members and their families.

Our observation of Constitution Week was an outstanding project this year reported on by fifty of the fifty-seven chapters reporting. Many fine outside speakers were used. A reinactment of the signing of the Constitution with members protarying the famous patriots was also reported. Many chapters used the Constitution quizz. A study of present day legislation and a consideration of our rights and privileges in America gave one chapter an insight of the necessity for us to preserve our precious liberties.

Several chapters reported activity using the children and young people in programs. Three chapters sponsored essay contests and usually entertained the participating students and their mothers at a meeting.

American music, conservation (an interesting program on trees),

and programs on study of our approved schools (their needs and what they are doing) were also used for program subjects. These were reported by many chapters.

It has ben a pleasure to serve the Kansas Society of the D.A.R. as program chairman these past three years. To work in such a wonderful organization and with so gracious a leader as our State Regent, Mrs. Abels, has truly been a privilege and an inspirtaion.

May I take this space to again thank the various program chairmen for their cooperation and compliment them for their excellent programs that they planned for their home chapters these past years.

RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMITTEE

63 Chapters in Kansas—with 50 reported as having Radio or TV Chairmen.

18 answered Questionnaires, 10 reporting no activity or facilities.

Mrs. Abels spoke on Constitution Day at Marysville and again at Ottawa.

Mrs. Abels also had two more broadcats from Lawrence of about $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

Mrs. Frances Williams spoke on National Defense in Marysville. Mrs. John Reese and Mrs. J. M. Veazey gave 15 minute program on Constitution Day. Also a 15 minute program on March 17. They are from Newton Chapter.

Tape recording of Patriotic Skit given February 20th at Garden City. They report four broadcasts at 1 hour.

Mary Wade Strother Chapter reported a one hour program on October 15th.

Emporia Chapter reported several "Spot announcements" for Constitution Week. For Lincoln's Birthday they were given several "Spot Announcements" using 50 words for a "Spot." Also on Washington's Birthday they had several "Spot announcements" using material sent from National, in script form. Miss Haynes wrote a script on Lincoln and Early Kansas History which was broadcast on February 14th on their public service program. Both scripts were later played to their Chapter meting.

There are still many blank spaces in the Scrapbook. It is not just a passing project. The pictures show the condition of each market. After all they are our rea lestate, each chapter along the trail has a respnosibility to the rest of the state, to show and report on the condition of each marker. I hope the next Chairman will continue the project. The Scrapbook will be on display.

Dodge City has 2 that are now out in the fields, the question of moving them is being discussed.

Sterling Chapter had a review of Mrs. Cordry's book on "Marking the Santa Fe Trail" from our D.A.E. Library, and found it very interesting. They plan a tour later to see the markers and take pictures.

Henry Dawson Chapter reports that the old cemetery which contains one of our markers has been made permanent. So that insures it's care.

On the whole, I think the markers are in good condition.

SHAWNEE MISSION

What Chairman wouldn't feel elated receiving a 92% Chapter response from her annual Questionnaire? That kind of cooperation makes one realize more than ever just how outstanding our Kansas D.A.R. Society actually is. Out of the 50 Kansas Chapters that have Chairmen, 46 of them returned your Chairman's Questionnaire—the information being used for this Annual Report.

Twenty-four Chapters were represented at our 22nd annual Shawnee Mission D.A.R. Constitution Day Pilgrimage on Saturday, September 17th with approximately 150 in attendance. The hostess Chapters were James Ross, Shawnee, Tomahawk and Wyondot.

The annual Pilgrimage, an all day affair, constituted a tour of the historic buildings of the old Indian Manual Labor School in the morning and a picnic lunch on the spacious grounds of the Mission at noon with the afternoon program following. Included in the morning activities were both a Junior and a Senior C.A.R. Board meeting, conducted by Mrs. William Ainsworth, Kansas State C.A.R. President. Miss Eleanor Ferrell, Junior State C.A.R. President was also present.

If there was anyone who came uninspired to the afternoon meeting, they certainly must have left feeling some degree of inspiration after nearing Jack McNees deliver his winning oration "The Constitution on Trial." REPORT OF BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

Mrs. C. F. Eckelman, Chairman, Pro-tem

The Sixty-fourth Continental Congress of April, 1955 adopted Both at the time of the adoption and subsequently in the monthly a complete Revision of the By-Laws of the National Society, D.A.R. department of the D.A.R. Magazine, the National Parliamentarian, Mrs. Roberts has urged—

First—That States and Chapters do not attempt, by numerous amendments, to make existing State or Chapter By-Laws conform to the National Revision.

Second—That both States and Chapters plan at once for a complete revision of present By-Laws, that all changes required by the National Society may be included, and obsolete provisions discarded.

Your By-Laws Committee believes this to be sound counsel, and recommends that a general Revision of the Kansas State Society By-Laws be undertaken as soon as possible.

However, since a State Election occurs in Kansas this year, and since one of the changes in the National By Laws definitely states an eligibility requirement for two State Offices, we are submitting for your adoption an amendment covering this one change. Notice of this proposed amendment as required by the present State By Laws, was sent each chapter of the Kansas Society sixty days prior to this State Conference. The proposed amendment is as follows:

In order to conform with Art. XIV, Section 6, National Society D.A.R. By-Laws adopted at Continental Congress, April, 1955—Insert as the first sentence of Art. IV, Section 2, Kansas State Society By-Laws—"To be eligible to the office of State Regent or State Vice-Regent, a member shall have held membership in a Chapter of the Kansas State Society for at least five years."

TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

It is gratifying to note from the reports received from the 34 chapters responding, that the work of the Transportation Committee is growing. Total rides given this year were 989 as compared with 547 last year and included Constitution Week observances, Tours for School Children, Homes Tours, Naturalization Ceremonies as well as all D.A.R. activities.

Again our efforts to have a Charter Bus to Continental Congress and return have failed because of insufficient reservations by the deadline. Contacts were made with the Missouri and Colorado State Transportation Chairmen to place interested members on their buses. In 1955, some of our members joined the Colorado Bus and this year several reservations have been sent to the Missouri State Chairman for the purpose of joining that delegation.

It has been a pleasure and an experience to serve as Transportation Chairman. Thank you Mrs. Abels, Chapter Chairmen, Regents and Members for your support and cooperation.

REPORT OF STATE ORGANIZER

Nine applicants for an Evening Chapter in Wichita have been accepted. Twelve new members, who have not before belonged to D. A. R. are required for this new chapter, with an additional thir-

teen members, who may be new members, transfers or reinstated members, transfers or reinstated members. Mrs. C. L. Trapp, 802 N. Old Manor Road, Wichcita, has been appointed as Organizing Regent.

Letters of inquiry concerning the possibilities of locations for new chapters were sent to each District Director and to several chapter Regents. No suggestions were made in time to look into the prospects. During the State Conference, the Regent of Tomahawk Chapter in Prairie Village suggested that there was room for a second chapter there. Our Good Citizen, Janet Adams of Paola requested that we look to Paola for location of a D. A. R. Chapter.

COMPLETION OF KANSAS D.A.R. EISENHOWER FOUNDATION FUND MARCH 1956

Seldom has it been my pleasure to give a more exciting report; success is marvelously stimulating, and, you know, we have been a huge success! The Kansas D.A.R. Eisenhower Fund has been completed on schedule, and \$19,960.07 made available for permanent outdoor beauty at The Eisenhower Foundation Organized to Promote Citizenship and To Honor Veterans of America's Wars at Abilene, Kansas. A major part of this has been accomplished through the amazing and wonderful support of Kansas Daughters of The American Revolution—you are truly stupendous!

March 30th is the scheduled date for arrival from Missouri quarries of the polished Cold Spring Carnelian granite to complete all five pylons in the main entrance reflection pool. It will require around four weeks to erect scaffolds and set the granite in place. Final work is being done on the huge bronze inscription tablets in Chicago, and I'm told April 25th will see these tall stately marble pylons in all their sixteen-foot glory, with gleaming bands of bronze, and handsomely lettered plaques, ready for all to view and admire.

It has been suggested by the Directors at Abilene that a dedication ceremony be planned in connection with the completed plyons, and it is thought this might best be done in conjunction with the placing of the fine murals on the lobby walls.

It is my most sincere hope that when you visit the Museum and • the Old Home your heart will lift at the sight of the enduring beauty you have caused to be created here; look upon the pylons and know you have had a part in something in Life which outlasts it. The Museum is very beautiful, and the old home gives a sort of inner joy of remembrance and appreciation of early-day Kansas. It is open every day from 9 to 5, except Sunday, when it is 1 to 5 p.m.

Do plan to go sometime, and above all encourage and aid Kansas

youngsters to see and know this place of inspiration, where the boy from the wrong side of "two tracks" lived and planned and dreamed, and knew fulfillment as a world-renown general, and President of the United State from Kansas.

Many of you know full well the time an energy and effort that has gone into this objective of Kansas Daughters at Abilene. Mrs. Davis commented at District meeting that "women were at their best in fund raising"; I don't actually know about this, but I do know you were at your best in this plan to do something for our native State. Many and devious were the methods employed to attain success in this undertaking—silent auctions, food sales, white elephant sales, book reviews, musicals, silver teas, Homes Tours, Lemon Jelly Cake parties, etc.; all aided and abetted by the fine support of our sparkling State Regent, Marie Abels.

We are indebted to President Eisenhower and The First Lady for permission to use their companion pictures in attractive leather folders with the Great Seal of Kansas on the front; the sale of 2,500 of these add \$1,000 to our efforts.

Our "500 Club" will be the means of placing a handsome handbound book of green leather tooled in gold in the Museum with names of many honored service men of recent wars, and some of long ago, of pioneer ancestors, and staunch D.A.R.'s; around \$2,450.00 from this source.

Had we not shared this objective, permitting one pylon to another group, an additionnal year beyond schedule would have been required to raise funds, reflecting unfavorably on Kansas D.A.R. prestige. It would also have meant another year of raw cement pylon forms standing bare and unadorned in the entrance pool of the Museum.

This report would not be complete without an expression of deep appreciation to Alice Hesler, our State Treasurer. No one has any idea of the tremendous amount of extra work this project at Abilene has entailed; with all my heart I thank her for gracious assistance, courtesy and accuracy unequalled.

Now all that remains is our deep gratification for a job well-done, that can and will mean much to others through the years. We have established excellent public relations in this endeavor, created interest in the primary objectives of our National Society here at this Memorial in Abilene, where the historical, patriotic and educational are united in the boyhood home of a President of the United States, a museum housing priceless military documents and World War II mementoes, and a memorial to American veterans.

We have given honor where honor is due to a great American while he is still living, but above all we have attempted to enshrine in this place, and in our hearts, a continuing tribute to our soldiers, sailors, mavines, and those who fly the air; this we have done for; THE GALLANT—THE BELOVED—THE REMEMBERED.

APPENDIX

BY-LAWS of the KANSAS STATE SOCIETY of the

NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised and Adopted at the State Conference March 11, 1950

Amended Feb. 16, 1954

ARTICLE I.

Name

The name of this society shall be the Kansas State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II.

Object

- Section 1. This Society pledges fidelity and loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the objects of which are:
- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and for the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patrious, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary and enlightening public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.
- (3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Section 2. Its purpose shall be to further the above plans of the National Society and to maintain harmonious co-operation among the chapters in Kansas and to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

ARTICLE III.

Membership

Section 1. The membership of this State Society shall include all Daughters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who are members in good standing of some Chapter in Kansas. Good standing shall be interpreted to mean that all National and State dues have been paid.

Section 2. Chapters failing to pay State dues shall not be entitled to representation at State Conference, to receive State Communications or participate in any State affairs until dues are paid to the State Society.

ARTICLE IV.

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Chaplain, State Recording Secretary, State Treasurer, State Registrar, State Historian, State Librarian, State Reporter, and State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 2. No member shall be eligible for election to any state office or appointment to any state chairmanship who has not been a member in good standing of the Kansas State Society for one year. To be eligible to the office of State Regent or State Vice Regent, a member shall have held memberchip in a chapter of the Kansas State Society for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms. No member may be elected to serve more than two successive terms as state officer, except to the office of State Regent until the expiration of one year.

Section 3. A candidate for State Regent must have served as an elected Chapter Regent and at least one term as an elected state officer. A candidate for any state office must have served as an elected chapter officer. A member having served more than one-half term in any office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4 Election of officers shall take place on the last day of the annual State Conference occurring in the year of the election of National Officers.

Election shall be by ballot, for a term of three years.

A majority of votes cast shall elect.

The terms of office of the State Regent and State Vice Regent begin at the close of the Continental Congress which confirms their election. The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected and confirmed.

Section 5. The nominating committee shall consist of five members elected by ballot, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the October State Board of Management meeting.

This elected member shall serve as chairman of the nominating committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to submit names of candidates for the state offices on the second day of the annual State Conference of election year. Nominations other than those made by the nominating committee may also be made from the floor. All candidates must have given their contest before nomination.

The nominating committee shall, immediately after November first, notify all Chapters of impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted.

Candidates shall be selected from all district of the state.

No person shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at State Conference.

Section 6. When the several candidates for State Regent are nominated, each in turn shall nominate her State Corresponding Secretary. The ballot cast for a State Regent shall serve, automatically, as a ballot for her State Corresponding Secretary. Thus each is an elected officer. In no other instance may two officers be elected from the same chapter.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the State Society the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by acclamation at a State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent.

ARTICLE V.

Duties of Officers

Section 1. STATE REGENT: The State Regent, in addition to performing the duties which pertain to her office, according to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, shall preside at all meetings of this Society, of the Executive Committee, of the State Board of Management and to the Kansas Delegation to the Continental Congress. She shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for, sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer for moneys appropriated by the Society, and may call meetings of the Executive Committee or Board of Management whenever she may consider it important and necessary. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter General Chairman, prepare the program for the Annual State Con-

ference. She shall present at the Annual State Conference all amendments proposed to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society and such other matters as she may deem worthy of consideration. She shall be a member of the printing committee. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees, excepting a nominating committee.

She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer, to have recorded in the State Treasurer's books, all membership reports received from the National Society, following each meeting of the National Board. The State Treasurer will duly record the same.

Upon her confirmation, the incoming State Regent may appoint a State Parliamentarian, and Consulting Genealogist.

Section 2. STATE VICE REGENT: The State Vice Regent, in the absence or disability of the Regent, shall perform the duties pertaining to the office of Regent. She shall be a member of the printing and stationery committee and a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. STATE CHAPLAIN: The State Chaplain shall officiate in the effering prayer and other roligious services when requested by the Regent. She shall be the Chairman of the Memorial Committee.

Section 4. STATE RECORDING SECRETARY: The State Recording Secretary shall keep a correct record of all meetings of the State Conference, the State Executive Committee and the Board of Management. She shall be chairman of the Printing and Stationery Committee; countersign all orders drawn on the Treasurer and signed by the Regent. She shall prepare the proceeding for the Annual State Conference for publication, subject to the approval of the State Regent, and perform such other duties as pertain to her office.

Section 5. STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: The State Corresponding Secretary, under the direction and supervision of the Regent, shall notify all state Officers and the Regent of each chapter in good standing of the time of the Annual Conference not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall give notice of meetings of the Executive Committee, and Board of Management as directed by the State Regent. She shall be the chairman of the committee on credentials. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary Ceneral, each year, immediately after the close of Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the various chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each state chairman two typewritten copies of the list of names and addresses of her respective chapter chairmen, (one of which is to be sent to her National Chairman and the second one for her own use.)

She shall compile these lists into a directory for the ensuing administration.

STATE TREASURER: The State Treasurer shall collect all moneys and disburse the same only upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. All moneys received by the Treasurer shall be deposited in some reliable bank in her name as State Treasurer, and all payments made by her shall be by check. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit the same to a Certified Public Accountant before the Annual State Conference. She shall be custodian of all bonds and policies belonging to the Society. She shall be bonded by the State Society for the sum of \$2,500.00 for the faithful discharge of the duties above defined. She shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payments of all Student Loan Notes, Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall be a member of the Executive and Credentiaïs Committees.

Section 7. STATE REGISTRAR: The State Registrar shall keep the card file as established; assist in proving eligibility claims; prepare the Kansas Directory Daughters of the American Revolution, when ordered by the Society; check her membership file against the records of the State Treasurer immediately after July first. She shall keep a file of all reports received from the National Society and those are to be delivered with the State Card file, and all other material dealing with the work of the office, to her successor. She shall be a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 8. STATE HISTORIAN: The State Historian shall take charge of all the historical papers received by the Society and shall catalogue and arrange the same, placing a locker at the State Historical Society at Topoka, such historical documents, and all materials for preservation. She shall be a member of the Memorial Committee. She shall prepare the Smithsonian Report.

Section 9. STATE LIBRARIAN: The State Librarian shall have supervision of the State D.A.R. library. She shall prepare a report listing all material sent to the National Library and all books, records, and other material received for the State Library, during the year, for publication in the State Conference Proceedings. On retiring from the office, the State Librarian shall send to the newly elected Librarian and to the State Regent a complete list of all material on file in the State D.A.R. Library, and given over to the newly elected State Librarian.

Section 10. STATE REPORTER: The State Reporter shall fur-

nish articles concerning the activities of the State Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be State Chairman of the Publicity Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files (or Scrap Book) and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D.C.

Section 11. All officers and Committee Chairmen upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, all moneys, accounts, record books, papers or other property belonging to the Society.

ARTICLE VI.

Meetings

Section 1. The supreme governing body of this society shall be a Conference. An annual meeting of the Kansas State Conference shall be held in March unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or by the State Board of Management. The purpose of this conference shall be to receive reports of the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen; for the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. Each State Chairman shall compile a typed report of not more than three hundred words covering the work accomplished by her committee for the year ending February twenty-eighth. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recordings Secretary by March first, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Each Chapter Regent shall send a report of the work and plans of her chapter, for the year ending February twenty-eighth, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary immediately after March first. This report shall be typed, and limited to two hundred fifty words, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Section 3. The Kansas State Society shall be divided into four districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively.

At each District meeting the State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board of Management meeting.

A Director, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected at an annual district meeting to be held in the fall. The term of office shall be one year and no District Officer shall serve more than three consecutive terms. Each district shall entertain the State Conference in rotation; the time and place to be determined by the hostess district and the State Regent.

Section 4. The voting members of the Annual State Conference shall be the State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, and Chapter Regents, or in their

absence, the first Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates, regularly elected by Chapters as hereinafter specificd, provided they have been members of their Chapter for one year and are in good standing.

Section 5. Twenty-five voting members shall constitute a quorum at the meeting of the Annual State Conference.

Section 6. Chapters of less than fifty members shall be entitled to representation at the Annual State Conference by the regent and two delegates. Chapters having membership of fifty to one hundred shall be represented by their Regent and five delegates. After the first hundred, representation shall be in the ratio of three delegates for every subsequent one hundred. Alternates shall be elected for each Chapter Regent and delegates.

Section 7. Delegates and alternates shall be elected at the January meeting of their Chapter in each year, and certificates of their election signed by the Regent and Treasurer of their Chapter, shall be sent to the State Corresponding Secretary for the Committee on Credentials by February first. Vacancies that occur in the delegation may be filled by the Regent from alternates duly elected for that purpose at the January meeting.

Section 8. Daughters attending State Conference shall pay a registration fee of One Dollar.

Section 9. The Shavmee Mission Pilgrimage and Picnic shall be held on Constitution Day, September 17, with the local chapters as hostesses. Those attending shall pay a registration fee of Twenty-five Cents.

ARTICLE VII.

Board of Management

Section 1. The State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose memberships are within the State, District Directors and Chapter Regents shall constitute a State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over affairs of the State Society to do and transact business during the interim between the meetings of the State Society. The State Board shall meet at the call of the State Regent at least twice a year. One meeting to be held immediately preceding the first fall District meeting and one to be held immediately preceding the opening session of the State Conference.

Other meetings may be held upon the call of the State Regent or upon written request of seven members of the Board of Management. It shall recommend to the Annual State Conference such patriotic and historic work as seems desirable to be undertaken by the Society. Eleven members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have power to fill vacancies in office until the next election; the election to fill such vacancies shall be by ballot, notice of the vacancy having been given in the call for the meeting of the State Board.

Section 4. All officers, the Board of Management and Committees shall make reports of their work for the year, at the Annual State Conference.

ARTICLE VIII.

Executive Committee

Section 1. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Recording Secretary, State Registrar and State Treasurer, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 27 Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three members.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall make a report at each meeting of the Board of Management.

ARTICLE IX.

Committees

Section 1. The Regent shall appoint a Student Loan Committee consisting of three members who shall supervise the Kansas D.A.R. Student Loan Fund.

The Regent shall appoint a Conference Committee which shall consist of the Reporter and two other members.

There shall be a Printing and Stationery Committee which shall consist of the Recording Secretary, Vice Regent and Regent.

A Memorial Committee shall consist of the State Chaplain, chair man; State Historian, and one other member.

The Committee on Credentials shall consist of the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and one other member.

ARTICLE X.

State Funds

Section 1. Each Chapter, belonging to the State Society shall

pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before January first of each year the sum of \$1.35 for each member, in good standing on the Chapter rolls on that date.

Chapter Treasurers shall furnish, with each remittence of dues, a list of members for whom she is paying.

Chapters failing to pay above per capita dues shall be delinquent February first and not entitled to representation at State Conference.

Representation of Chapters at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon number of dues in the hands of the State Treasurer by February first.

The Treasurer shall notify chapters of their standing on February first.

Section 2. Life Members shall be counted in the basis for representation. Chapters shall count all Life Members in their Representation and State dues should be paid for full representation.

Section 3. Stationery and postage, and in cases of emergency, telephone and telegraph charges, which charges shall be validated by the Executive Committee, shall be furnished to the State Officers and State Committees.

Section 4. A sum not to exceed \$750.00 per year shall be allowed the State Regent for her expenses in carrying on her work.

Section 5. To partially defray her expenses to the State Conference, each State Officer shall be allowed the sum of \$25.00 provided however, that no expenses will be allowed an Officer when the Conference is held in her own home city.

Section 6. No provision is made for expenses of Honorary State Officers.

Section 7. In addition to the obligations specified in these By-Laws, no debts or liabilities shall be incurred except by vote of the Conference.

Section 8. A sum equal to ten cents per member shall be taken from the State Fund and placed in an Annual State Conference Expense Account.

Section 9. A sum equal to five cents a member shall be taken from State Fund Annually and placed in the treasury of the Kansas C.A.R. The amount accumulated to be used for C.A.R. projects.

ARTICLE XI.

Chapters

Section 1. It is recomended that election of chapter officers, for a term of three years, take place in January, occuring in the same year as the election of state officers. Chapter officers shall be installed and take office in May, following the confirmation of the

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State Regent and the State Vice Regent at Continental Congress.

On or before February first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks to be furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter Officers for the ensuing year.

The Regent-elect of each chapter shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on or before April first, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of all newly appointed chapter chairmen.

. ARTICLE XII.

Parliamentary Authority

Section 1. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order revised, shall govern this Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XIII.

Amendments

Section 1. These By Laws may be amended by a two thirds vote at any State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amend ments has been sent to the State Regent and each Chapter at least sixty days before the Annual State Conference.

Section 2. Amendments to these By-Laws shall take effect at the close of the Annual State Conference at which they are adopted.

STANDING RULES

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. The Recording Secretary with the Regent shall see that arrangements are made for the publishing of Proceedings of the State Conference which are contained in the files of the Recording Secretary, the expense of such report to be born by the State Society.

The Recording Secretary shall send a copy of the printed Proceedings to all State Officers, Chapter Regents State Chairmen District Directors, and to such other persons and libraries as shall be designated by the State Regent.

When an election has occurred, it shall be the duty of the retiring Recording Secretary and retiring Regent to compile these proceedings and arrange for their publication.

Section 2. Board of Management meetings may be attended by

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State Chairmen, Chapter Regents' representatives and other interested members, on invitation of the State Regent, except when the Board is in Executive session.

Section 3. A sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the ed each year, expense to be borne by the State Society.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. \$25.00 shall be allotted the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

Section 2. \$50.00 shall be allotted the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Congress.

Section 3. A sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Picnic.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. These rules may be amended, suspended or replaced at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of voting members present.
