OBJECTS OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, acquisition and the protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual service of the Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people. "To promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge", thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American Citizenship.
- (3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for all the blessings of liberty.

Extract from Constitution National Society, D.A.R., Article 11.

INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, Page 62.

Continue, we pray, Thy blessings upon this nation, that all who are a part of it may learn true nobility of manhood and womanhood.

Grant us growth in understanding and increasing devotion to righteousness. Amen.

Meeting of the elected officers and three district directors (Mrs. Lindahl being absent) met at the call of the State Regent in her home at 9:30 a.m.

Miss Haver welcomed the group. We are starting on a three year association together—we are concerned not only with our office and its duties but with every other office and with what is best for a more effective DAR in Kansas—and to advance the societies work and program. Our by-laws need to be revised in keeping with the National Society. According to the National Society by-laws all elected officers compose the executive committee, so, under that provision, this group will be known as the Executive Committee and vote and function as such.

Devotion was given by Chaplain Bertha Gabbert, (a prayer by Billie Graham—and comment) and the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

State Officers, District Directors and all State Chairmen are asked to send copies of all circular letters to the State Regent, Vice Regent and District Directors.

In delegating responsibilities in this administration the Vice Regent will be known as "Advisor with District Directors" and will plan with them for fall conferences.

Personalized stationery for the Directors, and Committee Chairmen will be provided.

The State Regent will plan to visit some 20 chapters this year in the Four Districts. The Directors will plan with the state Regent such itinerary in her district so the State Regent can meet with each chapter. It is requested, in so far as possible that the Director accompany the Regent on these visits.

DAR News was the next item on the agenda. The policy and content will be the responsibility and under the direction of the State Regent. An Editor, was authorized—Mrs. C. H. Reser, State Reporter will work on this project also. This is in line with the policy of all the other state papers at hand.

Each member is to provide a glossy print, from which a cut will be made (at her personal cost) for the DAR News. Mrs. Reser asked that each member send to her the short personal sketch which she had requested.

Considering the printing contract—bids were carefully scanned and the lowest accepted—of the Preston Printing Company of Wichita.

At least 3 issues of the DAR News will be published, June, September and February, or early March. Size 8½ x 11 10 pages.

Table No. 12 was drawn by Kansas for the 1957 banquet of Continental Congress, \$8.00 a plate, and tickets are available from Miss Haver.

Mis. Chesney wondered if some plan could be put into effect, whereby the subscription to our National DAR Magazine could be included in our national dues.

It seemed the general opinion that the chapters would prefer to follow the previous procedure of sending all news clippings to the state reporter—after discussion of the recommendation of the State reporter at the 1956 state conference, which was not brought to a vote of the conference "that pages of the state scrap book be sent to each chapter, they prepare same with their clippings and at the end of the year the completed page or pages be returned to the state reporter.

The program of the coming year is "Cherish and Maintain American Freedom". The National Society has created a "Community Service" committee under which Red Cross and any other Chapter activities of a similar nature will be included. Honor Roll was continued by vote of the delegate body. Name of "Correct Use of the Flag" committee was changed to "Flag of the United States of America".

Our Kansas Special Committee "DAR Historical Markers" will replace the "Santa Fe Trail Markers. Eisenhower Foundation Committee duties are completed. The Speakers Bureau will be discontinued. The Directors and their advisor reported tentative dates for the district conferences, with the State Board of Management meeting in Baxter Springs on Thursday, October 25.

Mrs. Kilbourn moved all outstanding bills be paid as they are presented. Seconded by Jean Reser. Motion carried.

Complying with suggestions made at the March 17 meeting, each state chairman had been contacted for her recommondations of Chairmen of different committees for the coming term. These were considered in choosing persons to head these different committees—the State Regent to make contact and inform these persons of their appointment.

Miss Haver served coffee and delicious cookies as members arrived for the meeting. All were her guests at a lovely luncheon prepared and served by Bessie Watts Circle of WSCS of the Methodist Church.

Mrs. W. L. Ainsworth, newly elected Registrar Ceneral of the National Society arrived at noon, had lunch with the group and attended the afternoon meeting.—Pauline Cowger, Recording Secretary.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING

Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution Baxter Springs, Kansas Presbyterian Church

October 25, 1956

Meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by State Regent Miss Maude Haver. Invocation was given by Chaplain Mrs. H. B. Gabbert. Mrs. Howard Doyle, Director of Southeast District, extended Creetings.

Miss Haver expressed appreciation for the gracious welcome and good attendance.

Roll call was answered by all of the state elected officers (Mrs. Reser arriving later), District Directors (except Mrs. Lindahl), State Parliamentarian and Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, Vice-President General of the National Society.

Also, our four National Committee vice Chairmen, and State Chairmen, Mrs. John A. Pomeroy, Mrs. Wm. Hurxthal Miller; Mrs. Paul R. Greenlease; Miss Belle Provorse; Mrs. R. W. Pearson, Mrs. Mollie Cloud Huston; Mrs. Park Salter; Miss Kate B. Shields; Mrs. O. M. Stansbury; Mrs. Theodore H. Voegthi; Mrs. Ben W. Friedel; Mrs. R. V. Shrewder.

Also, Chapter officers: Regents Mrs. R. O. Ralston of Isabella Weldin, Mrs. F. L. B. Leavel of Cofachique, Mrs. F. P. Taylor of Wyandot, Mrs. W. E. Crawford of James Ross; and Mrs. C. Y. Semple of Baxter Springs. Chaplain Mrs. Eula Hunter of Cofachique, and Mrs. DeMoss—Historian of Cofachique. Mrs. Dellinger member of Oceanus Hopkins.

Each person introduced herself, told of her position in the Society and something about herself.

Under officers reports-Mrs. Gabbert told we have lost 25 members by death since March 1.

Mrs. Feller read summary of cash receipts, disbursements and balances February 1, to October 20, 1956, with detailed schedules for inspection and information.

Mrs. J. H. Griffith of Newton had bequeathed \$250.00 gift to Kate Duncan Smith, and \$250.00 to Tamassee from her estate.

Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick of El Dorado presented a \$1000.00 gift to Tamassee for a slaughter house.

Mrs. Weilepp reported the compiling of the mailing list and bringing it up to date. Kansas now has 3542 members. Every change in membership should be reported to her, immediately.

Mrs. Chesney outlined a suggested project "Kansas History in Capsule form". She told of the dedication of the Pylons at the Eisenhower museum November 24, and the presentation of the 500 club book, one of the finest tributes paid to President Eisenhower.

Mrs. Durr commented on the books in our library, many are not in good condition with loose pages, bindings needed, etc. Nor do we have an appuaised value, and insurance. Moving is not too good for the books and should we have a permanent location for our library. There is a definite policy for our library books to be loaned only to DAR members to help in genealogical research. There is a complete list of all books, pamphlets and folders that make up the library. Many of these books are valuable and cannot be replaced.

MOTION was made by Mrs. Shrewder seconded by Mrs. J. O. Carter of Garden City, that a committee be appointed to select a suitable permanent location for the Library and the findings be brought to the state conference in March 1957. This committee to work out a policy for the library. Motion carried.

MOTION by Mrs. Tillie Karns Newman of Coffeyville and seconded by Mrs. B. W. Friedel of Kansas City, that the Library be appraised and then properly insured. Motion carried

Miss Haver, State Regent, in her report read the calendar of her activities since her election, which included attendance at Continental Congress April 16-20, where Mrs. Wm. L. Ainsworth was elected Registrar General, and Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick was elected Honorary Vice President General for life. Also attending the October Board meeting of the National Society in Washington, Shawnee Mission pilgrimage, attending Chapter meetings over the state—and seeing to the business and welfare of the Kansas Society. She expressed gratitude for the splendid work of the Chapters, the State Officers and Chairmen.

Parliamentarian Mrs. Paul Kent asked that all Chapters send to her the copy of their Chapter by-laws. This is in keeping with a request of the National Society that these be checked.

Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage by Mrs. Ben Friedel showed 101 persons attending with one-third of Kansas Chapters represented. The Committee had made a careful inspection of the two rooms sponsored by the State Society as a Museum at Old Shawnee Mission in Johnson County and recorded a complete inventory (copy on file with State Regent). They will return soon to do some further checking, cleaning shelves, washing the lovely old dishes and other details. The framed photographs of our state regents are no longer hanging on the walls.

IT WAS VOTED through motion by Mrs. Taylor, seconded by Mrs. Greenlease that the State Society purchase an album where the pictures of the past state Regents will be kept, and that the frames be returned to the donors.

Mrs. Shrewder had recently spent some time at St. Francis Boys homes—and their greatest need right now is at Ellsworth, for a larger water main from the city connection, out to the home. She asked that "we assign the gifts as they come to us for St. Francis Boys home, to this water project at Ellsworth". There being no objection, Miss Haver stated this would be done. This can also be reported through Community Service committee.

Miss Haver stated Mrs. Roscoe Graves, 141\(\beta\) Rural, Emporia, is Chairman of By-Laws Committee. Every member was asked to study the by-laws, and especially with regard to her particular work, and make suggestions to Mrs. Graves.

Copies of all circular letters of state officers and chairmen should be sent to Honorary State Regents as well as national officers within the state.

All correspondence from all officers and all committee chairmen is to be brought to Chapter meetings and read. Certain rulings of National Society must be observed and the Chairmen must follow these.

Orders for all materials must be sent to our national offices in Washington and not to individual addresses.

Kansas table at Continental Congress banquet, 1957 is No. 12, and cost is \$8.00 each. Kansas luncheon on Tuesday of that week \$4.00 each and Mrs. Earl C. Moses is Chairman. There are vacancies for Kansas members to serve during Continental Congess as pages, members of the House Committee, etc. Let your state regent know of any one who can serve. Next issue of DAR news is February 1957.

State Conference in Beloit, March 14, 15, 16, 1957.

Attention was called to Thursday, October 10, Christian Science Monitor telling the DAR. "The Daughters—Many Good Works" and passed out some copies. Also good articles recently in Time, and Sinclair Oil publications.

The Proceedings of March 1956 state conference were just received. Copies \$1.50.

MOTION by Mrs. Howard Doyle that the profit of \$205.97 from the Kansas Society Tea at the 1956 session of Continental Congress to be put in a savings account where it draws interest, to be used for similar functions in Washington. Seconded by Mrs. G. Y. Stewart. Carried.

IT WAS VOTED, by motion of Mrs. R. H. Chesney, seconded by Mrs. R. V. Shrewder "that all Kansas Chapter Historians be given the responsibility of compiling all local Kansas historical data to be screened and classified, such selected material to be suitable for use on a Kansas Historical map, to be sponsored and issued by the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution.' Details to be correlated by a committee appointed by the State Regent and such project to cover the present administration".

Huron cemetery problem in Kansas City, Kansas was brought by Mrs. W. E. Crawford. She explained the history of the cemetery (burial ground of the Wyandot Indian tribe) the contentions, problems, and litigations to this time. This is one of the finest records of history we have in our state.

ON MOTION by Mrs. Crawford, seconded by Mrs. Taylor, it was voted "that the State Board of Management, Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution go on record for continuing the Huron cemetery as it now is, and that the Corresponding Secretary write letters setting forth that position to our State Senators, to the District Congressman, to the Secretary of the Interior, and to the State Board of Helath."

There were only five Chapter regents present at this meeting. One of the purposes of holding the Board of Management meetings was for the Chapter regents convenience in attending the meeting. The question was asked the Parliamentarian if anything in our by-laws would forbid the holding of the Board of Management meetings in the central part of the state, with greater accessibility for every one.

The by-laws were checked and there was nothing that would restrain the Board from meeting where they desired. The intent, although it is not said, is that meeting would be held in different districts for regents to take advantage of attending. But experience has shown otherwise.

It was decided the October 1957 Board of Management meeting will be held in Wichita at 10 a.m. prior to the first fall conference, after the National board meeting—at a date to be arranged with convenience to the State Regent.

Reports were given by each of the State Chairmen present. Attention was called to the DAR Magazine advertising cooperative page—but for a chapter to qualify for the Honor Roll, it must pay the \$5.00 as outlined for that project.

Mrs. Paul Greenlease had just returned from a visit to 8 of our approved schools, but she made a special plea for the two DAR supported schools—they need our money and our gifts very much. Two sets of slides are now available for Chapter use, from Mrs. Greenlease—of the pictures she took on this trip.

Miss Belle Provorse of DAR Good Citizen urges where there is only one Chapter covering a County—or large district—that the chapter contact each of the high schools and sponsor a good citizen in each of them. Nice comments were made on the DAR news and its content.

Meeting was adjourned for a delicious turkey dinner at the Methodist church. Roses in large bowls were from the rose garden of the regent Mrs. Semple. Many Baxter Springs members attended as well as the Board of Management. A pleasant social hour was enjoyed after the dinner.—Pauline Cowger, Recording Secretary.

STATE OFFICERS MEETING Beloit, Kansas. Municipal Auditorium Wednesday, March 13, 1957

Called to order by State Regent Miss Maude Haver at 3 p. m., with all attending except Mrs. Kilbourn.

After words of greeting by Miss Haver, each officer was asked for comments on the duties of her office, activities, requests, and/or suggestions.

Mrs. H. B. Gabbert asked that Chapters send her as soon as any death occurs, this information so the State Chaplain can send sympathy to the bereaved family.

Mrs. George Y. Stewart reported on lists and information necessary for Credential work at State Conference. Also compilation of officers and Chairmen lists from each chapter for state officers and chairmen.

Registrar Mrs. G. D. Weilepp stated a net loss of 10 in Kansas membership this year, with 62 deaths and 67 resignations. 24 Chapters did not have a new member. The mailing list is now up to date.

Mrs. R. H. Chesney asked for a meeting of the Eisenhower Committee. The Kansas room in Washington needs attention, including repainting and some refurnishings. She also requested an active committee and information from each chapter for the history map project.

Treasurers report and Auditors summary were given by Mrs. John Feller, showing \$1,572.11 balance in the bank March 10. Last years proceedings cost \$890.20, and Directory \$1,600.00. One suggestion advanced was that CAR have only one page in DAR News. Another was that they carry all their own financial responsibilities since the state gives them five cents a member.

Mrs. C. H. Reser inquired about awards of money to Chapters for publicity, as had been done previous years—she was authorized to make such awards.

There was considerable discussion about our State history. From organization to 1937 a separate history was published. The policy to be that every 6 years a summary would be made and included in the proceedings of that year. This was done in 1944 and 1950, but none since that date. The State Regent and Recording Secretary will review proceedings and bring this up to date for next year.

Miss Haver commented—1959 state conference will be in Southeast district, and our President General will visit Kansas. Suggestion was made that we check the file of the Kansas Society, at the Kansas State Historical Society rooms, this will be done some time this summer. She also hopes we may consolidate our going to District conferences via caravan.

The Student Loan bonds of \$1,000.00 were due January 1, 1957. It was advised these be renewed as "G" bonds, adding the interest to the account in the First Savings & Loan Assn. in Hutchinson. Mrs. Feller made this motion which was seconded and carried.

Question was raised by Mrs. Chesney of easier accessibility for state conferences, and accommodations. Thinking probably State conferences could be held in three or four key cities in or near the center of the state, with the different districts as hostesses.

Flowers were sent Mrs. R. V. Shrewder from the State officers at the time of death of her mother two weeks ago—red and white carnations tied with a blue ribbon.

Mrs. Durr, Librarian, spoke in detail of the DAR Library, of the committee findings, condition of books, need for repairs, and of the desire of the Dodge City Library Board to have their building selected as the permanent location of our Library.

Pauline Cowger, Recording Secretary commented she had endeavored to fulfill duties of the office.

Time was called and it was necessary to adjourn to keep the schedule of meetings. It was mutually agreed the next officers meeting would be Saturday, May 25, 9 a.m., at the home of Mrs. Stewart.

STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING

Beloit, Kansas, Municipal Auditorium Thursday, March 14, 1957, 10 a.m.

Meeting was called to order by State Regent, Miss Haver, at the scheduled hour.

Invocation was given by State Chaplain Mrs. H. B. Gabbert.

Miss Haver spoke greetings and appreciation for the fine attendance; with every state officer and all but six State Chairmen or their representatives of standing and special committees, District Directors (chairmen absent were Mesdames Naylor, Ripple, Huston, Blackburn, Voegtli and Friedel).

Registrar General Mrs. William L. Ainsworth was presented and urged Chapters to send applications every month thoughout the year. National is now accepting supplemental papers and when so many come in shortly before a board meeting, it is almost impossible to process them, and report as desired. Chapter Registrars are very important in checking the blanks and knowing all spaces are filled in properly. Mrs. Ainsworth has an article on this subject in April issue DAR magazine.

Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn asked for a meeting of the four District Directors to set dates and places for the fall district meetings. Most districts already know where the meetings will be held.

Chaplain Mrs. H. B. Gabbert suggested as soon as there is a death in the Chapter, please notify the State Registrar and also the Chaplain. Her thought is to send messages of sympathy to the family.

Corresponding Secretary Mrs. Geo. Y. Stewart reported she had written letters as directed about the Huron cemetery. She asked for names of newly elected officers and appointments of Chapter Chairmen as soon as possible. And as any changes are made, be sure to let her know.

Mrs. Jno. Feller gave a summary of the Treasurers and Auditors reports (will be printed in the poceedings). Kenmore is not a national or state project and Chapter contributions should be sent direct to it.

Mrs. G. D. Weilepp stated that only four applications were verified at the February meeting of National Board of Management and urged attention to comments by Mrs. Ainsworth. Any Chapter desiring assistance in preparing papers should write Mrs. Weilepp as she may have the needed information at hand. Kansas had one new Chapter last year, Flores del Sol at Wichita. There were 62 deaths and 67 resignations last year, making a loss of 10 in our total membership.

Mrs. Chesney explained that markers for deceased DAR members do not come under her jurisdiction for approval. As the graves are marked, make report of this action to the State Historian.

Reporter, Mrs. C. H. Reser has been publicity minded, arranging interviews for the local papers with persons at this meeting. Clipping of ALL publicity should be sent to her, and will be included in the state scrap book which is on display near the registration table.

Miss Haver asked that Chapters bring their local by-laws up to date, to correspond with the recent revision of the National Society, copy sent to our state Parliamentarian for checking.

MRS. FELLER MADE THE MOTION that we re-invest the F bonds of the Student Loan Fund which expired January 1, 1957, in "G" bonds—\$1000.00, the interest to be added to the student loan fund now at the First Federal Savings & Loan Association, Hutchinson, Kansas. Motion seconded by Mrs. Ray, Regent of Tomhawk Chapter. Motion carried.

Mrs. Durr reported on the DAR Library. The records show that the Library was established in 1930 at the state conference held in Salina March 25. "\$25.00 was allocated from the state funds to start a genealogical traveling library." Later, it is referred to as circulating genealogical and historical Library. At that time the Librarian took the books and manuscripts to the state and district meetings. Then, at the 34th annual conference, March 31, 1932 in Abilene recommendation was adopted "that hereafter it be known as Kansas State DAR Library".

The committee appointed, as instructed by our October 25, 1956 board meeting was Mrs. Durr as Chairman, Mrs. J. C. Denious, Mrs. R. P. Vernon, Mrs. Guy Josserand, Mrs. J. C. Harper, Mrs. Frank Blaser. The report presented by Mrs. Durr had the approval of the five members, with Mrs. Blazer discenting. The Dodge City Library Board has in writing requested that the Kansas State DAR Library be permanently housed in their library building. A suitable, adequate place would be assigned. The Dodge City Chapter DAR has volunteered that a permanent committee from its membership would have charge and care for the lending and checking in of books to DAR members. The State Librarian would still follow her line of duties, except that the books and manuscripts would always remain in the one place.

This policy and suggestion follows the pattern of the Nebraska library and it has worked well for them. The only thing the State Librarian would not do that she does now is to send out the books, and check them back as they return, the Library Committee would take care of this.

Mrs. Blazer stated her reason for discenting was she felt that the Chapters should study this question and discuss it in their meetings, and come to the next state Conference prepared to act.

There was a general discussion, and questions asked and answered.

MRS. HOOFER, REGENT OF MINISA CHAPTER, Wichita moved that we accept the offer of the Dodge City Library Board to have our DAR Library permanently located there, under the supervision of our DAR State Librarian, and Committee. Motion seconded by Kate Shields, Iola.

Counting those persons eligible for voting, there were 39.

Putting the motion to vote, 35 voted for it.

Motion carried, and Recommendation will be presented to the State Conference for its action.

Mrs. Howard Doyle, Conference Marshall asked that all persons in the processional always be at the place of meeting on time, so there will be no delay in starting each session.

Shawnee Mission question that was asked at the October 25 Board meeting—we do have insurance on the DAR properties there, and the policy expires in 1958.

Historian Mrs. R. H. Chesney urged all Chapters to report to her any places of Kansas interest in their locality, so plans may go forward for the "History Map and brochure" within the year.

She suggested it would be a help to members if we held state conferences at probably three central cities easily accessible, with the districts taking their turns of being hostesses as they do now, and probably a local liaison person for contact. The districts will still hold their meetings in their own districts.

Much discussion indicated such a plan is successful in other states.

MRS. W. E. CRAWFORD REGENT OF JAMES ROSS CHAPTER, moved that we hold our state conferences in three cities, Wichita, Salina and Topeka, with the Districts still taking their turns of entertaining the Conference, with liaison person in the city where the conference is being held. Mrs. L. E. Thomas, Ft. Scott, Mrs. R. O. Ralston, Wichita and several others seconded the motion.

MRS. WM. HURXTHAL MILLER, REGENT OF TOPEKA CHAPTER asked to amend the motion to include Kansas City, Kansas which would alternate with Topeka. Mrs. C. P. Baugh, Regent of Oceanus Hopkins Chapter of Pittsburg seconded the amendment.

Voting on the amendment—carried.

Voting on the motion as amended, Carried. And this will be referred to the state Conference for its decision.

Miss Haver read a letter from our President General, Mrs. Groves, to all state regents, enclosing a request from the Commander of Homestead Florida Air Force Base, that all state flags be hung in their Chapel. They already have from 17 states, and the Kansas flag is not one of them. These are of coton 3'x5'—no flagpole—cost \$16.00.

- MRS. L. E. THOMAS, DIRECTOR OF SOUTHEAST DISTRICT, Fort Scott, made the motion that we recommend to the State Conference that the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution cooperate with the Homestead Florida Air Force Base in providing them with a Kansas Flag. Mrs. I. M. Platt, Regent of Lois Warner Chapter, Junction City seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- Mrs. R. W. Graves, Emporia, Chairman of the By-Laws Committee explained about our by-laws, giving provisions of Roberts Rules of Order for amending, and also procedure in revision of by-laws. The Committee will ask permission for a revision of the by-laws at our 1958 state conference.
- Mrs. C. H. Reser, State Reporter commented it has been customary in the past to award cash prizes in different classes, 1. daily papers with the most inches. 2. weekly papers with the most inches, and 3. most outstanding publicity of any single chapter in Kansas.
- MRS. R. W. PEARSON, STATE MAGAZINE CHAIRMAN moved that this Board appropriate funds for the three Publicity prizes as heretofore, and also for the four Magazine subscription prizes. Edna Wheatley, State Program Chairman seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Miss Haver expressed pleasure that so many of the Chapter regents were at this meeting, And, asked that they appoint chapter chairmen to coincide with each national committee. She advised that they refer often to the suggestions sent out by the state chairmen and officers, as these come from our National Society, and follow the policy set out by Continental Congress.

A number of regents made comments and suggestions, and an interesting time was spent listening to their ideas.

No further business being presented, the meeting was adjourned for luncheon.

Registration began at 7 p.m. Wednesday, March 13, and continued throughout the session time, in the lobby of the Porter Hotel.

State Regent Miss Maude Haver called to order the fifty-ninth annual state conference of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution at 2:30 p.m. Thursday afternoon, March 14, 1957, in the Municipal Auditorium at Beloit, Kansas. Miss Haver announced the time keeper would be Miss Cowger.

Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn, State Vice Regent, presided while Miss Haver read her report showing a busy year, and a constructive one for the Kansas Society.

Miss Haver resumed the chair—and reports of the Vice Regent, Chaplain, Recording Secretary, Registrar, Historian, Librarian and Reporter were read and filed for printing in the proceedings. The report of the State Treasurer and the Auditors Report were read by Mrs. Feller. She moved that the auditors report be accepted. Motion seconded by Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden, Honorary State Regent. Motion carried.

DAR News Editor, Mrs. Joe MacConkey of Wichita had flown in by plane—and it was necessary that she return home that afternoon, she gave her report at this time.

The assemblage sang "America The Beautiful" with Mrs. Carl Biegert as leader, with Mrs. R. W. Long accompanist.

Mrs. William L. Ainsworth, Registrar General, gave an inspirational address on the conference theme "Cherish American Freedom".

"Just what do we mean by this expression, 'Cherish and Maintain American Freedom.'" Patriotism is all that it implies, a love of fatherland. We are blessed with the heritage that is ours because our Fathers dared

June 14, 1777 the American Flag was adopted. And it led in the progress and the march of our ancestors from the Atlantic seaboard through the Cumberland gap on west and they spread out here in Missouri and Kansas and other states. Then, later there was a march on to the Pacific sea coast.

Our National building has engraved on it "The heritage of the past is the side that brings forth the harvest of the future" and how true that is. Whether we realize it or not, our very thinking, in a way, is governed by our parents, and our grand paents—our ancestors.

Genealogy is such a facinating hobby once it is started, one never gives it up, and I recommend it to every one.

As you cherish your American freedom, cherish your American heritage. Follow the hobby, and search for your ancestors. Mrs. Chas. D. Cruse called attention to exhibit of flag materials on the east wall of the Porter hotel lobby.

The colors were retired, and the meeting recessed.

Regents Dinner, Thursday evening, March 14, 1957, Municipal Auditorium The tables were colorful and attractive, with many potted red geraniums in fluffy blue paper containers. At each place was a small box of Stover candies, and miniature hand made flags of every state and country in which there is a DAR Chapter—with a brief history and description of that flag.

In as much as the luncheon was served cafeteria—Grace was given by the State Chaplain before the meeting was recessed.

12:15—Approved Schools Luncheon, with tables decorated in spring colors, large straw hats served as flower baskets. Each person had a favor of a miniature spring hat which was really a needle book, with a thimble. Napkins were fringed spring colors of cloth, and made by the Girls Industrial school. Two of the instructors were guests at the luncheon.

Miss Haver presented Mrs. Greenlease, State Chairman of Approved schools, who introduced the speakers.

John P. Tyson, Executive Secretary of Kate Duncan Smith School. He told of the background and establishment, and very great need for a day school such as Kate Duncan Smith—and of its progress and development since 1924. Then, he told of many personal incidents in the lives

of the students, and where many of them are today, and what they are doing.

Most of the people in this region (over 100 square miles) are eligible for the DAR and SAR. In 1924 there were two teachers, 4 small rooms and less than 100 students. Today there are 21 buildings, faculty of 23 persons, 9 of whom have their Masters Degree—500 students, and grounds of 230 acres including the school farm. Yet, the population on Gunters Mountain is no more today than it was in 1924.

There is a deep appreciation of what DAR has done in and for that community. It has changed the minds of the people who live there. Our motto is "To be better than the Best"—we must be that to be worthy of the ideals and lofty aspirations of DAR."

Mrs. Greenlease then introduced Ralph Cain, Superintendent of Tamassee-our Boarding School. He gave a valuable talk summarizing the progress at Tamassee, picturing the miracle of development from the days when the school had no heat except an old broken down stove and no water except the brook, of today with its physical plant and modern equipment on a campus of 759 acres. But, more than this is the miracle wrought in the children and in the community. The students are our big story—and what they have done, and will do in the future years. There is the academic program like other schools but here is also the practical education for the students, to equip them for their future living. One must not forget the medical problem, in such a community, and for the school. Of the 500 graduates, about half of them live within a 100 mile radius-and the others are scattered all over the United States; and to the best knowledge of the officials—there has been no criminals among them. Mr. Cain gave thanks and praise to the DAR for the many contributions in cash and clothing for the good work at Tamassee, and the wonderful investment in the youth of that locality.

Mrs. Greenlease announced that there was literature of the two schools on a table in the rear of the room.

Mrs. Greenlease offered two cash prizes for the coming year—\$25.00 to the Chapter contributing the most to Kate Smith, and \$25.00 to the Chapter contributing the most to Tamassee. Chapter Chairmen will be receiving information about this.

Miss Haver stressed that these two schools are ours—they belong to the DAR—who pay all the bills. It is to our good interests to see that their standards remain high.

2:15—State Regent Miss Haver presented Mrs. William L. Ainsworth, State President, Society of CAR, who gave her report.

Next in order were the reports of the Special state appointees: Parliamentarian, Mrs. Paul N. Kent; Conference Marshall, Mrs. Howard Doyle; St. Francis Boys Home, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder; Consulting Genealogist, Miss Lucina Jones (a general discussion followed).

Announcements for the evening—and Saturday morning were made, colors retired and the meeting recessed for the Memorial Service in the Presbyterian Church at 4 p.m. and for the Courtesy Tea Honoring State Regent; National Officers, Honorary State Regents'; National Vice Chairmen; State officers; and CAR officers.

The Impressive Memorial service for our sixty-two deceased members this past year was held in the sanctuary of the First Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Emerson Hazlett, member of the Award of Merit Committee, reported: "The National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution is the outstanding women's patriotic organization in the world. We are devoted to the preservation of our Constitutional Republic and will settle for no less than the highest concept of American citizenship. "Thank you for being on our side—on America's side."

To Miss Lola Gebhardt, a charter member of Smoky Hill Chapter, an award for her many years of producing good citizens through her position as a teacher in the Ellsworth schools. She has served her chapter as chairman of Junior American Citizens for the past twenty years, and has 120 children in her group now. She has also served as publicity director and chairman of the DAR Good Citizen Committee for two terms. To Miss Gebhardt goes our Thanks and Congratulations for helping produce the type of Junior citizens we would all wish our own sons and daughters to be.

The Second Award goes to Congressman Wint Smith of the Sixth Kansas District. It is only fitting that while we enjoy the hospitality of his District, we send our appreciation to Congressman Smith for the forthright manner in which he fills his office. There's never any doubt on whose side this well-informed member of Congress belongs. His position has never been that of fence straddling or political expediency. He believes, as we do, that there can be no compromise with Americanism. In fact, were Congressman Smith a woman, I'm sure he would be our President General by now. He believes in the DAR, and we believe in him. So, to Congressman Wint Smith of Sixth District, our Thanks and Appreciation for representing his part of Kansas so outstandingly in the United States Congress. We feel safer because he is there.

The words of the Award we give to Miss Gebhardt and Congressman Smith are: "In grateful recognition of constructive activity directed toward the preservation of our Constitutional Republic, and expressed devotion to a high concept of American Citizenship."

We regret that neither Miss Gebhardt nor Congressman Smith could be here tonight to personally receive these awards.

Mrs. Abels introduced Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, Vice President General who gave the address "Maintain American Freedom."

Eunice Sterling Award Flags were presented by Mrs. Louis H. Grieb, Regent of that Chapter, with the following remarks:

"Forty-seven years ago, in 1910, The Eunice Sterling Chapter, presented to the State Conference a large silk flag of the United States of America, complete with standard and base. The purpose of the gift was to encourage increase in membership. Mrs. Chas. Bitting, the Regent explained that the award would be given each year to the Kansas Chapter with the largest percentage increase in membership from one state conference to the next state conference.

In 1920 during the regency of Mrs. Robert Campbell, the flag had become travel worn and was replaced by another. Since the award was made on a percentage basis, it has always remained in the small chapters, where the members meet in the homes. A request came asking for a flag of smaller dimensions, so in 1934 during the Regency of Mrs. C. A. Matson, the large silk flag was placed in the DAR room at Shawnee Mission, and again Eunice Sterling presented the State Society a smaller silk flag with standard.

In 1940 during Mrs. Garland P. Ferrell's Regency, she presented to the State Society, in behalf of Eunice Sterling Chapter, the DAR silk flag and standard to accompany the flag of the United States of America on its travels about the state. Seldom has the same chapter won the award twice in succession, but this year the award goes again to the Tomahawk Chapter with a gain of 13.41/43rds per cent. We know that you will cherish and protect both flags, the flag of the United States of America as symbol of the "supreme law of the land" and our DAR flag as symbol of "our love and hope and appreciation of our country," and both flags as our priceless heritage.

We are happy to present to the Tomahawk Chapter at this time, "The Traveling Flags Award."

Mrs. W. D. Ray, Regent of Tomahawk Chapter, accepted this recognition, and spoke the appreciation of the members.

Mrs. Mary Boyd, District Chairman of Decorations and Favors, named the Chapters responsible for the different functions, and the favors.

Mrs. Edwin F. Abels, Honorary State Regent, of Lawrence, Betty Washington Chapter is a candidate for the office of Vice President General, at Continental Congress—through action taken at our 1956 state conference. And, Miss Haver read the complete printed announcement of Mrs. Abel's candidacy.

The gavel used by Miss Haver through this days session was awarded to the Kansas Society by the Building Promotion Committee 59th Continental Congress in 1950 for Honor Roll Attainment. Our emblem is engraved on it.

The final report of the Credentials Committee signed by Elizabeth Steward, Ruth Feller and Mildred Huffman,, was read by Mrs. Stewart.

Three National Officers; 10 State Officers; 103 Delegates; 29 Alternates; 51 visitors, making a total registration of 196.

Minutes of the previous days proceedings were read by Recording Secretary, Pauline Cowger, with no corrections or questions.

The Recording Secretary was asked to read the recommendations from the State Board of Management.

1. As a background of explanation—a letter from our President General, enclosing copy of a letter from Major Thomas E. Adams, USAF Base Chaplain, Headquarters 823rd Air Division USAF Homestead Air Force Base, Florida, requesting state flags, which would be hung permanently in that air base chapel. They had flags from 17 states, when the letter was written, and several others have been added since that time. Among the flags they do not have, is one from Kansas. These are of cotton 3' x 5' (bull dog), with no flag poles, and cost \$16.00.

Board Recommendation: Mrs. Edith Thomas of Fort Scott moved that we recommend to the State Conference that Kansas Society DAR cooperate with the Homestead Air Force Base, Florida in providing them with a Kansas Flag. Mrs. I. M. Platt of Junction City seconded the motion. Motion carried.

- Mrs. W. C. Harbin made the motion that the State Conference approve this recommendation and that the Kansas Flag be sent. Motion seconded by Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden. Carried
- Mrs. Hoofer of Minisa Chapter "moved that we accept the offer of the Dodge City Library Board to have our DAR Library (books and manuscipts) permanently located there, under the supervision of our DAR State Librarian, and committee. Motion seconded by Kate Shields of Iola. Motion carried, by vote of 35, with 39 eligible voters

Miss Haver asked the Parliamentarian to give her ruling on this Recommendation.

Mrs. Kent stated this Recommendation should be referred to the Committee on By-Laws in as much as this would change by intent the status quo of our by-laws, and that cannot be done. Next year we will have a complete revision of our by-laws and this may be considered by the by-laws committee.

And Miss Haver stated the suggestion would be followed, and the recommendation turned to the by-laws committee.

3. "Mrs. W. E. Crawford, Regent of James Ross Chapter moved that we hold our state conference in four cities, Wichita, Salina, Topeka, and Kansas City, with the Districts still taking their turns of entertaining the Conference, with a liaison person in the city where the conference is being held. Mrs. L. E. Thomas Ft. Scott, Mrs. R. O. Ralston delegates and several others seconded the motion.

Miss Haver called on the Parliamentarian for her ruling.

Mrs. Kent. I am sure all of you realize this recommendation would be contrary to our by-laws as they are now. This would be referred to your by-laws committee. The Chapters may discuss it in their meetings and this will lead to a better understanding.

Miss Haver announced we would consider the ruling of our parliamentarian as final and that action would be taken.

Mrs. Clair Lindahl introduced the persons active in the planning for the state conference along with Miss Addie O'Reilly and Mrs. Tweed Ross co-chairman. Misses Irma Nixon and Helen Stafford as Finance Secretaries; Decorations and Favors—Mrs. Frank Boyd Jr. and Mrs. C. W. Inge, Mrs. F. R. Fair Page Chairman, Mrs. R. W. Long, Mrs. Lester Beeler as Musicians, and all the members in the district who had cooperated so beautifully, and helped to make the conference a success.

Mrs. W. C. Harbin, acting Chairman of Resolutions read the report, and moved adoption of each resolution as it was read—

- 8. Rededication to Religious Principles, seconded by Mrs. T. H. Allan, Wichita. Carried.
- 9. Flouridation, seconded by Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden, Newton. There was much discussion of this subject, many feeling it was out of the general province—and many chapters had not discussed the subject. Voting on the motion. No's carried by a large majority, and motion lost.
- 10. Courtesy, seconded by Mrs. R. W. Pearson, Kansas City, Kate Shields, Iola, and several others. Mrs. L. E. Thomas, Fort Scott moved to amend the resolution by adding the Chamber of Commerce, the churches of Beloit, the Musicians from the high school. Amendment seconded by Mrs. Mabelle S. Ehlers of Manhattan. Amendment carried. Voting of the motion as amended. Carried.
 - Mrs. J. C. Woolley, Chairman of Community Service read her report.
- St. Francis Boys Home Chairman, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder presented request for assignment of contributions. "I MOVE THAT THE AMOUNT OF \$519.00 received during the year 1956-57 as gifts from chapters and individual members for the St. Francis Boys' Homes be assigned to the water line at the Ellsworth unit and that other funds received by the state treasurer for this committee work, during the remaining two years of this administration be assigned for this same purpose to help defray the total cost of this vitally needed utilities improvement, for this much needed work. Motion seconded by Mrs. J. C. Woolley of Wichita. Carried.

\$15.00 was voted by the Regents Club at their breakfast to each of our schools, Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith.

The State officers club voted to send \$5.00 to each of the two schools, and \$12.55 to St. Francis Boys Home for water improvements at Ellsworth.

Miss Haver asked Mrs. William L. Ainsworth who had assisted greatly in the organization of the new Flores del Sol Chapter in Wichita, to welcome the organizing regent, Mrs. C. L. Trapp, Sr., and the Treasurer, Mrs. Gladys Barutiney.

This is a Chapter made up mostly of business women and teachers and meets in the evenings. December 29, 1956 they were organized with 30 members.

We are pleased to welcome them into the Kansas Society, and to present them with this gavel—a gift of our state regent.

Mrs. Trapp accepted the gavel and responded graciously "we want you to be proud of us."

Mrs. L. Kampschroeder of Garden City, Chairman of Membership had found it necessary to resign—and Mrs. Frank Blaser of Wichita was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick, Honorary Vice President General for life, in speaking on highlights of the conference thought "perhaps I am the oldest member, in years, in this organization—I have been a member over 50 years".

Mrs. Wm. L. Ainsworth, Registrar General, and Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, Vice President General also spoke of the accomplishments—the constructive progress and thinking of the conference.

Thanks to Miss Haver, our State Regent, for her gracious manner and her capable handling of the conference, and keeping it going on schedule.

National Vice Chairmen in Kansas gave highlights of their work: American Music, Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn; DAR Museum, Mrs. Robert H. Chesney, Junior American Citizens, Mrs. H. B. Gabbert; Press Relations, Mrs. Tillie Karns-Newman.

Invitation for the 1958 state conference was given by Mrs. L. V. Chancy of Topeka Chapter, the meeting to be held in Northeast District, Topeka, with Jayhawk Hotel as headquarters, on March 13-14-15, 1958. Mrs. Forrast Beal, Junction City moved the invitation be accepted. Seconded by Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, Ashland. Carried.

Mrs. Paul Kent made the motion that the final reading of the Minutes of this session be deferred, and that the Executive Committee pass on them. Motion seconded by Mrs. W. B. Pierce of Salina. Carried.

State Regent Miss Haver wished every one well—a successful year in their Chapters—assurance of the cooperation of all the state officers and chairmen, and expressed appreciation of everyone who had assisted, in making this State Conference an outstanding success.

"Blest Be the Tie That Binds was the closing song, led by Mrs. Carl Biegert, with Mrs. R. W. Long accompanist.

The colors were retired, and the 59th State Conference was declared adjourned by the state regent, Miss Maude Haver.

EDUCATION

RESOLVED, That Kansas Society, DAR reaffirm confidence in and gratitude for the work of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and to J. Edgar Hoover for devotion and successful achievements in the protection of these United States from enemies within and without.

MAINTAIN AMERICAN FREEDOM Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder

Madam Regent may I express my appreciation for this honor you would accord me tonight—To speak to our Kansas Daughters on that part of our Conference Theme—to "Maintain American Freedom"?

I have chosen to try to lead the way along that controversial road of patriotism and Nationalism, I dare take up the Controversial, because in the words of Doctor Louis Kayser, eminent historian and dean of George Washington University, we must not avoid, we cannot afford to ignore the controversial. There are those who classify nationalism in the same category with colonialism, imperialism and other unmentionable institutions of an earler period but not the learned Doctor who states it this way—"What is nationalism? If I know history at all it is the greatest political force existing in the modern world. It is a fusion of two elements, the sense of nationality and patriotism. By a sense of

NATIONALITY is meant—that group consciousness which ties together large numbers of people on the basis of a common heritage—tradition, history, language, common destiny. With this to create nationalism, patriotism has been fused. Patriotism is love of fatherland, with all that implies.

Breathes there a man with soul so dead,
Who never to himself has said,
This is my own, my native land!
Whose heart has ne'er within him burned
As home his footsteps he has turned,
From wandering on a foreign strand?
(Sir Walter Scott: Lay of the Last
Minstrel. Canto VI, St. 1)

That is patriotism. It leads people without irreverence to describe their own as "God's country". It finds exaltation of soul in every rock and rill and wood and templed hill. It is a great dynamic in historic evolution. More than once it has pulled down the mighty from his seat, and exalted them of low degree.

NATIONALISM AS WE KNOW IT cannot be found in antiquity. The middle ages disclose its presence only in embryonic form. But as the elements of the MODERN age begin to array themselves, we can see the factors which shape it emerging. Universal empire and universal church are shaken in their hold on human allegiance. Feudalism crumples with the rise of national sovereigns. An expanding economy breaks out of its medieval straight-jacket, a middle class emerges and the new state becomes the guardian of the economic well being of its people. In place of universal western church, numerous new faiths find new doctrines and people of each national group tend to unity of doctrine and unity of church organization. Englishmen find themselves speaking English more exclusively and a great vernacular literature becomes a part of the national heritage and so with the French, the Germans, the Spaniards and so on. In a word, the modern world sees the more enlightened and progressive peoples, grouped in nations, occupying national homelands, speaking national languages, enjoying a national scale of living, worshipping in national churches.

It was in the last half of the 18th century that nationalism became more active and aggressive. The cause of the change in tempo and force was due to the fact that the idea of popular sovereignty, that the people alone were supreme, ceased to be an academic proposition and became a rule of action. When people in vast numbers became convinced that it was their land, not the kings, that they fought for their own and not for somebody else's, the great dynamic forces of patriotism and nationality merged and became marching orders. Nationalism as we know it had made its appearance. This was the age of the American Revolution and the establishment of a "New Order of the Ages" the outgrowth of which was the Republic established under the Constitution of the United States and the Bill of Rights.

Mankind has been on the earth a long time. Records go back about 6,000 years. Two thirds of known history happened before the birth of Christ. It was 1,492 years from the birth of Christ to the discovery of America. It was almost 300 years more before our Constitution was adopted. We have been under our Constitution less than 200 years.

Our life as a nation is only a wink in the eye of history. Yet in that short time Americans have made a record that exceeded all man's previous hopes. America is great today because it had great Founding Fathers who sincerely and unselfishly dedicated themselves their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor to the cause of independence and civil and religious liberty, individual freedom of choice and personal freedom of action and the establishment of a Government with a Constitution and Bill of Rights that would guarantee these blessings to the people of the United States. They set about to create that New Order where men could, WITH THE HELP OF GOD, work out their own spiritual, economic and social salvation freed from Old World governmental and ecclesiastical restraints and prohibitions, superstitions and ignorance. They had high purpose, noble ambitions and lofty ideals, plus mighty convictions and the determination and courage to maintain them at all costs.

They built homes for themselves and their families, churches of all sorts wherein they worshipped God in their own way, school houses for the education of their children in the liberal arts and sciences of government Court Houses to assure peace and order.

They put their ideals into action and thus created AMERICANISM. For about 125 years they and their successors, by precept and example taught it to their children and they to theirs in succession.

A series of world-shattering convulsions grieviously affected our "way of life" with the invasion of alien ideas and "isms". Many of us forgot to keep the old landmarks of our Founding Fathers in plain view, neglected to teach the old ideals, to our children and failed to tell them of the way by which we came. Our public schools have also generally failed in this respect so that the young of today are coming to maturity without being well grounded in the principles, ideals and philosophy that has made America the greatest country in the world and are therefore lacking in strong convictions as to their value in maintaining our way of life.

If we are to keep America great, happy, prosperous, WE MUST IN-DOCTRINATE OUR CHILDREN with the ideals of liberty held by our forefathers and instill into their minds and hearts respect and admiration for their heroic deeds, their sufferings and sacrifices in establishing this Republic, and build into their lives and habits those attributes and characteristics which will make them good citizens, loyal to the concepts and philosophy which sustain our way of life. This training must start at the "grass roots", a crusade of inspirational education to create real love and admiration for home and country—a sense of nationalistic pride—PATRIOTISM, IF YOU PLEASE! This training must go through all of the grades in school and take in adults, many of whom have no real or adequate understanding of why America is great, and therefore no notion as to how to keep her so.

Our own DAR programs of, Good citizenshop, general education of the young through our approved schools, Americanism, more thorough teaching of American History, greater knowledge and understanding of the Constitution are all a step in the right direction but such meager beginning where the need is so great, the hazards of the present day so overwhelming.

With increasing frequency the American people are told that patriotism is a narrow sentiment, and that the really virtuous citizen loves other countries and the world in general as well as he does his own land. The effect of this teaching is not to increase world patriotism to any great degree, BUT IT DOES TEND TO DIMINISH love of country. And the nation in which love of country has disappeared is on the way to ruin.

Why should not the American citizen love his own country better than he loves any other country in the world. It is the land of his birth; usually the land of his fathers; it protects him in his right of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; it represents the highest ideals, the highest degree of diffused popular well-being, the most practical plan of ordered freedom the world has yet developed. Why should not every citizen of America be grateful to his country; why should he not love it, cherish it and be willing if need be to protect the institutions and laws which protect him?

It is not usually true that the spirit of internationalism is born of any real love of humanity in general. It is not that the internationalist loves his country more; only that he loves his own country less.

This nation was not founded, it was not developed, it has not been defended by internationalists. It is a CREATION of patriots, but for whom the Republic would not have been born, and but for whom it would not have endured. NEVER PERMIT an advocate of internationalism to make you ashamed of your patriotism.

Lincoln was not ashamed to be a patriot. Washington was not ashamed to fight for his country. When you are proud of your country, you stand in the company of such giants of our history and all who have made this the land of liberty freedom and opportunity.

Patriotism—nationalism—is NOT an evil thing. It has done many great things, it can do many more. There is no force in history which has served so efficiently to hold together and to utilize great masses in the pursuit of a common cause. Until there is some clearer vision of ONE WORLD than any of us has now, it is highly unlikely that we will see any greater unifying element in our day than nationalism. The critical will continue to find fault and say that its dicisive force is the great evil of our day. Nationalism IS dicisive, (thank God) if world domination is the other alternative.

Our great organization is engaged in nationalistic activity on a major scale; preservation of national tradition, respect for national symbols and shrines, encouragement of the study of national histoy; all of these are certainly nationalistic endeavors. They are certainly aimed at no other people. They threaten to enslave none, to despoil none. They are concerned purely with our own.

In a world still basically nationalistic and it has been said that "American nationalism can give to our people a renewed solidarity and to the world, new hope. By its example it can show more than by its guns and dollars. It can show that, here at least, is one people willing to be neither slave nor master; content with its own, but with nothing less." So America needs full time patriots, in order to fulfill her destiny as J. Edgar Hoover put it aptly.

STATE REGENT Miss Maude Haver

This marks the end of the first year of this administration. It has been a privilege to serve as your State Regent.

Our record for the year is not entirely as we would have it, yet much has been accomplished.

Immediately following the close of the State Conference 1956 a meeting of State Officers and District Directors was held, at which time it was decided to have an all day meeting in my home to make plans for the coming year.

I attended the 65th Continental Congress, April 16-20. At which time the new National Officers were elected and installed. One of these officers is our own, Mrs. William L. Ainsworth, Registrar General. We are very proud of the fine, constructive work she is doing in this office. Mrs. John W. Kirkpatrick, Honorary State Regent, was elected to the office of Honorary Vice president General for Life. We appreciate her many years of service.

Mrs. Frederic A. Groves, President General, appointed five members from Kansas to act as National Vice Chairman, they are: American Music, Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn; DAR Museum, Mrs. Robert H. Chesney; Junior American Citizens, Mrs. H. B. Gabbert; Press Relations, Mrs. Tillie Karns-Newman; National Defense, Mrs. Edwin F. Abels.

April 28, all State officers and District Directors met for a day of planning. A list for State Chairmen of National Committees, chairmen of state committees and Special appointees was made. A short time later letters were sent to this list of members asking them to serve as chairmen of the various committees.

At this time it was decided that the Kansas DAR News with eight pages and a CAR Supplement should be published three times a year, the first issue to come out in June. At this meeting the State Vice-regent consented to act as advisor to the District Directors, accordingly plans were made for the Fall Meetings.

June 5, I met with representatives from the Northwest District chapters for the purpose of electing a general chairman and co-chairmen and of selecting a place for the meeting of the 1958 State Conference.

September 17, I made The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage, a fine program was arranged by the Shawnee Mission Committee.

October 16 and 17, I attended the National Board of Management Meeting in Washington. This was an informative meeting, reports of which I gave at each of the four fall district meetings.

In May I began my official visits to local chapters, since that time I have visited thirty-one chapters. My itinerary will appear separately in the proceedings of this Conference. These visits have been rewarding, helpful and delightful. Memories of friendships, generous hospitality, luncheons, dinners, teas, gifts, gifts made in my honor to Kate Duncan Smith, Tamassee and St. Francis Boy's Home, will linger in my mind always. All were greatly appreciated.

The Fall State Board of Management meeting was held in Baxter Springs, October 25. At which time the Southeast District Director and hostess chapters took care of all arrangements in a fine, generous manner. Twelve State Chairmen, five chapter regents, all of the state officers and a few visitors were present for this meeting. There was a discussion as to having a more centrally located place for the 1957 Fall State Board of Management meeting in order that a larger number of members might attend. Accordingly it was voted that the meeting be held in Wichita, the date to be announced later.

The motion was also made and carried that a library committee be appointed to assist the State Librarian in selecting a suitable, permanent location for our state Library and to report its findings to the State Conference in March. It was also voted that the books in the library be appraised, and properly insured. We are, indeed, grateful to the Dodge City Library for the present satisfactory housing of our books.

November 24, I attended the Presentation Ceremony of the pylons, gifts of the Kansas Daughters to the Eisenhower Museum. Our chairman, Mrs. Robert H. Chesney ably made the presentation speech.

December 29, I attended the organization meeting of our new chapter, Flores del Sol. Grateful praise is due Mrs. William L. Ainsworth, Registrar General and members of the Wichita Chapters, for their capable assistance in preparation for this organization. We welcome this new chapter as our 64th Kansas chapter.

February 18, following the unfortunate incident in Colorado I sent a telegram to Mrs. Frederic A. Groves, President General, expressing to her the appreciation, admiration and love of the Kansas Daughters.

January 31 and February 1, I attended the National Board of Management meeting in Washington.

Because of icy roads it was impossible for me to attend the State Conference of CAR in Great Bend, February 23.

I appreciated the co-operation and consideration of our two Kansas Governors, Mr. Fred Hall and Mr. Docking in issuing Constitution Week and History Month proclamations.

I have appreciated the assistance of those Honorary State Regents who always willingly and graciously responded to my requests.

I received annual reports from sixty chapters, twenty-four of these reported no admissions by confirmation in the year which has just closed. Sixty-seven members resigned in the past year and sixty-two members were lost by death. For these losses we are truly sorry.

There was encouragement in a large number of reports from the statement that application papers for prospective members are in the process of preparation. In the coming year, that means March 1957 to March 1958, let us emphasize membership, both adult and junior. If we advance we must grow in membership. We hope that every delegate, alternate and visitor will gain new inspiration and information from this Conference and will return home with renewed interest in and enthusiasm for all activities and projects of DAR. Then the program and arrangements for this Conference shall not have been made in vain.

It has been a privilege and a pleasure to work with the State Officers, their efficiency and promptness has been most gratifying, they along with State Chairmen of National Committees, chairmen of State committees and Special Appointees have done outstanding work. You and I owe much to their tirelessness, their study and knowledge of all state and national work.

I wish to extend grateful thanks to members of the Northwest District chapters, our most capable general chairman, and co-chairmen for the splendid work which they have done in making arrangements for this Conference. Many, many miles have been traveled by them as they have met to make plans. Their generous hospitality will long be remembered.

In closing this report I wish to quote Mrs. Bruce Livingston Canaga, Chaplain General, "May I ask that we keep ever before us 'Faith of our Fathers' as a watchword and a guide in our actions. It was the faith of our fathers that founded our country. It has been the faith of our fathers that has upheld it through all its history in times of stress and trouble, and it is the faith of our fathers that will preserve this priceless heritage of freedom for the generations that will come after us".

I thank you, Kansas Daughters, for the privilege of serving as Regent of the Kansas Society DAR.

STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

Immediately following the adjournment of the State Conference, March 17, 1956 a meeting of the State Officers was attended in the Broadview Hotel in Wichita, Kansas.

One of the first duties performed was the mailing of the names and addresses of the Chapter regents to the entire official mailing list and the National Officers.

Lists of the other chapter officers were sent to the respective State Officers at an early date also.

An all day meeting of the State Officers at the home of the State Regent in Douglass, Kansas on April 28 was attended.

There was much correspondence with the chapter regents concerning the lists of chapter chairmen during the months of April and May.

The month of June was spent compiling and typing the lists of chapter chairmen of the twenty-seven committees for the State and National Chairmen. Thirty-two chapter year books were received and a personal acknowledgement was written for each.

Official notices of the State Board of Management meeting and the four District Conferences were sent out as directed by the State Regent.

The State Board of Management Meeting and the State Officers' meeting held in Baxter Springs on October 25 were attended.

Three of the District Conferences were attended; the Southeast District held in Baxter Springs on October 26, the Northeast District held in Leavenworth on October 27, and the Southwest District held in Ashland on October 30. A short report of the work of the Corresponding Secretary was given at each Conference.

About December first seventy-two form letters of instruction concerning the Credential blanks for State Conference Delegates and Alternates were sent out. On January fourth similar letters of instruction and enclosing blanks for the names and addresses of chapter officers were sent out.

The third in the series of letters enclosing blanks for the names and addresses of chapter committee chairmen went out as soon as the two previous reports were received in this office.

Registration cards for delegates and alternates to State Conference were sent to all chapters.

On January 11, 1957 official notices of the State Board of Management meeting to be held in Beloit, Kansas on March 14, and the State Conference to be held in Beloit on Mach 14, 15 and 16 were sent to the entire official mailing list and the National Officers. Personal notes were received from the National Officers.

A Directory compiled from the Credentials of the 64 Chapters was mailed to the State Regent on March 7, 1957. On March 8 a similar Directory of the names and addresses of the Chapter officers was sent to the Organizing Secretary General.

During the year 97 personal leters and 96 personal post cards were written. 135 lists of chapter regents, 52 lists of chapter committee chairmen, 205 official notices, and 222 form letters bring the total of mail sent out to 810 pieces.

It has been a most enjoyable year and the splendid co operation of all officers, committee chairmen, and members is sincerely appreciated.

As soon as the list of Chapter Registrars was mailed to me by the State Corresponding Secretary I mailed a card to each registrar introducing myself and asking for her help and cooperation. I am sorry that I cannot report a net gain in membership this year for Kansas but as you will see from my report we have had many deaths and TOO many resignations.

HISTORIAN

This year our most outstanding historical accomplishment was the observance of February as American History Month; a most commendable show, with communities all over Kansas aware of our goal. Our Governor Docking issued, by request, a fine Proclamation, as did the Mayors of several cities, when asked by DAR to do so. The Bill was reintroduced in Congress urging that February be declared American History Month, and, locally, chapters did splendid things-fine newspaper articles, editorials, flag displays, wonderful store window exhibits (including tintypes and daguerraotypes), History Awards of all kinds, contests covering every phase thru plays, scrapbooks and history note books. Historical films were shown and simply innumerable chapters celebrated Washington's Birthday with Teas! One school used the "64,000 Question" as an approach to inspire history interest; another a guest day dinner with High School Principal as speaker, and another a Colonial Tea with teachers and parents as guests when History Awards were made. Over ninety Historical Anniversaries were observed, one hundred thirty-three patriotic programs, forty-four historical tours, including adults and children and simply excellent radio and TV broadcasts.

It is the efforts of ALL chapters that make it so worthwhile—do send in your reports even if you have only one item to record!

Historians are expected to focus attention on our Archives Rooms in Washington which are described as a "Repository of Americana and Historical Documents Pertaining to the American Revolution." This department was established in 1940 and they now have a very fine collection. At present National is asking your assistance in getting the signatures of the wives of the Presidents, for a special portfolio, and for contributions to a fund to restore and preserve gifts to the Archive Room. Kansas sent \$18.00 this year, and several original letters and documents were submitted.

The National Reporter General to the Smithsonian Institution urges DAR members to copy records of burial places of their ancestors and those of Revolutionary soldiers not previously reported. Our Society was chartered by Congress to report to the Federal government our major activities; locating and recording graves of Revolutionary soldiers form the most important feature of our report because of its historical value. Surprisingly enough this year Kansas chapters located ten Revolutionary graves, two of them women. Not all will be accepted due to insufficient data, but it shows remarkable interest. May I say here that headstones will be supplied free by the government for unmarked graves of soldiers and sailors of the Revolutionary War.

A brief review of our new historical project—Our Board of Directors approved the compiling of a historical map of Kansas by chapter Historians. We want to expose our school children now to Kansas history presented in a fascinating capsule form, and to let others know the pioneer background and present day appeal of our State, and in particular to have in lasting form the famous Santa Fe Trail Markers. These markers have been so much a part of our DAR work, beginning with the grant of \$1,000 many years ago by the State for this purpose.

We visualize the map on good paper, notebook size, a gold seal of Kansas on the front, illustrated and colored to the extent we can afford, showing remarkable and historical places numbered and coded, with, we hope, well-written thumb-nail data, in a small supplement. It will take time and thought to get this map in the hands of our youngsters but you know that song "Little by little—nothing we can't do." DO MAKE THIS YOUR PROJECT—there will be committee members in each District to consult and advise with chapter historians; all we ask is, don't send in Heresay—we must have authentic material with dates and descriptive location.

This year Dodge City and Betty Washington chapters did some restoration work on Santa Fe Trail Markers, and another chapter reported the erection of a Madonna Trail Marker.

We closed the year on a sad note with a commemorative candle-light service honoring sixty-two members. Many of these were also honored by their chapters by the placing of Official DAR markers; a beautiful gesture of remembrance.

NORTHEAST DISTRICT TENTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE OCTOBER 27, 1956

The annual meeting of the Northeast District, Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, convened at the Cody Hotel in Leavenworth, Kansas, October 27, 1956, with Captain Jesse Leavenworth as the hostess chapter. Preceding the opening of the morning session the visitors were greeted with a delightful coffee.

The meeting was called to order by the District Director, Mrs. R. W. Pearson. Following the pledge of allegiance to the flag and the singing of our national anthem, the visitors were graciously welcomed on behalf of the hostess chapter, and distinguished guests were introduced. The minutes of the 1955 annual meeting were then read, and the Treasurer's report given. Both were accepted.

Reports from chapters of the Northeast District followed. All reported worthwhile accomplishments and plans for the future:

Arthur Barrett Chapter told of sending clothing to the Indian School in South Dakota, and plans to send clothing to Crossnore later.

Atchison Chapter reported revision of Constitution and By-Laws in accordance with that presented by the National Society. Three boxes of clothing were sent to Kate Duncan Smith and Crossnore Schools.

At its October meeting Betty Washington Chapter celebrated the 60th anniversary of its founding at a tea given in the home of the regent. Their program for the year was planned to follow that recommended by the National Society, and the theme "cherish and maintain American Freedom."

Captain Jesse Leavenworth reported excellent community co-operation in connection with the observance of Constitution Week, and told of plans to send gifts to the approved schools and American Indians. This chapter presented an American History medal to the best American History student of the Leavenworth Junior High School. Three Good Citizenship pins were presented to senior girls of Leavenworth, Tonganoxie, and Basehor High Schools, and medals awarded to four R.O.T.C. cadets for excellence in drilling at the annual R.O.T.C. Field Day.

A \$100 scholarship was given to Kate Duncan Smith D.A.R. School by General Edward Hand Chapter, and clothing sent to St. Mary's. The chapter told of plans to send a \$100 scholarship to Tamassee D.A.R. School, and to collect clothing for Kate Duncan Smith and other Approved Schools. Fine community co-operation was reported during Constitution Week.

James Ross Chapter was one of seven chapters of Kansas to receive the D.A.R. Honor Roll Gold Star Award. This chapter reported an increase in membership from 120 to 134 members of which 41 take the D.A.R. magazine.

John Haupt Chapter told of completion of a project by The Flag of the United States of America Committee. Large American flags were sold to friends and chapter members, the goal being to have a flag flying in front of each D.A.R. home on every appropriate day.

Samual Linscott Chapter reported a membership of 21 resident members and 15 non-resident. This chapter received Honorable Mention last year, and told of worthwhile goals for the coming year.

STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL COMMITTEES AMERICAN INDIANS

Letters stressing the need for help in the way of education for Indian young people and giving information about American Indians, Bacone College and St. Mary's High School were sent to the fifty-nine Chapter Chairmen reported and to the four Regents who did not report Chapter Chairmen. In December questionnaires were forwarded to the Chapter Chairmen.

Twenty chapters had programs on American Indians. The subjects were varied and included programs on Bacone and St. Mary's and films of these schools, a talk on the Wyandot Indians, Indian Raids in Kansas, 1878, Indian Art and Music, Films of Indians in the Southwest and their arts and crafts, History of American Indians and a display of their handicraft, and one program on the Indian opera, "Shauevis," given in costume and accompanied by music.

Twelve boxes of used clothing and jewelry, totaling 408 pounds, were sent to St. Mary's, one box of used clothing, weighing 29 pounds was sent to Bacone and one box of used clothing went to White Horse Lake Indian School. Twenty-two wrapped gifts were sent to St. Mary's in December; also Christmas cards. Used magazines were given to Kansas Indians. Wyandot Chapter endorsed Huron Cemetery as a National Shrine.

AMERICAN MUSIC

AMERICANISM AND D.A.R. MANUALS FOR

CITIZENSHIP COMMITTEE

The following report includes information from 39 Chapters of the 63 in Kansas. Questionnaires were sent to all Chapters, with many showing fine work accomplished in this field.

Work With The Foreign Born

Twelve chapters worked with the Naturalization Courts, and one helped with Americanism work. Members of five chapters taught in Night School, preparing citizens for citizenship. At the Naturalization Ceremonies five chapters presented flags, two gave Welcome Cards and three gave other gifts, such as Flag Codes and copies of the Declaration of Independence.

Teas, receptions or some other form of entertainment for the foreign born or their children, were given by six chapters. Three chapters assisted the new citizens in voting, three visited them in their homes, one chapter took them to libraries and two chapters took them to recreational centers. Eight hundred forty-seven Manuals for Citizenship were distributed by the chapters. These went to U.S. District Courts, U.S.O., Libraries, Public Schools and to individuals. Several chapters worked with G.I. Brides and foreign families newly come to this country.

Those chapters having the greatest opportunity to work with the foreign born report the following:

The Lois Warner Chapter of Junction City, supplied 78 Manuals to the U.S.O. Director for Americanism work. Classes were held for foreign born wives of American soldiers. Impressive ceremonies were held to present diplomas to those completing a 21-week course in American citizenship. This course was prepared and graded through the extension service of the University of Kansas. The chapter also gave 350 Manuals to the Clerk of the U.S. District Court. A total of 428 Manuals were distributed by this chapter. In February 60 members of a new class received citizenship papers, representing eleven counties. The U.S.O. Director and foreign born wives were guests at one of the chapter meetings.

The Eunice Sterling Chapter of Wichita participated in three Naturalization Ceremonies this past year, giving a small flag, a Flag Code and a Pledge of Allegiance card to each new citizen. Two hundred Manuals were supplied to the Clerk of the District Court, and 135 Manuals were placed in the Intermediate and High Schools in Wichita. This Chapter continues to work with and support the American-Syrian Club, organized over 35 years ago. Sixteen members of this chapter attend monthly meetings, social gatherings and church programs, working with them on programs and projects.

The Topeka chapter works with the Naturalization Courts supplying Manuals and giving each new citizen a small American Flag. Fortyeight were presented this past year.

The Shawnee, Wyandot and James Ross Chapters of Kansas City are also cooperating with the Courts, supplying Manuals, visiting and assisting the Naturalization Council with its work. Flag Codes and copies of the Declaration of Independence were given these citizens. These chapters sponsored a Christmas party for the children of the new citizens and gave a Washington Day tea for the Naturalized citizens.

Americanism

One chapter gave a program on highway safety, seven used films stressing Americanism, fourteen chapters studied Immigration and the Naturalization Laws, and nineteen chapters had programs based on some phases of Americanism.

The Mary Wade Strother Chapter of Salina, gives a donation of ten dollars to the Americanization Center in Salina for work among the Mexicans.

There were 186 inches of publicity on Americanism reported.

A total of \$31.25 was spent for prizes on Americanism. Shawnee Chapter gave 12 prizes and spent \$12.25. Samuel Linscott Chapter reports \$10.00 in prizes.

Eight chapter chairmen gave talks to either their own members or to other organizations. Those chapters with little to report showed increased interest in this work, pledging themselves to do more another year.

REPORT ON CONSERVATION

Questionnaires on Conservation were mailed to all Chapters in Kansas. Fifty to the Conservation Chairmen and the remaining to the Regents of those Chapters without a Chairman.

Twenty-nine Chapters reported, of those, seven held Conservation programs, four used a speaker and nine Chapters used films. Seven Chapters visited former local or State D.A.R. projects. One had used the TV program—"Glimpses of the D.A.R. in Conservation."

State and National Legislation have been studied by five Chapters and held discussions, many Chapters reported planting trees and shrubery in public parks and along roadsides. Some terracing of land and one pond built.

A Pamphlet on "Saving America's Wilderness" a bill, introduced in Congress last June, was mailed to several Chapters.

Our State Treasurer reports we have \$16.00 in our Conservation Fund. Conservation in Kansas is a current theme and the daily papers tell of meetings in every district on Soil and Water Conservation. It is the responsibility of the people, and we, as D.A.R.s can become informed on Conservation matters in our own community and state and in the Nation. We can encourage the teaching of Conservation in our schools that our young people may know our natural resources and how vital they are to the life of our country.

Members might take field trips to see for themselves local and state projects for soil and water Conservation, reforestation and of wildlife preservation. Members having any land lying idle might plant trees on it to good advantage. We can urge the beautifying of the highways with plantings of trees and shrubs, discourage the picking of wild flowers, and encourage the feeding of birds.

The past drouth has reemphasized the need for moisture Conservation and soil conditioning practices, such as stubble mulch farming, contour strip farming, crop rotation, pasture furrows, irrigation water management, and more terraces and waterways. Soil Conservation practices are the difference between the drouth of the present day and the dust bowl days of the 30's.

In June, 1938, the first Kansas Soil Conservation District was organized. Today all districts are organized on a county boundry basis which complete a blanket of 105 soil Conservation Districts covering the entire State.

Your county soil conservation agent will offer assistance in carrying out a conservation program. Speakers, films, tours and other program material will be supplied merely for the asking.

D.A.R. GOOD CITIZEN

To carry on the State D.A.R. Good Citizens Contest, the major project of this committee, it was necessary to secure approval from the Kansas State High School Activities Association and the department of Education.

We wish to thank our State Regent, Miss Maude Haver for the privilege of serving in this capacity and for her understanding attitude and helpful assistance at all times.

With the help of district directors and others, we enlisted the services of four capable members to serve as district chairmen: Miss Addic V. O'Reilly of Concordia, N.W.; Mrs. R. P. Pinegar of Garden City, S.W.; Mrs. Albert L. Prince of Kansas City, N.E.; and Mrs. Edith S. Caughron of Neodesha, S.E.

Letters describing the contest were mailed to the 611 four year public accredited high schools in the state, together with questionnaire.

Contestants were given examination by their high school principals. One hundred thirty-five examination papers were forwarded to the respective district chairman whose three non-D.A.R. judges selected the three best papers from their district.

The three best papers from each district (12 in all) were sent to the State D.A.R. Good Citizens chairman whose three non-D.A.R. judges—all members of the faculty, Kansas State Teachers College, Pittsburg, selected the best paper. The writer of the best paper, Miss-Loy-Brown of Hutchinson High School becomes the State D.A.R. Good Citizen for the year 1957.

Miss Brown, is a scholar, an informed and active student. She is vice-president of the Student Council, board member of the Girls' Athletic Association, belongs to the Pep Club, the Creative Writing Club and serves as co-cd counselor. Last year she was varsity debator and servetary of the Kayettes. In the summer of '56 she was Kansas represent ative to the U.S. sponsored International Junior Red Cross Study Center in Maryland. She has received the highest honor as a girl scout—the curved bar. In the summer of '56 she was chosen to attend Girls' State at Lawrence, then to Girls' Nation, Washington, D.C. As to her future plans, she is interested in political science and languages, with a long-range view of government service, preferably over seas work.

Thirty-eight Certificates of Award and 45 Good Citizens pins were distributed to chapters for presentation. The remaining Certificates of Award—97, will be sent to high school principals for presentation.

We appreciate the cooperation of Chapter Regents and D.A.R. Good Citizens chairmen. We shall look forward to greater progress in the coming year.

DAR MAGAZINE

As State DAR Magazine chairman for the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, I submit the following report to the 59th Conference.

In September of 1956, I mailed letters to the Magazine chairmen, urging them to help attain the goal, our new National chairman, Miss Gertrude McPeek, had set up for us, which was to increase the Magazine subscriptions from 30,000 to 50,000 and raise the National percentage from 18% to 20% and over, and thus be in a position to attract National Advertising accounts, which would provide a sustaining income.

In January, I sent a questionnaire to the chairman. The results are as follows. Sixty two of the sixty-three chapters have Magazine Chair men. I received reports from fifty-seven, showing 601 Magazine subscriptions in the State, which gives us 17.3%, an increase of 1.3% over last year, but below the goal of 20%, 38% of the chapter officers subscribe to the Magazine. 10 State Officers subscribe. 10 State Chairmen of National Committees subscribe. 23 State Chairman subscribe. 27 Chapters report increases. 37 Chapters used the Magazine in their program. 13 Chapters secured advertising amounting to \$72.00.

We can encourage the teaching of Conservation in our schools that our young people may know our natural resources and how vital they are to the life of our country.

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Miss Brown, is a scholar, an informed and active student. She is vice-president of the Student Council, board member of the Girls' Athletic Association, belongs to the Pep Club, the Creative Writing Club and serves as co-ed counselor. Last year she was varsity debator and secretary of the Kayettes. In the summer of '56 she was Kansas representative to the U.S. sponsored International Junior Red Cross Study Center in Maryland. She has received the highest honor as a girl scout—the curved bar. In the summer of '56 she was chosen to attend Girls' State at Lawrence, then to Girls' Nation, Washington, D.C. As to her future plans, she is interested in political science and languages, with a long-range view of government service, preferably over-seas work.

FLAG OF THE U.S.A.

Sixty-one chapters have chairmen of the Flag of the U.S.A. Committee. Forty-five sent in reports. In September the chapters received from me a letter, a list of Flag materials available, and a duplicate of the questionnaire which was sent again in January. Our special aims for the year were education of the public on how and when to display the Flag, and a continuation of the aim that all D.A.R.'s own a Flag and fly it. This was in keeping with the National Objective of "More Flags Flying, Displayed Properly."

Twelve chapters made a special study of the Flag Code; 371 codes were distributed. Other Flag literature was given by 11 chapters to members, schools, new citizens, Scouts and others. Twenty-five chapters had 116 reminders of special days for flying the Flag and other Flag items in newspapers, including 8 pictures, and one had a quiz on the complete Flag Code. Ten chapters sponsored or gave Flag programs or reminders over radio and television. Eighty-five per cent of the members own Flags and 53 per cent display them.

Sixty-four Flag talks were given—to chapters, over radio, and television, at Flag Day picnics, to Scouts, lodges and clubs, one to the National Defense Council at Wichita.

Thirty corrections were made in the incorrect display of the Flag. Eight chapters presented scrapbooks or exhibits of Flag materials to chapters, Scouts, one here at State Conference and one at National.

Forty-three large Flags were presented to Girl Scouts, a chapter, a lodge, to a Women's Community Club Room, Chamber of Commerce, to the chapel at St. Francis Boys' Home of Bavaria, one as part of a memorial in a cemetery, and to friends and other organizations; 1,024 small Flags were presented to chapters, members, friends, "Good Citizens," Gold Star Mothers, Girl Scouts, five winners in an essay contest, and 899 of these on hospital trays. Three chapters sell Flag sets.

Six chapters sponsored exhibits of Flags in store windows, an office, at the Shawnee Mission Picnic, to Girl Scouts, and at a Flag Day luncheon. Thirty-nine chapters reported a planned display of Flags by merchants on patriotic days.

Shawnee Chapter (N.E. Johnson County) had an outstanding report. Some of the members persuaded most of the merchants to buy and display Flags. They won first prize for a display of historic Flags, including a 34 star Flag, in store windows during the Shawnee Centennial. A member has sold 90 Flags to members, schools, and individuals. Over TV they encouraged children to buy "Flags instead of bullets" (fireworks). 1957 pads for large American History calendars showing a large Flag and pictures of the Presidents were given to schools, and some more complete calendars were sold. One member furnished her own Flag when she found none at the voting place.

To Shawnee Chapter a prize of \$5.00 is given for having an outstanding variety of Flag projects. Mrs. Paul Kent received the check.

To John Haupt Chapter of Topeka a prize of \$5.00 is given for having presented the most Flags—67 dozen with cupcakes for trays at the Veterans' Hospital on Flag Day. Mrs. E. L. Hazlett accepted the check.

It was a happy experience to work with Mrs. Wallace Treaster, local Flag Chairman for State Conference. During State Conference commented to assemblage of proper position in saluting the Flag. A display of Flag publications was on display near the Registration table.

Since so few of the Daughters of the American Revolution attend picture shows now that most people have T. V. sets, it is difficult to make full reports especially to intelligently vote on "The best Children's Film" of the year etc. However I feel that this committee still has an important place in the direction of youth to attend worthwhile shows. Therefore I urge Regent and/or Chapter Chairman to send for at least two subscriptions to DAR Motion Picture Review, one to be kept in the local chapter and one to be placed in Junior or Senior High School to be displayed on their bulletin board.

I suggest that each chapter contact their theater manager of the best theater and furnish him with a list of films acceptable to the DAR (as given by this Motion Picture Review) and let him advertise that fact when that film is to be shown.

According to reports received there were; 8 chapters that gave the recommended films at meetings; 4 ch. used DAR material on M. P. from our Magazine; 16 had M. P. programs; 19 theaters have special matinees for children; 8 ch.—had special Patriotic films; 12 or more subscriptions; 8 members are associated with Better Film Councils.

There can be only one flag-the Stars and Stripes or the red flag of the godless union of Soviet. There can be only one national anthem-the Star Spangled Banner or the Internationale." Awards of Merit, 11 presented. 37 chapters read the 1956 Resolutions. 28 chapters check teachers, etc. 12 chapters have committees on State Legislation and un-American Activities. 11 chapters watching their own communities. 36 chapters check voting of Legislators. 41 watch bills sponsored by their representatives. 22 No's on world government. 9 Yes on world government. Federated Clubs, League of Women Voters, W.S.C.S., A.A.U.W. 28 No's on socialism in churches. Only 5 yes. (This is tragic) The larger churches that do not have it, are the rare exception. 25 yes re: information on pending legislation in State and National. 20 yes on literature table. 7 chapters

have contributed to National Defense Fund. 23 chapters evaluating text books. 119 patriotic holidays observed. 27 chapters cooperated in community work. 28 chapters sponsored community projects.

Important works are: National Defense, Constitution Week, Work with young people, Checking text books, World Government and Subversive Activities, To Fight Communism and Socialism, Alerting our Members to National Dangers, Deportation of All Unregistered Aliens, Appreciation and Preservation of our American Heritage, Keep members informed, Good Citizenship Medals, History Project, Pertinent Information.

PROGRAM

I want first to congratulate the Chapters for the very fine cooperation in answering my questionnaire and sending me the year books. I received fifty-eight year books or supplements. One chapter has no year book. The reports and year books give one a pretty good over all picture of program activity in the state.

"Cherish and Maintain American Freedom" was used by fifty-five chapters. One chapter reported it would use this theme next year for in setting up their year's program early, they were always a year behind. Two chapters reported basing part of their program on the theme. Fifty-eight chapters reported they adhered strictly to the programs promoting DAR objectives—historical, patriotic and educational. Forty-three chapters used material from the National Program Office at National Headquaters, but as far as I know only one chapter contributed program material to the Office. I wonder if you are too modest and believe that your programs, your studies, are not worth while enough to send to the office for the benefit of others. I urge you to use material from the National Program Office. In most cases one may keep it for thirty days and the fee is nominal. The material that has to do with historical documents is especially good. However, most papers from the Office have to be adapted to the local program.

THE DAR MAGAZINE is available to all sixty-one chapters reporting. Some chapters set aside definite time to review each issue, and fifty-two used articles from the Magazine in the total program.

"The DAR Handbook", "What Daughters Do", "Highlights of Program Activity", and the Program Outlines from the National Office all furnish valuable information on program building. Many reported having these pamphlets, and I urge all chapter program chairmen to avail themselves of copies from the National Office at a small price.

Fifty-two National Officers and Chairmen and State Officers and Chairmen were used in local programs giving all, or part, of the program. This contact with National and State leaders seems to me to be very valuable to both the chapter and the officer or chairman.

The fifty-eight yearbooks that I examined are most valuable and interesting. All the printed yearbooks have the DAR insignia on the upper front. Many have the opening Ritual at the beginning of the yearbook which is almost a must. Forty-eight yearbooks have the names of

National and State Officers entirely or in part. Only three have the names of the National Chairmen and forty-two have names of the state chairmen. Several have listed State Chairmen and corresponding local chairmen in columns on the same page. It seems to me this is a logical arrangement. The local chairman and the state chairman can know the names of each other without any effort. Would it be advisable to add National Chairmen?

Practically all the yearbooks listed chapter members and many gave their D.A.R. number and name of their Revolutionary ancestor or ancestors. All books carried the chapter programs, more or less in detail. About half of the books had the Pledge of Allegiance and American's Creed. I believe these should be in all books. Twenty-one listed National Holidays. Perhaps listing these days would remind us to display our flags more faithfully. Perhaps it would be well to list in the May letter the desirable content of yearbooks, I recommend chapters allow program chairmen to wait for program suggestions before making up program.

I appreciate the opportunity of serving as program chairman, and in this next year I hope I can be of more help to you.

PARLIAMENTARIAN

It has been a privilege to serve as your parliamentarian and I am grateful to the State Regent for this opportunity. I appreciate deeply the interest shown in parliamentary law and the work accomplished by our Kansas Chapters.

Early in September I conferred with the Parliamentarian's Department at our National Headquarters in Washington and secured information for our chapters. From our National Parliamentarian, Sarah Corbin Robert, I received information relative to points of procedure and information concerning correct Chapter By-laws. I also secured information and material relative to the correct revision of State By-laws. I have conferred with our State By-laws Committee and sent information to Mrs. Roscoe W. Graves, Chairman.

It was a pleasure to attend the State Board of Management meeting in Baxter Springs on October 25th, and the Southeast District Conference on October 26th. I also attended the Northeast District Meeting on October 27th in Leavenworth.

I have corresponded with chapters regarding parliamentary questions and have helped in the revision of a number of chapter by laws so that they will conform to the revised By laws of the National Society. I have sent copies of the "Suggested Model for Chapter By-laws" to a number of chapters and information pertinent to parliamentary procedure.

To quote Sarah Corbin Robert, July, 1955, "The immediate parliamentary work in every chapter is to complete the revision of its By-laws to conform to the newly revised By-laws of the National Society." This

is very important. Unless previously approved by the National Society, chapters whose revision of By laws is not complete should complete the revision this year. They will be reviewed and approved.

May I call to the attention of all Kansas Daughters, the many fine articles from our National Parliamentarian appearing in our Magazine. Attached hereto, is the Index of the items in the two rooms sponsored by the State Society as a Muscum at the Old Shawnee Mission in Johnson County.

Concerning the pictures of the past state regents, the Curator of the Mission buildings, through the Kansas Historical Society, caused these pictures to be removed from the walls. His reason being that they were not in keeping with the intent and purpose of the museum. At present they are in the lower cupboard of the east room. The committee, after due consideration, felt that it would be almost impossible to get an album into which these could be mounted suitably. We welcome any suggestion or idea the Board would care to make as to the future handling of these several pictures.

We removed the quilts and the spreads from the chest, placing two pieces in the Stanley Memorial Case which stands on the south wall of the hall adjacent to the D.A.R. rooms. We draped the other quilt and spread on the cradle in the East room.

The drapes, according to the Curator, are not suitable for the period

depicted and are "Taboo" from his viewpoint. They are in the lower cupboards in the west room.

The committee plans to return to the Museum to clean the shelves, wash the china and clean other items. The committee felt that some lovely plates could be shown if it procured metal stands for them.

Some of the items listed are strictly loans, but the greater part of the listing is a gift or gifts by the several donors.

We believe there has not been an inventory made since 1950. Mr. Hardy was most specific that all items were in the two rooms and cupboards and the Case in the Hall. The Committee felt that the Stanley case could more appropriately be placed against the north wall of the hall, rather than the south wall.

There are also 10 utility chairs, which are reproductions of the three rush bottom chairs. Mr. Hardy stated that they are in other rooms of the building but that they are in the building.

ST. FRANCIS BOYS' HOMES

Work at St. Francis Boys' Homes goes steadily onward. When first this project was adopted by the Kansas Society, upon suggestion by J. Edgar Hoover that the members of D.A.R. interest themselves in Juvenile Delinquency, it was comprised of a single unit at Ellsworth. The Bavaria unit has since been added, with consistent growth of plants and accomplishments. A Chapel and Study Hall, with some teacher's quarters and a personnel house have been built at Bavaria. Presently plans are going forward for an athletic building, O'Donnell Hall, at Ellsworth. Ellsworth Home has been operated on a one inch water line supply heretofore. It was voted at the 59th State Conference to assign our gifts for St. Francis Boys' Homes to the installation of a four inch line. All gifts from chapters and individual members are on a voluntary basis.

This year's results have been gratifying and from the total gifts we can pay for 171 feet of water main, at an estimated cost of \$3.00 per foot. This building will enable the boys at Ellsworth to exchange athletic events. It will serve as a recreation center for the boys of the Home and furnish additional quarters for personnel. The boys live in the large dormitory type home, oiginally procured for this unit. For the next two years our funds will go for help in this water line. The interest of Kansas Daughters and their generosity make your chairman confident that we will all be proud of the results at the end of this administration.

One letter has been sent to all chapter chairmen. The June D.A.R. State News will carry special information. Your chairman has material for chapter programs. Know this Kansas project and you will want to support it! "Cast your bread upon the waters and it shall return unto you."

From the sale of Eisenhower notes, watermelon pickles, and Christmas mints, we have been able to make cash donations to the following schools and projects: Kate Duncan Smith, Tamassee, St Francis Boy's Home, St. Mary's High School, Library Fund, D.A.R. Museum, Advertising in National Magazine, and State Genealogical Records.

The D.A.R. Magazine is placed in the city and high school libraries.

BY-LAWS

of the

KANSAS STATE SOCIETY

of the

NATIONAL SOCIETY OF DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised and Adopted at the State Conference March 11, 1950 Amended at Conferences 1954, 1956

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this society shall be the Kansas State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II

Object

Section 1. This Society pledges fidelity and loyalty to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the objects of which are:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquistion and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionaly soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary and enlightening public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.
- Sec. 2. Its purpose shall be to further the above plans of the National Society and to maintain harmonious cooperation among the chapters in Kansas and to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section 1. The membership of this State Society shall include all Daughters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who are members in good standing of some Chapter in Kansas.

Good Standing shall be interpreted to mean that all National and State dues have been paid.

Sec. 2. Chapters failing to pay State dues shall not be entitled to representation at State Conference, to receive State Communications or participate in any State affairs until dues are paid to the State Society.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Chaplain, State Recording Secretary, State Treasurer, State Registrar, State Historian, State Librarian, State Reporter, and State Corresponding Secretary.

Sec. 2. No member shall be eligible for election to any state office or appointment to any state chairmanship who has not been a member in good standing of the Kansas State Society for one year. No member shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms, and no member who has served one term in any state office, shall be eligible to election to any other state office, except that of State Regent and State Vice Regent, until the expiration of one year.

A member having served more than one-half term in any office shall be deemed to have served a term. A candidate for State Regent or State Vice Regent must have served as an elected Chapter Regent. A candidate for any State office must have served as an elected chapter officer.

Sec. 3. Election of officers shall take place on the last day of the annual State Conference occurring in the year of the election of National officers.

Election shall be by ballot, for a term of three years.

A majority of votes cast shall elect.

The terms of office of the State Regent and State Vice Regent begin at the close of the Continental Congress which confirms their election.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected and confirmed (beginning with the year of 1950).

(Provided that, at the next regular election, to be held in 1948, the officers shall be elected for a two year term.)

Sec. 4. The nominating committee shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the October State Board of Management meeting.

This elected member shall serve as chairman of the nominating committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to submit names of candidates for the state offices on the second day of the annual State Conference of election year. Nominations other than those made by the nominating committee may also be made from the floor. All candidates must have given their consent before nomination.

The nominating committee shall, immediately after November first, notify all Chapters of impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted.

Candidates shall be selected from all districts of the state.

No person shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at State Conference.

Sec. 5. When the several candidates for State Regent are nominated, each in turn shall nominate her State Corresponding Secretary. The ballot cast for a State Regent shall serve, automatically, as a ballot for her State Corresponding Secretary. Thus each is an elected officer. In no other instance may two officers be elected from the same chapter.

Sec. 6. In recognition of valuable serivce to the State Society the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by acclamation at a State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. STATE REGENT: The State Regent, in addition to performing the duties which pertain to her office, according to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society, shall preside at all meetings of this Society, of the Executive Committee of the State Board of Management and to the Kansas Delegation to the Continental Congress. She shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for, sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer for moneys appropriated by the Society, and may call meetings of the Executive Committee or Board of Management whenever she may consider it important and necessary. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter General Chairman, prepare the program for the Annual State Conference. She shall present at the Annual State Conference all amendments proposed to the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society and such other matters as she may deem worthy of consideration. She shall be a member of the printing committee. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees, excepting a nominating committee.

She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer, to have recorded in the State Treasurer's books, all membership reports received from the National Society, following each meeting of the National Board. The State Treasurer will duly record the same.

Upon her confirmation, the incoming State Regent may appoint a State Parliamentarian, and Consulting Genealogist.

- Sec. 2. STATE VICE REGENT: The State Vice Regent, in the absence or disability of the Regent, shall perform the duties pertaining to the office of Regent. She shall be a member of the printing and stationery committee and a member of the Executive Committee.
- Sec. 3. STATE CHAPLAIN: The State Chaplain shall officiate in the offering prayer and other religious services when requested by the Regent. She shall be the Chairman of the Memorial Committee.
- Sec. 4. STATE RECORDING SECRETARY: The State Recording Secretary shall keep a correct record of all meetings of the State Conference, the State Executive Committee and the Board of Management. She shall be chairman of the Printing and Stationery Committee; countersign all orders drawn on the Treasurer and signed by the Regent. She shall prepare the proceedings for the Annual State Conference for publication, subject to the approval of the State Regent, and perform such other duties as pertain to her office.

- Sec. 5. STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: The State Corresponding Secretary, under the direction and supervision of the Regent, shall notify all state Officers and the Regent of each chapter in good standing of the time of the Annual Conference not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall give notice of meetings of the Executive Committee and Board of Management as directed by the State Regent. She shall be the chairman of the committee on Credentials. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, immediately after the close of Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the various chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each state chairman two type written copies of the list of names and addresses of her respective chapter chairmen (one of which is to be sent to her National Chairman and the second one for her own use). She shall compile these lists into a directory for the ensuing administration.
- Sec. 6. STATE TREASURER: The State Treasurer shall collect all moneys and disburse the same only upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. All moneys received by the Treasurer shall be deposited in some reliable bank in her name as State Treasurer, and all payments made by her shall be by cheek. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same to a Certified Public Accountant before the Annual State Conference. She shall be custodian of all bonds and policies belonging to the Society. She shall be bonded by the State Society for the sum of \$2,500.00 for the faithful discharge of the duties above defined. She shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan Notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall be a member of the Executive and Credentials Committee.
- Sec. 7. STATE REGISTRAR: The State Registrar shall keep a card file as established; assist in proving eligibility claims; prepare the Kan sas Directory, Daughters of the American Revolution, when ordered by the Society; check her membership file against the records of the State Treasurer immediately after July first. She shall keep a file of all reports received from the National Society and these are to be delivered with the State Card file, and all other material dealing with the work of the office, to her successor. She shall be a member of the Executive Committee.
- Sec. 8. STATE HISTORIAN: The State Historian shall take charge of all the historical papers received by the Society and shall catalogue and arrange the same, placing in a locker at the State Historical Society at Topoka, such historical documents, and all materials for preservation. She shall be a member of the Memorial Committee. She shall prepare the Smithsonian Report.
- Sec. 9. STATE LIBRARIAN: The State Librarian shall have supervision of the State D.A.R. Library. She shall prepare a report listing

all material sent to the National Library and all books, records, and other material received for the State Library, during the year, for publication in the State Conference Proceedings. On retiring from the office, the State Librarian shall send to the newly elected Librarian and to the State Regent a complete list of all material on file in the State D.A.R. Library, and given over to the newly elected State Librarian.

Sec. 10. STATE REPORTER: The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the State Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be State Chairman of the Publicity Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files (or Scrap Book) and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D.C.

Sec. 11. All officers and Committee Chairmen upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, all moneys, accounts, record books, papers or other property belonging to the Society.

ARTICLE VI

Meetings

Section 1. The supreme governing body of this society shall be a Conference. An annual meeting of the Kansas State Conference shall be held in March unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or by the State Board of Management. The purpose of this conference shall be to receive reports of the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen; for the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.

Sec. 2. Each State Chairman shall compile a typed report of not more than three hundred words covering the work accomplished by her committee for the year ending February twenty eighth. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary by March first, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Each Chapter Regent shall send a report of the work and plans of her Chapter, for the year ending February twenty-eighth, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary immediately after March first. This report shall be typed, and limited to two hundred fifty words, and shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

Sec. 3. The Kansas State Society shall be divided into four districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively.

At each District meeting the State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board of Management meeting.

A Director, Scerctary and Treasurer shall be elected at an annual district meeting to be held in the fall. The term of office shall be one year and no District Officer shall serve more than three consecutive terms. Each district shall entertain the State Conference in rotation; the time and place to be determined by the hostess district and the State Regent. The Southwest District shall entertain the State Conference in 1948.

- Sec. 4. The voting members of the Annual State Conference shall be the State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, and Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the first Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates, regularly elected by Chapters as hereinafter specified, provided they have been members of their Chapter for one year and arc in good standing.
- Sec. 5. Twenty-five voting members shall constitute a quorum at the meeting of the Annual State Conference.
- Sec. 6. Chapters of less than fifty members shall be entitled to representation at the Annual State Conference by the regent and two delegates. Chapters having membership of fifty to one hundred shall be represented by their Regent and five delegates. After the first hundred, representation shall be in the ratio of three delegates for every sub sequent one hundred. Alternates shall be elected for each Chapter Regent and delegate.

- Scc. 7. Delegates and alternates shall be elected at the January meeting of their Chapter in each year, and certificates of their election signed by the Regent and Treasurer of their Chapter, shall be sent to the State Corresponding Secretary for the Committee on Credentials by February first. Vacancies that occur in the delegation may be filled by the Regent from alternates duly elected for that purpose at the January meeting.
- Scc. 8. Daughters attending State Conference shall pay a registration fee of One Dollar.
- Sec. 9. "The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Picnic shall be held on Constitution Day, September 17, with the Local Chapters as hostess. Those attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty five cents."

ARTICLE VII

Board of Management

- Section 1. The State Officers, Officers of the National Society whose memberships are within the State, District Directors and Chapter Regents shall constitute a State Board of Management.
- Sec. 2. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over affairs of the State Society to do and transact business during the interim between the meetings of the State Society. The State Board shall meet at the call of the State Regent at least twice a year. One meeting to be held immediately preceding the first fall District meeting and one to be held immediately preceding the opening session of the State Conference.

Other meetings may be held upon the call of the State Regent or upon written request of seven members of the Board of Management. It shall recommend to the Annual State Conference such patriotic and historic work as seems desirable to be undertaken by the Society. Eleven members shall constitute a quorum.

Sec. 3. The State Board of Management shall have power to fill vacancies in office until the next election; the election to fill such vacancies shall be by ballot, notice of the vacancy having been given in the call for the meeting of the State Board.

Sec. 4. All Officers, the Board of Management and Committees shall make reports of their work for the year, at the Annual State Conference.

ARTICLE VIII

Executive Committee

Section 1. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, State Recording Secretary, State Registrar and State Treasurer, shall constitute the Execuive Committee.

Sec. 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three members.

Sec. 3. The Executive Committee shall make a report at each meeting of the Board of Management.

ARTICLE IX

Committees

Section 1. The Regent shall appoint a Student Loan Committee consisting of three members who shall supervise the Kansas D.A.R. Student Loan Fund.

The Regent shall appoint a Conference Committee which shall consist of the Reporter and two other members.

There shall be a Printing and Stationery Committee which shall consist of the Recording Secretary, Vice Regent and Regent.

The Committee on Credentials shall consist of the State Corresponding Secretary, State Treasurer, and one other member.

ARTICLE X

State Funds

Section 1. Each Chapter, belonging to the State Society shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before January first of each year the sum of \$1.35 for each member in goodstanding on the Chapter rolls on that date.

Chapter Treasurers shall furnish, with each remittance of dues, a list of members for whom she is paying.

Chapters failing to pay above per capita dues shall be delinquent February first and not entitled to representation at State Conference.

Representation of Chapters at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon number of dues in the hands of the State Treasurer by February first.

The Treasurer shall notify chapters of their standing on February first.

Sec. 2. Life members shall be counted in the basis for representation. Chapters shall count all Life Members in their Representation and State dues should be paid for full representation.

- Sec. 3. Stationery and postage, and in cases of emergency, telephone and telegraph charges, which charges shall be validated by the Executive Committee, shall be furnished to the State Officers and State Committees.
- Sec. 4. A sum not to exceed \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent for the expense of carrying on her work.
- Sec. 5. To defray partially her expense to the State Conference, each State Officers shall be allowed the sum of \$25.00, provided, however, that no expense will be allowed an officer when the conference is in her own home city.
 - Sec. 6. No provision is made for expenses of Honorary State Officers.
- Sec. 7. In addition to the obligations specified in these By-laws, no debts or liabilities shall be incurred except by vote of the Conference.
- Sec. 8. A sum equal to ten cents per member shall be taken from the State Fund and placed in an Annual State Conference Expense Account.
- Sec. 9. A sum equal to five cents a member shall be taken from the State Funds annually and placed in the treasury of the Kansas C.A.R. The amount accumulated to be used for C.A.R. projects.

ARTICLE XI

Chapters

Section 1. It is recommended that election of Chapter officers, for a term of three years, take place in January, occuring in the same year as the election of state officers. Chapter officers shall be installed and take office in May, following the confirmation of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent at Continental Congress.

On or before February first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks to be furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter Officers for the ensuing year.

The Regent-elect of each chapter shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on or before April first, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of all newly appointed chapter chairmen.

ARTICLE XII

Parliamentary Authority

Section 1. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order revised, shall govern this Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XIII

Amendments

- Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendments has been sent to the State Regent and each Chapter at least sixty days before the Annual State Conference.
- Sec. 2. Amendments to these By-Laws shall take effect at the close of the Annual State Conference at which they are adopted.

STANDING RULES

ARTICLE I

Section 1. The State Recording Secretary with the State Regent shall see that arrangements are made for the publishing of Proceedings of the State Conference which are contained in the files of the State Recording Secretary, the expense of such report to be born by the State Society.

The State Recording Secretary shall send a copy of the printed Proceedings to all State Officers, Chapter Regents, State Chairmen, District Directors, and to such other persons and libraries as shall be designated by the State Regent.

When an election has occurred, it shall be the duty of the retiring State Recording Secretary and retiring State Regent to compile these proceedings and arrange for their publication.

- Sec. 2. State Board of Management meetings may be attended by State Chairmen, Chapter Regents, representatives and other interested members, on invitation of the State Regent, except when the Board is in Executive session.
- Sec. 3. No less than three Regent's Bulletins shall be printed each year, expense to be borne by the State Society.

ARTICLE II

- Section 1. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.
- Sec. 2. \$50.00 shall be allotted the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.
- Sec. 3. A sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Picnic.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of voting members present.
