


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
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THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG

OBJECTS OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, acquisition and the protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual service of the Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people: "To promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American Citizenship.

(3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for all the blessings of liberty.

INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, Page 62.

State Regent Mrs. Chester Davis presented Mrs. John A. Pomeroy, American Indians Chairman, who presided throughout the program.

Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn presented to our President General, Mrs. Frederic A. Groves, two money corsages for the Allene Wilson Groves cottage for little girls, the \$5.00 honoring our State Regent, and the \$3.00 in memory of Mrs. Pearl Stephenson, a member of Sterling chapter who had died within the month.

Panel Discussion "Securing and Keeping DAR Members" was moderated by Mrs. J. Randolph Kennedy, Registrar General—and others assisting were:

Mrs. Frank Blaser, Membership; Mrs. O. M. Stansbury, Junior Membership, Mrs. G. D. Weilepp, Registrar; Mrs. V. L. Durr, Librarian; Miss Edna Wheatley, Program; Mrs. Jess Harper of Sitka; Mrs. R. H. Chesney, Historian; and Mrs. Len Smith, Regent of Illinois; Miss Lucina Jones, Consulting Genealogist.

Mrs. Kennedy commented: At the January 31st meeting of the National Board, I was able to report 1650 original applications and 60 supplementals verified, among which were 203 new records on ancestors not accepted previously.

Permits were issued to Caldwell, our official jeweler, for 306 official insignia, 374 miniature insignia, and 318 ancestral bars.

A lovely and practical and much needed gift has come to the office of the Registrar General in the form of a large mahogany card file costing \$500.00. The marker for this gift will read:

In Memory of Edith Chesney
1874-1958
Susannah French Putney Chapter
El Dorado, Kansas No. 79859
Presented by Beulah and Robert Chesney

We also have 12 mahogany library tables for our genealogists to use beside their desks, for holding the large bound volumes of application papers used when checking against accepted records. At a cost of \$51.00 each, plus the marker, seven of these tables have been marked as Memorials or Honorariums.

"It is my pleasure to present a panel entitled "Securing and Keeping DAR members" and we hope you will find much helpful information, suggestions and ideas. (Panel members were introduced). In addition to officers and committee chairmen we will have comments from several others whose efforts and interests are of importance to membership.

As Registrar General of our National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution it will be my pleasure and privilege to make helpful suggestions regarding applications.

Perhaps it is well to open this discussion with the State Chairman of membership, Mrs. Frank Blaser, and have her inform us as to the exact steps she has taken during her chairmanship to pro-

mote an increase in membership. I am proud and delighted that Kansas does have an increased membership. From her experience, Mrs. Blaser can probably make some recommendations for improving the working plan of her committee, which will be helpful to her successor and to chapter chairmen.

Mrs. Blaser felt the actual work of obtaining new members rested with the Chapter. We have a high qualification—but we must maintain our numbers. There are still many, many people just waiting to be invited to become members. The Chapters themselves and their own members must be the contacts, if we continue in the way we have started—with an increase in our members. Only 10 chapters in the state did not have an increase last year. Let's hope every chapter next year will report an increase of several. I believe the Honor Roll program has helped in this.

Mrs. Kennedy introduced Junior Membership, Mrs. O. M. Stansbury, State Chairman. Mrs. Stansbury, "What suggestions do you have for your successor and for the Chapter Chairmen to increase our Junior members."

Mrs. Stansbury: "We have the cooperation of the CAR in admission to the DAR of members reaching the age of 18-21 when their applications may be made to DAR. It is necessary for the CAR transfer card accompanied by the DAR application to be presented before the CAR member reaches her 22nd Birthday.

Then, let's use the Junior member after she becomes a member of the chapter. She has earnestness, enthusiasm and devotion, and we need them. I might suggest there be a card file on Junior members in the state, giving their birthdays—so they can be contacted and immediately become loyal members of the DAR group.

Mrs. Kennedy presented the new membership blank which has been available since the first of the year, prepared through cooperation with Mrs. John W. Finger, Senior National President of the CAR—and your Registrar General. Because many chapters order a supply of application blanks ahead, many of you are not familiar with this blank to be filled in by an applicant at the time she is preparing her application. It is a blank with perforations to be separated into four smaller blanks, two of which give names and addresses of relatives eligible to DAR on the same ancestral line as the applicant, and two of which give names and addresses of relatives eligible to CAR on the same ancestral line. These blanks filled in, should accompany the completed application.

When the application reaches the office of the Registrar General, the sections of this blank are separated. The names of these eligible for CAR are sent directly to the CAR office. The names of those eligible for DAR are sent to the State Regents of the States. These names are not recommended, but are merely persons who are eligible—many of whom may not be aware of their eligibility.

Any applicant through a chapter must be endorsed by two members of the chapter in good standing who are personally well ac-

quainted with her. The name of each applicant must be properly presented to the Chapter in accord with the Chapter by-laws and voted upon.

Let me remind you as Daughters of the American Revolution, that this process is very important. Whereas our bylaws place no restriction as to Race, Color, Creed, or Politics upon membership, we are very insistent upon correct blood lineage with proof for each generation. Our bylaws Article III Section I specify requirements for eligibility and add "Provided the applicant is personally acceptable to the Society."

Another important point regarding membership is that a member is first, a member of the National Society. Until accepted by the National Society, no one can be a member of a chapter. At this point is a recommendation that may save a chapter some embarrasment. It is not wise for a chapter to list in its year book the names of applicants whose papers are pending. Some applications are never accepted—they can't find proper proof, and some take two years or longer to secure the necessary data and proof.

Membership records are very important and it is necessary that these records be accurate and current.

Mrs. G. D. Weilepp, State Registrar will give us some details of the work of her office and advise us of the data required for her files.

Mrs. Weilepp reported the data required for the files of Registrar. It is just as important that we keep our members as it is to receive them into membership. 39 Chapters reported resignations and a questionairre was sent them as to the reasons—and 35 chapters answered. There were many reasons—some of them very good,—most prevalent was health, age, finances, opposition to the national resolutions, illness in the family, conflicting interests, more time with the family, etc. 42 of those resignations were non-resident members, and there is one of the answers to our question—and to our problem. They need to be near and attend chapter meetings to keep up their contacts and interests.

Mrs. Kennedy: "It is my sincere desire that at some time in the future, some one of our state Officers or Appointees may give the time to setting up in Kansas such a program as is now carried on in Illinois. It was developed there by the State Registrar, Evelyn Cole Peters, who has written several very enlightening articles for our DAR Magazine. If I may take advantage of one our guests, Mrs. Len Young Smith, State Regent of Illinois, I would like to have her tell us just a little of this program.

A similar program could be developed by the State Consulting Genealogist, the State Registrar, the State Librarian, or the State Chairman of Membership—in fact, by any one who has the time and enthusiasm for setting it in motion. Perhaps it could be started

in the Districts for I know there are many members in each district who are deeply interested in genealogy.

Mrs. Len Young Smith said their State Registrar Mrs. Peters of Illinois set up a Researcher in each county in Illinois, at least one member in each county has volunteered to assist any applicant to an Illinois chapter by such research as she is able to do in the local court house, or the Library, and local cemeteries. Then, when a DAR applicant needs information in a certain county—that Researcher is contacted. I can recommend this system highly to you people. You will get a great many inquiries from out of the state "can some one give me information from a certain place," and we do, if it is for a DAR member, or a person making her DAR application. The program in Illinois has been the outstanding program over the United States.

Mrs. Kennedy: Our State Librarian, Mrs. Victor L. Durr may be helpful in advising Registrars and/or applicants of books in our DAR State Library, available that deal with certain areas or states. Mrs. Durr, do you have any recommendations as to how our State Librarian may be of greater assistance to the State Chairman of Membership, the Registrar, or to applicants tracing their lineage? And would it be helpful to review in each issue of the Kansas DAR News, one of our State Library Books? or would a letter to Chapter Regents, or Registrars advising them of valuable helps in our State Library be worth while?

Mrs. Durr: The State Library has some very valuable, and informative books, and these are available on loan to any DAR member in Kansas. She may borrow as many as three books at a time. The Librarian of every chapter has a list of the books in the Library—and this has been kept current, by listing in the Proceedings each year, any books that have been added. And we do get additional new books each year.

If any member will write of the area in which she is interested, the Committee will be glad to make suggestions to her, if she desires. All it costs is the postage of mailing. Right now our funds are pretty low—but we hope each Chapter will include the Library in its budget next year, so we'll have a little more to work with.

It might be a good idea to have a review in the DAR News of a new book in the Library, or of some we already have—of interest.

Mrs. Kennedy said the Lawson YMCA, 30 West Chicago Avenue (corner of Dearborn St.) Chicago, 10, Illinois, is now conducting classes in Geneaology, And, there will again be a course in Genealogical Research at our National Archives in Washington in June this year.

Mrs. Kennedy: Members of the six DAR chapters in Wichita have been doing a magnificent job at the Wichita Library. Mrs. Robert Chesney can tell us about this project so that we can take advantage of it in our membership program.

Mrs. Chesney, State Historian. The six Wichita Chapters raised about \$1700.00 to purchase outstanding books of genealogy. We started buying books—but we soon learned the genealogy records at the Wichita Public Library needed checking, and cataloging—so we'd know what was there and have now completed making a card catalog of the Genealogy books in the Wichita Public Library. We will continue to purchase books for the Library. They do have a fine library, but there are so many yet needed. We have had wonderful help and cooperation from the Library. Our members feel this is one of the finest undertakings we have achieved recently. Many of the members, and chapters—instead of sending flowers—are giving a book for a memorial of the deceased friend and member.

Mrs. Kennedy: I would like to have Mrs. Jess Harper of Sitka—Southwest District—tell us of the Southwest Kansas Genealogical Society.

Mrs. Harper: At first we started out with just a few interested members—we charge \$3.00 dues. Then others wanted to join, so we were glad to have them—and we now have more than 30 members, and adding others all the time. We were just making records and listing our own family genealogies—and then we had inquiry for other information, so we're happy to extend our interests also. We believe such a group could be organized, and work in every section of the state—maybe by counties—or several counties in a group. You will find it interesting, not only in the information but in getting better acquainted and in working together.

Mrs. Kennedy: We have given you some of the sources of information for helping a prospective member. Miss Edna Wheatley, State Chairman of Program can advise us of the importance of the program committee in holding our members.

Miss Wheatley: In our programs we emphasize the historic, educational and patriotic theme, and subjects. There is such a quantity of material on any of the subjects, and it is easily secured. Just be sure to give the person ample time in preparing her subject. And we can get many fine papers and material from the national society. The year books of the Chapters in outlining their programs shows an awareness—and they have most interesting program topics.

Mrs. Kennedy: I am very sorry Miss Irma Nixon, State Chairman of the Transportation Committee could not be with us. It is possible for the Transportation Committee to make an important contribution to holding members, by seeing that members have transportation to and from Chapter meetings, District meetings and State Conferences.

Mrs. Kennedy: I would like to ask our Consulting Genealogist, Miss Lucina Jones—"It it necessary to use the same ancestor for your childrens papers that you need for yourself?"

Miss Lucina Jones: No, it is not. We are always wanting new lines—but, they can if they desire. If some one is going in on a member who was accepted 20 years ago they will find additional information is needed. Many errors were made on some of those older applications, but more information is now available, and greater care is used—and additional information is requested. And, if you send a new application on an old ancestor, if the proof is not in Washington it is necessary to send the proof and have that proof certified. They will not make any changes now unless you have the proof to accompany your statement. This information is all available, but some times we must search it out.

Mrs. Kennedy: Now, as names and addresses of newly elected Chapter Registrars come to the office of the Registrar General, copies of "Information for Chapter Registrars" and "Requirements for and Preparation of Application Papers" will be mailed to them.

I wish it could be possible to send copies of the Handbook and our verification manual, "Is That Lineage Right?" Both can be ordered through the Corresponding Secretary General—all checks being made out to the Treasurer General. The Handbook is 35c. "Is That Lineage Right?" is 50c.

I wish each member would subscribe to our DAR Magazine. It has so much information besides so many historic articles, and reports of Committee activities, the Board of Management, etc. I have been a subscriber since I became a member.

I would like to speak about transfers. TRANSFERS are not completed until the Treasurer General is notified by the new chapter that a transferring member has been accepted. Transfers in December often create consternation in the office of the Treasurer General and embarrassment to the old chapter, not in any way responsible, with possible loss of Honor Roll status.

I would suggest that if a request for transfer is made to a chapter in December, dues be collected before granting this transfer card. The bylaws Article VIII Section 13 state that a member in good standing desiring to be transferred from one chapter to another, shall at once be entitled to a transfer card. In case of failure of chapter officers to comply with this provision within one month from date of request by the member, the Treasurer General shall be empowered to record the transfer so requested by the member and the chapter to which she is transferring. By the end of a month, if the request were made in December, the deadline for dues—January 1st has passed; the member's dues are delinquent and she is not eligible for a transfer until her dues are paid.

Perhaps the member is at fault in presuming that she can transfer at will to any chapter of her choice. A member accepted by transfer must be voted into a chapter just as a new member of that chapter. Until notice is sent to the Treasurer General of ac-

ceptance of a member by transfer, that member remains a member of her original chapter on the books of the Treasurer General, even though she has received a transfer card and a copy of her application paper to give to her new chapter. Chapters should watch this procedure with care as the first of the year draws near lest they be charged with delinquent members.

We hope that some benefits may come from this panel discussion. Membership is the responsibility of each member. Interest, enthusiasm and inspiration may be derived from chapter officers and chapter chairmen, but a growing chapter has members who are aware to the possibilities of eligibility among their friends. If a member enjoys the members of her chapter and is interested in the historical, patriotic and educational program of our national society, then, she will make every effort to interest others in the good work that we accomplish. Thanks to all the participants in this discussion.

Mrs. Davis expressed appreciation to all those who brought such an interesting and informative discussion.

Mrs. David F. Eads of Columbia Missouri, brought greetings from a former Kansan—who is now a loyal Missouri daughter—Mrs. Mary Hartley. She has attended 20 Kansas State conferences, and almost that many Continental Congresses. She wants to be remembered to all of you.

Mrs. Davis announced for Mrs. Walter J. Keeler of Lawrence, that there would be a short meeting of all the chapters near the Kaw river who are interested in a "Grinter Memorial Plaque" for the old Grinter House, at the Ferry crossing.

Meeting was recessed, for the luncheon, in the Masonic Temple.

American Defense Luncheon, at 12:15

Decorations were of Kansas maps, small plastic red-white and blue bells, and cut out construction paper bells. Kansas flag postal cards. KIDC postal cards.

State Regent Mrs. Maude Davis presented Mrs. Edwin F. Abels, State Chairman of National Defense. and National Vice President General, who presided for the program.

Mrs. Abels said that our two luncheon speakers were candidates for President General. Each has given distinguished service in her state and in the National Society.

Mrs. Ralph W. Newland, of St. Joseph, Michigan, is now completing her term as Curator General. Her topic was "Our Greatest Weapon Is No Secret." She gave us a running report of the struggle for supremacy—and concluded by saying "We must stand for what we believe is right—without compromise, and have courage to speak out. We must have a strong country and take a determined stand for it. Let each person teach one—that is the only way we are going to build up and get back those dearly beloved freedoms

and securities. We must be national defenders and we are our countries greatest weapon."

Mrs. Ashmead White of Bangor, Maine, at present is Chairman of the Continental Congress Program Committee spoke. The title of her talk was "Meeting the Challenge." "We are responsible for better citizenship in every avenue of life. Our folks who will man the world of tomorrow, they must learn better citizenship. Citizenship is a progressive education which starts in the home and works its way towards national responsibilities. Factual American history should be a requirement in our schools through the lower grades up through College and university. We obtain nothing without hard work—and success is attained only by that hard work. We must all get to work."

Mrs. Thomas E. Stribling, Honorary Regent of Georgia, and a past Vice President General from that state told of their experience in Georgia about world Government. Eight years ago, when this program in Georgia was successfully consumated she was honored by the President of the United States as National Defense Woman of the nation.

State Regent Mrs. Chester Davis introduced our state DAR Good Citizen Chairman, Miss Belle Provorse who presented Miss Althea Nelson of Ellis, Kas., our Good Citizen for this year, and awarded her the Scholarship from the National Society, and presented her with the Good Citizen pin. Althea responded with appropriate remarks, and thanks to the Society.

Mrs. Robert Nelson, Althea's mother was introduced.

President General, Mrs. Frederic A. Groves greeted Althea Nelson, and wished her well.

Edna Wheatley stated the Good Citizen of the Betty Bonney Chapter, Joanna Smith is serving the Conference as one of our pages.

The National officers and Honored Guests at the head table were presented by State Regent Mrs. Maude Haver Davis.

Martha K. Friedel—one of the pages—received recognition, and thanked the southeast district for the lovely little coffee spoons with the DAR emblem on them—presented to all the pages.

Meeting recessed, for the formal afternoon session of the conference.

AFTERNOON SESSION February 17

2:30 p.m. The afternoon session of the 61st Annual State Conference was called to order—with the delegates seated in one section, to the right, and the alternates and visitors in the section to the left.

State Regent Mrs. Maude Haver Davis asked Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, an Honorary State Regent to serve as parliamentarian.

Report of the Bylaws committee was given by Mrs. Roscoe Graves.

Mrs. Graves made the motion that the proposed bylaws be substituted for the present by laws of the Kansas Society, stating this is main motion and subject to amendment.

Printed copies of the proposed by-laws had been mailed to each Chapter regent the required period of time prior to this meeting and copies were passed to all members at the conference.

Mrs. Graves reading the entire proposed revision.

Article I. Name. No objection.

Article II. Objects. No objection. (This is copied from the national bylaws).

Article III. Membership. Mrs. Graves made motion that section 3 be struck out. It is taken care of in another place. Motion seconded by Mrs. Kilbourn. Carried.

Article IV. Officers. Section 1 okay. Mrs. Graves moved that Line 6 section 2 (A, beginning 7th word "no one shall hold a state office and a chapter office at the same time" be stricken out, and the following substituted "no Chapter member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the state conference." Seconded by Mrs. Harry Ives. Motion Carried.

Mrs. Charles D. Cruse of Abilene moved that at the end of the section 2 (a) the words be added, after 'State Vice

Regent'—"until the expiration of at least one year." Motion seconded by Mrs. Foy of Hutchinson. Carried.

Section 2b okay.

Section 3 okay.

Section 4. Line 2. Mrs. Graves stated the Committee recommends and moves beginning in line two strike out "provided she has been confirmed as State Vice Regent." This is taken care of in our national by-laws. Seconded by Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn. Motion carried.

Section 5. No objection.

Section 6. Question was asked that some of our members living in Missouri, and other neighboring states, would that constitute absence from the state. Mrs. Graves answered NO., it would not. She would be attending her meetings, and she would qualify as being in the state.

Article V. Nomination and Election of Officers.

Section 1. Mrs. Foy of Hutchinson objected to the provision of election by acclamation if there was only one candidate for each office. She felt it did away with our privilege of secret ballot.

Mrs. Chas. D. Cruse inquired if there was some way where the chapters and members could know of the nominees for office before coming to the state conference.

President General Mrs. Frederic A. Groves, and C. E. Arnett of Emporia spoke.

Mrs. L. E. Thomas of Fort Scott moved we strike out the balance of the section after the word "ballot" in line 2. No second to this motion.

Mrs. Roscoe Graves moved the word "acclamation" in line 3 be changed to "viva voce". Motion seconded by Mrs. C. E. Arnett. A standing vote was called for, and motion carried with only three persons voting against (Mrs. Foy, Mrs. Lutes and one other person).

Mrs. L. E. Thomas of Fort Scott moved that the balance of the sentence beginning in line 2 "if nominations are made from the floor, otherwise the election shall be by viva voce" be stricken out. Motion seconded by Mrs. Frank Blaser of Wichita.

Discussing the motion were Mrs. Foy of Hutchinson, Mrs. Paul Greenlease of Kansas City, Mrs. C. E. Arnett of Emporia, Mrs. Mollie C. Huston of Winfield, Mrs. Otto Lutes of Tyrone, Oklahoma, Mrs. Carl Hoofer of Wichita, Mrs. C. F. Eckelman of Wichita, and others.

Voting on the Motion. Motion carried.

Section 2. Approved.

Section 3. Approved.

Section 4. To be changed to section 5. Approved.

Section 4. Moved by Mrs. Chas. D. Cruse of Abilene, that a new section be added.

"The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth."

Seconded by Mrs. L. E. Thomas of Ft. Scott. Motion carried.

Article VI. Duties of Officers.

Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, approved at presented.

Section 8; Mrs. Graves moved the words "and state in which he served" be added at the end of line 5—word "ancestor".

Mrs. Foy of Hutchinson seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Section 9. line 4, after words "Smithsonian Institution", Mrs. R. H. Chesney of Wichita moved the words "and for the Historian General" be added. Seconded by Mrs. John Feller of Leavenworth. Motion carried.

Section 10, last line. Mrs. Graves moved the words "State

Traveling" be changed to "D. A. R." to agree with other provisions for the Library. Seconded by Mrs. C. E. Arnett of Emporia. Motion carried.

Section 11. Approved.

Section 12. Approved.

Article VII. Meetings.

Section one. line 5, after "Chapter Regents" to read "and Chairmen of all committees", etc. Mrs. Graves moved this correction. Seconded by Mrs. Walter Cox of Augusta. Motion carried.

Section 2. Approved.

Section 3. Approved.

Section 4. Approved.

Section 5. Approved.

Section 6. The committee wishes to strike out the word "March" in line 2, and substitute the word "February", and Mrs. Graves made that motion. Seconded by Mrs. Kennedy of Derby. Motion carried.

Section 7. Mrs. Graves moved, line 5, the words "any meeting of" be struck out. Seconded by Mrs. Otto Lutes of Tyron, Oklahoma. Carried.

Section 7. Mrs. Graves moved, line 6, after the words "special meeting" that the words "of the Kansas Society" be inserted. Seconded by Mrs. Charles D. Cruse of Abilene. Motion carried.

Section 8. Approved.

Article VIII. State Board of Management.

Section 1. Mrs. Graves asked that the word "elected" be inserted as the tenth word in line 1. —through an error in printing it had been omitted.

Mrs. C. F. Eckelman of Wichita asked why leave out the District Directors, and Chairmen of Committees. The Board of Management needs to have their reports, and they need to have information of the Society progress and activities.

Mrs. Graves read "Roberts" attitude—and the possibility of "packing" a meeting of the Board.

Section 2. Mrs. Graves moved that this entire section be deleted. Mrs. Eckelman again questioned the advisability of such action. Mrs. Graves read from the proposed model from the National Society on such policy.

Mrs. Gwen Hinshaw of Wichita seconded the motion.

Standing vote was taken. Carried with three voting against.

Renumber the other sections of this article, the last one being 7.

Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 were approved.

Article IX. Executive Committee.

Sections 1, 2, 3 were read and approved.

Mrs. C. F. Eckelman of Wichita questioned that no quorum was provided for.

Mrs. R. V. Shrewder—acting parliamentarian state "a quorum is a majority—when there is no set rule".

Article X. Finance.

Section 1. Approved.

Section 2. Mrs. Graves moved the following sentence be added to this section. "A chapter whose dues are unpaid shall not be represented in the state conference."

Motion seconded by Mrs. F. L. B. Leavel of Iola. Motion carried.

Section 3. Approved.

Section 4. Mrs. Graves moved the wording of this section be "Necessary expenses of the State Officers and State Committees shall be paid by the State Treasurer on presentation of itemized statements in writing and approved by the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary".

Seconded by Mrs. L. H. Kessler of Mission Hills. Motion carried.

Article XI. Committees.

Sections 1, 2, 3, Approved.

Section 4. Mrs. Graves moved the last sentence in the section would read "The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee." Seconded by Mrs. Stanley. Motion carried.

Sections 5, 6, 7, 8. Approved.

The State Regent announced the time for the Memorial Service was at hand. Meeting would be recessed, to take up further consideration of the by-laws at the Wednesday morning session.

Immediately following this banquet a reception was given at the Osage Hotel honoring Mrs. Frederic A. Groves, President General.

- 8:00 a.m. Voting booths were open, downstairs lobby of the Osage Hotel.
- 9:30 a.m. Meeting was called to order by State Regent Mrs.

 Maude Haver Davis.

Invocation was given by Mrs. Elmer Huffman, Chaplain.

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Charles D. Cruse, Chairman.

Singing the National Anthem, Star Spangled Banner was led by Mrs. Carl Biegert, Chairman.

Mrs. J. Randolph Kennedy was appointed Parliamentarian for the morning session.

The Award Flags of Eunice Sterling Chapter were presented by the Regent, Mrs. J. L. McEwen, to the Mission Hills Chapter of Mission Hills Kansas, and accepted by the regent, Mrs. L. H. Kessler.

Final report of the Credentials Committee, Mrs. George Y. Stewart, Chairman was read showing a total registration of 227, as follows:

Out of State Guests of Honor including President General and two members of her cabinet ... 8 National Officers within the state ... 2 State Officers ... 9 Delegates ... 126 Alternates ... 41 Visitors ... 41

Minutes of the session of the previous day were read by Pauline Cowger, Recording Secretary and approved.

Recommendations from the State Board of Management were read by Pauline Cowger, Recording Secretary:

1. Mrs. R. H. Chesney moved that the Board of Management recommend to our State Conference that all monies over and and above complete payment of \$2409.42 for the 2500 Kansas Society DAR Historical maps and postage be allocated for the permanent care and reconditioning of the Santa Fe Trail markers across Kansas, in cooperation with the State Highway Commission.

Miss Haynes of Emporia moved the adoption of this recom-

mendation. Seconded by Mrs. Carl Biegert of Junction City. Motion carried.

2. Mrs. R. H. Chesney moved that the Board of Management recommend to our State Conference that the Santa Fe Trail Marker in the western Kansas farm wheat field be moved, as requested, to a place suitable to the marker inscription—either on a county road adjacent to the Herman farm or on Highway US 50 near Bellefont.

Miss Stanley moved the adoption of this recommendation. Seconded by Mrs. Grabendike. Motion carried.

3. Mrs. J. Randolph Kennedy moved that the Board of Management recommend to our State Conference that the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution send a check of \$15 to pay for the new aluminum flag pole for the Kansas Flag at our National headquarters.

Motion by Miss Haynes of Emporia, that this recommendation be adopted. Seconded by Mrs. Samuel Somers of Emporia. Motion carried.

4. Mrs. V. L. Durr moved that the Board of Management recommend to the State Conference that the Kansas Society place \$2000.00 insurance on our property in the Dodge City Library. Mrs. Jess Harper of Sitka moved the adoption of this recommendation. Seconded by Mrs. Ralph O. Ralston. Motion carried.

Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn, Vice Regent, asked that Mrs. J. Randolph Kennedy take the chair.

5. Mrs. Kilbourn moved that the State Board of Management recommend to the State Conference, that the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution endorse Maude Haver Davis, our State Regent, as candidate in 1960 for the office of Vice President General.

Mrs. Alexander J. Berger moved the adoption of this recommendation. Seconded by Mrs. Garland Ferrell.

Printed ballots were passed by the tellers, Mrs. G. G. Gilbert, Mrs. C. A. Cotton, Mrs. J. F. Baldwin, Mrs. Walter Cox, Mrs. J. W. Taylor, Mrs. Ralph Belt, and Miss Pauline Sleeth.

Those present and eligible to vote numbered 81 was given as the number eligible.

Ballots were collected.

Reporting on the vote, Mrs. Davis received the favorable vote of the 81 persons casting their ballot.

Mrs. Roscoe Graves continued with the report on the Revision of the by-laws, beginning with Article XII.

Sec. 1. Mrs. Graves moved the last sentence be deleted—and the following sentence substituted "a condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resume shall not be published in the proceedings." Seconded by Mrs. E. E. Tippen of Wichita. Motion carried.

Sec. 4. Mrs. Graves moved that the following words "except in an emergency" be added to the last sentence in this section.

Motion seconded by Mrs. George Y. Stewart. Carried.

State Regent Mrs. Maude Haver Davis interrupted the discussion to ask if every one had voted for the officers for the coming term. Soon the polls would be declared closed.

- Sec. 3. Mrs. Graves moved that the word "installation" be substituted for the word "election" in line one, and that the word "elect" be deleted. That in line two, the word "postal" be added in front of the word card. Seconded by Lucina Jones of Emporia. Motion carried.
- Sec. 4. Mrs. Graves moved that the words "March first" in line two and in line three be changed to "January thirtieth."

Motion seconded by Mrs. Rollin Johnson of Salina. Motion carried.

Sec. 5. Mrs. Graves moved that this section be stricken out. Motion seconded by Mrs. J. A. Bogue of Wichita. Motion carried.

Article XV. Approved.

Article XVI.

Sec. 1. Mrs. Graves moved that this be amended-substituting the word "voting" for the words "entitled to vote" at the beginning of line 2, and in line 4, the

words annual meeting be changed to "state conference."

Mrs. C. E. Arnett seconded this motion. Carried.

Sec. 2. Approved.

Sec. 3. Mrs. Graves moved that the following be a new section 3 of Article XVI.

"Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this state and of this Society, shall become a law of the Chapters and of the Kansas Society, without notice of amendment."

Motion seconded by Mrs. Alexander J. Berger of Arkansas City. Motion carried.

State Regent Mrs. Maude Haver Davis asked if all eligible had voted for election of officers. She then declared the polls closed, and asked the election committee to report on the number entitled to vote, number required for election, number of persons voting, number of votes the candidate received.

There was some discussion if a way could be devised whereby chapters and members of the Society could know who the Nominees for state officers are, before they come to state conference.

Mrs. Graves moved that the by-laws as proposed by the By-Laws Committee, as amended, be substituted for the present by-laws. Motion seconded by Mrs. Ethlyn Crawford of Kansas City. Motion carried.

Mrs. Graves stated the Committee had investigated the standing of our Corporation Charter. It was granted for 50 years—and has yet 8 years before it expires. However, it is not up to date, and is not really legal, including the name, the purposes, and several items.

It is necessary that we have a principal place of business—that we give the location of the registered office—that we have a resident agent, and that our papers be filed with the County in which the Registered office is located, as well as with the Secretary of the State of Kansas.

It is suggested that Miss Alberta Pantle be our Resident Agent, at the Kansas State Historical Society, Memorial Building, Jackson Avenue, Topeka, Kansas.

Mrs. Graves read the "RESOLUTION TO AMEND CORPORATE

CHARTER," which is printed in the proceedings on the page preceding the printing of the by-laws.—Moved its acceptance.

Motion seconded by Mrs. Grabendike, on vote, motion carried,

and the Resolution adopted. The Recording Secretary was instructed to proceed with the filing.

Standing Rules

Presented by Mrs. Graves.

- 1. Approved.
- 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer 1 to 3; Chapter Regents 1 each; another if requested; National Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State 1 each; Honorary State Regents 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairmen of other Committees 1 each: Senior President C.A.R. 1; District Directors 1 each; The Library of the Kansas Society 2; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society 2: the President General 1: the Kansas State Historical Society 1; the D.A.R. National Library 1; and the President of the State Officers Club, Chapter Regents Club and the State Chairmans Club 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.
- No. 2. Mrs. Graves asked that the word "shall" at the beginning of line 2 be changed to "may"—the provision reading:

"Chairmen of State Committees and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote." Approved.

No. 3 Approved, changing "Regents Bulletin" to "DAR News."

"No less than three DAR News shall be printed each year, expense to be borne by the State Society.

No. 4 "Mrs. Graves moved this Rule be adopted:

"The State Registrar shall furnish the publisher of the DAR News a correct and up to date mailing list".

Motion seconded by Mrs. Foy of Hutchinson, Motion carried.

Mrs. Graves explained, many of these things have been done—and we are trying to put them in the Standing Rules, and they can be changed as needed.

No. 5 A sum not to exceed \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent, each year for the purpose of carrying on her work.

Mrs. Craves moved the adoption of this standing rule. Seconded by Mrs. A. J. Berger of Arkansas City. Motion carried.

No. 6 Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed each elected state officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference. No expenses shall be allowed an officer if the State Conference is in

her home city. Mrs. Graves moved the adoption of this Standing Rule. Motion seconded by Mrs. R. W. Pearson of Kansas City. Motion carried.

Mrs. Graves moved that the present standing rules No. 4-5-6 be renumbered as 7-8-9.

No. 7 Twenty Five Dollars shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

No. 8 Fifty Dollars shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

No. 0 The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Pienic shall be held on Constitution Day, September 17, at Shawnee Mission, Kansas City, Kansas. Local Chapters shall act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed \$50.00 shll be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (25c).

Motion seconded by Mrs. John A. Pomeroy of Holton. Motion carried.

No. 10 The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum equal to ten cents per chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

Mrs. Graves moved the adoption of No. 19 standing Rule. Motion seconded by Mrs. L. H. Kessler. Motion carried.

No. 11 A sum equal to five cents per chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the treasurer of the Kansas C. A. R. Society to be used for C. A. R. projects.

Mrs. Graves moved the adoption of this Standing Rule. Motion seconded by Mrs. Howard Doyle of Parsons. Motion carried.

No. 12 The present No. 7.

The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 13 The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board meeting to each of the District meetings in the fall.

Mrs. Graves moved the adoption of this standing Rule. Motion seconded by Mrs. R. E. Harrouff of Emporia. Motion carried.

No. 14 Is the present No. 8, with changing the word October in line 2, to September. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15 of each year, a copy of the Chapter

Year Book to each of the State Officers and to the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

Mrs. Graves moved the adoption of this standing rule with the proposed word change. Seconded by Mrs. Howard Doyle of Parsons. Motion carried.

No. 15 Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

Mrs. Craves moved the adoption of this standing rule. Seconded by Mrs. Carl Hoofer of Wichita. Motion carried.

No. 16 All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

Mrs. Graves moved the adoption of this standing rule. Seconded by Mrs. Paul Greenlease of Kansas City. Motion carried.

No. 17 Be the former No. 10—and the name of the Library be The Kansas D A R Library, striking out the word State and Traveling as it appears.

The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Public Library, Dodge City, Kansas.

- (A) The Kansas Society shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Public Library, and shall provide a postal box in Dodge City, Kansas for the use of the Dodge City Chapter Library Committee in receiving requests for loan of books and their return.
- (B) The Dodge City Public Library shall provide a private room with adequate work and storage space.
- (C) The Dodge City Chapter, DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the library. This committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
- (D) All Scrap Books belonging to the Kansas Society shall be kept in the Kansas D A R Library.

Mrs. Graves moved the adoption of this standing rule. Seconded by Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn of Sterling. Motion carried.

No. 18 The present No. 9 to be re-numbered 18.

These rules may be amended, suspended or replaced at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote of those delegates voting.

Mrs. Graves moved that the present by-laws committee be dis-Daughters of the American Revolution 67 missed. Mrs. Carl Biegert of Junction City seconded the motion — adding the thanks of all the daughters for a work well done. Motion carried.

Mrs. J. Radolph Kennedy presented the following Resolution:

"During the committee work on Revision of the Bylaws, Mr. Roscoe Graves, Attorney at Law of Emporia, has made himself available for advising and counselling with the committee. Many hours of his professional services have been given unstingingly and without charge. I move the members of the 61st State Conference of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution express their appreciation through a rising vote, and that a letter be sent to Mr. Graves advising him of this action and our gratitude.

Motion seconded by several members. All stood, expressing their appreciation.

Next in order of business was the consideration of the Resolutions—printed elsewhere in these proceedings. Mrs. W. C. Harbin, a member of the committee, reading:

· No. 3 Government. Mrs. Harbin moved the acceptance of this Resolution. Seconded by Mrs. Carl Hoofer of Wichita, and Mrs. Otto Lutes of Tyrone, Oklahoma. Motion carried.

No. 4 Historic Places and Shrines. Mrs. Harbin moved the acceptance of this Resolution. Motion seconded by Mrs. R. E. Harrouff of Emporia, Mrs. Richardson of Kansas City, Mrs. Elmer Huffman of Wichita, and others. Motion carried.

No. 5 A proposal by Chemeketa Chapter of the Oregon Society providing for absentee ballots or proxy votes at Continental Congress. Mrs. Harbin moved the acceptance of this resolution. Motion seconded. Mrs. Foy of Hutchinson and several others spoke against the Resolution—thinking one should be present in the meeting to cast an intelligent vote. A standing vote was taken—and motion lost.

Courtesy Resolutions were also read by Mrs. W. C. Harbin.

Maddox, Mrs. Thomas Earle Stribling, Mrs. Hobart Lee Blackledge, and other distinguished guests; to speakers and musicians; to the Southeast District Chapters for their hostess duties; to the Osage Hotel; to the Episcopal Church, to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, to the Masonic Temple, to Mrs. Jess Rindt for the organ in the Masonic Temple; to Max Gragert for his lovely music; to the Arkansas City Traveler for the excellent publicity, to Clemente Drug Store for their gift, and to Arkansas City for the hospitality which contributed so much to the pleasure and enjoyment of the Kansas State Conference.

Mrs. Harbin moved the acceptance of this Courtesy Resolution. Seconded by Mrs. Elmer Huffman. Motion carried.

Mrs. Alexander J. Berger of Arkansas City asked for recognition—and that the Vice Regent, Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn take the chair.

"In recognition of valuable service to the State Society, I move that Mrs. Chester Davis (Maude Haver Davis) be made Honorary State Regent for life, of the Kansas Society."

Motion seconded by many, including Mrs. J. Randolph Kennedy. A rising vote of the assemblage—in respect and admiration.

Mrs. Davis responded; thanking the Society for the lovely honorand saying it had indeed been a joy to serve as state regent of Kansas.

Conference Chairman Miss Edna Wheatley announced "copies of the Arkansas City Traveller for Monday and Tuesday are available at the Osage hotel desk. Courtesy copies of Wednesday's paper will be sent by the hotel to every one who leaves her name and address at the desk.

Miss Wheatley stated one of the drug stores "Clemente's" had wanted to do something for the Conference, and insisted on giving a bottle of perfume. Names had been drawn—and Mrs. Ralph New land was the winner. Appreciation was expressed.

Miss Wheatley thanked every one for their cooperation—and hoped they had had a patriotic, educational and inspirational good time.

Invitations for the 1960 State Conference to be held in the Southwest District were called for—

A letter of invitation from the regent of Uvedale Chapter, Mrs. True Foster of Hutchinson was read by Mrs. Foy.

A letter from Mr. Frank Ripple, General Manager of the Baker Hotel in Hutchinson had been received by the State Regent, and was read.

Mrs. Alexander J. Berger of Arkansas City moved that the Kansas

Society DAR accept the invitation to hold the 1960 state conference in Hutchinson. Motion seconded by Mrs. Foy. Carried.

Being notified that the Committee of Tellers was ready to report, the State Regent asked Mrs. G. G. Gilbert, chairman to read the report of the election.

Mrs. Rollin Johnson of Salina made the motion that the minutes of this final session be submitted to the outgoing Regent Mrs. Davis and incoming Regent Mrs. Kilbourn for approval. Motion seconded by Mrs. L. E. Thomas of Fort Scott. Carried.

Mrs. Frederic A. Groves, President General "gave a most sincere thanks to everyone. This has been a wonderful Conference. I have enjoyed it, and I have gained a great deal. I do thank you for the beautiful corsages, and the courtisies you have shown me, but I thank you most of all for making me feel like a Kansan since I've been in your state. Your reports were wonderful—the Kansas Historical map is tremendous, and I hope that map will be the beginning

of maps of the same character in every state. It is a beautiful piece of work in Americanism and of pride of ones state.

Up in my room I have a letter addressed to the National Chairman of Honor Roll containing one of your charts. I'm going to send one to headquarters, too. It is exceptional. It makes it easy to see what chapters have succeeded, and where chapters need to concentrate—a little more work along certain lines.

I want to comment on the very able way the by-laws revision was handled. That's a tremendous job. They did a piece of work which you can feel grateful in your hearts for—and for their careful attention to it.

I would like to go on and mention many others.

How beautifully your State Regent has represented this state and its fine work on the national board. She has not only made friends for herself, but for you. There is gratitude in my heart and thanks for your beautiful and gracious hospitality, and I hope I've behaved so well that I will be invited back again.

All of the honored visitors and dignitaries said "thank you" for the many courtesies shown them.

STATE REGENT'S REPORT

Maude Haver Davis (Mrs. Chester)

The third and last year of this administration has come to a close. The time has come for us to give an accounting. I am sure that we can justly point with pride to the accomplishment of these three years.

The report of our officers and state chairmen which you will hear later in the Conference show that there has been much interest and work in the various projects of DAR.

Interest in El Quartelejo, a project of former administrations, has been renewed, and it is hoped that future work will be done to make this one of the outstanding historical monuments in Kansas.

Another important project was the preparation of historical maps in commemoration of our State's 100 years of statehood 1861 to 1961. Our State Historian has been the sponsor of this worthwhile project. Chapter members have given these maps to the pupils of the 6th and 7th grades in Kansas Schools.

It was decided at our 60th State Conference to have our State DAR Library on a permanent basis. Accordingly the invitation of the City Library of Dodge City was accepted and our Library was placed there in a private room. There greater care in handling the books is possible. The efficiency of our library is greatly increased.

A newly organized Genealogical Society of the Southwest has done much to increase the efficiency of the Library.

The revision of the by-laws of the state has been made in accordance with the National request of several years ago. This revision carefully and thoroughly done by the Committee will be presented for your consideration later on the Conference program.

Our file cabinet in the State Historical Library in Topeka has been relieved of it's "bulginess;" State scrap books have been placed in our Library; numberless extra copies of State Proceedings were removed. By-laws have been made to insure us in the future of more streamlined filing.

Contents of this file appeared in the 1958 Conference Proceedings. The necessary articles of this administration have been filed.

Our pledge to the Allene Wilson Groves Cottage at Tamassee has been paid and additional amounts have been given this year.

In the three years of my term of office I have visited all of the 65 chapters at least once and I have accepted invitations for return visits to many chapters. My itinerary for this year will appear separately in the proceedings of the Conference.

I am glad to report the organization of two chapters, Flores del Sol and Mission Hills. Work has been done on the organization of a third chapter. I am sorry that I can not report a completion.

One of the highlights of the third year was the visit to Natchez, Miss., where on March 21 I served as a guest hostess at the beautiful ante bellum home "Rosalie," which is owned by the Daughters of Mississippi.

You will be thrilled as I have been by the reports of state chairmen and officers for the last year of our administration. There has been an increase in membership, in junior membership; increased interest in our DAR magazine; an increase of subscriptions over the first year of our administration.

I felt a thrill of pride as I looked through the January issue of our DAR magazine in it's new form, containing three pages of Kansas advertising.

1991 pages of genealogical records have been sent in this year, almost double the amount sent in in the first year.

A sizable gift to the work of the Biblographical Index was made honoring our National Registrar, Mrs. J. Randolph Kennedy.

A number of memorial gifts have been made, a mahogany card cabinet for the Registrar Generals office, memorial acres, also scholarships given to several schools.

Two one thousand dollar gifts, according to provisions of the will of the late Clara B. Lidzy, member of the Topeka chapter, were made to Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee. These amounts to be used as an endowment fund for scholarships.

Forty six of our chapters attained Honor Roll requirements. This is a certain indication that the majority of our chapters are progressing and are interested in the things which National considers the most important. This number of Kansas chapters achieving Honor Roll status assures us of being on the National Honor Roll. The Honor Roll project has been a most valuable measuring rod.

We greatly appreciate the fine work done by our District Director and hostess chapter for the well arranged District Meetings.

We are truly grateful for the splendid and untiring work which our state officers and chairmen have done. They truly have made these years happy and successful for our Kansas Society. Our last year has been greatly saddened by the death of two members of our State Board. It has been difficult to continue our duties without them. Fitting tributes will be given them at our Memorial service tomorrow.

I wish to publicly thank Mrs. Elmer Huffman, Mrs. Joe Mac-Conkey and Miss Pauline Cowger for their generous and capable work in carrying on the duties of these two officers.

We extend our sympathy to all chapters which have been saddened by the death of beloved members.

We thank the members of the Southeast District chapters, the general chairman, the co-chairman for the capable work they have done in making arrangements for this Conference.

We are delighted to have our President General, Mrs. Frederic A. Groves as our guest in this conference. We have appreciated her valuable assistance through these three years.

We appreciate the participation in our Conference program of our Kansas member Mrs. J. Randolph Kennedy, Registrar General, Mrs. Ralph Newland, Curator General and Mrs. Ashmead White, Program Chairman of Continental Congress.

As a parting word of advice may I urge you Kansas chapters to grow in membership, especially junior membership, for junior membership is the "life insurance" of each chapter.

May you give to the incoming administration the same loyalty and cooperation which you have shown these past three years.

The office of state regent is really a full time job, but a most rewarding one.

Long after I have forgotten the number of hours required for the duties of this office, I shall still be remembering the beautiful friendships which it has brought me. The interest, cooperation, hospitality of the Kansas Daughters have been an inspiration. Nothing will ever replace these happy memories.

It is with a feeling of deep appreciation that I bring you my third and last (and best) report as your State Registrar. It does not seem possible that three years have passed since I took over the duties of this office and as I look back now I realize how BUSY and still how satisfying they have been. I feel that I have been especially fortunate to have had as Registrar General during these three years our own Mary Ainsworth Kennedy, who has been an inspiration and very great help in all my work. Had it not been for her the list of 47 Kansas admissions at the January 31st Board meeting would never have been received in time to count on this short year's report, thus making it possible for many chapters to qualify for the National Honor Roll. I feel too that one could not ask for more than to be on the State Board under the leadership of our State Regent, Maude Haver Davis, and our State Vice-Regent, Roberta Kilbourn. This has been a wonderful Board and friendships have been made that will last forever.

Many things have been accomplished in Kansas during the past three years and more especially during this past year, which really was a year of only eleven months.

As usual last September I sent my yearly letter to all Chapter Registrars outlining the year's work and giving instructions as to the information to be sent to this office and to the office of Registrar General. In January report forms were sent to each chapter and all chapters have made their yearly reports to me except one. A total of 314 postal cards and 205 letters were mailed from this office this past year.

All Executive Board meetings and all District Meetings were attended—all were profitable and enjoyable.

The Necrology list used at the Memorial Service was prepared by your State Registrar and it was with a great deal of sadness that I listed the names of BERTHA GABBERT and JEAN RESER, two state officers, who passed away this year.

Another duty taken over by this office since I have been your Registrar is that of being responsible for the mailing list of the Kansas DAR News Bulletin. When this duty was assumed in July 1956 a total of 231 June bulletins had been returned because of incorrect addresses. Following the mailing of the February bulletin last December only 32 bulletins have been returned so I feel that the work has not been in vain and that the chapters are being impressed with the importance of reporting changes of addresses to the State Registrar.

The Chapter yearbooks are invaluable in that they help keep the State files correct and up to date. Thanks for your promptness in sending them.

The Eunice Sterling Award Flag given this year to the chapter with the largest per cent net gain in membership goes this year to our baby chapter—MISSION HILLS—with a net gain of 73 and one third per cent—they have almost doubled their membership with no losses. Cofachique Chapter was 2nd with a twenty per cent gain.

HISTORIAN

Beulah Chesney (Mrs. Robert H.)

From the viewpoint of a state historian 1958 has been something of a banner year for the Kansas DAR. In considerably less than a year over 20,000 of our DAR Historical Maps were given to school children by chapters and individuals; no small accomplishment even with a map as gaily blue and exciting as ours! We received orders for them from people everywhere—Maine to Florida to Texas, and the U.S. Government. Maps will continue to be available until the remaining few thousand are gone. Beyond the shadow of a doubt our map with footnotes has stimulated interest in Kansas history.

Many ways were used to distribute them; some chapters gave them county-wide directly to history teachers, others all students in fifth, sixth or seventh grades, and still others gave them to County School Superintendents to place. One mother ordered 36 copies for her son to give his classmates on his birthday, and a grandmother wrote her very young grandson wants to be taken to all the pictures on the map. We hope everyone of you had the pleasure and satisfaction of having a copy and giving a few; this is quite one of the finest things we've done for our youngsters.

Outstanding this year were the letters sent out in July from national DAR officers in Washington. In a packet addressed to each chapter regent were three letters for the chapter historian—one with a general outline of historian's work from Mrs. Lowell Burnelle, Historian General; one from Mrs. Dale Brown giving details of American History Month observance and the Theodore Roosevelt Centennial essay contest; and one from Mrs. Herbert Parker regarding the compiling of information on graves of Revolutionary ancestors. These letters were most comprehensive; so much so there was no occasion for me to send out a fall letter to chapters. Instead, I mailed double postal cards in January requesting chapter data for our state report to national. I was very happy to receive 58 replies!

This year we were the third state in the United States to procure an American History Month Proclamation from our Governor naming February 1959 American History Month in Kansas. This proclamation was published in our DAR News and a local paper. We have been urged to see if we can have this Proclamation made a yearly observance by STATE ENACTMENT in Kansas. This is a splendid objective and should be followed.

In connection with American History month, I ordered 1100 bright blue stickers for Kansas use.

We did have a few Kansas entrants in Theodore Rossevelt essay contest, and await with keen interest hearing finalist in this nation-wide contest when announced at Continental Congress in April. A fine part of this observance of February was a televised broadcast of the film of life of Theodore Roosevelt arranged and sponsored by the Wichita DAR Defense Council. The united effort of Kansas chapters in observing February as American History Month in their meetings is splendid; it is this concerted action, this "togetherness" that will be the means of a nation-wide permanent observance.

It was utterly delightful to see the reproduction of American History Month stickers on the white ribbons of delegates and alternates at Arkansas City.

Your State report to national will include 18 names of Revolutionary ancestors sent in by Eunice Sterling chapter, 21 official DAR grave markers placed by chapters to honor members during 1958; a goodly number of American History medals and certificates awarded; excellent cooperation on Historical Programs and Anniversaries observed—several in schools; a few history broadcasts, and an encouraging report on historical Tours. Eleven dollars were contributed to Americana Restoration Fund.

After much correspondence plans have been made for the cooperation of Kansas DAR and the State Highway Commission to check, re-condition and maintain our famous Santa Fe Trail Markers across Kansas. The Highway Commission have already checked Douglas, Osage and Johnson counties, and the marker is being moved from the center of a wheat field in western Kansas to a highway. It was an interesting part of my duties to handle the correspondence and consultation with an attorney in drawing up the five-year agreement for the restoration and preservation of El Quartelejo, thru the joint efforts of Kansas Society DAR and the Scott County Historical Society.

I want to include in this report the outstanding accomplishment of six Wichita chapters in placing a Card Catalog of Cenealogical Books available in the Wichita Public Library. This is the outgrowth of their purchasing valuable books to add to this collection, and is a tremendous contribution of much effort and work. They are happy to invite all Kansas Daughters to use it!

This year we have fully lived up to the comment of a national officer—"The Historian's program is one of the Society's first objectives."

LIBRARIAN

Beverly Durr (Mrs. V. L.)

The past three years have been most enjoyable. The cooperation and interest of our officers and members has been inspiring and an invaluable help.

I feel a great deal has been accomplished during this administration. I am pleased that Kansas has been on the National Librarian's Honor Roll the past two years with librarians in every chapter. Forty-four items have been added to the State Library and copies of these additions made available to all chapter librarians.

After much study it was decided at the 60th annual conference to house the State Library on a permanent basis in a private room at the Dodge City Public Library. Much credit is due the special library committee appointed by Mrs. Davis and the Dodge City Library Board in providing us with a private room with adequate facilities to house and care for our ever growing library. A new Genealogical Society of Southwest Kansas has been formed which has done much to further the use and increase the interest in the library.

Nearly 50 percent of the chapters report that they give subscriptions to the D.A.R. Magazine to city, college, and high school libraries in their home town. Local high schools, colleges, city libraries and the Historical Library at Topeka received books from Martha Loving Ferrell, Eunice Sterling, Jane Dean Coffey, Esther Lowrey, Cofachique, and more than 100 volumes were given by Betty Washington Chapter. Neodesha is having the past National Magazines bound for their local library and Atchison Chapter is helping to supply bookcases in the D.A.R. room in their local library. Dodge City Chapter has a project of rebinding at least 10 of the books which are in such bad condition in the state library collection.



Ten chapters worked with the Naturalization Courts, and several others helped with Americanism work. Members of three chapters taught in the Night Schools, preparing citizens for citizenship. At the Naturalization Ceremonies, chapters presented Flags, Wel-

come Cards, Flag Codes and copies of the Declaration of Independence.

Teas, receptions or some other form of entertainment for the foreign born or their children were given by four chapters. Six chapters assisted the new citizens in voting, while other chapters visited these citizens in their homes, took them to church, to Libraries and Recreational centers.

1080 Manuals for Citizenship were distributed by the chapters. These went to the U.S. District Court, USO, YWCA, Libraries, Public Schools, and to individuals. The Topeka Chapter supplied 40 Manuals to G.I. Brides at Forbes Air Force Base at Topeka, while other chapters gave Manuals to GI Brides in their districts.

Those chapters having the greatest opportunity to work with the foreign born report the following:

The Lois Warner Chapter of Junction City continues to supply Many Manuals to the USO Director for Americanism work. Classes for foreign born wives of American Soldiers at Fort Riley are held several times a year. Over 500 Manuals have been given this year. The publicity includes pictures of each class that graduates.

The five chapters in Greater Kansas City—Shawnee, Wyandot, James Ross, Tomahawk, and Mission Hills work closely with the Naturalization Courts, supplying Manuals, visiting and assisting the Naturalization Council with its work, giving a Christmas party for the children of new citizens, and furnishing Flag Codes, and copies of the Declaration of Independence to them.

The Topeka Chapter supplies Manuals to the Clerk of the District Court, and gives a small American Flag to each new citizen. Following the Ceremony the John Haupt Chapter serves refreshments to this group.

The Eunice Sterling Chapter of Wichita continues to work with and support the American-Syrian Club, organized over 35 years ago. Members of this chapter attend monthly meetings, social gatherings and church programs, working with these women on programs and projects.

Americanism

Twenty-four Chapters had programs based on some phase of Americanism. Two chapters had speakers from the U.S. District Court, explaining the value of the DAR Manual, and the way an alien becomes a citizen. Other programs were based on the Constitution, the History of the 13 Original Flags, Fruits of Freedom, and the Immigration and Naturalization Laws.

Ten Chapter Chairmen gave talks to either their own members or to other organizations.

A total of \$46.35 was spent for prizes on Americanism, with

seven Chapters awarding prizes to twenty-three children for their essays.

480 inches of publicity on Americanism was reported by the Chapters.

These three years as State Chairman of Americanism and DAR Manuals for Citizenship, have been very interesting ones for me. I wish to thank Mrs. Davis, State Regent, and all the Chapter Chairmen for their wonderful support and cooperation in furthering this very worthwhile program of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

AMERICAN MUSIC

Lucile Biegert (Mrs. Carl D.)

As I look back over the past three years in which I have worked with the Chairmen of the American Music Committee, I realize what a wonderful experience I have had. To all who have answered my letters, those who have asked for help in programs and those who have helped me, I am truly grateful. To Mrs. Maude Haver Davis I am grateful for her understanding and kindness to me.

This has been a good year, we have improved, 56 Chapters have reported on their year's work and given plans for the coming year. Only six have not used the National Anthem at their meetings. There are plans for April and May American Music programs. Many used the State song "Home On the Range." One Chapter has a series of eight programs telling in Story and Song our Country's History, some told of the Christmas through Song and Story, others tell the Story of our Country's Wars through Story and Song. This to me has been very encouraging, because it meant the members as well as the Chairmen were enlightened on the place American Music takes in Our History and Life. One Chapter sings to the accompaniment of the Boston Pops Orchestra, of course through phonograph, but sing they will and do. All I ask; Please, program Chairmen make room for the Music Chairman, she wants to help you.

APPROVED SCHOOLS

Vera L. Greenlease (Mrs. Paul R.)

It is with real regret that I see this chairmanship come to a close. Serving as Approved Schools Chairman is an experience that I would like to share with every member of the DAR. Not only does the wonderful work of this committee bring personal pleasure, but great satisfaction in serving the National Society in a capacity which follows so closely the real objects and ideals of our society. It has been a distinct privilege and pleasure to serve our State Regent and other officers who have been most cooperative. My

thanks to the chapter chairmen, without whose cooperation the work could not have been accomplished.

I am happy to report cash donations to the schools amounting to \$5,047.51. Two thousand dollars, one thousand each to Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith, a bequest from the estate of Clara B. Lidzy of the Topeka Chapter.

Highlighting my chairmanship for the three years were of course my visit to the schools in 1956 followed by the visit, to our State Conference in Beloit, of Mr. Ralph H. Cain, Superintendent of Tamassee and Mr. John P. Tyson, Executive Secretary of Kate Duncan Smith. It was in this year that Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick contributed \$1,000 to Tamassee for a much needed abhatoir.

Outstanding in my second year was our part in the National project, the new dormitory for little girls, called the Allene Wilson Groves Cottage for Little Girls in honor of our President General. It was in this year that Fort Supply Trail Chapter and Tomahawk won first places for the largest cash donations, per capita, to Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith.

I have spoken and shown slides to nineteen chapters during my chairmanship. We have contributed a total of \$12,698.11 in cash and 6,274 pounds of used clothing.

It is my firm conviction that as long as we shall maintain two such fine schools as Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee that it is the bounden duty of each member of the society to support these schools to the best of her ability. We must continue to improve conditions in order that these schools may reach a higher standard and be worthy to bear the name Daughters of the American Revolution.

BYLAWS

Myrtle K. Graves (Mrs. Roscoe W.)

Your Committee on the Revision of the Bylaws of the State Society has been working for two and one-half years. We studied the Bylaws of the National Society, the Bylaws of eight other State Societies, the twelfth edition of the Handbook, what the Daughters Do, and the "Model" for State Organizations as prepared by Mrs. Sarah Corbin Robert. The chairman read all the articles by the National Parliamentarians that have appeared in our DAR Magazine for the last nine years. Some of those articles were read and re-read a number of times and then copied so that they would be ready at hand to back up our reasons for doing some of the things we did.

We do not expect that everyone will be satisfied with the results of our work, but we have tried to remember the admonition that "Bylaws should contain only the basic and fundamental rules of an organization." We have tried to keep each article reserved to one subject and to state each section in language that is not ambiguous and will not require interpretation. Also, we have attempted to limit the content of the bylaws to the basic structure that is likely not to need frequent change, or that should be changed by a two-thirds vote after notice to the chapters.

We have placed under Standing Rules such matters that may be adopted at any meeting by a majority vote and may be suspended or rescinded by a two-thirds vote at any meeting. We have a number of Standing Rules to present after the Bylaws have been adopted.

In the Bylaws and amendments to same that we present to you, we feel we have a basic structure adapted to the conditions under which this Kansas State Organization must operate. We have kept in mind at all times the position of the State Organization within the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution and at the same time, we have tried to recognize the rights and duties of the Chapters. The purpose of the State Organization is the vital function of uniting its chapters to accomplish by working together what they could not accomplish by working separately.

CAR

As State Chairman for CAR, I am happy to report that through the efforts of your Regents and CAR Chapter Chairmen, definite progress has been made in the state in the past year. Interest has been aroused to the extent that many DAR Chapters who do not sponsor a CAR Society are cooperating on a state-wide basis. Such cooperation has been most helpful in boosting the statistical records in membership, the collection of coupons for Tamassee DAR School, and most of all, in arousing the interest in our CAR organization. Through the efforts of one Chapter Chairman alone, a new Society is in process of being organized at Douglass. Several DAR Chapters are helping financially in the society they sponsor.

As to actual work done during the past year, your State Chairman has sent bulletins outlining the projects and needs of the CAR; she attended the State Board meeting in October and three of the District meetings. Innumerable letters have been answered pertaining to certain aspects of CAR work, and messages have been written for each issue of the DAR News. In her capacity as senior state president of CAR, she has attended State and Regional conferences, the National DAR—CAR Conventions in Washington, D.C., and will chaperone a group going to the National CAR Convention again this year.

It has been a real pleasure to know and to work with Mrs. Davis and officers of the state DAR organization and I want to express

my appreciation for the help and encouragement they have given me in my term of office.

Kansas CAR still needs much help and encouragement from the Daughters in the coming years. It is my wish that each Kansas Daughter will consider herself a Committee of one to do everything in her power to make our record even finer in the coming years. Our Children are your future Daughters. Help us keep our training fields filled with prospective members for your Chapter.

CONFERENCE MARSHAL

It has been a pleasure and a privilege to serve the Kansas So ciety this past three years as your conference marshal.

In the morning, prior to each state conference, a meeting has been held with the pages, discussing their duties throughout the sessions—fine points of posture, saluting, carrying the flags, and other details.

Name cards have been prepared, and placed on the front and stage chairs, where state officers, honored guests, committee chairmen, dignitaries, and speakers are to sit throughout the sessions.

The line-up for the processionals has been arranged—protocol. Also for receptions.

The place cards have been placed, according to protocol, at the tables for the meals.

At Continental Congress, I have assisted the State Regent as to assignments of chapter delegates seating in the Kansas box during sessions—and in other ways.

Too, I've served as a member of the Kansas Luncheon Committee at Continental Congress, assisting with all those plans and arrangements.

CONSERVATION

Ada H. Ripple (Mrs. H. E.)

The Kansas DAR realizes a definite need for water, soil and wildlife conservation, as well as for recreational activities, also the increasing need to stress the control of pollution of our streams and rivers. The more that informed people urge proper conservation practice the more work can be accomplished.

Cards were mailed to every Kansas Chapter informing them of the two Conservation Resolutions which were passed by Continental Congress.

1. The Preservation of National Parks, Forests and Monuments.

2. That DAR Chapters participate in the Theodore Roosevelt Centennial observance by planting trees in his memory and by studying his Conservation ideals and accomplishments.

In January a questionnaire, based on our National Chairman's Conservation Questionnaire, was mailed to each Chapter. As of January the 27th, thirty Chapters had reported the following.

Ten Chapters used a program on Conservation.

Five Chapters used a speaker on Conservation.

Two Chapters used slides.

One made a field trip to a DAR Conservation Project.

Two Chapters visited a State Conservation Project.

Two Chapters studied State and National Legislation.

Five Chapters studied Soil and Water Conservation.

Many, many trees were planted on private land and in public parks, also shrubbery. One Chapter reported a program on Historic Kansas trees—another studied Theodore Roosevelt's Conservation ideals. Thirty members wrote to their Congressman urging preservation of our National Parks; One Chapter is promoting an essay contest in the Junior High History Classes on "Theodore Roosevelt and his Conservation ideals."

The National Wildlife Federation 1959 Conservation Stamps are now available. This committee urges you to purchase these as the sale of stamps enables the Federation to carry on its Conservation projects.

CONSULTING GENEALOGIST

Your Consulting Genealogist has not only been consulted on several occasions from members of Kansas Chapters and given the best help she was capable of, but she has tried to promote the cause of genealogical research. Tried to find at the close of a three year term, if the members over the state had seemed more interested in the work. This does seem to be the case.

There are several causes, of which the splendid work of our Mrs. Kennedy, as Registrar General, has been the first. Mrs. Maude Davis has aided materially in making the time and place for promotion, available. To these fine officers we express real gratitude. The indexing work of the Wichita women in the local library; the added material that has been placed in their library is, and will be, substantial help to the women in our state. DAR MAGAZINE

Corinne Pearson (Mrs. R. W.)

As State Magazine Chairman for the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, I submit the following report to the filst annual Conference.

In July of 1958, I sent cards to the chapter chairmen, asking the number of out of State subscribers in each chapter, trying to determine the possible loss to Kansas, if these subscriptions were credited to the State in which they lived, rather than to the State where they belonged. The replies showed that at least 70 subscribers lived in other States. In September I mailed letters to the chairmen urging them to replace the out of State subscriptions with new ones, who lived in the State. In January I mailed questionnaires to the Chairmen to summarize the year's work. The results were most gratifying. With 63 chapters reporting, we have 849 magazine subscriptions. Of these, 66 were out of State subscribers. If we receive no credit for these it still leaves us with 783 local subscribers. The February report of membership credits Kansas with 3539 members, plus 24 members at large, making Kansas credited Nationally with 3583 members. Even substracting the 66 out of State subscribers, it still leaves us with a 21.5 percent, plus the subscriptions from Courtney Spalding, and Wellington chapters, from whom I have received no reports. So, without a doubt, Kansas must be well over the 20 per cent National goal, and have the largest

number of subscribers ever credited to the State. Forty chapters of our 65 chapters are twenty per cent chapters.

Nine State officers, four appointive officers, 21 State chairmen of National committees, 6 National vice chairmen, 1 National officer, and 275 chapter officers subscribe to the magazine. Fourty four chapters used the magazine in their programs and 48 obtained ads for the National magazine, when the Kansas Historical Map was featured.

It is our sincere regret that no loans have been made the past three years, although the availability of money for loans has been stressed at all times and through correspondence with the Chapters. We are pleased to have inquiry from two students, but their application blanks have not been completed.

Chapter contributions to the State Fund this past year were \$11.50.

It is known that some Chapters have their own loan and/or scholarship funds, but these are not reported to the state chairman.

EISENHOWER MEMORIAL

The Eisenhower Memorial and Museum at Abilene continues to be the major tourist attraction in the State with yearly attendance well over 100,000, including visitors from many foreign countries, including Italy, Iran and Afghanistan, to name a few.

I will repeat again that the Eisenhower Foundation has an insurance policy on the Kansas DAR pylons in the entrance pool for \$16,000, or over \$3,000 on each pylon.

This year the Kansas Society DAR is establishing a permanent maintenance fund of \$2,000 for the perpetual care of our marble pylons, here at this spot dedicated to a great General, and to Veterans of America's Wars—the Gallant, the Beloved and the Remembered. This fund will be in the form of government bonds.

The Eisenhower Memorial is an historical mecca for school children, and we urge you to encourage your schools to take advantage of it. We especially ask that you arrange for older youngsters to visit the Museum—7th, 8th and 9th grades, who will more keenly appreciate the historical significance. Younger pupils come in abundance, thanks to the interest of their teachers, and PTA. Remember Tulip Time is a joy to behold; each year it seems to grow more beautiful, and the Rose Garden is a wonderment.

EL OUARTELEJO

Beulah Chesney (Mrs. Robert H.)

Kansas Society DAR is again engaged in one of the most fascinating historic projects in many years — the excavation, restoration and preservation of the famous adobe pueblo in western Kansas known as El Quartelejo — Built around 1650 by Indians migrating to escape Spanish oppression from what is now New Mexico.

This adobe and stone pueblo was the northermost one ever built in the United States, and has considerable historical significance being approximately 309 years old; something like thirty years after the landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth Rock.

The Indian builders of the pueblo remained in Kansas 20 years before they were persuaded by the Spanish to return to New Mexico. Other Indian tribes occupied the pueblo, but it is said that in 1720 a Frenchman named Iturbi established a trading post in the buildings, founding here the first white settlement in what is now the state of Kansas. The pueblo was later totally destroyed by fire be-

lieved to be an attempt by Apache Indians to check further settlement by the Spanish or their allies.

Of all the bright stars in the Kansas DAR historical firmament, none shine with the ageless luster of these 17th Century Taos Indian pueblo ruins, and their reconstruction will be an outstanding archaeological attraction in Kansas.

Excavations in 1898, which were allowed to drift full again, indicate that the pueblo contained no two rooms of the same size, and that the stone used to construct the two foot thick walls came from neighboring chalk bluffs, and that the walls and floors were plastered with mud.

The side of the pueblo, a 7 room structure lying midway between the north and south boundaries of the Scott County State Park, is on a slight rise near the old channel of what was once called Punished Woman's Ford, or Beaver or Ladder Creek. There is a flowing spring nearby and you can still see the ditch built by the Indians and once used to irrigate their field crops on adjacent flatland.

It was in 1922 that western pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Steele, deeded the five acres with this remarkable site to Kansas DAR, and in 1925 Kansas Daughters raised more than \$1200 to erect a marble shaft inscribed with historic data and the DAR insignia to mark this place.

Thirty-three years later, in June, 1958, an agreement was signed between Kansas DAR, by our Regent, Mrs. Chester Davis, and the Scott County Historical Society. The agreement is for a term of 5 years — the DAR to grant the land and the Historical Society to restore the pueblo, as near like the original as possible, to erect a suitable fence, maintain a road, landscape, and properly care for this historical mecca in a manner appropriate thereto. Failure to do so cancels the agreement. This Spring will see the planting of trees by Boy Scouts, particularly our native tree, the Cottonwood. The Historical Society plans to have Indians from New Mexico assist with pueblo restoration.

El Quarteleo is 12 miles north of Scott City, Kansas.

It was an enchanting sunny afternoon in October when I first saw the site known as El Quartelejo, and the charm and serenity of this valley gave reality for me to that long ago settlement. It cannot be questioned that a valley as beautiful and well-watered as that of Ladder Creek would have been a spot attractive to Indians from the very beginning of the historic period of what is now Kansas. The valley, less than a mile wide, rimmed with high bluffs green with trees and shrubs, has a sense of enclosure and yet not shut in; it afforded easy sentinel protection and a measure of shelter from storms.

More than two centuries later a band of Cheyenne Indians under Chief Dull Knife, fleeing from Reno reservation in an attempt to return to their northern Plains homes, made a stand against United States troops from Ft. Dodge, in a box canyon just outside the present limits of the park. This is recorded as the last battle in Kansas between Indians and U. S. soldiers, and in all history accounts of this skirmish there is mention of the great natural beauty of the place, and that the women and children were hidden in a cave at the closed end of the ravine.

I left El Quartelejo with a feeling of pride in our handsome shaft and this valley of waving grass and countless wheeling birds, and I hoped with all my heart that one day again, as in years gone by, Kansas Daughters would make pilgrimages to this historic spot when the reconstruction is complete.



EL OUARTELEJO SCOTT COUNTY STATE PARK AGREEMENT

This agreement made this 9th day of June, 1958, between The Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, a corporation, acting by its president being thereunto duly authorized, of the first part, and the Scott County Historical Society, of Scott County, Kansas, of the second part, witnesseth:

1. The first party hereby grants unto the second party an easement over, across, and upon the following described property, to wit:

Beginning at the corner stone located in the center of Section Twelve, running south two hundred forty five (245) feet, thence east five hundred fifty (550) feet, thence south sixty (60) feet, thence west five hundred fifty (550) feet, thence north sixty (60) feet, located in the Northwest Quarter (NW¼) of the Southeast Quarter (SE¼) of Section Twelve (12), Township Sixteen (16), Range Thirty-three (33) West of the 6th P.M. in Scott County, Kansas, for the purpose of restoring and rebuilding thereon a historical monument, in its original state, as nearly as possible, of an ancient Indian abode pueblo (1604), erecting a tall and suitable fence, and a road of ingress thereto and egress therefrom, with out expense to the first party, which owns the land.

- 2. The second party shall carefully and safely remove a D. A. R. granite shaft monument now marking the location of El Quartelejo, which is the location of the said pueblo, to a proper and prominent position on said land, plant cottonwood trees where they will enhance this restoration, keep the said structure in good repair, and properly maintain this historical structure in a manner appropriate thereto.
- 3. No concessions other than the sale of Indian jewelry and appropriate souvenirs shall be permitted; and the second party shall complete the said structure and work within 5 years from the date of this agreement.
- 4. If the second party fails or declines to perform this agreement within the time herein specified, this agreement shall be at an end, and all rights of the second party hereunder are hereby cancelled.

In witness thereof, the party of the first part has executed this instrument and affixed its corporate seal the day and year first above written.

FLAG OF THE U.S.A.

Maurine Cruse (Mrs. Charles D.)

Out of 65 chapters in Kansas 62 have chairmen of the Flag of the U.S.A. Committee. Fifty sent in reports. In September the chapter chairmen received from me a letter, a list of flag materials available, and a questionnaire to be answered in January. On Jan. 6 duplicates of the questionnaries were mailed to those chairmen who had not yet sent in their reports.

Although the presentation of flags was not stressed this year

because of the admission of Alaska as a state and the coming change in the flag, 3 chapters presented 16 large flags — to Girl Scout troops, the Y.W.C.A. and as gifts; 7 chapters presented 930 small flags — to naturalized citizens, school children, chapter members and as hospital favors. John Haupt chapter again excelled in this activity in presenting 625 small flags on cupcakes to veterans in hospitals. General Edward Hand chapter presented 47 to hospitals. Eunice Sterling chapter again presented 198 small flags and flag codes to new citizens; 421 flag codes were distributed — James Ross and Mary Wade Strother chapters also presented codes to new citizens; others were given to Scouts, a lodge, chapter members and individuals.

Twenty-four corrections were made in the incorrect display of the flag. Fifty-two flag talks were given, 12 of these by the. Newton chapter chairman to several patriotic organizations.

Twenty-four chapters had an entire flag program, many at special luncheons.

Eleven chapters reported having 48 newspaper items about the flag. Newton chapter reported 18 items. Fort Supply Trail chapter sent me five beautiful items which you will see in the Flag Exhibit.

John Haupt and Eunice Sterling chapters had fine pictures. Look for these too in the Flag Exhibit. Twenty-four chapters put reminders in the newspapers of days for flying the flag; 9 had reminders over the radio or T. V.; 4 reported radio broadcasts and 2 T. V. broadcasts about the flag.

All chapters give the pledge of Allegiance, 72 percent sing the National Anthem, all reported a general display of the flag in the community, but only 65 percent of the members remember to display the flag.

Flag literature was presented to schools, Scouts, new citizens, elder citizens, an orphans' home and to chapter members. Nineteen chapters promote flag raising ceremonies in the schools. Six chapters have compiled scrapbooks — five of them were presented at our last State Conference. Seven chapters had flag exhibits of various kinds.

Additional items of special interest are: Abilene chapter was instrumental in promoting the placing of a flag and pole at the Dickinson County Courthouse; Arthur Barrett chapter had a talk on "Our New Star — Alaska"; Betty Washington chapter joined thirteen patriotic organizations in giving a patriotic tea for the public on Veterans' Day; the chapter's flag display was in advancing the colors: Desire Tobey Sears chapter had a flag display in a store window on Constitution Day; Fort Larned chapter participated in a "Return to the Santa Fe Trail"; Polly Ogden chapter takes part in Memorial Day ceremonies where flags owned by the chapter

are used; Shawnee chapter made corrections in two T.V. programs — one on the proper display of the United Nations flag, the other on flags displayed in table decorations; the chapter also sells flags — 16 sets this year and a 20 ft. steel flag pole; also obtained a film on the flag for a school board.

Each year I have given prizes for a different type of flag activity. This year I have selected flag talks and flag publicity. To Newton chapter, Mrs. John C. Reese, chairmen, a prize of \$5.00 is given for the 12 flag talks she gave to the D. A. R., the Daughters of Union Veterans, the Daughters of American Colonists, and the Huguenot Society.

To Fort Supply Trail chapter, Miss Katherine C. Harper, chairman, a prize of \$5.00 is given for having outstanding flag publicity AND for sending me two copies of each item. I'll have some fine clippings for my national chairman.

I have enjoyed very much being your chairman the past three years. KEEP THE FLAG FLYING!

It was my pleasure to attend the State Conference last March in Topeka and the South East District meeting in Iola.

New Junior Members the past eleven months, 31. Nine papers are pending in Washington, D.C. 16 chairmen and 21 Juniors subscribe to the D.A.R. Magazine while 23 chairmen have a copy of the Handbook. Serving within their chapters were the following: Children of the American Revolution, 7. Good Citizens committee, 9. Approved schools, 6. Radio and TV, 4, and National Defense, 5. 12 report studying all phases of the National Society and the majority stated National Defense is the most widely studied. Individual Juniors served their chapter in the following offices: 1 Regent, 2 Vice Regents, 10 other chapter offices. 44 served on committees and 1 served as a State Officer.

There has been a 67 member increase this year — 55 chapters

MOTION PICTURES

First I wish to express my appreciation to those Chairmen of Motion Pictures who have been doing the good work they have in this Committee.

As a whole my report this year is very disappointing in that we have had a decrease in activities all along the line. I realize that only a small portion of our members attend Picture Shows since television, yet the need is greater than ever to have better films for who do attend.

May I suggest that each Regent in Kansas appoint a chairman for this committee and also see that there is at least one subscription to the Magazine Motion Picture Review and to request the Program committee to allow time at several meetings for the Chairman to report I believe it is very essential for each chapter to

have access to this magazine otherwise the chairman has nothing to guide her in her work.

Lack of time in our meetings can well bring about lack of interest in our Society, unless we can have time to keep our members posted on the work of the D.A.R.

Out of the 65 chapters in the state were 49 Motion Picture Chairmen, to these were sent letters and questionaires and I received 22 replies, but only 15 had anything to report. From this number I can report;

- 6 Chapters gave Motion reports at regular meetings.
- 5 gave a recommended list of best pictures.
- 5 used the Motion Picture Review.
- 16 subscriptions to the magazine were taken.
- 3 used special patriotic or documentary type films.
- 5 teachers made use of our approved films.
- 8 of the subscriptions taken were placed in school or public libraries.
 - 2 or more members were active in Better Film Councils.

A member of Kansas' new Chapter Flores del Sol who is a teacher was chosen among the teachers as the Chairman of Selection, to select all the films to be used in the Wichita schools. A great deal of her time is given to this project, selecting patriotic and educational films and showing them.

This Chairman of General Edward Hand chapter contacted the heads of the City and County Schools requesting them to properly observe Constitution Week, using patriotic and historical films also giving them a list of appropriate films to be used.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

As a great patriotic society we do try to inform not only our members but also the American people of our policies and principles regarding our constitutional republic. PRESS RELATIONS, AND SCRAP BOOK PAGES

Pauline Cowger, reporting for Jean Reser

Thanks so much for your exceptional response to the Decem144 1959 Proceedings, Kansas Society

ber 17 letter. Some had already mailed their scrap book pages to Hamilton, Kansas. They will be inserted in the book as soon as Mr. Reser returns home.

With the 65 chapters in Kansas—there are only nine that did not save their clippings and follow this part of the Society's program. Every chapter did make a reply—and it was heartening to receive the many, many lovely pages, and read of the outstanding Chapter activities, and I do thank those chapters also, for their cards saying they did not make the pages.

William Creekmore put their pages and report of 255 inches in the post office but between Fort Scott and Kansas City there was a mail fire—but enough of the wrapping was salvaged for the post office department to tell us what had happened.

You might ask why a state scrap book? It isn't just an idea of something to do. It is really your history, and every chapter should have its record in the book. These state scrap books are deposited in our DAR Library at Dodge City and are well taken care of. One needs to refer to them often in research. The newspaper items tell your history more completely than does the Regents report in the Proceedings.

There are certain standard rules for scrap books—clipping evenly and carefully along the lines—with the name and address and date of the publication neatly at the bottom of the clipping. Ink. or pen or pencil notations are not in order. And, there should be a well balanced page. Pictures and art work and snap shots, well placed, add to the attractiveness and history but only the press pictures count in tabulations.

The judges were very complimentary. There were five of them, and they counseled, considered and discussed—in deciding winners, and only by the strictest adherence to rules they'd agreed upon, were the final decisions made.

Probably you would like to know something about the judging committee; there was represented, the newspaper, the library, a clipping service, a scrap book hobbiest, and a club woman. Each had her own score sheets and went over the pages separately—and the co-incident is that when they got together, they had selected the same eleven chapters. Then came their problem of which was the best (or which would rank first) etc.

Please examine the book and the winning chapters carefully—profit and improve, so that next year you may be in the top rank. While you're doing that, especially notice the fine full page picture of the Emporia Chapter "Good Citizen," and their "Woman of the Week". And the way the paper lists the date.

One could go on calling your attention to something exceptional

from each Chapter—but I want to talk a little about the winners—and bring to you some of the comments of the judges. They made three classes—instead of the two we've had previously. Those Chapters who had daily papers—those chapters that had only weekly papers—and then those chapters that had access to both daily and weekly papers.

In the Daily—we have two Honorable Mention—Oceanus Hopkins—They have carried out the Colors of the society by pasting each clipping on a blue background, with little white ink trimming around.

And William Wilson—each item is carefully labeled and spaced on their pages, with some nice pictures—but the spacing is block, and one might wonder to which item the date and name of the paper belonged.

Now, Isabella Weldin—third in the Weekly papers did not adhere to the rule of the printed name and date of the paper, there's much white ink writing—but the judges did like the number of nice snap shots of the chapter functions and members.

Topeka—third in the daily class—had exceptional pictures of our Flag of the U. S. A. and news print. It gives a good description of our 1958 state conference, but it was felt there was greater possibility for good page arrangement.

Lois Warner—had very good coverage for one daily and one weekly—and was third in that class.

Desire Tobey Sears had outstanding print for a small town—and a weekly paper, second in weekly but the clippings are not completely pasted down—and can easily be torn. Not practical for use.

You can see from these comments how detailed your judges were, and how carefully they checked to come to their final decision.

Tomahawk has most detailed hand work, beautifully done. Their Chapter name, our insignia, the Eagle, Flag, etc—but some of their clippings are not fully pasted—and there was space on the reverse side of the page. They had dailies—and 5 weekly papers from which to clip. Unusual publicity for a large town. It is second in the Daily—Weekly class.

Peleg Gorton — at Winfield interspersed clippings effectively with appropriate decorations. And, here are photographs of historical markers and plantings they've made. Second in the daily group.

One need only to see the Indian to know which chapter did this work. It is entered by the month.. They had one daily and five weekly papers. The clippings aren't trimmed as neatly nor are the paper dates as uniform as they might be. Shawnee is first in its class—all clippings are completely pasted.

Polly Ogden chapter ranks first in the Daily papers. They have complete news coverage—the clippings are neat and simple, nicely balanced on the page, with adequate margins, and shows fine coverage by one newspaper. There is no artistry whatever.

And we award to Polly Ogden chapter the second place award from the National Society Press Relations Committee for the second best in Kansas—this comes from our National Chairman, Mrs. Olive Burchett.

In the weekly newspapers—Martha Vail Chapter is first. It shows the extent of the DAR Activities of the Chapter as well as in their community. You have a picture of their program, and activities, by reading their clippings.

Martha Vail ranked first of all the chapters—and is presented the First Award of the National Society.

PROGRAM

Miss Edna Wheatley

Thank you, Kansas Officers, for my appointment as program chairman to serve the Kansas Daughters.

I have enjoyed helping you plan successful programs. I have worried with you when the program material has not been available for you to make up your programs and year books, by the first of June. In the past two weeks, I have received the annual program report forms from the National Program Committee, sent

them to you, and have 60 of the 65 questionnaires returned answered. That is cooperation and speed.

Kansas finally has a set of slides and script on a historical subject to contribute to the National project of gathering historical material for the national program files. Mrs. Howard Neumann, Betty Bonney chapter, has produced "From Plowshares to Pylons," from material received about Abilene and the Eisenhower Memorial. The other slides with script will be combined in some way to furnish a story that may meet the requirements of the National Committee.

Fifty-eight of the chapters reporting used the theme "Fruits of Freedom" and fifty-seven published in some form, the outline of programs. These topics caught my eye: "Price of Freedom Rises Every Year," "Thanksgiving Lives Only in the Land of the Free," "Youth Organizations in the Land of the Free," "The Sciences for Some; the Liberal Arts for Many, and Liberty for All," "Churches of Kansas."

Our National Committees contributed their share to the State program, with National Defense and American Music being the most popular.

Many chapters used non-member guests as speakers. I'm sure in most cases these speakers brought valuable information, but let us not use all guest speakers for the years programs. A half dozen hours spent in the library, or a letter to the Kansas Historical Society, or the Extension Department of the University of Kansas, will bring material for members' papers. Research even done in a very small way is valuable to the individual and is appreciated by fellow workers.

Several books came under the survey of Kansas Daughters. Tillie Karns-Newman's book, "Black Dog Trail" ran a close second to the "F.B.I. Story." "The Bending Twig" was discussed in several chapters.

ST. FRANCIS BOYS' HOME

Dorothy Berryman Shrewder (Mrs. R. V.)

Before I begin my report I wish to thank the State Treasurer, Mrs. John M. Feller, for the cumulative report of gifts from chapters and individuals sent to her office for the St. Francis Boys' Homes—and Miss Catherine Harper of Fort Supply Trail Chapter for making the mimeographed copies available to you.

The sustained interest shown in this St. Francis Boys' Homes Committee has been most gratifying and your chairman was very proud when a letter of appreciation came from the Reverend Robert H. Mize, director. The gifts this year represent two thirds of the Kansas Chapters. Our total gift this year was \$550.00 (less 956) and it came without much urging.

Chapter programs have been more numerous than reported as indicated in the annual programs and Chapter Yearbooks received. Special material was sent on request to Courtney Spalding and Wyandot chapters. Four chapters had representatives of the Homes as speakers at meetings.

Shawnee, Dodge City and Fort Supply Trail chapters sent clothing; one member of the last named sent a suit with complete outfit to fit and match—shoes, sox, shirts and ties, underwear and a breast pocket handkerchief. Another member of this chapter is an annual patron and a member of the St. Francis Advisory Council.

Forty one (41) chapters either have chapter chairmen or the regent acting as special agent for this committee.

As a member of the Advisory Council of the St. Francis Boys' Homes, it is your chairman's privilege to attend the meetings of this Council. As it was impossible for her to attend the 1958 Fall Council she was represented by Mrs. Vernon E. McArthur, Uvedale

Chapter and Smoky Hill and Mary Wade Strother Chapters can always be counted on for special contacts and special reporting.

You will be interested in a brief summary of Father Bob's letter, which is in the manner of a report: "I feel the DAR will be most pleased with the renovations that have been completed at Ellsworth. The new kitchen, the renovations in the dining room, the new house mother's quarters and two new rooms upstairs—one for a staff member and an infirmary—with a private bath! Most of the gifts comprising the capital fund that paid for these improvements were very small. I believe the DAR gifts last year (\$491.75) was the largest assigned to this purpose. We are very grateful.

"Knowing the abiding interests the DAR has in the Ellsworth Unit I am wondering if the check this year might be used here. The boys' TV Room with the DAR furnishings of several years ago has been moved to the east of the building, a part of the middle parlor has been diverted to the housemother's use (this is where the old kitchen used to be). We are for the moment without furnishings in the "reception parlor"—which is the portion left of the original parlor in the middle of the building." Of course my reply to Father Bob was "yes." I couldn't help thinking wistfully that had we only known earlier—what a "reception parlor" Ellsworth might have had.

O'Donnell Hall, in which we also have an interest has proven a wonderful addition to the Ellsworth Unit and is used constantly. A class in modern ballroom dancing is taught there weekly for 75 boys and girls from the Homes and the City of Ellsworth. "It means," writes Father Bob, "that St. Francis boys are accepted now in a wonderful way, and this acceptance reflects well in their lives. They are worthy members of Society." This is, of course, the ultimate goal at St. Francis.

Be very proud, Kansas Daughters to have had a part (even so small a part) in the rehabilitation and building program of St. Francis Boys' Homes. Although a **State** program it is nevertheless a potent factor in building good character and good citizens an aim quite in accord with Good Citizenship Programs of our National Society; a real and an intimate part of that program.

As we close the report of this year and this administration may I thank you all; especially our State Regent, Mrs. Davis for her never failing interest and cooperation and for the privilege of service she has made possible for me.

Local Chapters together participated in Constitution Week. The Mayor signed a Proclamation declaring September 17-23 Constitution Week. A display of the Constitution was made in one of Walker Brothers' downtown store windows. The Wichita Eagle printed on its' Editorial page Essays written by two of the winners who participated in the Essay Contest sponsored by the National Defense Council of the local Chapters. The two contestants were presented over Television station KAKE on a twenty-minute interview which was sponsored by the DAR Regents Club of Wichita founded in 1958. The Regents Club also hostessed a Coffee for the non-affiliated Members-at-large.

Contributions in the amount of \$100 were made to the Approved Schools as well as the Indian Schools. \$100 were contributed in September to the Genealogical Records Committee, National Society, DAR for compilation of classified Bibliography of Genealogy and History. 200 Kansas Maps were purchased by the Chapter to be distributed to members and to students in several of the City's Schools. A subscription to DAR Motion Picture Review was renewed for the City Library and, Minisa, in cooperation with the other local Chapters, cooperated in recataloguing and microfilming

the entire collection of Genealogical Records at the City Library. In addition, the Genealogical Committee Chairman prepared and sent a book of genealogical material to Kate Shields, State Chairman, who forwarded one copy to the Kansas State Historical Society and one to the National DAR Library.

Two State Chairmen and the Editor of DAR News are members of Minisa. In August, 1958 Mrs. Blanche Comstock received the appointment of National Vice-Chairman of the Western Disision for DAR Magazine. The Regent attended Continental Congress and presented a report and pictures from the meeting at the May Chapter meeting.

spect the facilities now going up to furnish people in this locality with maximum protection in case of an air attack from hostile nations.

For our approved schools project, the Chapter sponsored the play "Inherit the Wind" at the University of Kansas City playhouse and it netted us \$75 each for Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith, plus 100 pounds of clothing for Tamassee. We are fortunate indeed to have Mrs. Paul R. Greenlease, Kansas State Approved Schools Chairman and national Vice-Chairman of the Western Division of Approved Schools as a member of our Chapter.

Under the able direction of our Program Chairman, Mrs. R. C. Amberson, our theme "The Fruits of Freedom" has been followed closely and enjoyably and has met all requirements of the National Society. We have had a five minute lecture at each meeting on National Defense and are looking forward to the February meeting when our program shall consist of a review of the book "Masters of Deceit" by J. Edgar Hoover.

For our December program, we held a Mother-Daughter tea at the home of Mrs. Paul R. Greenlease, making it as authentically colonial as possible. One of our members spent considerable time in research as to recipes, decorations and customs of that era. It was quite a pleasant experience.

We attended the Shawnee Mission pilgrimage and several of our members assisted in the duties necessary to make this function a success.

The State history map project was completed this year and a total of 1,250 maps were distributed by the Tomahawk Chapter.

We, as a Chapter, are looking forward to making the Gold Honor Roll again this year.

Topeka Chapter, the first chapter organized in Kansas with 26 women now has a membership of 195. Two papers are pending in Washington and 9 women are working on papers. We have lost six members this year, but gained 10.

Topcka women are most interested and active in all the committees of DAR as shown in the following report.

Through the generosity of one of our deceased members, Mrs. Clara B. Lidzy, \$1,000 each was given to Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith Schools. A Memorial Acre was purchased at Tamassee

and a large box of used clothing and household furnishings was sent to each of the schools.

Seven dozen small silk American Flags have been given to the U. S. District Court to be given to the Naturalized Citizens.

Five dollars was sent to St. Marys School for Girls.

We sponsored and presented four certificates and pins to the high school girls in our vicinity who represented their high schools in the Good Citizen Award. The girls and their mothers were our guests at our George Washington Birthday Tea.

We have had eight new subscriptions to the magazine this year, making a total of 51 subscribers, with 26.66 percent of the chapter subscribing.

Fifteen minutes of every meeting is given to the National Defense Chairman for a discussion of the National Defense Literature. Our November meeting was in charge of our National Defense Chairman and the entire meeting was a talk on National Defense by a Major from Forbes Air Base. A donation was made to the National Defense Committee and we cooperate with the Civil Defense programs.

Five dollars was given to the DAR Library for book repairing.

Five dollars was given to the Genealogical Committee.

Two subscriptions to the Motion Picture Review Magazine was placed in the City and the Topeka High School Libraries.

For the past 40 years we have given a \$75 scholarship each semester to a Student at Washburn College. Each year this student is our guest at one of our meetings.

Fifteen dollars has been given to the Endowment Fund.

The transportation committee has been most active securing rides for 15 to 20 women to each meeting. Also to the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and to the District Meetings and State Conferences. Many cars were furnished for transportation last spring during the State Conference.

We are saving our Betty Crocker Coupons and giving them to the CAR Chapter which we sponsor to buy silverware for the Groves Cottage at Tamassee.

Again we supported the Kansas Society Map project and donated maps to each County School in Shawnee County and each city school in Topeka.

Our Americanism Chairman has placed Manuals in English, German and Spanish in the City, Topeka High School, Night School and Washburn College Libraries. Twenty copies have been given

to a Japanese Wives Club and a British Wives Club at Forbes Air Base. Each year over a hundred Manuals are placed in the U.S. District Court to give to those studying for Naturalization. Last spring the District Director of Immigration and Naturalization spoke to us and at the same time we had all the Foreign Exchange Students in Topeka as our guests. This is our plan again this year.

The two Topeka Newspapers have been most generous in giving us 291 and a half inches of publicity with 17 pictures totaling 71 and a half inches.

One radio station has given us spot announcements about our meetings and have taped the speeches of our speakers for future use or interviewed them for ten minutes on the radio.

We have stressed membership this year, and have had an average attendance of 70 or more at each meeting.

In adding our Honor Roll points, we are very happy to have succeeded in accomplishing eleven points for the silver Honor Roll, but our aim is still for the Gold Honor Roll.

Betty Bonney No. 793, organized April 18, 1908. Mrs. Celia Foss Farrar was the first regent. Chapter was named for ancestor of Mrs. Alice Howard Worthly (Albert).

Betty Washington No. 327, oganized October 17, 1896, with 12 charter members by Miss Mary L. Robinson. Named in honor of the only sister of George Washington.

Captain Jesse Leavenworth No. 720, organized October 23, 1905

with 15 charter members by Miss Ruth Johns. Named for a Revolutionary soldier, the father of Colonel Henry Leavenworth who was the founder of Fort Leavenworth.

Concordia chapter organized March 21, 1921 with 18 charter members by Mrs. Ada B. Messal (E. J.)

Council Oak organized December 14, 1925 with 13 charter members by Mrs. Madge Lane Lawrence. Named for the famous old oak beneath whose branches representatives of John Quincy Adams and the chiefs of the Osage Indians met in 1825 and signed the treaty which established the Santa Fe Trail. The "Madonna of the Trail monument is located here.

Courtney Spalding chapter organized April 22, 1926 with 12 charter members by Mrs. Carol Courtney Carter (Jonathan B.) named for Thomas Courtney and Ezekiel Spalding, Revolutionary soldiers, the ancestors of Mrs. Carter and Miss Mary L. Ruppenthal respectively.

Dana No. 1310 organized Dec. 9, 1915 with 26 charter members. Mrs. Ida Baker Jones was the first regent. Named for Capt. William Dana the revolutionary ancestor of Mrs. Parmelia Dana Hord, a charter member, since it was through efforts that the charter was formed.

Desire Tobey Sears, organized December 23, 1923 with 21 charter members by Mrs. Ona Snyder Drake. Named in honor of Desire Tobey Sears because she was called the Mother of Patriots, having had five sons who served in the American Revolution.

Dodge City organized December 15, 1925 by Mrs. Juliet Pettijohn Denious (Jesse C.) Named because of the historical associations of Fort Dodge.

Emporia No. 1067, organized March 30, 1912 with 34 charter members by Mrs. Myrta McKee Ramseyer (J. P.)

Esther Lowrey No. 685, organized on flag day June 14, 1905 with 15 charter members by Mrs. Frances McGill Goodrich. Named for Esther Fleming Lowrey, the wife of Colonel Thomas Lowrey the Revolutionary ancestor of Mrs. Goodrich (Clark H.)

Eunice Sterling No. 287, organized October 21, 1896 with 14 charter members by Mrs. Katherine Sterling Lewis. Named for the wife of Captain Abijah Sterling, the Revolutionary ancestor of Mrs. Lewis.

Ft. Larned No. 1258, organized January 5, 1915 with 14 charter members. Mrs. Josephine Reeser Wickwire (Edward G.) was the first regent.

Named in honor of General Edward Hand who served on Washington's staff—the ancestor of Mrs. Alexina Williamson Davis and Mrs. Jane Williamson Gilley (H. W.) charter members of the chapter.

Phebe Dustin chapter, organized December 19, 1924 with 24 charter members by Miss Marjorie Spaulding. Phebe Dustin the grand-daughter of Mrs. Hannah Dustin was the wife of Daniel Spaulding who served in the French and Indian War and the Revolution.



MEETING OF THE OFFICERS OF KANSAS SOCIETY, DAR

May 10, 1958, Sunflower Hotel, Abilene Kansas

Roll call showed the following present. Regent Mrs. Chester Davis, Vice Regent Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn, Recording Secretary Pauline Cowger, Corresponding Secretary Mrs. Geo. Y. Stewart, Treasurer Mrs. John M. Feller, Registrar Mrs. G. D. Weilepp, Historian Mrs. Robert H. Chesney, Mrs. C. H. Reser, Reporter. Absent were Librarian Mrs. V. L. Durr and Chaplain Mrs. H. B. Gabbert.

Minutes of the previous meeting were not read, in as much as they were printed in the 1958 Proceedings and every one would receive a copy. They had been checked and carried the OK of the state Regent.

Mrs. Davis announced the Kansas advertisiting in the National DAR Magazine exceeded that of any other mid-western state for the past year.

Each officer was asked for her report:

Vice Regent Mrs. Kilbourn announced District Conference dates, and locations and considered suggestions for plans. She had attended Continental Congress and the breakfast for which Congressman Ed Rees of 4 District was host. 41 attended Congress from Kansas and were seated in Sec. C. Is President of the Vice-Regent club of NSDAR.

Mrs. Davis stated Kansas has drawn Table 27 for next years banquet. We have a fair attendance at the meetings, but many of our delegates do not vote for candidates. "Our voting record is poor"—lets strive to improve that.

There was considerable comment and discussion on the Resolutions adopted by the 1958 Continental Congress.

Motion by Mrs. R. H. Chesney that the Executive Officers bring to the attention of the Board of Management some method of studying and considering in our State conference the resolutions for Continental Congress, and that these findings be carried to the national level. Motion seconded by Mrs. Stewart. Carried.

Mrs. Reser raised the question of doing away with the State Reporter, and having only a Press Relations Committee. The decision from discussion was that a State Reporter is needed. One person can serve and function in these two positions.

Standing Rule to be suggested to the By-laws committee. That the Scrap book of each year be turned to the Regent of that administration.

Mrs. Chesney brought the concensus of her Chapter, from discussion in meeting—that it is unfair to all members of the Society

to have Resolutions adopted without careful thought and study and discussion in the chapter.

1500 Historical maps have already been distributed. \$1430.00 receipts from that project at this time. Read comments from many letters of approval and thanks for the maps.

Motion by Mrs. R. H. Chesney that \$1000.00 of this fund be invested in U. S. Government 'G' Bonds to the credit of the Eisenhower fund, in line with the resolution adopted by the State Conference, of establishing a permanent maintenance fund for the DAR Pylons at the Eisenhower Museum. Seconded by Mrs. C. H. Reser. Motion carried.

Considering the request of the Scott County Historical Society, written by J. A. Bogue, also Mrs. Clarence Dickhut, Secretary-Scott City, and Mrs. John A. Boyer, 418 Main Street, Scott City, in their recognizing El Quartelejo.

State Regent Mrs. Davis appointed a committee of Mrs. R. H. Chesney, Chairman, Mrs. Neison Kilbourn, Mrs. Keith Hall of Oakley and Mrs. Chester Davis, to investigate, contact, and discuss the suggestion, and to develop a working agreement with the Scott county group. It would be necessary to inspect the deed, draw a contract of permission for re-construction and many other details.

Mrs. Weilepp, Registrar, reported from March 1, to May 10, 1958. Kansas membership shows 65 chapters.

3529 total membership which is a net gain of 46.

State Regent Mrs. Davis reported Kansas took second place in "Insignia" in the National Society—and a lovely plaque had been forwarded our state Chairman Mrs. Otto Lutes for her "outstanding work and the interest shown".

Also, 31 Chapters in Kansas were on the National Society Honor Roll.

She spoke of some plan whereby our non-resident members might become affiliated with a Chapter where they now live. This would give them the opportunity of attending meetings and taking part in the Society activities. She and the State Membership Chairman will consider this further.

The Records of the Secretary of State, by letter signed by Edward B. Converse, Counsel, show "May 18, 1921, the Daughters of the American Revolution of Kansas was incorporated for 50 years".

Treasurer Mrs. John M. Feller reported—through an error of the State Conference Committee their balance turned to the State Society was only \$5.24. A refund was made of meals paid for a second time—reason for the smaller balance.

Total to date in the Allene Wilson Groves Cottage fund \$777.10. Total balance on the Treasurers books, of all funds \$2991.14.

Pauline Cowger, Recording Secretary, distributed the 1958 Proceedings, and was complimented on the fine work and promptness in getting these in the hands of the officers, chairmen, directors and chapter regents.

A letter was received by our Sate Regent from Mrs. C. W. Hughes, Senior State President, Kansas Society CAR, dated April 5, asking that the Kansas Society DAR return to the CAR Treasurer the money contributed by the CAR to the Eisenhower Fund for a Bas Relief on one of the DAR pylons at the Eisenhower Museum.

Mrs. Fellers-Treasurer was instructed to conform with this request and to send the check immediately.

Also **Resolution** was read from the CAR Board meeting held March 14, 1958 in Topeka, "On motion of Mrs. Earl C. Moses Sr., we shall continue our CAR publication with the DAR News sheet for the next two issues by paying for the printing with money from the DAR fund".

Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn made motion we accept with sincere regret, the resignation of Mrs. H. B. Gabbert as our Chaplain. Seconded by Mrs. John M. Feller. Motion carried. The entire society appreciates Mrs. Gabbert's fine work, and wish her a complete recovery.

Moved by Mrs. Weilepp that the State Regent be authorized to appoint a Chaplain Pro-Tem. Seconded by Mrs. C. H. Reser. Motion carried.

Mrs. Charles D. Cruse of Abilene who had charge of arrangements for the meeting, invited the Officers to attend the meeting of the Abilene chapter which was being held this same afternoon. Lunch was waiting, and the meeting was recessed.

Meeting reconvened—after a delicious luncheon, and thanks to the Abilene Ladies. 1:30 PM.

Meeting was called to order by State Regent Maude Haver Davis. Other members present were Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn, Vice Regent; Mrs. Elmer Huffman, Acting Chaplain; Pauline Cowger, Recording Secretary; Mrs. George Y. Stewart, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. John Feller, Treasurer; Mrs. G. D. Weilepp, Registrar; Mrs. R. H. Chesney, Historian; Mrs. V. L. Durr, Librarian; Mrs. C. H. Reser, Reporter.

The regent had brought from the printers all cuts used in D Λ R publicity and publications and every officer was requested to claim her property.

Business to be considered at the Board of Management meeting was mentioned: The Treasurers report and amounts in the special and general fund; ElQuartelejo contract and progress on that project; New Chapter in process of organization in Goodland; Election of a Chaplain to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. H. B. Gabbert; Election of a Chairman of the Nominating Committee as provided in the by-

laws; Plans for the tour of the district conferences, routes, places to stay and other details.

Meeting was recessed until 8:30 PM in Garden City. And the hospitality of the Wichita chapters of coffee and delicious rolls and a social hour was enjoyed.

8:30 PM, Warren Hotel, Garden City, October 22, 1958

Mrs. Davis told of her general invitation to all of the national candidates on both tickets, telling them the dates of the conference—but assuming no financial responsibility on the part of the state Society. Acceptances have been received from Mrs. Newland, Mrs. White and --Mrs. Eads of Mo.

A summary of the displays at the State Conference was presented by Mrs. Reser—with a Junior Bazaar, Heraldry, Indians, Activity posters and national defense.

Registrar Mrs. G. D. Weilepp told of one of the biggest problems—getting-members-correct-addresses-for-mailing-the-D-A-R-News—and other problems of the Registrar.

The Memorial at State Conference will be in charge of the Chaplain, the Historian and the Registrar, with a special service for our deceased state officer.

The agreement with the Scott County Historical Society for reconstruction of the pueblo—where the first white people in Kansas lived, and where Indians had sought_refuge_was_discussed.. El Quartelejo is a place of historic interest.

The Administration has a policy of visiting different D A R projects. In 1957 the officers visited St. Francis Boys Homes at Bavaria and Ellsworth. This October 1958 they again toured the district conferences and visited El Quartelejo and discussed plans with Secretary Boyer in Scott City.

Meeting was adjourned by motion duly made, seconded and carried.

A tiny fire place on floor one and the wall fundation is very evident. A pilgrimage was also made to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Steele, who had given this wonderful landmark to the State Society. The home is built of rock and in one room is the loom Mrs. Steele had strung and was weaving at the time of her death.

A most interesting aspect is the original irrigation ditch built by these early Indians and first white people on the soil of Kansas. It is still in use and indicative of the awareness of those people to needs and opportunities. The officers then drove to the Lamer Motel for the night in Hays, Kansas.

Friday was the meeting of the Northwest District Conference in Hays. All state Officers except Mrs. Stewart and Mrs. Huffman were present and made reports to the conference. The caravan then drove the 278 miles to Kansas City that evening (leaving Mrs. Reser in Topeka to go on to her home.)

Our State Regent greeted all who were present with appropriate remarks—and thanked the Wichita Chapters for their cooperation, preparation and planning of this meeting, serving the coffee and rolls for the social hour and other details. Mrs. G. Y. Stewart had taken the reservations for the luncheon.

Mrs. J. R. Kennedy (Mary Ainsworth) Treasurer General, and a Honorary State Regent was presented to the group.

In as much as all members had received minutes of the previous Board of Management meeting, printed in the 1958 Proceedings reading of same was dispensed with.

Reports of Officers were called for.

Vice Regent Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn told of working with the Directors and plans for the District Conference which will include a panel by members of the district bringing facts on several of the controversial resolutions passed by the National organization of State Vice Regents.

Acting Chaplain Mrs. Elmer Huffman told of her correspondence with Mrs. Gabbert, and following plans set up by her—of sympathy letters to bereaved families of D A R members. Mrs. Gabbert was deceased Monday October 6, 1958 with a heart attack being the direct and immediate cause.

Corresponding Secretary Mrs. G. Y. Stewart asked all to respond immediately to her inquires, and return all blanks to her, properly filled in.

Recording Secretary Pauline Cowger commented on some of the privileges and joys of that office which included research and contacting chapters, getting data and information to assist a Schilling Air Force Masonic lodge in selecting an appropriate name for their lodge (some man who had given early service to his country).

Treasurer Mrs. John Feller read the detailed report of receipts and disbursements showing the balance of each fund. This report was filed for the Auditor.

Registrar Mrs. G. D. Weilepp asked that care be used in making out application papers that all dates, and names are correct. Also

the need of full and complete addresses for every member so the DAR News will reach them. Membership report showed a total of new, transfer and reinstatements of 92, less dropped, transferred, death and resignation of 87, showing a net gain of 5 with 73 new members admitted at the October Board meeting The total state membership is 3555.

Historian Mrs. R. H. Chesney reported on the Essay Contest by the National Society, in the 5 to 8 grades—recognizing 100 years since birth of Theodore Roosevelt. A picture book on his life has been prepared, cost 35 cents.

Historic maps are still available. This can be continued as a project of the Kansas Chapters, putting them in the schools for years to come. An inquiry about our map has been received from the Bureau of Interior, National Park Service, U S Dept. of Agriculture. Also the place mats of the map pattern are available. The Iowa Society has written an inquiry as to procedure of them making an Iowa Map.

The Santa Fe Trail Markers need care and attention in many instances. Some markers need a new base or relocation—some being in fields and home yards—since our highways have been changed from the locations when the markers were placed.

Anticipating a little overage in the Historic Map fund, this could be expended on the work on the Santa Fe Trail Markers. The Kansas State Highway Commission has been contacted and assure us of their cooperation and assistance in so far as possible.

The El Quartelejo contract with the Scott County Historical Society was considered as the State Society's major project at this time.

Librarian Mrs. V. L. Durr told of the new shelves, the placing of our books from the boxes into a private room, and other cares of our DAR Library in Dodge City. Some 50 or more interested ladies in the Southwest District have organized a genealogical society and desire permission to index our entire library. This permission was granted.

Reporter Mrs. C. H. Reser urged all chapters to send_her_the completed pages for the State Scrap Book. Also to send her by December 10 or before, any items they might have for the DAR News, including the "Chatter" column.

State Regent Mrs. Chester Davis read her report, including the agreement with the Scott County Historical Society for the care and reconstruction at El Quartelejo.

March 21 at the invitation of the State Regent of Mississippi, I was a guest hostess at the beautiful ante-bellum home 'Rosalie'.

Because of the resignation of Mrs. H. B. Gabbert our State Chaplain—due to her health—Mrs. Elmer Huffman was appointed to fill the vacancy until the fall meeting of the State Board of Management when a state Chaplain will be elected.

Mrs. Blackburn, Junior American Citizens state chairman resigned and Mrs. J. C. Woolley formerly chairman of Community Service was appointed to act as Chairman. The work of Community Service Committee was discontinued by action of 1958 Continental Congress.

It is with sadness in our hearts that we report the death of our dear Bertha Gabbert, former State Chaplain. She has served our state and national Society long and well. Her passing leaves a vacant place against the sky.

To date year books of 51 chapters have been received. Probably the others will be received soon.

I want to thank the Chapters of the northeast district—our general chairman and co-chairman and their workers for the well planned 1958 state conference.

Thanks to the Regents of the Wichita Chapters who are again acting as hostesses for this meeting and to the women of Dellrose Church for the delicious luncheon they serve us today, and for the privilege of holding our meeting in this church.

It has been a privilege and a rewarding experience to serve the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution as your Regent. A complete itinerary report will be included in the report to the State Conference, and for the 1959 Proceedings.

Mrs. J. R. Kennedy, Registrar General was asked to speak. She told of progress made in that office and processing of papers for membership. Some of their problems were mentioned—and the need of carefully giving all requested information.

The immediate need in that department is a classified bibliographical index which will cost at least \$5000.00 and contributions are being asked for, from individuals and from Chapters, so this work can go forward immediately.

Mrs. Kennedy commented on a booklet 'Information for Registrars' which is available from the national office for the asking, without cost. And the printing of a handbook titled 'Is That Lineage Right' giving information and helpful hints in genealogical research at cost of 50 cents a copy.

Mrs. R. H. Chesney made the motion that the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution allocate \$200.00 for the classified bibliography index, honoring Mary Ainsworth Kennedy, such money to be taken from the State Genealogical fund. Motion

seconded by Mrs. Frank Blaser. Standing vote taken. All present stood. Motion carried.

Honorary State Regent Mrs. R. V. Shrewder was called on and made appropriate general remarks. It was her suggestion that the State Recording Secretary send notes to Mrs. W. H. von der Heiden—who had been in a bad auto accident early this year and is now home in Newton; and to Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick whose husband is quite ill.

Next in order of business was the election of a Chaplain filling the unexpired term of Mrs. H. B. Gabbert. The State Regent read from Section 3, Article VII of the by-laws governing such a situation.

Nominations were called for. Mrs. Elmer Huffman, 102 S. Pinecrest, Wichita was nominated. Other nominations were called for, but there were none.

Mrs. R. W. Peasons made the motion that in as much as there was only one nominee, that the nominating ballot be the elective ballot. Mrs. G. D. Weilepp seconded the motion. Motion carried, and Mrs. Huffman was declared elected.

Mrs. Davis read the provisions of Article IV, Section 4 of the By-laws of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution regarding the election of a nominating Committee for the selection of nominees for office to be presented to our State Conference in February 1959.

Mrs. G. D. Weilepp nominated Mrs. Clair Lindahl of Clay Center to represent the State Board of Management.

Mrs. B. E. Smith nominated Mrs. Frank Blaser. Mrs. Blaser stated it was not possible for her to serve and asked that her name be withdrawn.

There were no other nominations and on motion duly made, and seconded, the nominating ballot was declared the elective ballot. All in favor stood. No one stood when the opposed vote was called for. Motion carried. Mrs. Lindahl was declared elected.

Our State Regent commented about the weight of the poles on which our state Flags are attached in Washington, and the need of an aluminum pole of lighter weight. These poles cost about \$20.00. Investigation will be made and decision at our February meeting.

We were reminded by the State Regent of the need for pages at our State Conference and at Continental Congress, and of members to serve on the House Committee at Continental Congress.

Reports of State Chairmen were called for and they gave their reports in order, as previously listed.

Question was asked Mrs. Hughes of the kind of coupons wanted

by the CAR. Answer—any General Mills coupons. None that have a partial cash payment.

Insignia—reported the Northeast and the Southwest Districts are 100 percent in Chapter Chairmen. We need only 3 more—2 from the Northwest and 1 from the Southeast to make the state 100 percent. Wear our D A R Insignia. The only thing that comes above the Insignia is your highest office designation. Then, if you have supplemental bars, they are attached to another ribbon and fastened below the insignia. Send all orders for bars direct to Caldwell. They check with our Registrar General. There was considerable discussion on the proper way to wear the insignia and bars.

Mrs. Shrewder commented that the St. Francis Boys Home is a state project and any gifts of cash or materials are gratefully received. 82 percent of the cost of operation comes from voluntary contributions. This is an organization for the rehabilitation of boys. Father Bob Mize, or some member of his staff will be glad to speak at any chapter meeting on the work of the Home.

State Regent Mrs. Davis commented that it was a real inspiration to hear from the Chairmen, and the things done.

Mrs. G. Y. Stewart reported a guarantee had been given the church ladies of 50 for the luncheon and as of that moment they were 13 short. What was the pleasure of the group in taking care of this shortage. Mrs. Stewart moved that the Treasurer be authorized to take care of any balance deficit for the luncheon. Mrs. G. D. Weilepp seconded the motion. Carried (check of \$22.75 was authorized.)

Announcement was made by our State Regent of appointment of two new National Vice-Chairman from Kansas. Mrs. Paul Greenlease has been appointed National Vice Chairman of Approved Schools for the Western Division, and Mrs. Blanche Comstock as National Vice Chairman of Magazine in this Division.

Kansas has been re-zoned and will, after the 1959 Continental Congress, be in the South Central Division, of Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma.

Motion by Mrs. R. H. Chesney that the Board of Management, Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution go on record as approving the working out of a plan of cooperation with the Kansas State Highway Commission, to permanently and properly maintain the Santa Fe Trail Markers across Kansas. Motion seconded by Mrs. R. E. Harrouff. Motion carried.

Suggestion was made that in some way the subscription of our D Λ R Magazine be included in our national dues so every member of the Society would receive her copy. With 185,000 members there should be more subscriptions than only 3500. A magazine in the hands

of every member would increase its desirability for advertising, also.

Our State Regent told of information given at the October National Board of Management meeting where the cost of each subscription is really \$4.00, but only \$2.00 is still being charged as it was in 1892. The size of the magazine is to be enlarged to $8\frac{1}{4}$ x11½ inches, which will be a savings in paper costs.

Mrs. Elbert Naugle told of the Wichita Chapters Regents Club of which she is the President this year. They meet once a month and discuss general problems and cooperation.

Mrs. Davis, State Regent, told of the work being done at Goodland, and a new Chapter is in the process of organization there.

Each officer, director and chairman will please have a file of her duties and of her activities to pass on to her successor. This file to include explicit records and directions of her work.

Mrs. Elbert Naugle, a members of a committee of three, Mrs. Harrison, Mrs. Farmer and herself, appointed by the Chapter Regents Club to study the Scholarship Loan Fund and to consider the use of those funds—commented on their findings.

As previously reported, two members were in agreement and one member dissented—that from the \$4000.00 now in the fund, the majority of this Committee desires to take the interest and use it as a scholarship.

This money was given by the Chapters for student work, and the using of the interest would not be dissipating the original fund—but would be using the interest.

No action was taken.

Meeting recessed for Lunch \$1.75 each—served in the basement of Dellrose Church by the ladies of that church. A guarantee of 50 luncheons had been given the ladies.

At the luncheon tables, after the meal reports were given by the three District Directors present. Each invited and urged our attendance at all the district meetings, planned for the next few days.

There being no further business at hand, the meeting was adjourned. The next meeting will be February 1959 at the time of the State Conference.

Meeting was called to order by State Regent Mrs. Maude Davis. Others present were Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn, Mrs. Elmer Huffman, Pauline Cowger, Mrs. George Y. Stewart, Mrs. John Feller, Mrs. G. D. Weilepp, Mrs. R. H. Chesney, Mrs. V. L. Durr, and Mrs. Joe MacConkey. Mrs MacConkey is Editor of the DAR News

The proposed revision of the By Laws of the Kansas Society was discussed.

Mrs. Davis asked that officers give reports, and comments on their activities.

Mrs. R. H. Chesney—Historian presented the thinking of several—that all officers have a two year term— with a State Conference every other year, and district meetings in the alternate years—and the Proceedings be issued after the State Conference every two years; but the Board of Management would hold its regular meetings.

Mrs. Kilbourn moved that Mrs. Chesney present this to the Board of Management meeting Monday for its consideration. Seconded by Mrs. Huffman. Motion carried.

In as much as the Parliamentarian Mrs. Paul Kent will not be in attendance at the meetings this year the State Regent asked for suggestion for acting Parliamentarian.

Mrs. Chesney commented that the National Society has available a set of 36 slides of our National Museum at cost of \$10.00. It might be well for the State to own such a set, and lend them to our Kansas Chapters.

The Eisenhower Memorial Committee is a Permanent Committee of the Kansas Society with members Mrs. R. H. Chesney, Mrs. Chester Davis, Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn, Mrs. J. Randolph Kennedy and Mrs. E. F. Abels.

El Quartelejo is a permanent Committee of the Kansas Society, with members Mrs. R. H. Chesney, Mrs. Chester Davis, Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn.

This is considered the State Society's major project at this time. Mrs. Chesney reported that progress had been made with the Santa Fe Marker inspection. In 1949 all the markers were checked and conditioned. At this date markers in three counties have been checked, Osage, Douglas and Johnson. She suggested any overage in the Map Fund go into a Santa Fe Markers Fund—and it be used for reconditioning and upkeep of the markers, with the State Highway Commission assisting as they can, and that there be a permanent Committee for the Santa Fe Trail Markers.

Mrs. Chesney was asked to present to the Board of Management meeting on Monday— a plan for the Santa Fe marker now in the center of a wheat field, near Bellefont.

In discussion, it was felt that the State Society should have a permanent book in which to place the pictures of all markers in Kansas and the Historian be authorized to buy such a book and place therein such pictures with markers.

Mrs. Walter J. Keeler of Lawrence has asked for cooperation of the eastern Kansas Chapters near the Kaw River—in placing a marker at the Moses Grinter House—marking the first ferry crossing the Kaw River.

Mrs. V. L. Durr, State Librarian displayed one of the recently re-bound books of our Library, comparing it with another not yet bound but in similar condition. They hope to rebind some 10 to 15 books this year—cost about \$1.50 each.

She presented figures and information of Insurance on the books, manuscripts, etc., in the Library. In as much as no insurance has ever been had previously there is no guide as to possible amounts, costs, etc. She advised an Installment policy plan.

Extra copies of DAR News and Proceedings of previous issues were passed by the State Regent—members to take the one they desired.

Mrs. Kilbourn commented—when any one accepts the office of vice-regent it should be with the understanding that she would be Regent the next term. It gives the Vice-Regent the opportunity of using her ofice as a training program for Regent. In some places the vice regent is really the regent elect.

Mrs. Davis read a letter from Miss Markle, Regent of Rhoda Carver Barton chapter and their difficulty in getting any member to take the regency of the chapter. Several members of the Committee expressed willingness to go to Fredonia on March 20 to meet with the Chapter and see what could be worked out.

Our State Regent, Mrs. Davis has been invited to be a hostess at Rosalie—for the Natchez Pilgrimage, on March 20.

An invitation was read— for members to attend a luncheon in Kansas City February 23 and to hear Mrs. Ray L. Erb, National Society Defense Chairman to speak that afternoon on "Arise and Conquer".

Considering content of the Proceedings—it was the Committee's thought that the talk of the President General Mrs. Allene Groves would be the only one included, and reports would be kept to the time word limitation.

Mrs. G. D. Weilepp, Registrar reported a net gain of 71 members this past year, to date.

Mrs. John Feller, Treasurer read report, and presented the Auditors report.

Meeting adjourned.

MEETING OF STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution Osage Hotel, Arkansas City, Monday, February 16, 1959

Meeting was called to order by State Regent, Mrs. Chester Davis at $10:00\ A.M.$

Invocation by Chaplain Mrs. Elmer Hufman.

Mrs. Davis extended Greetings and welcome.

Mrs. Garland Ferrell was appointed to serve as Parliamentarian at this meeting.

Minutes of the October 22, 1958 Board of Management meeting were read, and declared approved.

Reports of Officers were called for.

Mrs. R. H. Chesney told of progress made in inspection of the Markers on the Santa Fe Trail by the State Highway Commission—but of the need of some funds for repairs and up-keep. Inspection of markers in Osage, Johnson and Jackson county has been made.

She moved that the State Board of Management recommend to our state Conference that all monies over and above complete payment of \$2409.42 for the 25000 Kansas Society DAR Historical maps and postage, be allocated for the permanent care and reconditioning of the Santa Fe Trail markers across Kansas, in cooperation with the State Highway Commission. Seconded by Mrs. A. L. Comstock of Topeka. Motion carried.

Mrs. Chesney told of a situation of a marker being in the center of a wheat field near Bellefont, Kansas—and those people desired its removal.

She moved that the Santa Fe Trail Marker in the western Kansas farm wheat field be moved, as requested, to a place suitable to the marker inscription—either on a country road adjacent to the Herman farm or on Highway U S 50 near Bellefont. Seconded by Mrs. Ralph Ralston, Wichita. Motion carried.

Mrs. Chesney told of action of the Executive Committee authorizing the purchase of a suitable book in which to place pictures—with brief comment, of all the different historic markers in Kansas placed by DAR Chapters and members.

Mrs. J. Randolph Kennedy (Mary Ainsworth) Registrar General was introduced and greeted the members.

Mrs. Kennedy moved that the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution send a check of \$15.00 to pay for the new aluminum flag pole for the Kansas Flag at our National head-quarters. Seconded by Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn of Sterling. Carried.

Mrs. V. L. Durr, Librarian explained that the state never had carried any insurance on the DAR State Library books, manuscripts, etc. She had investigated costs and it seemed an installment policy most fitting—but needed authorization and also the amount of insurance to take.

She displayed one of the books that needs re-binding, and a book that had been re-bound costing \$1.50. There are a number of books needing such care but very little funds in the Library account.

After discussion—

Mrs. Durr moved that the Kansas State society place \$2000.00 insurance on our property in the Dodge City Library. Motion seconded by Mrs. A. L. Comstock of Topeka. Motion carried—with no dissenting vote.

Members were reminded that a list of all books in the Library had been sent to the Chapter Librarian three years ago, and that they had been informed of additional books, through the Librarians report in the Proceedings. All members are urged to consult the list and borrow the books they desire.

Routine reports were made by other officers, all being present at the meeting.

Revision of the by-laws printed copy has been sent to all Chapters, complying with the by-laws, and will be presented and considered at the State Conference. Complying with the laws of the state of

Kansas, for corporations, it will be necessary that a Resident Agent be named for the Kansas Society.

Committee reports were given of American Indians, American Music, Approved Schools, C A R, D A R Magazine, D A R Magazine Advertising, Flag of the United States of America, Insignia, Junior Membership, Membership, D A R Museum, Program, St. Francis Boys Home, Kansas Luncheon.

Mrs. R. V. Shrewder, Chairman St. Francis Boys Home stated that the total of gifts from Chapters this year is \$550.00 and it would help if it could be spent for furnishings in the Reception room and parlor of the Ellsworth home. We are pleased at the fine coperation and contributions to this project.

Mrs. Frank Blaser **moved** that the Chairmen use her discretion in expenditure of the money contributed. Seconded by Mrs. W. C. Harbin, Arkansas City. Carried.

Mrs. L. H. Kessler of Prairie Village announced the luncheon—and afternoon meeting on February 23 in Kansas City at which Mrs. Ray L. Erb, National Defense Chairman would speak—her topic being "Arise and Conquer". The Mission Hills Chapter is bringing Mrs. Erb to Kansas City.

32 Kansas Chapters were represented in this Board meeting—and Chapter Regents were asked for comments or questions.

Mrs. Naugle had been appointed as one of a three member committee by the Chapter Regents Club to investigate our Student Loan Fund- and recommend ways in which it might be put to use. Mrs. Naugle spoke on this question to the Board of Management, asking for their study and consideration of using this as a Scholar ship fund—thereby giving more people the opportunity of service from it.

There was considerable discussion by Mrs. Lutes, Leavell, Blaser, Greenlease, Stansbury, Kennedy, Shrewder, and others but no action was taken.

Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn asked Mrs. Kennedy to take the chair, and moved that this Board recommend to the State Conference, that the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution endorse Maude Haver Davis our State Regent, as candidate in 1960 for the office of Vice President General. Seconded by Mrs. Weilepp, Mrs. Greenlease and several others. Motion carried with no opposing vote.

Mrs. Davis thanked the members for considering her for this

PROGRESS ACCOMPLISHMENTS-1956-1959

Historical Map of Kansas material collected, was printed, and distributed—25,000 copies, was probably the most outstanding tangible accomplishment. Place mats of this map are also available.

Information of all work carried out by each officer was communicated to all the other state officers by copies of letters—which gave coordinated information.

A caravan of State officers attended the district meetings with each officer attending an average of three meetings each year—and some were present at all four meetings, and the State Board of Management preceding the first district meeting. On each of these trips some DAR special activity or shrine was visited—including Eisenhower home and Museum in Abilene, St. Francis Boys Home at Bavaria, and El Quartelejo in Scott County.

Plans were formulated, and invitation accepted of the Dodge City Library, to house our DAR State Library in a private room at that place. And, for the first time, Insurance has been placed on our Library books and Manuscripts. A project of repairing and rebinding the books has been started, hoping all those needing attention may have it within the coming year. Any scrap books previously prepared—and the three Press Relations books of this administration are to be kept in our DAR Library. Forty-eight new additions made, several of these include up to 20 volumes.

Took action requesting continuance of the Huron Cemetery in Kansas City, Kansas as it is now, to maintain its identity and historical value.

To encourage better attendance at Board of Management meetings, they were held in Wiehita. In addition. State officers meetings were held at least three times each year for planning the work of the Kansas Society—and bringing more effective results.

Pilgramages were held at Shawnee Mission each Constitution Day. The properties of the Kansas Society were inventoried and recorded. The dishes and cases were washed, the furniture arranged—and a general good cleaning given the rooms. The pictures of the State Regents had been placed in storage from the walls—by order of the Kansas State Historical Curator; The State Society purchased

an adequate and appropriate album in which all these pictures will be placed—to be kept at the Old Shawnee Mission Museum.

Two new Chapters were organized—Flores del Sol and Mission Hills and a third, at Goodland, Kansas, is in the process of getting their members papers in form. No chapters disbanded over this period.

There was a complete revision of the by-laws of the State Society.

Amended the state Charter to read, Kansas State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and its purposes and activities more nearly in line with present day procedures. The time of incorporation extended for 50 years—to May 18, 2021. A resident agent was selected—and said information filed with Shawnee County Registrar of Deeds, as well as our Secretary of State.

Concentration of effort and promotion of our own two schools brought rewarding results. For the first time, Kansas Society State Conference was visited by the heads of our two DAR Schools—Kate Duncan Smith, and Tamassee. And total gifts from Chapters were increased. A sizable pledge was made to Allene Wilson Groves Cottage at Tamassee which has been paid in full, and additional amonuts given. Increased interest and pledges have been made to DAR approved schools, and to the State project, St. Francis Boys Home.

State Chairmen were appointed for all national committees and they have been active in their departments. The Honor Roll attainments of the Chapters this past year have grown to 46—a very high percentage. For the first time we've had an Insignia Chairman and she won national recognition for the outstanding reports and results.

This 1959 Kansas Society won first prize for the largest increase in subscriptions to the DAR magazine, in states having 3000-3500 membership.

Kansas listed on the National Librarians Honor Roll for the past two years with Librarians in every Chapter. The State Honor Roll Chairman also reported 100 per cent Chairman in our Kansas Chapters.

The State Regent invited and served in March 1958, and invited for March 1959, at the Natchez Pilgrimage, as guest hostess at the lovely home Rosalee.

Purchased a new aluminum stardard for our Kansas Flag at Continental Congress.

Special Emphasis was placed upon marking historic places in the state. Authorization for purchase of a book in which pictures of all markings—with a brief description, made by each Chapter in Kansas through the years, and this program to be continued in the future.

An agreement was made with the Scott County Historical Society for the restoration of the Pueblo of El Quartelejo in Scott County—and its upkeep. Also preservation of the monument which the DAR had previously erected there. The deed to this 5 acres of DAR property, originally a gift of Mr. and Mrs. Steel, is in the Archives file of the Kansas State Society DAR, in the Kansas State Historical Society.

The Archives file of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, in the Kansas State Historical Society was inventoried. Standing rules made for filing and content, and persons eligible to the key. The two New Chapters organization papers have been placed therein. There is a complete file of the DAR News of this administration. The State Conference Proceedings from the time of issue are complete in this file—and hand written minutes of State Conferences prior to the time of printing the proceedings are filed there.

Approval was given for the working out of a plan—in cooperation with the State Highway Commission of permanently and properly maintaining the Santa Fe Trail Markers across Kansas.

The file of the Proceedings at the Kansas State Historical Society is complete.

The file with the State Recording Secretary is complete, except for two copies, 1934 & 1935.

The Mission Hills Chapter received first prize in the National Society for the greatest increase in membership.

Thirty-six slides in a case, of our DAR National Museum have been purchased, and are available for loan to any chapter in Kansas.

Two-hundred dollars gift was made to the bibliographical index fund in the Cenealogical department of the Registrar Cenerals office, from our Kansas Genealogical fund. And many chapters have contributed most generously to this national project.

The Registrars new duty was the mailing list of the DAR News. It's been a great satisfaction for the chapters cooperation to decrease the number of wrong addresses for members, so the NEWS reaches them promptly.

The CAR is increasing in numbers and interest and effectiveness.

There is a new Junior membership in Kansas, and their participation in the Chapter functions. And the adult membership has increased correspondingly. Our membership March 1, 1956 was 3485, with some loss the first year which had to be overcome and the total February 1, 1959 is 3559.

To our National DAR Museum—gift of beautiful old quilt, hand quilted with linen thread spun from the flax grown on their farm. Given by Mrs. C. F. Eckelman.

REPORT

Senior State President, Kansas Society, C. A. R.

The Senior State President of Kansas Society, C. A. R., submits the following report which covers our activities from May, 1958, to March 1, 1959.

Over five thousand miles have been spent by the senior president in travel, attending local, state, regional, and national meetings. Letters and bulletins by the hundreds have been mailed from my desk, and my dividends from the telephone company have gone back to them in the form of long distance calls, telegrams, etc. Final statistics are not available as yet but a preliminary check shows that Kansas has made a definite gain in C. A. R. membership over last year's record.

Kansas was proud to be host for the Regional Conference, held in Great Bend last August, 1958, at which time our own Davis Hughes, National Vice-president, was presiding officer. At this regional conference, Barbara Bristol, of Meade, Kansas, our State President, was chosen to represent our region in the National Oratorical Contest in Washington, D. C., in April, 1959. Her subject is, "What C. A. R. Means To Me." It was our distinct pleasure to have as our honored guests at Great Bend, David H. Kember, Jr., National president of C. A. R., Mrs. John W. Finger, Senior national president, Mrs. John W. Roberts, Senior National Vice-President, and Mr. John Turrentine, National Vice-president General, S. A. R. Mrs. Earl C. Moses, Sr., Honorary National vice-president, acted as general chairman for the conference. Many other national member and senior officers were also in attendance.

A new society, El Quartelejo, was organized in Garden City. The Kanza Society at Stafford was disbanded. One new society, at Douglass, is in process of organization. Memberships in the active societies have shown a decided gain.

Our State paper, The Sunflower, has been published in three issues of the D. A. R. News. Our State Flag Chairman has presented an American Flag, with standard, which is to be known as the "Traveling Flag" and is to be presented at each annual state conference to the Society deemed the most outstanding in the state on the basis of the National merit award tally sheets

During Patriotic Education Week, October 19-26, 1958, many societies made a special effort to bring this theme to the attention of their local cities by means of proclamation by mayors, window displays, radio and TV announcements, and the use of stickers for mailing.

Clothing, games, jewelry, and financial aid were sent to St. Mary's Indian School for Girls. Over 3,600 coupons were sent to the Tamassee D. A. R. School by the state of Kansas. Buffalo Society, of Dodge City, sent over 950 coupons this year. Financial support was given to our national projects such as Gadsby's Tavern, The Museum, the Frigate Constitution, and Kate Duncan Smith School.

The southwest area of the state has been especially active during the past year. They held an area Christmas Tea Dance—the second annual affair at which attendance was doubled over the previous year. A new feature this year has been the inauguration of intercity exchange meetings of local societies.

Kansas C. A. R. was especially pleased and honored to have as their guest at the Annual C. A. R. Breakfast, February 17th, 1959, Mrs. Frederic Groves, President-General of the D. A. R., who graciously gave us the message. Greetings were read from the National president of C. A. R., David H. Kemker, Jr., Mrs. John W. Finger, Senior national president of C. A. R., Mrs. John Turrentine, S. A. R., and other national officers and members. Favors for the Breakfast were furnished by the Rebecca Moore Odell Society, at Great Bend, and Buffalo Society, at Dodge City.

Our Fourtheenth Annual State Conference will be held in Wichita, March 20-21, 1959. Mrs. Roy Beck is General Conference Chairman.

Kansas has been exceedlingly honored in the appointment of two of its members as pages at National Convention in Washington this year. Lynn Moses, of Great Bend, will assist Mrs. Finger, and "Tinker" Hughes, of Dodge City, will serve as personal aide to David. H. Kemker, Jr. Your senior state president will serve as co-chairman of the National Committee for Exhibits, and one of our Kansas boys, H. A. Davis Hughes, of Dodge City, has been placed in nomination as National Assistant Organizing Secretary.

H. A. Davis Hughes, National Vice-president, presented a Charter to the Sunflower Society, of Wichita. Charter members, Elizabeth Ferrell and Billy Ainsworth, received the Charter with Larry Woodruff, president of the Sunflower Society. of Daughters of the American Revolution of Kansas Filed; May 18, 1921.

CHARTER

Undersigned citizens of the State of Kansas, do hereby voluntarily associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private corporation under the laws of the State of Kansas, and do hereby certify;

FIRST: The name of this corporation shall be The Daughters of the American Revolution of Kansas.

SECOND: That this corporation is organized not for profit and that the purposes for which it is formed are: To perpetuate the memory of the men and women who aided in achieving American Independence in the Revolutionary War; to cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American liberty and foster patriotism and love of country: to preserve historic landmarks; to acquire and hold title to Historic spots which it desires to preserve; to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

THIRD: That the place where its business is to be transacted is at Topeka, Kansas.

FOURTH: That the term for which this corporation is to exist is Fifty Years.

FIFTH: That the number of directors of this corporation shall be three, and the names and residences of those who are appointed for the first year are:

SIXTH: No goods, chattels, lands, stock, etc.

RESOLUTION TO AMEND CORPORATE CHARTER

Whereas, it now appears to the Kansas Society of The National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, that its present corporate charter does not meet the needs of the Kansas Society at the present time and that said charter should be amended.

Now therefore, be it resolved by the Sixty-first Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, that its present charter be amended as follows:

FIRST: The Name of the corporation is THE KANSAS SOCIETY of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the DAUGHTERS of the AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

SECOND: The location of the principal place of business in this State is Kansas State Historical Society.

THIRD: The location of its Registered Office in this State is Memorial Building—Jackson Avenue, Topeka.

FOURTH: The name and address of its Resident Agent in this State is Miss Alberta Pantle.

FIFTH: This Corporation is organized NOT for profit, and the objects and purposes to be transacted and carried on are:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.
- (4) This corporation shall have power to receive title to real and personal property by gift, devise, bequest or pur-

chase; to own, hold, sell, convey, lease and re-lease, let and sub-let real and personal property; and to manage, invest, re-invest or disburse the funds that may accrue from the holdings of such property in the manner provided by the By-Laws of The Kansas Society as now constituted or as hereafter amended. This corporation shall have the power to lend any surplus funds it may have on hand at any time and to enforce the collection thereof in any manner provided by law. This corporation shall have the power to sue and be sued.

No officer, director or member of this corporation shall be individually liable for the obligations of the corporation.

These Articles may be amended in any manner that shall be ordered by vote of the members of the corporation at any annual State Conference of The Kansas Society. This corporation shall have such other authority as may be provided in the By-Laws of the Kansas Society, not in contravention of the provisions of this Charter or the laws of the State of Kansas.

This corporation shall not have authority to issue capital stock.

SIXTH: The elected officers of The Kansas Society shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation, and shall be the managers of the business of the corporation and shall hold, manage and control all property of the corporation.

The members of The Kansas Society and all persons who shall hereafter become members, who are in good standing under the By-Laws of said Society, shall be members of this corporation.

SEVENTH: The term for which this corporation is to exist is ONE HUNDERD YEARS.

EIGHTH: The number of Directors shall be TEN.

BY-LAWS

of the

KANSAS STATE SOCIETY NATIONAL SOCIETY OF DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II

Objects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American

Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of know ledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section 1. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a Chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the Chapter: name of Chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Reporter.

Section 2.

(a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a Chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a Chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No State officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office. An officer who has served more than half a term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office. A member of the

National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be ineligible for any other state office except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent until the expiration of at least one year.

- (b) A Chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same Chapter.
- Section 3. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.
- Section 4. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by the State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.
- Section 5. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitaed from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V

Nomination and Election of Officers

- Section 1. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National Officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall elect.
- Section 2. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.
- Section 3. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, im mediately after November first, to notify all Chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The Committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State. Additional nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained.

Section 4. The report of the nominating committee shall be

sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State officers and State chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Endorsements for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the chief executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these bylaws and shall be ex-officio a member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and a Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairman of the National Committees and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Section 3. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office.

Section 4. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5.

(a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of

State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents, and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than three years.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all Chapters in each District and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen, the Regent of each Chapter in good standing and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall also notify the state officers and delegates of any special meeting that may he called She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and of the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of June, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the various Chapters. made into a directory form. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each chapter Regent a list of the newly elected state officers with their addresses.

Section 7. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State Conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, the amount to be fixed and the expense to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds, and shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and

shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each Chapter on February first.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members-at-large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; address; date of admission to the National Society; national number; name and rank of ancestor and state in which he served, and name of Chapter. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceding year. In recording a transfer, both the date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society, or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution: When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location. In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have the supervision of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library.

Section 11. The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the Kansas Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be chairman of the State Press Relations Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D.C.

Section 12. Each officer and Committee chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them when transferring them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

ARTICLE VII

Meetings

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the entertaining District.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the State; the Honorary Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or alternate and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates must have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and must be in good standing.

Section 5. The number of delegates to which a Chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society, on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

- (a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates.
- (b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members, Regent and five delegates.
- (c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Section 6. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, a typed list of the delegates and alternates, signed by the Regent and Treasurer of the Chapter, shall be sent to the State Regent, the State Corresponding Secretary and the chairman of the Committee on Credentials for the State Conference. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 7. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days' notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be the delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 8. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be Chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII

State Board of Management

Section 1. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent of each Chapter in the State.

Section 2. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall following the regular meeting of the National Board of Management and preceding the District meetings; the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting mem bers of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX

Executive Committee

Section 1. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three of its members. Ten days' notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X

Finance

Section 1. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January 31st.

Section 2. The annual state dues of a Chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.35 for each member of the Chapter, payable in advance. These dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. On January fifteenth, the State Treasurer shall notify chapters whose dues are in arrears. A chapter whose dues are unpaid shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the

State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess chapters to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Necessary expenses of the State Officers and State Committees shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing and approved by the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

ARTICLE XI

Committees

Section 1. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and five members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget, as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. This committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the Society.

Section 2. The Student Loan Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the Kansas DAR Student Loan Fund. This Fund is maintained by contributions from Chapters and individuals and the interest on money loaned.

Section 3. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Recording Secretary as Chairman, the State Regent and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State officers and chairmen of committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee composed of a chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Con-

ference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conference, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolutions shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that have not previously been presented to the committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. A Press Relations Committee composed of the State Reporter as chairman and two members appointed by the State Regent shall prepare and distribute information for the press concerning patriotic and educational activities of the Kansas Society. This committee shall be responsible for the preparation and mailing of the Kansas D. A. R. News.

Section 8. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees, as are not otherwise provided for in these bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII

Reports

Section 1. Each State officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairman of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resume shall not be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send, not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent for use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

ARTICLE XIII

Districts

Section 1. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall

be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the Chapters in each District arc set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the programs of the State and National Societies; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District Secretary thirty days in advance to all Chapters within the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Each District shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. The term of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three terms.

Section 4. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV

Chapters

Section 1. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. On or before June first of each year, the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typwritten lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of National Committees, giving her the name and address of the Chapter member on that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer before January thirtieth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report. Contributions received by chapter treasurers after January thirtieth shall be sent to the State Treasurer and shall be included in her supplementary report.

ARTICLE XV

Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws or the bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI

Amendments

Section 1. These bylaws may be amended by a two thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a Chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the Chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows. State \$\mathbf{X}\$ Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer 1 to 3 Chapter Regents X each; another if requested; National Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State 1 each; Honorary State Regents 1 each; State Chairmen of Na-X tional Committees and Chairmen of other Committees 1 each; Senior President CAR 1; District Directors 1 each; The Library of the Kansas Society 2; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society 2; the President General 1; the Kansas State Historical Society 1; the President General 1; the Kansas State Historical Society 1; the DAR National Library 1; and the President of the State Officers Club, Chapter Regents Club and the State Chairmans Club 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2. Chairmen of State Committees and the appointed officers

may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

- No. 3. No less than three issues of Kansas D A R News shall be printed each year, expense to be borne by the State Society.
- No. 4. "The State Registrar shall furnish the publisher of the Kansas D A R News a correct and up to date mailing list."
- No. 5. A sum not to exceed \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent, each year for the purpose of carrying on her work.
- No. 6. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected state officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference. No expenses shall be allowed an officer if the State Conference is in her home city.
- No. 7. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.
- No. 8. \$50.00 shall be allotted to State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.
- No. 9. The Shawnee Pilgrimage and Picnic shall be held on Constitution Day, September 17 at Shawnee Mission, Kansas City, Kansas. Local Chapters shall act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be alloted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (25c).
- No. 10. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of could to ten cents per chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.
- No. 11. A sum equal to five cents per chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the treasurer of the Kansas CAR Society to be used for CAR projects.
- No. 12. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key with out the permission of these three officers.
- No. 13. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board meeting to each of the District meetings in the fall.
- No. 14. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15 of each year, a copy of the Chapter Year Book to each of the State Officers and to the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

- No. 15. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.
- No. 16. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.
- No. 17. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Public Library, Dodge City, Kansas.
 - (a) The Kansas Society shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Public Library, and shall provide a postal box in Dodge City, Kansas for the use of the Dodge City Chapter Library Committee in receiving requests for loan of books and their return.
 - (b) The Dodge City Public Library shall provide a private room with adequate work and storage space.
 - (c) The Dodge City Chapter, DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the library. This committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
 - (d) All Scrap Books belonging to the Kansas Society shall be kept in the Kansas DAR Library.
 - No. 18. The Chapters in each district are as follows:
