# OBJECTS OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, acquisition and the protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual service of the Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people: "To promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and afording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American Citizenship.
- 3 To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for all the blessings of liberty.

#### INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be carried only on the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, and conference reports. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner, without any wording whatever above it.—D.A.R. Handbook, Page 62.

### REGISTRAR

### Martha L. Prichard (Mrs. J. R.)

My first year as your State Registrar began with a meeting of the new State Officers and the District Directors called by Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn, State Regent, at her home in Sterling, Kansas.

In July I received her first official letter sent to all State Registrars by Mrs. Austin C. Hayward, Registrar General. My own first letter to the Chapter Registrars was then sent out passing on to them certain directives by the Registrar General concerning available material, filing of applications, anouncement of the Genealogical Records forms and their use and her request that the Rebinding Fund be made one of the chapter projects for the coming year.

In October I attended the meeting of the Executive Board and of the Board of Management in Wichita. Following this I attended the Annual meetings of three Districts, Southwest, Northwest and Southeast and enjoyed each of them especially the opportunity of meeting so many who had up to that time been only names as signatures to correspondence. This correspondence, may I add has been a great joy and cooperation in replying so promptly to my queries has been deeply appreciated.

Fifty-six Year Books have been received. These are most valuable in checking and correcting files and the mailing list for the DAR NEWS BULLETIN.

On January 1, 1960 the annual report blanks were mailed to each of the sixty-five chapters. These reports were to cover thirteen months since the previous year had been shortened. Sixty-one reports have been returned.

The Necrology report which will be heard in the Memorial service was compiled for the State Chaplain.

The responsibility for maintaining a correct mailing list for the Kansas DAR NEWS BULLETIN is another duty of this office. Changes in the Chapters, as reported by their Registrars assist in this constant supervision. These changes should be reported promptly and include new members, deaths, resignations, reinstatements, transfers either into or out of the State and between chapters, marriages and changes of street and city addresses, including Zone numbers where this is required. This will help to ensure that all members will receive the Bulletin on time. This is an age of a population very much on the move and it will probably never be possible to have a perfect mailing list but we can try.

The Eunice Sterling Award Flag goes this year to Tomahawk Chapter with the largest per cent gain in membership of 11 and 19%, Dodge City is second with a gain of 9 and 12|31 per cent. Perhaps here is the place to welcome the sixty-sixth chapter, Good-Land Chapter which has made a good start with fourteen members.

## HISTORIAN

### Mrs. Helen Wilson

To begin with, I want to express my thanks and appreciation to the many people who have helped with the historian's work this year. First of course, I thank Mrs. Kilbourn and Mrs. Chesney for their help. I want especially to thank Pauline Cowger for her advice and careful counsel. I thank my husband for listening, and for talking back. And Nyle Miller for his frequent help and the use of his records. Finally, I thank the Chapter Historians and the Chapter Regents. These are the ones who really do the work. Without them it would be impossible to function.

The first thing I want to mention is the Historian General's Portfolio of original signatures of the First Governors of the States. We still need an original signature of Governor Charles Robinson, the first governor of Kansas. A letter, state paper, or some flat document is desired.

One gift was given to the Americana Collection this year. Mrs. J. Randolph Kennedy, a member of Eunice Sterling Chapter, gave a newspaper, The Republican Herald, dated Oct. 8, 1823. Also \$21.00 (?) in money was given from Kansas for the care of the collection.

The second thing that needs to be brought to your attention is a book listing and picturing all the Historical Markers in Kansas placed by Chapters and members of the Daughters of the American Revolution. As many of you know, a considerable amount of work already has been done toward this end.

Jean Reser worked on compiling a list of the DAR Markers in Kan. Mrs. Jess Denious and Mrs. J. O. Carter worked listing and locating the Santa Fe Trail Markers in Kansas. They also obtained some pictures of these Markers and mounted them in a photograph album which is now in the "trunk" of the State Historian. This album is dated 1953-1954.

Mrs. J. W. King, Miss Adelaide Morse, and Miss Marion Seeley did a large amount of research on a marker list and collected and mounted

a number of pictures of Historical Markers placed by DAR's in Kansas. A penciled date 1938-1939 is at the end of this notebook.

A new Marker Book implies no thought or desire of trying to take credit for their work. Without that work any sort of a present complete listing might well be nearly impossible. It is time though, that the Marker List is brought up to date, and material evidence of such produced. The idea for this Marker Book is one extra nice book, which when completed will be placed in the DAR Library. There is no plan to publish this book.

Several Chapters have cooperated with this work already. Betty Washington has sent a picture of the new Grinter Marker placed last June by Mission Hills, Shawnee, Wyandot, Topeka, Betty Washington, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, James Ross, Polly Ogden and John Haupt Chapters. Abilene Chapter has sent eight pictures with a detailed list of information about the markers placed by that chapter. Byrd Prewitt has sent three pictures of DAR Markers in their area. Neodesha sent a picture accompanied by the history of a marker placed by their chapter. Lois Warner sent a fine picture of a tablet placed in Junction City. Emporia has sent two pictures with historical detail, and has promised more. Only seven chapters indicated on their annual report that they were not interested in a Marker Book. And that may have been due to a misunderstanding.

The third item in this report concerns the observance of American History month. In Kansas, Governor Docking proclaimed February as American History Month. One of his three original proclamations was sent to the Historian General. A card from Mrs. George W. Armstrong of Richmond, Texas, the National Vice Chairman of the American History Month Committee, advises that our South Central Division was the first to become 100 percent in this project. According to the reports of the Chapter Historians, Mayors of eight Kansas towns also issued proclamations.

Eight window displays also were reported. Captain Jesse Leavenworth, Dana, Desire Toby Sears, Concordia, Eunice Sterling, Jeremiah Howard, Mary Wade Strother and Sarah Steward each reported one.

One chapter, James Ross, organized a speakers Committee and addressed ten groups.

Nearly all chapters reported newspaper stories, pictures or editorials about American History Month during February.

Special Chapter programs, Teas and Parties in observance of American History month were reported by a number of Chapters. Wellington started observing American History Month on the 29th of January by celebrating the birthday of Kansas and their chapters. They also presented a medal to their essay contest winner. Desire Toby Sears, Eunice Sterling, Isabella Weldin, James Ross, Lois Warner, Mary Wade Strother, Nathan Edson, and Shawnee report special historical programs and Guest Day or Open House during February. Abilene had special historical displays in the public library all during February. These displays were for adults and children.

The National Essay Contest on "Historic Trailways" was a significant observation of American History Month. Thirty-nine schools and

eight hundred twenty seven students in Kansas participated, actually I think there were more. Several Chapters sponsored local contests, but—for varying reasons—did not enter essays in the state contest. The quality of the essays entered was high. It gives one hope to see the things young people can do. I have asked Mrs. Spires for permission to place the best of these essays in the DAR State Library.

Essay contests were sponsored by Byrd Prewitt, Cofachique, Dodge City, Emporia, Esther Lowrey, Eunice Sterling, Fort Supply Trail, Peleg Gorton, Shawnee, Smokey Hill, Sterling, Topeka, Uvedale, Wellington, Wichita, William Wilson, and Wyandot.

Jeremiah Howard reported seven schools participated in observing American History Month. John Athey awarded three History medals. Susannah French Putney gave cash awards for American History scrapbooks. General Edward Hand presented awards to the boy and girl having the highest History grades during the first semester. And the Lawrence schools generally were making a study of historic trails as part of their school work.

The final judging of the essays entered in the State Contest was done in the office of the Secretary of the Kansas State Historical Society. Most of you will know that more impartial or better qualified judges could not have been found.

The essays were in two groups: one—the 5th and 6th grade group; the other—the 7th and 8th grade group. Sharon Burdick of Hutchinson, sponsored by Uvedale Chapter, and Cathy Lindner of Garden City, sponsored by William Wilson Chapter, received Honorable Mention. The Kansas State First Place winner in the 5th and 6th grade group was Kathy Baker of Ashland, sponsored by Fort Supply Trail Chapter.

In the 7th and 8th grade group Betty Stutzman of Ulysses, sponsored by Byrd Prewitt Chapter and Roger Histe of Wichita Chapter, received Honorable Mention. The Kansas State First Place Winner in the 7th and 8th grade group was Clyde Toland of Iola, sponsored by Cofachique Chapter. The two Kansas State First Place Winners received DAR Silver History Medals and their essays were entered for judging in the National Contest.

There was a total of 159 historical programs held and 102 historical anniversaries observed in Kansas DAR Chapters this last year. The actual figures probably are larger as a few chapters did not file reports.

The official Marker File is one of the most valuable and important set of records the Daughters of the American Revolution make and keep. This file includes the known locations of graves of soldiers of the American Revolution and also marked graves of DAR members. During this last year Isabelle Weldin reported the location of one grave of a soldier of the American Revolution; Susannah French Putney reported three; and Emporia reported twenty-five.

Thirteen Chapters reported marking graves of DAR members. General Edward Hand reported placing a marker for Clara Lewis (Mrs. Mahlen Dodge). Cofachique placed a marker for Grace Gates Leavell (Mrs. F. L. B.), Henry Dawson placed three: one for Miss Mazie Lindsay, one

for Mrs. R. C. Webb, and one for Mrs. Rachel White Simpson. Oceanus Hopkins placed two markers: one for Mae McKillop Stroud (Mrs. Carl D.) and one for Mrs. June Paris Willis. Bryd Prewitt reported placing two in 1959: one for Elizabeth Hitch Lee (Mrs. Robert) and one for Zella Cornick Blackmer (Mrs. L. G.). Emporia Chapter placed two: one for Sarah Crandler Berryman Price (Mrs. W. M.) and one for Jennie Howenstine Meckel (Mrs. Fred A.). Shawnee reported placing a marker for Mrs. Gertrude M. Willard. Susannah French Putney placed a marker for Mrs. Sadle Teliaferro (Mrs. R. Y.). Kanza placed one for Mrs. F. C. Powell. Mary Wade Strother placed a marker for Mrs. Delmar Spangler. Fort Supply Trail placed one for Mrs. J. B. Smith. Olathe placed a marker for their organizing regent Mrs. Emily Barnes Kelly. Betty Bonney placed for Elizabeth Houston Frailey (Mrs. F. H.)

Three other chapters reported placing grave markers for DAR members but so far have not given me sufficient exact data for the markers to be reported to the Official Marker File.

Honoring DAR Members graves, Baxter Springs and Isabella Weldin planted flowers. Mary Wade Strother placed flags on the graves of twenty-three DAR members on Memorial Day. Topeka and Wichita Chapters bought Memorial Acres at Tamassee in memory of deceased members.

Several chapters report buying and giving the DAR Centennial Maps. The Map Chairman is best able to report on this historical activity.

Individual members and Chapters on their own initative have done many other interesting things: taken historical tours, written papers, taken part in parades, appeared on radio and TV programs, and worked in museums and historical societies.

This seems like a lot of bragging for one report. Maybe the reason so many do so much historical work is that it is just plain fun.

I have been asked to insert the following correction as a part of my report.

Real Daughter Mrs. Harriet Gregg Melvin National No. 15782 Buried in Mt. Olive cemetery at Troy, Kansas.

Stone bears the bronze DAR marker and insignia with wording "Real Daughter."

Harriett Gregg, daughter of Reuben Gregg of New Hampshire.

She is a sister of Joseph Houston Gregg.

Mrs. W. H. Borland (Margaret Robinson Borland) Nathan Edson Chapter, Clay Center Kansas joined the DAR on the record of Reuben Gregg. (her mother's line).

Miss Nellie Zimmerman, a great grand daughter of Harriet lives at Troy, Kansas (cousin of Mrs. Borlands mother.) Miss Zimmerman was a member of the St. Joe Missouri DAR but has resigned because of inability in attending the meeting.

The St. Joe Chapter put the marker on the grave of Mrs. Melvin, and had quite a ceremony at that time.

A snap shot of the tomb stone and bronze marker shows Harriett G. Melvin July 4 (or 1), 1803

### July 19, 1901

Mrs. Borland has the snap shot in her possession.

Page 220 of the 1958 Kansas Proceedings lists Mrs. Melvin but gives Atchinson credit for marking.

#### LIBRARIAN

### Marie E. Spires

During the past year I attended the State Board Meeting at Sterling, The State Board Meeting in Wichita, the State Board of Management meeting in Wichita, and all the district meetings except the one in Kansas City.

The new catalog of the library was compiled and mailed to all Chapter Librarians, some of the Chapter Regents, and given to all State officers and most of the State Chairmen. This catalog was a donation from State Librarian.

I have averaged one day each month in the library at Dodge City, and spent many hours working, arranging and repairing books.

A questionnaire was sent to all chapter librarians, and forty-eight returned questionnaires. Total donations to the library fund \$127.36, this sum came from twenty-four of the sixty-five chapters.

In the Fall informative letters were sent out urging support of our two schools. St. Marys High School at Springfield, S. Dakota

and Bacone near Muskogee, Okla.

Your state chairman attended the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and the S.E. District meeting at Eureka. Altogether 106 letters, 61 postals and 4 packages of program material was mailed out.

Cash gifts to St. Mary's amounted to \$230.50; \$49.50 of that was for "Bricks" for building; cash to Bacone \$136.50 and to the American Indian Fund \$50.50, a total of \$411.50. 27 boxes of clothing, beads and gifts and 3 boxes to Bacone, totaled an estimated weight of 800 pounds and value of \$250. Several boxes of Christmas Cards were sent also. 34 Chapters reported programs on American Indians.

The need for financial help for these two schools is great as is the need for good used clothing for St. Mary's "Store" and for the Indians in Oklahoma. Plan to aid them as much as possible. Have interesting programs to inform your members of the Indian's problems and of his contribution to American culture.

My thanks to the chapters and their chairmen who have cooperated to make this a better year for our first Americans. Keep up the good work.

## AMERICANISM AND MANUALS FOR CITIZENSHIP Betty Kessler (Mrs. Lewis H.)

Early last Fall, letters and questionnaires were mailed to the 65 Kansas chapters. By Dec. 1, there were 55 chapter chairmen names in the State chairman's file; but only 35 of these chairmen completed and returned the questionnaire. 13 of these Chapters reported no opportunity to do the work of this committee; therefore the work done by 22 chapters comprises this report.

7 Chapters worked with Naturalization Court and 1 Chapter worked with the Americanization and night schools. 3 chapters presented 184 Flags, plus flag codes and copies of the Declaration of Independence to newly naturalized citizens. 5 chapters entertained these new citizens, either at teas or chapter meetings. \$73.76 reported spent an these activities. 3 chapters conducted essay contests in the schools and presented a total of \$14.50 in cash prizes plus 5 medals (cost not given). 11 chapters had programs on Americanism; 2 used films or slides, and 4 chapters studied the Immigration and Nationality Act.

The chapters in Wichita cooperated in a public meeting presenting Miss Helen Poe, who spoke on "Our American Heritage." A copy of a program on "The Constitution of the United States" prepared by a member of Susannah French Putney chapter, has been sent to the Program Review Committee for consideration for their outstanding program file.

Chapters reported 298 inches of publicity for this committee. 392 manuals were used in Naturalization work, 22 placed in libraries and with youth organizations, and 9 were sold to chapter members.

## AMERICAN MUSIC Miss Florence Armstrong

Music is an ornament to civilization. We can survive without it but we need it for emotional release, personal enjoyment, recreation and

as an adornment to the stark framework of every day life. The expression of patriotism leans heavily on music with the use of war songs, national songs and folk music. Music has a place in D.A.R. and we are grateful for the opportunity to develop it further.

The major project for this three year term is to collect information about Kansas songs, the old songs, folk songs and songs of today, to be made into a bibliography. Five chapters have given pertinent information. This includes names of songs sources of historic material and the addresses of contemporary composers.

41 of the 65 chapters of the Kansas Society have chairmen of American Music. 34 replied to the questionnaire. 17 used American music at each meeting. 24 had a program on American Music, 5 observed National Music Week, 1 used slides of American Composers, 10 promoted American Music in the community and helped musicians in various ways. No chapters have ensembles but 2 plan to sing in the National Chorus at the next Continental Congress.

We are grateful to those who returned the questionnaires and appreciation is expressed to those who sent information about Kansas songs. May we be of more service next year.

## APPROVED SCHOOLS Mrs. Bill Smith

My appointment to serve as Chairman of the Approved Schools Committee by our State Regent has indeed been a most challenging experience for me.

I have enjoyed corresponding with the Chapter Chairmen, having written over three hundred letters in the last few months, and hope to know many more of them personally during my tenure of Chairmanship. The interest shown in our own two D.A.R. Schools, Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee, as well as in the other schools listed on the approved list, has been most encouraging. To teach the children about their community, the part each has in it, his or her responsibilities and its reward for each was the purpose of sponsoring the two Schools.

Every child graduating from one of our Schools to which our Chapters have made contributions means that each of these Chapters has had a stake in the successful operation of the Schools. To meet the needs of the two D.A.R. Schools is our first concern and these needs will require a greater annual expenditure that ever before. The Committee must have the backing of all the Chapters—for a job well done!

I have corresponded with all Chapters in Kansas and the majority have reported listing the two Schools in their budget as well as contributing to the others. All Chapters have been contacted and the Chapter Chairmen requested to contact individual members of each Chapter for voluntary contributions to the Doris Pike White Auditorium-Gymnasium Fund. There were some eight hundred and ten letters reported as having been written by the Chairmen. The response to date has been most exceptional. As of March 1, 1960 \$1,023.75 has been recorded with the State Treasurer ear-marked for the Audi-

torium-Gymnasium Fund. Some twenty-six women have contributed individually. The Kansas Daughters have been most generous.

Fifty-nine Chapters contributed to Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee, and a total of \$3,066.45 was sent to all schools. All Chapters were urged to send good used clothing to the Schools as well as Christmas gifts. Some sixty-six boxes of clothing were mailed to the Schools, the value of which was well over \$2,500.00. I have appeared and spoken before several Chapter meetings in Wichita and in the State and attended two district meetings. All Chapters were requested to sponsor Programs on the Approved Schools and thirty-three Chapters reported as having had a program on the schools and seven procured slides from the Program office.

Chapters sending Regents and Delegates to Continental Congress are urged to have their representatives attend the Approved Schools Lunchcon at the Mayflower Hotel. Many Corsages will be sold at Continental Congress. This project is being sponsored by the District of Columbia Daughters and it is hoped the goal of \$5,000.00 will be reached. Proceeds will go toward the Doris Pike White Fund. Credit will be given Chapters and States if orders are placed before April 15, 1960. You may place your orders with me during the Conference.

We have had an encouraging year in that many new D.A.R. Chapters have responded to our call for help with the C.A.R. organization in the state. Messages have been placed in the D.A.R. News Sheet at each publication date stressing some important factors in state work with our Children. The State Chairman was present at all but one of the Fall District D.A.R. Conferences (October, 1959) and was given ample time to present a report of the work being done and the future needs of C.A.R. One of the most important messages brought at these meetings was the presentation of an "envelope" idea conceived by our State Chairman for Tamassee Coupons for the C.A.R. This is a 4 x 9 manilla envelope to which a complete list of Coupons wanted for Tamassee and Crossnore had been affixed and with a small ribbon holder so that members could hang the envelope on a convenient kitchen door as a constant reminder to save Coupons for the C.A.R. This idea resulted in the collection of over 1,500 coupons from the Daughters which were sent to the Approved Schools and for which the Kansas C.A.R.'s were given credit.

The Daughters have furnished aid to our C.A.R.'s in the form of Patron's Funds, contributions of cash for individually sponsored Societies, used clothing for the Indian and Mountain Schools, help in publicity, and by acting as senior advisors, sponsors, and helpers in our C.A.R. work.

There are twelve active Societies in the State, one new Society is to be organized at our State Conferenc in Kansas City on March 19th, and one Society still is in process or organizing. Two Societies

will furnish the table favors for the Annual C.A.R. Breakfast at the D.A.R. State Conference. They are the Susannah Oldham Society, Topeka, and Francis Scott Key Society, Wichita. The annual State Conference of C.A.R. will be held later this month.

C.A.R. programs have been given by societies for eight D.A.R. Chapter meetings.

Five D.A.R. Chapters have reported that they might be interested in organizing new C.A.R. Societies.

Ten D.A.R. Chapters have taken a census of eligible C.A.R. members and several others are planning such a census in the coming year.

Three D.A.R. Chapters are to be given Special Mention for help in our Tamassee Coupon program. They are; Betty Bonney. Ft. Larned, and Nathan Edson Chapters. Dodge City Chapter D.A.R. is named the outstanding Chapter in the State. For the second year they have sponsored the C.A.R to win the Traveling Flag Award.

As usual, in the course of the past year's work, there have been headaches but they are offset by the progress that is being made and C.A.R. looks forward to an even better year.

The line-up for the processionals and reception have been arranged as to protocol.

The place cards have been placed, according to protocol, at the tables for the meals.

### Mrs. Hobart Frederick

Report for March 1, 1959 to March 1, 1960.: Theme—"Conservation Thru Education.'

65 Chapters in the state.

41 Chapters Reporting.

Program-15 Chapters having Conservation Programs.

7 Chapters had speakers; 1 had film; 2 had colored slides; 1 had field trips; and 1 visited former or State D.A.R. Conservation Projects. Legislation—6 Chapters studying State or National Conservation Legislation, and one Chapter visited a Federal Dam Project of their community.

Soil and Water Conservation—(Including Water Pollution)

8 Chapters are studying these problems; 1 sent letters to Congressmen; 1 had a member take individual action; 1 had a talk and film by the County Agricultural Extension Agent.

Trees and Flowers—19 Chapters Reporting: 2,061 trees were planted; 12,038 seedlings were planted; 1,885 (T) 12,037 (S) on private land; 12 (T) 1 (S) in public parks and 132 along roadsides; 2 elsewhere.

Wildlife—24 Chapters Reporting—524 members feed birds; 125 (7 Chapters) assisted other wildlife.

Landscaping D.A.R. Grounds at Headquarters—21 Chapters made cash contributions; 1 Chapter (\$5.00) made individual cash contributions; Total amount reported to State Chairman is \$41.00.

State Project— 23 Chapters Reporting— 1959-1960 Survey:

Number of members in Chapters is 1,091; 550 members own land; 192 members who are cooperating in the Soil Conservation Service.

Miscellaneous—Number of Chapters having any other Conservation Projects is 8.

Flores Del Sol-Planted Lilac bush at Dedication of Cow Town in Wichita, Kansas.

Mission Hills—Gave book on Conservation to Library. Given cards and books to Scout Troop for study.

Betty Washington-Purchased over \$15.00 worth of National Wildlife Federation Cards.

Arthur Barrett-Upkeep of grave marker of Sarah Keyes grave at Alcove Springs.

Lucretia Griswold Latimer-Preserved and froze 1000 jars and packages of food.

Desire Tobey Sears—Placed markers on Lovewell Dam and Lake Project to mark first three graves in Jewel County; made by Rep. Wint Smith.

Randolph Loving—A member of Chapter recently sponsored three awards in Soil Conservation work in Sedgwick County. Each award amounting to \$25.00.

Betty Washington—Project regarding safety of D.A.R. Oregon Trail marker located on Highway 40 between Lawrence and Topeka. Moved marker to a roadside park.

October 28, 1959—Form Letter No. 1 was sent to each Chapter Conscrvation Chairman in the state outlining the three year program.

January 13, 1960—Conservation questionnaire and form letter No. 2 was sent to each Chapter Conservation Chairman. The questionnaire returned and thus the State report for 1959 was compiled. Form letter No. 2 outlined the program to be carried on during 1960.

The new Chapter Good-Land has received all this above information.

One Chapter officially informed the State Chairman it will not participate in the Conservation Program—due to the fact of so very few members in Chapter.

February 22, 1960—State Conservation Report sent to the National Chairman Conservation Committee, also copies to State Regent, and Recording Secretary. A copy for the permanent records of the State Society.

### REPORT OF THE CONSULTING GENEALOGIST

As Consulting Genealogist, I have received increasing inquiries from not only members of our Kansas Chapters, but from persons over the state concerning genealogical information on their families and desiring information on the elgibility of D.A.R. I have directed them to sources which they had not available themselves and in some cases have investigated material at the Kansas Historical Library.

The women in the Southwest part of the State who have organized the Southwest Genealogical Society are to be congratulated. They have collected a vact amount of material that has not been available. Many of these women are members of our State Society.

The Wichita Chapter has added many volumes to the rapidly growing Genealogical Section of the Wichita Library, thru their combined efforts of the Home Tours.

Miss Pantle, Librarian, of the Kansas Historical Library is ever mindful of the needs of the Genealogical Section of the Library and is most desirious of purchasing those books that will be helpful.

Several of the other Patriotic Societies are contributing money which is matched by the Kansas Historical Library to purchase 1850 Census of other states.

The 1850 Census of New York State is the latest addition to the Census file.

# D.A.R GOOD CITIZEN Miss Pauline Horton

Senior girls from seventy-four Kansas High Schools entered the D.A.R. Good Citizens Contest held November 14 to February 1. About five hundred sixty four year accredited high schools in Kansas, were contacted and requested to enter the contest. Thirty D.A.R. Chapters sponsored Good Citizens.

Faith of Our Fathers—Living Still was the subject of the three hundred fifty word essay, stressing three phases patriotism, religion and government, that the contestant wrote without any assistance.

The senior class of the high school chose from its membership three girls who possess outsanding qualities of a Good Citizen: Dependability, Service, Leadership and Patriotism. From the three selected the high school faculty chose the girl to represent the school as its Good Citizen and write the essay.

Each contestant was given a Certificate of Award. Fifty Good Citizen pins were given by local D.A.R. Chapters to the senior girls they sponsored.

Wichita High North won the contest with the essay written by Kathryn Titus. The top seven schools rated in this order. Wichita High North, Topeka, Winfield, Olathe, Hays, Salina and Topeka Highland Park.

### D.A.R. GOOD CITIZEN

Kathryn Titus of Wichita High North was the winner of the D.A.R. Good Citizen seventy-five dollar Scholarship Award. She re-

ceived the State Good Citizen's pin.

Kathryn is one of Wichita High's most outstanding senior girls. She is a member of Redskin Players, National Thespians, Future Teachers of America and Pep Club. She plans to enter Kansas Teacher College at Emporia and train for secondary teaching.

### D.A.R. MAGAZINE Mrs. Clair Lindahl

Early in the fall, your State Chairman for the D.A.R. Magazine sent an urgent plea to all Chapter Chairmen asking for an added effort in securing subscriptions. This was not just a "bigger and better" campaign. Rather, we were facing the fact that if we continue to have a national magazine—and it is most important that we do—then we must have enough subscriptions and advertising to make the income equal the cost of publishing it.

Their magazine subscription is included with their yearly dues. This Chapter will be mentionel in our Magazine by the National Magazine Chairman.

Each year, prizes are given to Chapters which have the most new subscriptions per membership. Since there must be at least 5 subscriptions to qualify, there was no chapter with a membership of less than 30 to receive the prize in this class.

For Chapters with membership of 30-40 inclusive, Byrd Prewitt with a membership of 46 and five new subscriptions will win \$5.00. Mrs. Otto Lutes is Chapter Chairman.

For Chapters with membership of 50-60 inclusive, Randolph Loving with a membership of 52 and six new subscriptions will win the \$5.00. Mrs. C. T. Hinshaw is Chapter Chairman.

For Chapters with a membership over 70, Eunice Sterling with 206 members and 29 new subscriptions, will win \$5.00. Mrs. Hugh Cloninger is Chapter Chairman.

"Treasures in our Museum" slides with comments were used in over 20 chapters. 77 dollars contributed came from 25 Chapters and 6 chapters have reported possible gifts to be given at a later date. There are gifts forms which should accompany pictures of the gifts offered.

Remember gifts desired are articles from Colonial, Revolutionary and Federal periods (1607-1830) which are in good condition and of historical or artistic value.

Our Museum is one of the finest and will profit by our interest and support.

### DAR STUDENT LOAN Mrs. Elbert Naugle

Let me thank the following chapters for their recent gifts to the Kansas Student Loan Fund: Dodge City, Henry Dawson, James Ross, Olathe, Arthur Barrett and Wyandot. I have welcomed letters from several chapter chairmen. Let me also thank the State Treasurer for a comprehensive and up-to-the-minute compilation of the monies held for the Kansas Student Loan Fund account. The impressive total shows \$4372.92.

No loans have been made for 10 years, and then only 1 for 5 years before that.

The chairman of the South Central Division of Student Loan reported that some of the states in this region have more money not being used than the amount IN USE. Also that the same thing held true in a number of chapter funds. She asked for our ideas and suggestions. I replied to Mrs. Callender with the letter which has already appeared in the Kansas D.A.R. News.

A request for information about the possibility of there being any DAR scholarships based on the fact that one was a direct descendant, was sent to me from Washington, as the request came from a Kansas woman. I reported to her that we knew of no such scholarships.

At the Board of Management meeting in the fall, it was voted to recommend to the conference the addition of the word: scholarship, to our title. This would conform to National. It would also permit the use of the money, if not for loans, the interest accrued, for scholarships.

The following suggestions have been made:

- 1. Use the interest on the \$4372 held each year, for a scholarship for a worthy Kansas college woman.
- 2. Offer loans to girls in junior colleges as well as seniors in 4-year colleges, as originally planned.
- 3. Give the entire fund outright to some college for its use in obtaining more government-sponsored loan money.
- 4. Give the money to some college but maintain the DAR identity, the college furnishing names of possible borrowers but the D.A.R. standing any losses through non-repayment of the loans.

In conclusion, I shall ask this Conference to authorize the immediate payment of the interest accured on this fund for the past year, for scholarships in the amount of \$75, one each to Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee.

### EL QUARTELEJO REPORT Maude Haver Davis, Chairman

In the former administration a five-year agreement for the restoration and preservation of El Quartelejo was made with the Scott County Historical Society.

According to this agreement, plans were made to build a reproduction of the original pueblo at El Quartelejo. This was the only definite place where white men stopped in 1704.

Members of the Scott Historical Society have done much research work upon this particular place, and were anxious to begin excavation, but because of the lack of funds they have not been able to carry out their plans.

This committee is recommending that a sum of money be set aside by our Society for the care of the marker and the plot of land at El Quartelejo.

### EISENHOWER MEMORIAL PYLONS

In 1959 the Eisenhower Foundation D.A.R. Committee report the purchase of the second U. S. Government bond, making a total of \$2,000.00 in bonds in the permanent maintenance fund for our pylons at Abilene. This fund will insure their proper care and upkeep for some years; an intense satisfaction to all concerned.

Of much interest is the proposed development that is being considered at the Eisenhower Museum. At this time a new library building is being constructed directly south, or across the street from the Museum, and when this handsome edifice is completed, it is planned to close the street and make the entire block a mall with symmetrical walks and attractive landscaping. This new Eisenhower Center entails moving the marble pylons to a place of importance at the east end of the mall with a fine background of trees and shrubs. The pylons would be in an appropriate setting with the great flag pole now in use at the Foundation, and should be a most beautiful and impressive part of this historical place, as they now are. All pools will be removed and a smooth expanse of lawn connect all parts of the memorial.

Attendance at the Museum and Old Home continues to be very high with a constant flow of buses of school children—they come by the hundreds! Many new and interesting items are being displayed since President Eisenhower's return from his recent European trip.

Tulip Time in 1961 would be a wonderful time for the Kansas D.A.R. Centennial Pilgrimage!

### FLAG OF THE U.S.A.

### Mrs. Mayme Farmer

Out of 65 Chapters, 62 have Flag Chairmen. 58 sent in reports. In September I sent out letters with information and suggestions,

and in January sent copies of reports to be filled out. Reminders were sent in February to 25 Chapters who had not returned reports.

Almost every Chapter indicated they gave Flag salute at meetings. 36 reported singing National Anthem at meetings and 20 studied the Flag Code. There were 13 corrections on improper display of the Flag, 3 corrections on improper disposal. Reported were 69 newspaper items concerning the Flag, 49 radio broadcasts and one TV. 15 Chapters distributed Flag literature. 698 Flag Codes were distributed to new members, new citizens, schools, at meetings. Northeast District Conference and with presentations of new Flags.

81 Flag talks were given, 39 of them entire programs. They were given at Chapter meetings, Flag Day luncheons, 5 schools, to Scout Troops and an Optimist Club, Garden Club.

13 Chapters participated in community activities in which the Flag played an important part. Included were Constitution Week, window displays, Memorial Day, Football games, Centennial celebrations programs at City Halls, public presentation of Flags, and Minisa Chapter arranged to have the Flag used as a backdrop for TV announcements during Constitution Week.

15 large and 1411 small Flags were presented. Of all Flags presented 40 were the new 49-star Flag. Presentations were made to schools, a boys' ranch, a youth camp, to hosts, children participating in programs, Brownie, Girl and Boy Scout Troops, hospitals, stores for their window displays, new members, a church, a Chamber of Commerce and new citizens.

CHAPTERS REPORTING SPECIAL ACTIVITIES: MISSION HILLS reports 100 per cent membership displaying Flag on Flag Day. LOIS WARNER has largest number of Chapter members displaying 49-star Flag with 4 reported. POLLY OGDEN surpassed everyone with 36 radio broadcasts concerning the Flag. They also had 4 newspaper items and almost every member displays Flags on Flag Days. GENERAL EDWARD HAND presented 5 large Flags to Brownie and Girl Scout Troops and 45 small Flags to hospital patients. Their newspaper and radio publicity was good. COUNCIL OAK had Boy Scouts display Flags on Flag Day in business sections of town.

JOHN HAUPT gave 1104 small Flags on cup cakes to the Winter Veterans Hospital on Flag Day, and in addition 2 large Flags were given to Scout Troops. They also had television coverage of presentation of one of the Flags and had a nice picture of Flags given to the patients.

FT. SUPPLY TRAIL seems to be very active with emphasis on good programming and purchase of good Flag reference books and literature for members. They used color slides obtained from National for their February program. Their Chapter has lent a 49-star Flag to their courthouse for use until the 50-star Flag comes out, when they will put the 49-star Flag in the Clark County Historical Museum. They sent in the largest amount of clippings.

SHAWNEE CHAPTER reports 3 large Flags presented, one to Chamber of Commerce, one to a Church and one to a host, and 7

small Flags to school children. 250 Flag Codes were distributed at schools, Chamber of Commerce. Chapter and Northeast District meeting. 8 Flag talks were given by Chapter Chairmen, one to Scout Troop, one D.A.R., 5 schools, one Optomist Club. Flag talk given by vice-Regent, Shawnee sold 11 49-star Flags and featured a 14-star Flag in an American History Month window.

Many Chapters report plans to buy new 50 star Flags this year.

These forms are written on both sides of the paper, and the National office gives each chapter double credit, so they have a total credit of 2516 pages. And many of the chapters report they are working on these forms.

These record forms are copied from ALL the application papers in each Chapter meaning current members, non-resident, deceased, resigned, dropped, etc., and this is an urgent national project. They will be bound and made available for research and reference in our National Library. Beginning with the grandparent through whom membership was attained, there isn't so much copying to do, and it doesn't take long.

Tomahawk Chapter made a carbon copy of these forms, so that second copy is made available in our state.

And it will be necessary that as each Chapter has new members, that their papers be copied to these record forms and sent to your state chairman.

One of the joys of being State Chairman is the privilege of receiving these record forms—and I've glanced at most of the Ancestors and his service.

Thanks for the opportunity, and the privilege of serving in this capacity. It is most interesting, and satisfying in results. The Chairman has attended both Board meetings— a District Conference and State Conference and Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage.

# HONOR ROLL

## Mrs. John Harrison

From past experience we know that our State Report is not final until it has been checked and approved by National. Last year our tentative report showed 46 on Honor Roll. 9 corrections were made at National, but we lost only 5 from Honor Roll and four others were changed as to rating, This year we have 47 Chapters on our tentative report and if National affects us comparatively, we will still be slightly over 60 per cent for 1960, which was the goal set by National.

When we work for Honor Roll, we are NOT working for vainglory. National has told us that Chapters working toward Honor Roll are working for the best interests of the National Society. This means we are diversifying our efforts and money toword our three objective fields—Patriotic, Educational and Historical.

Mrs. Hoofer, my immediate predecessor, did so much to increase Honor Roll consciousness in Kansas, that my work has been fairly easy—in spite of the fact that we had all new officers in both National and State and in some of the Chapters.

This year 28 Chapters increased their YES answers; 15 decreased, and 19 held. All except one of the Chapters which held their previous rating were already on Honor Roll. Only 6 Chapters which made Honor Roll in 1959 failed to make it this year. 12 Chapters not on Honor Roll in 1959 made it this year.

In reviewing the reports, I noticed one particular thing that was unique and interesting and I believe of value to D.A.R. work and to all Chapters in qualifying for Point 11—Historian General. Abilene Chapter went all out for American History month by having a table display in their two local libraries of all the fiction and non-fiction Historical books. A card was placed on the tables stating that the display was sponsored by D.A.R. They received much publicity and much local interest. This is a project that all Chapters could emulate with little effort and with much credit to our National Society.

A window display deserving special mention, was that of Lucretia Griswold Latimer, which included a photograph of a "coat of arms" tray, made by Mrs. Jewell Johnson of Eureka, for President Eisenhower, which is now a part of the permanent collection at the Abilene Museum.

This year Isabella Welden and Shawnee Chapters have made Gold Honor Roll for the 4th consecutive year. Six Chapters have made it for the third consecutive year and 5 for the second. Charts are available for your comparison.

My thanks to Chapter Chairmen and Regents who have been so cooperative!

Congratulations to the Chapters which made Honor Roll or increased their point rating this year! And, now, looking forward to 1961—our Centennial Year may I urge you all to do your utmost in this, our special year. You know, it isn't inconceivable that Kansas COULD be 100 per cent on Honor Roll in our 100TH YEAR!

It is with pleasure that I make my first annual report to the State Conference.

From the 65 annual report forms sent to the Chapter Chairmen or Regents, I received replies from 40 Chapters. I am grateful for these responses but I just wish that there had been 25 more reports sent to me, for this ommission cannot give us a true picture of the junior membership in Kansas.

However, there are 49 Chairmen. There has been an increase of 32 members with a total membership, as reported to me of 159. This is a decrease from last year's total. There are 4 active junior membership committees with Martha Vail Chapter having the largest with 4. There are 36 junior members serving on active Committees. Magazine. We contributed \$96.00 to the Helen Pouch Scholarship Fund the past year. This has been due to the work of the Chapter Chairmen and their committees.

Our President General had set a goal for us of 20 per cent increase of the total membership of D.A.R. I'm afraid that Kansas has fallen a little short of this, but we will do better this coming year. This spring we will begin to compile the State Directory of Junior Members. We will need your help and cooperation in this project. A letter will be sent to each Chapter Chairman or the Regent and the Registrar. Please keep this in mind.

If you have a new chairman please notify me of this change.

Stationery orders are now being taken. The samples are on the Bazaar table. The reason for not having a supply on hand is that a check must accompany the order and I do not feel that any chairman should have to stand an expense such as this out of her own

pocketbook. Also if you order stationery, please do so through the State Chairman. This is the only way Kansas can get credit.

I wish to thank the ladies that have contributed to the Bazar and I might add that not all of them have been Junior Members. We certainly appreciate your time and effort. And many thanks to Mrs. Kilbourn and to Mrs. O. M. Stanbury for their help and interest.

The very old Bible there is an historic one but does not belong to Kansas D.A.R., as do none of the present hodge podge furnishings.

The Room is rather remote and quiet, thus eminently suitable for its intended use, and when complete should be a place of restful beauty and repose.

Plans may be suggested this Fall at District meetings for possible money-raising ideas to enable this objective to be well begun, and, we hope, completed in 1961.

Background work has beesn done to permit work to go forward rapidly as soon as final plan selection is made. Arrangements for painting the wall, shuttering the windows, purchasing an old grandfather clock, and possible carpeting, have been discussed.

Christmas cards has given the Prayer Room a nice start, and that, with the interest and enthusiasm of Chapters who have already begun to raise funds, is most stimulating. We should be off to a good start and in full swing by next winter, on this project of service to many.

Letters outlinning the objectives of the Motion Picture Committee were sent to the 37 Chairmen, and to the 28 Regents who had not

sent names of chairmen, asking that questionaires be returned to me. 33 replied and it was interesting that 11 Regents filled out questionnaire, thus only 26 of the chairmen replied. 10 reported that regular reports were given Chapters, and lists of best pictures recommended.

9 reported using D.A.R. Magazine Pictures as program material.

12 Chapters used special patriotic pictures recommended by our National Society and urged teachers to use our Approved list of films.

3 used films in other Chapter committee work. Only 3 Chapters voted on the best "Children's Film" in 1959—2 voted for "Big Circus" and 1 for "Disney Films". 18 reported theater managers provided special programs for children. The State Chairman was made responsible for securing subscriptions to the Monthly Motion Picture Review, and the three State chairmen showing largest percentage of increase in subscriptions will be awarded prizes at the next Congress in April.

Letters with an order blank were sent all Chapters and 20 subscriptions were received and sent in believe this is an increase of 4 subscriptions however, the National Chairman has not reported the number of last years subscriptions to me.

5 Chapters placed the Review in Libraries and Schools. Several Chapters sponsored Patriotic Films that were shown in different groups in their towns.

- 1 Chapter reported the placing of the copies of J. Edgar Hoover's "Masters of Deceit" in High School Libraries in the city.
- 1 Chapter reported a cash gift to the Local National Defense Council.
- 1 Chapter reported: "Our members are getting old, deaf and blind and due to inflation and high taxes cannot do as much as they would really love to do."
  - 50 Chapters arranged for a special observance of Constitution week.
  - 60 Good Citizenship Medals were presented by 35 Chapters.
- 56 Chapters read the 1959 Resolutions or resume at the Chapter meetings.
- 53 Chapter chairmen read the National Defense Articles in the D.A.R. Magazine in addition to the monthly mailings.

I received a publicity questionaire last month, and immediately sent a copy to each Chapter. She is Miss Marion Gault, 6715 Cherokee Lane, Kansas City, Mo. Perhaps you have already heard from her, but if not, you may want to write to her reguarding her plans for this year's Scrapbook.

I feel certain we will have much to look back upon in the way of publicity this year. Each of you knows what is outstanding in your own Chapter and we will know, too, as soon as the news appears in print. Good luck. I hope to be able to meet most of you personally during State Conference in Hutchinson. Any suggestions you have for the successful coverage of the meetings will be most appreciated.

- 1. Write a news release for your local paper listing the Regent's name and other delegates from your Chapter.
  - Conference dates—March 8 to 10 in Baker Hotel, Hutchinson. Mrs. H. Nelson Kilbourn, Sterling, is State Regent and will preside at business sessions in the 62nd Conference.
- 2. Prepare short news releases when your Chapter elects new officers or holds an election to fill an office.

### **PROGRAM**

### Mrs. Theo Stebbins

This report is compiled from the Chapter yearbooks and the local Program Committee Chairmen Reports. Your cooperation in sending me yearbooks and answering the questionaire is appreciated.

Chapters meet from six to eleven times during the year with an average of eight or nine meetings annually. Historic Pilgrimages, picnics, guest-day teas, presentation of Good Citizenship pins and certain social functions were listed in some yearbooks in addition to outlined programs. Practically all of the Chapters used the theme, "Faith of Our Fathers, Living Still." Half of the Chapters had nonmember speakers and many Chapters had guest speakers who were State officers or State committee chairmen. Twenty-one Chapters had book reviews. The Chapter programs seem to have been reported to the press in nearly all instances.

It was a pleasure to note that National Defense was so well stressed in many Chapters as well as was the reading of the President's General's message. Practically all yearbooks listed the State officers and committee chairmen, along with Chapter officers and local committee chairmen. This is most important information to have available for State officers and chairmen.

About one-third of the yearbooks listed dates for the display of the Flag and about the same number contained the complete Chapter opening D.A.R. Ritual. Most of the other books included a partial ritual. This item was stressed by the previous Program Chairman and it seems a good plan to continue.

Two original Chapter papers have been sent to N.S.D.A.R. and several clippings on Constitution Week were sent to the National Vice-Chairman of Program Committee.

Forty-six Chapters kept records of member attendance at scheduled meetings, September 1959 through January 1960. We are asked to keep this record for next year also. It would be wonderful to have 100 per cent participation in this!

It is still true that the State Program Chairman has no program material except as it is sent from National. I will speed the material on to you just as soon as I receive it and have requested National to get it to us as soon after Continental Congress as is possible. Perhaps it will reach you a little earlier this year, at least that is our hope.

Martha Vail Chapter sent in their report after the papers had been sent in on the program. Since they kept a record attendance of their members for Chapter meetings and sent slides to the National Library on the Indian Peace Treaty at Medicine Lodge Kansas, it seems desirable to send this report in—even though late.

I will call this a supplemental to my March 1 Report.

I have enjoyed helping you plan successful programs, and feel this is one way of strengthening our Society. Good programs should stimulate better attendance as well as help to increase membership in D.A.R.

Thank you, Chapter Program Chairmen, for your cooperation.

# REPORT OF STUDENT LOAN COMMITTEE Mrs. Elbert Naugle

According to our Treasurer's Records, the Student Loan Fund contained on November 21, 1959, \$4,208.66. The money is invested in Leavenworth, Hutchinson and Prairie Village.

Three important motions connected with the Fund were approved by the State Board of Management meeting in Wichita in October, 1959.

- 1. The group voted to ask Conference to approve the immediate payment of approx. \$150.00, which is the interest accrued on the invested funds for the current year, to Kate Duncan Smith and to Tamassee, in equal shares.
- 2. The group voted to ask Conference to permit the use of the interest annually for scholarships.
- 3. It was voted to ask Conference to change the name of the Fund to include SCHOLARSHIP. To read: Student Loan and Scholarship Fund.

There have been no applications for loans. In fact, no loans have been made for over 10 years. If conference approves the above-mentioned changes, the Committee hopes to make wise use of DAR money.

# TRANSPORTATION Mrs. Paul H. White

A letter was sent to all Chapter Regents on October 1, asking for the names and addresses of their Transportation and Safety Chairman along with a list of suggestions for each Chairman. Since many of the Regents did not answer it was necessary to send out 38 cards to obtain the names of the Chairmen.

A questionnaire was sent to all the Chapters in January and reports were received from all but four Chapters.

- 21 Chapters planned special trips for their groups.

The State Chairman, D.A.R.—C.A.R., submits the following report. ### BY-LAWS

of the

# KANSAS STATE SOCIETY NATIONAL SOCIETY OF DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

### ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

### ARTICLE II

Objects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects

of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

### ARTICLE III Membership

Section 1. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2, The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a Chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the Chapter: Name of Chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

# ARTICLE IV

Section 1, The officers of the Kansas Society shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Reporter.

Section 2.

(a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a Chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a Chapter within the state for at least two years. No Chapter member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No State officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office. An officer who has served more than half a term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be

ineligible for any other state office except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent until the expiration of at least one year.

(b) A Chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same Chapter.

Section 3, All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Contintual Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4, Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by the State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

### ARTICLE V

### Nomination and Election of Officers

Section 1. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National Officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 2. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after November first, to notify all Chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The Committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State. Additional nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained.

Section 4. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each Chapter and to all State Officers and State chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Endorsement for candidates for Vice-President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

### ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these by-laws, the By-laws of the National So-

ciety and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the chief executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these by-laws and shall be ex-officio a member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and a Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairman of the National Committes and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Section 3. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office.

Section 4. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5.

- (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer and signed oy the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents, and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than three years.
- (b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Concerence. She shall keep a list of all Chapters in each District and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen, the Regent of each Chapter in good standing and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall also notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may

be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and of the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of June, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the Officers of the various Chapters, made into a directory form. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to tend, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairmen to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to a. the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, the amount to be fixed and the expense to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds, and shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each Chapter on February first.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all Chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members-at-large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; address; date of admission to the National Society; national number; name and rank of ancestor and state in which he served, and name of Chapter. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceding year. In recording a transfer, both the date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society, or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the His-

torian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have the supervision of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas D.A.R. Library.

Section 11, The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the Kansas Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be chairman of the State Press Relations Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D.C.

Section 12. Each Officer and Committee chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them when transferring them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

### ARTICLE VII

### Meetings

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the entertaining District.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the State; the Honorary Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or alternate and the elected delegates or alternates of each Chapter of the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective Chapters. Delegates must have been members of their Chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and must be in good standing.

Section 5. The number of delegates to which a Chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society, on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

- (a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates.
- (b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members, Regent and five delegates.
- (c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall

Section 6. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, a typed list of the delegates and alternates, signed by the Regent and Treasurer of the Chapter, shall be sent to the State Regent, the State Corresponding Secretary and the chairman of the Committee on Credentials for the State Conference. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the Chapter.

Section 7. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five Chapters. At least fifteen days' notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be the delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 8. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be Chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

### ARTICLE VIII

### State Board of Management

Section 1. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her absence, the Chap-

ter Vice Regent of each Chapter in the State.

Section 2. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall following the regular meeting of the National Board of Management and preceding the District meetings; the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

### ARTICLE IX

### Executive Committee

Section 1, All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three of its members. Ten days' notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

# ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January 31st.

Section 2. The annual state dues of a Chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.35 for each member of the Chapter, payable in advance. These dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. On January fifteenth, the State Treasurer shall notify Chapters whose dues are in arrears. A Chap-

ter whose dues are unpaid shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess Chapters to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Necessary expenses of the State Officers and State Committees shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing and approved by the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

### ARTICLE XI

#### Committees

Section 1. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and five members oppointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget, as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. This committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the Society.

Section 2. The Student Loan Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the Kansas D.A.R. Student Loan Fund. This Fund is maintained by contributions from Chapters and individuals and the interest on money loaned.

Section 3. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Recording Secretary as Chairman, the State Regent and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess Chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. The By-laws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this Committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each Chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conference,

and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolutions shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that have not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. A Press Relations Committee composed of the State Reporter as Chairman and two members appointed by the State Regent shall prepare and distribute information for the press concerning patriotic and educational activities of the Kansas Society. This Committee shall be responsible for the preparation and mailing of the Kansas D.A.R. News.

Section 8. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees, as are not otherwise provided for in these bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

### ARTICLE XII

### Reports

Section 1. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, the Regent of each Chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairman of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resume shall not be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send, not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent for use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

# ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the Chapters in each District are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the programs of the State and National Societies; to provide instruction and inspiration to Chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place

and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District Secretary thirty days in advance to all Chapters within the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Each District shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. The term of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three terms.

Section 4. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency

### ARTICLE XIV

### Chapters

Section 1. Chapter Officers shall assume the duties of office at the first Chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. On or before June first of each year, the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter Officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of National Committees, giving her the name and address of the Chapter member on that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer before January thirteenth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report. Contributions received by Chapter Treasurers after January thirtieth shall be sent to the State Treasurer and shall be included in her supplementary report.

### ARTICLE XV

# Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws or the bylaws of the National Society.

### ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These bylaws may be amended by a two thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all Chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a Chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a Chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other Chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in

the motion to adopt, an amendment to these bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the Chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the Chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

### STANDING RULES

- No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows. State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer 1 to 3; Chapter Regents 1 each; another if requested; National Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State 1 each; Honorary State Regents 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairmen of other Committees 4 each; Senior President C.A.R. 1; District Directors 1 each; The Library of the Kansas Society 2; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society 2; the President General 1; the Kansas State Historical Soc 1; the D.A.R. National Library 1; and the President of the State Officers Club; Chapter Regents Club and the State Chairmans Club 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.
- No. 2. Chairmen of State Committees and the appointed Officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.
- No. 3. No less than three issues of Kansas D.A.R. News shall be printed each year, expense to be borne by the State Society.
- No. 4. "The State Registrar shall furnish the publisher of the Kansas D.A.R. News a correct and up to date mailing list."
- No. 5. A sum not to exceed \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent, each year for the purpose of carrying on her work.
- No. 6. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference. No expenses shall be allowed an officer if the State Conference is in her home city.

No. 7 \$25.00 shall be alloted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

- No. 8. \$50.00 shall be alloted to State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.
- No. 9. The Shawnee Pilgrimage and Picnic shall be held on Constitution Day, September 17 at Shawnee Mission, Kansas City, Kansas. Local Chapters shall act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be alloted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents 25c).
- No. 10. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State

Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 11 A sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be used for C.A.R. projects.

No. 12. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 13 The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board meeting to each of the District meetings in the fall.

No. 14. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15 of each year, a copy of the Chapter Year Book to each of the State Officers and to the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 15. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 16. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 17. The Kansas D.A.R. Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Public Library, Dodge City, Kansas.

- (a) The Kansas Society shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Public Library, and shall provide a postal box in Dodge City, Kansas for the use of the Dodge City Chapter Library Committee in receiving requests for loan of books and their return.
- (b) The Dodge City Public Library shall provide a private room with adequate work and storage space.
- (c) The Dodge City Chapter, D.A.R. shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the library. This committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
- (d) All Scrap Books belonging to the Kansas Society shall be kept in the Kansas D.A.R. Library.

No. 18. The Chapters in each District are as follows:
