OBJECTS OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge" thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

INSIGNIA

The insignia of the National Society shall consist of a badge in the form of a spinning wheel and distaff. It shall be worn only over the left breast.—National By-Laws, Article XIII.

The insignia should always be accorded the place of honor on all forms of stationery, programs, year books, conference reports and tablets. It should be either at the top center or the upper left hand corner. No wording whatever should be put above it.—DAR Handbook, Page 62.

A copy of her speech follows:

Madame Regent:

"Our American Heritage has been hard won and can only be maintained and made to flourish through our constant vigilance against those forces which would seek to undermine our way of life. Many of our native born countrymen unfortunately take our inheritance for granted and wishfully assume that it will ever be that way without a great deal of individual effort to counteract such forces. Hence, it warms our hearts and brings a deep sense of satisfaction to find among us those, who, although not American Citizens through birth, so highly prize that which is theirs through Naturalization that they constantly work at the furtherance of our American ideals.

One such person is Ebenezer Allen, a Naturalized American Citizen of Columbus, Kansas. Mr. Allen was born in England in 1874 and came to the United States in 1900. He received his final Naturalization Papers in 1924. In his early time in this country he was a coal miner and then an employee of the Spencer Chemical Company. For twenty-nine years immediately prior to his retirement in 1962 he served as door-keeper of the House and Senate of the Kansas Legislature. During these sixty-two years in his adopted country he has worked hard at being a good American, achieving feats of Americanism which should be an inspiration to all of us. He has been most active in a variety of civic and patriotic endeavors including a deep and intense interest in youth through Public School activities, and as an officer in his local union of the United Mine Workers and many years of service as a member of his local Election Board. On his retirement, he was accorded the unusual distinction of an

invitation to address the Kansas Senate from the rostrum of the Senate Chamber, a privilege never before granted anyone outside of senators, the governor and visiting dignitaries.

The Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution has been honored to recognize the life and works of Mr. Allen by awarding to him our Americanism Medal for his trustworthiness, service, leadership and patriotism as a Naturalized Citizen. This award was initiated and made through the splendid sponsorship of the Dana Chapter of Columbus. Will Mrs. Stebbins, Regent, and Mrs. Sparks, Chairman of Americanism, of that Chapter, please come forward and be recognized for this outstanding work in behalf of their Chapter.

While the Dana Chapter has only twenty-nine members and does not have a Naturalization Court located in their town, it has been active above and beyond the call of duty in furthering the cause of Americanism in their community and surrounding area. To you, Mrs. Stebbins and Mrs. Sparks, as representatives of your Chapter and for each of your hard working members, the Kansas Society extends it's heartfelt appreciation and congratulations for an excellent job well done. May your number increase."

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Kansas Society DAR work for the standardization of traffic laws, stricter regulations for obtaining drivers' licenses, and tighter laws regarding drunken drivers.

CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY OF WOMEN

WHEREAS: Statistics show that more than half of the citizens of voting age are women in the United States, and

WHEREAS: The welfare of our nation depends upon the selection and election of **GOOD CANDIDATES FOR PUBLIC OFFICE**, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The Kansas Society DAR encourage all its members to assume their civic responsibility to register and vote in all county, city, state and national elections after a study of issues and the qualifications of the candidates for the offices.

**REPEAL THE "ARMS CONTROL AND DISARMAMENT
ACT" OF CONGRESS**

WHEREAS: History shows that no people have long endured nor maintained their freedom unless they were able to defend it with well-

trained armed forces from the time of earliest recorded civilizations, and
WHEREAS: Congress has passed an act to create a disarmament agency to work for the eventual disestablishment of all United States armed forces and providing the United Nations with the only armed forces in the world, and

WHEREAS: OUR OWN STATE DEPARTMENT is actively seeking the abolishment of our armed forces, and since the direction of the United Nations armed forces is under the office of the assistant secretary general for POLITICAL AND SECURITY AFFAIRS, WHICH APPOINTMENT IS NOT UNDER OR SUBJECT TO A VETO BY THE UNITED STATES and said office is now being held by a COMMUNIST (BY SECRET AGREEMENT since the FOUNDING OF THE UNITED NATIONS)!

BE IT RESOLVED: By the Kansas Society DAR to memorialize the Congress to repeal the "Arms Control and Disarmament Act" of September 26, 1961.

PROMOTION OF GOOD WILL

TEXT BOOK ON AIMS OF COMMUNISM

Completing our first year in the office of Recording Secretary, we report:

INVENTORY:

The inventory is complete to date with the exception of these Proceedings — 1934-1935 and 1935-1936. If you know where we may secure one copy each of the Proceedings, will you please advise us?

FILES:

We are using the duplicate file system because the State Regent will have the information when needed, and should the original be lost we still have a record.

PRINTING:

Dids are received for all printing. Stationery and postal cards were printed in Salina with the State Regent assuming this responsibility.

STATIONERY AND POSTAL CARDS:

All State Officers and District Directors received their stationery and postal cards on May 12, 1962, at the Executive Committee Meeting. The two District Directors not present received theirs from a State Officer living in the same city. State Chairman received their stationery directly from the printer.

POSTAL CARDS:

These are in packets of 50 and 100. A record of who receives the cards, number received and date is kept in the file. State Chairmen and Appointees, with the exception of four, received their postal cards during the District Conferences. During this administration additional postal cards will be available upon request to State Officers, State Chairmen and Appointees. Send your request including the number desired to the Recording Secretary.

ANNUAL REPORT OF OFFICERS:

A few minor changes were made on the report form. The report blanks were mailed on January 2, 1963, to the Chapter Regent. We received 66 completed reports and 66 narrative reports: the latter will be printed in the 1963 Proceedings.

PROCEEDINGS:

The Proceedings record what we are doing in the State and we firmly believe your DAR will mean more to you by reading the complete record each year.

Bids for the 1963 Proceedings were received from 6 Hutchinson, Kansas Printers and 2 from Salina, Kansas. The latter by the State Regent.

All warrants received from the State Regent were countersigned.

The Conference program was proof read by the Recording Secretary. The State Regent assumed the responsibility of having 300 printed in Salina.

We attended the Fort Larned Chapter Flag Day Breakfast, guest of Mrs. Homer Smith, and announced the official appointment of Mrs. Smith as State Conservation Chairman.

We attended the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and in the evening the Mary Wade Strother Chapter Covered Dish Dinner and Meeting, guest of the State Regent.

All Executive Committee Meetings, Board of Management Meetings, Four District Conferences and State Conferences in 1962-1963 were attended.

Our Office has numerous duties to perform and holds great responsibility, but in return we are receiving an excellent education and much enjoyment working with many dedicated members.

TREASURER

As Treasurer of Kansas Society DAR, I have attended all Executive Board meetings, the meeting of the State Board of Management, and the four District meetings. I have tried to perform the duties of my office in a prompt, courteous and efficient manner. I have answered numerous inquiries, and given information and assistance whenever requested. This has necessitated approximately 660 pieces of letter mail and 170 post cards on official business.

The Treasurers and Auditors report which is presented today covers the period February 1, 1962 to January 31, 1963: which is three months of the past administration and nine months of the present administration. I will not read the complete report, but I do urge the members to study it and become familiar with the financial operations of the Kansas State Society.

State Conference, 1961, authorized the publication of a State Directory. The printing cost of \$1265.00 was paid in February 1962, and is shown on page 2 of this report. Sale of Directories, both before and since publication, totals \$410.25, which leaves a Directory Deficit of \$854.75, which is reflected in the General Fund Balance.

On pages 3 and 4 you will find a report of the Kansas Room Chapel Fund. Your attention is called to Exhibit "C" on the bottom of page 4, and the \$4634.48 in the Student Loan Fund. Consideration should be given to some method of putting this money to work helping students.

The \$35.59 withdrawn from the Congress Tea Fund Account was to pay the deficit on the Kansas Coffee held in Washington, D. C. last April.

Interest from the Eisenhower Fund Bonds was accumulating in the checking account. Your Treasurer, with the consent of the State Regent, opened a savings account in the Johnson County National Bank and Trust Co., Prairie Village, with these funds. As of January 31, 1963, there was \$190.21 in this account.

Chapter Regents and Treasurer are reminded to file Form 990-A with the Internal Revenue Service, Wichita. Failure to do so may jeopardize the tax exempt status of the National Society.

It has been a pleasure to serve the Society and our State Regent, and I wish to thank the Kansas Daughters for giving me this opportunity to serve.

REGISTRAR

The first year serving as your State Registrar has been far more busy than I had anticipated but it has been a most interesting year because in the Registrar's Office, which acts as the information center concerning the status of your members and their ancestors, one watches the progress of the Society.

The State Registrar is solely dependent on the Chapter Registrars for all information which is placed in the files—not only of the new members, but those who have passed away, resigned, transferred out of the State Society, or the new members transferring into the State Society, those who change residence in Kansas and transfer between Chapters, or change names or addresses as well as those who are dropped.

Only through the prompt and close cooperation of the Chapter Registrars with the State Registrar can the State Files be kept accurate and also the mailing list for the State DAR News.

Please, Chapters, elect a woman Registrar who is willing and has time because the Registrar's duties can be very time consuming especially if she is helping on Genealogical Research for new members.

Only 48 Yearbooks were received this year. Thanks to those Chapters sending them to me and please all 66 Chapters send me your Yearbooks this Fall. These are invaluable to me in checking the files and mailing list. Will those Chapters not printing the address of the member in the Yearbook, please send me a correct and complete copy of your Chapter Roster with all addresses, including those who are non-resident.

The Necrology List was assembled for the Memorial Service. If there were names omitted, it was because I did not receive them.

Two Supplements to the 1961 State Directory have been compiled and are here for those who have purchased the Directory. With the Supplements printed twice a year which contain the names and addresses of all the new members plus those who have been reinstated and transferred into the State and the Necrology List, we feel that the Directory is as up to date as possible and the price is \$5.00.

A four page list of the names of the women in the Kansas Society who are living in towns outside their local Chapters has been prepared and will be distributed. We hope these will be studied and perhaps these women at sometime may be invited to visit your Chapter, be asked to become an associate member, or even transfer.

I am very encouraged about the growth of the Kansas Society. For the first time in several years we have shown a gain in membership. We

have had a net gain of 27 members. The reinstatements are most encouraging, but the resignations and dropped members are most discouraging. There should not be any dropped members! Usually by December you are aware that because of circumstances a member will not be able to pay her dues. Point out to her that a resignation is just a leave of absence and she can return to active status with no penalty, but a dropped member has a penalty to pay plus the back dues and present dues and the fee is high. This must be done before January 1st, while the member is still in good standing. The fiscal year of DAR is July to July, so after December 31st the member is no longer in good standing and not eligible.

Desire Tobey Sears Chapter of Mankato with a net gain of 7 members is awarded the Eunice Sterling Chapter Traveling Award Flags with 12.72% net gain in membership, 16% of their membership of 55 are Junior Members.

William Wilson Chapter of Garden City was a very close second with a net increase of 12.50%, just .22% back of Desire Tobey Sears. They had four new members.

Our two largest Chapters Eunice Sterling of Wichita and Topeka, admitted 14 and 15 new members respectively, but because of high losses, their net gains were small.

I appreciate the splendid cooperation of the Chapter Registrars and Regents. It is becoming evident to all of them, that this vital information sent to the Registrar is as essential as the treasurer collecting dues. I'm looking forward to working with these women for the next two years and hope to meet many of them at this State Conference.

All has not been duties performed, it has been a pleasure to meet and serve with the State Officers at all the Executive Board Meetings and the Chapter Regents and State Chairmen at the Board of Management Meetings. Visiting the District Meetings this Fall and renewing old friendships was most enjoyable and I'm looking forward to the District Meetings this Fall.

The State DAR Library has always been a special interest of mine and it has been a pleasure to work for it officially throughout the past year. The State Board meetings at Salina in May and October were attended and plans made for library improvement. These plans were presented to the four District Conferences in October.

The thirty-nine excellent year books received were placed in the DAR Library and have been used.

Forty-eight library Questionnaires were returned by the Chapter Librarians, and showed contributions made to NSDAR for rebinding and micro-film projects. A total of \$112.50 was given to the State Library Book fund and a variety of Genealogical books and manuscripts which are listed below. We thank each Chapter for their fine contributions.

A meeting of the State Library Board was called and suggestions for books and the best methods of serving our members have been followed. The DAR Library staff consists of members of the Dodge City Chapter and Kansas Genealogical who are on duty one to four afternoons each month at the library. They deserve special thanks for this dedicated service. Your Librarian has spent every Wednesday in the Library, when not out of the state, and has had appointments on other days helping a potential member find some missing link. The Registration Book shows that more than 900 people have used the Library and over 100 books have been mailed to members. We have a complete file of DAR Magazines, 1945 through 1962, ready for binding as soon as funds are available. We will be glad to send the duplicate copies to Chapters who wish to complete their files.

This year special emphasis has been on completing the set of DAR Lineage Books. These books are the first to be consulted by persons beginning research for membership. Four years ago there were but 29 volumes and all were in bad repair. Now we have 90 volumes, half of which have been rebound. We hope that by March 1, 1964, we will have the complete set of 166 volumes.

Your DAR Library is the gateway to membership. We invite you to use it.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

The service of the American History Month Chairman and Historian seem to overlap. The fact that Chapter Historians and American History Month Chairmen are often the same person adds to the confusion. However, we do have rather definite fields of activity.

Your American History Month Chairman urges you to be actively interested in American History twelve months of the year rather than just in February. Any phase of American History demands our attention. How long has it been since you looked into an American History textbook, read or encouraged someone to read a new book—historical or fiction with a historical background? You would be surprised at some of the new slants given on historical events.

On request, the Governor of the State of Kansas issued an American History Month Proclamation. Your Chairman received a copy of that Proclamation and on request sent it to the National Chairman. Being uninformed your Chairman took for granted that the office of the Governor sent copies of the Proclamation to the newspapers of the State. Too late she found she was wrong.

Forty letters were written urging the passage of Senate Joint Resolution 22 designating February as American History Month.

Your Chairman wrote twice to all Chapter Chairmen or Regents and sent material from the National Chairman. She revamped the questionnaire sent the State Chairman by the National Chairman. The following are some interesting facts obtained from 38 Chapters that answered the questionnaire.

All 38 Chapters (and I venture to say all 66 Chapters) had some sort of special programs in February . . . teas, lectures, contests involving essays or notebooks and special publicity.

Six Chapters used 1160 American History Month stickers. Posters were used in stores, cafes and schools. Two Chapters organized speakers' bureaus to furnish special programs to other organizations.

Public and private schools in 10 cities participated in essay contests.

Eight schools sent 35 essays on historical subjects to the State Chairman for competition. The essays came from grades 6, 7 and 8. There were none from the 5th grade. The essays are being judged at each grade level. Each essay will be read by an English teacher, a history teacher and a person of another profession.

Historical books have been purchased for the first place winners at each level. The second place winners will be recognized with Certificates of Merit. The winners will be announced through the State Bulletin.

Next year your Chairman hopes to accomplish a great deal more. We want to popularize the essay contest and set up standards for judging. The Governor's Proclamation will be sent to all Chapters who in turn may give them to the newspapers and some will print the Proclamation.

Your Chairman begs you to send her suggestions and criticisms.

The first place historical essay contest winners are: Dixie Draeger, Columbus, "Trail of Tears" 8th grade. Debbie Sandella, Columbus, "Dwight David Eisenhower" 7th grade. Dean Bergman, Lenexa, "The Political Life of Kansas" 6th grade. Kansas DAR has sent them historical books as prizes.

Second place winners: Melissa Owen, Topeka, "The Story of Kansas Wheat" 8th grade. Stuart Miller, Topeka, "The Kansas-Nebraska Bill" 7th grade. Ronald Davis, Augusta, "Indian Territory" 6th grade. Kansas DAR will send them historical medals.

Our thanks to chapters for sponsoring the contest; to teachers for supervising; to the students for the great deal of reading, writing and re-writing. Not all won prizes, but I know to do this reading and writing was worth while.

Each essay was read by three people: an English teacher and a history teacher of each level; one of another profession.

The first place essays have been entered in the district competition. This South Central Division includes Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas.

AMERICAN INDIAN **Mrs. Lloyd V. Mellick**

Letters were mailed in September to all Chapters asking help for our two Indian Schools: Bacone College, Bacone, Oklahoma and St. Mary's School, Springfield, South Dakota, or other Indian Schools of their choice.

A questionnaire was sent to all Chapters in January, asking for a report on the work done. Forty-one Chapters had reported before my report was sent in to the State

The reports gave the following: Cash to Bacone, \$69.50. Cash to St. Mary's, \$151.50. Clothing—about 500 pounds of clothing were sent, with an approximate value of \$514.00. Postage—about \$34.83, not all reported pounds or postage. Other items—value about \$76.00, sent were jewelry, cosmetics, sun lamp and yard goods. One Chapter sent Christmas gifts and others sent cards and stamps. A car load of clothing was sent to the Navajo Indians in New Mexico. Cash sent to General Indian Fund, \$45.00. Programs on American Indians, 5.

My sincere thanks to all Chapters who helped in this important work.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL

Mrs. E. Carruth Owen

Last fall letters and questionnaires were sent to 66 Chapters. Fifty-eight Chairmen's names were sent in. Only 39 of this number reported. Many of these were not complete. We have about 20 very active Chapters.

Thirty-three awards were given. One of these was the Americanism Medal. There were 10,783 service hours. Ten Chapters worked in Naturalization Courts. Three Chapters gave Teas serving 250.

Six hundred thirty six Manuals were distributed to prospective citizens, 22 to libraries, 63 to Public Schools, 64 to Americanization Schools and 11 miscellaneous for a total of 796.

Two hundred and eleven American Flags, 160 Declaration of Independence and 160 Welcome cards were given to new citizens. Three hundred eighty hours of service were given at Naturalization Courts.

A total of \$105.63 was spent. Eighteen radio hours, 7 television hours and 1140 inches of publicity were given to this committee.

Mrs. Mayme Farmer, Shawnee Chapter, taught classes in basic English. She also had just finished two years as President of the Naturalization Council of Wyandotte and Johnson Counties. She did many things for these people far beyond her call of duty such as entertaining them in her home and taking them places of local interest. Mrs. John A. McQuire, James Ross Chapter, has been elected the new President of the Council.

Dana Chapter of Columbus, Kansas, has done outstanding work, not only for awarding the Americanism Medal to Mr. Allen but in programs and service to their community. They have a membership of 31 and there is not a Naturalization Court in Columbus. They had 152½ hours in publicity, a library display and have been on radio and television. Mrs. Sparks, Chairman, says she hopes to do better next year.

Thank each of you for your reports. Without them I would not have been able to make this one. I do appreciate the work you do.

AMERICAN MUSIC

This has been a good year. To date I have heard from 58 Chairmen of American Music. All but 11 of those either sing or repeat the National Anthem. Most have had, or will have an American Music program. Some even say, "We have used American Music at all meetings, even while using other Music."

Our big project is the chorus singing at the State Conference. We have high hopes that this will lead to a custom and we will be able to "break into song" when needed. Song sheets have been printed and one has been sent to each Chapter Chairman or the Regent, with a letter of explanation.

Many Chapters have sent clippings of their Musical Programs and these will be sent to the National Music Chairman to be included in a Scrap Book. Perhaps another year and all Chapters will send clippings from Newspaper and all will be included in this National Scrap Book.

I am grateful for all the help of the State Officers and most of all to the State Regent, Miss Cowger.

Kansas Society, Children of the American Revolution, has twelve organized societies with a total reported membership March 1, 1963, of 260. Loss reported 41. Total decrease since last report, 74. Ten new members approved as of February National Board. Nine transfers to DAR.

Five Societies together contributed a total of \$40.00 for one page advertisement in National C A R Magazine. Twenty-Five Dollars was expended on reports with pictures of State and Regional Meetings in 1962. Kansas Society sent \$7.50 as a special contribution for a flag case for Kansas flag at National Headquarters. Articles by members have been published in the National Magazine.

Total amount of money reported contributed to National Projects \$46.60.

Used clothing and coupons were sent to Mountain Schools, in addition to cash donations. Indian Schools were sent cash plus used clothing, jewelry and books.

Kansas hosted the Fifth Northwestern Regional Meeting at Wichita, June 1962, and the Seventeenth Annual State Conference was also held at Wichita at that time. State prizes were awarded in many categories at the 1962 State Conference, and we have to date seven State Chairmen's cash awards to be awarded at the 1963 State Conference at Great Bend, Kansas. The traveling flag award is in its fourth year, and at the 1962 State Conference a banner to accompany the flag was presented to the State Society by Sunflower Society.

Our Sunflower Special, published in conjunction with the DAR News, has been published three times during the year, July, October and February.

Kansas Society received the 1963 Patriotic Education Week National Ribbon for the Fifth Consecutive year, and three Societies report they have been awarded streamers for their colors for participation in programs stressing Patriotic Education.

Kansas Annual C A R Breakfast was held at the DAR State Conference in March 1963. Distinguished guests were Mrs. Roy L. Beck, Senior National Vice President Northwestern Region, who brought greetings from the Senior National Board; Ann Brinkoeter, State President KS C A R, who brought greetings from the State Society to the DAR. Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn, Historian General NSDAR, representing the NSDAR Board, and Mrs. Paul R. Greenlease, NSDAR Magazine Chairman. Miss Pauline Cowger, State Regent, graciously stopped and said "hello" to the breakfast guest. Two CAR members in Colonial costume, Billy Woodruff and Debra Schreiner, presented a corsage and money gift to President General, Mrs. Robert V. H. Duncan, when she arrived at the KSDAR Conference.

Kansas will have a nice delegation at National Convention this year; the State President and Senior State Vice-President will attend; we have a candidate on the National ticket for Vice President Northwestern Region; three members will serve as pages for National Senior officers, Mrs.

W. Earle Hawley, Col. J. Huntington Hills, and Mrs. Roy Beck. One member will participate in the National Oratorical contest and one member is to be Color Bearer for Kansas flag.

Kansas CAR has suffered a loss of members through resignations and drops this year which is not recouped through new members. We shall endeavor to gain more next year, with the continued support and cooperation of KSDAR, SAR and SR.

June 1962—Your State Chairman had the outgoing State Conservation Chairman, Mrs. HoBart Frederick, as my guest at the Fort Larned Chapter Flag Day Breakfast, June 14, 1962. Mrs. Frederick brought the State Conservation file with her and turned it over to the new State Conservation Chairman.

July 1962—Your State Chairman chose as her State Project for the next three years "Beautifying Markers and Historical Places Through Conservation." I took pictures before and after of Markers in the Fort Larned Chapter area and made a scrapbook of the pictures.

August 1962—Received letter from National Conservation Chairman, Mrs. J. Stewart James stating her husband was ill and in the hospital and she would be unable to do much.

September 1962—Your State Chairman mailed out form letter No. 1 to all Chapter Conservation Chairman and to Regents (where no Conservation Chairman was appointed), State Regent, State Recording Secretary, National and Vice Conservation Chairman.

October 1962—State Chairman attended Board of Management Meeting in Salina and the Northwest and Southwest District Meetings.

December 1962—Mailed Conservation Questionnaire with letter enclosed to all Conservation Chairman and Regents (where no Chairman was appointed), State Regent, State Recording Secretary, National and Vice Conservation Chairman.

January 1963—State Chairman requested literature from the American Forest Industries sent to all Conservation Chapter Chairmen in the State. This was sent during the month. State Chairman attended the Pawnee County Soil Conservation Annual meeting. The speaker, Mr. Males, showed pictures of farms in Oklahoma before and after Conservation programs. He stated there would not be a water shortage if the soil was preserved and cared for like it should be. Attended Pawnee Council of Clubs, the program was a book review on dangers of Insecticides and Herbicides by Rachel Carson, a biologist.

February 1963—State Report sent to National and Vice National Conservation Chairmen, State Regent and State Recording Secretary.

March 1963—State Chairman will attend Board of Management meeting and State Conference. Conservation literature and material will be displayed at the State Conference. Also a Scrapbook compiled by the State Chairman as an example in making a scrapbook. The State Project pictures may be included in the same book.

DAR GOOD CITIZEN

Mrs. Lucile Rust

The DAR Good Citizen Committee is an important committee in the National and State Societies of DAR. Established in 1935, the Committee's activities have been enthusiastically carried on, and are recognized by DAR members and others as an outstanding contribution to the encouragement of good citizenship among high school students. The complimentary statements of Kansas Educators made to the Chairman of the DAR Good Citizen Committee of the Kansas Society were most gratifying and encouraging.

This year 576 principals of accredited Kansas high schools were invited to participate in the DAR Good Citizen project and 133 high school senior girls were named DAR Good Citizens. Of these, 122 participated in the district and state contests. A change was made this year by the NSDAR, whereby a questionnaire on citizenship, patriotism and leadership was used in the district and state contests instead of the essay. However, the state winner was required to write an essay on the subject, "Prove All Things" to participate in the national contest.

Northwest District led in the number of schools having DAR Good Citizens—42, with Northeast District—36, Southwest District — 33 and Southeast District 22. One hundred twenty-four (124) of these DAR Good Citizens were sponsored by DAR Chapters. Though 9 DAR Good Citizens were not sponsored, chapter sponsors were invited for all of them.

Fifty-five chapters sponsored DAR Good Citizens and 11 chapters sponsored none, although every chapter was asked to sponsor one or more. Northwest District was first in the number of chapters sponsoring DAR Good Citizens—14. Northeast District led with the fewest chapters not sponsoring DAR Good Citizens—2. In each of the Northwest and Southeast District all DAR Good Citizens but one were sponsored.

The number of DAR Good Citizens that a chapter sponsored varied from 6 to none. Three chapters—Desire Tobey Sears, Polly Ogden and Topeka—each sponsored six DAR Good Citizen. Concordia chapter spon-

sored five. Four chapters, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, General Edward Hand, Ninnescah and Wyandot—each sponsored four. Seven chapters—Atchison, Betty Washington, Courtney Spalding, James Ross, Nathan Edson, Oceanus Hopkins and Peleg Gorton—each sponsored three. Twenty-four chapters each sponsored 2; 17 chapters each sponsored 1; and 11 chapters none.

One hundred nine DAR Good Citizen pins were purchased by chapters and 3 chapters reported pins on hand. Even so there were a few sponsoring chapters that did not award the honor girls pins. Most of the sponsoring chapters recognized their DAR Good Citizens in some special way and often included the girls' mothers in these events.

DAR Good Citizen Certificates, provided by the NSDAR, were sent for all of the girls either to the Chapter Chairmen or High School Principals and were awarded by these persons.

Many of the chapters had excellent publicity relative to their DAR Good Citizens. More chapters should give more attention to this aspect of the activity, so that more people should know about the DAR Good Citizen project. Too, more high schools and students should be participating in this fine project.

Our Board of Management voted to continue the addition of names in the Remembrance Book from time to time. Colored postal cards of the Kansas Chapel are being sold, six for twenty-five cents. A four foot rug with a foam rubber pad outside the entrance door, and a strip of plastic inside, afford a measure of protection for the carpeting, as the many visitors enter the Chapel.

It is hoped to put into effect a yearly plan of a vesper meditation hour each afternoon between 4 and 5 o'clock during the week of Continental Congress. The lighting and extinguishing of the altar candles and quiet door courtesies would be the duties of one or two Kansas Daughters appointed for daily service.

Mr. Eisenhower spoke with deep feeling and much affection to the huge crowd of Kansans. The colorful setting for this gala occasion was enhanced by the stirring music of marching bands and a thrilling color guard of honor—it was indeed a memorable day.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

The Lineage Research Committee in its second year of service has received notice that forty-one chapters have a lineage research chairman, and seven of these are also the chapter registrar. The other twenty-five chapters are small and reported no need for a separate committee chairman.

Twenty requests of various sorts were received from chapters and fifteen papers asking for aid were sent to the National Lineage Research Committee. The answers from the Committee showed that much research had been done and gave directions to the applicant for further research. Report was received of only one new member being admitted to the DAR because of the research of this committee. The National Committee worked out a form to be used which shows the whole family ancestry for four generations, and the Committee requests that at least three generations be completed before asking assistance.

As chairman I have worked twenty-five hours on research in the Wichita Public Library, have written thirty letters besides the sixty-six sent to Chapters last fall. Request for research came from the Ohio State Lineage Research Chairman and the answer was found, graves and dates located, and a copy of record on the head stones sent to be notarized if needed. I have sent the annual report to the National Chairman, Mrs. Albert B. Whitley, and to the National Vice Chairman of the South Central Division, Mrs. Floy Perkinson Gates, Durant, Okla.

It has been an interesting year and I trust I may be of help to the Chapters.

The award given by our National Membership Chairman, Mrs. George U. Baylies, to the Chapter having the greatest gain in our state goes to the Topeka Chapter. Mrs. Alfred H. Tebbens, Jr., is Regent of Topeka Chapter and Mrs. Aubert J. Mowry is Membership Chairman.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

Cards for information were mailed to Chapter Regents in August and letters outlining plans and suggestions for the yearly program were sent to Chapter Chairmen in September. Names and addresses of chairmen were mailed to the National Chairman in time to receive material for the first meetings of the year.

Questionnaires were mailed to Chapter Chairmen in January. They also received a questionnaire from the National Chairman that covered information needed for her report to Continental Congress in April. The prompt response and excellent work done by the Chapter Chairmen were much appreciated and the results were very encouraging.

Many letters were answered and phone calls made to give help whenever possible. Much time, effort, study, mileage and anxiety has been given to this first year as chairman but the stimulation to do more comes with the knowledge that each member must strive harder to "Hold High the Torch" and work to preserve the Constitution and American ideals.

The following report is based on reports from 60 of the 66 Chapters: 60 gave 5 minutes or more to National Defense each meeting. 49 had one or more complete programs on National Defense. 49 observed Constitution Week. 45 reported one or more members made historical tours. 59 displayed Defense material at Chapter meetings. 25 worked on special projects for the year. 46 gave materials to schools and libraries or individuals. 18 made material available for debates on current issues. 64 Good Citizenship Medals awarded 42 Chapters participating. Some awards were given at assemblies, some at Teas or programs with winners and mothers as guests of the Chapters. 32 read the 1962 Resolutions. 36 responded to alerts; 10 had telephone committees. 8 reported communities contributed to UNICEF and card sales. 26 contributed to DOLLARS FOR DEFENSE. 23 Chapters wrote as individuals to Congressmen and Senators on current issues. (These 23 Chapters were concerned about the Cuban Crisis, Medicare, Disarmament Bill 28, UNESCO, NATO, Tax, Foreign Trade, Connelly Amendment, Radio Programs, known Communist organizations, National Debt, Immigration, Conservation, error in Flag stamp, etc.). Several Chapters had editorials in the newspapers. Wichita Chapters formed a Council that did outstanding work.

Projects mentioned were: Cupcakes with tiny flags to Veteran's Hospital; open meeting to public; helping write county history; replacing DAR Trail markers; Grace cards to local cafes; recordings of Constitution to schools; Flag to scouts; Flag to Brownies; Flag to dedication of youth's gymnasium; Flag placed in Indian School; took part in dedication of the Wagon Bed Springs National Monument; civic programs; book rebinding and purchasing books DAR Library, Dodge City; plan to teach American ideals of freedom and patriotism, implementing text, 1st to 8th grades; program on signers of Declaration of Independence; restoration of historic fountain; framed Constitution to schools; public Washington Day Tea; History notebooks for 8th grade and participation in Flag raisings.

The Chairman attended Shawnee Pilgrimage, the October Board of Management Meeting and the four District Conferences; gave report at each meeting, visited 8 Chapters, gave 3 speeches on National Defense, was one of 3 hostesses at a reception for State Regent, given by both Jane Dean Coffey Chapter and the BPW Club, Coffeyville, of which Miss Cowger is a Past State President, BPW.

Future plans are attendance at the State Conference in Wichita—presiding at the National Defense Luncheon and attendance at Continental Congress in Washington, D. C., in April.

It has been a great pleasure to serve as your State Chairman. Much has been learned about DAR procedure and the contact with the Board of Management, Chapter Chairmen and the DAR members around the state has been a worthwhile experience, challenging and rewarding—in fact a new challenge appears every day for National Defense.

Grateful thanks to the Chapter Chairmen for their cooperation which has made this report possible and special thanks to you, Miss Cowger. I am happy that I have had the opportunity to serve and work for National Defense and to do my part to preserve Constitutional Government.

PROGRAM

Congratulations to every Chapter in Kansas for your very fine year books. It has been a rewarding experience to catalog them and see how you have "Held High The Torch" in presenting the three objectives of our Society. Our President General's theme has been used throughout and we have learned how to "Prove All Things" so that we can "Hold Fast To That Which Is Good."

Many of the items listed in these books are: Opening Ritual, Pledge of Allegiance, National Anthem, Daughter's Creed, American's Creed, Daughter's Pledge, the poem "Our Emblem," days the Flag should be displayed and other pertinent items.

From your yearbooks I have learned the President's Message is regularly read in 13 Chapters, but since I find Magazine Review listed, I am sure it is read in more Chapters than indicated.

Our State Regent, Miss Pauline Cowger, will visit 23 Chapters this

year. She brings to each one an inspiring message as she presents the various facets of our work.

Our National Society suggests book review programs which have been used by 20 of the Chapters. Many have reviewed the book **A Nation of Sheep** following the suggestion of our National Defense Committee.

One of our most important committees is National Defense, and we have been asked to have a five-minute report at each meeting so that every member can be well informed on the subject and understand the views of our society. Twenty-three Chapters have either had a five-minute report or a special program by their National Defense Committee Chairmen.

We are urged to use non-member speakers for our programs, and most Chapters have had at least one. I know this is easier for some Chapters as they are located where speakers are available.

Fortunate is the Chapter that can be represented and have a report each year from Continental Congress. We are first members of the National Society and this meeting is vital to us all.

Our National Program Chairman, in her letter to each Chapter, asked for original programs and color slides from our members. I have not learned of any programs at this time, but our color slide program is being well received. Many Chapters have indicated they will cooperate and we should have a fine program from Kansas.

I want to thank the Program Chairman of each Chapter for their promptness in returning the questionnaire which was sent to them early in January. The information received has been forwarded to our National Program Chairman, Miss Town.

It has been a pleasure to serve as State Program Chairman, and our work should improve in the next two years as we learn to know each other better.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

My appointment to the State Chairmanship of Public Relations for the Kansas Society DAR is a challenging one and one that by necessity demands the cooperation and willingness to share of all of those who were appointed to this Committee by Chapter Regents. Ours is a tremendous task ahead for the coming year. The assistance and help of every Kansas Daughter is urgently needed. Our goal is to create interest in DAR. We must strive for and have good publicity at all times and this includes not only press releases but radio and television as well. Our Committee is closely dependent upon all of the other Committees; Committees such as Constitution Week and American History Month.

All Chapters were urged to forward news stories to their newspapers; to print news items and pictures on those members who were planning on attending State Conference and Continental Congress. Special projects

sponsored by Chapters were publicized. The news printed in the last year reflects an overwhelming interest throughout the State on DAR.

A list of 64 Chapter Chairmen and two Chapter Regents was prepared and forwarded to the National Chairman of Public Relations with a list of the leading newspapers in Kansas.

In September, 1962, letters were mailed to all Chapter Chairmen advising them of the work of the Public Relations Committee. Responses were received from 64 Chapters. A new Press Book was purchased and at the request of the Executive Board the sheets were light in color and the book approximately the same in size. Pages were distributed at the District Meetings and those Chapters not represented received sheets through the mail. The questionnaire on Reporting was mailed to each Chapter Chairman in September and a second notice was sent out in January, 1963. The same method of counting and reporting were used by all Chapters.

As of March 6, 1963, 140 Press Pages were submitted representing some 52 Chapters who participated in the annual Press Book Awards Contest.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

I am happy to report that 64 of the 66 Kansas Chapters sent in reports.

Our members are 100% in giving the Pledge of Allegiance but only 68% in singing, or reciting, the National Anthem.

In the general display of Flags in the Community, 54 reported participation. The number of members flying Flags has risen 20% in the last 5 years to 68%.

Eight large Flags were presented with 4 going to schools. This number should be increased greatly.

Flag talks were given to a number of different organization other than DAR Chapters, and I would urge members to continue this practice. Naturalization Courts were the occasion for presenting the major part of 418 Flag Codes.

Of the 1448 small Flags presented, 93 dozen were mounted on cup cakes for veterans, while nearly 300 were given to New Citizens.

Good publicity with pictures was given the Flag raisings at schools.

I would mention several outstanding projects or activities:

Dana had reminders of special days to fly Flags on the radio, while Dodge City had 14 newspaper items, and Newton 9. James Ross gave

Flag talks to Veterans' Auxiliary groups, while Jonathan Gilbert and Lois Warner had outstanding Flag Day programs. Jane Dean Coffey's goal of at least one Flag in every block in Coffeyville, is most commendable. The most large Flags were sold by John Haupt Chapter to members and friends, the number being 40. Eunice Sterling reported the widest variety of Flag activity. In addition to the presentation of Codes and Flags to 180 New Citizens, they gave 5 Flags to Boy Scout groups and sold 13 to members, and had a Flag exhibit at each Chapter meeting.

TRANSPORTATION

2. Change in compiling NEWS—suggested arrangement by printer. All DAR news will be together followed with CAR news. Results—better working paper for members.

3. A "No Return Postage Guarantee" necessary. This will save 8c per copy. The NEWS will be delivered to last address, only. Following discussion the Board authorized the reporter, Mary Smith, to send the next issue, July, with "No Return Postage Guarantee." A notice of same will appear in the July NEWS.

4. Pictures used in the DAR NEWS will be paid by those persons. The Reporter will send them a statement of cost and will receive their remittance—so record will be complete. The reporter will then forward same to State Treasurer. Size of pictures—State Officers pictures will be one column. State Chairman pictures will be uniform.

5. 3625 copies of the DAR NEWS will be printed for the July issue. All extra copies will be given to State Regent for her mailing to other State Regents.

6. SCRAPBOOK will be of standard size and light colored pages. The Board authorized the reporter to purchase same. The pages will be taken to the District meetings and distributed. Each chapter will sign for receiving same. Any pages mail—return post card will be enclosed—for record.

4. Th librarian suggested DAR members give books to the library as Memorials.

TREASURER: Betty Kessler

1. Files: Needed for use by treasurer. Betty will secure prices and send to State Regent.

2. Large size Checks—the treasurer discussed the advantages of using these kind of checks. Betty Kessler, treasurer, moved she be authorized to secure large check book containing 500 checks of the KSDAR. Elizabeth Ives seconded motion. Motion carried. Betty Kessler will have the checks printed.

3. The treasurer read a statement of her policy which she will use during this Administration. A copy of this statement is filed with the State Regent.

4. Betty Kessler, treasurer, moved the Johnson County Bank and Trust Company, Prairie Village, Kansas, be the depository for the KSDAR Funds. Vera Greenlease seconded motion. Motion carried.

5. BUDGET: The budget was read and discussed. Betty Kessler moved we adopt the budget as presented. Elizabeth Ives seconded the motion. Motion carried.

6. State Conference recommended a maintenance fund be established for the Kansas Chapel. State Regent, Pauline Cowger, recommended each chapter contribute \$1.00 each year for this fund.

7. The same auditors will audit the Treasurers books as have previously audited them.

Change Standing Rule No. 17 to read: The Scrap Book of each year—is presented to the State Regent of that Administration (not to the DAR Library).

The reason for this change a storage problem has been created in the State DAR Library because of the increasing number of books and their large size. Microfilming of Scrapbooks was discussed. Following a discussion of the advantages and disadvantages of the Scrap Book becoming the personal property of the State Regent.

Mrs. Uphoff read a letter from Honorary State Regent, Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, regretting her necessary absence.

Report of Officers:

Vice-Regent: Mrs. Paul Greenlease told of working with the Directors and plans for the District Meetings were completed. The meetings were to be a "workshop" and no reports would be given by the Chapter Regents. A meeting in her home with the Four Directors attending had been profitable.

Chaplain: Mrs. J. R. Henning stated sympathy notes are being sent to the next of kin of members we lose by death. Notes of encouragement are sent to our members who have some great sorrow or over-whelming difficulty. Use of the Ritual and the recently compiled Prayer Book and study of the Bible should be encouraged for all our members as well as for the Chaplains.

Recording Secretary: Mrs. HoBart Frederick explained the duplicate file system being used and how the records are being kept. Bids are

received for all printing done. A few minor changes have been made in the Annual Report form. The Proceedings are very important and each member should purchase a copy each year, read the complete record, and your DAR will mean more to you.

Corresponding Secretary: Mrs. J. R. Uphoff compiled a Directory of all chapter officers and presented to each State Officer, State Chairman of National Committees, District Directors, and the Organizing Secretary General. All official notices are mailed on schedule. Assists the State Regent in her official correspondence.

Treasurer: Mrs. Lewis Kessler read the detailed report of receipts and disbursements showing the balance of each fund. This report was filed for audit.

The meeting reconvened at 1:05 p.m. State Regent, Miss Cowger, stated the gavel being used is made of wood taken from John Brown's cabin and presented to Mrs. Guernsey when State Regent by the Betty Washington Chapter.

Report of Officers: continued—

The DAR Magazines are bound to 1945 and now want to complete bindings. The library has many good genealogical books and we suggest books be given to the library as memorials.

Reporter: Mrs. Bill E. Smith explained why the October DAR News has not been received by the members and because of this unsatisfactory cooperation by the Preston Printing Company another company may be selected. The Scrapbook which will be used for Public Relations during this Administration was shown to the members and pages handed to Regents for their chapters. For a successful and interesting DAR News, chapters will please send items of outstanding events.

State Regent: Miss Pauline Cowger.

Since installation at Continental Congress last April 20, 1962, each day has carried its duties.

Officers meeting in Salina, May 12, and then began the pleasure of

filling the chairmanships and special appointments. We were happy to report 100% in time for our July DAR news and for the National Society Directory although our American Indians Chairman, Mrs. Lloyd V. Mellick, Jonathan Gilbert Chapter, was omitted from the latter.

State Chairman Reports:

American Indians: Mrs. Lloyd Mellick stated our two Indian Schools are Bacone College in Oklahoma and St. Marys in South Dakota. Crowded conditions at St. Marys caused disappointment to girls who wanted to attend school this year. This problem must be met and we must help our school.

American Music: Mrs. Carl Biegert announced we will have a chorus at State Conference this year. No practices will be held that will interfere with Conference meetings. In addition to singing the "Star Spangled Banner" and "Home On The Range" songs to be sung will be "Familiar" ones.

Americanism and DAR Manuals: Mrs. E. Carruth Owen announced a new edition of the DAR Manual will soon be available. In general the working plans of the committee remain the same. Chapters can sponsor Americanism in schools, on TV and radio. Place the DAR manual in the schools. Give manual to and assist prospective citizens in studying for the examination to become an American Citizen.

Girls of Senior classes of all accredited high schools, only, are eligible to participate.

DAR Magazine: Mrs. Howard Haines—Big Bargain in good reading to be had in your DAR Magazine. The \$2.00 subscription price represents a mere fraction of its value. Give a subscription to School Library, Public Library, YWCA and etc. Again this year prizes will be given to chapters having most subscriptions per membership. October 1963 will be NEW subscriber month. National Contest and prizes will be awarded in four divisions.

DAR Museum: Mrs. Theo Stebbins (sent report). Miss Cowger announced all gifts (except monetary) must go through the State Museum Chairman. Send description (photograph, if possible) of each gift—this will be sent to National for consideration prior to presentation.

Genealogical Records: Mrs. W. C. Adamek's projects for the next

three years are: 1. Completing genealogical forms in all the chapters. 2. Continue to copy and prepare genealogical source material for the DAR Library. 3. 1962-1963 Special Project—cataloging of all source material contained in the bound volumes of Genealogical Records now on the shelves of the library.

Insignia: Mrs. W. E. Crawford. What shall the Kansas Insignia recognition pin to wear on our ribbons be—the Sunflower, State Seal or Centennial Seal? The more intricate the design the more expensive. Following a discussion by the members, Mrs. Ralph Ralston moved the Insignia Chairman be authorized to obtain design, price and the time of delivery for Kansas recognition pin to wear on our ribbons. Mrs. J. Wesley Lucas seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Junior Membership: Mrs. M. W. Reece said the Junior Members will have a Bazaar at the State Conference and it is our desire for the DAR members to patronize the booth. The Junior Members are also selling stationery. Chapters are requested to supply at least 10 items for the Bazaar. An "Outstanding Junior" contest is being sponsored, also.

Lineage Research: Miss Hazel Howes (sent report). Miss Cowger stated from the report one question which has been asked is "Does this Committee help with supplementals" and the answer obtained from Mrs. Albert B. Whitley, National Lineage Research Chairman is "No."

National Defense: Mrs. E. A. Smith said Communism must be fought in four areas: Education, Church, Politics and Community. Work through the schools especially with suggestions for panel discussion, symposiums and displays. At least FIVE minutes should be devoted to National Defense at each chapter meeting.

Public Relations: Mrs. Bill E. Smith had sent special releases regarding Constitution Week, and about this Board Meeting and the District Meetings to the different papers. Clippings received showed excellent acceptance from the Press. I handed to Chapter Regents present pages for the State Scrap Book.

Program: Mrs. E. H. Snider requests chapters use original programs by your members and use local speakers as well. The National Chairman is asking for a copy of original papers prepared for DAR meetings. Prize will be given at 1963 Continental Congress for the most outstanding collection of 35 mm slides. Mrs. Snider hopes many chapters will send her slides and commentary.

Student Loan and Scholarship: Mrs. Wayne Shaw announced the month of January will be observed as Kansas Student Loan Fund Day. Send contributions directly to STATE TREASURER. The State Scholarship is \$150.00. To qualify the girl must be a Freshman or Sophomore, must have a good academic background, good character and must have connections with DAR.

The Flag of the U.S.A.: Mrs. Brook L. Haines presented the idea of Aluminum Flag Poles and the prices of same. Urged the members to display their flag on all designated days. Also any request to DAR chapters for flag of the USA from any group is NEVER denied.

Special Appointments:

State Organizer: Mrs. Paul Greenlease is eager to assist in organizing new chapters in Kansas and will come at anytime to assist. Organizing a second chapter in the same town has proved to be beneficial, as the present chapter becomes more alert and works with more enthusiasm.

Constitution Week: Mrs. Ralph Ralston, Historian, stated Constitution Week, September 17-23 was observed throughout the nation. This 175th celebration has been extended to July 4, 1963 by the President of the United States. Constitution Day was celebrated by 132 Kansas Daughters and guests attending the Annual Shawnee Pilgrimage.

DAR News Editor: Mrs. Bill E. Smith urges members and chapters to send items of special interest, announcements and information for DAR News.

Shawnee Mission: Mrs. Roscoe Gillaspie plans for the next three years are: 1. Re-catalog all the items in our rooms and re-type new cards naming donors. 2. There is a need for a cabinet with glass doors in which display items that are fragile or put away for the lack of a place to show them to their advantage. 3. No charge for the Pilgrimage this year. Chapters please allow funds on your annual budget or it will be necessary to return to the 25c Registration Fee provided in our Standing Rules. The 1963 Shawnee Pilgrimage---this you will want to attend. A ceremony honoring Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn, Past State Regent, with the placing of her photograph in the Regent's Book on display in our rooms. Time: 11:00 a.m. Place: Museum. Mrs. Lawton Hanna moved Recommendation No. 3 be referred to the By-Laws Committee and properly drawn up. Mrs. J. W. MacConkey seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Standing Rule Changes:

Change Standing Rule No. 9 to read: Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage—On Constitution Day, September 17, if possible. Otherwise on the date nearest September 17, to be determined by the State Regent and the State Chairman.

Change Standing Rule No. 17 to read: The Scrap Book of each year—is presented to the State Regent of that Administration (not to the DAR Library). Action deferred awaiting Mrs. Harry Ives report on available storage elsewhere, the cost of storage and etc.

Change Standing Rule No. 18 to read: Emporia transfer from the Northwest District to the Northeast District. Reason: we were informed Emporia Chapter had voted for transfer to the Northeast District.

Mrs. Guy D. Jossierand moved to refer to the By-Laws Committee recommended three changes in the Standing Rules. Mrs. Harry Ives seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Standing Rule:

Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund: Standing Rule to be suggested to the By-Laws committee and presented to the Board of Management.

Each chapter shall contribute \$1.00 annually to the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund.

Mrs. John L. Higgins moved—Each chapter shall contribute \$1.00 annually to the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund. Mrs. Max Petty seconded the motion. Motion carried.

DAR Magazine Advertising:

The February 1963 issue of the DAR Magazine has been assigned for Kansas Advertising and the executive committee presents to the Board of Management: KSDAR sponsor the first page of the two pages in the DAR Magazine month of February with the picture of our State Regent.

Mrs. J. W. McGuire, Jr., moved—KSDAR sponsor the first page of two pages in the DAR Magazine month of February with the picture of our State Regent. Mrs. J. Wesley Lucas seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Kansas Chapel Remembrance Book:

Question: "Are money gifts still being accepted and will donors name be recorded in the Remembrance Book?"

Discussion: Money gifts should continue to be accepted and the name should be recorded in the Remembrance Book but NOT alphabetical, because impossible.

The artist who penned the names in the book will now charge \$1.00 for each additional name.

Members discussed the charge being made by the artist and agreed any amount would be accepted but for listing in the memorial book a minimum amount should be specified.

To all to whom these presents shall come, GREETINGS:—

I, Paul R. Shanahan, Secretary of State of the State of Kansas, do hereby certify that the following and hereto attached is a true copy of

CHARTER

of Daughters of the American Revolution of Kansas

Filed; May 18, 1921.

CHARTER

Undersigned citizens of the State of Kansas, do hereby voluntarily associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private corporation under the laws of the State of Kansas, and do hereby certify;

FIRST: The name of this corporation shall be The Daughters of the American Revolution of Kansas.

SECOND: That this corporation is organized not for profit and that the purposes for which it is formed are: To perpetuate the memory of the men and women who aided in achieving American Independence in the Revolutionary War; to cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American Liberty and foster patriotism and love of country; to preserve historic landmarks; to acquire and hold title to Historic spots which it desires to preserve; to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

THIRD: that the place where its business is to be transacted is at Topeka, Kansas.

FOURTH: That the term for which this corporation is to exist is Fifty Years.

FIFTH: That the number of directors of this corporation shall be three, and the name and residences of those who are appointed for the first year are:

SIXTH: No goods, chattels, lands, stock, etc.

RESOLUTION TO AMEND CORPORATE CHARTER

Whereas, it now appears to the Kansas Society of The National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, that its present corporate charter does not meet the needs of the Kansas Society at the present time and that said charter should be amended.

Now therefore, be it resolved by the Sixty-first Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, that its present charter be amended as follows:

FIRST: The Name of the corporation is **THE KANSAS SOCIETY of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the DAUGHTERS of the AMERICAN REVOLUTION.**

SECOND: The location of the principal place of business in this State is Kansas State Historical Society.

THIRD: The location of its Registered Office in this State is Memorial Building, 10th Street and Jackson Avenue, Topeka, Kansas.

FOURTH: The name and address of its Resident Agent in this State is Miss Alberta Pantle.

FIFTH: This Corporation is organized NOT for profit, and the objects and purposes to be transacted and carried on are:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

(4) This corporation shall have the power to receive title to real and personal property by gift, devise, bequest or purchase; to own, hold, sell, convey, lease and re-lease, let and sub-let real and personal property; and to manage, invest, reinvest or disburse the funds that may accrue from the holdings of such property in the manner provided by the By-Laws of The Kansas Society as now constituted or as hereafter amended. This corporation shall have the power to lend any surplus funds it may have on hand at any time and to enforce the collection thereof in any manner provided by law. This corporation shall have the power to sue and be sued.

No officer, director or member of this corporation shall be individually liable for the obligations of the corporation.

These Articles may be amended in any manner that shall be ordered by voto of the members of the corporation at any annual State Conference of The Kansas Society. This corporation shall have such other authority as may be provided in the By-Laws of the Kansas Society, not in contravention of the provisions of this Charter or the laws of the State of Kansas.

This corporation shall not have authority to issue capital stock.

SIXTH: The elected officers of The Kansas Society shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation, and shall be the managers of the business of the corporation and shall hold, manage and control all property of the corporation.

The members of The Kansas Society and all persons who shall hereafter become members, who are in good standing under the By-Laws of said Society, shall be members of this corporation.

SEVENTH: The term for which this corporation is to exist is ONE HUNDRED YEARS.

EIGHTH: The number of Directors shall be TEN.

**BY-LAWS of the KANSAS SOCIETY of the
NATIONAL SOCIETY OF the DAUGHTERS OF THE
AMERICAN REVOLUTION**

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II

Objects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section 1. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a Chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the Chapter: name of Chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Reporter.

Section 2.

(a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a Chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a Chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No State officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office. An officer who has served more than a half a term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be ineligible for any other state office except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent until the expiration of at least one year.

(b) A Chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same Chapter.

Section 3. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by the State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V

Nomination and Election of Officers

Section 1. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National Officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 2. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State. Additional nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained.

Section 4. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Endorsement for candidates for Vice-President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these by-laws, the By-laws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the chief executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these by-laws and shall be ex-officio a member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and a Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committees and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Section 3. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office.

Section 4. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5.

(a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State

Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents, and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than three years.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen, the Regent of each Chapter in good standing and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall also notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and of the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of June, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the Officers of the various Chapters, made into a directory form. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairmen to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, the amount to be fixed and the expense to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds, and shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the paid state membership to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the

State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each Chapter on February First.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members-at-large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; address; date of admission to the National Society; national number; name and rank of ancestor and state in which he served, and name of Chapter. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceding year. In recording a transfer, both the date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society, or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have the supervision of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library.

Section 11. The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the Kansas Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be chairman of the State Press Relations Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D. C.

Section 12. Each Officer and Committee chairman, having in her

possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them when transferring them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and Chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the entertaining District.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the State; the Honorary Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or alternate and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective Chapters. Delegates must have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and must be in good standing.

Section 5. The number of delegates to which a Chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society, on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

- (a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates.
- (b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members, Regent and five delegates.
- (c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Explanatory Table, Chapter Representation at Conference:

Section 6. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, a typed list of the delegates and alternates, signed by the Regent and Treasurer of the Chapter, shall be sent to the State Regent, the State Corresponding Secretary and the chairman of the Committee on Credentials for the State Conference. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 7. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be the delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 8. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be Chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII

State Board of Management

Section 1. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent of each Chapter in the State.

Section 2. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall following the regular meeting of the National Board of Management and preceding the District meetings; the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January 31st.

Section 2. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.35 for each member of the Chapter, payable in advance. These dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. On January fifteenth, the State Treasurer shall notify Chapters whose dues are in arrears. A Chapter whose dues are unpaid shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess Chapters to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Necessary expenses of the State Officers and State Committees shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing and approved by the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and five members ap-

pointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceeding the State Conference. The budget, as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. This committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the Society.

Section 2. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the Kansas DAR Student Loan and Scholarship Fund. This Fund is maintained by contributions from Chapters and individuals and the interest on money loaned. The interest from this fund shall be used annually for scholarships.

Section 3. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Recording Secretary as Chairman, the State Regent and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. The By-Laws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent, Amendments and recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conference, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolutions shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that have not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. A Press Relations Committee composed of the State Reporter as Chairman and two members appointed by the State Regent shall prepare and distribute information for the press concerning patriotic and educational activities of the Kansas Society. This Committee shall be responsible for the preparation and mailing of the Kansas DAR News.

Section 8. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees, as are not otherwise provided for in these by-laws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII

Reports

Section 1. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, the Regent of each Chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resume shall not be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send, not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent for use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

ARTICLE XIII

Districts

Section 1. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the Chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the programs of the State and National Societies; to provide instruction and inspiration to Chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District Secretary thirty days in advance to all Chapters within the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Each District shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. The term of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three terms.

Section 4. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV

Chapters

Section 1. Chapter Officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. On or before June first of each year, the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the Chapter Officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of National Committees, giving her the name and address of the Chapter member on that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer before January thirteenth in order to have them included in the State Treasurers annual report. Contributions received by Chapter Treasurer after January thirtieth shall be sent to the State Treasurer and shall be included in her supplementary report.

ARTICLE XV

Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these by-laws or the by-laws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI

Amendments

Section 1. These by-laws may be amended by a two thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all Chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a Chapter of the Kansas Society or by the By-laws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a Chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other Chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these by-laws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the Chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the Chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the

Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer 1 to 3; Chapter Regents 1 each, another if requested; National Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State 1 each; Honorary State Regents 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairmen of other Committees 1 each; Senior President CAR 1; District Directors 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society 2; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society 2; the President General 1; the Kansas State Historical Society 1; the DAR National Library 1; and the President of the State Officers Club; Chapter Regents Club and the State Chairmans Club 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2. Chairmen of State Committees and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

No. 3. No less than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expense to be borne by the State Society.

No. 4. "The State Registrar shall furnish the publisher of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up to date mailing list."

No. 5. A sum not to exceed \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent, each year for the purpose of carrying on her work.

No. 6. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference. No expenses shall be allowed an officer if the State Conference is in her home city.

No. 7. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

No. 8. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

No. 9. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Picnic shall be held on Constitution Day, September 17 at Shawnee Mission, Kansas City, Kansas. Local Chapters shall act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (25c).

No. 10. The State Society shall allocate \$25.00 annually to the El Quartecljo Committee for the proper upkeep of the El Quartecljo Monument in Scott County.

No. 11. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 12. A sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas CAR Society to be used for CAR projects.

No. 13. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 14. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board meeting to each of the District meetings in the fall.

No. 15. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and to the Chairmen of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 16. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 17. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 18. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Public Library, Dodge City, Kansas.

- (a) The Kansas Society shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Public Library, and shall provide a postal box in Dodge City, Kansas for the use of the Dodge City Chapter Library Committee in receiving requests for loan of books and their return.
- (b) The Dodge City Public Library shall provide a private room with adequate work and storage space.
- (c) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the library. This committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
- (d) All Scrap Books belonging to the Kansas Society shall be kept in the Kansas DAR Library.
