#### PREAMBLE OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

We, the people of the United States, in oredr to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for common defense, promote the general welfare and secure the blessing of liberty to ourselves and to our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

### OBJECTS OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge" thus developing an enlightened public cpinicn, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### CONFERENCE RULES

- 1. All sessions will begin at the hour announced.
- 2. No one is to be scated during reports, speeches and musical numbers.
- Any business unfinished at the time set for recess shall be resumed at the next session at the point where the recess was taken.
- 4. Only delegates have the privilege of the floor.
- No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes at one time, except by the consent of the Conference.
- 6. Only the chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 7. If both the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent are absent, the report shall be filed unless otherwise ordered.
- 8. All motions shall be written and signed by the mover and seconder and handed to the Recording Secretary before action is taken.
- 9. A timekeeper will be appointed. All speakers shall conform to the ruling when time is called.
- 10. A typewritten copy of each and every report must be filed with the Recording Secretary as it is presented. Also a copy of same handed to the State Regent.
- If the Officer or Chairman or Appointee is not present, her report shall be filed for printing in the Official Proceedings unless other wise ordered.
- 12. All Resolutions shall be in the hands of the Resolutions Committee not later than Thursday, 3-10-66.
- 13. Any chairman or individual who has a table display or exhibit will please attend to having all materials removed at the close of the conference. Do not leave this detail for the hostess chapters.
- 11. Members who appear on the program will always occupy the front seats, please.
- 15. Robert's Rules of Order Revised, will govern all parliamentary action, not covered by the Society by-laws and Rules.

The Board of Management of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution met Monday, October 25, 1965, in the Highland Manor Motel at Great Bend, Kansas. The meeting was called to order at 9:30 AM by the State Regent, Mrs. Elmer Huffman, Followed by a prayer given by Mrs. Carruth Owens, State Chaplain. The State Vice Regent led the Flag Salute.

Roll call was next on the agenda and was answered by two National

Officers, nine State Officers, and fifteen Chapter Regents.

Mrs. Huffman then gave a report of her work thus far including not only Kansas but the meeting of the National Board which she had recently attended in Washington, D. C. Mrs. Huffman announced the following names of the Kansas Daughters who had received National appointments as Vice Chairmen: Mrs. Wallace Treaster, American Indians; Mrs. W. M. Ostenberg, Conservation; Mrs. Howard Doyle, D. A. R. Magazine; Mrs. Robert Chesney, Museum; Mrs. Roscoe Gillaspie, D. A. R. Schools; Mrs. Mevel W. Reece, Junior Membership; Mrs. Bertram Lempenau, Transportation; Mrs. Chester Davis, Friends of the Museum.

Mrs. Paul Greenlease was again selected as chairman of our National

Magazine.

The 1966 State Conference will be held Mar. 10-12 at the Ramada Inn in Topeka, Kan.

The recommendations of the Executive Committee to the National

Board of Management as of October 12, 1965, were read:

Whereas the time of October 10, 1965 to October 10, 1966, constitute the 75th year after the founding of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution; and Whereas the outstanding record of service to "Home and Country" by the membership of this great society during the Seventy-five years since its founding, merits a year of observance in appreciation to the membership and its leaders; Resolved that the year October 10, 1965 to October 10, 1966, be designated Diamond Jubilee Year, NSDAR and henceforth to be known as such in the records of the society.

Resolved, that the National Board of Management, NSDAR endorse the building of an administration building at the Tamassee DAR School. Tamassee, South Carolina, at an estimated cost of \$49,500. Resolved that the DAR School committee promote this project through voluntary con-

tributions during the next two years:

Resolved that when erected this building be named in honor of the

President General, NSDAR the "Adele Erb Sullivan Building."

Mrs. Howard Haines moved "that we accept Mrs. Huffman's report given to the Board of Management meeting as of Oct. 25, 1965." Motion seconded by Mrs. James Smith, motion carried.

Mrs. Gaddis then moved "that the minutes of the Board of Management on March, 1965 be accepted as printed." Seconded by Mrs. Stebbins.

motion carried.

Short reports of all the State Officers were given with the exception of Mrs. Frank McAleavey who was unable to attend because of illness, but who sent a written report.

Our First Vice President General, Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn brought a few words of greeting as did our other National Vice President, Miss Pauline Cowger.

In discussions the fact was stressed that markers may not be placed on graves of deceased members unless said member is in good standing in

the National Organization.

Mrs. Paul Greenlease, National Magazine Chairman, gave a report on the DAR magazine stressing especially the Diamond Jubilee number and asking that the Daughters sell more advertising.

Mrs. Wallace Treaster then reported on her work as American

Indians Vice Chairman.

Mrs. Roscoe Gillaspie told of the new administration building plans for Tamassee and asked for aid from Kansas DAR. Mrs. Huffman then read a recommendation from the Executive Board that the Kansas

Daughters give \$1000 toward new administration building.

Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn then moved "that the Board of Management of the Kansas DAR through voluntary contribution raise \$1000 for 2 columns at \$500 each for the Adele Erb Sullivan Building at Tamassee School in South Carolina." Motion seconded by Mrs. Gladys E. Routh, motion carried.

Mrs. Huffman then presented \$10 to the fund in honor of her state

board. The meeting was recessed for noon luncheon.

The meeting reconvened at 1:30 with Mrs. Lawrence Krause of Great Bend, guest speaker.

#### STATE REGENTS REPORT, STATE CONFERENCE, 1966

Madam Vice Regent and Daughters:

They are a congenial and dedicated group. This report does not allow time for me to express my full appreciation for them and to them.

The summer was a time of organization. To the members that accepted appointments and have so faithfully executed their duties in their field, I give sincere thanks. As you hear the reports you will share my pride in their talent and devotion to duty. Kansas Society is indeed blessed with members equal to any task. This has been a time of challenge and learning for all of us. We ask your indulgence and understanding that we are ordinary women and homemakers. We love our Society and are giving of our time and talent as far as they will take us. If we err, it is with the very best intention to do right.

In October I traveled to Washington again to join several Kansas Daughters in the Diamond Jubilee festivities and the October National Board Meeting. The report of that meeting was given to the District Meetings. On October 24th the Executive Board met in Great Bend. On Oct. 25 the Board of Management was held in the same city, as was the Southwest District Meeting on the 26th. We are grateful to the Southwest Chapters and to Jeremiah Howard Chapter for arranging these meetings. That began a delightful time with the Northwest meeting at McPherson, the Southeast at Baxter Springs, and Northeast at Kansas City. Eight State Officers, one National Chairman, and many State Chairmen joined us as we tried to take the DAR story to you. Each meeting was informative and a joy to attend. We thank the hostess chapters and districts for their warm hospitality, lovely arrangements and many courtesies. autumn weather was ideal and when the perfect fellowship of Kansas Daughters and perfect Kansas weather combine, Kansas DAR can only be inspirational, informative and productive.

It was my earnest desire to attend the February 1st National Board Meeting, to bring vital up-to-date information to you. I flew out of Wichita Jan. 29th, but in Chicago was told we could go no further because of the blizzard in the east. After a night in frigid Chicago, three reschedulings and a telephone call to Mrs. Kilbourn in Washington, I returned home depressed and uninformed. I have had reports of that meeting and they will be brought to be read during this conference.

I have visited eighteen chapters, that represents seven working months as chapter activity ceases in July and August. Each Chapter has its own charm and individuality. I should love to give you a detailed account of each. It is inspirational to sit with the gathering of Daughters, to share their thoughts and their approach to the work of the Society, and large or small, they produce effective results in our projects. On a trip to western Kansas I stopped by the DAR Library in Dodge City. I was welcomed by Miss Katherine Harper who is serving the DAR there. The short stop was only a teaser to spond more time in that well organized library of genealogical research. On the following day I returned and was met by a group of charming Daughters from Dodge City and area, treated to lunch and given a guided tour, Mrs. Smith will tell you more, but we owe much to the members out there. They have

kept, improved and increased our valuable source material. On this same drive I saw the El Cuartelejo Monument for the first time. It is marked as a National point of interest, but Kansas Daughters will always take great pride in the beautiful shaft they erected on this historical spot and keep a watchful eye on its maintenance and beautification.

It has been a pleasure to sign the Americanism Award Certificate for a worthy Naturalized Citizen. The award was given to Mr. Henry Buhr

by the Eunice Sterling Chapter in proper ceremony.

Without underrating the talent and ability of us older members, I do want to speak of the Junior members I have met over the state. Our pride in them is justified by the fact that so many have been chosen the outstanding young woman in her community. They come to us happy and proud of their lineage and membership in DAR. They have ability and charm, a real and deep interest in our ideals and work. They are eager to be a part of the things for which we stand. Each fortunate chapter is enjoying the vitality that a junior brings to it.

On Feb. 19 I attended a Coffee and showing of the Colonial Picture given by the Sunflower Society, CAR. I plan to be a guest of the CAR State Conference March 26. May I urge all chapters to support with leadership, encouragement and even money gifts, these wonderful children and their equally wonderful leaders. Two thirds of our National Committees aim at youth projects, it is a satisfaction to feel the strength in that area of the Kansas Society. I will let the chairmen tell of that, although I am tempted to dwell on their fine accomplishment.

I regret to tell you that two of our old and valued chapters have disbanded. They are Rhoda Carver Barton and Lucretia Griswold Latimer. We welcome the new Sagamore Chapter of Leawood. They were chartered at the April 17th National Board meeting. They are eager and able, and a worthy addition to our State Society. I hope that in the 1967 Conference we can greet another new chapter that is forming under the able leadership of Mrs. R. B. Harkins.

Many of you heard me tell at the District meeting of the service man in Viet Nam who had asked the NSDAR for pictures or replicas of our nation's flags. He was making flags to illustrate talks to other service men and to the natives. I kept my promise to send him a small silk Kansas Flag, and quickly received his grateful thanks. His address is Richard Barrett, Advisor Team 33, APO 96297, San Francisco, Calif.

As we are being urged to write our Servicemen, perhaps some can take a few minutes to write him greetings and appreciation. We have all watched the growing participation in the war in Asia until we have accepted it as our war. We have seen the many disturbances all over the world. Meanwhile we have experienced sorrow, anger and always a great uneasiness in our own national troubles, the student riots, draft eard burning and picketings. It is difficult to keep up with events and to avoid periods of dismay, depression, and a feeling that we are much too near the trees to see the forest. It is a time of challenge to all of us dedicated to the American concept of freedom and dignity of man.

An organization such as ours, built upon proud lineage and dedicated to the American Ideals as conceived and executed by our Founding Fathers is especially challenged. I have enjoyed serving as your State Registrar this year. I have learned a great deal about our DAR members while working in this office. I wish to thank our many fine chapter registrars for their promptness and cooperation in sending me the needed information about their members. Few of us realize the time it takes to keep the records for a large chapter. I urge all chapter registrars to send me as soon as possible all information about their new members and any changes in membership

which is needed for our files. Please be accurate and legible.

I received 49 yearbooks. I thank the chapters for them. They are helpful in checking membership lists and the changes of address.

Supplements for the 1961 State Directory were printed in the December 1965 and February, 1966 Kansas DAR News. A necrology list for 1965 was printed in the February News. A few 1961 State Directories are still available and the price is \$1.00.

Although we gained 131 new members of whom 38 were juniors, we had a net loss of 40 for the year. Eunice Sterling Chapter gained 17 new members but lost 16-Topeka Chapter gained 11 and lost 11. 22 chapters reported a gain in membership, 11 stayed the same and 30 had a loss. We now have 63 chapters in Kansas. Lucretia Griswold Latimer

Chapter, Eureka, with 19 members was officially disbanded July 30, 1965. It was organized in 1940. Rhoda Carver Barton Chapter, Fredonia, was organized in 1909 and disbanded in November, 1965. It had 16 members. We are sorry to lose these chapters. Several of their members have transferred to other chapters or to At Large.

The net gain and the percent gain in membership of the chapters were figured. Neodesha Chapter receives the Eunice Sterling Traveling Flags Award with a 20 per cent gain in membership. Neodesha had a membership of 19 and a net gain of 4 new members. Fort Larned Chapter had the largest net gain with 7 new members.

#### STATE HISTORIAN'S REPORT Mrs. Theo. Stebbins

One of the chief concerns of the Historian is the preservation of historic sites and to interest the public in events which have occurred—by encouraging the placing of markers and calling attention to historic

spots, buildings, battle fields and trails.

Thirty-seven chapters responded to the questionnaires sent out: Council Oak placed a bronze plaque at the base of the flag pole at Madonna of the Trail marker. Another event not credited to KSDAR but of historical interest was the placing of a metallic marker in Kansas City by the State Highway Commission and Kansas Historical Society. This marker enumerates several historic events in early Wyandotte County history and faces four highways including US 40-24-73. Twenty-three chapters contributed \$35.00 to the Americana room. Historical anniversaries were celebrated honoring thirty six each mon and womon and sixty two famous events, plus sixty five historical programs. There were seventeen TV broadcasts reported and fifty six radio spot announcements; twenty nine chapter and school children tours were conducted. One grave marker was replaced and twenty-two members' graves were marked Thirty-six chapters reported participation in American History Month activities; Jesse Leavenworth Chapter presents yearly a gold medal to the best eighth grade student in U. S. history at Junior High School.

Some interesting activities reported were: Ringing of bells on July 4th, various Veterans Day celebrations, Washington teas, visits to historic spots, beginning of rectoration at Historic Fort Larned; chapter anniversaries (fortieth for Council Oak and sixty years for Esther Lowry). Polly Ogden is credited with forty two pages of new records through the Kansas Kin Quarterlies published by the Riley County Genealogical Society and Dana Chapter's Genealogical Records Chairman sent copies of seventy eight pages tombstone inscriptions to three libraries in Kansas.

I am happy to report the above accomplishments and perhaps much more could have been reported if all the Kansas Chapters had sent me a report. My thanks and appreciation to Chapter Regents and Historians for your fine efforts.

### "SPIRIT OF PATRIOTISM" (Talk—Spring, 1966) 1st V. P. G.

When the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, was founded in 1890, its founders adopted three objectives to guide our future activities. These were Historical Preservation, Educational Opportunity, and Patriotism. During the intervening 75 years we have never deviated from these aims. I want to speak to you tonite of one of these objectives, Patriotism, which is so important in these troubled timestimes which our country finds itself in a confused state, largely engendered by subversive and extreme left wing groups. It is indeed alarming to witness some minority groups—some from the teaching profession, some

ministers, public officials, and judges having either lost their God-given faith in American ideals, or having embraced radical theories proving their so-called sophistication by attempting to tear down long tried and proven principles. These groups preach the abandonment of Patriotismand that love of country is something unnecessary and outmoded. They would make over our nation on their own pattern, ignoring the fact that no nation can be healthy, vibrant nation of free men, without a high standard of good citizenship instilled in its people. Patriotism and good citizenship are each an essential component of the other.

Not only is Patriotism ridiculed, but these radical groups have succeeded in barring Almighty God from our public school; aided and abetted by the Supreme Court of these United States. In Miami, Florida, the Superintendent of Schools has gone a step further, He has issued a directive to the school principals of Dade County that no printed matter containing the name of God, nor over 100 passages from the Bible may be issued to, or used in, the schools. He took his cue from the Supreme Court's ruling that prayer in our public schools violated the constitutional rights of the pupils.

Encouraged by the Supreme Court's ban on prayer and Bible reading in our schools others have made attacks on the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States, and the phrase "under God." A teacher in a Santa Barbara school sued in the courts of that city to eliminate "under God" from the Pledge, alleging conscientious objection to this manner of recognition of God in the public schools. The judge in the case upheld him, and banned the Pledge from recitation in the Santa Barbara

School system.

Less than a year ago, in July, 1965, the presiding judge in the Naturalization Court in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania summarily announced that at the forthcoming session of the court he would not permit the usual ceremonies of welcome at the swearing in of the new citizens. As members of our Society you know that it has been a long standing custom for the DAR members, and the local Junior Chamber of Commerce, to greet our new citizens with a small ceremony in the court, including a welcoming speech, giving each new citizen a copy of the DAR Manual for citizenship, presentation of an American flag, and the benediction. These ceremonies generally have the warm approval of the courts as a fitting and dignified beginning for our new citizens. But this Pittsburgh judge ruled, "There shall be NO address of welcome, NO speaker, NO flags, NO flag codes, NO sponsoring organization, and NO benediction in this court on July 16th," What was the judge's motivation. Another step to downgrade Patriotism?

We have recently been treated to the disgraceful spectacle of a Yale University professor—in company with two other men—one of whom is the chief theoretisian of the Communist Party, USA—the other a left-wing student, flouting our laws and endangering our government's efforts to bring about peace in Asia, by embarking on their well-advertised trip to North Vietnam. In making this trip the three men violated TWO laws of the United States-first, the Logan Act which prohibits unauthorized American citizens from negotiating with a foreign power on matters per-taining to government policies, and second, the United States Code, Title 8, section 1185 which prohibits United States citizens from traveling in

foreign countries without properly validated passports.

And how did this shameful venture end? The Yale professor was granted two television interviews in which he said in effect—peace can come quickly, IF the United States will bow to the communists, pull our troops out of South Vietnam, and turn the Vietnamese people over to whatever fate the communists have in store for them. Yale University authorities have made no public move to chide this law-breaker and meddler in public affairs-he is already back at Yale teaching history to our young men there.

Even more serious is the seeming attitude of our government toward the whole episode. Has the Department of Justice called these three men to account for their actions? Apparently not. The State Department did give them a gentle slap on the wrist by cancelling their passports, BUT while the State Department was in the process of cancelling his passport—but before they could actually secure it for cancellation, he made a flying trip to England in open defiance of the government—for the purpose of appearing on a television program, criticizing our action in the Vietnam conflict. He boasted that he went to England to prove that he "can travel freely."

What do you think will be the effect upon many young people, our young Americans, when they see our laws broken with impunity, and in so blatant a manner? These incidents I have cited certainly do not set examples of high moral principles and good citizenship, but conversely will encourage disrespect for law and order, helping to intensify the downgrading of Patriotism in our youth. It is little wonder that a group of students in a Syracuse, New York high school recently petitioned the principal of their school to discontinue certain patriotic activities, because, as they stated, "Patriotism is not an essential to good citizenship."

It is amazing that this nation, born in an atmosphere of patriotic fervor, by God-fearing men and women, seeking liberty, freedom, and an equal opportunity for all, could now find so many citizens willing—and eager—to subvert our great American heritage. It is deplorable that there is not alive today in our public consciousness, more of the spirit which moved that courageous band of men who signed the Declaration of Independence, to include these words, "and for the support of this Declaration, with firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other, our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor." These men were ready, and willing, to give their all for their love for their country. Patriotism could have no higher call than that.

One wonders if the judge who refused to allow patriotic exercises in his court remembers the brand of patriotism displayed by Washington and his men at Valley Forge. There in that terrible winter of 1777-1778, that great leader and his small army of 11,000 men—25 percent of whom were incapacitated—never faltered in their devotion to duty and country. These men in ragged uniforms lacking sufficient food and fuel to keep them warm, held honor and patriotism above life itself, and would have had the utmost contempt indeed for a judge who scorned patriotism and barred the Flag of the country for which they fought.

The Yale professor, who would like to see us bow down to the Communists in Victnam, must not remember his history otherwise he would recall that courageous patriot, Molly Pitcher, who did not know the meaning of surrender. This brave woman, seeing her husband killed during the battle of Monmouth, stepped into his place to service his gun without a thought for her personal safety. She did not hesitate to carry on the fight for freedom, and you can be assured that Molly Pitcher would never have tried to make a deal with her country's enomies.

The Miami school superintendent who has barred God from the Dade county schools seems to be unaware that this country was settled by mon and women who were seeking the right to worship God in their own way free from persecution. Most of our historical patriots were religious men who invoked God's blessings on their actions. George Washington, Patrick Henry, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, Daniel Webster, and Thomas Paine are just a few of the great men who built our nation, who have left a record of their deep faith in Cod to guide America thru its deatiny. At his inauguration in 1780 Washington prayed for guidance, beginning with these words, "Almighty God, we make our earnest prayer that Thou wilt keep the United States in Thy holy protection." I doubt if there is a person alive who believes that the father of our country would have agreed that God should be kept out of our schools.

It is distressing that so large a part of our public, including some school authorities, legislators, and some of our courts, has allowed a small group of atheists and fanatical objectors to pervert the meaning and intent of the founding fathers in writing the first amendment to the Con-

stitution. "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." It would appear that the last phrase has somehow been lost in the arguments over the possible involvement of church and state. Isn't barring the voluntary prayer or references to God in our schools "prohibiting the free exercise thereof?"

Each day the Supreme Court is in session it is called to order with these words, "Oyez-Oyez-Oyez, all persons having business before the Honorable, the Supreme Court of the United States, are admonished to draw near and give their attention, for the Court is now sitting. God save the United States and this Honorable Court." Here we witness the highest body in the country, daily asking the protection of God, and at the same time denying school children the right of starting their daily studies with a simple prayer.

These examples point out the big inroads which subversive groups have made in their attempts to downgrade patriotism, good citizenship, our American heritage and respect for established laws. As a patriotic organization it is our privilege to keep abreast of these groups, and combat it thru the promotion of the thorough study of American history.

We must keep in mind that patriotism has ever been one of the most important objectives of our Society, for without patriotism our American heritage would be but an empty shell. Our Bylaws pledge "to perpetuate that spirit of patriotism exhibited by our forefathers who founded this nation." If we are to keep this pledge, we must be ever alert to cherish as well as protect the meaning of Patriotism from attack and ridicule. It is no less an honor and a privilege to be a patriot today than it was in 1776

Our founding fathers never had to ask the meaning of patriotism. It was deeply imbedded in their hearts, in their lives, in their fortunes, and in their sacred honor.

True patriotism is not just spectacular, or heroic act in time of war. It is that normal consciousness of constant allegiance to one's country, and a deep pride in its people and their progress in a free land. It is the driving desire to make ours a better country in which to enjoy the liberty and freedom given us.

An example of the impact of the first realization of her true feeling for our country came to a young singer just returned from Vietnam. Hugh Mulligan, an AP news feature writer, reported on the 10-day tour of the war zone by the "Hello, Dolly" troupe. He found that the experience of playing in Vietnam had affected them deeply. Transporting the unreal make-believe world of show business to the starkest of all realities, the reality of war, had a profound effect upon Julie Sargent, singer, from Carmel, California, she said, "When I got home I found that I didn't like myself anymore—I wasn't giving enough. You see, I had been among boys who were giving so much, everything really, to bring freedom to a pathetic country barely capable of understanding what the word meant." Julie, against a background of roaring jets and beating helicopter blades, had suddently discovered the real meaning of allegiance and love of country to the extent of fighting for the survival of freedom for our beliefs.

Our children are not born with a sense of love of country—it must be taught to them, as with a belief in spiritual values. Let us make sure that our children are well versed in American history; that they develop a love of country; and a desire to be good citizens. They should know our unselfish heroes, our historic traditions, and above all, how to keep our liberty and freedom as a nation. Much of this part of children's education can be gained at home, but we must also know that our schools do not reglect their share in fostering patriotism in our young people. Our Society, thru its individual members should inform themselves as to the factual teaching of American history in the schools, should encourage patriotic exercises in our class rooms, and respect for our flag.

Individual efforts, as well as working thru P. T. A., Girl Scouts, 4-H and similar youth groups should eventually bring the desired results.

Why this emphasis upon our children? They are our future leaders; they are now in the formative and impressionable stage of their lives. Do you realize that the Communists are making our young people the principal target of their insidious propaganda? Here is what J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, had to say on this subject in his latest report dated January 6, 1966: "Contrary to the off-expressed wishful thoughts of apologists for the Comunist Party in the United States, this organization is still a force to be reckoned with." He stated that the Party is experiencing the greatest upsurge in its history, and membership has jumped 1000 to 2000 above its 10,000 total of a year ago!

Mr. Hoover further stated, "In an effort to correct its most serious deficiency, the lack of trained youth, the Party held a National Youth Leadership School for two weeks in June, 1965 at Camp Midvale, New Jersey. Under maximum security conditions, 80 students from various parts of the country received instructions in Marxism and tactics. Many of these students were then sent to various party districts to engage in recruiting activities during the summer months.

In September, 1965, a second youth gathering was held under secret conditions on a farm in Indiana to discuss the work accomplished during the summer, and plan the Party's youth program. In line with instructions from Gus Hall, general secretary of the communist party, USA, to take advantage of the upsurge in "radicalism" among American youth, party leaders are continuing to make every effort to speak on college campuses throughout the nation as a means of further attracting youth in the communist orbit."

The report continues, "During 1965, the communist party's year old youth front, the W. E. B. DuBois Clubs of America, consolidated its resources and became more ambitious in its efforts to expand its influence among the youth of this nation's Volunteer recruits, who were trained at the communist party cadre training school, were sent into the Midwest area during the summer of 1965 to bolster the midwest region of the DuBois Clubs. Two DuBois Club's leaders recently openly announced their affiliation with the communist party, and the DuBois Clubs' National President has issued a public statement that the organization welcomes Communists as members."

With such a strong warning from so authoritative source as J. Edgar Hoover, all parents should make sure that their children are given:

1st—The benefit of religious education, faith in God, and our Holy Bible.

2nd—Early training in good citizenship, and respect for law and proper authority.

3rd—The meaning of true patriotism, and love of our country.

4th—A thorough knowledge of American History, our American heroes, and our American heritage.

If our children are well grounded in these precepts we need have no worries about the next generation into whose hands will rest the future well being of our country.

Let us start reclaiming the American heritage of "government of the people, by the people, and for the people, which under God shall not perish from the earth."

Mrs. Nelson Kilbourn then read the revisions of the bylaws which had been proposed by its National Congress. No action was taken on these. The business of the Conference continued with reports from the State Appointments: Constitution Week, Mrs. Theo Stebbins; Consulting Genealogist, Mrs. L. H. W. Hall; Parliamentarian, Mrs. Paul N. Kent; Shawnee Mission, Mrs. Joel L. Hodges, Jr.; and Resolutions, Mrs. E. L. Wulfmeyer.

Mrs. Wulfmeyer presented eight resolutions to the Conference five of which were discussed and lost or withdrawn. The following three were accepted by the Conference by a vote of the elected delegates:

RESOLVED: That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution express sincere thanks to the National Broadcasting Company and the Kansas State Network for televising the live hearing of the "Fullbright Committee Hearing on the United States policy in Viet Nam."

RESOLVED: That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution urge all schools in the state of Kansas to stress the teaching of our American Heritage in their classrooms, passing it on from generation to generation as a rich legacy, and stressing the fact that "love of country" does not make one an enemy to international peace and good will.

WHEREAS, the phrase under fire by World Court advocates reads "the United States will not accept compulsory jurisdiction within the domestic jurisdiction of the United States, as determined by the United States.

and WHEREAS, only 35 of the 111 members of the World Court accept jurisdiction of the World Court to any degree whatever,

AND WHEREAS, 13 have reservations which enable them to cancel at will the jurisdiction of the Court,

AND WHEREAS, 27 of the 35 filed acceptances which enable them to accept or reject the World Court jurisdiction as they please,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution urge the United States Congress to re-emphasize the Connally reservation to World Court jurisdiction.

Mrs. Frank McAleavey read words of Greetings from the State

Regent of Missouri, Mrs. Clarence Kemper.

Mrs. Bertram Lempenau read the proposed budget for 1966-67 then moved it be adopted. Seconded by Mrs. Myra Keele; Motion carried. Mrs. Lempenau then announced that the "Operation Money Bag" of the previous evening had netted \$304.93 for the DAR School building.

Miss Pauline Cowger, Counselor, announced that she was in charge of the Kansas Luncheon at Continental Congress in Washington, D. C.

and had the tickets for the reservations.

# NATIONAL VICE CHAIRMAN, DAR SCHOOL COMMITTEE Mrs. Roscoe Gillaspie

As National Vice-Chairman South Central Division DAR School Committee, I presented to the Kansas Board of Management, October 1965, the Diamond Jubilee project of the National Committee—the proposed Adele Erb Sullivan Administration Building at Tamassee—to replace the present one which is inadequate and outmoded. I also presented a break-down of parts of the Building which might be purchased, furnished me by the National Committee. The Board of Management voted to recommend to Kansas State Conference, March 1966, that we raise \$1000.00 by volunteer contributions, to purchase two of the eight Columns for the Building. It is most gratifying that over \$300.00 of that amount is awaiting in the State Treasury for the State's action on the recommendation.

I reported to the Board and District meetings in October, the desire of the National Committee DAR Schools that we give substantial financial aid toward the debt necessarily incurred by Kate Duncan Smith at the time of being Accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Universities last year, which standard must be maintained in order to keep the above achievement. This was an added advantage to the boys and girls attending KDS and a credit to DARs.

In compiling the reports of the other State Chairman DAR Schools in the South Central Division of which Kansas is a part, I found that we are supporting our Schools comparatively well — taking into consideration number of chapters, etc.—we did fall a little short in School chapter programs and on the number of chapters that reported to me. However, in the number of boxes of clothing value, sent KDS and Tamassee and an all over cash response we did quite well. Let it continue to be good, even better.

Two interesting ideas reported by the State Chairman DAR Schools of Louisiana, I might pass on to you. The State awards a prize to the three Chapters sending the greatest number of pounds of used clothing per member. Also, one Chapter, Spirit of '76 sold \$23.50 of woven goods from Crossnore to help that School.

May I ask you—what is more important to the future of this great Nation than practical and Christian training and Patriotism? Our Schools, through their fine faculties and financial support does just this.

It is a privilege, I feel, to have been given the opportunity to be a working part of our DAR School program. Thank you.

The General Indian scholarship Fund received \$54.00. Fifty Christmas gifts were given to the students of the Chilocco Indian School. Five dollars to each was sent directly to Bacone, the Indian Mission Church, St. Labre Indian School, the St. Anthony Indian Mission, and as aid to an Indian group. Eighteen American Indians programs were presented.

I thank the chapters for their contributions this year and hope that

all will participate next year.

# AMERICANISM and DAR MANUAL Mrs. C. G. McKinney

Informative letters were sent out last fall to all chapters with information on the procedure of securing the Americanism Award for a Naturalized Citizen. Two hundred eighty-five Manuals were distributed, two hundred Declarations of Independence, one hundred American Flags, ninety-seven Citizenship cards, three hundred twenty-seven Flag Codes were given to new Citizens. Total of \$196.91 was spent for Teas, Awards, and Manuals. Three hours of television, five hours of radio and 850 inches of publicity and several pictures was credited to this committee.

"Citizen U. S. A." was used by DAR at Chapter meetings, Girl Scouts, Schools and community service. Six tapes were purchased. Eight Chapter members attended Citizen Soldiers Award presentation in

Wichita.

We had 10,594 service hours, served 510 at teas for Naturalized Citizens and one Americanism Award. The Eunice Sterling Chapter presented the Americanism medal and Certificate to Mr. William H. Buhr, of Wichita, Kansas at their annual George Washington luncheon.

It is wonderful to know that several DAR women devote one night a week during the school year teaching basic English Classes to the foreign

born.

## DAR MUSEUM Mrs. Hugh D. Ransom

In September letters were sent to all 65 chapters telling of our aims and plans for the year. Fifty-three chapters answered. In January I sent 60 follow-up postal cards reminding them of their annual reports. To these only 35 chapters replied. With this information I have compiled the following report.

20 chapters contributed to the Museum.

12 chapters had programs on Museum.

41 books "In Washington" were placed in Libraries.

1 chapter asked for our slides to use in Spring program. I wish to thank all of the chapter chairmen and regents who made

this report possible. I also am grateful for the Yearbooks which were sent to me.

# DAR SCHOOLS Mrs. Roscoe Gillaspie

It has been a privilege to serve you as Chairman of DAR Schools Committee this year. I sent out letters to the Chapters in September, November and late January, including a questionnaire in the latter, plus 'follow-up' reminder cards in February to Chapters who had not sent me reports to date. Sixty-one Chapters sent the name of their DAR School chairman and fifty-six reported on the work accomplished. Twenty-seven chapters gave DAR School programs.

Generous donations from Chapters received by the Kansas State

Treasurer this year showed that monetary gifts were:

\$840.10 sent to Kate Duncan Smith, \$1,346.43 sent to Tamassee, \$22.00

sent to Crossnore and \$1.00 sent to Berry, making a total of \$2,209.53.

This included: \$285.00 Medica Scholarships, \$107.50 Regular Scholarships, \$200.00 Ledbetter Scholarship to Tamassee, \$200.00 Shield's Scholarship to Tamassee, \$15.00 Shoe Scholarship, \$60.20 Part Scholarships, \$867.70 Total Scholarship Funds, \$50.10 Christmas fund and gifts, \$917.80.

Number of boxes-of used clothing and household linens totalled fortyeight, weighing approximately 1,067 pounds with an estimated value of \$1,428.90 wer sent. The cost of transportation charges on boxes was about

\$140.60. Several Chapters sent Christmas packages.

I am glad to report that Free Freight for boxes to Tamassee has been secured, for Chapters in the greater Kansas City area, at least, through the Watson & Wilson Transportation System if they are delivered to the Terminal Dock at 1526 West 9th Street, Kansas City, Missouri. They will be shipped to Greenville, South Carolina, where they will be picked up by, the Schools. They should be marked DEADHEAD FREIGHT and addressed to Tamassee DAR School and boxes or drums should not be over two and one half by two and one half feet in size. Detailed information will reach these chapters by letter. Results of further investigation is being made as to other lines and terminals that may serve a wider area and reach Kate Duncan Smith as well as Tamassee. This information will be relayed to the chapters if favorable results are obtained.

The special project for the Diamond Jubilee Administration proposed by NSDAR School Committee was the Adele Erb Sullivan Administration Building at Tamassee-to replace the present out-moded and inadequate one, among the first built on the grounds. At the Kansas Board of Management meeting in October 1965, it was voted to recommend to the KSDAR State Conference in March 1966, that \$1000.00 be raised by volunteer contributions for two of the eight columns for the new building. By February first of 1966, the State Treasurer had received \$315.70 toward the proposed recommendation, which monies was held in the Treasury

until formal action was taken by the vote at State Conference.

We were most fortunate and honored to have with us for the DAR
School Luncheon at State Conference as speakers, Mrs. Fred Aebly,
National Chairman DAR School Committee of New York City, New York,
and, Mr. A. B. Bradford, Executive Secretary, Kate Duncan Smith,

Grant, Alabama. I'm sure after hearing their inspiring messages, you more fully realize the valuable work being done by maintaining our DAR Schools and the fine efforts of the faculties' services to the boys and girls as well as to our Nation by teaching them practical living and high ideals, love of Church and America. Let us continue in our support of these young people and the Communities from which they come. Let Kansas DARs double our efforts and make KSDAR 100% DAR School participation! I wish to thank the Chapters, Chairman and members for your fine work this last year.

### FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM Mrs. Lewis Hanford Kessler

During this Diamond Jubilee Administration, The Friends of the Museum Committee provides the opportunity for individual members to contribute to the DAR Museum, and thus provide funds for the purchase of rare antiques and significant portraits, as they become available.

Through this committee, Chapters may honor outstanding and longtime faithful members with a Life Contribution or a Memorial Tribute. This year Kansas had 29 regular contributors at \$1.00 each and 4 sustaining contributors at \$5.00 each, plus one Life Contribution at \$100.00

# LINEAGE RESEARCH Mrs. Harry M. Ives

This year there have been only four requests for assistance. All requests must go thru the State Chairman on specific charts. One chart was completed and sent to the National Research Lineage Office.

Many of you have become discouraged while waiting for help, but there are only two paid Genealogists in the National Office, and there are no more hard working loyal and efficient persons than these. In spite of their efforts the backlog of papers has grown constantly until it has reached staggering proportions.

Five hours of study is spent on each request and the papers are processed in order received. Whether the paper is proved or not, much

valuable information is obtained.

One paper was returned this year which has been pending for a year

and a half.

'It is plain that, since it is difficult to obtain services of more genealogists in the Office, we must have more assistance from the State and Chapter Chairman. We appeal now to State Regents and State Chairman to organize classes in Lineage Research or Workshops in various parts of each State with a competent genealogist as a leader or teacher,' quoted from a letter from Mrs. Ivan T. Johnson, National Chairman, Lineage Research Committee.

Thirty-four Chapters have Chairmen appointed by their Regents, but there are many Chapter Regents and Chapter Registrars working actively

on this Committee.

If there is a desire for a Workshop, let me know, perhaps together we can set up one.

### JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Ralph Ralston

Thirty-eight Junior members joined Kansas Daughters of American Revolution this year.

#### MEMBERSHIP Mrs. W. M. Ostenberg

Letters of general information were sent to all Chapter Regents and Chapter Membership Chairmen. Report blanks were mailed to all Chapter Chairmen in January and reminder notices sent to all tardy ones in February. I regret, that out of the 64 chapters contacted, 4 did not respond.

Of those reporting, 20 showed a gain in membership, 28 a loss and 10 remained static. We regret most sincerely, the disbandment of 2

chapters.

GAINS: New Members (including 38 junior members and 1 C. A. R. transfer) 131, Reinstatements 8, Transfers In 6, Total 145.

LOSSES: Deceased 84, Resignations 77, Transfers Out 12 (18 to At Large), Dropped 12, Total 185.

Our Membership February 1, 1965 was 3,471 and February 1, 1966, 3,413 leaviny us a net loss of 40 members.

We have 49 Members At Large.

These figures are sobering, but bear in mind, this trend did not begin this year. For the past 3 years, our State Society has shown a loss in membership. The time has come for us to stop this trend and put

ourselves on the plus side again.

While each chapter has a Membership Chairman to carry out details, EVERY member of our DAR is automatically a member of the Membership Committee. The RISE or FALL of our Society depends upon each of us and our ability to interest and secure for our Society new members who are capable and willing to share with us, pride in our heritage and willing to work toward the enlargement of our Society's threefold objectives—HISTORIC PRESERVATION, EDUCATION PROMOTION and PA-TRIOTIC ENDEAVOR.

Our National Society, recognizing the need of stressing membership, created a "DAR Membership Commission" to guide and aid us in fulfilling our responsibility. The following very capable women comprise our State Commission: Mrs. L. O. Gaddis, Registrar; Mrs. Paul R. Greenlease, State Organizer; Mrs. J. R. Pritchard, Genealogical Records; Mrs. L. W. Hall, Consulting Genealogist and Mrs. Hary M. Ives, Lineage Research. In addition, we must work closely with Mrs. E. L. Wulfmeyer, C. A. R. Chairman and Mrs. Ralph Ralston, Junior Membership. We must aid these ladies in any way we can-because the young people in these 2 groups form the nucleus of the future leadership of our Society.

Our President General, Mrs. William H. Sullivan, Jr. has set a quota of 200,000 members during our Diamond Jubilee anniversary. If we are to achieve this goal, we must fulfill our National slogan-"Each Member Get a Member." Under the guidance of our gracious and capable State Regent, Mrs. Huffman and the enthusiastic support of ALL our Kansas

Daughters we CAN achieve this goal.

Ninnescah Chapter, Pratt, Kansas is the recipient of the National Membership Chairman's certificate award for the highest NET PERCENT gain in membership with 16.1% gain. Ft. Larned is second with 13.8% net gain,

# NATIONAL DEFENSE Mrs. Ellis E. Rounds\_

Cards were sent to all chapter regents who had not sent the name and address of their National Defense chairman. This list was completed one hundred per cent and materials from National were sent to all chairmen to be used at their chapter meetings. Many chairmen expressed their apprecation for this fine material which they have used along with the DAR magazine.

Reports from 59 chapters give this information: Thirty-nine had entire programs on National Defense and fifty-two had reports of five or more minutes at each meeting. 1964 Resolutions were studied and discussed by thirty-seven chapters; fifty had National Defense material at chapter meetings and material was made available to schools and libraries by thirty-three chapters. Thirty-two Good Citizenship medals were awarded, seven presented at assemblies, twelve given newspaper publicity; nineteen chapters gave to "Dollars for Defense" a total of \$61.00. Effort made by twenty-two chapters to increase National Defense mailing.

Topics of the greatest interest were: Viet Nam, Immigration, Cuban

Refugees, Poverty Program, Youth Demonstrations, Medicare, Re-apportionment, Supreme Court. Rulings, Right to Work Bill, Foreign Aid, Law and Order, States Rights, Education, Agriculture and Conservation.

This has been a most interesting year with so many vital subjects

to be discussed. My sincere thanks for the cooperation of chapter chairmen, and to the National Defense Committee for the fine material mailed to each chairman.

#### PUBLIC RELATIONS Mrs. Bill E. Smith

I consider it an honor and a privilege to have been asked by our State Regent to continue on as the State Chairman of Public Relations during her tenure of office.

In October, a letter was written to all Chapter Regents requesting the appointment of a Public Relations Chairman if one had not been appointed and advising each of the work of the Public Relations Committee, 55 responded with appointments.

Notices were sent to the Chairmen requesting their assistance in taking announcements of the four District Meetings, held in October, to their local news media. Each was requested to TELL THE DAR STORY this year—our Diamond Jubilee 75th Anniversary Celebration of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution! The response was tremendous. As a result Kansas has entered the two Contests being sponsored by the National Society, Public Relations Committee: A DAR Feature Story has been entered from the Southwest District and a Feature Published in Recognition of the 75th Diamond Jubilee has been entered from this same District.

"Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is Liberty." What more inspirational and appropriate theme could have been selected by our President General for this 75th Anniversary Year? Chapter Chairmen are charged with the responsibility of carrying this message to ALL in every facet of our DAR activity.

The response of the newspapers in printing DAR news in Kansas presents a changing picture of DAR status in more recent years. The questionnaire on Reporting was mailed to each Chapter Chairman in January, 1966 and the response has been 100%.

Advance preparations on publicity for the 68th State Conference, Topeka, were made in January and February, 1966 with all news media responding. The newspapers, the television and radio stations began publicizing the Conference on March 6, 1966 and continued throughout the week of Conference. Their cooperation is gratefully appreciated by the Kansas Society and especially by this Chairman and the members of her Committee who worked so diligently to TELL THE DAR STORY.

#### PROGRAM Mrs. Elmer H. Snider

I am grateful for the opportunity to again serve the Kansas Chapters as their Program Chairman. This is our Diamond Jubilee year and every chapter, with few exceptions, has had a program celebrating this event. Some of our chapters are also celebrating anniversaries of their own. Chapter programs have been based on the work of our society and have been developed around our President General's Theme, "WHERE THE SPIRIT OF THE LORD IS, THERE IS LIBERTY." Our Kansas newspapers and other media, have given us excellent publicity creating good public relations. The Regent's Round Table of the Northeast District have prepared for their own use, an interesting slide program on Kansas history, development and industry which will later be sent to the National Program Office. Kanza Chapter has donated a manuscript. Yearbooks were judged at a state level for the first time this year and the winning yearbooks were sent to the National Vice-Chairman.

The cash award, won by the Kansas Program Committee, for the two slide programs sent to the National Program Office in 1965, was used to place two cement benches in Madonna Park at Council Grove.

#### STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP Mrs. Lou B. Naylor

Our National Chairman of Student Loan and Scholarship Committee says—at a time when education of our youth is being stressed at all levels we have a world of opportunity through State and Chapter Scholarships and she hopes we are looking ahead with plans for our young people.

We feel Kansas DAR is doing this in offering a cash award each year to a High School Senior girl with a DAR connection and sound academic background, who will enter the following fall a Junior College, a Nursing School, a Teacher's College or a four Year University. The award is the accrued interest on our Student Loan and Schoarship Fund. There has

been no loans made for several years.

The 1965 award of \$175.00 was given to Miss Barbara L. Martins of Prairie Village who graduated from Shawnee Mission East High School last May. She was sponsored by Shawnee Chapter. Miss Martins was in the upper five percent of her class of 780 students. Her mother and grandmother belong to DAR. She entered Kansas State University at Manhattan last fall as a freshman in the biology-science department. The judges who read the letters of the contestants were Mrs. May McGuire, Columnist, Miss Roberta Miller and Mrs. Don Starry.

We are now receiving letters from chapter chairmen over the state sponsoring eligible Senior girls. These names should reach the state chairman by Apri 15. The contestants have until June first to submit

their letters for the judges.

The Flag is the badge of the Nation's greatness and the emblem of its Destiny. All sixty-three chapters reporting, how wonderful! 85% of the members display the Flag on Flag Day, 65% other Holidays, with 100%—Arthur Barrett, Concordia, Dana, John Haupt, Olathe. All chapters gave the Pledge of Allegiance at meetings, 52 sang the National Anthem.

Twenty-three large Flags were presented to members, homes, city, Girl Scouts, Wing Scouts, courthouse, Mayor's office, and American Legion. 1794 small Flags given chapters, city hospital, cemeteries, Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage, District meeting, DAR Good Citizen and American History meetings; John Haupt 1200 to Veterans Hospital; Eunice Sterling 97, and Topeka 28 to naturalized citizens.

Eighteen chapters presented flag literature; 30 studied the Flag Code; 52 Flag talks given at meetings, schools, church, scouts, D. U. V., on radio, Atchison having 9, thirty-two of these were entire programs; 26 corrections in displaying the flag incorrectly; 702 Flag Codes distributed to new members, schools, local newspaper, libraries, Scout troops, 4-H Clubs, post office, teachers, new citizens, and YMCA; 20 radio broadcasts. Twenty-three chapters reported having 68 newspaper items about the flag, Dodge City with 15. Thirty chapters participated in community activities, included were Memorial Day, County Fair, July 4 Bell Ringing, window displays, Constitution week, Veterans' Day and Boot Hill parades.

#### DAR PYLONS - Eisenhower Center **Beulah Chesney**

The historical importance and personality appeal of the Eisenhower Museum and Library and Old Home (and, of course, the DAR pylons in their stately setting) continue to attract a tremendous number of visitors to the Eienhower Center in Abilene, Kansas. During 1965 there were over 115,000 visitors.

It never fails to astonish, the number of people from foreign countries who find their way there. They came from forty countries; those above ten are: Japan 28, Kenya 12, Korea 11, Mexico 60, Netherlands 22, New Zealand 13, Peru 16, Philippines 33, Sweden 13, Switzerland 15, Thailand 13 and Venezuela 21, all part of a total of 1,279 for 1965.

1966 will see the completion of the new all-faith Meditation Chapel, just west of the Library—a building of inspiring design and great beauty. This could be the star attraction for our 1967 Pilgrimage; it isn't too soon to think about!

Again the donor, an admirer of Mr. Eisenhower, sent wonderful Tulip bulbs from Holland for planting this year-last season was too damp to be much of a success; perhaps this Spring will be a rewarding riot of color.

DAR chapters should encourage the visits of school children to this memorable and informative place; remember it is open every day in

the year from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. except Christmas Day.

One of the finest pictures we have of the Kansas DAR pylons was used in a Sunday newspaper three-quarter page coverage of DAR AND WHAT IT DOES, and as an outstanding tribute to the NSDAR Diamond Jubilee anniversary. This appeared last October 10th.

#### KANSAS CHAPEL Mrs. Robert Chesney

Kansas DAR Chapel in Washington last April was the scene of a well-attended and impressive Christian Flag dedication. The flag was presented as a gift by Mrs. Charles Johnson, outgoing Chaplain General, and accepted for NSDAR by Mrs. Erwin F. Seimes, outgoing First Vice-President General. Three flags now proudly add their grace and color to the room—the flag of the United States of America, the flag of the State of Kansas, and the Christian flag.

Presumably this year will see the continuation of the Vesper Hours at the close of each day of Continental Congress, with the prayer for peace, candle light and fresh altar flowers. (Altar flowers are a most acceptable gift honoring or in remembrance. Last year Mrs. Ralph Pryor gave them in memory of the young Navy flier commemorated by

Maintaining the quiet beauty of our chapel requires some refurbishing at regular intervals, thus the one dollar given by each chapter every

year is vital and necessary. A present day problem is to find a suitable and attractive means to diffuse the strong sunlight that hits an opposite wall and reflect to the detriment of the blues of the altar cloth, dossal curtain and communion chairs. Under consideration are adjustable Colonial white louvres, and a new type of simulated stained glass mounted directly on the glass of the two windows.

It has been suggested that the committee consider installing a heavy silken cord across the chancel rail opening to deter the handling of altar items. Another suggestion is that of a handsome white altar cloth; this would necessitate the finding of some DAR dedicated enough to give it the required care.

#### CONSTITUTION WEEK Theodora H. Stebbins

In 1955, the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution originated the idea of devoting an entire week to the Constitution by extending the period of observance beyond the day of September 17. Our Constitution, which guarantees priceless freedoms to our citizens, sets forth a concept of liberty that has been an inspiration to freedomloving people everywhere. Questionnaires are sent from NSDAR to State Historians to obtain information from each chapter. Here is what forty chapters sent to me: The Flag was displayed all week by thirty communities; there were displays in public buildings pertaining to the Constitution in six banks, four postoffices, fourteen department stores, twentyone schools, two Chambers of Commerce, and eleven other places. Fifteen had time on TV and radio; programs on the Constitution were given in thirty-five chapters, eight schools, two Service Clubs and five Boy or Girl Scout groups. The Governor of Kansas and Mayors in twenty-seven towns issued Proclamations for this important occasion.

Newspaper publicity was good—a total of four hundred sixty-six inches reported. Perhaps Wichita, with all six chapters cooperating, had the most (one hundred fifteen inches) with several TV interviews including State and Chapter Regents, Constitution, Naturalization and National Defense Chairmen speaking. All this made quite an impact on the general public. Another Chapter, Fort Larned, had forty-nine inches publicity plus window displays and a speaker on radio; still another chapter, Emporia, had splendid publicity with forty-one inches in two newspapers with six different write ups including an excollent editorial, "In Defense of DAR."

The highlight of Constitution Week in Kansas is the annual pilgrimage

to Shawnee Mission. That report will be given by the local chairman.

The purpose for this honoring of our Constitution is "to strengthen a nation dedicated to liberty and justice a nation in which its citizons may live an abundant life, developing to the fullest their individual opportunities for success and rendering a corresponding service to their country."

Under consideration is the construction of a decorative stone wall of native field stone as a backdrop near the eastern boundary line of the KSDAR land, to give depth and beauty to the setting. The report of a fine new road from the highway to the park is most gratifying; now if we can get the one in the park blacktopped we'll be satisfied.

Do please keep us in mind. It is our desire to maintain and enhance this remarkable Kansas DAR historical spot in the most efficient manner

possible; to do this we need your interest and cooperation.

Officers elected for 1966-67 were: President, Sally Hardman; Vice-President, Tom Moses; Chaplain, Sharon Stauth; Secretary, Kathy Schreiner; Treasurer, Valla Wilson; Registrar, Roberta Chambers; Historian, Carolyn Thomas; Color Bearers, Linda Hupp and Carol Stauth. These were installed by Minisa Regent, Mrs. McCready, who used the Helen Pouch candle which burned throughout the business meeting.

Upon adjournment the benediction was given by the Chaplain and the

assembly sang the C. A. R. song while the colors were retired.

The closing luncheon, attended by numerous DAR members and senior society presidents, concluded with an informal talk by Mrs. A. W. Geiger of Newton. Entitled, "Food for Thought," her remarks revealed amusing superstitions and provided opportunity for interesting anecdotes regarding the history of a number of our common American foods.

### BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

#### ARTICLE I Name

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### ARTICLE II Objects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution,

particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries,

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in

securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### ARTICLE III Membership

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the

American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

#### ARTICLE IV Officers

Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent.

prior to her election and shall have servel as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office. An officer who has served more than a half a term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be ineligible for any other state office except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding

Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. Term. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State-Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by the State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the

vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

### ARTICLE V Nomination and Election Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National Officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall

State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter, signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State

Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

#### ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the chief executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be ex-officio a member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarain and a Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committees and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the

absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of state Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents, and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than three years.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and of the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first, three Credential Blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of March, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each Chapter Regent before February fifteenth, State Conference registration cards for the Regent and elected delegates. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairmen to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, the amount to be fixed and the expense to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds, and shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members in good standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State \_\_ Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February First.

Section 8. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members-at-large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter, name and rank of ancestor; colony or state and branch of servec in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceding year. In recording a transfer, both the date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society, or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events

in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. State Librarian, The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have the supervision of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library.

Section 11. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the Kaneas Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be chairman of the State Press Rolations Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D. C.

Section 12. Retiring Officers. Each Officer and Committee chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them when transferring them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

#### ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and Chairman of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the entertaining District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers; the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state; the Honorary State Regents; the Chapter Regent; or in her absence the First Vice Regent or alternate and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society, on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

- (a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates.
- (b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members, Regent and five delegates.

(c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Explanatory Table, Chapter Representation at Conference:

Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three Credential Blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privilege. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meetings of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

# ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the chapter Regent or in her absence, the chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Secion 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall following the regular meeting of the National Board of Management and preceding the District meetings; the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

#### ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Members. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three of its members. Ten

days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Boarl may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

#### ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be

from February first through January 31st.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.35 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. These dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. On January fifteenth, the State Treasurer shall notify chapters whose dues are in arrears. A chapter whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess chapters to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Necessary expenses of the State Officers and State Committees shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing and approved by the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

#### ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and five members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget, as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. This committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the Society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the Kansas DAR Student Loan and Scholarship Fund. This Fund is maintained by contributions from

chapters and individuals and the interest on money loaned. The interest

from this fund shall be used annually for scholarships.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Recording Secretary as Chairman, the State Regent and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conference, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolutions shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that have not previously been presented to the Committee,

courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Press Relations. A Press Relations Committee composed of the State Reporter as Chairman and two members appointed by the State Regent shall prepare and distribute information for the press concerning patriotic and educational activities of the Kansas Society. This Committee shall be responsible for the preparation and mailing of the Kansas DAR News.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committee, as are not otherwise provided for in these bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

#### ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports for Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, The Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resume shall not be published in the Proceedings. Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. State Officers, State Chairmen

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send, not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent for use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

## ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Name. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast,

Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the programs of the State and National Societies; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District Secretary thirty days in advance to all chapters within the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each District shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The term of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three terms.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

#### ARTICLE XIV Chapters

Section 1. Officers. The Chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year, the chapter recording secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmon. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of National Committees, giving her name and address of chapter member on that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurers. Chapter treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer before January thirteenth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report. Contributions received by chapter treasurer after January thirtieth shall be sent to the State Treasurer and shall be included in her supplementary report.

## ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws or the bylaws of the National Society.

#### ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These bylaws may be amended by a two thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsel by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

#### STANDING RULES

No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer, 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairmen of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C. A. R. 1; District Directors, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society 2; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society 2; The President General 1; the Kansas State Historical Society 1; the DAR National Library 1; and the President of the State Officers Club, Chapter Regents Club and the State Chairmans Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2. The treasurer shall present each year a tabular list of chapter receipts to the Secretary which shall be printed in the Proceedings.

No. 3. Chairmen of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

No. 4. No less than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expense to be borne by the State Society.

No. 5. The State Registrar shall furnish the publisher of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.

No. 6. A sum not to exceed \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent,

each year for the purpose of carrying on her work.

No. 7. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer

to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

No. 8. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress. No. 9. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

No. 10. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year itno the

Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund.

No. 11. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be in Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (25c).

No. 12. The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its

properties housed at Shawnee Mission.

No. 13. The State Society shall allocate \$25.00 annually to the El Cuartelejo Committee for the proper upkeep of the El Cuartelejo Monu-

ment in Scott County.

No. 14. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 15. A sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas

C. A. R. Society to be used for C. A. R. projects.

No. 16. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the

contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

- No. 17. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board meeting to each of the District meetings in the fall.
- No. 18. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and to the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.
- No. 19. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.
- No. 20. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.
- No. 21. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Public Library, Dodge City, Kansas.
  - (a) The Kansas Society shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Public Library, and shall provide a postal box in Dodge City, Kansas, for the use of the Dodge City Chapter Library Committee in receiving requests for loan of books and their return.
  - (b) The Dodge City Public Library shall provide a private room with adequate work and storage space.
  - (c) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the library. This committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
- No. 22. The Press Books shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration they are compiled.
