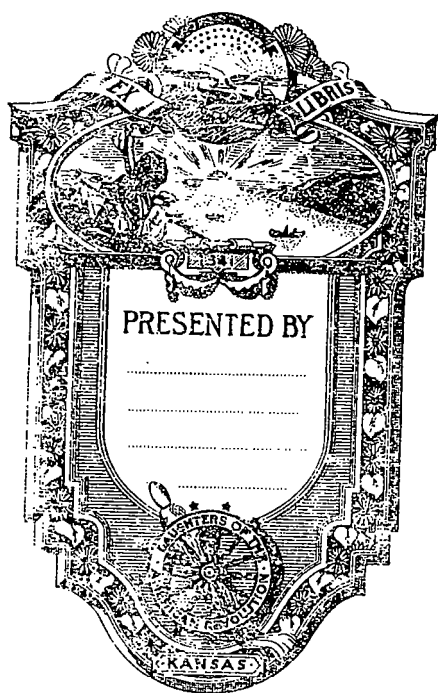

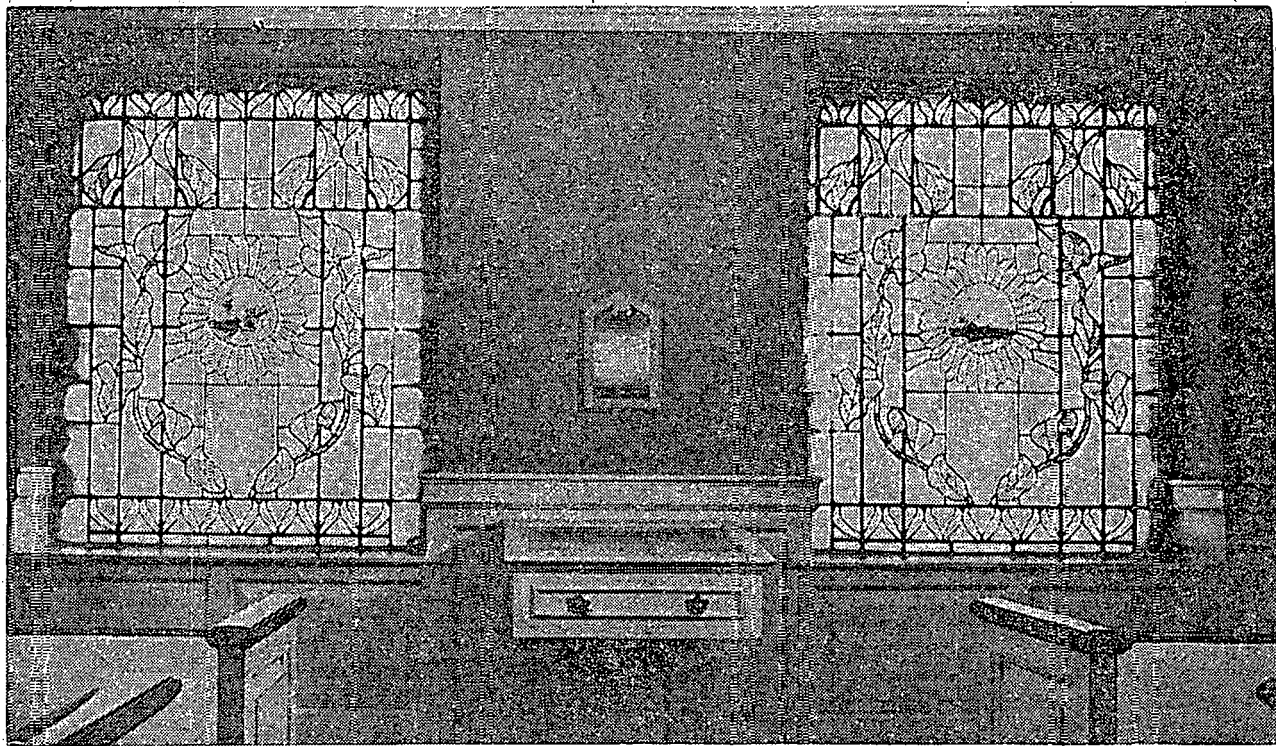

Preamble of the United States of America

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for common defense, promote the general welfare and secure the blessing of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

CONFERENCE RULES

8. All motions shall be written and signed by the mover and seconder and handed to the Recording Secretary before action is taken.
9. A timekeeper will be appointed. All speakers shall conform to the ruling when time is called.
10. A typewritten copy of each and every report must be filed with the Recording Secretary as it is presented. Also a copy of same handed to the State Regent.
11. If the Officer or Chairman or Appointee is not present, her report shall be filed for printing in the Official Proceedings unless otherwise ordered.
12. All Resolutions shall be in the hands of the Resolutions Committee not later than Thursday, 3-10-66.
13. Any chairman or individual who has a table display or exhibit will please attend to having all materials removed at the close of the conference. Do not leave this detail for the hostess chapters.
14. Members who appear on the program will always occupy the front seats, please.
15. Robert's Rules of Order Revised, will govern all parliamentary action, not covered by the Society by-laws and Rules.

Mrs. Rust, State Vice Regent, led the Daughters in the flag salute followed by the entire group singing the national anthem.

Mrs. Casey moved that the minutes of the March Conference 1967 which had been approved by a committee appointed by the State Regent, Mrs. Huffman, and printed in the 1967 Proceeding, be accepted as printed. Miss Lelia Whearty seconded the motion—motion carried.

Mrs. Lucile Rust gave the report of the State Vice Regent, which consisted of the planning of the DAR Fall Tour and mentioned some plans in regard to State Conference to be in Hutchinson in March 1968.

Mrs. Casey reported on the Proceedings for 1967. She has copies for sale; also anyone wanting Proceeding for the years 1965 and 1966 can have them by sending her ten cents to cover mailing charge.

Mrs. McAleavey gave a resume of her fall and summer work as Corresponding Secretary.

Mrs. Lempenau, Treasurer, gave the Treasurer's report from February 1, to the present time. The complete year's report will be published in the 1968 Proceedings.

Mrs. Gaddis, Registrar, reported an increase in membership in Kansas with no dropped members reported this year.

Mrs. Theo Stebbins, Historian, stressed a complete survey of all historic sites, restorations, trail markings, etc., in your area that have been marked and preserved by a DAR Chapter or State Society. Please prepare a list of markings for filing in the Historian General's office for the upcoming 200th anniversary of the birth of our nation. She also stressed the February American History Essay Contest. Mrs. Stebbins reported a nice response for the observance of Constitution Week.

Mrs. Smith informed us that a more complete list of records has been printed and are in the hands of the Chapter Librarians and State Officers. "The Twentieth Century History and Biographical Record of Crawford County, Kansas by Home Authors" published in Chicago in 1905 is needed by the National DAR Library. Also 28 more DAR lineage books. If found for sale, contact your State Librarian. It is hoped each Chapter will give enough to rebind one book each year.

Mrs. Haines reported that the publication dates of the KEDAR News are as follows: Jan. Feb. issue carries the news of the March Conference, and the Necrology list for the past year. This issue also has the election results of the District meetings of the preceding fall. The May-June issue carries a full list of State Chairmen with their addresses, also all appointees, and a complete list of the Chapter Regents. This is a special issue for Yearbook committees to use in compiling their yearbooks during the summer. The Sept.-Oct. issue has all of the plans for the Fall Meetings of the Districts and, of course, the time and place of the Board of Management meeting. Lists of the new members are included in all issues of the News. A pet project of your Reporter has been "The Parade of Kansas DAR Chapters." This is a chronological list of all of the Chapters which have been admitted to the National Society, including information about the origin of the name, something about the Organizing Regent, and a list of the present day officers. This project will be completed in the Jan.-Feb. 1968 issue with the inclusion of chapter histories from 1931 until the present. Our State Regent, Mrs. Huffman, tells us that, as far as she knows, Kansas DAR is the only society that sends their News out to all members free of extra expense to them. It is estimated that this is accomplished at the cost of 30c per member per year, for the three issues.

During the District meetings, Press Book pages have been distributed to all of the Chapters, and it is hoped that we will have some very fine Press Books for display at the Conference at Hutchinson in March, 1968.

The State Regent was the last of the State Officers to report. Here is a resume of her report:

October 30, 1967

Since my last report in March, I have attended the CAR State Conference, three National Board Meetings in Washington, D. C., reported to the Continental Congress for KSDAR while participating in the activities of the Congress. I enjoyed the triennial Eisenhower tour at Abilene on May 2, and on June 19, the planning meeting with Mrs. Rust and the District Directors. On September 13, KSDAR gathered at Shawnee Mission, where the following gifts were received and dedicated to the KSDAR room in the museum: (1) framed picture and invitation to Requiem Mass of Eugenia Washington, one of the Societies' four Founders— (2) Antique Doll Carriage and— (3) a beautiful wedding dress, circa 1886. I have visited fourteen chapters, and El Cuartelejo monument. Also joined in the DAR tour to Tamassee, where we were privileged to attend a Tamassee Board meeting, and the dedication of the Adele-Erb Sullivan Building, where two pillars were the gift of the Kansas Daughters, and so marked.

Today I can report to you that the status, the strength and enthusiasm, the financial standing, as well as the public image and acceptance of the Daughters of the American Revolution is at a high point.

Your State Officers are here to report on the work of KSDAR. Listen carefully, each report will reflect the dedication they feel toward their office, and their pride in serving you. As we come to the end of our administration, we can not find words to thank you for the cooperation and understanding you have given to us. We are very sad as we, your Executive Board, come to you for the District Meetings. The loss of our beloved Chaplain has touched us deeply. For almost three years she has given of her faith and strength. Our tribute to her is to go about our duties with devotion to our Society as she would have us. I have asked Mrs. Roscoe Gillaspie to act as Chaplain until March 1968.

Again we thank you most sincerely, and pledge to serve you to the best of our ability.

At the close of the report of Mrs. Huffman, State Regent, she then appointed Mrs. Roscoe Gillaspie of Mission Hills to fill the unexpired term of the late Mrs. E. Carruth Owen as Chaplain.

Mrs. McAleavey nominated Mrs. Harry Ives to be chairman of the State nominating committee. Mrs. Huffman appointed Miss Whearty, Mrs. Roscoe Gillaspie; Lineage Research by Mrs. Harry Ives; Program by Mrs. E. H. Snider; Student Loan and Scholarship by Mrs. L. B. Naylor.

Mrs. Huffman then declared the meeting be recessed for a luncheon in the Gold Room.

At 1:15 the Daughters reconvened in the conference room. At this time the 13 Regents present responded with words of greetings and some asked questions which were bothering them.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE KSDAR request the Kansas State Legislature to begin a state wide realistic study of the air pollution in Kansas with the view to implementing a non-air pollution program to protect the health of Kansas citizens BEFORE the good atmosphere of our state is greatly endangered.

In the three years that I have served as Registrar, the trend has changed from a loss in membership in our State Society to substantial increases. Two chapters were disbanded in that time and two new ones organized. More Junior Members are joining our chapters.

Supplements for the 1961 State Directory were printed in the October, 1967 and the February, 1968 Kansas DAR News. A Memorial List was compiled for the State Chaplain and was used at the Memorial Service.

Many hours have been spent checking addresses in yearbooks and making corrections on the file cards and in the mailing list for the DAR News. With the help of the State Reporter, I completely redid the mailing list last April and May and now hope to have it as up to date as possible. Cimarron River Valley Chapter, our newest chapter, won the Eunice Sterling Traveling Flags Award with 21.4 per cent net gain in membership. This chapter had a net gain of 3 members from March 1, 1967 to March 1, 1968. Fort Larned had the most new members by verification—12.

I have attended all the Executive and State Board Meetings and the District Meetings. It has been a privilege and a pleasure to serve the Kansas Society under the leadership of our State Regent, Mrs. Huffman.

STATE HISTORIAN'S REPORT 1967-68

One of the chief concerns of the Historian is the preservation of historic sites and to interest the public in past events by encouraging the placing of markers and calling attention to historic spots, buildings, battlefields, trails.

An item of interest is the restoration of the Old Fort at Hays. This old fort was an important military installation from 1867 until 1889. The Kansas Historical Society has earmarked \$128,000 for the project.

The Lewis and Clark Trail in Kansas has been marked recently. These markers were placed along Highway K-7 in Kansas, west on U. S. 40 from Kansas City and North on K-7 to the Nebraska line, and follow along the highway as nearly as possible the trail Lewis and Clark took along the Missouri River in 1804.

With the 200th anniversary of the "Birth of Our Nation" approaching, the Historian General has requested a complete survey of all sites and restorations which have been marked and preserved by a DAR Chapter or State Society. Kansas is fortunate to have had Helen Wilson of Concordia who made such a survey while she was State Historian several years ago. Two copies of this outstanding report were sent to NSDAR at that time. To learn whether or not additional markers have been placed, your Historian contacted each Kansas Chapter requesting information on markers and restorations since 1961. Many Chapters answered. Few additional markers have been placed or moved. Copies of the new survey will be sent to NSDAR as an addition to Mrs. Wilson's report.

Abilene Chapter replaced two wooden markers with bronze ones. Arthur Barrett Chapter is involved in the restoration of the original Pony Express Barn located in their area. This chapter also moved a "Pike's Peak Trail" marker from the old highway to a city park in Marysville. Betty Washington Chapter repaired Historical Markers on Highway 40 and the Santa Fe Trail. Byrd Prewitt Chapter reported that an old Santa Fe Trail Marker in Kearney County was moved in 1967 to a nearby location, due to construction of a new four-lane highway. Council Oak Chapter presented and placed a bronze plaque at the base of the flag pole at Madonna of the Trail Park in July, 1965. James Ross Chapter re-dedicated an old DAR stone marker that had previously been located in Huron Park, Kansas City. This ceremony took place on November 19, 1967 and the stone is now located on the east side of the new library building. Randolph Loving Chapter restored and replaced an old water fountain at the entrance to "Cow Town" in Wichita. The fountain was originally presented by the WCTU to honor Carrie Nation. A bronze plaque on the marble stone tells that it was erected in its present location as a gift of Randolph Loving Chapter in 1962. Both Polly Ogden and Mary Wade Strother Chapters reported that an historic restoration has been started.

The number of DAR members' graves marked for this year is 15.

Many historical anniversaries were celebrated and patriotic programs were widely used. All but one of the reporting chapters observed February as American History Month.

I am happy to tell you of the above accomplishments. My sincere thanks and appreciation to each of you with a very special Thanks to the State Officers, Chapter Regents and Historians for all their help in the past three years.

The Press Books for the year, February 1, 1966 to February 1, 1967 were on display at the State Conference in Wichita, March, 1967. A book is kept for each of the four districts and prizes awarded for the best all-around book, and first and second prizes for the chapters in each district, making a total of \$15.00 provided for that purpose in the state budget.

Volume 15, numbers One, Two and Three of the KSDAR News came to each member of the State Organization, and also the President General, The State Library in Dodge City, and the Kansas State Historical Society. The May-June 1967 issue contained the new Program Theme which is announced at the Continental Congress in April. This issue also featured a complete up-to-date list of State Chairmen of National Committees, Special Appointments made by the State Regent, and a complete list of Chapter Regents, to be used by yearbooks committees during the summer. The Sept-Oct. 1967 carried plans for the District meetings, and the Jan-Feb. 1968 has data pertaining to the State Conference, March 14, 15 and 16th in Hutchinson. A pet project of your Reporter has been to carry short histories of the 64 Chapters in Kansas. This series was called "Parade of Kansas DAR Chapters" and started with the oldest chapter, Topeka, in July 1965 and ended with "Cimarron Valley" in the last issue. The entire series takes up the issues from July 1965 to Jan-Feb. 1968, or Volumes 13, 14 and 15.

Report on Press Books, 1967-68

During the District meetings in the Fall, your Reporter explained the procedure in regard to the Press Books and distributed pages to all interested persons. March 1st was the deadline for receipt of pages to be included in the district books. The books were then submitted to a judging committee composed of people who were non-members of DAR. The results of the committee's findings were as follows:

The Northeast District book won first place among the Districts, \$3.00.

The first and second places in the NE Book were won by Shawnee Mission and Wyandot, \$2.00 and \$1.00 respectively.

Prizes in the other districts were won by Mary Wade Strother and

Polly Ogden in the Northwest, Uvedale and Martha Vail in the Southwest, and Jane Dean Coffey and Peleg Gorton in the Southwest District. The sum of \$15.00 is provided in the State Budget for the Press Book awards, and is thus divided into nine prizes.

In March we toured Nelson Art Gallery, reviewing again the Indian Exhibit and the Early American Rooms. Our annual guest tea was held in May; "The DAR Schools" was the subject for the program. We also participated in the Memorial Day Parade with other area Chapters. The Chapter began its new year in September with the annual Pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission and the observance of Constitution Week. Wyandot Chapter took an active part in both events. October was our 14th anniversary and our meeting topic was; "Grinter House A State Historical Spot?" Many members have written supporting this project and it will be discussed during the current Legislative Session in Topeka. In November one of our members presented a slide tour of Historical Sites in the Northwest. The next month we visited DAR Schools in the same manner. Kansas' Birthday was celebrated in January and a History of Kansas City, Kansas was presented for our program. Other activities of Wyandot Chapter include: The presentation of a large flag to the Wyandotte County Library; furnishing "Pledge of Allegiance Cards" to new citizens; the purchase of two volumes of "Kansas History" for the State DAR Library; and contributions to the DAR Schools and other projects of the National and State Society.

In October letters were sent to all chapters. December 30th I mailed the questionnaires to the chapter chairmen. Fifty chairmen completed and returned the reports to me.

Bacone received \$112.50 and of this amount \$1.00 was designated for the scholarship fund and \$10.00 was given to the nursing scholarship fund. Cash given to St. Mary's School for Indian girls amounted to \$106.93 with \$7.00 to be used for the DAR Wing. Donations to the General Indian Scholarship Fund amounted to \$37.00.

Approximately 547 pounds of good used clothing and jewelry were sent or delivered to Bacone and St. Mary's at a cost of \$40.00. Twenty Christmas gifts were given to girls at St. Mary's, and 30 gifts were presented to the Alaskan Indian students attending Chilocco Indian School. Books, both new and used were given to Haskell Institute.

I wish to express my appreciation to our State Regent, all officers and chairmen for the cooperation given to me. It has been a privilege to serve as chairman of the American Indians Committee.

AMERICANISM and DAR MANUAL

Letters and questionnaires were mailed last fall to all chapters, with information on procedure for securing Americanism Award for a Naturalized Citizen. Twenty questionnaires returned.

Two hundred four Manuals, one hundred and three Citizenship cards, three hundred and fifty three Flag Codes, one hundred and fifty three Declarations of Independence, two hundred and ten American Flags given this year. Total \$180.00 spent for Teas, Awards, Manuals and Flags. Four hours television and radio, 1050 inches of publicity and several pictures credited to this committee. Two tapes purchased and one tape shown of "Citizenship U.S.A."

Had 11,000 service hours, served 502 at teas for Naturalized Citizens. Four Americanism medals and certificates presented this year. Two, by Mary Wade Strother chapter, honoring Mr. and Mrs. Eric Stein. One, by Hannah Jameson chapter, honoring Mrs. William Haubold. One, by Eunice Sterling chapter honoring Mrs. Dean Ritchie.

A member from Uvedale chapter tutored and sponsored a family of four. This family received their citizenship through the efforts of a DAR member.

During my chairmanship, Eunice Sterling chapter has honored a naturalized citizen each year. (One man and two women.) This year alone through the efforts of three chapters, Kansas has honored four, making a grand total of six.

R. meetings and to make regular reports of C. A. R. work at DAR meetings. Chairmen were reminded to make contributions to the Endowment Fund through the Kansas C. A. R. Society and to urge DAR members to become state promoters.

The Sunflower Special news sheet printed in conjunction with DAR News has been made possible through the years by the continuous financial support of the Kansas Society DAR for which the C. A. R. Society is sincerely appreciative.

CONSERVATION

Mrs. Walter W. Sondker

Three-part Program for 1967-1968. Judging the work this year was as follows: 50% Beautification of our National Headquarter's grounds. 25% State beautification and education of youth. 25% Water and air pollution work. A. \$132.50 total money sent by chapters for National Headquarters. \$28.50 was earned and sent by Eunice Sterling. 1. Wild flowers, grasses etc. were pressed and inserted between paper and made into book marks, note paper and sold to members. Also, they planted and cared for berry plants and fruit trees, made jelly and jam from them and sold to the members. B. State beautification: 776 trees, 150 bulbs, 63 bushes, many flowers and vegetable gardens were planted by DAR families. Special trees and money were given to three colleges and Shawnee Mission Museum grounds. Mary Wade Strother sold fruit cakes to pay for a historical marker in their city park; chapters cooperated with city and county officials to promote conservation. 2. Conservation pamphlets and DAR magazines were placed in college and public school libraries. Wild life and conservation material was given to schools, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. Three chapter chairmen gave talks before youth groups. Betty Washington chapter made six posters 14" x 20" in color and exhibited them in the Eldridge Hotel and later they were displayed in their public schools. The subjects treated were pesticides, trash disposal, sewage, smoke fumes, smog and feed lots. Randolph Loving gave a DAR Conservation award to a Boy Scout who alone had planted 90 trees. Eunice Sterling has worked with youth in the field of crime prevention. In October this chapter gave \$25 plus individual gifts of \$53 to a youth group in Wichita which is dedicated to the betterment of youth. C. Twenty chapters reported programs on Conservation, Water and Air Pollution. One chapter chairman gives a brief report each month on some phase of conservation. Three special subjects treated by members were: "A Portrait of Water; This Polluted Air We Breathe and A Look Into the Future—Our National Resources." The chief architect for the Highway Commission was guest speaker at the Topeka Chapter meeting. Several husbands have given up smoking to combat air pollution. A DAR family was cited for Conservation on their farm. Another family improved industrial conditions at their plant thereby eliminating air pollution by smoke from the plant. Another DAR family is working to improve and beautify conditions on the Arkansas River which flows by their farm. An attractive stone wall has been built. The Randolph Loving Conservation Chairman gave Conservation awards of \$25 to each of three farmers in Sedgwick County, also a Conservation plaque to a business or professional man who had helped promote conservation in his community. Mrs. Huffman, our State Regent and twelve members of Randolph Loving were guests at the Sedgwick County Bankers Conservation banquet. The Regent and chapter chairman

took the Bankers Soil and Water Conservation tour and on this occasion presented the awards mentioned above. This report has been given in detail in the hope that other chapters will be inspired to do more work in Conservation. My thanks to all of you who have contributed in any way to the promotion of conservation in Kansas DAR.

Letters were sent to all 61 Chapters in September with information concerning DAR Museum, followed in January by letters to all Chapters, containing form for Annual Reports. Forty-three Chapters replied. From these reports I have compiled the following report. 14 chapters has programs on Museum. 12 chapters made contributions to Museum totalling \$20.00. 28 chapters contributed to Air-conditioning Museum totalling \$176.25. 41 Books, "In Washington" were placed in Libraries by 7 chapters. A lovely gift of a 3-piece English Copper Lustre Teaset was presented to the DAR Museum by Mrs. John Olinger of Eunice Sterling Chapter. This gift was accepted on May 18, 1967. Our Kansas Society DAR has placed a Little Girl mannekin in our Museum, honoring our State Regent, Mrs. Huffman. This little girl mannekin will be a companion piece to the lovely Lady which was placed there several years ago.

REPORT—STATE CHAIRMAN DAR SCHOOL COMMITTEE
Kansas State Conference, March, 1968

There is only one way, in my opinion, your State Chairman DAR School Committee should begin, this the final report to you—that is—with a sincere "Thank You," Kansas Daughters for the loyal support you've given both me and our DAR Schools. The Kansas compiled reports of chapters' accomplishments sent in this month by your State Chairman to Mrs. Fred Aebly, National Chairman DAR School Committee, was one of which we may be proud. That report was based upon the response of sixty one chapters out of the sixty three, so, thank you for a near 100% accounting of Kansas' school support. An increase was shown in the number of boxes of clothing and other items sent to Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee, due, more especially, to the wider range of dead head freight established in more locations in the state. Thirty nine out of eighty-four boxes were shipped free (only eighteen sent free last year). Out of 2,211 lbs. of freight only 807 lbs. were paid. The total estimated value of clothing was \$2,480.00—\$1,080.00 valuation was sent free. Many chapters gave full or partial programs on the schools—36 on Kate Duncan Smith and the same number on Tamassee, and, 31 programs in all on the other DAR Approved Schools. This was a substantial increase over the previous two years. Total cash donations sent through the State Treasurer to Kate Duncan Smith was \$670.13, and, to Tamassee \$1,155.20. Early last fall, your State Chairman mailed letters to each of the 63 chapters including suggestions for furthering school support. In September the Shawnee Mission Annual Pilgrimage was attended. Three DAR School programs were given by me, one, slides and commentary on Kate Duncan Smith for Mission Hills Chapter, one, slides and commentary on both KDS and Tamassee for Shawnee Mission Chapter. A written report was presented on both Schools to Sagamore Chapter. October was a busy month. Your State Chairman was privileged to attend the Tamassee Dedication Exercises, at which time, the very beautiful and well-appointed, Adele Erb Sullivan Building was dedicated. The two lovely white columns you gave in honor of our State Regent, Mrs. Elmer E. Huffman, flank either side of one of the two entrances. Another proud moment was experienced when a gift of \$5,000.00, from the estate of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Kirkpatrick, Eldorado, Kansas was presented and accepted by Tamassee. From Tamassee, my travels led me to Kate Duncan Smith for their Dedication Day, at which, in the absence of our State Regent, it was my

sincere privilege to present a gift of \$5,000.00 from the above Estate to KDS. Mrs. Esther Thayer Kirkpatrick had been a devout and dedicated worker in DAR during her long lifetime, and, our schools were remembered when she could no longer serve—her good work goes on. The wonderful visits to our schools will never be forgotten. To see, personally, the fine campus of each, the polite boys and girls, unspoiled, to talk with devoted faculty members was indeed a privilege. A written report of details was given at the Four District Meetings in October and at the Mission Hills Chapter meeting in October. The Board of Management was attended, also. In November, it was my pleasure to be present at the Olathe Chapter Founder's Day Dinner at which time I presented a slide and commentary program on the Dedication Activities at KDS and Tama-see, also, distributing current literature from the schools obtained while there in October. The same program was repeated for the Wyandot Chapter at their Dec. meeting. As I review the three years serving as State Chairman DAR Schools, it is with a deep feeling of gratitude—for the new friendships, and, for having gained a far deeper understanding and knowledge of our schools, of the splendid service they render boys and girls and the communities in those mountains. More especially, my appreciation goes to our State Regent for her co-operation, always, and for her having made these experiences possible. Thank you, Mrs. Roscoe Gillaspie, State Chairman, DAR School Committee.

Forty-one Lineage Research Kits were sold. It has been gratifying to know that some have benefitted from the work of this committee. MEMBERSHIP

Serving our State Society as Membership chairman, has been a challenging and rewarding experience. After 3 consecutive years of net loss, we moved into the plus column last year and ended this year with a net gain of 53 members. With 100% of the Chapters reporting, the final tabulation reads as follows: GAINS: by Verification 164, Reinstatements 11, Transfers In 19, Total 194. LOSSES: Deaths 64, Resignations 52, Transfers Out 22, Dropped 3, Total 141. Of the 164 new members, 45 are Junior members including 5 C.A.R.s. transferring into DAR. With 64 Chapters in our State, 36 showed a gain in membership, 18 a net loss and 10 remained the same. Our total membership February 1, 1968 was 3474 plus 31 members At Large. With the assistance of Mrs. James W. Smith, Librarian, Mrs. L. H. W. Hall, Consulting Genealogist and Mrs. Harry M. Ives, Lineage Research, the Membership Workshops held in Dodge City and Topeka Last June proved very successful. It was the consensus of

opinion of those of us working on them, that it definitely is a good service to those preparing papers and should be improved, enlarged and continued. To Mrs. E. E. Huffman, State Regent, Mrs. L. O. Gaddis, Registrar, Mrs. Smith, Mrs. Ives, Mrs. Hall, Mrs. J. R. Pritchard, Genealogical Records, Mrs. R. B. Harkins, State Organizer, the Chapter Regents and Membership Chairmen and ALL the members of KSDAR—I give my sincere thanks for your cooperation and valuable help in making this year so successful. With our Country so besieged with conflict and dissent, our DAR is a valuable stabilizing force for all concerned with the preservation of the ideals of Freedom. To my successor, I leave a legacy of 150 prospective members working on papers. With this nucleus to begin the next year and with EVERY MEMBER of our DAR assuming her responsibility as a MEMBER of the MEMBERSHIP Committee, we can definitely say—"KSDAR is on the Move." Cimarron River Valley, Mrs. R. B. Harkins, Regent, receives the National Membership Chairman's Certificate award with a net increase of 50%.

MOVIE CHAIRMAN
Mrs. James C. Routh

The National Society voted to re-instate the Movie Committee, because of the urgent need to emphasize high quality moves. Kansas members are encouraged to promote good movies and to help secure one with little or no charge for schools and organizations. Two letters were written last year to the chapters. This year a letter was sent to tell about the National Essay Contest on "Suggestions for Stressing Good Movies." \$25.00 was offered by National for the best essay. As Chairman for Kansas I offered \$5.00 or the best Kansas essay. The Green Sheet which evaluates the quality of Movies was distributed to members at the State Convention. Chapters were encouraged to subscribe to it. The Wichita Eagle and Beacon sponsored high quality movies for children on Saturday mornings. A letter of commendation was sent to the Editor. The excellent movie, Williamsburg, was shown at several Chapter meetings. It is shown and narrated by M. Robert Carrol of KARD TV without charge. Each Chapter should have at least one member do at least one thing to promote good movies each year.

ESSAY

Contemporary entertainment through the visual-audio media has progressed to a great extent over the past two decades. However, progress is confined to certain limitations, primarily mechanics in improved photography, richness of color, casting in true characterization, and projection of sound. A large portion of current films portray an excess of nudity, intimate scenes, both beach and boudoir, that leave little to the imagination and an undesirable stimulation to the emotions of young viewers. The producers state that such productions are big box-office—that their patronage is composed largely of teen-agers; consequently the industry produces films based on sex, violence and protest in order to appeal to the younger patrons. As a result, young people are apt to develop a misconception of human love, basing it upon the physical, rather than compatibility of interests as manifested thru mind, soul, background and education. The past two years productions have improved remarkably—"The Sound of Music," "A Mall for all Seasons" each an outstanding achievement in the category of music and history. However, productions on that level are expensive to produce and the run of the mill films must be provided to fill the void in order to keep the theatres in operation. Censorship is not as effective as it should be, a banned film or book stimulates curiosity, resulting in determination to discover that which is objectionable. The responsibility for improvement in standards lies with the industry, more comedies, musicals, documentaries and historicals. It has been proven that high quality entertainment for children is possible

as evidenced by the Walt Disney productions. Producers should discontinue exploiting the body and produce films with less emphasis on sex. Our youth would continue patronage of the theatres as they are seeking entertainment and diversion. Recommendations should be made thru an authorized committee with the composite suggestions from the people as a foundation for action.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

As your National Defense Chairman it has been a pleasure to correspond and to meet many of you who have served as National Defense chairmen of your chapter. I thank you for your promptness and cooperation. I had hoped to have all chapters reporting this year but in spite of my efforts, six are missing. From fifty-eight chapters reporting I have compiled the following information: Forty-six chapters had one entire program on National Defense and fifty-eight chapters spent at least five minutes each meeting, and thirty-four spent ten minutes or more. National Defense Material was made available by thirty-four chapters at their meetings. Five schools and eleven libraries also received National Defense material and the DAR magazine. Forty chapters had discussions on the 1967 Resolutions. Twenty-five Good Citizenship medals were awarded and also one ROTC medal. These were presented at awards assemblies and received newspaper publicity. Twenty-three chapters gave a total of \$57.50 to National Defense and twenty-five chapters made an effort to increase subscriptions to the National Defense mailing. One hundred fifty-six members as individuals wrote to members of Congress in regard to the vital issues of the day. Topics of the greatest interests were: Tax, Inflation, Great Society, Vietnam, Open Housing, Crime, Communism, Civil Rights, Rioting, Panama Canal, Civil Disobedience, Welfare, Immigration, Decisions of Supreme Court, and Changing our National Holidays. I have enjoyed so much working under the leadership of our dear State Regent, Mrs. Huffman, and the association and friendship with her and the other officers and members of the Kansas DAR. Years pass quickly but pleasant memories linger on.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

The National Society DAR has made great strides in public relations throughout the Nation. The most recent of which was the visit of our President General, Mrs. William Henry Sullivan, Jr., to South Vietnam in January, 1968 representing the DAR to the wounded in hospitals, to the men in combat and to the officials in Saigon. On the state level the Kansas Society DAR has enjoyed a marked increase in publicity the last six years especially through Press, Radio and Television. The State Press Books reflect the interest shown. The number of Chapters reporting good publicity increased and many Chairmen reported cooperating with other civic and patriotic organizations in their communities. Every effort was made to use all news media in publicizing the DOINGS of DAR. Early in the Fall Chapters were urged to THINK DAR! TELL DAR! and DO DAR! All Chairmen were requested to obtain the Public Relations Kit from National Headquarters and were encouraged to cultivate a friendly understanding with the Radio, Television and Newspaper offices in their areas. In October, 1967, notices were sent to Kansas newspapers announcing the date and program of the four District meetings. Chairmen were requested to complete Questionnaires and forward to the State Chairman prior to March 10, 1968. In January, 1968, the State Chairman began contacting speakers, guests and officers scheduled to appear on the

program at the State Conference in Hutchinson, March 14, 15 and 16. This material was then forwarded to the Conference workers in Hutchinson for personal contact with the news media there. Again Kansas newspapers were sent general information on the Conference meetings. Television and radio stations contacted in Wichita were given Conference material for broadcasting and spot announcements during the week of State meetings. The cooperation, interest and assistance this Chairman has experienced the past three years has made it a privilege and an honor to have served the State Regent as State Chairman of Public Relations. To all the Chapter Chairmen who worked so diligently in telling the DAR story and to all facets of the news media in Kansas this Chairman is sincerely appreciative and deeply grateful.

PROGRAM

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

The Kansas Society DAR has a new fifty star ceremonial flag which is being used for the first time at this 70th Conference. It was my pleasure to present this flag to the Kansas Society State Regent, Mrs. Huffman, at the meeting of Northeast District, Topeka, October 31, 1967. I want to express the appreciation of the Kansas Society DAR, and my personal gratitude to Northeast District Director, Mrs. H. A. Van Doren, and the following chapters: Arthur Barrett, Atchison, Betty Washington, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, Emporia, General Edward Hand, James Ross, John Haupt, Mission Hills, Olathe, Sagamore, Samuel Linscott, Shawnee, Tomahawk, Topeka, and Wyandot. The reports showed the interest and activity of sixty chapters. Seventeen large flags were presented by fifteen chapters to public schools, public libraries, historical museum, Scout troops, Boys Club, 4-H groups, and cities. Small flags numbering 1,215, were presented by twenty chapters to newly naturalized citizens, veterans, libraries of public schools and college, Scout troops, Boys Club, 4-H groups, DAR Chapters, and YWCA. Twenty chapters participated in community projects and parades. They furnished floats, cars for transportation, flags, window displays, made wreaths for graves, and two chapters, Esther Lowery and Newton, contributed \$25 each to purchase flags for community use. One chapter, John Haupt, sold thirteen large flags (3' x 5'). I would like to urge more chapters to have flags available for sale . . . not as a money making project, but to promote the ownership and proper use of the flag of the United States of America. Only 746 members were reported having a 50 star flag in good condition. This is less than one-third of our membership of more than 3,400. Two chapters, Byrd Prewitt and General Edward Hand, reported that every member had accepted this privilege and responsibility. We must own flags and use them if we are to "KEEP THE FLAGS FLYING."

1967 PILGRIMAGE TO EISENHOWER CENTER

This required several types of anchor fittings; all of the pews were loose in varying degrees. Now they are secure—at Washington prices. A dedications service for the new windows is planned for this coming Continental Congress on Monday, April 15th. Kansas Daughters are urged to attend. And the committee is very pleased that for this occasion the walls have been freshly painted, the carpet professionally cleaned, and new Williamsburg blue velvet enhances the Communion Chairs and Altar Dossal curtain. We are indebted to Vernon McArthur for \$150.00 toward the colored postal card fund for views of the new windows and renovated altar; this has been an exasperatingly delayed project. CONSTITUTION WEEK 1967

OUR KANSAS HERITAGE THROUGH TRAVEL

(Excerpts from a paper by Mrs. George J. Trombold presented
at the 1968 State Conference)

To all DAR members, heritage means a great deal. In fact, it is our reason for being. All of us certainly should concern ourselves with our American Heritage from the very beginning. But what is America? It is fifty states banded together under one constitution. I asked myself what do I know about my own state? How much has Kansas contributed to this great nation? As I began my research, I decided if everything wonderful about our state were told I would be speaking for days. So I chose the history of travel in our beloved Kansas. In the last four centuries, six different peoples varying in race, language, customs and religion have claimed Kansas as their own. The grass-house and earth-house dwellers; the tepee dwellers whose homes were cone-shaped leather tents, the immigrant Indians from east of the Mississippi, Spanish horsemen who claimed the plains and prairies for their king, French trappers and traders who lived in the lodges with their red brothers, and American plowmen who built a great state. These six peoples loved the timbered valleys, the wide reaching grasslands, the fertile earth and sunny skies we call Kansas. Each wanted them for his own. Each of the six has contributed to our history and made our past so glamorous that the poet Whittier said "No one of the sisterhood of states has such a record as Kansas so full of peril and adventure, of fortitude, self-sacrifice and heroic devotion to Freedom." There were five Indian tribes in Kansas—the Pawnees, the Wichitas, the Osages, the Kansas and a few Comanches. The Comanches were a migrant tribe who lived in leather tepees which could be taken down and moved. The other four tribes built more permanent homes of grass and earth, and planted gardens of corn, beans and pumpkins. Wars were frequent between the Indian tribes but the Kansas and Osages usually were at peace with each other. The Indian's only domestic animal was the wolf dog. Pups were taken from prairie wolves' dens. The dogs were taught to draw loads on a simple vehicle and made harnesses for them from buffalo leather. The coming of the horse made a great change in the life of the Indian. While the white man brought the horse to Kansas, the Indian now could ride when they hunted buffalo. Wild herds developed from abandoned horses exhausted from travel, and some horses the Indians stole. As the new nation developed on the Eastern seaboard, the Indians were pushed West, to Kansas. They fought back but every war resulted in defeat for the red men, while white men's diseases and whiskey destroyed whole tribes. Within two centuries the forty tribes were reduced to forty-six Indians. In 1830 Congress designated the region covering the present Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas, and westward,

the Indians Territory. After the Spanish came the French, from Canada, and then English-speaking Americans. Of the many missions set up for the Indians, the best known today is Shawnee Mission, in Kansas City, Kansas. A treaty was signed at Medicine Lodge in late October of 1867 but it was not ratified by Congress until in July, 1868, which angered the Indians. So the wars went on. The Wyandotte tribe, most highly advanced on the emigrant tribes, founded the village of Wyandot, now Kansas City, Kansas. They had been so reduced by war and disease few were left, so they stole white children and raised them as their own. At the time of their migration they were more white than red, as there was not a full blooded Indian in the tribe. Southwest Kansas has been under five flags; France, Spain, Mexico, Texas Republic and the United States. Following the Louisiana Purchase a bill authored by Stephen A. Douglas created the Kansas Territory, bounded by the fortieth parallel on the north, Missouri on the east, the thirty-seventh parallel on the south and the Rocky Mountains on the west. Kansas then became a state of trails, and with the trails many forts, the most historic of which is Fort Leavenworth—for years a symbol of the nations strength. The old stone wall which was the first structure built at the fort has been preserved and restored through the efforts of the Captain Jesse Leavenworth Chapter of DAR. Next came Fort Larned in 1859, Fort Scott in 1843 and Fort Riley in 1853. "Ships of the Plains", "Prairie Schooners" and "Covered Wagons" were the names given the canvas topped wagons that crossed the prairies, drawn by oxen or horses. They sometimes traveled four abreast with as many as eighty wagons in one train, at an average speed of one mile per hour. Pawnee Rock was one of the most dangerous spots on the Santa Fe Trail, and Post Office Oak was an old tree at Council Grove where travelers left letters to be picked up by passing wagon trains. The "Western Trail" came up from Texas through Dodge City and thence through the Northwestern corner of Kansas to Nebraska. When Joseph McCoy built pens and loading chutes in Abilene he invited Texans to drive their cattle to the Kansas Pacific Railroad and the first herd started north guided only by the North Star, thus establishing the Chisholm Trail. Before long, Dodge City on the Western Trail became known as the Cow Capital of America. It was the world's largest cattle market from 1875 to 1884. This part of our state's history will live in the paintings of such artists as Charles M. Russell, popular all over the world. The cowboy hated the sodbuster but Kansas had a date with destiny, and the sodbuster came and brought his family with him. The American woman went where her husband went. The pioneer and his wife were partners in all they did. Refreshed by the sweat of their toiling bodies, the Great American Desert was bound to become fruitful. The old trails became roads, but many early roads had no bridges and streams had to be forded in both low and high water. High water constantly damaged what frail bridges there were. Horses would cross on a broken bridge but a mule would not set foot on one. As many farmers had only mules, they had a hard time getting their wagon loads to market, or the family to the "Literary Society" in the spring wagon. About twenty dollars would buy a two-wheeled one-horse cart, and a buffalo robe was the popular luxury for cold winter days. No other state entered the union under such difficulties as did Kansas. The Civil War waged in Kansas spread to the nation as the state was being organized. Until aroused by the Kansas atrocities, the majority of people of the North were indifferent to slavery. The Kansas struggle played an important part in the rise of Lincoln to the Presidency. Lincoln, scarcely known outside of Illinois, was a close friend of John Calhoun, Surveyer-General of Kansas and Chairman of the Lecompton Constitutional Convention. Calhoun appointed Lincoln as a surveyor and while working at surveying he studied law and was admitted to the bar. Following passage of the Kansas-Nebraska Bill, Lincoln became an outspoken champion of freedom for Kansas. His speeches on the

Kansas question in December, 1859, at Elwood, Troy, Atchison, and Leavenworth, and his opposition squatter sovereignty as espoused by Stephen A. Douglas made Lincoln a national figure. The state was only two months old when President Lincoln issued a call for soldiers on April 15, 1861. Enemies lurked on all sides of Kansas. To the east was Missouri, half Union and half Confederate, while the western part of that state wanted to join the Confederacy. Kansas had to hold open the Santa Fe, California and Smoky Hill Trails, beat off the Indians, try to keep Missouri in the Union, and send soldiers to fight with Lincoln's armies in the south. Bandits took advantage of the situation and the renegade William Quantrill and his guerilla gang sacked Lawrence, killing all men left there except a young Congregational minister, Dr. Cordley, whose resourceful wife hid him in a well. Kansas supplied 20,097 soldiers to the Union Army, of whom 798 were killed in action, 204 died of wounds, and 2,106 died of disease. She had more soldiers than voters and gave the Union more soldiers in proportion to her population than any other state. The nickname "Jayhawker" applied to all native Kansans came from the Seventh Kansas Cavalry, headed by Charles Jennison who had served with Montgomery in the Jayhawker War. After the war, more travel came west. The soldiers who had crossed the state liked what they saw and came to live. The wagon train, the Pony Express the trapper—and then the railroad. The desire for mail service did more to speed up transportation than anything else, and Congress voted money for mail service on the Santa Fe Trail from Independence to Santa Fe. The first stagecoach was drawn by six mules, carried the mail and eight passengers, was guarded from Indians by eight men, and took a month to reach Santa Fe. Next came the railroad. The first railroad built across Kansas from east to west was the Kansas Pacific, now the Union Pacific, incorporated by act of the Kansas Territorial Legislature in 1855 and constructed in 1863 from eastern money and by eastern men. How the railroads progressed through Nebraska and Kansas, impeded by incessant warfare of hostile Indians, and at times delayed by moving masses of buffalo, is a matter of history. Many forts were set up along the way by the government, to protect the workmen. In 1863 Samuel Hallett, of Steuben County, New York, with John Fremont acquired control of the company and completed the railroad to Lawrence, Kansas. The Kansas Pacific Railroad played an important part in development of the agricultural areas of the state through sales of land grants on extremely liberal terms and through encouragement of settlements and colonization. At Hays, Buffalo Bill Cody supplied buffalo meat for the railroad crews. Wichita's Williams Mathewson (the original Buffalo Bill) also supplied buffalo meat for the workmen and the army men guarding the trails. The plains buffalo herds were once estimated at 15 million head and tracks of the railroad often followed the buffalo paths. The bison was known always to take the easiest grade or incline. Diseases spread through the new settlements along the Kansas Pacific. In 1867 seven out of every ten people with cholera in Ellsworth died. The Santa Fe Railroad and the state of Kansas have a close kinship and their histories run parallel in a truly remarkable story of development. Roughly, a triangle 411 by 208 miles, Kansas is the center of a 700 mile circle described by Roger Babson as the richest mineral and agricultural area in the world. It would be dormant today but for modern distribution methods, not the least of which is rail transportation. Cyrus K. Holliday and others realized this in 1859 when they met in Atchison to organize the Santa Fe Railroad Company, with the intent of developing the latent richness of Kansas and the southwest. When the road was completed, it became the end of the Chisholm Trail, which terminated at Abilene and Ellsworth. When the line was laid to Wichita, that young city became the cowboy capital. Another railroad that played an important role in the development of Kansas was the Missouri Pacific, which came to Kansas in 1880. With the turn of the century, came the automobile, and ensuing better roads.

The first streetcar appeared in Wichita at about the same time. The first genuine road signs or Highway Markers were put up by Woody Hockaday and the No. One sign was placed in Wichita, with highway travel supposedly radiating from that corner to every part of the United States. The Wright Brothers invented the airplane in 1903. The story of Wichita's stature in aerospace comes from the faith and hope of adopted and native sons and can be traced back to 1908. There were a few scattered areas elsewhere in the nation where the airplane was not considered the plaything of the mentally unbalanced, but they had nothing even remotely comparable to the topography, geography, climate and faith made manifest in the graphic form of money offered by Kansas. A month after Orville Wright set the world afire by flying 57 minutes and 25 second at Fort Myer, Virginia, in the fall of 1908, Wichita launched its first venture into aerospace. In 1919 many airplane companies were launched in Wichita. Wichita's aerospace position didn't just happen. Behind it all was a group of enthusiastic businessmen, an energetic Chamber of Commerce, and the incentive which comes only from the free enterprise system. From 1920 to 1931 Wichita had forty airplane companies, and the first one was Laird. After the war Lloyd Stearman came to Wichita and got a job with Laird, where he joined Walter Beech and Clyde Cessna. Out of the efforts of these three great men came the three leading aircraft companies in Wichita today—Boeing, Cessna and Beech. This was the beginning of aircraft in Kansas. The B-17, B-29, B-52 and Stearman Trainer played a major part in bringing World War II and the Korean War to an end. Boeing peak employment during World War II was 30,000, composed of men and women who left the farms to face another challenge—not only the winning of the war, but the bringing home of their sons, husbands and brothers. Until the 1920's every generation since the caveman lived in his own time—i. e., no one went faster than a man or horse could run. Since then we have become pioneers in a land of constant change, and we can't stop. Once we were taught that all that goes up must come down. Now, there are many Telstars, Sputniks and other objects circling the earth. We have long since broken the sound barrier and gone on to speeds in excess of 16,000 miles per hour as we have become inhabitants of the jet age. Soon we face a new frontier—landing on the moon. The moon shot that will carry our astronauts is familiar to Kansas, for much of the first stage booster is built in the Boeing-Wichita plant. Who knows, when the rocket lands on the moon, maybe a tiny sunflower seed may have been a stowaway. From the plains of Kansas, where once the only music was the wind playing on barbed wire fences of the western prairie, from the Indian raids, from the ravages of grasshoppers, the "Bleeding Years" of the Civil War, disease, drought, tornadoes and dust has come a great people. As Carl Becker, the historian, said of our state, "Kansas is a state of mind, Kansans love each other for the dangers they have passed through together." How appropriate that our State Motto is "To the Stars by Difficult Roads." We have traveled them together, and I am indeed proud to be a native Kansan.

C. warm, beautiful, hospitable, and very grateful for our faith in the stability of our Nations Capital. Mayor Walter Washington welcomed the representatives from every State. The pretty hats, the ribbons and orchids, and the large number of DAR members going about the "Business as usual" of our annual Congress were heartening to a City recovering from strife. DAR busy days and colorful evening meetings were evidence of normalcy.

Three Kansas Pages, Elaine Oakleaf, Justine Lewis and Noel Tyson added their charm and talent to this last Congress of the Diamond Jubilee Administration. In every way it was worthy of the fine accomplish-

ments of the past three years. Our Society has grown in membership and in responsible service to our Country and its people. To attend a Continental Congress is to grow in pride and perspective of the great strength of our Organization. I hope each chapter can have a complete report by one that attended in person.

Region; Mrs. Bernardt Schreiner, Senior State Chaplain; Mrs. C. W. Wheeler, Senior State Secretary; Mrs. Hugh Cloninger, Senior State Treasurer; Mrs. Howard Muncy, Senior State Historian; Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Moses; Mrs. M. L. Loomis and Mrs. E. D. True.

Standing Conference Rules and Minutes of the Twenty-second State Conference were read by the Secretary, Roberta Chambers. Minutes were approved as read. Three communications were read: Mrs. Elmer E. Huffman, Regent, KSDAR; Mrs. Edwin H. Tiemeyer, Senior National President, C.A.R., and Jane Wells Freeny, National President, C.A.R. The Treasurer's report was read by Mrs. Hugh Cloninger and filed for audit. Reports of State Officers, State Chairmen and Society Presidents were read and filed with the Secretary. Marian Chambers, Sunflower Society, who will be representing the N. W. Region in the oratorical contest at N. S. C.A.R. National Convention in April, gave her oration on "Living Patriotism." The motion was made by Mrs. E. L. Wulfmeyer that \$25.00 be allowed to help defray the expenses of the Regional Meeting to be held in Topeka, July, 1968. Motion carried. Marian Chambers, Chairman, Nominating Committee, presented the names of the nominees for office. Certification of good standing was read by Mrs. Cloninger, Senior State Treasurer. Roberta Chambers gave a report of the Resolutions Committee. Mrs. Moses presented the following prizes and awards: Sunflower Society, most members; Tomahawk Society, contributing most money to National Projects; Traveling Flag to Sunflower Society. Mrs. Moses also spoke briefly of the National C.A.R. Museum.

Invitation for next year's State Conference was issued by the Buffalo Society, Dodge City, and promptly accepted. Newly elected officers were installed by Mrs. Smith, the Helen Pouch candle burning throughout the ceremony. Before the installation Mrs. Moses gave a brief history of the Helen Pouch candle. BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II

Objects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section 1. **Members.** The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. **New Chapters.** The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. **Officers.** The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Reporter.

Section 2. **Eligibility.** (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter member shall hold at the same time

two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be ineligible for any other state office except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. Term. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by the State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V

Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National Officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter, signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI

Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the chief executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint

all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be ex-officio a member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and a Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committees and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of state Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents, and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than three years.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing. Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first, Three Credential Blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of March, a type-written list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each Chapter Regent before February fifteenth, State Conference registration cards for the Regent and elected delegates. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairmen to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas

Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, the amount to be fixed and the expense to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds and shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members in good standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February First.

Section 8. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members-at-large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter, name and rank of ancestor; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceding year. In recording a transfer, both the date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have the supervision of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library.

Section 11. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the Kansas Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be chairman of the State Press Relations Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D. C.

Section 12. Retiring Officers. Each Officer and Committee chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them when transferring them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. **Annual.** The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and Chairman of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. **State Conference.** The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the entertaining District.

Section 3. **Voting Members.** The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers; the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state; the Honorary State Regents; the Chapter Regent; or in her absence the First Vice Regent or alternate and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. **Qualifications.** Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. **Chapter Delegates.** The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society, on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

- (a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates.
- (b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members, Regent, and five delegates.
- (c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Explanatory Table, Chapter Representation at Conference:

NSDAR — Representatives	Votes
12 to 49—Regent and two delegates	2
50 to 100—Regent and five delegates	6
100 and over—Regent and five delegates plus three delegates for every full hundred	6 plus

Section 6. **Alternates.** The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. **Election of Delegates.** Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three Credential Blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. **Privilege.** Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meetings of the State Conference.

Section 9. **Privileges.** The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. **Special Meetings.** Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that

mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII

State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the chapter Regent or in her absence, the chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall following the regular meeting of the National Board of Management and preceding the District meetings; the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX

Executive Committee

Section 1. Members. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon the written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X

Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January 31st.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.35 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. These dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. On January fifteenth, the State Treasurer shall notify chapters whose dues are in arrears. A chapter whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution
Daughters of the American Revolution

who attend the state Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess chapters to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Necessary expenses of the State Officers and State Committees shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing and approved by the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and five members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget, as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. This committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the Society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the Kansas DAR Student Loan and Scholarship Fund. This Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals and the interest on money loaned. The interest from this fund shall be used annually for scholarships.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Recording Secretary as Chairman, the State Regent and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the state Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conference, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolutions shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that have not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Press Relations. A Press Relations Committee composed of the state Reporter as Chairman and two members appointed by the State Regent shall prepare and distribute information for the press concerning patriotic and educational activities of the Kansas Society. This Committee shall be responsible for the preparation and mailing of the Kansas DAR News.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committee, as are not otherwise provided

for in these bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII

Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, The Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resume shall not be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent for use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

ARTICLE XIII

Districts

Section 1. Name. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the programs of the State and National Societies; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District Secretary thirty days in advance to all chapters within the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each District shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The term of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three terms.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV

Chapters

Section 1. Officers. The Chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year the chapter recording secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of National Committee, giving her name and address of chapter member on that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurers. Chapter treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer before January thirteenth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report. Contribution received by chapter treasurer after January thirtieth shall be sent to the State Treasurer and shall be included in her supplementary report.

ARTICLE XV
Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws or the bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI
Amendments

Section 1. These bylaws may be amended by a two thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer, 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairmen of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C. A. R. 1; District Directors, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society 2; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society 2; The President General 1; The Kansas State Historical Society 1; the DAR National Library 1; and the President of the State Officers Club, Chapter Regents Club and the State Chairmans Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2. The treasurer shall present each year a tabular list of chapter receipts to the Secretary which shall be printed in the Proceedings.

No. 3. Chairmen of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

No. 4. No less than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expense to be borne by the State Society.

No. 5. The State Registrar shall furnish the publisher of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.

No. 6. A sum not to exceed \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent, each year for the purpose of carrying on her work.

No. 7. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

No. 8. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

No. 9. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

No. 10. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund.

No. 11. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be in Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as

possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (25c).

No. 12. The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its properties housed at Shawnee Mission.

No. 13. The State Society shall allocate \$25.00 annually to the El Cuartelejo Committee for the proper upkeep of the El Cuartelejo Monument in Scott County.

No. 14. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 15. A sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C. A. R. Society to be used for C. A. R. projects.

No. 16. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 17. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board meeting to each of the District meetings in the fall.

No. 18. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and to the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 19. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 20. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 21. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Public Library, Dodge City, Kansas.

(a) The Kansas Society shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Public Library, and shall provide a postal box in Dodge City, Kansas, for the use of the Dodge City Chapter Library Committee in receiving requests for loan of books and their return.

(b) The Dodge City Public Library shall provide a private room with adequate work and storage space.

(c) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the library. This committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.

No. 22. The Press Books shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration they are compiled.

No. 23. The Chapters in each District are as follows:

No. 24. The State Regent shall appoint a committee at the closing session of the State Conference to review the minutes of that session.

No. 25. These rules may be amended, suspended or replaced at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote of those delegates voting.
