



CONFERENCE RULES

- 1. All sessions will begin at the hour announced.
- 2. No one is to be seated during reports, speeches or musical numbers.
- 3. Any business unfinished at the time set for recess shall be resumed at the next session at the point where the recess was taken.
- 4. Only delegates have the privilege of the floor.
- 5. No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes at one time, except by the consent of the Conference.
- 6. Only the chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 7. If both the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent are absent, the report shall be filed unless otherwise ordered.
- 8. All motions shall be written and signed by the mover and seconder, and handed to the Recording Secretary before action is taken.
- A timekeeper will be appointed. All speakers shall conform to the ruling when time is called.
- 10. A typewritten report of each and every report must be filed with the Recording Secretary as it is presented, and a copy of such report handed to the State Regent.
- If the Officer, Chairman or Appointee is not present, her report shall be filed for printing in the Official Proceedings, unless otherwise ordered.
- 12. All resolutions shall be in the hands of the Resolutions Committee not later than Thursday, March 9, 1972.
- 13. Any chairman or individual who has a table display or exhibit will please attend to removal of all materials at the close of the Conference. Do not leave this detail for the hostess chapters.
- Members who appear on the program will always please occupy front seats.
- Robert's Rules of Order Revised will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

The Board of Management of KSDAR met October 25, 1971 in the Ramada Inn, Junction City, Kansas at 9:30 a. m. This was preceded by a coffee hour, with Lois Warner Chapter, DAR as hostesses. The State Regent, Mrs. Ralph M. Casey presided.

The invocation was given by the Chaplain, Mrs. Lewis B. Roller. This was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and by the singing of one verse of the Star Spangled Banner led by Mrs. James Hagan.

Decker; Librarian, Mrs. James W. Smith; and Reporter, Mrs. John W. McGuire. Jr.

Other Chapters represented included: Uvedale, Mrs. Francis L. Johnson; Courtney-Spalding, Mrs. Naomi Nielsen; and Hannah Jameson, Mrs. Lewis B. Roller. A quorum was declared present and the meeting was opened for business.

The Minutes of this meeting will be printed. A copy will be sent to cach state officer, to the regent of each of the 64 Chapters of KSDAR and the National Officer whose residence is within Kansas.

Mrs. Casey introduced the recently elected state officers, comment ing that each would give a report later.

This fall meeting of the Board of Management had been planned to follow the October Board of Management Meeting of the National Society. Mrs. Casey had very recently returned from that meeting and gave quite a detailed report of the experience. All state regents except five were present.

Since this has been the election year for the present national officers, Mrs. Casey gave a resume of an interview with the incoming President General, Mrs. Eleanor Sullivan Spicer, which had been published in an eastern newspaper. The title of the article was "The DAR—Love It Or Leave It." Mrs. Spicer talked about the DAR organization as she sees it. Some of the things she mentioned are familiar to DAR members. The DAR has an image problem with the American public which needs a great deal of constructive attention. The DAR has been instrumental in developing several programs including the army nurse corps, planting of trees and shrubs, and the distribution and display of the American Flag. The DAR is the richest organization in the world. It was the first organization to develop an active program of education for immigrants who wished to become naturalized American citizens.

The resolutions passed by the National Board of Management will be submitted to the Continental Congress for final action. Some of the reolutions are of particular interest to the Kansas members. The Bicentennial Committee needs to be reaffirmed for this administration.

The Museum Committee would function more effectively if placed under the direction of the Museum General. A certificate should be issued to those donors who give over \$25 to the Seimes Microfilm Center. A Zerox copy may be used instead of a typed second copy on applications for membership. The Veterans' Service Committee should become a national instead of a state only committee as it is now. Plans are being made to develop an organization of volunteers to act as guides in Memorial Hall.

Much time and thought is being given to the Bicentennial in 1976. A booklet is being planned which will sell for \$1.00. A song for the Bicentennial will be composed and published. Three special Haviland bone dishes have been designed. Commemorative medals will also be available.

Mrs. Spicer's special project for her administration will be known as "A Gift to the Nation." The effort will be concentrated on the restoration of two rooms on the second floor of Independence Hall in Philadelphia. One was the former Committee Assembly Room. The other was the Governor's Council Chamber. There will be a special assessment of 50c per DAR member per year for a period of two years.

Mrs. Casey talked about the mix-up during the installation ceremony in Washington, D. C. involving several of the state regents. She assured the Board she has been officially recognized by the national organization as the Regent of KSDAR. The matten of prime importance and emphasis for the term of the present Regent of KSDAR will be "Membership." Mrs. Casey will do all she can to bridge the age gap in DAR membership.

Mrs. Casey has traveled over 1100 miles within the state in her capacity as State Regent, participated with four chapters, as a guest, in their activities, and has written over 200 letters. All of this is in addition to attending the October National Board of Management Meeting in Washington, D. C. Her time and services will be willingly given and available upon request.

Mrs. Casey introduced the State Officers, each of whom gave a brief report.

The Vice Regent, Mrs. Francis L. Johnson expressed chagrin that the "Proceedings of the Seventy-Third Annual State Coference" are not ready for distribution at this time. The printer has had many difficulties this past summer.

The Chaplain's and Recording Secretary's reports were brief. The Treasurer's Report was as follows:

KANSAS STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING Hutchinson, Kansas March 8, 1972

The State Board of Management of KSDAR met on March 8, 1972 at 9:30 a. m. in the Kansas Room, Hilton Inn, Hutchinson, Kansas.

The meeting was called to order by the State Regent, Mrs. Raph M. Casey. A prayer was offered by the State Chaplain, Mrs. Lewis B. Roller. This was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and the singing of the last stanza of the National Anthem.

The Roll was called by the Recording Secretary, Mrs. Naomi Nielsen. Ten state officers, 17 chapter regents and 2 honorary state regents responded. A quorum was declared present. The motion was made, seconded and carried that the reading of the Minutes of the Fall Board of Management Meeting be omitted because each state officer and chapter regent had previously received a copy.

The State Regent introduced all of the state officers, commenting

each would present her report later. The personal page of the State Regent, Mrs. Harold (Diana) Jones, Courtney-Spalding Chapter, DAR was also introduced to the group.

The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. L. O. Gaddis, read a letter of regret from the President General, Mrs. Donald Spicer for not being able to attend.

The problem of double payment of dues by new members was presented by Mrs. J. Channing Brown. Miss Pauline Cowger explained this will no longer be a problem because the national office had moved their date back to May 1st, thereby eliminating the overlapping time period between dates. Miss Cowger also mentioned the practice in her chapter of collecting the subscription price to the DAR Magazine at the time new members pay their first dues.

Mrs. E. E. Huffman, Chairman of El Cuartelejo State Committee reported the current situation regarding the El Cuartelejo marker. Differences of opinion were obvious in the lively discussion which followed. It seems the State of Kansas has no funds available for El Cuartelejo at this time. The state archeologist, Mr. Witte, has suggested the DAR provide a new marker to replace the old shaft. He estimated the repair of the old shaft would be at least \$1,000.00. The date of 1922 on the old shaft is in error. Mrs. Huffman proposed a fund raising project for the new marker, if the conference approved. Others did not think the state of disrepair of the shaft was that bad. The suggestion was also made that the easement for El Cuartelejo be reexamined to determine the specifics of the arrangement. The whole matter will be presented to the state conference group.

Mrs. Casey requested the Recording Secretary to read the motion referred by the Executive Committee, which had been made by Mrs. Lucille Johnson, which reads: "I move that all state officers and state chairmen stay within the expenses allotted them in the estimated budget as nearly as possible. Approval from the Finance Committee shall be obtained before making any expenditure which exceeds the estimated budget."

The State Treasurer, Mrs. Theis, explained the regulations and procedures regarding expenses allowed to committee chairmen. The motion was seconded and voted upon favorably.

The Recording Secretary read the motion regarding another matter referred by the Executive Committee which had been made by Mrs. L. O. Gaddis. It reads: "I move that the Treasurer of the Kansas Society of DAR be bonded during the term of office for the amount of \$10,000.00; the amount of the bond to be paid by the State Society." The statements in Bylaws VI Sec. 7 were read and discussed. The motion was seconded and the vote was for approval.

At this time the Treasurer discussed only the cash receipts and disbursements for the year ending January 31, 1972. A copy of this report will be included in the Proceedings. There will also be some further discussion during the annual conference. She remarked that the Friendship Fund had been used only once to pay state and national dues for a member prior to resignation so she would be regarded as having resigned "in good standing."

The State Registrar, Mrs. James O. Kershner, stated she has cards available for the use of chapter registrars. The Vice Regent, Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, called the attention of the group to the availability of 1970 and 1971 Proceedings at \$1.00 each and of the Rosters at \$2.50 each. Commendation was given to the DAR News Reporter, Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., for the current quality of the contents in the publication. Mrs. Clifford M. Funston, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee explained she has two prices for the printing of the Resolutions. One is

for \$36.00 and the other for \$25.00 but the curcumstances surrounding the firm with the lower bid have certain inherent disadvantages. She was urged to work with the firm most likely to be satisfactory. The change of address of the Chaplain, Mrs. Lewis B. Roller to 614 Creek Drive, Parsons, Kansas 67357 was announced.

The meeting was adjourned by the State Regent.

The three chapters placing in the subscription to the DAR Magazine contest are: first Byrd Prewitt; second Jonathan Gilbert; third John Haupt. A show of hands showed that members present might be interested in sponsoring a page in the DAR Magazine of chapter members and their ancestors. Three chapters tied in showing the greatest net gain in membership. They are Esther Lowrey, General Edward Hand and Neodesha. They are sharing in the honors of this national award. An Isenhower Memorial Pilgrimage is being planned for 1973. Specific information regarding the legal responsibilities for expenses at El Cuartelejo will be obtained from the easement and other legal documents before further planning for El Cuartelejo.

It became apparent there was misunderstanding among the members regarding placement of DAR markers on Daughter's graves. The information on pages 42 and 43 in the DAR Handbook 1969 was read and discussed.

Each chairman of a State Committee presented a report. These will be printed in the Proceedings so little of their content will be repeated here. The reports presented were: DAR Library - Mrs. James W. Smith; Eisenhower Memorial - Miss Pauline Cowger; El Cuartelejo - Mrs. E. E. Huffman; Finance Committee - Mrs. Charles Theis; Friendship Committee - Mrs. Frank Williams; Kansas Chapel - Mrs. Bertram J. Lempenau; Resolutions - Mrs. Clifford M. Funston; Press Book - Mrs. Charles Theis for Mrs. Jean O'Brien; and Press Relations - Mrs. Howard Neumann.

Mrs. E. H. Snider, Credentials and Registration Committee Chairman reported the current statistics regarding conference registration. Present and registered were: National Officers 1; Honorary Regents 3; State Officers 10; Chapter Regents 42; Delegates 100; Alternates 19; Members 45; Visitors 4 making a total of 224.

Reports were also given by State Appointments persons. These, too, will be included in the Proceedings. They are: Bicentennial Chairman - Mrs. R. E. Byler; Consulting Genealogist - Mrs. James W. Smith; Parliamentarian - Mrs. Raymond Lees; and Shawnee Mission - Mrs. L. H. Kessler

Mrs. Lucille Johnson announced a correction on page 4 of the program booklet for the conference. The following addition should be made under "Officers" - Librarian General Mrs. Bertram J. Lempenau.

Mrs. Lucille Johnson gave the report of the Roster Committee. Copies of the Roster and of the Proceedings for the 1971 annual conference were sold to members wishing to purchase them.

Three yearbooks had been "graded" in Washington, D. C. The awards won were: Blue ribbons to Flores del Sol and Captain Jesse Leavenworth Chapters; blue and white ribbons to Newton and Council Oak Chapters.

: At least 161 persons attended the luncheon. They heard the only forester in the State of Kansas, Mr. Hank Deutsch, approach the luncheon theme "Conservation" in three ways - slides, lecture and the sale of 150 Austrian Pine seedlings from Kansas Statel University for 25c each. More

MINUTES MARCH 11, 1972

Following a Musical Interlude by Mrs. E. G. Freese, the Seventy-Fourth Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution was reconvened at 9:00 a. m. by the State Regent, Mrs. Ralph M. Casey. The Chaplain, Mrs. Lewis B. Roller gave a prayer. Mrs. A. A. Schultz, U. S. A. Flag Chairman, led in the Pledge of Allegiance. Mrs. Marshall Garey then led the conference in The American's Creed, The Daughter's Pledge and The Kansas Creed. The singing of the first and last verses of the Star Spangled Banner was led by Mrs. Lewis B. Roller.

The Minutes of the Friday meeting were read by the Recording Secretary and approved.

Two recommendations of the Board of Management to the State Conference were read by the Recording Secretary. They were as follows:

1. "The Board of Management recommends to the State Conference that all state officers and state chairmen stay within the expenses allotted them in the estimated budget as nearly as possible. Approval from the Finance Committee shall be obtained before making any expenditure which exceeds the estimated budget."

Mrs. Lucille Johnson moved that this recommendation be adopted. It was seconded and approved.

2. "The Board of Management recommends to the State Conference that the Treasurer of the Kansas Society DAR be bonded during her term of office for the amount of \$10,000.00; the amount of the bond to be paid by the State Society."

The Treasurer, Mrs. Theis, gave an explanation of the methods presently used in making payments and withdrawals of Society funds. She also cited the provisions in the Bylaws for payment of the cost of such a bond but there was no statement regarding the amount of the bond.

The motion was made by Mrs. Charles Theis that this recommendation be adopted. It was seconded and approved.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee, who is also the Treasurer, presented the estimated budget of Fiscal 1973. This will be included in the Proceedings with the Report of the Finance Committee so will not be included in these Minutes. The total of this estimated budget is \$5.800.00.

Mrs. R. E. Byler, Chairman of the Bicentennial Committee moved that funds for this purpose also be included in the budget. It was seconded and approved. Mrs. Bertram J. Lempenau moved that the estimated budget, with needed minor modifications be adopted. The motion was seconded and approved.

Copies of the suggested Resolutions had been distributed by the Resolutions Committee to the membership at the conference on a day prior to this session. Consequently there had been sufficient time for members to read and carefully consider the import of these Resolutions.

Mrs. C. W. Wheeler of the Resolutions Committee presented the Resolutions as a whole to the conference.

The Resolutions adopted by the State Conference are:

HONOR THE FLAG

"WHEREAS, a small group of indifferent people have desecrated the Flag by wearing it as clothing, by walking on it and burning it; and

WHEREAS, the Flag is the symbol of a Nation whose people have fought and died that they might have life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; and

WHEREAS, the Flag Code has been abused by some individuals and groups; and

WHEREAS, there is an effort by some groups to discourage the playing and singing of the National Anthem at public meetings; and

WHEREAS, a few have little or no respect for the National Anthem when it is played or sung at some public meetings and completely ignore it; and

WHEREAS, there is a tendency to omit the Pledge of Allegiance in some public and private institutions; and

WHEREAS, children need to be taught early in life to love and respect the Flag;

BE IT RESOLVED: That Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution pledge themselves to be more alert than ever to Flag desecration and use every influence to improve observance of the Flag Code in homes, schools and public places.

PORNOGRAPHY CHECKED

WHEREAS, the production of obscene literature, art and pornography grows in volume and is a factor in today's rapidly rising rate of crime;

BE IT RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution work toward the eradication of pornography in our Public Libraries, Newsstands, Bookstalls and other places frequented by our young people.

CHILD DEVELOPMENT ACT

WHEREAS, Our President saw fit to veto Senate Bill 5-2007, containing the controversial Child Development Act, passed by both Houses of Congress: and

WHEREAS, The President announced that the Bill was unacceptable because if passed into law, it would be marked by fiscal irresponsibility, adminstrative unworkability and family weakening implications; and

WHEREAS, It would create a new army of bureaucrats and would relegate the authority of states to an insignificant job; and

WHEREAS, The plunge headlong financially into supporting child development would commit vast moral authority of the National government to the size of communal approaches to child rearing against the family-centered approach; and

WHEREAS, The program called for the establishment of so-called day care center in every section of every city and town in the country, and an invading army of inspectors who would be authorized to go into every home in their respective districts to instruct the parents on food to be provided for the children, discipline or the lack of it, the right of the child to have a voice in the management of the home, to lay down rules for weekend and overnight visits for the children away from home; and

WHEREAS, This 'Child Development' legislation aims at providing a substitute for the family, in the form of committees of psychiatrists, psychologists, sociologists and social workers; and

WHEREAS, The family is the backbone of America and to destroy it is to destroy America; and

WHEREAS, The proponents of this Bill have vowed to continue to push for its adoption and will not rest until they have succeeded in doing so;

BE IT RESOLVED: That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution use their influence to keep Child Development in the home where it belongs.

RESOLUTION COMMENDING PRESIDENT NIXON

WHEREAS, President Nixon made public over TV net work, radio and the press his longstanding proposals of peace to our enemy North Vietnam; and

WHEREAS, These proposals include a total cease fire throughout all Indo-China, the mutual release of all prisoners of war, the total withdrawal of all American and allied forces from South Vietnam within six months of acceptance of these proposals by Hanoi, and the resignation of the President and Vice President of South Vietnam one month before free elections are held, including participation by the National Liberation Front; and

WHEREAS, These proposals have been offered for many months in good faith in direct private negotiations between the United States and North Vietnam in Paris, Therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That each daughter of the Kansas Society of the American Revolution commend the President for his efforts and support him in his determination to bring American prisoners of War home and bring peace to Vietnam and the whole Southeast Asia.

RADIOACTIVE WASTE MANAGEMENT

WHEREAS, The State of Kansas is the GEOGRAPHICAL MAINLAND CENTER OF THE UNITED STATES, it should therefore be protected against nuclear reactor ashes and

WHEREAS, A great part of the Nation's STAFF OF LIFE, wheat - grows in Kansas, any damage to that yield would endanger the NATIONAL FOOD SUPPLY, if not totally destroy it; and

WHEREAS, the CROSSROADS OF AMERICA are in Kansas, irreparable damage, or a temporary damage, to its systems of TRANSPORTATION and COMMUNICATIONS would paralyze the entire nation; and

WHEREAS, Other nations must face this same dilemma and an attempt has been made to centralize disposal of this substance which is so lethal that human environment could be destroyed for one thousand years;

BE IT RESOLVED: That individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution oppose any and all attempts to establish a repository for the burial of nuclear reactor ashes anywhere within the state of Kansas, until other sites on the planet are surveyed.

A SUPPLEMENTAL RESOLUTION TO THE RESOLUTION ON RADIO WASTE MANAGEMENT

BE IT RESOLVED: That members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge that the efforts of the Atomic Energy Commission and other appropriate governmental agencies be directed

toward an accelerated program to develop an economically feasible method to recycle and further break down atomic waste and to eliminate the hazards of such wastes to all peoples of the planet.

She expressed the hope and expectation of seeing everyone, and more, in Salina next year. With that 1972 State Conference was dismissed to reconvene in Salina on March 14, 1973. REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

STATE REGENT

It is my privilege and pleasure to begin these reports of the activities and the accomplishments of the Kansas Daughters. Your State Regent is more than pleased with not only the State Officers and State Chairmen, but every Kansas Daughter who has helped to make this past year a success. How successful it really has been will be determined only as time passes and we go from one completed project to another.

My term of office began when Mrs. Lempenau placed the pin and ribbon on my shoulder and I took the Oath of Office on that bright, clear April morning in Washington. All was not clear sailing for me. Three directories of delegate lists for State Conference were compiled for the State Regent, the Credentials Chairman and one for my files.

I have received 50 chapter yearbooks. I thank the chapters for them as they are helpful in checking members' names and addresses. I have enjoyed serving as Corresponding Secretary this past year. I am looking forward to another successful year in Kansas Society DAR.

HISTORIAN

The year began with the observance of Constitution Week and the Annual Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage, hosted by six Kansas City Chapters. Mrs. Lewis Kessler, Chairman, made arrangements for the well attended pilgrimage and former Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, Charles E. Whittaker, brought an inspiring message on the Constitution.

The Governor and 44 Mayors proclaimed Constitution Week. 58 articles and 9 pictures, totaling 341 inches of publicity were received. 252 spot announcements and 21 programs made a total of 845 minutes of radio time and 60 spot announcements and 3 programs totalling 173 minutes of TV time were received.

Reports were received of 148 special displays at various banks, stores, libraries, post offices, county fairs and a 20' x 30' billboard display which was secured by the Sagamore Chapter. 23 ministers included the mention of Constitution Week, either in their sermons or bulletins; 41 chapters, 37 schools, 21 scout troops and 9 service clubs had programs on the Constitution. 860 pieces of literature were distributed at various groups.

Mrs. Frank Williams, of the Arthur Barrett Chapter, gave a historical dialogue about the Constitution and it was read on station KNDY. The Randolph Loving members, dressed in colonial attire, served tea to the public at a local shop. The Eunice Sterling Chapter reported an outstanding program from a Boy Scout Troop. Although it was a simple ceremony, the fact that it was planned and carried out by the boys, without adult supervision showed a true respect and love for God and their Country.

I'm delighted to report that we had 100% of the chapters reporting

on Constitution Week and on the State Report we filled all categories requested by National.

The grave of the first State Vice Regent, Jeanette Huntington Ware, was marked in the Fort Scott National Cemetery, February 18, 1972. This was the climax of many hours of work by former State Historian Mrs. Wm. Ostenberg and Mrs. W. A. Hughes, Regent of Molly Foster Berry Chapter. A bronze plaque was placed on the large stone that marks the grave. A dedication ceremony was held with the State Regent and four other officers present. Following the dedication, we were guests for tea at the home of Mrs. Hughes. At one time her interesting home had been the Ware home.

The graves of two Revolutionary soldiers; one wife of a Revolutionary soldier and 19 members were marked this year.

The chapters reported 95 historical programs for adults were given and 45 for/or by school children. Anniversaries of 25 famous men, 2 women and 57 events were celebrated. 45 historical broadcasts on the radio and 2 TV programs were reported. 20 historical tours for adults and 6 for/or by school children were conducted.

Uvcdale Chapter had a rededication coremony for the "Salt" marker which had been relocated. Polly Ogden reports the restoration of the Goodnow Home in Manhattan, Kansas. Members found, cut and sewed all the wool material for carpets in the living room and stairs, and a member's husband wove the carpets on his loom.

Desire Tobey Sears Chapter is preparing history on Mankato and a history book or booklet is being compiled by a member to be published next year. The Neodesha Chapter is having lineage books bound for the library. Betty Bonny Chapter helped with research for the centennial at Arkansas City.

Mrs. Williams of the Arthur Barrett Chapter did research and a paper on "The Otoe Indian of Marshall Co.", and one of her articles on the Pony Express appeared in the DAR Magazine. Miss Hazel Howes of the Eunice Sterling Chapter, researched and wrote a paper on "Early Wichita Indians," which she has read at various meetings.

Several chapters report that Heritage Tables at their meetings help stimulate interest in meetings.

STATE REPORTER

Three four page issues of the Kansas DAR News were published during the past year in the months of July 1971, October 1971 and February 1972. An effort has been made to publicize Kansas DAR activities and to make the News a link of communication between State Officers, State Chairmen and Kansas members.

It was decided to continue the printing and mailing arrangements of the past administration. The Kansas Society retains its bulk mailing permit in Topeka. The printing has been done by the Lees Printing Company of Kansas City, Kansas, with the A-1 Steno Service in Topeka handling the addressing, tying and mailing.

The total cost of printing and mailing the News during the past year amounted to \$1032.45 (printing \$739.85; postage and handling \$263.60; mailing permit \$30.00). Cost of changes in the mailing list amounted to \$65.86 (270 additions to the list; 118 changes of address; 366 dropped from the list). Based on the total expenses of this ofice, the cost of the News amounted to about 10c per issue per member.

The mailing list continues to be our biggest problem. We hope to make progress towards solving this problem during the coming year.

I want to express my appreciation to Mrs. James Kershner, State Registrar, for her invaluable help with the mailing list. I also wish to thank all of the State Officers and State Chairmen who have submitted copy for the News and the chapters who have sent items about their activities.

Other outstanding programs were "Fun on the Frontier," "One Small Candle" (story of the Mayflower crossing), history of the Pottawatomie Indian Reservation library, and movies on the dis-

play and history of the Flag of the U. S. A. "Virginia Taxpayers" and "West Virginians in the American Revolution" by Ross Johnson were given to the State DAR library. Twenty-nine U. The enthusiastic response from the many Kansas chapters of DAR has pointed up the fact that interest in American Heritage is state-wide. Three chapters have instituted an American Heritage Table for every meeting of the year, on which is displayed heirlooms of significance with no end of variety, provided by different members each time, for each of the chapters. Notable reports were sent by the Dodge City chapter, the Emporia, the Nathan Edson, Eunice Sterling, and Shawnee Mission chapters. These were in concise form, and followed the specific directions set by your chairman to expedite the mailing of materials, besides being full of interesting data. Of the 64 chapters, at least one program carries the American Heritage theme, most having no less than three devoted to the subject. Some chapters are assisting in the restoration and preservation of many early Kansas homes, now memorial museums an important phase of state history. Interest in early American music, carly American art, and contemporary Kansas artists is apparent, even to some chapters participating in workshops in painting, silver, and ccramics. The American Heritage program has led to the ransacking of attics for old letters, pewter pieces, books, Bibles, daguerreotypes, chairs chests, quilts no end of Americana. Interest in community history has led to research in county historical societies throughout the state, the finding of much biographical material on early citizens. From all this busy-ness should come fine articles for the DAR Magazine, slides and lectures for the National Program booklet (1974), or even some historical novels, from those who have time to devote to the findings they have made. Who knows? With all of the creative energy rampant in this Sunflower state, your chairman hopes that splendid DAR songs may come forth, lofty poems, noteworthy sagas. May we continue to uphold our state's dreams—"Ad astra per aspera."

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUALS FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. A. E. Voigt

Forty-one chapters answered the questionnaires from the state chairman of Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution's Americanism and DAR Manuals for Citizenship Committee. Of these chapters, all but four were repeating The American's Creed at each meeting which is the National Chairman's special promotion. During the past year, 34 chapters devoted one chapter meeting to an Americanism program, 8 gave Americanism talks to other organizations, 12 presented Americanism programs on radio and TV. 22 placed patriotic literature in schools, libraries and other places for display and 6 participated in the special project-promotion of The American's Creed. 436 manuals for citizenship were given to use in Americanization classes, 4 purchased for high schools, 2 for libraries, 1 for youth groups, 1 for adult groups and 2 for other uses. 8 Flags of the United States of America, 3 Welcome cards, 171 patriotic leaflets and pamphlets were given to new citizens by Kansas chapters. Twelve chapters sponsored teas and 18 provided other activities and gifts. DAR Americanism Awards were presented to a naturalized citizen by two chapters. There are 7 individuals and four chapters working with Americanism classes. Fourteen chapters are working with young people sponsoring Americanism essay and poster contests in schools and seeing that young persons attend Naturalization ceremonies. There were 145 inches of newspaper publicity and one hour 36 minutes of radio and TV time devoted to Americanism plus \$120.00 spent by the chapters on this committee's work. What could be more important than Americanism? Our entire existence depends on it. Let us rededicate ourselves to speak out and let our voices be heard in our love of country and our pride in being an American.

CONSERVATION Mrs. Lennel I. Wright

We had a good year in conservation. Forty-six chapters reportednot as many as last year. (I hope my materials did not frighten anyone.) There was some illness, and some shifting of chairmen. However, almost 4,000 trees were planted, 550 in parks. Conservation awards were given to farmers students and teachers. One chapter gave an award to an ecology class from Wichita State University. Conservation practices were reported on over 500,000 acres of Kansas land. Over 15,000 pounds of foodwas put out for birds and wildlife. Fourteen chapters took part in conservation legislation. One member helped prepare legislation on septic tank cleaning. One member wrote a section for a senate bill on land use. Eight chapters worked with youth groups. Ten chapters helped with beautification programs. Truck loads of trash were picked up. Parks and historical marker sites were planted with trees and flowers. One chapter helped with the development of a game preserve. Interesting meetings were held. Ecology professors, soil scientists, and conservation officials talked. Films were shown. Some members gave funds to pay for these programs. Several chapters gave a conservation report or roll call at every meeting. Some members wrote columns for newspapers, others gave television programs. One member received a bronze plaque for her years in conservation work. This item came too late for Mary Gavin

to report last year—but during April at Continental Congress the first prize in the nation for the most unusual DAR conservation effort went to a Kansas chapter—Randolph Loving in Wichita. I will attend the conservation workshop in Washington this year and we will be ready for a big 1972-73 in conservation in Kansas.

DAR GOOD CITIZEN Miss Virginia Weisgerber

All sixty-four chapter committees reported in some way. Chapter records show sixty one chapters sponsoring 172 Kansas senior girls DAR Good Citizens. Baxter Springs, Sarah Steward, and William, Wilson Chapters report valid reasons for not participating this year, but we hope they can another year. We are happy to welcome Abilene and Susannah French Putney Chapters back into the program, each sponsoring a Good Citizen! Reports show 215 Kansas schools were contacted, inviting par ticipation in the program. We are proud of each girl sponsored, with special chapter recognition given to Uvedale Chapter, sponsoring eight senior girls; John Haupt and Polly Ogden, each sponsoring seven; Betty Washington, Henry Dawson, and Topeka, each, six! Then, six chapters, each, sponsored five girls; and six chapters, each, four girls. Of course, the total of 172 is a wonderful record for all chapters. Reported are various methods of honoring each sponsored DAR Good Citizen: at a chapter meeting; teas, dinners, breakfasts, luncheons, picnics; school Honors Assemblies; riding in a patriotic parade; publicity in news media; gifts or honors, including "In Washington - The DAR Story." DAR Good Citizen Pin, and Certificate. One chapter even discovered that both the Good Citizen and her mother are eligible for DAR membership! Start ing July, 1971, the State Chairman sent many items of personal correspondence to each chapter chairman or regent. Materials were sent promptly. She sent 175 DAR Good Citizen Pins, and 183 Certificates and letters of commendation for each participant. Three Kansas DAR News articles appeared. Sent to each chapter was a final program summary, including names and sponsors of the top two State winners, and names and sponsors of ten honorable mention Good Citizens. Both the State DAR Good Citizen winner and the Runner-up will be honored at the State Conference. DAR MUSEUM Mrs. Frank Williams

The goal to have a chairman for the DAR Museum Committee in each of the 64 Kansas chapters reached 70%. Forty-six chapters reported, hence this report is not a complete picture of the work accomplished by the Kansas daughters in the DAR Museum. A letter listing goals, needs of the DAR Museum, rules governing acquisitions, a partial list of reference books that chapters may pay for and annual report blanks were mailed to each chairman or chapter regent in all 64 chapters on November 1st. A postal card reminder that the annual report was due was mailed prior to February 1st. There was some misunderstanding—some chapters reported books sent or paid for to the State DAR Library, or the National DAR Genealogical Library, not the Museum Reference Library. However, 2 chapters paid for Museum reference books; Good-Land Chapter honored their regent, Mrs. Hary Lutz, with the book "Netsuke," a Japanese art book on ornamental buttons and carved ivory figures; Arthur Barrett Chapter honored Mrs. J. D. Britt, Washington, D. C., with the book "Early American Herb Recipes"—a total of \$8.00. The following report is compiled from 46 chapters: Air Conditioning Fund \$69.00, DAR Museum (from 10 chapters) \$17.00. Friends of the Museum \$131.00 (A different committee), Chapters having DAR Museum programs 16. Some chapters used slides, some had speakers, which included the State Regent. I am most grateful for the support and assistance of the immediate past State DAR Museum Chairman, Mrs. Benjamin Franklin, Topeka, who did a magnificant job during her years of service. I wish to call attention to the State owned Museum slides which may be borrowed by paying postage both ways, as well as the National owned slides, now for a \$2.00 fee. Please book your order early for either, so you will not be disappointed. If your chapter wishes to honor a member, the chapter may pay for a reference book already in the Museum Reference Library. Prices range from 98c to \$100 for a volume set. The person so honored will be notified and her name and the chapter placed on the book plate.

Write me how much you wish to spend, and I will send a list to choose from. Please send all money for the DAR Museum to the State Treasurer but report the amount to me. There are 2 DAR museum committees, which are separate committees. The Friends of the Museum is a separate committee. It has been a privilege to serve on this committee.

DAR SCHOOLS Mrs. Howard W. Haines

51 of the 64 chapters have reported DAR Schools Chairmen. In case of failure of the Regent to report a chairman, letters and questionnaires are sent directly to her. The preliminary letter was sent in September and the questionnaire in January. Replies to the questionnaire show a total of \$812.04 for Tamassee, including \$235.00 for a scholarship. Contributions to Kate Duncan Smith total \$531.41. Seventeen chapters report having programs on the Schools. The five approved schools, Berry, Crossnore, Hillside, Hindman and Northland have received some donations consisting of clothing, cash, Christmas gifts and coupons. Crossnore is especially interested in coupons of all kinds. Through a misunderstanding of the functions of this committee, reports have been received of denations to Bacone and St. Mary's. As these are under the American Indians Committee, the reports have been relayed to that chairman. Donations of clothing from our Kansas Chapters amount to 33 packages weighing 514 pounds. Shipping costs total \$275.00. It has been a rare privilege to serve on this committee. Thank you all, for a wonderful and truly amazing response to the needs of our DAR Schools, Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith and the five Approved Schools.

FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM Mrs. Ralph Stewart

In July 1971, the 64 chapters of KSDAR received information concerning the aims of the Friends of the Museum Committee and instructions to follow in making donations to this committe from Mrs. Harry Hoopes, National Chairman. Six categories of gifts were listed and fully explained. The first of January 1972, your state chairman sent forms to the 64 chapters for reporting contributions to the Friends of the Museum from February 1, 1971 to February 1, 1972. Reports were received from 41 chapter chairmen or regents. Although 20 chapters reported no contributions, 21 reported contributions by individuals, amounting to \$141.00. However, a check with the State Treasurer showed receipts to this fund of \$135.00 from 16 chapters. This slight difference may be due to late donations. In a few instances donations to the Museum, a different national committee, were reported as donations to the Friends of the Museum, and it may be that a few of these were registered in the State Chairman's report by mistake. The response to the request for support of this committee showed an interest in the growth of the museum through the funds contributed for the purchase of art treasures. Serving as State Chairman of Friends of the Museum during 1971-1972 has been a very pleasant experience. Appreciation for cooperation from chapters and officers of KSDAR is expressed herewith.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS Mrs. Ralph O. Dickey

Three hundred and thirty-four pages of genealogical material was catalogued and bound and copies sent to our DAR Library in Washing-

ton, D. C., Kansas State Historical Society Library in Topeka, and the KSDAR Library in Dodge City. The records consist of Bible records, deeds and mortgages, city directories, family records, township histories, personal leters containing genealogical data, marriage records, naturalization records, obituaries and wills. The following chapters participated in the program: Arthur Barrett, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, Courtney-Spalding, Emporia, Eunice Sterling, Fort Larned, John Haupt, Jonathan Gilbert, Lois Warner, Mary Wade Strother, Mission Hills, Neodesha, Ninnescah, Peleg Gorton, Randolph Loving, Shawnee Mission, Topeka and Uvedale. Next year I would like to be able to report that many more chapters had participated. I have given two programs on Genealogical Research and Records.

HONOR ROLL Mrs. Walter B. Norris

Subject to review by the National Society, it appears that 57 Kansas chapters have qualified for the Honor Roll with 23 Gold, 16 Silver and 18 Honorable Montion awards. All 64 chapters submitted reports. Letters were sent to chapters in September and January with follow-up cards. Several chapters had outstanding reports, fulfilling more requirements than needed for Gold Honor Roll. Membership requirements kept 19 chapters from attaining Gold Honor Roll. The Kansas Junior Membership is starting a new administration under the leadership of Mrs. Donald J. Gonchar. We hope to achieve her Junior Goals of (1) Build a well informed Junior Membership. (2) A Junior chairman in every chapter. (3) Promote Junior functions within our state. (4) \$74,000.00 by 1974 for the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. (5) Honor outstanding Juniors on chapter, state and national levels. The Junior theme is "WELCOME A JUNIOR, INVOLVE A JUNIOR, HON-OR A JUNIOR." This year we have 33 new Juniors in our state with a total of 295 members. We lost 10 members because they had reached their 36th birthday. We have 64 chapters in Kansas and the number of chapters reporting was 40. Our 1971 jewelry sales and donations totaled \$287.56 with a total of \$110.70 to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. This chairman attended two district meetings last October, answering questions and making suggestions. We know of 3 chapters who have new members as a result. MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Ernest L. Tripp

Of the 64 chapters, 55 reported, showing a net gain of 40 members. The statistics show there were 139 new members during the past year, of which 8 were reinstated members, and 7 had been transferred from out-of-state. The losses included 67 deceased, 47 resignations and 9 transferred out-of-state. There were 15 transfers from Kansas chapters. The National Membership Chairman has sent us a State Conference Award to be presented to the chapter with the greatest net increase in membership. There is a 3-way tie for this honor so I am happy to present 3 awards to: Esther Lowrey Chapter, Mrs. Ben Taylor, Membership Chairman; General Edward Hand Chapter, Mrs. H. A. Parker, Membership Chairman; Neodesha Chapter, Mrs. Charles Long, Membership Chairman.

NATIONAL DEFENSE Mrs. John Oakleaf

As your National Defense Chairman it has been a pleasure to correspond and meet with many of the chapter National Defense Chairman. It was a privilege to attend each of the district meetings on the fall tour. Unfortunately, only 34 chapter chairman reported on National Defense activity. The following information is based on those reports: 30 chapters had at least 1 entire meeting assigned to a National Defense topic; 32 chapters devoted at least 5 minutes at each meeting for National Defense. 10 usually allowed more than 10 minutes; 32 chapters have studied and discussed the 1971 Resolutions; 33 chapters had National Defense material available at chapter meetings; 25 chapters made the material available to interested individuals. Four chapters presented 19 Good Citizenship Medals to deserving individuals. Three chapters participated in ROTC Medal projects, 1 bronze and 2 gold medals were presented. Ten chapters donated a total of \$32.05 to Dollars for Defense. Seventeen chapters made an effort to increase subcriptions to the National Defense mailing. Two hundred and forty of the Kansas Daughters from 24 chapters have written members of Congress regarding pending legislation and pending treaties. Topics of greatest interest were: communism, inflation, Panama Canal Zone, United Nations, sales to the Soviet Union, labor, education, taxes, war situation, child care laws, price freeze, Social Security, farm legislation, prisoners of war, foreign aid, liquor by the drink, urban renewal, minimum housing law and the trip of the President of the United States to China. I feel it an honor to have served the Society during the administration of our State Regent, Mrs. Ralph Casey. I look forward to hearing from each Kansas Chapter in 1973!

PROGRAM Mrs. Mildred D. Watson

I received the package with the "Outlines for Preparing the Chapter Yearbooks or supplements." I mailed a copy to each chapter program chairman or regent in the state. I received a copy of most of the DAR Yearbooks. They all followed the required subjects as outlined by the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. For the National Contest for the bost program books, I sent in 5 of the most outstanding. The Flores del Sol Chapter, Wichita, Kansas received a blue ribbon for an outstanding book. Captain Jesse Leavenworth, Leavenworth, Kansas also received a blue ribbon. Two chapters received blue and white ribbons. These were the Newton Chapter, Newton, Kansas and the Council Oak Chapter, Council Grove, Kansas. These books were displayed on the Display Table at the State Conference in Hutchinson.

PUBLIC RELATIONS Mrs. Howard Neumann

Public relations—it's everyone's job. The image of DAR is reflected by the actions of members in the community as well as being measured by newspaper inches, radio and TV time. This was the message conveyed on the fall tour and offered as a challenge throughout the year. A fine communication was issued from the national public relations chairman and sent to all chapters in July 1971. The annual report to be sent to the Kansas chairman by February 25, 1072 was printed on the reverce side. This saved your DAR considerable postal expense. The major project of the Kansas Public Relations Chairman is publicity for the state conference. A total of 386 stories was sent out, to every weekly and daily newspaper in the state, every radio and television station. Each carried the name of the local chapter, its regent, publicity chairman, and others in state offices and on the conference program. Plans are being made for continued total-state coverage throughout the year.

STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP Mrs. George Trombold

Recipients of the Kansas State DAR Scholarships for 1971 are Pamela Jean Hay of Ottawa and Deborra Case of Marion. The tuition scholarships of \$150.00 each are awarded to college-bound senior girls having DAR lineage and are sent direct to the colleges of their choice. Pamela Hay has concentrated on academic courses in high school, participating in individual study and honors courses. She has also taken home econmics courses whenever possible attemping to build a strong background for a college major in home economics and clothing retailing. She is a member of the National Honor Society and has been active in Youth Fellowship and Youth for Christ. In her junior year, she was an alternate to the Business and Profesional Women's Youth Leadership Conference and was a delegate to the conference as a senior. Pamela has been a member of select vocal groups, has participated in school operettas and is considering a minor in vocal music. In addition to her school activities, she was employed part-time during her senior year. She is attending Kansas State University at Manhattan. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Hay of Ottawa, Pamela was sponsored by General Edward Hand Chapter. Both her mother and grandmother, Mrs. O. L. Breckenridge, are members of the sponsoring chapter. Deborra (Debbie) Case has attended the Marion Public Schools. She was a member of many high school organizations including the National Honor Society. Active in both vocal and instrumental music groups, she has taken bassoon solos at State Music Contest for 3 years. She was a cheerleader for 3 years and was the 1970 Football Homecoming Queen. Debbie is a member of the Presbyterian church and is secretary of the Wichita Presbytery Youth Council, a member of the Synod Youth Committee and the Synod Outreach Committee. At Girls' State, she was elected State Senator. She was selected to page in the Kansas Legislature and to participate in the Presidential Classroom for Young Americans last February in Washington, D. C. She has been active in Girl Scouting for 10 years, has served as a Candystriper in a local nursing home. She enjoys working with handicapped children and has been active in the Marion County Association for Retarded Children. Deborra, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Case, Jr., is attending Texas Woman's University and intends to work toward a degree in education of the handicapped. She was sponsored by Polly Ogden Chapter, of which her grandmother, Mrs. T. A. Hagans, is a member. As of February 1972, we have 8 applicants for the Scholarship Award in 1972. They are all outstanding girls. I am hopeful that next year we will have some college men and women apply for the National Scholarships.

For these awards the winners receive \$2,000.00 a year, and need not be of DAR Lineage. These awards are given for study in Medicine, Master's Degree, FhD. Degree and other advanced college work. This year I am very pleased that we have 2 applicants for National DAR Fellowships. A young man from the University of Washington, at Seattle and a young woman from Pittsburg Teachers' College, Pittsburg—whose Master's Thesis will be on American Revolution.

TRANSPORTATION Mrs. J. W. Cossell

This year, as Chairman of Transportation for the Kansas DAR has been one of education and broadening interests. I accepted the appointment with some reservations, but found it a much more difficult and time consuming task than I had expected. I had been a member of DAR for more than 20 years, but as a non-resident of the Dodge City Chapter. was not able to attend, so was totally unprepared for the task I was undertaking. It is quite difficult to be active in more than one community. because of the conflicting activities in each. I have enjoyed the work and becoming acquainted with many new friends. In spite of the failure of my one project—a chartered coach trip to the Continental Congress in Washington, D. C., in which I could not get sufficient interest to justify the trip, it has been an interesting year. In promoting the project, I have written letters to each Kansas Chapter to get a list of chapter transportation chairman and sent out 400 general letters, to each chapter regent and to others who might be interested, and announcing the prospective trip. I have sent a letter to librarians (sharing postage with the state librarian, asking that it be shared with the chapter) telling more details of the tour (a sort of two-in-one operation to save our cents). Another letter was sent to each chapter giving the deadline for reservations, and urging members to attend the Congress. A final letter was sent to each chapter begging members and state chairmen to join the trip-all to no avail. In addition to my letter writing crusade I have had published in the Kansas DAR News two different articles-thanks to the editor and others for giving me so much space. And when the dust had cleared away I found I had only about one-half as many as required to charter a bus. Then I wrote to each one who had made reservations, returning their deposit with my regrets. After all of this, I feel that I am quite well acquainted with many of the Kansas DAR members. I have had nice. letters from many to whom I have written. To those who read this report--would you like to try again next year, possibly joining forces with Colorado? Please express an opinion on this matter.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. A. A. Schultz

Of the 64 chapters, 50 reported with reference to the Flag of the United States of America. In September each of the 64 chapters received a letter from me containing information and suggestions. Our special aims were to continue education of the public on how and when to display the flag, and a continuation of the aim all DAR's own a flag and fly it. Also know the Flag Code. I am happy to report the result. Total flags presented 912. Recipients of large flags were youth groups among them Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, a girl's church group, Wichita Children's Home, a Good Citizen recipient, a Head Start school, 4-H Community Center, an American Legion Post for Avenue of Flags, 1 museum, 2 city libraries, a courthouse and Madonna of Trail Park. Small flags were distributed to new citizens, new DAR members, a veterans hospital, a nursing home wherein two patients were veterans and one an Indian. 264 Flag Codes were given to youth groups, students and

others. Corrections made on incorrect display of the flag numbered 25. 1 large tactual flag was given to the Kansas School for the Visually Handicapped. 50 programs were devoted to Our Flag. 12 chapters used local newspapers to publicize Our Flag, 7 chapters used 70 minutes of radio time for this. All 50 chapters opened with the Pledge of Allegiance. Many also used the National Anthem. Flag literature in the form of book marks was given 165 school children. 10 flag pictures bearing the inscription "This is your Flag—be proud of it," were presented to Tomahawk Chapter C. A. R. for their accomplishments. 3 Flag kits were sold by 1 chapter, 2 chapters sold 1 large flag each. Nearly all the chapters reported members flew their flags on National Holidays. 30 members flew their flags every day weather permitting. Window displays were used during Constitution Week, also Nov. 11, and American History month by 5 chapters. My thanks to these Chairmen and Regents. Without their cooperation this report would not be possible.

VETERAN-PATIENTS Mrs. S. M. Vendy

During the year 1971-72 I heard from most of the 64 Kansas DAR chapters. First, they gave me the names of Veteran-Patients Committee Chairman in the chapter. Later, 38 chapters reported with detailed accounts of their year's work. Kansas chapters report that we have 4 organized VAVS-Emporia, Kansas City, Leavenworth and Wichita, but no one seemed to know the total membership. Many chapters reported participation in special patriotic days activities, such as Memorial Day Services; Veterans Day, Flag Day and a Parade of Flags. Special parties were conducted throughout the state. Some were on a monthly basis, some weekly and others seasonal, such as birthdays, bingo, cook-outs and Christmas. There was over 2,000 hours of service to V-P with over 100 members participating, giving of their time and energy. Gifts were listed in the reports as: a flag, value \$10.00, donations for canteen books, over \$120.00, monetary gifts to hospitals, \$20.00, commemorative stamps (some were counted, others weighed them), seat covers for wheel chairs, cribbage boards, 200 crossword puzzles, 30 jig-saw puzzles, carpet rags, over 30 decks of cards cookies, candy, soap, lotions, over 100 books, many magazines, sox, Kleenex, over 25 lap robes, 100 bouquets of flowers.

DAR LIBRARY Mrs. James W. Smith

The Kansas DAR Library was established in the spring of 1930 by the State Librarian, Mrs. Mary Klayder of Neodesha and approved by the State Conference in Salina in March 1930. That was 41 years ago. It was 1 of only 2 in the United States. This was a traveling library and each new State Librarian received the entire library collection in boxes to be kept in her home or other available space. The State DAR Library books are now shelved on 8 tiers of shelves, 6 shelves high. These shelves

were donated by Mrs. Robert Cook and Mrs. J. C. Harper. A case holding the original 1880 Census books with trim from the building owned by Mr. L. H. W. Hall on old Front Street, and a 3-drawer legal file complete the space used by the DAR Library. The Library is located with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the new Dodge City Recreation Center on the ground floor and is a most pleasant place to work. It is located on Avenue G and Vine. Each chapter is urged to send books and genealogical material to your State DAR Library. Your name and the name of your chapter is put on the book plate of each donation. These books may be borrowed for a period of two weeks. Over 150 books were sent to chapters helping prospective members last year. Many hours were spent copying records from books also. The books in your library are listed each year in the Book of Proceedings which each chapter receives. Ask for these from me and they will be sent to you, Librarian to Librarian, for the cheaper book rate, postage being paid by the borrower both ways. I want to urge each Chapter Librarian to contact members for money to purchase new books in areas most needed, for binding, or for materials needed such as eards, for the new file index, book ends, scotch tape to mend worn pages, etc. Do come and visit your DAR Library Call me if you wish to work all day. I will see that the room is available to you. Otherwise it is open from 1:30 to 5:00 each afternoon. Let's all make our library grow to provide proof for new members.

EL CUARTELEJO

For centuries the area in and about Scott County State Park has been of historical interest to Kansas. It was the home of prehistoric and also advanced Indian tribes, and a haven for Southwest Indians that fled from Spanish oppression. When Mr. and Mrs. Steel deeded from their ranch those acres known to be the site of El Cuartelejo Pueblo to KSDAR in 1925, it became our pride and our care. By 1928 the Daughters had erected a handsome shaft to mark the Northernmost Pueblo in America. During Miss Cowger's administration it became a National Historical Land Mark. In 1970 funds became available for excavation and restoration under the supervision of Mr. Thomas Witty, State Archeologist. Many artifacts have been discovered many historical dates and estimations have been verified and some have been in error. The findings have strengthened our belief that in preserving El Cuartelejo, KSDAR played a vital role in the story of the development of Man, and have served our Country, State and Society well. The work of Mr. Witty is at a temporary standstill until more funds are voted for it. Let us, as individual members write our Governor and elected Representatives to urge support for the completion of the work at El Cuartelejo.

FRIENDSHIP FUND Mrs. Frank Williams

BYLAWS Mrs. Paul N. Kent

It is most important that our Kansas DAR chapters have adequate and correct chapter Bylaws. These Bylaws serve as a guide and a source of definite information for correct procedure for chapter meetings. I have attended a number of chapter meetings and have discussed problems concerning parliamentary procedure. I urge each chapter to have a copy of "Robert's Rules of Order, Revised" and to become familiar with its contents. Members will find it very helpful to study the model for chapter Bylaws given in our DAR Handbook. The Bylaws of a number of our Kansas chapters have been examined and suggestions concerning them have been given. I have corresponded with members and have answered questions relative to procedure and Bylaws. Opinions have been given concerning procedures to chapter members and committee chairmen. It is a pleasure to service this administration as State Chairman of Bylaws.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Mrs. Wallace R. Decker

American History Month is DAR in action—in that it helps to fulfill one of the three main objectives of our society. This year 52 schools participated in the essay contest with 331 contestants writing essays. Ten of these schools were participating for the first time. 13 Medals, 10 History Awards, 44 Certificates of Awards and 94 Certificates of Appreciation were awarded. Six schools had assemblies, 5 articles appeared in school papers, 7 reported class discussions and six used spot announcements. Winners in the essay contest were: Fifth Grade—First, Diane Stohs, Arthur Barrett Chapter; Second D. J. Chance, Ft. Larned Chapter, Third, Sarah Mills, Flores del Sol Chapter; Sixth Grade—First, Glenda Marie Henley, Susannah French Putney Chapter; Second, Carla Hirt, Four Winds Chapter; Third, Mary Rose Geigle, Uvedale

Chapter; Seventh Grade—First, Debbie Moore, Betty Washington Chapter; Second, Melodie Funk, Hannah Jameson Chapter; Third, Jeanne Carlson, Arthur Barrett Chapter; Eighth Grade—First, Barry Frank, Betty Washington Chapter; Second, Ivan Baker, Courtney-Spalding Chapter; Third, Loretta Frank, Four Winds Chapter. The chapters reported 78 programs on American History and one script was sent to National. 35 reported American History Month displays and 25 used the American History Month Posters. 92 American History month stickers were used, 8 Medals and 45 Certificates for Excellence in American History (other than the essay contest) were awarded. 96 newspaper articles and 10 pictures were published, totaling 480 inches. 193 spot announcements were used for a total of 326 minutes on the radio. 1 TV program totaling 15 minutes with 34 members appearing either on TV or radio in behalf of this committee. Leavenworth Chapter reports that they give a History Quiz and present certificates and medals for the highest scores. This has been a most interesting phase of my work for this year, but I would like to see more chapters actively support American History Month either with essays, displays, publicity or any other means to stimulate interest in American History.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

ARTICLE 1

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Objects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the proservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an

enlightened public opinion, and according to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility, (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conferencee. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be ineligible for any other state office except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent; until the expiration of at least one year.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. Term. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Confenence.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of

six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National Officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has series of hor chapter, signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the chief executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio a member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and a Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committees and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secre-

tary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than three years.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the accistome of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs thall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6: State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first, Three Credential Blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of March, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapters, made into a directory form. She shall send to each Chapter Regent before February fifteenth, State Conference registration cards for the Regent and elected delegates. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, the amount to be fixed and the expense to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds and shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members in good standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secetary the number of members in each chapter on February first.

Section 8. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as

possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter, name and rank of ancestor; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library.

Section 11. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the Kansas Society to leading newspapers in this territory. She shall be chairman of the State Press Relations Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D. C.

Section 12. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them when transferring them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and Chairman of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the entertaining District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers; the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state; the Honorary State Regents; the Chapter Regent; or in her absence the First Vice Regent or alternate and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Rogent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society, on the first day of February each year and chall be as follows:

- (a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates.
- (b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members, Regent, and five delegates.
- (c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five dolegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Explanatory Table, Chapter Representation at Conference:

Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three Credential Blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privilege. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meetings of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the chapter Regent or in her absence, the chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.60 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. These dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. On January fifteenth, the State Treasurer shall notify chapters whose dues are in arrears. A chapter whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar,

such sum to be given to the hostess chapters to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Necessary expenses of the State Officers and State Committees shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing and approved by the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and five members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget, as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. This committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the Society.

Scction 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the Kansas DAR Student Lcan and Scholarship Fund. This Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals and the interest on monoy loaned. The interest from this fund shall be used annually for scholarship.

Scction 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Com-

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Recording Secretary as Chairman, the State Regent, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this commitee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conference, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolutions shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that have not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Press Relations. A Press Relations Committee composed of the State Reporter as Chairman and two members appointed by the State Regent shall prepare and distribute information for the press concerning patriotic and educational activities of the Kansas Society. This

Committee shall be responsible for the preparation and mailing of the Kansas DAR News.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resume' shall not be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent for use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Name. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the programs of the State and National Societies; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District Secretary thirty days in advance to all chapters within the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each District shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The term of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three terms.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapters

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year the chapter recording secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten

lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each state Chairman of National Committee, giving her name and address of chapter members on that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurers. Chapter treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer before January thirteenth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report. Contributions received by chapter treasurer after January thirtieth shall be sent to the State Treasurer and shall be included in her supplementary report.

ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

- No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer, 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each another if requested; National Chairman and Vice Chairman of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairman of National Committees and Chairman of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C. A. R. 1; District Directors, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society 2; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society 1; the DAR National Library 1; and the President of the State Officers Club, Chapter Regents Club and the State Chairmans Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.
- No. 2. The treasurer shall present each year a tabular list of chapter receipts to the Secretary which shall be printed in the proceedings.
- No. 3. Chairman of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

- No. 4. No less than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expense to be borne by the State Society.
- No. 5. The State Registrar shall furnish the publisher of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.
- No. 6. A sum not to exceed \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent, each year for the purpose of carrying on her work.
- No. 7. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.
- No. 8. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.
- No. 9. \$50.00 shall be alloted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.
- No. 10. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund and \$1.00 to the State DAR Library.
- No. 11. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (25c).
- No. 12. The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its properties housed at Shawnee Mission.
- No. 13. The State Society shall allocate \$25.00 annually to the El Cuartelejo Committee for the proper upkeep of the El Cuartelejo Monu ment in Scott County.
- No. 14. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.
- No. 15. A sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C. A. R. Society to be used for C. A. R. projects.
- No. 16. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.
- No. 17. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.
- No. 18. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and to the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.
- No. 19. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.
- No. 20. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.
- , N. 21. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Public Library, Dodge City, Kansas.
 - (a) The Kansas Society shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance insurance, loan and period of housing at

the Dodge City Public Library, and shall provide a postal box in Dodge City, Kansas, for the use of the Dodge City Chapter Library Committee in receiving requests for loan of books and their return.

- (b) The Dodge City Public Library shall provide a private room with adequate work and storage space.
- (c) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
- (d) Rental of \$10 per month shall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library with the Dodge City Public Library.
- No. 22. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.
- No. 23. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

No. 24. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.

No. 25. The State Regent shall appoint a State Mail Chairman, to take charge of central mailing of all group letters.

No. 26. A \$10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.

No. 27. The Runner-up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an engraved silver-plated bowl as an award.

No. 28. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests at the Kansas Luncheon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

No. 29. The State Regent shall appoint a committee at the closing session of the State Conference to review the minutes of that session.

No. 30. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote of those delegates voting.

No. 31. The Chapters in each District are as follows:
