Preamble of the Constitution of the United States of America

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for common defense, promote the general welfare and secure the blessing of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

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CONFERENCE RULES

- 1. All sessions will begin at the hour announced.
- 2. No one is to be seated during reports, speeches or musical numbers.
- 3. At all business sessions, members will wear their registration Badge along with blue ribbon for delegates, red ribbon for alternates, and green ribbon for non-voting members.
- 4. Any business unfinished at the time set for recess shall be resumed at the next session at the point when the recess was taken.
- 5. Only delegates have the privilege of the floor.
- 6. No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes at one time, except by the consent of the Conference.
- 7. Only the Chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- .8. In making reports time allocated for State Officers is not limited. Committee Chairman 4 minutes, District Directors 2 minutes,, Chapter Regents 2 minutes.
- 9. If both the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent are absent, the report shal be filed, unless otherwise ordered.
- 10. All motions shall be written and signed by the movers and seconder,
- and handed to the Recording Secretary before action is taken.
- 11. A timekeeper will be appointed. All speakers shall conform to the ruling when time is called.
- 12. A typewritten copy of each and every report must be filed with the Recording Secretary as it is presented, and a copy of such report also handed to the State Regent.
- 13. If the Officers, Chairman or Appointee is not present her report shall be fled for printing in the Official Proceedings, unless otherwise ordered.
- 14. All resolutions shall be in the hands of the Resolutions Committee not later than Thursday, March 15, 1974.
- 15. Any chaiman or individual who had a table display or exhibit will please attend to removal of all materials at the close of the Conference, Do not leave this detail for the hostess chapters.
- 16. Members who appear on the program or are making reports will always please occupy front seats.
- 17. Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

KANSAS STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING Wichita, Kansas

October 23, 1972

The Board of Management convened at 9:00 a.m. Monday, October 23, 1972 in the Ramada Inn, Wichita, Kansas for the regular Fall Meeting. The meeting was called by the State Regent, Mrs. Ralph M. Casey.

The meeting was called to order by the State Regent, Mrs. Ralph M. Cacey, who presided. An invocation was given by the Chaplain, Mrs. Lewis B. Roller, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States, which was led by Mrs. A. A. Schultz.

The roll was called by the Recording Secretary, Mrs. Naomi Nielsen. A quorum of 26 members, was declared present.

The Regent introduced the state officers present. Miss Pauline Cowger was also introduced. The state officers and Miss Cowger gave brief reports later in the session.

The Minutes of the KSDAR Board of Managers meeting on March 9, 1972 had been printed in the Proceedings. Therefore, the decision was made to dispense with the reading of these Miuutes.

The State Regent gave a comprehensive report of her trip to Washington, D. C. The area of concern and emphasis in the capital city are on the Bicentennial and the closly related matter of fund raising. Special arrangements have been completed for the scating of handicapped per sons at Continental Congress. Each state regent is allowed no more than two minutes in which to give her report. Recently the State Regent completed a trip during which she made visits to nine local chapters.

Eight state officers gave brief reports. The increase in DAR membership continues in Kansas as well as nationwide. Kansas has a net gain of 80 new members as contrasted to a net gain of 52 last year. One hundred three new books and records were received by the Kansas DAR Library this year. The compilation of a new list of books and manuscripts has been completed and may be purchased for \$1.00 each.

A luncheon was served to the group at 12:00 Noon. The noon hour was shortened because of the group making the Fall Tour having quite a long drive after the meeting.

Two motions referred by the Executive Committee were read by the Recording Secretary. They were:

Daughters of the American Revolution

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- 1. Isabel D. McGuire had made a motion, which had been seconded, reading: "I move the adoption of the following recommendation of the Executive Board: Should the winner of the Kansas Good Citizen Contest be named the National Winner, the exponses of her trip to Washington to accept the award, plus the expense of her chaperone preferably the State Good Citizen Chairman, shall be provided from the General Fund. These expenses shall include round-up transportation and food and lodging for a maximum time of two nights and three days in Washington." The motion was seconded and voted on favorably.
- 2. Jackie O. Theis had made a motion, which read: "I move that we accept the Executive Committee's recommendation concerning including a contribution of \$1.00 from each Kansas Chapter to Shawnee Mission and adding this to Standing Rule No. 10. The motion was seconded and then voted on favorably.

KANSAS STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING Salina, Kansas March 15, 1973

The Kansas State Board of Management Meeting, called by the State Regent, Mrs. Ralph Casey, was held on March 15, 1973, at 9:30 a. m. at the Hilton Inn, Salina, Kansas.

The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Ralph M. Casey, State Regent. A prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Mrs. Lewis B. Roller. This was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and the singing of the first and last stanzas of the National Anthem. Both were led by Mrs. Carl Biegert.

The Roll Call was by the Recording Secretary, Mrs. Naomi Nielsen. Present were 2 Honorary State Regents, 10 State Officers and 14 Chapter Regents. A quorum was declared present.

The State Regent introduced all the state officers.

The Recording Scoretary read the Minutes of the KSDAR Board of Management Meeting in Wichita, Kansas on October 23, 1972. The following corrections were made:

- 1. In paragraph 1, revised the first sentence to read "The Regent introduced the state officers present."
- 2. The estimated budget beginning on page 2 should be deleted and replaced by the interim audit report for February 1 to August 31, 1972.
- 3. In the next to the last paragraph on the last page of the Minutes, in line 1, the second word should be "Eisenhower."

The Recording Secretary moved that the Minutes as corrected and revised be approved. The motion was seconded and carried. A revised copy will be sent to all state officers, chapter regents and to the national officer whose residence is within Kansas.

The Vice Regent, Mrs. Francis L. Johnson presided while the State Regent gave her report of the year's activities. This report will be included in the forthcoming 1973 Proceedings.

Each state officer, with the exception of the treasurer, who will present a detailed report during the afternoon session, gave a partial report at this time. The more complete reports will be included in the 1973 Proceedings so the partial reports will not be given here.

Miss Pauline Cowger, Eisenhower Pilgrimage Chairman, reported regarding plans for the Eisenhower Pilgrimage to Abilene, Kansas on May 17, 1973. An announcement giving more details will be mailed at a later date.

Mrs. Casey talked briefly about some o fthe suggested changes by the Bylaws Committee during the regular meeting of the National Board of Management on February 1, 1973. Of most interest to the membership is the proposal of increased National dues of members of chapters from \$3.00 to \$7.00 and the dues of members at large from \$7.00 to \$12.00 per year. Changes in the Bylaws of NSDAR for voting by mail were proposed. Pre-registration for Continental Congress Bylaws were also thought to need some changes. The National Board of Managementt did not approve of the changes in either voting by mail or for pre-registration for Continental Congress.

The Recording Secretary read the following recommendation from the Executive Committee.

"Withdrawal of the balance in the Student Loan Fund savings account S-2334 from the First Federal Savings and Loan, Hutchinson and adding a sufficient amount from the General Fund, and purchasing from another Federally Insured institution, a \$1,000.00 Certificate of Deposit which will draw a higher rate of interest, earnings of which will be credited o the General Fund.'

The Recording Secretary moved the acceptance of this recommen dation. It was seconded and approved.

The Recording Secretary read the following recommendation, which had been processed through the Executive Committee.

"Withdrawal of th \$5,000.00 Certificate of Deposit from First Federal Savings and Loan, Hutchinson, Kansas and purchasing from another Federally Insured institution, a \$5,000.00 Certificate of Deposit, which will draw a higher rate of interest, and will be credited to Scholarship Fund."

The Recording Socrotary mave the accoptance of this recommendation. The motion was seconded and approved.

The following recommendation, which had been processed through the Executive Committee was read by the Recording Secretary:

"The Executive Committee recommends to the State Board of Management that the two DAR rooms in Shawnee Mission be renovated before September 1, 1973."

The Recording Secretary moved the approval of the recommendation. The motion was seconded and approved.

A recommendation processed through the Executive Committee was read by the Recording Secretary. It is: "That the contests of the Historian's non-current File be placed in the DAR Library."

The Recording Secretary moved the acceptance of this recommenda tion. The motion was seconded and approved.

It being evident during the discussion regarding the increase in national dues for individal members that opposition was strong.

Mrs. Lucille L. Biegert moved "That a vote be taken at this meeting as to the sontiment for or against the raise of dues paid to the National Society of DAR." The motion was seconded and approved.

Mrs. R.P. Thayer moved "That the increase in dues of \$.00 be opposed. " The motion was seconded and approved.

Mrs. Lucille L. Biegert then moved "That the sentiment of the Kansas State Board of Management be related to the National organization." This motion was seconded and approved. (Later, on March 20, 1973, a letter addressed to Mrs. Wakelee Rawlins Smith, Corresponding Secretary General, signed by the State Regent, Vice Regent and Recording Secretary expressing this opposition to the increase in ducs.)

The meeting was adjourned by the State Regent to reconvenc at 2:00 p. m. for the Conference opening.

 - 2. "Withdrawal of the \$5,000.00 Certificate of Deposit from First Federal Savings and Loan, Hutchinson, and purchasing from another Federally insured institution, a \$5,000.00 Certificate of Deposit, which will draw a higher rate of interest to be credited to the Scholarship Fund."
 - 3. "The Board of Management recommends that the two DAR rooms in Shawnee Mission be renovated before September 1, 1973."
 - 4. The contents of the Historian's non-current file are to be placed in the KSDAR library."

Mrs. F. L. Veatch, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented the final reading of the Resolutions. She moved the acceptance of each Resolution. Her motions were seconded and the following were adopted.

The motion was made by Mrs. Paul N. Kent to accept the invitation, which was seconded and so voted.

The State Regent, Mrs. Casey expressed her appreciation to the Conference Chairman, Miss Pauline Cowger, for being such an efficient chairman and presented her with The DAR Bi-Centennial bon-bon dish instead of the Kansas Bar. Miss Cowger had previously explained her preference for the bon bon dish inasmuch as she already had a Kansas Bar.

Mrs. Casey, State Regent, introduced Mr. John P. Tyson of Kate

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Duncan Smith School, and expressed her appreciation for his coming to Kansas and presenting the program on Kate Duncan School to the members of the Conference. HISTORIAN

The year began with the annual pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission. Under the capable direction of Mrs. Lewis Kessler it was once again a success and very well attended.

53 Chapter reporting: The Governor and 28 mayors proclaimed Constitution Week. 532½ inches of publicity, 75 articles and 8 pictures; 534 minutes of radio time with three full programs and 236 spot announcements; 184 minutes on TV with 36 programs and 50 announcements; Displays were placed in banks, stores, libraries, post offices, county fairs, schools and on billboards. Programs were presented in 44 chapters, 26 schools, 2 scout meetings and in 7 service clubs. 15 churches noted Constitution Week. 43 chapters purchased materials from the Defense Office and 1025 pieces of literature were distributed.

The Sagamore Chapter placed a large framed display of the evolution of the Flag of the United States in the lobby of a public building and this will become a permanent display. Many chapters had fine displays in various places.

This year the quiz furnished in the packet from National was used a great deal in schools, chapter meetings, clubs, radio, TV and scouts. I feel that this is a valuable tool and one that is easily available to all chapters.

45 Chapter Historians: There are 84 historical programs for adults and 25 for children given. Anniversaries of 18 famous men, 3 women and 25 events were celebrated. There are 86 radio broadcasts made and 3 TV programs on behalf of this office. 38 tours for adults and 12 for children were conducted.

The graves of 2 daughters of Revolutionary War soldiers and 27 members were marked. 4 restorations were begun and 1 completed and one marker rededicated.

It has been a good year in all phases of the Historian's office and [hope next year will be better. (Continued on page 105)

REPORTER

Issues of the Kansas DAR News were published in August and September of 1972 and in February of 1973. Mr. Raymond Lees, who has printed the News for several year, has sold his priting business to Mr. Earl Price. The News is being printed in the same shop but on new equipment which accounts for the change in appearance of the February issue.

The cost of printing and mailing the News during the past year was \$1105.63 (printing \$782.98; postage and handling \$292.65; mailing permit \$30.00). The cost of changes in the mailing list was \$88.81 (502 additions; 331 change of address; 255 drops). This is an increase of \$73.18 over the

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cost of printing and mailing last year. There are 3538 names on the mailing list—an increase of 163 names over last year.

To keep the mailing list current, this office is dependent upon the State Registrar and in turn, upon the Chapter Registrars for changes of address and changes of names and for notification of deaths, resignations, and transfers. A complete listing of new members is received from National Headquarters.

A new feature of the News, instituted at the request of the State Regent is the 50-Year-and-Over Membership Honor Roll. This is an unofficial listing of members with 50 or more years of active membership. Names are listed as they are received from the chapters.

Items for publication by the State Officers, State Chairman, and Chapters add information and interest to the News. These contributions are appreciated.

meetings. Forty-seven programs, in all, were devoted to American Heritage. Interest in the history of chapter locales has brought forth the resurrection of old flags, quilts, medals, coins, war sabers, silver, pewter, and the like: discovery of contributions of early citizens and their part in building the communities: of Indian relies and stories about the early days in Kansas, not found in books: renewed interest in the many county historical societies and their findings and accumulation of invaluable memorabilia; and even to the writing of biographies of heertofore unknown citizens; in contributing to the restoration of old homes, and gifts of furnishings has been done. Programs of historical music of some ares have been performed. Many members have completed family trees in various art media and have completed perapbooks of lives of family members. Although not as much in the way of pic-tures and articles was sent this year, a brief report of activities of chapters was sent in the many letters and a summary, along with the more detailed reports, was sent to the South Central Division Chairman. Some of the excellent articles, sent last year were relayed to the DAR Magazine for possible use. You all known, by now, that Kansas won the Evelyn Cole Peeters Award last year for our division. Your Chairman was notified that her "Ode to America" was one of the "top ten" winners in the poetry contest. (Haven't heard who the others were.) According to report this year, 20 poems from Kansas were ontered in the contest, no drama, but two sent musical compositions. We may not receive the Division Award again this year, but maybe each chapter will make a greater effort toward a better and more informative report. for the coming term.

AMERICAN INDIANS

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Early in the fall I mailed a packet to the American Indian Chairman in each of the 61 chapters containing the Annual Committee Report from Mrs. Carl W. Keitzman, National Chairman, also a letter explain-ing the origin of the Indian Committee, schools assisted, state projects and scholarship fund with a questionnaire to be returned to me by March 10th. I am very pleased with the enormous response, more than doubling last year. To Bacone College:—15 chapters gave \$89.50 to the National Project (a Chair in Arts and Crafts), 1,079 pounds valued at \$238.60 sent to the thrift shop, also \$0.00 in cash to use as needed. I am deeply grateful for two full \$300.00 scholarships from Geneva Herndon of the Courtney-Spalding Chapter, Hays, and Elizabeth Trombold, Ran-dolph Loving Chapter, Wichita. To St. Mary's Indian Girls School — 8 chapters gave \$27.50 to their National Project (Bricks for the recreation room), 501 pounds valued at over \$857.00 was sent to the thrift shop, also 8 Christmas packages, \$20.00 in Memorials, package of jewelry and \$13.00 in cash as needed. There was also \$20.00 for the scholarship fund. 13 chapters had projects on the American Indian, all sounding exciting and stimulating. Then there was \$100.00 worth of coupons to Crossnore and money sent to various Indian schools from South Dakota to Montana. Wives and husbands from two chapters went to the Southwest and Dakotas with loads of clothing, working with and giving financial aid to the Indians. Numerous chapters had taken subscriptions to St. Mary's Bugle and Bacone's Smoke Signals publications, enlightening them to the schools activities and achievements.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP COMMITTEE Mrs. A. E. Voigh

The Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship Committee was

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interested in promoting better trained citizens and knowledge, love and loyalty of the American way of life. This was done through news papers, personal lectures and encouraging young people to attend Naturalization ceremonies, write essay and make posters in Americanism contests. Members attended, taught and worked with Americanzation classes, sponsored teas an gave gifts to new citizens. This year only 31 chapters responded, even though all information and report forms were mailed in September to each chairman or regent, if there was no chairman. The following information was compiled: 28 reported the American's Creed at chapter meetings. 26 gave Americanism talks to other organizations. 9 presented Americanism programs on radio and TV. 19 placed patriotic iterature in schools, libraries and other places for display and study. 5 chapters particiated in promoting the American's Creed in a special way. 502 Citizenship manuals for use in Americanism classes were purchased and 275 flags, 258 Welcome cards, 470 patrioic leaflets, and 3 gifts were given to new citizens. 20 chapters helped with Naturalization Naturalization Court teas and 4 members worked with Americanism classes. 80 members in 15 chapters attended Naturalization Court ceremonies. 11 sponsored Americanism essay and poster contests and 4 arranged for youth to attend Naturalization proceedings. 8 hours of radio and TV time and 6,399 hours of Community service were reported. Two chapters, Topeka and Dodge City, recognized and presented an Americanism Medal to an outstanding naturalized citizen. The most outstanding report received was from Shawnee Mission Chapter.

BICENTENNIAL Mrs. R. E. Byler

A letter and questionnaire was mailed to the Bicentennial Chairman, or the Regent, of each of the 64 chapters. 48 chapters reported the following Bicentennial activities: 36 chapters had at least 1 full Bicentennial program; 37 chapters contributed a total of \$932.50 to the President General's Bicentennial Project; 36 chapters cooperated with various kinds of Centennial projects; 28 copies of "Focus—1976" now in use; 28 copies of "A For America" purchased; 25 Haviland Bicenennial Commemorative Bonbons purchased; 5 silver and 6 bronze medallions and 12 ornamental tiles were purchased. While there were no projects designated as Bicentennial, there were many interesting and worthwhile ideas projected. They included: "A For America" used at meetings, a paper "Ring In The New Liberty Bell," "Quilt Project," Colonial music, Colonial dress, Historical sketches, Spot announcements at chapter meetings, Local centennials, "Focus" items in local newspapers. Historical Vignettes Skit, American Flag Lineage in Song, "Gritt" news articles reviewed, Contributions to county library for genealogical department, Spot announcements on local radio, Major trails and routes paper, Window displays on Bicentennial Hisory, Bicentennial chorts at each meeting, Original drama, Magazine article and Dinner favors.

CONSERVATION Mrs. Lennel I. Wright

Only 37 of 63 Chapters sent in Conservation Reports. Two were too late to be counted. This was not as good a record as last year. However, there were some excellent reports. Several Chapters did a very fine job. Over 2400 trees were planted. Twenty-five Chairmen talked to their Chapters. Thirteen talked to outside groups. Over 700 members together put out 8 tons of food for birds and wildlife. Over 100 members wrote to their Legislators. Trees were planted along the banks of the Missouri River, at Old Fort Hays, in City parks, cemeteries, historical spots, farms, ranches, and gardens. Programs were held on pollution

of various kinds, feed lots, and land use. Some programs were broadcast on radio and television. Several Chapters worked with Young Groups. One member helped the C. A. R. gather and recycle 300 pounds of aluminum. A DAR Conservation Award was given to one youth in Scout Conservation work. Wildlife Magazines were sent to youngsters and schools. One Chairman still serves as an Advisor on the Board of her County Conservation District, and attends the county, area, and state meetings. Several farm ponds, and miles of soil terraces were built by member families.

DAR GOOD CITIZEN Miss Virginia Weisgerber

Reports show responses from 61 chapters, 60 of them sponsoring 170 DAR Good Citizens. State school consolidation reduced numbers in some localities. Also, the State Board of Education October News Bulletin included a "DAR Good Citizen" note. This year special recognition goes to these chapters: sponsoring 7 girls, Topeka; 6 girls, each, to Betty Washington; Desire Tobey Sears, Henry Dawson, John Haupt, Polly Ogden, and Uvedale; 5 girls, Martha Vail; 4 girls, each, to Abilene, Capt. Jesse Leavenworth, Dodge City, General Edward Hand, Jeremiah Howard, Nathan Edson, Oceanus Hopkins, and Peleg Gorton. At various lovely social events or school honors assemblies, chapters presented Good Citizen the official pins certificate, letter from the State officers, and other recognition. The first and second place State winners and their mothers were guests at a State Conference luncheon. Our State winning entry was submitted in the National Contest. Starting August, 1972; the State Chairman sent to all chapters, letters, postals. and packets of materials needed to assure maximum results. Responding to the efforts of the State Chairman, the chapter chairmen, regents, and sponsored girls worked diligently, in excellent teamwork. A great big thanks to all, and best wishes for another year!

Of the Kansas Chapters, 48 have DAR Museum Chairman. 22 Chapters reported as of March 1st. The following report represents only one third of the probable work accomplished in this committee in the state. Contributions from 18 chapters totaled \$27.00. Eight books for the DAR Museum Reference Library from four chapters amounted to \$26.75. From Arthur Barrett: honoring Mrs. Cora Guthrie (R. C.) a 64-year member; Mrs. Mary E. Brodrick (Van C.) a 50-year member; Mrs. Lydia Cottrell (John) and Mrs. Jane Henry (R. M. Jr.) both Charter members 45 years and Mrs. Dorothy Brown (John Spalding) Chap-ter Regent. From Fort Larned Chapter: in memory of Mrs. Jessie Grope (C. E.) From Ninnescah Chapter: in memory of Mrs. Elsie Angie Eads (Ray R.). From Uvedale Chapter: honoring Mrs. Lucille Johnson (Francis), State Vice Regent. Chapter programs 10; 5 used slides from National; none used the Kansas owned slides; 1 radio program reported; 3 speakers used. Topeka Chapter reported gifts to the National Museum - a Cardan pewter lamp and a document concerning George Washington's inauguration Centennial, both from Mrs. Benjamin Franklin, Topeka. Your DAR Museum Chairman has stressed Museumprograms, contributed to purchase reference books for the Muscum Library, use of Kansas owned Museum slides ,available from your State Chairman at no cost except postage. She appreciates the cooperation of Regents and Chapter Chairman. Every Caughter should take pride in the outstanding collections owned by the National Society, the different state rooms and above all our Kansas Chapel, a real jwel.

DAR SCHOOLS Mrs. Howard W. Haines

Questionnaires were mailed early in January to all Chapter Chairmen. 34 of the chapters reported having programs on the DAR Schools and the Approved Schools. Clothing and other useful articles were sent, entailing a declared expense of \$70.00. Only two chapters reported "Free Freight" and a good many sent articles but did not specify their expenses, so \$70.00 is a very low estimate. A good many saved coupons and sent them to the schools. A note about coupons: Crossnore seems to be the only one that solicits both Discount and Trading

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Stamps. A good many have been sent to them and they always acknowledge them with thanks. In the January issue of Kate Duncan Smith DAR School News, a photograph shows lovely furniture secured with S & H Green Stamps, Betty Crocker and Red Scissors Coupons sent in by the Western District; Mrs. Thomas H. Navin of Tucson, Arizona, National Vice Chairman. The message under the picture is that they can use Trading Stamps but not Discount Stamps or Coupons. Kansas people have access to Betty Crocker coupons, but not the trading stamps as they are illegal in Kansas. Kansas Chapters are generous with their donations. Mrs. Theis reports a total of \$59.00 for Kate Duncan Smith and \$938.46 for Tamassee. Only one chapter gave \$10.00 to the Approved Schools to be divided equally between the five institutions, and one chapter gave \$2.00 to Crossnore. A few of the reports showed money given that was not reflected on the Treasurer's report, so PLEASE send your contributions through the State Treasurer. Some chapters gave \$200.00 scholarships for which we are most grateful. Education is such a worthy cause, that we, as Daughters in Kansas, can be justly proud to do our part in the furtherance of it. We are truly grateful for the privilege of working on the DAR Schools Program.

FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM Mrs. Ralph H. Stewart

At the district meetings held in October 1972, members of the Kansas Society, DAR, were reminded of a letter sent to each chapter in the state in July from the National Chairman of the Friends of the Museum, emphasizing the important purpose of this committee - to provide for the growth of the Museum Collection through personal conrtibutions. Information was given concerning awards to be presented at the 1973 Continental Congress to states excelling in contributions. In December 1972 a letter from the State Chairman of the Friends of the Museum was sent to each of the 64 Kansas chapters, urging cooperation and enclosing a blankform for reporting contributions for the fiscal year. Thirty-eight chapter chairmen or regents replied. Of this number, 23 reported no contributions. Fifteen chapters reported gifts from individuals, amounting to \$135.00. Although this is not an increase in donations, it does show an interest. Serving on this important committee is a pleasure and a privilege. It is the wish of the State Chairman of the Friends of the Museum Committee that all Kansas chapters will strive to make the DAR Museum a special project next year. GENEALOGICAL RECORDS Mrs. Ralph O. Dickey

Twenty-eight Chapters contributed 708 pages of Genealogical data for the years 1972 - 1973 to be placed in the Library in Washington, D. C., Dodge City and Topeka. Marriage records, wills, Bible records, land records, directories, family records, cemetery records and memoirs were among the material sent in. Kansas received second place award for the state, with the largest percentage gain in JAC Clubs and for percentage membership gain, at the 1972 JAC Roundtable at Continental Congress. Eight of the 1972 Kansas contest entries were announced as national winners. Again this year Kansas JAC grew. Chapters contributing to the state prize fund: Arthur Barrett, Oceanus Hopkins, John Haupt, Randolph Loving, Kanza, Martha Loving Ferrell, Betty Bonney, Jeremiah Howard and Concordia. 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In the second year of this administration we can feel proud of what has been accomplished. We are well on our way toward the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund goal of \$74,000 by 1974. The Helen Pouch Memorial Fund provides medical treatment, health services and scholarships for students at Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee, the two DAR schools. Our National Junior membership project is: "The Junior Momborship arts and Crafts Center at Tamassoc." In order to realize our dreams, we depend upon the sales of the approved Junior jewelry and note paper. By ordering and selling you will share in our joy of giving. The Helen Pouch Memorial Fund is more than an annual challenege to the Juniors to raise money for the DAR schools. It reflects the emphasis of the National Society on Education. The fund raising efforts of the Juniors combined with the support and generosity of DAR mem bers throughout the country result in this success story. This year we have 36 new Juniors in the state of Kansas with a total of 312 members. We lost 19 members because they had reached their 36th birth day. We have 64 chapters in the state with 35 chapters reporting. Our total contributions to the Helen Pouch Memorial fund this year were \$341.14. Lets keep up the good wrk. We hope to show an increase in our Junior membership this coming year and have a greater number of chapters selling jewelry and note paper. LINEAGE RESEARCH Pauline Cowger

Last year the Kansas Society showed an increase in membership and we trust this year the same roport will be made, resultant of the Chapter Chairmen of this Committee. Pages 62 63 of the NSDAR Hand Book outlined our duties and responsibilities "to assist prospective mem bers who have had invitations to join the Society, not to complete the application paper." Of our 64 Chapters, 53 reported Chairmen or Registrars also serving in that capacity. Two letters were sont each chapter in 1972 outlining possible services and holps. This Chairman attended District Meeting, and spoke of available holps and offered assistance. She also spoke at four Chapter meetings. Letters from 18 Kansas individuals and chapters asking direction and help for potential members have been received. Two sets of papers were sent NSDAR Research Chairman - one set is awaiting their reply. Three requests from out of state asked for information: Michigan, Colorado and Connecticut. A workchop is planned following Friday business to answer questions, discuss problems, places to contact for specific needs, and general suggestions. This Committee is an interesting and challenging esperi ence. Any time the Chairman can be helpful in furthering our program and increaseing membership, please write me. Thanks to our State Regent for giving me this opportunity.

MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Ernest L. Tripp

The official number of Kansas members of DAR as of February 1, 1972 was 3,571. As a result of twolve chapters not reporting, the correct number of membership increase is not available for the past year. How ever, those reporting showed a substantial increase in new members, as well as some reinstatements and transfers from out of state. A number

of deceased members is to be expected. There are far too many resignations. It is hoped the number of these may become fewer. Next year, please impress on your chairman that it is important to get their report in on time. Again this year, the National Membership Chairman, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, is presenting an award certificate to the chapter that has the greatest net increase in membership. It would be well for all of us to find the formula the winning chapter is using. After winning last year, we wish again to congratulate Neodesha Chaptor which had a net gain of sevontcen new members.

NATIONAL DEFENSE Mrs. John E. Oakleaf

As your National Defence Chairman, it has been rewarding to attend each of the district meetings on the fall tour and to learn of the work being carried on by this DAR Committee throughout the state. 57 chapter chairmen reported on National Defense activity. The following information is based on those reports: Each chapter devoted at least 5 minutes, usually 10 or more, at each meeting for National Defense; each chapter has studied and discussed the 1972 Resolutions; each has made National Defense material available at chapter meetings and made the material available to interested individuals or groups. 13 ROTC medals were presented during the year, \$28.00 went to Dollars for Dc-fense, 2 chapters presented Good Citizenship medals (not to be confused with Good Citizonship Pins given to senior high school girls only). Many chapter members have contacted their congressman by cards, letters, phone calls or telegrams concerning important happenings of the day. Topics of greatest interest were Taxes, Pollution, Women's Liberation. Russia, China, the Panama Canal, Revenue Sharing, Welfare and School Problems. Several chapters reported interesting programs from people with a military background who lived in their own areas. Let's not overlook similar informed people in our communities for future program ideas.

PROGRAM Mrs. Mildred D. Watson

The outline for preparing chapter yearbooks for 1972-1973 was received from the National Office for distribution; a copy was mailed to each DAR chapter program chairman or regent. A few chapters made up their year books early before they received the 1971-1972 outline for programs and therefore used the 1971 and 1972 national theme. Forty chapters cent me their yearbooks, ten their supplements and two their inserts for 1972 and 1973. In reviewing the yearbooks and supplements, I find they are all well planned and have promoted the three objectives of the DAR - historical, educational and patriotic; they have all considered the National Honor Roll requirements in their programs. I have sent seven of the best year books and four supplements to the National Program Chairman to be judged for National awards. I have made an annual report for the National Program Chairman and Vice Chairman as required.

PUBLIC RELATIONS Mrs. Howard Neumann

Public relations showed a tremendous increase in 1972, with newspaper inches doubled over a year ago: 3,808 inches this year compared to 1,893 previously. The same increase continued down the line: 63 photographs, 127 magazine inches, 5 pictures, 121 minutes of radio time in 231 broadcasts, 30 television minutes in 8 telecasts. No doubt these

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figures should be doubled, as only 21 chapters reported -- but this is better than 15 chapters a year ago. Several followed suggestions to report to more than one newspaper. For instance, Martha Vail Chapter in Medicine Lodge garnered 500 inches by sending material to several newspapers; Dodge City used eight different sources; Arthur Barrett Chapter in Marysville totaled 604 inches and four pictures in six area papers, plus good radio coverage, one article in the national DAR magazine and a story in Kansas DAR News. As for statewide publicity, notices went to newspapers in every county and all radio and TV stations in the state. A clipping service revealed that most papers used some material and 25 of the largest newspapers carried good stories. We're telling "it" like it is. This takes time and energy. But it pays.

STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP Mrs. George Trombold

Recipients of the Kansas State DAR Scholarships for 1972 are Marian Chambers of Coldwater and Karen Blair of Emporia. Marian is a young woman of varied talents and interests. While in high school she placed first in the state in drama, music and literature contests. She held office in the Student Council, Kayettes and Pep Club and was on the Annual Staff and a Library Proctor. She was a member of several vocal groups and received leading parts in several school plays. She is a member of the National Honor Society and was Salutatorian in her graduating class. Marian has been a regular assistant in the morning worship service at the Clearwater Methodist Church, and on various task forces in adult and youth groups. She attended the Presidential Classroom for Young America in 1972 Some of her essays and poems have been published in national as well as local and state publications. Marian is the first woman to attend Dartmouth College, Hanover, New Hampshire where she is majoring in biology leading to a career in oceanography. Marian has been a C. A. R. since 1963 and was sponsored by Minisa Chapter where her mother is a member. Her grandmother, Mrs. R. A. Rounsavell is a member of Henry Dawson Chapter. Karen Blair received the DAR Good Citizen Award from Emporia Chapter last spring. She was an honor student in high school and a member of the Foreign Language Club. Pep Club and Executive Board of the Student Council. She was president of Kayette in her senior year and served on the Student, Administration and Faculty Evaluation Committee. She was secretary of social sciences for the social science department. Her project in the field of psychology received the Navy Award at the Regional Science Fair. This included a trip to San Diego. Karen has been a counselor for three summers at a church camp for the retarded. She was secretary of the Kansas-Oklahoma Youth Council of the Congregational Church. She is former Girl Scout and member of the Job's Daughters. She felt it a special privilege to have an American Field Service Student living in her home during the past year. Karen attends Cottey College, Nevada, Missouri where she is a major in psychology and social science. Karen was endorsed by Emporia Chapter where her mother is a member. Her maternal grandmother and paternal great grandmother were members of General Edward Hand Chapter.

TRANSPORTATION

Mrs. J. W. Cossell

This report covers the two years since my appointment as Chairman of Transportation. In 1972, soon after my appointment as Transportation Chairman, I began plans for a chartered coach trip to the Continental Congress in Washington, D. C. The first of the year I mailed out

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more than 250 letters - to each Chapter in Kansas, all officers and chairmen, and other members whom I hoped to interest. The response was most disappointing. Later I contacted members and officers of the Colorado and Missouri organiations, and still there were not enough reservations to justify taking a bus. The trip was cancelled and the deposits returned. Not accepting this defeat as a lack of interest, I again tried for the 1973 Continental Congress trip. I sent out some 125 letters to all Kansas Chapters, state officers and members who had expressed an interet last year. I have also contacted the Colorado, Oklahoma and Nebraska organiations, and find they are working on the same plan. Nebraska has sent one or two buses for several years. Missouri sends one every year. Colorado and Oklahoma are trying, but may have some who will go with us. At present, the interest appears to be good. Have a few sure reservations, and many inquiries. I am encouraged to think we might fill a coach. Being a non-resident member of the Dodge City Chapter, and some distance away, I have not been able to attend regularly, but when possible, I go and take other members from this community. It was my pleasure to attend the 1972 annual conference in Hutchinson last March, the board of directors meeting in Kingman, and expect to attend the conference in Salina this year.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. A. A. Schult

As Kansas Daughters we have presented 35 large flags and 125 small flags. More than half the chapters have studied the Flag Code. We have distributed 145 code posters and 410 Flag Codes, most of which were placed in elementary schools. 6 corrections were made on incorrect display of the flag. All chapters urged members to try the flag on "Flag Holidays" 26 entire programs on the flag, 32 partial programs were presented and 15 flag programs given to other organizations. Excellent newspaper publicity was received, 134 hours radio time on the air and 4 television programs were also given. All chapters opened with the Pledge. New citizens of the United States were given small flags. I chapter gave 2 large flags. Abilene Chapter reported every member owned and displayed her flag. Eunice Sterling presented a braille flag to Kelly Elementary School for the visually handicapped in South Wichita. Emporia gave a specially made 37 star flag to old Schoolhouse on K. S. T. C. Campus. Four Winds observed Flag Day with a radio program: The skit was written by a chapter member, and presented by their, 4-H Club youngsters. A copy of the skit was sent to National, accepted and is now on file for use of other chapters. My thanks to the chapter chairman who sent in their questionnaire, with their various interesting reports. My goal next year is 100% respons from all Chapters. Thank you.

VETERAN PATIENTS Mrs. S. M. Vendy

Out of 64 chapters, 30 reported. It is pretty hard to total up a report that says "several" or a long list of items without a total or monetary value. This year's reports shows that the Veteran-Patients needs are numerous and sometimes surprising. It can best be summed up for you by listing it all and may give you ideas for next year. Bedding; Barber Shop Fund; Book & Magazines (all kinds)); Greeting Cards; Cakes, Candy, Cookies, Cupcakes (668); Cigarettes; Clothing, used (\$250 value); Chapel Fund; Coin Containers, Cosmetics; Desk Set; Ditty Bags (\$20 value); Drapes & Curtains; Easter Tray favors; an Electric sewing machine; Flags, braille; gifts for bingo games (\$30 value); hair brushes; Home calls & taking patients to doctor; jigsaw

puzzles, Lap Robes (about 50); layettes for V-J family (25 value); Nail Clippers; Pencils; pens, Razor, electric; Socks; Scrap Books; Stationary; Soap, Shaving Lotion; and Wheel Chair. Patriotic Days were commemorated with special parties and parades; Canteen Book donations; gifts to Hospital or individual patients; and last, but not least-stamps-over 22,000 ounces.

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Established during the administration of Mrs. B. J. Lempenau, the Friendship Fund may be used to assist aged, indigent member no longer able to pay their dues, to resign in good standing rather than be dropped from the National Society, DAR. The Fund has not been used as much as possible. The difficulty has been that Chapters wait too long to ask for help, In order to resign, a member must be in good standing. If National dues are not received by Treasurer General in Washington by January 1st, that member is in arrears and cannot resign or transfer to another Chapter (page 65, DAR Hand Book). When a Chapter asks for help in the payment of dues in hardship cases, the Chapter must assume the responsibility of obtaining the resignation of the member whose dues are to be paid from the Friendship Fund. Then only the National and State dues are paid, not Chapter dues. May I suggest that Chapter Regents or Treasurers seek needed help as soon after October 1st as possible, then more use can be made of this Fund..... Two members dues were paid from the fund this year.

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Proposed Amendments

to the

By-laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution for the consideration by the 82nd Continental Congress 1973.

(Amendments to provide increase in dues proposed by unanimous vote of the National Board of Management in accordance with Article XIX, Section 1.)

ARTICLE XI

Amend Article XI, Section 3 of the Bylaws of the National Society, DAR by striking out the word "three" before "dollars" and inserting the word "seven." The second item then will read:

"The annual National dues of a member of a chapter shall be seven dollars, which shall be sent by the chapter treasurer to the Treasurer General before the first day of January.

Amend Article XI, Section 4 of the Bylaws of the National Society, DAR by striking out the word "seven" before "dollars" and inserting the word "twelve." The section then will read:

The annual dues of a member at large shall be twelve dollars payable to the Treasurer General on or before th first day of January.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Objects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historic spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historic research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promise, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and accounting to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III

Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Register, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter member shall hold at the same time

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two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be elected for two consecutive terms in the same office. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be ineligie for any other state office except that of state Regent or State Vice Regent; until the expiration of at least one year.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Sction 3. Terms. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successor are elected, and their term of office hall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmd.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall befilled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable corvice to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V

Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National Officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall be taken.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees chall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter, signed by the Chapter Rgent and Secretary.

Section 4. **Report.** The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall

perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings. of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Socity. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio a member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Onapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and a Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committee and of any other She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at appointments. least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference, Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secreary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee... She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersigned all orders drawn on the State Treasurer and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than three years.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the Sate Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Sction 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the line of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first Three Credential Blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of March, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapter, made into a directory form. She shall send to each Chapter Regent and elected delegates. She shall notify each Chapter Regent for the Regent and elected delegates. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of th newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Mangament. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds and shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members in good standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February first.

Section 8. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members-at-large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter, name and rank of ancestor; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrants requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accopted; dropped re signed, transferred, married or doceaced during the preceding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimuate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of

this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library.

Section 11. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the Kansas Society to leading newspaper in this territory. She shall be chairman of the State Press Relations Coma copy of each article published, for the files and shall send monthly roports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D. C.

Section 12. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman. having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them when transferring them to her successor. She chall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

ARTICLE VII

Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and Chairman of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

: Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Reporter and the entertaining District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers; the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state; the Honorary State Regent; the Chapter Regent; or in her absence the First Vice Regent or alternate and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be clected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

- (a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates.
- (b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members, Regent, and five delegates.
- (c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred. Explanatory Table, Chapter Representation at Conference.

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Section 6. Alternates. The númber of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three Credential Blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meetings of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII

State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the chapter Regent or in her absence, the chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management chall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Daughters of the American Revolution

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Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICE IX

Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shal be given.

Soction 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X

Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society chall be \$1.60 for each momber of the chapter, payable in ad vance. These dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. On January fifteenth, the State Treasurer shall notify chapters which dues are in arrears. A chapter whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess chapter to defray Conference expenses. The amount romaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Necessary expenses of the State Officers and State Committees shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing and approved by the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

ARTICE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Scoretary and five members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Managers' such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the Society.

: Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be

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appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the Kansas DAR Student Loan and Scholarship Fund. This Fund is maintained by contribution from chapters and individuals and the interest on money loaned. The interest from this fund shall be used annually for scholarships.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Recording Secretary as Chairman, the State Regent, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credenials Committee composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secetary and the State Treasurer shall act as advicors to this committee.

Ecction 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amending and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be prescated to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommondations thirty

days prior to the annual State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during he year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that have not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Press Relations. A Press Relations Committee composed of the State Reporter as Chairman and two members appointed by the State Recent shall prepare and distribute information for the press con committee shall be responsible for the preparation and mailing of the Kansas DAR News.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing on special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICE XII ARTICE

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resumes shall not be published in the Proceedings. Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send not later than March first of each year; a written report of the work

of the past year to the State Regent fo use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District Secretary thirty days in advance to all chapters within the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each District shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The terms of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three terms.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV

Chapters

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers in or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year the chapter recording secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each state Chairman of National Committee, giving her name and address of chaper members on that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer before January thirteenth in order to have them included in he State Treasurer's annual report. Contributions received by chapter treasurer after January thirtienth shall be sent to the State Treasurer and shall be included in her supplementary report.

ARTICLE XV

Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

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Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty ldays before the State Conference, and brovided further that the amendment has been proposed by he State Board of "Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Commitee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society. Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or invite motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at

the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted. Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall "become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment. 21-12-0°1

No. 2. The treasurer shall present each year a tabular list of chapter receipts to the Secretary which shall be printed in the proceedings.

BREENO. 510. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1,00 cach year into the Kansas Chapel, Maintenancel Fund and \$1.00 to the State DAR Library.

No. 11. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (25c).

No. 12. The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its properties housed at Shawnee Mission.

No. 13. The State Society shall allocate \$25.00 annually to the El Cuartelejo Committee for the proper upkeep of the El Cuartelejo Monument in Scott County.

No. 14. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 15. A sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C. A. R. Society to be used for C. A. R. projects.

No. 1. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have he custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file of the newely elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 17. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

No. 18. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of he Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 19. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 20. All main motion presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 21. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Public Library, Dodge City, Kansas.

- (a) The Kansas Society shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Public Library, and shall provide a postal box in Dodge City, Kansas, for the use of the Dodge City Chapter Library Committee in receiving requests for loan of books and their return.
- (b) The Dodge City Public Library shall provide a private room with adequate work and storage space.
- (c) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
- (d) Rental of \$10 per month shall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library with the Dodge City Public Library.

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No. 22. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

No. 23. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

No. 21. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.

No. 25. The State Regent shall appoint a State Mail Chairman, to take charge of central mailing of all group letters.

No. 26. A \$10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.

No. 27. The Runner-up in the Good Citizens Contest shall be presented an engraved silver-plated bowl as an award.

No. 28. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests at the Kansas Lunchcon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

No. 29. The State Regent shall appoint a committee at the closing session of the State Conference to review the miuutes of the session.

No. 30. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State Conference by a two thirds vote of these delegates voting.

No. 31. The Chapters in each District are as follows:
