#### Preamble of the Constitution of the United States of America

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for common defense, promote the general welfare and secure the blessing of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

#### CONFERENCE RULES

- 1. All sessions will begin at the hour announced.
- 2. No one is to be seated during reports, speeches or musical numbers.
- 3. At all business sessions, members will wear their registration Badge along with blue ribbon for delegates, red ribbon for alternates, and green ribbon for non-voting members.

- 5. Only delegates have the privilege of the floor.
- 6. No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes at one time, except by the consent of the Conference.
- 7. Only the Chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 8. In making reports time allocated for State Officers is not limited. Committee Chairman 4 minutes, District Directors 2 minutes,, Chapter Regents 2 minutes.
- 9. If both the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent are absent, the report shal be filed, unless otherwise ordered.
- 10. All motions shall be written and signed by the movers and seconder, and handed to the Recording Secretary before action is taken.
- 11. A timekeeper will be appointed. All speakers shall conform to the ruling when time is called.
- 12. A typewritten copy of each and every report must be filed with the Recording Secretary as it is presented, and a copy of such report also handed to the State Regent.
- If the Officers, Chairman or Appointee is not present her report shall be filed for printing in the Official Preceedings, unless otherwise ordered.
- All resolutions shall be in the hands of the Resolutions Committee not later than Thursday, March 15, 1974.
- 15. Any chairman or individual who had a table display or exhibit will please attend to removal of all materials at the close of the Conference, Do not leave this detail for the hostess chapters.
- 16. Members who appear on the program or are making reports will always please occupy front seats.
- 17. Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

#### KANSAS CITY TOUR

#### **KSDAR** State Conference

#### March 22, 1974

Welcome to the Kansas City Tour. Your tour guides are Shirley Johnson and Kay Trimmer. We hope you will enjoy this brief introduction to the Kansas City area. Other places of interest in addition to those listed will be brought to your attention.

The Highlights of the tour are as follows:

- PLAZA MALL—Two blocks of architectural elements connected with the Center City Urban Renewal project.
- **HURON CEMETERY**—This old Indian burial ground is the final resting place of the Huron Indians who formerly lived in this vicinity.
- \*CITY HALL—A short lecture describing the history of the ten stained glass windows in the Council Chamber.
- \*GRINTER HOUSE—Now a museum, it was built by Moses Grinter in 1857. It has been restored and is one of the few in the area recorded in the Library of Congress.
- \*SHAWNEE MISSION MUSEUM—One of the earliest Indian missions in pre-territorial Kansas. A stopping point on the Santa Fe Trail.

MISSION HILLS—A drive through this senic residential area. \*Getting off bus at this location; please board the bus promptly.

#### The Indians Win . . . at Last

The last skirmish over the old Huron Indian Cemetery has ended in a public victory.

For 128 years since its establishment in 1843, the old burial ground has from time to time been threatened by commercial encroachment, tribal disinterest, neglect and abuse.

Effective Sept. 3 of this year, the cemetery became a national historical site when the National Park Service placed it on the National Register of Historical Sites. Thus the cemetery will be preserved as an historical Indian burial ground, and as such it will be maintained.

Early in the planning stage of the downtown Kansas City, Kansas Center City Urban Renewal project, it was recognized that Huron Cemetery was a potential asset, but that it was also a problem that would have to be unsnarled.

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Ownership technically was in the hands of the Wyandot Indian tribe of Oklahoma. The city gave the grounds occasional attention. Local historians have pleaded for—and some actually fought for—retention of the cemetery when other sought to acquire the property for commercial uses.

Center City plans made Huron Cemetery a vital link to the downtown mall, integrating it with grounds of the public library immediately east and literally "spilling" it down to street level on Minnesota Ave. Thousands of people have walked past the old high retaining will without realizing that an historic Indian cemetery was behind it near the busiest intersection in town.

Urban Renewal treatment will make it impossible to miss seeing the cemetery when the mall is completed and opened in late November.

Because of the cemetery's strategic and unique downtown location, Urban Renewal officials powwowed early in the planning stage with representatives of the Wyandot tribe and of the U.S. Department of Interior concerning the renewal of the burial ground.

Finally, U. S. Senator James B. Pearson notified the UR agency that Huron Cemetery had become a National Historical Site as of Sept. 3, 1971.

Spirits that may still be wafting around Huron Cemetery now can rest easy "as long as water flows and grass grows," to borrow a line from the original treaty that created the cemetery.

WHEREAS, Under the constitution of the United States, treaties become the supreme law of the land, and can override the Constitution itself, and

WHEREAS, The Supreme Court has ruled that an executive agreement, made by the President alone in the conduct of foreign affairs and without the approval of Congress has the same force and effect as treaties, and a Constitutional Amendment is needed in order to prevent treaties or executive agreements from becoming domestic law except by implementing legislation valid under the Constitution of the United States.

RESOLVED: That the members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, in the interest of preserving national sovereignty and constitutional government, support the so-called "New Bricker Amendment" as proposed by Congressman Steven Symns and

John Ashbrook.

#### FAMILY FARM ANTITRUST ACT

WHEREAS, Growing reports of foreign investment in land in the United States have stepped up interest in enactment of the Family Farm Antitrust Act as a way to prevent operation of those holdings as big corporate farms, and

WHEREAS, Public hearings on the foreign investment issue were opened January 29, by the House subcommittee chaired by Rep. John Culver (D-Iowa) who cited "rumors of intense foreign interests in land and agriculture," and

WHEREAS, It is now nearly impossibe to document most reports of

land purchased by foreign investors;

RESOLVED: That each of us acquaint ourselves with Family Farm Antitrust Act now before the House subcommittee, and particularly urge such a requirement for reporting land acquisitions and also urge the subcommittee members to support the Family Antitrust Act as a way to prevent foreign corporations from engaging in agricultural production in competition with family farmers.

#### HISTORIAN

Last year at State Conference is was decided to move the files of the Historian to the Dodge City Library. This was accomplished this year and I'm told by the Librarian that these materials have been used. There is a vast amount of information in these files about the chapters, the state and markers, and hopefully they will be used by more people for programs and information.

As State Historian I had the opportunity to speak before the Wichita Junior Chamber of Commerce and two Educational groups. These groups wanted to know just what DAR did, and I endeavored to bring them some information through "The DAR Story." I also visited five chapters bringing reports or programs.

47 chapters reported to the State Historian. 79 programs were presented—21 for adults and 58 for children. The anniversares of 39 men, 8 women and 15 events were celebrated. Broadcasts secured were 104 on radio and 26 on TV, 16 tours were conducted for adults and 15 for children. 23 DAR members graves were marked.

#### CONSTITUTION WEEK

I am delighted to report that we again had 100% chapters reporting this year on Constitution Week.

The year began with the pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission. It was especially well attended and the time the President General chose to make her official visit to Kansas.

From the reports returned to me 63 chapters urged display of the Flag of the United States of America. There were 683 inches of publicity, 93 articels, 34 pictures were secured in various publications. There were 469 minutes of radio time, 379 spot announcements and six programs. 97 minutes of TV time was secured with 68 spot announcements and 2 programs. Combined there were 145 displays in various establishments throughout the state, and 1368 pieces of Patriotic Literature was distributed to schools. Many fine window displays and programs were reported by the Chapters.

An unusual project is being planned by the Oceanus Chapter. They are establishing an oration contest in connection with Constitution Week. It will have to be held in the spring in order to fit with the schedule of the school. The subject of the contest will be "The Constitution of the United States."

I want to express my appreciation to all who have worked and cooperated so diligently during the past three years and especially to

our State Regent. To have had the opportunity to meet and work with so many fine Kansas ladies, to have been State Historian and to have served on this board has indeed been a privilege.

#### CONCERNING REGENTS

#### Mrs. Bertram J. Lempenau, Hon. State Regent and Past Librarian General NSDAR

When you and I became Regent of our chapter, for most of us it was the culmination of a long journey on the road of service to be found within the walls of every chapter room. When we assumed office, we found we were expected to wear many hats—to be all things to all persons—a dynamo to keep the chapter charged up; a magnet, to attract new members; a financial wizard, to keep the treasury healthy; a press agent, to keep the chapter in the public eye; a judge, to settle controversies; and a counsellor, to listen to the problems of others. On our shoulders had descended the mantle of leadership—in our hands rested the future of our chapter. In other words, we were the executive, the court of last resort in chapter matters. We were in the same position as the late Harry S. Truman, who kept on his desk in the White House a small sign which read "The buck stops here."

The reports which you gave to this Conference last night summed up your accomplishments and showed clearly how you functioned in your many capacities as Chapter Regent during the year just ended. Today, you stand on the threshold of a new year in DAR service. Before you stretches an untravelled portion of the road. This should be a time of self examination, a time to analyze your mistakes so they will not be repeated, and a time to evaluate your successes, so they may be continued. Galationas 6:4 tells us each must examine her own conduct for herself—then she can measure her accomplishments by comparing herself with herself and not against anyone else. If there are those amony you who feel no need for self-examination, may I remind you that it's hard to see the picture when it's you inside the frame. You owe it to yourself and to your chapter to compare your achievements during the year now ended with your expectations at its beginning.

There are questions you should ask yourself and answer honestly. The few brought up here are not to instruct you, but, rather, to remind you. If to follow these suggestions would disrupt your routine as Chapter Rgent, then they should certainly be food for thought.

Basically, all DAR work is done on the chapter level. Chapter Chairmen and committee members are the instruments through which DAR objectives are achieved. Ask yourself, did you assist, encourage and praise your Chairman and committees for their work this past year? Did you ask the Chairmen to report to the Chapter, and did you thank them and their committee members for their efforts? Chairmen and committee members whose work is publicly appreciated, as a rule are spurred on to higher levels of achievement. Be like Catherine the Great, who said, "I praise loudly, I blame softly."

Were you a Regent who appreciated Chairmen and committees and then bowed out, expecting them to carry on without further help from you? A good regret takes part in planning and putting into execution plans for her committee, realizing that in many cases they are like wheelbarrows, capable of carrying heavy loads, if pushed judiciously. On the other hand, a wise regent never interferes with nor takes over duties of her chairmen or committees—that is, not if she expects their cooperatin in the future. One who makes that mistake may well find herself in the same position as the little duck that insisted on flying upside down—that little duck quacked up! Work behind the scenes quietly but industriously, because you can get almost everything done if you don't

care who gets the credit. Be like another little duck—the one who swam upstream, serene and unrushed on the surface, but paddling like the devil underneath.

Don't be a regent who expects almost instant results from her committees. Instant results are like instant mashed potatoes or instant coffee—they never reach their potential, and they just don't fill the bill. It takes time, patience and perserverance to achieve maximum results. Abraham Lincoln once observed that you can't set a hen in the morning and expect chicken salad for lunch. Remember, the only one who ever got everything done by Friday was Robinson Crusoe—and he never really existed.

Look back at your chapter meetings and ask yourself if the programs reflected DAR objectives. Miss Dorothy Ragan once told the Kansas daughters that ours is truly a HEP organization-H for historic preservation, E for education and P for patriotic activities. What better source of programs could you ask than these objectives-and where could you find a firmer base for an organization such as ours in this troubled world of today with its mixed up values? The DAR committees offer an endless variety of topics for interesting programs. American Heritage, for instance, covers everything from Colonial events, Colonial personages, Colonial cooking or what have you, through antiques, old books, glass and silver, up to and including the pioneer settlement of our own great state of Kansas. Another committee much in the public mind is Conservation, with its problem child, Ecology. Conservation and Ecology discussions fill the press, these days. Why not have interest programs on local projects coming under this committee? Above all, don't let your chapter meetings deteriorate into purely social events with programs unrelated to DAR. We are a working organization, proud of our objectives. Let's keep it so!

Ask yourself, did you make an honest effort to help your Chairman obtain publicity for your chapter meetings? Did vou, or did you have the Program Chairman, call her and discuss coming programs well in advance, so she could prepare material to submit to the press? Publicity is not the problem in small communities that it is in cities, where the media consistently refuses to print organization material. However, a well written account of the Good Citizen program, with its emphasis on youth and community involvement, or a story about an outstanding speaker, will often be accepted because it is news for the community. Just two or three weeks ago in the Kansas City Star (and I assure you that the Star is an exceedingly hard nut to crack for publicity) I read an article, with pictures, about Good Citizens chosen by, I believe—Mission Hills Chapter. It can be done—but these days to get good publicity you have to go after it and to keep at it.

How many of you sent for the Handbook published in 1972 and studied it for changes in committees, procedures, protocol or forms required? How many of you conducted your chapter meetings according to the order of business outlined in the Handbook? How many of you presided over your chapter meetings with the dignity due the office of regent? How many kept aloof from friction and poured oil on troubled waters? It is the duty of a regent to reconcile opposing point of view when possible, so her chapter will function as a unit, rather than in factions.

Finally, what was your goal during the year just ended? Judging from the reports yesterday evening, the Honor Roll was the main goal, and there could be no finer goal than that. An Honor Roll chapter is a true working chapter in the finest DAR traditions. A chapter with a goal is a chapter which achieves, and a chapter with drive. I was not only delighted but thrilled to learn that Kansas for four years has had 100% Honor Roll participation by chapters, and that of the state's sixty three chapters only eight failed to qualify. I congratulate your

hardworking Honor Roll Chairman, Mrs. Walter Norris, for an outstanding job. To the regents of the eight chapters which fell by the wayside, may I quote an old adage—"If at first you don't succeed, try, try again." Further, may I comment that if a resourceful regent gets her members behind her, she can push her chapter to Honorable Mention.

As State Regent of Kansas, I travelled this big state from corner to corner and down the middle. No one realizes more than I that we have weak, struggling and isolated chapters to whom the Gold Honor Roll represents the Impossible Dream. But aim high-give it a try-you way be amazed at the results, if you really try. How many of you remember John Athey Chapter at Oakley five years ago. For two years they faced automatic disbandment because their membership fell below twelve, but they refused to quit. They rolled up their sleeves and went to work. The first year those eleven women sent their High School Girls Chorus, in a school bus three hundred miles to sing for our State Conference, at their own expense. The next year when they came they were on the Gold Honor Roll, with eighteen member. It CAN BE DONE! You no longer have to get that elusive junior member, providing you members will sell enough DAR jewelry—and beginning this year, enough DAR note paper or stationery—to turn in a \$5 profit to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. Now, for those of you who have forgotten, or those who do not know, that fund is the one which provides scholarships for our underprivileged mountain children educated at Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith, our own DAR schools. What finer reason could you have for selling DAR jewelry or paper? All that, and Honor Roll Credit, too.

It will be difficult to show an increase in membership because of the raise in national dues from \$3 to \$7. Inevitably some of your members will resign or be dropped. To combat loss in membership, why not try an old formula which works? Ask every member of your chapter to turn in a list of every female blood relative in the vicinity, mothers, daughters, grandmothers, granddaughters, sisters, nieces, grandnieces and cousins of all degrees. If your membership committee works on list such as these, they are bound to find more than one who has never joined DAR previously because of lack of an invitation. Relatives join on established lines, using short form applications. Think of the saving in time and research alone.

Let's face it—the DAR is top heavy with Senior citizens who have served many years in many capacities and who have earned the right to sit on the sidelines. This is particularly true in smaller communities. One thrid of the DAR membership is made up of junior under thirty five, but the younger members are tied down with school jobs or little children, while the older junior are so deeply involved with P.T.A., A.A.U.W., Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, church or organizational work, that they have no time for DAR. Far too many members of all ages belong, derive all the benefits of membership, but refuse to do any of the work. Each year it is more difficult to find members for officers and committees. work, particularly in small communities. The only solution to the problem is to find new members, to bring new life, new blood and, above all, new enthusiasm to your chapter. Dr. Norman Vincent Peale tells us that enthusiasm is one of the greatest qualities with which humans are endowed-that it is priceless, as well as creative. An enthusiastic member-undertakes responsibility and has the drive and the will to succeed. I urge you to strive to find new members, whether from relatives of present members or newcomers in the community. They are vital to the future of your chapter.

Because I feel some among you may not fully understand the urgent necessity for the increase in national dues, let me explain. First, I wish to make it clear that the National Society must operate its buildings and committees only on income from national dues and interest on trust funds where the principal cannot be expended. Some income derives

from operation of Constitution Hall, but upkeep there is tremendous. National officers pay every cent of their own expense, including transportation to and from and lodging in Washington. The President General is given a modest travelling expense fund, but no salary. sent in by chapters or individuals for various committees or the schools can be spent only for the purpose donated. When you read the report of the Treasurer-General it appears the Society is wealthy, but money held in trust cannot be touched, and many of the trust are restricted to specific committees, the library or elsewhere, so even the interest cannot be used to operate the National Society. In 1904 the national dues were 50c, in 1925 they were a \$1, in 1948 they were \$1.50. in 1951 \$2 and finally, in 1960, they were fixed at \$3, where they remained for thirteen long years, during which we had inflation, devaluation of our dollar, and astronomical increases in cost of materials and labor for management of the buildings. Due to these circumstances, the National Society operated at a deficit from 1966 on. No less a person than Miss Gertrude Carraway, Honorary President General, told Continental Congress last year that the dues should have been raised in 1966. They were not raised because the administration preceding this one balked at taking such an unpopular step and passed the problem on to their successors in office. Unfortunately, ignoring money problems does not cause them to go away, they lurk in the background, growing dangerous each day that passes.

The real crunch came in 1970. That year the deficit was \$81.111. By deficit, I mean that the National Society spent \$81.111 more than its income and passed that amount of unpaid bills on when it left office. The National Society was then aware that it would lose the National Symphony and other Constitutional Hall tenants when the new Kennedy Center opened, causing an annual loss in income of \$93,000. Then was the time to wake up and smell the coffee, in the words of Helcine. Instead, that was the year a computer costing over \$60,000 annually in rent alone was installed. I am not downgrading the computer—I am downgrading the time and the circumstances.

It doesn't take a lead pencil, and you don't have to be an Einstein to understand the enormous financial burden assumed by the Spicer Administration when we took office in April, 1971, when von take into consideration \$81,111 of carried over bills to be paid, \$93,000 loss in income, and over \$60,000 additional expense anually for the computer. Deficits are like snowballs rolling downhill—the longer they go the higger they grow and the harder they are to dissipate. By the end of 1972 the deficit had risen to \$149,600. At the end of 1972 the deficit was \$191.600 and the deficit for 1973 was estimated at \$318.000. Daughters—that sum represents almost one third of one million dollars! Clearly, the National Society had reached the point of no return, financially, unless drastic action was taken to curb the mounting deficit and put the Society in sound financial condition again. The voters at the 1973 Continental Congress faced the situation and voted to increase national dues to \$7. which was the minimum amount required to retire the deficit and get us in the black once more. At that time it was estimated that with continued inflation (which we have) and the new dues level it would not be necessary to raise dues again for ten vears. By that time you and I will be so far over the hill that others will have to cope with the problem.

I close with a gem sent to Mrs. Donald Spicer when she was State Regent of California, and I dedicate it to all regents, past, present and future.

A DAR regent must be winsome, witty and wise And Goodlooking enough to appeal to all eyes. She must be a good dresser and spender and lender, Always willing to go where the State wants to send her. She must give all her time and that of her spouse And neglects her poor family, her friends and her house. She works day and night on every committee That is formed in her chapter, her state or her city. She must eat every luncheon and banquet and dinner Yet manages somehow to grow thinner and thinner. While doing all this, she forgets about self And works every minute or gets put on the shelf. And when she has finished this term of her slavery, Just WHAT does this regent get for her bravery? Well, she enjoys her hard labor so don't analyze She just grows more witty and winsome and wise While she broadens in learning, and culture, and SIZE!

#### AMERICAN HERITAGE Violet Hembling Williams

Enthusiasm for American Heritage in Kansas continues on the upsurge. Of the 51 chapters with full reports, 81 programs were devoted to the subject, with more chapters indicating greater interest in local history than before-in persons, homes, buildings, and owned treasures. Questionnaires are splendid for tabulating figures. But to see snapshots, photos, ney pictures, articles, original compilations of material—that's something alive and interesting even to persons not directly involved. Some of you have taken special pride in gathering information for your reports, many arranged beautifully. Programs have shown history of various locales from "Early Ancestors of Riley County" to "The Gifts of Our Ancestors," of treasured memorabilia from "Old Pillow Shams" to "Aunt Hattie's Quilts," local historical places from "The Old Curtis Home" to "Old Churches in Our Area." And that does not begin to touch upon treasures of old glass and china, pewter and candle-making. Music, too, of particular areas has come forth like "Thurlow Lieurance: Kansas Composer of Indian Music" to "Songs of the Trail." Restoration of and visits to old homes has been the rule, including the giving of priceless furnishings. Visits to museum are noteworthy. In my own area, documents and manuscripts of the Revolutionary War, loaned by the Smithsonian, and covering the period from the Stamp Act in 1766 to the Inaugural of George Washington, 1789; 56 flags used by American and French regiments during the war, and a rare collection of miniature soldiers in authentic uniforms of American, French, British, loyalist, and Hessian troops was on display. Some chapters paid visits to Clara Barton's home; tothe one time Vice President Charles Curtis' home; to Eiesenhower's home, and homes where antiques are found. Many chapters found the DAR Magazine a source of material for American Heritage programs. Two of the outstanding reports this year were from Dodge City and Shawnee Mission chapters. The pictures taken, the articles written, the considerable research, the vast quantity of excellent material sent, and the variety of presentation in the reports for American Heritage should be a spur to all chapters to capitalize on the heritage which everywhere surrounds them. Whether or not any Division or National awards be forthcoming, or prizes given, you members of Kansas chapters who have stimulated such great interest in American Heritage are to be commended. These three years for which I have served as your State Chairman have been rewarding, even though we have scratched only the surface of what lies around us. Whomever your next chairman may be, she will be thrilled, as I have been, with your co-operation, your abounding interest in and for our Kansas Heritage.

#### AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Mrs. Wallace R. Decker

The participation in American History Month increased in all areas this year. 52 chapters reported American History Programs, 48 sponsored American History displays. There were 135 spot announcements used on radio and two on TV. Three members appeared on radio and three on TV. Approximately 358 letters were written to senators and congressmen urging legistlation make February American Histry Month permanently. The subject to the essay contest this year was "A Child of 1776." There were 774 contestants, 33 schools participating and 8 for the first time. The winners were: Fifth Grade: First place-Ann Lowder, Emporia Chapter; Second place-Mary Robins, Bettey Washington Chapter; Third place-Letitia Piper, Hannah Jameson Chapter. Sixth Grade: First Place-Nanette Roson, Betty Washington Chapter; Second Place: Shawnee Bridgeman, Emporia Chapter: Third Place-Nancy Jean Malir, Mary Wade Strother Chapter. Seventh Grade: First Place-Paige Chilton, Hannah Jameson Chapter; Second Place—Rene Marie Siefers, Courtney Spaulding; Third Place—JoAnn Wells, Martha Vail Chapter, Eighth Grade: First Place—Liz Meriwether, Dana Chapter; Second Place—Judy Podschun, Martha Vail Chapter. Third Place: Doug Bittel, Courtney Spaulding Chapter.

#### AMERICAN INDIANS Mrs. Einer T. Strand

We have come to the third and final year of this administration and it has proven to be the best year for us and our Indian friends. We have heard a great deal about militant groups and their unlawful acts during the past year. These actions have hurt the cause of those who truly wish to help the American Indian to help himself. However, let us bear in mind that this is a minority: we can best combat it by increasing our assistance to our two Christian oriented schools, and by giving assistance to deserving students. The two schools which depend heavily on us for assistance are St. Mary's School for Indian Girls and Bacone College. Early in the fall, I mailed seventy-five packets to Chapter Indian Chairmen, District and National Chairmen, two Indian schools, and State Chairmen. The packet contained the annual committed report (from Mrs. Carl Keitzman, National Chm.) and a letters of explanation accompanying a questionnaire, regarding each chapter's participation, to be returned to me. The response to date has been most gratifying-St. Mary's School for Indian Girls having been sent \$98.00 from sixteen chapters for the national project (the building of a recreation room at the school). Also 383 pounds of goods were sent to the thrift shop, boxes of jewelry, hundreds of Betty Crocker redeemable coupons and over \$35.00 in cash were all given. To Bacon College-Eleven chapters reported \$94.00 to the national project (salary of an instructr in silversmithing at the college). In addition, five chapters gave \$20.00 to use as desired and over 1,480 pounds were sent to the thrift shop. It is with the deepest of gratitude, for the second year, we announce that Mrs. George Trombold (Randolph Loving, Wichita) and Dr. George Herndon (Courtney-Spaulding, Hays) have given a full \$300.000 scholarship to Bacone College. Randolph Loving (Wichita) and Mr. Holstine (Bacone President) present their November meeting. Having also invided Wichita's other five chapter regents and state chairman, \$35.00 was given Bacone. Also Randolph Loving's chairman visited and purchased outstanding jewelry from Bacone. Several Wichita chapter members belong to and give financioal aid and many boxes of clothing to all the All American Indian Center, Wichita, Kansas. 17 chapters have had all-Indian programs and sent in money to be applied on scholarships and there have been many chapters having subscribed to Bacone and St. Mary's publications. The State Chairman

has been in close contact with both schools through written correspondence, long-distance phone calls and visits. An Indian report was given at the fall workshop. It will be of the utmost pleasure to preside at the Indian luncheon; March 21, at our State Conference. The speaker will be Kenyon Cull, Headmaster at St. Mary's.

# AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. A. E. Voigt

The year the chairman of the Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizens Committee was prud to approve 4 medals. The first Medal of Honor in Kansas was presented by Shawnee Mission Chapter to Mr. C. Y. Thomas and the 2nd Medal of Honor was given by John Haupt Chapter to U. S. District Judge George Templar. An Americanism Medal was given to Mr. Antonio Casada by Eunice Sterling Chapter, and to Dr. Carl Zacharias by Dodge City Chapter. These 4 men exemplified the qualities of outstanding, trustworthiness, service and patriotism toward the betterment of their communities. 28 of the 30 chapters reporting repeated the American's Creed at each meeting as requested by the National Chairman. 22 devotions, 1 meeting to our Americnism program, while 6 gave Americanism talks to other organizations. Refarding Citizenship, 237 manual were given to applicants; 138 Flags, 134 Welcome Cards and 381 Patriotic Pamphlets were presented to new citizens and 8 chapters sponsored teas. Working with young people was accomplished by sponsoring essays and contests, making arrangements to attend and take part in Naturalization Courts, and presenting flags and working with 4-H, Scouts and other groups. All of these activities helped promote the purpose of this committee: to strive to make better citizens of all. (Best Report: John Haupt; 2nd Best: Mary Wade Strother)

#### BICENTENNIAL, 1973-1974 Dorothy H. Byler

Forty six of the sixty three Kansas Chapters submitted a report of activity in the Bicentennial program during the year. Your State Chairman accompanied the Fall Conference Tour, visiting 3 of the Districts. Outstanding entertainment commemorated the events of the 1970's. Promotional material was mailed to each Chapter, to supplement information and suggestions made at the District Conference. Questionnaires with a two page letter of instruction were mailed to each Chairman or Regent early in the year. Thirty nine chapters reported contributions to the President General's "Gift To The Nation" project, with a total of \$1,409.50 being contributed. Nine Chapters received certificates from Mrs. Spicer for completing their projects before March 1, 1973. Eight chapters had special Bicentennial programs; many chapters had special displays featuring antique and/or comemmorative articles. Exceptionally good programs were reported; however, none were entered in the ally good programs were reported; nowever, none were entered in the Bicentennial Action, Contest for the year. Programs included: "Heritage of Church," "Colonial Newspapers," "How It All Happened," "Cradle of Liberty," "This Old Church of Ours," "Colonial Medicine," "Spies of the Revolution," "The Tea-less Tea Party," "Washingth Lady," "Make Local History Live," and, "A Dish of China Tea." Thirty seven chapters reported a full Bicentennial program for this year. The NSDAR Bicentennial project, under the direction of Mrs. Betty Kessler and her Committee, was the renovation of Shawnee Mission for the visit of our President General, Mrs. Donald Spicer. The Project has been submitted to the National Bicentennial Committee for consideration. Thank you for the privilege of being your Bicentennial Chairman.

#### BYLAWS Mrs. Paul N. Kent

As chairman of Bylaws for the Kansas Society DAR, I have attended a number of chapter meetings and have discussed problems concerning correct bylaws and parliamentary procedure. I urge each member to have a copy of "Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised" and to become familiar with its contents. The Bylaws of a number of our Kansas chapters have been examined, and suggestions concerning them have been given. I have corresponded with members and have answered questions relative to procedure and bylaws. It was a pleasure for me to serve the Kansas Society in this capacity, and I want to thank our State Regent, Mrs. Ralph Casey for the privilege of service she has made possible for me.

### CONSERVATION Mrs. Lennel I. Wright

Last year Kansas DAR won the Regional Award for having the best state report on Conservation in the South Central Division. We would have had an even better report this year but ten Chapters were to late for the National dead line. However we had a fine year. Forty-nine Chapters reported. Three thousand trees were planted. Thirty-five Chapters had conservation programs. Twenty Chairmen talked to other groups. Almost eleven tons of feed was put out for birds and wildlife. One hundred and three members wrote or talked to their legislators. Members helped Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H, and other youth groups to recycle paper, aluminum, and glass. Several Chapters helped with planting trees and shrubs, making "Hunting Safely" signs, and posters for Wildlife Week, arranging programs, providing transportation, and other conservation activities with young people. A DAR Conservation Award was given to an outstanding high school boy. Twenty-five dollars were given to a young conservation farmer. Other cash awards were given for conservation work. Beautification projects were begun or completed in parks, on campuses, historic sites, and elsewhere, District Conservationists, and University professors talked to a number of Chapters. Conservation magazine and literature were distributed to schools and community centers. DAR families give conservation treatment to thousands of acres of Kansas farm land.

### CONSULTING GENEALOGIST Mrs. James W. Smith

There have been fewer requests for your Consulting Genealogist this past year but each one has ben given as prompt attention as time permits. Genealogical research can be frustrating but with our combined efforts and suggestions we have helped several. Chapters who have Consulting Genealogists are fortunate to have members willing to help. others. It has been a pleasure to work together to increase membership.

#### DAR GOOD CITIZEN Miss Virginia Weisgerber

Reports on file show responses of some kind from 62 chapters, 59 of the sponsoring 170 WAR Good Citizens from 240 schools contacted. School consolidations still affect some areas. The State Board of Education still carries a note about this Prograam in its News Notes. Chapters report various ways of honoring sponsored Good Citizens, their mothers, and often their school sponsors: at meetings, teas, coffee, breakfasts, luncheons, picnics, dinners; in school Honor Assemblies and News

Media, with pictures; gifts, including the official DAR Good Citizen Pins and Certificates. Martha Vail awards a \$25 Series E Bond to its Chapter Representatives. Starting August, the State chairman sent letters, postals, and packaged materials for this State Contest. She helped in many ways, so chapters could participate. In spite of many difficulties, the Committee work is again successful! Formal announcement of top two winners was made at State Conference. First Place Winner, Kathy Dee Houghton, sponsred by Emporia Chapter and now entered in National Contest, received a \$100 Series E Bond and a State Good Citizen Pin. Runner-up, Rosanne Meier, sponsored by Courtney-Spalding, received an engraved Pewter Bowl. Kansas chapters and schools can be proud of the 170 girls, who gave of their time, effort, and thoughts in the 1973-1974 KADAR Good Citizens Contest. 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#### DAR MUSEUM Mrs. Frank Williams

The DAR Museum dates back to the very founding of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, October 18, 1890. It was the original project of the Society. For many years the DAR display was housed in the Smithsonian. Now with more than 50,000 items in the Museum, the recent accreditation by the Amerian Association of Museums, donations to continue the work of cataloging, the states of the DAR Museum becomes more important. It is truly the Show Case of the National Soceity. Especially fine are the Textile Collections. These include quilts, samples, needlework pictures etc. — the finest example of Early American Needlework in the Washington area. Kansas had 13 Chapters that reported DAR Museum programs. Chapter programs by John Haupt, Shawnee Mission and Arthur Barrett were outstanding. State owned and National slides and guest speakers were used. 59 Chapters donated \$72 to the Cataloging of DAR Museum collection and Period rooms. \$5.60 was given to the Museum Reference Library. During this administration one Chapter has paid for 9 books honoring members for special service. \$12.00 was donated to the General Museum fund and \$137.75 to Friends of the Museum. Total amount donated by Kansas Chapters \$225.35.

#### DAR SCHOOLS Mrs. Howard W. Haines

Your chairman wrote a personal letters to each Chapter Chairman or the Regent, enclosing a copy of the letter received earlier from Miss Amanda A. Thomas, National Chairman of the DAR Schools Committee. The letter was under the date of July 1973. In each of these letters was a copy of the company discount coupon that can be used by Crossnore School. The total of Kansas Chapter donations to the two DAR Schools and the five Approved Schools were given as reported in the DAR Magazine of June 1973. Miss Thomas' letter gave the addresses of all the schools, in order that further questions about them could be addressed directly. In January 1974, questionnaires were sent out to all chapters. The response has been quite good but is not 100%. suppose that would not be possible. Forty-nine chapters out of the sixtythree have reported. The following totals may not be entirely accurate, as they have not been checked with the State Treasurer, but I believe they are approximate. Tamassee is receiving a total of \$958.68, of which \$405.00 is scholarship money from Ninnescah and Fort Supply Trail. Kate Duncan Smith has a total of \$439.72 for their General Fund. The Approped Schools each received \$3.00 excepting Crossnore with \$38.00. A great many coupons have been sent to Crossnore and also Kate Duncan Smith, some chapters listing as many as 1149. Donations of clothing amounted to over 500 pounds, with total expense amounting to \$111.08 One chapter gave costume jewelry for resale in the Craft shop at Kate Duncan Smith School. Literature about the schools has been distributed at all DAR meetings and teas and will be on hand at the Conference. Many thanks to all of these fine Kansas Chapters for their continuous support of our DAR Schools.

Thanks to the generosity and long time interest in El Cuartelejo of one member of this committee this was accomplished with no cost to the Society. The restoration of the pueblo site is complete, and marked for visitors. The planned roads and trail paths, and the museum building at the entrance are awainting more funding for the project. As of March 1973, the El Cuartelejo Fund in the DAR Treasury was \$768.11. In this 1st report of the current committee we recommend that the fund be used for adequate flag pole and flag to be placed at the entrance. The program material on El Cuartelejo is available, the only charge is that it be returned promptly after use. It is easily mailed, and has proved to be popular for any group that wants an informative and entertaining program on an interesting phase of early Kansas history. Write Mrs. Robert Chesney at 145 N. #### FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. A. A. Schultz

September 7, I mailed each Chairman a letter and questionnaire, (questionnaire to be completed and returned to me Jan. 1, 1974). was a duplicate of the one from National. Our aims this year; education of the public on how and when to display the Flag. Also continuation of our project, each DAR own a Flag and fly it. All Chapters opened with the Pledge. 105 Flag programs given, 79 flags presented various groups, 60% of Chapters studied Flag Code and have given 400 Codes to schools and clubs. 8 incorrect Flag displays corrected and donated 9 braille flags to visually handicapped children. Publicity included 75 newspaper items, 20 radio programs and 15 TV programs. 14 Flag posters were given elementary schools and 2 city libraries. Flag literature given to 4-H clubs, Girl Scouts, Libraries, elementary schools, Women's Clubs, Church groups and Women's Relief Corps. 8 especially interesting reports received. For Flag Day Wichita Chapter had a display illustrating correct manner to dispose of flags so badly worn that they are no longer a fitting emblem to display. John Haupt exhibted American Flags from 1776-1973 during February at Kansas Historical Museum. Arthur Barrett, every member owns and flies her flag every day weather permitting. This report could not have been made without the cooperation of all chairman and regents. My Thanks to all. It has been a rewarding experience to serve in this capacity.

#### FRIENDSHIP FUND Mrs. Frank Williams

Established during the adminstration of Mrs. B. J. Lempenau, State Regent, the Friendship Fund was intended to assist aged, indigent members, who through no fault of their own are no longer able to pay their National and State dues. Thus this member may resign in good standing, rather than be dropped for non-payment of dues. If such a member is recommended by her Chapter that she is eligible, to this Committee, the Chairman then recommends that the National and state dues be paid from this fund. If the Chapter has paid these dues for that member, then the Chapter is reimbursed from the Friendship Fund. The Chapter Regent is obligated to get the member's resignation. This fund has not been used as much as expected since its establishment. Only one Chapter has requested use of this Fund this year.

#### FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM Mrs. Ralph H. Stewart

In December, 1973, a letter was sent by the State Chairman, Friends of the Museum Committee, KSDAR, to each of the 63 Kansas chapters, calling attention to the purpose of this committee, urging participation and requesting a report of the year, Feb. 1, 1973 to Feb. 1, 1974. Included in this letter was a form for reporting contributions in the eight

categories, listed by the National Chairman. Only 31 chapter chairmen or regents replied. Of this number, 20 reported contributions by individuals, totalling \$142.50. However, according to the State Treasurer's Report, \$175.75 had been received and credited to the Friends of the Museum, which indicated that not all gifts had been reported to the State Chairman. The National Museum is now accredited by the American Association of Museums — a great honor. By their gifts for acquisition of important artifacts and paintings the Friends of the Museum have contributed to this well-deserved recognition. In fact, this year, a very early and unusual painting of George Washington was purchased by this national committee. Chapter chairmen and your State Chairman hope their efforts have been partly instrumental in making the DAR Museum one of the most important in Bicenntennial America. It has been a privilege and a pleasure to serve on this important committee. The State Chairman is grateful to the National Chairman, the Kansas State Officers and the individual chapters for their cooperatin and help during the past three years.

#### GENEALOGICAL RECORD Flo B. Dickey

Kansas DAR has been credited with sending in nine hundred and forty-five pages of records to the WASHINGTON DAR Library this year. Announcement was made at the 1973 JAC Roundtable at Continental Congress of 1st place honors for largest percentage gain in both clubs and membership for Kansas JAC. Sixteen of the 38 contest entries were also announced as national winners. The five clubs sponsored by the Dodge City DAR were reorganized with 594 children participating during the present school term. Over 300 entries were received in state competition in the 1974 contest with the theme, "America's Future, My Responsibility." Over 60 entries were submitted for national competition. Chapters sponsoring contest winners were Desire Toby Sears, General Edward Hand, and Dodge City DAR. Chapters contributing to the State Contest Prize Fund this year were Abilene, General Edward Hand, Kanza, Ninnescah, Oceanus Hopkins, and Susannah French Putney. With the growth of Kansas JAC additional funds are needed each year for contest awards. Speaking about JAC, attending Continental Congress Roundtable, and working with the JAC chairmen and students has been rewarding. Thank you for the support you have given these three years of my chairmanship.

#### JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP Jean Niemann

This year our National Theme is "You Too'—'Can Do—For Junior Membership." Where do we begin? Begin on the Chapter level. EACH CHAPTER "CAN DO" FOR JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP—"CAN DO" their part by gaining new members—by selling Junior Jewelart jewelry and/or DAR Insignia notepaper items for the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. Only Bright of America can be a Chapter fund raising project. (The Chapter realizing the sales profit.) Therefore the profit of Bright of America sales does not give a Chapter Honor Roll credit. This year we lost 20 members because they had reached their 36th birthday. We now have 320 Junior members in the state. We contributed \$551.74 to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. We have 65 Chapters in the state with 14 Chapters reporting. We have 47 new Juniors. # SHAWNEE MISSION BICENTENNIAL REFURBISHINB PROJECT Mrs. Lewis Hanford Kessler

On March 12, 1973, this chairman wrote the Kansas Society DAR Executive committee concerning the deplorable condition of the wall paper and paint in our two rooms in Shawnee Mission. The Committee was most cooperative and they, the State Board of Management and the State Conference voted to refurbish our rooms as our State Bicentennial Upon my return home from Conference, I contacted Mr. Stanley Sohl of the State Historical Society. He, Mrs. Jerome Parenteau, and I met at the Mission, discussed the work to be done, went to a Wall paper and Paint Store to select samples. The samples went with me to Washington last April, and our State Regent, Mrs. Ralph Casey chose the peper she preferred. Back home, on April 30, Mrs. Parenteau and I met in the Mission with a contractor and signed the contract for removing the old wall paper, some repair work and hanging the new paper. On May 7, and S.O.S. call brought me to the Mission. At least a third of the plaster was soft and spongy, due to long time old roof leaks. An additional agreement was made for the removal of the old plaster and replastering. By June 1, the walls and ceilings were fresh with new paper of the type that might have been used during the period the Mission was in operation. The wood trim and cupboards had been given two coats of paint. We furnished the paint and Mr. A. N. Wilts, site Superintendent did the painting, at no cost to us. The interior of the fireplaces were painted black to denote smoke and much use. After the floors were cleaned and waxed, he moved back in and rearranged the furnishings in an attempt to create a home like lived in atmosphere. Our mannequins wig was cleaned and restyled; her legs removed to enable her to sit in a chair by the boy's cradle. Our rooms are quite complete except for lighting; lamps and candle sticks complete the decor. We also need a more suitbale dress of the period of 1830-1860 for the Aside from that, I strongly recommend that we accept manneguin. no more fabric articles such as quilts, shawls, or other clothing, Hand woven counterpanes, sheets and table linen. These items are very hard to care for and we really have no adequate way to display them My thanks to the Chapter Regent club for their generous contribution of \$55,00 to the Shawnee Mission Fund and the record number of 51 chapters who gave sums from \$1.00 to \$10.00 for a grand total this year of \$135.00. Madame Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve you and the Kansas Society.

## SHAWNEE MISSION CONSTITUTION DAY PILGRIMAGE Mrs. Lewis Hanford Kessler

Plans for the Shawnee Mission Day Pilgrimage on September 18, 1973 were in the making before the 1972 Pilgrimage had taken place. Our State Regent, Mrs. Ralph Casey had invited our President General, Mrs. Donald Spicer to be our honored guest and speaker. Mrs. Casey and I conferred with Mrs. Sommerville, Administrative Liason in the office of the President General while we were in Washington April 1973.

The summer months were filled with letter writing and plan making. Mrs. Kessler and I met with Mrs. Spicer at Kansas City International Airport on September 17, 1973 and escorted her to Alameda Plaza Hotel where I reserved a room overlooking the famous Country Club Plaza. State Officers called for her and escorted her to the new Crown Center Hotel. In a private dining room the State Officers honored the President General with a dinned party. The next morning, Mrs. Spicer was at Shawnee Mission at 9:30 A. M. to attend presentation ceremonies in the D.A.R. rooms, the 1812 rooms and then the 10:45 A.M. ceremony of the dedication of Bicentennial Refurbishing and the gift presentation ceremony. Mrs. Theodore H. Voegtli gave a handsome marble topped walnut commode, and Mrs. Ruby Graf a beautiful eight piece pitcher and basin set. Miss Caroline Walbridge presented a handmade in Paris in 1857, linen and lace handkerchief which had belonged to her great aunt, Ann Walbridge Merchant. This chairman presided at the ceremony and Mro. Casey accepted the gifts on behalf of the Kansas Society DAR and then presented them to the State Historical Society represented by Mr. Theo Sanborn, a past president. Mr. Sanborn also brought greetings from Gov. Robert Docking. The 12 noon luncheon was at the Old Mission United Methodist Church with an all time record of 257 persons attending. Elwin Shanahan, Secretary of State brought official greetings from the State of Kansas. Music was by vocal soloist, Mrs. Lee Neubert, and Mrs. John P. Durdee, pianist. A framed DAR Bicentennial Certificate of Appreciation was presented to Mr. and Mrs. A. N. The President General, Mrs. Spicer, made a wonderful address entitled, "With Vision and concluding event of the day was a reception and tea honoring the President General held at the home of a Mission VIII Mrs. Gerald Dickey, 3400 West 69th Street, Mission Hills. Approximately 200 attended. The table was beautifully decorated with a marble eagle and red, white and blue carnations. The food was delicious, beautiful and ample. Regents of the seven chapters in the Regent's Round table poured. Early the next morning, Mr. Kessler and I drove Mrs. Spicer to the airport for her return to Washington. # BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

#### ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

# ARTICLE II Objects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historic spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historic research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promise, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and accounting to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

## ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chaper: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

# ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Register, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Register, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter member shall hold at the same time

two officers carrying a vote of the State Conference. No state officer shall be elected for two consecutive terms in the same office. An officer who has served more than thalf a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be ineligible for any other state office except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent; until the expiration of at least one year.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seemes feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. Terms. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the Stae Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismisial. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

## ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National Officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall be taken.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter, signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Charimen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

#### ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the

National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio a member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending to the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and a Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committee and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secreary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee.. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersigned all orders drawn on the State Treasurer and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than three years.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Sction 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first Three Credential Blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of March, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapter, made into a directory form. She shall send to each Chapter Regent before February fifteenth, State Conference registration cards for the Regent and elected delegates. She shall notify each Chapter Regent

to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of th newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds and shall keep a separate account of all Student Loan Funds and receive payment of all Student Loan notes. Immediately after July first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members in good standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February first.

Section 8. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members-at-large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter, name and rank of ancestor; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrants requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimuate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of

this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library.

Section 11. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall furnish articles concerning the activities of the Kansas Society to leading newspaper in this territory. She shall be chairman of the State Press Relations Committee and Chairman of the Conference Press Committee. She shall keep a copy of each article published, for the files and shall send monthly reports to the National Chairman of Publicity at Washington, D. C.

Section 12. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them when transferring them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

#### ARTICLE VII

#### Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and Chairman of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Reporter and the entertaining District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers; the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state; the Honorary State Regent; the Chapter Regent; or in her absence the First Vice Regent or alternate and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

- (a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates.
- (b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members, Regent, and five delegates.
- (c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three Credential Blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meetings of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

#### ARTICLE VIII

#### State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the chapter Regent or in her absence, the chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting

members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

## ARTICE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

#### ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.60 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. These dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. On January fifteenth, the State Treasurer shall notify chapters which dues are in arrears. A chapter whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess chapter to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Necessary expenses of the State Officers and State Committees shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing and approved by the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

## ARTICE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and five members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Managers such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the Society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the Kansas DAR Student Loan and Scholarship Fund. This Fund is maintained by contribution from chapters and individuals and the interest on money loaned. The interest from this fund shall be used annually for scholarships.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Recording Secretary as Chairman, the State Regent, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officres.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credenials Committee composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secetary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amending and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions6 The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for considesation any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that have not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Press Relations. A Press Relations Committee composed of the State Reporter as Chairman and two members appointed by the State Regent shall prepare and distribute information for the press concerning patriotic and educational activities of the Kansas Society. This Committee shall be responsible for the preparation and mailing of the Kansas DAR News.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

#### ARTICE XII

#### Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resumes shall not be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent fo use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

#### ARTICLE XIII

#### Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District Secretary thirty days in advance to all chapters within the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each District shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The terms of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three terms.

Secion 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

#### ARTICLE XIV

#### Chapters

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers in or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year the chapter recording secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each state Chairman of National Committee, giving her name and address of chaper members on that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer before January thirteenth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report. Contributions received by chapter treasorer after January thirtieth shall be sent to the State Treasurer and shall be included in her supplementary report.

#### ARTICLE XV

#### Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

#### ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Commitee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

#### STANDING RULES

- No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Office, 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairman and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairman of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C. A. R. 1; District Director, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 2; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2; The President General, 1; The Kansas State Historical Society 1; the AR National Library 1; and the President of the State Officers Club, Chapter Regents Club and the State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.
- No. 2. The treasurer shall present each year a tabular list of chapter receipts to the Secretary which shall be printed in the proceedings.
- No. 3. Chairman of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privelege of the floor but may not vote.
- No. 4. No less than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.
- No. 5. The State Registrar shall furnish the publisher of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.
- No. 6. A sum not to exceed \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work.
- No. 7. Tweny-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.
- No. 8. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.
- No. 9. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.
- No. 10. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund and \$1.00 to the State DAR Library. \$1.00 to the Shawnee Mission Fund.
- No. 11. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted

to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (25c).

No. 12. The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its properties housed at Shawnee Mission.

No. 13. The State Society shall allocate \$25.00 annually to the El Cuartelejo Committee for the proper upkeep of the El Cuartelejo Monument in Scott County.

No. 14. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 15. A sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C. A. R. Society to be used for C. A. R. projects.

No. 16. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Ilistorical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file of the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 17. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

No. 18. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and the Chairman of the Mombership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 19. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 20. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 21. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Public Library, Dodge City, Kansas.

- (a) The Kansas Society shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Public Library, and shall provide a postal box in Dodge City, Kansas, for the use of the Dodge City Chapter Library Committee in receiving requests for loan of books and their return.
- (b) The Dodge City Public Library chall provide a private room with adequate work and storage space.
- (c) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
- (d) Rental of \$10 per month chall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library with the Dodge City Public Library.

No. 22. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

No. 23. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

- No. 24. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.
- No. 25. The State Regent shall appoint a State Mail Chairman, to take charge of central mailing of all group letters.
- No. 26. A \$10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be incligible to compete for three consecutive years.
- No. 27. The Runner up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an engraved silver-plated bowl as an award.
- No. 28. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests at the Kansas Luncheon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.
- No. 29. The State Regent shall appoint a committee at the closing session of the State Conference to review the minutes of the session.
- No. 20. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote of these delegates voting.

The cost of the News was about 34c per member during the past year.

#### HISTORIAN

Last year at State Conference is was decided to move the files of the Historian to the Dodge City Library. This was accomplished this year and I'm told by the Librarian that these materials have been used. There is a vast amount of information in these files about the chapters, the state and markers, and hopefully they will be used by more people for programs and information.

As State Historian I had the opportunity to speak before the Wichita Junior Chamber of Commerce and two Educational groups. These groups wanted to know just what DAR did, and I endeavored to bring them some information through "The DAR Story." I also visited five chapters bringing reports or programs.

47 chapters reported to the State Historian. 79 programs were presented—21 for adults and 58 for children. The anniversares of 39 men, 8 women and 45 events were celebrated. Broadcasts secured were 104 on radio and 26 on TV, 16 tours were conducted for adults and 15 for children. 23 DAR members graves were marked.

#### CONSTITUTION WEEK

I am delighted to report that we again had 100% chapters reporting this year on Constitution Week.

The year began with the pilgrimage to Shawnee Mission. It was especially well attended and the time the President General chose to make her official visit to Kansas.

From the reports returned to me 63 chapters urged display of the Flag of the United States of America. There were 683 inches of publicity, 93 articels, 34 pictures were secured in various publications. There were 469 minutes of radio time, 379 spot announcements and six programs. 97 minutes of TV time was secured with 68 spot announcements and 2 programs. Combined there were 145 displays in various establishments throughout the state, and 1368 pieces of Patriotic Literature was distributed to schools. Many fine window displays and programs were reported by the Chapters.

An unusual project is being planned by the Oceanus Chapter. They are establishing an oration contest in connection with Constitution Week. It will have to be held in the spring in order to fit with the schedule of the school. The subject of the contest will be "The Constitution of the United States."

WHEREAS, The only other available energy product, coal, of which we have an ample supply for years to come, is much more difficult and dangerous to mine, is much more expensive and, as presently used, causes air pollution, and

WHEREAS, Highway speeds for cars and trucks have been reduced to 55 miles per hour, and

WHEREAS, Inflation has reached an all time high and continues to

soar, bringing hardships to many and inconveniences to others;

RESOLVED: That individual members of KSDAR support the FED-ERAL GOVERNMENT by continuing to conserve on heating oils by lowering thermostate, by refraining from unnecessary electrical use, by reducing use of gasoline in cars through reduction of speed to 55 miles per hour, and by curtailing, other than necessary driving, to a reasonable extent, such as avoiding vacations requiring long distance driving, and by avoiding waste of many articles, especially food, through more conservative and intelligent buying and preparation.

Ownership technically was in the hands of the Wyandot Indian tribe of Oklahoma. The city gave the grounds occasional attention. Local historians have pleaded for—and some actually fought for—retention of the cemetery when other sought to acquire the property for commercial uses.

Center City plans made Huron Cemetery a vital link to the downtown mall, integrating it with grounds of the public library immediately east and literally "spilling" it down to street level on Minnesota Ave. Thousands of people have walked past the old high retaining will without realizing that an historic Indian cemetery was behind it near the busiest intersection in town.

Urban Renewal treatment will make it impossible to miss seeing the cemetery when the mall is completed and opened in late November.

Because of the cemetery's strategic and unique downtown location, Urban Renewal officials powwowed early in the planning stage with representatives of the Wyandot tribe and of the U.S. Department of Interior concerning the renewal of the burial ground.

Finally, U. S. Senator James B. Pearson notified the UR agency that Huron Cemetery had become a National Historical Site as of Sept. 3, 1971.

Spirits that may still be wafting around Huron Cemetery now can rest easy "as long as water flows and grass grows," to borrow a line from the original treaty that created the cemetery.

\*SHAWNEE MISSION MUSEUM—One of the earliest Indian missions in pre-territorial Kansas. A stopping point on the Santa Fe Trail.

MISSION HILLS—A drive through this senic residential area. \*Getting off bus at this location; please board the bus promptly.

#### The Indians Win . . . at Last

The last skirmish over the old Huron Indian Cemetery has ended in a public victory.

For 128 years since its establishment in 1843, the old burial ground has from time to time been threatened by commercial encroachment, tribal disinterest, neglect and abuse.

Effective Sept. 3 of this year, the cemetery became a national historical site when the National Park Service placed it on the National Register of Historical Sites. Thus the cemetery will be preserved as an historical Indian burial ground, and as such it will be maintained.

Early in the planning stage of the downtown Kansas City, Kansas Center City Urban Renewal project, it was recognized that Huron Cemetery was a potential asset, but that it was also a problem that would have to be unsnarled.


