

Preamble of the Constitution of the United States of America

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for common defense, promote the general welfare and secure the blessing of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

CONFERENCE RULES

All sessions will begin at the hour announced.

No one is to be seated during reports, speeches or musical numbers.

At all business sessions, members will wear their registration Badge along with blue ribbon for delegates, red ribbon for alternates, and green ribbon for non-voting members.
Any business unfinished at the time set for recess shall be resumed

at the next session at the point when the recess was taken.

Only delegates have the privilege of the floor. 5.

No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes at one time, except by the consent of the Conference.

Only the Chair is to be addressed in making reports. 7.

In making reports time allocated for State Officers is not limited. Committee Chairman 4 minutes, District Directors 2 minutes, Chapter Regents 2 minutes.

If both the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent are absent, the report

shall be filed, unless otherwise ordered.

- 10. All motions shall be written and signed by the movers and seconder, and handed to the Recording Secretary before action is taken.
- 11. A timekeeper will be appointed. All speakers shall conform to the ruling when time is called.
- 12. A typewritten copy of each and every report must be filed with the Recording Secretary as it is presented, and a copy of such report also handed to the State Regent.
- 13. If the Officers, Chairman or Appointee is not present her report shall be filed for printing in the Official Preceedings, unless otherwise ordered.
- 14. All resolutions shall be in the hands of the Resolutions Committee not later than Thursday, March 20, 1975.
- 15. Any chairman or individual who had a table display or exhibit will please attend to removal of all materials at the close of the Conference. Do not leave this detail for the hostess chapters.
- 16. Members who appear on the program or are making reports will always please occupy front seats.
- 17. Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

MINUTES OF SATURDAY, MARCH 22, 1975

morning session.

The minutes of the Friday Session were read by the State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Fayette E. Rowe, and approved as corrected. The report of the Credentials Committee was as folows: 1 National Officer, 2 HOnorary State Regents, 8 State Officers, 32 Chapter Regents, 117 Delegates, 40 Alternates, 34 Members, 5 Visitors. Total 240. The report was accepted upon the motion of Mrs. Luther Glenn. Mrs. R. E. byler, State Corresponding Secretary, read correspondence from Mrs. H. E. Stang, El Cuartelejo Chairman, regarding the acceptance of a flag and the repair of the flag pole at El Cuartelejo.

Recommendations approved by the Board of Management on Thursday morning, March 20, 1975, were presented to the conference and were

approved as follows:

1.\$1,000 from the General Fund to be invested. The interest from this investment to be depostied in the General Fund and credited to the Roster Fund for publishing and printing the next Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution Roster.

2. To revise Standing Rule No. 6 to read as follows: A sum of \$750 shall be allowed the State Regent in addition to office expenses for carrying on her

work.

3. The Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall provide a Flag of the United States of America for El Cuartelejo and pay for the repair of the flag pole through funds of the society allocated to El Cuartelejo.

4. A motion for an addition to the Standing Rules as follows: The Kansas Society DAR shall place a \$25 ad in the All States issue of the DAR Magazine.
5. That the conference accept the nomination of Mrs. Walter M. Ostenberg

to fill the unexpired term of State Librarian.

6. That the following inactive funds be deleted from the State Treasurer's accounting books: ROTC Award, Santa Fe Trail, J. W. Smith Memorial Fund,

and the Eleanor Spicer Memorial Fund.

The resignation of Mrs. Richard Bird as State Librarian was accepted and the vacancy declared, and Mrs. R. E. Byler, State Corresponding Secretary, read the by-laws pertaining to filling a vacancy in a state office. The State Regent, Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, appointed Mrs. Lloyd Miller and Mrs. Villa Stoltz to act as tellers at the mandatory election to fill the vacancy, and Mrs. Walter M. Ostenberg was duly elected to fill the unexpired term of State Librarian.

Mrs. Clarke T. Jackson, State Treasurer, read the estimated budget-for-1975-76 approved by the Finance Committee, and it was moved and seconded the conference accept the estimated budget. The Hazel Howes Fund was placed back on the treasurer's books. *See Estimated Budget at close of

Saturday minutes.

Mrs. Č. W. Wheeler, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented the Resolutions for consideration of the conference and they were adopted as listed following the Saturday minutes. Mrs. George Millbank, Chairman-of-the By-Laws Committee, presented changes in the by-laws which were adopted by the conference. **See revisions to the by-laws and standing rules

She urged each member to write to the Governor and their Congressman expressing disapproval of the bill. RESOLUTIONS OF KSDAR 1975 ENERGY, SUPPLY, PRODUCTION AND CONSERVATION

WHEREAS, For many years our major elements for obtaining energy for transportation, production of electricity and the heating of buildings and homes were plentiful, and

WHEREAS, Oil and natural gas were discovered in large quantities with

little cost and no pollution, and

WHEREAS, In the last twenty years or so, these two products have been used increasingly greater than produced in this country, causing us to be more and more dependent on oil purchased and shipped into the United States, and

WHEREAS, These countries suddenly and unexpectedly increased their cost as much as 400%, or more, creating an energy crisis, making it imperative to find alternative sources of supply, reducing our use of imported

oils, either or both, and

WHEREAS, Increased production of energy producing fuels within our shores involves the returning of stepped-up mining and use of coal, the exploration and production of crude oil within our own country, the exploration of obtaining crude oil from shale in sufficient quantities and at a reasonable cost, the building of nuclear plants, some of which are already under construction, and

WHEREAS, Industry, the landlord and the householder play an important part in conserving fuel oil by reducing temperatures to a reasonable figure at

WHEREAS, The use of gasoline, the most important product obtained from crude oil, is already largely the responsibility of the average citizen, and

WHEREAS, Consumption may be reduced by forming car pools for driving to and from work, church, school and other public gatherings, and by

arranging shorter vacation trips,

RESOLVED, That individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHT-ERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION encourage industries, merchants, landlords, householders and private citizens to do their part in putting into effect the suggestions contained herein, in order to balance our exports and imports and to increase the value of the American dollar in the world market.

PROTECT THE FARMER

WHEREAS, If farmers are to compete on the world market for production, equipment and supplies, especially chemicals, fertilizer and machinery, and WHEREAS, Farmers cannot be expected to maintain full production of

any commodity without free access to world markets for that commodity, and WHEREAS, It is therefore imperative that the President and/or appropriate government officials give concrete assurance prior to planting

time that embargoes will not be applied during the ensuing year, RESOLVED, That the individual members of the KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION be urged to write to their Congressmen urging that farmers must be allowed free access to world market prices without fear of embargo or strict licensing of exports so as to cripple the free trade concept.

WHEREAS, The Soviet SAM 6 (Surface to Air Missile) is superior to

every U.S. missile in its class, and

WHEREAS, The recent Arab-Israeli war demonstrates the increased

importance of anti-tank and anti-aircraft missiles,

RESOLVED, That KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION members support whatever improvements necessary for competing with the USSR in Nuclear Weapons, Air Power, Sea

Power and Land Power, and

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY TO THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE

AMERICAN REVOLUTION

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 2. ELIGIBILITY.

(a) To be eligible for the office if the State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No

state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least a year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 3. DUTIES.

It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after their election and no later than November 1st, to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State, if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter, signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

ARTICLE VI **Duties of Officers**

Section 2. STATE REGENT.

(Line 7) She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. Section 3. STATE VICE REGENT.

The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

ARTICLE VI - Duties of Officers.

Section 5. STATE RECORDING SECRETARY.

(Line 5) (a) She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent.

(Line 7) (a) She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than **one** year.

Section 7. STATE TREASURER.

(Line 11) She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. Immediately after May first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members in good standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February first.

Section 11. STATE REPORTER.

(Delete Section 11 as it was, and substitute the following paragraph) The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News", and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the Conference Press Committee.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 2. STATE CONFERENCE.

The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by The State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. VOTING MEMBERS.

The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 5. CHAPTER DELEGATES.

(Under "Explanatory Table,---"

12 to 49 - Regent and two delegates - Vote 3

Section 6. ALTERNATES.

The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 2. DUES.

The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.60 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. A chapter whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 4. OFFICE EXPENSE.

(Delete Section 4 in its entirety and substitute the following paragraph). Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. FINANCE.

A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and three members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget as approved by the STate Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the Society.

Section 2. STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP.

The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Student Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals, and interest on monies invested for this purpose.

Section 3. PRINTING AND STATIONERY.

The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Regent as Chairman, and the State Recording Secretary, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 7. PUBLIC RELATIONS.

(Delete Section 7 in its entirety, and substitute the following paragraph). The Public Relations Committee shall consist of a chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an ex-officio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 2. MEETINGS.

(Line 4)

The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent.

ARTICLE XIV Chapters

Section 3. COMMITTEE CHAIRMEN.

Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of a National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. CHAPTER TREASURER.

Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January first in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

(The last sentence of Section 4 is to be deleted)

ARTICLE XV

Parliamentary Authority
The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

No. 2 Delete

No. 5. The State Registrar shall furnish the Editor of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.

No. 6. A sum of \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work, in addition to her office expense.

No. 21 The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

(a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.

(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.

(c) Rental of \$100 a year shall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library. It shall be housed with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the Dodge City Recreation Center, making it a valuable

resource center.

No. 22 A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and the Public Relations Chairman, to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

No. 25. Delete.

No. 27. The Runner-up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an appropriate gift as an award.

No. 29. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session of the State Conference to review the minutes of the session.

No. 31. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before August 1 by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, subject to the approval of the State Regent.

No. 3) KSDAR shall place a \$25 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR Magazine.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

This has been a year of learning just what is required of the State Historian. September 17, 1974, Constitution Day at Shawnee Mission was very ably directed by Mrs. Forrest Gilmour, Chairman, and was well attended. During October, the DAR Tour was very enjoyable. Early in 1975, questionnaires were mailed to all 63 chapters with the following results: Americana Collection, 18; 85 programs for adults; 13 for children; 85 DAR members marked, and there were 3 restorations of historical places, the main one being the marking of Indian Rock by Mary Wade Strothers Chapter of Salina. Read the current KSDAR News for details about this.

In November, the KSDAR Library sent the very lovely Santa Fe Trail Memory Book compiled by Grace Ostenberg, former Historian, along with a copy of the 'Marking the Santa Fe Trail' published in 1915 by KSDAR, telling about the 96 markers installed along the Old Trail during 1906-07. The memory book was displayed at Chapter meetings in Wyandotte and Johnson Counties, and was found to be most interesting and instructive. The book not only shows photos of the markers, but has maps of the Kansas counties. There are pictures of grave markers of our first State Regent and first State Vice-Regent.

The Hamilton County Historical Society of Syracuse, Mrs. W. E.LaRosh, Historian, reported under date of October 6, 1974, that the DAR Santa Fe Trail marker has been relocated in front of their building located on Highway 50. The marker was formerly on the Santa Fe Railroad grounds near buildings that were scheduled for demolition, and it was feared that the

monument would be damaged.

On writing to the Kansas State Historical Society in regard to establishing the Charles Curtis home as a National Historic Monument, the reply was that such a step would be impractical at this time.

It has been a great pleasure for me to have the privilege of serving as your

A letter from Mrs. Joel A. However, one of the main requirements for any kind of rating on the Division Level is 100% participation by the chapters. PLEASE, Chapter Regents, get your Constitution Week Chairmen to send in the questionnaire to me, which is provided in the Omnibus Mailing from National. Also, let us have more proclamations by city and state officials, and many more inches of publicity, to say nothing of Radio and Television coverage. The scrapbook is on display on the table of exhibits, so you can see what sort of thing is needed.

As this is a September project, we must start planning immediately. It is less than six months away, as we listen to these reports at State Conference.

Lueers of Marysville on the subject of 'John Paul Jones,' sponsored by Arthur Barrett Chapter; Julie Frobish of Sixth grade of Columbus, on 'Benjamin Franklin' sponsored by Dana Chapter; for the seventh grade, Terry Ebanks wrote on the subject, 'John Quincy Adams,' sponsored by Betty Washington of Lawrence; and the eighth grade entry is 'Nathan Hale' written by Renee Schmidt of Hays, and sponsored by Courtney Spalding. These four essays have been sent to Mrs. Leon Anhaiser, Vice-Chairman for the South Central Division. Our non-DAR judges, all former school teachers, experienced more than a little difficulty in—choosing the best for each grade, as there were so many outstanding ontries. A good many of the sponsoring chapters recognized their own best entries with History Medals and Certificates.

Many of the chapters reported celebrations of American History month besides the Essay Contest with programs and displays. The spot announcements sent out by Mrs. Edward J. Norris, Vice Chairman in charge of the Essay Contest, were used for radio, television, high school loud

speaker, classroom and newspapers.

46 Kansas Chapters submitted names of Chairmen of their American Indians Committees to your State Chairman. As of March 1, 1975, 39 Chapters replied to questionnaires sent by your State Chairman, reporting on contributions made to the American Indians. The results are as follows: BACONE COLLEGE: Eight chapters contributed to the National Project - (a Chair in Silversmithing) a total of \$45.00.

Two scholarships were given. One \$400.00 reported by Mrs. George Trombold, Randolph-Loving, Wichita, and one given by Miss Geneva Herndon, Courtney-Spalding, Hays, for \$200.00. This is the third year these ladies have contributed toward scholarships, and we are extremely grateful.

Fifteen packages were sent to the Thrift Shop, weighing 1,214 pounds,

valued at \$459.30.

Miscellaneous gifts totalling \$94.00 were also reported.

ST. MARY'S SCHOOL FOR INDIAN GIRLS: Eight chapters contributed to the National Project - (a bus), a total of \$44.00.

One scholarship was given by Mrs. A. M. Bogren, Courtney-Spalding,

Hays, in the amount of \$250.00.

Fourteen packages were sent to the Thrift Shop, weighing 384 pounds, valued at approximately \$549.00.

Miscellaneous gifts valued at \$131.90 were reported.

Fifty unwrapped Christmas gifts with ribbons and wrapping materials were also sent to St. Mary's.

Various other gifts, such as trading stamps, were sent.

The sum of \$46.50 was sent in to the American Indians Fund.

Numerous Wichita Chapters reported having made many contributions to the Mid-America All-Indian Center, Inc., with offices at 1650 East Central. Wichita. This is a non-profit organization which will become a National Indian Center. At the confluence of the Big and Little Arkansas Rivers in downtown Wichita, it will provide facilities to make Wichita's Indian Center a national resource for Indian culture, research studies, and information. It is anticipated that the building will be completed in April, 1976, and will be ready to accommodate the public for Wichita's Bicentennial Celebration in June, 1976.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUALS Mrs. Raymond Lees

The Americanism Chairmen who reported their activities are to be congratulated. All have Pledged Allegiance to the Flag and recited The American Creed at each meeting. Others list them in yearbooks. 39 programs have been given on Americanism, both to DAR Chapters and to other groups. New and prospective citizens have been entertained with teas on Washington's Birthday and Flag Day, been guests at regular meetings, students from Arabia, Persia, and China have spent vacations in DAR homes, and patriotic motion pictures were provided. Wives at Schilling Air Base were entertained, and some were helped in becoming citizens. Radio publicity amounted to about 2½ hours, plus the notices of regular meetings. 997 inches of publicity included photographs. Nine thousand six hundred and thirty-four pounds of feed were put out for our birds and wildlife by our women. Six conservation scholarships were given to our youth. One membergave \$100.00 for visual education equipment to the Conservation District to be used for conservation education in the Sedgwick County Schools. Eighty-eight of our women in their individual capacity wrote to her respective legislator on conservation issues. Eight subscriptions to 'Ranger Rick' were presented to individual youths by one member; also subscriptions to the 'National Wildlife' was presented to several of the local libraries. Much terracing was being done and maintained by our rural members. A DAR Conservation medal was given to a school teacher for doing outstanding Conservation educational work in a classroom. DAR MUSEUM AND FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM Barbara J. Kerr

The DAR Museum dates back to the very founding of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, October 18, 1890. It was the original project of the Society. For many years the DAR display was housed in the Smithsonian. Now with more than 50,000 items in the Museum, the recent accreditation by the American Association of Museums, donations to continue the work of a cataloging, and all other donations to the Museum become much more important. This accreditation is a great honor indeed. The Friends of the Museum have contributed many important artifacts and paintings through the contributions made to these funds. I am grateful for the fine response by the chapter chairpersons and the regents this year, and look forward to the coming two years with much optimism. A letter will be sent to each chapter following our state conference with some ideas about the Museum committees and how we in Kansas can be a part.

A report was sent to each of the 63 Kansas chapters by the state chairperson for these two committees requesting a report to cover the year: February 1, 1974 to February 1, 1975. This form included places for reporting contributions of all types to national categories or local interest. Of those 63 chapters, 49 chapter chairpersons or regents responded. Of this number, reports on contributions totalling \$33.00 to Friends of the Museum and \$66.00 to the Museum fund with several chapters reporting contributions of reference books (for example Byrd Prewitt contributing the Land Series books with a \$60.00 cost) to several state libraries, and 11 chapters reporting speakers or state or national slide programs on the DAR Museum.

As I have already mentioned, I am extremely pleased by the fine response from the chapters and trust that we can make even greater contributions in this next year-the year of the United States Bicentennial!

DAR SCHOOLS Mrs. Esther Johnson

Each DAR chapter was sent a questionnaire for reporting contributions to the schools. Less than half the chapters responded. The questionnaires were sent early because the need for money was urgent. This could have been the reason for the lack of response. The following totals were reported: Tamassee receiving \$627.58, of which \$300.00 is scholarship money from Ninnescah and Tomahawk; Kate Duncan Smith a total of \$219.58 for their General Fund. The Approved Schools each received \$5.00, excepting Crossnore with \$30.00. Donations of clothing amounted to over 800 pounds with the expense \$43.00. Literature was on hand at the Conference, along with items to order from Tamassee. Mr. Tyson, the Executive Secretary of Kate Duncan Smith, died November 27, 1974. Mr. Charles Hugh Edmonds of Grant, Alabama, was selected as the Executive Secretary of the school. He is a 1963 graduate of KDS, has a B.S. degree from Jacksonville University, and a M.A. degree from the University of Alabama. The DAR Schools should be every chapter's favorite project. Sixteen chapters reported programs, Many thanks to all the Kansas Chapters for their continuous support. Thank you State Regent for this appointment.

EL CUARTELEJO Mary B. Stang

Since the State of Kansas has taken over the care of the monument, there is very little to report on El Cuartelejo. It was brought to the attention of the Society the absence of a flag at the site. They do fly a flag at the Maintenance Area of the Park. Mr. Rickard wrote, 'Due to the fact that the National holidays are our busiest

time, and also that we fly the flag at our Maintenance Area, and the condition of the flag pole at El Cuartelejo, I recommend that no action be taken on this matter.'

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS Mrs. Woodrow Dew

The Junior American Citizens in Kansas again emphasized the National Contest, which had as its theme, 'My Birthright-Freedom.' There were 320 entries in the 1975 contest. Twenty-eight were judged as state winners and were submitted for national competition. Winning contestants were sponsored by Sarah Steward Chapter, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Maydew, Directors, and General Edward Hand Chapter, Mrs. John Oakleaf, Chairman.

Twenty-seven chapters contributed \$45.00 to the National JAC Prize Fund and 24 chapters gave \$44.00 to the Kansas one. My special thanks to these chapters for this increase in monies available. Token awards were purchased for the 1975 state winners and any national winners can also be honored. Please note, though, that Chapter Treasurers should clearly mark their

checks and report forms as to whether their funds are to go to the state or national funds.

It has been a pleasure for me to begin working with Junior American Citizens. I've had interest from several new sources, and so hope that the 1975-76 year will be even more successful.

Of the sixty State entries in the 1974 contest, ten came; none were

National winners.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP Mrs. James R. Decker

The Junior Membership Committee started the new administration with the theme 'We've Done It. Let's Support It.' Over the past few years the Juniors have initiated some wonderful projects through the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. This fund provides scholarships for students at Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee, and essential medical and dental treatment. It also supports the new Junior Membership Arts and Crafts. This year we are committed to approximately \$35,000.

The Helen Pouch Memorial Fund is maintained through the sales of jewelry and Insignia notepaper. Kansas Juniors are working to promote this project through their Conference Bazaar and also Chapter sales. Kansas sales of jewelry and notepaper, plus contributions this year, amounted to \$185.43. 1974 Bazaar profits of \$450.44 were submitted by the past chairman, which

gave us a total of \$635.87.

Kansas now has 281 Juniors of which 27 are new this year. Twenty-four Juniors were lost when they reached their 36th birthday. Also reported were two resignations, one dropped, and one transfer out.

Kansas has one Junior serving as a National Vice-Chairman. Four State Chairman positions are held by Juniors. One is a Chapter Regent, 15 are

Chapter Officers, and 27 are working as Chapter Chairmen.

Only four of the forty-four chapters reporting listed any type of Junior Membership Program presented. One was very appropriately entitled 'What is a Junior.' Another Chapter reported that their Juniors hostessed a Christmas Luncheon and Program for the members. I hope next year more chapters will report on this question, giving more ideas on Junior involvement.

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LINEAGE RESEARCH Mrs. J. F. Parenteau

The summer packet letter from the National Chairman, Mrs. Edward Lynn Westbrooke, cautioned the chapter chairmen that this committee would only assist PROSPECTIVE MEMBERS and not help on supplementals. She reminded them of the kits that are available from the Lineage Research Office at National Headquarters for \$2.44. She emphasized that all requests for help must be submitted on the lineage charts available free from the same office.

Forty chapters appointed Lineage Research chairmen and sent their names and addresses to me. Near the end of January, return postal card questionnaires were sent to the chairmen, and to the Regents of the chapters without chairmen. Fifty-four chapters responded with a report of the work

that they had accomplished.

The State Chairman received requests for help from ten chapters in Kansas, but none from out of state. The chapter chairmen report that they sent 33 requests to Washington and three to the chairmen of other states. Only six chairmen in Kansas received requests for help from other states. They all report that they have had good luck with programs, workshops, and seminars, and have held 46 of them. The chairmen report that they have aided 161 potential members and say that 69 new members were acquired through the efforts of this committee.

It has been a real pleasure to work with you, Mrs. Johnson, and your fine board, and it is hoped that next year's report will be even better.

MEMBERSHIP

Mrs. Walter B. Norris

Letters were sent to all chapters the early part of October and report forms in January. Reports were received from 51 chapters.

Since your chairman's national report stated that report of the National Membership Committee can be based only on figures from the Office of the

Treasurer General as of February 1, 1975, your chairman did not ask for a

membership count report.

Summary of Kansas report is: 129 Revised Membership Outline Guides were distributed in the chapters, 11 chapters distributed the Prospective Members Form, 34 chapters reported that their libraries had a copy of the DAR Patriot Index and Supplements. Methods of increasing membership were: newspaper coverage, personal contact, invitation to special meetings of eligible persons, relatives, assisting prospective members with their research, use of Patriot Index and Supplements and the 'Pot of Gold' Genealogical Societies. Courtney-Spaulding gave a program on DAR at a Genealogical Society meeting, thus creating interest in DAR for those working on their lineage.

Two letters were received from out of state informing your chairman of prospective members. Chapters in the towns were notified of these

prospects.

The Certificate from the National Chairman of Membership Committee for the greatest per cent net increase in membership goes to Smokey Hill with 15 per cent. Mrs. Glenn Maze, Regent, is their Membership Chairman. Esther Lowrey came in second with 7.6 percentage.

NATIONAL DEFENSE Marilyn Freese

Thirty-seven chapters reported their participation in the work of this committee. All chapters reporting assigned one entire meeting to a National Defense topic. Panel discussions and guest speakers chose topics such as freedom, inflation, metric system, and the Declaration of Independence. Chairman make National Defense material available at chapter meetings and some also distribute literature to schools, libraries, and interested individuals; mainly from the 'National Defender.' Twenty-one Good Citizenship Medals were presented, fifteen ROTC Medals, and \$44.00 was donated to Dollars for Defense.

Conservation of natural resources, ERA, detente, socialized medicine, United Nations, and inflation were the National Defense subjects of most interest to members of the chapters who reported. I am pleased to learn about the dedicated work being done in the chapters on behalf of National Defense, and thank you for assigning me to this committee, Madam Regent.

I'm pleased and happy and proud to tell you that of the 24 submitted, Kansas received five Outstanding Yearbook Awards, and six Blue Ribbon Awards.

We hope to receive the National Outline early this spring, and by greater attention to details, perhaps we can double or triple those awards in 1976! Just remember our Kansas motto: 'To the Stars Through Difficulties!'

PUBLIC RELATIONS Mrs. Bill E. Smith

Your State Chairman brings you greetings and wishes to Welcome the new Chapter Chairmen who will be working with her for the first time this year. I am returning to this appointment - thus beginning my fourth term. In the Fall, all Chapters were contacted and after some effort-100% participation resulted. In January, a letter and card were sent to all Chapters and 60 out of the 63 responded, giving me a 95% total. After reviewing the reports sent in, I wish to mention Arthur Barrett Chapter from Marysville, Kansas, made the -most complete report in TELLING THE DAR STORY. We totaled 5,276 printed inches - 766 articles and 179 pictures - our Radio publicity was 9 hours and 26 minutes with 239 broadcasts. Television averaged two hours including the interviews held during the Conference. No one participated in the Feature Story Contest at National. I am hoping this year will bring many Feature Stories due to the Bicentennial Celebration.

Our work is a tremendous task, for our goal is to create interest in DAR bytelling a complete DAR story - as you all know we do stress - KNOW DAR! DO DAR! AND TELL DAR! This broadens the scope of Public Relations to include every member and friend of the National Society. While the Public Relations Committee remains primarily responsible to the basic tasks assigned to it, here is a challenge for all to acquire knowledge of the DAR, to actively participate in the DAR Program, and to Tell the DAR Story. Remember material is available at National Headquarters for Chapter use to inform the public about our Society. We must at all times give a clear, concise and constructive picture of the Whole DAR. The official voice of the DAR on all issues is that of the President General. Others speak merely-as-

individuals.

Remember the work of our Committee is closely dependent upon all of the other Committees - We advocate publicizing those attending Conference and some 100 Newspapers were sent stories of the 77th State Conference. A number of Chapters have reported the story was carried to date we have had two stories, two TV broadcasts, and one Radio interview during Conference. SERVICE FOR VETERAN PATIENTS

Frances Vining Vendy [Mrs. S. M.]

Before February 15, 1975, I had heard from 40 out of 63 chapters reporting much activity this year rogarding Veteran patients in VA Hospitals: Kansas City, Missouri, Leavenworth, Topeka and Wichita, Kansas; five nursing homes and Irwin General Hospital, Ft. Riley, besides private hospitals and private homes. Many special parties and entertainment were organized for the Veteran patients, such as, Christmas music, bingo parties, and patriotic days being commemorated. The easiest way to report all the gifts and thoughtfulness is to list them in a sort of alphabetical way: after-shave lotion; bibs; books (715 paper backs); braille flags; bread (nut); cup cakes and tiny flags (810); cards (Christmas and playing); coffec; candy; cookies (74 dozen); coats and men's suits (value \$300.00); carpet rags; fruit; lap robes (93); money for canteen books (\$81); magazines (current, DAR, National Geographic); newspaper; punch; puzzles (258); paints; peanuts; pies; poinsettas; scuffies (20 pair); socks; stamps (317 ounces); shaving cream; shampoo; shirts (19); toothpaste; talcum powder; Vitalis; plus 20 pounds of assorted gifts; and \$10.00 donation on a special chair bed.

VETERAN ADMINISTRATION VOLUNTEER SERVICE Frances Vining Vendy [Mrs. S. M.]

I have volunteered my services each Thursday in the name of DAR in the Nursing Home Care Unit at VA Center, Leavenworth, Kansas, I have also been appointed by our President General, Mrs. Henry Stewart Jones, as VAVS Representative, and will need some Deputies to attend VAVS meetings which are held four times a year, always on third Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. at the VA Center, Leavenworth, Kansas, September, November, February and April. My first meeting was February 19, 1975. I was given two lists: one listed VA needs for the hospital and the other listed volunteer services needed by individual people who can give even a few hours a week, or month, in whatever department you choose. Mr. Reid, of the volunteer section, is very happy that DAR is being recognized and getting credit for the hours of service, gifts donated, etc. He claims that many DAR ladies have been putting in precious hours and effort and some other organization has been getting credit for it. Also, I was given what they call 'a book' and it gives some patterns and instructions for lap robes, carpet rags, scuffies, etc. All the pages mentioned herein can be obtained by writing to Mr. Reid, Volunteer Services, VA Center, Leavenworth, Kansas, 66048. I have some copies for any Kansas Chapter that wants to take one for future reference. DAR Chapters should contact the VA Center closest to them as their needs may be different than needs of VA Center, Leavenworth, Kansas. Not very many volunteer hours can be counted at this time and it takes more than one person to get the job done. By 1976 Kansas should have a good report regarding and volunteer hours. CONTINENTAL CONGRESS

'Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might.' Ecclesiastes 9:10

This was the theme chosen by Mrs. Henry Stewart Jones one year age when she was elected President General, Daughters of the American Revolution.

The Society now mourns the passing of Sara Roddis Jones on April 8, 1975. Memorial services for Sara Roddis Jones and Honorary President General, Eleanor Spicer, (Mrs. Donald), were held in Constitution Hall on Sunday afternoon April 13th. The National Society memorialized 3,700 Deceased Members during these Memorial Services.

The 84th Continental Congress opened on Monday evening, April 14, in its usual impressive manner, with Mrs. Wakelee R. Smith, President General,

presiding.

After the introduction of the distinguished Daughters and guests assembled on the platform, Helen Margaret White Terrell of Oak Ridge, Tennessee, was presented as the National Outstanding Junior Member of 1975.

Dr. Carl S. Winter, one of America's foremost speakers and humorists, was the principle speaker for the evening. His address, 'What's Right with

America, gave the Daughters food for thought.

On Tuesday morning, the President of the United States, Gerald R. Ford, addressed a crowded Constitution Hall. The President told the Daughters and guests that he knew the DAR well as his Mother had been a devoted member and that he is a member of the SAR. Most of the President's address was devoted to keeping america strong and a leader among the nations of the world

The speaker for the National Defense evening, was the Secretary of the Army, Howard H. Callaway, who gave the Daughters a 'Report on Today's Army.' He concluded by saying that the world is hungry for American leadership, and the DAR and Today's Army should both be a part of the regeneration.

During the reports of National Committee, it was announced that the winner of the NSDAR American History Scholarship was John Randall Shannon of Napton, Missouri. The recipient of the 1975 DAR Good Citizens Award was Susan Bradford of Grant, Alabama, a student at Kate Duncan

Smith DAR School.

Thursday was voting. Mrs. Edward Lynn Westbrooke of Arkansas was elected, First Vice President General. Three Vice Presidents General were elected.

In honor of the late President General, Sara Roddis Jones, the Daughters voted to finance a mural for the U.S. Capitol. It will be located in the East Corridor of the House of Representatives side, and will consist of 14 historical

vignettes.

On Thursday evening, Bishop Fulton J. Sheen addressed the Daughters. The only word to describe the address was 'Spellbinding.' Using no notes, Bishop Sheen told us that it was impossible just to give a talk since we are all too concerned about our country. He went on to state that there are three ways to preserve our nation: Our Rights, Duties, and Traditions. We can rebuild America by stressing the origin of our rights and liberty, he stated. He also reminded us that we cannot have a right without a duty.

Bishop Sheen went on to say that Americans have forgotten God and are too proud to pray to the God who made us. He said that we must stress our liberty, and liberty 'is the right to do as we ought, not as we please.'

Our final way to save America, Bishop Sheen stated, is by our traditions. He stated, 'We need to reintroduce discipline and self-sacrifice before we find ourselves with the horrors of Russia and China in this country.'

On Friday morning after unfinished business and new business and the installation of the new officers and regents, there was a time for pledging to the President General's Project - the painting of the murals in the capitol. A little over \$27,500.00 was pledged at that time.

The National Society has reached its 1976 goal of 3,000 chapters, and as of April 18, 1975, has 196,316 members.

Sara Roddis Jones selected the theme for the 1975-76 year. It is, 'All things work together for good to them who love God.' Romans 8:20.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

(Revised March 22, 1975)

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Objects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historic spots and the crection of monuments; by the encouragement of historic research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relies, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injuction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promise, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and accounting to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Register, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her years. No chapter member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for relection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for relection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least a year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

Section 3. Terms. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent

and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Baord of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All-officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall be taken.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after their election and no later than November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio a member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and a Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committee and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Mangement and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter of good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first Three Credential Blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of March. a typewritten list of the names and addresses

of the officers of the local chapter, made into a directory form. She shall send to each Chapter Regent before February fifteenth, State Conference registration cards for the Regent and elected delegates. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Society and shall deposit them in such banks or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. Immediately after May first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members in good standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February first.

Section 8. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members-at-large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter, name and rank of ancestor; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrants requiring an accurate report of all members who have—been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance-by-the—National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect the preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Rebolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society

Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library.

Section II. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News", and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the Conference Press Committee.

Section 12. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman. having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and Chairman of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference, The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by The State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents. the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent of the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

- (a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates. (b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred
- members, Regent, and five delegates. (c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five

delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred. Explanatory Table, Chapter Representation at Conference.

MSDAR -- Representatives . Votes 12 to 49 -- Regent and two delegates 50 to 100 -- Regent and five delegates 100 and over - Regent and five delegates plus three

delegates for every full hundred 6 plus Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall

not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three Credential Blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Sccretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meetings

of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are

not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the

Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Mangement shall consist of the cleeted State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the chapter Regent or in her absence, the chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society, shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.60 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. A chapter whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess chapter to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and three members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget as approved by the State board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the Society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Student Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals, and interest on monies invested for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Recording

Secretary, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. **Bylaws**. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amending and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that have not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Public Relations. The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an ex-officio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200-words-shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resumes shall not be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent for use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be

divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District Secretary thirty days in advance to all chapters within the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each District shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The terms of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three terms.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapters

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers in or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year the chapter recording secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of a National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January first in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion

to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Office, 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairman and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairman of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C.A.R. 1; District Director, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 2; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2; The President General, 1; The Kansas State Historical Society 1; the AR National Library 1; and the President of the State Officers Club, Chapter Regents Club and the State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2 Chairman of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privelege of the floor but may not vote.

No. 3. No less than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each

year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.

No. 4. The State Registrar shall furnish the editor of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.

No.5 A sum of \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

No. 6 Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partiallly defray her expenses to State Conference.

No. 7. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of llowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

No. 8. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

No. 9. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund and \$1.00 to the State DAR Library. \$1.00 to the Shawnee Mission Fund.

No. 10. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (25 c).

No. 11 The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its properties housed in Shawnee Mission.

No. 12. The State Society shall allocate \$25.00 annually to the El Cuartelejo Committee for the proper upkeep of the El Cuartelejo Monument in Scott County.

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No. 13. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 14. The sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R.

Society to be used for the C.A.R. projects.

No. 15. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file of the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 16. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board

Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

No. 17. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 18. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats

together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 19. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 20 The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

- (a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.
- (b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
- (c) Rental of \$100 a year shall be paid for Housing of the Kansas DAR Library. It shall be housed with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the Dodge City Recreation Center, making it a valuable resource center.

No. 21. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to preapre a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

No. 22. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served

two-thirds of her elected term.

No. 23. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.

No. 24. A \$10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.

No. 25. The Runner-up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an appropriate gift as an award.

No. 26. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests of the Kansas Luncheon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

No. 27. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session of the State Conference to review the minutes of the session.

No. 28. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State

Conference by a two-thirds vote of these delegates voting.

No. 29. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before August 1 by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, subject to the approval of the State Regent.

No. 30. KSDAR shall place a \$25 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR Magazine.
