THE KANSAS STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING Salina, Kansas Sept. 29, 1975

The Kansas State Daughters of the American Revolution held their Annual State Board of Management Meeting in the Portsmouth Room of the Hilton Inn at Salina, Kansas on Septembr 29, 1975, following the courtesy coffee served by the hostess chapter, Mary Wade Strother. Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, state regent, called the meeting to order and extended greetings. Prayer was offered by the state chaplain, Mrs. John L. Myers, and Mrs. R. E. Byler led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, followed by the singing of the National Anthem.

Roll Call by the state recording sccretary, Mrs. Fayette Rowe, was answered by ten state officers, one honorary state regent, and eleven regents or vice-regents from the following chapters: Abilene, Arthur Barrett, Flores Del Sol, Fort Larned, John Athey, Martha Loving Ferrell, Martha Vail, Mary Wade Strother, Minisa, Topeka and Wichita, and a quorum was declared and the meeting proceeded.

The minutes of the Board of Management Meeting held in Wichita at the Holiday Inn Plaza on March 20, 1975, were read by the recording secretary and approved as corrected. Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., state vice-regent, then took the chair for the report of the state regent, Mrs. Johnson. Following her report, Mrs. Johnson resumed the chair and called for the reports of the state officers and chairmen of the state and national committees. State officers responding were: Mrs. McGuire, state vice-regent; Mrs. Myers, state chaplain; Mrs. Rowe, state recording secretary; Mrs. Clarke T. Jackson, state treasurer; Mrs. Donald Steward, state registrar; Mrs. Byler, state corresponding secretary; Mrs. Howard W. Haines, state historian; Mrs. Walter M. Ostenberg, state librarian; and Mrs. Billy P. Compton, state reporter.

Mrs. Byler, state corresponding secretary, read the following correspondence from: the Lewis B. Roller family thanking the society for placing their mother's name, Myra King Roller, in the Memory Book in the Kansas Chapel in Washington D.C.; Mrs. Lewis H. Kossler thanking the society for the gift of the Bicentennial Flag to Shawnee Mission in her honor; Mrs. Beulah Chesney of Wichita offering to finance the painting of the Kansas Chapel in Washington D.C.

Reports of the state and national chairmen were given as follows: Honor Roll, Mrs. Charles C. Theis; Lineage Research, Mrs. Jerome F. Parenteau; Program, Mrs. J. Channing Brown; Flag of the USA, Mrs. Robert W. Carlson; Transportation, Mrs. Keith Johnson; Eisenhower Memorial, Miss Pauline Cowger; American History and Constitution Week, Mrs. Howard W. Haines; Bicentennial, a written report, Mrs. E. L. Wulfmeyer; Press Book a written report, Mrs. Bill E. Smith. Mrs. Haines, state historian, announced the last pensioner of the Revolutionary War is buried at Halstead, Kansas. Mrs. Myers, state chaplain, announced she would like to give the flowers for the Memorial Service at the 1976 State Conference in honor of her mother.

A letter from Senator Bob Dole was read by the state historian, Mrs. Haines, pointing out the non-feasibility of designating a whole month rather than certain days as American History Month, and that the bill did not pass the committee. The state librarian, Mrs. Ostenberg, told of the need of sturdy shelves for the state library, and where they could be bought. The state regent, Mrs. Johnson, announced the acceptance by the DAR Museum at National headquarters of a silver thimble presented by a member of Newton Chapter DAR. Mrs. Johnson also asked the society to be thinking of a gift for Mr. and Mrs. Wilts who will be retiring soon from Shawnee Mission.

Consideration of the Recommendations of the Executive Committee as approved at the committee meeting in the regent's room at the Hilton Inn the evening of September 28, 1975, was the next order of business. The following recommendations were read by the recording secretary, Mrs. Rowe, who moved their adoption, and all carried: 1.) That the sum of \$47.80 be paid for the flag presented to Shawnee Mission Rooms on September 17, 1975. 2.) That the Executive Committee recommend to the Board of Management that the \$4,387.49 in the Hazel D. Howes Memorial Library Fund be placed in Pass Book Savings Account with the \$55.37 accrued interest to be placed in the State DAR.

Library Fund. 3.) That the Executive Committee recommend to the Board of Management that the names of Mrs. Donald Spicer and Mrs. Henry Stewart Jones be placed in the Memory Book at the Kansas Chapel at National Head quarters. 4.) That KSDAR sponsor the Bicentennial project of the state chairmen, Mrs. E. L. Wulfmeyer, "The retracing of the Black Dog Trail by school children."

Mrs. Donald T. Ingling moved, the motion was seconded and carried that the state society purchase five shelves for the KSDAR Library with monies from the State Library Fund.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned around 4:30, to meet again in the spring at the State Conference in Dodge City.

The Board of Management of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution met in the Corral Room of the Silver Spur Lodge at 9:00 a.m., Thursday, March 25, 1976. The State Regent, Mrs. Francis L. Johnson called the meeting to order. State Chaplain, Mrs. John L. Myers offered prayer, and the Plege of Allegiance to the Flag of the United State of America was given.

Bylcr: letter of recignation from Mrs. Fsyette Rowe as Recording Secretary; letter from Mrs. John Vallentine stating that Fort Supply Trail Chapter, Ashland, had voted to proceed with disbanding; letter from Mrs. Ford Hubbard, Organizing Secretary General, stateing that Henry Dawson Chapter at McPherson was officially disbanded on January 30, 1976; letter from Mrs. Stanleigh Swan, National Chairman of Building and Grounds Committee acknowledging receipt of a check for the payment of repainting the Chapel and that she had personally visited the Chapel after completion of the work; letter of thanks from Hilda Rennick for the Flag of the United State of America presented to Shawnee Mission in the name of James Ross Chapter, and a letter from Mrs. Forrest Gilmour concerning the gift of a flag of the United Stte of America for Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Wilts.

The minutes of the September 29, 1975 Board of Management meeting were read and approved as corrected.

The State Regent called for reports from the State Officers.

The following recommendations from the Executive Committee were read:

Donors are asked to check with the Librarian to avoid duplication". Miss Katherine C. Harper moved that the recommendation be accepted, motion was duly seconded and carried.

Mrs. Clarke T. Jackson presented the report of the auditors and the proposed budget for 1976-1977 and moved that the audit be accepted by the Board of Management. The motion was seconded and carried.

The matter of a gift for Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Wilts, Superintendent of the Shawnee Mission Historical Museum in Fairway, Kansas, was discussed.

Mrs. Jack D. Dunn moved that the gift of a flag flown over the United States of America Capitol Building on Flag Day, June 14, 1976, (the gift of the flag to be from James Ross Chapter, Mrs. Vincent J. Signaigo and Mrs. Forrest J. Gilmour) together with a framed certification (the gift of Mission Hills Chapter, Mrs. Joseph R. Riden and Mrs. J. F. Parenteau) and a monetary gift of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) from KSDAR be given to Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Wilts, the motion was seconded and carried.

Announcement was made that Mrs. Robert Chesney gave the money to paint the Chapel in Wasington, D.C. Mrs. J. F. Parenteau moved, the motion was seconded and carried that an appropriate letter of thanks be sent to Mrs. Chesney.

Announcement was made that a Memorial Fund to be used for conservation purposes had been established for Gordon Byler, the recently deceased son of Mrs. R. E. Byler, State Corresponding Secretary. Contributions may be sent to the State Treasurer.

Mrs. J. F. Parenteau commented that there seemed to be a lack of communication between NSDAR, KSDAR, State Chairmen and Chapters, and that all reports of Regents must be in the hands of State Chairmen by March 1.

Mrs. J. Channing Brown announced that all year books which were received for judging plus comments are to be returned to the Chapters.

Mrs. John W. McGuire, State Membership Chairman, will be happy to assist any Chapter with problems. More people are interested in membership applications.

State Vice Regent, Mrs. John W. McGuire requested permission to preside.

Mrs. Walter M. Ostenberg moved, the motion was seconded and carried that KSDAR endorse State Regent, Mrs. Francis L. Johnson for Vice President General for election in April 1977.

RESOLUTIONS OF KSDAR 1976

"DETENTE"

WHEREAS, A major part of American foreign policy today is DETENTE, a relaxing of strained relations between nationo, or more simply stated, peaceful coexistence; and

WHEREAS, the Western World on the one hand, and the communist nations, Russia and its satellites and China on the other, appear to be defaulting in their agreements; and

WHEREAS, recently President Ford and Sccretary of State, Henry Kissinger have made visits to Russia, moeting with Russian top oficials, and have met with indifferent success; and

WHEREAS, Russia found it necessary to make purchases of grain from exporting countries, and recently made an agreement with the United States to furnish it with a minimum amount of grain for the next five years in return for oil, all at reasonable prices; and

WHEREAS, grain has been furnished in accordance with this agreement and to this date, no deliveries of oil have been made or definite deliveries promised;

RESOLVED, That in view of repeated violations of these agreements by the Russians, that the individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION should urge the President and members of Congress to view with suspicion and carefully scrutinize any and all agreements offered by Russia; and that no agreements should be executed unless there is good reason to believe the Russians will not violate them to their advantage and the disadvantage of this country.

RESPECT FOR THE FLAG OF THE USA

WHEREAS, many periodicals and newspapers are carrying advertising during the Bicontonnial year that is in conflict with the Flag Code: and

WHEREAS, many items are being made and sold that are using the Flag of the United States of American in a disrespectful manner;

RESOLVED, That individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTER AMERICAN REVOLUTION be alert to these violations and personally express concern to the advertisers, publishers, manufacturers and store owners.

AGRICULTURE

WHEREAS, Agriculture is one of the major industries of he world, and especially of the United States; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that farmers receive reasonable prices for their products in order to survive and to produce at a profit; and

WHEREAS, other countries, especially the Soviet Union, have found it necessary to purchase grain from this country, and in turn, the American farmers need to dispose of their ourplus supplies at fair and reasonable prices, and

WHEREAS, during the year of 1975, the President placed embargoes on shipments abroad with adverse effects on the farmers;

RESOLVED, That individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION remind Congress and the executive branch that the placing of embargoes should be limited only when there appears to be an inadequate supply to most the needs of this country for the foreseeable future.

REGISTRATION AND VOTE

WHEREAS, there is no better way to celebrate the nation's 200th birthday than by helping others to exercise their right to choose persons who will represent them in local, state, and national government;

RESOLVED, That individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION initiate and support registration drives in their communities; and

RESOLVED, That as concerned citizens we seek out and support able, honest candidates for political office, and through our words and deeds, insure that we shall continue to enjoy the blessings and security of self-government.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

WHEREAS, The Soviet Union and the People's Republic of China, as well as many other countries, are increasing their military and nuclear strength on the ground, on the sea and in the air; and

WHEREAS, through our industrial capacity (twice that of the Soviet Union) we have sold outright or on credit strategic material and "know how" all over the world; and

WHEREAS, the United States has accepted parity with the Soviet Union as a goal of arms control negotiations; and

WHEREAS, hostile states dedicated to World conquest are building up excessive military power; and

WHEREAS, the United States has many unclear political and military commitments and agreements throughout the world;

RESOLVED, That individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION urge the President to keep the American public informed frankly and honoutly of the chifting balance of strategic arms with the view of upgrading our National Defence wherever needed; and

RESOLVED, That individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION urge the United States Government to verify compliance with agreements entered into by the United States of America with other governments, and if such agreements are not honored by those governments, the United States should, after full and open discussion with the nations involved, withdraw from such agreements.

BICENTENNIAL

WHEREAS, Thirteen colonics on this continent two hundred years ago had been continuously annoyed under the grievous tyranny of taxation without representation by England, their Mother Country; and

WHEREAS, the colonists consulted with one another and agreed that their only recourse was separation from their Mother country; and

WHEREAS, Richard Henry Lee of Virginia in the Continental Congress on June 1, 1776, moved that the United Colonics "are, and of right ought to be free and independent"; and

WHEREAS, a committee of eminent citizens directed Thomas Jefferson, with the help of Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Roger Sherman and Richard R. Livingston to draft a Declaration of Independence; and

WHEREAS, the final draft of the Doclaration of Independence was approved by the Congress on July 4, 1776, and was first presented to the public some four days later; RESOLVED, That individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION do re-affirm their appreciation of the debt they owe to the genius and foresight of the Founding Fathers of their country; and

RESOLVED, In this opening year of the Bicentennial Commemoration of this great event, that individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION do hereby pledge to uphold the principles expounded in this great document.

PROTECT EDUCATION

WHEREAS, Education is essential to democracy and vital to the life and progress of our nation; and

WHEREAS, the quality of education determines the quality of life and every child in America has the right to a good education; and

WHEREAS, time lost from education can never be regained, but permanently a student's preparation for life and service; and

WHEREAS, teachers have the right as citizens to join Unions and strike the same as workers in other organizations; but for the sake and best interests of all children and young people of America, they should give careful consideration before taking such action;

RESOLVED, That individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY OF DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION encourage all certified teachers in elementary and secondary schools, colleges and universities to avoid taking strike action unless and until all other means of obtaining what they believe to be their just dues have failed.

F.B.I.

WHEREAS, The maintenance of highly competent detection services is essential to the administration of justice in modern society; and

WHEREAS, subversive forces are continuously attempting to undermine the government from within by treasonable action; and

WHEREAS, a competent and responsible counter-intelligence bureau is required to detect and forestall the subversive action of enemy agents; and

WHEREAS, the F.B.I. has justly earned a world-wide reputation for its performance in these fields; and

WHEREAS, the F.B.I. has been attacked by radical elements of the news media and radical fringe groups of society;

RESOLVED, That individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION commend the F.B.I. for its continuing great service to the internal security of the United States and support their outstanding duty performance.

C.I.A.

WHEREAS, The United States, for its own protection and that of friendly nations, finds it necessary to maintain the services of professional agencies to detect and combat secret and subversive activities of hostile forces; and

WHEREAS, this information is gathered by friendly intelligence services, often conducted at the risk of life and held in secrecy; and

WHEREAS, it appears that the C.I.A. has been lax in maintaining its own security resulting in possible infiltration; and

WHEREAS, the current practices now used appear to cause a serious break of National Security;

RESOLVED, That the individual members of KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION go on record as favoring a carefully chosen Congressional Oversight Committee to execute discreet and responsible continued surveillance over activities of C.I.A.; and

RESOLVED, That this committee alone has access to all information concerning it, and that the head of such intelligence agency and its subordinates should make no public appearance in any cause or case and should testify before the Congressional Oversight Committee only.

My report will be divided into 2 categories - Good News and Bad News. First the Good News:

The announcement that the final settlement of the Hazel D. Howes bequest gave the KSDAR Library an additional \$4,387.49 for the purchase of genealogical books. To date 104 books have been purchased from the Hazel D. Howes Memorial fund at a cost of \$1,357.11.

To house these books and replace some of our older light weight units, interested DAR members and Chapters gave \$232 and the Board of Management paid \$560 from the Library Fund to give us 6 new sturdy units.

Kansas Daughters and Friends of Chapters have presented 9 books and Manuscripts to the NSDAR Library and \$259.69 to the Skylight Fund '76.

Ten DAR Members have given a minimum of 476 volunteer hours manning our KSDAR Library and many monetary contributions were given as memorials. PLEASE—when giving memorial gifts to the Library, send a memorand name of next of kin to your Librarian so that prompt acknowledgement may be made to the family.

Now for the Bad News: For those who have not visited our Library the KSDAR leases a portion of the Kansas Genealogy Society Library at Avenue G and Vine. As a result our space is very limited and we are forced to recommend to the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution that we limit our acquisitions to Genealogical items. We are a Genealogy Library. History is interesting and valuable but it is worthless to genealogists unless it includes a vast amount of genealogical material.

I have enjoyed my year as Librarian very much but without the help of Florence Smith and the Library Committee it would have been impossible.

My sincere thanks to our State Regent, Mrs. Francis L. Johnson and all of you for your interest and gifts of books and money. Please keep up the good work.

schools were presented pins and certificates, when they and their mothers attended a meeting. AMERICAN INDIANS Alice M. Bogren

We are honored to have with us Mrs. Jennie Martin, our National Chairman of the American Indians Committee, from Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Early last fall our State Regent, Mrs. Johnson, gave us the momentum to launch our drive to help the Indians by sending us a \$10.00 bill urging us to "Watch It Grow". That was indeed an inspiration, so we began our game, and The Name Of The Game was to increase the \$10.00 by "passing the hat" at each of the Chapter's meetings. The idea was excellent and returns were favorable but it was a very slow process and by the time we got down to the Chapters in the "C's" alphabetically it was around November 1st. It was then decided to mail out questionnaires together with Fact Sheets, requesting donations for our cause. As of March 1, 1976, 35 Chapters replied reporting on contributions made to the American Indians as follows: BACONE COLLEGE

A total of \$24.75 was donated toward their National Project (a Chair in Silversmithing).

Two Scholarships were given; One for \$300.00 reported by Mr. and Mrs. George Trombold, Randolph-Loving Chapter, Wichita, and one given by Miss Geneva Herndon, Courtney-Spalding Chapter, Hays, for \$300.00. This is the fifth year these donors have contributed scholarships and we are extremely grateful. Three hundred and nine pounds of clothing and gifts valued at \$593.00 were sent to the Thrift Shop. Other assistance given totalled \$113.50.

ST. MARY'S SCHOOL FOR INDIAN GIRLS

\$16.25 was reported donated to the National Project - a school bus. One Scholarship in the amount of \$250.00 was given by your Chairman of Courtney-Spalding Chapter, Hays. Five hundred eighty four pounds of clothing and gifts valued at \$812.79 was reported sent and two hundred seventy eight pounds of clothing and gifts were delivered personally. Other assistance given totalled \$182.81. The General Indian Scholarship Fund received \$41.81.

The Eunice Sterling Chapter, Wichita, contributed \$35.00 to Mid America All Indian Center.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUALS Mrs. Raymond Lees

Every chapter chairman reports adherence to the ritualistic openings of meetings. Patriotic programs of a historical nature have predominated, mostly with the bicentennial in mind. Some members are serving on Bicentennial committees and some are assisting husband on these committees. Wherever Naturalization Proceedings are held, Americanism chairmen have attended, usually accompanied by other chapter members. 350 Manuals of Citizenship have been distributed to Kansas schools, libraries, and to those persons studying for citizenship. One member sponsored a Vietnamese family. Several chapters are working on Americanism awards, but only one has been presented. No candidates were submitted for Medals of Honor. Various flags. especially those of the Bicentennial and our 50-star flags - have been given. New citizens were entertained, both in groups and as individuals.

Kansas DAR Americanism chairmen are active in unusual events planned for July 4th, and one of the most unusual is helping with the re-enactment of the landing of Lewis and Clark at Atchison, along the Missouri River.

Excellent publicity in both stories and pictures is given by the newspapers of the state.

STATE BICENTENNIAL Mrs. E. L.Wulfmeyer

We are all aware of the hazard of changing horose in the middle of the stream, but when you add to that a non-swimmer who has a deathly fear of horses, and no visible aid from either shore, the feat can be fatal. This is the cituation in which your Chairman found herself last August when she agreed to pick up the reins and promised the State Regent to produce a project worthy of State effort and National attention.

Newsletters mailed in October and December outlined plans for retracing of the Black Dog (Great Osage) Indian Trail by school children from Baxter Springs to Oxford in Southeast Kansas, with prizes to be awarded and markers to be delicated. This project is now officially recognized by the Kansas American Bicentennial Commission. I have researched, telephoned, written hundreds of letters, filled out numerous complicated forms, spoken to chapters, met with civic and school authorities and made two trips along the trail. And my work and yours has only begun if we are to complete this project successfully by October 1976.

There are 63 chapters in the state; with 52 reporting, we can assume that they are "alive and well and living in Kansas." Since they have received three first class mailings between October and February, I am not so sure about the remaining 11 unresponsive chapters!

In compiling statistics for evaluation purposes, of the six divisions Bicentennial Programming in chapters was strongest, followed by Civic Participation. While solid emphasis was placed on Historic Projects and the News Media produced a healthy response, Youth Involvement was weak and the State Bicentennial Project lagged far behind.

Kansas chapters have been particularly active in bicentennial civic participation, co operating in projects of landscaping areas and installing flag poles, contributing time and funds to restoration and cleaning of plaques and markers of historic sites and buildings. They have researched and written histories of churches, schools and buildings, as well as contributed stories for variety of volumes on city history. Several chapters have written and produced original playlets dealing with customs and facts of the Rovolutionary War period. Each of these dramas has been presented numerous times to other organizations in the area.

On March 13,1976, the Kansas State Children of the American Revolution met at the home of Robert Adams, 10126 Linden Lane, Overland Park, Kansas Tomahawk Society was the host.

Four members of the Tomahawk Society will attend National Conference in Washington, D.C. in April.

Miss Jane Adams, outgoing State President is running for National Vice President General this coming April. An honor for the State of Kansas.

During the State Conference, the first CAR scholarship in the name of Mrs. Earl C. Moses of Great Bend in the amount of \$100.00 was given to Tim Godfrey of the Tomahawk Society, who is a second semester freshman at KSU.

My guidelines in doing my job are and will always be service and courtesy. During this past summer I was in Dodge City on personal business. I contacted Mrs. James Smith and wecame over to the convention center to discuss State Conference with management. You have not known true friendship until you have a friend who is Florence Smith. I cannot thank Florence enough. Also

special thanks goes to Mrs. Kenneth Anderson, Page Chairman, Mrs. Harold (Diane) Jones, my personal page and the rest of the hardworking pages, Mrs. Johnson, let me thank you for letting me serve you and the state.

CONSERVATION Mrs. A. L. Elledge

We did do better this year! Fifty-seven chapters did send in their reports this year; many of them were fine reports. Twelve chapters cooperated in the State Project. One hundred seventy-six dollars was reported given to the "Black Dog Trail". Nine chapters reported encouraging "Green Belt" programs in their respective areas as their Bicentennial Focus. There were 3,478 trees planted by our members. Forty chapters reported having a program on conservation, nine on energy, four on wood fibre needs, eight on clean air projects, and four on recycling or water recovery. Seven chapters reported giving a conservation scholarship to youth. Two chapters gave a subscription of the Wildlife Magazine to their local library. Only one chapter gave a subscription of Ranger Rick; I feel that that is something that smaller chapters can do. 4,290 pounds of bird food was put out for our wildlife. Two chapters mentioned building slielters for our fast deminishing wildlife. Fourteen chapters reported studying the pros and cons of federal and state land use control plans. Sixty-three of our members in their individual capacity wrote to her respective Legislators concerning consorvation issues. Many of our rural members reported terracing on their farms and being conservative with the spraying, this was also reported in our urban area. Five reported establishing waterways on their farms. Newspapers are being recycled; food is being preserved; our parks are being improved: roadsides and small cemeterics cleaned by two chapters. I sincerely feel that we should be and are conservation conscious; thanks for your good reports.

CONSULTING GENEALOGIST Mrs. James W. Smith

As your Consulting Genealogist, I have answered all letters asking for research. Hours of reading census records, checking genealogical books and asking for more information have been spent at our State DAR Library.

First Runner-up is Sharon Meyer of Ellinwood, Kansas. She was sponsored by Jeremiah Howard Chapter. She will also be introduced at the Friday Night Banquet and presented an engraved silver bowl.

Chapters entertain and honor their Good Citizens in various manners: teas, luncheons, commmemorative gifts and awards at school assemblies. This committee requires a great deal of effort and time on the part of the chapter chairmen and I want to take this opportunity to say thank you for their outstanding work of the past year.

Special recognition was given to Mission Hills, making Kansas one of the 12 states that had a Chapter with 100% subscription, and the 12 states and their Chaptere rated a full page in the May issue!

I am pleased to report that Junior American Citizens activity has become more widespread in Kansas in the past year than previously. Once again the chapters emphasized the National Contest, which had as its theme, "America's Bicentennial 1776-1976".

There were nearly three hundred entries in local contests across the state. Due to an increase in the size of the project nation-wide, only first place state winners in each category and grade division can now be forwarded to the national contest. In accordance with this policy, twenty state first place winners were sent to the national contest in February. The results of that competition will be made known in April at Continental Congress. Chapters sponsoring first-place winners were Cimarron River Valley Chapter, Liberal; Dodge City Chapter, Dodge City; Desire Tobey Sears Chapter, Mankato; Kanza Chapter, St. John; and Sarah Steward Chapter, Smith Center. In deeping with the Bicentennial theme, each of the twenty winners will be awarded a Bicentennial silver dollar as first prize in a division of the state contest.

Although Kansas contest entries received no first places in the national contest last year, one of our hard-working leaders was recognized. Mrs. Dwight Winger, Dodge City Chapter, has been honored with a certificate for outstanding leadership by the national chairman.

There are now 29 Juniors serving as Chapter Chairmen, 19 Chapter Officers, 1 Chapter Regent and 4 State Chairmen.

Six Chapters reported Junior Membership programs. One group of Juniors gave the Christmas program. They then baked and served plum pudding while a history of it was read. Another group of Juniors hostessed the Christmas luncheon for their Chapter members. Many Chapters reported programs presented and activities handled by their Juniors. Junior INVOLVEMENT has been on the INCREASE in Kansas Chapters.

With the help of many of you, Kansas was able to turn in \$565.00 to our national project which is the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. \$165.00 was reported from sales of jewelry and notepaper. The 1975 Conference Bazaar, with items submitted by 25 chapters earned \$400.

I feel Kansas has done their part in attaining the theme of our National Chairman, "Junior Increase: Membership, Involvement, Contributions".

My challenge to each of you in this Bicentennial year is a new Junior member for each Chapter. The future leadership of our Society depends on these young women.

Thank each of you for your help during the past year, for without it Kansas Juniors would have been unable to attain many of their accomplishments during the past year!

KANSAS CHAPEL Mrs. Bertram James Lempenau

Shortly after Continental Congress in 1975, permission was requested to perform a wedding in the Kansas Chapel. Subsequently, Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Wallace were married there in a traditional ceremony. Mrs. Stanleigh Swan, National Chairman of Buildings and Grounds NSDAR attended, and reported it to be a small but lovely wedding. In gratitude for use of the Chapel, Mr. and Mrs. Wallace, after consulting with the State Regent, Mrs. Francis Johnson, sent \$20, to be used to inscribe in the Remombranco Book of the Kansas Chapel the names of our two recently deceased Honorary President Generals, Eleanor Washington Spicer and Sarah Roddis Jones.

Mrs. Robert Chesncy contributed \$475 to cover cost of repainting walls and ceiling, and a few retouches, in the Chapel. It is trusted the work will be completed before Continental Congress convenes.

Duc to the faded condition of the American Flag, a new one has been ordered, to be in place in time for the 1976 Continental Congress. Topeka Chapter has volunteered to buy the flag for the Chapel.

Fifty two Kansas Chapters forwarded \$62 (including cost of the flag) to the Chapel Fund. This, plus \$90 for inscribing names of deceased members in the Remembrance Book, and the \$475 contributed by Mrs. Chesney, brings to \$627 the amount received the past fiscal year.

LINEAGE RESEARCH Mrs. J. F. Parenteau

This committee has had its ups and downs this year! The ups were the great response we had to the lineage research programs held at all the district meetings last fall. The downs, as you all know, was the ceiling in the library in Washington! That slowed the responses from National. A letter from the National Chairman Mrs. Richard H. Thompson, Jr. tells about it. Paraphrased, she said, "You have all experienced, ufortunately, excessive delays in getting responses from this committee. Part of the cause of the delay was the repair work being done. A more recent cause is the extraordinary uppurge in the volume of new applications for membership. As part of the alloue effort to process these applications as quickly as possible, the staff of the Lineage Research committee has temporarily been assigned to the Genealogical Division of the Office of Registrar General to verify papers. As soon as this great backlog of work is cut down to size we will again be able to give more attention to lineage research matters. This is why you have not received answers to the requests that have been sent in."

Some of you may remember that last year's chairman of this committee, Mrs. Edward Lynn Westbrooke, was elected First Vice President General last spring when Mrs. Smith became President Ceneral. It is the wish of the new chairman, Mrs. Thompson, to continue the program of having a volunteer researcher in every county who will do a limited amount of work in her own community to assist potential members in establishing their eligibility. The Chapter Chairmen's names have been sent in, and it is hoped that a list can be compiled to turn to for help on opecific probleme. This is not to take the place of paid researchers and will only have to do with their own country. If anyone knows of a DAR who would research in a county where we do not have a chapter, please give me her name and address and the name of the county.

The slow response from National must have dampened the enthusiasm of our chapter chairmen because very few chapter reports were received. No postcard form was sent this year because so few seemed to know how to use them. Still, all in all, what we did do was successful, we stirred interest, and I am sure we got some new members, or will when they complete their lines.

Mrs. Johnson, it has been a great pleasure to work with you again this year.

MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Harry M. Ives

In January questionnaires were sent to all Chapter Membership Chairman with 48 Chapters out of the 62 reoponding. Not all Chapters have Membership Chairmen, but their duties are taken over by the Chapter Regent, Treasurer, Registrar or other committee chairmen. All are aware that our very existence depends on members and are doing all in their power to interest new members.

Summary of the Kansas Report: Two CAR members transferred to two DAR Chapters 46 Chapters had no CAR transfers. There are two CAR Chapters in the State Society and this is a vital source of new members. CAR needs your support.

Ninety free 1971 Revised Membership Guides are used in 11 Chapters. Free Prospective Member Forms are being used by nine Chapters. These Prospective Member forms are to be used between Chapters and states to cite a Prospective Member. Those and the Revised Membership Guides are free for the writing to the National Corresponding Secretary at National Headquarters

in Washington and requesting them. I do have a few Membership Guides with me. I requested a supply of both to be distributed here at the State Conference, but received only a small supply which the Chapter Regents or Membership Chairmen can secure from me. One Prospective Member form was received from New Jersey which was forwarded to Mrs. Williams in Marysville.

Forty Chapters have access to the Patriot Index and the two Supplement in their local libraries or Genealogical Societies. This is an increase of six over lst year.

In September 1975 the Kansas DAR News carried the announcement of the newly appointed Membership Commission by our State Regent at the Request of the President General and National Chairman of the DAR Membership Commission. Following the Board Meeting in October, the Commission meant to formulate plans to gain new members and expedite the process at a minimum cost to the Applicant. The State Vice Regent is Chairman, with State Registrar, Librarian, Organizer, State Chairmen Lineage Research, Genealogical Records Membership, Siemes Microfilm Center and Miss Pauline Cowger.

No new ways to attract new members has been found. Just keep up good programs, secure publicity, if you can for meetings, Guest Day Teas, projects, encourage relatives to interest relatives, personal contact of friends, assist prospective members with their research without charge, refer to the Patriot Index and Supplements and to the many Genealogical Societies which are being formed over the State.

The awarding of Certificate from the National Chairman of Membership Committee for the greatest per cent net increase in membership is delayed because the contest ended in a tie between Jonathan Gilbert Chapter, Membership Chairman, Ruby Ryan and Regent Mrs. Floyd Thompson and Sarah Steward, Mrs. J. A. Robertson, Regent. As soon as I was informed by the State Registrar of the tie, I wrote to the National Chairman, Membership Committee asking for another Certificate, but none has arrived. As soon as the second Certificate arrives I shall mail them to the Chapters. May the Regent and the Membership Chairman of Janothan Gilbert Chapter and Sarah Steward Chapter rise to be congratulated.

Only the Official Count as of Feb. 1, 1976 can be used to determine the exact membership in the state. Requesting this in January, it has not arrived either, but our State Registrar's figures show a gain of 33 members and total membership of 3537 for the State.

MEMBERSHIP COMMISSION Mrs. John W. McGuire, Sr.

The newly appointed Membership Commission met in Salina on September twenty-ninth with six members and the State Regent present. Members of the Commission expressed their eagerness to assist chapters in working to build membership.

A letter was sent to all Chapter Regents in August announcing membership workshops to be held in conjunction with the District Meetings. The workshops were conducted by Mrs. Jerome Parenteau, State Lineage Research Chairman, who furnished materials from her own library. The workshops were well attended, and the assistance of members of the districts contributed to the success of this effort.

A message from the chairman of the Commission in the February 1976 issue of the Kansas DAR News suggested ways to promote membership and reminded each member of the Kansas Sciety that she has a responsibility in the membership program. Members of the Commission will continue to make every effort to visit chapters with membership problems and to assist in the organization of new chapters where chapters are needed.

NATIONAL DEFENSE Mrs. E. G. Freese

Forty-seven chapters mailed reports to me concerning National Defense work for the 1975-1976 year. I really appreciate this improved reporting since National mailed out a misworded report in January, then the corrected one in February which meant double work for those ladies who had filled out the first report blank.

Forty-one chapters had at least one entire program devoted to a national defense topic. Twenty-four chapters devote the required time at chapter meetings to national defense and twenty-three reported giving more time at most chapter meetings, some as much as fifteen minutes. Regents can really help in this area by their willingness to put national defense on the agenda.

Chapter chairmen continue to make National Defense material available at chapter meetings and many also distribute literature to schools, libraries and interested individuals through the "National Defender" and the "DAR Magazine."

Health insurance, taxation, U.S. budget, land management, Panama Canal, aid to Angola, sale of wheat to Russia and energy were the legislative topics of most interest in the chapters.

The chapter chairmen are enthusiastic about National Defense and are emphasizing a positive approach in presenting the material to chapter members. Ten DAR members hold elective public office which in itself is positive.

PROGRAM Mrs. J. Channing Brown

National Program and Yearbook material was mailed by me to each Chapter Regent on May 6, 1975.

Good use of the material was reflected in most of the 33 yearbooks and 12 supplements sent to me for state judging. As requested by our National Program Chairman, this year each book to be sent for National judging had to have a state ribbon attached - red, blue or white.

I'm proud and happy to report that of the 19 yearbooks and 12 supplements sent to Mrs. White for National judging, seven of our chapter yearbooks received National Red, White and Blue Outstanding awards, eight received National Blue awards, and seven supplements received National Mini Awards.

Two chapters (Jeremiah Howard and Sagamore) received certificate awards for using conservation of printing funds for a DAR project. Mary Wade Strother Chapter received an award for having their manuscript program "United States of America Flag Day" accepted.

I received the annual report on Chapter Program activities from 53 of our 63 state chapters - three were too late to be included in my report to the National Chairman but all reflected dedicated effort to comply with National plans, sometimes in spite of many problems, especially in small chapters.

PUBLIC RELATIONS Mrs. Bill E. Smith

Your State Chairman brings you greetings and wishes to Welcome new Chapter Chairmen who will be working for the first time this year in the field of Public Relations for Kansas DAR.

This past year was really a BUSY ONE for all of us we closed the year with the participation of all Chapters in reaching the 100% goal of articles sent to your Press Chairman and therefore for the first time in many years have a Press Book eligible for judging in the National Press Book Contest at Continental Congress. Ruth Smith, our Press Book Chairman, is to be commended for her diligent and persistent endeavor.

We have an increase in the articles and in the photos pulished this year over last with a total of 783 articles and 215 photos making a total of 7,522 inches of printed material. For the first time we have counted Magazine publicity totaling 155 inches with 37 articles and 10 pictures. 86% or 95 Newspapers of the 110 on the mailing list carried DAR stories in Kansas.

A slight increase over last year was noted in Television Publicity with some 30 TV telecasts totaling 1 hour and 58 minutes. There was a decrease in the Radio announcements of one hour and 5 less broadcasts. Therefore let us concentrate on the Radio and Television medias this coming year. Let the Public KNOW DAR by your DOING AND TELLING DAR! Public Relations includes every Chapter Regent, Chapter Chairman and each and every member of DAR. Here is a real challenge for all to publicize DAR during this Bicentennial year of 1976!

We urge each of you to increase your participation in Civic, Social and Patriotic activities. Some Chapters reported taking part in Bi-centennial Programs, joining with other Organizations in presenting Patriotic Programs in Schools, Hospitals and Clubs. Many participated in Naturalization and Youth Programs.

Six articles were given to the Dodge City Daily Globe for publication during Conference week and notices of the Conference were sent to 100 Newspapers in Kansas the week prior to Conference.

Thank you all for your efforts in telling the DAR STORY - thus making 1976 a Banner Year!

SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER Flossie Scofield

Since I am an avid genealogist I gladly accepted the State Chairmanship of the Seimes Microfilm Center Committee, as I know how important these microfilms are to the genealogists - especially the Soundex Index to the 1880 census, which is the committee's special goal at this time. Having done research at the DAR Library in Washington I realize how much they need financial support in increasing their microfilm holdings.

An urgent request was sent to each Chapter Regent asking that a chairman be apointed, and that donations be made to this worthy cause. I bragged that our chapter members had made contributions netting us \$17.45. We had the advantage of having an explanation of how the Soundex Index is beneficial to the researcher.

Twelve chapters out of the sixty-three reported, and the total money turned in was \$57.45, with one chapter neglecting to show the amount. If I could have visited each chapter with a pep-talk we would have made Washington very happy with the returns. It isn't too late yet - get busy and make some money some way to build this fund up to the needed amount to purchase the 1880 Soundex Index!

DAR SERVICE VETERAN-PATIENTS Mrs. S. M. Vendy

The Kansas VAVS now has one Representative and one Deputy who attend meetings during the fiscal year in September, November, February and April at the VA Center, Leavenworth, Kansas. There are also Award Sessions to attend. The DAR was assigned to assist with refreshments the afternoon that the young people (some where 14 years old) were given awards for the many hours that they served during the summer months. I was pleased to get to attend that day.

This year 37 chapters reported on many activities and interests for the Veteran-patients. All the parties and gifts reported this year shows that much effort, time and money were used to brighten the Veterans day. Many patriotic days were commemorated and two Flag Day programs deserve special mention. A blind man was presented a braille flag. This event was in three local newspapers. Another chapter served punch and 805 cup cakes with tiny flags to each Veteran as is their custom each year.

Following is a list of the many things done this year: bibs, books, candy, carpet rags, canteen books, cash, Christmas cards, Christmas gifts (assorted), clothing (suits and coats), cookies (some home made), cup cakes, flashlight, framed pictures, fruit, games, handkerchiefs, house slippers, lap robes, many letters written, listening while they talk of the past, magazines, pens, playing cards, puzzles, soap, stationary, toiletries and tray favors.

Two more things are worthy of special mention: KNI (Kansas Neurological Institute \$75; and 150 hours in Circulation of Veterans Voices (Hospital Veterans Writing Project).

SHAWNEE MISSION PILGRIMAGE Mrs. Forrest Gilmour

The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage on September 17, 1975, was another good day for greeting old friends and making new ones. More than a hundred members and guests enjoyed the coffee at the Museum, a tour of the buildings and the presentation ceremonies, when a bicentennial flag and a 50-star American flag were placed in the DAR rooms. The recent renovation of the rooms had been designated by the Johnson County Bicentennial Commission as a Bicentennial project, and Mr. H. Jay Gunnels, Chairman of the Commission, presented the Bicentennial flag, a gift from the Northeast District KSDAR, to Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, State Regent, who in turn presented it to the Kansas State Historical Society for the DAR rooms at the Museum. The presentation honored Mrs. Lewis Hanford Kessler who, during the preceding administration, supervised the renovation of the rooms. Mrs. Kessler expressed her appreciation of this honor.

The American flag, a gift from the State Society, was presented in honor of James Ross Chapter of Kansas City, since that Chapter was responsible for starting the ball rolling to have the Old Shawnee Mission restored. The first mention of the Shawnee Mission in the minute books of the Chapter is in 1927. Mrs. I. B. Morgan was regent, Mr. Morgan had an automobile and he took four or five women to look over the grounds. (Mrs. Floyd R. Fugate, her sister Miss Dods and their brother Mr. J. H. Dods, a civil engineer, also went.) The women threw up their hands in horror, it was so disreputable. The east building had been used as a roadhouse and tavern. The women said "What can one chapter do?", but Mr. Morgan said a little bonfire, soap and water and paint would take care of the inside. Mr. Dods said the buildings were well built, strong, woodpegged and mortised and capable of being restored. A letter was written Henry McGrew, state legislator, requesting aid in restoring the Mission. Later it became a state-wide project and there is a letter from Miss Marion Seelye, State Regent, requesting all chapters to contact their representatives urging them to vote funds to restore the Mission. The DAR has furnished two rooms in the East Building and an annual pilgrimage is made by the State Society. James Ross Chapter was hostess for many years but it is now a Northeast District project.

The above remarks were taken from a history of James Ross Chapter on the occasion of its 50th anniversary, prepared from the minutes of the Chapter.

Other gifts presented to the DAR rooms included a sterling silver "Grandmother's thimble" from Mrs. Ross A. Etter, Newton Chapter; two pudding molds from Mrs. Howard Haines, Wyandot Chapter; an 1857 Webster's Dictionary from Mrs. Arthur Dunbar, Sagamore Chapter; and a butter mold from Mrs. Forrest Gilmour, James Ross Chapter. The gold cords and tassels for the new flags were gifts also from James Ross Chapter.

On the table in the parlor, the Regents' Album was opened to the portait of Mrs. Ralph Caey, State Regent of the Kansas Society, 1972-1974. The portrait had been placed in the Album earlier by Mrs. Casey's sisters, Mrs. A. A. Schultz and Mrs. Lewis Warren.

Other members and friends attended the luncheon at Old Mission United Methodist Church, making a total for the day of 153. Mr. Horace Warren Kimbrell, Executive Administrator of Public Affairs for Kansas City Life Insurance Company, spoke on the subject "Can this nation survive in today's

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION (Revised March 22, 1975)

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Obiects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in

the State of Kansas:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historic spots and the erection of manuments; by the encouragement of historic research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promise, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge." thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and accounting to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens. (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom., to

foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind

all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American

Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter; name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of

State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have scrved as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of StateRegent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least a year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seem feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to

be from the same chapter.

Section 3. Terms. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A

majority vote shall be taken.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Mccting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board

Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after their election and no later than November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or

before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and

by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and a Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committee and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reporte of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofrading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the

Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresonding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter of good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first Three Credential Blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. Slie sliall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of March. A typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapter, made into a directory form. She shall send to each Chapter Regent before February fifteenth, State Conference registration cards for the Regent and elected delegates. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the exponses to be borne by the Konsas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. Immediately after May first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members ingood standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Sccretary the number of members in

each chapter on February first.

Section 8. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter, name and rank of ancestor; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrants requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceeding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and

monuments erected by the Kansas Society.
Section 10. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library

Section II. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News-, and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the

Conference Press Committee.

Section 12. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and Chairman of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent of the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing. Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

(a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates. (b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred

membrs, Regent, and five delegates.
(c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Explanatory Table, Chapter Representation at Conference.

NSDAR -- Representives

Votes 12 to 49 - Regent and two delegates 3 50 to 100 - Regent and five delegates 6 100 and over - Regent and five delegates plus three

delegates for every full hundred Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates delected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of reordary each year. Immediately after their election, the three Credential Blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meetings of

the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not

duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegate and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the

Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the chapter Regent or in her absence, the chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of

the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken

by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The

officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers

shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.
Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX **Executive Committee**

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall

constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such

meetings shall be given

Section 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kasas Society shall be from

February first through January thirty-first.
Section 2. Dues The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.60 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. A chapter whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess chapter to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman the State Recording Sccretary and three members apointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget as approved by the State board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and

Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Student Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals, and interest on monies invested

for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the

Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee. Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the previous State Converence, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee nincty days prior to the State Conserence. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the state Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been

presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.
Section 7. Public Relations. The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an exofficio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resumes shall not be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent for use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

ARTICLE XIII. Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State Shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in

each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District Secretary thirty days in advance to all chapers within the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each District shall as its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The terms of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three terms.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers in or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year the chapter recording secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officrs for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the

Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of a National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January first in order to have

them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State

Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer, 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairman and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 cach; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairman of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C.A.R. 1; District Director, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society. 2: The President General, 1; The Kansas State Historical Society, 1; the DAR National Library, 1; and the President of the State Officers Club, Chapter Regents Club and the State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2 Chairman of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

No. 3. No less than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each

year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.

No.4. The State Registrar shall furnish the editor of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.

No. 5. A sum of \$750.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the

purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

No. 6. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

No. 7. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of

flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

No. 8. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of

Pages at Continental Congress.

No. 9. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund and \$1.00 to the State DAR Library. \$1.00 to the

Shawnee Mission Fund.

No. 10. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (25¢).

No. 11. The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its properties

housed in Shawnee Mission.

No. 12. The State Society shall allocate \$25.00 annually to the El Cuarteleio Committee for the proper upkeep of the El Cuartelejo Monument in Scott County.

No. 13. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 14. The sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be

used for the C.A.R. projects.

No. 15. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file of the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 16. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board

Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

No. 17. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 18. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 19. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 20. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

(a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City

Recreation Center.

(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.

(c) Rental of \$100 a year shall be paid for Housing of the Kansas DAR Library. It shall be housed with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the Dodge City Recreation Center, making it a valuable resource center.

(d) That the materials submitted to the KSDAR Library shall be limited to

items of genealogical nature. Donors are asked to check with the librarian

before presentation to avoid duplication.

No. 21. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

No. 22. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-

thirds of her elected term.

No. 23. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a

Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.

No. 24. A \$10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive vears.

No. 25. The Runner-up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an

appropriate gift as an award.

No. 26. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests of the Kansas Lunchoon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

No. 27. The State Regent shall apoint a committee before the closing session

of the State Conference to review the minutes of the session.

No. 28. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State

Conference by a two-thirds vote of these delegates voting.

No. 29. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before August 1 by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, subject to the approval of the State Regent.

No. 30. KSDAR shall place a \$25 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR

Magazine.
