Preamble of the Constitution of the United States of America

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for common defense, promote the general welfare and secure the blessing of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Consitution for the United States of America.

CONFERENCE RULES

- 1. All sessions will begin at the hour announced.
- 2. No one is to be seated during reports, speeches or musical numbers.
- 3. At all business sessions, members will wear their registration Badge along with blue ribbon for delegates, red ribbon for alternates, and green ribbon for non-voting members.
- 4. Any business unfinished at the time set for recess shall be resumed at the next session at the point when the recess was taken.
- 5. Only delegates have the privilege of the floor.
- No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes at one time, except by the consent of the Conference.
- 7. Only the chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 8. In making reports time allocated for State Officers is not limited. Committee Chairman 4 minutes, District Directors 2 minutes, Chapter Regents 2 minutes.
- 9. If both the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent are absent, the report shall be filed, unless otherwise ordered.
- 10. All motions shall be written and signed by the movers and seconder, and handed to the Recording Secretary before action is taken.
- A timekeeper will be appointed. All speakers shall conform to the ruling when time is called.
- 12. A typowritton copy of each and every report must be filed with the Recording Secretary as it is presented, and a copy of such report also handed to the State Regent.
- If the Officers, Chairman or Appointee is not present her report shall be filed for printing in the Official Proceedings, unless otherwise ordered.
- 14. All resolutions shall be in the hands of the Resolutions Committee not later than Thursday, March 24, 1976.
- 15. Any chairman or individual who had a table display or exhibit will please attend to removal of all materials at the close of the Conference. Do not leave this detail for the hostess chapters.
- Members who appear on the program or are making reports will always
 please occupy front seats.
- 17. Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING September 7, 1976

The Board of Management of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution met in the Mid-Americana room of the Ramada Inn in Manhattan, Kansas, at 9:00 a.m. The State Regent, Mrs. Francis L. Johnson called the meeting to order. The State Chaplain, Mrs. John L. Myers gave the invocation, and State Treasurer, Mrs. Clarke T. Jackson led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. Roll call was answered by 10 State Officers, 1 Honorary State Regent and 16 Chapter Regents.

RESOLUTIONS OF KSDAR 1977

NATIONAL DEFENSE

WHEREAS, Defense officials are admitting that we must begin to reverse present military trends lest we, the United States of America, be in an untenable position in the near future; and

WHEREAS, President Carter is urging a cut in our Defense budget; and

WHEREAS, many people are beginning to express a demand for a stronger military posture and return to a sane foreign policy;

RESOLVED, That individual members Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution support all reasonable measures to increase military strength in face of today's dangers.

"DETENTE"

WHEREAS, Evidence that "detente" has failed to live up to expectations can be found in the Soviet aggressions in Angola, the Soviet actions in the Middle East in 1973 and the exploitation of our trade agreements; and

WHEREAS, the assumption behind "detente" as expressed by the United States has been that Soviet leaders would recognize the mutual advantages in minimizing the possibility of nuclear war; and

WHEREAS, United States leaders hoped for a change in Soviet expansionist policies and a halt to the continuing "class-struggle" attack against the leading capitalist state, the United States;

RESOLVED, That individual members of Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution should urge Congress to expend its diplomatic energies and try to provide leadership to what remains of the free world, showing to the World that we are a nation united at home and firm without belligerence abroad.

PANAMA CANAL

WHEREAS, We built the Panama Canal, paid for it and received title in perpetuity, and have maintained it ever since, spending hundred millions of dollars for this purpose, and defending it; and

WHEREAS, the economy of Panama, governed by a dictator, ruthless and undependable, who cannot be relied upon to abide by any treaty or promise; and

WHEREAS, the economy of Panama is in a deplorable state and Torrijos plans to use ownership of the Canal as an emotional issue to divert attention from his many domestic failures, and to use tolls to bolster up this economy, rather than to maintain and defend it; and

WHEREAS, the Canal is a life line for the United States to move shipping from one continent to another, and to defend its interests throughout the world; and

WHEREAS, Cuba, backed by the Soviet Union, is very much interested in destroying the power of the United States in this area, and are backing Panama in its demands; and

WHEREAS, any treaty, however faithfully maintained, necessarily must weaken United States influence in South America and thereby through the Free World;

RESOLVED, That individual members of Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge the United States to stoutly defend its right to total and unencumbered ownership and control of the Canal, and that it consistently decline to participate in or approve any treaty that would, in any way, change the present status.

CONSERVATION

WHEREAS, The NSDAR has strongly supported Conservation efforts since 1909; and

WHEREAS, water and land pollution is becoming more detrimental to wildlife and wildlife habitat; and

WHEREAS, the energy crisis continues to escalate; and

WHEREAS, non-returnable containers cause litter, use extra energy and oil in their manufacture and add to trash collection and disposal; and

WHEREAS, Schatc Bill #147 is now before the Federal and State Affairs Committee of the Senate:

RESOLVED, That the Kansas State Daughters of the American Revolution encourage its members as individuals to contact their State Senators and Representatives requesting them to enact legislation which would require that all containers be reusable and that pull tab tops be prohibited in the State of Kansas.

RECOGNITION FOR OUTSTANDING YOUTH AND ADULT LEADERS

WHEREAS, Membership in the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution is based by virtue of descent of the members from a patriot who rendered loyal service, either military or non military in the cause of freedom and independence and, by so doing, helped to further the establishment of the great Commonwealth of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution feel strongly that the future strength of our nation is dependent on the leadership and strength of our young people;

RESOLVED, That recognition be given at local, state and national levels to outstanding youths and adults for religious and civic leadership, educational and cultural achievements in any field for the betterment or enrichment of others.

APPRECIATION FOR OUR SENIOR CITIZENS

WHEREAS, Members of KSDAR realize the strength of this nation is determined by the quality of the citizeno and the abilities of its leaders;

RESOLVED, That the members of KSDAR show their appreciation of the experience, wisdom and strength of purpose of our Senior Citizens by letting them know that we value them by accepting assistance and advice from them whenever possible, by showing our respect to them, by visiting with them and by realizing the mutual benefits received.

AGRICULTURE - MARKETING ABROAD

WHEREAS, The agricultural situation economically, and especially that of wheat and corn, has been steadily worsening, due to the recent steady decline in prices, caused in part by an overabundant supply, and in part by government intervention in calco abroad, and most recently by unfavorable weather conditions; and

WHEREAS, prices paid for wheat almost two years ago were as much as \$5.00 per bushel which encouraged farmers to increase production in the hope of obtaining additional income to aid in meeting mounting costs of production; and

WHEREAS, the only condition that could take care of increased supplies is an expanding world market; and

WHEREAS, sales in world markets have become increasingly difficult, due to demands of labor and those of AFL-CIO president, George Meany, that shipments be stopped until demands be met, a situation weakly agreed to by former President Ford; and to demands of the Maritime Union that a considerable part of overseas chipments be made in U.S. vessels at greatly increased costs, which had to be paid for by foreign buyers, making it difficult to compete with other grain shippers, Canada, Argentina and Australia;

RESOLVED, That individual members of Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge the United States Government to abstain in any and all ways from interfering with sales contracted abroad, and to strongly resist any and all demands of labor that might tend to hinder these sales by increasing costs which would ultimately have to be paid by the farmer.

CUBA

WHEREAS, Cuba has demonstrated to the United States of America and the world that it is a pupper state of Soviet Russia and blatantly sends troops to countries to aid the Communistic cause; and

WHEREAS, Fidel Castro is continuing a friendly allegiance with the Sovict Russia and aiding in overy way possible to harm and discredit the United States of America: and

WHEREAS, Cuba is back of the discontent in Panama and other South American countries and encourages foreign intervention in the Western Hemispehre;

RESOLVED, That individual members of Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution roaffirm their belief that there should be no diplomatic relations nor trade with Cuba.

PROTECTING OUR MISSLES

WHEREAS, There is a growing Soviet threat to our ICBM's (Inter Continental Ballistic Missles); and

WHEREAS, a multibillion dollar plan providing for a new system of deploying U.S. Land-based missles; and

WHEREAS, this plan calls for the construction of several thousand additional and alternate launching shelter installations throughout the country; and

WHEREAS, the smaller number of actual ICBM's would be readily moved and deployed these installations "on a random pattern deliberately varied at adequate intervals of time;" and

WHEREAS, the plan is being proposed as a compromise between proposals for vastly increasing the number of U.S. ICBM's to meet the Soviet threat and the phasing out of ICBM installations on the grounds that the Russians will soon have the capability to neutralize them with a first strike force;

RESOLVED, That individual members of Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge the President and Congress to oppose any measure that would aid the Russians to keep track of the whereabouts of all U.S. ICBM's despite the changing deployment system; and

RESOLVED, That individual members of KSDAR urge that our missles be protected by either increasing the number of land based ICBM's or by forcing the Russians to cut down on their overall nuclear strike force.

OBJECTIONAL COMMERCIALS

WHEREAS, Objectional Commercials are now being presented during prime time on T.V.;

RESOLVED, That the members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, write to the President of the companies paying for such distastoful advertising and expressing their opinion; and

RESOLVED, That the individual members write letters of protest to Emile Criffin, National Advertising Council of Better Business Burcau, 845 Third Avenue, New York, 10022; and

RESOLVED, That individual members abstain from purchasing products presented to the public in this way.

HISTORIAN

Bi-Centennial activities are still with uo, and this is as it should be. Mrs. La Cauza, Historian General has requested a survey of buildings owned by DAR Chapters, so a letter was sent to each chapter regent. The response was negative except the Esther Lowrey Chapter of Independence. Mrs. Funston, the Regent, sent a very fine resume including photographs of a building which they owned, now being used by the Campfire Girls.

As of January 1st, a questionnaire was mailed to each chapter historian, with the following general response from 51 of the 63 chapters. 234 historical programs were reported for both children and adults. Altogether 133 graves of DAR members were marked. Two graves of daughters of Revolutionary Soldiers were marked. Many exceptional radio programs were reported such as "Flash Back in History" 5 minutes daily, 5 days a week through July, written by Frances Williams of the Arthur Barrett Chapter of Marysville. Atchison chapter is completing the restoration of a monument about the Lewis and Clark Expedition of 1804-06. The list of special accomplishments is too lengthy to include. Dodge City Chapter has moved a Santa Fe Trail monument to a more appropriate location. Some chapters report planting of shrubbery around an existing monument. A book of the questionnaires is on exhibit so you may see for yourselves.

A most informative letter came to me from Mrs. Frank Emilio La Cauza, Historial General, about Real Daughters. As DAR was founded in 1890, it might occum an impossibility for a daughter to be alive to join NSDAR. However, there were 759 Real Daughters, and the last one died in 1943.

This has been a most interesting and rewarding year for your Historian, and many thanks are due to all of the participating chapters.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

Questionnaires for Constitution Week observances were sent to each Chapter Chairman or Regent in September to be returned by October 15th. There was 100% participation, which means that every Chapter responded. Various activities were listed. Almost every chapter urged members to display the Flag of the United States of America during the week of September 17-23. Many asked the Mayor of their city to issue a proclamation urging citizens to observe the Week and give special thanks to the Almighty and the Founding Fathers of our Beloved Country.

The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and Constitution Week celebration was enjoyed by DAR members and friends on September 15, 1976. It was beautifully arranged by Mrs. Forrest Gilmour, Shawnee Mission Chairman, and included music by the Hallmark singers, an address by Ray Morgan of the Kansas City Star, besides tours of the Mission buildings and presentations of suitable articles for the DAR rooms. The Regents' Roundtable of Johnson and Wyandotte Counties were responsible for much news coverage, and obtaining Mayors' proclamations. A great many of the Kansas Chapters sent photos and

clippings of their Constitution Week displays in schools and libraries. All of

this material is on display for your perusal.

Some of the statistics are of interest, such as 39 mayors proclaimed the Week; a total of 1,094 inches of publicity in 69 articles, 34 pictures and 6 editorials; 240 minutes of Radio in 150 Spot Announcements and 5 programs; 143 minutes of TV with 44 spot announcements in 3 TV Programs; displays in banks, libraries and schools add up to 34, and the programs total 55; 72 pieces of patriotic literature other than National Defense were distributed and 520 pieces of literature were purchased from the National Defense Office. Please look through the book. I am most grateful for the help of Chapter Chairmen and Regents.

REPORTER

It has been a pleasure and a privilege to serve you as your State Reporter the past 3 years. Thank you for your yearbooks and your interest in the DAR News. Thanks too to those who provided pictures and stories for the NEWS.

As your State Reporter I have attended all meetings of the Executive Committee and State Board of Management meetings, Shawnce Mission Pilgrimage, and Eisenhower Pilgrimage. About Fifty cents of your state dues went for printing and sending you the last three issues of the NEWS. to solve all those other little problems that come up.

It will be noted that Michel Ney of Parsons was the 5th Grade winner in 1976. Congratulations to Michel Ney for being a two-year winner!

Many thanks to all of the Chapter Chairman and Regents who sent in cssays. There are 56 cssays, distributed as follows; eleven for the 5th Grade, fifteen for the 6th, eight for the 7th and 22 for the 8th grade. Also thanks are due to the American History Teachers involved in this offort and the non DAR judges. The Essay Contest is a real challenge to all involved, and a wonderfully

interesting and instructive experience.

AMERICAN INDIANS Alice M. Bogren

In reply to questionnaires sent out by your State Chairman of the American Indians Committee thirty four Kansas Chapters reported on contributions made to the American Indians as follows:

BACONE COLLEGE

A total of \$102.25 was donated to their National Projects - (s Chair in

Silversmithing).

\$516.75 were donated toward Bacone scholarships. Dr. Geneva Herndon of Courtney-Spalding Chapter, Hays, donated a \$300.00 scholarship for the fourth consecutive year. We are extremely grateful for her generosity. Mrs. W.J. Mädden, also of Courtney Spalding, contributed \$25.00 toward a scholarship fund. Randolph Loving Chapter of Wichita gave \$50.00 toward the fund.

Six thrift packages weighing 3151/2 pounds at an estimated value of around

\$1,000.00 were sent to Bacone College.

Miscellaneous gifts totalling \$175.00 were also reported.

ST. MARY'S SCHOOL FOR INDIAN GIRLS

A total of \$112.00 was contributed to the National Project (a Bus).

Miss Nancy Madden of Courtney Spalding Chapter donated \$25.00 toward a scholarship and Mrs. A.W. Bogren, Courtney-Spalding, gave \$250.00 toward a scholarship for a nurse. An additional \$29.00 were also contributed toward the scholarship fund.

Six thrift packages weighing 301# 40 oz. at an estimated value of \$542.29

were donated.

Other assistance in the amount of \$22.00 was reported. The General Indian Scholarship Fund received \$42.75.

Mrs. F.C. Mattax, ElDorado, is contributing \$100.00 toward the Southwest Indian Foundation, it was reported.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUALS Mrs. A.E. Voigt

Each Kansas Daughter loves America and works hard to protect its customs and values. She repeats the American's Creed at each meeting and responds to the meaning of those words by giving Americanism talks to other organizations and by helping youth in 4 H Clubs, in schools and in courts. She gives her time to assist many new citizens to become good Americans. She not only donates many appropriate momentoes to them but shows she cares by teaching them our American ideals.

Of the 45 chapters reporting, 16 entertained new citizens with a reception. One sent money to help buy gifts since there was no Naturalization Court in their town. 344 manuals were given to applicants and 12 were placed in schools or presented to individuals. This year Dodge City Chapter presented an Americanism Medal to a naturalized citizen and Esther Lowrey Chapter honored an outstanding citizen with the Medal of Honor. Several chapters demonstrated Americanism to the many Vietnamese families living in Kansas.

Let us always remember to stand up for America, our Country and to honor her. Be proud, Daughters, and keep our country strong.

U.S.A. BICENTENNIAL REPORT Lucile Wulfmeyer

Desiring to increase appreciation and general knowledge among school children of a unique and little known Kansas trail in Southeastern Kansas, I secured from the Kansas American Revolution Bicentennial Commission a federal matching grant and invited youth in schools along with the original Black Dog Trail used by the Osage Indians in the early 1800's to participate in the contest through original contributions in literature and the arts, on Chief Black Dog and the Osage Tribe.

The contest culminated September 10 to October 2 in a series of dedications of markers placed in towns (Oxford, Winfield, Dexter, Chautauqua, Coffeyville and Caney) along the 150-mile trail near favorite campsites of Chief Black Dog with city officials cooperating in the choice of sites and assisting in the installation of the porcelain enamel-on-steel signs which hang from cedar posts and feature a student's winning art sketch, a stylized drawing representative of the Osage Wah-Kon-Dah (Great Spirit). There are over 122 known trails in Kansas and although at least seven were officially marked, none had been previously marked in Southeast Kansas, and none had honored the American Indian. Our project received two national awards and a letter of commendation from Governor Robert Bennett. Estimated cost of the completed project was \$1,259.03.

In 1976 I gave three awards to chapters for Bicentennial effort: William Wilson, Capt. Jesse Leavenworth, and Four Winds. 1977 awards went to Atchison for newspaper publicity and Arthur Barrett for TV radio. We totalled 2729½" of Bicentennial coverage and 651 minutes of TV-radio time. There were 12 Bicentennial publications reported and we forwarded three color slides of our project for housing in the Bicentennial Chest at National Headquarters.

C.A.R. REPORT Mrs. Raymond E. Briggs

The Kansas State Society Children of the American Revolution is growing and progressing. The membership has increased by six and a number of papers

pending in Washington. The total membership is 60.

The Children owe thanks to the Daughters in many ways for the things they have done for uo. On April 24th in Washington, the Kansas Color Boaror will present a new Kansao State Flag with flag pole in NSCAR. For this honor, we arc thankful to the Kansas Daughters. Also so many of the Daughters came forth and gave to become State Promoters, one Life Promoter and two for Endowment Fund.

On March 5th, the thirty first Annual State Conference was hold in Topeka. The number in attendance was two fold increase over last year. The Kansas Society Sons of the American Revolution presented a U.S. Flag and a Kansas Flag to the KSCAR. We are grateful. We are also selling the Kansas Seal Pins to make money for the Great Plains Regional meeting which we are the host, July 26.27, 1977 in topeka, Kansas. We couldn't go on as a state organization without your support of 5¢ per

member of KSDAR from the State Society. Thank you all again.

I would like the Daughters to give a lot of thought to C.A.R. We need to organize more societies in the state. We have the members but not the senior leadership. With C.A.R. we are building, the leaders of tomorrow.

CONSERVATION Mrs. A.L. Ellege

We had a good year Conservation wise in DAR; forty-eight chapters returned the questionnaire that was mailed to the regent at the end of January. I had stated in my letter last year to the chairmen that a copy of the questionnaire be made since it would be almost identical this year. A few chapters complied with this request.

Seventeen chapters had a Bicentennial Conservation Project with a total of

\$555.00 money being reported spent on it.

Twelve chapters reported that they had fostered a tree stand improvement of Tree Farming. Fifteen chapters reported planting a tree for each member with a total of 493 trees being planted. Ten chapters reported having a Green Belt or Green Patch program. Sixteen chapters reported having beautiful parks, schools, museums, monuments or other public places with a total of \$220.45 being spent on it.

Nine chapters reported giving some form of a conservation scholarship amounting to \$200.00. Thirteen chapters worked on Conservation Education with youth through the schools, CAR, 4-H, JAC, Camp Fire Girls, Elementary

Libraries.

Thirty-eight chapters made an effort through its members to protect or feed wildlife or provide good wildlife habitat, 248 members established wildlife habitats.

Thirty-seven chapters had a program on conservation this year. Twelve chapters reported studying federal land-use controls. Ninety-eight DARs acting as individuals wrote letters or acted in some way concerning legislation on conservation.

Six chapters sent conservation resolutions to the State DAR conference.

These entries were judged on the percentage points as indicated on the questionnaire that each contestant filled out plus all other items requested for the entry. Six well qualified judges gave of their time to make the very difficult decision as to the winner.

The 1st place winner was Kim Hamlin, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. William Hamlin. She is a student at Eudora High School and was sponsored by the Betty Washington Chapter. Kim was presented a \$100 series E Savings Bond at the 1977 DAR State Conference.

1st Runner-up was Joan Elizabeth Jantzen, daughter of Mrs. Victor Jantzen. Joan is a student at North High School, Wichita, Kansas and was sponsored by Randolph Loving Chapter. She was presented an engraved silver bowl at the March DAR Conference.

Good Citizens are honored at the chapter level in various manners and many

chapters present the certificate at the school award assembly.

LINEAGE RESEARCH Mrs. J.F. Parenteau

Thank you for the opportunity to serve as Chairman of the Lineage Research Committee. It was my choice of committees and the research has been a pleasure. It has been frustrating at times, but the thank you notes show that at least a few people have gotten some leads on what to do next.

The heavy backlog of requests for assistance to the National Chairman has resulted in long delays — 18 months or more in some cases. That was because for three different periods this year alone, the headquarters staff was loaned to the office of the Registrar General for the processing of new applications. Everyone decided to join the DAR in the Bicentennial year! Mrs. Knoche of Fort Larned Chapter sent a request to me on April 7, 1975, for assistance on a prospective member. The reply was received on March 3, 1977, two years, locking one month, later! But there have been some good results, too.

The postcard form of the questionaire received excellent results. All but five chapters returned the eard with interesting responses. Seventeen chapters said they sent requests for help to me. Three requests for help were sent by your chairman to the National Chairman. About 20 requests for help were received from other states. Twenty-five chapter chairmen sent requests direct to National. Right here it should be mentioned that requests to National are supposed to go through the State Chairman, and not direct! Many times the State Chairman can solve the problem hercelf and that saves time for the National Committee. The State Chairman also has the "Blue Book" and can refer you to someone in the county where you are searching. Twelve such requests were sent to other states. This service is only for prospective members, of course.

We assisted a total of 245 potential members and acquired 126 new members through the efforts of this committee. Sixteen programs, workshops, and seminars were given. Eleven \$3.00 kits were bought, and a goodly supply of the free Lineage Research charts were distributed.

Thank you, Madame Regent, for the opportunity to serve you as chairman of

the Lineage Research Committee during your term of office.

MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Harry M. Ives

In January questionaires suggested by the National Membership Chairman were went to all 62 chapters. Forty five were returned which is less than last year. These women are aware that our very existence depends on new members

and are doing all in their power to interest new mebers.

Summary of the Kansas Questionaires: Three CAR members transferred to DAR Chapters. There are only two CAR Chapters in the State Society. This is a vital source of new members. CAR needs your interest and support. Eighty-four 1971 Revised Membership Guides were used in ten Chapters. Free Prospective Member Forms are used between Chapters and State to cite a prospective member. Fifteen chapters have used this method this year and I received one from Illinois and sent the form to the Chapter nearest the prospective's home. These and the Revised Membership Guides are free. Write to the Naitonal Corresponding Secretary, National Headquarters, 1776 D. Street, Washington, D.C. 20008. Forty Chapters have access to the Patriot Index' and the Supplements in their local libraries or Genealogical Societies and some members. Every Chapter should have these for their Registrars to use in checking ancestors and their service for prospective members. The Membership Commission is always ready to help.

The Official Count Out for Membership was received in April, too late for last years report. From Feb. 1, 1976 to Feb. 1, 1977 the Official was 3584 members in the Kansas Society. The 1976-1977 Official Count has not been received. Last year's account showed that 31 chapters in the Kansas Society had gains in membership totaling 92. Fourteen Chapters showed a loss totaling 74

members. The Kansas Society did have a gain in membership.

Nationally 35 of our 50 states showed gains in membership, one state remained the same and others had fewer losses than before, so that too is a

gain.

From your reports the best way to realize new members are: Seminars and Workshops, Guest Day in Chapters where friendly well-informed members "sell" the DAR story, telling DAR projects and programs; to friends in other organizations who are eligible for membership in our Society; and a good active Membership Commission ready to assist prospective members with their papers.

Avoid resignations by a friendly personal call to inactive and shut in members. After all fails resign a member in good standing, never permit a drop.

Use the Friendship Fund which was set up for this purpose.

Cimarron River Valley Chapter has won the Award of the Certificate from the National Chairman of Membership Committee for the greatest percent net increase in membership, Cimarron River Valley Chapter had a 25% net increase.

NATIONAL DEFENSE REPORT Mrs. E.G. Freese

Thirty-one Kansas chapters returned to me the 1976-1977 questionnaire mailed directly to them by National. Each of these chapters devote the required amount of time to national defence at chapter meetings and twenty-one of them report giving more than the required time. Twenty-seven chapters studied and discussed the 1976 resolutions and thirty had national defense material available at chapter meetings. Some also made this material available to schools, libraries and interceted individuals. There are nine paid subscriptions to the National Defender.

Thirteen chapters gave a total of thirty-seven dollars to Dollars for Defense.

Seven chapters participate in the ROTC Medal program.

Three of our members hold elective public office and at least one hundred sixty wrote as individual American citizons to members of Congress regarding legislation and treaties.

PUBLIC RELATIONS Mrs. Bill E. Smith

The past three years have been busy once for your State Chairman especially during the Bicentennial year! DAR Public Relations have shown remarkable

gains in the field of the news media including Press, Radio and TV. Two entries were made by the Minisa Chapter in The Feature Story Contest — in the Bicentennial U.S.A. Category — one in the Single Feature Story and the other in a Series of Articles featuring the dedication of Black Dog Trail Markers throughout coutheastern Kansas. I have been advised the stories and series of articles have been entered in the National Feature Story Contest for judging.

()nce again our year was closed with participation of all Chapters in reaching the 100% goal of articles sent to the Press Book Chairman, therefore, for the second time in two years Kansas has a Press Book cligible for judging in

the National Press Book Contest at Continental Congress.

An increase in nows articles and in the number of photos printed this year has been noted — again Magazine articles and photes were counted and also increased in this area. One hundred eleven newspapers in Kansas carried DAR stories

A tremendous increase over last year was noted in TV Publicity and an increase in the Radio announcements also surpassed last year's total. SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER Flossie Scofield

I regret to report that I received a response from only nine chapters (including my own) in regard to my plea of aid for the Microfilm Center, at the DAR Library in Washington, with a total of \$37.50 donated (\$19.50 of which came through the Neodesha Chapter, with personal donations making up most of it). This was a big disappointment to me, and fell far short of the \$57.45 contributed last year.

I sent out two requests the previous year and only one this year — all at my personal expense, which is no small item when there are 63 chapters.

The response might be greater if the DAR members were genealogists themselves instead of joiners through the work of some relative. Having worked on my family history many years in many libraries I know the value of the microfilms, and more especially the value of the 1880 Soundex Index which they are trying so hard to acquire. It can be accomplished only with the cooperation of each chapter through each individual.

year, and respond to a one-time reminder.

DAR SERVICE VETERANS-PATIENTS Mrs. S.M. Vendy

This year 43 chapters reported work being done for the Veteran-Patients. Some were out of state like the Naval Hospital, San Diego, CA; a private home, Belton, TX; VA Hospital, Grand Island, NB; and then — Morris County Hospital, Council Grove; VA Centers at Leavenworth, Topeka & Wichita; Soldier's Home, Fort Dodge; Sunrise House & State Mental Hospital, Larned and Fort Dodge, Dodge City — all in the State of Kansas. And when it gets all added up the totals read as follows: 12 lap robes, 410 books (including paper backs), 250 puzzles (crossword and jigsaw), 815 cup cakes with tiny flags, home made cookies, 1 dictionary, 1 Bible, 1 mattress, springs, bedding and warm clothes, 200 magazines plus Readers Digest and Book Digest, 10 National Geographics, clothing, playing cards, 20 letters written, 12 bingo parties and

prizes, \$218.30 donated for canteen books, 12 patriotic days commemorated, 10 braille flags, 10 chapters had special talks about the Veteran-Patients, 1,279 personal visits with a total of 5, 592 hours spent, thread, craft items, stationery, all occasion cards, pamphlets, toiletry articles, candy, nuts, towels, combs and socks.

The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage on September 15, 1976, was a happy day for 137 members and guests of the Kansas Society. Members of the Olathe Chapter served cookies and coffee provided by the local chapters. It was a pleasant day to sit outside and visit with friends, old and new, on this 44th annual observance of Constitution Day by the Kansas Society.

The ceremony for the presentation of gifts was conducted by the State Regent, Mrs. Francis L. Johnson. The gifts included a brass candleholder from Mrs. Vincent Signaigo, James Ross Chapter; a pressed glass art nouveau lamp from Mrs. George Hobson, Sagamore Chapter; and a redware pie plate and matching pitcher from Mrs. F.A. Graf, James Ross Chapter. These gifts were accepted by Mr. Stanley Sohl for the Kansas State Historical Society. Mr. Sohl was very happy to have all of these articles, which he described as fine pieces. for the DAR rooms.

STATE REGENT'S REPORT ON CONTINENTAL CONGRESS 1977 Mrs. Francis L. Johnson

Prior to the opening of the Eighty-Sixth Continental Congress Memorial Services were held on Sunday Afternoon in Constitution Hall for the 4579 Deceased Daughters who have entered into Eternal Life.

On the roll of deceased Past State Regents was the name of Maude Haver Davis (Mrs. Chester), Isabella Welding Chapter, Kansas. State Vice Regent of

Kansas 1953-1956, State Regent 1956-1959.

Monday night Constitution Hall was a mass of color. Following the bugle call and to the tune of a spirited march, the Pages, all in white, came down the aisle carrying the Flags in a very colorful and impressive procession. Once again we got a lump in our throats when the beautiful Flag of the United States of America unfurled majestically from the ceiling and fluttered gracefully over the head of the President General, Mrs. Wakelee Rawson Smith, as she reached the center of the huge auditorium.

Greetings were brought to the Daughters by the Hon. Walter E. Washington, Mayor of the District of Columbia, also from Mr. Matthew B. Sellers III, President General S.A.R. and Mrs. Charles M. Scheer, Senior National President C.A.R., who presented the National President, Stephen Scott Miller.

One of the highlights of the evening was the announcement and presentation of the 1977 Outstanding Junior Member, Andrea Egan Weyhing of Michigan.

The guest speaker for the evening was the Honorable John B. Connally, who captivated the audience with his address on "vital Issues." Governor Connally took issues of today and correlated them with the past and pointed out what can be done for the future.

Tuesday morning the session opened with the usual ritual, followed by the reports of the executive officers. There was no session Tuesday afternoon, a time traditionally alloted for a Tea at the White House. For the sake of some familial privacy, First Lady Rosalynn Carter has banned afternoon tours of the White House. The ban was reissued by President Carter "so that the family can come and go" without running into tourists.

Tuesday night was the National Defense night of the Congress with the guest speaker, Major General George J. Keegan, Jr., USAF, who gave a tremendous address on our National Defense. It will be printed in the DAR

Magazine and you are urged to read it in full.

Wednesday morning was Reports of the Administrative committees and special and National committees. Steven A. Fisher of Port Chester, New York was named the recipient of the 1977 American History Scholarship. Wednesday afternoon was the official presentation and voting on Resolutions. During this afternoon session, the Hall had to be cleared due to a note received from an irate young man stating that he had placed a bomb in the Hall. The reason given was that his mother's application papers had not been approved for membership. The trained dogs were turned into the Hall after all had been cleared from the building, but nothing was found.

Wednesday night was "State Regents' Night," a traditional part of Congress, with Regents from 51 States (Mexico our newest) and Units Overseas. As usual, it is difficult to condense so many accomplishments into a 2 minute report, but after two or three years in office, State Regents are masters at "not breathing"

for 2 minutes.

Following the reports, the President General presented the 100% Certificates to those State Regents whose State qualified. The State Regent of Kansas was proud to receive the certificate for 100% participation in the President General's Bicentennial Project.

After all State Regents had reported, the stage was cleared and the candidates for the National Offices and their nominators processed to the stage. Kansas Regent, and candidate for the office of Vice President General, drew number one on the ballot; therefore was the first to be nominated. Mary C. Lempenau, Honorary State Regent and Past Librarian General, made a most effective nominating speech for Mrs. Francis Lee Johnson, using no notes. When all had been nominated, the colors were retired and this concluded the evening session.

Thursday was voting, more reports, and the voting on Resolutions, interrupted due to the bomb scare, was finished. The personal teller for the Kansas candidate for V.P.G. was Jane Miller (Mrs. Lloyd) of Uvedale chapter, Hutchinson. The tellers were ready to report at 5:30 p.m. and the President General read that the following were elected to serve as our new National Officers for the term 1977-1980: Mrs. George Upham Baylies, President General; Mrs. Richard D. Shelby, First Vice President General; Mrs. Robert Lacy Jackson, Chaplain General; Mrs. Paul Gerhardt Meyer, Recording Secretary General; Mrs. Carl William Kietzman, Corresponding Secretary General; Mrs. Coray H. Miller, Organizing Secretary; Mrs. John Samuel Biscoe, Treasurer General; Mrs. Herbert Hadley White, Registrar General, Mrs. Raymond Franklin Fleck, Historian General, Miss Martha Ansley Cooper, Librarian General; Mrs. Carl Edwin Carlson, Curator General; and Mrs. Benjamin Watson Musick, Reporter General. The following seven Vice Presidents General were elected for a three year term: Mrs. Carl Ellroy Stark. Mrs. Archie C. Camp, Mrs. Francis Lee Johnson, Miss Frances Vivan Flanders, Mrs. Max L. Pharr, Mrs. William Paul Hale, Mrs. Francis D. Campbell.

Mrs. D. Edwin Gamble was elected Honorary Vice President General.

Thursday evening the Daughters were privileged to hear the United States Navy Sea Chanters, who delighted the audience with their colorful uniforms and singing style. This was followed by another first for DAR. The DAR has entered the world of film making: We had the premier showing of the Society's new film, "Home and Country." The film was originally conceived as part of an orientation program to visitors to the DAR Museum and will be used primarily for that purpose. It will also be made available to state societies and for chapter use. The 15 minute presentation was an overview of the history, committee work and accomplishments of the DAR as well as an introduction to the DAR Museum and buildings.

Following the unfinished business and new business on Friday morning, Congress was recessed to prepare for the installation ceremony. The entrance march was retiring State Regents, the State Regents elect, the Honorary Vice President General elect, the retiring Vice Presidents General and the Vice Presidents General elect, the retiring National Officers and the National Officers elect.

The State Regents were installed and the ribbon of the office was placed on Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., by the retiring State Regent, Mrs. Francis Lee Johnson. After all State Regents had been installed, the Honorary Vice President General was installed, followed by the installation of the seven Vice Presidents General. The ribbon was placed on the Kansas Vice President General by the retiring Vice President General and newly elected Treasurer General, Mrs. John S. Biscoe.

The newly elected executive officers were installed, and Mrs. Wakelee Rawson Smith was installed as Honorary President General and presented with the pin of that office.

Mrs. George Upham Baylies, President General, made a few remarks, gave her theme for the year, the benediction was given by the retiring Chaplain General, the Colors were retired, and the 86th Continental Congress was adjourned.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

(Revised March 22, 1975)

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Objects

The objects of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historic spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historic research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promise, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and accounting to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter; name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter members shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office, except the State Librarian, in order to provide efficient service to the Society from the city where the genealogical books are located. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least a year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except

when it seem feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. **Terms.** All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regnet is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall be taken.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after their election and no later than November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Sccretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majoirty vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficion member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National

Committee and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence of inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registral hold a Memorial scrvice at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or ir distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Managment and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list o all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers; committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter of good standing, Honorary State Regent, and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first Three Credential Blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officere to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of March. A typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapter, made into a directory form. She shall send to each Chapter Regent before February fifteenth, State conference registration cards for the Regent and elected delegates. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and chall accist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds for the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Recent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duites, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. Immediately after May first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members in good standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reporte received from the National Society. She shall

send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in

each chapter on February first.

Section 8. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter, name and rank of ancestor; colony or state and branch of corvice in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrants requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceeding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend such celebrations of historical events in the State of Kansas as may pertain especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and

monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library.

Section II. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News," and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the

Conference Press Committee.

Section 12. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and the Chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent of the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll; in good standing in the National Society on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

(a) Chapters having less than fifty members, Regent and two delegates.
(b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members, Regent, and five delegates.

(c) Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five

delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled. Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates of the State

Conforence shall be elected on or before the first day of February cach year. Immediately after their election, the three Credentail Blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughtors of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meetings of

the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not

duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegate and alternates cleeted for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the

Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the chapter Regent or in her absence, the chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of

the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Managment shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call,

which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from

February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.60 for each member of the chaptor, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January. A chapter whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess chapter to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allottted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for

approval.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman the State Recording Secretary and three members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding to the State Conference. The budget as approved by the State board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Student Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by

contributions from chapters and individuals, and interest on monies invested

for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented form the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been

presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Public Relations. The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an exofficio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resumes shall not be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent for use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each District shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The terms of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more

than three years.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers in or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year the chapter recording secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names

and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of the National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January first in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the state

Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number

she desires; each State Officer, 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairman and Vice Chairman of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairman of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C.A.R. 1; District Director, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2; The President General, 1; The Kansas State Historical Society, 2; The President General, 1; The Kansas State Historical Society, 1; the DAR National Library, 1; and the President of the State Officers Club, Chapters Regent Club and the State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2. Chairman of State Committees, District Directors and the apointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

No. 3. No loss than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each

year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.

No. 1. The State Registrar shall furnish the editor of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.

No. 5. A sum of \$1,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the

purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

No. 6. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to

partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

No. 7. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

No. 8. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

No. 9. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund and \$1.00 to the State DAR Library. \$1.00 to the Shawnee Mission Fund.

No. 10. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fcc of twenty-five cents (25¢).

No. 11. The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its properties housed in Shawnee Mission.

No. 12. The State Society shall allocate \$25.00 annually to the El Cuartelejo Committee for the proper upkeep of the El Cuartelejo Monument in Scott County.

No. 13. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 14. The sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be

used for the C.A.R. projects.

No. 15. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file of the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 16. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

No. 17. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 18. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy scats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 19. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 20. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City

Recreational Center at Avenue C and Vine in Dodge City, Kanoas.

(a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.

(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.

(c) Rental of \$100 a year shall be paid for Housing of the Kansas DAR Library. It shall be housed with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the

Dodge City Recreation Center, making it a valuable resource center.

(d) That the materials submitted to the KSDAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. Donors are asked to check with the librarian

before presentation to avoid duplication.

No. 21. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

No. 22. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two thirds of her elected term.

No. 23. The Kanoao Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.

No. 24. A \$10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.

No. 25. The Runner-up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an

appropriate gift as an award.

No. 26. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guesto of the Kansas Luncheon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

No. 27. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session

of the State Conference to review the minutes of the session.

No. 28. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote of these delegates voting.

No. 29. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before August 1 by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, subject to the approval of the State Regent.

No. 30. KSDAR shall place a \$25 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR

Magazine.
