- 11. Reports of Committee Chairmen shall be limited to 4 minutes, reports of District Directors and Chapter Regents to 2 minutes. All speakers shall conform to the ruling when time is called.
- 12. A copy of every report for the printed Proceedings of the State Conference shall be typed ready for printing and sent to the State Recording Secretary before the report is read at the Conference.
- 13. If the Officer, Chapter Regent or Chapter Vice Regent, Chairman or Appointee is not present, her report shall not be read and shall be filed for printing in the Official Proceedings unless otherwise ordered.
- 14. Any chairman or individual having a table display or exhibit will please attend to the removal of all material at the close of the Conference.
- 15. Members will please refrain from smoking in the session room.
- Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING WICHITA, KANSAS October 24, 1977

The Board of Management of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution met at 9:00 a.m. on Monday, October 24, 1977 in the Crystal Room of the Holiday Inn East, Wichita, Kansas. Mrs. John W. McGuire, KSDAR State Regent, called the meeting to order. Mrs. Halden R. Moon, State Chaplain, offered a prayer. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of American and the American's Creed were recited and Mrs. Kenneth Anderson led the group in singing the first verse of the National Anthem.

Roll call was answered by thirty-six members of the Board and a quorum was declared to be present. The following chapters were represented by the Chapter Regent: Arthur Barrett, Cofachique, Council Oak, Esther Lowry, Eunice Sterling, Flores Del Sol, General Edward Hand, Isabella Weldin, John Haupt, Lone Elm, Martha Loving Ferrell, Martha Vail, Mary Wade Strother, Minisa, Molly Foster Berry, Neodesha, Newton, Randolph Loving, Shawnee Mission, Topeka, Wichita, William Wilson, And Wyandot. Polly Ogden and Courtney Spalding chapters were represented by the Vice Regent. All ten state officers were present as was Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, NSDAR Vice President General.

Mrs. McGuire presented Miss Pauline Cowger, KSDAR Honorary State Regent.

By general consent the reading of the minutes of the March 24, 1977 Board of Management meeting was dispensed with, as the minutes were printed in the Proceedings of the Seventy-Ninth Annual State Conference.

Each state officer reported on recent activities in connection with her office. Mrs. McGuire briefly explained the President General's proposed project, "Building for Our Future", which will be submitted for approval by the delegates to the 1978 Continental Congress.

Mrs. Moon noted problems in sending condolences to the next-of-kin of deceased members. The address as well as name of the next-of-kin should be sent to her by chapter chaplains. The chapter of the deceased should be noted as well.

Mrs. Woodrow W. Dew, State Recording Secretary, urged Chapter Regents to keep a permanent reference file of State Conference Proceedings. According to Standing Rule Number One Chapter Regents receive one copy of the Proceedings automatically but are entitled to another if they request it.

Mrs. Vincent J. Signaigo, State Treasurer, reviewed the financial status of KSDAR as of September 30, 1977. On the motion of Mrs. James Kershner, the financial report was accepted.

Miss Virginia Weisgerber, State Historian, noted that Governor Robert F. Bennett has consented to issue a proclamation designating February as American History Month in Kansas. He has invited Miss Weisgerber to be present for the signing of the proclamation.

Miss Weisgerber also explained that Kansas DAR chapters can receive credit for marking the grave of a Revolutionary ancestor buried in another state.

Mrs. Walter P. Ostenbert, State Librarian, urged chapters that wish to present books to the National DAR Library do so through the State Librarian. The Kansas DAR Library is in need of some volumes of the Lineage Books of the DAR and contributions for rebinding books. Mrs. Ostenberg noted that the fifth annual supplement to the library holdings catalog is available for thirty-five cents each. One copy is distributed to each chapter free of charge.

State Chairmen present and reporting for their committee were Mrs. Richard C. McGehee, American Heritage; Mrs. Donald T. Ingling, American Indians; Mrs. R.G. Swenson, DAR Service for Veteran Patients; Mrs. Glenn Eastlack, Friends of the Museum; Mrs. Kent Wymore, Honor Roll; and Mrs. H.O. Bullock, National Defense.

Mrs. Ingling recognized Mrs. May Smith of Eunice Sterling Chapter, Wichita, who has established a loan scholarship at Bacone College in the name of her friend, May Raughley.

Recommendations of the Executive Committee of KSDAR were moved by Mrs. Dew and were approved by the Board of Management. They are as follows:1. That extra copies of the current KSDAR Proceedings be sold for \$2.00 per copy and back numbers be sold for \$1.00 per copy.

- 2. That the State Treasurer of KSDAR be authorized to transfer funds that are at present in various Kansas institutions to a banking institution convenient to the State Treasurer.
- 3. That Mrs. John W. McGuire, KSDAR State Regent, be reimbursed in the amount of \$215.00 for the cost of the recognition page honoring Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, NSDAR Vice President General, in the October 1977 issue of the DAR Magazine.

Mrs. Rudolph Barta nominated Mrs. James O. Kershner, Polly Odgen Chapter, Manahattan, for the office of State Organizing Secretary. The office was created at the 1977 State Conference. Mrs. Kershner was unanimously elected by the Board of Management. Another election will be held at the 1978 State Conference to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, KSDAR Vice President General, spoke briefly about the National Board of Management meeting in October and the activities of her office. She is the area representative of the Speaker's Staff and is available to speak on the many facets of DAR.

Mrs. McGuire noted the following goals for the coming year:

- 1. That every Kansas DAR be active in some way--particularly in visiting a veteran patient.
- 2. That the genealogical records program be improved.
- 3. That 100% of the chapters report to the Honor Roll and Constitution Week committee chairmen.

Mrs. Raymond Briggs, 1978 Conference Chairman, announced that the 1978 State Conference will be held March 20-22, 1978 at the Ramada Inn, Topeka. The President General is expected to attend.

Her genealogical library was one to be envied. No one could have given more of her time working on genealogy for others. This and music were her hobbies. She shared with others her knowledge of local, state and National history. She was an avid reader. No one could have been more concerned for the welfare of our country.

Virginia loved people of all ages and was liberal with her contributions. The funds for the Ancestral Index in the last KSDAR Roster, published in 1969, were contributed be her.

Her courage and principles for the Truth remained undaunted. Jean Paul Riehter said, "Each departed friend is a magnet that attrats us to the next world."

I feel honored to have been asked to pay this tribute to Frances Williams who was my dear personal friend. Her death occured last April soon after the State Conference and just before Continental Congress. She had planned and so hoped to attend both meetings but her illness and death intervened.

KSDAR, her own Arthur Barrett chapter, family and friend felt the influence of this dear lady's spiritual outlook and great enthusiasm with which she approached each new task.

She served DAR in may capacities. In her own chapter she was registrar, twice Regent and through her great love of history and geneology the chapter membership and interest increased. The State society benefited from her knowledge of American History when she was State Historian. She was state chairman of the Friendship Fund and NSDAR Museum Committee. She was a member of the State Officers Club, State Chairman's Club and State Regents Club.

DAR was not her sole interest. She was active in 4-H, Farm Bureau, Eastern Star, and the Presbyterian Church. She was State Chairman of Girl's Homemakers and a busy City Librarian for 3 years. I believe her happiest years were those when she was Curator of the Pony Express Barn and the historical Koester House at Marysville. This is not all---she organized the Marshall County Historical Society with 650 charter members and she wrote a column for the Marysville Advocate for 26 ½ years without missing a week. She also wrote for one of the farm magazines. For her ability to express herself by the written word she won a State Award in Kansas Press womens awards for writing contest.

Let us not grieve for Frances Williams but instead be reminded of the great privilege and pleasure it was to have known her. For many reasons we will long remember her with appreciation and love.

RESOLUTIONS OF KSDAR 1978

WHEREAS there are pending before the Kansas Legislature bills dealing with competency based education;

RESOLVED, That the individual members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge the Kansas Legislature to pass legislation providing for standardized testing of competency in the basic skills.

MOVIETONE NEWSREELS

THEREAS the 20th Century is the only century for which there is a photographic record; and

WHEREAS history on newsreel is not hearsay, but actual fact; and WHEREAS millions of feet of historically precious newsreel footage in on highly perishable nitrate film; and

WHEREAS the National Archives has assumed the cost for restoring the first ten years;

BILINGUAL BALLOTS

WHEREAS the Congress of the United States has recently enacted legislation requiring bilingual ballots and bilingual voters information be printed in counties, cities and districts where 3% of the population have minority surnames; and

WHEREAS very few voters have used the bilingual ballots in the various counties where such ballots have been prepared at enormous expense; and

WHEREAS all citizens of the United States should be encouraged to become literate in English in the best interests of the American heritage;

RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge its members to express their opinion to their Congressman and their Senators that Congress should repeal the bilingual ballot legislation and require ballots and voting information to be printed in English.

ELECTION DAY REGISTRATION

WHEREAS the integrity of the ballot is essential to the success and survival of popular based representative governments; and

WHEREAS the proposal of the Carter administration to enact legislation which would allow the registration of voters at the pools on election day without any assurance or opportunity to ascertain whether such individual is a qualified voter in the precinct in which he attempts to register himself; and

WHEREAS for all practical purposes an election result cannot be changed after the election regardless of the amount of vote fraud that is subsequently revealed; and

WHEREAS election day registration is an open invitation to fraud, the stealing of elections, and the corruption of the election process;

RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution oppose any legislation that would allow the registration of voters on election day, and urge its members to express their opposition to such legislation to their Congressman and their Senators.

BLASPHEMOUS MOTION PICTURES

WHEREAS these United States of America were founded on a firm belief in the holiness of God and of his Son, Jesus Christ; and

WHEREAS a film has been produced in Israel, from the book "The Passover Plot", which portrays Christ in the role of a revolutionary charlatan: and

WHEREAS a film is to be produced in Denmark which will portray Christ as a pervert; and

WHEREAS if these films are imported into these United States and are commercially successful, such attacks will spread to all the great leaders of the faith:

RESOLVED, That the individual members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution be alert to the possible importation of these films, namely, "The Passover Plot" and "Many Faces of Jesus" into this country and into local communities; and

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the individual members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution express their opposition to the showing of these films or like films on television or in motion picutre theatres by phoning radio or television talk shows expressing their concern; by contacting community leaders and public figures in their city; and by urging their churches to take a stand on these blasphemous films; and

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the individual members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution will use their efforts to assure that such blasphemous films will not be commercially profitable in the United States, thus discouraging the production of any similar films in the future.

"KANSAS IS NOT FOR SALE"

WHEREAS this Society in 1975 resolved that "Kansas is not for sale"; RESOLVED, That the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm the resolution to support any valid legislation that would protect our lands, our banks, our historical sites and our industries from alien control.

REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

STATE REGENT Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr.

Since my installation at Continental Congress last April, my activities as State Regent have been mainly those of organization and evaluation. I have made ninety State Society appointments, have traveleed over 8000 miles within the State of Kansas and have mailed some 800 pieces of correspondence.

My request to visit the chapters individually in order to become better acquainted with the chapters and with the members has been courteously granted. The chapter visits are the most pleasant privilege of my office. By the time of the summer recess, I shall have visited one-half of the chapters including all of the chapters in the western part of the state.

It is my good fortune to work with State Officers in whom I have complete confidence and who have never hesitated to "go the extra mile" in the performance of their duties. I am grateful for the spirit in which the State Chairmen have accepted and carried out their responsibilities. No negative thought or reluctance has been expressed by any of these dedicated leaders in meeting the requirements of their offices or chairmanships.

"Strength through Unity and Service" was the subject chosen last May for the State Regent's address to the chapters. It was learned later that the National Chairman of Public Relations is emphasizing the service aspects of our seciety. Your State Regent believes that people are attracted to organizations that are doing things, that we should be involved in DAR-related activities within our own communities and that service-related activities have a special appeal for young women. It is important for our members to understand the purpose behind each of our projects as it relates to the objects of our society and to realize that many of our social activities which provide the joy of fellowship and needed relaxation are planned with the underlying purpose of capturing the attention of others and reminding them of our DAR objectives.

The Theme of this Conference, "Kansas DAR Serving Kansas", does not imply diminished interest in our National projects. The participation of our members in DAR activities utilizes time, talent and money, and most of our time and talent is spent on projects within our own state. There is hardly a committee in which one cannot find some activity which is local in nature. "Kansas DAR Serving Kansas" is a reminder that although we are a part of the National Society we are at work in our own state and in our communities.

Two goals set by the State Regent will be continued during the coming two years. The first is to involve every Kansas Daughter in some way in the work of our society. Even the sick and infirm can support our work with their prayers and good wishes. Too often the entire responsibility in a chapter falls on the Chapter Regent and a few chapter officers. Sharing responsibility multiplies the interest and joy of the members in the work of the Society; it makes it easier to get chapter leadership; it frees the Chapter Regent to the extent that she can participate in a normal range of activities within her community thus exemplifying as an individual the qualities of good citizenship.

The second goal is for every able member to make at least one call on a veteran-patient in a Veterans Administration hospital, in a nursing home,

community hospital or in his own home during the year. A few minutes of time and a few cheerful words are the best gift we can give to someone confined for a period of time or permanently disabled. The response of the Kansas Daughters to this project has been gratifying. The concern of our members for the welfare of those who have served in the defense of our country is evidence of our respect for the dignity of military service and of the military profession.

The DAR is alive and flourishing in Kansas. The new chapter, Lone Elm, confirmed at the 86th Continental Congress is active and is located in an area of population growth. Our records show that we have an increase in membership. The State Chairmen, having had only six months to become familiar with their work, are mentioning their feelings of increased confidence and their plans for the coming year.

A membership workshop planned by the members of Sarah Steward Chapter was held in Smith Center in August and the report of that chapter will reveal its success. For the State Regent and others who made the trip, it was an exhilarating experience and one we would like to repeat in other communities. Special appreciation is expressed to Mrs. Jerome Parenteau, who will soon be moving to Maryland, for conducting the workshop and for the hours she has spent in travel and research in behalf of the Lineage Research Committee.

The tradition in Kansas is one of consistent, balanced support for DAR projects and of sincere efforts to meet the Honor Roll requirements as a measure of a balanced and effective chapter program. As in the past, we will accept as part of our DAR obligation our share of the President General's project.

For the State Historian, confronted with problems of relocating and restoring the Santa Fe Trail Markers, this might have been designated the "Year of the Markers". To learn that these markers placed more than seventy years ago, are appreciated, is encouraging and we have welcomed the opportunity to further our work and to tell the DAR story.

The Bicentennial Project of the Kansas Society, the Marking of the Black Dog Trail, is continuing. The State Regent with several representatives of the State Society had the pleasure of attending the dedication of a marker in Elgin on January 29. Mrs. E.L. Wulfmeyer is to be commended for responding to the appeal of communities along the Trail which did not receive markers during the Bicentennial and who are interested in purchasing markers themselves to commemorate this part of their history.

The past year has brought some disappointments. I report with regret that the disbandment of the Fort Supply Trail Chapter is almost complete. Many of the members have transferred to other chapters or to membership at large which shows their interest in the DAR and makes more regrettable the fact that leadership could not be found to hold the chapter together.

Phebe Dustin Chapter has sent official notice of intent to disband. Every effort will be made to revive this chapter which has a record of over fifty years of service to the Society and to the community of Phillipsburg.

We are building on the solid foundation laid by former leaders of our State Society and Chapters. With the help of every Kansas Daughter, I am confident that reports next year and in the succeeding years will record growth in membership, increased support for the National projects and expanded service to our State and to our Country.

Activities include requests from Historian General Mrs. Raymond Fleck and our State Regent Mrs. John McGuire. Of importance were research and report of DAR-owned, partially-restored El Cuartelejo Pueblo, and of Council Grove "Madonna of the Trail" Monument; proposed relocation-restoration of three Santa Fe Trail monuments--McPherson, Dodge City, and Rice County.

Questionnaires from 56 chapters report: 168 historical programs for adults and children; 69 radio and 18 TV broadcasts; 24 anniversities celebrated; 11 historical tours for adults, 106 for children; \$2.00 to Repository of Americana. A Black Dog Trail Marker was placed in City Park, Elgin, Kansas, January 1978. Mary Wade Strother placed a DAR Plaque on grave of a Revolutionary Patriot, and reported two located graves of Revolutionary Soldiers. Uvedale reported two located graves of Revolutionary Soldiers. This year chapters report placing of eleven DAR Lay Member Markers. General Edward Hand assists in maintaining Old Dietrich Cabin, Ottawa; five Topeka members guided 100 children's tours of Historical Society Building, also for Regional C.A.R. and State S.A.R. Requested by the Historian, the Governor issued this year's Kansas American History Month Proclamation.

We stress importance of giving prompt, complete information, and of studying explanations particularly about Markers in DAR HANDBOOK, pages 31-35. Oh, how grateful we are of the conscientious efforts of our Kansas historians!

STATE LIBRARIAN

March is a special month for us as it marks the 48th anniversary of the establishment of the KSDAR Traveling Library. Since 1956 it has had a permanent home in the Dodge City Public Library and now with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the Recreation Center, Avenus G and Vine.

Then as now, our Libraries are supported through gifts of books and money by Chapters, Members and Friends. Seven books, 1 pamphlet and 2 volumes of Periodicals were given the NSDAR Library in addition to \$14 cash. For our State Library in addition to the many books etc., \$227 for general expenses and another \$198.50 for memorial books were received. A special "thanks" goes to Byrd Prewitt Chapter for the \$35 gift (50% of the proceeds from a side walk sale) for the purchase of books.

Ten members gave 112 volunterr sessions at the Library representing 448 hours.

From a small beginning of 36 books, 30 pamphlets/manuscripts and 8 magazines in 1930, a conservative inventory of our acquisitions to date total 3,205 items plus 15 rolls of microfilm.

We are indebted to Miss Virginia Weisgerber for the gift of another sturdy, enclosed book shelf unit. That leaves only 1 more open shelf case to be replaced.

My sincere thanks to our State Regent, Mrs. McGuire and all you other wonderful members for your loyal interest and support.

During the first year of the present administration, three issues of the KSDAR NEWS have been published. Two of these have been six-pages and the first one in August of 1977 was four pages. A-One Steno, Topeka, is continuing as our mailing service and your Reporter has communicated with it many times, informing of 243 additions to the mailing list, 156 changes and 146 names to be taken off the list, making a total of 544 such changes. Approximately 412,000 copies have been mailed by this service, and many copies have been sent by the State Reporter to individuals who did not receive their copies. It is most important to inform us of changes in addresses as quickly as possible as copies of the NEWS are not forwarded by the Post Office. Parker and Sons, Wichita, continue to serve as the KSDAR NEWS printers. Both of these companies have been most helpful.

Regretfully, prices of printing also of mailing have risen and for this reason some items which have been sent to the Reporter are not printed, as an attempt is made to keep the paper to four pages, whenever possible.

Your Reporter has attended all meetings of the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management Meetings, the four District Meetings, State Conference, and other functions to which she was invited. Year Books from the Chapters are appreciated and we say Thank You for them, however, they do not keep us informed of late changes, so these must be sent frequently. At all meetings, copies of the KSDAR NEWS were available to members.

It has been most helpful, also, to receive items of interest from members. These are printed whenever space permits. The State Reporter is extremely grateful to Mrs. Billy Compton, State Registrar, who is also the past Reporter, for her wonderful help in keeping this office posted on membership changes; she wishes to thank the members who wrote encouraging letters, and those who forwarded directly to her their Chapter membership changes; and she has appreciated the cooperation given her by the State Regent, Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., and her fellow officers.

REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL COMMITTEES

AMERICAN HERITAGE

This committee was interested in knowing about the types of American Heritage programs that chapters planned this year; if they participated in any of the special contests as outlined in the directives sent out from the National Chairman and the State Chairman; how many programs were on music; and if our National Anthem was sung at chapter meetings.

The response from the Kansas chapters was less than 25%, but several very interesting new activities were reported. Of the 17 American Heritage programs reported, 8 were in the field of music. Most were scheduled at Christmas time, but 5 programs were a study of American music. Fewer programs on art and literature were reported, indicating the difficulty in finding people to present programs in those cultural mediums.

Chapters told of Heritage tables at meetings, viewing collections, and even viewing an art exhibit. One chapter entered a patchwork pillow top in the craft contest.

The Eunice Sterling Chapter had a meeting at Wichita's historic Cow Town, where the Munger House is now located. They purchased this home, the first in Wichita, re-located it in the present Cow Town, and presented it to the city, because they believed in preserving the heritage of early Wichita for all to enjoy.

Randolph Loving Chapter will have a unique program in May - "The Work of Our Hands", reproductions of heritage pieces, made by each member.

Your chairman will prepare a list of suggestions for American Heritage programs, from the National Societies program catalog, and send to each chapter chairman. The chairman can assist the chapter program chairman in selecting a wider variety of programs next year in the American Heritage field.

One goal of the Kansas Chairman for next year will be the singing of our National Anthem as a regular past of each chapter's opening ritual at meetings. A larger percentage of chapters reports with a wider variety of American Heritage programs will also be stressed.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH: FEBRUARY 1978

This committee follows activities directed by NSDAR Historian General Mrs. Raymond F. Fleck. Information came through "Regents' Packet." chapter chairmen, and State Chairman's Questionnaires, Fifty-One Kansas Chapters reported thus: 122 American History programs: 47 chapter-sponsored displays: use of 72 sets of spot-announcements: 36 members appearing on radio or TV; 689 inches and 49 pictures in newspapers. At the request of the State Society DAR, the Governor issued a Proclamation designating February as American History Month in Kansas. Present for the signing were the State Chairman, State Corresponding Secretary, and the two chapter regents from Topeka. Your State Chairman sent Proclamation copies to all Kansas Chapters. Twenty-nine chapters sponsored 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th Grade American History Essay Contests; 72 schools participated, with 1,022 reported contestants! Chapters presented 37 bronze, and 4 silver medals; 663 Certificates of Appreciation, and 174 of Award. They sent 61 winning essays to the State Chairman. State winning essays, chosen by 3 non-DAR judges, were sent to the Divisional Vice-Chairman for further competition: 5th Grade, Lisa Harris, Betty Washington; 6th Grade. Eric McManaman, Ninnescah; 7th Grade, Jeff Dieker, Four Winds; 8th Grade. Alan McKee, Dana. Our gratitude and congratulations to all involved! As you review this year's activities, please make plans NOW for even greater emphasis on American History Month, February 1979.

Your State American Indians Committee was happy to hear from 39 Chapters or 64% reporting on the following contributions.

Bacone College, Muskogee, Oklahoma:

Printing Room Project had 14 chapters with \$84.00 plus. 747# & 13 boxes for Thrift Shop estimated value \$1220.00. Scholarships received \$400.00 which includes 3 from Dodge City Chapter for \$68.00 & 2 in Randolph Loving for \$300.00. General Fund was donated \$155.50.

St. Mary's School for Indian Girls, Springfield, S.D.: Thrift Shop received 6 packages 223 lbs. amounted to \$66.00. Scholarships was given \$71.75 by the chapters. General Fund was contributed \$129.00.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Of the 43 Chapters reporting there were 1469 hours given in community service in various ways. They gave teas and a warm welcome to newly naturalized citizens. They helped and encouraged them by giving them 608 manuals and many flags and cards. They gave talks to their own Chapters and to other groups. They worked with and encouraged scout troops to attend naturalization proceedings. They entertained foreign students. One Chairman and her husband have had a Chinese boy in Hong Kong as a foster child since 1960 and now are paying for his education at the University of Texas. There were other ideas. One Chapter taught craft classes to children who were released from jail.

Most Chapters repeated the Americans Creed at their meetings and one Chapter is teaching it to history students. The success of our Good Citizens program has been due for the most part to the hard work, long hours and many miles driven by Chapter Chairmen. Of the 170 schools which were contacted, 141 became involved actively. 25 entries were from young men, 3 of whom reached the final judging.

Six judges gave hours to the difficult task of choosing one winner from the many. They based their decision on merit, using as their guidelines those set up by the National Chairman and which stressed Leadership,

Dependability, Service and Patriotism.

Rex Sharp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Sharp, was selected as the Kansas Good Citizen. Mrs. Keith Johnson was Chairman for the sponsoring chapter, Cimarron River Valley of Liberal. Rex was presented with a \$100 "E" Savings Bond at the State Convention in March 1978.

The first runner-up received an engraved silver bowl at the same time. Andrea Berner, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. W.C. Berner, was entered by the Concordia Chapter whose Chairman was Mrs. Gary Reynolds.

In addition to the top winners, 10 were named as Honorable Mention. It was nice to see that each District was represented in this group.

Chapters honored their Citizens in various ways. Most invited them and their parents to be special guests at a meeting, very often a Washington Day tea or luncheon. Sometimes the pins and certificates were presented at special school assemblies. Area newspapers were very good about giving nice covered of the Good Citizens, write-ups and pictures.

In addition to the Chairmen, I would be amiss if I did not thank the many Chapter members and Regents of the participating Chapters for the

cooperation and support given to this committee.

DAR MAGAZINE

There has been a great interest shown in the DAR Magazine. It is the organ that binds all the different chapters into one national unit. It cannot help but be an inspiration to all Chapters when the members read about some of the outstanding accomplishments that the different chapters are doing. Most questionaires come back with a request for more genelogical information, this information may be just what someone needs to become a member or prove another line. Only 24 reports out of 63 have been returned. Next year we need a better report from all the chapters.

DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING

Kansas had \$1280.00 in advertising in the DAR Magazine for 1977-78 with 55 Chapters participating. Total commercial ads amounted to \$135.00 with Mission Hills Chapter selling \$75.00. Mrs. J. Howard Neumann, the past chairman, was responsible for the Kansas ads in the May 1977 issue. There were two full pages, the cooperative page on El Cuartelejo and

Minisa Chapter honoring the "Great Osage Tribe", a gift from the estate of Bird Vanskiver Rounsavell. The Kansas Society honored Mrs. Francis Lee Johnson, Vice President General, with a full page in the October issue. Letters were sent to 22 chapters in November informing them they did not have magazine advertising for Honor Roll credit for 1977-78. Kansas had ads in nine of the ten issues of the DAR Magazine this year. We would like to encourage Chapters to place their ads in the May issue which we help sponsor. A bouquet of Orchids to Ms. Beth Watlington and her staff at NSDAR Magazine Advertising Office for their assistance to your chairman this year.

DAR SCHOOL Miriam G. Eads

The DAR schools are being supported by 33 chapters that sent reports for this year. As we work together, have better understanding and communicate on the needs of the schools, we will more nearly fulfil the purpose of giving every child an opportunity for an education.

The figures for this year show: Tamassee \$347.50, Kate Duncan Smith \$320.50, Crossnore \$46.25, Berry \$1.25, Hillside \$1.25, and Hindman \$1.25.

A contribution of \$27.00 was made for the Home Economics Building at Kate Duncan Smith. Programs were given on the schools by 27 chapters. Ten boxes of books were donated, as were 20 boxes of clothing weighing 697 pounds and valued at \$285.25.

A contribution was made to Tamassee Scholarship fund.

One of the speakers at last year's conference was "The American Dream" by Col. Keith G. Duckers, St. John's Military School.

Emphasis was given to the Home Economics Building at Kate Duncan Smith this year. This is a national project and all contributions large and small are appreciated.

Each of us have a responsibility toward education. Being thankful for the opportunities given to us in our youth, then from our own resources making a contribution toward giving youth of today and the future a chance to achieve.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS Mrs. R.G. Swenson

Due to the perseverance of our State Regent, Isabel McGuire, our fairly new committee has taken a great stride in becoming much better organized. She appointed a VAVS (Veterans Administration Voluntary Service) Representative and three deputies to each of the three Veteran Hospitals in Kansas - Wichita, Leavenworth and Topeka. Through these nationally certified volunteers we learn what services are needed and how we may help provide assistance. Also how to find Veteran Patients in nursing homes and private homes. A workshop is planned for April 4th at the Veteran's Hospital here in Topeka for these volunteers. We hope to pass on to you information we acquire there.

Out of 42 chapters reporting for Service to Veteran-Patients it shows there have been 835 VAVS hours spent at Veteran's Hospitals, 1060 visits to other hospitals and nursing homes, 9 parties given, one program, 7 flags donated and gifts to patients valued at over \$1036.00. There have been 5 talks as well as 5 new articles and talks on TV and radio. A donation of over 990 oz. of cancelled stamps for the wounded, some of this information received too late for my annual report.

Thank you, Madam Regent, for my appointment and for your help in this effort.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Flag Day seems to be often marked by potluck luncheons and special programs.

Flags, flag literature, and pins were also given to new American citizens by Mary Wade Strother and Eunice Sterling chapters.

Friends of the Museum Committee was organized as a MONEY RAISING COMMITTEE for the DAR Museum in 1962. McArthur of Uvedale; One Participating Member, Mrs. Harold Hockersmith of John Athey and Forty-five Regular Members, One each from Betty Washington, Dodge City, and William Wilson, Ten from Hannah Jamison, Four from Mission Hills, Eighteen from Randolph Loving and Ten from Shawnee Mission. Donations reported after the February 1st jdeadline for reporting will be listed in next year's report. Your Chairman is pleased to welcome the new members of Friends of the Museum. Your loval support is important to the continuation of the Program of Acquisition for the DAR Museum.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

INSIGNIA

The largest selling piece of insignia in Kansas this past year was the recognition pin, no doubt due to its lower price and practicality, since it may be worn at any time. Purchase of 92 pieces of insignia was made from 19 chapters as follows:

17 recognition pins, 13 official insignia, 12 ancestor bars, 10 state chairman pins, 6 Kansas state pins, 6 ex-regent bars, 4 state officer pins, 4 grave markers, 3 ancestral riders, 3 bicentennial pins, 3 50-year pins, 2 regents bars, 2 chapter bars, 2 bicentennial charms, 1 national vice chairman pin, 1 organizing regent pin, 1 charm, 1 ring, and 1 recognition pin in a lucite paperweight.

Only 1 chapter had a program on insignia, and discussions on the subject were reported in 3 chapters. I encourage all chapters to obtain free reprints of the DAR Magazine article, "The Insignia and Seal", from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General to give to your new members. There is also a slide program available for \$3.00 from the National Program Committee. JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS

The Junior American Citizens in Kansas took an active part again this year in supporting the National JAC Contest. The theme for this year was "The American Way". The contest begins in classrooms across the state, with chilren carrying out the theme in poetry, essays, posters, songs, plays, programs, and scrapbooks, and other special projects. The contest is open to preschool through high school. The entries are then judged locally and the winners sent to me where the best in each grade and category are selected and sent for National Judging. This year there were 64 entries for state judging and 17 were selected to represent Kansas in the National Judging. The results of National Competition will be announced in April at Continental Congress.

Chapters sponsoring winners in Kansas this year, are: Dodge City Chapter, Shawnee Mission, Capt. Jesse Leavenworth, and Desire Tobey Sears Chapters. Each of the 17 winners will receive awards. We have two JAC Clubs in Kansas, Martin Luther King, Jr. in Dodge City and General Patton Club in Leavenworth. The Thatcher Pin was presented by the Martin Luther King, Jr. Club in Dodge City, to a teacher who has done outstanding work in JAC for 6 consecutive years.

I would like to emphasize that children need not belong to a JAC Club to enter the JAC Contest. Anyone can enter. The theme for next year will be announced this July. Watch for a letter from me before school starts next fall for all the details. Lets all work together and make it an even better year for JAC in 79. It is a great way to teach patriotism to our children.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP REPORT

"Strength in Unity" is the theme for the Junior Membership Committee. At this Kansas is 310 Junior members strong. Of these, 58 young ladies have joined this year. There are 2 juniors serving as National Vice Chairmen, 1 as a State Officer, 8 as State Chairmen, 5 as Chapter Regents, 15 as other Chapter Officers, and 23 as Chapter Chairmen.

Eighteen chapters sold Jewelart jewelry, Insignia stationery, or Bright of America products to support the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. These contributions plus the profits from last years Junior Bazaar totaled \$747.53.

Three chapters reported they had special junior programs. One Chapter had a membership coffee and one sponsored a genealogy workshop.

Some interesting projects in which other juniors were involved included painting historical signs for their community and presenting a United States Flag to a young peoples group. Many junior members have worked together making items for the Junior Bazaar. Sixteen juniors served as pages at State Conference last year and five juniors served as pages at Continental Congress.

I am deeply grateful to all the Junior Membership Chairmen and Chapter Regents who sent reports and lists of their junior members. This has enabled us to bring our files up to date. I feel we should be very proud of our Kansas juniors and the outstanding work they are doing in DAR.

There were three entries in the Outstanding Junior Member Contest this year. The judges were Mr. Fred Cross, Dr. Donald Wilson and Mrs. Elmer Huffman. The winner was Mona Hartzler.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

I have received only one report from a Chapter Lineage Research Chairman. I hesitated to send out a mailing asking for reports as, from the past Chairman's records, I found that a mailing was sent out at the end of the third year with a stamped return postcard.

Only three requests for help from Regents or Lineage Research Chairmen have been received. I made several suggestions to them for further research before sending a request on to a National Chairman.

Eunice Sterling Chapter had a very fine program on Lineage Research on January 27, 1978, conducted by a chapter member, Mrs. Dorothy Bethel. Randolph Loving Chapter had two programs the past year, one on Genelogical Records and the other on Lineage Research. Both were given

by Mrs. Robert N. (Dorothy) Keeler.

The Executive Committee of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, made a ruling on October 12, 1977, that, henceforth documentary proof of dates of birth and marriage of the applicant, the applicant's parents and grandparents must be submitted with the application. This ruling has long been overdue and gives a clear understanding of what is required. The State Reporter was asked to have this ruling published in the March 1978 Kansas DAR News to notify the Chapter Lineage Research Chairmen and Registrars of the ruling.

Thank you Madam Regent for the opportunity to serve you as Chairman of the Lineage Research Committee and I do hope I will have more time to

give to the work in the next two years.

MEMBERSHIP

Mrs. James Milloy

In January, questionnaires were sent to all Chapter Membership Chairmen or Regents. Answers were received from 47 of the 63 Chapters.

Free Prospective-Member Forms are being used in 14 chapters. These forms are to be used between chapters and states to cite a prospective member. Membership Outline Guides were used in 11 chapters. The Membership Outline Guide is being revised and will be printed shortly. Old copies are no longer available. The Prospective-Member forms and Revised Membership Guides are free and can be obtained by writing to the Corresponding-Secretary-General at National Headquarters in Washington.

Forty-five chapters have access to the Patriot. Index and the two Supplements in their local libraries, which is an increase of four from last year's record. Every chapter should have these for their Registrars to use in checking ancestors and their service for prospective members.

The film, "Home and Country", was shown in just 5 chapters this year. I have not received the 1977-1978 Official Count of Membership. According to the 47 reporting chapters, we had a gain of 73 new members in 21 chapters; while we had a loss of 28 members in 12 chapters.

According to your reports, the best methods to increase membership are: Seminars and Genealogical Work Shops, Guest Days in the chapters where friendly, well-informed members "sell" the DAR story, telling about DAR projects and programs to friends and the public through good public relations and in the use of newspapers, radio, and television. Do have an active Membership Commission ready to assist prospective members with their research.

I am happy to report that Sarah Steward Chapter has won the Award from the National Chairman of Membership Committee for the greatest percent net increase in membership. Sarah Steward had a 38% net increase.

MOTION PICTURE AND TELEVISION

Forty seven Chapters reported the following information regarding Motion Pictures and Television. Very few members attend movies because few current films have the educational or entertainment value worthy of DAR attendance.

Members rate the following television shows as favorites: Today, Little House on the Prairie, The Waltons, Hawaii 5 - 0, Lawrence Welk, and the Hallmark Hall of Fame Productions.

Several members throughout the state have written letters of appreciation to television stations for outstanding presentations. Also, letters of criticism have been written to persuade managers to prevent the viewing of shows which do not represent DAR principals.

It is the opinion of this committee that members should do more in their communities regarding the interest in motion pictures. Although, our members do not attend movies, and therefore, are not affected by what is seen, many of the youth do attend and absorb what is presented to them.

This committee urges members to visit theater managers to discuss Rating Codes and ask that they be displayed in advertisements and at the theaters and to become informed on films containing violence and/or pornography for the prevention of their presentation in local areas. Members should insist on higher quality entertainment for all to see!

NATIONAL DEFENSE

This has been a rewarding year to me as your State Chairman for National Defense. Fifty-five chapters responded to the annual questionnaire, and 50 of them reported regular discussion of National Defense Topics. Twenty-four devoting at least 5 minutes to the regular report while 29 reported 10 or more minutes used in this discussion. Two Chapters reported no National Defense reports given.

Forty-two Chapters reported the awarding of Good Citizenship Medals, totaling 63 Medals. Twelve reported giving the R.O.T.C. Medals, totaling 18 medals. In the larger cities, this was a cooperative endeavor. Forty-two dollars was reported given to Dollars for Defense, this coming from 14 chapters. We have 14 paid subscriptions to the National Defender, this, of course, is in addition to the two sent to each chapter.

Six of our members hold elective office.

We did quite well in writing to our Congressmen and Senators, some 400 letters were reported being written, on an individual basis.

The most popular topics of discussion presented in the Defender were (1) The Panama Canal (2) ERA (3) Russian-American relations (this covered all phases, SALT, detente, etc.) (4) Education in the United States (5) Election Reform and Energy Problems tied for fifth place.

PROGRAM Mrs. Keith Johnson

Fifty-three yearbooks and supplements were received; five of these were after the deadline and too late for national judging. A Red, Blue, or White State ribbon was attached to the left corner along with a gold ribbon if the program utilized the National Theme. Inside the back cover was stapled a sheet containing a critique, which, hopefully, will aid in compiling next year's book.

Only the perfect books were sent to Mrs. Hussey, National Program Chairman. Of the fourteen books sent all received National recognition. Eleven books received the National Red, White, and Blue ribbon, while the remaining three received a National Blue. Late books could not be sent.

On the state level, thirty-two books earned blue, ten obtained red, and eleven received white ribbons. Fourteen books received a gold ribbon for using the National Theme in programs.

Annual reports were received from forty chapters. The Abilene Chapter reported a manuscript entitled "New Basel Reminisces-Journey to America 1852 Style" has been accepted by the National DAR Reviewing Committee. It was written and presented by one of its members, Mrs. Marvin Tishhauser.

The DAR film, "Home and Country," is available for programs through your State Program Chairman. Rental fee is \$3.00 plus postage both ways. By the way, if DAR is mentioned in both the address and the return address and if the film is marked Library Book Rate, the film can be mailed for \$.19.

A special thanks to our state regent, Mrs. McGuire, for her help this year and to the Chapter Regents and the Program Chairmen for sending their yearbooks and reports. Let's work to have 100% of the yearbooks sent to the Program Chairman next year for judging!

PUBLIC RELATIONS

In September, a letter of information was sent to all chapter chairman of Public Relations. In it suggestions were made on how to use our many DAR activities as a basis for stories and pictures in the local press. This chairman prepared a profile article on the State Regent, Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr. The article and a glossy print photo were mailed to chapters upon their request.

After receipt of a questionnaire from the National Chairman, duplicates were made and mailed to all chapters. Fifty-two chapters responded by the March 1, deadline. It was obvious from the replies that many chairman did not keep accurate records of the newspaper column inches. Several sent glowing accounts of all their chapter activities instead of reporting the number of column inches the activity could, and should have had in the local paper.

Let's do better next year.

SEIMES MICORFILM CENTER

We have made good progress this year toward purchasing 1880 Soundex Index for Kansas, with \$125.00 contributed for that purpose. That will buy ten rolls. We will continue to stress the 1880 Soundex Index because it is the special project of the National Chairman. We also had \$16.00 contributed for genealogical film and \$6.00 for other film, making \$147.00 total for films contributed.

We have 63 chapters in the state, ten did not report at all and five more gave nothing. \$50.00 was given for upkeep and maintenance of the Center, making a total altogether of \$197.00. I am very happy at the response of so many chapters to the needs of the Seimes Microfilm Center, as it is becoming more and more important as space in the National Headquarters continually decreases.

We need to work on each chapter having an appointed chairman to look after the needs in this area. We only had twenty-one chairmen appointed last year, this leaves an added duty for the regent who has plenty to do without adding more. Less than ten states had 100% participation last year. We only fell fifteen short of that goal this year. We can reach that goal next year!

STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP

The Kansas Society Bicentennial Project initiated by Mrs. E.L. Wulfmeyer and culminating in a series of marker dedications at six sites along the Black Dog (Great Osage) Trail in Southeast Kansas became the object of interest among members of the Busy Bee Extension Homemakers Unit at Elgin, Kansas, in 1977.

Headed by Mrs. Thursie Uhls and Mrs. Rennie Darnall, a project was launched by the local EHU club in June of 1977, following the granting of approval by the Kansas Society Executive Board. A cost estimate was obtained and a fund-raising effort successfully concluded which made possible the placing of a marker in the Elgin City Park.

Dedication of this seventh Black Dog Trail marker was held on Kansas Day, January 29, 1978, with a number of state DAR officers participating: Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, Vice-President General, Louisburg; Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., Regent, Prairie Village; Mrs. Hal Moon, Chaplain, Coffeyville; Mrs. Donald T. Ingling, American Indian Chairman, Wichita. Also attending from Wichita were Mrs. Wallace Decker, Vice-Regent, and Mrs. Billy Compton, Registrar. Over 100 people attended the ceremony and reception following held in the First Methodist Church because of cold and snow. Excellent coverage was given by the area media both preceding and following the event.

BLACK DOG TRAIL DEDICATION MARKS KANSAS DAY

A cold, snowy Kansas Day provided the background for a dedication of the seventh Black Dog Trail marker in Southeast Kansas, when nearly a dozen officers and members of Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution joined the Elgin E.H.U. Busy Bees on January 29th at 2:00 p.m. in the First Methodist Church of Elgin, Kansas. The sanctuary was filled with over 100 guests, area dignitaries and residents.

Members of the Busy Bee Extension Homemakers Unit of Elgin became interested in the project in 1976 when DAR members donated six signs for marking the Black Dog (Great Osage) Trail located between Baxter Springs and Oxford. At that time funds were inadequate to provide additional markers. But the women of the Busy Bees E.H.U. in Elgin were determined that their community should have one of these signs. Cost estimates were obtained in June of 1977; labor and materials had risen since the initial signs were prepared. Eighteen members of the club. headed by Mrs. Thursie Uhls and Mrs. Rennie Darnall, initiated a fund-raising project to provide their community with a marker of this trail created by Chief Black Dog in the early 1800's for the Osage Indian tribe. The drive was successfully completed in mid-November of 1977. It took the companies involved an additional six weeks to complete the marker, at a final cost of over \$300. Mrs. E.L. Wulfmeye of Clearwater, Bicentennial Chairman of the original project, drove to Sedan in early January and delivered the component parts which were then installed in the Elgin City

Elgin dignitaries taking part besides Mrs. Uhls and Mrs. Darnall were Alfred Burdette, Mayor; Mrs. Gertrude Kirchner, E.H.U. President: Mrs. Louis McElroy, librarian; Sedan Boy Scouts and their Lowden; and Kirk Boulanger, trumpeter.

DAR participants included Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, National Vice President General, Louisburg; Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., State Regent, Prairie Village; Mrs. Hal R. Moon, Chaplain, Coffeyville; Mrs. E.L. Wulfmeyer, U.S.A. Bicentennial Coordinator, Clearwater; Mrs. Donald T. Ingling, American Indian Chairman, Wichita.

John McGuire, Hal Moon, Donald Ingling, Wallace Decker and George London were also in attendance, as well as Mike Merchant, Dearing student designer of the sign. Descendants of the Osage Tribe were given special recognition. Following the dedication, refreshments were served by members of the Elgin E.H.U. Busy Bees.

The Golden West Tea at 4:00 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon at the Mayflower Hotel was sponsored by the State Societies of Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorade and New Mexico. The table decorations of Yucca and Indian dolls were planned by the New Mexico Society. Among the guests were members of the National Board of Management, representatives of the DAR Schools and American Indian schools and the President of the National Society, C.A.R.This was a relaxed and festive occasion and was attended by 273 guests, members of the hostess societies and members from other states.

In her two minute report to the Assembly on Wodnesday evening, the State Regent reported an increase in membership for Kansas; a 10% increase in Honor Roll Chapters with 40% of the chapters on the Cold Honor Roll; over 1200 pages of Genealogical Records compiled and bound for the NSDAR Library, for the KSDAR Library and for the State Historical Library in Topeka; over 1000 entries in the American History Essay Contest; 141 Good Citizens honored; an active Junior membership; certified representatives and deputies in all Kansas VA Hospitals; 63 Citizenship medals and 18 ROTC medals presented. Mrs. Marion F. Rouse of Martha Loving Ferrell Chapter was the National Third Place Winner in the Craft (patchwork pillow) Contest sponsored by the American Heritage Committee. Other awards received were for yearbooks and for J.A.C. Contest entries.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

[Revised March 22, 1975]

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Objects

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1)To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historic spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historic research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farcwell address to the American people, "to promise, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and accounting to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3)To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter; name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility, (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter members shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office, except the State Librarian, in order to provide efficient service to the Society from the city where the genealogical books are located. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least a year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seem feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding

Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. Terms. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall be taken.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after their election and no later than November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for

each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall record all changes in membership, sending the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committee and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a Memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year.

(b)It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material for, edit, and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than three months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers; committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter of good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty day prior thereto. She shall send before January first Three Credential Blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, on or before the tenth day of March, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapter, made into a directory form. She shall send to each Chapter Regent before February fiftcenth. State conference registration cards for the Regent and elected delegates. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds for the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Certified Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State Conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds. securities and other evidence of invested funds. Immediately after May first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members in good standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February first.

Section 8. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married, husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number:

name of chapter, name and rank of ancestor; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given.

Section 9. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 10. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books and papers as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location.

In her annual report she shall list all material sent to the National Society Library and all books, records and other material received during the year for the Kansas State Society. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called the Kansas DAR Library.

Section 11. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News," and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the Conference Press Committee.

Section 12. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them to her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and the Chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary

State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or the Regent's alternate, and the elected dologates or alternates of each chapter in the State entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceeding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conforence shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society on the first day of February each year and shall be as

follows:

(a) Chapters having less than fifty member, Rogent and two delegates.

(b)Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members, Regent, and five delegates.

(c)Chapters having more than one hundred members, Regent and five

delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three Credential Blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meeting of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegate and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the chapter Rogent or in hor absence, the chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Scction 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section. 3 Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.60 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance.

Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of December. A chapter whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be represented in the State Conference.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess chapter to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and three members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding to the State Conference. The budget as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Student Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals, and interest on monies invested for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee, composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Recording Sccretary, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee, composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters, shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the provious State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the annual State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. **Public Relations.** The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an exofficio member of the committee. This committee shall

prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State-Regent or the State Board of Management, shall prepare a report for the State Conference. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent, one for the Recording Secretary, and one for the permanent records of the State Society. A condensed report, not exceeding 200 words shall accompany each complete report. Any report lacking the required resumes shall not be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. State Officers, State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Chapter Regents shall send not later than March first of each year, a written report of the work of the past year to the State Regent for use in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress. A copy of this report shall be sent to State Recording Secretary at the same time.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southcast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Mcctings. District meetings shall be hold each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each district shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The terms of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three years.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year the chapter recording secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of the National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January first in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

No. 1 The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer, 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairman and Vice Chairman of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairman of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C.A.R. 1: District Director, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society,2; The President General,1; The Kansas State Historical Society.1: the DAR National Library.1: and the President of the State Officers' Club, Chapter Regents' club and the State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2. Chairman of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

No. 3. No less than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.

No. 4. The State Registrar shall furnish the editor of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.

No. 5. A sum of \$1,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

No. 6. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

No. 7. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

No. 8. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

No. 9. Each chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund, \$1.00 to the Shawnee Mission Fund, and \$.05 per member to the KSDAR Library.

No. 10. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage. Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents (\$.25).

No. 11. The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its properties housed in Shawnee Mission.

No. 12. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 13. The sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be used for the C.A.R. projects.

No. 14. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file of the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 15. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National

Boards Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

No. 16. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 17. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 18. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 19. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G. and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

(a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.

(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and Maintenance of the Books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.

(c)Rental of \$100 a year shall be paid for Housing of the Kansas DAR Library. It shall be housed with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the Dodge City Recreation Center, making it a valuable resource center.

(d)The materials submitted to the KSDAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. Donors are asked to check with the librarian before presentation to avoid duplication.

No. 20. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

No. 21. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

No. 22. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.

No. 23. A \$10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.

No. 24. The Runner-up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an appropriate gift as an award.

No. 25. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests of the Kansas Luncheon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

No. 26. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session of the State Conference to review the minutes of the session.

No. 27. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote of these delegates voting.

No. 28. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before August 1 by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, subject to the approval of the State Regent.

No. 29.KSDAR shall place a \$25 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR

Magazine if no other Kansas advertising is available.
