The Board of Management of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution met at 9:30 a.m. on Monday, October 30, 1978 at the Old Mill Plaza, Newton, Kansas. Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., State Regent, called the meeting to order. Mrs. Halden R. Moon, State Chaplain, offered a prayer. Mrs. R.B. Woods, The Flag of the United States of America Chairman, led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and in singing the first verse of "The Star-Spangled Banner".

Roll call was answered by 36 members of the Board and a quorum was declared to be present. All State Officers were present. Mrs. McGuire introduced Miss Pauline Cowger, Honorary State Regent and Past Vice President General and Mrs. George Milbank, Parliamentarian.

By general consent the reading of the minutes of the March 20, 1978 Board of Management was dispensed with, as the minutes were printed in the Proceedings of the Eightieth Annual State Conference.

Mrs. William C. Baker, State Corresponding Secretary, read a letter from Mrs. Roy Shrewder, Honorary State Regent, in which she expressed regret that she would not be attending the meeting.

- 3. That the State Society present State Conference Award Certificates to Greg Fixley, Olathe, for his restoration of two Santa Fe Trail markers at Olathe; to Margaret Bodine (Mrs. Louis) for her direct service to the Kansas Society in her efforts and planning relative to the restoration, placing, and rededication of the Santa Fe Trail marker in Jones City Park, Scranton; to the Scranton Lions Club, which provided the concrete base for the Scranton Santa Fe Trail marker; and to Grace Woldt (Mrs. Herbert W.), Polly Ogden Chapter, Manhattan, for conducting family history workshops for KSDAR.
- 4. That the number of KSDAR scholarships given annually be reduced from three scholarships of \$150 to one scholarship of \$450.

McGehee led the singing of the first and fourth stanzas of The National Anthem

Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, Vice President General, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, extended greetings to the Kansas Society from Mrs. George Upham Baylies, President General, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. Greetings were also extended from Commissioner A.F. "Tony" Casado on behalf of the Honorable Connie Peters, Mayor of Wichita; Mrs. Frank Lary, Sales and Catering Manager of the Broadview Hotel; Mrs. Carl W. MINUTES Friday, March 16, 1979

The Eighty-first Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution reconvened at 9:00 a.m., March 16,1979 at the Broadview Hotel, Wichita, Kansas. Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., State Regent, presided.

Mrs. Halden R. Moon, State Chaplain, offered a prayer. Mrs. R.B. Woods, State Chairman of the Flag of the United States of America Committee, led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America; Mrs. Don Buster led the repetition of The American's Creed; and Mrs. Richard C. McGehee, State Chairman of the American Heritage Committee, led the singing of the first and fourth stanzas of The National Anthem.

Mrs. Woodrow W. Dew, State Recording Secretary, read the minutes of the opening session and they were approved as corrected.

Mrs. Reuben Byler, Chairman of the Credentials Committee, gave the following partial report of the Credentials Committee: National Officers, 1; Honorary State Officers, 3; State Officers, 11; Delegates, 119; Alternates, 23; Members, 19; Pages, 5; and Visitors, 3 for a total attendance of 225.

Mrs. Forrest A. Gilmour, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, read the proposed Resolutions of the Conference:

BILINGUAL EDUCATION

WHEREAS a study by the American Institute for Research in Palo Alto, California, commissioned by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, claims that children in bilingual classes do no better academically and perhaps worse than children from similar backgrounds in regular English classes and that 85% of the students are being kept in bilingual classes after they are capable of learning in English; and

WHEREAS the bilingual education program began in a small way as a \$7.5 million "pilot program" in 1968, the expenditure will increase to \$200 million in 1980 and to \$400 million in 1983; and

WHEREAS the program is actually preventing children from learning our national language, English, and someday it will be necessary to teach these young people English in order that they can support themselves and not become public responsibilities;

RESOLVED, that the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, encourage its members as individuals to contact their state and national legislators requesting them to enact legislation which would put an end to the bilingual program altogether.

PANAMA CANAL

WHEREAS the Panama Canal is vital to the security and commerce of the United States and important to world trade; and

WHEREAS the United States Constitution, in Article IV, Section 3, paragraph 3, provides, in part, "The Congress shall have the power to dispose of and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the U.S. ..."; and

WHEREAS according to Article I "the Congress ... shall consist of a Senate and a House of Representatives", and

WHEREAS the House of Representatives did not vote on the disposition of the Panama Canal;

RESOLVED, that the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the House of Representatives to take the necessary action to nullify the treaties.

ONE WORLD GOVERNMENT

WHEREAS the World Affairs Council of Philadelphia and similar organizations such as the Council of Foreign Relation, Bilateral Commission and the Trilateral Commission are sponsoring a Declaration of Interdependence;

RESOLVED, that the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, alert the public to this plan for promoting One World Government.

INFLATION

WHEREAS the most critical problem facing Americans today is that of inflation; and

WHEREAS we should understand that the real wealth of this country is in the goods and services produced by the people and not in the money coined or printed by the Government; and

WHEREAS we should understand also that the Federal Government can never be all things to all people; and

WHEREAS in the words of Donald Kemmerer, economic historian and monetary expert, "A nation that does not stop an inflation simply because it is politically painful to do so is essentially declaring bankruptcy"; and

WHEREAS both Congress and the Executive Branch must accept major responsibility for bringing inflation to a halt;

RESOLVED, that the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, inform our President and our Congressmen that we are ready and willing to make whatever sacrifices are necessary and expedient for solving the problem of inflation.

METRIC MEASURE

WHEREAS the adoption of the metric system is not mandatory; and WHEREAS the cost of an all-out changeover would be astronomical; RESOLVED, that the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, oppose the adoption of the metric system as a national policy and that we so inform our Congressmen.

THE CHILDREN AND THE STATE ROCK

WHEREAS 837 elementary school children from northwestern Kansas have petitioned the Kansas Legislature to name limestone as the official rock of Kansas; and

WHEREAS several other states have state rocks as well as state flowers and state birds;

RESOLVED, that the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, support the petition of these students by urging the Kansas Legislature to name limestone as the state rock of Kansas.

LITTER CONTROL

WHEREAS the Kansas Legislature is considering mandatory deposit legislation: and

WHEREAS most studies show that beverage containers comprise only about 10 to 15% of roadside litter, but that paper products such as newspapers and fast food convenience packaging account for over 50% of litter; and

WHEREAS, eight states have enacted comprehensive litter abatement

laws which mandate public education for litter control;

RESOLVED, that the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the legislators of the State of Kansas to pass comprehensive litter control legislation, including legislation to require a deposit on carbonated soft drink and malt-derived alcoholic beverage containers.

ARSON HOT LINE

Whereas the crime of arson has reulted in serious loss of both life and property, many tax dollars, increased insurance premiums and endangered the lives of our firemen; and

WHEREAS the Legislature of the State of Kansas has taken action making arson a crime second only to murder in the State of Kansas;

RESOLVED, that the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge their state legislators to pass legislation establishing a toll-free arson hot line for the State of Kansas.

FOREIGN STUDENTS IN KANSAS

WHEREAS the recent turmoil in Iran has resulted lack of funds for students from Iran who are studying in the universities and colleges of Kansas; and

WHEREAS this lack of funds has resulted in these students being given preferential treatment by these universities and colleges in that the students were permitted to continue their studies without payment of tuition and other fees; and

WHEREAS citizens of the United States are required to pay the tuition and other fees before they are permitted to study in Kansas universities and colleges;

RESOLVED, that the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, advise the Legislature of the State of Kansas that, as individuals, we are opposed to subsidizing the education of foreign students, regardless of nationality, now or at any time in the future.

Mrs. Gilmour introduced the other members of the Resolutions Committee present at the Conference. They are Mrs. Augustus deZerega, Mrs. Marshall Garey, Mrs. Harry M. Ives, Mrs. Wayne W. Jones, and Mrs. Emma Lou McDaniel.

Farney; DAR School, Miss Miriam Eqads; The Flag of the United States of America, Mrs. Robert B. Woods; Friends of the Museum, Mrs. Glenn Eastlack; Genealogical Records, Mrs. Charles F. Fellenstein; Honor Roll, Mrs. Kent Wymore; Insignia, Mrs. Richard B. Hartzler; Junior American Citizens, Mrs. Larry Overmiller; Motion Picture and Television, Mrs. John E. Oakleaf; National Defense, Mrs. Harold O. Bullock; and Seimes Microfilm Center, Mrs. George A. London. Mrs. McGehee presented the National Society's award certificate to Neodesha Chapter for their American Heritage programs in the past year and for their fine report of same. Mrs. Overmiller noted that in the 1978 Junior American Citizens contest, Kansas had 3 National winners, with one girl placing first in the nation in the Scrapbook category.

MINUTES Saturday, March 17, 1979

The Eighty-first Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution reconvened at 9:15 a.m., March 17, 1979 at the Broadview Hotel, Wichita, Kansas. Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., State Regent, presided.

Mrs. Halden R. Moon, State Chaplain, offered a prayer. Mrs. Maynard Black led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, Mrs. Armalea Hopperstad led the repetition of the American's Creed, and in the absence of Mrs. Richard C. McGehee, Mrs. Vincent Traffas led the singing of the first and fourth stanzas of the National Anthem.

Mrs. Woodrow Dew, State Recording Secretary, read the minutes of the Friday session and they were approved as corrected. Mrs. McGuire requested that Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, Mrs. Bert Brooks and Mrs. Robert Crowther approve the minutes of the Saturday session.

Mrs. William C. Baker, State Corresponding Secretary, read correspondence from Colonel Ralph Goodell, President, Kansas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, and from James Marett, Administrator of Tamassee DAR School.

Mrs. Eugene Smith, State Chairman of the Lineage Research Committee, presented her report. Yerington, the Resolution concerning One World Government was amended to state "that the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution alert the public to the inherent dangers of promoting One World Government." The Resolution entitled Metric Measure required 47 votes to carry and received 66 in favor and 27 in opposition. Mrs. Oakleaf and Mrs. Ronald Price served as tellers in the standing vote. On the motion of Mrs. Dan Sullivan the Resolution concerning Litter Control was returned to the Resolutions Committee for further study and revision. All other Resolutions were adopted as proposed by the Resolutions Committee, including the Courtesy Resolution which states:

RESOLVED, that the members of the Eighty-first Conference of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, express their appreciation to Mrs. Dudley L. Henderson, Conference Chairman, Mrs. Myron Feemster, Conference Treasurer, and the hostess chapters of the Southeast District; and

RESOLVED, that we express our gratitude and thanks to all officers, chairmen and members of committees for the careful planning of the program and the carrying out of the many details; and

RESOLVED, that we thank Mrs. Francis Lee Johnson, Vice-President General, for bringing us the President General's message; the Honorable A.F. Casada, Commissioner of Wichita; the guest speakers, Dr. Charles Hugh Edmonds, Administrator, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School; Dr. Dean Chavers, President, Bacone College; and General Edward R. Fry, Adjutant General of Kansas National Guard; Kevin Chase, Gary Gibson and John Collison for musical selections; Mrs. Jan Lary of the Broadview Hotel and the staff for their gracious hospitality; the news media, the pages; and everyone who has had a part in making this Eight-first Conference a happy and informative occasion.

Mrs. Kenneth Anderson, Conference Marshall, reported the activities of her office.

Mrs. Lauren O. Gaddis, Chairman of the Bylaws Committee, read the proposed amendments to the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the Society and moved the adoption of each.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 2. State Regent. Delete the sentence "She shall record all changes in membership, sending the State Treasurer all membership reports received from the National Society". Adopted.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (b) Change "three months" to "six months" so that the sentence will now read, "The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than six months after the State Conference." Adopted.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. Line 12-Change "on or before the tenth day of March" to "before Continental Congress". The sentence will now read, "She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year before Continental Congress, a typewritten list..."

Delete the next sentence "She shall send to each Chapter Regent before February fifteenth, State Conference registration cards for the Regent and elected delegates." Adopted.

Add Section 7. State Organizing Secretary. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and the Organizing Regent in organizing new chapters. She shall ascertain the possibilities of organizing a new chapter where a new chapter is contemplated. She shall be responsible for correspondence relative to the organization of new chapters. She shall give assistance to existing chapters in sustaining their membership quota as required by the National Society. Adopted.

Section 8. State Treasurer. Delete "Certified" from line 8, so the sentence will now read, "She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Public Accountant...".

Line 12 after ... "evidence of invested funds", add "She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall pass them on to her successor."

Delete the next sentence, "Immediately after May first, she shall furnish a complete list of the members in good standing to the Registrar and shall record all changes reported to her by the State Regent from the reports received from the National Society". Adopted.

Section 10. State Historian. Line 4—Delete "of the State Society for the Reporter General of the Smithsonian Institution and". The sentence will now read, She shall compile an annual report for the Historian General." Adopted.

Section 11. State Librarian. Line 2—Add "microfilm and equipment": so the sentence will read .. "The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books, papers, microfilm, and equipment as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution".

Line 6. Delete "belonging to the Kansas Society and shall keep a record of their location" and add "and materials in the Kansas State DAR Library". The sentence will now read, "She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all books and materials in the Kansas State DAR Library". In the next sentence change "Kansas State Society" to "Kansas State DAR Library".

In the last sentence "She shall have supervision of"—Delete "of this collection of books and papers, such collection to be called" and add "the Kansas State DAR Library". The sentence will now read, "She shall have supervision of the Kansas State DAR Library". Adopted.

Section 12. State Reporter. Add—"She shall send a short report of the Kansas State DAR Conference to the National Magazine." Adopted.

Section 13. Retiring Officers. Change "for them to her successor" to "for them from her successor". Adopted.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 2. Dues. Line 2, page 129, change "chapter" to "member" and "represented in" to "a delegate to". The sentence will now read—"A member whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be a delegate to the State Conference".

Add—"The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after May first shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year in conformance with the policy of the National Society." Adopted.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. **Reports of Proceedings.** Replace section 1 with the following: "Each State Officer, the Regent of each Chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent, shall prepare a condensed report, not exceeding 200 words. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent and two for the Recording Secretary and sent not later than March first each year. These reports covering the year's work shall be prepared for the State Conference and shall be published in the Proceedings." Adopted.

Section 2. **Reports to the State Regent.** Replace section 2 with the following: "Each State Chairman shall send to the State Regent, not later than March first of each year, a copy of the statistical report prepared for the National Chairman or Vice Chairman. This information will be used by the State Regent in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress." Adopted.

ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. Change the second sentence—"Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office at the first chapter meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress" to read "Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office by June first following Continental Congress". Amended on the motion of Mrs. Harold Bullock to state "Chapter Officers shall assume the duties of office by the June meeting following Continental Congress."

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Change "January first" to "January thirtieth" so the sentence will read—"Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January thirtieth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report." Adopted.

STANDING RULES

No. 10. Delete the last sentence which states "Each daughter attending shall pay a registration fee of twenty-five cents." Adopted.

No. 19. (3) Change "Rental of \$100 a year..." to "Rental of \$125 a year...". Adopted,

No. 30. In the event that KSDAR should have a national winner in the Good Citizens Contest, the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the award. Amended on the motion of Mrs. Dew to state "In the event that KSDAR should have a national winner in any NSDAR youth competition in which the winner is required to attend Continental Congress, the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the award."

Mrs. Vincent J. Signaigo, State Treasurer, presented the report of the Fianance Committee and the 1979-1980 Budget. On the motion of Mrs. Signaigo, the Budget was adopted.

Mrs. Dew read the following recommendations of the Board of Management and moved their adoption:

- 1. That the State Registrar be authorized to have printed 1000 copies of an updated State Roster. Adopted.
- 2. That Section E of Standing Rule #19 be added to state: "That a policy of lending materials from the KSDAR Library to out-of-state DAR members require said member to include National Number, name of chapter and chapter regent or a Kansas DAR sponsor". Tabled for further study on the motion of Mrs. James O. Kershner.
- 3. That the State Society present State Conference Award Certificates to Greg Fixley, Olathe, for his restoration of two Santa Fe Trail markers at Olathe; to Margaret Bodine (Mrs. Louis) for her direct service to the Kansas Society in her efforts and planning, relative to the restoration, placing, and rededication of the Santa Fe Trail marker in Jones City Park, Scranton; to the Scranton Lions Club, which provided the concrete base for the Scranton Santa Fe Trail marker; and to Grace Woldt (Mrs. Herbert W.), Polly Ogden Chapter, Manhattan, for conducting family history workshops for KSDAR. Adopted.
- 4. That the number of KSDAR scholarships given annually be decreased from three scholarships of \$150 to one scholarship of \$450. Adopted.

Mrs. Ronald Price, Chairman of Pages, presented Page Awards to the Pages who qualified. Mrs. John Oakleaf presented a plant to Mrs. Price from the Pages.

Mrs. Oakleaf announced that Mrs. Francis L. Johnson had won the Junior Bazaar special fund raiser and that the project netted \$14.00.

Mrs. Edwin Hein, State Chairman of the Junior Membership Committee, presented her report and noted that the profits from the Junior Bazaar totalled \$623.40.

Mrs. David Stone, Southwest District Director, invited the Kansas Society to hold the Eighty-second Annual State Conference of the Society in Wichita in March of 1980. On the motion of Mrs. Jack Dunn, the invitation was accepted.

Mrs. Wallace R. Decker, State Vice Regent, expressed appreciation on behalf of the Executive Committee to the Southeast District members for their efforts to make the Conference successful. Mrs. McGuire presented Mrs. Dudley Henderson, Conference Chairman, the Kansas bar in appreciation of her efforts in organizing the Conference.

Mrs. Stone announced a gift of \$60.00 from the Southwest District to Tamassee in honor of Mrs. McGuire. Mrs. Johnson reported that the State Officers' Club will place a book in the KSDAR Library in memory of Lois Cook, Past State Librarian. Mrs. G.H. Colver reported the gift of \$25.00 for the same use. Mrs. McGuire thanked the clubs for their donations.

Mrs. Johnson thanked the Conference Chairman, members of the Southeast District and her Personal Page, Donna Overmiller, for the courtesies extended during the Conference. Mrs. McGuire recognized her Personal Page, Mona Hartzler.

In the absence of Mrs. Roy V. Shrewder, Honorary State Regent and Past Vice President General, the Daughters Pledge was led by Miss Pauline Cowger, Honorary State Regent and Past Vice President General. In the absence of Mrs. Richard McGehee, Mrs. Jack Dunn led the singing of the first stanza of "America". Mrs. Moon pronounced the benediction and the Conference was adjourned at 12:30 p.m.

A list of the chapter regents with their addresses was mailed to Mrs. Charles C. Theis May 13, 1978. Early in June, a Santa Fe Trail marker, placed by Daughters of the American Revolution in 1906 at the south edge of Scranton, Kansas on US 56, was examined. This marker had been moved by the State Highway across the road from its original location, and the people of the community were interested in having it permanently located in Scranton. I discussed the matter with Scranton officials, State Regent, State Historian, and Kansas Highway personnel. It was agreed for the marker to be placed in Jones City Park of Scranton, and that a convenient time the State Highway would transport it from the east right-of-way of US 56 to the northeast corner of Jones City Park. On September 20 a formal call was mailed to each member of the Board of Management to be present at 9:00 a.m. October 30, 1978 at Old Mill Plaza, Newton, Kansas. On January 8, 1979 letters of notice of Board of Management meeting at the Broadview Motel, Wichita, Kansas at 9:30 a.m. March 15th. and the State Conference, same location. So, although this kind of news has priority, your Reporter works toward including as many chapter and individual items as possible. Please continue sending these to her, but, also, please understand if they cannot be used.

The cooperation regarding the deadlines has been wonderful. Many thanks go to Mrs. Billy P. Compton, State Registrar, for her assistance in maintaining a current mailing list.

REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL COMMITTEES

AMERICAN HERITAGE

The American Heritage committee has a wide field of activities for a chapter to participate in. The contests are designed to provide an opportunity for chapter members to enter their creative efforts for judging and exhibition. Our country's history relates the many creative talents of the colonial and frontier women. We need to preserve this art form and teach others as well.

A letter explaining the work of the committee and the contest details was sent to each chapter chairman last May. A two page list of American Heritage program titles was included, to assist chapters plan programs in this category. We stress the educational portion of each of these programs, and the need for including it. This will make the program more informative, enjoyable, and an interesting experience as well.

We urge all chapters to sing the Star Spangled Banner at each meeting. Too many have dropped that part of the opening ritual, thinking they can not sing without a piano each time. We ask that you make a greater effort to sing the Star Spangled Banner each time.

Seven chapters reported by mail and five more were reached by phone. Needlework programs were mentioned by five chapters including quilts and weaving. The art programs included tours of an art museum, and an Indian Museum. A "Journey with Music of Yesteryear" and Christmas music were the only musical programs given. Several chapters plan programs that involve each member present. This is one of the finest types as we learn from each other and become better acquainted.

We hope chapter regents will stress the great need for chairmen to report each year to the State Chairman, so their reports will more accurately relate the work of the chapters and it's members. The Neodesha chapter receives the American Heritage award for the most

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

Committee information came in "Regents Packet", DAR NEWS, District meetings, State Chairman's questionaire, and mid-winter notes. Requested by the State Chairman, Governor Carlin issued the February 1979 American History Month Proclamation. Present at the Topeka signing were the State Chairman, Corresponding Secretary, and Press Chairman. Your State Chairman sent Proclamation copies to each chapter. Fifty-one chapter chairmen reported thus: 186 American History programs, 39 chapter-sponsored displays, 52 members appearing on radio or TV, 840 inches and 72 pictures in newspapers, and 89 sets of Spot Announcements used. Thirty-three chapters sponsored American History essay contests in Grades 5,6,7 and 8, from 79 schools, with 1010 reported contestants. At chapter meetings or school assemblies chapters awarded 41 bronze and 4 silver medals, 679 certificates of appreciation, and 57 of award. Chapters entered 64 essays for State competition. Three non-DAR judges chose 4 winning essays, sent to the Divisional Vice-Chairman for further judging: Grade 5, Lynnea Huffman, Ninnescah; Grade 6, Amy Seeber, Susannah French Putney; Grade 7, Marilynn Richtarik, Betty Washington; Grade 8, Hillary Kircher, Sagamore. They received State medals and certificates at the Thursday Luncheon; parents also attended. Kansas is proud that Amy Seeber (Grade 6) and Hillary Kircher (Grade 8) both won first place in their Grades, in the South Central Division. At Continental Congress, Hillary Kircher was announced to be National Winner in the Grade 8 Essay Contest. Her prizes are a \$100 United States Savings Bond and a Gold Medal. Thank you, everyone!

Fifty-two Chapters reported this year—each doing their best to promote patriotism in various ways. Where there were Naturalization proceedings, several chapters banded together and gave manuals and instruction and teas to welcome new citizens. William Wilson Chapter gave each new citizen a flag at one such proceeding. Ninnescah Chapter has tutored and aided a Vietnamese family. Newton Chapter members welcomed a Mexican family at one of their meetings and are tutoring them towards citizenship. Dodge City Chapter had District Judge Bahee speak on Americanism and had 60 students and parents as guests. Desire Tobey Sears had an Americanism talk by a naturalized citizen from England. James Ross Chapter presented the Americanism Award to Mrs. Ryoko Mast who was a most worthy recipient. Olathe Chapter gave programs for 4-H Clubs and a Boy Scout Troop on Americanism. CONSERVATION

This past year 2119 trees have been planted by Kansas DAR. One-hundred forty-one dollars was spent excluding money spent for food for wildlife. Two-hundred fifty-nine wildlife habitats were established. Forty-two letters were written to legislatures concerning Conservation.

A Conservation display was prepared for this State Conference. A Conservation Workshop is to be conducted for Conservation Chairmen and/or Chapter Regents.

Two Conservation Awards are to be presented at this State Conference: William Wilson Chapter, Helen Whitney Hicks, Chairman, for their efforts to have sand dredging on the Arkansas River curtailed or controlled to help reduce bank erosion; and Oceanus Hopkins Chapter, Mrs. Wesley Hess, Chairman, for their overall conservation participation.

As announced last year at State Conference a state Conservation project was introduced: to have each chapter participate in a Green Belt/Green Patch project. The final results will be given next year. With this project we are "Building for Our Future" by making Kansas a green place to live.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage is always outstanding for statewide participation during Constitution Week, and was well supported in 1978. I wanted to thank each Chapter Regent or Constitution Week Chairman for their co-operation and I am looking forward to reading the reports this fall from our enthusiastic KSDAR members.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS

Through the hard work of our Chapter Chairmen, the DAR Good Citizens Program was expanded this year with several high schools participating for the first time. An increased number of young men were involved, with ten entered in the State Contest and five listed in the top fifteen.

It would be impossible to list all of the Chapters which showed an increase. Ten schools were contacted by Dodge City and Flores del Sol and seven contacts were made by the chairmen of Betty Washington, Polly Ogden and Topeka Chapters. Eunice Sterling had six Good Citizens to honor, an increase of four over last year. Desire Tobey Sears contacted nine schools to honor eight Good Citizens when Mrs. McGuire made her official visit to that Chapter. The more we reach out on the "Grass-Roots", so to speak, the stronger our program is. The special meetings to which the Good Citizens, and usually the parents, were invited is one of the finest ways of telling the DAR Story.

Special thanks should be given to the James Ross and Olathe Chapters, for it was through their efforts that both the State School for the Blind and the State School for the Deaf had entries in the State Contest. The judges had a difficult task in evaluating the papers and at the same time found them wonderfully exciting to work with. The papers were so fine that 14 honorable mentions were given in addition to the top winners. In this group were representatives from all four districts.

First place winner was Joseph A. Dellasega, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Dellasega of Pittsburg, sponsored by Oceanus Hopkins Chapter. He received a \$100 "E" Bond at the State Convention in Wichita. At the same time, a silver bowl was presented to the first runner-up, Miss Dana Tait, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Tait of Leawood whose entry was submitted by Mission Hills Chapter.

DAR MAGAZINE

It has been said that experience is the best teacher and another saying is persistence pays off. I am so proud to report this year on my magazine chairmen. Out of 62 chapters in the state I have had replies from 60 chairmen. However, due to the severe winter weather conditions, several planned programs had to be cancelled. Hopefully, these Chapters and many others, will have full Museum programs in 1979.

DAR SCHOOL

The DAR schools are being supported by 39 chapters that have sent in their report. Emphasis was given to support the Baylies Home Economics building at Kate Duncan Smith.

Due to high freight charges, there was less clothing sent to Kate Duncan Smith this year. There was only one chapter reporting they had free transportation of clothing. There were only ten packages of clothing sent this year with the cost approximately \$150.00 for about 423 lbs. of clothing.

As reported to the chairman, Tamassee received approximately 143.00 for the Smith-Mettetal Building and about \$150.00 on scholarships. There were a number of contributions for the general operating funds of Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith.

For the Baylies Home Economics Building, just over \$250.00 was reported to the chairman.

The chairman has attended the state conference and the area meetings. This past fall, the chairman attended two area meetings in addition to her area meeting.

The chairman wants to thank the chapters for their support of the schools. It is important that we realize our responsibilities for the schools and try in every way to increase the support in the coming year.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS Mrs. R.G. Swenson

Kansas DARs spent more than 650 hours in visiting Veteran Patients during 1978. Parties and personal visits by more than 100 members were greatly appreciated. More than five hundred dollars worth of gifts were donated and some members gave indirectly by saving "Stamps for the Wounded". Over 131 oz. were sent in. Many chapters have organized parties but many individual members call on patients in hospitals or nursing homes or make and donate many items for the patients. A list of these items is available from any of the VAVS Representatives.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. R.B. Woods

I am pleased to report that 52 of our 62 chapters have reported and that they have been quite active.

I attended two District Meetings and gave talks on the Flag and some instructions from the Flag Code.

Many chapters had Flag Day luncheons, pot luck dinners, and picnics with flag programs given at each. Teas for new citizens were given following the Naturalization Courts by John Haupt, Polly Ogden, Eunice Sterling, and William Wilson chapters and flags, codes and literature were distributed. Mary Wade Strother decorated the graves of 44 deceased members with flags. John Haupt gave 800 cupcakes decorated with miniature flags to veterans as they have for the past 28 years.

Many large flags were replaced and given in parks, resthomes, museums, civic centers, to 4-H and other youth groups. There were 29 free large flags, 75 small flags, and 939 miniature flags given. Two hundred sixty-nine Flag Codes were distributed to members, and 342 were given to school and youth groups. Flag pins were given as awards or gifts. A Braille flag and four Braille Flag Codes were given to a school for the blind.

Thirty-five full programs on the flag were reported, in addition to thirty-one partial programs. Each chapter reporting repeats the Pledge of Allegiance at each meeting and 47 also repeat the american's Creed.

FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM

FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM is a special committee. Its sole purpose is to "RAISE MONEY" for the acquisition of valuable artifacts for the NSDAR Museum for the enjoyment of present and future generations.

Letters of "information-instruction" and a sample report form from the National Chairman, the Curator General, and NSDAR Museum Chairman, were in the Chapter Regent's "Packet". Your KSDAR Chairman reported on and carefully reviewed these letters at the Northwest, Southwest, and Southeast District Meetings during the Fall Tour.

Several have asked why my last year's report gave \$400 for donations and the 1978 Proceedings showed only \$242. This is due to the difference in the closing dates of January 30th for the State Treasurer's books and February 28th for Friends of the Museum reports. The \$242 was received by January 30th. The \$158 came in February and that amount plus the \$171 received this year from March 1, 1978 to January 30, 1979 totals \$329 as the State Treasurer's report in the 1979 Proceedings will show.

Since February 1, 1979 Dodge City Chapter has reported \$11.00 and Shawnee Mission \$12.00 from individual donors. Thank you, Chapter Chairmen, for a copy of your report, and thank you, members, for your donations. I cannot give special recognition to the other types of memberships for this year because the Chapter Chairmen failed to send me a copy of the donations report.

The reports, made as per instructions, are very necessary. They verify funds for acquisition and supply essential information for your State, National and Division Chairmen to acknowledge and honor all of Our Friends of the Museum for their loyal support Following is a Resume of "participation" for Friends of the Museum from March 1, 1977 to January 30, 1979:

An achievement Goal to be met by January 30, 1980: five cents—ten cents per member from the other 50 KSDAR Chapters.

Material from 18 chapters was bound as previously unpublished records; this included some material that had been returned by National several years ago to be prepared according to their instructions. One such set was from a chapter since disbanded.

Seventy-two (72) sets grandparent forms were reported sent to National.

Chapter chairmen really read the Instructions for Preparing Genealogical Records this year—only one set had to be returned for correction. Keep up the good work, and let's have some material from chapters that have not submitted in several years—some of these chapters have written me for the instructions already.

A total of 1072 pages have been submitted; five complete books to National, five for KSDAR Library and four to Kansas State Historical Society Library in Topeka.

Chapters contributing genealogical material this year are: Abilene, Arthur Barrett, Dana, Desire Tobey Sears, Emporia, Fort Larned, Jane Dean Coffey, Lone Elm, Martha Loving Ferrell, Mary Wade Strother, Minisa, Ninnescah, Polly Ogden, Susannah French Putney, Uvedale, William Wilson and Wyandot, plus Baxter Springs.

The chapter submitting the greatest number of pages of material was for the second year in a row-Desire Tobey Sears with 246 pages of Marriage Records for Mankato. Second was William Wilson with 176 pages of misc. Bible, Church and Family Records. Third was Jane Dean Coffey with 157 pages of Bible Records & Patent Deeds Index. Remember it ouny takes five pages to qualify for Honor Roll, and index pages are included in this count.

With over 140 entries we were happy to send twenty-one winners on for National Judging. Last year we had three National winners, with one girl placing first in the Nation in the Scrapbook Category.

Our contest begins in classrooms across the state, preparing their entries for local judging. First Place winners are sent to me for State-wide competition. JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

The Junior Membership Committees' theme is "Be in the Know and on the Go for Junior Membership" and to put YOU in the KNOW may I tell you of some of our aspirations and activities. The main purpose of Junior Membership is to get new Junior Members and to have Juniors in all phases of DAR work. The secondary purpose is to raise funds for the Juniors' Helen Pouch Memorial Fund by ordering and selling Junior products. The profits from these sales go to our two DAR schools. We now have 313 Junior Members and, of these, 36 joined this year. There are two Juniors serving as National Vice Chairmen, five as Chapter Regents, fifteen as other Chapter Officers, and twenty-eight as Chapter Chairmen. Nineteen served as Pages at State Conference and three were pages at Continental Congress. Many Chapters sold Junior products and one Chapter gave a program explaining our goals. Your generous support of our Bazaar and your purchases of Junior items enabled us to contribute \$1,205.50 to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. I am especially pleased to announce that I received reports and Junior Membership Lists from a very large number of Chapters and we now have a Directory ready for the printer. My thanks to all Regents and Chairmen who sent reports.

There were three entries in the Outstanding Junior Member Contest. The judges were Mayor Jack Carpenter of Roeland Park, Mrs. Jack Toot, Kansas PTA President, and Mrs. R.V. Shrewder, Honorary State Regent. The winner was Elaine Oakleaf who was also the South Central Divisonal winner. Elaine is a member of General Edward Hand Chapter. We take great pride in all our Juniors. To us, all of them are winners!

LINEAGE RESEARCH

The 1978-1979 year has been very interesting. In April I attended Continental Congress and received much inspiration and encouragement. I attended the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage on September 20, the Fall Board of Management and Northwest District Meeting at Newton October 30, and the Southwest District Meeting at Ulysses October 31.

At the meeting in Newton packets were made up for all chapters throughout the state and I prepared a questionnaire for the Chapter Lineage Research Chairmen to be included in the packets. A great deal of postage was saved in this manner. Forty of the questionnaires were returned to me from which I made my statistical report to the National Lineage Research Chairman and Vice Chairman.

I received three requests for help from Chapter Chairmen and feel that I was able to help them surmount their problems. Two requests were received that requred the help of researchers in other states. They are still being processed and we hope to get the needed information soon.

Nine programs and two workshops were given on lineage research. Smoky Hill Chapter, Ellsworth, Kansas, held a workshop on family history research July 20, 1978, for anyone interested in genealogical research. Grace Shaw Woldt conducted the workshop with assistance from several State Officers.

In August, 1978, an exciting genealogical workshop was held at Smith Center, Kansas, and was led by Grace Woldt of Manhattan, Kansas. Over 30 persons attended. Papers for six prospective members were distributed and now two of the six have papers pending. Much community interest was shown and the Sarah Steward Chapter is planning for an even larger workshop in 1979.

MEMBERSHIP

Forty-nine of the sixty-two chapters in Kansas responded to my questionaire. I am happy to report that 34 chapters fulfilled the new requirement for Honor Roll this year and admitted two new members by application. There were no C.A.R. members accepted into DAR in Kansas this year. I feel this is an area in which we all need to work.

I received notice of 7 members reinstated in KSDAR. Eighteen chapter chairmen ordered and distributed free membership literature. Of these, 97 Membership Outline Guides, 32 DAR in Action, 202 Fact Sheets, 106 Prospective Member Blanks, 10 DAR Policies, 10 Membership Reinstatement Cards, and 30 Transfer Cards were used by the chapters across the state. General reaction to this current, free literature has been favorable. Sixty per cent of the chapters expressed interest in having this free membership information continued. These can be obtained by writing the Corresponding Secretary General at National Headquarters.

According to your reports, the best methods to increase membership are: genealogical workshops, guest-days in the chapter, and publicity about DAR projects and programs.

I am happy to report that Jonathan Gilbert Chapter has won the award from the National Membership Chairman for the greatest percent increase in membership. They had a 30% increase! Several other chapters did well and should be commended for their effort. They are: William Wilson, 16%; Concordia, 15.3%; Sagamore, 12%; Council Oak, 10.8%; Sarah Steward, 10.3%; and Tomahawk, 10%.

MOTION PICTURE AND TELEVISION

Several chapters had spot announcements on television concerning American History Month, Constitution Week, and Council Oak promoted news coverage of the Madonna of the Trail Celebration. Byrd Prewitt sponsored the DAR film, "Home and Country" on KUPK-TV. Neodesha helps obtain good films to show in a church that the town has purchased for the purpose of presenting drama to the community. However, most of the reports from Kansas chapters went something like this:

> Forty-six chapters sent me reports I couldn't help noticing their answers were short, NO we don't know and NO we don't go We have NO interest in motion picture shows. They cost too much and the plot is bad, They show very few scenes to make me feel glad. So I stay home and watch the TV, But its programs and ADS often embarass me. Thus, I watch the news on CBS And hear that everyone, everywhere is in a MESS! Well, I'M here to say if you don't like the shows Hop in your car and to the theater go. Or visit the managers of the TV stations Be informative, kind, be sure to have patience. Unless they hear from us, they won't know, That we're offended by what they show. Take a few minutes and write a letter, Offer suggestions to make programming better. Put up a bulletin board for all to see, Place notices on it about shows rated Gl When a theater shows a film for the family, Go and See it and Praise it grandly. Money talks and theaters listen Let the managers know if You they're Pleasin' Talk at your meetings, stay up-to-date, Encourage others to watch what you think is GREAT! All of us know this little guy, Snoopy, Let him offer a challenge about this years movies. Snoop into what our young people see, At the movie house, most attend regularly. Snoop into who sponsors television shows That out the window really should go. Don't buy their products and write more letters. Tell them we won't buy, unless their shows get better. If all of us gather together our friends, We can be an influence to bring to an end, Pornography, violence, and other such stuff, It won't get done, until we Daughters get tough! Be verbal with praise, tell what makes us glad, Let's blow the whistle on shows that are BAD!!!!

Sixty-eight percent of our Kansas Chapters reported this year with the following results:

39 reported one entire program devoted to National Defense.

14 used at least 5 minutes at each meeting.

28 used 10 or more minutes at each meeting.

38 discussed the 1978 Resolutions.

38 had N.D. material available at each meeting.

31 made the material available to other persons.

8 gave the N.D. material to schools and 15 to libraries.

46 Good Citizen ship Medlas were awarded.

11 participated in the ROTC Program with 9 Bronze and 4 Gold Medals being awarded.

39 paid subscriptions to the National Defender.

426 letters were written to members of Congress.

423 letters or contacts were made with our State Legislators.

995 were reported as voting in the last elections. This is an approximate number for many chapters reported in percentages or saying that so many members lived out of town that a tally was impossible to obtain.

38 members hold elective or appointive office including City and County Commissioners, members on Library Boards, Aging Councils, Recreation Commissions, Beautification Commissions, Park Boards, Election Boards, etc.

The Panama Canal was still of Primary Concern, with the E.R.A., our Educational System, Taxation, and World Peace running close seconds.

Loss of Morals and Ethics in our National Leaders, Encirclement of United States by U.S.S.R., Giving of Technical Information to the U.S.S.R., Recognition of China, Marijuana and other Drugs, Taiwan, Foreign Ownership of our Land, and SALT 2 were among the other topics of great interest to Kansas Daughters.

These reports show that most of our chapters are well versed in the many problems facing us today and desire more concise information from the national office.

The personal notes many of you enclosed were much appreciated.

PROGRAM

Forty-seven yearbooks and supplements were received; several of these were too late to be forwarded to the National Chairman. However, they all were given a critique stapled to the inside back cover and a blue, red, or white ribbon stapled to the left corner of the cover. Those who utilized the National Theme in the program titles were also given a gold ribbon.

Thirty-one books earned a blue ribbon, thirteen earned a red ribbon, and three earned a white ribbon. Twenty-one books were sent to the National Program Chairman who requested only the perfect and near perfect books.

Annual reports were received from twenty-six chapters. All twenty-six chapters reported they used the instructions received from the National Office and all reported fulfilling honor roll requirements.

The DAR film "Home and Country" was used by several chapters and is available through your State Program Chairman. The cost is \$3.00 plus postage both ways. It has been a pleasure to serve as chairman of the Public Relations Committee these past eight months, but due to an out-of-the-country trip, several short trips in the states and unexpected company, I have not been able to attend meetings and functions as desired. And for this I'm sorry.

I attended the signing of the proclamation by Governor John Carlin designating February as American History Month.

Fifty chapters reported on their publicity with a total of 6,617 inches in newspapers—837 articles and 185 pictures. Magazines had 207 inches with 20 articles and 5 pictures. We had 9 hours and 24 minutes of radio publicity and 275 broadcasts. Television publicity consisted of 2 hours and 7 minutes and 74 telecasts. None of our chapters participated in the Feature Story Contest. Twelve chapters used the "Home and Country" film for programs. Three chapters invited the press to special chapter programs and 16 chapters invited the press to State Conference for programs and reports.

We trust that the publicity used throughout the state this past year made a good impression and that more people have a better understanding of DAR.

SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER

This was a great year for the Seimes Microfilm Center Committee in Kansas. First, the Seimes Microfilm Center became a mational committee at Continental Congress in April. Second, four members of the Kansas DAR recognized the importance of the Seimes Microfilm Center by giving four Life Membeships. These were from Uvedale, Topeka and Jane Dean Coffey members. Third, after some prodding by the State Chairman, we achieved the 100% reporting level. Our State Regent will be happy to report this at Continental Congress, especially since this is our first year as a National Committee.

We have 62 Chapters in the state and of those almost 50% report a chairman for this committee, a slight increase over last year. This is an area we need to work on in the future as we are now a National Committee. We had a total of \$743.00 contributed to the Center, \$582.00 of that designated for the purchase of the 1880 Soundex Indes film and another \$84.00 contributed for the purchase of seven rolls of the 1900 Census for Kansas. Many were donations honoring someone in that chapter. I am sure some Chapters did not report this item to me so there may be more. We look forward to another great year in 1979!

STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP

Madam President General: I bring greetings from the 62 chapters and more than 3700 members of the Kansas Society.

The Page holding the Kansas Flag is Elaine Gaddis Oakleaf, Outstanding Junior Member of the Kansas Society and of the South Central Division.

The most exciting event of the past year was the celebration, on September 7, of the fiftieth anniversary of the placing of the Madonna of the Trail Monument in Council Grove. The "memory box" placed fifty years ago remains a "Mystery Box", but a new box was placed with ample records of its location.

Believing that everything we do should represent the best in American life, we have been striving for excellence. Reports from all state chairmen associated with youth contests told of the high quality of the entries. BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

[Revised March 22, 1975 with subsequent amendments]

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Objects

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1)To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historic spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historic research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2)To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promise, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and accounting to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3)To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Troasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a)To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter members shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office, except the State Librarian, in order to provide efficient service to the Society from the city where the genealogical books are located. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least a year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b)A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seem feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. **Terms.** All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. **Dismissal.** Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. **Tenure.** All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall be taken.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board of Management Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after their election and no later than November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. **Report.** The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committee and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary: (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year. (b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material, to edit, and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Recording Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than six months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers; committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter of good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first three credential blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, before Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapter, made into a directory form. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the corespondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and the Organizing Regent in organizing new chapters. She shall ascertain the possibilities of organizing a new chapter where a new chapter is contemplated. She shall be responsible for correspondence relative to the organization of new chapters. She shall give assistance to existing chapters in sustaining their membership quota as required by the National Society.

Section 8. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds for the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State Conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall pass them on to her successor. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February first.

Section 9. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married; husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor; and colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceeding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given. The State Registrar shall prepare and have printed a necrology list for the memorial service at State Conference.

Section 10.State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 11. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books, papers, microfilm, and equipment as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all materials and equipment in the Kansas State DAR Library.

In her annual report she shall list all materials sent to the National Society Library and all materials received during the year for the Kansas State DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of the Kansas State DAR Library.

Section 12. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News", and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the Conference Press Committee. She shall send a short report of the Kansas State DAR Conference to the "DAR Magazine".

Section 13. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them from her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent-Elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of rocciving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and the Chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceeding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

(a) Chapters having less than fifty members: Regent and two delegates.

(b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members: Regent, and five delegates.

(c) Chapters having more than one hundred members: Rogent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three credential blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. **Privileges.** Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meeting of the State Conference.

Section 9. **Privileges.** The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegate and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. **Regular Meetings**.Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section. 3 Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$1.60 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of December. A member whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be a delegate to the State Conference. The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after May first shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year in conformance with the policy of the National Society.

Section 3. **Registration Fee.** Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee of one dollar, such sum to be given to the hostess chapter to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and three members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Student Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals, and interest on monies invested for this purpose.

Section 3. **Printing and Stationery.** The Printing and Stationery Committee, composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee, composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters, shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. **Resolutions.** The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. **Public Relations.** The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an exofficio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. **Reports of Proceedings.** Each State Officer, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent, shall prepare a condensed report, not exceeding 200 words. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent and two for the Recording Secretary and sent not later than March first each year. These reports covering the year's work, shall be prepared for the State Conference and shall be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. **Reports to the State Regent.** Each State Chairman shall send to the State Regent, not later than March first of each year, a copy of the statistical report prepared for the National Chairman or Vice Chairman. This information will be used by the State Regent in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each district shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The terms of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three years.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office by the June meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. **Report of Election.** On or before March first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. **Committee Chairmen.** Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of the National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January thirtieth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

No. 1 The report of the Kansas State Society shall be knowl as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer, 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairman and Vice Chairman of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairman of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C.A.R. 1; District Director, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2; The President General, 1; The Kansas State Historical Society, 1; the DAR National Library, 1; and the President of the State Officers' Club, Chapter Regents' Club and the State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2. Chairman of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

No. 3. No less than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.

No. 4. The State Registrar shall furnish the editor of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.

No. 5. A sum of \$1,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

No. 6. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

No. 7. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

No. 8. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress,

No. 9. Each chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund, \$1.00 to the Shawnee Mission Fund, and \$.05 per member to the KSDAR Library.

No. 10. The Shawnee Mission^{*}Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage.

No. 11. The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its properties housed in Shawnee Mission.

No. 12. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 13. The sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be used for the C.A.R. projects. No. 14. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 15. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Boards Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

No. 16. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 17. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 18. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 19. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G. and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

(a)The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.

(b)The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.

(c) Rental of \$125 a year shall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library. It shall be housed with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the Dodge City Recreation Center, making it a valuable resource center.

(d)The materials submitted to the KSDAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. Donors are asked to check with the librarian before presentation to avoid duplication.

No. 20. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

No. 21. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

No. 22. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.

No. 23. A \$10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.

No. 24. The Runner-up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an appropriate gift as an award.

No. 25. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests of the Kansas Luncheon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress. No. 26. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session of the State Conference to review the minutes of the session.

No. 27. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote of these delegates voting.

No. 28. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before August 1 by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, subject to the approval of the State Regent.

No. 29. KSDAR shall place a \$25 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR Magazine if no other Kansas advertising is available.

No. 30. In the event that KSDAR should have a national winner in any NSDAR youth competition in which the winner is required to attend Continental Congress, the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the award.
