- 14. Any chairman or individual having a table display or exhibit will please attend to the removal of all material at the close of the Conference.

- 8. That the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, authorize J.E. Caldwell Company to produce the three proposed pins designed for Page, State Chairmen's Club and State Regents' Club with spelling and final design approval of the State Regent and Insignia Chairman. Adopted.
- 9. That a Standing Rule be created to state: An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings, and other pertinent historical information will be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings decennially beginning in 1980. Adopted.
- 10. That a style rule be created to state that El Quartelejo be spelled with original Q spelling--E-l Q-u-a-r-t-e-l-e-j-o in all KSDAR records and publications. Adopted.
- 11. That the Kansas Society accept the offer of Mrs. Frank Hodges to purchase the silver tea service placed in the DAR Room of Shawnee Mission in memory of her mother, Mrs. Edward Pendleton. Adopted.
- 12. That State Conference Awards be presented by the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution to Janice Benjamin, history teacher at Meadowbrook Junior High School, Shawnee Mission, for extensive and outstanding involvement with the DAR American History Essay Contest; to Clyde Ernst, Curator of the Rice County Historical Museum, for assistance in the restoration of the Sterling Chapter Santa Fe Trail marker; and to Katherine Harper, Gertrude Josserand, Florence Smith, and Grace Ostenberg in recognition of the long and devoted service given to the Kansas Society through their work and assistance with KSDAR Library. Adopted.
- 13. That a Standing Rule be created to state: Upon her election, the State Treasurer shall be empowered to transfer funds to a convenient federally insured banking institution. Adopted.
- 14. That a Standing Rule be created to state: KSDAR will have printed a directory of members every ten years beginning in 1990. Adopted.
- 15. That The Regents' Roundtable of Johnson and Wyandotte County be authorized to present a certificate of award to David Wolfe, Director of Social Studies of Shawnee Mission School District, and to Mrs. Lewis H. Kessler for their extensive involvement in the American History Essay Contest. Adopted.

In other Patriotic Societies she was a member of Daughters of 1812 and a past State President: a past national officer of Daughters of American Colonists; and was a member of Daughters of Colonial Wars, the Huguenot Society of Washington, D.C., the Colonial Dames of the 17th Century and the Dolly Madison Tent of Union Veterans.

She was member and past officer of the Ladios Reading Circle, Federated Club of Newton, and the First Methodist Church.

Her life was dedicated to her belief in patriotism and service. Cornis not only knew her Kansas history, she lived it.

#### **MEMORIAL TO THEODORA H. STEBBINS** by Mrs. Fayette E. Rowe

We gather here roday to pay tribute to the memory of one who has endeared herself to her many UAR friends and acquaintences, Theodora Halcomb Stebbins. Theo, as she was called by her friends, was born in Pittsburg, Kansas on July 24, 1894, was reared in Columbus and was married to Lester D. Stebbins who died April 14, 1946 at Parsons.

Theo attended college at KSTC of Pittsburg and received a B.S. degree with majors in Food and Nutrition. She received a M.S. degree from the University of Iowa with majors in Nutrition and Child Welfare. She served as chief dietition in hospitals in Michigan, St. Louis, Missouri, the Veterans' Administration Hospital at Wadsworth, Kansas, and the Normandy Consolidated Schools at St. Louis County, Missouri, and the Parsons State Hospital and Training Center, where she worked until she retired.

Theo returned to make her home in Columbus in 1951, and occupied the old family home after the death of her mother in law, Mrs. Elva Stebbins. She joined Dana Chapter DAR in December, 1955, and became a most active and efficient member, filling many offices and chairmanships. She

served as State Chairman of the DAR Museum Committee from 1962 - 1965, and State Historian from 1965 - 1978. She also served as State Chairman of Constitution Week and Honor Roll. Many will remember her at meetings with her long insignic ribbon with 17 ancestor bars.

Other lineage societies to which Theo belonged include: Daughters of American Colonists, Magna Charta Dames, Daughters of Colonial Wars, National Huguenet Society, Dames of the Court of Honor, and Daughters of 1812. She was also President of the St. Louis Dietetic Association 1937 - 1939, Missouri Dietetic Association, and Kansas Dietetic Association 1958 -1959. She was a member of Kappa Delta Phi and Phi Upsilon Omicron honorary educational and home economic fraternities, and was listed in Who's Who of American Women, 3rd edition

Some of the memorials to our dear Theo include her name on a plaque in the DAR Museum in Washington, D.C., and the Seimes Microfilm Center there, memorials at the DAR schools yet to be placed, a genealogical volume to be placed in her memory at the Columbus Library, and Dana Chapter's other memorial to be yet placed.

Following announcements by Mrs. David J. Stone, Conference Chairman, Mrs. Moon pronounced the benediction and the colors were retired. The Eighty-second Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution reconvened at 9:00 a.m., March 14, 1980 at the Broadview Hotel, Wichita, Kansas. Mrs. John W. McGuiro, Jr. State Regent, presided.

Mrs. Halden Moon, State Chaplain, offered a prayer. Mrs. R.B. Woods, State Chairman of the Flag of the United States of America Committee, led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America; Miss Pauline Cowger, Honorary State Regent and Past Vice President General led the repetition of the American's Creed; and Mrs. Jacob Farney led in the singing of The National Anthem.

Mr3. Woodrow W. Dcw, State Recording Secretary, read the minutes of the opening session and they were approved as corrected.

Mrs. Reuben Byler, Chairman of the Credentials Committee, gave the following partial report of the Credentials Committee: National Officers, 2, 1 being from Kansas; Honorary State Regents, 2; State Officers, 11; Chapter Regents, 39; Delegates, 100; Alternates, 21; Members, 19; and Visitors, 1 for a total attendance of 197. Mrs. Byler noted that 22 honored guests had been present at the Thursday luncheon who had not been counted previously.

Mrs. McGuire introduced Mrs. Richard Denny Shelby, First Vice President General, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, Vice President General and Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Martin Alexander Mason, National Chairman of the Finance Committee and Honorary State Regent of the District of Columbia; the State Officers of the Kansas Society; and the State Parliamentarian.

Mrs. Forrest A. Gilmour, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, reported that the present Resolutions Committee has studied the Litter Control Resolution referred back to committee by the Eighty first Annual State conference, and that the Committee recommends its adoption as printed. On the motion of Mrs. Gilmour the following resolution was adopted:

#### LITTER CONTROL

WHEREAS the Kansas Legislature is considering mandatory deposit legislation; and

WHEREAS most studics show that beverage containers comprise only about 10 to 15% of roadside litter, but that paper products such as newspapers and fast food convenience packaging account for over 50% of litter; and

WIIEREAS, eight statcs have enacted comprehensive litter abatement laws which mandate public education for litter control;

RESOLVED, that the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the legislators of the State of Kansas to pass comprehensive litter control legislation, including legislation to require a deposit on carbonated soft drink and malt derived alcoholic beverage containers.

Mrs. Gilmour introduced the other members of the Resolution Committee, Mrs. Artie Elledge, and Mrs. Dudley Henderson and read the proposed Resolutions of the Conference:

### CHILD ABUSE

WHEREAS, For years experts have realized that the frightening phenomenon of child abuse has reached epidemic proportions in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Not enough is being done either legally or medically to check or reverse this terrible tide; and

WHEREAS, There is now pending before the Kansas Legislature S.B. 609 which would increase marriage license fees from \$3.00 to \$10.00; and

WHEREAS, 70% of the funds created by this increase in marriage license fees would be used to establish a Families and Children Trust Fund to deal with the problem of child abuse in the State of Kansas;

RESOLVED, That the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, write to their Kansas legislators in support of S.B. 609.

### WOMEN AND THE DRAFT

WHEREAS, The registering and/or drafting of women into the armed services is a matter of national security and not a matter of social concern; and

WHEREAS, The army already has more women on a volunteer basis than it can effectively use (8% of its total); and

WHEREAS, 15% of the women in the armed services are pregnant at any given time, which contributes to the fact that the loss of time from duty of women is three times as great as that of men; and

WHEREAS, The armed services are not permitted to discharge pregnant women; and

WHEREAS, Drafting women into the armed services of the United States would be a further signal to the world of our military weakness;

RESOLVED, That the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, oppose both the registration and the drafting of women into the armed services of the United States of America.

### **NATIVE-BORN AMERICANS**

WHEREAS, Until recent years the members of the Executive Branch of the United States Government have been native-born Americans, although this is not a legal requirement; and

WHEREAS, There are many qualified native-born citizens of these United States willing to serve their country;

RESOLVED, That the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, write to the President of the United States, the incumbent President as well as future Presidents, and to the members of Congress urging that, in the future, persons appointed to serve in the Executive Branch of the United States Government be native-born Americans.

### THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES

WHEREAS, Our Society has as one of its principal aims the collection

and preservation of historical and genealogical records; and

WHEREAS, The National Archives in Washington, D.C., has been the treasure house of historical and genealogical data concerning our country and its citizens; and

WHEREAS, There have recently been indications that these data, records and materials may be dispersed to regional centers where they would be inaccessible to us as individual researchers, and to all researchers of whatever interest in our country.

RESOLVED, That the members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, support the position that the National Archives be restored to its former position as a separate entity, and not be kept as a subsidiary of the General Services Administration; and

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the protection of our National Archives as the repository of historical and genealogical records be further enhanced by being directed and maintained only by competent, professional archivists.

### **GEORGE MASON, PATRIOT**

WHEREAS, George Mason framed the Virginia Declaration of Rights and the First Constitution of Virginia at Williamsburg in the spring of 1776; and

WHEREAS, His public work and patriotic service became the basis for our Declaration of Independence and our Federal Constitution and Bill of Rights; and

WHEREAS, He helped draft our Federal Constitution but refused to sign it because it did not have a Bill of Rights; and

WHERAS, His opposition to ratification produced the "gentlemen's agreement" under which the First Ten Amendments were introduced and adopted; and

WHEREAS, June 12, 1976 and December 15, 1991, being the 200th anniversaries, respectively, of the adoption of the Virginia Declaration of Rights and the First Ten Amendments of our Federal Constitution, mark our American Constitutional Bicentennial Era; and

WHEREAS, The likeness of George Mason has not appeared upon a United State Postage Stamp; and

WHEREAS, Millions of Americans have never heard of George Mason;

RESOLVED, That the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, request the Postmaster General of the United States to issue one or more series of United States Postage Stamps bearing the likeness of George Mason.

### WINDFALL PROFITS TAX

WHEREAS, The windfall profits tax has been misrepresented as a tax on the big oil companies when, in reality, it is a complicated well-head tax levied on landowners and producers; and

WHEREAS, It has been computed that this tax would cost Kansas landowners and producers \$1,000,000 and \$3,500,000, respectively, the first year, resulting in lost production; and

WHEREAS, Originally it was anticipated that the proceeds from the tax would be used for the development of synthetic fuels, but the bill (HR-3919), as now written, funnels the billions of dollars which would be derived from this tax into the general fund of the United States Treasury; and

WHEREAS, Well over half of these funds are being targeted to provide tax relief for individuals and corporations and aid to the poor and not for developing fuel alternatives and fostering energy independence for the United States; and

WHEREAS, The passage of this bill is imminent;

RESOLVED, That the individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, write their legislators in Washington, D.C., immediatoly, urging them to exercise great courage and discipline and vote to defeat the windfall profits tax bill (HR-3919).

On the motion of Mrs. Walter Ostenberg, the name of Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr. will be placed on the ballot for Honorary State Regent.

### **REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS**

### STATE REGENT

### Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr.

It is with feelings of relief and regret that your State Regent presents her last report. The responsibilities of this office can only be understood from experience. The excitement and constant activity will be missed, but I look forward to leisure to enjoy the happy memories collected during the past three years and to continuing to serve our society in a supportive role.

During the past year, the State Regent completed individual visits to the 62 Chapters and has attended 13 other Chapter meetings. She has mailed over 900 pieces of mail and has travelled 5,700 miles within the state - about one half the number of miles driven each of the two previous years.

Three goals of this administration - to increase membership, to strengthen weak chapters and to expand DAR activity within the state have been only partly met for this is a continued effort. State Society records show our membership to be exactly the same as last year, the halt in growth due, in part, to the increase in National Society dues. We will always have chapters needing assistance, but there are no chapters at this time that cannot be revitalized.

Reports of the Chapters and State Chairmen will testify to increased DAR activity within our state. The placing of historical markers, participation in youth projects, outstanding growth in C.A.R., increased work for the Veteran-Patients Committee and special conservation projects are but a few of the ways that our members are letting their "light shine before men". The reports of National projects will show our interest and support.

At the October National Board of Management Meeting, Mrs. Garland Braden was confirmed as Organizing Regent for a chapter in the Overland Park Lenexa area. The nucleus for this chapter has been meeting and the organization is expected to be completed in June.

The processing of a backlog of genealogical records from previous administrations has not been completed, and the State Chairman estimates there is enough valuable material remaining for nine volumes. A total of 46 volumes of new and old material have been compiled during this administration, 16 volumes having been sent to the NSDAR and KSDAR Libraries and 14 volumes to the Kansas State Historical Library. The cost of binding these volumes has been met through chapter gifts to the State Regent and through chapter and individual contributions.

Appreciation is expressed to Mrs. Herbert Woldt and to Mrs. George London who conducted workshops in six communities and to State Officers and Chairmen who assisted them. The workshops have promoted good public relations and have laid the foundation for several years of membership growth for the sponsoring chapters.

A Master Chapter Regent's Questionaire comprising the reports of all committees was instituted this year on a trial basis. The State Regent compiled, typed and mailed the questionaire, received the completed reports from 61 chapters and distributed the responses to the State Chairmen. The reports of the State Chairmen seem to reflect the more complete reporting. The cooperation of the Chapter Regents who received the questionaires only a month before they were to be returned was appreciated.

Another innovation was the two day combined Board of Management, District Meetings and Fall Workshop held in Wiehita in September. Early in the summer, when gasoline shortage was critical, a meeting in a central location seemed desirable. Again, the Kansas Daughters were flexible and cooperative and showed their ability to accept change and inconvenience with good humor and enthusiasm. The survival of our society may rest on our capacity to adjust to such changes and emergencies.

When I accepted the office of State Regent, I did not recognize it as a gift. Not all gifts come gift wrapped, and we may reflect, sadly, that we are not always eager to accept a gift which cannot be recognized by its wrapping. Truly precious are the gifts of the spirit which come to us disguised as responsibility wrapped in confidence and trust. I thank you for this gift and for the privilege of serving as your State Regent.

#### STATE REGISTRAR

This final year as your State Registrar has been a rewarding one. I attended the Executive Committee meeting, and the State Conference in Wichita last March, and the Eisenhower Pilgrimage in May. In May I sent a letter to all chapter registrars asking for an up to datc list of chapter members, their ancestors and state of service, national number with address, all as groundwork for printing a State Directory. Many were very prompt and I prodded a few with phone calls. As I checked my cards against the new lists, I wrote many letters back to the chapters. I checked the file of ancestors against the active file of members. I typed new cards for each member to be used for our Directory. Daily changes of membership that I received were made until it came time to start typing. Thanks again to Ruth Smith and Elinor Jackson for their invaluable help. To make a long story short, the typing was done, taken to the printer and the books were ready for the District meetings in September.

I attended the Board of Management in the fall and the district meetings in Wichita. I attended the Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage and tried to answer all my correspondence. Thank you to the chapters who sent in their reports by February 5th. As last year, the forms and instructions were included in the Regent's packet at the district meetings.

This February, I prepared the Memorial list and had it printed, and will help the State Chaplain with the Memorial Service held this Thursday afternoon. If a death in your chapter was missed, please bring it to my attention so the name may be included next year.

Copies of the Directory are for sale - \$5.00 at meetings, and \$6.50 if they have to be mailed. I have already returned \$1,000.00 to the State Treasurer. Receipts are kept in a savings account in Wichita, with some interest earned, and a blanket for the Jr. Bazaar for opening the account. The Directory has been advertised in Kanhistique, the DAR News, the DAR Magazine, and will be in the Genealogical Helper. To date we have sold 228 copies. The cost was \$3,669.89.

### STATE HISTORIAN

#### Miss Virginia E. Weisgerber

Under the efficient leadership of Mrs. Raymond F. Fleck, Historian General, and the kind assistance of Mrs. John W. McGuire, State Regent KSDAR, and of chapter officers and members, this officer has experienced a busy and productive year.

This year all 62 chapters reported this in questionnaires: \$33.00 contributed to the Americana Collection; 126 historical programs for adults and 35 for children; anniversaries celebrated for 15 famous people and 9 events; graves marked for 5 Revolutionary Soldiers and 10 deceased members; 2 Historical Markers placed; 1 Restoration of a Lewis and Clark Marker begun and 1 Santa Fe Trail Marker completed and marked.

Within the knowledge and advice of the State Regent, the State Historian provided requested information for two men wishing material for publication: Gerald P. Wood, co editor of OFL, Fort Scott; and Steven Crum, toward his history of American Indian higher education. She presented a copy of Historical and Memorial Buildings of the DAR to the Kansas DAR Library.

Requested by the Historian General, she sent in four shipments a total of 259 Marker Reports: Kansas Real Daughters; Santa Fe Trail, Oregon Trail, and Historical Marker completed data and condition of Markers; and DAR Grave Markers. Then she provided Kansas copies of all records sent to Historian General. These are assembled in 6 notebooks, complete with letters, clippings, and photos relating to reports. The Kansas files will be placed in State File Cabinet, State Historical Library, Topeka. After the State Conference, she will assist the State Regent in a 1980 Inventory of the State File Cabinet.

My 5 years as Librarian of the KSDAR Library have been interesting, challenging and rewarding because of the concern and support of my two State Regents - Mr3. Francis L. Johnson and Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., and the many loyal KSDAR Members for your gifts of books, money and letters.

During that period our space in the KGS-DAR Library has been doubled, the 5 open shelf units replaced with sturdy enclosed book shelves and 8 new ones added. With space available for 1 more unit-we are indebted to Captain Jesse Leavenworth, Sarah Steward, Kanza, Martha Vail, Dodge City Chapters and the Wyandot-Johnson County Regents Round Table for their 1979 gifts plus gifts from Mrs. John M. ### **REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL COMMITTEES**

### AMERICAN HERITAGE

#### Mrs. Richard C. McGehee

The American Heritage Chairmen in Kansas have planned and reported a larger number of programs this year than any previous year. Every chapter responded to the questionaires, reporting a total of ninety-four programs in the American Heritage category. The chairman was pleased to note the increased interest in the field of art by the larger number of art programs this past year. Community interest was shown in the local D.A.R. programs in fourteen cities and towns in our state.

The national Program office furnished chapters with thirty programs which is a large increase over past years. Chairmen reported that these programs were outstanding and recommended the use of them to other chapters.

The National Anthem is being sung at every meeting in forty chapters. We strongly urge all chapters to establish this as a regular part of their opening ritual.

A Hannah Jameson chapter member, Merle Lewis Crooks, entered the wall hanging contest in the craft department of the American Heritage committee. Mrs. Erma Tebben wrote an essay entitled "Chimes, Strikes, Peels, and Tolls", from her research on the beautiful old historic churches in her city.

This chairman wishes to commend the Arthur Barrett, Courtney Spaulding, Desire Toby Sears, General Edward Hand, and Good Land chapters for planning programs in three of the four categories. Special recognition is given to Molly Fostor Berry and the Kanza chapters for programs in all four fields. The National Society American Heritage award goes to the Cimarron River Valley chapter, Mrs. Virgil House chairman, Mrs. Albert Shank Regent, for outstanding programs in each field and the community interest and attention shown in them.

### AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

#### Miss Virginia E. Weisgerber

This year has been most gratifying! Committee information reached chapters in Regents Packets, "Kansas DAR News", Fall Workshop, and -committee questionaires. Governor Carlin issued the State "February --1980: American History Month Proclamation," with the State Chairman and the two Topeka regents and vice regents present for the signing. Chapters received Proclamation copies.

All 62 chapters reported as follows: 38 chapter-sponsored displays; 19 other awards to students excelling in American History, 89 sets of spot announcements used; 34 members on radio or TV for this committee; 844 inches of publicity and 55 pictures; 56 letters to Legislators urging permanent National Proclamation.

The essay subject "Industries and Trades During the American Revolution" attracted 35 chapters, reporting that 70 schools – 12 for the first time – entered 1,275 participating Grades 5, 6, 7, and 8 children. Chapters entered 65 grade-winning essays in state competition. At special events they honored contestants with cortificates or medals. Three non DAR judges chose winning essays, sent to the Divisional National Vice Chairman for further competition: Grade 5, Kathleen Wogan;

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sponsor Hannah Jameson; Grade 6, Marcia Biggs, Emporia; Grade 7, David Hall, Courtney-Spalding; Grade 8, Laree Huffman, Ninnescah. Awards were lapel medals and certificates. Winners and their parents were guests at the Thursday Luncheon -- a highlight of this successful year!

On April 26, and verified on April 5, 1980, word was received that Kansas has again two South Central Division Winners in the American History Essay Contest. The two Kansas winners are Kathleen Wogan and Laree Huffman. Each girl receives National Awards of a DAR Gold Medal and a book published by the National Geographic Society entitled **The American Revolution**; Chapters will present the awards at special meetings. The National Society is proud of the 65,254 contestants this year from all of the states. Of this number, there were 10,477 from our South Central Division, showing the extent of this important youth activity.

In 1979-1980 the State Regent's master questionaire reports are 97% received and reflect the following:

St. Mary's School for Indian Girls, Springfield, SD Cash gifts totalled \$319.18 Thrift shop received 245 lbs. with estimated value of \$385.00 Campbell & other labels were sent from 5 Chapters

American Indians Scholarship Fund Received \$34.00 from 4 Chapters

American Indian programs were reported by 27 Chapters and some also reported tours. Your Chairman presented several programs. An American Indians Luncheon was a part of the Eighty-First Annual State Conference with this Chairman presiding. Special guests included Mr. Jay Hunter, Executive Director of the Mid-America All Indian Center, Wichita, and Mrs. Mike Mayfield, MAAIC Museum Director. Dr. Dean Chavers, President of Bacone College, was the luncheon speaker. An afternoon tour of the Mid-America All Indian Center was well attended.

Kansas Daughters were delighted to have Mrs. Sherman B. Watson, National Chairman of the American Indians Committee, attend morning ceremonies and be the luncheon speaker at the annual Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage, September 19, 1979.

### AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. Joe Reddell Perry

Our chapter response was 100% this year. All of them were in some way able to participate in this committee's work. Fifty-four chapters did this by repeating The American's Creed at chapter meetings and twenty-seven had an Americanism program. Six had spot announcements on radio and TV and twenty-two placed patriotic literature in schools, libraries, and other places. Betty Bonney Chapter presented flags to the Cherokee Strip Museum. Cimarron River Valley and Uvedale Chapters have had projects with members and school children. Jeremiah Howard Chapter is helping mixed origin teenagers with current programs and music groups from street children have been organized. Shawnee Mission Chapter presented an Americanism Award and KSDAR has received approval for a Medal of Honor award to be given to Mr. Arthur M. King at State Conference.

Nine hundred and eighty-three DAR Manuals for Citizenship were given to applicants for American citizenship. Four hundred and sixty-six flags of the U.S., four hundred and seventy-four patriotic leaflets, two hundred and twenty-four welcome cards, seven hundred and eleven flag codes, one flag pin, and thirty American's Creed cards were distributed. Many, many hours were spent in teaching and working with Americanism classes and in sponsoring teas. John Haupt Chapter has had two naturalization receptions each year for 30 years.

### CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION Mrs. Inghram Miller

An outstanding event of C.A.R. during 1979 was the election of Miss Lisa Godfrey as National C.A.R. Corresponding Secretary during the National convention in Washington, D.C. April 19 - 23, 1979. Lisa was installed at Mt. Vernon at the same time as Kansas C.A.R. President, Chris Ottinger.

Activities this year included at least a dozen out-of-town trips by the Senior State President. Ten Senior Officers, 4 C.A.R. members and families attended the Great Plains Regional C.A.R. Meeting at St. Mary's School for Indian Girls in Springfield, South Dakota, July 25 - 26, 1979. This Officer attended the C.A.R. State Meeting September 4, 1979 at the home of President Chris Ottinger in Leawood and the KSDAR meeting September 13 - 14, 1979 in Wichita to report C.A.R. activities in Kansas. At least 100 each, letters and telephone calls were necessary to perform duties as Senior State President.

One new Society, El Quartelejo, located at Oakley, was organized. Membership presently stands at 57 for the four Societies (Tomahawk Society at Kansas City, Jesse Lee Reno Society at Hutchinson, El Quartelejo Society at Oakley, and Leavenworth Society at Leavenworth, the latter pending confirmation) includes an increase by 21 new members, which is 210% of quota, plus 9 more members pending. The importance of C.A.R. is emphasized by the fact that a loss this year of 5 C.A.R. members is a gain of 4 to DAR and 1 to SAR, reinforcing continuity to the senior organization.

A personal award of appreciation was received by this Senior State President for cooperation with SAR in a presentation by the KSAR President on March 31, 1979.

Contributions included one Major Benefactor (\$1,000) to the C.A.R. Museum, one Life Promoter (\$100), two Endowments (\$100 each + \$200), ... and one 300+ (\$100) Member. Emphasis on C.A.R. Magazine subscriptions resulted in 100% family participation.

Scholarship recipient for 1979 was Miss Gwendolyn Godfrey of the Tomahawk Society.

#### CONSERVATION

#### Mrs. Bruce Cochran

The Kansas Society can be very proud of this conservation year. With 100% chapter reporting the figures are impressive: 44= individuals \_\_\_\_\_ working with youth on conservation projects, 18 individuals establishing wildlife habitats, 787 trees planted, 8 chapters with Green Patch projects, 153 individuals who wrote to their legislators concerning various conservation issues, 38 chapters who presented conservation programs, and two NSDAR Conservation Medals approved. Arthur Barret Chapter nominated Maude Bryan and the Kansas Society nominated Wauketa R. Wright.

The Wauketa R. Wright Conservation Awards were presented to Newton Chapter for Best Conservation Representation and Report and to Topeka Chapter for the Best Green Belt/Green Patch Program.

The State Conservation Committee Chairman was pleased to participate in the presentation of two white oak trees to the Shawnee Indian Mission at the annual pilgrimage on September 19, 1980. The funds were provided by the Dodd Memorial-Conservation Fund (contributions made in memory of the father of Isabel Dodd McGuire, our State Regent) and by the Shawnee Mission Chapter.

The final state conservation project for this administration is the planting of thirteen trees on the grounds of the Kansas Statehouse near the Pioneer Woman statue. Funding for this project has been provided by:

### THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. R. B. Woods

The forty-three chapters reporting have been active with good reports. Chapters presenting flags and codes to new American citizens are Eunice Sterling, John Haupt, and James Ross. Chapters giving Braille flags and codes to blind schools and the handicapped are Tomahawk, Good Land, and Jane Dean Coffey. Good Land gave 143 Pledge bookmarks to third grade students. Jane Dean Coffey had a Tulsa TV station use the Flag at each newscast. John Haupt gave 830 flags and cupcakes to each veteran in the VA Hospital. Many chapters gave flags to 4-H and other youth groups, civic clubs and resthomes. Neodesha had flags for each deceased member's grave. The chapters report the following statistics: large flags presented, -19; small flag, 13; miniature flags, 1,185; codes to members, 365; to schools & youth groups, '930; corrections, 12; pins sold, 9; awards, 4; lapel pins, 41; flag display, 43 chapters; programs, 22; partial programs, 43; newspaper items, 16; radio, 7; TV, 1; public presentation, 19; chapters reciting the Pledge, 43; American's Creed, 37.

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#### **FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM**

Your Chairman attended the Board of Managment, the State Conference, and District Meetings in each year of this Administration. She addressed the District Meetings, reviewed the "Information -Instructions" letters from the National Chairmen and invited DAR members and friends to participate in raising money for the continuation of specific acquisitions.

This has been a profitable three years for our NSDAR Museum. This year, March 1, 1979 to March 1, 1980, ten chapters made donations. There were three new Life Members, Mrs. Essa Hoover of Jane Dean Coffey, Mrs. John W. McGuire, our State Regent, of Shawnee Mission and Mrs. Jacob Farney of Tomahawk. Two chapters, Betty Washington and John Athey, became Participating Members. Mrs. Lewis Kessler of Mission Hills and Mrs. Lennel Wright of Randolph Loving gave Sustaining Memberships. Sixty five Regular subscribers - twenty one from Shawnee Mission, thirty-eight from Randolph Loving, five from Topeka and one from Mary Wade Strother - made the receipts total \$425.00. The 1980 Proceedings will show \$448.62 due to different final reporting dates.

Total participation by KSDAR for the NSDAR Museum the past three years by chapters: 60 reported on the short form; 38 named a Chairman; 14 contributed - 5 from N.E. Dist. gave \$651.00, 2 in S.E. \$110.00, 3 in N.W. \$178.00, 4 in S.W. \$80.62 - for a total contribution of \$1,019.62. This amount included the following memberships: 7 Life (\$700.00), 4 Participating (\$100.00), 13 Sustaining (\$65.00) and 154 Regular (\$154.00) which makes the \$1,019.00.

Our National Vice Chairman, Mrs. C. Wayne Elsea, reports a new high in the donations by Friends of the Museum during the past two fiscal years. Kansas Daughters you have helped generously to achieve this record.

A new method for collecting the statistical reports has been used this year and it may have caused some confusion for the Chapters, but in years to come it will prove efficient. A report form was placed in the packets made up at the District Meetings in September and later the State Regent's questionnaire was sent out. Twenty-five Chapters reported on both forms, two Chapters reported only on the packet form and thirty-five Chapters reported only on the State Regent's form -- a total of sixty-two Chapters reporting.

Six workshops were conducted in genealogy as follows: March 28 at Stafford, Kanza Chapter, sponsor; May 16 at Manhattan, Polly Ogden Chapter, sponsor; August 8 at Phillipsburg, Phebe Dustin, Sarah Steward, and Desire Tobey Sears Chapters, sponsors; November 8 at Clay Center, Nathan Edson Chapter, sponsor -- all of these were conducted by Mrs. H. W. Woldt assisted by Mrs. Harold Albrecht, Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr. and Mrs. James O. Kershner; July 14 at Garnett, Four Winds Chapter, sponsor; November 13 at Gardner, Lone Elm Chapter, sponsor -- these were conducted by Mrs. George London assisted by Mrs. Woodrow W. Dew, Mrs. Halden R. Moon, Mrs. Vincent Signaigo and Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr. Thirteen lineage research programs were given by the Chapters and outside programs were conducted by Mrs. Robert W. Keeler of Randolph Loving Chapter for the VFW Auxilliary, University Dames, and a book club. Much community interest has been shown on lineage research and 12 Chapters reported that they have members who are qualified and willing to research requests. Requests from 9 Lineage Research Chairmen or Chapter Regents have been received and one required the services of an out-of-state researcher.

#### MEMBERSHIP

#### Mrs. Lewis W. Warren

Questionaires were mailed out to all 62 chapters in Sept. 1979. Cards were sent out to Chapters that had not sent in the 50 year and over list of members in Feb. 1980.

The statistics show there were 104 new members during the past year, of which 4 were reinstated members and 25 of the new members are Junior Members.

11 members were dropped for non-payment of dues.

29 members were deceased and 16 members resigned. We have a gain of 48 members.

Smoky Hill Chapter will receive The National Membership Chairman Award for the greatest percent net increase in membership.

There are 102 members in the 50 year and over members. Not all chapters reported.

Thank you all for your cooperation.

### NATIONAL DEFENSE

#### Mrs. Harold O. Bullock

The National Defense Chairman reports the following statistics:

61 chapters reported, 61 reported on the short form, 25 supplemented this by filling in the longer more detailed report sent out from the national office.

- 59 reported one entire program devoted to National Defense.
- 60 gave at least 5 minutes at each meeting to National Defense.
- 58 reviewed the NSDAR Resolutions.
- 58 reported National Defense materials available to each meeting.
- 13 placed materials in schools.
- 12 placed material in libraries.
- 35 made material available to interested individuals.
- 49 Good Citizen Medals were presented.
- 17 chapters participated in the ROTC Medal project.

9 Bronze medals were presented; 7 Gold medals were presented, \$10.00 was contributed to NSDAR ROTC and one chapter awarded a savings bond to the ROTC graduate.

14 chapters donated \$36.00 to Dollars for Defense.

38 paid subscriptions to the National Defender reported.

381 persons wrote to members of Congress.

381 wrote to members of our State Legislature.

364 reported as having voted, local elections only this year.

16 members hold elective or appointive public office.

The issue of Salt 2 was the most discussed, with ERA and the Drafting of Women running second. The Eroding of our National Security and our relations with Russia were of great interest. The Prairie National Park and the Windfall Profits tax were of great concern, both issues touching on Kansas economy.

Mrs. Phyllis Schlafly was our National Defense speaker at State Conference.

We still need to urge members to subscribe to the National Defender, it is a great way to keep us informed.

#### PROGRAM

#### Mrs. Joseph R. Riden, Jr.

A letter was sent in May to each Chapter Vice Regent giving information about District Meetings, State Conference, changes in State Chairmen and yearbook information. A four page letter from the National Program Chairman was enclosed. A second mailing in July had new program information available from National (that was not in the program catalog) and a report form to be answered and returned to the State Chairman.

Forty-nine Chapters submitted yearbooks and supplements for judging. Thirty-one books and supplements were sent to the National Program Chairman. Five of the remaining eighteen books were awarded a blue ribbon, seven books received a rcd ribbon and white ribbons went to six books. Gold ribbons were awarded to fourteen Chapters for using the National theme in over fifty per cent of their program titles. Every book has a critique stapled to the back cover. There were many excellent and interesting programs scheduled for this year. The certificates for the winners of the "Theme" and "Cost of Printing" Contest were not available at this time from the National Chairman. They will be given out at the fall District Meetings. Kansas Daughters should be proud of the quality and content of their yearbooks.

All 62 Chapters answered the program report due to the efforts of the State Regent, Mrs. John W. McGuirc, Jr. Of our 62 Chapters, 59 used the instructions from National and 48 Chapters have the current Program Catalog. A total of 46 Program Manuscripts were ordered by 13 Chapters and 10 Chapters ordered slide programs. 54 articles from the DAR Magazine were used by 28 Chapters and 58 Chapters used the honor roll requirements in planning their programs. The average cost of a yearbook was 78 cents and the average cost of a supplement was 38 cents. The DAR film "Home and Country" was used by five chapters during the last year. It is available through the State Program Chairman. The cost is \$3.00 paid to the State Treasurer plus postage both ways.

#### PUBLIC RELATIONS

Beryle L. Elliott \_ \_

Sixty-one chapters reported on their publicity with a total of 4,985 inches in newspapers - 580 articles and 93 pictures. Magazines had 151 inches of publicity with 15 articles and 4 pictures. We had 7 hours and 31 minutes of radio publicity and 241 broadcasts. Television publicity consisted of 1 hour and 50 minutes with 61 telecasts. Six chapters reported they had a feature story and submitted it to the State Chairman, but I did not recieve any. Nine chapters used "Home and Country" film for programs. Eight chapters invited press to special programs and the press has been invited to your State Convention. Forty-five chapters have visited their local newspaper offices, 19 have visited their local radio stations and 4 have visited their television stations and provided them with good press releases in advance and after meetings.

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Eleven chapters said they placed displays in banks, 9 in schools, 8 in libraries and 3 in other places.

Seven chapters said they distributed NSDAR literature.

Hopefully more Kansans have a better understanding of DAR.

#### SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER

#### Mrs. George A. London

The second year of Seimes Microfilm Center as a National Committee went very well. In spite of the State Regent's efforts to get 100% reporting, we still had some chapters who did not report and to whom I had to write individually to get that 100% response. We did collect \$808.00 however, and all chapters but two gave something. If these two chapters had given even twenty five cents we could have achieved the award of 100% chapter participation! We did however, complete the purchase of the 1880 Soundex Index for Kansas. For that we are eligible for a national award.

This year I am happy to report that Kansas DAR mambers are rccognizing that they can honor someone or give mamorials and have a lasting tribute which will still furnish money for the Microfilm Center, too. We have Life Memberships from Shawnee Mission, Wyandot and Jane Dean Coffey Chapters. We also had two honorariums from Jane Dean Coffey. We had one memorial from Tomahawk Chapter, but it could not be counted for this year as it came after February 1. It will be a great start for the new year.

We have some momentum started now so if most chapters could buy one roll of film or donate the \$12.00 per year to help with the filming of the thousands of new applications and supplementals which the Registrar General is reporting, plus the unpublished non copyrighted genealogical material which comes in each year, then Kansas would be able to do its part.

#### STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP

#### Mrs. Francis L. Miller

Another good year, with five chapters sponsoring girls for the three \$150.00 scholarships given by the Kansas DAR for the 1979-80 school year. All were such outstanding girls (a credit to their families, schools, and communities) that it made judging a difficult and heart breaking task.

The three winners were: Gail Elaine Garey, daughter of Clarice Garey and the late James C. Garey of Stafford, sponsored by the Kanza Chapter, Mrs. Robert Shank, Regent, Mrs. George Hart, Chairman; Barbara Jean Lange, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Lange of Mankato sponsored by the Desire Toby Sears Chapter, Mrs. Lang, Regent; Dawn Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley C. Smith of Garden City. She was sponsored by the William Wilson Chapter of which Mrs. Robert L. Vincent is Regent, Helen Finke is Chairman.

The three judges, who graciously gave their time and concern were: Dr. Elizabeth Coehran, a retired Professor of History at Pittsburg State University; Dr. Ernest Mahan, a retired hidtory professor and Dean of Instruction at Pittsburg State University; and Mr. Marian Nation, a retired history teacher and senior advisor at Pittsburg High School.

#### TRANSPORTATION

Sixty one chapters reported through the Transportation Chairman's or the State Regent's questionaire. Of these, 41% have walkers, 100% carpool to chapter meetings, 88% to state functions, and 85% make a conscious effort as a chapter to observe the 55 mph speed limit. The car pools are arranged by phone between friends for convenience of pick up. Think about using inter-chapter car pools, too.

Thirty KSDARs have CPR certificates. Fifty-one have taken defensive driving courses. Eight transportation, three safety, and two CPR programs were presented.

We wrote to many people about various things. The police, state legislators, local officials, and the Governor heard comments about stop signs, tree hazards, Highway 81 and gas rationing.

Reactions regarding the combination of the Board of Management Mccting and the District Mcctings generally tended to express favoring the fuel conservation of the State Officers and Chairmon; however, the district structure was weakened by not having sufficient time to conduct district business. Lack of tables and chairs was also mentioned. These comments will be forwarded to the next State Officers and Transportation Chairman.

My favorite compiled fact is that only two of us admitted to having recieved a ticket in the last two years. Keep up the good driving!

#### STATE CONFERENCE AWARDS

You put the KAN in KANSAS! In the three years since the State Conference Awards were established, all but two Kansas chapters received recognition. This included NSDAR awards. There is no contest nor discrimination. Award recipients are selected by the State Chairman. Explanation and rules of State Conference Awards are found in the 1978 Proceedings, page 85, and 1979 Proceedings, page 81. In 1980, 34 chapters and 12 individuals were recognized. Total cash awards were \$56.50, representing 21 categories. Three NSDAR awards and 29 certificates for "One Hundred Percent Participation in the President General's Project" were included. The 3 year's approbations are: 47 President General's Certificates; 139 cash awards or certificates to 60 chapters in 24 fields of interest; \$250.50 cash disbursed. We deeply appreciate the support and contributions of the State Regent, Honorary State Regents, State Vice Regent, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Historian, State Chairmen, Pages, Eunice Sterling Chapter and individual Kansas members. We thank Mrs. McGuire for asking us to serve on this committee. It has been a pleasure. We congratulate all award recipients on their recognition for excellence in NSDAR activities. We have enjoyed "getting to know you, getting to know att about you".

#### **EL QUARTELEJO**

#### The State Chairman accompanied Rick Stevens, Scott County State Park Manager, to see the Indian ruins. Last spring the state restored the ruins, repacking the floors and reforming the old fire pits. They also replaced the sign posts. The signs will be repainted and the floors repaired this spring. The winter freezing and thawing is hard on these floors. The signs have the "C" spelling and the Monumant has the "Q" spelling. There were 120,593 visitors to the Scott County State Park in 1979 and 53,692 visitors to the El Quartelejo Indian Ruins. Mr. Stevens would like to have a building to display Indian articles and a shelter over the ruins. He hopes that some effort will begin in the near future.

There have been several questions about the spelling of "El Quartelejo". According to the letter that Mrs. McGuire received from Mr. Robert W. Richmond, Assistant Executive Director of the Kansas State Historical Society, both spellings -- El Cuartelejo and El Quartelejo -- are now in print. The "Q" is the older spelling. "As far as we (the KSHS) are concerned, both would be correct, with the 'Q' representing original usage. It's an old monument and it carries the old spelling. What you might consider is consistency in your records and publications. If all of your spellings in the past have begun with a "Q", then we suggest that you set a style rule to continue to do it this way".

#### **FRIENDSHIP FUND**

# Article I. Name.

# Article III. Membership.

Sec. 1. Those eligible to membership shall be officers and ex-officers of the Kansas State Society of the DAR, providing however, that the member is in good standing in the State and National Society.

Sec. 2. The membership chairman must notify newly elected officers that they are eligile for membership in the State Officers' Club.

# Article IV. Meetings.

Sec. 1. The annual breakfast meeting shall be held the morning of the last day of the annual conference of the Kansas Society, DAR, the hour and price to be determined by the Second Vice President of the State Officers' Club and the general chairman of the State Conference hostess chapter.

Sec. 2. Special meetings of the Executive Committee and the club may be called by the president at such times as she deems best; and special meetings may be called by the president upon the written request of five members.

Sec. 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the club.

# Article V. Officers.

Sec. 1. The officers of the club shall be president, three vice presidents, chaplain, secretary, treasurer, historian, and reporter. These officers, together with the ex-state regents not holding office in the club, shall constitute the executive committee.

Sec. 2. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the executive committee.

Sec. 3. Vacancies in office shall be filled by the executive committee.

Sec. 4. The term of office shall be for one year only and no officer may succeed herself.

# Article VI. Duties of Officers.

Sec. 1. President. The president shall preside at all meetings and shall appoint all committees. She shall sign with the treasurer all bills for disbursement of the funds of the club.

Sec. 2. First Vice President. The first vice president shall perform the duties of the president in her absence, and be chairman of Bylaws Committee.

Sec. 3. Second Vice President. The second vice president shall be State Officers' Club chairman of arrangements for the annual meetings.

Sec. 4. Third Vice President. The third vice president shall be chairman of membership.

Sec. 5. Chaplain. The duties of the chaplain shall be the offering of prayer as directed by the president.

Sec. 6. Secretary. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep the minutes of the annual meeting and of the executive committee meetings of the club.

Sec. 7. Treasurer. The treasurer shall send out notice of the annual meeting, collect and receive all dues and fees. All orders for disbursements of funds must be signed by the president and treasurer.

Sec. 8. Historian. It shall be the duty of the historian to keep an indexed reference record of all work of the club. (A scrapbook of so desired.)

# Sec. 9. Each officer shall make a report at the annual meeting. Article VII. Dues.

Sec. 1. The annual dues shall be fifty cents per member payable to the treasurer before the annual meeting each year. The initiation fee shall be one dollar.

Sec. 2. Only members in good standing are eligible to attend the annual meeting of the Club.

# CONTINENTAL CONGRESS REPORT Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr.,

#### State Regent

About 37 mombers of the Kansas Society attended the Eighty-ninth Continental Congress in Washington, D.C., April 17-21, 1980. The Congress deviated from custom in opening on Thursday rather than Monday with a full program of activities on Saturday and Sunday. Particularly memorable was the Saturday evening program celebrating the 50th Anniversary of Constitution Hall.

The State Chaplain conducted brief devotions for the Kansas members in the Kansas Chapel on Thursday morning and read the names being placed in the Memory Book. New solid brass vases were in use on the altar replacing the vases which disappeared two years ago. The view of the Chapel sunflower windows from the atrium of the new construction, the President General's Project for this administration, was of special interest to the Kansas Daughters.

Some 15 Kansas members enjoyed a tour of the United States Capitol on Thursday afternoon through the courtesy of Senator-Nancy-

## **REAL DAUGHTERS**

A Real Daughter was the daughter of a Revolutionary soldier and also a member of the NSDAR. Real Daughters received a pension of \$8 a month from the National Society and were presented with a gold teaspoon. The following six Real Daughters have been members of the Kansas Society:

MARGARET WRIGHT BROWN (1803-1900) Member of Topeka Chapter. Buried in Camden, Ohio. Mrs. Brown was the mother of Mrs. W. A. Johnston, Kansas's third State FRegent. Her father, William Wright, served both in the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812.

CYNTHIA SELLERS BUFFINGTON (1837-1918) Member of Eunice Sterling Chapter. Buried at Clearwater, Kansas. Her father, Howard Sellers, was born in 1762, was 14 when he enlisted, and served as late as 1779.

LUCY PRATT EASTERBROOK (d. 1902) Member of Betty Washington Chapter. Buried in Lawrence, Kansas. Her father, Paul Pratt, was born in 1763.

IERESA EMMONS HOYT (1824-1913) Member of General Edward Hand Chapter. Buried in Lebo, Kansas. Her father, Jonathan Emmons, was born in 1760. He enlisted from Connecticut and served much of the time under General Lafayette.

FRANCES BUSH LOVELAND (1824-1923) Member of Captain Jesse Leavenworth Chapter. Buried in Soldier, Kansas. Her father, Zeba Bush was born in 1763. He enlisted at the age of 16. \_\_\_\_\_

JANE SELLERS NIGHSWONGER (1828-1919) Member of Eunice Sterling Chapter. Buried at Clearwater, Kansas. Sister of Cynthia Sellers Buffington.

Another Real Daughter, HARRIET GREGG MELVIN (1803-1901), was --- a member of Betsy Ross Chapter, Dearing, New Hampshire. She is buried at Troy, Kansas.

The Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the Children of the American Revolution convened on Saturday, March 15, 1980, in the Wichita Room of the Broadview Hotel, Wichita, with the State President, Christopher Ottinger, presiding and the Recording Secretary, Miss Melissa Godfrey, being present.

The meeting was called to order at 12:10 p.m. with five C.A.R. members, two prospective members, ten senior officers, three society senior presidents and eighteen guests in attendance.

The State Chaplain, Steve Parker, gave the invocation. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Bobby Szymula. The American's Creed was led by Miss Becky Riden, and the C.A.R. Creed was led by Miss Christina Mace.

Following the luncheon, Mr. Ottinger introduced the Senior State President, Mrs. Inghram Miller, who introduced the guests. These included Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, NSDAR Vice President General; Mrs. Wallace R. Decker, KSDAR State Regent; Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., KSDAR Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Harold Hockersmith, Organizing President, El Quartelejo Society; Mrs. Ruth Parker, Organizing President, Leavenworth Society; Mrs. Robert Szymula, Tomahawk Society and the senior officers.

Mrs. Miller announced the organizational meetings of the El Quartelejo Society in Oakley on January 5, 1980 with fourteen members and of the Leavenworth Society on May 4, 1980 with thirteen members. Mrs. John W. Stewart, Wichita, and Mrs. Kenneth Anderson, Council Grove will organize societies in their cities.

Miss Godfrey, also N.S.C.A.R. National Recording Secretary, announced the National Board meeting on April 25 - 27 in Washington, D.C. and noted that she will be a candidate for office of National Second Vice President and Mr. Ottinger will be a candidate for Great Plains Region Vice President. Both will attend the board meeting.

Mr. Ottinger reported on Kansas Society activities. A section of Indian Creek in south Overland Park has been regestered by the Tomahawk Society in the "Adopt a Stream" project, and a sign has been placed there with the society name. Mrs. Miller reported ten senior officers have accepted positions for another two years. The remaining board members will be appointed at the Senior Officers Board meeting following the State Conference.

Mrs. Howard Haines, Senior Treasurer, reported a balance of \$341.16 and \$1500 in Certificate of Deposit.

Miss Gwen Godfrey is this year's recipient of the Kansas State Society Scholarship. Mr. Doug Adams, last year's winner, has been designated an outstanding freshman student in the School of Architecture at Kansas State University, Manhattan.

Mr. Ottinger read the report of the nominating committee. Miss Riden nominated Miss Stephanie Johnson for the office of Corresponding Secretary. There were no further nominations from the floor, and the nominations were declared closed. Miss Riden was appointed teller. There were five members eligible to vote. While the ballots were counted, the members sang the C.A.R. Song. Miss Godfrey and Mr. Ottinger san the C.A.R. Membership Song.

The teller reported all candidates received a favorable vote. The President declared all nominated duly elected.

The following officers were installed for a one year term by Mrs. Miller: President, Steve Parker; Vice President, Becky Riden; Chaplain, Doug Adams; Recording Secretary, Chris Ottinger; Treasurer, Melissa Godfrey; Corresponding Secretary, Stephanie Johnson; Registrar, Jane Adams; Organizing Secretary, Diane Kramer; Historian-Librarian, Tanya Hockersmith; Flag Bearers, Julie Williams and Amanda Hartzler.

Mr. Steve Parker, newly installed President, addressed the conference and thanked Mrs. Miller for making the arrangements for luncheon meeting.

The benediction was given by Mrs. Kenneth Anderson, Senior Chaplain, and the meeting was adjourned at 2:10 p.m.

The National Society, Children of the American Revolution Convention was held April 24 - 28, 1980 at the Sheraton Washington Hotel, Washington, D.C. and was attended by Mrs. Inghram Miller, Senior State President; Chris Ottinger, State President; and Lisa Godfrey, National Recording Secretary. The board meeting of the Senior Officers was held on Thursday at the C.A.R. Headquarters for Senior Officer reports and election of new Senior Officers.

The C.A.R. Officers met at the C.A.R. Headquarters for the annual board meeting. The C.A.R. Convention opened Friday evening, April 26, 1980, the nominees for National Office were introduced at the evening session and each was given an opportunity to speak.

On Saturday, the nominees for National Office were again presented and the election was conducted. Four ballots were required. On Saturday evening the annual banquet was held in the ballroom of the Sheraton Washington Hotel. At this time awards were presented. Kansas received three awards. The state received the Membership Committee's Award for "most new members over state goal, March 1, 1979-March 1, 1980"; Tomahawk Chapter received the National Merit Award for 1980; and Mrs. Miller received the National Children of the American Revolution Benefactor Plaque and a red apple. Kansas should be on the Honor Roll.

Installation of the newly elected officers was held in the ballroom of the hotel. The Convention closed with a visit to the Old Presbyterian Church at Alexandria, Va., where special memorial services were held and a floral tribute was placed on the tomb of an unknown soldier in the churchyard.

- THIRD: That the place where its business is to be transacted is at Topeka, Kansas.
- FOURTH: That the term for which this corporation is to exist is Fifty Years.

#### **RESOLUTION TO AMEND CORPORATE CHARTER**

Whereas, it now appears to the Kansas Society of The National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, that its present corporate charter does not meet the needs of the Kansas Society at the present time and that said charter should be amended.

Now therefore, be it resolved by the Sisty-first Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, that its present charter be amended as follows:

FIRST: The Name of the corporation is THE KANSAS SOCIETY of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the DAUGHTERS of the AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

SECOND: The location of the principal place of business in this State is Kansas State Historical Society.

THIRD: The location of its Registered Office in this State is Memorial Building—Jackson Avenue, Topeka.

FOURTH: The name and address of its Resident Agent in this State is Miss Alberta Pantle.

FIFTH: This Corporation is organized NOT for profit, and the objects and purposes to be transacted and carried on are:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens. (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

(4) This corporation shall have power to receive title to real and personal property by gift, devise, bequest or purchase; to own, hold, sell, convey, lease and re-lease, let and sub-let real and personal property; and to manage, invest, re-invest or disburse the funds that may accrue from the holdings of such property in the manner provided by the By-Laws of The Kansas Society as now constituted or as hereafter amended. Thos corporation shall have the power to lend any surplus funds it may have on hand at any time and to enforce the collection thereof in any manner provided by law. This corporation shall have the power to sue and be sued.

No officer, director or member of this corporation shall be individually liable for the obligations of the corporation.

These Articles may be amended in any manner that shall be ordered by vote of the members of the corporation at any annual State Conference of The Kansas Society. This corporation shall have such other authority as may be provided in the By-Laws of the Kansas Society, not in contravention of the provisions of this ' Charter or the laws of the State of Kansas.

This corporation shall not have authority to issue capital stock.

SIXTH: The elected officers of The Kansas Society shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation, and shall be the managers of the business of the corporation and shall hold, manage and control all property of the corporation.

The members of The Kansas Society and all persons who shall hereafter become members, who are in good standing under the By-Laws of said Society, shall be members of this corporation.

EIGHTH: The number of Directors shall be TEN.

## BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION [Revised March 22, 1975 with subsequent amendments]

### **ARTICLE I**

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

## ARTICLE II Objects

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1)To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historic spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historic research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and . patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2)To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promise, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and accounting to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3)To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

## ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and \_\_\_\_\_\_ of its members.

## ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter members shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office, except the State Librarian, in order to provide efficient service to the Society from the city where the genealogical books are located. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least a year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b)A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seem feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. **Terms.** All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. **Dismissal.** Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

## ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. **Tenure**. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall be taken.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board of Management Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after their election and no later than November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. **Report.** The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Soction 5. Vice President General. Endorscment for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

## ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committee and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year. (b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material, to edit, and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Recording Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than six months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers; committee chairmen of the Kausas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify thee State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first three credential blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, before Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapter, made into a directory form. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and the Organizing Regent in organizing now chapters. She shall ascertain the possibilities of organizing a new chapter where a new chapter is contemplated. She shall be responsible for correspondence relative to the organization of new chapters. She shall give assistance to existing chapters in sustaining their membership quota as required by the National Society.

Section 8. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds for the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State Conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her dutics, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds. securities and other evidence of invested funds. She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall pass them on to her successor. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February first.

Section 9. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of

the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married; husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor; and colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, rosigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceeding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given. The State Registrar shall prepare and have printed a necrology list for the memorial service at State Conference.

Section 10.State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relies which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 11. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books, papers, microfilm, and equipment as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the. American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all materials and equipment in the Kansas State DAR Library.

In her annual report she shall list all materials sent to the National Society Library and all materials received during the year for the Kansas State DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of the Kansas State DAR Library.

Section 12. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News", and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations -- Committee and of the Conference Press Committee. She shall send a short.

report of the Kansas State DAR Conference to the "DAR Magazine".-----Section 13. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them from her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent Elect.

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Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and the Chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise. Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chaptor, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceeding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. **Chapter Delegates.** The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

(a) Chapters having less than fifty members: Regent and two delegates.

(b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members: Regent, and five delegates.

(c) Chapters having more than one hundred members: Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three credential blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. **Privileges.** Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meeting of the State Conference.

Section 9. **Privileges.** The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegate and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

### ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. **Regular Meetings**. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Soction 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

## ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section. 3 Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

## ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$2.50 for each momber of the chapter, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of December. A member whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be a delegate to the State Conference. The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after May first shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year in conformance with the policy of the National Society.

Section 3. **Registration Fee.** Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee not to exceed five dollars, such sum to be given to the hostess district to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

## ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and three members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Student Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals, and interest on monies invested for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee, composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee, composed of a

Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters, shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. **Resolutions**. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. **Public Relations.** The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reportor shall be an exofficio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

#### ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. **Reports of Proceedings.** Each State Officer, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent, shall prepare a condensed report, not exceeding 200 words. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the \_ State Regent and two for the Recording Secretary and sent not later than March first each year. These reports covering the year's work, shall be prepared for the State Conference and shall be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. Each State Chairman shall send to the State Regent, not later than March first of each year, a copy of the statistical report prepared for the National Chairman or Vice Chairman. This information will be used by the State Regent in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress.

## ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast,

Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each district shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The terms of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three years.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

## ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office by the June meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. **Report of Election.** On or before March first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. **Committee Chairmen.** Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of the National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January thirtieth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

### ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

## ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairman and Vice Chairman of National Committees whose membership is within the State. 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairmen of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C.A.R. 1; District Director, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2; The President General, 1; The Kansas State Historical Society. 1; The DAR National Library, 1; and the President of the State Officers' Club, Chapter Regents' Club and the State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2. Chairman of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have privilege of the floor but may not vote.

No. 3. No less than three issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.

No. 4. The State Registrar shall furnish the editor of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.

No. 5. A sum of \$1,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

No. 6. Twenty five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

No. 7. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

No. 8. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

No. 9. Each chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund, \$1.00 to the Shawnee Mission Fund, and \$.05 per member to the KSDAR Library.

No. 10. The Shawnee Mission Pilgrimage shall be held at the Shawnee Mission on Constitution Day, September 17th, if possible. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the seventeenth as possible and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Shawnee Mission Chairman and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage.

No. 11. The Kansas Society shall pay insurance each year on its properties housed in Shawnee Mission.

No. 12. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of moncy equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

No. 13. The sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be used for the C.A.R. projects. No. 14. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 15. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Boards Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society

No. 16. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 17. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 18. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No 19. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G. and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

(a)The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.

(b)The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.

(c) Rental of \$125 a year shall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library. It shall be housed with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the Dodge City Recreation Center, making it a valuable resourse center.

(d) The materials submitted to the KSDAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. Donors are asked to check with the librarian before presentation to avoid duplication.

No. 20. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

No. 21. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

No. 22. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.

No. 23. A \$10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.

No. 24. The Runner-up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an appropriate gift as an award.

No. 25. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests of the Kansas Luncheon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

No. 26. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session of the State Conference to review the minutes of the session.

No. 27. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote of these delegates voting.

No. 28. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before August 1 by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, subject to the approval of the State Regent.

No. 29. KSDAR shall place a \$25 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR Magazine if no other Kansas advertising is available.

No. 30. In the event that KSDAR should have a national winner in any NSDAR youth competition in which the winner is required to attend Continental Congress, the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the award.

No. 31. An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings, and other pertinent historical information will be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings decennially beginning in 1980.

No. 32. A Directory of members will be printed every ten years beginning in 1990.

No. 33. Upon her election, the State Treasurer shall be empowered to transfer funds to a convenient federally insured banking institution.

No. 34.
