BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING

Emporia, Kansas

September 14, 1981

Mrs. Richard C. McGehee, National Chairman of the Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship Committee, presented information about the Americanism Medal which is given to naturalized citizens, who are qualified to receive it. Mrs. Woodrow W. Dew, National Vice Chairman of the Motion Picture, Radio and Television Committee, spoke on behalf of the State Chairman of that committee, Mrs. Thomas M. Wall. The national project is to make a professional videotape of Continental Congress which would be available to the chapters. Each

She is asked to sign each page and each page states that the items in the rooms can be dispersed over the State of Kansas in other State Museums and that we will have no control over what the Historical Society does with the items we gave. Since we carry insurance on the contents, there is a question of whether Mrs. Decker should sign the inventory pages. The Executive Committee suggested that the items could be marked with the donor's name. There was much discussion and Mrs. Decker thanked everyone for their thoughts on this matter.

Mrs. Decker announced the State Conference will be in Lawrence, Kansas on March 18, 19, 20, 1982.

SANTA FE TRAIL MARKERS

WHEREAS, In 1906 ninety-six granite markers were placed to mark the Santa Fe Trail through Kansas from Overland Park through twenty-three counties to the NE Sec. 7 of the Kansas-Colorado State line by the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution and the State of Kansas. and

WHEREAS, Some markers need repair and a few have been moved, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, individually, inspect and appraise markers in home areas, reporting to the State Board of Management any infraction found.

ENGLISH - OFFICIAL LANGUAGE OF THE UNITED STATES

WHEREAS, There is now a Joint Resolution in Congress to amend the Constitution to state "The English language shall be the official language of the United States of America", and

WHEREAS, All immigrants seeking citizenship must be able to "read, write, and speak words in the ordinary usage of the English language" before citizenship is granted, and

WHEREAS, Currently thirty states are required to use bilingual ballots, many schools have bilingual programs, and in some areas receive instruction solely in the native tongue, and

WHEREAS, The longer students are instructed in their native tongues, the more difficult it is to learn English, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution individually urge their representatives and senators to make English the official language of the United States of America.

SOIL IS MAN'S DUTY

WHEREAS, The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof - an inheritance to man, who is responsible for its stewardship, and

WHEREAS, The world cannot exist without fruitful agriculture and fruitful agriculture cannot be achieved without good soil, and

WHEREAS, It is the duty of every citizen, urban or rural, to save the top soil which is eroding at an alarming rate, be it

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, individually, give study, time and talent to talk to groups, write papers, and practise conservation in regard to this precious heritage.

REASSERTION OF ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

WHEREAS, An educated citizenry is the basis for a continuation of a free democratic society in the United States of America, and

WHEREAS, The allocation of funds and personnel to administration rather than teaching, to extra-curricular activities rather than basic skills, is the current trend, and

WHEREAS, Every student has a right to the academic excellence his or her ability can achieve, be it

RESOLVED, That each member of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution study and evaluate the schools of her community, then endeavor to have changed any program that fails to prepare the student for a job or entrance into a school of higher learning.

MAKING CHARITY EASIER

WHEREAS, People are hungry, food is donated, and such charity has been known to backfire in the form of illnesses claimed to have come from the donated food, and

WHEREAS, A bill has been introduced in the Kansas legislature that encourages donations of usable, but unsalable, food to the poor with the provision that eliminates lawsuits against persons who give charity in good faith, and

WHEREAS, Thirty-eight states of the United States have such a law, be it

RESOLVED, That each member of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution write her representatives and senators affirming her approval of this bill.

RESTRICTIVE CRIMINAL LEGISLATION

WHEREAS, It is no longer safe for an individual of any age or sex to travel streets or highways without fear of violent crime, and

WHEREAS, Apprehended criminals may confess to a lesser crime and avoid conviction for a serious crime by disclosing evidence usable to convict another or others of the serious crime, and

WHEREAS, The system of repeated bail bonds often permits hardened criminals to return to the streets in a relatively short time, be it therefore

RESOLVED, That each member of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution urge local, state, and national legislators to enact more severe and restrictive regulations and laws for criminals who commit serious offenses.

WHEREAS, The Flag of the United States is a symbol of our national unity, endeavor, and aspiration, and

WHEREAS, The Flag Code as amended by the 94th Congress reads, "During the hoisting or lowering of the Flag, or when the Flag is passing in parade or review, persons present, except the military, face the Flag with right hand over heart. The military render a salute." During the rendition of the National Anthem when the Flag is displayed, all stand at attention facing the Flag with hand over heart, be it therefore

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution individually make special effort to contact television, radio stations, athletic extravaganzas, and newspapers asking for their co-operation in promoting respect for the Flag of the United States.

Mrs. John W. McGuire made the motion - that the Resolution on Flag Etiquette be amended to read "the Flag of the United States of America" where the proposed Resolution refers to the "Flag of the United States." The motion carried. The Resolution was adopted as amended.

FLAG ETIQUETTE (as adopted)

WHEREAS, The Flag of the United States of America is a symbol of our national unity, endeavor, and aspiration, and

WHEREAS, The Flag Code as amended by the 94th Congress reads, "During the hoisting or lowering of the Flag, or when the Flag is passing in parade or review, persons present, except the military, face the Flag with right hand over heart. The military render a salute." During the rendition of the National Anthem when the Flag is displayed, all stand at attention facing the Flag with hand over heart, be it therefore

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution individually make special effort to contact television, radio stations, athletic extravaganzas, and newspapers asking for their co-operation in promoting respect for the Flag of the United States of America.

ELECTIVE OFFICERS - STATE OF KANSAS

WHEREAS, The primary cause of the American Revolution was 'Taxation Without Representation' and

WHEREAS, In 1859 the constitution of the State of Kansas forwarded representation by stating that the governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, printer, attorney general, commissioner of insurance, and superintendent of instruction shall be chosen by electors of the State, and

WHEREAS, The Kansas constitution has been amended to abolish the offices of superintendent of instruction and printer, and make the auditor an appointed officer; and now, Resolutions #5036 and #5037 have been proposed to fill the offices of treasurer and commissioner of insurance by appointment, be it therefore

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, individually, assert their rights to elect the commissioner of insurance and treasurer of the State of Kansas.

The above Resolution was amended by a motion made by Mrs. Forrest A. Gilmour. The motion:

RESOLVED, that the members of the KSDAR individually, write their respective legislators expressing opposition to proposed Resolutions #5036 and #5037. The motion carried and the Resolution was adopted as amended.

Mrs. Baker read the Courtesy Resolution and moved it be accepted by the State Conference. The motion carried.

Mrs. Glenn Wolfe, Conference Chairman, was presented a Kansas State Bar in appreciation of her efforts in organizing the Conference.

Mrs. Charles C. Theis, DAR School Committee Chairman, announced she had collected \$150 for the schools during the Conference and in addition she had been given \$100 from Mrs. Howard W. Haines for the DAR Schools.

Mrs. Jack D. Dunn on behalf of the Chapter Regents' Club presented Mrs. Decker with \$25 to be used for the project of her choice.

Mrs. A. L. Elledge, State Chairman of the Membership Committee, led the assembly in the repetition of the Daughters' Pledge followed by the singing of the 1981-1982 Hymn: "O God, Our Help in Ages Past, Our Hope for Years to Come". REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

STATE REGENT

Your State Recording Secretary has attended the Executive Committee Meetings, Board of Management Meetings, two District Meetings, and the State Conference. Last July we attended the C.A.R. Great Plains Regional in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

All Chapters reported, only five did not make American Indian contributions. Thanks for the increase in your giving to Bacone College air conditioning and both schools for clothing to thrift shops.

American Indian Scholarship money was \$140.00, an increase of \$128.00 over last year. Remember to send monies through your State Treasurer again this year for your chapter to receive credit. Gifts to Bacone were: Air conditioning - \$145.50, Scholarships - \$268.00, Other Help - \$689.00 up over \$297.00. Thrift Shop - 1930 pounds of clothing and some jewelry valued \$2,500.00. St. Mary's: Tennis Courts - \$165.00 up \$133.00, Scholarships - \$245.50, Other - \$154.12, Thrift Shop - 1025 pounds of clothing valued \$1,500.00. Twenty-three Chapters had Indian programs and Memorials honoring deceased members. \$30.00 in green stamps, Campbells Soup Labels, and Betty Crocker Coupons were given by various Chapters. Several members visited both schools.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Our Chapter response was 100% this year. 59 Chapters repeated the American's Creed at every meeting and 27 Chapters devoted one meeting to an Americanism program. 8 Chapters had spot announcements on radio and television and 4 Chapters studied the Immigration Act. 973 DAR Manuals for Citizenship were distributed in the state.

There were 3 Chapters working with the Naturalization Courts. 9 Flags of the United States of America, 12 Flag pins, 1044 Flag Codes, 260 Welcome Cards, and 612 American's Creed Cards were given to the new Citizens. Six Chapters sponsored receptions or teas for new Citizens.

KSDAR has received approval for a Medal of Honor to be awarded to Col. Joe Engle, astronaut and space pioneer, at the State Conference.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

A concentrated effort was made to increase membership this year in the state. Two new societies are being organized. One of the new societies will be in the Wichita area and has chosen the name "Prairie Dog."

The Leavenworth Society was awarded the National Merit Award and they had a tie for first place for contributions to the National Endowment Fund. Krissie Blakley of the Leavenworth Society won the "enthusiast" award at the Great Plains Regional and was recognized at the National Convention in Washington in April for her enthusiasm.

The recipient of the C.A.R. Scholarship this year was Steve Parker of the Leavenworth Society for his scholarship, enthusiasm and leadership in C.A.R.

It is rewarding to this chairman to see the young people receive awards at the National Convention in Washington for their work done in the local societies and for taking part in the Regional Meetings. In September 1981, 12 trees were dedicated at Eisenhower, Center in Abilene to complete the 1980-81 State Conservation Project. This year's project, the planting of trees on the grounds of the Kansas Capitol in Topoka, has been assured by money given by DAR members and some Chapters. This dedication to be in September 1982.

The National Conservation Medal was approved for presentation to Mrs. Emil Claassen of the Newton Chapter.

Two Conservation Scholarships were given to students at KSU at Manhattan by a member of the Newton Chapter.

Some 2712 trees were planted, wildlife was protected and fed and some habitats have been provided. Members in 48 Chapters put out 15.264 pounds of feed for birds.

Many different kinds of wild flowers were planted by 12 Chapters and 10 Chapters were involved in beautifying public places at the cost of \$300 above what was donated as plants.

Logislators continued to hear from members of 30 Chapters on such items as pollution, wildlife refuges, farmland dissipation, Prairie Parkway and nuclear issues.

Youth groups received help from 134 members of 27 Chapters. 200 members of 24 Chapters read about National Parks and Wildlife in such magazines, while 128 members belong to such organizations.

Our farmland was conserved by the building of many miles of terraces, rebuilding pastures, building ponds, using wise management of water and doing contour plowing.

We carpooled in 57 Chapters to save gasoline.

All of this was accomplished under the fine leadership of Chapter Chairmen to whom we give our thanks.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS

Every Kansas Daughter should take pride in the outstanding COLLECTION of artifacts concerning our rich cultural heritage, at the NSDAR Museum. The Museum, to date, tells the story of America from 1775-1830. Its existence depends, chiefly, on contributions from all DAR members and friends. Of the sixty-five chapters, sixty-three reported. The following report is compiled from thirty-seven chapters; Museum General Fund \$147.00. Friends of the Museum \$136.00 (another committee), and chapters having DAR Museum programs 16. The National Chairman Project this year was the celebration of the "Victory of Yorktown", hopefully this was acknowledged by many chapters.

A gift in furniture was given to the DAR Museum, September 22, 1981, by a bequest of Naida I. Cravens "In memory of my beloved Mother, Delia Curtis Stevenson, Organizing Regent of the Fort Supply Trail Chapter of the DAR, Ashland, Ks." The objects: Speakers-style desk, Sewing cabinet, Bowl-porringer type, Mirror and Frame and Water Pitcher. The objects were made in the 19th century in the United States. Mrs. Cravens was a Member At-Large of Ashland, Ks.

This Chairman is pleased by the fine response from the chapters and trust that we can make even greater contributions in this next year, again a special "thank you" to all the participating Chapters.

Replies to the Scholarship questionnaire indicated that seven of the 65 chapters were not involved. Three of the 12 chapters who contacted high schools also contacted colleges. Eight chapters did not contribute to scholarship funds. Two chapters maintain special scholarships.

Fifty-four chapters contributed a total of \$73.50 for the NSDAR American History Scholarship; 43 chapters contributed a total of \$63.50 for Occupational Therapy and Medical Scholarships; 10 chapters contributed a total of \$19.00 for KSDAR scholarships, making a total of \$156.00.

Means of raising scholarship funds included catering a dinner, a raffle and card party, and serving food at an auction. The majority of the 17 chapters who replied to this question cited dues and budgeting.

John Edwin Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Anderson of Osawatomie, Kansas, was selected as the 1982 Kansas Candidate for the NSDAR American History Scholarship Award. He was sponsored by Marais des Cygnes Chapter.

His participation included athletics, band, debate, civil air patrol, Boys State, church activities and work experiences. Particularly interested in the Civil War period, he has been a member of Civil War Living History and Reenactment Groups.

No applications were received for the Kansas DAR Scholarship.

DAR SCHOOL

The reports from the chapters indicate that we are doing well in the presentation of Flags and Flag Codes. Also the majority of chapters report opening their meetings with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

All chapters are still encouraged to speak out on the proper use and display of the Flag, and to promote its history through radio, television, and newspaper. Thank you for a good year!

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS Mrs. Woodrow W. Dew

Seventeen Kansas Chapters "opened windows to our past" by submitting 799 pages of previously unpublished source records to this Chairman. Three volumes of material were submitted to National and were bound there. An additional volume, Blue Rapids Centennial, with an index submitted by Arthur Barrett Chapter, was accepted by the DAR Library and the index was credited through this committee. Duplicates of material sent to National were bound in three volumes for both the KSDAR Library and the library of the Kansas State Historical Society. William Wilson Chapter submitted the greatest number of pages this year, 244, and therefore received the Genealogical Records Award.

Sixty-two of the sixty-five Chapters in the state submitted \$108.00 to the National Genealogical Records Binding Fund and four Chapters donated \$28.00 to the State Binding Fund.

It is regrettable that both Chapters and this Chairman were surprised by the discontinuation of the Grandparent Project. Emphasis would not have been placed on the project last year, if any notice had been received.

It is to be hoped that interest will be shown next year in National's new project of retyping and indexing old genealogical records.

With 63 of the 65 Chapters reporting and depending on the grading by the National Society, it seems that 54 of the Chapters reporting have qualified for Honor Roll awards. These are 31 Gold, 19 Silver, and 4 Honorable Mention. Again this year, Number 1 on the forms, membership and dues, were the main deterrents for higher awards.

I do want to thank all of you for your kind notes and well wishes. It has been an honor and pleasure to serve as your Honor Roll Chairman again this year.

I appreciate your promptness in returning the Honor Roll forms to me. It has made my job so much easier.

Kansas has much of which to be proud in its very active Chapters. The donations have been excellent and the programs follow the Honor Roll qualifications and sound very interesting.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Richard B. Hartzler

The Junior Theme this year is "Let HOPE in DAR Grow Through the Juniors." According to those chapters reporting, our number of Juniors totals 298, of whom 38 are new this year, so we are growing. The number of Juniors working actively in their chapters is also growing. We have 1 National Vice Chairman, 1 State Officer, 6 State Chairmen, 2 Chapter Regents, 18 Chapter Officers, and 49 Chapter Chairmen. 18 served as Pages for last year's State Conference, and 2 at Continental Congress.

The Junior Bazaar at State Conference was very successful, bringing in almost \$1,000. Contributions from that and from chapters

for the Helen Pouch Fund totalled \$691.32. Junior products must now be ordered from our State Junior Vice Chairman in Charge of Sales, Mrs. John W. McGuire, III. Four chapters have honored Juniors by endorsing them for the Outstanding Junior Member Contest. Judges for this Contest were Dr. John Baeke, Lt. Col. Jack W. Stover and Mrs. John W. McGuire. This year's winner is Colleen Marie Anderson, our State Chaplain.

It is gratifying to see more chapters giving jobs to their Juniors and endorsing them for the Contest, thereby helping the State Society build future strength.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

This year has been a fairly busy year for me as Lineage Research Chairman. I have received requests from Kansas Chapters on 12 prospective members. I have also received a request for help from Texas and one from Washington. I helped 6 of the 12 to complete their papers and gave a small amount of help to some of the others. I wrote to 36 volunteers, and many letters to the prospective members and the chapters. I have always sent your material on to a researcher. I don't always receive an answer.

Our committee has helped 128 prospective members and gained 102 new members. We have 4 new volunteers to add to the Laura Thompson Blue Book. There were 6 workshops given in the state this year.

Kansas has 105 counties, 37 of these are covered by a DAR Volunteer Researcher in the Laura Thompson Blue Book. Those counties covered are: Atchison, Anderson, Bourbon, Barton, Butler, Clay, Coffey, Cowley, Crawford, Dickinson, Douglas, Ellis, Franklin, Ford, Grant, Harper, Jackson, Jewell, Johnson, Labette, Leavenworth, Lyon, Kiowa, Marshall, Montgomery, Morris, Logan, Pawnee, Reno, Riley, Rush, Saline, Sedgwick, Shawnee, Stevens, Stafford, Wilson. Can we do better?

MEMBERSHIP

Yes, the contest is still on. I still have fifty-eight pins to present. Don't you want one of them? These were the figures that I had to send on to Regional. There were 24 members dropped for nonpayment of dues this year. There were 50 resignations. We now have 241 Junior Members in the state. Eunice Sterling Chapter has the most Juniors.

Twenty-one chapters lost membership, 48 chapters had a gain in membership, and six chapters had no change. So we had a gain of 272 members and a loss of 196 members. This left us with a net gain in the state of 76. The total membership is now 3,797. I have mailed a total of 24 sunflower pins to seven different chapters. We are on the move, but let's keep the good work going. The three chapters with the greatest gains in membership are William Wilson, Uvedale, and Eunice Sterling. Let's congratulate them!

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION

This year I am happy to announce 100% reporting from the sixty-five chapters in Kansas. This year members were encouraged to write letters to television and radio stations to either commend or criticize programming. Only a few of the chapters reported writing letters. Courtney-Spalding Chapter is to be commended on having the largest volume of letters with over 100. This year the chapters voted "The Great Muppet Caper" as the best motion picture for all family viewing and "Ordinary People" as the best motion picture for adults. "Little House On the Prairie", "MASH", "60 Minutes", were again voted as the best television shows. Bob Hope was chosen as best actor upholding DAR principles.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

The short form for National Defense reporting was eliminated this year; with only half as much reporting to be done, only half as many reported. This was NOT what was intended! The outstanding chapter chairman is in James Ross Chapter of Kansas City; I sincerely wish that Betty Jones' enthusiasm was more highly contagious, regardless of age or distance.

Of the chapters reporting this year - less than half the total of the chapters in the state - a marked decrease was noted in medals awarded, in chapters discussing the 1981 resolutions and in paid subscriptions to the National Defense mailings; however considerably more members wrote to members of Congress and to their State Legislators.

State legislative issues reported as having the greatest interest were: ERA, National Defense, and Social Security (not really within the realm of state legislation) and capital punishment and state taxes vs. budget cuts.

National legislative issues of greatest concern were: English as THE one language, immigration limitation, national defense build-up, question of bias on the part of the media, and economics and taxes.

The complacency of the local chapters concerns this Chairman. Webster defines complacency as self-satisfaction accompanied by unawareness of actual dangers or deficiencies.

PROGRAM

The 10 page detailed instructions, outlining the correct format for a yearbook, prepared by the National Program Chairman were mailed by this chairman to each chapter in June. The increased number of yearbook awards indicate the value and need of such a guide. Yearbooks and supplements from every chapter were received and 58 were submitted to the National Chairman for judging. Tricolor Awards were received on 28 yearbooks and 17 earned Blue Awards. The total of 45 awards reflect an increase from last year.

Yearbooks from 8 chapters were entered in the "use of the theme" contest and Sagamore was the state winner. Samuel Linscott was the

winner of the 3 chapters who entered the "cost of printing" contest with a savings of forty dollars.

Chapters planned 171 educational programs, 146 historical and 59 patriotic in addition to 39 full National Defense programs. The DAR Magazine proved to be an excellent source of material for more than 75 programs and the National Program Office supplied an additional 19 manuscripts and 11 slide programs.

This chairman is available to assist chapters in the preparation of yearbooks and in program planning. The goal for the third year of this appointment is an award for every chapter yearbook.

This is not true of the larger out-of-state owned papers with the ever-changing communiques from the home office. Computers are fast and effective but they replace the personal note realized by the family-run newspaper. PR chairmen battle for every inch of coverage they receive and only too often are shocked and angered to read their copy re-re-edited into an article hardly recognizable from the original. We heave a sigh of relief for even getting the article in the paper and hope for more success next time, perish the thought!!!!

The Seimes Microfilm Center is a vital cog in NSDAR organization. When a DAR genealogist checks an applicant's papers, he or she comes to the Center. So, too, does the Lineage Researcher trying to prove a line for a promising prospect. That missing reel of 1880 census, not yet subscribed, may carry the needed proof. Delay and a lost member can result.

An important new project is the purchase of new equipment. Great improvements have been made in microfilming and up-to-date equipment must replace the obsolete, if we are to maintain a high standard of service. Ultimately, the investment will be largely offset by the more efficient use of employee time. Specifies as to type and brand are presently being studied and a decision will soon be announced.

All \$100 Life Memberships entitle donors to recognition with their names engraved on brass plaques as well as a special pin to be purchased from J. E. Caldwell Co. This year there is one Life Membership - Mrs. L. C. Hay, Wichita.

All chapters answered the requests of this chairman. \$225.50 was the contribution to the Committee from Kansas.

TRANSPORTATION AND SAFETY Mrs. Douglas Kocher

I am happy to report a 100% response to the Transportation and Safety Questionnaire, from which the following statistics were derived: 90% of the Kansas Daughters often participated in car pools; 18% of our Chapters have a full Transportation and Safety program and 4% of the Chapters gave a tip of the month.

Our major project for the past year was a bus tour to the DAR Schools in April of 1982. I am sorry to report that this trip was cancelled due to lack of participants.

However, we already have tentative plans for a similar tour in October of this year. I am still waiting for confirmations, so cannot give you definite details at this time, but we are striving for an October 7 departure, which would include Dedication Day at Kate Duncan Smith on October 12 and Founders Days at Tamassee on October 9 and 10. We hope a fall departure will be better suited to your schedules and more of you can join us this time.

I cannot be definite, but we anticipate a price of about \$325 per person, based on a 40 passenger bus and accommodations for the 8 nights of the tour.

REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL SPECIAL COMMITTEES

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Mrs. Carl Riggs

The information reached Regents and Committee Chairmen in Regent's Packets, Fall Workshops and Questionnaires.

Chapter reporting was 100%. These reports showed 136 spot announcements were used and 60 members appeared on television and 9 on radio for this committee. 515 inches of publicity and 26 pictures were reported. 44 chapters sponsored displays. 815 Certificates of Appreciation were given to students participating in the Essay Contest. Other awards to students excelling in American History were 253. There were 107 letters to Legislators urging a permanent National Proclamation. There were 19 City Mayors, who issued the February American History Proclamation. Chapters had 123 programs on American History with each Chapter having at least one program on the subject.

Students and teachers appreciated the Essay subject, "A Famous American Born in February." There were 29 Chapters with 110 schools participating in this contest, 27 for the first time. 1,446 students in grades 5,6,7 and 8 entered the contest. Chapters entered 50

grade winning essays in the State competition. At special events students were honored with medals and Certificates. Three non-DAR judges chose the winning essays which were sent to the Divisional Vice Chairman for further competition. The winners in the State Competition were: Grade 5, Amy Stack, James Ross Chapter, sponsor; Grade 6, Christine Watkins, Dodge City Chapter, sponsor; Grade 7, Henry A. Sands, Susannah French Putney Chapter, sponsor (second year State winner); Grade 8, Nancy Staab, Mission Hills Chapter, sponsor. Awards were Certificates and the book, Washington Landmark. Winners and their parents were guests at the Thursday Conference Youth Luncheon at the Holidome in Lawrence. It was announced at the luncheon that Nancy Staab was the South Central Division winner.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

Kansas chapters participated 100% in reporting to the state chairman who compiled the information for the national questionnaire which was due November 15th. A scrapbook of clippings from the chapters was also prepared and mailed.

The number of mayors who proclaimed Constitution Week increased as did publicity by newspaper, television and radio. Displays at libraries are popular and approximately 1/3 of the chapters have Constitution Week programs.

Constitution week activities begin the fall DAR work and can set the pace for ensuing projects the remainder of the year. I am very impressed with the amount of effort and dedication given to Constitution Week by the Kansas chapters when I read the reports. Thanks for your loyalty and belief in the importance of this committee.

ENERGY ETHICS

This year, 11 chapters reported having had programs on Energy Ethics. Some of the titles were: "Harnessing Energy", "Easy on Energy", "Things You Can Do to Save Energy", "Save a Kilowatt", "Don't Be Fuelish", "Wild Life and Energy", and "No Fuel Like Old Fuel."

A visit to a solar home was a project of one chapter, while another visited a power plant. Information on energy was secured from outside sources by 4 chapters.

Homes have been made more fuel efficient by adding insulation, storm windows, weather stripping, turning off lights, lowering thermostats by members in 51 chapters. Members in 55 chapters share rides to meetings.

FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM Mrs. Myron W. Feemster

The Friends of the Museum Committee was organized as a SPECIAL COMMITTEE in 1962. Its purpose is to raise money for the DAR Museum. The funds are used at the discretion of the Curator General for specific acquisition of historical items and completion of collections.

Letters of "Information - Instruction" and a sample report form from the National Chairman, the Curator General, NSDAR Museum Chairman and a letter from your State Chairman were in the Chapter Regents' Packet. Your KSDAR Chairman reported on and carefully reviewed this material at the Southeast and Northeast District meetings during the Fall tour.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Miss Virginia E. Weisgerber

This Division — made up of Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, Mexico, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas — is proud to report the totals from the March 1, 1981 — February 28, 1982, above State Questionnaires:

- (1) The American History Essay Contest, Grades 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9; The Contest subject this year was "A Famous American Born in February", with a total of 1049 participating schools, 148 for the first time, from 12,268 pupils presenting essays to sponsoring DAR Chapters. In this term, this is the second time that our Division has won two of the four National First Place Contest Awards! Winners this year are Amy England, Grade 6, Missouri; Nancy Staab, Grade 8, Kansas. Each winner receives gold medals and a check for fifty dollars.
- (2) Reports of other Divisional Chapter Committee activities: 471 chapters had American History programs; sponsored 179 Committee displays; gave 828 other history awards. In radio and TV, publicity was excellent in use of 2360 sets of Spot Announcements; also 274 DAR members appeared in behalf of this Committee. Newspapers printed 5938 inches and 316 pictures for the Committee. Members wrote letters to 981 Washington Congressmen, urging them to co-sponsor a bill, permanently designating February as American History Month. State Governors and city mayors issued American History Month Proclamations.

The South Central Division is proud to report the above American History Month Committee activities.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

STATE REGENT'S REPORT TO CONTINENTAL CONGRESS

Madam President General: I bring greetings from the Sunflower State. The Page holding the Flag is Mrs. Kenneth Anderson, State Outstanding Junior for 1982.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

[Revised March 22, 1975 with subsequent amendments]

ARTICLE 1

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Objects

The object of the Karlsas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1)To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historic spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historic research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2)To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promise, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and accounting to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3)To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter members shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office, except the State Librarian, in order to provide efficient service to the Society from the city where the genealogical books are located. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least a year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seem feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. Terms. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. **Tenure**. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall be taken.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board of Management Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after their election and no later than November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committee and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material, to edit, and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Recording Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than six months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the

Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers; committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify thee State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first three credential blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, before Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapter, made into a directory form. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and the Organizing Regent in organizing new chapters. She shall ascertain the possibilities of organizing a new chapter where a new chapter is contemplated. She shall be responsible for correspondence relative to the organization of new chapters. She shall give assistance to existing chapters in sustaining their membership quota as required by the National Society.

Section 8. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds for the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of the

receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State Conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall pass them on to her successor. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February first.

Section 9. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married; husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor; and colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceeding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given. The State Registrar shall prepare and have printed a necrology list for the memorial service at State Conference.

Section 10. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 11. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books, papers, microfilm, and equipment as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all materials and equipment in the Kansas State DAR Library.

In her annual report she shall list all materials sent to the National Society Library and all materials received during the year for the Kansas State DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of the Kansas State DAR Library.

Section 12. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News", and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the Conference Press Committee. She shall send a short report of the Kansas State DAR Conference to the "DAR Magazine".

Section 13. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them

and receive a transfer receipt for them from her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent-Elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and the Chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceeding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

(a) Chapters having less than fifty members: Regent and two delegates.

(b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members: Regent, and five delegates.

(c) Chapters having more than one hundred members: Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

delegates for every full hundred 6 plus Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall

not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State
Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each
year. Immediately after their election, the three credential blank forms

Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three credential blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding

Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meeting of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegate and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings.Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that

specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section. 3 Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be

from February first through January thirty first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$2.50 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of December. A member whose dues are not paid by Fehrnary first shall not be a delegate to the State Conference. The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after May first shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year in conformance with the policy of the National Society.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee not to exceed five dollars, such sum to be given to the hostess district to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and three members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The

Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Student Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals, and interest on monies invested for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee, composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee, composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters, shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Public Relations. The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an exofficio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be

requested by the State Regent, shall prepare a condensed report, not exceeding 200 words. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent and two for the Recording Secretary and sent not later than March first each year. These reports covering the year's work, shall be prepared for the State Conference and shall be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. Each State Chairman shall send to the State Regent, not later than March first of each year, a copy of the statistical report prepared for the National Chairman or Vice Chairman. This information will be used by the State Regent in compiling her annual

report to the Continental Congress.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each district shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The terms of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three years.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office by the June meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of the National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January thirtieth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the

close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

- No. 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairman and Vice Chairman of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairmen of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C.A.R. 1; District Director, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2: The President General, 1: The Kansas State Historical Society, 1: The DAR National Library, 1: and the President of the State Officers' Club, Chapter Regents' Club and the State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.
- No. 2. Chairman of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have privilege of the floor but may not vote.
- No. 3. No less than two issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.
- No. 4. The State Registrar shall furnish the editor of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.
- No. 5. A sum of \$1,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.
- No. 6. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.
- No. 7. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.
- No. 8. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.
- No. 9. Each chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund and \$.05 per member to the KSDAR Library.
- No. 10. A Pilgrimage to an historically significant Kansas site be held annually on Constitution Day, September 17th. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the 17th as possible, and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Constitution Week Chairman and the hostess committee. Local Chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed fifty dollars shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage.
- No. 11. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

- No. 12. The sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be used for the C.A.R. projects.
- No. 13. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.
- No. 14. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.
- No. 15. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.
- No. 16. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.
- No. 17. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.
- No. 18. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G. and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.
- (a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.
- (b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
- (c) Rental of \$125 a year shall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library. It shall be housed with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the Dodge City Recreation Center, making it a valuable resource center.
- (d) The materials submitted to the KSDAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. Donors are asked to check with the librarian before presentation to avoid duplication.
- No. 19. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.
- No. 20. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.
- No. 21. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.

- No. 22. A \$10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.
- No. 23. The Runner-up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an appropriate gift as an award.
- No. 24. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests of the Kansas Luncheon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.
- No. 25. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session of the State Conference to review the minutes of the session.
- No. 26. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote of these delegates voting.
- No. 27. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before August 1 by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, subject to the approval of the State Regent.
- No. 28. KSDAR shall place a \$25 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR Magazine if no other Kansas advertising is available.
- No. 29. In the event that KSDAR should have a national winner in any NSDAR youth competition in which the winner is required to attend Continental Congress, the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the award.
- No. 30. An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings, and other pertinent historical information will be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings decennially beginning in 1980.
- No. 31. A Directory of members will be printed every ten years beginning in 1990.
- No. 32. Upon her election, the State Treasurer shall be empowered to transfer funds to a convenient federally insured banking institution.
- No. 33. The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship to be given once in each KSDAR Administration to a high school senior who is entering a two or four year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of National Defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Chairman, the State National Defense Chairman and the State Regent.
- No. 34. An Endowment Fund for the KSDAR Library has been established.
- No. 35. Each State Regent shall have the Regent's Pin appraised and insured for the three year period of her term.
