

- 13. If the Officer, Chapter Regent or Chapter Vice Regent, Chairman or Appointee is not present, her report shall not be read and shall be filed for printing in the Official Proceedings unless otherwise ordered.
- 14. Any chairman or individual having a table display or exhibit will please attend to the removal of all material at the close of the Conference.
- 15. Members will please refrain from smoking in the session room.
- 16. Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

MEMORIAL SERVICE

Colored candles were lit in memory of the other Kansas Daughters. The Memorial Roll Call was read by Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. George A. London, State Registrar. MEMORIAL TO DOROTHY BERRYMAN SHREWDER by Mrs. John L. Myers

Dorothy Berryman Shrewder was a native of Kansas. She was a graduate of Bethany College in Topeka and held a degree in Library Science from Northwestern University. Dorothy worked as a librarian before her marriage to Roy Valentine Shrewder.

To know Dorothy was to love her. She was an outgoing person and most generous with her time, talents, and money. Until two years before her death, she had served as the presiding officer of more lineage organizations in the State of Kansas than anyone else.

At the time of her death, May 14, 1982, she was a fifty year plus member of DAR and had served in many capacities on the Chapter, State and National levels. Dorothy was first a member of Topeka Chapter and then helped to organize Fort Supply Trail Chapter. She transferred to that chapter in 1931 and served as Regent of Fort Supply Trail Chapter from 1934 until 1938. After disbandment of the chapter in 1977, she transferred back to Topeka Chapter.

She served as Kansas State Librarian from 1938 until 1940. From 1940 until 1944 she served the State Society as Vice Regent and in 1944 she was elected State Regent. She was Kansas State Regent until 1948. She was elected Vice President General of the National Society in 1954.

With the passing of Dorothy Shrewder, DAR lost a loyal, dedicated member and a great lady.

MEMORIAL TO ESTHER DORGAN CASEY by Mrs. Edward J. Gutsch

Esther Dorgan Casey, Kansas Honorary State Regent, served Council Oak Chapter and the Kansas Daughters of the American Revolution well. She served as Regent of Council Oak Chapter, Northwest District Director, State Recording Secretary, State Vice Regent and was State Regent during 1971-1974.

Her pleasing personality and capabilities won her many friends throughout the state who will miss her. She was reared on a farm that her Grandfather Dorgan homesteaded. Esther graduated from Kansas State University at Manhattan and taught school for eight years. She and her husband, Ralph Casey, lived on their ranch, near Council Grove for forty-five years.

She was very proud of her ancestors. The Craig Family was instrumental in founding the first Presbyterian Church in Virginia. She was also a descendant of William Penn.

Esther was a member of the Congregational Church, TPM Club, the Margaret Dunning Chapter of the Daughters of the American Colonists, the Kansas Society Daughters of Colonial Wars and Delta Zeta Sorority.

She is survived by her husband, two sons, three grandchildren, and two sisters - Mary Dorgan Schultz and Helen Dorgan Warren, both active members of DAR.

MEMORIAL TO OLIVETTE STURTH STRICKLEN by Miss Iva Barkley

Olivette Sturth Stricklen lived in Tonkawa, Oklahoma after her marriage to Dr. Harve M. Stricklen, who was a physician and surgeon. They came to Arkansas City in 1928. She transferred her DAR membership from Oklahoma to Betty Bonney Chapter. She served the Kansas State Society as Corresponding Secretary for three years from 1940-1943.

Throughout her active years, Olivette maintained a vital interest in her church and community affairs. She was a member of The First United Presbyterian Church and helped organize the church library. She was instrumental in organizing the American Red Cross Chapter in Tonkawa and served for many years on the Board of Directors of the Arkansas City American Red Cross.

She had been a member of fifty years or more of: Chapter BO, P.E.O. Sisterhood; Victory Chapter Order of Eastern Star; The National Society of the Colonial Dames of America in the State of Kansas, and was an Honorary Member of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society, Upsilon Chapter.

Olivette will be missed by the members of Betty Bonney Chapter.

MEMORIAL TO DORIS LEWELLEN JACKSON by Mrs. G. G. Rogers and Mrs. Lawrence Kellerman

Doris Jackson was interested in American history and genealogy and helped organize Four Winds Chapter in Garnett. She was elected the first Regent of Four Winds and also served as Registrar. She was elected State Treasurer of the Kansas Society in 1974 and served for three years.

In 1972 Doris planned a public ceremony for the dedication of a bronze plaque commemorating the Anderson County Courthouse being listed on the National Register of Historic places. The plaque, given by Four Winds Chapter, was placed near the west front entrance.

Very talented in music and drama, Doris wrote the Bicentennial play "Penelope Barker's Tealess Tea Party" which was given before several organizations. The story was of a true Tea Party held the day after the Boston Tea Party.

As a Bicentennial Project, Doris gave a flag in memory of her Revolutionary War ancestor for the Avenue of Flags in Garnett Cemetery. For a memorial gift, the chapter purchased twelve flags for the graves of veterans in Springfield Cemetery. These were in memory of Doris for her patriotism and love of country.

MEMORIAL TO GERTRUDE CLEGHORN JOSSERAND by Mrs. Martha E. Muncy

Mrs. Gertrude Cleghorn Josserand of rural Dodge City died on December 23, 1982. A longtime member of DAR in Dodge City, in Kansas, and in the Nation, Gertrude was a tireless worker in all DAR programs and a faithful supporter of the Society's ideals.

She married Guy D. Josserand in 1919, while both were University of Kansas students. For twenty years they lived on a wheat farm near Copeland, then at Pratt for six years, moving in 1945 to their Santa Fe Trail Ranch near Dodge City.

Mrs. Josserand published four genealogies: the Gideon, the Norris, the Cleghorn, and the Josserand family histories. Her interest in DAR was extensive, beginning with her organizing the Ninnescah Chapter at Pratt. She served as Regent of the Dodge City Chapter and as State Librarian for KSDAR. She was an organizing member and the first president of the Kansas Genealogical Society and was a charter member of the Huguenot Society of Kansas.

A son and his children are now left to carry on Mrs. Josserand's interests. She will be greatly missed by her friends in DAR.

MINUTES

Tuesday, March 15, 1983

The Eighty-fifth Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution reconvened at 9:00 a.m., Tuesday, March 15, 1983 at the Broadview Hotel, Wichita, Kansas. Mrs. Wallace R. Decker, State Regent, called the meeting to order.

The State Chaplain, Mrs. Kenneth E. Anderson, offered a prayer. The singing of the first stanza of the National Anthem was led by Mrs. Jack D. Dunn, State Chairman of the American Heritage Committee with Mrs. Fred Burr at the piano. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Steven L. Cox, State Chairman of the Flag of the United States of America Committee. Mrs. James Bryant III, Press Book Chairman, led the repetition of the American's Creed.

Mrs. Bill Jackson, Chairman of the Credentials Committee, gave the following partial report of the Credentials Committee: National Officers 1; State Officers 11; Honorary State Officers 4; Chapter Regents 46; Delegates 106; Alternates 29; Members 23; Visitors 8; making a total of 228.

Speech given at the State Conference "Love of Our Country" Banquet, March 15, 1983, Wichita, Kansas

Being DAR members, we have great opportunities to live - have full, exciting lives. . .Love - love all people and love our country. . .Laugh - be happy and make others happy too.

We live. We have life. Life- what a miracle! Just think of a new-born baby, a miracle! There is no greater thrill in life than the thrill of holding a new-born child. We have been given life, talents, blessings. Ever count your blessings? "Count Your Blessings, Name Them One By One." Just think - you have hands, feet, ears, eyes. . .you can see beauty, hear music, you have work to do. You have food, shelter, clothing AND Freedom. I'm sure you can count many more blessings. What about your families, children, grandchildren, your friends? Before you go to bed tonight, make a list of your blessings. You'll need a BIG piece of paper. Life - we're all going to live a long time. DAR members are guaranteed longevity. We need the time to get all our work done and our reports written. I'm no fool, no sirree, I'm going to live to be 103!

Life-the greatest thing in life is the capacity to care. DAR members care. Do all the good you can, to all the people you can, in every way you can, while you can. STOP! THINK!...Think of all you have been given as DAR members...the opportunity to SERVE! I often think of all I have been given - as a chapter member, Chapter Regent, as a State and National officer. I was given jobs to do, members to help and our National Society to serve.

Every Chapter Regent receives a Summer Packet! What a tremendous gift that is! I've heard that it tops the Best Seller list. I am very serious about the packet. It is a gift. A gift of many challenges. I need challenges. You need challenges. You've given one to me today - given me a chance to speak. You make me try harder. You make me want to do well. Your warmth, friendship, hospitality fill me with thankfulness. You light up my life. Remember though - You can't ignite a spark in anyone else unless you kindle a spark in your own heart first.

Give of yourself. Be willing to serve. Living is giving. When you give, you receive.

The gift of life - what are you doing with it? Ben Franklin said; "Dost thou love life? Then do not squander time for that is the stuff life is made of." Ann Fleck says: "Every second, every minute, every hour that goes by, never again as long as you live, can you make it up." Don't waste it.

Live as long as you are alive. Love life while you live it. You have been given life, talents, blessings, and you've been given each day. "You wake up in the morning and lo!, your purse is magically filled with 24 hours of the unmanufactured tissue of the universe of your life. It is yours. It is the most precious of possessions. No one can take it away from you. It is unstealable. And no one receives either more or less than you receive." When you wake up, get up and when you get up, do something.

Are you doing all you can? It's how well you live that counts - not how long. Live all the days of your life. Will Rogers had the right idea when he said: "Live so you wouldn't be ashamed to sell the family parrot to the town gossip." Speaking of gossip - gossip is like toothpaste. . .once it's out of the tube, you can't put it back. Ever hear this? "O, Lord, help my words be gracious and tender today, for tomorrow I may have to eat them."

Now to LOVE. . .our National Theme mentions love and our National Hymn for the year is "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling." Love Life! "Though I have faith so that I could remove mountains, and have not love, I am nothing." You can give without loving, but you cannot love without giving. Remember - living is giving. Every minute you live - give.

You've heard the phrase, "Love makes the world go 'round.'" All the world would go around a lot better if we had more love for one another.

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Start with yourself - show more love to your family, your neighbors, friends, your chapter members, your community and your country. Love people. Love your work. Work, work, work - work brings happiness. Work is a blessing.

Love what you are doing in your chapter - in your State Society. Love your country - strive to make it better. What can you do as an individual? Listen. "I am one, but still I am one. I cannot do everything, but still I can do something: and because I cannot do everything, I will not refuse to do the something that I can do." (Edward Everett Hale)

Love...don't be afraid to show it. New Englanders are often accused of being cold and unfriendly. I think the reason for that is, we are hesitant to show our love or express it. We shouldn't be that way. Love is kindness. Kind words give more pleasure than presents. Mark Twain once said that he could live for two months on one good compliment.

Love - love is like a bell. A bell isn't a bell until you ring it. Love isn't love until you give it away.

LAUGH - oh, I love this one. Do you laugh every day? Laughter is a good habit to develop. Laughter is therapeutic. Laugh and the world laughs with you. Cry and your contact lenses fall out.

Just think of all the fun and laughter we have in DAR. Guess my DAR fun started when I attended my first Continental Congress at age seven. Mother and grandmother were Chapter Regent, so we all went to Washington. We stayed at the Hotel Raleigh. At one dinner in the hotel, I gathered up all the silverware that I hadn't used, gave it to the waiter and said: "These are clean." Poor mother. Also on that trip, I ran off and got lost at Mount Vernon. They found me in the carpenter's shop.

The February meeting of mother's chapter was always held at our house. Guess who had to dance the Minuet dressed in costume each year? Also did skits about George Washington and Betsy Ross with my two sisters. Later, I even had to play my xylophone at a Massachusetts DAR State Conference.

How many Chapter Regents here? Great! Chapter Regents have more fun than anyone else. The day I took over as Regent of Boston Tea Party Chapter, the past Regent discovered that I had a station wagon. You can guess what happened - all the boxes, trunks, flags, scrapbooks, bank stubs dating back to 1895, etc. were dumped in my station wagon. Some fun! Finally organized it all and it's now in a four-drawer legal file cabinet that goes from Regent to Regent. Will never forget my first meeting as State Regent. ..was installing new Chapter Regents and I had several nudges from my Page. When she finally almost knocked me over, I turned around, she fainted and I slid her under the piano. One of the State Officers was a nurse, so she took over. After that I kept smelling salts in my briefcase. Another memorable occasion...my first State Fall Meeting. After months of preparation, the exciting day arrived. First - rooms that were reserved for our members were no longer available and all had to be moved to another motel! Next - there was a hold-up in the lobby! After that a waitress slid and broke her leg while waiting on us. A screen was put up for the slide show - the screen broke. I had to get down on the floor and repair the screen. To top it off, the hotel sent the bill to the President General!

You are richer if a little child has smiled at you or if you have looked for the best in others, and have given others the best in you.

LIFE - LIVE IT! LOVE - GIVE IT! LAUGHTER - SHARE IT! Let's LIVE, LOVE and LAUGH all the days of our lives.

In accordance with Standing Rule twenty-five, Mrs. Decker appointed a committee to approve the minutes of the Wednesday morning session and the resumes of the two luncheons and two banquets. Mrs. William C. Baker, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, read for the second time the Proposed Resolutions and moved the adoption of each Resolution. The following Resolutions were adopted as proposed by the Resolutions Committee.

OPEN PUBLIC RECORDS

WHEREAS, There is a growing threat that public government records can be closed by economic or political pressure, and

WHEREAS, Historical and patriotic organizations depend heavily upon the attainment of public government records to verify the history of our nation and its citizens, be it

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, individually, persevere in action to assure continued availability of all public government records to citizens of the United States of America.

THE NUNN BILL

WHEREAS, Roy Williams is the third of the last four presidents of the Teamsters Union to be found guilty of a crime while holding the office of president, and

WHEREAS, Prior offenders have been permitted to continue to hold the office of president after conviction, and

WHEREAS, Senator Sam Nunn of Georgia has introduced legislation that would disqualify persons from holding union office immediately upon sentencing for a crime, be it

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, individually, support the Nunn Bill in every possible manner.

EDUCATION

WHEREAS, Students are automatically passed into the next grade because they are a year older, rather than qualifying for advancement, and

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WHEREAS, Every subject in school depends upon the student's ability to read and understand what is read, and

WHEREAS, Colleges and universities find it necessary to have remedial reading, spelling, and English classes for 20% of their students, be it

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, use influence in every manner possible to get more effort extended in the early teaching of reading, English and spelling.

THE CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

WHEREAS, The Congressional Record is supposed to be an authentic record of each day's business in Congress, and

WHEREAS, It is common knowledge that the Record is changed daily, often to delete unfavorable action or to include whole unuttered speeches, be it

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, urge their Congressmen to eliminate the "revise privilege", and maintain the true record of Congress for the citizens of the United States of America.

THE INSANITY DEFENSE

WHEREAS, Law permits a criminal to be judged "not guilty because of insanity", and

WHEREAS, The insanity defense is used by intelligent people who plan their crimes, and

WHEREAS, A criminal termed "not guilty because of insanity" is committed to a mental institution for treatment, and

WHEREAS, The treatment period may be as short as six months, then the criminal is free to commit further crimes, be it

RESOLVED, That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, individually, exert influence to get the Federal law changed to read, "Guilty, but mentally ill", that imprisonment rather than freedom will follow treatment.

Mrs. Woodrow W. Dew, State Chairman of the Genealogical Records Committee, led the assembly in the repetition of the Daughters' Pledge. Mrs. Anderson pronounced the benediction and Mrs. Decker declared the Eighty-fifth Annual Stato Conference adjourned. The colors were retired and the conference ended at 11:33 a.m., with the singing of "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

However, it is a prime example of what happens when a chapter does not continue to seek new members. New, interested, enthusiastic and dedicated members are needed in every chapter if DAR is to continue to flourish in Kansas. Once these new members are secured, they must be kept interested and involved, so that they will be willing to furnish needed leadership when necessary.

The State Registrar will once again report a gain in membership. Kansas now has a total of 3890 members - an increase of 77 this year.

Two new C.A.R. Societies were organized this year in Kansas and this is a source of membership for the future, as well as, an instrument in the patriotic education of children. This officer was pleased to attend the C.A.R. Regional Meeting in Kansas City last summer. The members of the Kansas Society were saddened during the past year by the loss in death of two of our Honorary State Regents. Mrs. R. V. Shrewder and Mrs. Ralph Casey. The highlight of the Fall Tour was the planting of trees at the Capitol in Topeka in honor of the 250th Anniversary of the birth of George Washington.

The response to the Library Endowment Fund has been gratifying and hopefully in the future there will be continued support. This will be a source of strength for the Library to insure that it will be able to continue to operate in future years.

The President General's Project has been stressed and 52 Chapters returned their 100% support to this worthwhile project. Kansas received a Certificate of Award from the National Society for participating 100% of the membership.

The Master Questionnaire was again used this year, and 100% Chapters returned the Questionnaire. This method of reporting has proven to be an excellent reporting tool for the officers and chairmen. Also, there is a financial savings in postage, printing and telephone calls.

Following the October Board of Management meeting in Washington, this Officer attended the Dedication Days and participated in the programs at both Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith Schools. To visit the schools is always a gratifying experience. Although our hus tour to the schools failed to materialize, it is the hope of this Officer that sometime in the future each member will have the opportunity to visit the schools. Our donations have increased considerably in the past two years and this Regent was proud to receive six Golden Rulers for Kansas at Continental Congress.

This information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statement mentioned above, and in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statement.

The first thing I want to remind you of is that the Registrar's Reporting year is from Feb. 15 to Feb. 15. Anyone admitted or deceased before Feb. 15 last year does not count on this year.

I sent in four pages of resigned and five pages of deceased which have accumulated over the last three years. This is a lot of extra work.

If not sent promptly, some of the deceased miss being on the Remembrance List as it has to go to the printers before final chapter count. I have green, pink and white cards. Stock up to last until the Fall Tour next September.

Much interest was shown this year in finding and improving grounds around the Santa Fe Trail Markers. Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Baker of Topeka followed the Santa Fe Trail Markers across Kansas. A report was written concerning location and condition of markers. This work was much appreciated.

Chapter reporting was 100%. Reports sent in gave the following information: 1 original document and \$14 cash were contributed to Americana Collection; Historical programs were given to 79 adult groups and 2 for school children; anniversaries celebrated for 33 famous people and 22 events: 20 Historical Tours for adults and 1 for school children; 8 Historical Markers placed, all have been reported to Historian General; 12 graves marked for DAR members, 1 for Revolutionary soldier and 1 for wife of Revolutionary soldier.

(1) Establishment of the Endowment Fund.

Sixty-two chapters reported this year. Of these, 7 did not contribute to American Indian Phase of DAR.

Mrs. George H. Colver

<u>September 15, 1982, 12 trees were dedicated on the Gapitol grounds</u> as the state Project to honor the 250th anniversary of George Washington's birthday. The Governor was represented by his wife, a DAR member, and the event was televised.

The Conservation Medal was presented to Mrs. Jesse Krasny of John Haupt Chapter, Topeka, at the State Conference held in March 1983. Under her leadership, that chapter has sponsored Conservation Essay Contests for the past several years.

Eight chapters have had special tree planting ceremonies to honor George Washington's birthday. Individual members have planted more than 1400 trees. Many varieties of wild flowers have been planted. Eight chapters have spent more than \$250 to beautify public places.

Wildlife has been protected and fed. In addition to the grain which farmers have left in their fields, 1500 pounds of birdseed were purchased.

Members in 31 chapters wrote to their legislators concerning agricultural problems, pollution, nuclear issues, national parks, national defense and nursing home care.

One hundred members in 24 chapters provided leadership for youth groups. One hundred and forty members subscribe to magazines dealing with wildlife or national parks; 62 members hold memberships in such groups.

In all chapters, car-pooling is the general rule.

Some program topics were: "Astonishing Kansas", "Fire Prevention Through Conservation", "Water-Its Power and Beauty", "Food Conservation Through Drying."

Members who live on farms report continuing conservation practices...terracing, the building of waterways, ponds and sholterbelts...

Many thanks to the Chapter Chairmen for making this good report possible.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS

One hundred sixty-eight schools were contacted out of 356 schools in the state. One hundred ten submitted entries to their local chapter. Fifty one entries were entered in the state contest. All entries were complete and no one was eliminated for rules violation.

DAR MAGAZINE

Sixty-four reports were received, but there were twenty-one incomplete reports. A few had nothing but the Chapter name. Surely everyone can find out how many members are in their chapter. The Chairman receives a "print-out" each March, so it is impossible to verify the chapter's subscriptions the next February. I am sure there were more subscriptions, but the totals from the reports were: Northeast District - 336; Northwest District - 175; Southeast District - 133; Southwest District - 257 for a total of 901. This is a very disappointing total.

Historical articles seem to be the most popular with those on Genealogy second. "With the Chapters" is a popular feature but only three from Kansas appeared the past year.

Suggestions for articles were for more on Cenealogy and more space devoted to "Queries". One suggestion was for more articles and less advertising, but if it were not for the advertising there would be no DAR Magazine as the advertising carries the cost of the magazine! The subscription rate is less than one dollar an issue. The members and chapters must support the Magazine, if they want to know what DAR is doing. Let's try to do better in the future.

DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING Mrs. Armalea Hopperstad

Fifty-six (56) chapters contributed to Magazine Advertising in 1982-1983 and received Honor Credit. Our total input was twenty-four hundred sixty-five dollars (\$2465.00). Four full pages with photographs were for the candidacy of our State Regent, Mrs. Wallace R. Decker, for the position of Corresponding Secretary General on the slate of Mrs. Walter Hughey King. One page was sponsored by the State Board of Management, one by Northeast District, one by Southwest District and one by Southeast District, Juniors and Friends.

One page in the Legacy issue was our Kansas Chapel in Washington D.C., sponsored by our State Board of Management. The other page was Connie, her mother and her two daughters, in a three generation picture as members of Eunice Sterling Chapter. DAR MUSEUM

As chairman of this committee, I extend appreciation to 65 chapters reporting in behalf of the DAR Museum. The following contributions were compiled from 56 chapters: Museum General Fund \$157.50, Cataloging Fund \$2.00, Museum Research Fund \$5.00, Air-Condition Fund \$1.00 and Friends of Museum \$50.00. Nine chapters having full and partial programs, using slides and manuscripts from the National Program Committee and others pertaining to the Museum.

KSDAR Regent, Mrs. Wallace Decker, honored in recognition, the DAR Museum National Chairman's request for a 5-course dinner menu familiar or unique to her state. Also for the Fashion Show to be used at State Conference, one authentically reproduced gown, of one woman historically important in the state of Kansas.

It was my pleasure to serve as your State Chairman on this committee.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP

Although 13 of the 65 chapters reporting did not contribute to this program, three of these chapters had contacted high schools.

Forty-six chapters contributed a total of \$65.50 for the NSDAR American History Scholarship; 44 chapters contributed a total of \$54.50 for Occupational Therapy and Medical Scholarships; nine chapters contributed a total of \$30.00 for the KSDAR Scholarship, making a total of \$150.00 in contributions.

One chapter reported the use of a memorial to a chapter member as a means of raising funds.

Craig Anthony Arnold, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Arnold, Wichita, Kansas, was selected as the 1983 Kansas candidate for the NSDAR American History Scholarship Award. Tony qualified his purpose in studying American History by pointing out its usefulness in the study and practice of law, the pursuit of a political career, and in undertaking the responsibilities of an active citizen in the community.

This year's winner of the KSDAR Scholarship of \$450 is Robin Kaylene Carlson. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Carlson, Smith Center, and was sponsored by Sarah Steward Chapter. Robin will attend Hastings College in Nebraska.

The new Pendleton National Defense Scholarship of \$500 to be given once in each KSDAR administration was awarded to Margaret Ruth Palmer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Van Palmer, Independence, Kansas. Selection of the 1983 winner was based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of National Defense, patriotic awareness of the candidate and appropriate support material. Miss Palmer's essay totaling 843 words was entitled "The Price of Freedom is Vigilance". She will attend the University of Kansas.

Further proof of the outstanding qualifications of Robin Carlson and Margaret Palmer was evidenced by the selection of each of these winners as a recipient of one of the Arthur and Lillian Dunn Scholarships. This is a new National scholarship awarded annually to six sons or daughters of DAR members to provide for four years of college; \$1,000.00 annually to a graduating high school senior.

Lee Ann Sherry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Sherry, McPherson, Kansas, sponsored by Uvedale Chapter, won a National Caroline B. Holt Occupational Therapy Scholarship.

DAR SCHOOL

There are also four schools which have met requirements to be acceptable for donations from the Daughters, -Berry, Crossnore, Hillside, Hindman. These are called DAR-Approved Schools, and they are grateful for any aid given, but are not dependent upon us for survival.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

The Daughters of KSDAR Society have made significant contributions to the Veteran-Patients. They reported a total of 1692 VAVS hours, 17 parties and 25 handmade afghans and laprobes. The General Edward Hand Chapter contributed a Braille Flag to the VA in Leavenworth.

Almost all chapters contributed used stamps for the wounded, gave magazines, stamped greeting cards, bingo prizes and baked cookies for parties. Many visited veterans in hospitals and nursing homes.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. Steven L. Cox

In keeping with our President General's National Theme, the coordinating theme for this Committee for the 1982-83 year was "Fly Our Flag"...and have "Faith" in its meaning. "Hope" in the liberty and freedom it represents; but most importantly..."love" and respect it!

Again this year the Flag Committee stressed the presentation of a "Certificate of Award" as a positive means to encourage correct use and proper display of our Flag. Each chapter has been encouraged to seek out a recipient for this award. This year two certificates were presented in Kansas: one by Neodesha Chapter, and the other by Four Winds Chapter.

Another first for our Committee is The Pledge of Allegiance for the Deaf in American Sign. A few chapters reported using this as a positive approach in Flag promotion.

All chapters were encouraged to speak out on the proper use and display of the flag, and to promote its history through radio, television and newspaper. Thank you for a good year!

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

Seventeen Kansas chapters continued to "open windows to our past" by contributing 1248 pages of previously unpublished source records to this chairman. Eight volumes of records were submitted to National and were bound there. Duplicates of these volumes were bound and presented to both the KSDAR Library and to the library of the Kansas State Historical Society. William Wilson Chapter submitted the greatest number of pages, 550, and therefore received the Cenealogical Records Award at State Conference. Desire Tobey Sears Chapter placed second with 291 pages.

Fifty eight of the sixty five chapters in the state submitted \$104.00 to the National Genealogical Records Binding Fund and five chapters contributed \$29.00 to the Kansas Genealogical Records Binding Fund.

Over the years records have occasionally been returned from Na tional as being unacceptable in format. This chairman and her predeces sor returned to the chapters those records that could be matched to them. Many could not be identified with a particular chapter, however, and some were from chapters since disbanded. Special recognition therefore goes to Mrs. Jessie Muck. Desire Tobey Sears Chapter, Mankato, for properly retyping and indexing 291 pages of these records to eatch up the backlog. A State Conference Award was presented to Mrs. Muck in appreciation of her service.

This chairman was pleased to learn that Kansas in 1983 placed first in this membership division in the number of pages of original records submitted.

HONOR ROLL

Again, I want to thank all of you for your kind notes and well wishes the past three years. It has been a pleasure and honor to serve as your Honor Roll Chairman.

Your promptness in returning the Honor Roll questionnaires to me has helped make my job so much easier.

It is possible that we will have 22 gold awards, 14 silver, and 12 Honorable Mention awards. Each chapter has much to be proud of in the effort put for th to comply with the requirements. Kansas should be very proud of its chapters and their endeavors to fulfill their obligations. The donations have been excellent and the programs sounded very interesting.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

"This Year the Juniors' LOVE Will Glow Throughout the Nation." This Junior theme for 1982 83 is true in Kansas, where our Juniors love to serve. Last year 16 Juniors paged at State and 3 paged at National. The bazaar made \$887.40 after expenses. \$500.00 of that was sent to the Helen Pouch Fund, as well as \$250.00 from the chapters. We had a Junior breakfast and an "after glow" party. We contributed to the na-

tional project, the state project, and toward a page in the DAR Magazine supporting our State Regent. We had a state page pin made, and have bought several to have available at State Conference. Our State Vice Chairman in charge of Jr. Product Sales has been Mrs. John W. McGuire, III. Chapters report having 290 Juniors, of whom 56 are new. Many of these girls are given active responsibilities. We have 1 National Vice Chairman, 1 State Officer, 3 State Chairmen, 1 Chapter Regent, 16 Chapter Officers, and 44 Chapter Chairmen. This year's Outstanding Junior Member is Donna Jean Vogt Overmiller from Sarah Steward Chapter. Judges for the contest were Dr. John Baeke, Dr. John T. Neely, and Mrs. John W. McGuire.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

I received 9 requests to help prospective members. I wrote to 15 volunteers in the Laura Thompson Blue Book, besides doing research in the Woldt Library and the Riley County Genealogical Library to assist these prospective members. Mrs. Wernecke, the new National Lineago Research Chairman, sent letters out to every volunteer in the Blue Book trying to update the listings. On my questionnaire, I gave the volunteer listed for your county and asked for you to clarify this, and to give me the name of a volunteer for your county, if none was listed. Twenty-two chapters answered this request.

Thirty-four chapters returned my questionnaire. A total of 65 chapters returned the State Regent's questionnaire which she shared with me.

We have reports of 17 workshops given to DAR and 6 given to other organizations. Our Chapter Chairmen reported 180 potential members assisted and 106 new members acquired through efforts of this committee.

MEMBERSHIP

We have total membership in the state of Kansas at this time of 3,878 paid members. We had a total gain of 80 members during the year: we had 162 new members by application, 28 transfers which makes a total of 200. We had some losses, too: 88 deaths were reported, thirty-two resignations, which made a total 120, but we did gain in the total count. Kansas just needs 122 more members to go over the 4,000 mark. I am much concerned with the number of resignations; these should not be allowed without a follow-up. Education is the only way to stop resignations - our national chairman tells us; there were 3124 resignations in the nation last year.

Twenty-nine chapters gained in membership, seventeen chapters stayed the same, and nineteen chapters lost in membership. There was a total gain in the national membership of 1,295; Kansas did more than her share to help with this increase. I mailed a total of sixteen sunflower pins to wind up the contest. In the recent survey of 50 year members, a total of eighty members was reported.

The Motion Picture, Radio and Television Committee had 65 chapters reporting for 100%. The motion picture voted as best for all family viewing was "E.T." and the motion picture voted best for adults was "On Golden Pond". The best television series for all family viewing was "Little House on the Prairie" and "M.A.S.H." The best television series for adults was "Blue and The Gray". Bob Hope was again voted actor upholding DAR principles. Ten chapters reported members writing in to television stations though no record was kept of the number of letters.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

National Defense reporting shows a decided increase in the number of paid subscriptions to the "National Defender", more interest in the awarding of ROTC Medals and greater activity in the number of DARs writing their State and National representatives on various legislative issues.

The State legislative issue creating the most interest this year is the severance tax and opinions on this show the expected variation with respect to the geographical location of the reporting chapters.

National issues remain fairly constant with English as THE one language, immigration limitation, nuclear freeze and national defense build-up sharing the concerns of our members.

The cooperation of the Chapter National Defense Chairmen has been appreciated and the challenge stands, if not us as DARs, then who, to carry the message of vigilance and valor, to inspire our youth in awarding the Good Citizenship and ROTC Medals, and to be informed through the educational materials available.

When in doubt, recall the words of George Washington, "If we desire to secure peace... it must be known that we are at all times ready for war!"

PROGRAM

The number of yearbook awards has increased each year which reflects the reference to the excellent guide provided by the National Chairman. There were 56 awards with 23 Tri-Color for excellent, 18 Mini-Tri-Color for supplementals or inserts, 12 Blue and 3 Mini-Blue for those with less than 2 errors. Program eatalogs were reported in 48 chapters, and DAR Magazine articles were used for 89 chapter programs. The Program Office furnished 35 manuscript and 15 slide programs for chapters on a rental basis. Program Honor Roll requirements were met by 52 chapters.

Historical programs presented numbered 136, 129 patriotic, 106 educational and 50 full National Defense. A number of interesting George Washington programs and events were listed. Mary Wade Strother was the state winner in the use of the theme contest in the program titles, with 9 other chapters entering. Sagamore was the state winner in the cost of printing contest, saving \$50. Many chapters indicated free printing by a member and the monies saved used for projects.

This chairman furnished pages of suggested program topics and roll calls the first year, and it is hoped that chapters have kept them in their file and can refer to them in the future. Program catalogs should be ordered from the National Program Office for additional suggestions. These are all excellent and well prepared in the 3 main areas of our purposes and objectives.

It has been a pleasure to serve the State Regent, my good friend, Mrs. Wallace Decker, and the chapters of the Kansas Society during this term. It is hoped that this Chairman has been of service and assistance to the membership.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Even though our newspaper coverage was excellent this year, we also had a first - several entries in the Feature Story Contest.

In Wichita coverage was better (50%) than in previous years. From the forms sent me, most chapters fared well or at least were able to have most of their publicity printed. That is an improvement from last year. Yes, computers are faster, but they cut down on manpower and sometimes accuracy plus the added expense of cutting news for advertisements (ads pay the bills, they say). But our loyal DAR's also subscribe and pay for ads, too. Just keep on sending or calling your news in, especially illustrating points on freedom, loyalty and God and country which is supposed to be why a newspaper is printed in the first place or have we become a money market! It is our duty to keep the public informed about our country. Please continue to write tight copy without rambling (an editor's nightmare) and use as many school, church and conservation ties as possible, as this will motivate most editors. Thank you for your time and effort and continue in the coverage.

The National Chairman's project during the Shelby Administration was to buy new equipment for Seimes Microfilm Center. A Dietogen Camera and its auxiliary equipment was purchased to film application papers. Plus the new additional microfiche viewer which allows three more patrons to be served to everyone it was serving before.

The Index to the Seimes Microfilm Center and Supplement to the Index are available for \$3.75 each from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General.

During the Shelby Administration, a special honor offered by a handsome oak plaque adorned by a gilded shell to those who serve as National and state officers and chairmen during this time frame for being a Life Member of the Center. Mrs. Richard C. McGehee of Martha Loving Ferrell will be honored this year. Another Life Member is Deborah Zrust of Jane Dean Coffey Chapter. A total of 64 chapters answered the questions and 56 chapters participated, giving a total of \$353.50.

TRANSPORTATION AND SAFETY Mrs. Douglas Kocher

This year, I am happy to report a 100% response to the Transportation and Safety questionnaire, which showed an increase in the number of chapters, who included a program on Transportation and Safety and an increase in the chapters giving a tip of the month.

Although we planned two bus tours this past year, one to the DAR Schools in October and one to Continental Congress in April of '83, I am sorry to report that neither tour "came to pass." We had hoped to have a busload of Kansas Daughters in Washington this spring to give our vote and support to Mrs. Decker and even though we can't travel together, I trust that many of you have found alternate means of transportation in order to give Kansas a great representation.

REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL SPECIAL COMMITTEES

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

"Everyday Life in Early America", was the topic for the American History essay contest. There were 1,253 students who wrote essays, 106 schools participated, 25 for the first time. Thirty-one chapters sent in 51 first place entries in grades 5, 6, 7 and 8. James Ross Chapter sponsored 180 students, Dodge City Chapter 171. The first place winners in the State competition were: Grade 5, Tracy Cook of Parsons; sponsored by Hannah Jameson Chapter; Grade 6, Gregg Patton of Wichita, sponsored by Eunice Sterling Chapter; Grade 7, Sara Tinchnell, Cherryvale, sponsored by Esther Lowrey Chapter; Grade 8, Kim Fischer, Pratt, sponsored by Ninnescah Chapter. Tracy Cook, fifth grade winner, also won first place in the South Central Division and competed at National level. Winners and their parents and teachers were guests at the Monday Conference Youth Luncheon held at the Broadview Hotel in Wichita.

Chapter reporting was 100%. Eighty-three programs on American History were given, 33 American History Month displays. Seventy spot announcements were given on TV and Radio. There were 550 inches of publicity with 37 pictures in the press. Susannah French Putney Chapter, El Dorado, sent in 252 inches. Fifty-seven letters were written urging Senators and Representatives to designate the month of February as American History Month permanently.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

There was 100% participation of the 65 Kansas Chapters in reporting to the state chairman, who compiled the information for the national questionnaire. A certificate was awarded at Continental Congress in April for the 100% participation of all the chapters in Kansas.

ENERGY ETHICS

Eleven chapters had programs on energy. Some of the titles were: "Saving our Resources"; Passive Solar, A Way to Save Energy"; "Energy in the 80's"; What We Are Doing in Kansas, Energy Success Stories"; "Saving Your Gasoline"; "The DAR Conservation and Energy Story at the World's Fair in Knoxville".

Seven groups made visits to a solar home or a power plant. Fifty chapters reported that members had insulation in their homes. Members in forty-five chapters have storm windows. Other suggested ways of saving energy were the lowering of the thermostat and shutting off of unused rooms.

Of the sixty-five chapters in the state, car-pooling is the habit in fifty-six chapters.

FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM

The Friends of the Museum Committee was organized as a SPECIAL COMMITTEE in 1962. Its purpose is to raise money for the DAR Museum. The funds are used at the discretion of the Curator General for specific acquisition of historical items and completion of collections.

Letters of "Information - Instruction" and a sample report form from the National Chairman, the Curator General, NSDAR Museum Chairman and a letter from your State Chairman were in the Chapter Regents' Packet. Your KSDAR Chairman reported on and carefully reviewed this material at the Southeast, Southwest, Northeast and Northwest District meetings during the Fall Tour.

By March 1, 1983 thirty-six Regents had appointed a Chapter Chairman and twenty-five Chapters had reported contributions total-

REPORT OF STATE CHAIRMAN OF STATE COMMITTEE

KANSAS CHAPEL

The State Regent, Mrs. Wallace R. Decker, brought the Memorial Book to me from Washington last fall. In January I met with Mrs. Kenneth Anderson and Mrs. John Oakleaf, members of the Kansas Chapel committee, in Council Grove. We planned how to bring the Memorial Book up-to-date. Each state reported fine programs and activities involving the art of quilting. It is a credit to the society to think it has been instrumental in

the revival of this wonderful American art form.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Miss Virginia E. Weisgerber

In late summer, all chapter and State chairmen received Committee details and questionnaires from the National Chairman. This Division Chairman was proud to send the National Chairman her winning essays and summary questionnaires from all seven State Chairmen. The American History Essay Contest subject, Grades 5, 6, 7, and 8, was "Everyday Life in Early America - 1750-1850." In this Division we are proud of the 9341 children participating from 613 schools. Winning South Central Division Essays included the Grade 5 Entry from Tracy S. Cook, sponsor Hannah Jameson Chapter, Parsons, Tracy received a Gold Medal and a Certificate for Division awards, but did not rank in the final National competition. However, in the past two years of this Administration, we do not forget that South Central Division had won four final National American History Essay awards, as reported in the last two KANSAS PROCEEDINGS. Totals from Division State Questionnaires show great interest in other Committee activities. especially in 306 American History Programs; uses of 16,037 Spot Announcements on radio and TV; newspaper printing of 10,830 inches and 289 pictures relating to the Committee; 536 personal letters sent to Washington Congressmen, urging their co-sponsoring a Bill, designating February as American History Month. We urge all Division Chapters to continue their enthusiasm in the American History Month Committee activities.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

Approximately 55 Kansas Daughters attended the 92nd Continental Congress.

Kansas participated in the Golden West Tea held at the Capital Hilton Hotel, April 18, 1983.

Three Junior members served as Pages, seven members served on Congressional Committees.

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Kansas received the Citation of Honor for 100% participation in the President General's Project; first place in the Division of the Genealogical Records Committee for the Original Records submitted; Tracy S. Cook, sponsored by the Hannah Jameson Chapter placed first in the Division in the American History Essay Contest; received Certificate for 100% participation in Constitution Week; Certificate for 100% reporting in American Heritage Committee with the Topeka Chapter listed as the Outstanding Chapter and Captain Jesse Leavenworth and James Ross Chapters as having the Outstanding Programs; Honorable Mention was given to the Nathan Edson Chapter and first place in the Division went to the Good-Land Chapter for the Feature Story Contest. Kansas received Honorable Mention for 100% Chapter reporting and for the letters written to promote quality productions in Motion Picture, Radio and Television. On opening night Vice President and Mrs. Bush were present. The Vice President brought greetings to the Congress.

Five Kansas Officers were present, Mrs. Wallace Reed Decker, Mrs. Billy P. Compton, Mrs. Jacob Farney, Mrs. Kent Wymore and Mrs. John Oakleaf.

Election was held for National Offices of 1983-1986. Mrs. Walter Hughey King, of Tennessee, was elected President General, as well as her entire slate. The Kansas State Regent, Mrs. Wallace Reed Decker was elected Corresponding Secretary Ceneral. Her name was placed in nomination by Mrs. Bertram J. Lempenau, Past Librarian General, Honorary State Regent. Mrs. Decker's personal Teller was Mrs. John Oakleaf.

Installation of Officers and State Regents and Vice Regents was held Saturday, April 23, 1983. Mrs. Billy P. Compton was installed as State Regent of Kansas.

Susanna M. Salter

Each State Regent was requested, by National, to select an outstanding woman from her state and copy one of her dresses. This dress was to be sent to the NSDAR Museum to be used in a Traveling Fashion Show. The Kansas selection was Susanna M. Salter.

Mrs. Salter was the first woman to be elected to a public office. She gained international fame when in 1887 she became Mayor of Argonia, Kansas. Mrs. Salter and her husband moved to Argonia in 1882.

In February 1887, the Kansas Legislature granted partial suffrage to women in first, second and third class cities. Argonia was a third class city. Women could vote for city and school officials and in school bond elections. They also were eligible for the same offices for which they had suffrage.

Prior to the Argonia City election in 1887, the local Women's Christian Temperance Union caucused, with Mrs. Salter presiding, to select a ticket of men, who they thought deserved office. A group of men, "Wets", opposed to the temperance movement decided to teach the women a lesson. They put up a ticket identical to the WCTU's except for the substitution of Mrs. Salter for the Mayor's office. They expected all women would support the WCTU ticket and no man would ever vote for a woman. The humiliation of Mrs. Salter in securing only a few votes was expected to drive the women of the WCTU out of politics forever. She was unaware of the fact her name was on the ballot until the morning of the election.

She was elected by a 2/3 majority and at the age of 27 she became the first woman Mayor in the United States. She was informed of her victory as she was washing elothes in a tub in her backyard. Her home, in Argonia, Kansas, has been designated as a National Historical Landmark.

The dress was a typical black dress, found in every woman's closet for special occasions. It was made of black watered taffeta and the bodice was overlaid with black lace. The dress was modeled by the State Regent on Regent's Night at the 92nd Continental Congress.

The State Conference was held in Lansing on March 26 where state officers and chairpersons gave their report, and election of officers for the 1983-84 year took place.

Kansas has the honor of hosting the Great Plains Regional in July, which is scheduled to be held in Leavenworth.

C.A.R. STATE PRESIDENT

I was installed at Mount Vernon, in April and attended the first National Board Meeting of the year. I attended the Great Plains Regional Conference in Kansas City, Missouri, in July, where I gave a report of my plans as K.S.C.A.R. President. The State Project was to provide funds for a new state flag. I traveled to Oakley, Kansas, in August, where I conducted the State Workshop. I also traveled to Wichita, Kansas for the Organizational Meeting of the Prairie Dog Society: Home On The Range Society was also organized this year, in Smith Center. I was a guest at the DAR State Banquet, in Wichita. The State Conference was held in Lansing, Kansas. Along with my activities as K.S.C.A.R. President, I attended all of the meetings of the Leavenworth Society.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION [Revised March 22, 1975 with subsequent amendments]

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Objects

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas:

(1)To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historic spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historic research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2)To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promise, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge." thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and accounting to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3)To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a)To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No chapter members shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference. No state officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms in the same office, except the State Librarian, in order to provide efficient service to the Society from the city where the genealogical books are located. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least a year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b)A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seem feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. **Terms.** All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. **Tenure.** All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall be taken.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board of Management Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after their election and no later than November first to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. **Report.** The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot, and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the hostess Chapter's General Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian and Consulting Genealogist. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committee and of any other appointments. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during the term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar hold a memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress. Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meeting of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material, to edit, and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Recording Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than six months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers; committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing. Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State, of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the day designated. She shall notify thee State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. She shall send before January first three credential blank forms, and three forms for reporting Chapter officers to each Chapter Regent. She shall send to the Organizing Secretary General, each year, before Continental Congress, a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapter, made into a directory form. She shall notify each Chapter Regent to send, on a card, the name and address of the Chapter Chairman to each respective State Committee Chairman. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to cach Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and the Organizing Regent in organizing new chapters. She shall ascertain the possibilities of organizing a new chapter where a new chapter is contemplated. She shall be responsible for correspondence relative to the organization of new chapters. She shall give assistance to existing chapters in sustaining their membership quota as required by the National Society.

Section 8. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds for the Society and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the State Board of Management. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a Public Accountant in time to have the Auditor's report for the Annual State Conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall pass them on to her successor. She shall send each year to the State Corresponding Secretary the number of members in each chapter on February first.

Section 9. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep a card file of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include name, including maiden name in full and if married; husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter: name and rank of ancestor; and colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In January of each year, the State Registrar shall send blanks to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceeding year. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given. The State Registrar shall prepare and have printed a necrology list for the memorial service at State Conference.

Section 10.State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments crected by the Kansas Society.

Section 11. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books, papers, microfilm, and equipment as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all materials and equipment in the Kansas State DAR Library.

In her annual report she shall list all materials sent to the National Society Library and all materials received during the year for the Kansas State DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of the Kansas State DAR Library.

Section 13. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them from her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent-Elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing offirers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and the Chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceeding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The number of delegates to which a chapter is entitled to representation at the State Conference shall be based on the number of members on the Chapter Roll, in good standing in the National Society on the first day of February each year and shall be as follows:

(a) Chapters having less than fifty members: Regent and two delegates.

(b) Chapters having fifty members and not exceeding one hundred members: Regent, and five delegates.

te) Chapters having more than one hundred members: Regent and five delegates, with three delegates for each additional hundred.

Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after their election, the three credential blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer, and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at meeting of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privileges of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegate and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. **Regular Meetings**. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

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Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetingo. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section. 3 Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$2.50 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of December. A member whose dues are not paid by February first shall not be a delegate to the State Conference. The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after May first shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year in conformance with the policy of the National Society.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee not to exceed five dollars, such sum to be given to the hostess district to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 1. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary and three members appointed by the State Regent shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget as approved by the State Board of Management shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Student Loan and Scholarship. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Student Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals, and interest on monics invested for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee, composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary, and State Vice Regent shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee, composed of a Chairman and four members to be appointed by the State Regent from the membership of the hostess chapters, shall have charge of the rogistration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary and the State Treasurer shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. **Resolutions**. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. **Public Relations.** The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an exofficio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent, shall prepare a condensed report, not exceeding 200 words. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one for the State Regent and two for the Recording Secretary and sent not later than March first each year. These reports covering the year's work, shall be prepared for the State Conference and shall be published in the Proceedings.

Section 2. **Reports to the State Regent.** Each State Chairman shall send to the State Regent, not later than March first of each year, a copy of the statistical report prepared for the National Chairman or Vice Chairman. This information will be used by the State Regent in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society; to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be sent by the District and to the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each district shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The terms of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three years.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office by the June meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. **Report of Election.** On or before March first of each year the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary on blanks furnished by the State Secretary three typewritten lists of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter shall send a postal card to each State Chairman of the National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee. Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January thirtieth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it was adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as No. the Proceedings of the Annual State Conference, Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Proceedings shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; each State Officer 1 to 3; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairman and Vice Chairman of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National Committees and Chairmen of other Committees, 1 each; Senior President C.A.R. 1; District Director, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2: The President General, 1: The Kansas State Historical Society, 1: The DAR National Library, 1: and the President of the State Officers' Club, Chapter Regents' Club and the State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In election year one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

No. 2. Chairman of State Committees, District Directors and the appointed officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have privilege of the floor but may not vote.

No. 3. No less than two issues of Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.

No. 4. The State Registrar shall furnish the editor of the Kansas DAR News a correct and up-to-date mailing list.

No. 5. A sum of \$1,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

No. 6. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

No. 7. \$25.00 shall be allotted to the Kansas Delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

No. 8. \$50.00 shall be allotted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

No. 9. Each chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund and \$.05 per member to the KSDAR Library.

No. 10. A Pilgrimage to an historically significant Kansas site be held annually on Constitution Day, September 17th. If the date is changed, it shall be Constitution Week as near the 17th as possible, and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Constitution Week Chairman and the hostess committee. Local Chapters shall act as hostesses. The sum not to exceed fifty dollars shall be allotted to the Committee in charge of the Pilgrimage.

No. 11. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per Chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society. No. 12. The sum equal to five cents per Chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be used for the C.A.R. projects.

No. 13. The State Regent, Vice Regent and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the newly elected incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

No. 14. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

No. 15. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers and the Chairman of the Membership Committee and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

No. 16. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.

No. 17. All main motions presented to the State Conference shall be in writing and signed by the mover and seconder and shall be handed to the Recording Secretary when made from the floor.

No. 18. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G. and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

(a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.

(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books; shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.

(c) Rental of \$125 a year shall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library. It shall be housed with the Kansas Genealogical Society Library in the Dodge City Recreation Center, making it a valuable resource center.

(d) The materials submitted to the KSDAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. Donors are asked to check with the librarian before presentation to avoid duplication.

No. 19. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

No. 20. The Kansas Society shall purchase and present the State Regent a Past Regent's Bar at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

No. 21. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Bar at the close of State Conference.

No. 22. A 10.00 ceiling shall be placed on prizes awarded in each contest offered by the Kansas Society DAR and any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.

No. 23. The Runner-up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an appropriate gift as an award.

No. 24. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for wives of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests of the Kansas Luncheon or other functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

No. 25. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session of the State Conference to review the minutes of the session.

No. 26. These rules may be amended, suspended, or replaced at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote of these delegates voting.

No. 27. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before August 1 by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, subject to the approval of the State Regent.

No. 28. KSDAR shall place a \$25 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR Magazine if no other Kansas advertising is available.

No. 29. In the event that KSDAR should have a national winner in any NSDAR youth competition in which the winner is required to attend Continental Congress, the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the award.

No. 30. An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings, and other pertinent historical information will be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings decennially beginning in 1980.

No. 31. A Directory of members will be printed every ten years beginning in 1990.

No. 32. Upon her election, the State Treasurer shall be empowered to transfer funds to a convenient federally insured banking institution.

No. 33. The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship to be given once in each KSDAR Administration to a high school senior who is entering a two or four year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of National Defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Chairman, the State National Defense Chairman and the State Regent.

No. 34. An Endowment Fund for the KSDAR Library has been established.

No. 35. Each State Regent shall have the Regent's Pin appraised and insured for the three year period of her term. No. 36. The Chapters in each District are as follows:
