



CONFERENCE RULES

- 1. All sessions shall begin at the hour announced.
- 2. No one is to be seated during reports, speeches or musical numbers.
- 3. At all business sessions, members shall wear their registration badge along with the blue ribbon for delegates and red ribbon for alternates.
- 4. Any business unfinished at the time of recess shall be resumed at the next business session.
- 5. Only delegates shall have the privilege of the floor.
- 6. All main motions shall be written and signed by the mover and seconder and sent to the Recording Secretary before action is taken. The maker of the motion shall rise and state her name and that of her chapter.
- 7. All Resolutions shall have been in the hands of Resolutions

Committee prior to State Conference. The date will have been determined and announced by the Resolutions Chairman.

- 8. No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day or longer than two minutes at any time except by the consent of the Assembly.
- 9. Members who appear on the program or are making reports will please occupy the front seats. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.
- 10. Only the Chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 11. Reports of Committee Chairmen shall be limited to 4 minutes, reports of District Directors and Chapter Regents to 2 minutes. All speakers shall conform to the ruling when time is called.
- 12. A copy of every report for the printed Proceedings of the State Conference shall be typed ready for printing and sent to the State Recording Secretary before the report is read at the Conference.

She was a member of the P.E.O. Sisterhood, Daughters of the American Colonists, Daughters of Colonial Wars, Cornelius Club, and was serving as President of the Wichita East Lioness Club. Lucile Parmenter Williams Heffelfinger was born Oct. 23, 1887 in Lawrence, Douglas County, KS to Charles S. Parmenter and Anna Gaylor Williams. She departed this life Sept. 12, 1985 at the Bethesda Home in Goessel, KS at the age of 97.

Lucile grew up in Baldwin, KS where her father was vicepresident of Baker University. She graduated from Baker in 1908 and married John Byers Heffelfinger Oct. 29, 1908. They moved to Newton in 1923 when he became Supt. of Schools. He passed away March 15, 1960.

Mrs. Heffelfinger affiliated with Newton Chapter on April 8, 1932 and received her 50-year pin in Sept. 1982 at her home in Newton when members of the chapter gathered for cake and punch to share in this happy occasion with her.

She served her chapter as regent 1936-1938, vice-regent 1939-1941, librarian 1942-1949 and was a member of the advisory board 1949-1956. She was State Corresponding Secretary from 1950-1953.

Both she and her husband were active in the Methodist Church, teaching Sunday School and starting the Week-day Bible School. Mr. Heffelfinger was President of the Library Board for many years and was instrumental in securing genealogical books and helping women prove their eligibility to join DAR, as well as other patriotic organizations. Compton presiding. The invocation was given by Mrs. Rudolph Barta, State Chaplain. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Jacob Farney, State Chairman Flag of the United States of America Committee. The American's Creed was led by Mrs. David Stone, State Organizing Secretary and National Vice Chairman South Central Division Flag of the United States of America Committee. Mrs. Carl Riggs, State Treasurer, led the assembly in the singing of the first and fourth stanzas of the National Anthem.

Mrs. Compton introduced her son, Carl, and his wife, Suzie.

Mrs. Compton appointed Mrs. E. L. Franklin, Mrs. Joseph Woodson and Mrs. James Shirley as a committee to approve the Saturday morning minutes.

Mrs. Albert E. Carpenter, State Recording Secretary, read the minutes of the Friday morning and afternoon secondors. They were approved as read.

Reports were given by the following Chairmen: Conference Marshal, Mrs. Robert Kline; President General's Project, Mrs. Howard Haines; Sunflower Bus Tour, Mrs. Carroll Taylor; Junior Membership, Mrs. John Oakleaf, who, then, surprised the assembly with small gifts and asked for donations; National Chairman Junior American Citizens, Mrs. Charles Theis; National Vice Chairman South Central Division American History Month, Miss Virginia Weisgerber; National Vice Chairman South Central Division DAR Magazine Advertising Committee, Mrs. Harold Ottaway and National Vice Chairman South Central Division Flag of the United States of America Committee, Mrs. David J. Stone.

Mrs. John L. Myers, Chairman Resolutions Committee, read the following resolutions and moved their adoption. Motion carried.

THE ESPIONAGE THREAT TO THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

WHEREAS: Industrial and political betrayal is threatening the national security of the United States of America and jeopardizing the lives of millions of people in a nuclear age; and

WHEREAS: The Soviet Union saves billions of dollars and years of military research by making use of stolen high technological equipment that the Western countries relied on to offset high Soviet numerical advantages in weaponry; and

WHEREAS: In the highly technological world of today there are more sophisticated technical devices and systems available for copionage; and

WHEREAS: The Administration and Congress of the United States of America are at last intensifying their efforts against espionage in our country by reducing many unnecessary security clearances, increasing security checks, and increasing the use of electronic surveillance and polygraphs to test the loyalty of defense and other sensitive staff and contractor personnel, be it **RESOLVED**: That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, support the campaign for stiffer penalties for treason that in this day and age can threaton an entire nation; these penaltics extending even to possible execution of those voluntarily engaging in peacetime espionage of great magnitude; and be it further

RESOLVED: That we fully endorse the idea put forth by the Administration that no more Soviet-bloc Diplomats be allowed in our country than we are, in turn, are allowed to station in Moscow and other Soviet-bloc countries; and be it further

RESOLVED: That we give full support to the existing and proposed measures herein mentioned along with others envisaged by the White House and Congress for the curtailment of betrayal and espionage against our country and us, its people.

COMBATING TERRORISM

WHEREAS: The past year of 1985 was a particularly threatening year for American citizens abroad; the President stated that there had been over a hundred terrorist attacks aborted by the United States of America in the past fourteen months; and

WHEREAS: Because the United States of America is a democratic society which believes in individual rights, the terrorist method is to cause conflict between the reverence for innocent life versus the natural instinct to defend the nation; and

WHEREAS: The United States of America believes in an international order in which necessary change can take place peaceful ly, versus many states in the Middle East which believe that the totalitarian image can be enhanced by state sponsored terrorism which is intended to transform the international order and to turn the balance of power against the democracies; therefore be it

RESOLVED: That foremost, the United States of America must take the initiative to rally concerted international action; political, economic, diplomatic and military; and that this concerted action will not in the long run somehow sacrifice more important issues in international relations; that obviously prudence is necessary in dealing with state sponsored terrorism; but prudence cannot be an excuse to avoid the truth of the main issue; and be it further **RESOLVED**: That the members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, write to the Congressional members of their support of the United States of America and international policies regarding state-sponsored terrorism.

"WATER, WATER, EVERYWHERE BUT NARY A DROP TO DRINK!"

WHEREAS: We can no longor take water for granted. Our water crisis is a crisis of mismanagement; handicapping efforts to come to grips with the issue are the vastness of the United States of America and the uneven distribution of its water supplies. Distross cries are heard from New Jersey to Spokane to Tucson, and

WHEREAS: Already American rivers, lakes and underground sources are being used faster than nature can replenish them, and man-made contamination is starting to poison water where supplies are plentiful. Americans are not going to accept conditions where one has to boil water coming out of the tap or use bottled water, and

WHEREAS: An average of 18,000 gallons of water per person falls on the 48 contiguous states of the United States of America in a typical day. The notion of running out of water may seem far fetched to most Americans when we spend a billion dollars a year on federal reclamation projects to grow more commodities that are chronically in surplus anyway, and

WHEREAS: In the Southwest, the survival of major cities depends on finding new sources of wator. Run down the aquifers under the Southwest and in 50 years time there could possibly be no Tucson or Phoenix. On the Great Plains, vanishing ground water is forcing farmers to abandon irrigation. Deplete the Ogallala aquifer and in 30 years time the United States of America could be exporting no wheat, therefore be it

RESOLVED: Congress should shake off its old ways of treating water projects as "pork barrel" matters to be traded among influential members, and effect a national water policy which at prescnt we do not have. Yet water is going to determine the economic dynamics of the nation; and be it further

RESOLVED: That Congress support concerned members who have formed the bipartisan National Water Alliance as a forum to hammer out a national consensus on what to do; and be it further

RESOLVED: That members of the Kansas State Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, write to their Senators and Representatives to urgently impress on them that our nation is in a water crisis right now, and that America's most precious resource is in peril.

AVAILABILITY OF GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

WHEREAS: Genealogy is now the second most popular hobby in the United States of America, and

WHEREAS: Availability of the vital records is a necessity in pur-

suing this avocation, and

WHEREAS: The copying of such records is an aid for researchers, and

WHEREAS: Vital records are, according to law, open to the public, and

WHEREAS: Family historians are mainly interested in names, dates and places and causes of death, in certain cases, where hereditary diseases are concerned, be it

RESOLVED: That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, write to their State Sonators and Representatives encouraging them to keep these records open to the public for genealogical and research purposes from the day they are recorded and the certified copies of the records be made available for a reasonable fee.

CONSTITUTIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT

WHEREAS: The United States of America operates under an established Constitution with several amendments; and

WHEREAS: The Constitution was adopted to afford protection to all citizens by setting forth laws and provided for the enforcement of the same, and

WHEREAS: Plea Bargaining and lenient punishment administration have entered our court systems. Therefore be it

RESOLVED: That our courts return to our Constitutional enforcement of the law, particulary the criminal law, be it

RESOLVED: That each convicted offender be prosecuted and be punished according to his guilt and that plea bargaining be abolish ed in the court proceedings. Be it further

RESOLVED: That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, write to their duly elected officials and urge that they legislate the laws to effectively punish wrong doers.

LIMITATIONS ON WELFARE PAYMENTS

WHEREAS: Welfare programs have been established on the Na tional, State and Municipal levels, and

WHEREAS: These programs were intended to assist underprivileged persons with their living expenses for a temporary period of time, until they could become self supporting again, and WHEREAS: The programs grew to include food stamps, aid for dependent children, unemployment compensation supplements, payment of utility bills, surplus food programs, free medical expenses and many more, and

WHEREAS: Support in these programs is still being paid today for successive generations of the same families. This indicates that the programs are not being corrective for the conditions, be it **RESOLVED**: That the amounts being paid out in welfare programs be reduced to a subsistance level that would encourage able bodied recipients to secure work for a living and to provide an incentive for returning to the market place and gainful employment, and be it further

RESOLVED: That members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, write to their elected officials and request that the entire welfare plans be reviewed along with non-governmental organizations.

OCEANS FACE CATASTROPHE IN NEAR FUTURE

WHEREAS: The oceans of the world are suffering from a dangerous decrease in vitality, and

WHEREAS: The continuation of fishing in spawning grounds, dynamite fishing, using nets with mesh so small that the young fish as well as the adults are taken, the diversion of rivers and filling in of marshs are all contributing to the depletion and contamination of the world's oceans, and

WHEREAS: The main role of the oceans is so obvious that nobody talks about it (That is to sustain life). They do so, not by providing food or minerals, but by providing water; without water there is no life, and

WHEREAS: One cannot say that one body of water is more or less healthy than another, because water moves. To illustrate this, in 90 years there will not be one drop of water in the Caribbean or Mediterranean, North Sea or Gulf of Finland that is there today. The pollutants of one will come to pollute all the others; therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the Congress face what is a long term catastrophe, happening now, and not be satisfied to make only short term decisions. For all too often, what matters most to them is economic productivity during the next four or five years, if they are obliged by public opinion to do something, that they do not cheat, nor make a commitment to something and then not follow through, and be it further

RESOLVED: To achieve this end the members of Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, should write their State and National Senators and Congressmen, asking them to be aware of this serious problem and to suggest constructive proposals to contribute to the protection and improvement of life in the near and more distant future for the people of the entire planet.

One resolution concerning Trial by jury of Peers, was sent back to Committee for further study. Mrs. Myers, then, read the Courtesy Resolution and moved its adoption. Motion Carried.

STATE REGENT

Thank you to all for doing their best for 3 years. Listen to the Chairmen's reports and the Chapter Regents reports to hear the details.

Contributions to the State Regent's Project—The State Library Endowment fund totals \$1208.50 and the interest is used by the Library Committee. This money came from Chapter gifts when the State Regent made her official visit, from donations from the State Clubs, the district meetings and from individuals.

The Annual Proceedings were edited, using the mails and a trip to Topeka in combination with the Governor's proclamation.

The Society's policy is to prepare its financial statement on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statement is not intended to present financial position, results of operations, and changes in financial position in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In my opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly the recorded receipts, disbursements, and cash balances of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution for the year ended January 31, 1986 on the basis of accounting described above, which basis has been applied in a manner consistent with that of the preceding year.

The accompanying schedules are presented as additional analytical data. This information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statement mentioned above, and in my opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statement. REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN NATIONAL COMMITTEES

AMERICAN HERITAGE

Mrs. Albert V. Schwartz

The American Heritage theme for the year was "Out of todays and yesterdays are the blocks with which we build tomorrow." It has been a real privilege to work on this committee. I am so proud to be able to say we had 100% reporting again this year. A very special thanks to the chapter chairman and to their regents for their splendid cooperation and outstanding reports. The following chapters had members that entered the National Contests, Abilene, Good-Land, Prairie Rose, Sagamore and Topeka. Perhaps next year even more chapters will enter the contests. The NSDAR American Heritage Certificate for the most outstanding chapter based on programs, American Heritage projects, use of American Heritage theme, and participation in National Contests goes to Sagamore Chapter, Mrs. Samuel Scorza, American Heritage Chairman. This has been a very good year.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

Mrs. R. G. Swenson

Essays this year could be written on "Prominent Signers of the Constitution". There were 134 schools participating with essays from 395 students. Winners were: 5th grade - Gina Barlotta, Leavenworth, Captain Jesse Leavenworth Chapter; 6th grade -Travis Brown, Parsons, Hannah Jameson Chapter; 7th grade -Monica Boccia, Pittsburg, Oceanus Hopkins Chapter and 8th grade - Matthew Mayerske, Pittsburg, Oceanus Hopkins Chapter. American History Programs were given by 56 chapters and 42 had displays. There were 188 sets of spot announcements on radio and 42 on TV. There were 541 inches of publicity in the press and 27 pictures. Governor Carlin signed the American History Month Proclamation as well as 26 Mayors. I want to thank the chapters who tried but got no cooperation from the schools or newspapers. This can be a problem sometimes. I have enjoyed working on this committee the last three years and appreciate all the help the Chapter Chairmen have given me.

AMERICAN INDIANS CHAIRMAN Dr. Geneva Herndon

The reports of 63 of our chapters showed concern for the welfare of our Native Americans. Thirty-one Chapters devoted one program to Indians, ten more than last year. The designated subject "Little Known Indians in your State" was difficult. Flores del Sol Chapter solved it by having a Saturday breakfast meet in Wichita from which they moved to the Mid-America Indian Center, nearby. They took an interesting tour seeing Indian pottery, paintings and artifacts. They had a fine chance to learn about Indians since 6500 live in Wichita.

Scholarship donations of \$692.15 exceeded last year's by 25%. Money to be spent for miscellaneous needs for Bacone \$245.00. St. Mary's \$124.25. No money was sent for the bus project.

There were 7000 soup labels from 17 chapters; ten others sent but gave no count. Both schools prize these to help get athletic equipment. Other donations for the thrift shops came from 15 chapters. The amount ranged from "24 lb." to "a car load" or "over 200 lb." Other designations were "books for Bacone", "sweaters for St. Mary's", or "fifteen pairs of blue jeans". Again, Mrs. C.L. Shoemake, Indian Chairman of Martha Vail Chapter, used an Indian Bazaar taking in \$79.50. With this she bought from her druggist medical supplies for Bacone, value \$430.30 (retail). Another gift for Bacone that she gave was men and women's shoes, belts, and jewelry valued at over a thousand dollars.

We appreciate all your gifts and thank you for a good year.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Reports were received from all 65 chapters. Fifty-five Chapters repeated the American Creed at every meeting. Thirty-two had Americanism programs. Thirteen gave talks on Americanism to other organizations. Thirty-six placed patriotic material in schools, libraries, post offices, county clerks offices and with a few lawyers. There were no programs on radio or TV reported. 1478 DAR Manuals for Citizenship were given out. 880 to courts and 598 to other locations.

A number of chapters used their twenty-five free manuals to give to Wichita and Topeka for the Naturalization Courts or gave money for purchase of manuals and patriotic materials.

Four chapters sponsored receptions or teas. Three chapters had other activities for new citizens and other foreign born.

Twelve studied Immigration Act and material. Four worked with Americanization classes. Ten attended Naturalization courses. 531 Welcome cards, Flag Codes and Flag pins were given out and 27 Flags were presented by 27 chapters.

A number of chapters reported giving material, Flag Codes etc. but didn't have the number given.

Wichita and Topeka chapters cooperated as a group in working with Naturalization Courts and honoring new citizens. 59 new citizens were naturalized by Judge Richard Rogers as reported by John Haupt chapter. Citizen Patriot, Atwood, KS reported there were 132 people seeking citizenship in 20 counties of Kansas.

Medal Of Honor Awards were presented to Dr. Philip W. Bernstorf by Eunice Sterling Chapter, Wichita. The Application was received for Thomas Eastwood Smith, Jr. in March and submitted. This will be presented by the state at State Conference March 20, 1986.

The Medal of Honor was presented to Robert E. Burt of Kansas City, MO by Mrs. Billy P. Compton, State Regent, at the SAR State Banquet held in Wichita on March 30, 1985.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Reports were received from all chapters. Six chapters sponsor/cosponsor C.A.R. societies. Fifteen chapters provide senior leadership, nine subscribe to the C.A.R. magazine. There were six state promoters, one national promoter and one life promoter. Twentyseven members attended local meetings, 10 attended state meetings, six attended the regional meeting and two attended the national convention. Four DAR chapters secured six new C.A.R. members and 20 chapters reported C.A.R. activities 77 times. In April the 40th State Conference was held in Great Bend and Lonna Carpenter of Topeka was elected State President, 1985-86. A delegation of 12 members, seniors and guests attended the 90th Annual Convention in Washington, D.C., April 19-21. The Regional Meeting in Omaha, Nebraska was attended by a delegation from Tomahawk, Leavenworth and Kansa societies. Following this meeting, a Work Shop, a national requirement, was organized and conducted in Topeka by President Lonna Carpenter, and Mrs. Parker. Lonna's state theme was "Zero in on C.A.R." and her project was the preparation of a C.A.R. lineage book of present and past members of the state society. Also, book marks with the state and national theme and the K.S.C.A.R. buffalo pin were offered for sale. Special thanks are extended to those of you who cared enough about C.A.R.'s future by supporting your local, state and national society in its projects.

CONSERVATION

As conservationists, we have been quite busy this year. Kansas Daughters planted at least 39 varieties of trees for a total reported plantings of 1809; 44 varieties of shrubs and flowers plus 55 plantings of wildflowers.

We fed 15,314 pounds (plus one seed bell) to birds and animals and still found time to discover Kansas minerals and landmarks. From Castle Rock to Burnett's Mound, from Rock City and Rock Posts to Pawnee Rock, we acknowledged natural geological landmarks.

Good-Land prepared a program on minerals. Dodge City submitted a mineral essay and presented a conservation certificate.

The state project of planting white oaks at Shawnee Mission. Special donations for the full amount of a tree were received from Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Mummett-Memory of Capt. Ralph O. Bray, who died in Vietnam; Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Cochran-to honor Mr. and Mrs. Mabes, 35 anniversary-to honor Mr. and Mrs. James Craig, 60th Anniversary; Mrs. Billy P. Compton-Carl and Suzy Compton; Mrs. Joseph R. Riden Jr.-honor Mission Hills Chapter, Prairie Rose Chapter-fifth anniversary.

This Chairman has enjoyed meeting so many people in connection with the various plantings of this administration and it has been a pleasure to serve.

According to the Kansas "Record and Proceeding" books, September 1985 is the **TENTH CONSECUTIVE** year the Chapters in Kansas have reported 100% on Constitution Week. This is an excellent record for the Kansas Daughters. Congratulations!

Governor John Carlin and 71 officials signed proclamations. 51 Chapters urged display of the flag and 600 flags decorated the city of Emporia on September 17th. Reported were 1156 inches of newspaper, 2152 TV announcements, 563 radio announcements, 178 displays plus 60,480 minutes on revolving signs, 148 programs, 67 of which were in our schools. 5191 pieces of literature were purchased and distributed. 2500 "Preamble" bookmarks were presented to ten Junior High Schools by Tomahawk Chapter.

Dreams really do come true! Kansas was 100% in Advertising participation. Our sincere thanks to the 65 Chapters who made it possible for Kansas to honor in this way two outstanding Daughters-our State Regent, Mrs. Billy P. Compton, and our very own Mrs. Wallace R. Decker, NSDAR Corresponding Secretary General.

In the May, 1986 issue, Kansas' designated month, 54 Chapters sponsored four full pages, and 6 Chapters sponsored one commercial, $\frac{1}{2}$ column, and five one inch ads. The Northwest District was responsible for another one inch ad, making our total in the Kansas Issue very impressive. Total amount credited to Kansas \$1,895.00, for May.

Other ads appearing during this past year were: two full-pages, one ¹/₄-page, two ¹/₂-column, and twelve one-inch. Thanks to all of you for your wonderful cooperation.

Regents and Chapter Advertising Chairmen please take note that ads must be in the National Office two months before they are to appear, with the exception of the May Issue, for which they must be in three months in advance, which means February first they must be in Washington. It is important to keep in touch with your State chairman.

It has been an interesting and enjoyable three years, serving KSDAR in this capacity. Thank you, Madame State Regent, for appointing me to this position. 65 Chapters reported with 59 making contributions to the Museum for Honor Roll credit.

7 Chapters had a program on the DAR Museum and 9 Chapters reported having a program on one or more other Museums. Some gifts were made to other Museums.

15 Chapters had the DAR Museum brochures available at one or more meetings and these were also available for Chapters at the State Conference in March. These brochures can be obtained from the Curator General at National without charge.

Chapters reported \$80.50 donated to the Museum General Fund, \$2.00 to the Cataloging Fund, \$27.00 to the Museum Library Fund, and \$29.95 to the Kansas Chapel Fund.

A number of the books "The Art of Independence" have been purchased and the books will be for sale at the Kansas State Conference in March.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP

A renewed interest in DAR scholarships this year resulted in only two chapters reporting no activity. Good publicity increased the number of applicants for our scholarships over former years. Via the Fall Packet application forms and information on rules for national and state scholarships was sent to all 65 Kansas chapters. They in turn contacted 15 high schools and five colleges with this information. As a result we had 12 fine students apply for scholarships.

Kansas winner of the KSDAR American History Scholarship is David D. Barnum, Garden City, who plans to attend Harvard-Radcliffe, Cambridge, MA, to study American History as a base for law school or teaching. Carmen Jo Day, Council Grove, is KSDAR Scholarship winner and has not definitely decided upon her college choice. The Pendleton scholarship is placed with Timothy J. McGlasson, a senior at Wichita Northwest, who plans to enter the University of Arkansas to study psychology (Child and Gerontology). Two students have been awarded Merritt scholarships: Kersten Shelton, Cherryvale, who will enroll in Premed courses but has not yet determined her college choice: Tammy Winger, Minneola, who is presently attending Dodge City Community College using the scholarship monies granted her in June. The monetary value of the scholarships is given the winners after they are officially enrolled in college and attending classes.

Judges for the NSDAR American History and KSDAR Scholar ships are experienced educators: Dr. James Juhnke, professor of history, Bethel College, who has had two books and many articles published; Miss Bonnie Selanders, Humanities and English teacher, Newton High School, recipient of two Fulbright Scholarships to teach in an Italian university and in Sardinia and a John Hay Fellowship to Columbia University; Senator Joseph Harder, chairman of the Kansas Senate Education Committee and chairman of the Intergovernmental Advisory Council on Education, a national committee appointed by the President of the U.S.

Kansas DAR chapters contributed \$147 to scholarships, \$18 for state and \$129 for national. I have enjoyed serving as DAR Scholarship Committee chairman with the goal of rewarding good students and helping to make college a possibility for them.

DAR SCHOOL

I am delighted to report that \$4843.00 has been given to our DAR schools this past year by Kansas daughters. \$2399.75 of this amount went to Kate Duncan Smith, \$2328.25 to Tamassee, and \$115.00 to Crossnore. This is in addition to hundreds of Campbell soup labels, hundreds of pounds of articles for resale and articles for Christmas gifts. We had 100% reporting this year with 15 chapters presenting programs on our schools. One chapter reporting giving a program for another organization. 15 chapters reported giving more this year than previously, 20 gave the same while 9 reported giving less. We weren't as innovative in our money making projects this year, basically weigh-ins and free will offerings. Some chapters reported on-going collections of good rummage and other articles suitable for resale. GENEALOGICAL RECORDS COMMITTEE

Fifteen chapters contributed 1624 pages of original source material for honor roll credit: General Edward Hand, Council Oak, Good-Land, William Wilson, Tomahawk, Oceanus Hopkins, Capt. Jcooc Leavenworth, Lois Warner, Uvedale, Wyandot, Eunice Sterl ing, Dodge City, Arthur Barrett, Abilene, Shawnee Mission. Fiftythree chapters contributed to National Binding Fund and thirtynine chapters to State Binding Fund.

Four volumes of original source material were sent to NSDAR: Franklin County, Kansas Marriage Records 1858-1913; Volume I Morris County Cemetery Inscriptions; Genealogy of Thomas and Mary (Elmore) Moore; and a volume of Miscellancous Records of Kansas and Kansas Family Records. Duplicates of all were sent to KSDAR Library and to the Kansas Historical Library. One contribution was held over.

Kansas restored two volumes of old genealogical records for NSDAR Library. Oceanus Hopkins Chapter recopied and indexed Deeds of Crawford County, Kansas 1867-1800, and General Edward Hand did the same for Crawford County Early Marriage Records. Duplicates went to KSDAR Library and Kansas Historical Library.

THANKS for the excellent response of contributions to the National and State Binding Funds. SPECIAL THANKS to the individuals who prepared the material. The quality of work improves each year as interest increases in genealogical research, and closer attention is paid to official instructions for preparation, and better quality of paper is used.

Kansas Chapters contributed generously to the JAC prize fund. 1985 contributions to the National JAC prize fund were \$80.50, with \$55.00 being donated to the State prize fund.

This Chairman attended the JAC Roundtable during Continental Congress in Washington, D.C. and was pleased to see many fine entries from Kansas.

port the objectives of JAC in their communities.

This chairman appreciates the generous donations from each chapter given to make the Junior Bazaar a success each year!

A project of this committee is to financially assist the Kansas DAR Outstanding Junior Member to attend Continental Congress and to have her attend the Junior Breakfast/Forum/Workshop during Continental Congress.

It is with a feeling of accomplishment to report that Kansas received a certificate for 100% Completion from NSDAR regarding the national committee Junior Membership Survey. Appreciation is expressed to everyone involved in the chapters to make the project a success!

LINEAGE RESEARCH

Each Kansas Chapter reported through the State Regent's report form. From this information the National Committee has been advised of 302 requests for assistance and 12 chapters have held workshops. Five Kansas Daughters have qualified for the new Volunteer Lineage Pin; accounting for a minimum of 20 new members already accepted as a result of their efforts.

The first National Lineage Workshop held at Continental Congress last year had 12 in attendance from Kansas and 15 are indicating they plan to attend the 1986 NSDAR Workshop.

As requests for assistance continue to be received they are processed and forwarded to the National Lineage Research Committee. The volume of requests and the four-generation pedigree charts have slowed since the inauguration of the 'Records Searcher' program. Whether this signals a change of research approach or is only coincidence cannot be determined at this time. If the Chapter Chairmen are not finding prospective members who need help this Chairman would submit, "You're **NOT** looking for them!" "Be Membership Minded" was once again the theme of the membership committee and was stressed at the fall district meetings. Many chapters responded to this challenge by contacting nearly 250 prospective members. Continued contact with these prospects should result in many new members in the next year or two. These new members will be needed, as there was a decrease of about thirty members statewide this year. The number of chapters with gains or lossed in membership was nearly the same, but a few chapters, mostly the larger ones, reported losses of five to seventeen members this past year. The steady, but smaller, gains of the other chapters could not overcome this deficit.

In the three size categories chapters having the largest percentage increase in membership were Little Osage Trail, Martha Loving Ferrell, and Eunice Sterling. Eunice Sterling also had the largest increase in membership by applications. Peleg Gorton was the winner of "The Most Innovative and Successful Chapter Membership Project" contest.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

The State Regent's Questionnaire on National Defense was returned by all Chapter Regents. However, only 45 full reports were filed by chapter chairmen. Consequently, the National Defense report filed for Kansas could not reflect the total activity in Kansas.

The number one national defense topic reported by the chapters was the Strategic Defense Initiative, followed by the summit meeting, terrorism, and schools.

Your state chairman has continued to promote an awareness of the need for national defense through programs for civic groups and schools, and has also worked to get a Strategic Defense Initiative resolution introduced in the Kansas Legislature. The Kansas Senate passed the resolution.

Your state chairman also was instrumental in a bill being introduced in the Kansas Legislature to establish a commission for the celebration of the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution. It passed both houses.

This chairman was been invited to be the National Defense speaker at the State Conference of the Missouri Society NSDAR.

PROGRAM

In mid May 1985, Chapter Regents were sent a letter with dates and locations of the fall tour, names and addresses of District Directors, dates and location for State Conference and dates for Continental Congress. the sixteen page 1985 Program Outline Guide from National was also included as was a Supplemental Listing of Programs and Names and addresses of all State Chairmen.

Yearbooks, inserts or supplements were received from all sixtyfive chapters for judging. Thirty-three chapters received the Tricolor award for outstanding Yearbooks with only one error or less. Thirteen received a Mini-Tri-color award for supplements and inserts. Eleven Chapters received a Blue award for a yearbook with one to two errors and four chapters received a Mini-Blue award for an insert or supplement. Two more chapters received the Tri-color award this year than in 1984. Good Work Chapters. Complete yearbooks were printed by 45 chapters. Eighteen chapters prepared supplements and two chapters printed inserts.

All 65 Chapters responded to the program report. The program outline guide was used by 62 chapters in planning chapter programs and yearbooks. Sixty-three chapters used articles from the DAR Magazine when planning programs. Fifteen chapters entered the Conservation of Printing Cost contest. The Use of Theme in Program Titles contest was entered by 18 chapters. Results from these contests are received at Continental Congress.

Serving as Program Chairman has been a challenge as well as a pleasure. I hope that I have been of assistance to those involved in the preparation of chapter yearbooks. Let us continue to work toward our National Theme for 1985-86, "Let our objective be our country, our whole country and nothing but our country," as we continue to work toward our DAR goals.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE Mrs. Bill Jackson

Another year has seen our Chapters reporting good news coverage of their activities. Some chapters who are fortunate enough to be near television stations report coverage by that media; other chapters report coverage by radio stations. This is indeed encouraging. Two of the chapters were winners in the South Central Region. Shawnee Mission Chapter won first place for its series of a news story - reporting the marking of a daughter's grave. Sarah Steward Chapter was awarded third place for a single news story and an honorable mention for a single story feature story. Congratulations to both these chapters for their fine entries. My thanks to all the chapter chairmen for their cooperation in reporting chapter activities. Again this year we had 100 per cent chapter reporting. The first objective of the Seimes Microfilm Center Committee is to build a resource for genealogical research, and Kansas Daughters have responded to this objective generously. There was 100 % reporting by 65 chapters. Sixty-three chapters donated a total of \$200.50. Thirty-five chapters have Seimes chairmen.

Funds were contributed among several areas: The National Chairman's Project, New Equipment for the Center, and the 1900 Soundex Index. In addition, Chapters were enthusiastic in their support of this year's State Chairman's Project: the purchase of a Life Membership in the Center by the Kansas State Society in honor of Mrs. Wallace R. Decker

Further interest was shown by the attendance at the Workshop held at the 1985 State Conference, and by the 5 chapters who featured programs on the Center this past year. It was the privilege of this chairman to present programs to 2 chapters. The slide program "Seimes Microfilm Center--Vital to DAR" will be viewed by 2 additional chapters this Spring.

 Four chapters donated a total of 5 rolls of microfilm to local institutions. Ninnescah Chapter loaned materials to the library in Salt Lake City for microfilming.

For the success of the State Project, this chairman is indebted to the chapters who supported it, as well as to Mrs. Carl Riggs, State Treasurer, whose efforts made it a reality. Mrs. Decker has requested that the \$100 be designated for the National Chairman's Project: the microfilming of the Revolutionary War Pension and Bounty-Land-Warrant application files.

On behalf of Kansas Daughters, the certificate showing that a Life Membership in the Seimes Microfilm Center was purchased by the Kansas State Society in her honor has been presented to the family of Constance Routh Decker.

TRANSPORTATION AND SAFETY

We had our FIRST Annual Kansas Bus Tour to Continental Congress in 1985, and it was a great success-thanks to Mary Taylor, our new State Tour Director!

Eleven chapters had full safety programs, including guest speakers from Sante Fe Railway, Kansas Women for Highway Safety, City Police, and City Engineer. Some of the Transportation and Safety ideas presented and used were: distribution of safety literature; conducted survey at intersections on "view blockage"; safety tips at meetings; car-pooling; seat belts and child-restraint seat usage; driving for school and Girl Scout field trips, and assisting the transporting of patients to Doctor appointments during inclement weather; window displays with posters at medical offices and beauty shops; reading of newspaper clippings about traffic accidents, quoting a survivor who said she "owed her life" to wearing her seat belt; -and this State Chairman rode the "Convincer"...and ONE trip will convince anyone to wear seat belts!!

Then, South Central Division Annual Report shows that Kansas chapters observed American History Month in programs, displays, spot announcements, and appearances of members in radio and TV. Local newspapers printed 6.938 inches and 382 pictures. Chapters were grateful that State governors and city mayors proclaimed February as American History Month. BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION [As amended March 16, 1986]

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Objects

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas.

(1) To perpetuate the memory and opirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the crection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to sid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No state officer, except the State Librarian, shall be eligible to two consecutive terms in the same office. A member of the Na tional Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reclection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, excopt that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. Terms. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officero. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three fourthe vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissional. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out hor dutics for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Moeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board of Management Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediate ly after its election and no later than November first, to notify all chapters of the imponding election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be solected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nomina tions may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regont of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice Presi dent General shall be by ballot and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the

State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the Conference Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committees and of any other appointees. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar, hold a memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management, and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen, and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material, to edit, and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Recording Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than six months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officero, committee chairmon of the Kaneas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the date designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. Before January first, she shall send to each Chapter Regent three crediential blank forms and three forms for reporting chapter officers. Before Continental Congress each year, she shall send to the Organizing Secretary Ceneral a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapters made into a directory form. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kaneae Society and shall assist the State Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conforence, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and the Organizing Regent in organizing new chapters. She shall ascertain the possibilities of organizing a new chapter where a new chapter is contemplated. She shall be responsible for correspondence relative to the organization of new chapters. She shall give assistance to existing chapters in sustaining their membership quota as required by the National Society.

Section 8. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds for the Society. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kanoao Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and counter-

signed by the State Recording Secretary. Upon assuming the duties of her office, she may, with the approval of the Executive Committee, transfer funds to a convenient, federally insured banking institution; this action shall be ratified at the next meeting of the State Board of Management. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a public accountant in time to have the auditor's report for the annual State Conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall pass them on to her successor.

Section 9. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep the card files of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include: name, including maiden name in full and, if married; husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor; spouse of ancestor, if known; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given. On or before January first, the State Registrar shall send blank forms to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceeding year. The State Registrar shall prepare and have printed a nocrology list for the memorial service at State Conference.

Section 10. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall kccp a reference record of the documents and rolics which may como into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 11. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books, papers, microfilm, and equipment as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all materials and equipment in the Kansas State DAR Library.

In her annual report she shall list all matorials ocnt to the National Society Library and all materials received during the year for the Kansas State DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of the Kansas State DAR Library.

Section 12. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News", and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the Conference Press Committee. She shall send a short report of the Kansas State DAR Conference to the "DAR Magazine".

Section 13. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them from her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent-Elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and the Chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. A member holding two or more offices each carrying a vote at the annual State Conference shall be limited to vote in only one of the offices held.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately proceeding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The representation of a chapter at the annual State Conference or at any other meeting of the State Society shall be three times the representation to which the chapter is entitled in the Continental Congress and shall be as follows:

12 through 49 members	Regent and two delegates	3
50 through 199 members	Regent and five delegates	6
200 through 299 members	Regent and eight delegatcs	9

Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of voters to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after the election, the three credential blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at the meeting of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privilege of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates _ for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her abscncc, the Chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX

Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Moetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$2.50 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. These dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of December. A member whose dues are not paid by January first shall not be a delegate to the State Conference. The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after May first shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee not to exceed five dollars, such sum to be given to the hostess district to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the Ceneral Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee, composed of the State Treasurer as Ohairman, the State Recording Secretary, and three members appointed by the State Regent, shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget, as approved by the State Board of Management, shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Kansas DAR Scholarship. The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members of be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals and from interest on monies invested for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee, composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Vice Regent, and the State Recording Secretary, shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee, consisting of a Chairman from the membership of the State at-large and four members from the membership of the hostess chapters, shall be appointed by the State Regent and shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary, the State Treasurer, and the State Registrar shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Public Relations. The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an exofficio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent, shall prepare a condensed report, not exceeding 200 words. These reports shall be

typed in triplicatc, one copy for the State Regent and two for the Recording Secretary and sent not later than March first each year. These reports covering the year's work, shall be propared for the State Conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. Each State Chairman shall send to the State Regent, not later than March first of oach yoar, a copy of the statistical report prepared for the National Chairman or Vice Chairman. This information will be used by the State Regent in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be published in the summer issue of the Kanasa DAR News or shall be sent by the District Director to the District Chapters, State Officers and State Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each district shall at its annual mooting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The term of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three years.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an omergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office by the June meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year, the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary, on forms furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three legible typewritten lists or one original and two eligible photocopies of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter will send a postal card to the State Chairman of each National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January thirtieth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

Number 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Annual Report and Proceedings of the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The report shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent. the number she desires; State Officer, 1 to 3 each; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National and State Committees, 1 each; Senior State President, C.A.R., 1; District Directors, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1: the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2; the President General, 1; The Kansas State Historical Society, 1; the Presidents of the State Officers' Club, Chapter Regents' Club, and State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In an election year, one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

Number 2. No loss than two issues of the Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.

Number 3. The State Registrar shall assist the editor of the Kansas DAR News a current mailing list.

Number 4. A sum of \$1,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

Number 5. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

Number 6. Twenty-five dollars shall be allotted to the Kansas delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

Number 7. Fifty dollars shall be alloted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

Number 8. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

Number 9. A sum equal to five cents per chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be used for the C.A.R. projects.

Number 10. KSDAR shall place a \$30.00 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR Magazine if no other Kansas advertising is available.

Number 11. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund and \$.05 per member to the KSDAR Library.

Number 12. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send, on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers, to the Chairman of the Membership Committee, and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

Number 13. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent, and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

Number 14. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

Number 15. The State Regent shall have the State Regent's pin appraised by the J. E. Caldwell Company once during her administration, and if the pin is lost the State Society shall assume the cost of replacing it.

Number 16. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G. and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

(a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.

(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books and shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.

(c) Rental of \$150 per year shall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library. (d) The materials submitted to the KSDAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. Donors are asked to check with the librarian before presentation to avoid duplication.

Number 17. An Endowment Fund for the DAR Library has been established.

Number 18. The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship is to be given once in each KSDAR Administration to a high school senior who is entering a two or four year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of National Defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity, and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Chairman, the State National Defense Chairman, and the State Regent.

Number 19. A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school senior who has DAR eligibility.

Number 20. The Lena Fry Merritt Daughters of the American Revolution Scholarship is to be awarded at least once in each DAR administration according to the guidelines of the Lena Fry Merritt Scholarship Committee.

Number 21. State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and the honorary officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

Number 22. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session of the State Conference to approve the minutes of the session.

Number 22. The entertainment of the following persons, if attending the State Conference at the invitation of the State Regent, shall be a Conference expense: candidates for President General; National Officers or National appointees appearing as speakers; representatives of the DAR Schools, Approved Schools, or Indian Schools.

Number 24. Two members of the National Board of Management may be invited by the State Regent to attend the State Conference as guests of the Conference.

Number 25. (a) A \$10.00 limit shall be placed on prizes awarded at the State Conference. Any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.

(b) Interest accrued annually from the Mary Lempenau Permanent Trust Fund of \$750.00 beginning in 1987 be used to pay monetary prizes at State Conference with no prize exceeding \$10.00.

Number 26. The Runner-Up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an appropriate gift as an award.

Number 27. The Kansas Society shall present the State Regent

a Past State Regent's Pin at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

Number 28. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Pin at the close of the State Conference.

Number 29. In the event that KSDAR should have a national winner in any NSDAR youth competition in which the winner is required to attend Contintenal Congress, the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the award.

Number 30. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for members or spouses of members of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who arc guests at functions eponeored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

Number 31. A pilgrimage to an historically significant Kansas site shall be held annually on Constitution Day, September 17th. If the date is changed, it shall be during Constitution Week as near the 17th as possible, and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Constitution Week Chairman, and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the pilgrimage.

Number 32. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before March first by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, subject to the approval of the State Regent.

Number 33. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

Number 34. An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings, and other pertinent historical information will be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings decennially beginning in 1980.

Number 35. A Directory of members will be printed every ten years beginning in 1990.

Number 36. Number 37. These rules may be amended or suspended at any State Conference by a majority vote.
