CONFERENCE RULES

- 1. All persons must be registered before entering the business sessions. Proper identification badges must be worn at all business sessions with the blue ribbon for delegates and the red ribbon for alternates.

- 7. All Resolutions shall have been in the hands of Resolutions Committee prior to State Conference. The date will have been determined and announced by the Resolutions Chairman.

- 8. No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day or longer than two minutes at any time except by the consent of the Assembly.
- 9. Members who appear on the program or are making reports will please occupy the front seats. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business sessions.
- 10. Only the Chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 11. Two timekeepers shall be appointed by the Chair. Reports of Committee Chairmen shall be limited to 4 minutes, reports of District Directors and Chapter Regents to 2 minutes. All speakers shall conform to the ruling of the timekeepers.
- 12. Announcements must have the approval of the State Regent.
- 13. A copy of every report for the printed Proceedings of the State Conference shall be typed ready for printing and sent to the State Recording Secretary before the report is read at the Conference.
- 14. If the Officer, Chapter Regent or Chapter Vice Regent, Chairman or Appointee is not present, her report shall not be read and shall be filed for printing in the Official Proceedings unless otherwise ordered.
- 15. Any chairman or individual having a table display or exhibit will please attend to the removal of all material at the close of the Conference.
- 16. All necessary communications shall be delivered by the pages.
- 17. Members will please refrain from smoking in the session room.
- 18. Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society By-laws and Rules.

MEMORIAL TO NAOMI MARIAN SIGNAIGO

Mrs. Vincent J. Signaigo (Naomi Marian Utz Hootman) died August 23, 1986, while on a vacation in Durango, Colorado. The funeral services were held in Gardner, Kansas, with burial in the Mount Muncy Cemetery at Lansing. She is survived by her husband, three sisters and several nieces and nephews.

Mrs. Signaigo became a member of James Ross Chapter on October 13, 1955. In the words of a member of that chapter, she was a concerned, loving, serving member of the DAR. She was elected to the office of State Treasurer in 1977. She was the State Conference Chairman in 1973 and had served as State Chairman of the El Quartelejo Committee. She was a past district director of the Northeast District and a past president of the Regents' Roundtable of Johnson and Wyandotte Counties. She served two terms as regent of James Ross Chapter and multiple terms as chapter treasurer and chapter registrar. She had been chairman of several chapter committees.

For many years, the James Ross Chapter members looked forward to the annual Flag Day picnic at the lakefront home of Naomi and her husband, "Sig," near Gardner.

Mrs. Signaigo was a member of the Gardner Presbyterian Church and of the Order of the Eastern Star. She gave up her memberships in other lineage and civic organizations when she and her husband began spending the winter months in Florida.

I first knew Naomi when, as Naomi Hootman, she was serving her first term as regent of James Ross Chapter some twenty-five years ago. Her first husband died, and she later married Vincent Signaigo. Over the years, I came to appreciate her qualities of modesty, compassion and good humor. She loved people. She was always fair and impartial in judgment — a DAR member who could smooth troubled waters but who could also make the hard decisions when necessary. She had not had an easy life. Her mother died when she was a child, and she and her sisters kept the home together, as their father's work required him to travel. Because

of a severe childhood illness, she was never physically strong, but her zest for life was so great that she laughed away her problems.

Naomi attended business college and had her own accounting and income tax office in Kansas City, Kansas. She retired the year that she was elected State Treasurer and brought to that office her professional expertise.

Naomi once told me that she had been taught that her books should be in order at the end of the day, so that someone else could take over without any problems should anything happen to her during the night. Her death was sudden, but I am confident that her accounts were in order, that she had left no kind words un said or good deeds undone. She was a good and faithful servant.

We rejoice in and give thanks for this life which has enriched and blessed our society.

BILLS OF MINOR IMPORTANCE

WHEREAS, Many bills of small importance are attached to bills of greater importance; and

WHEREAS, Many bills are passed by Congress which are not worthy of recognition on the floor of the assembly;

RESOLVED, That the Daughters of the American Revolution as individuals write their Congressmen encouraging them to make every bill stand on its own merit and be voted on separately.

EXPENSE ACCOUNTS OF MEMBERS OF CONGRESS

WHEREAS, The salaries of members of the Senate and the House of Representatives are adequate to cover expenses; and WHEREAS, The United States of America is deeply in debt; RESOLVED, That members of the Daughters of the American Revolution as individuals write to their elected officials encouraging them to limit the expense accounts of all members of Congress.

ELECTRONIC BUSINESSES

WHEREAS, The United States at one time was preeminent in the manufacture and sale of computers, components and discs, but this preeminence has been gradually taken over by the Japanese, who have become our greatest competitor in small personal computers as well as larger ones for industrial and government use; and

WHEREAS, The United States government and American industries must not allow foreign companies to own certain businesses such as those which make the advanced chips and components for super computers and since there are only 50 to 60 super computers in the world today which are used by governments to make and break codes, predict weather, and target nuclear weapons;

RESOLVED, That members of the Daughters of the American Revolution as individuals write their Senators and Representatives voicing their concern over the loss of control over industries vital to our national defense and urge them to use every means to keep such businesses under American ownership and control.

LEADERSHIP IN SPACE

WHEREAS, Sensors mounted on space satellites are capable of sending invaluable scientific information back to earth, such as soil erosion, toxic waste sites, locations of ocean dumping, illegal tree-cutting in forests, preductions of weather disasters and numerous other benefits; and

WHEREAS, The United States is at serious risk of losing its technological lead in space; and

WHEREAS, Japan launched an ocean-observing satellite last month, and India is paying the Soviet Union to launch a remotesensing satellite this year, and French astronauts will visit the Soviet MIR space station next year, and the Soviet Union itself is preparing to launch about a dozen scientific missions including five this year; and

WHEREAS, Space programs around the world are entering an era of increased activity; and

WHEREAS, American space scientists are frustrated by our government's delay of authorized missions and lack of new "starts," and the future of NASA's next logical step into space — the space station — is uncertain; and

WHEREAS, This stagnation in the U.S. space program can't be blamed only on the Challenger accident but results from a lack of leadership in planning for space activity;

RESOLVED, That it is time the United States stops talking about its "leadership" in space and faces the fact that the rest of the world is moving on in space while the United States program stagnates, and that the United States recognize that the USSR has a massive capability in space and that France, Japan, and India are ready for strong action, but that none of this could seriously challenge American leadership if only the United States would focus on a long-term space strategy; and

RESOLVED, That members of the Daughters of the American Revolution as individuals should let their Congressmen be aware that they support a program of space leadership by the United States of America.

STRATEGIC DEFENSE INITIATIVE

WHEREAS, The United States has no defense against incoming ballistic missiles, whether launched deliberately or by accident; and WHEREAS, It is the primary responsibility of government to provide for the defense of our nation and its people against this most awesome of threats; and

WHEREAS, The Soviet Union has clearly achieved first strike nuclear capability; and

WHEREAS, Technologies are now available for construction of a layered, cost effective defense, based on kinetic energy weapons; and

WHEREAS, The President must make the decision to deploy such a defense before he leaves office; and

WHEREAS, The ABM Treaty should be considered null and void

by virtue of Soviet violations and must not be allowed to stand in the way of our national security;

RESOLVED, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, urge Congress to support and fully fund the STRATEGIC DEFENSE INITIATIVE and ask the President to begin the construction of a non-nuclear defense for the United States without delay; and

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be delivered to every member of the Kansas congressional delegation, and to the President, the Secretary of State, and the Secretary of Defense.

REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

STATE REGENT

Since the day your State Regent was installed at Continental Congress last April, she has been very busy making sure that the Kansas Society functions as smoothly as possible.

Five days after her return from Continental Congress she made her first trip to Wichita to confer about this year's State Conference with the Conference Chairman, Mrs. Stanley Kippenberger. Two additional trips were made to work on conference plans.

Your State Regent then made the appointments of the State Chairman to continue the work of all the National and State Committees. She is very appreciative of the willingness of the members to assume the chairmenships and the excellent cooperation she has received from them.

If each Daughter would have the opportunity to attend at least one Continental Congress; to see what we do in Washington at our meetings; to tour our buildings; our library and period rooms; then our organization would mean much more to each Daughter who has actually been to Washington. Report of the Auditor

I have examined the statement of recorded receipts, disbursements, and cash balances of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution as of January 31, 1987. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

The Society's policy is to prepare its financial statement on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statement is not intended to present financial position, results of operations, and changes in financial position in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In my opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly the recorded receipts, disbursements, and cash balances of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution for the year ended January 31, 1987 on the basis of accounting described above, which basis has been applied in a manner consistent with that of the preceding year.

The accompanying schedules are presented as additional

analytical data. This information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statement mentioned above, and in my opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statement.

AMERICAN INDIANS

Your activities and donations show your interest and concern for our first Americans. Surely when you reach "that happy hunting ground in the sky" you will have an extra feather in your crown.

63 percent of the chapters donated to the American Indian Scholarship Fund. Dodge City Chapter gave the largest amount. 85 percent donated to the General Fund of Bacone. Three chapters gave to the Nursing Fund. One contributed to the library. Two chapters gave to the Special Christmas offering. Twenty percent gave clothing and supplies exceeding 1,000 pounds. Two gifts of money and 5,000 soup labels were sent to St. Marys. Twenty-four percent of the chapters had Indian programs.

Randolph Loving had a shower for Bacone, complete with invitations, to obtain articles needed on the White Cross list. A generous monetary gift to Bacone was given by a member.

Flores del Sol reported that when Dr. Mary Blood, a chapter member, retired she gave medical equipment and office furnitue to the medical clinic for the Indian Center in Wichita.

Martha Vail chapter had their third bazaar for Bacone, which went over with a "bang." They tripled their money in medical supplies and also sent many gifts of new merchandise to Bacone.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. W. Ward Marrs

All 65 chapters for 100%, reported the following: Repeating the American's Creed at all meetings 56; Program on Americanism 37; Program on the Constitution 19; One chapter added the Preamble to the Constitution for opening. One or all members in 25 chapters reading the Manual; 22 Chapters ordered 426 Manuals; 18 participated in naturalization ceremonies. Gifts to new citizens were: 1,094 flags; 450 welcome cards; 1,100 flag codes; cookies and drink for reception following ceremonies.

Activites of special note: Olathe Chapter works with Scouts in having flag burning ceremonies to dispose of old damaged flags; Sagamore Chapter distributed 200 copies of "What the Constitution Means To You"; Martha Loving Ferrell Chapter took an American History Class of 18 to a Naturalization Ceremony, they were presented with bookmarks with the "Preamble." They also gave The Madrigal Singers, another High school groups, 30 copies each of "What the Constitution Means to You" and "Preamble to

the Constitution." The State of Kansas had one recipient for the Medal of Honor. It will be presented at the State Conference to Mr. Dwane L. Wallace.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

C.A.R. activities were reported by all KSDAR chapters. Six chapters sponsor/cosponsor societies. This year we had nine State Promoters, two National Promoters and one National Life Promoter. Five chapters reported CAR magazine subscriptions. Two C.A.R. Societies report a new member each; one Society has four new members and with two transfers in of two members each has increased membership by 28% this year. This year's National Theme is MAKE IT HAPPEN; the State Theme is Go For It! We did and exceeded our National financial allotment of \$582.40 to be donated towards the eventual computerization of N.S.C.A.R. Headquarters.

Four issues of *The Sunflower Scribbles*, K.S.C.A.R. Newsheet, has been published and mailed to about 225, including DAR Regents and their C.A.R. Chairmen and SAR Presidents and their Secretaries.

Efforts are proceeding with the organization of a new society at Lawrence; the organizing president is Steven Parker, an SAR. The State Conference will be held at Lawrence, 13-14 March.

Following her attendance at the State Convention in Topeka last April, this officer attended National Convention of C.A.R. for installation at Mt. Vernon. She also attended SAR National Convention in Tampa, Florida, where Erice Radwick, N.S. C.A.R. President, brought greetings from the National Society. This officer attended the Great Plains Regional Meeting in Minneapolis, MN, in July where Mike Ellis of the Kansas Society received the Regional Enthusiast Award. She assisted with the K.S.C.A.R. Workshop held in August in Topeka. This officer also attended the N.S.C.A.R. Boards in Washington, DC, in October and December but was forced by weather to cancel on the February meeting.

CONSERVATION

The State Conservation Project was well-supported by all Kansas Daughters! Six trees, and twelve shrubs were donated to, and planted, at the Ensenhower Center, near the entrance of the Chapel in Abilene, Kansas. A dedication ceremony was held there on September 17, 1986 during the Eisenhower Pilgrimage. The cost of the project was \$912.87, and \$1,116.00 was received from chapters and individuals for this worthwhile project. This chair-

man wishes to thank all benefactors and to congratulate each chapter for their support.

Each chapter was asked to undertake a project relating to water, primarily the restoration of historic waterways, and for providing safe and pure water supplies. Forty-one programs were presented on Conservation, with many pertaining to water conservation. The State Conservation Award was presented to Mary Wade Strother for outstanding work with water conservation, and for researching the Smoky Hill rural flooding issue in the Saline Basin.

A total of 1924 trees were planted by Kansas Daughters, and 337 shrubs, as well, One hundred seventy-two pounds of wildflower seed was distributed or planted. And can you believe that 22,586 pounds of bird seed was donated by DAR members! That's over 10 TONS!! Great work, ladies. Let's top that next year.

It's truly rewarding to know that Kansas is Conservationminded. It must take the conscious effort of each member to continue the work of Conservation.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

The Eisenhower Pilgrimage September 17 at Abilene was the highlight of Constitution Week in Kansas. Plans made by our State Regent and carried out by various chairmen gave appropriate tribute to the United States President who signed the first Constitution Week proclamation.

Chapters arranged for proclamations to be signed by mayors in 62 cities. The State Regent, State Treasurer, State Historian and this Chairman were present when the Governor signed a state proclamation.

Publicity from the chapters is well received by newspapers with 884%" reported in 104 articles, 9 pictures and 16 editorials. Spot announcements of 2,233 on TV aired for 244 minutes. Radio spots totaled 712 covering 381 minutes. A special taped interview with the Chairman was aired 3 times on Constitution Day by the Abilene station.

Chapters arranged displays at 10 banks, 30 libraries, 26 stores, 45 schools, 8 miscellaneous locations and on 8 marquees.

Constitution programs were given in 48 chapters, 44 schools, and to Scouts and Women's organizations as requested.

Patriotic literature purchased from the National Defense Office totaled 5,475 pieces with 230 pieces from private companies.

Ministers in 5 churches preached sermons and 21 churches noted the Constitution Week in their bulletins.

The Dodge City Chapter report was judged the best due to their numerous activities and publicity. Six chapters failed to report and Regents are requested to help secure 100% next year.

The DAR Good Citizens Contest is based on the individual's leadership, dependability, patriotism, service and personal accomplishments. The competition is very great and difficult to judge because of the excellence of the entries.

There were 153 schools contacted and 103 schools participating with 51 chapters sending entries.

First place winner was Mike Fiegel of Ness City, Kansas, Courtney-Spalding Chapter, sponsor. Second place winner was Johnny Gaffney, Anthony, Kansas, Martha Vail Chapter, sponsor and third place winner was Carl Carter of Overland Park, Kansas, Mission Hills Chapter, sponsor.

The chapter chairmen responded 100%. Chapters honored their DAR Good Citizens with teas, luncheons, 16 Washington Landmark books, 5 Pillars of Patriotism books were given to their contestants and others gave monetary gifts, bonds, pens, flags and roses. Pins and certificates were given to each Good Citizen student.

The judges who selected the winners were Mrs. Harold Myers, Shawnee Mission and Mrs. Thomas Rodgers, Kansas City, Kansas.

Additional ads during the year include a full page ad as a Memorial for Mrs. Decker from her Kansas friends which will be in the March 1987 issue. Individual ads placed during the year by five other chapters brings the year's total to \$2,380.00. Only thirteen chapters did not participate.

It has been a pleasure to work with the members of the chapters. The past chairman of this committee has gone the long mile and handled completely the placing of the two ads for Mrs. Decker. I appreciate all the work this involved and wish to thank Mrs. Theis for her continuing work for this committee. Her help and guidance when I took over is also much appreciated.

DAR MUSEUM

This year 65 chapters reported. Eight chapters reported giving programs on the DAR Museum while 11 chapters reported programs on other museums. Four chapters reported Docents giving programs. Fourteen chapters had materials available at the chapter meetings.

Fifty-nine chapters reported \$98 given to the Museum General Fund. Other contributions were as follows: Cataloging Fund 4 chapters — \$7, State Room Fund and Chapel 17 chapters — \$26, Museum Library Fund 8 chapters — \$10.35. Three Arts of Independence books were reported as being purchased.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP

Information on rules for National and State Scholarships was sent to all 65 Kansas Chapters by way of the fall packets which each chapter Regent received. This information was given to 47 high schools and 7 colleges.

Kansas DAR Chapters contributed \$616 to scholarships, \$263 for National and \$353 for State.

Kansas winner of the NSDAR American History Scholarship is Kevin Michael Joe Keller, Salina, sponsored by Mary Wade Strother Chapter. He plans to attend Kansas State University to prepare himself for teaching American History. Karla Ross, Mankato, sponsored by Desire Toby Sears Chapter, is the KSDAR Scholarship winner. She is enrolled at Kansas State University and plans to obtain a Bachelor of Science degree in Interior Design. The E.M. Hill Kessler Scholarship is placed with Corinne Louise Donahue, Frankfort, sponsored by Arthur Barrett Chapter. She

plans to enter Kansas State University, major field, Institutional Management. The Merritt and Pendleton Scholarships were not given this year.

Judges for the Scholarship Awards are intensely interested in students: Dr. Andy Tompkins, superintendent of the El Dorado School System, U.S.D. 490; Professor Lester Nixon, head of the English Department at Butler County Community College before he retired; Miss Helen Case, has spent many years in the classroom at all levels, elementary through high school, an instructor in American History and Social Sciences, at present serving her third term on the school board of U.S.D. 490.

Only one chapter in the state reported no activity — let us make it 100% in 1988.

DAR SCHOOL

We all agree the education of the youth of our Country is of upmost importance. There is no better way for members of the DAR to show their belief than the support of our DAR approved schools.

A questionnaire was included in each Chapter Regents packet. I am happy to say, every Chapter in our Kansas State Society returned the questionnaires. Even if no activity has taken place of this committee in your chapter, we were happy that you return ed the questionnaire.

Interest in the DAR schools has been proven by the amount of money donated, boxes of clothing and number of soup labels sent to the schools. Some chapters reported in detail on the schools, with two chapters having entire programs on the schools.

Some chapters reported, with regrets, that inflation had affected incomes of some members and donations were not as large from these chapters as in some years. However, the interest is still there.

Cash donations of \$3,779.14 were given through the chapters, 8518 soup labels and many articles of clothing were also donated.

One chapter reported that they have a "weigh-in" at the Christmas meeting. The proceeds are sent to the schools.

I urge every member to familiarize yourself with work the DAR schools are doing.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

Votoran Patient chairmen and their chapters have been busy this past year. 3,494 hours were given directly to the Veteran Patient in hospitals and nursing homes. Personal contact with these Veterans can never be measured in dollars and cents. Over \$400 was spent on parties alone. Many gifts were given which could not be placed on a statistical reporting sheet. There were baseball

tickets, cupcakes to every patient in a hospital, coffee served and paid for, everyday, in a ward, by DAR ladies, hours of backbreaking toil as well as money and effort for plantings around a patio of a newly built nursing care unit, money and time spent on a summer carnival for Veteran Patients, and 3,470 stamped Christmas Cards. On the balance sheet, all this adds up to love and care.

The KSDAR had a South Central divisional winner for the outstanding DAR Service for Veteran Patient Award. Mrs. Joseph Woodson (Nelda) of the Martha Vail Chapter was not only our State winner but also our South Central Division winner. She will be honored at the Veteran Patient Luncheon on April 22, 1987 at Continental Congress.

As volunteers our motto is: Smile, it may be contagious!

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. Douglas Kocher

Forty-five chapters reported through the State Regent's and Flag Chairman's questionnaire. Reports indicate that we are doing well in the presentation of flags and flag codes. Also, the majority of the chapters open their meetings with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Both the Dodge City Chapter and Four Winds Chapter deserve special recognition for the many projects honoring our Flag and for the extensive publicity of these events. Neodesha, Little Osage Trail and Randolph Loving Chapters are also to be commended for their efforts in promoting the Flag.

All chapters are encouraged to speak out on the proper handling and display of the Flag and to promote its history through radio, television and newspaper.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS Mrs. R. G. Swenson

Fifteen chapters contribued 591 original pages of source material: Abilene, Arthur Barrett, Dodge City, Emporia, General Edward Hand, Isabella Welden, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, Lois Warner, Oceanus Hopkins, Polly Ogden, Tomahawk, Topeka, Uvedale, Wyandot and William Wlson. Of this 93 pages were a Bibliography of Source Records on American Indians, which is the special project for this year. One volume of 166 pages of Miscellancous Records were bound for the Kansas State Historical Library and another for the State DAR Library. Along with the Miscellaneous Records, 135 pages of a survey of Cemetery Records of Butler County and a 49 page book on the Bunn Family History, plus the Bibliography on American Indian Source Records were sent to the NSDAR Library. Since my report was sent in I have

mailed to the NSDAR Library 115 pages of Miscellaneous Records and have had same bound for the Kansas State Historical and KSDAR Libraries. During the year \$110.00 were contributed to the National Records Binding Fund, 310 hours were spent in field experience and 17 workshops were held.

HONOR ROLL

Special thanks goes to Mrs. Ron Smith of Lone Elm chapter, Mrs. David Carpenter of John Haupt chapter, and Mrs. Richard McEntire of the Topeka chapter for locating the contestants for the JAC contest. Mrs. Carpenter and Mrs. McEntire have been awarded the Thatcher pin and certificate.

Forty-one flags were reported given. Desire Toby Sears chapter honored their winner from last year at their Flag Day celebration.

The contest had seventy-seven entrants of the eighty youth registered. We have no actual JAC clubs but produced nine winners to send to the district contest. Due to the budget and meal expenses, it was elected to present awards to the JAC state contest winners in their own region with the family and friends and perhaps classmates to watch and share their awards.

The winners were: third grade — poster, Toni Carpenter; eighth grade — poster, Holly Urbam; poem, Matt Henry; essay, Ann Jones; and stamp, David Tuttle; and seventh grade — poem, Susan Hovorka; essay, Kerry Book; stamp, Kierston Stadler; and family tree, Cindy Glotzbach. Cindy received an extra award for her hours of research.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

The State Vice Chairman in Charge of Contest, Mrs. John McGuire III, reports Mrs. Thomas Wall, Dedee, has been selected as Outstanding Junior. She will be honored during the Junior Breakfast at Continental Congress.

Continued cooperation is needed from the chapters to update the computer list at National for Juniors, by adding or deleting birthdates of new Juniors and non-Juniors respectively. Appreciation is given to all the Chapters who have supplied their lists.

Thank you to all the 'Golden Girls' who donated items to the Country Store Bazaar. Your generosity helps make all the projects of the Junior Membership successful.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

Each Kansas chapter responded through the State Regent's report form. About half of the local chairmen sent their report on their activities, indicating that local chapters preferred cooperating with a library or genealogical society with a workshop. Seven local chapters sponsored a workshop with approximately 190 attendance.

The attendance at the National Lineage Workshop at the Continental Congress last year was 6, and 4 are planning to attend in 1987.

The local chairmen reported receiving 259 requests for assistance, with 10 requests being sent to the Lineage Research Office at NSDAR.

There was a total 259 requests received by the 65 Chapter Chairmen in Kansas with 53 new members acquired. A total of 5 volunteers are eligible to receive the Volunteer's Pin.

For the first year for this State Chairman, it is hoped to improve the assistance to each chapter chairman.

MEMBERSHIP

MEMBERSHIP POWER is the theme of this Committee for the current term. The emphasis focuses on innovative ways to attract and help new members.

One Chapter, Randolph Loving of Wichita, sent in a most interesting report which will be sent to NSDAR. Their effort to help prospective members evolved into a "buddy" system where each prospective member found she had a helping friend in the Chapter who had been through the process which is sometimes bewilder-

ing to a beginner. One member helped by bringing her Notary Scal so papers could be witnessed and another took papers out to be copied so the Applications could be completed. New members were welcomed and given something to do that would make them feel a part of the Chapter from the beginning. The Membership Chairman, Mrs. Harold Stephans and the Regent, Mrs. Harold Ottaway, are to be congratulated on their report.

All 65 Chapters reported. 19 Chapters reported an increase in membership and 28 reported a decrese. 168 applicants received assistance and 788 pieces of DAR material were distributed to prospective members.

Eunice Sterling Chapter admitted 22 members by application. The greatest percentage of increase in the three membership categories were John Athey 15%, Wyandot 8%, and General Edward Hand 2.88%.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION

Members express their interest in excellent and worthwhile television and motion pictures in numerous ways. They have contacted television stations, magazines and video-cassette dealers to protest X-rated features. Some areas have no movie theaters and one chapter helped on fundraising to keep the local theater in operation.

Members taped good all-family programs on VCR's to share with family and friends. Other members use videotape equipment for training on their teaching jobs and for taping and showing school activities weekly.

One member and students were on a television program highlighting "Say No to Drugs."

Some turn off the undesired or watched only worthy programs or movies. All members are encouraged to PROTEST or PRAISE the programs, as individuals.

"United we stand" (against pornography and violence), or "Divided we fall" (and our country with us).

NATIONAL DEFENSE

With the help of our State Regent we achieved 100 per cent reporting on National Defense. Kansas reported an increase in paid subscriptions to the National Defender, ROTC medals presented, cash contributions to the ROTC Award Program, and contributions to Dollars For Defense. Kansas also reported an increase in daughters holding elective and appointive public office.

The leading topic of greatest interest to our members continues to be the Strategic Defense Initiative, followed by illegal aliens and education.

Your state chairman has arranged for a seminar in Kansas City on April 4 with General Daniel Graham covering all aspects of the Strategic Defense Initiative and the importance of deployment.

PROGRAM

Considering the fact that we had a revised program guide for 1986-87 and that many chapters went to press using the program outline guide distributed at Continental Congress: I thought you Kansas Daughters did very well and I sent all chapter yearbooks to the National Chairman for ribbon judging. All chapters used program guide for preparing their yearbooks. I believe there was a misunderstanding in regard to entering the contests for use of theme in program title and conservation of printing costs because 33 chapters said they entered but the chairman of the South Central Division to whom you were to send your entries said she received only 16, she rated Martha Loving Ferrell and Captain Jesse Leavenworth as very good on theme and Flores del Sol and Marv Wade Strother as good. Nathan Edson on conservation of printing costs. Twenty one chapters ordered material from National; forty nine stressed the Bicentennial and fifty-three read all or portions of the constitution at each meeting. I was impressed with the idea that William Wilson chapter has been doing - they make a recording of the one minute statements "We the People" heard each day on their local TV station in observance of the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States of America and then read and discuss at each meeting.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

DAR publicity is alive and booming in our 65 chapters. The publication of 908 articles and 148 photographs gave a total of 5,448 inches of news coverage. Area radio stations aired 427 minutes in 147 programs and 290 spot announcements. Television coverage included 68 spot announcements giving a total of 275 minutes.

Twelve feature stories were reported. Nine of these stories were received and sent to the Division National Vice Chairman. One feature story was sent to NSDAR headquarters for posting.

Community activities in which members participated included taking a history class to Naturalization Court, attendance at naturalization proceedings, participation in flag presentations, distribution of Flag Facts at scout meetings, a program on Indian Trails in Kansas, attendance at Santa Fe Trail marker dedications, distribution of Flag bookmarks and making genealogical packets and posters available in libraries.

Constitution Week brought proclamations, chapter programs, displays in stores, schools and banks and the distribution of Constitution booklets to high school students.

American History Month was marked by bookstore displays, proclamations and awards teas. It was gratifying to receive reports of the attendance of students, parents, teachers and superintendents at the meetings at which the American History Essay winners and DAR Good Citizens were recognized.

SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER Mrs. Tommie J. Crispino

As chairman of the Seimes Microfilm Center I was delighted after the fall tour to open my mail box each day and discover there a message from some previously unknown DAR member to me. Some days messages were more plentiful than others. I was thrilled with the response from over the state as chapter after chapter advised me of their chapter chairman's name and address or as in some cases, with the information that the Regent, bless her, would do the necessary work.

Messages picked up again in December and early January as reports trickled in with the amounts of contributions the chapters could manage this year for Seimes. A dollar here, two dollars there may not seem like mcuh but with 65 chapters totaled together, we managed to contribute \$377.00 to the Seimes Microfilm work this year.

One \$100.00 gift was a life membership from the Courtney-Spalding Chapter at Hays honoring Katherine Rogers and Jean Cain, jointly. A second \$100.00 gift was in memory of Mrs. John B. Heffelfinger, past State Corresponding Secretary, given by the Newton Chapter. General Edward Hand Chapter donated \$20.00 to the National Chairman's Project. All other monies were undesignated. Four chapters had programs on the Center and one member reported using the Center during Continental Congress. There were 36 chapter chairmen for this committee while five chapters reported no contribution or activity. 65 chapters giving \$377.00 averages \$5.80 per chapter.

TRANSPORTATION AND SAFETY Mrs. Carroll D. Taylor

Emphasis this term has been placed on Transportation. Thanks, to the SUNFLOWERS of Kansas, The SUNFLOWER EXPRESS (Bus) traveled to Continental Congress again last year. This was our SECOND successfully completed trip. Seven chapters were represented and most assure these chapters have had a new dimension added to them.

Kansans are all aware of our new seat-belt law and this has been stressed in our meetings. Car pooling has been used successfully for our membership. Three chapters have partcipated in travel for school children and have sponsored safety programs. Seven chapters had most interesting and inventive programs: Some with traffic patrolmen and others conducted safe driving tests. One chairman attended a Driver Improvement Program using American Automobile Association material and she received a certificate. Safety Tips at regular meetings were used by most chapters. Window displays were promoted.

REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL SPECIAL COMMITTEES

BED AND BREAKFAST

I love to travel and have seen the Bed and Breakfast services advertised but have not stayed there. It sounded so interesting that I accepted the chairmanship.

It was not until after State Conference, that I received some information from National. Their plan is to collect hostesses from the chapters in each state and list them with their state chairman. When a member plans a trip and wants to know of a B&B in another state, the member contacts her state chairman with her request. The state chairman then sends the member the name and address of the State Chairman in the state the member wishes to visit. The member contacts that State Chairman to get information on B&B's where she plans to travel. The member then con tacts the individual place where she wants to go and makes her own arrangements as to price, accommodations and so on.

Only five members have sent me their chapter chairman. Two members offered their homes and two requests for services.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP SALES

The only national fund raising project of the Junior Membership Committee is the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. The formation of this project was approved in 1938 at Continental Congress. The fund was named in the memory of the daughter of Mrs. William H. Pouch, Honorary President-General and the first National Chairman of the Junior Membership Committee. It reflects the emphasis that the National Society puts on education. These expenses at the DAR schools are paid by the Junior's fund raising efforts: Junior Library Accreditation, dental and eye care and the nurse's salary at KDS and medical scholarships, the art teacher's salary and art supplies at Tamassee.

Part of the fund raising efforts are the sale of insignia notepaper and other approved items. In 1986, nineteen chapters met honor roll requirements by purchasing junior sale items. Fifteen other chapters purchased items but didn't fulfill honor requirements. A total of \$198.75 was contributed to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund through the purchase of junior sale items.

REPORTS OF NATIONAL VICE CHAIRMEN SOUTH CENTRAL DIVISION

DAR MAGAZINE

South Central Division consists of Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana, and Arkansas. Reports received from these State Chairmen included the following information.

Kansas' 65 Chapters responded -100% reporting. 43 met the 25% subscription requirement for Honor Roll. The State Chairman reported an increase in subscriptions. A more detailed report appears elsewhere in this Proceedings.

Oklahoma sent the most informative report: 36 Chapters have 684 subscriptions; 26 made the Honor Roll; there were 70 new subscriptions. Louisiana have 41 out of 55 Chapters 75% meeting Honor Roll Requirements; 100% reporting. Chapters were divided into two categories: more than 100 members and less than 100 members. Award Certificates were given to the three highest percentiles over 35%. Good reports were received from Texas and Missouri, but were not as detailed.

Kansas Chapter Mission Hills had 100% subscriptions; Louisiana Chapter D'Arbonne had 75%; and Oklahoma Prairie Chapter had 61%.

All subscribers will receive the special issue celebrating the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States of America.

This Vice Chairman has forwarded to the National Chairman

of this Committee and to the Magazine Office suggestions from the State Chairmen including requests for an earlier delivery of the magazine, and of the print-outs of subscribers.

BICENTENNIAL OF THE CONSTITUION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Miss Virginia Weisgerber

Statements concerning establishment of the National Commission on the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States of America are a part of this Report. After establishment of the Commission by Act of Congress, September 1983, and after the June 1985 appointments — by the President and Congress — of the Chairman Warren E. Burger and the remaining 31 members, the Commission met during 1985-1986 — to issue reports on the purpose, determining headquarters and funding, and framework of observances.

In June 1986 the proposed plan for NSDAR celebration of the Bicentennial was presented and accepted by the Executive Board. Subsequently, the NSDAR plan was submitted to the Commission which received and approved it with gratitude and congratulations, July 1986.

The National Chairman, Mrs. Gavin B. Barr, did not have the usual time, to give to the Society the necessary plans she had in mind, the ones that would do justice to the importance of the occasion. She eventually presented a beautiful packet of inspiration and suggestions, followed by additional information.

This Division Chairman, anticipating problems, sent letters of cncouragement to the six chairmen in the Division and answered any questions. Reports were sent from all six State Chairmen, who graciously responded quite well to the comprehensive questionnaire, sent by Mrs. Barr. All chapters would be proud of the summary Report which the Division Chairman sent to Mrs. Barr. The first phase of the Celebration continues until after September 17, 1987, and is a part of next year's Report. Mrs. Barr will send directions concerning the NSDAR 1988 celebration: "The Ratification of the Constitution and Bill of Rights."

All observations are the educational approach in which "We the People" in the United States will better know that the Constitution of the United States of America has guided and served the National for the past 200 years.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

[As amended March 16, 1986]

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Objects

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas.

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To chorish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No state officer, except the State Librarian, shall be eligible to two consecutive terms in the same office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelec

tion to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has screed two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from

the same chapter.

Section 3. Terms. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference

when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her dutice for a continuous period of six months or lenger automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board of Management Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after its election and no later than November first, to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before

January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall provide at all meetings of the

State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the Conference Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, cond to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committees and of any other appointoes. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform

those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious scrvices as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar, hold a memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kanaa Society, the State Board of Management, and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen, and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material, to edit, and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Recording Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than six months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the

Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing. Honorary State Regents and the National Of ficers whose membership is within the State of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days provious to the date designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. Before January first, she shall send to each Chapter Regent three crediential blank forms and three forms for reporting chapter officers. Before Continental Congress each year, she shall send to the Organizing Secretary General a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapters made into a directory form. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the State Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and the Organizing Regent in organizing new chapters. She shall ascertain the possibilities of organizing a new chapter where a new chapter is contemplated. She shall be responsible for correspondence relative to the organization of new chapters. She shall give assistance to existing chapters in sustaining

their membership quota as required by the National Society.

Section 8. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds for the Society. She shall disbured those funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and counter-

signed by the State Recording Secretary. Upon assuming the duties of her office, she may, with the approval of the Executive Committee, transfer funds to a convenient, federally insured banking institution; this action shall be ratified at the next meeting of the State Board of Management. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a public accountant in time to have the auditor's report for the annual State Conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall pass them on to her successor.

Section 9. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep the card files of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include: name, including maiden name in full and, if married; husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor; spouse of ancestor, if known; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given. On or before January first, the State Registrar shall send blank forms to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceeding year. The State Registrar shall prepare and have printed a necrology list for the memorial service at State Conference.

Section 10. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 11. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books, papers, microfilm, and equipment as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all materials and equipment in the Kansas State DAR Library.

In her annual report she shall list all materials sent to the National Society Library and all materials received during the year for the Kansas State DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of the Kansas State DAR Library.

Section 12. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News", and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the Conference Press Committee. She shall send a short report of the Kansas State DAR Conference to the "DAR Magazine".

Section 13. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them from her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent-Elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the

State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and the Chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regento, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. A member holding two or more offices each carrying a vote at the annual State Conference shall be limited to vote in only one of the offices held.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately proceeding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The representation of a chapter at the annual State Conference or at any other meeting of the State Society shall be three times the representation to which the chapter is entitled in the Continental Congress and shall be as follows:

Section 6. Alternates. The number o	f alternates elected by a chapter	shall not
exceed twice the number of voters to	which the chapter is entitled.	

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after the election, the three credential blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at the meeting of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privilege of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the

state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$2.50 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of December. A member whose dues are not paid by January first shall not be a delegate to the State Conference. The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after May first shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee not to exceed five dollars, such sum to be given to the hostess district to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee, composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary, and three members appointed by the State Regent, shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget, as approved by the State Board of Management, shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Kansas DAR Scholarship. The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members of be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals and from interest on monies invested for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee, composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Vice Regent, and the State Recording Secretary, shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairman of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee, consisting of a Chairman from the membership of the State at-large and four members from the membership of the hostess chapters, shall be appointed by the State Regent and shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary, the State Treasurer, and the State Registrar shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Public Relations. The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an exofficio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent, shall prepare a condensed report, not exceeding 200 words. These reports shall be

typed in triplicate, one copy for the State Regent and two for the Recording Secretary and sent not later than March first each year. These reports covering the year's work, shall be prepared for the State Conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. Each State Chairman shall send to the State Regent, not later than March first of each year, a copy of the statistical report prepared for the National Chairman or Vice Chairman. This information will be used by the State Regent in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be published in the summer issue of the Kansas DAR News or shall be sent by the District Director to the District Chapters, State Officers and State Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each district shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The term of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three years.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office by the June meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year, the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary, on forms furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three legible typewritten lists or one original and two eligible photocopies of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter will send a postal card to the State Chairman of each National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January thirtieth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter. it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State

Conference at which it is adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES

Number 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Annual Report and Proceedings of the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The report shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; State Officer, 1 to 3 each; Chapter Regents, 1 each, another if requested; National Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National and State Committees, 1 each; Senior State President, C.A.R., 1; District Directors, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2; the President General, 1; The Kansas State Historical Society, 1; the Presidents of the State Officers' Club, Chapter Regents' Club, and State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In an election year, one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

Number 2. No less than two issues of the Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.

Number 3. The State Registrar shall assist the editor of the Kansas DAR News a current mailing list.

Number 4. A sum of \$1,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

Number 5. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

Number 6. Twenty-five dollars shall be allotted to the Kansas delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

Number 7. Fifty dollars shall be alloted to the State Regent for the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

Number 8. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

Number 9. A sum equal to five cents per chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be used for the C.A.R. projects.

Number 10. KSDAR shall place a \$30.00 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR Magazine if no other Kansas advertising is available.

Number 11. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund and \$.05 per member to the KSDAR Library.

Number 12. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send, on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers, to the Chairman of the Membership Committee, and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

Number 13. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent, and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

Number 14. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

Number 15. The State Regent shall have the State Regent's pin appraised by the J. E. Caldwell Company once during her administration, and if the pin is lost the State Society shall assume the cost of replacing it.

Number 16. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G. and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

- (a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.
- (b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books and shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive and answer all requests for loan of books.
- (c) Rental of \$15 $\overline{0}$ per year shall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library.

(d) The materials submitted to the KSDAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. Donors are asked to check with the librarian before presentation to avoid duplication.

Number 17. An Endowment Fund for the DAR Library has been established.

Number 18. The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship is to be given once in each KSDAR Administration to a high school senior who is entering a two or four year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of National Defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity, and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Chairman, the State National Defense Chairman, and the State Regent.

Number 19. A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school senior who has DAR eligibility.

Number 20. The Lena Fry Merritt Daughters of the American Revolution Scholarship is to be awarded at least once in each DAR administration according to the guidelines of the Lena Fry Merritt Scholarship Committee.

Number 21. State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and the honorary officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

Number 22. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session of the State Conference to approve the minutes of the session.

Number 22. The entertainment of the following persons, if attending the State Conference at the invitation of the State Regent, shall be a Conference expense: candidates for President General; National Officers or National appointees appearing as speakers; representatives of the DAR Schools, Approved Schools, or Indian Schools.

Number 24. Two members of the National Board of Management may be invited by the State Regent to attend the State Conference as guests of the Conference.

Number 25. (a) A \$10.00 limit shall be placed on prizes awarded at the State Conference. Any chapter that has won first place three years consecutively shall be ineligible to compete for three consecutive years.

(b) Interest accrued annually from the Mary Lempenau Permanent Trust Fund of \$750.00 beginning in 1987 be used to pay monetary prizes at State Conference with no prize exceeding \$10.00.

Number 26. The Runner-Up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an appropriate gift as an award.

Number 27. The Kansas Society shall present the State Regent

a Past State Regent's Pin at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

Number 28. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Pin at the close of the State Conference.

Number 29. In the event that KSDAR should have a national winner in any NSDAR youth competition in which the winner is required to attend Contintenal Congress, the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the award.

Number 30. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for members or spouses of members of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests at functions sponsored by

the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

Number 31. A pilgrimage to an historically significant Kansas site shall be held annually on Constitution Day, September 17th. If the date is changed, it shall be during Constitution Week as near the 17th as possible, and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Constitution Week Chairman, and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the pilgrimage.

Number 32. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before March first by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, sub-

ject to the approval of the State Regent.

Number 33. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

Number 34. An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings, and other pertinent historical information will be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings decennially beginning in 1980.

Number 35. A Directory of members will be printed every ten years beginning in 1990.


Number 36. The Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship shall provide a college scholarship for a girl graduating from high school. The recipient of this scholarship shall have acceptable scholastic ability, show financial need, be a citizen of the United States of America, and be eligible for membership in the DAR. This award is to be given once in each KSDAR administration.

If the two rooms at the Shawnee Mission in Fairway, Kansas, formerly supported by the KSDAR are again maintained and refurbished by the Kansas Daughters, the interest from this fund shall be used for these purposes and take precedence over the

scholarship fund.
