The funeral services were held in the Seelye home for close friends and relatives. This home had been opened to chapter members many times and was opened to the DAR who attended the Eisenhower Pilgrimage after the renovation of the home.

She is survived by a sister, Helen R. Seelye, and two adopted grandsons, Terry and Jerry Tietjens, and other relatives.

"Miss Marion", as she was affectionately called, will be missed by her family, chapter members and the Kansas Society.

#### AIR TERRORISM

Whereas, The December 21 bombing of Pam Am Flight 103 over Scotland that killed 270 people is still unsolved; and

Whereas, In committee hearings in the US House of Representatives recently congressmen and relatives of those killed in the airline bombing urged that more money be spent on high-tech equipment to detect bombs in luggage; and

Whereas, This perilous problem is enhanced by weapons that X-

rays can not detect; and

Whereas, It is estimated that 50 percent of international travel by US citizens is on foreign airlines which the US is unable to control; and

Whereas, Federal Aviation Administration officials say that US airlines have greatly increased security measures for foreign flights since the bombing, such as all checked baggage is X-rayed, additional measures prevent access to luggage or planes by unauthorized persons, and more passengers are randomly selected to have suitcases actually opened by inspectors;

RESOLVED, That members of the Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, support development of new technology for bomb detection, especially for plastic explosives such as those investigators believe were planted aboard Flight 103, and also support airline officials and members of Congress who want increased security imposed on foreign carriers flying into the US.

#### REAFFIRMATIONS

All past resolutions of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution are in effect unless rescinded.

RESOLVED, That the following resolutions be reaffirmed:

(1) ELECTRONIC BUSINESSES 1987, 1988

Continue to voice concern over the US threatened loss of leadership for foreign countries, especially to Japan, in the field of electronic businesses—the manufacture and sale of computers, components, discs, etc.

(2) CONSTITUTION CONVENTION RESOLUTION IN STATE LEGISLATURES 1988

Immediately urge Kansas legislators to call for withdrawal of the resolution which threatens the Constitution of the United States.

(3) OUR NATIONAL ANTHEM 1988

Oppose recent legislation that would replace "The Star Spangled-Banner" with the song "America the Beautiful."

(4) WATER CONSERVATION 1985, 1986, 1987, 1988

Continue urgently to impress upon local, county, state, and nationally elected officials that our nation is in a water crisis and that America's precious resource is in peril and that water conservation legislation be encouraged.

## REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

#### STATE REGENT

Mrs. Joseph R. Riden, Jr.

Three years may seem like a long time, but to the State Regent they have passed all too quickly.

At the beginning of the third year in office your Regent attended the C.A.R. State Meeting in Wichita. After State Conference last year, she was a guest at the District of Columbia State conference and the Maine State Conference in Portland.

Before leaving for Continental Cognress, the official visit to Esther Lowrey Chapter was made. After the Friday night Banquet at Continental Congress, it was announced by the Kemper Associates that your State Regent was running for the office of Curator General in 1989. This is an honor to the State Society.

Eleven official chapter visits were completed in May and June. One of the most interesting visits was to Desire Tobey Sears Chapter in Mankato. On a beautiful summer evening, we traveled by caravan to a ranch where the owner had a collection of windmills - some were new and some had been restored. This was a very different and interesting chapter program.

Your Regent went to Topeka in June for the signing of the Proclamation for the "21 Day Salute to Honor America" by the Governor at his office.

In June your Regent went to Clinton, Missouri to the grave marking of Mrs. Clarence W. Kemper, past Chaplain General.

The last half of June and all of July and August your Regent was in Pennsylvania comforting her mother through her last illness. Your Regent kept in touch with the Kansas Daughters by telephone and letter.

Immediately after returning to Kansas, the Regent's Master Questionnaire was prepared and ready to distribute at the Fall District Meetings.

Attendance was very good again at the District Meetings in September. The Pilgrimage to Fort Scott (a fully restored frontier fort) was on a beautiful September day. We heard what it was like to live on a frontier fort. Following the Northwest District meeting in Council Grove, there was a rededication of the Madonna of the Trail Monument. Money was collected during the meeting to help pay for the needed repairs. The monument has withstood its sixty years very well. Kansas should be proud to have a Madonna of the Trail Monument.

The District Meetings went an extra day and ended on a high note with the dedication of an Historical marker at the Mahaffie Farmstead and Stagecoach Stop in Olathe. This was a stagecoach stop on the Santa Fe Trail from 1865 to 1869. The beautiful marker with a stagecoach at the top was made possible by the Regents'

Roundtable of Johnson and Wyandotte Counties and the city of Olathe. An outdoor luncheon was served on the Farmstead grounds after the dedication.

Before leaving for the October Board Meeting in Washington your Regent made four more official chapter visits and was able to share the slides of the NSDAR Museum State Rooms with several of the chapters.

The last week in October your Regent attended DAR functions in Lexington and Paris, Kentucky and Knoxville and Nashville, Tennessee. On the way back to Kansas, a visit was made to Bacone College in Muskogee, Oklahoma, where your Regent met members of Martha Vail Chapter for a tour of the campus.

In November and December visits were made to twelve chapters. Between September and January your Regent traveled over 5000 miles inside Kansas. With one chapter visit in January and two in February, the official visits to all sixty-three chapters were completed. Council Oak was the first chapter visited in 1986 and Sarah Steward was the last chapter to be visited. Your State Regent found the chapter visits most rewarding and were well worth the thousands of miles of travel in Kansas.

Many of the chapters contributed to the State Regent's Project - the Library Endowment Fund of the KSDAR Library in Dodge City. The interest from the Endowment Fund is used by the Library Committee. Over one thousand dollars was given to the State Regent's Project by the chapters, districts and individuals. Your Regent is very grateful that the chapters supported the project so generously.

The use of the Regents Master Questionnaire made 100% reporting possible for the third year. The Chapter Regents are to be thanked for their participation and cooperation.

This past week the office of the Treasurer General informed us that the Kansas Society had contributed 100% to the President General's Project - "Pipes and Drum". Fifty-seven of the sixty-three chapters were 100%. Contributions from individuals at Continental Congress the past three years has helped to give us the 100% participation. Kansas Daughters should be proud that they have helped to preserve our buildings. With proper maintenance they should remain in good repair for many years to come.

The up-dating of "The History of the DAR in Kansas, 1944 through 1986" was accomplished in this administration through the efforts of the State Historian, Mrs. Harold B. Myers and Mrs. Woodrow W. Dew.

In February your Regent attended the National Board Meeting in Washington and was a guest at a reception given by the District of Columbia Society in honor of the President General, Mrs. Raymond Franklin Fleck, and her Executive Board. Your Regent also traveled to Dallas in late February for several DAR functions.

Before your Regent leaves office in April at Continental Congress, she will be a hostess at Rosalie, the antebellum Mansion in Natchez, Mississippi. Rosalie is owned by the Mississippi State Society.

Your State Regent urges each chapter member to think membership. As an organization we need to be more attuned to the changing times. Women today have so many demands on their time with career and home competing that there isn't much time for anything else. We must be sure that DAR will continue to be worth their time.

# Report of the Auditor

I have examined the statement of recorded receipts, disbursements, and cash balances of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution as of January 31, 1989. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

The Society's policy is to prepare its financial statement on the

basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statement is not intended to present financial position in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In my opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly the recorded receipts, disbursements, and cash balances of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution for the year ended January 31, 1989 on the basis of accounting described above. This basis has been applied in a manner consistent with

that of the preceding year.

The accompanying schedules are presented as additional analytical data. This information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statement mentioned above, and in my opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation of the financial statement.

Kansas Chapters - 100%. Reported were two documents and \$103.00 contributed to the American Collection; 116 adult historical programs and 5 for children; three Revolutionary Soldiers' and thirteen DAR members' graves marked. One official historic marker was placed and three were restored. James Ross Chapter contributed an 1880 Bible to Mahaffie Farmstead and Olathe Chapter participated in the "Archaeological Dig." Shawnee Mission Chapter toured historic Independence, Mo.

The "Outstanding Teacher of American History" was Barbara E. Hubert sponsored by Wichita Chapter.

Added to the file at Topeka: S.W. District minutes 1945-1982; records of the State Chairman of the Shawnee Methodist Mission; two copies of the "History of the DAR in Kansas 1944-1986;" histories by the Chapters 1965-1968 and 1968-1987; file from disbanded Phebe Dustin Chapter; two accounts of the "History of the DAR Library;" two copies "Proceedings 1987-1988;" "Guest Book/Photo Album" from Mahaffie Farmstead dedication. A photograph of the State Regent was added to the "State Picture Album."

The up-date of the "History of the DAR in Kansas, 1944-1986" was completed. All 155 copies were distributed or sold.

The program kit on "The Black Dog Trail" provided by Mrs. E. L. Wulfmeyer was used by four Chapters.

On the Fall Tour free will donations of \$259.95 were contributed toward the repair of the Madonna of the Trail Monument in Council Grove. The labor is to be donated. Any extra funds will be used to have the DAR Insignia re-engraved.

The renovation of the Johnson Cemetery, part of the original land of the Shawnee Methodist Mission in Fairway, was completed. Through the efforts of Mission Hills Chapter over \$9000.00 of the \$25,000.00 was raised from donations from DAR members and private individuals. The City of Fairway provided the balance of the funds.

The highlight of the year was the dedication of the historic marker September 17, 1988 at Mahaffie Farmstead and Stagecoach Stop on the Santa Fe Trail 1865. This was accomplished through the cooperative efforts of the eight chapters in Johnson and Wyandotte Counties and the City of Olathe.

#### STATE LIBRARIAN Mrs. Maurice B. Daniels

Chapter reporting is again 100 percent and you are to be commended for such fine reports. Fifteen dollars were donated toward the Indian Collection, and \$26.25 to the Constitution Collection of the NSDAR Library. Thirteen chapters gave books to the National Library and seven chapters also gave to the State DAR Library. A large number of chapters gave to their local libraries. Twenty seven chapters reported members using the state library and one chapter showed the slide program to 33 members.

The State Library workers are all volunteers. Those ladies assisting in the work are Margaret Cole, librarian, Marian Hurtig, treasurer, Rosemary Wilkerson, Norma Jane Daniels, Anna Lew Johnson, Phyllis Soliday, Florence Smith, Chris Pearsall, Nadine Smith, Billie Howard and Lucille Tucker. These volunteers worked well over 950 hours.

The library committee met and compiled a policy of library bylaws and standing rules and regulations. After some minor changes, this was accepted and approved by the State Officers in September, 1988. Copies were available during the Fall Tour.

With the assistance of the volunteer workers, Margaret Ann Cole has directed the revision of shelving of all books and publications. Books have been accessioned, spine markings applied and books shelved in order. Catalog cards have been prepared for each of the holdings. Accession books began with number 1, and at the present time show well over 5,000 books and publications.

This was a monumental task and I wish to express my thanks and appreciation to Mrs. Cole and her committee. Over 1275 persons registered at the library during the past year.

Items distributed throughout the State were: 1,437 flags; 1,014 flag codes; 80 American Creed cards; and 3,840 leaflets or patriotic pamphlets. Great work by the Kansas Chapters and this chairman thanks you for your contribution in making others aware of their obligation and privileges as citizens of this great country.

## CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION Mrs. Philip W. Bernstorf

The 43nd Annual State Conference of KSCAR was held in Wichita, where John Skelton was elected President. Three Kansas CAR's attended N.S.C.A.R. Convention, where John Skelton was installed as State President, Michael Ellis was installed as Vice-President for Great Plains Region and Mr. Larry Skelton was installed as Senior State President. In addition, this Chairman was installed as Senior Vice-President for the Great Plains Region and Dr. Philip W. Bernstorf was installed as an Honorary Senior Vice President of the National Society.

The Great Plains Regional Meeting was held in Wichita at the Airport Hilton Hotel, July 26-27, 1988, with Michael Ellis presiding. Kimberly Ellis was named Regional Enthusiast.

Kansas CAR workshop was held in Topeka, Kansas, August 20, 1988, with John Skelton preciding. He had chosen the sale of the Kansas Postage Stamp pins for his State Project.

Home on the Range Society is now being disbanded and Tomahawk Society is changing Senior Presidents. Kansa and Prairie Dog Societies are on a 'gold rush' for their Gold Merit Awards again this year.

This Chairman attended all five N.S.C.A.R. Board Meetings, the Mid-Southern and the Great Plains Regional Meetings, the National Convention and the Yorktown Day Celebration during the past year.

### CONSERVATION

Congratulations to all KSDAR Chapters for their continued support of all aspects of Conservation during this past year. You are

to be commended for your fine work, and glowing reports. Special emphasis was placed on water conservation, and with an extremely dry year in Kansas, this certainly made us all aware of just how precious this most-valuable resource is!

Through your efforts, 1,185 trees and 705 shrubs now shade our yards. Wildflowers have sprung up all over the place since over 79 pounds of seeds were sown this past year. Wildlife have appreciated the 3198 pounds of feed you have provided, as well as many, many fields of standing mile and maize which have been left for grazing. This must be some kind of record, and you are deserving of a pat on the back, for the 20,048 pounds of bird seed donated for our feather friends. Through your generosity, Kan sas' flora and fauna will continue to flourish.

This chairman wishes to commend Little Arkansas and Johathan Gilbert chapters for their special programs, and to James Ross, Oceanus Hopkins, Neodesha, and Capt. Jesse Leavenworth chapters for their supreme support in providing vast quan tities of bird seed. Conservation awards for best water conservation project is presented to Lois Warner chapter for their participation in county-wide water testing program. Nathan Edson chapter is presented with an award for their outstanding program on the "Effects of Drought 1988."

#### CONSTITUTION WEEK

The chapters continue to provide active and effective leadership in their communities by promoting Constitution Week awareness and observance. Displays in schools numbered 42, with libraries, museums, stores, banks, and other miscellaneous types bringing the total to 112.

Public officials proclaimed Constitution Week in 49 communities, listed this special event on 20 community calendars and 34 chapters urged the display of the Flag of the United States of America by all citizens.

The Preamble was recited by 34 chapters at meetings. Members presented 15 special programs for the community and 28 in the public schools. They were responsible for promoting 11 sermons and noting Constitution Week in 42 church bulletins.

Patriotic materials totaling 5,182 pieces were obtained and distributed by Kansas chapters. The new essay contest had 14 entrants from schools with one entry in the poster contest.

The spot announcements provided by the National Society were aired 544 times for a total of 219½ minutes on radio, and 79 spots covering 167½ minutes were used by television stations. Newspaper publicity contained 58 articles, 13 pictures and 14 editorials for a combined total of 639 inches on Constitution Week

news and events in our local communities.

The State Judges were Mr. Willard N. Bosler and Mr. Floyd A. Bosler of Kansas City, Kansas. They appreciated the opportunity to be judges and enjoyed this honor.

#### DAR MAGAZINE

Kansas will be able to say 100% reporting from all 63 chapters. Forty-two chapters met the honor roll requirement of 20% of total chapter membership subscribing to the magazine. There were over 450 new subscriptions from across the state this past year alone, which means that 37% of Kansas Daughters now subscribe to our fine magazine.

The most interesting articles are the Patriot Index, the President General's Message, National Defense and With the Chapters.

During this past year several of the chapters have submitted numerous articles for the DAR Magazine.

#### DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING Mrs. Robert H. Crowther

The State Project "Honoring our Revolutionary Ancestors" for the KSDAR Magazine Advertising Committee will be listed on ten pages in the May 1989 DAR Magazine. Overall 32% of the state membership participated resulting in 1170 members honoring 1398 ancestors. Eighty-one percent of the chapters participated (51 chapters) with another 10% contributing \$30.00 each. Of the chapters participating: twenty had fifty percent of their members listing one or more ancestors; seven had seventy-five percent of their members represented; two had 100%; one with 99% and two others were 80% or better. The presentation is divided into districts. Then each chapter is listed alphabetically with a brief history of the chapter name and date organized followed by the ancestors listed alphabetically, the state they served in, and the member's name.

The State Regent and I are very grateful for the cooperation of the chapters. Without it this could not have been done. I wish to thank Mrs. William Koulas of Shawnee Mission Chapter who helped with the proofreading.

### DAR MUSEUM

As State Chairman of the DAR Museum I am happy to report 100% reporting from all chapters in the state of Kansas. Twenty-five chapters had a program on the DAR Museum, fourteen on Period Rooms and eight chapters had programs on other museums. Thirteen of these programs were given to fulfill Honor Roll requirements. Brochures were available at chapter meetings. Fifty-eight chapters donated \$109 to the Museum General Fund and four chapters donated \$248 to the Curator General's project. Two chapters had members who donated items to museums. Fifteen Arts of Independence were purchased and fourteen of these were donated to libraries and schools. There were two individuals who became life members and five chapters donated one book and \$25 to the Museum Reference library.

#### DAR SCHOLARSHIP

The 63 chapters in the state received information on rules for National and State Scholarships in the packets which each Chapter Regent received at the fall tour. This information was given to 50 high schools and three colleges. There were eight applications for scholarships.

Kansas DAR Chapters contributed \$440.60 to scholarships, \$382.50 for National and \$58.10 for State.

Kara Heiman, Beloit, sponsored by Desire Tobey Sears Chapter of Mankato, was chosen to receive the KSDAR Scholarship of \$450. She has a 4.0 grade point average and ranks first in a class of 57 students. She will enter Washburn University in the fall, majoring in business and Communications. The Pendleton National Defense Scholarship of \$500 was awarded to Stacey Grauer of Marysville, sponsored by Arthur Barrett Chapter. She has a grade point average of 3.85 and ranks fourth in a class of 78

students. She will enter Kansas State University in the fall, majoring in business with marketing as a special area. The Kansas winner in the NSDAR American History Scholarship Award was Aaron Neumann of Ellis, sponsored by Courtney-Spalding Chapter. He will enter Fort Hays University in the fall to get a degree in history, then a law degree.

#### DAR SCHOOL

I was delighted to receive reports from all 63 chapters. \$2,268.92 was donated to Tamassee, including \$1,392.42 for the emergency fund; \$595.50 to Kate Duncan Smith, \$30 to Crossnore; \$30 to Hindman Settlement and \$7.00 to Berry College. Some chapters sent money and clothing to Bacone, but this should be reported on the American Indians report. 12,195 soup labels and 1,186 pounds of clothing and resale items were sent to the schools.

Five chapters reported giving less to the schools this year, but fourteen reported giving more. The remaining chapters reported giving the same as last year.

One chapter had a garage sale and one, a silver tea with the proceeds going to the schools.

## DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

So many chapter chairmen and Regents have worked hard keeping the welfare of the Veteran Patient an important priority. over 5000 hours were spent with Veteran Patients either in Veteran Hospitals, State and Military Hospitals or in Nursing Homes. More than 1000 hours were given to making items for Veteran Patients such as trachea bibs, lap robes, knitted items and laundry bags. Personal items were given as well as books, magazines, games and clothing for the comfort of these patients. Parties, Carnivals and various forms of entertainment have been provided in Hospitals and Nursing Homes.

Then, there have been the extra "gifts of love" that show DAR cares: A gardening project at a Nursing Home Care Unit; A V.A. Hospital received 65 plants from DAR; 12 cakes were baked for "Salute to Veterans" by DAR; cupcakes were brought for every patient to a V.A. Hospital on Flag Day; V.A. Hospital tours were given; many chapters sent money for special projects; and finally, hundreds of stamped Christmas Cards and "Stamps for the-Wounded" were given. The total: approximately \$25,000 given in labor, material and love.

We were so pleased that Nelda Woodson, past Veteran Patient

chairman and present State Reporter, received the South Central Divisional Award for Outstanding DAR Volunteer for Veteran Patients.

## THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. Douglas Kocher

Again this year, I am happy to have had 100% of the chapters reporting. Thanks to each of you who enable me to compile my statistics accordingly. Special thanks to the the 38 members who participated in the NSDAR Flagpole Contest by erecting new flagpoles.

Four chapters have gone "above and beyond" in their endeavors to carry out our national theme - "Keep the Flag Flying." They are: Jane Dean Coffey, Good-Land, Dodge City and Shawnee Mission. They are to be commended for their creativity and ingenui-

ty in promoting our flag.

The Shawnee Mission Chapter had a special honor bestowed on them this year as they became the recipients of a beautiful collection of twenty flags. These flags were donated by Dr. William F. Kuhn, former director of the Southside Sertoma Club. They depict the evolution of the American flag from Betsy Ross to our present day 50-star flag. We are indebted to member Mrs. James Early for her efforts in obtaining these flags and for promoting their history through various programs.

## GENEALOGICAL RECORDS Mrs. R. G. Swenson

Twenty one chapters contributed 1,051 original pages of source material: Abilene, Arthur Barrett, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, Cofachique, Dodge City, Emporia, Eunice Sterling, Fort Larned, Four Winds, Isabella Weldin, Little Arkansas, Lois Warner, Mary Wade Strother, Minisa, Mission Hills, Ninnescah, Prairie Rose, Tomahawk, Uvedale, William Wilson and Wyandot. Four volumes of Miscellancous Records were bound for the Kansas Historical Library and four for the KSDAR Library as well as sending the same amount to National for their binding. According to reports there have been 652 pages of source material donated to other libraries. Chapters contributed \$43.00 to the National Records Binding Fund and \$118.30 to the State. Three workshops were held this year and one chapter, Mary Wade Strother, donated a Bibliography of Indian Records.

#### HONOR ROLL

In reading the reports this year I find that the Kansas DAR is involved in many programs and objectives of the NSDAR. Five chapters received Certificates of Merit signed by President General, Mrs. Raymond Fleck. They are Good-Land, Emporia, Sagamore, Lois Warner, and Fort Larned. Four of her entrants received regional and state recognition and will compete at the National level. Those winners were Livewires 4-H Club, Julie Dunham, Cheryl Eldridge, and Lisa Oliver.

Other Chapters participating were John Haupt, of Topeka, Sagamore, Cimmaron River Valley and Fort Scott.

## JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP Miss Shirley Coupal

Kansas Juniors are Marching Together Toward Our Centennial. 31 new Juniors have joined the ranks for a total of 290. Juniors that are serving as National Vice Chairmen 1, State Chairmen 3, Chapter Regents 2, Chapter Officers 9 and Chapter Chairmen 39. A history of the Junior Membership Committee in Kansas has been compiled. This is to be included in a booklet containing other Junior State histories for the NSDAR Centennial.

Kansas was presented a certificate at Continental Congress 1988, for 100% Chapter Reporting. The State Committee has presented awards to the Chapters for Greatest Increase of Juniors, and Largest Contribution to Helen Pouch Fund.

Miss Shirley Coupal State Vice Chairman in Charge of Sales reported a profit of \$162.35 from Junior products. Bazaar profits, Chapter donations and sales total \$912.87. A special contribution for the 50th Anniversary of Helen Pouch Memorial Fund was col-

lected at the State Conference in 1988.

The State Vice Chairman in Charge of Contest, Mrs. John W. McGuire III presented Mrs. Rick Sellers (Jody), Regent of Council Oak Chapter as the 1989 Outstanding Junior Member. She also serves as State Chairman of Pages.

Deep appreciation is given to both Vice Chairmen for their efficiency and labored devotion, and to the Kansas daughters for making the Juniors shine in 1989.

### LINEAGE RESEARCH

Reports were received from 63 chapters making 100% reporting. Almost all the chapters had a chairman for lineage research. A request was received from NSDAR National Lineage Research chairman to enroll volunteers to help the chapter chairman and registrars in documenting all applications before sending to the state chairmen, thus trying to complete as many applications as possible before asking national for assistance.

A group of eight to ten people have agreed to serve the new Lineage Research Chairman in the next state administration.

A total of 348 requests were received this year. Workshops were conducted in 7 counties with an attendance of 188. From this activity there were 100 potential new members. The state chairman conducted one workshop and had ten requests for help on DAR memberships.

A number of chapters had special projects. One example is -Teaching children how to find and color their family coat of arms.

The assistance of many members and chapter chairmen are to be congratulated and thanked by this State Lineage Chairman for their cooperation and help the past 3 years.

#### MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters reported. Eighteen reported a gain in membership, Twenty-eight reported a loss, eleven remained the same, and six were incomplete so the number could not be obtained.

Membership literature distributed by Chapters was DAR in Action 49, Fact Sheet 234, DAR Policies 10, Know the DAR 110. for a total of 403 pieces.

There were no reports of Chapters using the Theme; "Membership POWER: Strengthening the Foundations of Tomorrow's Society". Some Chapter Chairmen had expressed to me they thought that the Theme was difficult to use effectively so presumably this was the reason for not using it this year.

## MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION

Thirty-one members were on television with over two and onehalf hours total time. Five members were on radio for seventy minutes. Seven chapters had slide programs; one chapter had a twenty minute video program and one chapter sponsored museum films shown to PEO, church and patriotic groups. Another chapter gave time and money to show movies at a Little Theater.

Over eighty members sent letters to television and radio stations and newspapers concerning the quality of programs and

advertising.

### NATIONAL DEFENSE

Thanks to some last minute efforts of our hard working chapter regents, Kansas achieved 100% reporting on national defense.

Thirty-six of our Kansas daughters hold elective or appointive public office, including one city mayor and the state president of the PTA. Sixty-one chapters devoted one entire program to National Defense and sixty chapters fulfilled the requirement of devoting at least five minutes to National Defense at each chapter meeting, with forty chapters usually devoting more time. Seven chapters gave \$29.00 to Dollars for Defense, this added to the \$161.00 raised at State Conference made a total of \$190.00 donated by Kansas to Dollars for Defense.

What is being taught in our schools ranked as the number one national defense concern of our members, with the Strategic Defense Inititative as a close second. Medicare and the deficit were the primary legislative concern of our members.

Your state chairman has continued giving programs on national defense to civic groups during this year and is currently working to rescind Kansas' call for a Constitutional Convention.

#### **PROGRAM**

All chapters used the program guide for preparing their year-books. They were all so great I sent all 63 to the National Chairman for Ribbon Judging. There were 42 yearbooks and 21 supplements. The results have not been received.

In the theme and conservation program the winners for theme were Good-Land, Eunice Sterling and James Ross. Conservation

of printing cost - Flores del Sol, Council Oak and Cimarron River Valley.

#### PUBLIC RELATIONS

The publication of 708 articles and 87 photos yielded 3,955 inches of publicity. A total of 14 radio programs and 581 spot announcements gave 403 radio minutes. Fourteen TV programs and 113 spot announcements totaled 134½ minutes.

The DAR story was told in the community through Constitution Week, American History Month, DAR Good Citizens. meeting, activity and proclamation signing publicity. Displays were arranged at libraries, schools and business establishments. Talks were made and DAR information displayed at genealogical workshops. Personal contact was made with members of other organizations. Flags were flown on national holidays and during the 21 day salute.

Members served as tour guides for museums, arranged historical displays and participated in patriotic and historical celebrations. markers were placed at historic sites; a Revolutionary soldier's grave was marked. A flag was provided for a veterans' memorial, flags given for a cemetery and opening and closing flag ceremonies provided for community meetings and dedications. ROTC medals were given and commissioning ceremonies attended. Veterans were entertained, their projects honored and memorial services attended. Members helped libraries with genealogical queries, participated in 4-H achievement night, had a booth at a county fair and welcomed the Santa Fe Trail Riders.

## SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER Mrs. Tommie J. Crispino

Kansas chapters reported 100% for the Seimes Microfilm Center committee, with 62 of the 63 chapters participating. Monies donated to the Center totaled \$207.00.

The Center is maintained entirely by contributions and is vital to genealogical research. We could say the future of the DAR is dependent upon the Seimes Center.

## TRANSPORTATION AND SAFETY Mrs. Carroll D. Taylor

The Transportation chairman was kept quite busy this year, thanks to the cooperation of all Kansas chapters' Transportation chairmen.

The National emphasis this year was placed on the safety for

children: in the home, in the school, and on the street. We also stressed the use of seat belts. This was demonstrated at one meeting using a six month old child. Safety programs were continued with safety tips being given at monthly meetings, along with safety pamphlets and maps. Car pooling was used successfully for our meetings.

The Bus Chairman contacted Chapters about a proposed trip to Continental Congress. We had 2 people respond. As this was not a sufficient number for us to charter our own bus, we encouraged these daughters to travel to Washington with the Missouri daughters.

## REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL SPECIAL COMMITTEES

#### BED AND BREAKFAST

Having very little response from the chapters in the state of Kansas and not enough help from national, I am very sorry to report that this is only a start for this committee. It should be very helpful to traveling members, if it can only get rolling.

There are seven Bed and Breakfast places in our state who would welcome other DAR members into their homes. There have been five requests for Bed and Breakfasts in other states. I have answered them and sent them the name and address of the state chairman in the state of their requests. Eight of the chapters have a chairman for this committee.

## BICENTENNIAL OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. Richard C. McGehee

The emphasis during this third year of the observance has been on the ratification of the Constitution. The chapters have continued the practice of reciting the preamble at meetings. Many articles have appeared in the newspapers relating to special events throughout the nation which have provided discussion information for our members.

The Kansas Daughters will long remember our observance in Dodge City during the Fall Tour in 1987. Members continued to provide leadership in community planning and observances.

#### DAR PROFESSIONAL WOMEN

I am pleased that 100% of the Chapters reported to the Friends of the Library Committee this year. There were 5 Regular donations in the amount of \$50.00. I thank all of the Chapters for their reports and generous contributions for this worthy cause.

The state of Kansas now has six Docents. They are Mrs. Phillip Bernstorf, Mrs. Keith O. Darr, Mrs. Stanley Kippenberger, Mrs. Jack Pounds, Mrs. Larry D. Ream, Mrs. Joseph R. Riden Jr., Mrs. Larry D. Ream gave one program with an audience count of fifty, and Mrs. Joseph R.Riden gave fourteen programs with an audience count of four hundred and twenty. There was four hundred dollars donated to The Friends of the Museum Committee, and the Curator General's Project.

Since the inception of the Correspondent Docent program, it has reached people interested in membership, in cash donations, and donations of artifacts, to the Curator General's fund. This year they bought a computer with the money.

The Corresponsednt Docent program reaches the general public by telling the NSDAR story through slide programs at State Fairs, other Museums, DAR Chapters, other Societies, Clubs, Television and Radio.

When 180 pinned Correspondent Docents have given four thousand four hundred and nine programs to four hundred twenty nine thousand five hundred eighty eight people not counting television and radio audiences, with less than half the available slide pro-

grams, think what can be accomplished.

This fund enabled the committee to authorize the purchase of a permanent sign to be placed in the lobby of the Administration Building, NSDAR, in Washington. The chairman was in the NSDAR buildings three times each year at the National Board of Management meetings and inspected the chapel and conferred with the Curator, James Hunter Johnson, and provided the staff with Kansas wheat for the urns. # HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 1986-1989 ADMINISTRATION

Mrs. Joseph Robert Riden, Jr., Overland Park, served as Kansas State Regent 1986-1989. Mrs. Billy P. Compton, Honorary State Regent, was elected a Vice President General in 1986 in the administration of Mrs. Raymond Franklin Fleck. National appointments included Mrs. Robert N. Kline, National Vice Chairman Junior Membership (in Charge of Contest). South Central Division Vice Chairmen were: Mrs. Charles C. Theis, DAR Magazine; Miss Virginia Weisgerber, Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States of America; Mrs. Thomas M. Wall, Insignia. Mrs. Wayne W. Jones served as a member of the Resolutions Committee. Mrs. Richard C. McGehee was elected President of the National Vice Chairmen's Association NSDAR.

Several new National Special Committees were established; Bed and Breakfast, Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States of America, Friends of the NSDAR Library and the Ellis Island Restoration. The NSDAR Long-range Planning Commission was established in 1987. This Commission is to provide a continuing assessment of future needs of the National Society.

The "We The People" Administration was a concentrated effort on the promotion of the celebration of the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States of America in all chapters, cities and communities.

Mrs. Riden's special project and prerequisite to the celebration of the centennial of NSDAR in 1990 was the up-date of the "History of the DAR in Kansas 1944-1986." This was accomplished through the efforts of Mrs. Woodrow W. Dew, Compiler and Mrs. Harold B. Myers, State Historian, Compiler. Mrs. Robert N. Kline, State Junior Membership Chairman, wrote the first history of the "Juniors in Kansas 1934-1989."

Mrs. Riden's State Project was the "Endowment Fund for the KSDAR Library." Over \$2300 was added to the fund during her administration. Mrs. Riden concentrated on conserving State Funds and was able to show an increase of over \$4000 in the General Fund when her administration was completed.

The Kansas Society was 100% on the President General's Project "Pipes and Drum." (\$4.00 per member) This was the replacement of plumbing, much electrical wiring, asbestos removal and repair of the elevator at our buildings in Washington.

With the use of the "Master Questionnaire" Mrs. Riden received National recognition for 100% reporting by the Chapter Regents for three consecutive years. Mrs. Riden went on the tour to the DAR Schools in 1986 and attended all National, State and

District Meetings. She visited all 63 chapters.

The Fall Tour 1986 was to the Eisenhower Center in Abilene. Near the entrance to the Chapel, six trees and twelve shrubs were planted and dedicated. The afternoon tour was to the A.B. Seelye Mansion, the home of Miss Marion Seelye, Honorary State Regent, who served as State Regent 1938-1940.

The Fall tour in 1987 at Dodge City was commemorating the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States of America. Ceremonies included releasing of balloons by school children, ringing of church bells, a special Naturalization Court, a visit to the KSDAR Library and the planting of two Burr Oak trees at Wright Park.

The Fall Tour in 1988 was the first time the Kansas Daughters had visited the restored fort at Fort Scott. The afternoon tour was to the National Cemetery. The evening prior to the tour included a visit to the Congregational Church, a Victorian Home, one room country school and the Fort Scott Museum.

A plaque commemorating a famous watering place was placed at the base of the Santa Fe Trail marker at Wright Park in Dodge City. The dedication was Flag Day, June 14, 1986. An official Historic DAR Marker with Insignia was placed at the base of the flagpole at Mahaffie Farmstead and Stagecoach Stop on the Santa Fe Trail in Olathe. Dedication ceremonies were Constitution Day, September 17, 1988.

Phebe Dustin Chapter, Phillipsburg, was disbanded October 15, 1987 and Lone Elm chapter, Gardner, was disbanded December 4, 1987. This administration did not organize any new chapters. The concentration was on the strengthening of the 63 existing chapters.

The Elizabeth M. Kessler Scholarship, awarded once each KSDAR administration, was awarded for the first time. The recipient was Corinne Louise Donahue sponsored by Arthur Barrett Chapter. The new Gladys E. Routh Scholarship was established as an award once every three years to a high school senior who is preferably one-fourth Pottawatomie Indian. Another Indian heritage may be substituted if there is no individual with Pottawatomie heritage available.

Members donated \$260 to preserve and weatherproof the Madonna of the Trail Monument at Council Grove. The Kansas Daughters gave \$1,411 to Tamassee DAR School toward the rebuilding of the dining hall which burned to the ground in July 1988

This administration helped to celebrate the KSDAR 50th Anniversary of the "Junior Membership Committee" and the 25th Anniversary of the "Outstanding Junior Contest." The State Junior Club was organized as an event at State Conference. All clubs within the Kansas Society dispensed with their Bylaws and

established Guidelines.

"DAR Serving the Nation", veterans of the Military, were recognized at both National and State levels. A pin was authorized by National for the DAR Veterans. Thirty-one chapters made "Gold" Honor Roll. Kansas Daughters purchased 575 DAR pins.

The Genealogical Records Committee, Mrs. R.G. Swenson, State Chairman, compiled and bound 8,671 pages of records for the NSDAR Genealogical Library with copies to the KSDAR Library in Dodge City and the Kansas State Historical Society Center for Historical Research in Topeka.

The DAR Magazine Advertising Committee, Mrs. Robert H. Crowther, State Chairman, furnished twenty-three full pages from the Kansas Society for the "NSDAR Magazine."

Mrs. Riden was instrumental in promoting the approval of funds for the purchase of a computer to more efficiently keep records of the State Registrar. Funds were also approved to provide a sign at National Headquarters giving directions to the Kansas Chapel.

Through the diligent work of the members and the encouragement of Mrs. Riden, there were many Continental Congress Awards. The American Heritage Committee had among other awards two first place awards. They were in Literature for Short Stories - two years and in Crafts for Dolls. The Junior American Citizens Committee had five National Awards - one first place. two second place and two honorable mentions. Other Continental Congress Awards were for: "Greatest percentage of subscriptions to the DAR Magazine", "State Committees for 100% Reporting", American Indians Committee, Mrs. Charley Shoemake, Chairman, for "Original Participation", "Outstanding Programs", "Use of Theme in Program Titles" and "Conservation of Printing Costs." Mrs. Garland E. Braden received recognition as an "Outstanding State Treasurer." South Central Division winners were: the eighth grade "American History Essay Contest" entry won first place two years; the DAR Good Citizen placed first one year. Mrs. Joseph Woodson was first in the South Central Division for two years as the "Outstanding Volunteer" in the DAR Veteran-Patients Committee Contest.

C.A.R. - Kansa Society won the "Regional Enthusiast Award" and Prairie Dog Society received the "Gold Merit Award."

In the National election for new officers in April 1989, Mrs. Riden ran on the narrowly defeated Kemper Slate. The Kemper Associates led by Mrs. Charles K. Kemper lost by forty votes. It was an honor of great distinction to Mrs. Riden to have been chosen to run for the office of Curator General.

# REPORTS OF THE CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

#### SENIOR STATE PRESIDENT

The 1988-89 year began when I assumed the office of Senior State President during ceremonies conducted at Mount Vernon, Virginia in April, 1988. During the National CAR Convention then, I was delighted to learn that Kansas had two Gold Merit Award winners: The Kansa Society (Topeka) and the Prairie Dog Society (Wichita).

Three months later, in Wichita, Kansas hosted the Great Plains Regional CAR Convention where we were presented with the "Summer Packet", the official CAR program for the remainder of the year. #### BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

[As amended March 16, 1986]

#### ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

# ARTICLE II Objects

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas.

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farcwell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherich, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in occurring for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Mombers. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

# ARTICLE IV

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No state officer, except the State Librarian, shall be eligible to two consecutive terms in the same office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelec-

tion to a accond term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b)  $\Lambda$  chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. Terms. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three-fourth vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

# ARTICLE V Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nominating committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board of Management Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after its election and no later than November first, to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

#### ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the

State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be exofficio member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the Conference Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committees and of any other appointees. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or in ability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar, hold a memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management, and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen, and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material, to edit, and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Recording Secretary All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules, not later than six months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing. Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the date designated. She shall notify the State Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. Before January first, she shall send to each Chapter Regent three crediential blank forms and three forms for reporting chapter officers. Before Continental Congress each year, she shall send to the Organizing Secretary General a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapters made into a directory form. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the State Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and the Organizing Regent in organizing new chapters. She shall ascertain the possibilities of organizing a new chapter where a new chapter is con templated. She shall be responsible for correspondence relative to the organization of new chapters. She shall give assistance to existing chapters in sustaining their membership quota as required by the National Society.

Section 8. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds for the Society. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Doard of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and counter-

signed by the State Recording Secretary. Upon assuming the duties of her office, she may, with the approval of the Executive Committee, transfer funds to a convenient, federally insured banking institution; this action shall be ratified at the next meeting of the State Board of Management. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a public accountant in time to have the auditor's report for the annual State Conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall pass them on to her successor.

Section 9. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep the eard files of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include: name, including maiden name in full and, if married; husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor; spouse of ancestor, if known; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given. On or before January first, the State Registrar shall send blank forms to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, mar ried or deceased during the preceeding year. The State Registrar shall prepare and have printed a necrology list for the memorial service at State Conference.

Section 10. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 11. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books, papers, microfilm, and equipment as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all materials and equipment in the Kansas State DAR Library.

In her annual report she shall list all materials sent to the National Society Library and all materials received during the year for the Kansas State DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of the Kansas State DAR Library.

Section 12. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News", and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex-officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the Conference Press Committee. She shall send a short report of the Kansas State DAR Conference to the "DAR Magazine".

Section 13. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them from her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent-Elect.

### ARTICLE VII Meetings

Scction 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the

State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and the Chairmen of all Committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. A member holding two or more offices each carrying a vote at the annual State Conference shall be limited to vote in only one of the offices held.

Section 4. Qualifications. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Recent or First Vice Recent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately proceeding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The representation of a chapter at the annual State Conference or at any other meeting of the State Society shall be three times the representation to which the chapter is entitled in the Continental Congress and

exceed twice the number of voters to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after the election, the three credential blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at the meeting of the State

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privilege of the floor, without votc, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly

elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings, Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas

Society.

#### ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the

state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Scction 3: Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District Meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

# ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Scction 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

#### ARTICLE X Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$2.50 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of December. A member whose dues are not paid by January first shall not be a delegate to the State Conference. The dues of a member admitted or reinotated after May first shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee not to exceed five dollars, such sum to be given to the hostess district to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expenses Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

## ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance Committee, composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary, and three members appointed by the State Regent, shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget, as approved by the State Board of Management, shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Kansas DAR Scholarship. The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members of be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from chapters and individuals and from in-

terest on monies invested for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee, composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Vice Regent, and the State Recording Secretary, shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee, consisting of a Chairman from the membership of the State at-large and four members from the membership of the hostess chapters, shall be appointed by the State Regent and shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary, the State Treasurer, and the State Registrar shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendmento and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the State Conference, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolutions excepted.

Section 7. Public Relations. The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an exofficio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

### ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent, shall prepare a condensed report, not exceeding 200 words. These reports shall be

typed in triplicate, one copy for the State Regent and two for the Recording Secretary and cont not later than March first each year. These reports covering the year's work, shall be prepared for the State Conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. Each State Chairman shall send to the State Regent, not later than March first of each year, a copy of the statistical report prepared for the National Chairman or Vice Chairman. This information will be used by the State Regent in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress.

# ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be published in the summer issue of the Kansas DAR News or shall be sent by the District Director to the District Chapters, State Officers and State Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each district shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The term of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three years.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

### ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office by the June meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year, the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary, on forms furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary, three legible typewritten lists or one original and two eligible photocopies of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter will send a postal card to the State Chairman of each National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January thirtieth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

# ARTICLE XV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

#### ARTICLE XVI Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State

Conference at which it is adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

### STANDING RULES

Number 1. The report of the Kansas State Society shall be known as the Annual Report and Proceedings of the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The report shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires: State Officers, 1 to 3 each: Chapter Regents, 1 each, Chapters, 1 each; National Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the State, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National and State Committees, 1 each; Senior State President, C.A.R., 1; District Directors, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2; the President General, 1; The Kansas State Historical Society, 1; the Presidents of the State Officers' Club, Chapter Regents' Club, and State Chairmen's Club, 1 each. In an election year, one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and chairmen of committees.

Number 2. At the close of each administration it shall be the duty of the State Historian to prepare a summary of the highlights of the past three years to be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Number 3. No less than two issues of the Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year, expenses to be borne by the State Society.

Number 4. The State Registrar shall assist the editor of the Kansas DAR News a current mailing list.

Number 5. A sum of \$1,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

Number 6. Twenty-five Dollars shall be allowed each elected State Officer to partially defray her expenses to State Conference.

Number 7. Twenty-five dollars shall be allotted to the Kansas delegation for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas Regent at Continental Congress.

Number 8. Fifty dollars shall be alloted to the State Regent for

the entertainment of Pages at Continental Congress.

Number 9. The State Treasurer shall, each year, set aside a sum of money equal to ten cents per chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money romaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the general fund of the Kansas Society.

Number 10. A sum equal to five cents per chapter member shall be taken from the General Fund and paid to the Treasurer of the Kansas C.A.R. Society to be used for the C.A.R. projects.

Number 11. KSDAR shall place a \$30.00 ad in the All States Issue of the DAR Magazine if no other Kansas advertising is available.

Number 12. Each Chapter in Kansas shall pay \$1.00 each year into the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund and \$.05 per member to the KSDAR Library.

Number 13. Each Chapter Corresponding Secretary shall send, on or before September 15th of each year, a copy of the Chapter Yearbook to each of the State Officers, to the Chairman of the Membership Committee, and to the Chairman of the Program Committee.

Number 14. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent, and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

Number 15. The State Regent shall give a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

Number 16. The State Regent shall have the State Regent's pin appraised by the J. E. Caldwell Company once during her administration, and if the pin is lost the State Society shall assume the cost of replacing it.

Number 17. The Kansas DAR Library shall be placed in the Dodge City Recreational Center at Avenue G. and Vine in Dodge

City, Kansas.

(a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of

housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.

(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee to assume custodial care of the Library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of the collection of books and shall assist the State Librarian where possible in the repair and maintenance of the books and shall receive

and answer all requests for loan of books.

(c) Rental of  $$15\overline{0}$  per year shall be paid for housing of the Kansas DAR Library.

(d) The materials submitted to the KSDAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. Donors are asked to check with the librarian before presentation to avoid duplication.

Number 18. An Endowment Fund for the DAR Library has been established.

Number 19. The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship is to be given once in each KSDAR Administration to a high school senior who is entering a two or four year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of National Defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity, and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Chairman, the State National Defense Chairman, and the State Regent.

Number 20. A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school senior who has DAR eligibility.

Number 21. The Lena Fry Merritt Daughters of the American Revolution Scholarship is to be awarded at least once in each DAR administration according to the guidelines of the Lena Fry Merritt Scholarship Committee.

Number 22. The Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarship, in memory of her parents, Albert Jesse Jones and Mabel Clare Early Jones, shall be awarded to a deserving boy or girl, preferably one who is at least ¼ Pottawatomie Indian. If a deserving individual of Pottawatomie horitage is not available another Indian heritage may be substituted. The interest from the \$3,000 gift shall be awarded once every three years for attendance at an accredited college or university. Members of the scholarship committee who will supervise the awarding of the scholarship shall consist of: the KSDAR Scholarship Chairman, the KSDAR American Indian Chairman and a member of the Eunice Sterling Chapter.

Number 23. State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and the honorary officers may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management. They shall have the privilege of the floor but may not vote.

Number 24. The State Regent shall appoint a committee before the closing session of the State Conference to approve the minutes of the session.

Number 25. The entertainment of the following persons, if attending the State Conference at the invitation of the State Regent, shall be a Conference expense: candidates for President General; National Officers or National appointees appearing as speakers; representatives of the DAR Schools, Approved Schools, or Indian Schools.

Number 26. Two members of the National Board of Management may be invited by the State Regent to attend the State Conference as guests of the Conference.

Number 27. (a) A \$10.00 limit shall be placed on prizes awarded

at State Conference.

(b) Interest accrued annually from the Mary Lempenau Permanent Trust Fund of \$750.00 beginning in 1987 be used to pay monetary prizes at State Conference with no prize exceeding \$10.00.

Number 28. The Runner-Up in the Good Citizen Contest shall be presented an appropriate gift as an award.

Number 29. The Kansas Society shall present the State Regent a Past State Regent's Pin at the end of her term of office, providing she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

Number 30. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Pin at the close of the State Conference.

Number 31. In the event that KSDAR should have a national winner in any NSDAR youth competition in which the winner is required to attend Contintenal Congress, the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the award.

Number 32. The Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for members or spouses of members of the Kansas Congressional Delegation who are guests at functions sponsored by the Kansas DAR during Continental Congress.

Number 33. A pilgrimage to an historically significant Kansas site shall be held annually on Constitution Day, September 17th. If the date is changed, it shall be during Constitution Week as near the 17th as possible, and the date shall be determined by the State Regent, the State Constitution Week Chairman, and the hostess committee. Local chapters shall act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed \$50.00 shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the pilgrimage.

Number 34. Plans for the Fall Tour shall be made before March first by the State Vice Regent, the four District Directors, and a representative of each of the hostess chapters on the Tour, sub-

ject to the approval of the State Regent.

Number 35. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

Number 36. An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings, and other pertinent historical information will be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings decennially beginning in 1980.

Number 37. A Directory of members will be printed every ten

years beginning in 1990.


Number 38. The Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship shall provide a college scholarship for a girl graduating from high school. The recipient of this scholarship shall have acceptable scholastic ability, show financial need, be a citizen of the United States of America, and be eligible for membership in the DAR. This award is to be given once in each KSDAR administration.

If the two rooms at the Shawnee Mission in Fairway, Kansas, formerly supported by the KSDAR are again maintained and refurbished by the Kansas Daughters, the interest from this fund shall be used for these purposes and take precedence over the

scholarship fund.

Number 39. The Chapters in each District are as follows: NORTHEAST - Arthur Barrett, Atchison, Betty Washington, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, Emporia, General Edward Hand. James Ross, John Haupt, Marais des Cygnes, Mission Hills, Olathe, Prairie Rose, Sagamore, Samuel Linscott, Shawnee Mission, Tomahawk, Topeka, Wyandot, NORTHWEST - Abilene, Concordia, Council Oak, Courtney-Spalding, Desire Tobey Sears, Good-Land, John Athey, Lois Warner, Mary Wade Strother, Nathan Edson, Newton, Polly Ogden, Sarah Steward, Smoky Hill. SOUTHEAST — Betty Bonney, Cofachique, Esther Lowrey, Four Winds, Hannah Jameson, Isabella Weldin, Jane Dean Coffey, Molly Foster Berry, Neodesha, Oceanus Hopkins, Peleg Gorton, Susannah French Putney. SOUTHWEST - Byrd Prewitt, Cimarron River Valley, Dodge City, Eunice Sterling, Flores del Sol, Fort Larned, Jeremiah Howard, Jonathan Gilbert, Kanza, Little Arkansas, Little Osage Trail, Martha Loving Ferrell, Martha Vail, Minisa, Ninnescah, Randolph Loving, Uvedale, Wichita, William Wilson.

Number 40. These rules may be amended or suspended at any State Conference by a majority vote.
