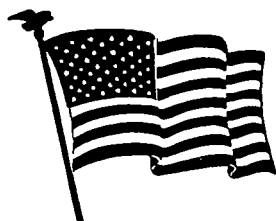

The Board of Management of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution met at the Countryside United Methodist Church, 3231 Burlingame Road, Topeka, Kansas, Tuesday, September 12, 1989. Mrs. Richard C. McGehee, State Regent, called the meeting to order at 9:15 a.m.

5. "that all bills for a given fiscal year be turned in no later than January 15, realizing that some carryover of expenses is unavoidable, but should be kept to a minimum." Motion carried.

Mrs. Vincent Traffas, State Registrar, reported that the transfer of membership information from the 28 cases of file cards into the computer was proceeding well. She answered questions from the floor concerning recording and retrieval of data, reporting forms, and other pertinent information. She stated that prepublication order forms for the 1990 Directory are available in the lobby.

Mrs. William Daniels, State Librarian, reported that she had the forms for checking with the National Library concerning their acceptance of all books. She also has a book "wish list" for the KSDAR library.

Mrs. McGehee announced that the Conference Chairman, Mrs. Bruce Cochran, preferred a book from the library list be purchased for the library in her name in lieu of receiving the customary Kansas pin.

Mrs. Robert C. Reid, State Chairman DAR Service for Veteran-Patients, reported that information from this committee will be in the summer packet. She commented that 16 chapters had reported no activity. While not all chapters are situated near a Veterans Hospital, donations to this committee and service at local nursing homes are acceptable alternatives.

Mrs. McGehee announced that the Executive Committee decided last fall not to have separate Constitution Day and Centennial celebrations. Instead plans have been made to celebrate both events in Abilene at the Eisenhower Center Monday, September 17, 1990. The Fall Board of Management will be followed by a luncheon, an Eisenhower program, Centennial Salute, Constitution Week recognition, and a Conservation activity. Mrs. Warren Coupal, Conservation Chairman, had conferred with the Eisenhower authorities who supervise the landscaping at the Complex. They suggest the need for three male ginkgo trees, but two would be acceptable. The estimated cost of a 10 foot tree is \$100.00 plus \$40.00 for the planting. Memorial, honorariums and other monetary gifts may be made to help fund this purchase.

Gladys Elizabeth Schmutz Beal was born April 21, 1903 to Edward and Harriet Thomas Schmutz in Dickinson County. She attended rural schools and graduated from Chapman High School. On November 11, 1925, she married Forast Beal in Wakefield. They moved to Junction City from Wakefield in 1926. She died on April 19, 1989 in Junction City, lacking two days of being 86 years old. Survivors include two daughters, Rachel Carez, Wakefield, and Aileen DeBruce, Ulysses; and one son, Jack Beal, Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Her sister, Mrs. Milton Ruhnke, Junction City, is also a member of the Lois Warner Chapter.

Gladys Beal was an inspiration to all her fellow-members of DAR. She loved the organization and her DAR sisters. She was our guide and mentor, mothering us who knew so much less than she did about DAR. Gladys enjoyed the District and State Conferences and seemed to know almost everyone there.

She was a tremendous influence on her chapter, her fellow-members and the Kansas Society. We profited from her experience and her knowledge, and we are better for having known her. We loved her, and we miss her.

ILLITERACY

legislative initiative designed to eliminate illiteracy in the United states by the year 2000, to co-ordinate, monitor and develop existing and new Federal literacy initiatives, and establish specific and measurable goals for the Federal effort to combat illiteracy;
RESOLVED, That The Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, support this recent legislation developed to attack illiteracy in a variety of ways and make it possible for millions of our citizens to reach their full potential.

Mrs. Marrs moved the adoption of the proposed budget. Motion carried.

Mrs. Victor Edgman, State Regent of Tennessee, was escorted to the podium. She extended greetings from the Tennessee Society and spoke briefly about the membership and activities in Tennessee.

In the absence of Mrs. George Milbank, Chairman of the Bylaws Committee, the proposed revisions of the Standing Rules were read by Mrs. Harold N. Ottaway, member of the Bylaws Committee.

1. Amend Standing Rule 1 by striking out "State" in line 1; "Chapter Regents, 1 each, National Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of National Committees whose membership is within the state, 1 each"; and "the Presidents of the State Officers' Club, Chapter Regents' Club, and State Chairmen's Club, 1 each." in lines 12 and 13. Further amend by adding a new sentence: "Other members desiring copies may place by June 1 with the State Recording Secretary a prepaid order at four dollars per copy."

Motion was made by Mrs. Glen Mayden to amend the proposed amendment by inserting the words "Chapter Regents, 1 each" following the phrase, "State Officers, 1 to 3 each," and before "Chapters, 1 each." Motion seconded and carried.

Motion was made by Mrs. William Daniels to amend the proposed amendment by inserting before the last sentence, the following sentence: "Except for State Officers, no one individual shall receive more than one free copy." Motion seconded and carried.

Proposed Standing Rule Number 1 adopted as amended.

2. Amend Standing Rule 3 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule: "Number 3. At least two issues of the Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year and mailed to each member. The printing and mailing expenses shall be borne by the State Society." Adopted.
3. Standing Rule Number 4, state as amended March 16, 1985, "Number 4. The State Registrar shall furnish the editor of the Kansas DAR News a current mailing list." Adopted.

4. Amend Standing Rule Number 6 by striking out “elected” on line 1; and by striking out “expenses to State Conference” and inserting “State Conference expenses” on line 2. Adopted.
5. Amend Standing Rule 7 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule: “Number 7. Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy flowers for the Kansas State Regent at Continental Congress; arrangements shall be made by the State Treasurer.”
6. Amend Standing Rule 8 by striking out “the entertainment of” and inserting “Kansas” before “Pages.” Adopted.
7. Amend Standing Rule 9 by transposing the words “each year” to begin the sentence and striking out “a sum of money equal to” after “aside” and inserting “from the General Fund.” Further amend by striking out “the” before State Conference on line 2. Adopted.
8. Amend Standing Rule 10 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule: “Number 10. Each year, each chapter shall pay five cents per member for the support of the Kansas State Society Children of the American Revolution. The KSDAR State Treasurer shall forward these funds to the K.S.C.A.R. Senior State Treasurer.” Adopted.
9. Rescind Standing Rule 11. Adopted.
10. Amend Standing Rule 12 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule as numbers 11 and 12: “Number 11. Each year, each chapter in Kansas shall pay one dollar for the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund.” “Number 12. Each year, each chapter in Kansas shall pay five cents per member for the Kansas DAR Library Fund.” Adopted.
11. Amend Standing Rule 13 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule: “Number 13. Each year, on or before September 15, each chapter shall send copies of its chapter yearbook to the State Officers, the State Chairman of the Membership Committee, and 2 copies to the State Chairman of the Program Committee.” Adopted.
12. Amend Standing Rule 15 by striking out the words “shall give” and inserting the words “may send.” Adopted.
13. Amend Standing Rule 17 by striking out the word “placed” between “be” and “in” in line 1 and inserting the word “located.” Further amend by striking out paragraphs (b), (c), and (d) and substituting the proposed paragraphs:

“(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee that shall be known as the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee to assume care of the library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of books, materials and equipment; shall assist the State Librarian when possible in the repair and maintenance of these items; and shall receive and answer all requests for the loan of books and other materials.

(c) The annual rent of \$150.00 shall be paid by January 15 to the Kansas Genealogical Society.

(d) Materials submitted to the Kansas DAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. To avoid duplication, donors shall check with State Librarian before books are sent.” Adopted.

14. Amend Standing Rule 18 by inserting “the support of” between the words “for” and “the”; inserting the word “Kansas” between the words “the” and “DAR”; and further amend by adding proposed paragraphs (a) and (b):

“(a) Monies contributed to the Endowment Fund shall be under the jurisdiction of the State Treasurer.

(b) The annual interest accrued from the fund shall pay for the following annual library expenses: rent, insurance, operating expenses, and purchase and maintenance of equipment.” Adopted.

15. Amend Standing Rule 19 by striking out “is to” between the words “Scholarship” and “be” and inserting the word “shall.” Adopted.
16. Amend Standing Rule 20 by adding “or to a member of DAR; proof of enrollment in a two or four-year college or university shall be required.” Adopted.
17. Amend Standing Rule 21.

Motion was made by Mrs. Vincent Traffas to rescind proposed Standing Rule Number 21. Motion seconded and carried.

18. Amend Standing Rule 23 by striking out “the honorary officers” and inserting “Honorary State Regents,”; inserting “with voice but no vote” after the word “Management” at the end of line 2; and striking out sentence 2. Adopted.
19. Amend Standing Rule 24 by striking out and substituting the proposed Standing Rule: “Number 24. At the Conference Opening, the State

Regent shall appoint a committee to approve the minutes of the closing meeting of the State Conference.” Adopted.

20. Amend Standing Rules 25 and 26 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule: “Number 25. The hospitality of the following persons, if attending the State Conference at the official invitation of the State Regent, shall be a Conference expense: Candidates for President General, NSDAR; National Officers or National appointees, appearing as speakers; two members of the National Board of Management; representatives of the DAR Schools, Approved Schools, and Indian Schools; or any designated speaker for a special program or event.” Adopted.
21. Amend Standing Rule 27 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule: “Number 27. (a) A \$10 limit shall be placed on awards at State Conference. (b) Interest accrued annually from the Mary Lempenau Permanent Trust of \$750.00 shall pay monetary awards at State Conference.” Adopted.
22. Amend Standing Rule 28 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule: “Number 28. The runner-up in the Kansas Society DAR Good Citizens contest shall be awarded a gift.” Adopted.
23. Amend Standing Rule 29 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule: “Number 29. The Kansas Society shall present to the State Regent an Ex-State Regent’s Pin or, if she has been elected Honorary State Regent, an honorary State Regent’s Pin at the end of her term of office, providing that she has served two-thirds of her elected term.” Adopted.
24. Amend Standing Rule 30 by inserting “or equivalent remuneration” between the words “Pin” and “at”. Adopted.
25. Rescind Standing Rule 32. Adopted.
26. Amend Standing Rule 33 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule: “Number 33. A pilgrimage to a historically significant Kansas site may be held annually on Constitution Day, September 17. Local chapters may act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed fifty dollars shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the pilgrimage.” Adopted.
27. Amend Standing Rule 34 by striking out and substituting the proposed standing rule: “Number 34. The schedule for the Fall Tour shall be made before March 1 by the State Regent and State Vice Regent in consultation with the four District Directors and representatives of the

hostess chapters. All plans for the tour shall be finalized by June 1." Adopted.

28. Amend Standing Rule 36 by striking out "will" on line 2 and inserting "shall"; further amend by striking "decennially" in line 3 and inserting "every ten years." Adopted.
29. Amend Standing Rule 37 by striking out "will" and inserting "may." Adopted.
30. Amend Standing Rule 39 by inserting "and" between "Topeka" and "Wyandot", between "Steward" and "Smoky", between "Gorton" and "Susannah", and between "Wichita" and "William". Adopted.

By direction of the Committee, Mrs. Ottaway moved the adoption of the proposed Standing Rules as amended. Motion carried, and the proposed Standing Rules were adopted.

REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

STATE REGENT

The election to the office of State Regent with the formal installation at Continental Congress is an honor and privilege that this officer has felt deeply during this first year. The appointment of chairmen and committees to carry out the objectives of our society were made and the willingness of Kansas Daughters to serve is deeply appreciated.

An Executive Committee "work day" and luncheon was held on May 10, affording each officer an opportunity to get acquainted. The duties of each officer were shared and future plans were discussed as well as pending business.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENT JANUARY 31, 1990

1. Summary of Accounting Policies

The accounting policies followed by the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution are described below.

A. Basis of Accounting

The Society maintains its accounts on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

B. Income Taxes

The Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution is organized exclusively for educational and charitable purposes and has qualified as a tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

Chapter reporting was 100%. Reports sent in gave the following information:

One document and \$189.00 were given to the Americana collection. Thirteen children's programs and 171 adult programs were presented. Anniversaries of forty-nine events and twenty-six people were celebrated. There were thirty-eight adult and twenty-one children tours.

Graves of fourteen DAR members and one Revolutionary War Soldier were marked. One historical marker was restored and dedicated.

Eighty-three events pertaining to the Bicentennial of the Constitution were held. Five teachers were honored.

The outstanding teacher of American History is Polly W. Swafford, Mission Valley Middle School, Shawnee Mission, sponsored by Sagamore Chapter. Mrs. Swafford was honored at Continental Congress as the Outstanding Teacher of American History.

The bronze plaque which had been placed by KSDAR on the organ at NSDAR Memorial Continental Hall in memory of Mrs. George Thatcher Guernsey, President General, 1917-1920, was removed from the locked file in Topeka in December 1989. The plaque was donated to NSDAR for the Centennial Jubilee.

This officer had the pleasure of attending the signing of the Proclamation by Governor Mike Hayden for Constitution Week.

STATE LIBRARIAN

Mrs. William D. Daniels

KSDAR daughters from twenty-five chapters and NSDAR friends from Alabama, Colorado, New Mexico, and Nebraska visited the library in 1989. The library opened five afternoons each week, excepting holidays, from 1:30 to 5:00 p.m. and the 1st Saturday of October through May from 10:45 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The Kansas Genealogical Society kept the library Monday through Wednesday and the 1st Saturday. Eight Dodge City and two Ninnescah Chapter volunteers gave 690 hours of service to the library. This included opening the library Thursday and Friday of each week, completing the collection inventory, indexing 50 Genealogical Records volumes (750 catalog cards), assisting prospective members with application papers, mailing out

book orders and answering correspondence. Mrs. George Cole, 303 University Drive, Dodge City, KS 67801, answered all mail orders and correspondence.

Dodge City, Minisa and Jane Dean Coffey Chapters gave \$87.00 for book memorials; fourteen other chapters gave books to the library. The library had maintenance expenses of \$166.83 for postage, plastic storage boxes, catalog cards and miscellaneous items. The library purchased four books. The library prepared a budget for expenses with no allowance for book purchases. Funds for this come from KSDAR members and their friends.

In August the KSDAR library committee of Mrs. Augustus diZerega, Mrs. Stanley Smith, Miss Miriam Eads, Mrs. George Cole, and the State Librarian met in Dodge City with the Dodge City Library Committee for a planning session to set future goals for the library. AMERICAN HERITAGE

Ninety seven percent of the Chapters confirmed their activities. Sagamore Chapter chronicled its programs and activities in a scrapbook of colorful photos documenting their aim to include something about American Heritage at each meeting. Topeka Chapter hosted the Northeast District Meeting

carrying out a red, white and blue theme including table decoration of period costumed dolls fashioned of leftover paper napkins.

The Daughters do volunteer work in, as well as tour, the museums, historic homes, sites, farmsteads and uniquely built barns so well preserved in Kansas. They never hesitate to roll up their sleeves to clean or recondition a historic site. Eunice Sterling Chapter became involved with a missing marker plaque that mysteriously reappeared in a neighboring state. A group of DAR members returned it and a joint luncheon, rededication ceremony was held commemorating the 1865 Treaty of the Little Arkansas.

The talents of our Kansas Daughters entering the contest was recognized with a National First Place, a Regional First Place, an Outstanding Entry and two Honorable Mentions awarded to Topeka Chapter.

The Kansas Daughters are very busy and visible in their respective communities.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

This Chairman attended Continental Congress, State Conference and participated in the Fall Tour.

American History Month Chairman for John Haupt Chapter, Mrs. A. E. Carpenter, and Mrs. LeRoy W. Dutt, History Chairman for Topeka Chapter, witnessed Governor Hayden's signing the American History Month Proclamation on February 14, 1990.

The topic for the essay contest was "An American Inventor 1755 - 1850." Ninety-one schools participated in the essay contest. The state winners were: Fifth grade, Elizabeth Suzanne Simmons of Lawrence, Kansas sponsored by Betty Washington Chapter; Sixth grade, Loretta Deanne Combes, of Humboldt, Kansas sponsored by Cofachique Chapter; Seventh grade, Karla J. Lohaus of Paola, Kansas sponsored by Marais des Cygnes Chapter; and Eighth grade, Anh Tuan Lam of Prairie Village, Kansas sponsored by Sagamore Chapter.

Fifty-three chapters had a program on American History and thirty-nine chapters sponsored American History Month displays. Ten members appeared on radio or TV on behalf of American History Month.

Medals, Certificates of Award and books were presented to the chapter winners. Certificates of Appreciation for Participation in the contest were given to those students who were not winners.

AMERICAN INDIANS

The aim of the American Indians Committee is to aid in the education of Indian youth. Kansas chapters have responded generously to this objective.

The American Indian Scholarship Fund, which benefits students attending colleges anywhere in the United States, received \$146.50. Bacone College, the Indian school that has been selected by the National Society for support, was the focus of abundant donations. Financial contributions totaled \$578.25, most of which was designated for scholarships. The White Cross Thrift Shop at Bacone enables students to purchase clothing, personal articles and school supplies at reduced prices. Kansas chapters sent literally over a ton of these items (estimated pounds: 2,844) and \$31 as donations to the thrift shop. In addition, Bacone obtains free educational equipment for Campbell's product labels. Kansas Daughters supported this program by sending 6,079 labels.

The DAR Library Special Indian Collection received \$3 from chapters and a special \$20 donation. Ten members and one prospective member are working, or have completed work, on lineages from Native American patriots.

Twenty-nine programs were presented. Several chapters enthusiastically reported that their American Indians program was one of their year's best.

It is hoped that the members attending State Conference will find Dr. Theodore Frisbie's address at the American Indians Luncheon to be interesting and informative, and that they will support the jewelry sale for the benefit of Bacone students as ardently as they have supported the activities of this committee during the past year.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

This committee started its duties very early this year. Thanks to all the Chapters and members who contributed to the success of the Naturalization Court with the celebration of the Bicentennial of the United States of America Judicial System. There were 173 persons who became citizens that day.

John Haupt Chapter and Topeka Chapter served the refreshments which had been purchased with the generous offerings of the Kansas Daughters. Flags, flag codes, Preamble to the Constitution cards and other patriotic material were distributed to the new citizens.

The number of articles of patriotic material purchased by the Chapters was overwhelming. Ten members, including this chairman, presented programs on Americanism and the DAR Manual for Citizenship. This is a wonderful way to tell the story of our country, which was founded by immigrants. The test that is given to the prospective citizens was used as part of the program and seemed to show that some of us need to review our own history.

Several schools used the DAR Manual for Citizenship in their Government classes.

This has been an enjoyable year as well as a learning experience for this Chairman. Thank you, Madam Regent, for the pleasure of serving you.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

The Regional Meeting in Des Moines, Iowa was attended by a delegation from Kansas society. Following this meeting a Work Shop was conducted in Emporia by President Elizabeth Lawson and Senior President, Mr. Larry Skelton.

CONSERVATION

Kansas Daughters were busy in Conservation projects and programs. 83% of our total Chapters preserved food. Four Chapters ranked high: Samuel Linscott 95%; Byrd Prewitt and Good-Land 90%; Cimarron River Valley 80% of members canning and freezing foods for their families. Twelve Chapter members were close to the best cooks in the 75%-50% range.

Trees for the FUTURE: a 10 acre tree "farm" was planted by a Eunice Sterling member; 264 trees and shrubs were planted for windbreak and home and public beautification.

Our DAR's lovingly fed the birds: 8807 lbs. worth, James Ross Chapter took great care of their bird friends with 4200 lbs.; Olathe Chapter fed 1307 lbs.; Polly Ogden had 1040 lbs. for their feathered friends. John Haupt brought \$390.00 of Bird Dessert. Congratulations.

Themes for the Conservation Programs were many: Wildflowers, Birds, Water, Pollution and Environment. Randolph Loving is commended for their outstanding program, "A Century of Preserving Grasslands," at the Peter Farrell Ranch, Beaumont, Kansas. A rewarding work was "Butterflies and Moths," researched and presented to DAR and Clubs by Marion Gault, Tomahawk Chapter.

This Chairman is proud of ALL the DAR members who worked to "RECYCLE" all that 23,069 pounds of "trash" since September. "YOU" kept all that "NEVER DISSOLVING" waste out of our Community LANDFILLS. Polly Ogden Chapter is the 'TOP' collector: 7,800 lbs. aluminum cans, 7,000 lbs. paper, 1,040 lbs. glass and 416 lbs. plastics. Desire Tobey Sears members,

in a community drive, gathered 4,500 lbs. glass and 600 lbs. aluminum cans; Martha Vail - 500 lbs.; Esther Lowrey - 300 lbs.; Captain Jesse Leavenworth and Good-Land - 200 lbs. aluminum. Chapters having 200-100 lbs.: Sagamore, Molly Foster Berry, Topeka and Wyandot, with lesser pounds by many other Chapters-BUT-very commendable. The first POUND starts the TOTAL. CONSTITUTION WEEK

KSDAR Chapters celebrated Constitution Week in many ways. The State Regent, Historian, Americanism Chairman and the Constitution Week Chairman met in Topeka at the Governor's Office, August 24th, to proclaim September 17-23 Constitution Week.

The State Chairman went on Fall Tour. She gave chapters some ideas to celebrate this important week. Dressed in a "Constitution Week" dress -the Preamble written on the bodice, a red striped skirt, wearing an Uncle Sam hat, carrying a huge birthday cake with American flags around the edge, a 202 on top-she recited a jingle:

DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING

DAR SCHOLARSHIP

This year a schedule was set to present scholarships in an orderly manner throughout the State Regent's administration. KSDAR scholarships are awarded each year. In 1990 the Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarship is being awarded, in 1991 the Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship and in 1992 the Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship. This will allow sufficient interest to accumulate each term.

All 61 Kansas Chapters returned their reports, only 3 did not report any activity. Fifty-one contributed monies to NSDAR American History Scholarship; fifty contributed to Occupational Therapy Scholarship; and three chapters contributed to KSDAR Scholarships with a total of \$236.00. Four Chapters reported separate scholarships which totaled \$550.00.

Monies were raised through gifts, donations, garage sales, bazaars, memorials and interests; however, most of the chapters contributed from their treasury budget.

Chapters contacted 80 high schools and 8 colleges in their efforts to create student interest in DAR scholarships. As a result we had eleven excellent applicants for our KSDAR and Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarships.

Charles Patrick Konecny, Derby, sponsored by Little Osage Trail Chapter, Derby, was the first recipient of the Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarship in the amount of \$500.00. He will be a freshman engineering student at Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, Terra Haute, Indiana. Patrick is an enrolled member of the Quapaw Tribe of Indians.

Indi Danielle Watts, Derby, sponsored by Little Osage Trail Chapter, Derby was the unanimous choice for the KSDAR scholarship in the amount of \$450.00. She will attend the University of Kansas as a freshman pre-medicine major.

David F. Tangeman of Seneca, Kansas, is the Kansas entrant in the NSDAR American History Scholarship competition. He will be a freshman this fall as a History major.

Our thanks to judges: Ms. Mona Cunningham, Salina; Mrs. Billy Compton, Wichita; and Mrs. Gene Sharp, Liberal. These judges have a great interest in our youth and education.

It is the goal of the Scholarship Chairman to have 100% of our Chapters reporting participation in this vital program to help with the education of worthy students.

DAR SCHOOL

This chairman was pleased to have received 60 reports concerning the workings of this committee. Twenty-three programs have been presented to chapter members. Several of the chapters have had special projects to benefit

the schools. Over 17,000 Campbell labels were collected and 469 pounds of resale items donated.

Half of the chapters sent monetary gifts to all six schools. These gifts are less than in past years. Monetary gifts are as follows: Kate Duncan Smith \$552.00; Tamasee School \$796.70; Berry College \$18; Crossnore \$57; Hillside \$18; Hindman Settlement School \$47. Many individuals purchased bricks for the dining hall at Tamasee. This rebuilding project has progressed steadily.

It is the goal of this chairman to have all the Kansas Daughters oriented and educated as to "who and what" the DAR schools are for in the nineties. The chapter should be encouraged to budget for all six schools and to clip their Campbell labels.

Thank you for your participation for the DAR School Committee and for the opportunity to give a helping hand in molding the educational lives of the children of the hills.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

Kansas Chapters have traveled 6,202 miles to be with Veteran Patients this year. Over 3,500 hours were spent in Veteran Hospitals and Nursing Homes. One chapter received an Outstanding Service Award from the Veterans Administration.

Fifty-four parties and many carnivals were welcomed by the patients. Fifty devotional were given in a Nursing Home by one chapter.

Forty lap robes, bibs, cast covers and other handmade items were provided for the patients' comfort; also books, canteen books, cards and personal items. Fifty-four caps were knitted by one chapter. A \$750.00 donation of used clothing plus 65 pounds of cut carpet rags were contributed by another.

Tutoring six patients twice a week for six months was the personal project of one member. Another DAR volunteer, weekly, for six months, danced with patients and helped wheelchair patients keep time to piano music.

Four hundred plants were contributed by one chapter while another spent 112 hours maintaining a Home Care Unit patio garden.

"Stamps for the Wounded" and 1,700 Christmas cards were given. Donations to the Homeless Veterans Project were given and 28 cakes baked for the "Salute to Veterans."

Nearly \$19,000 given in time, effort, labor and love show that Kansas Chapters care.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Special thanks go to those chapters donating money to present Flags to all participating 5th grade students in the Shawnee Mission School District on American Heroes' Day.

And Hats Off to those DAR members participating in the 21 Day Salute and the exciting Naturalization Ceremony. Many chapters have faithfully prepared window displays, posters, and written their congressmen concerning Flag issues. Book marks with the Pledge of Allegiance were given to schools. Avenues of new flags and new flagpoles have been dedicated by DAR members. When every member does a little, it really adds up to a lot of work accomplished to promote our beautiful Flag!! Let's all keep up the good work!!

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

We are very grateful to the twenty four chapters which contributed 1,308 pages of original source material to National this year: Abilene, Betty Washington, Cofachique, Desire Tobey Sears, Dodge City, Emporia, Eunice Sterling, Fort Larned, General Edward Hand, John Haupt, Isabella Weldin, Little Arkansas, Lois Warner, Mary Wade Strother, Minisa, Polly Ogden, Prairie Rose, Sagamore, Shawnee Mission, Tomahawk, Topeka, Uvedale, William Wilson and Wyandot.

All chapters received copies of the 1989 revised INSTRUCTIONS FOR COPYING SOURCE RECORDS AND THEIR PREPARATION FOR LIBRARY USE. Seven volumes of records were prepared for binding for National and six each for the KSDAR Library and the Kansas Historical Society Library. A total of 2,908 pages of genealogical material was donated to state and local libraries. Chapters contributed \$59 to the National Records Binding Fund and \$95 to the State. Nine chapters held genealogical workshops.

Outstanding contributions were made by John Haupt Chapter and Little Arkansas Chapter during this reporting period, and honorable mention must go to Polly Ogden, William Wilson and Isabella Weldin chapters for their valuable work.

All the genealogical records sent by our chapters are special and may provide for someone the needed information to prove their DAR lineage. Remember that "buried" records help no one. It is our goal that ALL of our chapters contribute unpublished records during this our Centennial year.

The goals of the Junior committee continue to be: 1. increase membership, 2. improve sales in Junior products and 3. involve Juniors in all phases of DAR programs.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

With sixty-one chapters sending in reports, we again achieved our 100% goal. This State Chairman received names of chairmen from nearly all chapters; this was greatly appreciated.

Your reports show chapter chairmen received requests for assistance from 270 persons. Nine chapters held or assisted with workshops benefiting many.

Lineage Research Kits were purchased by nineteen chapters. This would be a good tool for all Lineage Research Chairmen and chapter Registrars.

Remember the video "Membership Genealogy Papers and Lineage Research Workshop," was purchased last year for your use by paying postage only.

Use of the KSDAR Library is encouraged by this chairman. Additional research resources are available to all who have tried all means available to them through other State Lineage Research persons and the NSDAR committee.

MEMBERSHIP

Mrs. Harold B. Myers

The Membership Theme: Membership Challenge, "Reach Out for Prospective Member," shows evidence of success. By recording one disabled chapter as "No Activity," we had 100% reporting. Twenty-one chapters reported an increase in membership, twenty-nine a decrease and twelve remained the same. One hundred eighteen new members, including thirty-seven Juniors were reported. Three hundred thirty-four Prospective Members were contacted and 777 pieces of DAR Membership Literature were distributed. One hundred seven "Prospective Member Forms" were received from Chapters. Even though the Chapters showed diligence in their efforts to acquire new members, due to attrition, our membership has not increased as we had anticipated.

The Chapter with the largest net increase in membership by application was Eunice Sterling with an increase of eleven members, twenty-six new members including six Juniors. The greatest per cent net increase in membership by application was Little Arkansas with a 20% increase.

The "Special Project" to try to contact Members-at large, Members resigned and Members dropped comprised thirty-three letters to State Regents out of state, 103 to Chapter Regents in state and included well over 400 names. Other State Regents were impressed with this idea and plan to implement the same project in their state. Although results were not requested, we know, due to this project, ten individuals in state have returned to our ranks. It was definitely worth the time and effort.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

First, THE BAD - Chapters were asked at District Meetings to submit the names of their National Defense Chairman to your state chairman, so they would receive the NATIONAL DEFENDER magazine. Over a three month period, reports from forty-one of the sixty-one chapter "filtered in" causing discontent for some not receiving the magazine.

THE GOOD - KSDAR chapters reported 100%; each one devoted time to National Defense each month and spoke on the Constitutional resolutions.

Thirty-five GOOD CITIZENSHIP and ten ROTC medals were presented with \$175.00 being contributed to the ROTC award program.

There were fifty paid subscriptions to the NATIONAL DEFENDER in addition to the ones sent to the chapter regents and chairmen. Material was made available at many schools and libraries.

Members exercised their voting rights at the polls and over 290 wrote or contacted their legislative representatives. Many members hold elective or appointive civic offices.

Concern and interest included Medicare, Panama Canal, Crime, Drug Wars, Taxes, Foreign Aid, Flag Burning, Education and many other topics, which proves we are an organization that cares about keeping America strong and great.

PROGRAM

This chairman sent forty-nine year books and two supplementals to the National Program Chairman for "Correctness of Detail" judging. Your state chairman was impressed with the quality of the books, none had more than five errors.

The South Central Division Program Vice-chairman received twenty-six entries from Kansas, but twelve were incomplete. Winner in the "Use of Theme in Program Titles" was Dodge City, second; Good-Land and Flores del Sol, third; Isabella Weldin and Randolph Loving, honorable mention. Winners in the "Conservation of Cost of Printing" contest were Cimarron River Valley, first; Mary Wade Strother, second; and Good-Land, third. First place in "Cost of Printing" in supplementals went to Eunice Sterling Chapter.

Fifty-four chapters used the Outline Guide in printing their year books, forty-eight chapters used the Program Guide to plan programs and fifteen chapters ordered programs from the National Program Office.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Publicity increased this year by almost twenty-seven per cent, with the publication of 828 articles and eighty-three photos, for a total of 5,013 inches. A total of thirty-eight radio programs and 250 spot announcements gave 602 radio minutes. Seven-two TV programs and seventy-two spot announcements totaled 156 minutes.

The DAR story was told in Kansas communities through Constitution Week and American History Month proclamation signing, DAR Good Citizens recognition, American History Essay Contest and meeting notices. The Abilene Chapter was fortunate in having a local radio station recognize their daughters with announcements every thirty minutes throughout the day of July 4th. They called it "A Story of a Patriot from a local Daughter," with credit

given to the writer. One chapter regent writes a monthly column on local history. The historical association is publishing a book of these articles with profits going to restoration of the local historical cemetery.

Members participated in patriotic and historical celebrations including parades, naturalization ceremonies, Americanism Awards, ROTC medals, historical markers, Kansas Day booth, American Hero celebration, church bell ringing and DAR day of prayer. A patriotic video was given to seven middle schools and 2,300 preamble bookmarks to the school district.

SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER

The emphasis for the year, for the Seimes Microfilm Center Committee, was to continue the acquisition of the 1900 Soundex Census Films. This was started in the previous administration and is only half completed. Each roll of the 1900 Soundex Census costs \$20.

The State Chairman used the theme "Dimes for Seimes" as an incentive for the chapters to collect dimes at meetings and hoped enough dimes would be collected during the year, so each chapter would be able to buy at least one roll of the 1900 Soundex Census Film.

A total of \$412.72 was collected with money designated for 15 rolls of the 1900 Soundex Census Films. There was 100% reporting by the chapters, but only fifty-six chapters contributed money. We hope to do better next year and will keep collecting "Dimes for Seimes."

One chapter had a program on the Seimes Microfilm Center and six chapters had ten minute reports on the Center.

Eunice Sterling Chapter gave 2 rolls of the 1900 Soundex Census films. One roll was in honor of the State Regent, Mrs. Richard C. McGehee. Little Arkansas Chapter presented five rolls of other census films to the Wichita Public Library.

The Seimes Microfilm Center is a very valuable resource of our National Organization and the Center should have our continued support.

REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL SPECIAL COMMITTEES

BICENTENNIAL OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Twenty-three chapters gave programs on the Bill of Rights with forty-eight chapter programs which included a tribute to the Bicentennial of the Constitution. One hundred eighty-five participants and 413 persons were present at the programs. Publicity was reported by fourteen chapters. Members

of thirty-five chapters recited the Preamble to the Constitution at their monthly meetings.

The Topeka and John Haupt Chapters of the Northeast District served refreshments at the commemorative observance of the 200th anniversary of the U. S. Judiciary Act of 1789 which established the federal court system. The celebration was held in Topeka at the Capitol Building on September 22, 1989. Other chapters in the Northeast District assisted and chapters throughout the state made monetary donations to help with this tremendous undertaking. The Topeka and John Haupt Chapters are congratulated for this outstanding service.

The Tomahawk Chapter of Prairie Village handed out 2,300 Constitution Bookmarks to the fifth grade. A total of 3,448 copies of the Constitution or related materials were distributed by chapters in Kansas.

All sixty-one chapters of the state reported. Thirty-five chapters were active. The celebration continues. We will never again celebrate our 200th anniversary.

The Bill of Rights is an important part of our Constitution. It is the sincere wish of this chairman that each chapter continue to have programs on the Bill of Rights and be in the "know" when we celebrate December 15, 1991—the 200th anniversary of the Bill of Rights!

CENTENNIAL JUBILEE, NSDAR

This chairman is pleased to report that four chapters sent information on the Search and Rescue Transmittal forms, and these items were accepted for the Archives. The Kansas State Society offered the bronze plaque that had been given in honor of Mrs. George Thatcher Guernsey, the only President General from Kansas, and this was also accepted by the National Society.

Many chapters, as well as seven individual members, contributed to the Centennial Call this year.

This is the second term as chairman of this committee. To call attention to the Centennial Jubilee, the projects and the sale items, this chairman dressed in the attire of the 1890's, with long dress and large hat with flowers. This costume was worn at the State and all District meetings when the report was given, and part of the time at the Centennial Display table which was set up at all meetings. This chairman made a large poster with Centennial logo (in color) which was shown on a floor easel at all meetings.

Program ideas for the coming year were suggested for the chapters to use in planning for the very special 100th birthday celebration.

ELLIS ISLAND RESTORATION

SOME NOTEWORTHY EVENTS IN KSDAR HISTORY

- 1894-Mrs. Martha A. Scott Hand, Holton, was appointed first State Regent.
- 1906-1908-The Santa Fe Trail was marked across Kansas with 96 Markers.
- 1907-The first KSDAR DIRECTORY was printed.
- 1917-Sarah Mitchell Guernsey (Mrs. George Thatcher Guernsey) was elected President General NSDAR 1917-1920.
- 1921-Through the efforts of Kansas Daughters, the American Indian Institute of Wichita was placed on the list of accredited schools of NSDAR.
- 1922-Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Steele deeded 5 acres in Scott County which contained the El Quartejejo site.
- 1925-KSDAR raised more than \$1,200 to purchase a marble shaft to mark the El Quartejejo site.
- 1929-Two rooms were selected for KSDAR in the Shawnee Methodist Mission which had recently been acquired by the State of Kansas.
- 1930-KSDAR budgeted \$25.00 to begin the traveling genealogical library, the predecessor of the KSDAR Library.
- 1943-KSDAR refurbished the basement staff lounge at NSDAR Headquarters which was assigned to Kansas.
- 1944-KSDAR paid for the largest bell in the carillon for the NSDAR Valley Forge Bell Project, Valley Forge, PA.
- 1945-The annual State Conference scheduled for March 22-23 at Emporia was canceled. All rail and hotel facilities were needed to move the military.
- 1946-1968-St. Francis Boy's Home became a KSDAR project.
- 1947-1954-KSDAR contributed generously to the Valley Forge Bell Tower Project.
- 1948-A permanent file was installed in the Kansas State Historical Society, Topeka for the archives of the Kansas Society.
- 1950-KSDAR relinquished the basement staff lounge at NSDAR.
- 1956-KSDAR contributed \$20,000 to the Eisenhower Foundation Fund.
- 1957-The first issue of the "Kansas DAR News" was published. A newsletter had previously been compiled and paid for by the State Regent and mailed to all members.
- 1959-KSDAR Library was housed in a private room at the Dodge City Public Library, an insurance policy was secured on the books.
KSDAR underwrites four of the five Pylons placed in a reflecting pool at the Eisenhower Center, Abilene, insuring them for \$16,000.
- 1962-Kansas Chapel in Memorial Continental Hall was dedicated April 13, 1962.
The Pylons at Eisenhower Center were moved to a new location.
- 1965-El Quartejejo was designated as a National Historic Landmark by the U. S. Department of the Interior.
- 1967-Sunflower windows from the Wichita Public Library were donated to KSDAR to be placed in the Kansas Chapel in NSDAR. The Sunflower

windows came from the rotunda of the old Carnegie Library, given to Wichita in 1915, the design of Mrs. Elizabeth (Stufflefield) Navas, an interior decorator of Wichita and New York City, a long time non-resident member of the Wichita Chapter. She was associated with Mrs. Murdock.

1969-Dedication for the Sunflower Windows in the Kansas Chapel on April 15, 1969.

1971-The KSDAR Library was moved to the Dodge City Recreation Center.

1973-The two museum rooms at the Shawnee Methodist Mission were refurbished.

1976-Black Dog Trail was marked at six locations in southeast Kansas.

1983-September 22-Rededication of Santa Fe Trail Marker, Fort Larned. Marker was moved from the parade grounds to the roadside park near the entrance of the Fort. The marker was originally placed in 1906.

1986-June 14-A plaque commemorating a famous watering place for travelers on the Santa Fe Trail was added to the base of the Santa Fe Trail marker located in Wright Park at Dodge City.

1988-September-An official marker with insignia was placed on the base of the flag pole at the Mahaffie Farmstead and Stagecoach Stop on the Santa Fe trail 1865, located at 1100 Kansas City Road, Olathe.

1990-September 17-A dedication of 3 ginkgo trees to commemorate the NSDAR Centennial Jubilee Celebration, the Eisenhower Birthday Centennial and Constitution Week was held at the Eisenhower Library in Abilene.

A Real Daughter was the daughter of a Revolutionary Soldier and also a member of the NSDAR. Real Daughters received a pension of \$8.00 a month from the National Society and were presented with a gold teaspoon. The following six Real Daughters have been members of the Kansas Society.

MARGARET WRIGHT BROWN (1803-1900) Member of Topeka Chapter. Buried in Camden, Ohio. Mrs. Brown was the mother of Mrs. W. A. Johnson, Kansas' third State Regent. Her father, William Wright, served both in the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812.

CYNTHIA SELLERS BUFFINGTON (1837-1918) Member of Eunice Sterling Chapter. Buried at Clearwater, Kansas. Her father, Howard Sellers, was born in 1762, was 14 when he enlisted and served as late as 1779.

LUCY PRATT EASTERBROOK (d. 1902) Member of Betty Washington Chapter. Buried in Lawrence, Kansas. Her father, Paul Pratt, was born in 1763.

TERESA EMMONS HOYT (1824-1913) Member of General Edward Hand Chapter. Buried in Lebo, Kansas. Her father, Jonathan Emmons, was born in 1760. He enlisted from Connecticut and served much of the time under General Lafayette.

FRANCES BUSH LOVELAND (1824-1923) Member of Captain Jesse Leavenworth Chapter. Buried in Soldier, Kansas. Her father, Zeba Bush, was born in 1763. He enlisted at the age of 16.

JANE SELLERS NIGH SWONGER (1828-1919) Member of Eunice Sterling Chapter. Buried at Clearwater, Kansas. Sister of Cynthia Sellers Buffington.

Another Real Daughter, HARRIET GREGG MELVIN (1803-1901), was a member of Betsy Ross Chapter, Dearing, New Hampshire. She is buried at Troy, Kansas.

CHARTER

Undersigned citizens of the State of Kansas, do hereby voluntarily associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private corporation under the laws of the State of Kansas, and do hereby certify:

FIRST: The name of this corporation shall be The Daughters of the American Revolution of Kansas.

SECOND: That this corporation is organized not for profit and that the purposes for which it is formed are: To perpetuate the memory of the men and women who aided in achieving American Independence in the Revolutionary War; to cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American liberty and foster patriotism and love of country; to preserve historic landmarks; to acquire and hold title to Historic spots which it desires to preserve; to plan and execute patriotic and historic work in the state.

THIRD: That the place where its business is to be transacted is at Topeka, Kansas.

FOURTH: That the term for which this corporation is to exist is Fifty Years.

FIFTH: That the number of directors of this corporation shall be three, and the names and residences of those who are appointed for the first year are:

SIXTH: No goods, chattels, lands, stock, etc.

RESOLUTION TO AMEND CORPORATE CHARTER

Whereas, it now appears to the Kansas Society of The National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, that its present corporate charter does not meet the needs of the Kansas Society at the present time and that said charter should be amended.

Now therefore, be it resolved by the Sixty first Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, that its present charter be amended as follows:

FIRST: The Name of the corporation is THE KANSAS SOCIETY of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the DAUGHTERS of the AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

SECOND: The location of the principal place of business in this State is Kansas State Historical Society.

THIRD: The location of its Registered Office in this State is Memorial Building—Jackson Avenue, Topeka.

FOURTH: The name and address of its Resident Agent in this State is Miss Alberta Pantle.

FIFTH: This corporation is organized NOT for profit, and the objects and purposes to be transacted and carried on are:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

(4) This corporation shall have power to receive title to real and personal property by gift, devise, bequest or purchase; to own, hold, sell, convey, lease and re-lease, let and sub-let real and personal property; and to manage, invest, re-invest or disburse the funds that may accrue from the holdings of such property in the manner provided by the By-Laws of The Kansas Society as now constituted or as hereafter amended. This corporation shall have the power to lend any surplus funds it may have on hand at any time and to enforce the collection thereof in any manner provided by law. This corporation shall have the power to sue and be sued.

No officer, director or member of this corporation shall be individually liable for the obligations of the corporation.

These Articles may be amended in any manner that shall be ordered by vote of the members of the corporation at any annual State Conference of The Kansas Society. This corporation shall have such other authority as may be provided in the By-Laws of the Kansas Society, not in contravention of the provisions of this Charter or the laws of the State of Kansas.

This corporation shall not have authority to issue capital stock.

SIXTH: The elected officer of The Kansas Society shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation, and shall be the managers of the

business of the corporation and shall hold, manage and control all property of the corporation.

The members of The Kansas Society and all persons who shall hereafter become members, who are in good standing under the By-Laws of said Society, shall be members of this corporation.

SEVENTH: The term for which this corporation is to exist is ONE HUNDRED YEARS.

EIGHTH: The number of Directors shall be TEN.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

[As amended March 16, 1986]

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be The Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II

Objects

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the State of Kansas.

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to our young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III

Members

Section 1. Members. The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters. The State Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of chapter, date of its organization, names of its officers and of its members.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Kansas Society shall be State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility. (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent and of State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within this state for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as an elected Chapter Regent. To be eligible for any other office in the State Society, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state for at least two years. No state officer, except the State Librarian, shall be eligible to two consecutive terms in the same office. A member of the National Society who has served one term in any state office shall be eligible for reelection to a second term in another office. An officer of the Kansas Society who has served two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for reelection to a state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year. An officer who has served more than a half term shall be deemed to have served a term in that office.

(b) A chapter shall not have more than one State Officer at a time except when it seems feasible for the State Regent and the Corresponding Secretary to be from the same chapter.

Section 3. Terms. All officers shall be elected to serve for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Vacancy. Should the office of State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by State Board of Management until the next State Conference when the Conference shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 5. Honorary Officers. In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a three fourths vote by ballot at the State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent. Honorary office shall entitle the holder to a vote in the State Conference.

Section 6. Dismissal. Any State Officer absent from the State or incapacitated from carrying out her duties for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer.

ARTICLE V

Nomination and Election

Section 1. Tenure. All officers shall be elected at the State Conference in the year of the election of National Officers. The election shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 2. Nominating Committee. There shall be a nomination committee which shall consist of five members, one elected from each of the four districts at the regular District Meeting prior to the State election, and one member from the State at large who shall be elected at the Fall State Board of Management Meeting and who shall serve as the Chairman.

Section 3. Duties. It shall be the duty of the nominating committee, immediately after its election and no later than November first, to notify all chapters of the impending election and the final date on which names of nominees shall be accepted. The committee shall nominate a candidate for each office at the State Conference. Candidates shall be selected from all Districts of the State if possible. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter signed by the Chapter Regent and Secretary.

Section 4. Report. The report of the nominating committee shall be sent to the Regent of each chapter and to all State Officers and State Chairmen on or before January fifteenth.

Section 5. Vice President General. Endorsement for candidates for Vice President General shall be by ballot and shall require a majority vote by the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI

Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the National Society.

Section 2. State Regent. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be the executive officer, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws and shall be ex officio member of all committees except the nominating committee. She shall sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer requiring a warrant. She shall, with the assistance of the Conference Chairman, prepare the program for the State Conference. She shall appoint a State Parliamentarian. She shall, each year, immediately after the State Conference, send to each Chapter Regent the name and addresses of the State Chairmen of the National Committees and of any other appointees. She shall visit each Chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Section 3. State Vice Regent. The State Vice Regent shall, in the absence or inability of the State Regent, perform the duties of that office. She shall perform those duties designated by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain. The State Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require and shall with the aid of the State Registrar, hold a memorial service at each annual State Conference. Whenever possible, she shall communicate with members of the Kansas Chapters who are ill or in distress.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary. (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management, and the Executive Committee. She shall notify State Officers, Committee Chairmen, and Chapter Regents of any action taken at these meetings affecting their duties. She shall countersign all orders drawn on the State Treasurer requiring a warrant and signed by the State Regent. She shall place on file all of the reports of State Officers, Committee Chairmen and Chapter Regents and shall preserve such reports for a period of not less than one year.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile material, to edit, and have published the Proceedings of the State Conference, with the assistance of a proofreading committee to be selected by the State Recording Secretary. All proofs shall be approved by the State Regent before publication. The Secretary shall send the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules not later than six months after the State Conference. She shall keep a list of all chapters in each district and shall have this list published each year in the Proceedings.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary. The State Corresponding Secretary shall notify all State Officers, committee chairmen of the Kansas Society, the Regent of each chapter in good standing, Honorary State Regents and the National Officers whose membership is within the State of the time of the State Conference, not less than sixty days previous to the date designated. She shall notify the state Officers and Delegates of any special meeting that may be called. She shall send out notices of meetings of the Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior thereto. Before January first, she shall send to each Chapter Regent three credential blank forms and three forms for reporting chapter officers. Before Continental Congress each year, she shall send to the Organizing Secretary General a typewritten list of the names and addresses of the officers of the local chapters made into a directory form. She shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society and shall assist the State Regent in her official correspondence. Immediately after the State Conference, she shall send to each Chapter Regent a list of the newly elected State Officers with their addresses.

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and the Organizing Regent in organizing new chapters. She shall ascertain the possibilities of organizing a new chapter where a new chapter is contemplated. She shall be responsible for correspondence relative to the organization of new chapters. She shall give assistance to existing chapters in sustaining their membership quota as required by the National Society.

Section 8. State Treasurer. The State Treasurer shall receive all funds for the Society. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the Kansas Society upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary. Upon assuming the duties of her office, she may, with the approval of the Executive Committee, transfer funds to a convenient, federally insured banking institution; this action shall be ratified at the next meeting of the State Board of Management. She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on the 31st day of January and submit same for audit to a public accountant in time to have the auditor's report for the annual State Conference. She shall give bond for the faithful discharge of her duties, amount to be fixed and the expenses to be borne by the Kansas Society. She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds. She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall pass them on to her successor.

Section 9. State Registrar. The State Registrar shall keep the card files of the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, as far as possible, of members at large residing in Kansas. These records shall include: name, including maiden name in full and, if married; husband's name in full; date of admission to the National Society; National number; name of

chapter, name and rank of ancestor; spouse of ancestor, if known; colony or state and branch of service in which ancestor served. In recording a transfer, both date of acceptance by the National Society and the date of transfer shall be given. On or before January first, the State Registrar shall send blank forms to the Chapter Registrars requiring an accurate report of all members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, transferred, married or deceased during the preceding year. The State Registrar shall prepare and have printed a necrology list for the memorial service at State Conference.

Section 10. State Historian. The State Historian shall stimulate interest in the history of Kansas and shall direct such historical work as may be required by the State Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall compile the annual report for the Historian General. Whenever possible, she shall attend especially to the period of the American Revolution. She shall keep a reference record of the documents and relics which may come into the possession of the Kansas Society. She shall keep on file a record of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

Section 11. State Librarian. The State Librarian shall collect and preserve such books, papers, microfilm, and equipment as may be of historical and genealogical interest and value to the Daughters of the American Revolution. When possible, she shall send a duplicate copy of such books and papers to the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington. She shall compile and keep up to date a list of all materials and equipment in the Kansas State DAR Library.

In her annual report, she shall list all materials sent to the National Society Library and all materials received during the year for the Kansas State DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Proceedings of the State Conference. She shall have supervision of the Kansas State DAR Library.

Section 12. State Reporter. The State Reporter shall be the Editor of the "Kansas DAR News," and shall keep a file of the current KSDAR mailing list. She shall be an ex officio member of the Public Relations Committee and of the Conference Press Committee. She shall send a short report of the Kansas State DAR Conference to the "DAR Magazine."

Section 13. Retiring Officers. Each officer and Committee Chairman, having in her possession properties of the Kansas Society shall list them and receive a transfer receipt for them from her successor. She shall give a duplicate copy of this inventory to the State Regent-Elect.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

Section 1. Annual. The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March, unless otherwise ordered by the State Regent and the State Board of Management. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the District Directors, the Chapter Regents, and the Chairmen of all committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. State Conference. The date and place of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the hostess District.

Section 3. Voting Members. The voting members of the State Conference shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regent, or in her absence the First Vice Regent or the Regent's alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. A member holding two or more offices each carrying a vote at the annual State Conference shall be limited to vote in only one of the offices held.

Section 4. Qualification. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters. Delegates and alternates, except in the case of a Regent or first Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter, shall have been members of their chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which they are elected and they shall be in good standing.

Section 5. Chapter Delegates. The representation of a chapter at the annual State Conference or at any other meeting of the State Society shall be three times the representation to which the chapter is entitled in the Continental Congress and shall be as follows:

Section 6. Alternates. The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of voters to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 7. Election of Delegates. Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected on or before the first day of February each year. Immediately after the election, the three credential blank forms for the delegates and alternates shall be filled in and signed by the Chapter Regent and Treasurer and sent to the State Corresponding Secretary. Chapter Regents are authorized to fill vacancies in their delegations at the State Conference from duly elected alternates in the order designated by the chapter.

Section 8. Privileges. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolutions who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Kansas shall be entitled to be present at the meeting of the State Conference.

Section 9. Privileges. The State Conference shall grant the privilege of the floor, without vote, to the State Chairmen and District Directors if they are not duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 10. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. At least fifteen days notice shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum. Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the State, the Chapter Regent or in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent of each chapter in the state.

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the Fall preceding the District meetings and the other meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. At least thirty days notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, excepting that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Vacancies. The State Board of Management shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the State Offices. Notice of such vacancy shall be given in the call for the meeting of the State Board. The vote shall be by ballot. The officers so elected shall hold office until the next State Conference when officers shall be elected in the usual manner for the unexpired term.

Section 6. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior thereto.

Section 7. Quorum. Eleven voting members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX Executive Committee

Section 1. Meetings. All elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive committee.

Section 2. Meetings. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Regent or upon written request of three of its members. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given.

Section 3. Authority. The State Board of Management may authorize the Executive Committee to perform such specific duties between meetings of the Board as the Board may from time to time deem advisable. The State Regent may consult the Executive Committee in emergencies requiring attention between meetings of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X

Finance

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be from February first through January thirty-first.

Section 2. Dues. The annual state dues of a chapter in the Kansas Society shall be \$2.50 for each member of the chapter, payable in advance. Those dues shall be sent to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of December. A member whose dues are not paid by January first shall not be a delegate to the State Conference. The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after May first shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year.

Section 3. Registration Fee. Daughters of the American Revolution who attend the State Conference shall pay a registration fee not to exceed five dollars, such sum to be given to the hostess district to defray Conference expenses. The amount remaining in this fund at the close of the State Conference shall be given to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Office Expense. Expenses of the State Officers and State Committees, as allotted in the budget, shall be paid by the State Treasurer on the presentation of itemized statements in writing. Additional necessary expenses shall be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee for approval.

ARTICLE XI

Committees

Section 1. Finance. A Finance committee, composed of the State Treasurer as Chairman, the State Recording Secretary, and three members appointed by the State Regent, shall consider requests for appropriations and shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The budget, as approved by the State Board of Management, shall then be presented to the State Conference for adoption. The Committee may report to any meeting of the State Board of Management such recommendations with regard to the finances of the Kansas State Society as it may deem essential for the best interest of the society.

Section 2. Kansas DAR Scholarship. The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee, composed of a chairman and two members to be appointed by the Regent, shall supervise the selection of the Kansas DAR Scholarship recipient. The Scholarship Fund is maintained by contributions from the chapters and individuals and from interest on monies invested for this purpose.

Section 3. Printing and Stationery. The Printing and Stationery Committee, composed of the State Regent as Chairman, the State Vice Regent, and the State Recording Secretary, shall have charge of the printing of suitable stationery for the State Officers and Chairmen of Committees. This committee shall have charge of securing the proper supplies for the State Officers.

Section 4. Credentials. The Credentials Committee, consisting of a Chairman from the membership of the State at-large and four members from the membership of the hostess chapters, shall be appointed by the State Regent and shall have charge of the registration and checking of credentials at the State Conference. The State Corresponding Secretary, the State Treasurer, and the State Registrar shall act as advisors to this committee.

Section 5. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two members, appointed by the State Regent. Amendments and Recommendations from the previous State Conference, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, or Chapters, shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. This committee shall present

to each chapter all such recommendations thirty days prior to the State Conferences, and shall present such recommendations to the State Conference for action.

Section 6. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chairman and four members appointed by the State Regent before the Fall meeting of the State Board of Management. Resolutions may be presented to this committee for consideration any time during the year. No resolution shall be presented from the floor of the State Conference that has not previously been presented to the Committee, courtesy resolution excepted.

Section 7. Public Relations. The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the chairman appointed by the Regent, and a committee not to exceed four members to be selected by the chairman. The State Reporter shall be an ex officio member of the committee. This committee shall prepare and distribute all information for the press.

Section 8. Other Committees. Such other committees, standing or special, or such chairmen of committees as are not otherwise provided for in these Bylaws, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society shall authorize or as the National Society shall require.

ARTICLE XII Reports

Section 1. Reports of Proceedings. Each State Officer, the Regent of each chapter, the Director of each District, the chairman of each standing committee, and the chairmen of such special committees as may be requested by the State Regent, shall prepare a condensed report, not exceeding 200 words. These reports shall be typed in triplicate, one copy for the State Regent and two for the Recording Secretary and sent not later than March first each year. These reports covering the year's work, shall be prepared for the State Conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 2. Reports to the State Regent. Each State Chairman shall send to the State Regent, not later than March first of each year, a copy of the statistical report prepared for the National Chairman or Vice Chairman. This information will be used by the State Regent in compiling her annual report to the Continental Congress.

ARTICLE XIII Districts

Section 1. Names. At the direction of the Kansas Society the State shall be divided into four Districts. These will be known as the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Districts, respectively. The names of the chapters in each district are set out in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Meetings. District meetings shall be held each year in the Fall to expand the program of the State and National Society to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members and to acquaint them with the State Officers and State Chairmen. The place and time of the meeting shall be arranged by the District Officers in cooperation with the State Vice Regent. The call for the meeting shall be published in the summer issue of the Kansas DAR News or shall be sent by the District Director to the District Chapters, State Officers and State Chairmen.

Section 3. Officers. Each district shall at its annual meeting elect its own officers which shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The term of office shall be one year and no officer may serve more than three years.

Section 4. Entertainment of State Conference. The Districts shall entertain the State Conference by rotation in the following order: Northwest District, Northeast District, Southeast District and Southwest District except in an emergency.

ARTICLE XIV Chapter

Section 1. Officers. The chapters shall elect their officers on or before January thirty-first of the year in which they elect officers. Chapter officers shall assume the duties of office by the June meeting following the meeting of the Continental Congress.

Section 2. Report of Election. On or before March first of each year, the Chapter Recording Secretary shall send to the State Corresponding Secretary, on forms furnished by the State

Corresponding Secretary, three legible typewritten lists or one original and two legible photocopies of the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year.

Section 3. Committee Chairmen. Within thirty days after installation the Regent of each Chapter will send a postal card to the State Chairman of each National Committee, giving her the name and address of the Chapter Chairman of that Committee.

Section 4. Chapter Treasurer. Chapter Treasurers shall send contributions to the State Treasurer on or before January thirtieth in order to have them included in the State Treasurer's annual report.

ARTICLE XV

Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in **Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised** shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XVI

Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days before the State Conference, and provided further that the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society or by the Bylaws Committee. In case an amendment has been proposed by a chapter, it shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the chapters in this State and of this Society shall become a law of the chapters and of the Kansas Society without notice of amendment.

STANDING RULES
Adopted by the Ninety-second KSDAR Conference
March 17, 1990

Number 1. The report of the Kansas Society shall be known as the Annual Report and Proceedings of the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The report shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; State Officers, 1 to 3 each; Chapter Regents, 1 each; Chapters, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National and State committees, 1 each; Senior State President C.A.R., 1; District Directors, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2; the President General, NSDAR, 1; and the Kansas State Historical Society, 1. In an election year, one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and the chairmen of committees. Except for State Officers, no one individual shall receive more than one free copy. Other members desiring copies may place by June 1 with the State Recording Secretary a prepaid order at four dollars per copy.

Number 2. At the close of each administration it shall be the duty of the State Historian to prepare a summary of the highlights of the past three years to be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Number 3. At least two issues of the Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year and mailed to each member. The printing and mailing expenses shall be borne by the State Society.

Number 4. The State Registrar shall furnish the editor of the Kansas DAR News a current mailing list.

Number 5. A sum of \$1,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

Number 6. Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed each State Officer to partially defray her State Conference expenses.

Number 7. Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent at Continental Congress; arrangements shall be made by the State Treasurer.

Number 8. Fifty dollars shall be allotted to the State Regent for Kansas Pages at Continental Congress.

Number 9. Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the General Fund ten cents per chapter member for State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Number 10. Each year, each chapter shall pay five cents per member for the support of the Kansas State Society Children of the American Revolution. The KSDAR State Treasurer shall forward these funds to the K.S.C.A.R. Senior State Treasurer.

Number 11. Each year each chapter in Kansas shall pay one dollar for the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund.

Number 12. Each year, each chapter in Kansas shall pay five cents per member for the Kansas DAR Library Fund.

Number 13. Each year, on or before September 15, each chapter shall send copies of its chapter yearbook to the State Officers, the State Chairman of the Membership Committee, and 2 copies to the State Chairman of the Program Committee.

Number 14. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, and Historian shall have the custody of the locked file in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent, and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

Number 15. The State Regent may send a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

Number 16. The State Regent shall have the State Regent's pin appraised by the J. E. Caldwell Company once during her administration, and if the pin is lost the State Society shall assume the cost of replacing it.

Number 17. The Kansas DAR Library shall be located in the Dodge City Recreation Center at Avenue G and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

(a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.

(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee that shall be known as the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee to assume care of the library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of books, materials and equipment; shall assist the State Librarian when possible in the repair and maintenance of these items; and shall receive and answer all requests for the loan of books and other materials.

(c) The annual rent of \$150 shall be paid by January 15 to the Kansas Genealogical Society.

(d) Materials submitted to the Kansas DAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. To avoid duplication, donors shall check with the State Librarian before books are sent.

Number 18. An endowment Fund for the support of the Kansas DAR Library has been established.

(a) Monies contributed to the Endowment Fund shall be under the jurisdiction of the State Treasurer.

(b) The annual interest accrued from the fund shall pay for the following annual library expenses; rent, insurance, operating expenses, and purchase and maintenance of equipment.

Number 19. The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship shall be given once in each KSDAR Administration to a high school senior who is entering a two or four year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of National Defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity, and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Chairman, the State National Defense Chairman, and the State Regent.

Number 20. A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school senior who has DAR eligibility or to a member of DAR; proof of enrollment in a two or four year college or university shall be required.

Number 21. The Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship shall provide a college scholarship for a girl graduating from high school. The recipient of this scholarship shall have acceptable scholastic ability, show financial need, be a citizen of the United States of America, and be eligible for membership in the DAR. This award is to be given once in each KSDAR administration.

If the two rooms at the Shawnee Mission in Fairway, Kansas, formerly supported by the KSDAR are again maintained and refurbished by the Kansas Daughters, the interest from this fund shall be used for these purposes and take precedence over the scholarship fund.

Number 22. The Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarship, in memory of her parents, Albert Jesse Jones and Mabel Clare Early Jones, shall be awarded to a deserving boy or girl, preferably one who is at least 1/4 Pottawatomie Indian. If a deserving individual of Pottawatomie heritage is not available another Indian heritage may be substituted. The interest from the \$3,000 gift shall be awarded once every three years for attendance at an accredited college or university. Members of the scholarship committee who will supervise the awarding of the scholarship shall consist of: the KSDAR Scholarship Chairman, the KSDAR American Indians Chairman and a member of the Eunice Sterling Chapter.

Number 23. State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Honorary State Regents may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management with voice but no vote.

Number 24. At the Conference Opening, the State Regent shall appoint a committee to approve the minutes of the closing meeting of the State Conference.

Number 25. The hospitality of the following persons, if attending the State Conference at the official invitation of the State Regent, shall be a Conference expense: Candidates for President General, NSDAR; National Officers or National appointees appearing as speakers; two members of the National Board of Management; representatives of the DAR Schools, Approved Schools, and Indian Schools; or any designated speaker for a special program or event.

Number 26. (a) A \$10 limit shall be placed on awards at State Conference

(b) Interest accrued annually from the Mary Lempenau Permanent Trust of \$750 shall pay monetary awards at State Conference.

Number 27. The runner-up in the Kansas Society DAR Good Citizens contest shall be awarded a gift.

Number 28. The Kansas Society shall present to the State Regent an Ex-State Regent's Pin or, if she has been elected Honorary State Regent, an Honorary State Regent's Pin at the end of her term of office, providing that she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

Number 29. The Kansas Society shall present to the Conference Chairman a Kansas Pin, or equivalent remuneration, at the close of the State Conference.

Number 30. In the event that KSDAR should have a national winner in any NSDAR youth competition in which the winner is required to attend Continental Congress, the Kansas Society shall assume financial responsibility for transportation and three days' housing for the contestant and a chaperon to attend Continental Congress to receive the award.

Number 31. A pilgrimage to a historically significant Kansas site may be held annually on Constitution Day, September 17. Local chapters may act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed fifty dollars shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the pilgrimage.

Number 32. The schedule for the Fall Tour shall be made before March 1 by the State Regent and State Vice Regent in consultation with the four District Directors and representatives of the hostess chapters. All plans for the tour shall be finalized by June 1.

Number 33. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

Number 34. An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings and other pertinent historical information shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings every ten years, beginning in 1980.

Number 35. A Directory of members may be printed every ten years beginning in 1990.

Number 36. The Chapters in each District are as follows: NORTHEAST—Arthur Barrett, Atchison, Betty Washington, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, Emporia, General Edward Hand, James Ross, John Haupt, Marais des Cygnes, Mission Hills, Olathe, Prairie Rose, Sagamore, Samuel Linscott, Shawnee Mission, Tomahawk, Topeka, and Wyandot. NORTHWEST—Abilene, Council Oak, Courtney-Spalding, Desire Tobey Sears, Good-Land, John Athey, Lois Warner, Mary Wade Strother, Nathan Edson, Newton, Polly Ogden, Sarah Steward, and Smoky Hill. SOUTHEAST—Betty Bonney, Cofachique, Esther Lowrey, Four Winds, Isabella Weldin, Jane Dean Coffey, Molly Foster Berry, Neodesha, Oceanus Hopkins, Peleg Gorton, and Susannah French Putney. SOUTHWEST—Byrd Prewitt, Cimarron River Valley, Dodge City, Eunice Sterling, Flores del Sol, Fort Lamed, Jeremiah Howard, Jonathan Gilbert, Kanza, Little Arkansas, Little Osage Trail, Martha Loving Ferrell, Martha Vail, Minisa, Ninnescah, Randolph Loving, Uvedale, Wichita, and William Wilson.

Number 37. These rules may be amended or suspended at any State Conference by a majority vote.
