





DOROTHY HELEN DART BYLER

Dorothy Helen Dart Byler was born march 12, 1907, to Delcie Duvall Dart and Charles Milburn Dart on the family farm neat Halstead, Kansas. The eldest of three daughters, Dorothy lived her entire life in Harvey County.

Dorothy married Rueben E. Byler March 3, 1926, at Newton. They celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary with a family dinner a few months before her death, July 9, 1991. They had six children - Maridell Wylie of Tyler, Texas, Dorothy Ann Vawter of Colorado Springs, Sally Andus of Ft. Collins, Colorado. Two sons, Byron and Gordon, and a daughter, Martha Jane Dicks, preceded her in death.

Dorothy joined Newton Chapter DAR October 11, 1950 at the same time as her sister Millicent; their national numbers were consecutive. The youngest sister, Marguerite, joined Captain Jesse Leavenworth Chapter April the same year. Dorothy served her chapter as Regent, Vice Regent, Treasurer and on numerous committees. She liked to tell the story that Newton Chapter wasn't even reporting until Connie Decker urged her to do so, even if the report was "no activity."

Dorothy was State Corresponding Secretary (1974-77) in the administration of Mrs. Francis L. Johnson. As chairman of the State Nominating Committee she presented the report when Mrs. Wallace R. Decker, "Connie," headed the slate as State Regent.

Dorothy loved State Conference and the friendships she formed there. She always brought a few jars of sand hill plum jelly for the Junior Bazaar. In later years she liked to "bum" a ride home with chapter members, directing their route on an off-beaten path, stopping for lunch at an especially good place she knew, and pointing out a bridge or two her husband Rueben, had constructed in earlier years.

She was active in Northwest District as Treasurer and on the nominating committee. She attended Continental Congress several times and held membership in Daughters of Colonial Wars, Mayflower Descendants, and Descendants of French Huguenots.

In addition to being a homemaker, Dorothy was secretary/office manager at the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service office.

She was a volunteer in many groups. during WWII it was the Red Cross, then Girl Scouts, 4-H, and always in her church, Salem United Methodist of Newton, where she taught Sunday School and served on committees. She volunteered also at Friendly Acres, served on the board, and edited their newsletter for many years. She loved to write and kept a journal. She wrote long letters to her children and grandchildren and to nephcws during the war years, providing love and news from home. She was a charter member of Emma Happy Hour EHU and a member of Atelier study group and of Professional Secretaries International.

In 1965 Dorothy was accorded the distinct honor of being named the Newton Kansan Woman-of-the-Year for community and civic service.

Dorothy is survived by her husband Rueben, three daughters, her sister Millicent Claassen, grand children, great-grand children, nieces, nephews, and by scores of friends in Newton and throughout the state who miss her pleasant countenance, her strength and her wise counsel.

MINUTES

Saturday, March 21, 1992

The Ninety-fourth State Conference of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution reconvened March 22, 1992 at the Wichita Airport Hilton, Wichita, Kansas.

The State Regent, Mrs. Richard C. McGehee, called the Conference to order at 9:55 a.m. The invocation was given by Mrs. Kenneth M. Beal, State Chaplain. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Larry Overmiller, State Chairman. The first and fourth stanzas of the National Anthem were sung, led by Miss Jeanne Shreve, State Chairman of the American Heritage Committee. Repetition of the Kansas Creed was led by Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., Honorary State Regent.

The Colors were posted and the Pages retired.

The State Regent introduced those seated at the head table: Mrs. Francis L. Johnson, Past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent; Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Billy P. Compton, Past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Joseph Colburn, Ohio State Regent; Miss Margaret DeMoville, Mississippi State Regent; Mrs. Rice Youell, Jr., National Vice-Chairman, Constitution of the United States of America; Mrs. Raymond J. Kaufman, State Vice Regent; Mrs. Kenneth M. Beal, State Chaplain; Mrs. Glen E. Mayden, State Recording Secretary; Mrs. Stan Kippenberger, State Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Harold B. Myers, State Organizing Secretary; Mrs. W. Ward Marrs, State Treasurer; Mrs. Vincent Traffas, State Registrar; Mrs. Richard D. Standrich, State Historian; Mrs. William D. Daniels, State Librarian; Mrs. Ruth Keys Clark, State Reporter and Mrs. George Milbank, State Parliamentarian. Mrs. Charles Theis, National Chairman of Program, was also recognized.

The minutes of the Friday morning and afternoon sessions were read by the Recording Secretary, Mrs. Mayden, and approved as read. Resumes of the Friday luncheon and evening banquet were also read by Mrs. Mayden. Mrs. E. Lawrence Wulfmeyer, Resolutions Chairman, presented three Resolutions on second reading. On the reading of the Resolution, *OFFICIAL LANGUAGE*, motion from the Floor by Mrs. John McGuire "to amend the "Official Language" resolution by striking out the word 'government' in the fifth line of the fourth "Whereas" and insert 'the United States of America'." There was a second and the motion carried. The Chairman moved the adoption of the Resolution as amended. Motion carried.

On the reading of the Resolution, *RESPONSIBLE CITIZENSHIP*, Mrs. Rogers moved "to strike the words 'a unique' in the fourth "Whereas" and insert 'an important'." Motion was seconded and carried. The Chairman moved the adoption of the Resolution as amended. Motion carried.

OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

- Whereas, In the words of Alexis de Tocqueville, "The tie of language is perhaps the strongest and most durable that can unite mankind"; and Whereas, More than 150 languages are spoken in America, making it the most culturally diverse nation in the world, and more and more ethnic
- groups are demanding government services in their native tongues; and Whereas, An Act to make English the official language of the United States
- of America does not deny the right of ethnic groups to speak their native tongues in their homes and communities, nor does it restrict the study of foreign languages in the public schools; and
- Whereas, Three bills have been introduced in the United States Congress, two of which, H.R. 123 and S. 434, would make English the official language of government by statute, and the third, House Joint Resolution 81 - English Language Amendment, would make it the official language of the United States of America by amending the United States Constitution;
- <u>Resolved</u>, That the members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, study the content of these three bills and urge their elected representatives in Washington, D.C. to join in sponsoring and in supporting the strongest possible legislation to make English the official language of the United States of America.

RESPONSIBLE CITIZENSHIP

Whereas, Members of Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution are pledged to foster patriotic citizenship and to promote the development of an enlightened public opinion; and
Whereas, Responsible citizens seek to become informed on national and local governmental issues and candidates for office; and
Whereas, A state of indifference and apathy exists with regard to the governing process of this country, with statistics showing that less than 50% of the citizens eligible to vote exercised that right in the 1988 elections; and

- Whereas, The year 1992 presents an important opportunity for American citizens to become personally and individually involved in our country's governing process;
- <u>Resolved</u>, That members of Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution are urged to attend town hall meetings and forums, to listen to debates of candidates and participate in the discussion of crucial issues; to register to vote and urge others to do so, and to exercise that right to vote in an intelligent and responsible manner. The Resolutions Committee, Mrs. E. Lawrence Wulfmeyer, Chairman,

Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr. and Mrs. Floyd Jones presented the Courtesy Resolution which was adopted by a vote of the Conference.

- Resolved, That special appreciation be expressed to the Conference guests: Miss Margaret DeMoville, Mississippi State Regent, speaker for the Friday luncheon; Mrs. Joseph Colburn, Ohio State Regent, the Saturday luncheon speaker; and Mrs. Rice Youell, Jr., the Bill of Rights National Committee Chairman, speaker for the Saturday night banquet; and
- Resolved, That gratitude be tendered Mrs. Richard Standrich, State Historian, who presided at the Awards Ceremonies, and Mrs. Kenneth M. Beal, State Chaplain, for the Memorial Service; and
- Resolved, That thanks be given to members and guests who shared their musical talents during the conference: Pianists Mrs. Don Myers, Mrs. L. William Reel, and Mrs. Martin Robl; Ray Shidler and his
 - companion banjoist; "The Troubadors," Kansas Newman College singers under the direction of Janice Jaworsky; and Mrs. James Kirkham, handbell ringer; and
- Resolved, That special gratitude be expressed to Mrs. Larry D. Ream, Conference Chairman; to Miss Shirley Coupal, Conference Marshal; to the helpful pages and their Chairman, Mrs. Tod Hettenbach; to all state and chapter officers and conference chairmen who participated in the conference, and to all chapters in Southwest District which provided conference refreshments and table decorations for the luncheons and banquets; and

Resolved, That Wichita Mayor Robert Knight, and the sales and catering office and staff of the Wichita Airport Hilton be thanked for their courtesy, co-operation and hospitality.

The final report of the Credentials Committee was given by the Chairman, Mrs. Bill Jackson, who moved its acceptance: National Officers - 0, Honorary State Regents - 3, State Officers - 11, Chapter Regents - 38, Delegates - 129, Alternates - 29, Members - 32, Visitors - 5, Eligible to vote - 181, Total registration - 258. Motion carried.

The Regent called for Recommendations from the Board of Management. The Recording Secretary read the following: "I move at the recommendation of the Finance Committee, that Standing Rule # 5 be amended by inserting between the words 'Congress' and 'arrangements' the words 'and twenty-five dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent-elect.' Standing Rule # 5 will then read, "Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent at Continental Congress; and twenty-five dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent-elect. Arrangements shall be made by the State Treasurer"."

The recommendation was adopted.

Mrs. W. Ward Marrs, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the budget for 1992-1993. Printed copies of the Proposed Budget were distributed. Mrs. Marrs noted two changes to be made; that under EXPENSE — OFFICER, line 3 Chaplain the amount read \$45.00 and the last line of the report "Projected Net Gain — \$15.00", be deleted. Mrs. Marrs moved the adoption of the Proposed Budget as amended. Motion carried.

Mrs. George Milbank, Chairman, read the following, "The Bylaws Committee recommends to the 1992 State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution that the Corporate Charter of the Kansas Society be amended to be current with the requirements of the Office of the Secretary of State of Kansas. The Charter was last amended on June 8, 1959."

The committee hereby moves the following amendments:

FIRST: The name of the corporation is <u>the Kansas Society of the National</u> Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

SECOND: "The location of the principal place of business in this State is Kansas State Historical Society." Amend by striking out the entire sentence and INSERTING the sentence: "The name and address of its Resident Agent in this State is ______, State Treasurer,

_. (address)"

THIRD: The charter states: "The location of its Registered Office in the State is the Memorial Building - Jackson Avenue, Topeka." Recommendation of the Secretary of State's office is to strike out this section, as it is not needed. FOURTH: The present statement is: "<u>The name and address of the</u> <u>Resident Agent in this State is Miss Alberta Pantle</u>." Recommendation to strike out as it is included in the Second section.

As the Third and Fourth sections are recommended to be rescinded, the next section would be the Third instead of the Fifth.

FIFTH: Will become THIRD with the following changes: in the next to last paragraph strike out the words "<u>in any manner that shall be ordered by</u> vote of the members of the Corporation" and insert the words "<u>by a 2/3 vote</u>, provided a copy of the proposed amendments has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the Annual State Conference."

SIXTH: Will become FOURTH.

SEVENTH: Will become FIFTH.

EIGHTH: "Strike out."

Mrs. Milbank moved the adoption of the revised Corporate Charter. Motion carried. The State Regent announced the new Charter would be printed on the pages preceding the Bylaws in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Mrs. Milbank reported that a directive from the National Parliamentarian last April requires strict adherence to the National Bylaws which gives the date of January 1 as the date to pay dues. This requires changes to be made in:

ARTICLE IV - Fees and Dues. Section 2. Dues. (should read) "The annual state dues of a chapter shall be \$2.50 per chapter member, payable to the State Treasurer before <u>January 1</u>."

ARTICLE VIII - Meetings - Section 4. Chapter delegates and Alternates. (a) (should read) "The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any meeting of the Kansas Society during the year shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been paid by the January 1 preceding the State Conference."

ARTICLE XIII - Chapters - Section 4, (b) (should state) "No Regent, First Vice Regent, delegate or alternate whose dues for the current year have not been received by the State Treasurer on or before the January 1 preceding State Conference shall be entitled to represent her chapter."

ARTICLE XIII - Chapters - Section 7, (b) (should read) "Each year before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer shall remit the annual state dues of \$2.50 for every active member in the chapter to the State Treasurer. A computer printout of the chapter membership, received by the Chapter Treasurer from the State Treasurer in September, shall accompany the chapter's payment of annual state dues. A member whose state dues have not been paid by January 1 shall be ineligible to serve as a delegate or an alternate at the State Conference."

These changes will be printed in the 1992 Annual Report and Proceedings.

To conform to the requirements of the Bonding Company and the Auditor, the Bylaws Committee proposed the following amendments to the KSDAR Bylaws. ARTICLE VII - Duties of Officers, Section 2. State Regent (3rd paragraph) - Strike out: "<u>shall sign all vouchers drawn on the State Treasurer</u>; - -" and insert the words "<u>she shall co-sign all checks drawn on the Kansas</u> <u>Society Accounts</u>; - - -."

ARTICLE VII - Duties of Officers, Section 5. State Recording Secretary (a) 4th paragraph - Strike out: "<u>She shall countersign all vouchers drawn on</u> the State Treasurer and signed by the State Regent." and insert the words "<u>She</u> may co- sign checks drawn on the Kansas Society Accounts."

ARTICLES VII - Duties of Officers, Section 8. State Treasurer - strike out "upon orders signed by the State Regent and countersigned by the State Recording Secretary" and add the sentence "All checks drawn on the Kansas Society Accounts shall be co-signed by the State Regent except in cases of emergency when the State Recording Secretary may co-sign."

Mrs. Milbank moved the adoption of the proposed amendments. Motion carried.

The following changes in the Standing Rules were presented by Mrs. Milbank and she moved the adoption of each:

Number 1. Paragraph 1, line 4, strike out "Chapter Regents, 1 each". After the third sentence, insert the following sentence, "<u>Chapter Regents may</u> receive a free copy by special request made before June 1". Motion carried.

Number 15. Amend by striking out "\$150" and inserting "\$300" and further amend by striking out "15" and inserting "1." It would then read, "The annual rent of \$300 shall be paid by January 1 to the Kansas Genealogical Society." Motion carried.

Number 26. Rescind S.R. #26 as recommended by the Executive Committee. Motion carried.

Number 28. Rescind S.R. #28 as recommended by the Fall Board of Management. Motion carried.

Number 34. Amend by inserting "<u>Prairie Flint Hills</u>" after "Olathe" in line three and "<u>Stone Corral</u>" after "Smoky Hill" in line six. Motion carried.

Two new Standing Rules were recommended by the Fall Board of Management and adopted by a vote of the Conference:

(1) "The Kansas State Outstanding Junior shall be awarded \$150 if she attends Continental Congress, to be paid from the General Fund."

(2) "A national winner of the Good Citizens Contest, American History Essay Contest, Outstanding Junior Contest and V.A. Volunteer shall be awarded \$250 toward transportation expenses to attend Continental Congress. The money awarded shall be paid from the Award Transportation Fund."

The State Regent expressed appreciation for the work of the Bylaws Committee and asked them to stand; Mrs. Milbank, Chairman, Mrs. W. Macy Lewis and Mrs. Harold N. Ottaway.

The State Officers retired from the platform and recipients of the various awards were seated at the speaker's table.

Mrs. Richard Standrich, State Historian, presided at the Awards Ceremony. She introduced each contest chairman who then presented the winners.

"Famous Women of the Revolution" was the topic for the American History essay contest. Mrs. C. Richard Cain, American History Month Chairman, presented the following winners: fifth grade, Margaret Katherine Anderson, sponsored by Betty Washington Chapter, Lawrence; sixth grade, Shelly Anne Laubham, sponsored by Mary Wade Strother Chapter, Salina; seventh grade, Jeni S. Barnett, sponsored by Susannah French Putney, ElDorado; eighth grade Elizabeth Findlayson, sponsored by Arthur Barrett Chapter, Marysville. They were presented the Silver American History Medal and Certificate and State Regent, Mrs. McGehee gave each one an American history book, a gift from the Society.

Mrs. Charles Brewer, DAR Good Citizens Chairman, introduced those who had been named the Good Citizen in each District. They were: Northwest District, Jenny R. Topham, Peabody, sponsored by Newton Chapter, Newton and Northeast District, Megan C. Roth, Bishop Miege School, sponsored by Shawnce Mission Chapter, Mission. Southeast District winner, Lisa Nelson, sponsored by Cofachique Chapter, Iola, was unable to be present. Mrs. Brewer read the criteria for selecting the state winner. The award was given to Travis Carl Birney, Bucklin, sponsored by Dodge City Chapter, Southwest District. Travis was competing in the Quiz Bowl, so was unable to be present. The monetary award from National was given to a chapter member to deliver. The State Regent presented a gift to the two winners present.

Mrs. Wayne Cope, DAR Scholarship Chairman, introduced the following scholarship winners: NSDAR American History applicant, Marlee Suzanne Bertholf, Wichita, sponsored by Eunice Sterling Chapter; KSDAR Scholarship, Nickia McDill, Mankato, sponsored by Desire Tobey Sears; Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment, Travis Hagemann, Little River, sponsored by John Haupt Chapter, Topeka. Mrs. Cope announced that the National Occupational Therapy Scholarship had been awarded to Melanie Ann Aley who was sponsored by Prairie Rose Chapter, Overland Park.

Mrs. McCager Thompson, Junior American Citizens Chairman, introduced the grade school winners whose theme in the JAC contest was "1991-2091: My Vision of Tomorrow." A number of new forms have been designed by this officer over the past three years, these include the treasurers office, Scholarship Committee, Conference Committee, and additional Memorial contributions. The new form for treasurers is complete for 1992 and will again incorporate the National Honor Roll requirements. Sixty three of sixty four Kansas chapters were qualified in the monetary area for Honor Roll. The treasurers remittance form is designed to assist chapters in this area. Records for the office have been compiled in chronological order, scaled, and date for destroy on the bands. All tax report forms and audit reports are within a single record holder for easier access.

In terms of years of service this officer started her Second Century of Service to DAR. You have now allowed the financial records for our State Society to enter the Twentieth Century.

AMERICAN HERITAGE

Making the transition from factual to statistical reporting has not been easy for this chairman.

The annual reports always contained a variety of programs, projects and preservation and restoral endeavors that made giving certificates of award difficult but an enjoyable aspect of this committee.

With the short form this is no longer possible. All I can report is:

All Chapters Reported - 100%

51 chapters had programs on American Heritage.

31 chapters toured historic sites, museums, etc.

45 chapters have volunteers at historic sites, museums, etc.

32 chapters do historic preservation work.

2 members entered the American Heritage contest.

1 member submitted a program to the National Program Committee.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

Mrs. C. Richard Cain

The topic for the 1991 American History Essay Contest was "Famous Women of the Revolution." One hundred-thirty schools participated in the contest; twenty for the first time. Forty-eight winning essays were sent to the state judges.

The winners were: Fifth grade, Margaret Katherine Anderson of Lawrence, sponsored by Betty Washington Chapter; Sixth grade, Shelly Anne Laubham of Salina, sponsored by Mary Wade Strother Chapter; Seventh grade, Jeni S. Barnett of El Dorado, sponsored by Susannah French Putney Chapter; and Elizabeth Findlayson of Marysville, sponsored by Arthur Barrett Chapter.

Governor Joan Finney signed the American History Month proclamation on February 26, 1992, witnessed by Mrs. A. E. Carpenter, State Chairman of Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship, and Miss Jeanne M. Shreve, State Chairman American Heritage.

Programs on American History were reported by sixty of the sixty-four chapter reporting. American History displays were sponsored by twenty-seven chapters; medals, historical books and certificates were presented to chapter

winners. Certificates of Appreciation for Participation were presented to those students who were not winners.

American History Month Proclamations were signed by thirty-one mayors or town officials. Chapters reported the purchase of 26 posters and 210 stickers. Press coverage totaled 372 3/4 inches and 26 photos were printed.

AMERICAN INDIANS

During the past year Kansas chapters have participated in and supported the aims of the American Indians Committee in significant ways. Members learned about Native American culture through programs presented in 24 chapters. Financial donations totaling \$811.25 were given as follows: \$291.00 for scholarships at Bacone College of Muskogee, Oklahoma; \$338.75 for the Chapel Rebuilding Fund at Bacone, which was the National Chairman's Project this year; \$43.00 for Chemawa School of Salem, Oregon; and \$138.00 for the American Indians Scholarship fund, which aids Native American students attending colleges anywhere in the United States. Students at Bacone College also benefited from material donations sent by Kansas members to its White Cross Thrift Shop—amounting to more than 873 pounds plus some 25 cartons of clothing, personal articles, and school supplies—and from a total of 9,706 product labels that will help the college receive free educational equipment.

Over the three-year period of this administration, financial donations to this committee by the Kansas Society have totaled an impressive \$3,760.95. When it is considered that contributions to this committee are no longer among the requirements on the Honor Roll, the devotion to the American Indians Committee is especially commendable. Congratulations, Kansas Daughters, for such an outstanding and praiseworthy record!

The DAR Conservation projects and activities set forth in the Chapter Fall Letter by this chairman were well observed and completed with new incentives and endeavors by 64 chapter reporting 100% this year. The grand total for services is \$36,826.11 The state sewing and knitting project is off to a good start: 705 knitted caps, 178 laundry bags, 154 ditty bags, 27 pairs of slippers, 113 feeding bibs and 43 lap robes. The hospitals have no other group to sew or knit for them. I hope our chapters continue this worth while project. It makes a difference in the every day lives of our patients.

Creativity used by some chapters include: \$100.00 for the Women in the Military Memorial in Washington, another chapter sent a pick-up full of books three times to a VA Center. One member donated her services as a professional pharmacist. A Christmas tree was bought and decorated by one and another baked several hundred cookies. A rhythm band gave a monthly program and 192 plants were donated. Fifteen cakes were baked for the Veterans Salute. This is a total of forty-one cakes the past three Valentine Days for them.

It has been a privilege to be state chairman for the Veterans-Patients. It is heart warming to see how much KSDAR does for our Veteran-Patients.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

We are thrilled to announce that the Kansas Society has an increase in membership this year. The first since 1985. The official count from National shows an increase from 3730, February 1, 1991, to 3763 through February 8, 1992, an increase of 33 members. Kansas had 199 new members this year. Fifty were Juniors. Chapters voiced concerns about illiteracy in our country and a wish that more momentum could be exerted on "English as a National Language."

It has been a pleasure serving as your state chairman for three years... Regents, as you appoint your National Defense chairman for the coming year, send their name, membership number and address early to the new KSDAR chairman so that they may receive the National Defender.

PROGRAM

Mrs. John D. Afton

This chairman received thirty six yearbooks and fiftcen supplements as entries to the KSDAR CORRECTNESS OF DETAIL CONTEST. Thirteen chapters chose not to enter the contest. Of the fifty-one books and supplements entered, fourteen were without error, twenty seven had one to two errors, eight had three to five errors, and two had six errors.

Chapters having yearbooks or supplements with no errors were Cofachique, Courtney-Spalding, Emporia, Eunice Sterling, Fort Larned, Isabella Weldin, John Haupt, Kanza, Marais des Cygnes, Nathan Edson, Neodesha, Wichita, William Wilson, and Wyandot. Tri-color ribbons have been awarded to books and supplements with zero to two errors and blue ribbons have been awarded to those with three to five errors. This chairman is pleased to report that 79% of the chapters participated in the contest this year compared to 75% in 1991.

This chairman received twelve entries to the NSDAR Best of Program Contest. Each chapter had the opportunity to enter a total of two programs in any of the five categories. One chapter sent three entries so one entry was ineligible. The remaining eleven entries were graded and forwarded to the Program Vice Chairman for competition in the South Central Division. They were Eunice Sterling, first; and Susannah French Putney second in Centennial category. Courtney-Spalding, first in Columbus Quincentennial category. Topeka, first; Molly Foster Berry, second; and Neodesha, third in Educational category. Neodesha, first; Topeka, second; and Esther Lowrey, third in Historical category. Susannah French Putney, first; and Molly Foster Berry, second in Patriotic category.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Sixty-four chapters reported 639 articles published this year with 124 photos for a total of 3,977 inches. A total of 232 radio minutes, 181 spot announcements and two members were on the radio. Television coverage included 162 minutes, 26 members on TV and 28 spot announcements. Members were on TV observing proclamation signings and also attending the Naturalization Court.

Community activities included Constitution Week and American History Month activities, proclamation signings, community projects and displays, and distribution of DAR pamphlets.

Three chapters gave the book *Story of DAR* to speakers, several participated in Gulf War, July 4th and Bicentennial parades. One chapter is restoring a Santa Fe marker. Genealogy workshops were held, as were open DAR meetings for guests.

The Dodge City Chapter entered the "DAR News Article - A Day in the Life of a Daughter" contest telling about their organizing regent and the activities their members participate in. They ended their story encouraging the public to remember "The American's Creed," and had the creed printed in their story.

SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER

Mrs. Joseph R. Riden, Jr.

The National project for the Seimes Microfilm Center was the completion of the acquisition of the 1900 Census Soundex films. A roll of the film cost \$20.

The State Chairman used the theme again this year, "Dimes for Seimes," and hoped enough dimes would be collected during the year, so each chapter would be able to buy at least one roll of the 1900 Census Soundex.

A total of \$531.95 was collected from the chapters this year and showed an increase of $7\frac{1}{2}$ %. Only 35 of the 64 chapters participated, but the amount of money increased over last year.

There was one life membership acquired.

For the three years of this administration, a total amount of \$1439.39 was contributed to the Seimes Microfilm Center. Over the three years, Kansas sent enough in contributions to furnish 74 rolls of the 1900 Census Soundex.

The Seimes Microfilm Center is a very valuable resource of the National Society and deserved our support.

STATE CHAIRMEN OF NATIONAL SPECIAL COMMITTEES

BICENTENNIAL OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. D. Carol McNickle

The study of the "Bill of Rights" and the celebration of the 200th anniversary of its ratification was encouraged across Kansas in 1991.

Reports were given by this chairman at the 1991 State Conference and at two of the Fall District meetings. Chapter Chairmen were notified and encouraged by the State Chairman to attend the Bill of Rights Forum to be conducted at National Conference in April 1991.

Sixty-four chapters responded to this year's questionnaire for 100% reporting. Forty-nine chapters reported activity—much activity! Thirty-five chapters gave programs on the Bill of Rights and/or the Constitution.

Quivira Crossing Chapter, Lenexa, went all out—A proclamation from the Mayor; distribution of literature at the annual Spinach Festival; displays, publicity and then—a special birthday party for the Bill of Rights on December 15, 1991, and the release in the afternoon of 200 red, white and blue balloons. Members also attended the Virginia Bill of Rights Display in Kansas City.

John Haupt Chapter Chairman, Thelma Carpenter, gave 15 speeches on the Bill of Rights.

East to West, North to South, DAR chapter members inspired the ringing of bells for the Constitution and for the Bill of Rights celebration. There was newspaper and TV coverage. There were thirty-two Bill of Rights/Constitution displays throughout the state. A book, *George Mason, Father of the Bill of Rights*, was presented to a fourth grade class. Seedlings were planted.

Appreciation is expressed to the chapters for three years of 100% reporting to this committee chairman. Thank you Chapter Chairmen, Regents and members for your interest, work and participation for the Bicentennial of the Constitution and Bill of Rights of the United States of America, the Kansas Society DAR and NSDAR.

CENTENNIAL JUBILEE NSDAR

KANSAS CHAPTER REGENTS' CLUB OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY Amended March 19, 1992

1. NAME

The name of this club shall be the Kansas Chapter Regents' Club of the Kansas Society.

2. OBJECT

STATE CHAIRMEN'S CLUB GUIDELINES Adopted March 20, 1992

1. NAME

The name of the club shall be the State Chairmen's Club.

2. OBJECT

The object of this club shall be to promote the work of the National and State committee projects.

3. MEMBERSHIP

- a. Any member of KSDAR who is a past or present chairman of a National or State committee shall be eligible for membership in the State Chairmen's Club.
- b. The annual dues shall be fifty cents (0.50) per member and are payable at the annual meeting.
 - (1)A lifetime fee of five dollars (\$5.00) will guarantee a lifetime membership, without being required to pay annual dues.

 - (3) Any past chairmen, with the exception of life members, who have not paid dues within a consecutive two year period, shall be considered inactive and shall be dropped but may be reinstated by paying dues for the current year.
- 4. MEETINGS

 - b. State Conference guests may be honored guests at the annual meeting, with the expense of the meal paid by the club.
 - c. A quorum shall be the number present.
- 5. OFFICERS
 - a. The officers of this club shall be a president, a vice president, a recording secretary, and a treasurer.
 - b. The officers make up the executive committee. Three (3) members constitute a quorum at any executive committee meeting.
 - c. The duties of the officers are:
 - (1) The president shall conduct the annual meeting and any executive meetings that are necessary.
 - (a) The president may appoint any committee that is necessary to promote the object of the club.
 - (b)She may assign any necessary duty to the vice-president.

- (2) The vice-president shall perform the duties of the president in her absence and perform any necessary duty assigned by the president.(a) In case of the resignation of the president, the vice-president shall
 - (a) In case of the resignation of the president, the vice-president shall be declared president.
- (3) The secretary shall record the minutes of all meetings and keep a file of the proceedings. A copy of the minutes of the annual meeting shall be sent to the State Recording Secretary for the Proceedings.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 1989-1992 ADMINISTRATION

Mrs. Richard D. Standrich, State Historian

Mrs. Richard C. McGehee, Wichita, served as Kansas State Regent, 1989-1992.

Mrs. Joseph R. Riden, Jr., Honorary State Regent was elected Vice-President General in 1989 in the administration of Mrs. Eldred M. Yochim.

National appointments included Mrs. Charles Theis, National Chairman Programs; National Vice Chairmen, South Central Division, Motion Picture, Radio and Television, Mrs. David J. Stone, and National Defense, Mrs. Billy P. Compton.

Two National Special Committees were added: Literacy Challenge and the Columbus Quincentennial.

"The Ties That Bind" Administration was a concentrated effort on the promotion and celebration of the NSDAR CENTENNIAL, in all Chapters and State Societies as well as the National Society.

Over \$1,500.00 was collected for Mrs. McGehee's State Project which was the Endowment Fund for the KSDAR Library in Dodge City.

The Kansas Society was 100% on the President General's Project. (\$4.00 per member.) This was a continued effort for the restoration of our buildings in Washington.

With the use of the "Master Questionnaire" Mrs. McGehee received 100% reporting from all the chapters. The master questionnaire which is used in Kansas was introduced by Mrs. John W. McGuire during her term as State Regent, 1977-1980. This form of questionnaire is now being used by NSDAR.

Mrs. McGehee toured the NSDAR Schools in the fall of 1989 and attended all October and April National Board meetings, all State and District meetings. She visited 63 chapters.

The fall tour 1989 included a pilgrimage to Fort Hays and a tour of old Fort Hays.

The fall tour of 1990 included a pilgrimage to Abilene for the Eisenhower Centennial at the Eisenhower Center at which three ginkgo trees were planted and dedicated to commemorate the NSDAR Centennial Jubilee, the Eisenhower Centennial, the third tree was to honor the KSDAR Regents who served during the first 100 years of NSDAR.

The fall tour of 1991 included a pilgrimage to Leavenworth and a tour of historic Fort Leavenworth.

Hannah Jameson Chapter, Parsons, disbanded on April 14, 1990. Concordia Chapter merged with Nathan Edson Chapter, Clay Center, on October 18, 1989.

Three centennial chapters were organized: Quivira Crossing, Lenexa, October 9, 1990; Prairie Flint Hills, Dover, June 12, 1991; Stone Corral, Lyons, October 12, 1991.

Two computers were purchased for the use of the State Treasurer and the State Registrar.

A new KSDAR Membership Directory was compiled by the State Registrar, Mrs. Vincent Traffas. State Historian, Mrs. Richard D. Standrich, compiled the ten year historical up-date of the KSDAR for the 1989-1990 Proceedings as required by KSDAR Standing Rule # 32. A new library catalog was compiled by State Librarian, Mrs. William D. Daniels.

A new Christian Flag was purchased for the Kansas Chapel.

The KSDAR by-laws and standing rules were revised.

Papers of disbanded chapters were removed from the KSDAR Archives by State Regent Mrs. Richard C. McGehee and donated to local historical societies and libraries near where the chapters were located.

There is a complete file on all chapters' organization papers in the KSDAR Archives at Topeka, compiled by State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Harold B. Myers.

The following scholarships were awarded: the Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarship was awarded for the first time on March 17, 1990 to Charles Patrick Konecny, Derby, sponsored by Little Osage Trail Chapter; the KSDAR Scholarship, 1990, was awarded to Indi Danielle Watts, Derby, sponsored by Little Osage Trail Chapter; the KSDAR Scholarship, 1991, was awarded to Heidi Gretchen Hulse, El Dorado, sponsored by Suzannah French Putney Chapter; Brandi Lou Studer was awarded the Elizabeth Kessler Scholarship for 1992; the KSDAR Scholarship, 1992, was awarded to Nickia McDill, Mankato, sponsored by Desire Tobey Sears; the Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship was awarded to Travis Hagemann, Little River, sponsored by John Haupt Chapter.

CORPORATE CHARTER OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETYOF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

FIRST: The Name of the corporation is the KANSAS SOCIETY of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

SECOND: The name and address of its Resident Agent in this State is Mrs. John D. Afton, State Treasurer, PO Box 103, Benton, KS 67017.

THIRD: This Corporation is organized NOT for profit, and the objects and purposes to be transacted and carried on are:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

(4) This corporation shall have power to receive title to real and personal property by gift, devise, bequest or purchase; to own, hold, sell, convey, lease and re-lease, let and sublet real and personal property; and to manage, invest, reinvest or disburse the funds that may accrue from the holdings of such property in the manner provided by the Bylaws of the Kansas Society as now constituted or as hereafter amended. This corporation shall have the power to sue and to be sued.

No officer, director or member of this corporation shall be individually liable for the obligations of the corporation.

These articles may be amended by a two thirds vote, provided a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society. This corporation shall have such other authority as may be provided in the Bylaws of the Kansas Society, not in contravention of the provisions of this Charter or the laws of the State of Kansas.

This corporation shall not have authority to issue capital stock. FOURTH: The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation, and shall be the managers of the business of the corporation and shall hold, manage and control all property of the corporation.

The members of the Kansas Society and all persons who shall hereafter become members, who are in good standing under the Bylaws of said Society, shall be members of this corporation.

FIFTH: The term for which this corporation is to exist is ONE HUNDRED YEARS.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

As adopted by the Ninety-third KSDAR Conference March 6, 1991 Amended by the Ninety-fourth KSDAR Conference March 21, 1992

ARTICLE I Title

The name of this organization shall be the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Object

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the state of Kansas:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American People, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American Citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members.

The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in the state of Kansas. Section 2. New Chapters.

The State Organizing Secretary shall notify the Executive Committee the following information about a chapter newly confirmed by the National

Society: name and location, date of organization, names and addresses of its chapter officers and members, and chapter code number. This notification shall cause the newly confirmed chapter to be enrolled as a member of the Kansas Society, and a District assignment shall be made by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV Fees and Dues

Section 1. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be January 1 through December 31.

Section 2. Dues.

The annual state dues of a chapter shall be \$2.50 per chapter member, payable to the State Treasurer before January 1. A member whose state dues have not been paid by December 1 shall be ineligible to serve as a delegate or an alternate at the State Conference.

The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after April 1 shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year.

Section 3. District Dues.

Each chapter shall pay annual District dues to the treasurer of its assigned District, according to the guidelines of the District.

Section 4. Additional Payments.

Each year, each chapter shall remit to the State Treasurer the payments designated in the Standing Rules.

ARTICLE V Officers

Section 1. Officers.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility.

To be eligible for the office of State Regent or State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state of Kansas for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as a Chapter Regent for at least one-half of the chapter term.

To be eligible for any other state office, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state of Kansas for at least two years.

No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two successive terms, and no member who has served two terms in any state office shall be eligible to any other state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year. A member having served more than one-half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 3. Term.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Expenses.

The expenses of the State Officers, as approved in the budget, shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the State Regent, who shall present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment. Requests to be reimbursed for additional expenses shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the Executive Committee for its action. Section 5. Vacancies.

If the office of State Regent becomes vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent.

Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee, with the approval of the State Board of Management, until the next regular meeting of the State Conference, when the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by the Kansas Society.

Section 6. Automatic Resignation.

Any State Officer unable to carry out the duties of her office for a period of six months automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer, unless ruled otherwise by the State Regent with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 7. Honorary State Regent.

In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, a member who has served as State Regent, upon her retirement from office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life. Election shall be at State Conference and may be by voice vote. An Honorary State Regent is entitled to a vote at the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Nominations and Elections

Section 1. Election.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall be elected at the State Conference every third year, coinciding with the year of election of National Executive Officers. The election shall be by ballot, and a majority vote shall elect. Section 2. Nominating Committee.

(a) Members.

The Nominating Committee shall be composed of five members. The chairman shall be elected at the Fall State Board of Management meeting

during the second year of the administration. Each District shall elect one committee member at its annual District meeting which follows.

No member shall be eligible to serve on the Nominating Committee for consecutive terms.

(b) Duties.

Before May 1, the chairman of the Nominating Committee shall notify, in writing, all chapters of the impending election and shall indicate the final date on which the names of members to be considered for state offices shall be received from the chapters.

The committee shall select one nominee for each office. In its selection of candidates, the committee shall endeavor to represent each of the four Districts. No chapter shall have more than one member serving as a State Officer at a time. No nominee shall be eligible for election to a state office unless a chapter endorsement, signed by the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Recording Secretary, is received by the Chairman of the Nominating Committee prior to the election.

By January 15, the report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent to the State Officers, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, and the State Committee Chairmen.

The report of the Nominating Committee shall be presented at the State Conference. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter, signed by the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Recording Secretary. Section 3. Vice President General.

A candidate for Vice President General from Kansas shall be endorsed by a majority vote by ballot at a State Conference. No endorsement for Vice President General shall be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated in the motion.

ARTICLE VII Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society, and by its parliamentary authority.

Each State Officer shall type an annual report of less than two hundred words: before March 1, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and two copies to the State Recording Secretary. These annual reports shall be presented at the State Conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Within thirty days after the State Conference, each retiring State Officer shall deliver to her successor a written procedure of the requirements of her office, a list of the KSDAR property in her custody, and all records and property of the Kansas Society, and she shall obtain a receipt for these items. A duplicate of the list of the KSDAR property in her custody shall be sent to the State Regent-elect.

Section 2. State Regent.

The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management, and the Executive Committee.

She shall be the executive officer and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society.

She shall appoint all committees except the Nominating Committee, naming the chairmen of each; shall be ex officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee; shall appoint a State Parliamentarian; shall co-sign all checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts; shall plan the schedule for the Fall tour; shall plan and prepare the program for the State Conference and shall approve the arrangements, contract, and payments made by the State Conference Chairman and the State Conference committees.

Along with the State Treasurer, signature cards for all bank accounts and for the safe-deposit box (containing the bonds, securities, and other evidence of invested funds of the Kansas Society) shall bear her signature, and she shall possess a key to the safe-deposit box.

She shall receive from the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen all statements of expenses, as approved in the budget, and present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment.

At the beginning of her term of office, she shall file with the insurance company a complete and current inventory of the materials and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library.

With the assistance of the State Vice Regent or any other member whom she designates, she shall oversee the printing and distribution of the official KSDAR stationery.

She shall send each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the national committees and of any other appointees and shall notify the Chapter Regents of all changes in personnel and addresses of National and State Officers and appointees.

She shall endeavor to visit each chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Prior to their publication, the State Regent shall have the privilege of approval of the final proof copies of the "Kansas DAR News" and the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 3. State Vice Regent.

In the absence or inability of the State Regent, the State Vice Regent shall perform the duties of the office of State Regent.

The State Vice Regent shall preside at the Chapter Regents' banquet at the State Conference and shall work with the State Regent and the District Directors in planning the District meetings. If requested, she shall assist the State Regent with the printing and/or distribution of the official KSDAR stationery.

She shall perform any other duties designated to her by the State Regent. Section 4. State Chaplain.

The State Chaplain shall open and close meetings of the Kansas Society with the reading of scripture and prayer and conduct such religious services as occasion may require.

She shall conduct a Memorial Service at each State Conference: she shall receive the necrology from the State Registrar and prepare the printed program.

She shall send notes of sympathy to the families of recently deceased members.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary.

(a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, and the Finance Committee.

She shall notify State Officers, Chapter Regents, and State Committee Chairmen of any actions taken at these meetings affecting their duties.

She shall maintain the official membership roll of the State Board of Management.

She may co-sign checks drawn on the Kansas Society Accounts. She shall be a member of the Finance Committee.

Each year she shall file the annual reports of State Officers, Chapter Regents, District Directors, and State Committee Chairmen until January 1.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile, edit, and publish the Annual Report and Proceedings of the State Conference. A committee to assist with this duty may be selected by the State Recording Secretary. She shall provide to the State Regent a final proof copy of the Proceedings prior to its publication.

By November 1, the State Recording Secretary shall distribute the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary.

The State Corresponding Secretary shall maintain the official Kansas Society mailing list, shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society, and shall assist the State Regent in her official correspondence.

She shall notify the State Officers and the delegates of any special meetings that may be called.

She shall send out notices of meetings of the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior.

Immediately after a State Conference at which an election is held, she shall send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the newly elected state officers. Each year by January 15, she shall send the official call for the State Conference to the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose memberships are within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, the State Committee Chairmen, and the District Directors.

Each year by January 15, she shall send each Chapter Regent one credentials form and one form for reporting chapter officers, which shall be duplicated and returned by the Chapter Regents. She shall compile the lists of chapter officers reported by the Chapter Regents and, before Continental Congress, send one set to the Organizing Secretary General and one set to the State Regent. She shall file the remaining set.

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary.

The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and Chapter Organizing Regents in the organization of new chapters.

She shall be responsible for the correspondence related to the organization of a new chapter, and she shall notify the Executive Committee the following information about a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society: name and location, date of organization, names and addresses of its chapter officers and members, and chapter code number. This notification shall cause the newly confirmed chapter to be enrolled as a member of the Kansas Society, and a District assignment shall be made.

She shall determine the possibilities for new chapters within the state and shall assist existing chapters in maintaining their memberships and in gaining new members.

Section 8. State Treasurer.

The State Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all funds and securities of the Kansas Society. She shall deposit them in the name of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution and shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the State Conference. All checks drawn on the Kansas Society Accounts shall be co-signed by the State Regent, except in cases of emergency when the State Recording Secretary may co-sign.

Upon assuming the duties of her office, she may transfer the checking accounts to a convenient, federally insured banking institution, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee; this action shall be ratified at the next meeting of the State Board of Management.

She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on December 31, and submit them for audit to a public accountant. She shall present the auditor's report at the annual State Conference.

She shall serve as the chairman of the Finance Committee. (See Article XI, Section 1.)

Prior to the State Conference, she shall report to the State Credentials Committee Chairman the number of votes to which each chapter is entitled. After the delegates and alternates are elected, she shall verify their eligibilities for the State Credentials Committee.

She shall be bonded in the amount of \$10,000; the fee to be paid by the Kansas Society.

She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities, and other evidence of invested funds and shall rent a safe-deposit box for their safekeeping. A key to the safe-deposit box shall be issued to the State Treasurer and to the State Regent.

Signature cards for all bank accounts and the safe-deposit box shall bear the signatures of the State Regent and the State Treasurer.

She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall be responsible for their transfer to her successor at the close of the term.

She shall receive the membership changes from the Chapter Treasurers and shall enter these changes in her records.

Section 9. State Registrar.

The State Registrar shall keep the files containing the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, when possible, the names of the Members at Large residing in Kansas. The record shall include: full name, including maiden name and, if married, husband's full name; date admitted by the National Society; national number; name of chapter or, if the member has belonged to more than one chapter, the names of her original and current chapters; name and rank of ancestor, with spouse; colony or state, and branch of service in which the ancestor served; and the dates and locations of any transfers. She shall update these files with information reported by the chapters, including changes in membership by admission, transfer, resignation, removal for nonpayment of dues, reinstatement, death, marriage or divorce, and changes of name or address.

She shall prepare and send duplicate forms to each Chapter Registrar for the chapter's annual membership report, which shall list the members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, reinstated, transferred, married, divorced, or who have died during the preceding year. Newly accepted Junior Members and their dates of birth shall also be listed on the annual report. She shall send one set of the forms to the State Treasurer by June 1.

Prior to the State Conference, she shall prepare a necrology for the Memorial Service and shall furnish copies to the State Regent and the State Chaplain.

She shall assist the editor of the "Kansas DAR News" in maintaining a current mailing list.

Section 10. State Historian.

The State Historian shall direct such historical work as may be required by the Kansas Society or suggested by the National Society. She shall keep a file of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

She shall prepare and submit an annual report to the Historian General.

She shall keep a reference record of the archives of the Kansas Society and, at the close of her term, shall prepare copies of the inventory for the following incoming officers: State Regent, State Vice Regent and State Historian.

At the close of the administration, she shall prepare a summary of the highlights of the past three years to be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 11. State Librarian.

The State Librarian shall have supervision of the Kansas DAR Library and shall serve as the chairman of the State Library Committee.

She shall be responsible for all books, papers, microfilm, microfiche, and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library. She shall keep a current list of all the materials and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library and shall submit to the State Regent duplicate copies of the list, one of which shall be for the insurance company.

She shall list in her annual report all materials sent to the NSDAR Library and all those accepted for the Kansas DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

She shall work with the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee in maintaining the State DAR Library.

Section 12. State Reporter.

The State Reporter shall be the editor of the "Kansas DAR News" and shall keep a file of the current Kansas Society mailing list.

She shall provide to the State Regent a final proof copy of each issue of the "Kansas DAR News" prior to its publication.

She shall be ex officio a member of the Public Relations Committee and the State Conference Public Relations Committee.

Each year she shall send a report of the State Conference to the DAR Magazine of the National Society.

ARTICLE VIII Meetings

Section 1. Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March. The date and location of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the host District. The meeting shall be for the purpose of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the Chapter Regents, the District Directors, and the State Chairmen of all committees; the election of officers; and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. Voting Members

The voting members of the State Conference or any special meeting of the Kansas Society shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose memberships are within the state, the Honorary State Regents, each Chapter Regent or, in her absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the State Conference. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at the annual State Conference, shall be limited to one vote.

Section 3. Qualifications.

Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters by February 1 each year and reported by February 8 on State Credentials Forms (See Article XIII, Section 3 (b), of these bylaws). A delegate or an alternate shall have been a member of her chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which she is elected and shall be in good standing at the time of her election, as verified by the State Treasurer.

The Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter may be a delegate.

Section 4. Chapter Delegates and Alternates.

(a) The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any meeting of the Kansas Society during the year shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been paid by the January 1 preceding the State Conference. A member who is in arrears for national or state dues shall not be counted in determining representation at the meetings of the National or Kansas Societies, or be entitled to vote for delegates or alternates to meetings of the National Society or the Kansas Society, or to act as representative or alternate at such meetings.

(b) The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any other meeting of the Kansas Society shall be as follows:

12 through 49 members	Regent and two delegates	3 votes
50 through 199 members	Regent and five delegates	6 votes
200 through 299 members	Regent and eight delegates	9 votes

(c) The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of voters to which the chapter is entitled. Section 5. Privileges.

(a) Any member of the National Society who is a member in good standing of a chapter in the Kansas Society or a Member at Large residing in Kansas may attend the State conference.

(b) State Committee Chairmen and District Directors who are not elected delegates shall have the privilege to speak without vote.

Section 6. State Conference Registration.

Kansas members who attend any session or meal of the State Conference shall pay a registration fee, determined by the State Regent, not to exceed \$5.00. This fee shall be paid to the State Conference Treasurer toward the expenses of the State Conference. Any balance remaining after the approved bills have been paid shall be sent to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund. Payment of all bills of the State Conference shall be approved by voucher, signed by the State Regent and the State Conference Chairman. Section 7. State Conference Chairman.

A State Conference Chairman shall be appointed annually by the State Regent. She shall be a member of a chapter in the District hosting the State Conference.

It shall be the duty of the State Conference Chairman to be responsible for planning and coordinating the arrangements of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and in cooperation with the host District. She shall appoint, subject to approval of the State Regent, a State Conference Treasurer and the State Conference committees, including House, Public Relations, Registration, and such other committees as deemed necessary. She shall appoint members to assist the Credentials Committee Chairman (See Article XI, Section 3). She shall assign the various functions at the State Conference to the chapters in the host District and shall serve as an advisor for their plans.

Along with the State Regent, she shall sign all vouchers for payments of State Conference expenses.

The State Conference Treasurer shall receive the registration fees and the payments for meal reservations. She shall pay the bills of the State Conference which have been approved by vouchers bearing the signatures of the State Regent and the State Conference Chairman. After all approved bills have been paid, she shall send any balance remaining in the State Conference account to the State Treasurer.

Section 8. Special Meetings.

Special meetings of the Kansas Society may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. The purpose of the meeting shall be stated in the call. Except in cases of emergency, at least fifteen days' notice shall be given, and only the business specified in the call shall be transacted. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be the delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year. Section 9. Quorum.

Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at the State Conference or any special meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE IX State Board of Management

Section 1. Members.

The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the state, and each Chapter Regent in the state or, in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent.

Section 2. Officers.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Meetings.

Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the fall preceding the Annual District Meetings and the second meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. Except in cases of emergency, at least thirty days' notice of the time and location of the meetings shall be given. Section 4. Authority.

The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, except that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Duties.

The State Board of Management shall report annually to the State Conference, shall ratify any decisions made by the Executive Committee, and may make recommendations to the State Conference.

It shall approve any appointment made by the Executive Committee to fill a vacancy in a state office, except that of State Regent.

It shall elect the chairman of the State Nominating Committee at the Fall State Board of Management Meeting in the second year of an administration.

It shall approve the budget submitted by the Finance Committee, shall ratify any transfer of funds by the State Treasurer, and shall consider any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society. Section 6. Special Meetings.

Special meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior.

Section 7. Quorum.

Eleven members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Executive Committee

Section 1. Members.

The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings.

The Executive Committee shall hold meetings prior to the regularly scheduled meetings of the State Board of Management, at the call of the State Regent, or upon the written request of three of its members. Except in cases of emergency, at least ten days' notice shall be given.

Section 3. Authority.

The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society between the meetings of the State Board of Management. The Executive Committee shall be subject to the orders of the State Conference, and none of its acts shall conflict with action taken by the Kansas Society. Section 4. Duties.

The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact business between meetings of the State Board of Management and to report all actions and recommendations to the next meeting of the State Board.

It shall approve the standing and special committees appointed by the State Regent.

It shall declare a vacancy in any state office or committee for failure to perform stated dutics; shall rule on any exception to an automatic resignation of a State Officer; shall fill any vacancy in a state office, except that of State Regent, subject to the approval of the State Board of Management; and shall fill any vacancy which may occur on the State Nominating Committee.

It shall approve any transfer of funds made by the State Treasurer.

It shall consider any special matters or recommendations concerning the Kansas DAR Library referred to it by the State Library Committee.

It shall receive and act upon requests for reimbursements of additional expenses submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, by the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen.

It shall outline the guidelines for the Districts and shall assign a new chapter to a District.

Section 5. Emergency Business.

When necessary, the Executive Committee may conduct business by mail or telephone.

Section 6. Quorum.

Seven members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Standing Committees.

The standing committees of the Kansas Society shall be: Bylaws, Credentials, Finance, Kansas DAR Scholarship, Resolutions, and State Library. Section 2. Bylaws Committee.

The Bylaws Committee shall be composed of a chairman and two members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Bylaws Committee to consider all properly submitted proposals for amendments and to present amendments and recommendations concerning the Bylaws to the State Conference for action.

Amendments and recommendations from the chapters, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, or the previous State Conference shall be presented to this committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. (See Article XV, Section 1.)

The committee shall have the right to edit proposed amendments and the right to originate amendments.

Previous notice of all proposed amendments from the Bylaws Committee shall be sent to all chapters thirty days prior to the State Conference.

Section 3. Credentials Committee.

The Credentials Committee Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent. She shall be assisted by members of the host District for State Conference, who shall be appointed by the State Conference Chairman, and shall be advised by the State Treasurer and the State Registrar.

It shall be the duty of the chairman to supply the State Credentials Forms to the State Corresponding Secretary for the January 15 mailing, to advise chapters of the number of delegates and alternates to which they are entitled, and to receive their State Credentials Forms each year by February 8. She shall examine the returned forms and shall verify with the State Treasurer and State Registrar the eligibilities of the delegates and alternates listed. She shall have charge of the registration and its committee at the State Conference and shall submit credentials reports to the assembly.

It shall be the duty of the Credentials Committee to have the responsibility for the proper identification and registration of the delegates and the alternates attending the State Conference.

Section 4. Finance Committee.

The Finance Committee shall be composed of the State Treasurer, who shall serve as chairman; the State Recording Secretary; and three members appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The recommended budget shall be submitted to the State Conference for action. The Finance Committee shall report any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society to the State Board of Management.

Section 5. Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee.

The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee shall be composed of a chairman and two members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee to select the recipients of the Kansas DAR Scholarship and the Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship from the eligible applicants. Funds for the Kansas DAR Scholarship are provided from interest on designated investments.

It shall also be the duty of this committee to select the Kansas Society's candidate for the NSDAR American History Scholarship.

Section 6. Resolutions Committee.

The Resolutions Committee shall be composed of a chairman and two members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Resolutions Committee to consider all submitted resolutions, evaluating their suitability according to the guidelines of the National Society, and to present resolutions to the State Conference for action.

Resolutions may be submitted by chapters or individual members. Except for a courtesy resolution, all resolutions shall have been previously submitted to the committee in order to be considered for a State Conference. To be considered for a State Conference, a resolution shall be submitted to the committee by the February 15 immediately preceding.

The committee shall have the right to edit submitted resolutions and to originate resolutions. The courtesy resolution shall be prepared and presented by the Resolutions Committee Chairman.

Section 7. State Library Committee.

The State Library Committee shall be composed of the State Librarian, who shall serve as chairman, and four members appointed by the State Regent. The committee may meet quarterly and shall meet upon the request of the State Regent.

It shall be the duty of the State Library Committee to recommend to the Executive Committee purchases of books and equipment for the Kansas DAR Library which will benefit the members of the chapters in the Kansas Society. Special matters concerning the Kansas DAR Library shall be brought to the attention of the Executive Committee.

It shall promote greater use by loan of the books in the Kansas DAR Library and shall encourage donations of books, periodicals and other materials from chapters, members of chapters, and other interested individuals.

It shall serve as an advisor to the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee. The Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee shall be composed of members of the Dodge City Chapter, who shall be appointed by the Chapter Regent. It shall be the duty of this committee to assist the State Librarian in maintaining the materials and equipment of the State Library and in providing library services to members, according to the guidelines set by the Executive Committee.

Section 8. Other Committees.

Such other committees, standing or special, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society may authorize or as the National Society may require. The State Regent shall be ex officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 9. Committee Appointments.

Appointments of committee chairmen and members shall be concurrent with the term of the appointing State Regent.

Section 10. Expenses.

The expenses of the State Committee Chairmen, as approved in the budget, shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the State Regent, who shall present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment. Additional expenses shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the Executive Committee.

Section 11. Reports.

Each State Committee Chairman shall type an annual report of less than two hundred words: before March 1, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and two copies to the State Recording Secretary. These annual reports shall be presented at the State Conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Each State Committee Chairman shall prepare and send by the designated deadline a report to the Vice Chairman of the South Central Division of her committee. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent.

Section 12. Transfer of Records and Property.

At the completion of her term, each State Committee Chairman shall deliver to the State Regent-elect or, if so instructed, to the newly appointed State Chairman of her committee, a written procedure of the requirements of her chairmanship, a list of the KSDAR property in her custody, and all records and property of the Kansas Society, and she shall obtain a receipt for these items. She shall provide a duplicate of the list of the KSDAR property in her custody for the State Regent-elect.

ARTICLE XII Districts

Section 1. Names.

The Kansas Society shall be divided into four Districts: the Northeast District, the Northwest District, the Southeast District and the Southwest District. The chapters in each District are designated in the Standing Rules. District assignments of new chapters shall be made by the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Jurisdiction.

The four Districts are under the jurisdiction of the Kansas Society and shall follow the guidelines set forth by the Executive Committee. Each District shall have the privilege to determine the amount and deadline for payment of dues from its chapters and other financial matters and to allow for any traditional procedures and courtesies, provided that they shall not conflict with the Bylaws of the National and Kansas Societies or the District guidelines set by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Meetings.

(a) The meetings of the Districts shall be held for the general purpose of expanding the programs of the National and Kansas Societies, to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members, and to acquaint them with the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen.

(b) The Annual District Meetings shall be held in the fall, following the State Board of Management meeting, for the purpose of receiving the reports of its officers and conducting the business of the District. In the second year of an administration, each District shall elect a member to represent the District on the State Nominating Committee and a District Nominating Committee. District officers shall be elected at the Annual District Meeting. The call for the meetings shall be published in the "Kansas DAR News."

(c) Annual District Meetings shall be held in the fall, the times and locations to be arranged by the District Directors and the State Vice Regent, with the approval of the State Regent.

Section 4. Officers.

The officers shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, and a Secretary-Treasurer. Officers shall be elected for a term of three years at the Annual District Meeting preceding the election of the State Officers. No member shall be eligible to succeed herself in the same District office, and no member shall be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the offices of her District.

Section 5. State Conference.

The Districts shall host the State Conference by rotation in the following order: the Northwest District, the Northeast District, the Southeast District, and the Southwest District. If necessary, the rotation order may be altered. The chapters in the host District shall be assigned responsibilities for the State Conference by the State Conference Chairman.

ARTICLE XIII Chapters

Section 1. Officers.

The chapters shall elect their officers by February 1 of the year in which they elect officers. Newly elected chapter officers shall assume the duties of their offices after the close of the Continental Congress and by the June meeting.

Section 2. Chapter Officers Report Forms.

Each year before March 1, the Chapter Recording Secretary shall report the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year. This report shall be made on forms furnished by the State Corresponding Secretary and shall include the names and addresses of all chapter officers, whether newly elected or completing the term of election; the date of election; the date on which office is assumed; and the length of term. The report form shall be signed by the designated officers, and one original and two photocopies shall be returned to the State Corresponding Secretary by the March 1 deadline.

Section 3. Provision for Fees and Dues in Chapter Bylaws.

A chapter may provide in its bylaws for fees and dues for chapter use in addition to national and state dues, but may not levy assessments in excess of the requirements of its bylaws. The bylaws of a chapter shall prescribe a date for collection of chapter dues sufficiently in advance to meet the requirements for payment to the National and Kansas Societies before December 1.

Section 4. Representation and Return of Credentials Forms.

(a) Delegates and alternates to the Continental Congress shall be elected by February 1 of each year. (For number and qualifications of delegates and alternates to Continental Congress, see National Bylaws Article XIII, Sections 10 and 12.) A list of the delegates and alternates, with the date of their election by the chapter typewritten on blanks furnished by the National Society, shall be sent, bearing a postmark no later than February 15, to the National Chairman of Credentials and to the State Regent.

No Regent, First Vice Regent, delegate or alternate whose dues for the current year have not been received by the Office of the Treasurer General on or before the first day of January, preceding Continental Congress, shall be entitled to represent her chapter. (National Bylaws Article XIII, Section 12 (d).)

(b) Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by February 1 of each year. (For number and qualifications of delegates and alternates to State Conference, see Article VIII, Section 3 and 4, of these bylaws.) A list of the delegates and alternates and the date of their election shall be typewritten on the State Credentials Form, which is furnished to the chapter by the Kansas Society in a January mailing from the State Corresponding Secretary, and shall be photocopied and sent to the State Registrar, the State Treasurer, and the State Credentials Committee Chairman by February 8.

No Regent, First Vice Regent, delegate or alternate whose state dues for the current year have not been received by the State Treasurer on or before the January 1 preceding State Conference shall be entitled to represent her chapter. Kansas members who attend any session or meal of the State Conference shall pay a registration fee, determined by the State Regent, not to exceed \$5.00.

Section 5. Chapter Regent.

Before August 1, each Chapter Regent shall send a postal card to the State Committee Chairman of each national and state committee, listing the name, address, and term of appointment for the Chapter Chairman of the corresponding committee; only changes in appointments are required in the second and third years of a Chapter Regent's term, provided that the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen remain the same. Should new State Officers be elected, each Chapter Regent shall send postal cards listing the information about her chapter's committee chairmen to the newly appointed State Committee Chairmen by the August 1 reporting date.

Each Chapter Regent shall type an annual report of less than two hundred words: before March 1, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and two copies to the State Recording Secretary. These annual reports shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 6. Chapter Chaplain.

The Chapter Chaplain shall report deaths immediately to the State Chaplain. Information about the deceased member shall include her name and national number, date of death, name and address of next of kin, and any offices held in the chapter or in the State and National Societies. A newspaper obituary shall be sent with the report of a member's death.

Section 7. Chapter Treasurer.

(a) Each year before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer shall remit the annual national dues of \$15.00 for every active member in the chapter to the Office of the Treasurer General. The computer printout of the chapter membership, received by the Chapter Treasurer from the Officer of the Treasurer General by September 15, shall accompany the chapter's payment of annual national dues.

Payments to the Treasurer General, other than those remitted with the computer printout, shall be accompanied by remittance blanks, which may be ordered free of charge from the Office of the Treasurer General. Payments for which remittance blanks are required include additional annual national dues and the fees for applications, reinstatements, and supplementals.

All checks remitted to the National Society shall be made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR.

(b) Each year before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer shall remit the annual state dues of \$2.50 for every active member in the chapter to the State Treasurer. A computer printout of the chapter membership, received by the Chapter Treasurer from the State Treasurer in September, shall accompany the chapter's payment of annual state dues. A member whose state dues have not

been paid by January 1 shall be ineligible to serve as a delegate or an alternate at the State Conference.

Each year before December 31, the Chapter Treasurer shall also send to the State Treasurer all chapter contributions for the National Society and the Kansas Society, including the required payments designated in the KSDAR Standing Rules, accompanied by the State Treasurer's Remittance Form. Only payments received by the State Treasurer by December 31 will be processed for that year's reporting period; payments received after December 31 will be applied to the succeeding calendar year's reporting period.

All checks remitted to the Kansas Society shall be made payable to the Kansas Society DAR.

(c) Each chapter shall pay annual District dues to the treasurer of its assigned District, according to the guidelines of the District.

(d) The Chapter Treasurer shall report all changes in membership as they occur to the Membership Department of the Office of the Treasurer General and to the State Treasurer. Reports of membership changes shall be made on Membership Change Forms, available free of charge from the Membership Department of the Office of the Treasurer General, and shall include changes by admission, transfer, resignation, removal for nonpayment of dues, reinstatement, death, marriage or divorce, and changes of name or address. Section 8. Chapter Registrar.

The Chapter Registrar shall report to the State Registrar all information necessary to keep her records exact. Changes in membership by admission, transfer, resignation, removal for nonpayment of dues, reinstatement, death, marriage or divorce, and changes of name or address shall be reported on State Registrar's Report Forms. Information about newly admitted members shall include: full name, including maiden name and, if married, husband's full name; date admitted; national number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor, with spouse; colony or state, and branch of service in which the ancestor served. Information about members transferring into the Kansas Society from out of state shall include, in addition to the information required for newly admitted members, the name and location of former chapters and dates of transfers.

She shall complete the chapter's Annual Membership Report Form, supplied by the State Registrar, and return it to the State Registrar by February 15. Information listed on the annual membership report shall list members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, reinstated, transferred, married, divorced, or who have died during the preceding year. Newly admitted Junior members, with dates of birth, shall also be listed on the annual report.

ARTICLE XIV Parliamentary authority

The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XV Amendments

Section 1. These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the State Conference, and that the amendment has been proposed by the State Bylaws Committee, the State Board of Management, the previous State Conference, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society. An amendment proposed by a chapter shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is adopted.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the Kansas Society or the chapters in the state shall become the law of the Kansas Society and chapters without further notice.

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STANDING RULES Adopted by the Ninety-second KSDAR Conference March 17, 1990

[As Amended March 21, 1992]

Number 1. The report of the Kansas Society shall be known as the Annual Report and Proceedings of the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The report shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; State Officers, 1 to 3 each; Chapters, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National and State committees, 1 each; Senior State President C.A.R., 1; District Directors, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the KSDAR Archives in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society, 2; the President General, NSDAR, 1; and the Kansas State Historical Society, 1. In an election year, one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and the chairmen of committees. Chapter Regents may receive a free copy by special request made before June 1. Except for State Officers, no one individual shall receive more than one free copy. Other members desiring copies may place by June 1 with the State Recording Secretary a prepaid order at four dollars per copy.

Number 2. At least two issues of the Kansas DAR News shall be printed each year and mailed to each member. The printing and mailing expenses shall be borne by the State Society.

Number 3. A sum of \$2,000.00 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

Number 4. Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed each State Officer to partially defray her State Conference expenses.

Number 5. Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent at Continental Congress; and twenty five dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent-elect; arrangements shall be made by the State Treasurer.

Number 6. Fifty dollars shall be allotted to the State Regent for Kansas Pages at Continental Congress.

Number 7. Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the General Fund ten cents per chapter member for State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Number 8. Each year, each chapter shall pay five cents per member for the support of the Kansas State Society Children of the American Revolution. The KSDAR State Treasurer shall forward these funds to the K.S.C.A.R. Senior State Treasurer.

Number 9. Each year each chapter in Kansas shall pay one dollar for the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund.

Number 10. Each year, each chapter in Kansas shall pay five cents per member for the Kansas DAR Library Fund.

Number 11. Each year, on or before September 15, each chapter shall send copies of its chapter yearbook to the State Officers, the State Chairman of the Membership Committee, and 2 copies to the State Chairman of the Program Committee.

Number 12. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, and Historian shall have the custody of the archives in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent, and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

Number 13. The State Regent may send a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

Number 14. The State Regent shall have the State Regent's pin appraised by the J. E. Caldwell Company once during her administration, and if the pin is lost the State Society shall assume the cost of replacing it.

Number 15. The Kansas DAR Library shall be located in the Dodge City Recreation Center at Avenue G and Vine in Dodge City, Kansas.

(a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Dodge City Recreation Center.

(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee that shall be known as the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee to assume care of the library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of books, materials and equipment; shall assist the State Librarian when possible in the repair and maintenance of these items; and shall receive and answer all requests for the loan of books and other materials.

(c) The annual rent of \$300 shall be paid by January 1 to the Kansas Genealogical Society.

(d) Materials submitted to the Kansas DAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. To avoid duplication, donors shall check with the State Librarian before books are sent.

Number 16. An endowment Fund for the support of the Kansas DAR Library has been established.

(a) Monies contributed to the Endowment Fund shall be under the juris diction of the State Treasurer.

(b) The annual interest accrued from the fund shall pay for the following annual library expenses: rent, insurance, operating expenses, and purchase and maintenance of equipment.

Number 17. The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship shall be given the third year of each KSDAR administration to a high school senior who is entering a two or four year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of National Defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity, and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Chairman, the State National Defense Chairman, and the State Regent.

Number 18. A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school senior who has DAR eligibility or to a member of DAR; proof of enrollment in a two- or four-year college or university shall be required.

Number 19. The Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship shall provide a college scholarship for a girl graduating from high school. The recipient of this scholarship shall have acceptable scholastic ability, show financial need, be a citizen of the United States of America, and be eligible for membership in the DAR. This award will be given the second year of each KSDAR administration.

If the two rooms at the Shawnee Mission in Fairway, Kansas, formerly supported by the KSDAR are again maintained and refurbished by the Kansas Daughters, the interest from this fund shall be used for these purposes and take precedence over the scholarship fund.

Number 20. The Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarship, in memory of her parents, Albert Jesse Jones and Mabel Clare Early Jones, shall be awarded to a deserving boy or girl, preferably one who is at least 1/4 Pottawatomie Indian. If a deserving individual of Pottawatomie heritage is not available, another Indian heritage may be substituted. The interest from the \$3,000 gift shall be awarded the first year of a KSDAR administration for attendance at an accredited college or university. Members of the scholarship committee who will supervise the awarding of the scholarship shall consist of: the KSDAR Scholarship Chairman, the KSDAR American Indians Chairman and a member of the Eunice Sterling Chapter.

Number 21. In the event that no applications are received for the scholarships offered during any year of the term, applications will be accepted for those scholarships the following year in addition to those regularly scheduled to be awarded.

Number 22. State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Honorary State Regents may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management with voice but no vote.

Number 23. At the Conference Opening, the State Regent shall appoint a committee to approve the minutes of the closing meeting of the State Conference.

Number 24. The hospitality of the following persons, if attending the State Conference at the official invitation of the State Regent, shall be a Conference expense: Candidates for President General, NSDAR; National Officers or National appointees appearing as speakers; two members of the National Board of Management; representatives of the DAR Schools, Ap-

proved Schools, and Indian Schools; or any designated speaker for a special program or event.

Number 25. (a) A \$10 limit shall be placed on awards at State Conference.

(b) Interest accrued annually from the Mary Lempenau Permanent Trust of \$750 shall pay monetary awards at State Conference.

Number 26. The Kansas State outstanding Junior shall be awarded \$150 if she attends Continental Congress, to be paid from the General Fund.

Number 27. A National winner of the Good Citizens Contest, American History Essay contest, Outstanding Junior Contest and V.A. Volunteer shall be awarded \$250 toward transportation expenses to attend Continental Congress. The money awarded shall be paid from the Award Transportation Fund.

Number 28. The Kansas Society shall present to the State Regent an Ex-State Regent's Pin or, if she has been elected Honorary State Regent, an Honorary State Regent's Pin at the end of her term of office, providing that she has served two-thirds of her elected term.

Number 29. A pilgrimage to a historically significant Kansas site may be held annually on Constitution Day, September 17. Local chapters may act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed fifty dollars shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the pilgrimage.

Number 30. The schedule for the Fall Tour shall be made before March 1 by the State Regent and State Vice Regent in consultation with the four District Directors and representatives of the hostess chapters. All plans for the tour shall be finalized by June 1.

Number 31. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

Number 32. An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings and other pertinent historical information shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings every ten years, beginning in 1980.

Number 33. A Directory of members may be printed every ten years beginning in 1990.

Number 34. The Chapters in each District are as follows: NORTH-EAST—Arthur Barrett, Atchison, Betty Washington, Captain Jesse Leavenworth, James Ross, John Haupt, Mission Hills, Olathe, Prairie Flint Hills, Prairie Rose, Quivira Crossing, Sagamore, Samuel Linscott, Shawnee Mission, Tomahawk, Topeka, and Wyandot. NORTHWEST—Abilene, Courtney-Spalding, Desire Tobey Sears, Fort Larned, Good-Land, Jeremiah Howard, John Athey, Jonathan Gilbert, Lois Warner, Mary Wade Strother, Nathan Edson, Newton, Polly Ogden, Sarah Steward, Smoky Hill and Stone Corral. SOUTHEAST—Betty Bonney, Cofachique, Council Oak, Emporia, Esther Lowrey, Four Winds, General Edward Hand, Isabella Weldin, Jane Dean Coffey, Marais des Cygnes, Molly Foster Berry, Neodesha, Oceanus Hopkins, Peleg Gorton, and Susannah French Putney. SOUTHWEST—Byrd Prewitt, Cimarron River Valley, Dodge City, Eunice Sterling, Flores del Sol, Kanza, Little Arkansas, Little Osage Trail, Martha Loving Ferrell, Martha Vail, Minisa, Ninnescah, Randolph Loving, Uvedale, Wichita, and William Wilson.

Number 35. These Standing Rules may be amended at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote and may be suspended for that meeting by a majority vote.


