

Jones, Chief Clerk of the House Tim Shallenburger, Speaker of the House The Senate Resolution declaring April 2, 1996 as Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution Day was arranged by Johnson County Senator, Audrey Langworthy. The Tomahawk Chapter was instrumental in enlisting Sen. Langworthy's support. Mrs. Clark contacted her and she agreed to sponsor the Resolution. A summary of past and present KSDAR activities were sent to the Senator's Office. With Mary Wise's help a suggested resolution was formatted and also submitted. Patricia Carpenter arranged the transportation to the Capitol through the conference hotel.

DAR Marches on the Capitol!!! - March 29, 9:00 a.m. - State Capitol Building - Topeka

A distinguished group of women, at least fifty strong, descended from the Topeka Trolley and with a purposeful stride marched into the Capitol Building. Bedecked in blue and white sashes and ribbons with gleaming insignia, they strode to the Senate Chamber. After waiting nearly a century, they had come to the Senate floor to hear their virtues extolled and a day declared their own. Not since the days when these hallowed halls were an all male domain, their leader the wife of the Governor and their purpose had something to do with marking an old trail, had they made such an entrance.

Arrangements were completed for the Resolution to be read and adopted. A calendar rearranged to accommodate these august women. At the Senate door the leaders were escorted to the VIP box on the floor, the rest of the delegation to the gallery, all to witness a display of legislative process and oratory skill. Soon the Resolution noting accomplishments past and present was read. The vote taken, to a Senator, each and everyone, forty in all, unanimously sponsored and adopted this document of commendation.

The august group recognized and cheered, the DAR had arrived, the celebration to begin, their second century in the Great State of Kansas.

STATE OF KANSAS

Senate Resolution No. 1834
A resolution designating April 2, 1996, Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution Day.

WHEREAS, The Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution (KSDAR) came into existence with the organization of the Topeka chapter on April 2, 1896. The Betty Washington Chapter was organized in Lawrence on October 17, 1896, the Eunice Sterling Chapter was organized in Wichita on October 21, 1896. The first state conference was held in Topeka on December 5, 1899. A conference was held in Lawrence the following year, in Wichita in 1901 and a conference has been held each year since then; and

WHEREAS, The 3,500 members of the KSDAR have the privilege of serving their communities with patriotic, educational and historic preservation activities; and

WHEREAS, Historically, KSDAR, as individuals, have used their talents, energies and resources to further their hopes, dreams and ideals into reality; and

WHEREAS, From El Quartelejo to the Madonna of the Trail, from the Santa Fe Trail markers to the Kansas Pawnee Indian Village where, for the first time, the flag of the United States of America was raised; and

WHEREAS, From Junior American service to higher education scholarships, from good citizen awards, to ROTC Medal winners, the KSDAR honors young people and their outstanding teachers, encouraging them in their pursuit of knowledge about our precious heritage which was bought at such a great price; and

WHEREAS, KSDAR remembers veterans from American battles on a regular basis in hospitals and memorial services, recognizes outstanding community leaders, supports naturalization ceremonies and promotes conservation activities: Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Kansas: That the Kansas Legislature designate April 2, 1996 as Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution Day; and

Be it further resolved: That the Secretary of the Senate be directed to send five enrolled copies of this resolution to Mrs. Vincent Traffas, 518 B. Street, Smith Center, Kansas 66967.

- 8. No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes any time, except by the consent of the assembly.
- Members who appear on the program or who are making reports shall occupy the front seats. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business meetings.
- 10. Only the chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 11. Two timekeepers shall be appointed by the chair. Reports of State Officers and Committee Chairmen shall be limited to four minutes, and reports of District Directors and Chapter Regents to two minutes. The speakers shall conform with the ruling of the timekeepers.
- 12. Announcements must have the approval of the State Regent.
- 13. A copy of every report for the printed Proceedings of the State Conference shall be typed, ready for printing, and sent to the State Recording Secretary before the report is read at the Conference.
- 14. If the Officer, Chapter Regent or Chapter Vice Regent, Chairman or Appointee is not present, her report shall not be read and shall be filed for printing in the official Proceedings of the State Conference unless otherwise ordered.
- 15. Any Chairman or individual having a table display or exhibit shall attend to the removal of all material at the close of the Conference.
- 16. All necessary communications shall be delivered by the Pages.
- 17. Members shall refrain from smoking in the session room.
- 18. Registration shall close at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, April 2, 1996.
- 19. The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised" will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

TRIBUTE TO MARY GOVIER AINSWORTH KENNEDY

Mary Govier Ainsworth Kennedy, daughter of George Sanders Govier and Luna Vertrees, was born January 13, 1896, in Kansas City, Missouri. She passed away January 25, 1996 in Wichita, Kansas. She was united in marriage on April 17, 1919, to William Louis Ainsworth. They made their home in the Wichita and Derby, Kansas area. He passed away August 5, 1956. Mary remarried on October 24, 1957, to J. Randolph Kennedy and they resided in Carmel, California. He died on June 4, 1974. She is survived by one daughter, Mary Louise Ainsworth Aikins. Her son, William Louis Ainsworth, Jr., preceded her in death. She had eight grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

A member of Eunice Sterling Chapter, she was admitted into membership of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (National number 335281) on October 30, 1942. Mary served her chapter as Vice Regent and Regent and the Kansas Society as State Chairman of the Membership Committee. At the Kansas Society Annual State Conference in Wichita, she was elected State Regent, serving 1948-1950. This was the last two year term for Kansas Society State Regents.

In both years of her term the Kansas Society received the National Award for the greatest gain in Junior Membership. Four chapters were organized: John Athey, John Haupt, Shawnee and Cofachique.

It was at this time that the Kansas Daughters relinquished one project for another during the National building project to repair and enlarge the Administration Building. The third floor committee room that the Kansas Daughters gave their attention to, was originally known as the Kansas Room. It would later be dedicated as the Kansas Chapel, with one of the two original doors dedicated to Mrs. Mary Ainsworth.

The Kansas Society elected her Honorary State Regent at the Annual State Conference in March 1950.

Mary served the National Society in the Office of Vice President General, 1951-1954. She brought further honors to the state by being elected to the Office of Registrar General, NSDAR, 1956-1959, under Mrs. Fredric A. Groves, President General.

She served as National Vice Chairman, DAR Magazine, 1947-1950; National Vice Chairman, Western Division, Correct Use of Flag, 1950-1951; National Chairman, Correct Use of Flag, 1953-1956; and member of the National Financial Survey Committee.

She received a Fifty year Membership Certificate in 1992, and was recognized in the January 1996, issue of the Kansas DAR News in celebration of her one-hundredth birthday.

Mary was appointed Organizing Senior State President of the Kansas Society, Children of the American Revolution in 1956, and continued as Senior State President until 1958.

Mary's extensive research of family history resulted in finding her DAR Revolutionary Ancestor, Isaac Vertrees. Subsequent research would yield five supplemental ancestors: James Carr, Mathais Branderberg, Lambert Lane, Michael Prewitt, Sr., and James Prewitt.

Mary was graduated from the University of Kansas in 1917, with a Bachelor of Science Degree specializing in Botanical Science and was a member of Mortar Board Honor Society.

She was a member of St. John's Episcopal Chapel, Monterey, California; C.I. Chapter of P.E.O., Wichita, Kansas; and an alumni member of Pi Beta Phi Sorority. She was a life member of the Huguenot Society of Washington, DC.; and a life member of the Kentucky Historical Society.

Her interests included cooking, gardening and travel. Mary loved to entertain family and friends and is remembered for the marvelous meals and various dishes she created and prepared. Before leaving Wichita, Mary was well known for her beautiful flower gardens, especially the roses. California provided the perfect climate for the seventy-five varieties of orchids she grew, many of which she propagated herself.

Always active, combined with a love of nature, desire for new experiences and thirst for knowledge, Mary was the perfect traveler. Excursions took her around the world and to all fifty states. When Mary was in her eighties she traveled to Africa for a photographic safari.

We have profited from the experience, knowledge and dedicated service of this Kansas Daughter. Her sense of DAR history was unparalleled. We are better for having known her. We loved Mary Govier Ainsworth Kennedy and we miss her.

The first and fourth stanzas of the National Anthem were led by Mrs. Larry Overmiller, State Chairman, American Heritage Committee, followed by The Kansas Creed led by Mrs. Billy P. Compton, Honorary State Regent and Past Vice President General; and the Pages were retired.

Mrs. Frank C. Stewart, Jr., State Regent of Florida brought greetings to the assembly.

Mrs. Doran Cole, Credentials Chairman, gave the second report of the Committee. There were National Officers from KS I, Honorary State Regents 5, State Officers 9, Chapter Regents 42, Chapter Vice Regents 4, delegates 126, total entitled to vote 187, alternates 76, non voting members and guests 91, national officers not from KS 1, total registered 355 with five 50 Year members present. Mrs. Cole moved for the adoption of the revised Credentials Report as the official report of the 98th State Conference. Motion carried.

Copies of the Resolutions had been printed and distributed so the reading of the resolutions was waived by general consent. Mrs. Glen E. Mayden, Resolutions Chairman, moved for the adoption of each resolution. Other members of the Resolutions Committee were Mrs. Woodrow Dew and Miss Mary Wise.

ANNIVERSARY RESOLUTION

Whereas, The women descendants of Revolutionary ancestors were invited to establish the Kansas Society in 1894 with Mrs. Martha A. Scott Hand of Holton appointed as first Kansas State Regent;

Whereas, The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, President General Mrs. John W. Foster, recognized Kansas with the first chapter on April 2, 1896;

Whereas, The first three chapters in Kansas were organized: Topeka Chapter, April 2, 1896 with Regent Mrs. A. H. Horton and twenty-six charter

- members; Betty Washington of Lawrence, October 17, 1896 with Regent Miss Mary L. Robinson and twelve charter members; and Eunice Sterling of Wichita, October 21, 1896 with Regent Mrs. George F. Lewis and fourteen charter members;
- Whereas, From these modest beginnings the State Society has grown to a membership of 3,311 Daughters in sixty-three chapters and has been represented in the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution by one President General, two First Vice Presidents General, five elected national officers, one Honorary Vice President General, fifteen Vice Presidents General and numerous Chairmen of the South Central Division; and,
- Whereas, The year 1996 marks the 175th anniversary of the Santa Fe Trail, the 90th anniversary of the marking of the Santa Fe Trail by the Society; and the Centennial of the Kansas State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution;
- <u>Resolved</u>, That members, individually and collectively, celebrate these anniversaries and dedicate themselves to being worthy trustees of this rich heritage by participation in and promotion of the objectives of the state and national societies. Adopted.

RESPONSIBLE CITIZENSHIP

- Whereas, The American's Creed is repeated in the opening ritual at all meetings held by members of the Kansas Society and the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution;
- Whereas, The beliefs and privileges of each citizen are affirmed in this repetition; and with privileges comes duties and responsibilities; and,
- Whereas, The year 1996 is one in which Kansas Daughters celebrate a century of dedication to this nation and in which this nation again faces the selection of government leaders;
- <u>Resolved</u>. That individual members of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, exercise their privilege and duty by participating in the electoral process and encouraging others to do so. Adopted.

REAFFIRMATIONS

- Whereas, All past resolutions of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolutions, are in effect unless rescinded;
- <u>Resolved</u>. That the following resolutions be reaffirmed: English Language Used in Citizenship Testing and Swearing-in Ceremonies, 1995. Republican Form of Government, 1993.

Mrs. Larry Ream, Chairman of the Bylaws Committee, gave her report, then presented the proposed amendments to the Kansas DAR Bylaws and moved, "In accordance with notice given, and by direction of the State

Bylaws Committee, I move the adoption of the following amendments to the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the Kansas Society."

- 1. ARTICLE IV, Fees and Dues, Section 2, Dues. To amend Sentence 1 by striking out "\$2.50" before "per chapter member" and inserting in its place "\$3.50." Adopted.
- ARTICLE IV. Fees and Dues, Section 3, District Dues. To amend by substituting the the following, entitled "<u>District Fees</u>," for the existing section: "<u>A registration fee</u>, not to exceed \$3.00, may be collected at each of the Annual District Meetings from the members of that District who attend; the fee shall be set and disbursed according to the approved procedures."
 - After some debate, Mrs. Ruth Keys Clark called for a ballot vote and clarification of abstention and blank ballots. Tellers appointed were Mrs. Carol McNickle, Mrs. James B. Masson, Mrs. James Shirley, and Mrs. Richard Standrich. The teller's report was as follows: Number of votes cast 129, votes for motion 87, votes against 41, and 1 blank vote; 2/3 vote required. Adopted. Mrs. Bruce Cochran moved to destroy the ballots. Motion carried.
- 3. <u>ARTICLE IV</u>, Fees and Dues, Section 4, Additional Payments. To amend by substituting the following, entitled "<u>Designated Payments</u>," for the existing section:
 - "(a) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the annual state dues received from each chapter member five cents for the support of the Kansas State Society Children of the American Revolution. The KSDAR State Treasurer shall forward these funds to the K.S.C.A.R. Senior State Treasurer."
 - "(b) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the annual state dues received from each chapter member ten cents for the Kansas DAR Library Fund to help meet the annual library expenses of rent, insurance, operating costs, and purchases and maintenance of equipment."
 - "(c) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the General Fund, \$1.00 per chapter for the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund." Adopted.

Mrs. Traffas announced that Chapter Regents could come to the podium and receive a copy of a news release, provided by Mrs. Robert M. Neubert.

Mrs. Robert Satzler announced that a Chapter Regent's Club Pin had been found.

The benediction was given by Mrs. Albert R. Hagemann, State Chaplain. Meeting recessed at 11:45 a.m.

The National Anthem was a solo sung by Mrs. James F. Rueger. The Topeka High Madrigals sang several inspiring musical numbers. Mrs. Liestman introduced those at the head table.

Greetings were brought to the group by Mrs. Keith Lockard, State Regent of Nevada. Mrs. Liestman introduced Grant Walkup of Eisenhower VA Medical Center, who gave the noon address.

AFTERNOON MINUTES, APRIL 1, 1996

The afternoon session reconvened at 2:30 p.m. in Versailles C.

Mrs. Doran Cole, Credentials Chairman, reported there were National Officers from Kansas 1, Honorary State Regents 5, State Officers 10, Chapter Regents 42, Chapter Vice Regents 4, Delegates 129, entitled to vote 191, non voting members and guests 93, alternates 73, National Officers not from Kansas 1, total number registered 358, with five 50 Year members present. Mrs. Cole moved for the adoption of the revised roll of delegates to be the official roll of voting members of the 98th Kansas State Conference. Adopted.

4. ARTICLE VI, Nominations and Elections, Section 2, Nominating Committee, Subsection (a) Members. To amend by substituting the following for the existing subsection:

"The State Nominating Committee shall be composed of a chairman and four members, who shall be elected at the Conference Opening of the State Conference in the second year of an administration. The chairman shall be elected by nominations from the floor. The election of the four committee members shall immediately follow the election of the of the chairman, also from nominations from the floor. No name shall be placed in nomination without the consent of the nominee. A majority vote shall elect.

"No member shall be eligible to serve on the Nominating Committee for consecutive terms. No more than two members from the same District shall serve on the Nominating Committee."

Mrs. Larry Ream, Bylaws Committee Chairman, moved to amend the motion by adding at the end of paragraph two: "In the election of the five members to the Nominating Committee, no more than two members shall be elected from the same district. Rejected.

Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., Honorary State Regent, moved to refer to the committee for further consideration, seconded by Mrs. Ruth Keys Clark. Rejected.

Mrs. Harry J. Carpenter called for the previous question (a motion to end debate). The motion carried by 2/3 vote. The proposed amendment No. 4 was then voted on and was overwhelmingly rejected.

5. ARTICLE VIII, Meetings, Section 7, State Conference Chairman, Paragraph 2.

To amend by substituting the following for the existing paragraph:

"It shall be the duty of the State Conference Chairman to be responsible for planning and coordinating the arrangements of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and in cooperation with the host District. After conferring with the State Conference Chairman, the State Regent shall appoint the State Conference Treasurer; the State Conference Committees, including Public Relations, Registration, and other such committees as deemed necessary; and the members to assist the Credentials Committee Chairman. The State Conference Chairman shall assign the various functions at the State Conference to the chapters in the host District and shall serve as an advisor for their plans. Adopted.

- 6. ARTICLE IX, State Board of Management, Section 1, Members. To amend by adding the text of Standing Rule Number 24 as a new Paragraph 2, which reads:
 - "State Chairmen of Committees, District Directors, and Honorary State Regents may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management with voice but no vote." Adopted.
- 7. ARTICLE XI, Committees, Section 3, Credentials Committee, Paragraph 1. To amend Sentence 2 by striking out "who shall be appointed by the State Conference Chairman," after "host District for State Conference" and before "and shall be advised" and inserting in its place "(see ARTICLE VIII, Section 7)." Adopted.
- 8. <u>ARTICLE XII, Districts, Section 1, Names.</u> To amend by striking out Sentence 3, which reads: "<u>District assignments of new chapters shall be made by the Executive Committee.</u>" Adopted.
- 9. <u>ARTICLE XII, Districts, Section 2, Jurisdiction.</u> To amend by striking out in Sentence 2 "to determine the amount and deadline for payment of

- dues from its chapter and other financial matters and" after "privilege" and before "to allow for any traditional. Adopted.
- 10. ARTICLE XIII, Chapters, Section 7, Chapter Treasurer, Subsection (c). To amend by striking out Subsection (c), which reads: "Each chapter shall pay annual District dues to the Treasurer of its assigned District, according to the guidelines of the District." Reletter Subsection (d) as Subsection (c). Adopted.
- 11. STANDING RULE NUMBER 1, Sentence 2. To amend by striking out "the KSDAR Archives in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Building, 2" after "the Library of the Kansas Society, 1;" and before "the President General, NSDAR, 1;" and inserting in its place "the Kansas Society DAR Archives in the Kansas DAR Library in Dodge City, Kansas, 2;" Adopted.
- 12. <u>STANDING RULE NUMBER 11.</u> To amend by striking out "<u>shall</u>" after "Kansas" and before "pay" and insert in its place "<u>may.</u>" Further amend by striking out "<u>Honor Roll</u>" after "NSDAR" and before requirement and insert in its place "<u>National Achievement Award.</u>" Adopted
- 13. STANDING RULE NUMBER 13. To amend by striking out "archives in the Memorial Building of the Kansas State Historical Society" after "the custody of the" and inserting in its place "Kansas Society DAR Archives, which is located in the Kansas DAR Library in Dodge City, Kansas." Adopted.
- 14. STANDING RULE NUMBER 37, LINES 13-16. To amend the listing of chapters under the District heading "SOUTHWEST" by striking out "Ninnescah" in Line 15 after "Martha Vail" and before "Randolph Loving." Adopted.
- 15. ARTICLE VI. Nominations and Elections, Section 2, Nominating Committee, Subsection (b) Duties. To amend by adding a new Paragraph 5, to read: "The ballot for the election at State Conference shall be prepared by the chairman of the Nominating Committee." Adopted.

Mrs. Ream asked permission to withdraw proposed amendments to Article IX, Section 5 and ARTICLE XII, Section 3 because they pertained to proposed amendment No. 4 that failed. There was no objection. Mrs. Ream moved the following recommendation on behalf of the Kansas Society Bylaws Committee: "That the committee be authorized to correct Article and Section designations, punctuations and cross-references and to make such other technical and conforming changes as may be necessary to reflect the intent of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution." The motion carried. Other members of the Bylaws Committee were Mrs. Robert Kline and Mrs. Cecil O'Brate. Mrs. Ronnie Svaty was not present.

Mrs. Harry J. Carpenter, Chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that the amendment to Article IV, Section 2, necessitated a change in the

proposed budget to reflect the raise in dues. Amount received from dues should be changed to \$11,329.50 and the total income would be changed to \$14, 180.50. The projected net gain will be \$1,605.00. Mrs. Carpenter, "by the direction of the Finance Committee, I move the amended budget proposed for the 1996 year be adopted and that the State Treasurer be authorized to pay all bills as designated by this budget." Adopted. Mrs. Carpenter introduced members of the Finance Committee.

Tuesday, April 2, 1996



The work of the Chapter Registrars in getting all changes reported is much appreciated. This officer asks for continued help, remember a new state directory will be in the making soon. Total membership, February 15, 1995 was 3,460; chapters with increase in membership, 14; chapters with decrease in membership, 40; chapters with no change, 9; total chapters, 63; chapters disbanded, 1; and total membership labels printed for newsletter, 3311.

This officer appreciates all the help she has received and is looking forward to the thrill of keeping up with you for the next two years.

State Historian

The focus of this past year has been the research and promotion of the Centennial Book, "Looking Back Trails to the Second Century: The First Hundred Years of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution." Packets of previous histories and other pertinent data were put together for all chapters, state committees and clubs to use in the preparation of their histories for the Centennial Book. This officer is working on the histories of the ninety-seven state conferences, the twenty-one disbanded chapters and the numerous markers and historical artifacts of KSDAR. Information was also provided to the Honorary State Regents, who are preparing biographies of the thirty-three State Regents. We are taking prepublication reservations for the Centennial Book.

To ensure that knowledge of current activities is available to KSDAR in regards to its historical endeavors, this officer joined the Kansas Historical Society and the Santa Fe Trail Association.

As was explained during Fall Board of Management, the KSDAR Archives have been moved into the Kansas DAR Library at Dodge City. We had hoped to provide an updated inventory at this report. However, research for the Centennial Book has unearthed so many treasures, it has delayed the recataloging of the contents.

We are happy to report that the Kansas chapters are 100% in reporting their activities. Nineteen chapters were given commendations for undertaking a historically significant project(s). These projects include sponsoring an American History Teacher; contributing to the Americana Collection at NSDAR; dedicating a flagpole at Tamassee; starting, work-in-progress or finishing restorations and marker projects; contributing to the State Regents project or any one of the many ways of bringing history into our everyday lives. Eleven graves of DAR members were marked.

Restoration of the 1906 DAR Markers along the Santa Fe Trail continues. This officer is involved in negotiating resolutions to discussions of where markers should be located. Restoration of the 1976 DAR Markers along the Black Dog Trail has been started.

The Chapters not involved in restoration projects of markers or other historical sites, could be by remembering your sister chapters with a monetary contribution to their project(s). Your efforts would be appreciated and acknowledged.

Mrs. Kenneth A. Rice has been selected the 1996 Outstanding American History Teacher for Kansas.

Finally, we want to thank all the Chapter Historians (and others), State Chairmen, Club Presidents, the Honorary State Regents and the State Officers for completing their histories for the Centennial Book by the deadline. On the Historian's table, there are special hugs and kisses to acknowledge receiving your history. Also displayed are objects from the KSDAR Archives and a preview of the Centennial Book. Additionally there are pre-publication reservation brochures at the table.

Since election, this officer has attended the tea honoring the State Regent, the Fall Tour of all four districts, a State Executive Committee meeting, and State Conference. In addition, several trips to the Kansas DAR Library in Dodge City; has appeared as speaker on library information at Cimarron River Valley Chapter and was a guest at the Christmas Brunch meeting of the Dodge City Chapter.

This officer is charged with the general supervision of the KSDAR Library and to serve as Chairman of the State Library Committee. This has generated numerous phone calls, letters and fax messages from throughout the State answering queries on library affairs. These plus a new inventory of materials and equipment; new agreements with Kansas Genealogical Society and the Village Square Mall and the insurance company had led to a full year of negotiations.

Reports from the 63 Chapters in Kansas show 51 Chapters donated books and/or money to the KSDAR Library. In addition, five chapters donated books to the NSDAR Library.

As State Librarian, this officer is a link between the KSDAR Library and the NSDAR Library. To share their message a six page brochure was compiled for the Regents Fall packet and an article in the Kansas DAR News.

The NSDAR Library is celebrating its 100th Birthday this year. The main project is to computerize its card catalog and publish a guide to genealogical research.

The KSDAR Library has its own Centennial plans to publish a five year supplement to the Library Catalog which will be available on Fall tour of 1996. What a way to say "Happy Birthday, KSDAR."

Kansas Daughters have had a busy year preserving our American Heritage. Thirty- six programs were given on old tools, hat pins, photo preservation, early American music, family "tales", quilts, flags, samplers and one chapter has a monthly newsletter.

Our Statewide project has been the design and construction of a KSDAR Centennial quilt. A modified samplor design was chosen and 63 blocks of white and ivory print fabric were sewn by this state chairman. The blocks were distributed to chapters during the fall tour. Chapters were asked to embroider their name and organizing date in the block center using dark blue or royal blue thread. Further decoration was encouraged. Each chapter designed their own block. Due to the cooperative and ambitious nature of Kansas Daughters, I had received all 63 completed blocks by February 9th. Placed alphabetically, the blocks were sewn together with one inch wide "loyal" blue ribbon strips. The central block features our State Centennial Pin Design. An administrative theme block will be included.

This quilt will be completed and displayed during 1996 Fall Tour. Thanks to the hard work of all chapters to make this project possible.

AMERICAN HISTORY

The deadline for American History essay entries arrived at the same time as a Kansas blizzard. I received mail by Fed Ex, Priority, Certified, Express and UPS, all got through. I received fifty-seven entries from twenty-six Chapters. There were 86 schools participating with 923 essays being submitted.

The judges stated they learned more about Lewis and Clark than they ever thought they wanted to know. This years winners were: Fifth grade - Blaze Mollhagen, Smoky Hill Chapter; Sixth grade - Blaine Johnson, William Wilson Chapter; Seventh grade - Kathryn Marie O'Hanlon, Dodge City Chapter; and Eighth grade - Tom Reid, Shawnee Mission Chapter.

We had thirty proclamations with 100% chapters reporting and seventy one displays arranged in schools, libraries, etc. About 170 programs were given to Chapters and other clubs. Spot announcements were used on radio, TV, schools and bulletin boards. Certificates. medals, and cash prizes were awarded essay winners. One Chapter held a tea for contestants.

At a time when they are trying to remove Paul Revere from the ride and Boston from the Tea Party its up to us to promote the American History that shaped this great nation.

There is a lot for us to do but remember you dig a tunnel one shovel at a time and as Henry Ford once said, "Whether you believe you can or believe you can't, you're absolutely right." I believe we can! Let's share ideas.

NSDAR AWARDS Best State report (by Division)

South Central Division-Kansas, Marilyn Winton

There were many outstanding reports from the chapters this year, and as always it is difficult to choose any one; an outstanding group is more in order. Our members across Kansas reported recycling 199,124 pounds of paper; 4,955 pounds of magazines; 16,672 pounds of plastic; 23,081 pounds of glass; 4,221 pounds of aluminum; 2,691 pounds of tin and copper; 3,581 gallons of oil, and 40 batteries. Water re-use totaled 22,257 gallons and garbage composted was 10,502 pounds. Our chapters planted 3,078 trees (including 2 shelter belts), 1,222 shrubs, 12,061 bulbs, 2,316 packets of flower seeds, 9 pounds wildflower seeds, 1,782 bedding plants and 88 vegetable gardens. Used clothing donated to worthy causes totaled about 1,695 pounds.

Over, 54,048 pounds of birdseed were dispensed as well as 350 pounds of floating fish food and 22 deer blocks, both salt and protein. Thirty-five torraces were constructed and 52 miles of terracing reconstructed, as well as 19 ponds built, and 1.25 mile of dikes. Waterways planted amounted to 4.4 acres and 200 acres of wetlands were managed. Flow meters were placed on 15 wells to monitor water use. Several members have installed low-water-use-toilets; thousands of gallons have been reused from kitchens and washers for gardens and trees, two wildlife habitats created and reconstructed, eighteen bluebird houses built, three bat houses and one butterfly house. One member is overseer of recycling in Plains, Kansas and Little Osage Trail Chapter in Derby distributes information on recycling and the City's collection of Christmas trees program; they also prepare the trees for mulching by the City. Another member volunteered 60 hours at a State Game Preserve. Kansas DAR's are truly hardworking and creative in the cause of conservation and the environment!

Conservation Medals presented this year were from Sarah Steward to Melissa and Terry Nech; from Randolph Loving to John E. Wheery; Molly Foster Berry to John Culvahouse; and from Emporia to Ann Havenhill. This activity is one of the most important public relations efforts a chapter can make to push recognition of environmental concerns in their communities. The other activity is to plant a tree given by the chapter, for an Arbor Day ceremony. Chapters planting an Arbor Day tree were Topeka, Capt. Jesse Leavenworth, Shawnee Mission, Cimarron River Valley, Atchison, Dodge City, John Athey and Byrd Prewitt. Twenty-eight chapters gave programs on environment and conservation, and many more had one or two minutes spottalks at meetings. Newton Chapter received an award at State Conference for the most outstanding Chapter Conservation Report. It included photos of various tree planting projects and a narrative of conservation efforts. Other chapters sending in notable reports were Fort Larned, Quivira Crossing, Topeka, Shawnee Mission and Tomahawk. Thank you from your State Society to each and everyone of our members who made a contribution toward recycling, conserving, renewing and maintaining resources and environment.

She also reminds our members that any donations, large or small, will be appreciated greatly as the National Society does not include cost of exhibitions and acquisitions of objects in the Museum budget. This means the Museum is entirely dependent on the generosity of the Daughters. Suggestions for donating are the Adopt-An-Object and Give-A-Book programs and Life Memberships. Another project is just now taking form and you will hear more about it later.

This Chairman wishes she could take credit for the exciting idea of combining some of the Arabia Steamboat Museum items with the NSDAR Museum exhibit, but these ideas came from our very alert State Regent. All sixty-three Kansas DAR Chapters reported to the State Regent on genealogical records. This was a 100 percent response. Forty-two chapters reported no activity.

Twenty-one chapters submitted 7,788 pages of material. These Cochairman mailed 10 volumes of genealogical records and two books to NSDAR for a total of 2,652 pages. Duplicate volumes were sent to KSDAR Library in Dodge City and Kansas State Historical Library in Topeka. These chairmen indexed three volumes and wrote forty-five letters.

Little Arkansas Chapter submitted five complete volumes. Desire Tobey Sears, and Sagamore Chapters each contributed one complete volume. Nathan Edson Chapter and Sarah Steward Chapter each contributed a book. The remaining three volumes were made up of miscellaneous records.

This year again Kansas Daughters have shown their devotion and dedication in service to our Veterans, seeing to their every need which is indeed possible. Showing your concern through giving of your time, talent, skills, gifts and money certainly make life more pleasant for the patients in our Veteran facilities. The chapters both reported and participated 100%.

Sixty-three chapter reports totaled. 690 visits, 2,348 hours, 63 parties for a total of 1,249 hours and 278 volunteers traveled 18,754 miles. Dollar value reported: Cash/Canteen Books \$1,384, Comfort Items \$3,605, Magazines/Books \$428, Gifts \$3,866, Party Food/Favors \$1,605. The grand total of \$41,002.99 includes value of labor. "Stamps for the Wounded Project" yielded 455.8 ounces mailed.

The Outstanding DAR VAVS Member Award was presented to Mrs. Eunice Gentzler, member of Wyandot Chapter. She has served on the VAVS Advisory Board as Representative and/or Doputy, has over fourteen years of service and a total of 2,076 hours at Eisenhower Center, Leavenworth.

The Outstanding Youth Volunteer Award was presented to Jeffery Davis, sponsored by Prairie Flint Hills Chapter. He volunteers in Topeka, and at age 17, he has volunteered 8 years and has served 1,891 hours there. He has also won the South Central Division Award.

Both of these fine individuals were honored at the 50th Anniversary of VAVS Luncheon at State Conference.

LITERACY CHALLENGE

The Literacy Challenge Committee, that began in 1989, has become a vital part of the work done by members of the Kansas Society. There was 100% reporting from all the chapters. National surveys show that literacy is of extreme importance and all citizens need to be given the opportunity to learn to read.

Kansas Daughters are beginning to meet the Literacy Challenge, and I am happy to report that more chapters are having programs and are doing projects that benefit others, concerning this issue. This past year fourteen

chapters had programs on literacy (up from nine). Twenty-seven chapters were involved in local literacy programs (up from twenty-two). Forty-one members serve as tutors across the State of Kansas (up from thirty-four), with 2,669 volunteer hours (up from 2,291).

A few of the unique activities included: transcribing into Braille; a local and national award was presented to one member for teaching English to adults and foreign born; teaching prospective citizens to read; one tutored a father so he could read to his young children; helping foreign exchange students understand English and "slang"; distributing literature about literacy programs; donations to "Ton of Books"; DAR Manuals for Citizenship donated to a College; one junior member taught middle school English, feels that the foundation for the future of our English speaking nation is being laid today.

Let us all lay a firm foundation to meet the literacy challenges of tomorrow.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

All sixty-three chapters reported. A total of 247 prospective members were assisted by the chapters with eighty-five new members accepted and a number of applications are pending.

There have been a good many requests for assistance and information which were able to be handled by this chairman.

Six chapters sponsored genealogical workshops. They are: Little Arkansas, Marais des Cygnes, Newton, Shawnee Mission, Tomahawk, and Topeka. Your chairman participated in the workshop presented by the Marais des Cygnes Chapter.

We were very proud to be able to host the Volunteer Genealogical Workshop in Overland Park where seventy-four women from Georgia, Kentucky, Indiana, Kansas, Missouri, Colorado, and Nebraska worked for two days. Nineteen of these ladies then went to National and completed their training and are well on the way to earning their "Genie" pins. Little Arkansas, Nathan Edson, and Prairie Rose had booths at area historical functions whereby information regarding membership in the DAR was distributed. Molly Foster Berry even held a tea for prospective members. Imagination is working in Kansas.

Workshops are a proven method of gaining membership.

VOLUNTEER COMMUNITY SERVICE Mrs. William O. Stephens

Forty-six chapters reported a total of 40,740 hours contributed to community projects. DAR women seem to find time to help their locale beside DAR and their church.

The chapters who contributed the most hours are as follows: Category A – Molly Foster Berry with 2,403 hours and Category B – Neodesha and

Accordingly and guided by her further counsel, your State Parliamentarian has endeavored to implement the advice of the National Parliamentarian by providing assistance to the State Bylaws

Committee in the development of a procedural guide for annual District meetings.

The privilege of serving the Kansas Society as State Parliamentarian is both a pleasure and a challenge.

PRESS BOOK Mrs. Paul A. Jones

The Chapters have been faithful in telling the good news of DAR with 100% reporting. They have supported Constitution Week and American History Month with proclamations, essay contests, spot announcements, school programs, editorials, window displays and handouts. BYLAWS & STANDING RULES of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution

CORPORATE CHARTER OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

FIRST: The Name of the corporation is the KANSAS SOCIETY of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

SECOND: The name and address of its Resident Agent in this State is Mrs. Harry J. Carpenter, State Treasurer, 913 SW 4th St., Topeka, Shawnee County, KS 66606-1113.

THIRD: This Corporation is organized NOT for profit, and the objects

and purposes to be transacted and carried on are:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.
- (4) This corporation shall have power to receive title to real and personal property by gift, devise, bequest or purchase; to own, hold, sell, convey, lease and re-lease, let and sublet real and personal property; and to manage, invest, reinvest or disburse the funds that may accrue from the holdings of such property in the manner provided by the Bylaws of the Kansas Society as now constituted or as hereafter amended. This corporation shall have the power to sue and to be sued.

No officer, director or member of this corporation shall be individually liable for the obligations of the corporation.

These articles may be amended by a two-thirds vote, provided a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society. This corporation shall have such other authority as may be provided in the Bylaws of the Kansas Society, not in contravention of the provisions of this Charter or the laws of the State of Kansas.

This corporation shall not have authority to issue capital stock.

FOURTH: The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation, and shall be the managers of the business of the corporation and shall hold, manage and control all property of the corporation.

The members of the Kansas Society and all persons who shall hereafter become members, who are in good standing under the Bylaws of said Society, shall be members of this corporation.

FIFTH: The term for which this corporation is to exist is ONE HUNDRED YEARS.

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BYLAWS

OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised by the Ninety-third KSDAR Conference March 6, 1991 Amended 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995 and 1996

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Object

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the state of Kansas:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries;
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American People, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American Citizens;
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members.

The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in the state of Kansas.

Section 2. New Chapters.

The State Organizing Secretary shall notify the Executive Committee the following information about a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society: name and location, date of organization, names and addresses of its chapter officers and members, and chapter code number. This notification shall cause the newly confirmed chapter to be enrolled as a member of the Kansas Society and to belong to a District according to its location.

ARTICLE IV Fees and Dues

Section 1. Fiscal Year.

The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be January 1 through December 31.

Section 2. Dues.

The annual state dues of a chapter shall be \$3.50 per chapter member, payable to the State Treasurer before December 1. Only a member whose state dues have been paid by December 1 shall be eligible to serve as a delegate or an alternate at the State Conference.

The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after April 1 shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year.

Section 3. District Dues.

A registration fee, not to exceed \$3.00, may be collected at each of the Annual District Meetings from the members of that District who attend; the fee shall be set and disbursed according to the approved procedures.

Section 4. Additional Payments.

- (a) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the annual state dues received from each chapter member five cents for the support of the Kansas State Society Children of the American Revolution. The KSDAR State Treasurer shall forward these funds to the K.S.C.A.R. Senior State Treasurer.
- (b) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the annual state dues received from each chapter member ten cents for the Kansas DAR Library Fund to help meet the annual library expenses of rent, insurance, operating costs, and purchases and maintenance of equipment.
- (c) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the General Fund, \$1.00 per chapter for the Kansas Chapel Maintenance Fund.

ARTICLE V Officers

Section I. Officers.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding

Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility.

To be eligible for the office of State Regent or State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state of Kansas for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as a Chapter Regent for at least one-half of the chapter term.

To be eligible for any other state office, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state of Kansas for at least two years.

No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two successive terms, and no member who has served two terms in any state office shall be eligible to any other state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year.

A member having served more than one-half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 3, Term.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Expenses.

The expenses of the State Officers, as approved in the budget, shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the State Regent, who shall present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment. Requests to be reimbursed for additional expenses shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the Executive Committee for its action.

Section 5. Vacancies.

If the office of State Regent becomes vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent.

Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee, with the approval of the State Board of Management, until the next regular meeting of the State Conference, when the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by the Kansas Society.

Section 6. Automatic Resignation.

Any State Officer unable to carry out the duties of her office for a period of six months automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer, unless ruled otherwise by the State Regent with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 7. Honorary State Regent.

In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, a member who has served as State Regent, upon her retirement from office, may be elected

Honorary State Regent for life. Election shall be at State Conference and may be by voice vote. An Honorary State Regent is entitled to a vote at the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Nominations and Elections

Section 1. Election.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall be elected at the State Conference every third year, coinciding with the year of election of National Executive Officers. The election shall be by ballot, and a majority vote shall elect.

Section 2. Nominating Committee.

(a) Members.

The Nominating Committee shall be composed of five members. The chairman shall be elected at the Fall State Board of Management meeting during the second year of the administration. Each District shall elect one committee member at its annual District meeting which follows.

No member shall be eligible to serve on the Nominating Committee for consecutive terms.

(b) Duties.

Before May 1, the chairman of the Nominating Committee shall notify, in writing, all chapters of the impending election and shall indicate the final date on which the names of members to be considered for state offices shall be received from the chapters.

The committee shall select one nominee for each office. In its selection of candidates, the committee shall endeavor to represent each of the four Districts. No chapter shall have more than one member serving as a State Officer at a time. No nominee shall be eligible for election to a state office unless a chapter endorsement, signed by the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Recording Secretary, is received by the Chairman of the Nominating Committee prior to the election.

By January 15, the report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent to the State Officers, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, and the State Committee Chairmen.

The report of the Nominating Committee shall be presented at the State Conference. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter, signed by the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Recording Secretary.

The ballot for the election at State Conference shall be prepared by the chairman of the Nominating Committee.

Section 3. Vice President General.

A candidate for Vice President General from Kansas shall be endorsed by a majority vote by ballot at a State Conference. No endorsement for Vice

President General shall be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated in the motion.

ARTICLE VII Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society, and by its parliamentary authority.

Each State Officer shall type an annual report of less than two hundred words: before March 1, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and two copies to the State Recording Secretary. These annual reports shall be presented at the State Conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Within thirty days after the State Conference, each retiring State Officer, with the exception of the State Recording Secretary, shall deliver to her successor a written procedure of the requirements of her office, a list of the KSDAR property in her custody, and all records and property of the Kansas Society, and she shall obtain a receipt for these items. A duplicate of the list of the KSDAR property in her custody shall be sent to the State Regent-elect. The State Recording Secretary's deadline shall be September 1.

Section 2. State Regent.

The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management, and the Executive Committee.

She shall be the executive officer and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society.

She shall appoint all committees except the Nominating Committee, naming the chairman of each; shall be ex officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee; shall appoint a State Parliamentarian; shall cosign all checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts; shall plan the schedule for the Fall Tour; shall plan and prepare the program for the State Conference and shall approve the arrangements, contract, and payments made by the State Conference Chairman and the State Conference committees.

Along with the State Treasurer, signature cards for all bank accounts and for the safe-deposit box (containing the bonds, securities, and other evidence of invested funds of the Kansas Society) shall bear her signature, and she shall possess a key to the safe-deposit box.

She shall receive from the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen all statements of expenses, as approved in the budget, and present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment.

At the beginning of her term of office, she shall file with the insurance company a complete and current inventory of the materials and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library.

With the assistance of the State Vice Regent or any other member whom she designates, she shall oversee the printing and distribution of the official KSDAR stationery.

She shall send each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the national committees and of any other appointees and shall notify the Chapter Regents of all changes in personnel and addresses of National and State Officers and appointees.

She shall endeavor to visit each chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Prior to their publication, the State Regent shall have the privilege of approval of the final proof copies of the "Kansas DAR News" and the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 3. State Vice Regent.

In the absence or inability of the State Regent, the State Vice Regent shall perform the duties of the office of State Regent.

The State Vice Regent shall preside at the Chapter Regents' banquet at the State Conference and shall work with the State Regent and the District Directors in planning the District meetings.

If requested, she shall assist the State Regent with the printing and/or distribution of the official KSDAR stationery.

She shall receive from the Chapter Regents their annual lists of names, addresses, and telephone numbers of Chapter Chairmen of state and national committees; she shall collocate for each State Committee Chairman a listing of the Chapter Chairmen of her committee.

She shall perform any other duties designated to her by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain.

The State Chaplain shall open and close meetings of the Kansas Society with the reading of scripture and prayer and conduct such religious services as occasion may require.

She shall conduct a Memorial Service at each State Conference; she shall receive the necrology from the State Registrar and prepare the printed program.

She shall send notes of sympathy to the families of recently deceased members.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary.

(a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, and the Finance Committee.

She shall notify State Officers, Chapter Regents, and State Committee Chairmen of any actions taken at these meetings affecting their duties.

She shall maintain the official membership roll of the State Board of Management.

She may cosign checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts. She shall be a member of the Finance Committee.

Each year she shall file the annual reports of State Officers, Chapter Regents, District Directors, and State Committee Chairmen until January 1.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile, edit, and publish the Annual Report and Proceedings of the State Conference. A committee to assist with this duty may be selected by the State Recording Secretary. She shall provide to the State Regent a final proof copy of the Proceedings prior to its publication.

By November 1, the State Recording Secretary shall distribute the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary.

The State Corresponding Secretary shall maintain the official Kansas Society mailing list of the members who are to receive meeting notices, shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society, and shall assist the State Regent in her official correspondence.

She shall notify the State Officers and the delegates of any special meetings that may be called.

She shall send out notices of meetings of the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior.

Immediately after a State Conference at which an election is held, she shall send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the newly elected state officers.

Each year by January 15, she shall send the official call for the State Conference to the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose memberships are within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, the State Committee Chairmen, and the District Directors.

Each year by January 15, she shall send each Chapter Regent one credentials form and one form for reporting chapter officers, which shall be duplicated and returned by the Chapter Regents. She shall compile the lists of chapter officers reported by the Chapter Regents and, before Continental Congress, send one set to the Organizing Secretary General and one set to the State Regent. She shall file the remaining set. Each year by June 1, she shall send lists of the names and addresses of the current Chapter Regents to the State Recording Secretary for publication in the Annual Report and Proceedings and to the State Reporter for publication in the "Kansas DAR News." If requested by a State Officer, she shall provide a list of corresponding chapter officers.

She shall prepare the fall state packet from letters provided by the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen. She shall be responsible for distributing the state packet during the State Board of Management and District meetings of the Fall Tour and for mailing, by October 1, any packets that have not been collected during the fall meetings.

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary.

The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and Chapter Organizing Regents in the organization of new chapters.

She shall be responsible for the correspondence related to the organization of a new chapter, and she shall notify the Executive Committee the following information about a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society: name and location, date of organization, names and addresses of its chapter officers and members, and chapter code number. This notification shall cause the newly confirmed chapter to be enrolled as a member of the Kansas Society, and a District assignment shall be made.

She shall determine the possibilities for new chapters within the state and shall assist existing chapters in maintaining their memberships and in gaining new members.

Section 8. State Treasurer.

The State Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all funds and securities of the Kansas Society. She shall deposit them in the name of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution and shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the State Conference. All checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts shall be cosigned by the State Regent, except in cases of emergency when the State Recording Secretary may cosign.

Upon assuming the duties of her office, she may transfer the checking accounts to a convenient, federally insured banking institution, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee; this action shall be ratified at the next meeting of the State Board of Management.

She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on December 31, and submit them for audit to a public accountant. She shall present the auditor's report at the annual State Conference.

She shall serve as the chairman of the Finance Committee. (See Article XI, Section 4.)

Prior to the State Conference, she shall report to the State Credentials Committee Chairman the number of votes to which each chapter is entitled. After the delegates and alternates are elected, she shall verify their eligibilities for the State Credentials Committee.

She shall be bonded in the amount of \$10,000; the fee to be paid by the Kansas Society.

She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities, and other evidence of invested funds and shall rent a safe-deposit box for their safekeeping. A key to the safe-deposit box shall be issued to the State Treasurer and to the State Regent.

Signature cards for all bank accounts and the safe-deposit box shall bear the signatures of the State Regent and State Treasurer.

She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall be responsible for their transfer to her successor at the close of the term.

Section 9. State Registrar.

The State Registrar shall keep the files containing the names of all

chapter members of the Kansas Society and, when possible, the names of the members at large residing in Kansas. The record shall include: full name, including maiden name and, if married, husband's full name; full date of admittance by the National Society; national number; name of chapter or, if the member has belonged to more than one chapter, the names of her original and current chapters; name and rank of ancestor, with name of child through whom the lineage is traced; colony or state, and branch of service in which the ancestor served; and the dates and locations of any transfers.

The State Registrar shall receive the membership changes from the Chapter Registrars. She shall update the membership files with the information reported by the chapters, including changes in membership by admission, transfer, resignation, removal for nonpayment of dues, reinstatement, death, marriage or divorce, and changes of name or address.

She shall prepare and send duplicate forms to each Chapter Registrar for the chapter's annual membership report, which shall list the members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, reinstated, transferred, married, divorced, or who have died during the preceding year. Newly accepted Junior Members and their dates of birth shall also be listed on the annual report. She shall send one set of the forms to the State Treasurer by June 1.

Prior to the State Conference, she shall prepare a necrology for the Memorial Service and shall furnish copies to the State Regent and the State Chaplain.

She shall assist the editor of the "Kansas DAR News" in maintaining a current mailing list.

Section 10. State Historian.

The State Historian shall direct such historical work as may be required by the Kansas Society or suggested by the National Society.

She shall keep a file of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

She shall prepare and submit an annual report to the Historian General.

She shall keep a reference record of the archives of the Kansas Society and, at the close of her term, shall prepare copies of the inventory for the following incoming officers: State Regent, State Vice Regent, and State Historian.

At the close of the administration, she shall prepare a summary of the highlights of the past three years to be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 11. State Librarian.

The State Librarian shall have supervision of the Kansas DAR Library and shall serve as the chairman of the State Library Committee.

She shall be responsible for all books, papers, microfilm, microfiche, and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library. She shall keep a current list of all the materials and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library and shall submit to the State Regent duplicate copies of the list, one of which shall be for the insurance company.

She shall list in her annual report all materials sent to the NSDAR Library and all those accepted for the Kansas DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

She shall work with the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee in maintaining the Kansas DAR Library.

Section 12. State Reporter.

The State Reporter shall be the editor of the "Kansas DAR News" and shall keep a file of the current Kansas Society mailing list.

She shall provide to the State Regent a final proof copy of each issue of the "Kansas DAR News" prior to its publication.

She shall be ex officio a member of the Public Relations Committee and the State Conference Public Relations Committee.

Each year she shall send a report of the State Conference to the DAR Magazine of the National Society.

ARTICLE VIII Meetings

Section 1. Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in March. The date and location of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the host District. The meeting shall be for the purpose of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the Chapter Regents, the District Directors, and the State Chairmen of all committees; the election of officers; and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. Voting Members.

The voting members of the State Conference or any special meeting of the Kansas Society shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose memberships are within the state, the Honorary State Regents, each Chapter Regent or, in her absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the State Conference. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at the annual State Conference, shall be limited to one vote.

Section 3. Qualifications.

Each chapter entitled to representation at the Continental Congress, in accordance with the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the National Society, shall be entitled to representation at the State Conference, provided that its members' state dues are credited to the State Treasurer by December 1 and its State Credentials Forms have been completed in accordance with these bylaws.

Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters by February 1 each year and reported by February 8 on State Credentials Forms (See Article XIII, Section 4(b), of these bylaws). A

delegate or an alternate shall have been a member of her chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which she is elected and shall be in good standing with the National and Kansas Societies at the time of her election, as verified by the State Treasurer.

The Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter may be a delegate.

Section 4. Chapter Delegates and Alternates.

- (a) The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any meeting of the Kansas Society during the year, beginning January 1, shall be based upon the number of members whose national and state dues for the current year have been paid by the December 1 preceding the State Conference, provided that the chapter meets the qualifications for representation in accordance with Section 3 of this Article. A member whose national and state dues are delinquent shall not be counted in determining representation at the meetings of the Kansas Society, shall not be entitled to vote for delegates or alternates to meetings of the Kansas Society, and shall not be entitled to act as representative or alternate at such meetings.
- (b) The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any other meeting of the Kansas Society shall be as follows:

12 through 49 members	Regent and two delegates	3 votes
50 through 199 members	Regent and five delegates	6 votes
200 through 299 members	Regent and eight delegates	9 votes

(c) The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of voters to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 5. Privileges.

- (a) Any member of the National Society who is a member in good standing of a chapter in the Kansas Society or a member-at-large residing in Kansas may attend the State Conference.
- (b) State Committee Chairmen and District Directors who are not elected delegates shall have the privilege to speak without vote.

Section 6. State Conference Registration.

Kansas members who attend any session or meal of the State Conference shall pay a registration fee, determined by the State Regent, not to exceed \$5.00. This fee shall be paid to the State Conference Treasurer toward the expenses of the State Conference. Any balance remaining after the approved bills have been paid shall be sent to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund. Payment of all bills of the State Conference shall be approved by voucher, signed by the State Regent and the State Conference Chairman.

Section 7. State Conference Chairman.

A State Conference Chairman shall be appointed annually by the State Regent.

It shall be the duty of the State Conference Chairman to be responsible for planning and coordinating the arrangements of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and in cooperation with the host District. After conferring with the State Conference Chairman, the State Regent shall appoint the State Conference Treasurer; the State Conference Committees, including Public Relations, Registration, and other such committees as deemed necessary; and the members to assist the Credentials Committee Chairman. The State Conference Chairman shall assign the various functions at the State Conference to the chapters in the host District and shall serve as an advisor for their plans.

Along with the State Regent, she shall sign on vouchers for payments of State Conference expenses.

The State Conference Treasurer shall receive the registration fees and the payments for meal reservations. She shall pay the bills of the State Conference which have been approved by vouchers bearing the signatures of the State Regent and the State Conference Chairman. After all approved bills have been paid, she shall send any balance remaining in the State Conference account to the State Treasurer.

Section 8. Special Meetings.

Special meetings of the Kansas Society may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. The purpose of the meeting shall be stated in the call. Except in cases of emergency, at least fifteen days' notice shall be given, and only the business specified in the call shall be transacted. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be the delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 9. Quorum.

Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at the State Conference or any special meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE IX State Board of Management

Section 1. Members.

The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the state, and each Chapter Regent in the state or, in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent.

State Chairman of Committees, District Directors, and Honorary State Regents may attend the meeting of the State Board of Management with voice but no vote.

Section 2. Officers.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Meetings.

Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in

the fall preceding the Annual District Meetings and the second meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. Except in cases of emergency, at least thirty days' notice of the time and location of the meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority.

The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, except that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Duties.

The State Board of Management shall report annually to the State Conference, shall ratify any decisions made by the Executive Committee, and may make recommendations to the State Conference.

It shall approve any appointment made by the Executive Committee to fill a vacancy in a state office, except that of State Regent.

It shall elect the chairman of the State Nominating Committee at the Fall State Board of Management meeting in the second year of an administration.

It shall approve the budget submitted by the Finance Committee, shall ratify any transfer of funds by the State Treasurer, and shall consider any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society.

Section 6. Special Meetings.

Special meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior.

Section 7. Quorum.

Eleven members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Executive Committee

Section 1. Members.

The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings.

The Executive Committee shall hold meetings prior to the regularly scheduled meetings of the State Board of Management, at the call of the State Regent, or upon the written request of three of its members. Except in cases of emergency, at least ten days' notice shall be given.

Section 3. Authority.

The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society between the meetings of the State Board of Management.

The Executive Committee shall be subject to the orders of the State Conference, and none of its acts shall conflict with action taken by the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Duties.

The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact business between meetings of the State Board of Management and to report all actions and recommendations to the next meeting of the State Board.

It shall approve the standing and special committees appointed by the State Regent.

It shall declare a vacancy in any state office or committee for failure to perform stated duties; shall rule on any exception to an automatic resignation of a State Officer; shall fill any vacancy in a state office, except that of State Regent, subject to the approval of the State Board of Management; and shall fill any vacancy which may occur on the State Nominating Committee.

It shall approve any transfer of funds made by the State Treasurer.

It shall consider any special matters or recommendations concerning the Kansas DAR Library referred to it by the State Library Committee.

It shall receive and act upon requests for reimbursements of additional expenses submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, by the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen.

Section 5. Emergency Business.

When necessary, the Executive Committee may conduct business by mail or telephone.

Section 6. Quorum.

Seven members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XI Committees

Section 1. Standing Committees.

The standing committees of the Kansas Society shall be: Bylaws, Credentials, Finance, Kansas DAR Scholarship, Resolutions, and State Library.

Section 2. Bylaws Committee.

The Bylaws Committee shall be composed of a chairman and four members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Bylaws Committee to consider all properly submitted proposals for amendments and to present amendments and recommendations concerning the Bylaws to the State Conference for action.

Amendments and recommendations from the chapters, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, or the previous State Conference shall be presented to the committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. (See Article XV. Section 1.)

The committee shall have the right to edit proposed amendments and the right to originate amendments.

Previous notice of all proposed amendments from the Bylaws Committee shall be sent to all chapters thirty days prior to the State Conference.

Section 3. Credentials Committee.

The Credentials Committee Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent. She shall be assisted by members of the host District for State Conference and shall be advised by the State Treasurer and the State Registrar.

It shall be the duty of the chairman to supply the State Credentials Forms to the State Corresponding Secretary for the January 15 mailing, to advise chapters of the number of delegates and alternates to which they are entitled, and to receive their State Credentials Forms each year by February 8. She shall examine the returned forms and shall verify with the State Treasurer and State Registrar the eligibilities of the delegates and alternates listed. She shall have charge of the registration and its committee at the State Conference and shall submit credentials reports to the assembly.

It shall be the duty of the Credentials Committee to have the responsibility for the proper identification and registration of the delegates and the alternates attending the State Conference.

Section 4. Finance Committee.

The Finance Committee shall be composed of the State Treasurer, who shall serve as chairman; the State Recording Secretary; and three members appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The recommended budget shall be submitted to the State Conference for action.

The Finance Committee shall report any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society to the State Board of Management.

Section 5. Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee.

The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee shall be composed of a chairman and two members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee to select the recipients of the Kansas DAR Scholarship and the Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship from the eligible applicants. Funds for the Kansas DAR Scholarship are provided from interest on designated investments.

It shall also be the duty of this committee to select the Kansas Society's candidate for the NSDAR American History Scholarship.

Section 6. Resolutions Committee.

The Resolutions Committee shall be composed of a chairman and two members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Resolutions Committee to consider all submitted resolutions, evaluating their suitability according to the guidelines of the National Society, and to present resolutions to the State Conference for action.

Resolutions may be submitted by chapters or individual members. Except for a courtesy resolution, all resolutions shall have been previously submitted to the committee in order to be considered for a State Conference. To be considered for a State Conference, a resolution shall be submitted to the committee by the February 15 immediately preceding.

The committee shall have the right to edit submitted resolutions and to originate resolutions. The courtesy resolution shall be prepared and presented by the Resolutions Committee Chairman.

Section 7. State Library Committee.

The State Library Committee shall be composed of the State Librarian, who shall serve as chairman, and four members appointed by the State Regent. The committee may meet quarterly and shall meet upon the request of the State Regent.

The State Library Committee shall have the authority to select and purchase genealogical materials for the Kansas DAR Library which will benefit the members of the chapters in the Kansas Society; all such purchases shall be subject to the approval of the State Regent and shall be made from donated funds designated for that purpose.

It shall be the duty of the State Library Committee to bring any special matters concerning the Kansas DAR Library to the attention of the Executive Committee and to request approval of purchases of non-routine equipment and supplies which exceed the balance designated for that purpose in the Library Petty Cash Fund.

It shall promote greater use by loan of the books in the Kansas DAR Library and shall encourage donations of genealogical books, periodicals and other materials from chapters, members of chapters, and other interested individuals.

It shall serve as an advisor to the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee. The Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee shall be composed of members of the Dodge City Chapter, who shall be appointed by the Chapter Regent. It shall be the duty of this committee to assist the State Librarian in maintaining the materials and equipment of the State Library and in providing library services to members, according to the guidelines set by the Executive Committee.

Section 8. Other Committees.

Such other committees, standing or special, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society may authorize or as the National Society may require. The State Regent shall be ex officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 9. Committee Appointments.

Appointments of committee chairmen and members shall be concurrent with the term of the appointing State Regent.

Section 10. Expenses.

The expenses of the State Committee Chairmen, as approved in the budget, shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the State Regent, who shall present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment. Additional expenses shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the Executive Committee.

Section 11. Reports.

Each State Committee Chairman shall type an annual report of less than two hundred words: before March 1, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and two copies to the State Recording Secretary. These annual reports shall be presented at the State Conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Each State Committee Chairman shall prepare and send by the designated deadline a report to the Vice Chairman of the South Central Division of her committee. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent.

Section 12. Transfer of Records and Property.

At the completion of her term, each State Committee Chairman shall deliver to the State Regent-elect or, if so instructed, to the newly appointed State Chairman of her committee, a written procedure of the requirements of her chairmanship, a list of the KSDAR property in her custody, and all records and property of the Kansas Society, and she shall obtain a receipt for these items. She shall provide a duplicate of the list of the KSDAR property in her custody for the State Regent-elect.

ARTICLE XII Districts

Section 1. Names.

The Kansas Society shall be divided into four Districts: the Northeast District, the Northwest District, the Southeast District, and the Southwest District. The chapters in each District are designated in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Jurisdiction.

The four Districts are under the jurisdiction of the Kansas Society. Each District shall have the privilege to allow for any traditional procedures and courtesies, provided that they shall not conflict with the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the National and Kansas Societies.

Section 3. Meetings.

- (a) The meetings of the Districts shall be held for the general purpose of expanding the programs of the National and Kansas Societies, to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members, and to acquaint them with the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen.
- (b) The Annual District Meetings shall be held in the fall, following the State Board of Management meeting, for the purpose of receiving the reports

of its officers and conducting the business of the District. In the second year of an administration, each District shall elect a member to represent the District on the State Nominating Committee and a District Nominating Committee. District officers shall be elected at the Annual District Meeting. The call for the meetings shall be published in the "Kansas DAR News."

(c) Annual District Meetings shall be held in the fall, the times and locations to be arranged by the District Directors and the State Vice Regent, with the approval of the State Regent.

Section 4. Officers.

The officers shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, and a Secretary-Treasurer. Officers shall be elected for a term of three years at the Annual District Meeting preceding the election of the State Officers and shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the Chapter Regents' banquet at the State Conference. No member shall be eligible to succeed herself in the same District office. A member may serve consecutive terms in the three offices of her District; such consecutive service shall be limited to three terms.

Section 5. State Conference.

The Districts shall host the State Conference by rotation in the following order: the Northwest District, the Northeast District, the Southeast District, and the Southwest District. If necessary, the rotation order may be altered. The chapters in the host District shall be assigned responsibilities for the State Conference by the State Conference Chairman.

ARTICLE XIII Chapters

Section 1. Officers.

The chapters shall elect their officers by February 1 of the year in which they elect officers. Newly elected chapter officers shall assume the duties of their offices after the close of the Continental Congress and by the June meeting.

Section 2. Chapter Officers Report Forms.

Each year before March 1, the Chapter Regent shall report the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year. This report shall be made on forms from the office of the Organizing Secretary General which are furnished to the chapters by the State Corresponding Secretary and shall include the names and addresses of all chapter officers, whether newly elected or completing the term of election; the date of election; the date on which office is assumed; and the length of term. The report form shall be signed by the designated officers, and one original and two photocopies shall be returned to the State Corresponding Secretary by the March 1 deadline.

Section 3. Provision for Fees and Dues in Chapter Bylaws.

A chapter may provide in its bylaws for fees and dues for chapter use in addition to national and state dues, but may not levy assessments in excess of the requirements of its bylaws. The bylaws of a chapter shall prescribe a date for

collection of chapter dues sufficiently in advance to meet the requirements for payment to the National and Kansas Societies before December 1.

Section 4. Representation and Return of Credentials Forms.

(a) Delegates and alternates to the Continental Congress shall be elected by February 1 of each year. (For number and qualifications of delegates and alternates to Continental Congress, see National Bylaws Article XIII, Sections 9 and 10.) Using blanks furnished by the National Society, the name of the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent and a list of the delegates and alternates, with the date of their election by the chapter, shall be sent, bearing a postmark no later than February 15, to the chairman of Credentials Committee and to the State Regent.

Only a chapter member in good standing, whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society, shall be eligible to represent her chapter at meetings of the National Society. (National Bylaws, Article VIII, Section 2(e).)

(b) Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by February 1 of each year. (For number and qualifications of delegates and alternates to State Conference, see Article VIII, Sections 3 and 4, of these bylaws.) The name of the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent and a list of the delegates and alternates and the date of their election shall be typewritten on the State Credentials Form, which is furnished to the chapter by the Kansas Society in a January mailing from the State Corresponding Secretary, and shall be photocopied and sent to the State Registrar, the State Treasurer, and the State Credentials Committee Chairman by February 8.

Only a chapter member in good standing with the National and Kansas Societies, whose state credentials have been completed in accordance to these bylaws, shall be eligible to represent her chapter at meetings of the Kansas Society.

Kansas members who attend any session or meal of the State Conference shall pay a registration fee, determined by the State Regent, not to exceed \$5.00.

Section 5. Chapter Regent.

Annually before August 1, each Chapter Regent shall send to the State Vice Regent a listing of names, addresses, and telephone numbers of her chapter's chairmen of national and state committees.

The Chapter Regent is responsible for completing and returning by the stated deadlines the copies of the chapter credentials forms after the election on or before February 1 of the chapter representatives to the Continental Congress and the State Conference.

Each Chapter Regent shall type an annual report of less than two hundred words: before March 1, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and two copies to the State Recording Secretary These annual reports shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 6. Chapter Chaplain.

The Chapter Chaptain shall report deaths immediately to the State Chaptain. Information about the deceased member shall include her name and national number, date of death, name and address of next of kin, and any offices held in the chapter or in the State and National Societies. A newspaper obituary shall be sent with the report of a member's death.

Section 7. Chapter Treasurer.

(a) Each year before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer shall remit the annual national dues of \$25.00 for every active member in the chapter to the Office of the Treasurer General. The computer printout of the chapter membership, received by the Chapter Treasurer from the Office of the Treasurer General by September 15, shall accompany the chapter's payment of annual national dues.

Payments to the Treasurer General, other than those remitted with the computer printout, shall be accompanied by remittance blanks, which may be ordered free of charge from the Office of the Treasurer General. Payments for which remittance blanks are required include additional annual national dues and the fees for applications, reinstatements, and supplementals.

All checks remitted to the National Society shall be made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR.

(b) Each year before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer shall remit the annual state dues of \$3.50 for every active member in the chapter to the State Treasurer. A computer printout of the chapter membership, received by the Chapter Treasurer from the State Treasurer in September, shall accompany the chapter's payment of annual state dues. Only a member whose state dues have been paid by December 1 shall be eligible to serve as a delegate or an alternate at the State Conference.

Each year before December 31, the Chapter Treasurer shall also send to the State Treasurer all chapter contributions for the National Society and the Kansas Society, including the required payments designated in the KSDAR Standing Rules, accompanied by the State Treasurer's Remittance Form. Only payments received by the State Treasurer by December 31 will be processed for that year's reporting period; payments received after December 31 will be applied to the succeeding calendar year's reporting period.

All checks remitted to the Kansas Society shall be made payable to the Kansas Society DAR.

(c) The Chapter Treasurer shall report all changes in membership as they occur to her Chapter Registrar.

Section 8. Chapter Registrar.

The Chapter Registrar shall report to the Organizing Secretary General, in writing, all changes in membership, marriages, divorces, deaths, resignations, transfers, and changes of address as they occur (Bylaws of the National Society, Article XIII, Section 11). These reports of membership changes shall be made on Membership Change Forms and directed to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General, Membership Office. Membership Change Forms may be obtained from the Membership Office.

The Chapter Registrar shall report all changes in membership, in writing, to the State Registrar. She shall report all information necessary for the State Registrar to keep her records exact. Changes in membership by

admission, transfer, resignation, removal for nonpayment of dues, reinstatement, death, marriage or divorce, and changes of name or address shall be reported on State Registrar's Report Forms. Information about newly admitted members shall include: full name, including maiden name and, if married, husband's full name; full date of admittance; national number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor, with name of the child through whom the lineage is traced; colony or state, and branch of service in which the ancestor served. Information about members transferring into the Kansas Society from out of state shall include, in addition to the information required for newly admitted members, the name and location of former chapters and dates of transfers.

She shall complete the chapter's Annual Membership Report Form, supplied by the State Registrar, and return it to the State Registrar by February 15. Information listed on the annual membership report shall list members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, reinstated, transferred, married, divorced, or who have died during the preceding year. Newly admitted Junior Members, with dates of birth, shall also be listed on the annual report.

ARTICLE XIV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in the current edition of Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XV Amendments

- Section 1. These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the State Conference, and that the amendment has been proposed by the State Bylaws Committee, the State Board of Management, the previous State Conference, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society. An amendment proposed by a chapter shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.
- Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is adopted.
- Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the Kansas Society or the chapters in the state shall become the law of the Kansas Society and chapters without further notice.

STANDING RULES

Revised by the Ninety-second KSDAR Conference March 17, 1990 Amended 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995 and 1996

Number 1. The report of the Kansas Society shall be known as the Annual Report and Proceedings of the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The report shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; State Officers, 1 to 3 each: Chapters, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National and State Committees, 1 each; Senior State President C.A.R., 1: District Directors, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 1; the Kansas Society DAR Archives in the Kansas DAR Library in Dodge City, Kansas, 2; the President General, NSDAR, 1; the Organizing Secretary General, 1; the National Parliamentarian, 1; and the Kansas State Historical Society, 1. In an election year, one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and the chairmen of committees. Chapter Regents may receive a free copy by special request made before June 1. Except for State Officers, no one individual shall receive more than one free copy. Other members desiring copies may place by June 1 with the State Recording Secretary a prepaid order at four dollars per copy.

- **Number 2.** At least two issues of the "Kansas DAR News" shall be printed each year and mailed to each member. The printing and mailing expenses shall be borne by the State Society.
- **Number 3.** A sum of \$2,000 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.
- **Number 4.** Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed each State Officer to partially defray her State Conference expenses.
- **Number 5.** Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent at Continental Congress; and twenty-five dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent-elect; arrangements shall be made by the State Treasurer.
- **Number 6.** Fifty dollars shall be allotted to the State Regent for Kansas Pages at Continental Congress.
- Number 7. Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the General Fund ten cents per chapter member for State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the General Fund of the Kansas Society.
- **Number 8.** Each year, each chapter in Kansas may pay one dollar for veteran-patients in order to meet the NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award; to be sent to the State Treasurer, who shall make equal payment to the three Veterans Medical Centers.

- **Number 9.** Each year, on or before September 15, each chapter shall provide copies of its chapter yearbook to the State Officers, the Director of its District, the State Chairman of the Membership Committee, and the State Chairman of the Program Committee.
- Number 10. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, and Historian shall have the custody of the KSDAR Society DAR Archives, which is located in the Kansas DAR Library in Dodge City, Kansas, and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent, and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.
- Number 11. The State Regent may send a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.
- Number 12. The State Regent shall have the State Regent's Pin appraised by the J. E. Caldwell Company once during her administration, and if the pin is lost, the State Society shall assume the cost of replacing it.
- **Number 13.** The Kansas DAR Library shall be located in the lower level of the Village Square Mall, 2601 Central Avenue, in Dodge City, Kansas.
- (a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Village Square Mall.
- (b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee that shall be known as the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee to assume care of the library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of books, materials and equipment; shall assist the State Librarian when possible in the repair and maintenance of these items; and shall receive and answer all requests for the loan of books and other materials.
- (c) Annually by January 1, \$300 shall be paid for Kansas DAR Library location expenses.
- (d) Materials submitted to the Kansas DAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. To avoid duplication, donors shall check with the State Librarian before books are sent.
- **Number 14.** An Endowment Fund for the support of the Kansas DAR Library has been established in order to ensure its future.
- (a) Monies contributed to the Endowment Fund shall be under the jurisdiction of the State Treasurer.
- (b) The annual interest accrued from the fund shall pay for the following annual library expenses: rent, insurance, operating expenses, and purchase and maintenance of equipment.
- **Number 15.** A Library Endowment Fund II shall be established for the purpose of expenses connected with the Kansas DAR Library facilities and hired staff; the earned interest of the Library Endowment Fund II Certificate of Deposit shall be added to the principal and shall remain in the Certificate of Deposit until needed.

Number 16. The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship shall be given the third year of each KSDAR administration to a high school senior who is entering a two- or four-year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of national defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity, and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Committee Chairman, the State National Defense Committee Chairman, and the State Regent.

Number 17. A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school senior who has DAR eligibility or to a member of DAR; proof of enrollment in a two- or four-year college or university shall be required.

Number 18. The Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship shall provide a college scholarship for a girl graduating from high school. The recipient of this scholarship shall have acceptable scholastic ability, show financial need, be a citizen of the United States of America, and be eligible for membership in the DAR. This award will be given the second year of each KSDAR administration.

If the two rooms at the Shawnee Mission in Fairway, Kansas, formerly supported by the KSDAR are again maintained and refurbished by the Kansas Daughters, the interest from this fund shall be used for these purposes and take precedence over the scholarship fund.

Number 19. The Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarship, in memory of her parents, Albert Jesse Jones and Mabel Clare Early Jones, shall be awarded to a deserving boy or girl, preferably one who is at least 1/4 Pottawatomie Indian. If a deserving individual of Pottawatomie heritage is not available, another Indian heritage may be substituted. The interest from the \$3,000 gift shall be awarded the first year of a KSDAR administration for attendance at an accredited college or university. Members of the scholarship committee who will supervise the awarding of the scholarship shall consist of the KSDAR Scholarship Committee Chairman, the KSDAR American Indians Committee Chairman and a member of the Eunice Sterling Chapter.

Number 20. In the event that no applications are received for the scholarships offered during any year of the term, applications will be accepted for those scholarships the following year in addition to those regularly scheduled to be awarded.


Number 21. At the Conference Opening, the State Regent shall appoint a committee to approve the minutes of the closing meeting of the State Conference.

Number 22. The hospitality of the following persons, if attending the State Conference at the official invitation of the State Regent, shall be a Conference expense: Candidates for President General, NSDAR; National Officers or National Appointees appearing as speakers; two members of the National Board of Management; representatives of the DAR Schools, Approved Schools, and Indian Schools; or any designated speaker for a special program or event.

- Number 23. (a) A \$10 limit shall be placed on awards at State Conference.
- (b) Interest accrued annually from the Mary Lempenau Permanent Trust of \$750 shall pay monetary awards at State Conference.
- **Number 24.** The Kansas State Outstanding Junior shall be awarded \$150 if she attends Continental Congress, to be paid from the General Fund.
- Number 25. A national winner of the Good Citizens Contest, American History Essay Contest, Outstanding Junior Contest and V.A. Volunteer shall be awarded \$250 toward transportation expenses to attend Continental Congress. The money awarded shall be paid from the Award Transportation Fund.
- Number 26. The Kansas Society shall present to the State Regent an Ex-State Regent's Pin or, if she has been elected Honorary State Regent, an Honorary State Regent's Pin at the end of her term of office, providing that she has served two-thirds of her elected term.
- Number 27. An Honorary State Regent who becomes a candidate for national office shall be extended the courtesy of one full-page, black-and-white advertisement in the *DAR Magazine*; donations from Districts, chapters, and individuals may be solicited, but the Kansas Society shall be responsible for any remaining balance of the expense of the advertisement. The candidate shall be responsible for, and bear the expense of, the preparation of the advertisement for publication.
- Number 28. The schedule for the Fall Tour shall be made before March 1 by the State Regent and State Vice Regent in consultation with the four District Directors and representatives of the hostess chapters. All plans for the tour shall be finalized by June 1.
- Number 29. A pilgrimage to a historically significant Kansas site may be held annually on Constitution Day, September 17. Local chapters may act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed fifty dollars shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the pilgrimage.
- Number 30. A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book. The Press Book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.
- **Number 31.** An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings and other pertinent historical information shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings every ten years, beginning in 1980.
- **Number 32.** A Directory of members may be printed every ten years beginning in 1990. Interim supplements to the Directory may be issued.

Number 34. These Standing Rules may be amended at any State Conference by a two-thirds vote and may be suspended for that meeting by a majority vote.
