

# CONFERENCE RULES

- 7. All resolutions shall have been in the hands of the Resolutions Committee before the State Conference. The date shall have been determined and announced by the Resolutions Committee Chairman.
- 8. No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes any time, except by the consent of the assembly.
- 9. Members who appear on the program or who are making reports shall occupy the front seats. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business meetings.
- 10. Only the chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 11. Two timekeepers shall be appointed by the chair. Reports of State Officers and Committee Chairmen shall be limited to four minutes, and reports of District Directors and Chapter Regents to two minutes. The speakers shall conform with the ruling of the timekeepers.
- 12. Announcements must have the approval of the State Regent.
- 13. A copy of every report for the printed Proceedings of the State Conference shall be typed, ready for printing, and sent to the State Recording Secretary before the report is read at the Conference.
- 14. If the Officer, Chapter Regent or Chapter Vice Regent, Chairman or Appointee is not present, her report shall not be read and shall be filed for printing in the official Proceedings of the State Conference unless otherwise ordered.
- 15. Any Chairman or individual having a table display or exhibit shall attend to the removal of all material at the close of the Conference.
- 16. All necessary communications shall be delivered by the Pages.
- 17. Members shall refrain from smoking in the session room.
- 18. Registration shall close at 12:00 noon, Saturday, March 15, 1997.
- The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised" will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

The Colors were advanced by the ROTC Color Guard of Salina High School. The pages escorted the State Officers and honored guests in the processional.

The State Regent, Mrs. Vincent Traffas, called the meeting to order. The invocation was given by Mrs. Albert R. Hagemann, State Chaplain. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mrs. John D. Afton, State Recording Secretary. The American's Creed was led by Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., Honorary State Regent; and the first stanza of the National Anthem was led by Mrs Larry Overmiller, State Chairman, American Heritage Committee. The Colors were posted and the Color Guard retired. Mrs. Traffas expressed her appreciation to the ROTC Color Guard.

The pages retired.

The East of Salina Madrigal Singers entertained the guests with musical selections during the banquet. Mrs. Traffas thanked the Madrigal Singers for the lovely music.

The assembly was asked to stand as Mrs. Traffas read a letter from President General, NSDAR, Mrs. Charles Keil Kemper. Mrs. Traffas stated that a letter of appreciation would be sent to the President General.

Wichita-Wichita VA Medical Center: Mrs. Charles E. Hackney, Representative; Mrs. Donald J. Horn, Mrs. L. William Reel, and Mrs. Bill Jackson, Deputies.

A special guest to the conference, Mrs. Michael Dalton, State Regent of New Hampshire and candidate for the office of Vice President General at the 108th Continental Congress in 1999, was introduced. Mrs. Traffas and Mrs. Dalton became acquainted while serving as Officers of the State Vice Regent's Club. Mrs. Dalton brought greetings from the 1,040 members of the granite state. She called attention to the honey bee on Mrs. Traffas' sunflower which was a New Hampshire honey bee.

Another special guest, Dale A. Boggs, National Chairman, DAR Service for Veteran-Patients Committee, was introduced. Besides working for the American Red Cross, she is employed at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, MD. Dale is a Maryland Daughter and most instrumental in the NSDAR involvement and participation with the WIMSA Memorial last October in Washington, DC. Ms. Boggs presented a charcoal drawing made by a French soldier in the trenches at Tilleloy, France in 1916. During the administration of Sarah Mitchell Guernsey, President General 1917-1920 from Kansas, the National Society gave \$50,000.00 for restoring the water works in Tilleloy, a small French village. Daughters of the American Revolution, including Ms. Boggs, traveled to France this past year and visited the village. The charcoal drawing was presented to Ms. Boggs during the visit. Because Mrs. Guernsey, Ms. Boggs and Mrs. Traffas share a common Henkel ancestor and because Mrs. Guernsey was a former President General from Kansas, the drawing was presented to Mrs. Taffas, State Regent of Kansas.

Mrs. John Ivancevich, special guest, National Chairman, Junior Membership Committee, NSDAR was introduced. She has been a DAR member for twenty eight years, joining as a Junior. During her term, Junior Membership has been celebrating sixty years of service. Mrs. Ivancevich presented a beanie baby kangaroo named Pouch to Mrs. Traffas. She asked for the newest Kansas member who had joined as a Junior to be identified. Mrs. Veronica Krom, Nathan Edson Chapter, was the most recent person to join as a Junior and Mrs. Jane Williams, Fort Larned Chapter, was the earliest member to join as a Junior.

The Credentials Chairman, Mrs. Doran Cole, gave the first report of the Committee at 7:45 p.m. on Thursday, March 12, 1998. There were ten State Officers, one National Officer from Kansas, five Honorary State Regents, thirty Chapter Regents, one Chapter Vice Regent, eighty-two Delegates, one hundred twenty-two entitled to vote, seventeen Alternates, one hundred eighty-eight registered. Mrs. Cole moved the adoption of the report of the Credentials Committee. The motion was adopted. The chair deleared a quorum present.

Mrs. Traffas asked if there were any objections to dispensing with the reading of the conference rules on page three in the Conference Program. Hearing none, the conference rules were not read. Mrs. Billy P. Compton, Parliamentarian Pro Tem, moved the adoption of the State Conference Rules as printed. By a rising vote with two thirds majority in the affirmative, the State Conference Rules were adopted.

The Conference Chairman, Mrs. Kevin Smith, presented the Conference Program of the One Hundredth State Conference. Changes noted were: Top of page 4, Corresponding Secretary to President: bottom of page 4, Mrs. Wayne N. Cope to Mrs. Wayne M. Cope; page 11, Delete 'Presentation of Outstanding Teacher of American History', it had been moved to Friday night; page 11, Mrs. Harry N. Carpenter to Mrs. Harry J. Carpenter; page 12, Mrs. Wayne N. Cope to Mrs. Wayne M. Cope; page 13, Mrs. H. Ray Whitney as Regent of John Haupt Chapter; page 14, Mrs. Paul Buchanan as Regent of Randolph Loving Chaprer; and page 19, 'Presentation of Scholarship Winner' moved to Saturday morning to be presented by Mrs. Oliver I. West. Mrs. Smith moved for the adoption of the Conference Program as corrected. Motion carried.

With consensus, Mrs. Gus M. Ramirez and Mrs. Harry J. Carpenter were appointed as timekeepers for the State Conference. Mrs. Robert Neubert, Mrs. Bobby Campbell and Mrs. G. D. Spafford were appointed to approve the minutes of the 100th State Conference.

The minutes of the Ninety-ninth State Conference were approved as written by a committee of Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., Mrs. Wayne M. Cope and Mrs. Gary Eichman.

Mrs. John Ivancevich, National Chairman, Junior Membership; Mrs. Tod Hettenbach, Chairman of Contest for the Outstanding Junior Contest; and Mrs. Gordon Etalemaki, member of the Junior Membership Committee approached the podium to present the 1998 Kansas Outstanding Junior, Mrs.

Patrick Wempe, Topeka Chapter. The Junior Pin and Sash were pinned on Mrs. Wempe and Mrs. Billy P. Compton, representing the Flores del Sol Chapter, presented the Pat Decker Award—a silver tray with glass liner.

Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., Chairman of a committee appointed in September 1997 to study the authorship of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the Unites States of America, made the following report.

#### Authorship of the Pledge of Allegiance

Report of the committee authorized by the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, at the State Board of Management meeting on September 6, 1997 to evaluate the claim that Frank Bellamy of Cherryvale, Kansas, was the author of the Pledge of Allegiance and to determine if the report of the Kansas DAR committee appointed in 1919 and the conclusions of DAR review in 1936 are still valid.

The material reviewed by the committee included two books by Margarette Miller, I Pledge Allegiance and Twenty-Three Words; the United States Flag Association Report of 1939; The Library of Congress Report of 1957; correspondence from the Kansas DAR files relating to the investigations of this matter in 1919 and 1936; Frank Bellamy's pension records; numerous newspaper and magazine articles, including selected issues and pages of The Youth's Companions of 1891 and 1892 and 1917; the Journals of the National Woman's Relief Corps Conventions, 1897 and 1898; the Journals of the Kansas W.R.C. Conventions, 1894-1901; correspondence, affidavits and miscellaneous material. The Committee also corresponded with the Past National President of the Woman's Relief Corps who reviewed the W.R.C. Journals of 1892, 1894, 1897 and 1898-1909; the University of Rochester (NY) Library which is the repository for the Francis Bellamy papers; the G.A.R. Museum in Springfield (IL); the McKinley Memorial Library in Niles, Ohio.

No record was found that Frank Bellamy ever said that he wrote the Pledge. The only correspondence from him in the material reviewed consisted of letters and affidavits in his pension file and a few letters written while he was serving in the Philippines in 1898 and 1899. Mrs. Hendricks said she told Frank that he had written the Pledge of Allegiance after he was mustered out in Topeka. Whether from modesty or because he had reason to be uncomfortable with the honor, he asked her not to say anything about it. She honored his request for almost ten years. Mrs. Hendricks died on June 25, 1914 and Frank died on March 31, 1915.

It became apparent that newspaper accounts of Frank Bellamy's authorship all seemed to be based on three documents: (1) a paper read by Mrs. Homer Hendricks at a Lincoln's Birthday observance in Cherryvale, Kansas, in February, 1909<sup>1</sup>; (2) a letter to Mrs. T. A. Cordry, Kansas DAR Historian, from Lura Bellamy, Frank Bellamy's sister, dated 1919<sup>2</sup>; (3) a story

published in the Kansas City Star, in 1917, for which some information was furnished by Edgar E. Bellamy, Frank's brother<sup>3</sup>. As far as the committee knows, Mrs. Hendricks paper was the only account written while Frank was still living.

In addition to the three items mentioned, there were a few letters and affidavits from persons who knew Frank Bellamy in the 18890s, most of these collected by a Kansas DAR Committee in 1919. Items and accounts which were based on family tradition were considered as subject to proof, and hearsay evidence or speculation were regarded as being of low credibility.

Mrs. Hendricks statements in the 1909 paper are not precise. She described the situation under which the students wrote, in her words, "a patriotic quotation" in a class conducted by Mr. Homer S. Myers, the superintendent. In 1919, Mr. Myers refused to give an affidavit, saying that the flag pledge "appeared during the year 1895-96 when I was Supt. Of the Cherryvale Schools and Mrs. Powell, Principal of the High School. At that time, my attention was not called to the origin. A year or two later, I was told that Frank Bellamy wrote it. If anyone can give evidence that it existed earlier than this, I suppose the claim would hold."

Irene Beckley Powell, Principal of the Cherryvale High School in 1895-96, signed an affidavit on April 7, 1919, saying, "During the school year of 1895-96, I was principal of the High School of Cherry Vale, Kansas Mrs. Lillian Hendricks, State President of the Woman's Relief Corps<sup>5</sup>, asked me to have the members of my senior english class write short themes on the American Flag. This they did without previous preparation or warning during the class period. Neither did they use reference books or helps of any kind. "Frank Bellamy closed his theme with the words that have since been made the Pledge of Allegiance. Because the sentence was unusual, I asked him where he got it and he answered, 'out of my head.'... "A year or so later when a call was made for a Pledge of Allegiance, Mrs. Hendricks sent Frank Bellamy's words and they were accepted...."

According to the 1917 Kansas City Star article, Mrs. Hendricks "induced the principal of the high school to set aside a recitation hour during which the sixteen members of the class of 1896 wrote their ideas about their debt to their country and their duty to its government." It was mentioned that Frank "knew nothing of the adoption of his pledge of allegiance by the patriotic societies of America until Mrs. Hendricks told him when he arrived in his home town. 'We are proud of you, Frank,' she said, 'and the national W.R.C. has passed a resolution thanking you for writing it." The article continues by saying that the boy flushed and said, "It didn't express half of what I tried to write."

Mrs. Hendricks did not become state president of the Kansas W.R.C. until 1911.

Parts of Lura Bellamy's notarized letter contained almost the exact wording of *The Kansas City Star* article above. She gave details about Mrs. Hendricks meeting with Frank: "My brother knew nothing of his pledge having been accepted until he returned home from the Philippines, and Mrs. Hendricks told him of it when I was present and heard her say, 'We are proud of you, Frank, and the National W.R.C. has passed a resolution thanking you for writing it.' My brother, much embarrassed, flushed, as he was always very diffident when it came to receiving praise about any of his work or accomplishments, and said that it did not express half of what he had tried to write and what he felt." Later in the letter, she wrote, "when Mrs. Hendricks spoke to him of it, he at first had to stop and think to refresh his memory as to how it happened, etc., but he said it all came back to him and he remembered the circumstances of writing it when in High School."

There is a letter in Frank Bellamy's pension file written by Mrs. Hendricks in which she wrote, "He know nothing of the honor he had received until he was mustered out at Topeka. That was my pleasure to tell him."

The above accounts are in agreement that Frank wrote his essay while in high school, and three accounts say while he was in the senior class in 1895-96. Lura Bellamy and *The Kansas City Star* article both say it was written in the class taught by the principal of the high school, and this is confirmed by Mrs. Powell's affidavit. The accounts of both Mrs. Hendricks and Lura Bellamy say that Frank had forgotten about writing the essay and recalled the incident after thinking about it.

Mrs. Hendricks statement that the National W.R.C. had passed a resolution thanking Frank for writing the Pledge raises questions. In her letter to the Hon. Phil P. Campbell speaking of Frank's essay, she said, "The request was sent out in 1893. The pledge was adopted in 1898."

A Resolution adopted at the 11th National Convention of the Woman's Relief Corps, in 1893, called for the Department and Corps presidents in the states "to petition the county and city superintendents and teachers to recommend the adoption of some form of patriotic salute to the American Flag to be introduced into the morning exercises of the public schools." Affine 12th National Convention in 1894, the Committee on Patriotic Teaching presented a report recommending the Balch Salute, written by Colonel George T. Balch in 1887, which read: "We give our heads and our hearts to God and our country: one country, one language, one Flag." Two members of the committee, Lue Stuart Wadsworth and Ellen M. Putnam, filed a minority report saying that schools would not look kindly upon having outsiders dictate which salute they should use. Both Mrs. Putnam and Mrs. Wadsworth had been using the Youth's Companion Salute (called Bellamy's). The same 1894 Conference of the W.R.C. "recorded in its Journal a vote of thanks to be sent to Francis Bellamy for his patriotic work."

In the Journal of the 15th National W.R.C. Convention in 1897, the national president mentioned that the organization had printed literature for the schools, but that it had done nothing to indicate "its own allegiance to our country's flag." Mrs. Putnam announced the place where there would be an exemplification of the ritual work the president was recommending for adoption. The W.R.C. Department of Kansas, at its convention in 1898, "heartily endorsed" a resolution to endorse the new flag work as adopted by the 15th National Convention. There is reason to think that Mrs. Hendricks, when she submitted Frank's essay, may have interpreted the references to a new pledge of allegiance as a request for a new pledge rather than the consideration of a new pledge already written. The dates of the action taken by the National W.R.C. in 1893 and the adoption of the "new flag work" by the Kansas W.R.C. in 1898 coincide with those mentioned by Mrs. Hendricks in her letter to Mr. Campbell

There is no evidence to support the claim that Frank Bellamy actually wrote the Pledge in 1891 or 1892 and submitted it to *The Youth's Companion* and that the *Companion* used it as their own. The accounts of three people closest to Frank Bellamy mentioned earlier are in agreement that Frank's essay was written as a classroom assignment in 1896. The story that Frank actually wrote the Pledge in 1891-92 seems to have originated after it became known that *The Youth's Companion Salute* had first been published in September of 1892. No mention of a contest for readers to submit a flag salute was found in an examination of several issues of *The Companion* for the years 1891 and 1892. Those who "remembered" a contest later were probably thinking of Mr. James Upham's promotion to enable students to obtain a flag to fly over their schools.

The only extant copy of the Pledge of Allegiance written by Frank Bellamy, or purported to have been written by him, is the signed copy of the Pledge of Allegiance which Mrs. Hendricks had reproduced on a folder with his picture and biography to be sold during the time she was trying to get his pension restored. She enclosed a copy of the folder with a letter to Mr. Phil P. Campbell in 1914, with the notation, "This was made from a letter he wrote to me." The Pledge was probably written at her request when she was planning to publish the leaflets.

In 1957, Ed M. Tucker of Temple City, California, a former resident of Kansas who served with Frank Bellamy in the Philippines, wrote a letter to "The Honorable Mayor and Patriotic Citizens of Cherryvale" giving Frank Bellamy's story which he said was "taken from the Kansas State records and from my personal diary made daily while I was in the army." Mr. Tucker was prompted to come forward because of a reprint of an American Legion Magazine article of 1955, attributed to Miss M. Miller, which named Francis Bellamy of The Youth's Companion as the author of the Pledge.

Mr. Tucker offered his story to refute what he termed "the fictions" in Miss Miller's article. He quotes Frank's statements made to the writer and his comrades while in the Philippines as follows: "When I was in school at Cherryvale, I was a subscriber to *The Youth's Companion*, a paper devoted to youth.....when *The Companion* asked that all the youth join in a writing contest, presenting essays on the subject of the flag, our teacher suggested we enter the contest. We did so, each writing what they thought would best express their opinion of what each boy or girl had in mind when they were saluting the U.S. Flag." He also quotes Frank as saying that *The Companion* published his pledge and signed it 'Anonymous'."

There is no notarized transcript of Mr. Tucker's diary, and the only Kansas State Records from which he could have taken information, other than Mrs. Hendricks paper read in 1909 and the Kansas City Star article of 1917, would have been newspaper accounts. Mr. Tucker's account, written 57 years after the fact, agrees with the accounts of Mrs. Hendricks, Lura Bellamy and the Kansas City Star article of 1917 in saying that Franks essay was written in the classroom, but no date is specified, and the class was said to have been writing entries for a Youth's Companion contest. Mr. Tucker quotes Frank as saying, "My essay was the exact wording and form of the pledge The Youth's Companion finally published. The contest was for \$25.00 and I received the money, but they did not send my essay back to me."

The words "finally published," in Mr. Tucker's account, might indicate that Frank had written his essay before 1892 or early in 1892. At that time, Lura Bellamy, born in 1874, Albert, born about 1879, and Edward Bellamy born in 1880, would have been living in the Bellamy home with Frank, and a \$25.00 prize or payment for an article submitted to a magazine would have been an event which would have been remembered by his siblings.

In her 1919 letter, Lura Bellamy wrote, "Frank was a gifted writer, and his letters while in the Philippines were beautiful descriptions, giving vivid pictures of the battles and scenes he had passed through." She said he wrote his essay "when in High School." She did not mention any essay submitted to *The Youth's Companion* when he was in elementary school.

Edward Bellamy had an opportunity to correct the information in Mrs. Hendricks story of 1909 when he supplied information to the *Kansas City Star* in 1917. He let stand the statement that Frank had written his essay while a member of the senior class in 1896. He did not mention an essay or prize awarded to Frank four or five years earlier.

Mr. Tucker's letter also stated: "from the beginning, he (Frank) and his comrades all claimed that he wrote the original pledge." This statement is refuted by the statements of both Mrs. Hendricks and Lura Bellamy that Frank did not know anything about his having written the pledge until he returned home, and he had forgotten all about writing the essay until Mrs. Hendricks talked to him about it.

The Flag Salute when first published in *The Youth's Companion*, was not signed 'Anonymous,' but bore no signature in keeping with the policy of the magazine for anything written by a member of the staff. The committee is "Lura Bellamy's 1919 letter to Mrs. Cordry.

reluctant to evaluate Mr. Tucker's motives or veracity, but this story appears to be a composite of other accounts and lacks credibility.

At the 21st State Conference of the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revoltuion, on March 21, 1919, the State Regent was authorized by a motion "to appoint a committee of three members to investigate and secure data regarding the Bellamy claim and report, if favorable, to the Continental Congress." (The Bellamy claim referred to was that of Frank Bellamy of Cherryvale, Kansas.) The committee appointed consisted of Mrs. T. A. Cordry of Parsons, Chairman; Miss Clara Francis, Topeka; Mrs. R. W. Neale, Kansas City.<sup>13</sup>

The DAR Committee immediately wrote to Homer S. Myers, Superintendent of the Cherryvale schools in 1895-1896; to Irene Beckley Powell, Principal of the Cherryvale High School in 1895-1896; to Alice Hendricks of Iola, Kansas, who could supply no information but sent Mrs. Cordry a clipping; and Lura Bellamy. Mrs. Cordry also went to Cherryvale and talked with Frank's friends and schoolmates. This was only four years after Frank's death and five years after the death of Mrs. Hendricks.

On May 8, 1919, Mrs. Cordry sent her report to Miss Catherine Campbell, Kansas DAR State Regent, saying, "We proved positively that Frank Bellamy's essay was written at a school contest in Cherryvale in 1896." The report of the committee presented to the DAR State Conference in 1920 stated that "the honor should go to an Eastern man, Mr. Upham."

In 1936, an article by Irma Hill Vogel, National President of the Auxiliary to the United Spanish War Veterans, was printed in the United States Daughters of 1812 News-Letter. Mrs. Vogel said that the author of the Pledge of Allegiance was buried in an unmarked grave in Cherryvale. The article generated controversy in the 1812 Society. The Kansas Society, DAR, which had been criticized for not having marked Frank Belloamy's grave, started another investigation, and Mrs. Edgar Rex, State Regent, asked Marion Seelye, State Vice Regent, to look into the matter.

In the DAR files is a letter, dated June 19, 1936, from Kate Lower, Clerk of the City of Cherryvale, Kansas to "Dear Marion," probably Miss Seelye. Ms. Lower relates the story of Mrs. Sullivan Lomas who was teaching in the Cherryvale High School in 1895, forty years earlier. Mrs. Lomax told that Frank Bellamy and her brother decorated the blackboard with pictures of Union soldiers and Frank added what is now known as the Pledge of Allegiance. This account is repeated in a report of the Kansas State Historical Society on the Authorship of the Pledge in 1941.

Miss Seelye's report, dated September 16, 1936, said the similarity of the names of Francis Bellamy and Frank Bellamy had contributed to the confusion. She cited the DAR investigation of 1919 which through affidavits "and other indisputable evidence, had proven that Frank Bellamy was not the author." She summarized her report by saying, "We dislike very much not to be able to claim this honor for Kansas and, while a few of the residents of "Minutes of the 21st Kansas State DAR Conference. The Kansas City Star, February 8, 1941; "Kansas Logond is Hard to Down in Dispute Over the Flag Pledge."

Cherryvale still do not admit the mistake, the facts remain, and it seems that the honor should go to Mr. Upham and Mr. Francis Bellamy jointly."

The following statement, quoted in part, was written by Miss Marion Seelye on May 8, 1937: "In talking with Mrs. Isabelle Harvey, former State Vice Regent of the Kansas D.A.R., on January 29, 1937, she being in charge of the State Headquarters of the United Spanish War Veterans in Memorial Hall, Topeka, I found that the investigation conducted by that organization concerning the connection of Frank Bellamy with our Flag Pledge had been very exhaustive, and a large file of correspondence, newspapers, statements, etc., showed beyond a doubt that Frank Bellamy could not be the true author. "... She was very emphatic in hoping that the matter, after being accepted in its true light, would be dropped so that no more reflection upon Frank Bellamy's war record, which was very fine, would be cast."

The Committee found Mrs. Hendricks to be a kind and patriotic woman, who, despite her own illness, helped to provide comfort and financial support to Frank Bellamy during his last years. She was absolutely convinced that Frank wrote the Pledge of Allegiance. It can only be concluded that she assumed the Bellamy name associated with the Bellamy Salute, later called the Pledge of Allegiance, referred to Frank Bellamy.

The Committee found Frank Bellamy innocent of any charge of plagiarism. Building a theme around a quotation is frequently done by students. What he wrote was submitted by Mrs. Hendricks without his knowledge. There was no record that he ever said he wrote the Pledge. It was not until his health forced his move to Colorado that Mrs. Hendricks announced publicly her belief that Frank was the author. It is unlikely that he received or sought any accolades. The consensus of other DAR committees has been that Frank unconsciously memorized the salute when he heard it or read it; this committee shares this belief.

As much as the members of the committee would like to claim the honor of having the author of the Pledge of Allegiance as a graduate of the Cherryvale High School and as a resident of Kansas for part of his short life, the evidence does not support the claim that Frank Bellamy was the author of the Pledge of Allegiance. The Committee concurs with the conclusions of the DAR Committees of 1919 and 1936.

The Committee summarizes its finding with a quotation from the Library of Congress Report: "Nevertheless, the way of the arbitrator is hard; it is a thorny path, beset with many dangers and vexations. He knows he cannot possible please both sides; he may end by pleasing nobody, including himself."

In 1939, a committee appointed by the United States Flag Association reported as follows: "In view of this strong contemporary evidence, it is the opinion of the members of this committee that the author of the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag was Francis Bellamy of Rome, New York, and not James Upham of Malden, Massachusetts."

The Library of Congress Report of 1957, speaking of Francis Bellamy, said: "We are of the opinion, then, that all factors taken into consideration,

the Bellamy claim to authorship rests upon the more solid ground."15

It was not the responsibility of this committee to weigh the evidence of the Upham or Francis Bellamy claims. The investigations conducted by the United States Flag Association and the Research Service of the Library of Congress were thorough and impartial, and the Committee accepts these reports.

In reviewing the first hundred State Conferences, it was learned that a formal report from the State Historian was a featured event. In this regard, Shirley S. Coupal, State Historian, presented a slide program of the "Ninetieth Anniversary Survey of the Santa Fe Trail DAR Markers in Kansas.: The complete written report will be recorded in the Annual Report and Proceedings under the section of Officer Reports. Each attendee received a bound copy of the "Ninetieth Anniversary Survey of the Santa Fe Trail DAR Markers in Kansas" which was compiled by Shirley S. Coupal, State Historian.

The benediction was given by Mrs. Albert R. Hagemann, State Chaplain. The Pages retired the Colors and the banquet was closed with a recessional.

The meeting adjourned at 9:55 p.m.

Mrs. Albert R. Hagemann, State Chaplain, read Proberhs 37:7 and gave the invocation. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mrs. Wayne M. Cope, State Librarian. The American's Creed was led by Mrs. Joseph R. Riden, Jr., Honorary State Regent and Past Vice President General. The first verse of the National Anthem was led by Mrs. Larry Overmiller, State Chairman, American Heritage Committee.

Mrs. Doran Cole, Credentials Chairman, reported there were ten State Officers, one National Officer from Kansas, five Honorary State Regents, thirty-two Chapter Regents, one Chapter Vice Regent, ninety-one Delegates, one hundred thirty-five entitled to vote, twenty-two alternates, non-voting members and guests fifty-four, total number registered two hundred eleven,

and one 50 Year member. Mrs. Cole moved the adoption of the revised roll of delegates as the official roll of voting members of the 100th Kansas State Conference. Adopted.

Hagemann; State Recording Secretary, Mrs. John D. Afton; State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Gus M. Ramirez; and State Treasurer, Mrs. Harry J. Carpenter. Following her report, Mrs. Harry J. Carpenter presented the financial statements. She then read the Auditor's Report and moved its adoption. The motion carried.

Her expertise as a State Treasurer came from her work experience as Chief of the Kansas Inheritance Tax division. She was State Treasurer 1965-1968. She was Chapter Regent of Topeka Chapter and was State Marshal of State Conference in 1964.

She was generous with the other lineage societies where she was a member. In 1991, she endowed a scholarship at Washburn University that was called the "Daughters of the American Revolution Endowed Scholarship."

Mrs. Lempenau started the Friendship Fund in Kansas to pay the last dues of an indigent member so she could then be resigned in good standing. Since that time the rules at National have been changed and Kansas no longer uses that fund.

She was generous with a donation to KSDAR, with the interest to be used to fund chapter awards. Previous to that, the current and past state officers were asked for donations.

Mrs. Lempenau attended many sessions of Continental Congress, but one highlight was her trip with the DAR led by Sarah King, President General to celebrate the Bicentennial of the Treaty of Paris in Paris, in 1983.

She was honored by the Institute of Probate Administration of the Kansas Bar Association.

She died following her 97th birthday. She was survived by four nieces and will be missed by them, her chapter members and friends across the nation. Mary Carswell Lempenau is remembered by Kansas Daughters as a dedicated, well qualified member who served her chapter, state and national society as a leader.

I would like to conclude this memorial with a poem, written by Mrs. Lempenau.

#### Florence Evelyn Risinger Smith

Florence Evelyn, daughter of Marion and Clara (Beardsley) Risinger, was born October 22, 1906 at Winona, Minnesota. She was a teacher of hearing impaired children before her marriage to James Wellington Smith September 6, 1938 at Huron, South Dakota. The couple had three children: Dianne, Donna and Douglas. She compiled a library catalog and additional supplements for Kansas chapters, wrote a history of the library 1929-1972, added to the collection of lineage books, collected funds for the binding of the DAR magazines; mailed out books to Kansas DAR members, and set up the library card catalog. Florence assisted with the selection of books for the library made possible by the Hazel Howe Bequest. Her special interests were New England, New York and Pennsylvania.

Florence Smith was a special lady. She was active in church work, the Eastern Star, the Western Plains Hospital Auxiliary and Dodge City Senior Citizens. In addition to DAR, she was a member of the Huguenot Society. She attended chapter meetings as often as possible. It was a highlight for her in September 1996 to attend the Southwest District Meeting here in Dodge

City—one of many she had attended over the years.

Mrs. Doran Cole read the final report of the Credentials Committee as follows: State Officers 11, National Officer from KS 1, Honorary State Regents 5, Chapter Regent 38, Chapter Vice Regents 3, Delegates 113, total entitled to vote 166, Alternates 26, non voting members and guests 74, total registered 266 and two 50 Year members were registered. Mrs. Cole moved the adoption of the final report of the Credentials Committee. The motion was adopted.

There was a Junior Moment when sale items were displayed for members to see. We were reminded that if we did not make a purchase, some items may go home with us anyway. Mrs. Richard C. McGehee made an announcement about the Golden West Tea and Mrs. Traffas announced that Loberta Schwarz, had fallen in the parking lot the evening before and broken her ankle.

The report of the Tellers was presented by Mrs. Betty Darr. Mrs. Traffas read the following: Number of votes cast 147; necessary for election 74; State Regent, Mrs. Howard R. Walker, 146; State Vice-Regent, Mrs. Harry J. Carpenter, 147; State Chaplain, Mrs. G. D. Spafford, 147; State Recording Secretary, Shirley S. Coupal, 147; State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Wayne M. Cope, 144; State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Robert E.Schweiger, 142; State Treasurer, Mrs. Oliver I. West, Jr., 146; State Registrar, Mrs. Donald G. Horn, 146; State Historian, Mrs. John M. Boggs, Jr., 146; State Librarian, Mrs. Gary Eichman, 144; and State Reporter, Ann Roark, 145. On the motion for the endorsement as candidate for the office of Vice President General, to stand for election at the 108th Continental Congress, Mrs. Vincent Traffas, 142. The chair declared the candidates were elected.

Mrs. Ruth Keys Clark moved "That the ballots be destroyed following the installation of the newly elected State Regent and State Vice Regent at the 107th Continental Congress Congress." Motion was seconded and carried.

Copies of the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial Resolution had been distributed. By consensus, it was agreed that it would not be read. Mrs. John D. Afton moved the adoption of the Resolution. The motion was adopted.

#### Lewis and Clark Bicentennial Resolution

Whereas, In 1803, the United States acquired more than 800,000 square miles of territory west of the Mississippi River to the Rocky Mountains from France; and

Whereas, this purchase determined the westward orientation of the United States in the 19th century and was basic to its rise as a world power; and

Whereas, also in 1803, President Thomas Jefferson selected Captain Meriwether Lewis and Captain William Clark to lead the Corps of Discovery up the Missouri River to the Rockies, over the mountains, down the Columbia River to the Pacific Ocean, and back; and.

Whereas, this military expedition created the first map of the trans-Mississippi West, provided invaluable scientific data on the flora and fauna of the Louisiana Purchase, established a trade system with many Native American tribes, and established the American claim to what would become Oregon, Washington, and Idaho; and

Whereas, Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution has commissioned, installed and dedicated four historical markers—one at Fort Leavenworth, two in Atchison, and one at White Cloud—to commemorate this great undertaking and to mark its progress through what would become Kansas; and

Whereas, the year 2003 will mark the bicentennial of both the Louisiana Purchase and the beginnings of the Lewis and Clark Expedition; now, therefore be it

Resolved, That members of Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, educate themselves about this historic venture that has in one way or another affected every citizen of the United States from that time forward, and be it further

**Resolved,** That members of Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revoltuion, lead and participate in activities that celebrate its bicentennial.

# NSDAR AWARDS State Historian Certificate of Excellence Shirley S. Coupal, Kansas

"This may be bigger than the Bicentennial of the United States" was a comment made during the Dedication Day ceremonies of the Lewis & Clark markers. In many ways, it will mean more to those of us born and raised west of the Mississippi. February 20, 1998 should be remembered as the kick off day for the Corps of Discovery Bicentennial. It will be remembered as the grand finale of the KSDAR Centennial Administration.

For this officer, 1997-1998 was a year of searching, writing and celebrating. We searched many sections of Finney County for a missing Santa Fe Trail marker and didn't find it. We stopped searching and started writing the Centennial History book. The Looking Back, Trails To The Second Century manuscript was edited twice, space and captions for photographs added, before it was delivered to Sullivan's for the pre-publication composition. We traveled to Wichita for the first look and to pick up the finished manuscript. It was beautiful! The final edit was made and the manuscript was carried back to Sullivan's. With the final edit committed to disc, we trusted overnight mail for the two remaining reviews before the manuscript went to Jostens for printing and binding. The book was distributed during State Conference, copies were sent to NSDAR Library, Kansas DAR Library and Archives and Kansas State Historical Society.

However, writing wasn't over, the Ninetieth Anniversary Survey of the Santa Fe Trail DAR Markers in Kansas had to be finished. The Survey was officially presented at the 100th State Conference. The Conference Theme, Trails Through Kansas, was an ideal setting for this presentation and everyone attending opening night received a souvenir copy. The Survey was sent to the Office of the Historian General, NSDAR Library, Kansas State Historical Society, Kansas DAR Library and Archives and various Santa Fe Trail friends. The Survey includes a photograph, location, history and condition of each Marker. A special color rendition is being placed in the Kansas DAR Library.

The two accomplishments were cause to celebrate, but there were other celebrations. A May trip to Morton County determined the original locations of the Point of Rocks and the State Line Markers. A stop was made in Edwards County to confer with David Clapsaddle on the original location of the Dry Route (Larned Airport) Marker. Olathe, Lois Warner, Cimarron River Valley, Abilene, Fort Larned and Mary Wade Strother Chapters were visited for fun and special occasions. In September, we rededicated/dedicated the Lone Elm, Larned Depot, Aubry Cut-off, Point of Rocks and State Line Santa Fe Trail DAR Markers. A program on the Santa Fe Trail DAR Markers was presented to Arthur Barrett Chapter. The Dry Route Marker was reset in November. This left three Markers to be returned to their original locations,

Sora-Kansas Creek, Mountain Route and Santa Fe. The Quivira Chapter, SFTA with the Stone Corral Chapter, DAR and the Dodge City DAR and SFTA chapters are, respectively, working on getting these Markers moved by April, 1998. With Missouri and Kansas Daughters, we enjoyed the Washington Day Luncheon given by the Kansas City Area SAR.

We are happy to announce that Don Miller of Fort Scott is the Kansas Outstanding Teacher of American History for 1998. He was sponsored by the Molly Foster Berry Chapter.

It was a great pleasure for this officer to once again present an astounding number of awards to the hard working chapters. Thirteen chapters contributed to the Marker Restoration/Preservation Fund. There are approximately 40 copies of the Cordry book, The Story of the Marking of the Santa Fe Trail, left to use for fund raising. Thirteen chapters are continuing to restore, maintain, place, locate, dedicate and rededicate markers. Ten chapters have undertaken historic preservations and two chapters honored American History education. Four chapters provided for or helped with an historic event. In the South Central Division four of the five winners were from Texas and one from Missouri. Three were students of church schools, one was home schooled and one attended public school. Michael Owen Parker was second place winner in South Central Division and Ben Hirschfeld placed third.

#### **American Indians**

This chairman has the pleasure of announcing that the American Indian Scholarship fund received \$133.00, Bacone College received \$178.00 and Chemawa School received \$123.00. On the return forms it was reported that \$13.00 was sent for the Indian Youth Summer Camp program.

Other projects reported to this chairman were, approximately 1,353 lbs. of clothing were sent to the schools. A good count of soup labels sent was not possible. Some chapters said yes and some reported that they were taken to State Conference. The numbers reported were 4,993 labels. This chairman is happy to say that the Indian Schools did get an equal share of the labels that were taken to the 1996 State Conference emphasizing DAR Schools. Thank you!

Of the seven programs presented, Eunice Sterling Chapter had two speakers, one being the Director of Mid-American All Indian Center in Wichita. At the conclusion of the program the chapter presented the Director with a large outdoor American Flag for the Center.

As the administration comes to an end, this chairman would like to thank the Daughters for their support and interest.

#### Conservation

# Mrs. Marilyn Winton Misch

Our Kansas DAR members have again been working hard for our environment in the cause of conservation, particularly in the areas of recycling and renewing. All sixty-four chapters reported. By far the great majority stated that their recycling projects, and three-planting and maintaining were their chapter's most significant conservation-related achievement. Thirty-eight of the chapters reported educating members regarding organ donation, and approximately eighty-four members have signed the back of their driver's license or an Organ Donor Card. Some Chapter Conservation Chairmen-but not yet enough-have obtained these cards from their local Driver's License Offices to distribute at chapter meetings. Forty-two chapters have encouraged members to install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in their homes. We don't want to lose any of you! Only two chapters reported they had an Adopt-A-Highway program.

This chairman attended Continental Congress in Washington DC last April, including the meeting for State Conservation Chairmen. Our National Conservation Chairman gave a moving presentation on the tragic need for more organ donors, and wished to forego some of the statistical reporting this year in favor of working on the organ donor program. It is literally a matter of life or death for others, and even some elderly donors can contribute for research. That does not mean that our members' actions in the areas of recycling are not important, we all realize that. Chapters returning the statistical report demonstrated this fact, and more trees than ever were planted this year than in the past two: a grand total of 3,925, one of these being a shelter belt of 200 new trees. Shrubs planted totaled 1,410, and 27 new ponds were constructed. Terraces built amounted to 44, plus 15 miles of terracing, and 80 acres were newly terraced; this is so important for soil

conservation. Wildlife areas privately maintained by members, as reported, are 142 acres, 3, 140 feet of fence row, and brushy areas amounting to 38. Members please keep up the good work in this area, and be aware of increasing these numbers for the sake of our wildlife.

Just to keep some sort of a tab on the recycling, I am happy to report that members submitted at least 181,235 lbs. of newspapers and magazines; Tomahawk Chapter topped the list with 37,449 pounds. Plastics recycled amount to 15,141 pounds, and 25,548 pounds of glass. Although aluminum cans were not on the list for reporting this year, we know members recycle large amounts, and we even had write-ins of 4,545 lbs. as well as 3,575 lbs. of tin! The real totals of course, far exceed this.

Presentation of Conservation Medals by the chapters is one of the most important efforts we can make, and this year we had three presentations Mary Wade Strother, Salina, gave a medal to Mrs. Bette Wachholz, a secondgreat teacher who promotes an OWLS project at her school, involving many children from all grades (OWLS being an Outdoor Wildlife Learning Site). Tomahawk Chapter, Overland Park, presented Ms. Jan Armstrong the medal for all her fine work for animals and wildlife conservation as Executive Director of Friends of the Kansas City Zoo. Wichita Chapter presented a medal to Mr. Bob Gress, Director of the Nature Center there, author, and presenter of many programs and lectures to children and young people. These three chapters and their conservation chairmen are to be congratulated for their efforts. Awards of recognition will be presented at DAR State Conference to these chairmen, Jean Hamilton of Mary Wade Strother, Susan Young of Tomahawk, Mrs. Charles Garretson of Wichita, and also to Doris Brownson of Captain Jesse Leavenworth, and Millicent Claassen of Newton for their consistently fine and active contributions to their chapters. I know there are many more out there who are deserving and take an active interest. The following chapters also presented interesting reports, detailing many conservation activities of their members; I only wish I could include all the activities here. These chapters are Mission Hills, Three Trails West, Capt. Jesse Leavenworth, Lois Warner, Flores del Sol, Mary Wade Strother, Newton and Fort Larned. Major Elijah Hyde, Dodge City, Good-Land, Newton, Mary Wade Strother, and Eunice Sterling all reported on interesting conservation-related program presented at chapter meetings. I'm sure there were many more, as we do have an outstanding group of conservationminded Daughters here in Kansas! Many thanks to the chapters and to the chairmen for their response over the past three years during which I have been honored to serve as State Conservation Chairman. And thank you to a wonderful State Regent, Patricia Traffas, and her State Officers, for the privilege of serving with and for you and for KSDAR.

#### **DAR Scholarship**

Despite the sometimes bitter controversy swirling about DAR and C.A.R. at the National level, the Kansas State Society continues to admire and work well with each other. K.S.C.A.R. deeply appreciates the support from KSDAR. This chairman, who is also serving as K.S.C.A.R. Senior State President has been guided and nurtured by the KSDAR leadership these past three years.

There is a renewed interest in C.A.R., especially in the eastern half of the state. Membership is steadily growing. A new society is organizing in South Leawood sponsored by Three Trails West Chapter. Santa Fe Trail Society in the Kansas City area (name changed last June from Tomahawk Society) continues to grow and be active in all aspects of the C.A.R. program and purpose. Santa Fe Trail entered seven National contests this year including the National Merit Award. The State President also entered the National State Presidents' Contest. The State Society issued four newsletters Sunflower Scribbles, held a Summer-Packet Workshop in Atchison on August 16, and will hold its Fifty-Second State Conference on March 28 in Emporia.

In addition to attending these state C.A.R. functions, this Chairman attended the C. A. R. National Convention, the April, October and December Senior National Board of Management Meetings in Washington, and five regional meetings during the summer of 1997 including the Great Plains Regional meeting in St. Louis. She escorted the State President to all the above functions, except the Fall Board, plus the SAR Washington's Birthday Luncheon in Kansas City. They also visited four DAR Chapters to speak on C.A.R. Unfortunately, neither will attend the KSDAR State Conference due to the March 14 wedding of the Chairman's son (the State President's brother).

It is an honor and a pleasure to serve DAR as State Chairman for C.A.R., and a joy of equal measure serving the State C.A.R. members.

# Americanism and DAR Manual For Citizenship

This year 1,821 DAR Manuals for Citizenship were distributed to naturalization applicants, schools, and others. Kansas Chapters participated in the Naturalization Process or Ceremonies sixty-one times with ninety-seven members in attendance presenting each new citizen with flags, flag codes, history of the Pledge of Allegiance, patriotic memento cards showing the Pledge of Allegiance and the American's Creed and hosting teas and receptions for the new citizens and their families. They also involved youth volunteers in the program. Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts and a group of high school students assisted in the ceremonies or the receptions.

Many Americanism programs were given to groups and chapter meetings. Shawnee Mission and Mission Hills Chapters were outstanding in this area.

The State Americanism Contest was won by Neodesha Chapter for a published writing by K. Lucille Campbell. Second place went to Eunice Sterling Chapter for a published writing by Beulah Struthers Preuett.

One recommendation for the Award of DAR Medal of Honor has been forwarded to the National Chairman and its approval is pending.

# The Flag of the United States

The Kansas Daughters of the American Revolution have spent a very busy year promoting the correct use of our most valued symbol. With all but two chapters reporting, twenty-two large flags, two hundred fifty-six table flags and 2,113 small flags were distributed for a total of 2,391 flags. #### **National Defense**

Resolutions adopted by the National Society are topics at 54 chapters while State resolutions were discussed at 57 chapters. A total of \$62.00 was contributed to Dollars for Defense and ROTC program work at the NSDAR. As always, encouragement to vote is prevalent at the chapters.

Kansas Daughters support for our veterans well-being remains top priority, as we supply every day needs, enthusiastically sharing our time and talents.

The Kansas Daughters answered the literacy call in the following ways: 100% of the chapters filed Literacy reports, this past year twelve chapters had programs pertaining to literacy, eighteen chapters were involved in local literacy programs, forty-four members served as tutors across the State of Kansas, with 2,821 volunteer hours.

The Kansas Volunteer of the year for Literacy is Elda Faye Koehnt Blubaugh from the Cofachique Chapter. She regularly gives of her time to

help Mexican immigrants learn to read. Elda Faye's enthusiasm about reading rubs off and her students look forward to the tutor sessions and the opportunity to learn to read from such a *giving* person. Elda Faye's file on teaching English has been verified and KSDAR is fortunate to have someone with her attributes to represent our State in this contest.

Kansas DAR chapters still have room for literacy improvement. Thirty-four chapters reported no literacy program and no activities to promote literacy in their communities. The ability to read and comprehend is the groundwork for success in life.Let us be ever cognizant of others and share the gift that we possess—LITERACY.

With sixty-two chapters reporting there were 217 prospective members who assisted with sixty applications accepted. A number of chapters reported they have a number of applications pending and are still working with prospective members. Nine workshops were held with several chapters holding combined sessions. Several chapters held workshops with members of other chapters either attending or directing. That is great cooperation. Four chapters had involved youth in presenting or attending workshops.

Attendance at nineteen workshops totaled 154. This is where we get our members. Keep up the good work.

# **Volunteer Community Service**

Forty-eight of the KSDAR's sixty-four chapters contributed a total of 55,039 hours to helping in their communities. These were the verified hours. Also reported were 350 hours which were not verified. We had an increase of volunteers from the previous years. Some of their projects were: hospitals, Chambers of Commerce, historical activities, genealogy, Alzheimer's nursing homes, Meals on Wheels, museums, Scouts, Salvation Army, libraries, medical centers, audio readers, homeless, Shepherd's Center, blood mobile, Boys and Girls Clubs, and National Archives. Since most of the Chapters did not itemize their activities I cannot give totals for each service.

Kansas top chapters were: General Edward Hand 7,994, Topeka 4,048, Molly Foster Berry 3,500, and Eunice Sterling 3,264 hours of voluntary service. Many chapters still reported church work and DAR activities which cannot be counted. These hours were not included in the totals.

# The Marking of the Lewis & Clark Trail in Kansas

The markers are in place! On February 20, 1998, four historical markers commemorating the Lewis & Clark Trail in Kansas were dedicated. The dedication began with the marker located at Fort Leavenworth. The luncheon was held in Atchison, where Meriwether Lewis, portrayed by Dr. Phillip Thomas, told us of his travels, and special entertainment was provided by students of Atchison Community High School. After lunch, two markers in the Atchison area were dedicated. One located at the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Creek and the other at Independence Park. The marker at White Cloud, located at the old Steamboat Landing, was the last to be dedicated. Everyone agreed that the dedication ceremonies were a great success.

Thanks to the generosity of Kansas Daughters, who matched the \$5,000 challenge grant from the National Park Service secured by State Regent Pat Traffas, the project was fully subscribed before the markers were commissioned. State Regent Pat Traffas is to be commended for her hard work, research and foresight which have allowed Kansas Daughters to be in the forefront of preparation for the Bicentennial of the Lewis & Clark Expedition and the Corps of Discovery beginning in the year 2003. It has been an honor to serve as chairman of this project.

# LEWIS AND CLARK MARKER DEDICATIONS Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution

#### Fort Leavenworth

A large group assembled at Fort Leavenworth on Friday, February 20, 1998 at 9:30 a.m. Mrs. Vincent Traffas, State Regent of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution welcomed all to the historic Fort Leavenworth and to the formal ceremony to dedicate an historical marker. Mrs. Howard R. Walker, State Vice Regent, led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and the singing of the National Anthem.

The invocation was given by State Chaplain, Mrs. Albert Hagemann. "Almighty and Everlasting God, we gather here today and ask that by Thy grace there may prevail amongst us an increasing measure of friendship and mutual understanding, and of that unity of purpose which we share with the lovers of freedom everywhere in the world. Bless us in that righteous purpose. We would ask You to consecrate our country, our leaders and people alike. Most especially, Gracious Father, we ask You for protection of the men and women in our armed forces wherever their duty calls them. Give an extra measure of Thy grace upon all who serve at Fort Leavenworth. We ask this in Thy name. Amen."

Mrs. Traffas introduced the following with pleasure: Col. Rolland Dessert, Garrison Commander, United States Army, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas; Lt. Col. Ron Barry, who is in charge of ceremonies at Fort Leavenworth; Capt. Kubica, Director of Planned Training and Mobilization, U.S. Army, Ft. Leavenworth; Mr. Matthew C. Nowak, Natural Resources Manager, Fort Leavenworth; and Mr. Richard N. Williams, National Park Service, Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail, Madison, Wisconsin.

Mrs. Traffas spoke to the gathering about the historical background of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution was chartered by the United States Congress in 1890. The National headquarters are located in Washington, DC at historic Constitution Hall, Memorial Continental Hall at 1776 D Street. The three objectives of the National Society are education, historical preservation and patriotic endeavor. The Kansas Society was chartered in April 1896 in Topeka, our state's Capitol city. From the very beginning of DAR in Kansas, over 102 years ago, the State

Society has undertaken many projects of historical preservation. Perhaps the Kansas Daughters are best known for their marking of the Santa Fe Trail throughout Kansas in 1906. They placed 89 red Osage granite markers, a cannon, bronze tablets, and such, to mark the Trail for posterity. They have placed markers along the Oregon Trail, the California Trail, the Black Dog Trail, the Chisholm Trail, the Fort Hays-Fort Dodge Military Road which leads from Fort Leavenworth southward. Today we are gathered to commemorate yet another of the Trails where the Corps of Discovery, led by Lewis and Clark, passed by here on July 2, 1804. Theirs was a Trail of exploration and discovery. President Thomas Jefferson commissioned Meriwether Lewis and William Clark to lead a military expedition to explore the newly acquired Louisiana Purchase. He instructed them to cross the continent from what was known and settled lands east of the Mississippi River, to the Western Ocean which lav far to the west. They were to travel via the Missouri River, going to its source, and they were to record their observations in their journals daily. After spending the winter of 1803-1804 at Camp Wood on the Mississippi River, the Corps of Discovery set forth from what is now St. Louis, Missouri on May 14, 1804. This military expedition traveled in a 55'-long keelboat, and two French pirogues, which were somewhat larger than rowboats. The Corps of Discovery consisted of three platoons, each led by a Sargeant, a handful of interpreters, French voyageurs, a black man named York, and a New Foundland dog, named Seaman. Traveling against the current of the mighty Missouri River was slow and arduous—the expedition could only make progress of 6-7 miles on most days. To proceed on, they could row the boats, or they could use poles to coax the boats forward. If the wind was in the right direction, they could hoist sails, but most of the time, the men placed ropes over their shoulders, and walking in the river, or along the shore, would manually push the boats upstream. No wonder it took almost eight weeks to reach this part of Kansas! The Missouri River has changed over the years—the channel has shifted following floods, and since it is now used as a shipping channel—it is somewhat deeper and swifter today then it was in 1804. As the military expeditionary force passed this place on July 2, 1804, William Clark recorded in his journal, "we Camped after dark...above the Island & opposit the 1st old village of the Kansas which was Situated in a valley, between two points of high Land, and immediately on the river bank, back of the village and on a rising ground at about one mile The French had a garrison for Some time and made use of water out of a Spring running into Turkey Creek." You will see these very words on a raised type bronze table on the reverse side of this marker.

With these words, Mrs. Traffas dedicated the marker. "Today, the 20th day of February in the year of our Lord 1998, we dedicate this marker in the name of all who have served in the military under the flag of the United States of America. As the Lewis and Clark Expedition was a

military operation, we pause to remember all who have served this great nation." The marker was unveiled by State Historian, Shirley S. Coupal as Col. Rolland A. Dessert, Jr. came forward to accept the marker. Mrs. Traffas continued, "On behalf of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, this marker is presented to the United States Army and to Fort Leavenworth, in grateful recognition of service rendered by all military personnel who have given, and who continue to give, so much for the freedom and national defense of our Country. May all those who come to serve at Fort Leavenworth, and all who visit this place, be reminded of the important role of the military in the United States of America. I present this marker to you."

Mrs. Traffas thanked Col. Dessert, Lt. Col. Barry and Capt, Kubica for their valued assistance with the ceremony and Mrs. Albert R. Hagemann, State Chaplain, gave the benediction. "Blessed be Thou, Our Father from everlasting to everlasting. Prosperity and honor come from Thee. We do praise Thy name and glory. Look down from heaven and bless this great nation, its authorities and all those who have worked and who do work for its power to reach out for the right, the might to attain it, for the sake of Thy Praise, Thy name and Thy glory. Amen."

Mrs. Traffas thanked the Colonial Color Guard from the Kansas and Missouri Sons of the American Revolution for their participation in the ceremony and the colors were retired.

Announcements were: Attendees were urged to visit the wagon swales from the Santa Fe and Oregon Trail before leaving the Post; the Frontier Army Museum has a wonderful gift shop; and the group would travel to Atchison to attend ceremonies at the Mount Conference Center which would begin at 11:00 a.m.

#### **Atchison**

The group assembled at the Mount Conference Center in Atchison at 11:00 a.m. for a buffet lunch. Entertainment was provided by the Five Freshman Twirlers with lighted batons and Five Senior Twirlers with fire batons. They were under the direction of Mrs. Leon Torkelson, who is an instructor at the School and Regent of Atchison Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution. The Soundmasters, a select group of singers from the Atchison County Community High School, under the direction of Mrs. Amy Eckert provided songs for our enjoyment. Mrs. Traffas thanked the performers and their directors.

Introductions of persons who had assisted in the project of marking the Lewis and Clark Trail in Kansas were given by Mrs. Traffas.

Sharon Haun, of the Kansas State Historical Society accepted a certificate for Dr. Ramon Powers, Executive Director of the KSHS who had written a letter supporting the project.

Mr. Frank Fogler and DeeDee, his wife, had helped since the very outset of the project. Frank is a professional photographer, but most importantly, has spent a good portion of his life living and hunting along the Missouri

River, and knows it better than anyone else! Frank was presented with a certificate for meritorious service.

Mr. Matthew Nowak, Natural Resources Manager at Fort Leavenworth and the Kansas Commissioner for the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial, who is planning for the National Symposium in 1999 at Fort Leavenworth was recognized and thanked for his help with the project. He was presented a certificate of appreciation.

Mr. Richard N. Williams, who is in charge of the Ice Age Trails division of the National Park Service and the Department of the Interior, lives and works in Madison, Wisconsin. We first met Mr. Williams in January 1996 and traveled the length of the Lewis and Clark Trail in Kansas, reviewing all sites for possible marking. Mr. Williams informed us of a Challenge Cost Share program offered by the National Park Service, and assisted in preparation of the documents for that application. The Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution was awarded a \$5,000 grant which greatly assisted us in the marker project. Mr. Williams received a certificate of appreciation.

Mr. Alan Johnson of Mastercarved Memorials, of Clay Center, Kansas had been most helpful-right from the beginning. We first worked with Mr. Johnson with the preparation of the 175th Anniversary Marker on the Santa Fe Trail in Chase County, Kansas. When we considered who to work with on this project, only one name came to mind. Alan was instrumental in the design, the creation, the installation of the markers, and even has caught *trail fever*, we understand. His right hand assistant, Mrs. Janet Clark, who worked with him, is home attending the business. Alan received a certificate with thanks for another job well done.

Mr. Scott Knoch, Mayor of Atchison, received a certificate from the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution in appreciation of the approval to place the two historical markers in Atchison. Mrs. Traffas recognized the wonderful historically significant city—birthplace of Amelia Earhart, the home of the International Friendship Forest, many gorgeous homes, and some of the nicest people we have worked with.

The members of the Kansas and Missouri Society Sons of the American Revolution were given certificates of appreciation for their participation in the festivities of the day.

Mrs. Traffas recognized Mrs. Kimbley Kincaid who lives in Leavenworth and was the first person to suggest such a marker project. She received a certificate and thanks for her help and support during the past three years.

Members of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution and invited guests were introduced: Mrs. Ruth Keys Clark, Vice President General of Winchester; Mrs. Larry Bradley, State Regent of Missouri; Mrs. E. Harrison Powley, III, State Regent of Utah; Mrs. John W. McGuire, Jr., Honorary State Regent of Kansas and Mr. John W. McGuire, Jr. of Leawood; Mrs. Billy P. Compton, Honorary State Regent of Kansas and Past Vice President General of Wichita. The Kansas State Officers were introduced: Mrs. Howard R. Walker, Vice Regent, and Mr. Walker from Blue Mound;

Mrs. Albert R. Hagemann, State Chaplain from Ozawkie; Mrs. Gus M. Ramirez, State Organizing Secretary from Overland Park; Mrs. Harry J. Carpenter, State Treasurer from Topeka; Mrs. Ray Bendorf, State Registrar from Louisburg; Shirley S. Coupal, State Historian from Shawnee Mission; Mrs. Wayne M. Cope, State Librarian from Liberal and Mrs. Robert M. Neubert, State Reporter from Lenexa. Mrs. John Farmer, State Chaplain of the Missouri Society was recognized. K.S.C.A.R. State President, Mary Theda Owens brought greetings. Mrs. Dennis Owens, K.S.C.A.R. Senior State President and State Chairman of the C.A.R. Committee was recognized. All members of the Kansas Society DAR were asked to stand and be recognized. Norman and Mary Dorsch of Bird City, parents of Mrs. Traffas were present.

The speaker, Dr Phillip D. Thomas, Professor of History at Wichita State University is a member of the Kansas Humanities Council Speaker's Bureau as well as a book discussion leader. The Kansas Humanities Council is a nonprofit organization that promotes informed thinking about the history, traditions, and ideas that shape our democratic way of life. Dr. Thomas has published and spoken widely on medieval history and science, Western American history, and art, exploration of the West and conservation. He is an explorer who has experienced firsthand the wonders of our nation's new Louisiana Purchase—the wildlife, the plants, the people and the geography from the Mississippi River to the coast of Oregon. Dr. Thomas very ably portrayed the life of Meriwether Lewis as he spoke to the assembly.

The next stop was the Visitor's Center where the group joined together for the dedication ceremony for the 4th of July Creek marker. The Color Guard presented the Colors and Mrs. Traffas led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. Shirley S. Coupal, KSDAR Historian, presented the historical significance of the location. "As State Historian of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, I wish to welcome you to the formal dedication ceremony for two historical markers in Atchison. The markers were placed here to commemorate the Lewis and Clark Expedition of 1804-1806. Near where we are standing today, the party of the Corps of Discovery took lunch on the 4th of July in 1804. We know from their journals that they dined on maize and beans. The Creek that you see before us was named by the Expedition. In later years, the creek was called White Clay Creek, however, in recent years, the name of Fourth of July 1804 Creek has been reinstated. Throughout the years, this creek has flowed through downtown Atchison. A bridge was built over the creek and a marker placed prior to the visitation by the Re-Discovery Expedition and reenactment in 1996. This site represents the first time that Independence was celebrated west of the Mississippi River. It was here that the Flag of the United States of America flew over the first public celebration of what has come to be a National Holiday. Can't you almost imagine the patriotic fervor those brave members of the Expeditionary Force must have felt, at this spot, on that very special day? Later in the day, Captain Meriwether Lewis climbed atop the High Moun(d) located to the

northeast. He noted there were three rings, concentering on the Moun(d), and when descending it, he noted the openings to caves. Those were the very caves that Amelia Earhart played in as a child. The Corps of Discovery spent the night of July 4, 1804 a few miles north of here. They named the place, Independence Creek, they fired the cannon from the 55'-long keelboat, and each man received an extra gill (about 4 oz.) of whiskey to celebrate the occasion. During the night, one man was bitten by a rattlesnake—that area is called Joe Field's Snake Prairie. Captain Lewis applied the treatment and Private Fields recovered. In the days which preceded their arrival here, the men endured the toils of hot summer-time weather, and arduous travel against the current. They complained of boils, leeches in the river, the relentless humidity and heat, and the scourge of mosquitoes which came out during the cooler evening hours. The weary men were certainly ready for an excuse to celebrate, and celebrate they did."

Mrs. Vincent Traffas unveiled the marker and spoke to the occasion. "This marker is placed near the Fourth of July 1804 Creek where the Corps of Discovery rested at noon. The words inscribed on the reverse of the marker are taken from the Journal of William Clark on July 4, 1804. 'Passed a Creek 12 yds. Wide...comeing out of an extensive Prarie reching within 200 yards of the river, as this Creek has no name, and this being the...4th of July the day of the independence of the U.S....call it...4th of July 1804 Creek.'

The second marker placed in Atchison is located in Independence Park adjacent to the Missouri River at the junction of Commercial Street with River Road. At this marker, you can see the current of the Missouri River. Imagine yourself battling the current for the next 1,400 miles, or so. The High Moun(d) referred to in the journals is directly across from the marker. This is where Capt. Lewis stood on the afternoon of July 4, 1804. The marker there is inscribed with words from the Journal of William Clark: 'Capt. Lewis walked on the Shore above this Creek and discovered a high moun(d) from the top of which he had an extensive view, 3 paths Concentering at the moun(d).'

In the name of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, these two markers are dedicated to the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence. Forever may this holiday be remembered, and be celebrated, by all who revere the history of these United States. May we never shrink from our convictions and may we all work to preserve our American Heritage.

Mr. Scott Knoch, Mayor of Atchison, came forward to accept the two historical markers presented to the City of Atchison to commemorate the Lewis and Clark Expedition who celebrated Independence Day here in 1804.

Mrs. Albert R. Hagemann, State Chaplain gave the benediction. II Corinthians 3:17, Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is Liberty. "O God, you have bound us together in a common life. We thank you for all the men and women who have made this country strong. Grant that our people may understand what it is

they celebrate on July Fourth. We thank you for the faith we have inherited in all its rich variety, and may each of us in our own way make sure that, *life*, *liberty*, and the pursuit of happiness is shared by all, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The marker in Independence Park was viewed as guests drove by on their way to White Cloud for the final ceremony.

### White Cloud

The group arrived at White Cloud for the ceremony with the Iowa Tribe at 3:00 p.m. Mrs. Traffas called for the Color Guard to present the colors and led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. She welcomed the guests to White Cloud, one of the oldest towns in Kansas which holds much charm. They gathered at the Old Steamboat Landing to dedicate a marker to commemorate the Lewis and Clark Expedition of 1804-1806. Mrs. Traffas presented Mary Harvey, Pow Wow Committee-woman of the Iowa Tribe. Mrs. Traffas told of the historical significance to this spot. "We are honored to be in your presence today. It is significant that once again, red and white hands are clasped in friendship. As the Corps of Discovery encountered American Indians, they offered peace medals and other trade goods. The medals were significant, as one side revealed the image of President Thomas Jefferson, and on the reverse were two hands crossed in friendship-one white, one red. These medals became treasured objects in tribal circles. Time and time again, the American Indians came to the rescue of the Corps of Discovery. They provided the explorers with needed transportation in the form of horses and boats, they provided food and lodging, offered an inside look of their welldeveloped and functional civilizations. The Lewis and Clark Expedition encountered the following tribes in their two and one-half year expedition: Missouri, Oto, Omaha, Yankton Sioux, Teton Sioux, Arikara, Mandan, Hidatsa, Assinboin, Cheyenne, Crow, Blackfeet, Shoshoni, Nez Perce, Walula, Upper Chinookan, Chinook-proper, Clatsop and Tillamook. From these great tribes came such stirring peoples as Black Buffalo, Chief Cameahwait, the Nez Perce woman called Watkuweis, the resourceful Shoshoni Sacagawea, Old Tobey, to name but a few. The meeting of these white European explorers and the civilized peoples were to forever change the face of this Nation. It was on July 10, 1804 that the Corps of Discovery reached this site. As they camped here for the night, they noted the beauty of the land, and commented on the native crops. William Clark recorded in his journal, that on this date "opposit...is a butifull bottom Plain of about 2000 acres... Covered with wild rve and Potatoes...intermix't with the grass, we camped...opposit a vellow Clay Clift."

Mrs. Traffas introduced Mr. Virgil Cruse, Mayor of White Cloud, who came forward to accept the historical marker unveiled by Shirley S. Coupal, State Historian and Mary Harvey of the Iowa tribe. Mrs. Traffas spoke the words of dedication. "This historical marker is placed at the town of

White Cloud, Kansas, adjacent to the Missouri River where the Lewis and Clark Expedition camped on the night of July 10, 1804. The next time they would pass this site was on the return journey, over two years later. Today, it is still a beautiful site, and we know of your plans for future restoration of this site. From this day forward, may this marker stand to remind all Americans of the friendship of the red man with the white man, and the immeasurable assistance given to the Corps of Discovery by the American Indians. I therefore dedicate this marker to the Native Americans of yesterday, and of today.

Mrs. Traffas thanked Mayor Cruse and the members of the Iowa Tribe for their presence which brought extra meaning and significance to the gathering. The benediction was given by Mrs. Albert R. Hagemann, State Chaplain. "As we see the flags unfurled in the Kansas breeze, let us remember that this flag means America first, it means an undivided allegiance. It means America united, strong, and efficient, equal to her tasks. Those are the attributes through which all of our citizens have made this country, the land of the free, and the home of the brave. We thank Thee, Q Lord, for Thy continued blessings to our people. We thank Thee for those who laid the foundations of our national life. Grant that we may ever dedicate ourselves to the unfinished work they so nobly advanced, and give increased devotion that the government of the people, and for the people shall not perish from the earth, through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen."

The Colors were retired. Mrs. Traffas thanked the Colonial Color Guard of the Kansas and Missouri Sons of the American Revolution Societies for their participation throughout the day. Gratitude was extended to all who attended and participated in the festivities. A special invitation was extended to visit the sites of the markers often as we prepare for the celebration of the Bicentennial of the Lewis and Clark Expedition beginning in 2003 A.D.

The lovely page holding the Kansas flag is Amy Huffman Navarro, a member of the Arthur Barret Chapter in Marysville, Kansas. Kansas Daughters have pursued excellence in many areas in their 102nd year. The proceeds from the sale of insignia, which belonged to Mrs. Bertram J. Lempenau, Past Librarian General and Honorary State Regent, totaled over \$ 700 which was donated to the NSDAR Library in her memory. Generous bequests of over \$ 33,000 benefitted our DAR approved schools.

A Comprehensive Pictorial Survey of all Santa Fe Trail markers in

A Comprehensive Pictorial Survey of all Santa Fe Trail markers in Kansas was published, and was filed at the Kansas State Historical Society, the KSDAR Archives, the Santa Fe Trail Association, the Office of the Historian General, and the NSDAR Library. Also published was LOOKING BACK, TRAILS TO THE SECOND CENTURY which is the comprehensive history of the Kansas Society's first 100 years.

For the second time in this three-year administration, Kansas is proud to sponsor the National winner in the VA Youth Volunteer category. The winner is Eric Rush, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Rush of Topeka, Kansas. He is sponsored by the Prairie Flint Hills Chapter.

Four historical markers were placed along the Lewis and Clark Trail in northeastern Kansas and they were dedicated in formal ceremonies on February 20, 1998. The markers are green Lake Superior granite with all lettering and graphics done in goldleaf on the facade, with a raised text bronze interpretive tablet on the reverse of the markers. 
